Downs liquor hearing tonight

A public hearing on the proposed transfer of a liquor license for Mack Rice of Prime Time Restaurant and Lounge is scheduled tonight at 7 at the Ruidoso Downs municipal building.

Preliminary approval of the transfer has been received from the department of Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC), village clerk Wilma Webb said.

Although trustees voted last Monday to approve the transfer subject to approval of ABC and village attorney Tim Quigley, an ABC official advised the municipality the hearing would have to be held again, Webb said. According to state statutes, the transfer cannot be considered until after ABC has given its preliminary approval, which came after last Monday's meeting.

Petition for larger council circulating

A Ruidoso businessman is circulating petitions for a voter referendum on increasing the size of the Ruidoso village council from five to seven members.

Ralph Rush said he got the idea of working to change the size of the council after reading in an Albuquerque newspaper several months ago that Raton was considering a larger governing body.

Rush said he researched the matter along with an attorney. The petition states that those signing "petition the governing body to adopt a resolution calling for an election on the question

"If five percent of the registered voters in the village sign the petition, Rush said, the council must call for the election. If a majority of voters in the election favor the change, the petition states, 'the terms of all councilmen shall expire 120 days from the date of the certification of the results of the election.'"

Then another election to fill all the seats on the governing body—including the mayor's, according to Rush—would take place within 120 days.

Village clerk Leon Eggleston said he thinks the number of signatures required is five percent of the number of Ruidoso voters in the last general election. That number was not immediately available. All signatures would have to be verified, he added.

Rush said he believes a governing body with a mayor and six councilmen would better represent the people of the village than does the present five-man council. He indicated this is particularly true when any of the council members are out of town and cannot be present at a meeting.

Response to the petition has been favorable, Rush said. He predicted he will have the necessary number of names to present the petition to the village clerk by the end of this week.

Though acknowledging a new election would have the effect of a recall

of the present council, Rush claimed "that is not really the intention." He said some of the council members have told him they agree increasing the size of the governing body is a good idea.

Mayor George White said Monday he does not favor a larger council. "I would say we've got all we could handle," he stated. He believes a smaller body is more efficient, he said, but he acknowledged the argument that there is more representation with a larger body.

Rush pointed to dissension on the present council as a reason for favorable response to the idea among the public. "Based on everybody I've talked to and the people who have signed it (they) are just tired of the dissension on the village council," he said.

He noted campaign promises of some councilmen when they were candidates "versus" their actions on the council as another factor in the public's disenchantment. Rush predicted that if there is another election, voters will look very closely at what candidates say they stand for.

"I don't think it's a particularly bad idea," Councilman Frank Sawyer said Monday when asked about the proposed increase. He noted that it might achieve better representation, but expressed concern over possible changes in council members at this time.

Sawyer explained that with matters the present council is involved in—particularly the Grindstone dam project and the valley water protest—a new set of council members might find themselves in a difficult situation. "It would be kind of bad timing," he said.

"All I'm doing now is getting out and seeing if the people want to do it," said Rush. "I guess more than anything I'm just a concerned citizen."

Water loss way down

While there is talk about obtaining more water for Ruidoso, the village water department is trying to get more water by better using what it already has. According to a report to the village council by Water Board chairman Bill Karn last week, the department's efforts appear to be paying off.

Through a program of water meter and water line replacement, unaccounted water loss has been cut by 40 percent, according to Karn's report.

In any water district, the water consumed by customers never equals the water treated. It is fairly common for 25 percent of the treated water to never reach a customer's tap.

Some of that water is lost through leaks in water lines. Some gets lost because of faulty meters. The fire department uses water that is not metered. Water used to backwash filters is not metered either.

Last summer an average of 40-44 percent of Ruidoso's treated water was lost somewhere in the system, said Karn. When those numbers appeared, village officials realized something needed to be done.

One of the major problems in Ruidoso was old and leaky water pipes. Many water lines in older sections of Ruidoso had corroded over the years and sprouted small but per-

sistent leaks that cost thousands of gallons. Newer lines supplying houses around the Cree Meadows Golf Course were weak when they were installed.

Water superintendent Richard Sanchez said the lines around the golf course were sprouting leaks as often as twice a week.

"That was the biggest problem as far as leaks," said Sanchez of the golf course lines. Last summer the water department replaced about 8,000 feet of the weak water lines with PVC pipe that will withstand up to 200 pounds per square inch of pressure.

This year, Sanchez said the department plans to replace 18,000 feet of line. Much of that will be corroded line in the older parts of Ruidoso. Sanchez said he is working on a program to eventually replace all of the old line in Ruidoso.

The older line is a mixture of all sorts of materials, said Sanchez. In many places copper line was hooked directly to galvanized pipe—which can corrode pipes when electrolysis occurs between the two materials.

