Ag experiments on F.S. Mesa explained

About 100 ranchers from New Mexico and Texas Thursday toured the facilities and learned about livestock research at the New Mexico State University (NMSU) Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch.

Professors from the university explained progress and directions of research at Fort Stanton Mesa in grazing systems, nutrition, wildlife, noxious plant control and electric fences. They also explained numerous other research projects going on throughout the university system.

Ranchers from all over New Mexico and parts of Texas greeted old friends as they gathered for coffee and doughnuts at the ranch headquarters. After an hour of gossip and shop talk, university officials herded everybody onto three school buses for a tour of pastures on the Fort Stanton Mesa.

The first stop was the site of experimental studies on short duration grazing. The university has been look-

ing into this revolutionary type of grazing management for three years. Developed by a Rhodesian, Alan Savory, the theory is that many more cattle can graze on range land if the pastures are kept small and the herd is moved from pasture to pasture every few days.

University researchers are looking at a multitude of factors—including calving dates, weight gain, diet and plant response—to determine the effects of running more cattle on the short duration grazing program.

Although it is early to be able to tell just how good Savory's practice is, ranch superintendent Gene Parker said he thinks it may turn out to be an excellent management system. Researchers have been able to carry 50 percent more cattle on the land than is generally considered viable. Calving dates also appear to be earlier with the short duration grazing cattle, reported NMSU professor Rex Pieper.

Research will continue for many years, say researchers Professor Gary Donart explained they want to study all aspects of the program in

order to make recommendations to ranchers who work in a variety of conditions.

Associate professor Kirk McDaniel told the ranchers about research on control of broom snakeweed at the second stop on Thursday's mesa tour. Snakeweed is a plant with no forage value that causes abortion in some cows and is a problem throughout New Mexico, said ranch superintendent Parker.

McDaniel reported the effective use of herbicides can eradicate the noxious plant and increase useful forage plants substantially. He discussed relative merits of herbicide pellets and liquid, and the difficulties with long-term control of the plant.

Professor Howard Wallace and graduate student Mark Judkins reported on their experiments in supplementations of diets with phosphorous and cottonseed cakes. Results were not dramatic and the researchers could not promise the practices are economically viable.

"We need a little more study time to come up with some hard and fast conclusions," said Judkins.

Few of the researchers discussed economic realities during the day.

"We're more trying to learn principles," said Professor Pieper.

Ranchers seemed not to mind, however, and indicated they believe the research is valuable. After each presentation, ranchers asked numerous questions about the experiments and their applications.

"They're doing a lot of good. I think it's great," said one rancher who runs cattle and sheep near White Oaks. He said he reads many of the pamphlets on the experiments available through 4-H clubs and county extension offices.

Professor V. W. Howard told the ranchers about wildlife research on the mesa and the effects of cabling (clearing an area by pulling a cable between two tractors) pinyon-juniper stands. He said mule deer prefer the cabled areas during the spring and summer, but did not appear to distinguish between cabled and non-cabled areas during the fall and winter.

Make Mine Cash(es) in

Make Mine Cash, a filly who had made only \$14,138 this year, joined quarter horse racing's millionaire club with a victory in Sunday's finale of the \$1,696,244 All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

But it was a case of backing into the victory—and into the hefty winner's purse of \$564,849.

The awesome favorite, Mr Master Bug, powered his way to a thumping one and one fourth length win in the super-rich 440-yard dash. But it was obvious the colt's number would be coming down.

Shortly after the start, just as Mr Master Bug was winding himself up for a high-flying assault, he veered in sharply from the number 3 post. The maneuver came so quickly that jockey Jacky Martin was unable to alter the wayward course.

Mr Master Bug severely bothered Bartendress, a 7-1 shot coming out of the number 2 post. Ridden by Larry Byers, Bartendress lost considerable ground, but the game filly showed her courage by gathering herself up and finishing with a strong move.

Jockey Martin, aboard Mr Master Bug, went to left-handed whipping, but the tactic was too late. Mr Master Bug settled along the rail and really took off—sweeping across the finish line with a one and one fourth length lead in an alert clocking of 21:58 seconds.

Make Mine Cash, a 7-1 shot directed by Jerry Nicodemus, closed gamely to finish second. She raced without incident. Bartendress, despite all her problems, hit the wire in third place, three-fourths length behind Make Mine Cash.

The stewards immediately called an inquiry, and the decision wasn't long in coming: Mr Master Bug, the 1-5 favorite, was disqualified for bothering Bartendress. In the reshuffled order of finish, Mr Master Bug was dropped to third (behind the horse he had bothered). That put Bartendress in second place.

The ironic aspect is that Make Mine Cash, who was in no way involved in the fracas, benefited tremendously. It was a case of being in the right place at the right time, and Make Mine Cash was advanced into the victory position.

Make Mine Cash is owned by R.D.

Hubbard of Kingsport, Tennessee. The rider is one of the great ones—Jerry Nicodemus. H. Don Farris, one of the sport's top trainers, is the conditioner behind Make Mine Cash.

Although Make Mine Cash had earned a modest \$14,138 this year with a record of 1-2-1 from five starts, she'd hit the jackpot as a two-year-old in 1982, earning \$506,426 with a 3-1-1 record from 10 starts.

The Derby winner's purse of \$564,849 pushed Make Mine Cash's career earnings up to \$1,085,413. That made the filly the fifth millionaire in quarter horse history. She also became the fifth richest quarter horse of all time.

