Airport momentum up

Momentum for a regional airport on Fort Stanton Mesa continued to grow this week as more politicians committed their support to an airport on Site B while opponents appeared to soften their stance.

Interior Secretary James Watt told U.S. Representative Joe Skeen that he may reconsider his opposition to an airport at Site B, said Skeen Tuesday.

Skeen met with Watt for about an hour Monday to discuss the hazards of the present airport in Ruidoso and the advantages of an airport on Fort Stanton Mesa.

"I put in a case for Site B because I think it is the only site that lends itself to an airport," said Skeen, who operated a flight service out of the Ruidoso in the 1960s.

In August, Watt informed Governor Toney Anaya that he would reject an application for the transfer of land known as Site B from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to the Federal Aviation Administration.

That was before the application had actually been submitted. The U.S. Transportation Department has recently submitted the application to

the Interior Department.

Site B is the site proposed by the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) but opposed by New Mexico State University (NMSU). NMSU conducts range research on the land and claims that an airport there will disrupt its research.

BLM has backed NMSU in its opposition to Site B, but appeared to be reconsidering its position last week.

BLM director Robert Burford Friday said that he and Watt "are willing to negotiate" their differences over the site for an airport. Burford also said that he has "come up with some ideas that might make it a little more palatable to both sides."

The side advocating an airport at Site B appeared to be gaining more supporters, especially in Washington. U.S. Representative Manuel Lujan recently wrote a letter to Mayor George White of Ruidoso saying he would be most happy to work with Skeen on the airport. Lujan sits on the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee.

Skeen is leading the fight for Site B in Washington, according to SBAC chairman Fred Heckman.

"We're happy that Congressman Skeen is moving things on the Washington front," said Heckman.

He reported that Skeen has received word from some Texas congressmen that they will also support the airport at Site B.

Heckman was also very pleased with the support Governor Anaya has given to the airport.

"We're extremely pleased with the actions of the governor," said Heckman.

Anaya is doing something no one else has done for Ruidoso, said Heckman. He called Anaya's support "more than just lip service."

Anaya this spring encouraged SBAC to file an application for the land transfer. He has also advised Attorney General Paul Bardacke to examine a clause in a 1956 deed that may give the State of New Mexico an easement to the land.

The governor and New Mexico Transportation Secretary Judith Espinosa plan to meet with Secretary Watt this week to discuss the airport.

Mayor White met with Anaya at the New Mexico Municipal League Conference last week and said Anaya pledged his support for the airport.

"Action will be taken within the year," White quoted Anaya.

"We're just tickled pink," said Heckman of the growing support for an airport at Site B.

Illness tests inconclusive

Laboratory tests on stool samples from five persons who were sick showed no evidence of bacteria or parasites in people suffering from a mysterious gastrointestinal disease in Ruidoso.

Although there was an unconfirmed report of a second case of giardia, Environmental Improvement Division (EID) epidemiologist Jeff Sheyka said that would not change his evaluation of the situation.

Sheyka told a group of EID engineers and village officials that he has not been able to make any conclusions about the illness that has been plaguing Ruidoso area residents for more than four weeks.

"We were kind of concerned about giardia," said Sheyka.

Giardia is a parasite that causes diarrhea, abdominal cramps, nausea and low grade fever. It can be carried in water or food. There were 41 water-borne outbreaks in the United States between 1965 and 1980, and the disease has been detected numerous times in Colorado.

One case of giardia was confirmed early in the investigation, but none since. It was reported that state laboratory officials were talking to a local doctor about a possible giardia test on another sample Tuesday, but EID officials said Wednesday they knew nothing about it.

A random phone poll of Ruidoso residents conducted by EID showed a much greater concentration of the unknown malady in the Upper Canyon area, which has a water system separate from the rest of Ruidoso. EID documented around 100 people in the Upper Canyon who had contracted the disease.

The negative test results, however,

have made Sheyka believe it is more likely the disease is caused by a virus passed from person to person, he said. The concentration of the disease in the Upper Canyon, however, remains a mystery.

"That is a mystery at this time," Sheyka told the EID engineers and village officials.

In spite of the belief that the water system is delivering clean water to Ruidoso, EID engineers visited Ruidoso water treatment plant number one in the Upper Canyon.

Treated water taken out of a tap at the plant was called "quite turbid" by Ruidoso EID environmentalist Hari Mukhoty. Sheyka also thought the water looked more turbid than is generally permissible, but said he could not tell without performing tests.

All tests done on Ruidoso water have produced no evidence of bacteria. Giardia, however, is a parasite and would not show up in the tests.

EID district engineer John Burkstaller said he would normally consider adding a sedimentation coagulant to the plant if concerned about giardia. However, plant one produces only a maximum of 70,000 gallons of water a day, and generally provides about 10 percent of the village's water.

Burkstaller said it would probably not be worthwhile to add the sedimentation coagulant, and said he would suggest closing down the plant if giardia did appear as the cause of the illness.

The relatively small number of test samples has made the diagnosis difficult, according to Sheyka. Why there have not been more test samples remains a mystery.

Sheyka said it is often difficult to get the right people to give samples.

Many call in and tell him that they have been sick, but Sheyka needs samples from people who are acutely ill at the moment. Many are hesitant to give the stool samples, he said.

Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital spokespeople said they had sent at least seven samples to the state laboratory in Albuquerque, but did not know how many more they had sent.

One local doctor said he had sent 10 to 20 people to the hospital for testing, and another reported about 10 samples.

Not all the doctors, however, have been sending their patients for testing. Doctors R. L. Annala and Edward Stalzer said they had not been contacted by anyone at EID concerning testing.

"There's been nothing official about this at all," said Annala Tuesday.

County Health Nurse Hazel English said she had contacted all the physicians in the area. Some of them had been out of the office, however, and English said she had had to leave messages for the doctors.

Whatever the disease is, it appears to be affecting considerably fewer people recently. A number of doctors and the hospital reported seeing many fewer cases than they had a couple of weeks ago.

"It seems to be petering out," said Dr. Michael Stone.

But it will likely appear again next summer. Many residents said the same disease appears in Ruidoso every summer.

Environmentalist Mukhoty said he has heard complaints each of the five years he has been here. He expressed hope that if it appears next year, EID and the medical community will be more prepared to get samples and investigate the disease more closely.

It was an amorous donkey that got Jackie and Jess Stephenson involved in mule racing.

The Stephensons—who call Wetmore, Colorado, home—raise running quarter horses. Well, one day six or seven years ago, a neighbor's jack (that's a male donkey; if you didn't know) broke into the Stephensons' pasture and mated one of their quarter horse mares.

As a result of that encounter, Jackie and Jess found themselves with a little red mule.

After Sara was old enough to ride, Jackie was working cattle on her one day when she broke and stampeded the herd. In the ensuing roundup, the cowhands noticed Sara was outrunning their horses.

"Hey, you oughta race that mule," they told Jackie.

"I think they really were thinking, 'You oughta shoot that mule,'" she recalled Wednesday with a laugh.

Well, one thing led to another. The Stephensons went over to the Durango mule races "to see what we could do." Now their interest has grown to the point they brought seven head to the Ruidoso Downs

Mule Skinners meet that starts here Friday.

"This is about the best race meet that they have," said Jackie. "It's a lot of fun." From Ruidoso, the mule racing circuit—which started in Bishop, California—heads on to Del Rio, Texas, then Globe, Arizona. The Stephensons picked it up in Ignacio, Colorado, last weekend.

Jackie shows her mule a lot of affection, and she believes they respond to it.

"They have to like you to run for you," she said.

She points to Molly, whose racing name is Black Velvet. Molly had about eight owners before the Stephensons and was "kinda ornery" for about a year and a half after they got her.