Sanchez said many of the leaks do not bubble to the surface and can go undetected for years. Last year, Sanchez said, the department found three or four valves on Meander Drive that were all leaking 10 gallons a minute. Nobody knew about those leaks until the department dug up the lines.

The department is now working to

replace lines on El Paso Street that supply businesses along Sudderth Drive. Business owners had complained to Sanchez about lack of water pressure. When the department dug up the lines, Sanchez said, workers found numerous leaks and some two-inch lines that had so many deposits inside them they were delivering only a fraction of their original capacity.

Sanchez believes the replacement program will reduce the water loss as well as improve pressure for many businesses and homes in Ruidoso.

"In the next few years, it'll show a lot of difference," said Sanchez.

The water department also replaced about 600 faulty water meters last year, said Sanchez. Those faulty meters were supplying millions of gallons of free water as well as adding to the unaccounted-for water.

The new meters better record the actual water use and generate more revenue for the village.

As of June 1983, Karn reported, water lost in the system had dropped from its previous levels of 40-44 percent down to 22-25 percent. He warned that many variables such as backwash, fire department use and stored water make the figures only estimates.

Everyone involved agrees, however, that Ruidoso is getting more water by better using what it has.

Skeen still hopeful for airport

U.S. Representative Joe Skeen said he was disappointed to hear of Interior Secretary James Watt's refusal to allocate land for the Sierra Blanca regional airport, but remained optimistic about the eventual chances for an airport.

"I'm very much disappointed, but it's not the last word," said Skeen.

Watt denied an application for transfer of 1,700 acres from the Bureau of Land Management to the Federal Aviation Administration. The land includes Site B, the site preferred by the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) for the regional

airport. New Mexico State University opposes the transfer because it includes land on which the university is conducting range experiments.

Skeen said he believed there are still "lots of opportunities" to obtain preferred Site B land for the airport. He said he has not talked to Watt but plans to "make the case" for the airport soon. He would not elaborate on what he will tell the Secretary.

"I feel bad that I haven't gotten the chance to talk to him (Watt)," said Skeen. He said debate over issues such as Nicaragua and a belief that the decision would be made later have kept him from approaching Watt.

"I sincerely hope we can work out a compromise that would include Site

B," said Skeen.

He mentioned a possible purchase of the proposed airport site land instead of a trade.

Meanwhile SBAC is considering the option of having the Lincoln County Bar Association file a suit against the Department of the Interior.

SBAC chairman Fred Heckman said the Bureau of Land Management released statements of opposition to the application for the land before it was officially submitted. Heckman believes that violates the Administrative Procedures Act, and attorney Gary Mitchell said he feels the commission has a "meritorious claim."

Running Bucket triumphs

RUNNING BUCKET chewed up seven weary rivals in Sunday's renewal of the prestigious Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby.

It was clearly a mismatch from start to finish in the mile route that offered a tempting purse of \$28,094.

Running Bucket — a colt who always seems to come alive when big money is on the table — went into Ruidoso Derby like a hungry wolf finding an open door at the henhouse.

The only possible stumbling block appeared to be the overpowering favorite, Some Other Brother (40 cents on the dollar), who might have expected to be in for a casual Sunday

romp. A week earlier, Some Other Brother shotgunned his foes in the Derby trials, winning by nearly eight lengths.

Running Bucket, on the other hand, took his lumps in the Derby trials and ran fourth as a heavy favorite. But in Sunday's finale, Running Bucket, piloted by Billy Allen Jr. (for the first time) immediately set his sights on Some Other Brother. The latter wasn't allowed to open up his customary lopsided early lead.

As the two leaders swept down the backstretch, it almost seemed Some Other Brother suddenly realized he would be unable to shake off the pesky

Running Bucket. As if demoralized, Some Other Brother suddenly threw in the towel. The colt lost all interest in the affair and dropped out of contention.

Running Bucket, conversely, was merely getting down to business. He zoomed into a tremendous lead and was perhaps a dozen lengths on top in the upper stretch. With jockey Allen turning in a picture-perfect ride, Running Bucket cruised down to the wire to win by six and three fourths lengths in a clocking of 1:42 1/5 seconds.

Up With People experience memorable year for Susan Travis

Performing for Pope John Paul II in Rome was only one of the highlights of spending a year as an Up With People cast member, related Susan Travis upon her recent return to Ruidoso. Travis spent the past year as one of 120 young people from 17 countries who traveled with the musical dance show from Carrizozo to the Netherlands.

The group first gathered for one month of extensive training in Tucson, Arizona, participating in public relations seminars, dancing and singing workshops and exercise classes, and listening to speakers on various topics.