Mr Master Bug, who had hoped to vault to the top of the list with a win in the All-American Derby, had to be satisfied with his third-place paycheck of \$110,255. That put his total income at \$1,479,272, and kept him in third-place, just behind Highesterjet's total of \$1,518,402.

The sport's top money-maker remains Dashing, who vaulted to the head of the class a week earlier with her win in Ruidoso's \$1,500,583 All-American Gold Cup for four-year-olds.

Nearly overlooked in the Derby outcome was Bartendress, owned by Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas. The courageous filly nailed down a hefty \$235,777 for second, that put her total income at \$451,468.

Here's the way the mutual payoffs went: Make Mine Cash, \$17.40, \$7.40, \$2.20; Bartendress—\$10.60, \$2.40; Mr Master Bug—\$2.10.

Make Mine Cash is by Dash For Cash out of Easy Missile Bar.

As the stewards were sorting out the finish, jockey Richard Bickel, aboard Camelot King (who ran eighth), claimed an objection against Make Mine Cash. The claim was not allowed.

Here's the order of finish, starting with fourth: Tres Pass, earning \$78,027; 5th—Miss Squaw Hand, \$62,761; 6th—Dynago Victory, \$59,368; 7th—Betts Full Moon, \$55,976; 8th—Camelot King, \$54,279; 9th—Top Nobleman, \$50,887; 10th—Steppin For Te, \$47,494.

Miss Squaw Hand, the top qualifier (21.65) and a stablemate of Mr Master Bug (she's also owned by Marvin Barnes), was never in contention. The filly, piloted by Jerry Burgess, got out of the gate in sixth place and was unable to improve her status.

Except for the mayhem caused by Mr Master Bug, the Derby was pretty much a cut-and-dried affair. The general feeling was that Mr Master Bug, had he stayed on a straight course, would have handled his Derby foes with ease.

Prior to the Derby, the colt had shown no tendency to run any crooked courses.

Last year, he'd won the All-American Futurity. Earlier this season, he'd made easy work of the Rainbow Derby in a brilliant clocking of 21.38 seconds.

A slight headwind was blowing during Sunday's All-American Derby.

After the race, Make Mine Cash's connections were elated with the decision.

Many sick but cause unknown

An unknown malady plaguing many Ruidosoans has caused enough concern to attract the attention of state epidemiologists. The illness is generally characterized by diarrhea, vomiting and cramps.

Epidemiologists from the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) have been called in to investigate, but have determined no causes as of Monday morning.

"We don't really have any conclusions," said EID district supervisor Jeff Sheyka.

The illness appears to be widespread throughout the area.

"There seem to be lots and lots of people who have it," said Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital nursing director Mary Lou Brown.

Doctors Edward Stalzer and Lance Kirkegaard said they have recently been seeing more gastrointestinal disorders than usual. Stalzer said about five people a day have been coming to his office with the complaint during the past week.

"I really think it's bad," said Stalzer. He said one to two people out of 20 with the illness require hospitalization.

Sheyka of EID said epidemiologists last week interviewed close to 40 people with the disease and took stool samples. As of Monday morning he did not have any results from laboratory tests and would not speculate on the source of the problem. He said he expects results early this week.

Although many people have blamed the water in Ruidoso for carrying the disease, both Brown at the hospital and Dr. Kirkegaard were doubtful. Brown said she had seen people from Texas and Albuquerque who also had the illness. Kirkegaard said he believed more people would be affected if the water were the source of the problem.

"I think it's the whole area," said Stalzer. He said he has seen cases of the disease in a number of people from Texas. Sheyka also reported people in Ruidoso Downs have come down with the disease.

The Ruidoso water department, however, has received numerous calls about the illness.

"Water gets the blame," said water quality laboratory technician Becky Durham.

Durham said she tested water all around the village every day last week after receiving numerous phone

calls. "All test results are negative and the chlorine residual is higher than normal," she reported.

Durham tests for chlorine and bacteria. Her tests do not, however, include checks for parasites. The disease giardiasis is caused by a parasite, and Durham said the epidemiologists' stool tests would find the parasite giardia if it is present.

Water superintendent Richard Sanchez said the village has been using considerably more well water in the last three weeks. Durham estimated the village is using about 60 percent well water from four different wells and 40 percent water from Alto Lake.

The Upper Canyon and Pinecliff have different water supplies than the rest of the village. The Upper Canyon is supplied water from the Rio Ruidoso. Pinecliff gets its water from a well.

"The village runs a very good water system," said Sheyka.

Whether water is the cause or something else is carrying the disease, Ruidosoans are getting sick in large numbers.

"I think it's common knowledge that there's something basically wrong here," said Dr. Edward Stalzer.

Rabbits, which he pointed out are a prime game animal in some areas, also preferred the cabled areas during every season but winter.

The three buses returned to ranch headquarters for a barbecue lunch and numerous displays on research done throughout the university.

The whole morning was spent on the mesa on which many people would like to see a regional airport built. Parker said grazing research on the mesa accounts for about 50 percent of the research on the ranch.

He explained that the proposed airport would cross numerous pastures on the mesa. It would interfere with the short duration grazing experiments explained earlier in the day. The airport would also cross pastures now used for a four-pasture rotation experiment and moderate continuous grazing experiments.

"It would pretty well disrupt the grazing," said Parker, who pointed out that the experiments on the mesa would have to be abandoned. "We can't just move it. There's not a place."

"This experimental ranch is unique

because it is the only major range research facility that represents the nearly 90 million acres of mid-altitude delicate range ecosystems of the West," states an NMSU pamphlet.