But now, "Molly's a good girl," Jackie tells her, giving her a friendly scratch on the head. Molly is part of a champion chariot team.

"They worry a lot when we take 'em and haul 'em," said Jackie. "They think they're gonna be sold again."

Do mules have feelings then?

"I think they do—they really do," Jackie believes. She added that some trainers might not think so, but, "We're close to our mules and

Ruidoso High School (RHS) counselor James Sanchez announced this week that RHS senior Steven Dobbs is among the 15,000 students in the country named semifinalists in this year's National Merit Scholarship Corporation program.

Steven, the son of Joe and Evelyn Dobbs, ranked in the top half of one percent of the 1983 high school senior class across the country according to scores from the PSAT/NMSQT test taken in his junior year.

Of the 15,000 semifinalists, 13,500 will become National Merit finalists eligible for scholarship awards. Finalists will be chosen on the basis of SAT test scores, high academic performance throughout high school,

recommendation and endorsement of their principals and information they provide about their interests, accomplishments and goals.

Only 5,300 finalists will become Merit Scholars receiving scholarship money from the corporation and its sponsors. These winners will be announced in the spring.

Ruidoso High School has been represented in the National Merit Scholarship competition for the past three years and is one of about 15 school districts in the state this year boasting a semifinalist, Sanchez said.

Steven plans to continue his education after high school at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces to study electronics engineering.

Four new teachers join staff at Nob Hill Elementary School

Four new teachers have joined the staff at Nob Hill Elementary School this year, but none of them are new to teaching and only two are new to the Ruidoso School system.

Pernina Martin was hired at Nob Hill last year as a special education aide, but she was given her own class of 18 second-graders this year. Martin had previously taught for five years in Texas, in Title I math, high school math and the migrant program.

She attended Tarleton State University in Stephenville, Texas, where she earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education and health.

Martin said serving as an aide in special education last year was a good experience for her. She was promoted to the rank of teacher this year due to the heavy enrollment in second grade. The teacher said each student will be able to receive a lot more individual attention because of the staff expansion.

"I think we're going to have a good year," she noted. "I've got a good group of kids."

Gloria Pafford joined the Nob Hill staff as a special education resource room teacher. She is responsible for helping identify students with learning disabilities and working with them for an hour each day outside

their regular classroom. Pafford has nine students enrolled in the resource room program thus far.

Her eight years of previous teaching experience were in special education at schools in Hondo, Fort Stanton and Roswell. Pafford graduated from Eastern New Mexico University with a bachelor of science degree in special education, and from



the University of New Mexico with a master's in the same field. Her home is in San Patricio.

"I'm real excited to be here," the new teacher said. "I have a feeling it is going to be a real good year."

Rick Higginbotham switched this year from White Mountain Elementary School to Nob Hill, where he is teaching a first-grade class. He

taught fourth grade for half of last year at White Mountain, before which he was on the teaching staff in Captain for five years, working with third- and fourth-graders and Title I students.

"First grade is quite an experience," Higginbotham said. "The kids are super." He received his bachelor's degree

in elementary education and master's in reading education from Eastern New Mexico University.

Asked about his plans for this year, Higginbotham said, "We certainly hope to prepare the kids for another 11 years of quality education in the Ruidoso School system."

Linda Lott returned from a school system in Saudi Arabia to teach first

grade at Nob Hill this year. Her 10 years prior teaching experience were received in Gallina; Raton; San Jose, California; and Saudi Arabia, where she has spent the past seven years.

Lott and her husband were two of the first contract teachers in an international school in Saudi Arabia, with students representing 40 to 50 nationalities. After teaching for one year, they were made administrators, responsible for writing curriculum and building the entire school program, including hiring teachers.

Lott, a native New Mexican, applied to the Ruidoso School system after deciding it was time to return to the United States. Associate superintendent Mike Gladden had been her principal when she taught at Gallina.

Lott earned her bachelor's degree in elementary and bilingual education at Eastern New Mexico University, and a master's in reading at Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo, California. She also has credentials as a reading specialist from Cal Poly.

One of Lott's goals this year is to make her students aware of other countries and cultures. She also plans to concentrate on learning more about the American Indian culture. "I just want to really work hard and be a good grade one teacher this year," she stated.

Council increase referendum tentatively set for November 8

The Ruidoso village council received notification Tuesday evening that the petition calling for an increase of the council to six members is valid, and discussed November 8 as a tentative date for a referendum on the question.

Village clerk Leon Eggleston reported that 107 of the 145 signatures on the petition were valid. Some of the signatures were invalid due to people not being registered voters and not living within the village limits.

With 1,982 registered voters in the Ruidoso municipal limits, 99 signatures (five percent) were required to make the petition valid.

"Therefore I, Leon Eggleston, Clerk of the Village of Ruidoso, do hereby certify that there are enough valid signatures of registered voters from the petition presented and therefore it is my opinion that the governing Body, Village of Ruidoso, adopt a resolution calling for a special election increasing the number of councilmen from four to six ..."

Eggleston said he hopes to schedule the special election for council members in March during the regularly scheduled elections. As of now, only two councilmen, Don Dale and Benny Coulston, and the municipal judge are up for election in March.

Councilman Al Junge made a motion to hold the special election November 8. Upon Frank Sayner's suggestion, Junge withdrew his motion and the council decided not to take any action on an election since Dale and village attorney Lee Huckstep were absent.

The council did pass a resolution endorsing past efforts of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) and Governor Toney Anaya in at-

tempting to secure a regional airport on the Fort Stanton Mesa. The council instructed Eggleston to write a letter of thanks, which will be signed by Mayor White.

"I just think we should say thank you in some form," said Coulston.

White announced that he had received a letter from U.S. Representative Manuel Lujan supporting efforts to build an airport on Site B. Site B is the site preferred by SBAC but opposed by New Mexico State University because of range research it conducts on Fort Stanton Mesa.

Lujan wrote that he would be happy to work with U.S. Representative Joe Skeen, who also supports an airport at Site B.

Lujan does not represent the Ruidoso area but does sit on the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, which works closely with the Interior Department. A request for transfer of Site B land from the Bureau of Land Management jurisdiction to the Federal Aviation Administration has been submitted to the Interior Department.

White said he also talked to Governor Anaya and U.S. Senator Pete Domenici about the airport during the recent New Mexico Municipal League Conference in Carlsbad. White reported that Anaya reconfirmed his strong support of an airport at Site B. "Action will be taken within the year," White quoted Anaya.

Domenici was much more evasive on the issue and did not commit himself to support for Site B, said White.

White then named five appointees to the Lodgers Tax Committee (LTC), which were all approved by the council. White named Jim Biggs, Joan Bailey, Rod Adamson, Linda Flack and Gary Hall. All appointees except Gary Hall agreed to serve on the committee, reported LTC member Archer Wilson Wednesday.

The appointments were made to fill vacant spots created by a recent increase of the committee from four members to nine.

For the second meeting in a row, the council overturned a Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) zoning recommendation. The council ap-

proved a zoning change from single-family dwellings to light commercial use for two lots in Forest Heights Subdivision owned by Randall Mullican.

"I've been here 10 years and I thought it was commercial all along," said Coulston.

P&Z chairman Greg Masters said the commission denied the light commercial zoning because there was already sufficient commercial property in the area and restrictive covenants designated it as residential property.

Civil engineer Tim Collins said Mullican planned to build a professional office building on the lots where the Forest Heights sales office previously stood.

The council then instructed the P&Z not to grant any road right of way vacations but allow people with extenuating circumstances to use them until the village needs the land for wider roads.