Then it was off to Carrizozo for the first of countless performances—one that, Susan said, was the highlight in most of the cast members' memories of that year.

The group then headed northeast to Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey—performing at least once in each of eight states over a two-week period. One of the highlights of these shows, Travis related, was performing at the Waldorf Astoria for the opening banquet of the United Nations Business Council.

The next stop was Canada, where the cast spent about two months and visited 17 embassies. Then the group returned to the U.S. to spend two-and-a-half weeks in Cleveland, Ohio, where seven shows were put on for black high schools.

Travis said this stop was probably the best on the U.S. tour because the group was made so welcome. The cast had been warned of possible violence at the schools so the young people were apprehensive about performing there. But Travis said the school students "were excited to have us there. We made a lot of good friends there."

Following additional shows in the Northeast, the 120-member cast disbanded to celebrate Christmas at home. Up With People reconvened in Detroit, Michigan, after the holidays, and performed in eight Michigan cities. The cast also took time out to tour Detroit's auto industries and the Heineken brewery in Michigan. Travis said the group also toured

Heineken in West Germany later on the trip.

Before leaving the states, Up With People appeared in North Carolina and Virginia, and then left from Washington, D.C. for Amsterdam. The cast spent the next four-and-a-half months in Europe, covering Belgium, Switzerland, West Germany, Liechtenstein, Italy and the Netherlands.

Each cast member resides with host families at every stop during the tour, Susan pointed out. She lived with a total of 77 different families during the time she was with Up With People.

"Our goal is to get involved in the community and find out about the people in the area—just get to know them," she explained. The length of stay with each family varied from one night to a month, Susan said.

"It was usually time to leave just as you were starting to get to know them," she lamented. But that serves as motivation to keep in touch with those families, she indicated, pointing out she receives about eight letters every day now from people she met during the year.

The accommodations of the hosts varied tremendously also, Susan noted. The temporary residences ranged from huge mansions to converted barns—"the very poorest places."

Susan even had the experience of living for three-and-a-half weeks in the top "cell" of a monastery, which

she described as "just four beds and a lightbulb."

She did admit she will remember those quarters as the most interesting in which she stayed that year. "We just survived up there for three-and-a-half weeks."

Susan refers to Rome as the "most different" of the European cities she visited. The group's travels in this "very, very large, very crowded city" were made interesting by the repeated bus strikes, Travis noted. The 120 young people relied on the public transportation system to get them to their destinations, but often the bus drivers would go on strike in the middle of the journey. The entire group then had to get off the buses and hail taxis to complete their trip.

The cast did 23 shows in Rome, including one for the Pope at St. Peter's Square. This show was performed in Polish and Italian, Susan noted. By the end of the year's tour, the cast had learned the entire show in Italian and French and half the show in Polish. She said each performance included some folk songs from the country the cast was visiting at the time, or a medley of songs in that country's language.

Asked which was her favorite of all the places visited while on tour with Up With People, Susan chose the Netherlands.

"It was finally spring when we were there," she explained. But the Netherlands also were special because of the beautiful landscape, Susan added. She described it as flat, very green, dotted with windmills and thatched-roof houses, although some were tiled in a style like adobe.

Susan was also enchanted by the people and the Dutch language. She told a friend the people of the Netherlands were most like the people she had left behind in Ruidoso—very helpful and friendly. "Some places were special because of what we did," Susan commented. "Other places were special because of the people."

In addition to all the people met in each country, there were 119 other young people in the cast that became special in the course of the year, Susan indicated.

"It was like having 120 brothers and sisters for a year," she said.

Living with that large a "family," all having to participate in a "very packed" schedule of daily activities, "we went through more emotions in a day than we would in a week at home," Susan said.

Very little free time was available to cast members, she recalled. Although they were supposed to have two free days a month, Susan said "we were lucky if we got one day every three or three-and-a-half weeks."

There was a one-week vacation during Easter that Susan and a friend took advantage of to visit Austria. At the end of the year's tour, cast members had the option of returning directly home or spending two weeks on their own. Susan opted to explore England before settling back in New

Mexico. Now that she is back, she expresses ambivalence about having come to the end of her one-year tour of the world. "I wish I was still over there, but I'm glad to be back, too."

"But there are times when I just miss my buddies," she added. Susan reported on the things she learned while traveling with Up With People.

"I learned I am a lot more capable of doing a lot more things. "And I learned a lot about people, about accepting a lot more things about them ..."

"And I learned that being in a specific place that is really different and exciting is not what makes you

happy. It's the people you're with and dealing with your attitude at that time."

Susan has been working at Ruidoso Downs Race Track this summer. In about two weeks she will leave for college at New Mexico State University, where she spent two years before joining Up With People.