Parker explained that large tracts of land with a variety of growing conditions are necessary to obtain a wide base of data from which to make conclusions.

He indicated the size of the airport is not the major problem. But because the airport would cross so many pastures, he said, it would disrupt much more than most people realize.

A pamphlet from NMSU states that most professors believe a minimum of three to five years is needed for any experiment. Parker said many experiments need 10 to 20 years before there can be any real understanding of the range's ecology and the effects of different grazing patterns.

A towering black cloud brought rain after lunch and cancelled a planned trip to the Bonita Corral for live animal demonstrations. While it cancelled the afternoon's activities, Parker and the ranchers were very happy with the rainfall in a very dry summer.

Parker said the herd of approximately 400 cattle would have to be

cut almost in half because of the poor condition of the pastures.


Instead of touring to the corrals, the ranchers crowded inside the headquarters for a number of presentations on research at Fort Stanton and other experimental ranches in the university system.

During these talks, extension agents discussed two very practical strategies for cattle management. Extension entomologist Mike English told ranchers about advances being made in the field of ear tags for fly control. He said ranchers could count on a return of about \$21 on a \$2.50 investment in the ear tags.

Ron Parker told ranchers a one dollar investment in growth implants would bring a \$15 to \$20 return in larger cattle at sale time.

Professors also discussed research going on in breeding soundness evaluation and cancer eye treatment. Tim Ross outlined the fledgling sheep research beginning at Fort Stanton and findings so far on work with predator-proof electric fences.

Gene Parker said there are always about four or five major projects in progress at one time on the ranch. Anywhere from two to 20 graduate students can be simultaneously work-

ing on their own projects, which are generally related to the major projects, he said. In the 20 years of existence of the experimental ranch,

researchers have published 125 papers on experimental results, according to an NMSU pamphlet. Many of the ideas for research

come from the ranchers themselves, said Parker. "We're trying to change as the industry changes," said Parker.

"During the race, I just watched my filly," said owner R.D. Hubbard. "At one point, I thought I might win it all, but then I was ticked to death to run second. I hadn't even watched the inside horses, but when they came over and said we might win the whole thing on a disqualification, I knew we had a chance."

"Certainly, I would have rather won the race outright, but the filly (Make Mine Cash) broke real well and was with the leaders most of the way," the Kingsport, Tennessee, businessman recalled.

Even if the stewards had not changed the outcome, Hubbard was still pleased the filly ran so well against such a talented field.

"I'm extremely pleased with her race, she ran a big race. She's been training awfully well. We felt she was ready. But to be honest with you, I really thought we couldn't catch Mr. Master Bug or Miss Squaw Hand. I told my friends I thought we could finish third."

"It's certainly the biggest race I've ever won on a disqualification. In fact, it's probably the first time I ever won on a disqualification," he kidded. Hubbard said the victory gave Make Mine Cash an automatic berth in the prestigious Champion of Champions race at Los Alamitos near Los Angeles in December.

"I didn't know if we were going to have a runner in it this year. We've been in it the last few years, but I'm real happy things worked out so we can run in it," Hubbard said.

Although jockey Jerry Nicodemus was excited about the win, he showed what a gracious sportsman he has been throughout his career by feeling concern for the Mr. Master Bug party.

"My filly ran a big race today, but I hate to see anyone lose a race like that on a disqualification," said the veteran rider. "I felt she had a good shot. The filly's been having a few problems, but when you qualify for a race like this anything can happen. That was proven again today."

"I left the gate really well. Mr. Master Bug had me all the way. I never could catch him. My filly broke straight. She ran her own race, she just couldn't catch Mr. Master Bug. She's good and fit now," said Nicodemus.

Jockey Larry Byers on Bartendress, who was placed second following the stewards' decision, said he definitely was bothered by Mr. Master Bug.

"She crossed in front of me. Mr. Master Bug came over and made me check about 50 yards from the gate," Byers noted. "She made me check and then she (Bartendress) came running again. I was out of it when she checked, but she came running again. She deserved a second."

Bartendress' owner, Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas, was also pleased with the race.

"Sure, I'm pleased she was moved up, but even so, she ran a great race

today. I'm really proud of her. She always gives her best," Henderson said.

FLAMING THOUGHT, a 4-1 shot owned by Willie R. Talley of Athens, Texas, caught his foes unawares and led all the way in Saturday's First Consolation of the All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The 440-yard battle carried a total purse of \$247,651. The victory slice amounted to \$37,317, which pushed Flaming Thought's career bankroll just over the \$100,000 level.

Primitime Wrangler, off at nearly 53-1, came on well at the end to finish third, one and one-fourth lengths behind Painted Bug. Jimmie Hunt was up on Painted Bug while Troy Crissup piloted Primitime Wrangler.

Flaming Thought, in logging his second win of the year, covered the 440 yards in a snappy 21.85 seconds on a fast track and returned betting payoffs of \$10, \$3.40, \$3.40.

Painted Bug, the property of 440 Ranches of Aubrey, Texas, collected \$30,532 for second and returned \$2.40, \$2.20. Primitime Wrangler, owned by Tommy Joe Hoyt of Powderly, Texas, handed out a \$9.50 show price.

Here's the way the rest of the field checked in: 4th—Jet Set George, earning \$25,443; 5th—Rare Jet, \$24,595; 6th—Fathers Angel, \$22,899; 7th—Browns Dasher, \$22,051; 8th—Jet Set Princess, \$20,354; 9th—Vons Lucky Moon, \$18,658; 10th—Flamboyant, \$16,962.