When Masters asked about liability concerns if a motorist hit a building in the right of way, the council suggested obtaining waivers of liability from the landowners. Attorney Ron Harris predicted that would not stop people from suing the village if they wanted to, but suggested the chances of such a case are too slight to concern the council.

The council also instructed P&Z to use the Comprehensive Plan's Land Use Map when considering zone change requests. Masters noted there had been some confusion whether to refer to the Land Use Map or the Zoning Map of Ruidoso, which differ on several points. It was pointed out that the Zoning Map lists zoning as it exists, and the Land Use Map is a guide for zoning goals in the village.

The council agreed to meet with members of P&Z and the Architectural Plans Review Committee to discuss the village sign ordinance.

In other business, the council: —Approved seven items previously approved by P&Z.

—Approved a liquor license for Southland Corporation to be located at the midtown 7-11.

—Approved Ordinance 83-13, requiring car seats for young children and handicapped parking in all park-

ing lots.

—Approved Ordinance 83-13, resolving to apply for a \$250,000 Community Development Block Grant. Village manager Jim Hine said the application is for money to be used for repaving streets in Ponderosa Heights that will be torn up with the installation of sewer lines.

—Heard assistant village manager Frank Potter report that he has contacted the State Highway Department about a petition requesting a traffic light at the corner of Sudderth Drive and Juanita Avenue. Potter said a traffic study being done this fall will hopefully include some solutions to the traffic problem at that corner.

—Heard Potter report that the Lincoln County commissioners agreed to

turn the construction of the Bog Springs Road to the new Ruidoso High School over to Ruidoso. Under a joint powers agreement between the village and the county, the village will receive state funds appropriated for its construction.

—Heard Potter report that Ruidoso was six inches behind its normal rainfall for the year and that the village is using large amounts of well water for its water supply. He said recent rains have not significantly increased the flow of Eagle Creek into Alto reservoir, which was dropping at the rate of seven feet a week before the village began using the wells.

—Agreed to invite bids for municipal property near the corner of Sudderth and Mechem drives.

—Authorized Hine to negotiate for .22 acre needed for right of way on the Gavilan Canyon bypass.

—Complimented Ruidoso police chief Dick Swenor for being elected first vice-president of the New Mexico Municipal Chiefs of Police Association.

—Heard Councilman Al Junge say he plans to work with Potter to establish a policy and prices for private citizens to pay for paving of streets. Junge said he and many of his neighbors paid for paving of their street, which would not have been paved otherwise.

—Accepted a bid of \$22,153.76 for a flatbed truck for the Sanitation Department.

Roping and arena events will commence Friday morning at 9:30 at Beavers Arena and continue Saturday and Sunday mornings.

Live country and western bands will provide entertainment before the races start each day, and clowns will be on hand for the enjoyment of all the kids and young-at-heart grownups.


The purses have been increased again this year, up to an impressive \$55,000 total. And the meet is sanctioned by the American Mule Association (AMA).

An old rivalry with a new twist will be renewed Friday night when the Ruidoso High School varsity football team travels to Tularosa for a 7:30 contest.

Tularosa and Ruidoso were in the

same district for many seasons, but this year Tularosa dropped down to the AA division, making Friday's encounter a non-district game.

But that won't make the game any less important to either team.

"Tularosa is always tough," said Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt. "They're not that big, but they play

hard and they should be tough."

Indeed, Tularosa has been tough for Ruidoso to solve in the long series between the two schools. The Wildcats have won 20 games while the Warriors have won six in the 27-game series. One game ended in a tie. Ruidoso has won just once since 1968, that a 14-0 decision in 1980.

But the past is just the past where rivalries are concerned.

Both teams are 1-1 on the season. Ruidoso opened the campaign with a 29-0 loss to powerful Lovington, but came back with an exciting 22-21 victory over Clint, Texas, last week.

Tularosa defeated Cobre 27-7 in its opener but lost to Hot Springs 14-7 last Friday.

The Wildcats are led by quarterback David Sheppard, who has taken over in place of graduated Chris Cerney. Tularosa also has several starters back from last season's squad.

Ruidoso got a big emotional boost from its win over Clint. Last season the Warriors went 1-9, with the one victory (a 20-16 decision over Hot Springs) not coming until the ninth contest.

The Warrior offense showed a major improvement over the season opener against Lovington.

Ruidoso gained 181 yards total offense against Clint, after only picking up two yards total offense against Lovington. The Warriors also picked

up 12 first downs in the Clint game. They didn't get any against Lovington.

Sophomore quarterback Russell Easter had an excellent performance against Clint, scoring two touchdowns and throwing two two-point conversions.

The 6-0, 165-pound athlete will probably share quarterback duties with senior Cyrus Simmons again.

Simmons ran the team well in the first half against Clint, and intercepted a pass in the final moments of the game to preserve the win for Ruidoso.

Mike Williamson and Eric Strobel provide the Warriors with some running threats out of the backfield. Patric Pearson, Mike Smith and Justin Smith can also catch and run with the ball.

Guards Craig Carson and George Gresham keyed an improved offensive line performance last week. Tackles John Antol and Gary Burgess also looked good against the Lions.

Bobby Dickinson will probably start at tight end. James Herrera has

done well at center.

Defensively, the Warriors have shown an ability to force turnovers in the first two games.

Ruidoso has intercepted four passes in the two contests. Easter has two of them, while Simmons and linebacker Wade Proctor each have one.


Scott Ciraulo and Keyin Jameson will probably start at defensive end, the first time they've started this season. Eric Bell and Chris Woodall will go at tackle.

Dickinson will start at middle linebacker, while Proctor and Justin Smith will go on the outside.


Easter and Williamson will start at safety, while Kenny Espinosa and Mitch Mullican will go at cornerback.

The Ruidoso junior varsity hopes to have a better season than last year, when it went 0-8.


"We plan to look at a lot of guys," said head coach Jim Ramsey.



Downs trustees discuss sewer

Ruidoso Downs trustees Monday discussed how to enforce the part of the village sewer ordinance that requires residents to have been hooked on to the sewer line by June 1. At the previous meeting a resident had asked why all residents have not been required to hook on, indicating lack of enforcement is unfair to those residents who did comply with the ordinance.

Trustees agreed the ordinance should be enforced but acknowledged that many residents cannot afford the charges to hook onto the sewer line. Village attorney Tim Quigley reported that non-complying property owners could be cited into court and assessed a fine of up to \$300 and/or 90 days in jail.

Trustee Jake Harris contended that residents voted for the bond issue under the impression they would not have to tie onto the sewer line if they have a septic tank. He said it was voted in to serve those people who needed sewer service.

Village clerk Wilma Webb said she believes loans are available through a bank in Albuquerque to low-income residents who cannot afford to pay for

services such as this they are required to have. Community Development Block Grant monies may also be available for similar projects, according to Mayor J. C. Day Jr.

Finally, trustees decided to investigate possible sources of funding for residents who cannot afford the cost of sewer hookups, before citing any residents for non-compliance.

"We need to enforce it, but we need to help the citizens in every way we can," commented trustee Conrad Buchanan.

Action on two ordinances concerning proposed apartment complexes was tabled Monday due to the absence of trustee Laverne Cole. The proposed annexation and zoning of Mountain Top Radio, Inspiration Corporation and Inspiration Heights property, and the proposed ordinance allowing construction of a moderate-income apartment development on the Jess Armstrong tract of land, will be considered at a special meeting tonight (Thursday) at 7 at the municipal building.

Approval was given Monday to plans for a 100-unit motel east of Prime Time Restaurant, to be built by Sam Parker of Fredericksburg, Texas. In response to questions about water supply, real estate agent Bill

Pippin reported developers have received a permit to drill a well to serve as a backup supply of water. The well could furnish enough water to supply the motel for four months during the summer, he reported.