A brand new Up With People cast will begin its year of performances tonight in Carrizozo. Susan said she intends to go and hopes to see a few familiar faces there.

She may even, sometime in the future, sign on as a staff member. But first she plans to spend some time "in retrospect."

"You have to take time to look back before you go back in; otherwise it will be so muddled," she remarked.

Sunday's supporting stakes race was the \$14,575 Three Bars Handicap at 870 yards. The sprint went to Mighty Duck, a 3-1 shot ridden by Leroy Coombs. Mighty Duck won by an easy two and one fourth lengths, earning \$8,745. The payoffs: \$8.80, \$5. \$4. The heavy favorite, Special Hank (saddled with a 130-pound load) was never in contention and ran fifth.

JUSTANOLD LOVE, a chestnut mare with career earnings of \$592,156, won brilliantly on Saturday's program at Ruidoso Downs and set the top qualifying time for the upcoming \$1,500,534 All-American Gold Cup.

The Gold Cup, the exclusive domain of four-year-olds, is one of the world's richest quarter horse races. The winner of the '83 version (which comes up Sunday, August 21) will collect \$750,267. That's the second-richest victory slice in quarter horse history, second only to the \$1 million which goes to the winner of the All-American Futurity.

Justanold Love raced in Saturday's 10th race, which was the last of five 440-yard elimination trials for the Gold Cup. The mare ripped up her foes with ease, leading from start to finish under Jerry Nicodemus and clocking the distance in 21.49 seconds.

Another mare owned by Jumonville, Dashingy, also qualified handsomely for the Gold Cup. Dashingy won the third trial heat by a half-length in 21.66 seconds. Nicodemus was aboard that one, too. Dashingy, purchased for only \$50,000 in the 1980 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs, has earned over \$900,000 so far.

War Star Wrangler, owned by Larry Hughes of Salida, Colorado, qualified second-best with a 21.58 clocking. He won by a length. Johnny Vittorio (owned by Roland Marney of Houston, Texas) was next with 21.61, followed by Turn Bugs Loose, 21.62 (Ralph Shebester of Wynnewood, Oklahoma); Dashingy, 21.66; Shawnee High, 21.71 (Jim and Charles Thornberry of Locust Grove, Oklahoma); Mr Easy Ed, 21.72

(George Suthers of Sayre, Oklahoma); Hempens Jet, 21.73 (James Helzer of Mansfield, Texas); Cute Investment, 21.75 (Fletcher Huskey and Sam Womack of Poolville, Texas); and Viva El Sels, 21.80 (Cimarron Ranches of Marble Falls, Texas).

BURNELL, the colt who rattled off seven straight wins before finishing fourth as an 8-5 favorite in the \$689,800 Rainbow Futurity, came through with a coasting win on Friday's program at Ruidoso Downs.

Burnell won the 10th of 11 first-round elimination heats for the upcoming \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity.

In order to survive the first round, a hopeful had to finish in the top three in his trial heat. The final elimination round (in which the clock comes into play) is scheduled for August 25. Burnell raced as a 1-5 favorite in his 440-yard trial spin and got the lead from the first jump. He was never under pressure and was letting up at the end. He hit the wire with a two-length lead, clocking the distance in 21.82 seconds — one of the fastest of the day.

Mr Crimson Bug, the colt who took third in the Rainbow Futurity, won easily in Friday's fourth race and returned \$2.80 to win. He's owned by Jerry Rheudasil and Wilbur Smith of Lewisville, Texas.

Another strong performance was turned in by On A High (a winner of almost \$84,000) in the 11th race. The colt won handsomely as a 1-9 favorite. Steve Harris was up. On A High is owned by Jerry Rheudasil, Preston Carter and B.F. Phillips Jr. of Lewisville, Texas.

Friday's program was the third and final day of first-round All-American Futurity trials.

MEGANETTE, the filly who scored a nose victory in the recent \$689,800 Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, took a big step toward the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity during Thursday's program.

The 12-race agenda included 11 first-round trial heats (each at 440 yards) for the All-American Futurity.

In order to advance into the final qualifying round on August 25, a hopeful had to finish in the top three in his first-round elimination run.

Meganette drew into Thursday's first race and flashed to an easy one and one fourth length victory as an odds-on favorite. The mutual returns were \$2.80, \$2.10, \$2.10. Jerry Nicodemus was up for the San Jose Cattle Company of Pleasanton, Texas.

The win was Meganette's third out of eight starts. She's earned almost \$275,000 so far.

Tinys Rose Bud, an easy winner of the \$99,834 Rainbow Futurity Consolation, raced in Thursday's third race and hit the wire a half-length on top. The win payoff was \$2.60. Jacky Martin was up. Tinys Rose Bud is owned by Willie R. Talley of Athens, Texas. The win was the fifth in Tinys Rose Bud's career.