MISS AZURE TE BUG moved briskly out of third place to score a half-length win in Friday's \$128,914 Second Consolation of the All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

Miss Azure Te Bug is owned by Marvin Barnes of Ada, Oklahoma and is a stablemate of the two main standouts in Sunday's Derby finale: Mr. Master Bug and Miss Squaw Hand.

Ruidoso patrons made Miss Azure Te Bug a 4-5 favorite in Friday's Second Consolation and the filly looked like a winner, even from the first jump.

The mutual returns on the Second Consolation winner were \$3.80, \$2.40, \$2.20. Amy Jo Mito, a \$4,000 purchase in the 1981 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso, added \$16,996 to her moneyline for her second-place finish. Amy Jo Mito now holds career earnings of \$244,045. The chestnut filly is owned by Tommy Joe Hoyt of Powderly, Texas. The mutual returns: \$3, \$2.60.

Lucks Lucky, owned by Nerrel Brune of Dennis, Texas (and ridden by Larry Byers at just 3-1 odds), hit the wire a neck behind Lucks Lucky and collected \$16,257 for third. The show price: \$3.

The remaining order of finish, with purse-money earned: 4th—San Rosa Leah, \$15,333; 5th—Calm Tom, \$14,410; 6th—Medley Time, \$13,671; 7th—Your Rich, \$12,747; 8th—Kita Blue, \$11,823. Shaken Not Stirred and No Tell Motel were scratched. Each earned \$4,876.

EASILY A TWELVE splashed to a strong three-length win on Thursday's program at Ruidoso Downs and set the top qualifying time for the finale of the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity.

The first 10 races on the 12-race agenda consisted of final-round elimination trials (each at 440 yards) for the world's richest horse race.

The All-American finale, offering an astonishing \$1 million to the winner, comes up on Labor Day. The All-American Futurity is the third and richest jewel in the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses.

A draw was held in the racing office to break the deadlock, and the two winners were Countin The Cash and On A High. That put Rubarb Jones in the top slot for the First Consolation.

Although community participation was disappointing, the first annual Ruidoso Summer String Workshop has already been scheduled for July 13-26, 1984, at La Junta.

Dunn said the workshop here this summer "was far more successful than the previous three years." He attributed its success to the atmosphere at La Junta and to there being "a lot more room to grow."

Workshop organizers and instructors expressed a desire for more community involvement in the program, however. Attendance at the concerts was low. Cultural committee member Jackie Rawlins said the largest audience was about 30 to 40 people, although the concerts were "excellent," according to her.

Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth also noted that the workshop "was dynamite."

"Everybody feels that it came off very, very well," he said, agreeing that the event will get bigger and bigger.

This year the workshop ended with an ice cream social hosted by area young people at La Junta. Next year's plans include a mixer for workshop participants and Ruidoso students in the schools' gifted and talented program.

Fittz said he hopes to find ways to foster more community involvement with the Summer String Workshop and concerts next year.

"I sure am excited about the prospects," Fittz remarked about the entire program. "I've got big dreams!"

Dates for the concerts this winter will be available soon, he reported.

Well, another National Football League (NFL) season is upon us.

The season will begin next Sunday and football fans can look for the usual traditional powerhouses and upstarts.

So here's a look at the 1983 NFL division races, starting with the American Conference (AFC).

The Eastern Division ranks as one of the toughest divisions in the league. The New York Jets and Miami Dolphins are both strong Super Bowl contenders, and the New England Patriots are a rising club.

Look for the Miami Dolphins to edge the Jets out for the division crown again.

The Dolphins have a solid running game and an improved young quarterback in David Woodley.

Miami's "Killer Bees" defense has no real outstanding individuals, but they work well as a team and don't make many mistakes.

The Jets are loaded with talent, but they are not as consistent as Miami.

Richard Todd is improving at quarterback and Freeman McNeil is one of the league's top running backs.

The Jet defense is one of the best in the league, with a strong pass rush.

New England has built well with the draft, enough so to beat out the Buffalo Bills and the Baltimore Colts.

Look for both Miami and New York to go 11-5 on the season (Miami to win the title by virtue of the tie-breaker system). The Patriots will be 9-7, the Bills 7-9 and the Colts 2-14.

Pittsburgh should edge the Cincinnati Bengals for the Central Division title.

The Steelers are on their way back. They've done a good job of rebuilding in the offensive and defensive lines.

Running back Walter Abercrombie gives veteran Franco Harris some help in the backfield.

The Bengals appear to be slipping from their AFC championship of two years ago.

A couple of Cincinnati players have signed United States Football League (USFL) contracts and will probably have a hard time getting as motivated as they were in the past.

Cincinnati is still a solid team, however. The Bengals were 7-2 last year and have one of the league's best quarterbacks in Ken Anderson.

The Cleveland Browns have an improved defense and could contend for a wild-card berth. The Houston Oilers will have to rebuild.

Pittsburgh and Cincinnati will both go 10-6, Cleveland will end up 9-7 and Houston 4-12.

The Western Division should be the most interesting race in the conference.

Look for the San Diego Chargers to nip the Los Angeles Raiders for the title.

The Chargers have an improved defense with rookie Billy Ray Smith a big plus.

San Diego's biggest asset is still its explosive offense, revolving around quarterback Dan Fouts and outstanding receivers.

Fouts is probably the best quarter-

back in the game when he gets protection from his offensive line.