According to Pippin, negotiations are also under way for rights to the Turkey Canyon Spring as an additional water supply for the development. Trustee Harold Mansell indicated he favors the project because it will bring revenue into the village from gross receipts taxes.

Plans for the motel were approved unanimously.

Also Monday, the governing body heard complaints from River Park residents claiming their garbage has not been picked up in 19 days. Sanitation commissioner Mansell explained that the garbage truck was behind because the truck was broken down for one day, and then because of the Labor Day holiday.

"I guarantee you we will check into it," Mayor Day promised.

- Tabled a decision on purchase of uniforms for village employees.
- Approved the purchase of several fire hydrants.
- Passed a motion to buy two spare tires and rims for the garbage truck.

Capitan hires Albuquerque water engineers

various financial assistance programs.

The Village of Capitan decided to hire the Albuquerque civil engineering firm of Andrews, Asbury and Robert after hearing Ted Asbury make a presentation at Monday's village council meeting.

Early in the meeting, Hubert Quintana of Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District informed the council he is working on a Community Development Block Grant for water improvements for Capitan. He said he was seeking direction, indicating the village could not afford all the proposed improvements under the \$5 million grant.

"I think it would be best if I were working with the engineer," said Quintana.

In his presentation, Asbury noted that his firm previously had done work for the village when it was needed in a hurry.

He pointed out that the financial posture of the village always has been such that it had to go through Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) for money, which meant meeting FmHA standards. These standards, he claimed, mean doing something two or three times to get it right, instead of doing it right the first time.

"The problem is that there has never been a concerted effort to give the village a planning manual," said Asbury. He told the council the village has a short-term improvements schedule it needs to get onto immediately, and mentioned a HUD (Federal Housing and Urban Development) grant application.

"You're going to need all the financial assistance that you can get to improve your water system," Asbury told the council.

"Sixty percent of what we do is financing," he stated. He also pointed out that an engineering report is an eligible item under state Environmental Improvement Division rules, meaning matching funds can be applied to engineers' fees.

Asbury cautioned that Capitan should not lock up its bonding capacity, as the village will be required to put up matching funds through

"If you don't get your grant, you don't pay anything (to the engineers)," said Asbury. He added that he would agree to put that stipulation in a formal contract.

Village clerk Virginia Spall reported that in a vote taken after the meeting, the council members unanimously agreed to hire the Albuquerque engineering firm.

Mayor David Cummins said Wednesday the first task of the engineers will be to determine which water system improvements are most needed. The village council will then decide which work will be done first, he explained.

In other business, the council:

- Approved Resolution 83-7, SENMEDD agreement and dues, after hearing Quintana's presentation of profile and plan.

- Approved Resolution 83-8, change of Cablevision ownership.
- Approved Resolution 83-9, Community Development Block Grant application.

- Were informed a Land and Water Conservation Grant application has been filed, for work on the village park and tennis court.

- Voted to sell a pickup truck to David Strickland, who submitted the lone bid of \$650.

- Were informed an Interstate Streams Commission Grant application has been submitted for investigation of ground water for the municipality.

- Approved a State Highway contract for purchase of 24 yards of cold mix at \$19.31 a yard (total \$463.44) for repair of potholes.

- Decided to start charging the Lincoln County Fairgrounds for water and sewer service. It was also decided the village would reimburse the fire department for five months' water bills, and not charge the department for water in the future.

- Reappointed Stan Cox to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas board.

- Received a Water Advisory Board report.
- Dissolved the Emergency Water Board.

Ruidoso Schools may hire more teachers

The Ruidoso Schools may have to hire additional teachers this year if enrollment figures remain at their present level, Superintendent Sid Miller said at Tuesday's Board of Education meeting. A total of 1,700 students were enrolled in the school district as of Tuesday evening, 17 more students than were projected for the year.

Miller said he believes this year is the first time that actual enrollment is higher than projected enrollment this early in the school year. The administration had projected an enrollment of 1,683 based on a high enrollment last year of 1,670, reached around the 60th day of school.

"We're really in excellent shape," Miller stated, "but it does cause problems." Those problems are in the form of overcrowded classrooms and high pupil-teacher ratios.

Nob Hill Elementary School registered a total 332.5 students as of Tuesday, raising both kindergarten and first grade classes above the state's recommended maximum class size. Principal Roger Sowder pointed out the importance of keeping those primary grade classes small, and indicated that additional teachers are needed as soon as possible.

White Mountain Elementary School reported an enrollment of 428, up from 424 at this point last year. Enrollment at White Mountain Middle School was at 437 as of Tuesday evening, increased over the 423 students enrolled at the 10-day point last year. Miller noted that sixth grade classes at that school also are overcrowded.

Ruidoso High School enrolled 490 students as of Tuesday, a jump of seven students over the number enrolled at this point last year.

Miller agreed that additional teachers will be needed if enrollment remains at the present level or increases. He recommended delaying hiring new staff until after the 20-day period, however, to make sure that enrollment will stay high.

"The budget is extremely tight," he stated, "and there really isn't any money to play on."

The school board agreed to permit Miller to hire new instructors if enrollment does not drop after 20 days into the school year.

Also Tuesday, the board approved a new teacher observation-evaluation

form and handbook, presented by associate superintendent Mike Gladden.

"I feel like we are taking a step forward in really making teachers accountable and knowing what's expected in the school setting," Gladden commented about the new evaluation procedures.

Non-tenured teachers will be formally evaluated by the principal three times during the year—and tenured teachers twice a year—although principals are encouraged to evaluate and observe teachers at all times. The administrators and instructors will agree on a time for observation of the class and discuss beforehand what is expected, explained Gladden.

Teachers will be rated as professionally competent, needing improvement or must improve in their personal characteristics, professional competencies and instructional management.

"The whole program is designed on the improvement of each teacher," said Gladden. "The outcome of this should provide a higher quality of education for the kids in Ruidoso."

Miller reported he and Gladden are preparing an administrators evaluation form as well.

The superintendents also presented the board with a list of program presentations for future board meetings. Gladden said he believes the presentations, to be made by teachers about various school programs, will help keep board members informed about what is being offered in the schools.

The tentative list of topics for this year's board meetings include the bilingual program at White Mountain Elementary School; athletic period at the high school; Chapter II fine arts program plans; special education offerings and ancillary services; the high school DECA program; career day; report on inservice presentations; computer education direction for the high school; curriculum development in the district; and test results.

An additional change made by the new superintendents and adopted by the board Tuesday is in the policy on use of school buildings by outside organizations or groups. The new policy establishes charges for use of

school facilities at \$100 per day for the gymnasium, \$50 per day for the cafeteria and \$25 per day for a classroom. Organizations utilizing the facilities also are required to have adequate insurance coverage.

Groups exempt from the use fee and insurance requirement include "parent and student organizations of an educational nature directly involving the student body of the building." These include such organizations as PTAs and Scouts.

Cultural improvement organizations such as orchestras or drama groups may use the buildings for practice without providing insurance, but they must pay the use fee.

School buildings will not be made available to any partisan political meetings, athletic groups not officially sponsored by a municipal or county recreation program, or for money-making activities not connected with a recognized charity or cultural or educational agency in the district.

Application for use of any school building must be made in writing to the superintendent, the policy states.

In other business, the school board:

- Awarded the bid on a water pressure reducing station for the new high school to Burn Construction of Las Cruces for the low bid of \$49,712.50.

- Accepted the resignation of Shannon Brown as sixth grade teacher at the middle school and approved the

hiring of Catherine Palmer to replace her.

- Approved the hiring of Arlene Martinez as instructional support aide at White Mountain Elementary School (WMES), Emmalene Botella as teacher aide at WMES and Debbie Enjady as teacher aide at White Mountain Middle School.