Dashin Angel, another major two-year-old star (a winner of over \$140,000 thus far), made her All-American bid in the eighth race as a weighty 1-9 favorite and came through handsomely. She won by a length, returning a meager \$2.20 to win. The daughter of Dash For Cash is owned by Charles R. Weik of San Antonio, Texas. Hugh Tucker is the trainer and Jacky Martin does the riding.

EASILY A TWELVE and Racy N Lacy, two standouts from the barn of trainer H. Don Farris, were the two key horses in Wednesday's opening round of All-American Futurity elimination trials at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The two fillies each posted impressive victories in rapid times as 98 two-year-olds took the first step towards qualifying for the All-American Futurity, the third and final leg of the Triple Crown series for juvenile quarter horses.

The first three finishers in each of 33 elimination races will advance to the time trials on Thursday, August 25. The 10 fastest runners in the time trials will gain spots in the All-American Futurity on Labor Day at Ruidoso Downs.

The winner of that 440-yard classic will collect \$1 million from the total purse of \$2,530,000.

Easily A Twelve was in command throughout the 11th trial heat, registering a frontrunning one and one half length win in 21:91. That was the fastest time of the 11 trial winners.

Racy N Lacy, despite stumbling badly at the start of the 440-yard dash, recovered under magnificent handling by Jerry Nicodemus to post a win in the fifth trial heat by almost one length. Her time was a brilliant 21:92, the second-fastest of the day.

It was the Dash For Cash filly's second win in three outings. She won the prestigious Sun Country Futurity on April 24 at Sunland Park for her most important career triumph.

She's earned \$93,150 for owner R.D. Hubbard of Kingsport, Tennessee.

Racing continues this week at Ruidoso Downs with All-American Futurity elimination trials on Thursday and Friday while 12-race programs are slated for Saturday and Sunday.

Post time for each day's 12-race program will be 1 p.m.

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

However, Tularosa may be the weakest team on the Ruidoso schedule.

The Warriors will also play defending state AAA division champion Artesia High School and 1981 AAA division state champion Portales High School.

Both of those schools are supposed to be tough again this season, as most schools with a lot of football tradition usually are.

Other schools on the Ruidoso non-district schedule include Lovington High School (in the season opener); Clint, Texas; and New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI).

None of the above schools is a soft touch. The Warriors may have a tough time against these schools, but that should help get them ready for the district season.

The Artesia contest will be played

Friday, October 14. There is one district game (Hot Springs High School of Truth or Consequences) before it, but the rest of the district games follow the Artesia contest on the schedule.

When Ruidoso travels to Cobre High School Friday, October 21, it should definitely be ready for the Indians.

In the past, the Warriors have played a number of AA division teams during the non-league season. That was due mainly to the fact Ruidoso didn't enter the AAA division until 1979, so it still had AA division teams on its schedule.

Whether that helped or hurt Ruidoso when it entered district play is a matter for debate.


However, most teams that play tough non-district teams are usually emotionally tougher when the district season begins.

Propnsner optimistic on track

Roy Propnsner is hopeful that a Ruidoso bicycle motocross track can be completed by late September. Propnsner, who is president of the local motocross organization, hopes to have a temporary track at Eagle Cree Ski and Recreation Area finished by the fall.

He is also trying to get some area for a permanent track among 22 acres behind White Mountain Middle School. The area will probably be leased to the village by the school district.

"I have to get permission from the Parks and Recreation Department committee to use it," he said.

If the track were built behind the middle school, it would be one of several activities scheduled for that area.

Propnsner is going ahead with building the temporary track at Eagle Creek, regardless of what happens with the 22 acres near the middle school.

He has ordered a \$900 starting gate, and he thinks it will arrive within the next few days.

Other costs will probably include \$400 for a public address system, \$50 for safety padding, \$50 for extra plywood for the starting gate and \$25 for wiring. Excavation costs will be \$250 to \$300.

All of the above materials could be transferred to the site near the middle school, if the permanent track is approved.

Propnsner has raised \$1,800 from various businesses and individuals in the area. A total of 58 sponsors have offered money for the track and organization.

He is also encouraged by the response of youths in the Ruidoso area who have expressed an interest in the sport.

"About 10 to 12 kids have told me they're interested in the sport," Propnsner said.

Propnsner's son Jason, 11, is one of the youths interested in the sport. Jason has competed in two races this summer, taking a second in one race and third in the other.

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


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
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

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New sledding area proposed

Ruidoso may have a new park and a safer sledding area. The Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association (ECWSA) Thursday expressed interest in a presentation by Ruidoso parks and recreation director Pam Graves, during which she suggested using some of the association's land for recreation.