The Raiders are hurting in the offensive line with two men likely out for the season. Quarterback Jim Plunkett has had an up-and-down career, and if the offensive line is hurting, he could have an off season.

But the Raiders are still the Raiders, the team with the best record over the past 20 years.

They led the league in quarterback sacks last season and second-year running back Marcus Allen is one of the NFL's top performers.

Denver will be improved with rookie quarterback John Elway and an always rugged defense. Seattle should also show some improvement, but Kansas City is headed nowhere.

San Diego will go 11-5, with the Raiders 10-6. Denver will be 8-8, Seattle 7-9 and Kansas City 5-11.

Dallas has been the most consistent team in the National Conference (NFC) the past 15 years, but defending Super Bowl champion Washington has a good chance of keeping its edge over Dallas in the Eastern Division.

Running back Joe Washington is healthy, and he should give Super Bowl hero John Riggins some help with the running game.

The Redskins are solid everywhere, from quarterback Joe Theismann to the offensive line and defense.

Dallas is still strong with players like Danny White, Tony Dorsett and Randy White.

But Dallas has some weaknesses on defense, particularly at linebacker.

The New York Giants, St. Louis Cardinals and Philadelphia Eagles will bring up the rear.

Washington will go 11-5, Dallas 10-6, New York 8-8, St. Louis 8-8 and Philadelphia 7-9.

Look for the Minnesota Vikings to take the Central Division after a hard fight.

There isn't any really tough team in this division, but the Vikings appear to have the fewest weaknesses.

Minnesota should go 9-7, Green Bay 9-7, Chicago 7-9, Detroit 6-10 and Tampa Bay 5-11.

The Western Division race should also be close.

Atlanta is probably the most consistent of this bunch. The Falcons have an explosive offense led by quarterback Steve Bartkowski.

Atlanta's defense is erratic, but its offense should score enough points to nip San Francisco, the Super Bowl champion two years ago.

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
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Little League signups continue

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The making of a County EMT

"They say you get one save, and it makes it all worthwhile," Ed Jungbluth commented, attempting to explain why he wants to be an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT). "There are different reasons for different people."

Dick Reeves, for example, was prompted by thoughts of "what if?" a situation occurred in which a member of his family needed emergency medical attention. His being an EMT could possibly prevent a disaster within the family.

Mike Murray, head registered nurse at the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital emergency room, said his motivation to become an EMT was "to understand better how things are done in a pre-hospital setting." He agreed that understanding of emergency treatment given prior to arrival at the hospital might improve care given in the emergency room.

Jungbluth, Reeves and Murray represent only three of the diverse reasons for wanting to become an EMT. But Murray said he believes most people's motivation to become an EMT involves a desire to be able to help their neighbors.

Whatever the motivation, it must be strong enough to support the commitment required of an emergency medical technician.

First, one must complete an 81-hour basic EMT course, setting aside three hours twice a week for three-and-a-half months to learn everything from how to wash an ambulance to how to revive a person who has stopped breathing. Jungbluth, Reeves, Murray and 17 other residents from all over the county recently completed the course offered through the Lincoln County ambulance service.

The emphasis of the course is on the practical application of what is taught. Students must demonstrate such skills as splinting, bandaging, performing CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation) and ability to respond in emergency situations.

One night the class pulled cars out of the junk yard to set up an extrication exercise in which students took turns playing accident victims and EMTs. The EMTs were tested on how they evaluated the situation, set up triage (a system to determine which victims to treat and in what order),

and applied treatment. EMT students are also tested on how quickly they respond, as "time is of the essence, especially in a life-threatening situation," Jungbluth noted.

EMTs also must learn a bit of psychology and bedside manner, he discovered. A "victim" in one of the practical exercises had suffered several stab wounds, easily diagnosed due to the knife protruding from his chest, Jungbluth related. The "EMT" removed the blade, thus relieving the pressure to wounded internal organs and also inducing pain to the victim.

"The patient got mean," Jungbluth recalled. "You have to know how to calm him down so you don't become a patient."

Students also must pass a written exam before graduating from the course. Then practical and written exams must be repeated for an EMT to be listed on the State or National Registry.

Having graduated from the course, an EMT has automatically accepted the responsibility of rendering aid in an emergency situation "up to the limits of his training," Jungbluth reported.

According to a federal law known as the Good Samaritan Act, a person is bound to offer assistance if he is trained to do so. An EMT who passes by the scene of an accident "could be subject to legal ramifications," Jungbluth noted.

An EMT also must utilize his training in order to remain certified, Jungbluth said. Recertification is required of EMTs every two years, and a certain number of hours of service must have been rendered to qualify one for recertification.

Not all EMTs get the opportunity to utilize their newly acquired skills as rapidly as Jungbluth, however. Three days after completing the EMT course, he was called to an emergency involving a patient who was later pronounced DOA (dead on arrival) at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

Jungbluth had performed chest compressions on the patient, as part of CPR, from the time the ambulance arrived at the man's home in Alto until it pulled up at the hospital emergency room. As an EMT, he had no choice.

Once CPR is begun on any patient, Jungbluth explained, it must be con-

tinued until the EMT is exhausted; until the patient is so rigored that no response is possible; or until a physician has pronounced the patient dead. An EMT also has no choice about initiating CPR on any non-breathing victim unless the victim is either decapitated, so crushed that he is obviously dead, or so rigored that there is no chance for revival.

That rule requires EMTs to be adept at applying triage at the scene of an accident or disaster. In the EMT course, students are taught how to "size up" the scene of an accident as they come upon it, observing where vehicles and persons involved in the accident are placed.