- Approved the hiring of Estelle Mitchell as school bus driver.

- Voted to submit its draft for a lease agreement for use of White Mountain Schools property for village recreation to the school attorney. He will review the document with the village attorney and it will be presented to the village council for approval.

- Signed a contract with landscape architect Matthew Borowski for drainage work, sidewalks and parking at the new high school at an estimated cost of \$380,000.

- Voted to go on record in support of the village Planning and Zoning Commission's decision against rezoning property along Hull Road adjacent to White Mountain Schools for commercial use.

- Were introduced to the high school staff by principal Tom Hansen.



The Silver Lining

The Drought Breaks With Signs Of Fall

On Sunday, the eleventh, in the morning, I came out and looked the world over and something was missing. The Swallows had gone back to Mexico; as one of Longfellow's poems goes, had:

"Folded their tents as the Arab,
And silently stolen away."

Then two tarantulas crossed the little dirt road in front of the house, making their way to high ground and cover. This was the "handwriting on the wall" or rather in the sky and on the ground, both unmistakable messages.

Then on the afternoon of Monday, the twelfth, I was driving home and along about Conley's Nursery you could see the sky that dark blue almost black color like a curtain all down the way. Just past Bliscuit Hill, a cloudburst hit me head on, the water driven by wind in sheets against the windshield. Cars were stopped along the way. Two large trucks splashed small lake-fulls of water all over the pickup as they rolled through the streams of water running like creeks on the highway.

About Fox Cave the rain was in full flood, with water running off cliffs and hillsides onto the highway. A glance at the creek told me I had the high water beat; and just at the place the rain had slowed down to a good steady rain, which tapered off by evening to a lightly-drifting mist. Just before it reached the western hill, the sun broke through sending a golden smile to Mother Earth, who smiled back, dressed in her emerald best.

Apples Begin To Ripen

Thus it was that the September rains came in with the first cool waves of Fall. Today, the thirteenth, just before high noon, the sky is all

low clouds — a grey ceiling over a green mountain land. Before this rain the gramma grass had hastened to make its golf-club-shaped heads of grain, and the little greenish-yellow fringes of pollen were already decorating these little flagpoles.

Now today, in the mild, cloudy weather, from the soaked ground, up spring new stem heads, and blades of this marvelous food, this banquet of the grazing creatures.

These two things working together — the cool nights and the heavy rains and moist air — are hastening the ripening of the apples. You can see the bright red among the leaves turning a deeper shade day by day.

Down at San Patricio, Ben Sanchez says that he has a light crop of Double Red Delicious, but that they are of good quality, and ripening fast. This means that the apples down below at Hondo and Tinnie and Picacho will be ripe in a few days.

That is to say, the earlier ripening of the main varieties. Out of the two hundred or more popular varieties nation wide of years past, the local apples have simmered down to five main varieties which have stood the test of time and popular demand:

Double Red Delicious, Golden Delicious, Jonathan, Staymen Winesap and other Winesaps, and Rome Beauty. The Jonathan — a world wide favorite — ripens a little ahead of the five. Next the Golden and Double Red Delicious, followed by the Winesap in mid-Autumn and the Rome Beauty, the late apple.

The Double Red is a favorite eating and salad apple. The Golden is all-purpose: pies, cobblers, preserves, applesauce. The Jonathan is a favorite for eating raw and baked, and just about anything that calls for a good apple.

The Winesap and Rome Beauty, being later ripeners, are extra good keepers.

In storing apples, you need the temperature to be just this side of freezing, in a dry, airy place. The best containers were the old-time bushel baskets and apple boxes, because these would allow the air to circulate throughout, allowing the apples to "breathe."

In my childhood, I remember the Jonathan apples which came up to Juneau, Alaska, from Washington, in the apple boxes on the boats, each apple was wrapped in very thin special paper, which was porous enough to keep the fruit from suffocating, and yet thick enough to protect each apple from another which might accidentally go bad.

The apple inhales whatever is in the air near and around it. So do not wrap the apples in newspaper for they will take on the flavor of the ink. Just put them in a wood box or bushel basket or something like that, not too many in one container.

The apples are our long-time friends. The year without the complete without the apples in the Fall, Autumn, Indian Summer and Winter.

Hondo landfill now open

Lincoln County manager Suzanne Cox announced that the sanitary landfill site in Hondo will be reopened as of today. County residents may resume dumping their trash at that site, located about one mile north of the White Mountain Apple Shed.

The landfill has been closed for the past three to four weeks after the contract agreement for use of the land expired.

Cox said the county signed an agreement this week with landowner Manual Torrez to reopen the landfill.

The Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) Wednesday approved an expenditure of not more than \$2,000 for the American Automobile Association (AAA) Familiarization Tour.

The tour, hosted by the regional tourism organization Sun Country, will bring 37 travel AAA travel writers from around the country to Ruidoso and the other communities of Sun Country for a week long tour.

Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth said the travel writers will spend a day touring Ruidoso and a morning at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. They will arrive in Ruidoso Tuesday, September 20.

The AAA travel writers help AAA members plan their vacations. Jungbluth said the Familiarization Tour will introduce Ruidoso to the writers who will hopefully send tourists here for vacations.

The \$2,000 will cover meals and accommodations for the travel writers.

Jungbluth said the Chamber's advertising budget for winter 1983-84 would not be ready for LTC approval until September 28 because the Chamber has not determined its advertising plan for Mexico. He said the Chamber is looking into a program to accept pesos in Ruidoso and is sending a Chamber representative to Mexico to determine an advertising strategy.

LTC member Archer Wilson welcomed new committee members Joan Bailey, Rod Adamson, Richard Sandoval, Jim Biggs and Linda Flack

who were recently appointed by Mayor George White.

Since four of the members were notified of the LTC membership Wednesday morning, Wilson suggested carrying on no further business Wednesday.

Wilson acted as temporary chairman in place of former chairman Ed Hyman who has resigned. He called a special meeting for noon Thursday, September 22 at village hall.

LTC members will then determine terms of office, officers and a regular meeting time.

RMC works on details of Aspen Festival

The Retail Merchants Committee (RMC) of the Chamber of Commerce met this week to tie up loose ends on Aspen Festival plans.

The committee had difficulty agreeing on a grand marshal for the October 1 parade but did agree that the selection process should begin earlier in the future. At presstime, the parade did not yet have a grand marshal. Actor Dale Robertson was asked to serve as grand marshal but, according to Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth, regrettably declined due to a previous engagement.

Actress Debra Winger was also to be contacted about serving as grand marshal.

Ruidoso High School staff members met with RMC representatives Wednesday morning to discuss selection of an Aspen Festival Queen.

Other parade plans were finalized with the appointment of Budgie Green as escort for the judges. Judges have not been selected yet, but they will not be local residents.

The committee briefly discussed possible ways to avoid the lapse of time which usually occurs between the motorcyclists and the walking

parade, such as putting the motorcyclists at the end. But no action was taken after it was agreed that the time lapse is not that great a problem.

Jungbluth pointed out that tentative dates for the Motorcycle Festival next year are a week earlier than this year. He said RMC will have to decide whether to separate the Aspen Festival parade from the Motorcycle Festival or to hold the parade earlier than usual.

—Heard the resignation of Morgan Clough, who said the RMC meeting dates conflict with other appointments.

—Heard Clough report on proposed plans to begin a peso acceptance program among Ruidoso businesses.

—Set the next meeting for 5-7 p.m. Thursday, October 13, to meet with representatives of the Roswell Red Coats group. The meeting will be a no-host cocktail party, with the place to be announced later.



Drought affects livestock, fire

Though September has been rainy so far, the Ruidoso area is not out of the woods as far as the effects of an unusually dry summer.