Graves told the board she thinks there is considerable public interest in an increased park system. She noted that ECWSA has land it is not using, and she especially noted a tract of land at the corner of Ski Run Road and Highway 57.

"I think it could be used quite well," said Graves. She said she would like to encourage sledding on a hill there and reduce sledding next to the highway at the top of Alto Crest.

The association board members responded favorably to Graves' presentation. R. L. Van Norman said it was a good idea as long as the association had no liability for people using a recreation area. Don Stark was also in favor of the recreation area, "if it's going to benefit the general public."

"I'd like to see it put in the hands of a specific group," said association president George White. He said a responsible group could police the

area and keep it clean. White said the association could provide Graves with a plat of the 49.4-acre tract and she could request a right to use part of the land at the next meeting.

Also at Thursday's meeting, attorney Gary Mitchell briefed the association on the legality of its bylaws, and suggested some changes. He said the bylaws are basically sound and legal, but he attempted to clarify the powers of the association board and the governing bodies of the participating municipalities.

The ECSWA board discussed amending two of the bylaws at a special meeting June 7. One of the amendments changed terms of board members from two, four and six years to six years for all the board members. The other proposed amendment changed the power of removal from the municipal governing bodies to the association board.

Mitchell said state statutes governing corporations invest shareholders with the power to change the bylaws and to appoint board members. Since ECSWA is a corporation and Capitan and Ruidoso are shareholders, the governing bodies of the two villages have the power of bylaw amendment and director appointment and removal, said Mitchell.

The association board can recommend bylaw changes, but they have to

be approved by Capitan and Ruidoso village councils, said Mitchell.

Mitchell said he would write an amendment to change the terms of board members to six years, which could be approved by the association board and the two village councils. The change is an attempt to clarify confusion over the length of terms, said Stark.

Richard Sanchez, Ruidoso water superintendent, reported that perforations on steel sand removers at the Eagle Creek diversion point are 90 percent closed by corrosion. He said it is not a crucial problem but that the sand removers are not working properly. A committee including water superintendents from Capitan and Ruidoso, along with four board members, will inspect the diversion point and sand removers.

The association also elected Don Stark president, George White vice-president and Valton Hall secretary-treasurer. The officers will all serve one-year terms.

Board member Jim Hine thanked Jim Thompson for serving as the association's attorney for over 20 years without ever charging a penny for his efforts.

It was reported that the 1982 audit will be ready for the next regular meeting. Stark moved that the board meet in executive session Tuesday to discuss the audit.

Action on judgeship postponed

The state Judicial Council put off making a recommendation about an additional judge for Lincoln County at its meeting Friday, but promised to consider the matter next month, Lincoln County Bar Association president Mel O'Reilly reported.

O'Reilly and four other bar association members went to the council meeting in Santa Fe to argue the need for a third 12th District judge, but council members "indicated they didn't want to hear from us," O'Reilly said. He explained there was some mixup about whether the issue was on the agenda, but the council finally permitted the attorneys to present their case.

One council member, state Court of Appeals Judge Mary Walters, offered support to the attorneys' arguments, O'Reilly noted. Walters "indicated she viewed the situation as very critical," he said.

The council postponed action on the matter until its next meeting, however.

O'Reilly said he plans to attend that meeting and "will keep attending meetings until we finally get their attention."

"I'm pretty positive we still have the statistical information to back up the need for the judgeship," he stated.

The Bar Association had prepared a packet of statistical information to illustrate the need for another judge here, copies of which were mailed to

each council member and Governor Toney Anaya.

O'Reilly noted, however, that he was disappointed to learn the council is considering using population figures to determine the need for new judgeships in the state in the future. The Ruidoso attorney acknowledged this area would not qualify for an additional judge based on population, but he feels that is not an accurate measure of a judge's caseload.

Currently the Judicial Council does not have a formula for determining the need for additional judgeships, but takes into consideration caseload, number of lawyers in the district, amount of time it takes cases to reach trial and other available information, according to council member Dr. James Beall of Ruidoso.

Principal Roger Sowder urges parents to register their children as



They can deliver "Get Well" balloons to a hospitalized friend; a bouquet of black balloons to a 40th birthday celebrant; or balloons appropriate for any other occasion. The couple will also create a festive atmosphere for a party with their balloon decorating service. Also available are fresh fruit baskets, all delivered free of charge in Ruidoso and for a small fee to outlying towns.

Out-of-town customers also can have merchandise mailed from the store, and will soon be able to purchase balloon souvenirs to send to friends and relatives left at home.

"We feel people here are needing some personalized services," Jeff said.

Something Special also features lots of merchandise that can be personalized at the store with monogramming, engraving, painting and in soft sculpture. The McCurdys also plan to offer embossing for stationery. And customers can bring in their own belongings to be monogrammed.