If more than one person is involved, triage must be set up, meaning EMTs must establish priorities for patient treatment. Victims in life-threatening situations will receive immediate attention, Jungbluth explained. Patients will be then treated according to the severity of their injuries.

But in some cases where many victims are involved and only a few EMTs are on hand, a patient who is not breathing may be allowed to die so that an EMT will not be tied up administering CPR all the way to the hospital. Once CPR is begun, the EMT is obligated to continue it until one of the three situations outlined above occurs.

When asked whether he felt prepared for that emergency "code" run so soon after completing the EMT course, Jungbluth responded, "Oh, good Lord, yes." He said instructors Devil Bill and Verna Adams "did a near perfect job teaching the class."

Asked how he felt about responding to a "code" call, or life-threatening situation, just three days into his life as an EMT, Jungbluth said "that's what you take the course for."

He admits having been nervous at first when the call came in, but "all of a sudden you were on the scene and everything's fine."

The EMT training "takes over" and "you perform the skills to the level at which you were taught. The nervousness goes away," Jungbluth related.

He believes that initial nervousness will diminish with experience, in which case he should be rid of it altogether soon. In addition to the DOA call, he has been called to the scene of a motorcycle accident involving a patient with severe bleeding

and a compound fracture. This type of situation points out the limits of an EMT's training. Although he can splint and bandage fractures, broken bones and cuts, a basic EMT is not trained to administer any drugs or fluids to relieve pain or replace lost body fluids. Jungbluth said he is not even permitted to assist a patient (except a diabetic) administer drugs—even aspirin—to himself.

"That's not your purpose," Jungbluth stated. "The hurt is not going to kill him; maybe it will put him in shock, but then you treat him for shock."

"You do what you can," he added. "You do life-threatening situations, transport, make them as comfortable as possible and administer as much TLC as you can."

But Jungbluth said he plans to further his training by taking an IV-trauma course, which will authorize him to administer fluids.

The novice EMT expressed satisfaction with his handling of the emergency situations faced thus far. But Jungbluth still wonders how he will react in a "blood and guts" scene.

"I just haven't caught that real rough one that you know you're going to catch," he remarked.

But also still to come is that one "save" they say makes it all worthwhile.

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE — It's not easy to make the serious political mistakes Robert Robles made in the space of two short months.

He allowed Eric Serna, head of the Corporation Commission, to convince him it was okay for a racing commissioner to fly to the track in a state plane. That lost him his chance to be named to chair the Racing Commission to which the Governor had appointed him.

Then he was accused of pressuring a national convention to move from the Marriott to the Classic Hotel in Albuquerque. When he got caught at that, he lost even further ground with the Governor.

But we wonder this: Did Robles explain to Toney that part of his motivation in the latter action was that memo put out from the Governor's organization which orders a virtual boycott of the Marriott by all members of the Anaya administration?

It's tough to take public embarrassment for doing something on the boss' own recommendation.

Is the Democratic party splintering in New Mexico?

Some long-term Democrats seem to be jumping ship in an effort to get on the Pete Domenici-bandwagon.

Among those we hear as already having taken that step are the Eric Serna mentioned above, former Bernalillo county chairman Ed Romero and Graciela Olivarez, who held high offices under both Jerry Apodaca and Jimmy Carter.

Hardened old political observers here are comparing the group around Toney Anaya to the "Georgia Mafia" who helped so much to bring down their boss, President Carter.

They see these parallels: —Both groups boast of their status as "outsiders," who have come in to clear up a government of which they were sharply critical.

—Both appear to believe they can charm a reluctant bureaucracy into substantial change by the force of their self-declared righteousness.

—Both show minimal grasp of the realities of governing, such as an understanding of the legislative process as it really is. Both exacerbate poor relationships with lawmakers by tactlessness and a poor sense of timing.

Old-timers know the people around the boss can do more to hurt him than any other single factor. Anaya will understand that more and more clearly as his term runs on.

If Anaya were smart, he'd do something revolutionary: Let the 1984 Legislature meet solely to adopt a budget for the next fiscal year and then go home.

That's their main aim, as the Constitution has it. A governor should really put into his "call" only matters of genuine emergency — and none of the Anaya measures we have heard about fall into that category.

Instead of that, the young folks around the present Governor are chomping at the bit to see how many things they can propose for consideration.

They are going to confuse an already difficult session, to little or no avail.

Dan Weaks, the Governor's hand-picked legislative liaison, has already said he expects most of the administration bills to be enacted because the Cabinet contains so many attorneys, who are experts at drafting legislation.

It may be news to Weaks, but the ability to draft laws is not automatically acquired with a license to practice as a lawyer.

Most lobbyists, for instance, many with more legal experience and smarts than the Anaya bunch, go to the pros when they want a bill drafted.

They should. The Attorney General's office, for example, drafted one proposal last session which completely left out any language which would have enacted it into law.

Sometimes you just can't beat experience.

Once you get to know a team, you rejoice in their successes and suffer their miseries right along with them. I mean, Steve Bedrosian needed millions of people to commiserate with him after he hung that high curve to George Hendrick Thursday night that cost the Braves a 2-1 decision to the Cards.

Worse yet, the loss left the Braves just a game and a half ahead of the Dodgers in the NL West. It's going to be a very interesting September.

Now I don't want to give the idea I spend all my free time watching baseball. My wife sometimes accuses me of spending all my free time watching baseball. But what I do is catch little bits of lots of games.