Tom Guck of the U.S. Forest Service in Capitan reported 2.86 inches of precipitation there for June, July and August. That is the lowest total on record for those three months, going back to 1909. Average rainfall for the period is 7.30 inches.

Smokey Bear Ranger Station measured 5.08 inches for the three months, compared to the 35-year average of 10.69 inches. Just 1.60 inches of rain fell at Ruidoso Municipal Airport during August.

Guck said ranchers have been hurt by the drought.

"This year has been especially bad because they didn't make any grass hardy at all anywhere," he said. He explained that ranchers depend on gramma grass for winter pasture.

Without it, they are faced with the choice of cutting back their herds or relying on prepared feed. But the hot dry summer in the Midwest is already affecting the availability of feed in

New Mexico, Guck said.

So some cattle are being shipped to market early.

"They're starting to cut their herds down, size-wise," said Guck. "It's about the only thing they can do."

He also noted that many ranchers depend on gully water runoff to fill their earthen stock tanks. With no water in the tanks, cattle have to stay close to the windmills and cannot be spread out.

County extension agent Barry Herd confirmed that many cattle are going to market early. He said ranchers are doing pregnancy tests and shipping those cows that are not pregnant.

"If they don't have any grass right now they're really looking to reduce their numbers," said Herd. He pointed out that if the first frost comes late, ranchers could still make some grass, "but nothing like if we'd had the rains in July."

Guck expressed concern about the ground water supply, too.

"That's the thing that could be bad," he said, noting that unless there is a very wet fall and winter, wells could dry up as the water table drops. "I think we'll lose a lot of trees out

of this," Guck predicted, but he added that this is "nature's way of thinning." He also noted that dry conditions affect the availability of water for fire fighting in the woods.


"We're looking at potential of higher intensity fires in the fall," said Steve Makowski of the Forest Service in Ruidoso. He explained that fuels are classified—from one-hour fuels like grass and pine needles to thousand-hour fuels like logs of three inches or more in diameter—based on the time they take to adjust to surrounding conditions.

Normally, he explained, precipitation and high humidity in the rainy season allow the larger fuels to pick up a lot of moisture, "and they are very slow to give it off."

This year they did not get that moisture. As a result, said Makowski, "We're looking at a more difficult fall fire season than we're used to."

On October 1, the fire fighting manpower drops to its year-round level (seven), so a fire that might "get up and go" because fuels are drier than normal concerns Makowski.

"A five-acre fire gets bad to us, just because of limited resources," he said.

Plans finalized for Fantasy Mountain park

Sid Alford, president of Ruidoso Recreation, Inc., announced that plans have now been finalized for a proposed theme park in Ruidoso Downs.

The park has been named Fantasy Mountain, and will be located directly across Highway 70 from the Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

"The facility is designed along the same general format that is used in Six Flags Over Texas, Six Flags Over Georgia and other similar theme parks throughout the United States. Fantasy Mountain will not be as large as those major parks, of course, but we think we have kept most of the major attractions people look for in a family theme park," Alford said.

Construction is scheduled to begin this fall, and a preliminary opening date has been set for June of 1984. The park as now planned will be built on a turn-of-the-century rustic theme. The plans provide that the park will have two large fountains, a waterfall, a lake and several water-oriented amusements and rides, including remote-controlled boats, a log flume ride and a venture river ride. 


Bigger purses at State Fair races

Bigger purses, a new paddock and a sparkling clean, freshly painted grandstand will greet horseracing fans for the 17-day race meet at the New Mexico State Fair which got underway at 12:30 p.m. Friday, September 9.

The added purses have been increased from \$1,393,600 in 1982 to \$1,529,000 in 1983. More money has been added to the feature races. The 45th running of the New Mexico State Fair Handicap for three-year-old and older thoroughbreds will offer \$75,000-added money, making it the richest race of the 1983 New Mexico State Fair. The top purse for quarter horse sprinters will be offered in the State Fair Quarter Horse Handicap which will have \$30,000-added purse. With large purses, the best horses in the country are expected to compete on the track September 9 through September 25.

"We have made major improvements to the track and grandstand including the painting of the grandstand and construction of a new paddock area," said fair manager Steve Anaya.

Racing fans will have the opportunity to make quinnella wagers in all but the first, eighth and 12th races. Trifecta wagering will be held in the eighth and 12th race and the daily double in the first and second race.

Post time is 12:30 p.m. each day and 12 races will be run every day except for September 14, 15 and 16 which will have 13 races with the running of the World Wide Appaloosa Consolation, the Appaloosa Gold Cup Invitational and the World Wide Appaloosa Futurity.

For the second year, computerized pari-mutuel equipment will be used to allow race enthusiasts to place bets and cash tickets at the same window.

The new equipment has shortened the waiting lines, and is more efficient than systems used in the past. More than 200,000 race fans are expected to attend the 17-day race meet.

Finlay MacGillivray, director of racing for the 1983 New Mexico State Fair, is expecting the '83 meet to be the most successful race meet ever held at the New Mexico State Fair. He

attributes the expected success to Steve Anaya, who is responsible for the increase in purses and improvements to the racing plant. MacGillivray, manager of the New Mexico State Fair for 17 years and general manager of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park for two and one half years, will oversee more than 500 employees at the track during the annual race meet.

Hubert Smith, track superintendent, has the track in excellent shape, and with the new improvements to the grandstand and paddock area, racing fans are in for a real treat at the 1983 New Mexico State Fair Race Meet, said MacGillivray.

Reserve seat tickets may be purchased in advance at the New Mexico State Fair ticket office. Admission to the track is \$1.10 for adults and teenagers, 60 cents for children under 11. South Section reserve seating is \$1 (plus \$1.10 track admission); Second Floor reserve seating, \$2 (plus \$1.10 track admission); Club House Reserve Seating, \$4 (plus \$1.10 track admission).

All you want to know about "Biggest Show in New Mexico"

The 1983 New Mexico State Fair in September will be the 46th consecutive edition of "The Biggest Show in New Mexico."

The New Mexico State Fair is a totally self-supporting state agency and no public tax money has ever been used for its operation since it began in 1938.

The New Mexico State Fair horse racing track is a one-mile oval.

Queen contestants at the annual New Mexico State Fair furnish their own horses.

Gates at the annual New Mexico State Fair are open from 7 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. daily.

One out of every three persons going to the New Mexico State Fair visits the exhibits, making them the most popular attraction at the exposition. Second most popular attraction is the carnival, third is rodeo and fourth is racing.

There are more than 8,000 parking spaces on the grounds of the New Mexico State Fair.

Residents of every state in the union, plus several foreign countries, attend the annual New Mexico State Fair, with the largest percentage, approximately 80 percent, coming from the Land of Enchantment.

Exhibit halls at the New Mexico State Fair are open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily during the annual 12-day exposition.

The New Mexico State Fair is situated on 230 acres of choice land, located almost in the population center of metropolitan Albuquerque, purchased back in 1936 for \$9,950.

The School House exhibit building at the New Mexico State Fair was built in 1953.

The first modern New Mexico State Fair, on its present site in Albuquerque, was held October 9 through 16, 1938. An earlier Territorial Fair was held in Albuquerque's Old Town Area in the late 1800s and until World War I.

The New Mexico State Fairgrounds has more than 100 permanent buildings.

Candidates for New Mexico State Fair Queen must be single girls between the ages of 16 and 21, and they must be permanent residents of the county they represent.

The New Mexico State Fair is ranked eighth in the nation in attendance, on a per capita basis.

The Fine Arts Gallery is one of the oldest buildings on the grounds of the New Mexico State Fair. It was built in 1941 and in the early years doubled as fair administrative offices.