The idea behind Something Special, Dawn pointed out, is to feature specialty items good for gift-giving on all occasions. Among the other unique gift items available are gourmet jelly beans and imported candies, imported handmade clocks and cypress clocks, framed leather pictures, cocktail glasses, miniatures, country-look items, paper sold by weight and silk jackets to be monogrammed.

There is also a corner designed to keep children occupied while their parents browse. This section features stickers, pencils, plastic boxes, specialty soaps, friendship clips and books.



Sometimes, public officials perform in such a manner that that is all an observer can bring himself to say.

Take the state Racing Commission.

Anyone who follows that body's activities knows the mention of its name is often all that's needed in the way of a punchline.

Members of the commission act as if their appointment is a license to lord it over the horse racing world. Yet they resist the suggestion that their involvement be limited to overseeing the industry—without placing bets and without racing their own horses.

Rules prohibiting commissioners from betting and from racing their horses were recommended in a state Department of Finance and Administration study. But Governor Anaya, as a "compromise," proposed that commissioners simply keep records on bets they place and horses they run.

Evidently, Toney saw prohibiting commissioners from the two activities as something that would take too much sweetness from the political plum. That that is exactly what he considers the job to be was clearly evidenced by his appointment of a man with absolutely no knowledge of racing, Robert Robles, and designation of the man as chairman.

Then Toney got mad when Robles took a state airplane on a junket from Santa Fe to Ruidoso, along with some buddies. Hey, he was only trying to learn about racing!

Like we said, what a joke.—TP

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE — Some footnotes to news stories you may have read this hot August week:

—That young man named Robert Robles, one of the Governor's many attorney friends, may have learned a few things during the last seven days. He was named to the Racing Commission, though he told us he knew nothing whatever about racing. In fact, as everyone in the news business knew, he was set to be chairman of the Commission, because that's the way Toney Anaya wanted it.

That isn't the way he wants it now. After that flight to Ruidoso in the State Corporation Commission plane "to inspect conditions" at Ruidoso Downs, Mr. Robles managed to convince the Governor he is not the one to boss a group which oversees a major industry.

The Governor said he thought the flight was "totally inappropriate" and that he expressed his "complete dissatisfaction" with the conduct. ("I blew my stack" is what he actually said.)

He was little kinder in his comments about Eric Serna.

Serna, of course, is chairman of the already embattled Corporation Commission, and he set up the flight, which also included Robles' law partner, a Las Cruces electrical contractor and the manager of Serna's Dona Ana campaign last election. None of these had any business on the flight, not even the thin excuse of "checking out the plane" which Serna used for his own presence.

Anaya's comment on that: "I don't think Eric is any more competent at checking out planes than I am, and I have no competence in the matter."

—The Governor is also "not satisfied," he said, with the way things are going at his new Department of Economic Development and Tourism.

He's "concerned" about things there, he admitted, as he revealed that he called Alex Mercure, boss of that operation, to come to the Governor's office at 2:30 p.m. and stay as long as it takes, "even if that's till 2:30 the next morning," to talk about problems and their solutions.

Anaya is fond of saying that he will be judged on the basis of how he performs in the area of economic expansion for the state.

As of this week, there have been no performance — only promise after promise from Mercure and his cohorts.

—We got more of the same with Toney's latest appointment to Cabinet and near-Cabinet positions.

We got a 100%, Simon-pure, totally accredited environmentalist, Brant Calkin, former national chief of the Sierra Club, to run Natural Resources.

Then to head the Department of Licenture, we got another attorney and another woman.

She's Christina L. G. Chavez, of Las Cruces, who has been practicing here for a few years. She's 30 years old, and she says what experience she has in the field of licensing is limited to representing some contracting firms which have to deal with Construction Industries, the part of her new department which oversees builders around the state.

She replaces Harvey Fruman, who was sent over to get that new operation on the road (it's the one which is supposed to consolidate as many licensing boards and commissions as possible).

Fruman didn't really take charge there until July 1, and he'll be gone 60 days later.

That's not because he isn't capable; he is. It's because Anaya looked around his suite of offices and realized he didn't have anyone around anymore who knew anything about him except Shirley Scariflott.

He called Fruman back, since his former law partner is one who can get along with him and roll with the punches.

We are ticking toward the end of the eighth month of the Anaya occupancy of the governor's chair, and the man who sits there is still trying to find his style and his administration.

We'd all be better off if he'd stay home and keep his mind on that job, which is a big and important one.

Reporter's Round

When I was a little missionary kid growing up in Africa, my teacher—Miss Snyder—sometimes assigned difficult essays. One of the hardest to write on was the topic, "What America Means to Me."