To tell the truth, I can't watch TV long enough at one sitting to catch all of anything, much less a complete baseball game. But a lot of times, like Thursday night, you can let all the drama build up going into the late innings, then tune in and experience it anyway.



The restaurant employs two part-time and three permanent employees, including the Kittrells and their son John.



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

'Let's Make a Deal'

"Let's Make a Deal," the well-known, fast-paced game show, has returned to cable. The show, hosted by Monty Hall, airs weekdays at 5:30 p.m. (ET) on the CBN Cable Network.

In-studio players compete with chance for a fortune or a "zonk" behind one of the curtains or doors. Depending on a contestant's insight and willingness to trade items, that player can walk away with a new car, boat or complete wardrobe. Or, if they happen to choose the wrong box, they could be the new owners of a giant rocking chair or win a group of chickens.

The show was originally a trading show where the studio audience brought articles to trade for bigger prizes. The audience started dressing in costumes to attract Hall and be chosen as one of that day's contestants. The show then became one of the most popular shows on television and today, is drawing large audiences on CBN Cable Network.

Hall says the best part of the show is that "the whole family can watch and play along." He notes that people enjoy watching the fun and can participate at home by guessing which door or curtain has the biggest prize behind it.

In the more than 4,000 episodes that Hall has hosted, he has given away thousands of dollars worth of cash and merchandise. But, he says, the best part for him has been the reaction of the people. In all the shows, he adds, "there were never any disgruntled losers; it showed the basic goodness of people, which came out while they were playing the game."

Hall's fondest memory of the show was when a contestant chose a door and behind it was a double-decker table at which the "Odd Couple" — Jack Klugman and Tony Randall — was dining out.







Warriors hope to avoid injuries

Staying relatively injury-free is the main key to the Ruidoso High School football team's success this season, according to head coach Darrel Stierwalt.

"We can't afford a lot of injuries," Stierwalt said. "We really haven't got much depth and we're still young, but we've got some good people."

Ruidoso went 1-9 last season after going 8-2 and narrowly missing the state playoffs in 1981. The Warriors' hopes of becoming a contender again rest on how fast the young players improve and how much they can avoid injuries.

Stierwalt and his assistants have about 50 players out for three teams this year. Besides the varsity and junior varsity squads, the Warriors will also play a freshman schedule. About 20 of the 50 players are freshmen.

"Practices this year have gone much better than last season," Stierwalt commented. "Particularly attendance-wise. Usually when we've had kids miss practice this year, they've had a good reason."

The Warriors have eight returning starters, four on offense and four on defense.

Probably the strongest part of the Ruidoso team is the offensive line.

George Gresham (185 pounds) and Craig Carson (160 pounds) return at the guard positions. Both are quick and agile.

Kip McClellan (160 pounds), who is currently sidelined with a dislocated shoulder, is a returning starter at tackle. McClellan will probably miss the first three games of the season.

Junior John Antel, a 6-1, 200-pound transfer from Arizona, should help at offensive tackle. Other top line prospects are Mark Flack, Chris Woodul, Chip Ramsey and James Herrera.

Senior Gary Burgess, sophomore Bobby Dickinson and junior Chuck Jarrell are probably the top prospects at tight end. Jarrell is a transfer from Eastwood High School in El Paso, Texas, and the Warrior coaches are high on him.

Justin Smith, Mike Smith, Jeff Maxwell and Matt Porter are candidates for the split end position.

Senior Cyrus Simmons and 6-0 sophomore Russell Easter will operate at quarterback out of the Warriors' new two-man veer offense. Senior Kenny Espinosa is also a top candidate at quarterback.

Senior Eric Strobel will go at wingback. The 5-11, 165-pounder led the Warriors in

scoring last season with nine touchdowns. He also rushed for over 500 yards and was a fine pass receiver.

Sophomore Michael Williamson is a speedburner back, while Patric Pearson and Fernon Chino are probably the top fullback candidates.

Defensively, the Warriors are young but have talent.

Kevin Jameson and Burgess are solid defensive ends. Senior Scott Ciraulo, a 180-pounder, could also figure in the defensive line picture.

Carson, Flack, Woodul, Gresham and Ramsey are also top defensive prospects.

Gresham, Strobel and Jesse Reynolds all started at least part of the time at linebacker last season. They give the Warriors experience at that position.

The defensive backfield is probably the youngest part of the team, but it has lots of potential.

Easter and Williamson both started last season as freshman, and should do better this year. Easter has both the size and speed to become an outstanding defensive back.

Simmons and Espinosa are also defensive backfield prospects. Simmons was named Ruidoso's top defensive back last year.

The Warriors have several players trying out for kicker and punter, but no definite decision has been made yet.

Stierwalt is in agreement with the rest of the district 3-AAA coaches on who the title favorite should be this season.

It's Silver City as always.

"They've lost a few players, but they're always tough," Stierwalt said. "They've always got a lot of players and can draw a

lot from their large enrollment.

"But after Silver City, it's wide open for second place. Any team can take it."

Silver City lost the Vasquez brothers, Joe and Jim, because they moved to Texas. They were probably all-state backfield candidates.

Still, the Colts should be tough. George Peru returns at fullback, and he gained 800 yards last season.

The Colts will have a big line again, but will probably be a bit short on experience.

Deming, which finished second to Silver City last year, has several starters returning but a new coach.

Hot Springs (Truth or Consequences) was the only team Ruidoso defeated last year. The Tigers also have a new coach, but good team speed and size.