Approximately 1,400 persons are employed by the New Mexico State Fair during the yearly 12-day exposition.

In its 42 years of operation, the New Mexico State Fair has had only five managers. Steve Anaya is the current chief. Bill Humphries managed the Fair in 1981 and 1982. Finlay MacGillivray was at the post from 1969 to 1980. Leon Harms was the first

manager, serving from 1938 to 1953 and Quentin Tex Barron was at the helm from 1953 to 1963.

Many of the department superintendents at the New Mexico State Fair are professors on the staff of the New Mexico State University.

The 1983 queen contest at the New Mexico State Fair is now in its 34th consecutive year.

Biggest department at the annual New Mexico State Fair, strictly in terms of numbers, is the Hobby Show. More than 25,000 items, ranging in size from antique cars to postage stamps, are entered each year.

Biggest building on the grounds of the New Mexico State Fair is Tingley Coliseum, which contains 10,656 permanent seats. The large building was opened in 1957 and is named after the late governor, Clyde Tingley.

There are five acres of beautiful green lawns on the New Mexico State Fair grounds.

Horses are a vital part of the annual New Mexico State Fair. More than 2,000 of them, either on the racetrack, in the show ring, or in the All Star Rodeo, are in competition each year.

Candidates for New Mexico State Fair Queen must be sponsored by an organization in their home county.

There are more than 1,300 horse stalls on the New Mexico State Fair grounds.

Each year, Indians select a "Miss Indian New Mexico" to reign over festivities in the popular Indian Village at the New Mexico State Fair.

One of the most popular livestock exhibits at the annual New Mexico State Fair is the FFA Big Red Barn, in which a number of live baby animals and the mothers are exhibited.

The popular Spanish Heritage Program at the New Mexico State Fair will be marking its ninth anniversary

at the 1983 exposition.

The 50,000-square foot Horse Arena at the New Mexico State Fair was built in 1970.

The Indian Village at the New Mexico State Fair will be celebrating its 20th anniversary during the 1983 exposition.

The New Mexico State Fair maintains a First Aid Station on the grounds during the annual exposition, with a registered nurse on duty.

The public can get in free to the 1983 New Mexico State Fair by riding onto the grounds on specially marked Albuquerque Sun Tran city buses.

Candidates for queen of the New Mexico State Fair are judged 60 percent on horsemanship and 40 percent on personality.

Royal purple ribbons are awarded to the champions in all competitions at the annual New Mexico State Fair.

The reigning New Mexico State Fair Queen rides nightly in the grand entry preceding the All Star Rodeo in Tingley Coliseum. This year's queen is Mary Brett Darnell of Bernalillo County.

All food booths at the New Mexico State Fair must comply with all State Health regulations. Spot checks of all booths are made periodically during the annual exposition.

An information booth, which provides answers to all kinds of questions relating to the annual New Mexico State Fair, will be open at the 1983 exposition daily from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. It is located just inside Pedestrian Gate No. 4.

A record 1.2 million people visited the New Mexico State Fair in 1982.

A total of 194,994 horse racing enthusiasts joined in the wagering during the 1982 New Mexico State Fair to set an all-time pari-mutuel handle record of \$16,193,157.

More than 86,000 persons attended

the popular 11-night All Star Rodeo in Tingley Coliseum during the 1982 New Mexico State Fair.

It takes approximately three tablespoons of flour to make one Indian fried bread and there were 26,000 pounds of flour delivered to the Indian Village during the 1982 New Mexico State Fair.

After 75 years, admission to the New Mexico State Fair is still only 50 cents.

Members of the 1983 New Mexico State Fair Commission are: J.T. Turner, Chairman, Moriarity; Odie Echols, Albuquerque; Ina Wilcher, Dora; Benny Atencio, Santa Domingo; Joe Torrez, Angel Fire; Leo L. Smith, Chama; Jennie Day, Albuquerque.

The Chairman for the 1983 New Mexico State Fair Parade is H.H. Hooten of Albuquerque.

The 1983 New Mexico State Fair Championship Rodeo has been increased from 10 to 11 performances.

Prize money for the 1982 New Mexico State Fair Rodeo exceeded \$142,000 and is expected to increase this year.

For the first time in the history of the New Mexico State Fair, all 1983 entries by exhibitors will be handled by computer.

The State Championship Horse Shoe Pitching Contest is held annually at the New Mexico State Fair.

The Indian Exhibits Department will issue over \$5,000 in premiums at the 1983 New Mexico State Fair.

Twelve Western bands from across New Mexico will be competing for

over \$1,000 in cash and an all-expense-paid trip to Nashville's Grand Ol' Opry in the Country Music Showdown Finals at the 1983 New Mexico State Fair.

Nearly \$4,000 in premiums will be awarded from the Agriculture Department at the 1983 New Mexico State Fair.

The New Mexico State Fair's Beef Cattle Show awards over \$46,000 in premium money.

A total of \$51,000 in prize money will be awarded during the 17-day, action-packed 1983 New Mexico State Fair Horse Show.

For the first time, the 1983 New Mexico State Fair will host an International Food Pavilion with international and American delicacies for fairgoing food connoisseurs.

Under the direction of fair manager

Steve Anaya, fairgoers in 1983 will see over \$600,000 in improvements including a new copper-colored roof on Tingley Coliseum and some new paint at the Grandstand.

In cooperation with state and local police, the 1983 New Mexico State Fair will have 90 full-time officers on duty.

The concept of free quality entertainment began at the New Mexico State Fair in 1974. Since 1976, the Opera House has been the center for continuous free entertainment daily throughout the Fair.

Every year, the New Mexico State Fair honors the state's senior citizens with a free admission day and the Golden Age Celebration.

For the first time, the 1983 New Mexico State Fair will host the Exceptional Rodeo for handicapped children.

Reserved tickets for the Rodeo are \$7 per person or \$3 for general admission when purchased at the New Mexico State Fair Ticket Office located on the grounds.

Special concerts for the 1983 New Mexico State Fair are the Beach Boys and Dick Clark's Rock N' Roll Revue. These special concerts will be held in the grandstand.

The New Mexico State Fairgrounds has more than 100 permanent buildings.

Candidates for New Mexico State Fair Queen must be single girls between the ages of 16 and 21, and they must be permanent residents of the county they represent.

The New Mexico State Fair is ranked eighth in the nation in attendance, on a per capita basis.

The Fine Arts Gallery is one of the oldest buildings on the grounds of the New Mexico State Fair. It was built in 1941 and in the early years doubled as fair administrative offices.

Approximately 1,400 persons are employed by the New Mexico State Fair during the yearly 12-day exposition.

In its 42 years of operation, the New Mexico State Fair has had only five managers. Steve Anaya is the current chief. Bill Humphries managed the Fair in 1981 and 1982. Finlay MacGillivray was at the post from 1969 to 1980. Leon Harms was the first



Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE — Hold on to your hats! This column will take a headline nobody has ever seen before: **McCAFFREY COMPLIMENTS ANAYA.**

Yes, incredible as it seems, this writer has found a gleam of light in the administration of Governor Toney Anaya, and it is the Governor himself who gets the credit for it.

We'll hasten to make clear what it is.

Simply this: that Toney demanded, and almost made stick, a ruling that agencies of state government would have their budgets for the coming fiscal year in the hands of the Department of Finance and Administration by September 1.

That's what every governor ought to do. If he doesn't care when budgets get in, at least he ought to enforce the law; and the law says that's when they're due.

Never before in the recent history of New Mexico, however, has anybody in the governor's suite made a demand that the agencies actually deliver as specified.

Oh, there are a couple of little loopholes about the whole matter that one could carp at if one wanted.

The press release put out from the Governor's office said only one or two of the multitude of agencies would fail to fulfill the law. That's a low estimate. In fact, it's more like 30 of them that really didn't make it.