I had lived in the United States for the first three years of my life and then during first grade. Usually I could only come up with something like Fritos, grandparents and Captain Kangaroo to describe what America meant to me.

As I grew older, traveled more, and even came to the States once or twice for furlough, I continued to update my concept of my native land.

Later I had to take leave of what had been my home for so many years, and journey to this country for college. I spent three years in Missouri. Then I married, and after one year in South America, I have lived in the USA for five years in a row, sampling the bounties of Wyoming, Texas and New Mexico.

In these past years I have tried to add to my understanding of what America means to me.

A short time ago, I came to work for The Ruidoso News. Here I feel as though I've been blessed with a rare opportunity to discover my country at the grassroots level.

So, now I think I'll take the opportunity to reflect on my newly reevaluated concepts arising from that essay Miss Snyder assigned.

This is what America means to me:

•Democracy. My first day with the newspaper plunged me into contact with the police force, the district attorney, and a couple of very unhappy U.S. citizens. After sorting through a confusing mass of events and accusations concerning the theft of a horse, I had a pretty fair picture of how our local government works.

People, not regimes or codes, are at the center of everything. This makes for some interesting complications. People misunderstand one another. People forget things. People make mistakes.

But all this pales beside the important fact that here in America people have the unique opportunity to try their very best to make the country run smoothly. And what I discovered at the end of my horse stealing coverage, is that even though there may be many people-related faults with our democratic system, at least we are the ones running things.

We choose those who represent us, protect us, and enforce the laws we make. We sometimes have to pay a price for a government with people at the center. But all in all, I think it's the best system going.

•Right of peaceable assembly. Our country is consumed with meetings! I have watched the Mule Skinners gathered in the public library. I attended a meeting of the Lincoln County Mental Health Association board. I went to a high school reunion in Capitan. And I witnessed a big family reunion at the fairgrounds there.

Americans just love to get together. I've written about weddings, anniversary parties, open houses, funerals, seminars, workshops, fairs and potluck suppers. It seems we like one another's company and find all sorts of ways to meet for fun, planning or celebration.

•Free enterprise. There aren't many countries in the world where a 17-year-old high schooler would have the financial and artistic freedom to create works of art in bronze, like Steve Snidow has. And there aren't too many places where your average citizen would be able to come up with the money to indulge in purchasing a work of art he fancies.

Not only did I get to see Steve at work, but I also had the chance to go to the art festival. Here I saw craftsmen from all over the USA who were supporting themselves in small businesses through the work of their own hands.

I also met Dr. Arlene Brown, a new family physician, who has hung her shingle in Ruidoso. In America, both men and women get to choose what they want to do with their lives. We can decide where we want to work and live. Now that's nice!

•Government care. I've heard a fair amount of grumbling about government programs. But since working at the newspaper, I've been amazed at how many helpful resources are available to us through the government.

I met Barry Herd, our agriculture extension agent. He comes to us from New Mexico State University and is available to help us keep our trees, lawns and gardens in top shape. He also knows a lot about livestock.

This wonderful program also provides a home economist, Mary Ellen Payne, and a 4-H agent, Rick Richardson. And if you want to see something heartwarming, go to the Lincoln County Fair August 17-20. There you'll see the products of young people who have been given the chance to grow and learn, because of a government that cares and a group of citizens willing to work.

So, Miss Snyder, I'm still working on that assignment. But these days, I'm feeling pretty good about what America means to me.

Said amendments to read as follows:

3-2-9 SEWER SERVICE CHARGE:

The Village shall charge and collect from all users of sewer lines and sewage system for the use thereof, a monthly service charge is hereby set forth:

- A. For all single family dwellings \$6.00
- B. For all other dwellings, including duplexes, multiple family dwellings, rooming houses, trailer courts and all commercial establishments. \$6.00 plus ten (10%) percent of the charge of water
- C. A temporary dwelling shall not have to pay a sewer service charge. A temporary dwelling is a dwelling not having a duration of more than thirty days.
- D. A dwelling is defined as a living unit, separate building, commercial business, church or school. It is the intent of this Ordinance that a separate unit must pay the same sewer rate as stated in A. and B. above.
- E. For all users outside the village limits, there shall be assessed an amount one and one-half (1 1/2) times greater than the charge of the category they are in as described in Subsections above.
- F. No free service shall be provided for any user, public or private.

3-3-2 MONTHLY RATE:

The Village shall charge and collect from all residences benefiting from garbage, refuse and trash pick-up, a monthly charge as hereby set forth:

- A. For all single family dwellings \$6.00
- B. For all other dwellings, including duplexes, multiple family dwellings, rooming houses, trailer courts, the charge shall be per each occupied space or unit \$6.00
- C. For all commercial establishments \$10.00
- D. For schools and industries \$15.00