Cobre appears to be a bit weaker this year. The Indians lost standout quarterback Jerry Herd to graduation, along with several other players.


So with second place and a berth in the playoffs wide open, the Warriors could have a golden chance this season if they can avoid injuries.

The Ruidoso High School football coaching staff has one addition to its ranks this season.

Collins is a native of Alexandria, Virginia. He graduated from the University of Richmond in that state, and played with Washington Redskin standout Mike Bragg.


Collins was in private business in El Paso before coming to Ruidoso five years ago. He and his wife Susan have a five-year-old daughter, Bree.



Tigers rely on quality players to defend state championship

Capitan High School's football team will rely on several all-state caliber athletes to lead it in its defense of the state A division championship this fall.

Tailback Danny Cummins, quarterback Dewey Keller and tackle Todd Proctor rank as three of the top A division players in the state. Each of them played large roles in the Tigers' state 7-2-1 championship drive last season.

Besides Cummins, Keller and Proctor, the Tigers have several other returnees

who should make them more than competitive this season. They include wingback Tim McElhannon, split end Sammy Castillo and tight end Eddie Davis.

All the above players have a lot of talent, and new head coach E. C. Jenkins is relying on them to lead the team.

"We're looking for all our seniors to lead the team," Jenkins said. "We've got about 24 or 25 players out for the team and it's up to our experienced players to lead them."

The Tigers don't have a great deal of depth, so they can't afford many injuries. However, if Capitan's top players stay healthy, the Tigers should be tough.

It's doubtful whether any A division school in the state has three players as good as Keller, Cummins and Proctor.

Cummins is a 5-11, 195-pound athlete with good quickness. In the Tigers' I-formation offense, the tailback is the key runner, and Cummins has the ability to tote the ball a good number of times per game.

"I think he has the potential to be one of the best backs in the A division," Jenkins said of his star tailback. "That's because of his size and quickness. He probably runs around a 5.0, 5.1 40."

The 6-1, 195-pound Proctor may be the best two-way lineman in the A division. He made all-state last season. He is an excellent all-around athlete, also playing basketball and track. He should be the leader of the Capitan line.

Keller, a junior, also made all-state last year. He took over for the injured Grady Lee Eldridge at mid-year and showed amazing poise for a sophomore. He threw five touchdown passes on the season.

McElhannon is also a talented athlete, with the ability to run and catch the ball. Castillo played at guard last season and is a versatile talent. Davis is also a fine pass-catcher and is playing behind Keller at quarterback.

Jenkins was an assistant coach at Eunice High School before going to Capitan. Assistant coach Lewis Mowery was at Hondo School last year. The other assistant coach, Kendal Lawlis, is a returnee from last year.

Some of the players came out late for practice, but Jenkins is optimistic the Tigers will be ready for the district season. He thinks last year's state contenders should be strong again.

"Reserve should be very strong and Texico should be tough also," Jenkins remarked.

Last year Capitan edged Reserve 14-12 for the state title. The Tigers defeated Texico 7-2 in a semi-final defensive thriller, while Reserve topped Tatum High School in the other semi-final.

Reserve won the title for two years before the Tigers took it last year. Gary Zuniga, a standout running back, will lead the Reserve attack again.

Capitan will open the season Friday, September 2, with a home game against Tatum. That contest could tell Tiger fans a lot about whether their team can repeat as state A division champions.

The White Mountain Middle School football team may need a little luck to equal last season's excellent 5-1 record, according to head coach Terry Wharton.

New Mexico has five division champs

New Mexico has state high school football champions in five different enrollment divisions.

The largest schools (from 1,200 students on up) are in the AAAA division. Schools with enrollments from 400 to 1,200 are in the AAA division; those with enrollments from 150 to 400 are in the AA division; and those with enrollments from 100 to 150 are in the A division. The smallest schools play six-man football.

At the end of the regular season, the top two teams in each district qualify for the playoffs. Usually the second-place team in each district draws a high seeded first-place team from another district.

Clovis has won the AAAA division championship the past two seasons and four out of the last six years. Artesia is the defending AAA champion, Moriarty is the defending AA division champion and Capitan is the defending A division winner.

"If we can stay healthy, we'll be tough. If we don't stay healthy, we could have problems equaling last year's record."

The Braves did indeed lose some outstanding players who graduated to Ruidoso High School. Some of the better players who graduated included Jeff Willingham, Kirk Taylor, Jason Hill, Brian Davis and Billy Harrison.

Wharton and assistant coach Mike Crocker are working with about 25 players in camp. The team started contact practice last week after undergoing a week of non-contact work. The Braves have been

working out every afternoon.

Last year the White Mountain coaches worked with about 40 players.

There are four returnees from last season's team. They include lineman Sam Whitey, lineman David Swanner, halfback Aaron Von Rosenberg and flanker Mike Dickinson.

Several new players should also help the Braves, according to the coaches.

Eric Ford has been a standout at running back during the practices. Lance Willard, a star in the Ruidoso Little League football program last season, should also help the Braves in the backfield.

Jeff Sherwood should be good at middle linebacker on defense, while Bobby Lane and Kirk Ryan have done well at quarterback during practice.

White Mountain has a number of fine backfield prospects and that could be the team's strong point this year.

The Braves will field an A team and a B team this season. The B team had a 2-0 record last year.

White Mountain will play a six-game A schedule and a two-game B schedule. The first A game is Thursday, September 8, against visiting Dexter. Both B contests will be against Carrizozo, the first one Thursday, September 15, at home.