That's still phenomenal. What's more, the Department of Finance and Administration, the recipient of all these budgets, managed to get its own in on time this year — the first such occurrence of that kind in the memory of man or woman.

And there is the fact that some of those budgets, as turned in, are pretty much works of fiction. A lot of people have to have said, "Oh, what the heck. Just pencil some numbers in. The DFA and the Legislative Finance Committee will go over everything with a fine-tooth comb anyway. We don't really have to have a final budget we can defend in every detail till we have to appear before the legislators."

That too is a common attitude, which is not in any way the fault of the Anaya people. It's just a sort of shrug of the shoulders from the old bureaucrats — the kind who were here when Anaya came and will be here long after he has gone to whatever he goes to.

Despite all that, Toney gets credit for telling everybody he meant it when he said he wanted those budgets in on time, and for making most of them believe it.

One additional note, which may have had something to do with the alacrity with which the Cabinet Secretaries got this job done:

Toney told them he would judge the degree to which they understood and gave priorities to his policies by the way they apportioned their money.

"Do it the way I want," in other words, "and you get to keep your job."

That kind of sharpness tends to get people's attention.

So as not to spoil that happy note of compliments to our chief executive, let the writer hasten to say that the gripe he is about to allude to comes from a member of the State Legislature, not from the writer personally.

The Governor knows which one it is — or at least he does if he reads his mail.

The copy of the letter we saw points this out:

Of 80 new appointments to boards and commissions recently made by the Governor (not 100, as some of us carelessly stated), 58 were from the northern half of the state, and a mere 22 from the southern section. (Poor Eddy County, where this lawmaker hales from, didn't get a single one.)

That galls people more in light of the fact that the Governor himself promised to take geographical origin into consideration in these matters.

Maybe in the next 80 appointments, the proportion will be reversed.

You can bet southern New Mexicans will be watching to see if it is.

The decision of the Council was not easily made and many meetings were conducted with long discussions before the final decision was made.

The irony of this complicated matter lies in the fact that either party — the City or the Protestants — could have discussed the situation PRIOR to the date the Protestants filed their protest with the State. After the protest was filed it was too late to make a handshake agreement which would probably have prevented the situation we now face. Disclosures brought out in the news article serve no purpose and are restatements of comments and observations made previously from time to time.

Again, I ask — "WHY?"

"Life is full of changes," I wrote in a letter to a friend this week. Not a very profound statement, really, but suitable as a lead-in to the news I had to deliver. "I'm moving to Santa Fe," I continued, filling in the details on my new job and new home in the City Different. Christmas and address changes are the two events that motivate me to keep in touch with friends and relatives, it seems.

I'm having to write them all to explain that after 19 months and one week, I'm ending my career as a newspaper reporter (for now) and beginning a new life as an information specialist for the state of New Mexico, more specifically as a technical writer for the Taxation and Revenue Department. I suppose that calls for some retrospection.

I look at my time here in terms of the opportunities I would have missed had I not been at The Ruidoso News in Ruidoso, New Mexico, during the past year and a half plus.

For instance, I would have missed my interview with a celebrity, Michael Murphey, and my day as a "White House correspondent," covering President Reagan's visit to Roswell. These two assignments sound more exciting than they actually were. I interviewed Murphey by way of long distance telephone, and the press was situated so far from Reagan in Roswell that some pretty powerful telescopic camera lenses were required to get photographs.

But friends and relatives across the country are impressed by such assignments, and they were probably two of the highlights of my Ruidoso News career.

Then there's Ruidoso Downs. I can't imagine having missed the experience of Ruidoso Downs. I learned what it was like to feel utter exasperation as I sat through three-hour meetings hearing the same point being argued over and over and over, with no end or resolution in sight. But there were some laughs, too. Towards the end of those lo-o-o-ong meetings, when the discussion centered around garbage or sewer, the whole situation would sometimes become so ridiculous that I found it difficult to suppress an outbreak of

hysterics—somewhat unprofessionally, I admit.

I only regret that I won't get to stick around to see whether the Armstrong Tract apartments ever get built. But then, I probably won't live that long anyway.

Being at The Ruidoso News also taught me that ANYTHING can make good feature material. The bookmobile, RV-ers, a school bus ... I never did get around to the "life of a first grader," "life of a second grader," "life of a third grader," and so on series. It was always "next September."

If I hadn't joined the staff of The Ruidoso News I probably never would have been able to relive the college experience of regularly staying up into the middle of the night to get a term paper, I mean article, written by deadline. I even got in one all-nighter. It was great, just like being back in college during final exam week.

Moving to Ruidoso provided me with many opportunities for which I am sincerely grateful, such as getting to explore the Great Southwest. I could have missed Carlsbad Caverns, White Sands National Monument, Billy the Kid country, the Santa Fe Indian Market and Juarez, Mexico—my first venture into a foreign country. That trip gave me the opportunity to practice the few phrases I remember from high school and college Spanish classes—"Hable Ingles?" and "Donde esta ... ?"

And I may never have gotten to attend a horse race or rodeo or develop a taste for Mexican food and adobe architecture if it hadn't been for Ruidoso. My exposure to country-western music would have been much more limited had I not relocated to this part of the country.

And if I hadn't moved to Ruidoso, I probably wouldn't be planning a move to Santa Fe.

There's so much I would have missed. And I suppose there is much I will miss.

But life is full of changes.

Mule races kick things off

The roar of the crowd and the thunder of racing hooves at Ruidoso Downs Race Track will be heard again September 16-18. Mules with their speed clocked just two seconds less than a quarter horse are putting horse racing fans on their feet.

"Mule racing is the fastest growing sport in the country," says Briscoe West, a director of the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners. "Farmers and ranchers aren't the only ones interested in racing mules. Many business executives and professional people are getting involved in mules."

The long-eared sprinters are a breed apart from their ancestors—the beasts of burden on farms and ranches who pulled the wagon and plowed the fields. Today's racing mule is the offspring of a male donkey (jack) and a mare horse; or a stallion horse and a female donkey (jenny). Strong racing genes produce mules that have been known to beat a horse. The mules have stepped up in class with their own trainers, jockeys and racing circuit starting at Bishop, California; then on to Victoria, California; up to Idaho; down to Farmington, Albuquerque and Ruidoso; over to Del Rio, Texas;

and west to Globe and Phoenix, Arizona.

The going price for a good racing mule is between \$6,000 and \$10,000. This may seem like a big investment for a sterile animal, but a mule can run two races a day and race 12 or even 14 years. With a quarter horse priced

\$30,000 to \$100,000 or even more, racing enthusiasts are showing great interest in mules.

Melvin Means, president of the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners, which was organized in 1979 to promote mule races, is a manufacturers' representative. He travels five states and uses

every opportunity to promote the races at the "Downs". Means' avid interest in mules has left his fishing pole and hunting gear in the closet, but he must be doing something right. From a purse of \$3,000 for a three day meet in 1979

to a \$55,000 purse in 1983, the mules are coming to Ruidoso. Three hundred and fifty mules arrived for the meet last fall.

"With commercial sponsors getting interested, the only way for purses to go is up," claims Means.

"The richest and best mule races in the country are not

chutes, starters and stewards apply for mule racing as for horse racing, but the mules spice up their 14-race program with races without fun," add the Mule Skinners. The same rules, equipment,


referred to as Coon Jump, Diaper Race, Pole Bending and a favorite with the fans, the Bloomer Race. Riders climb into bloomers, race down the track and give the bloomers to another rider who has to put them on and ride back to the starting line.

The Balloon Bust race is run past a course of poles holding balloons that the riders must pop as they ride by. Along with the laughs, purses are awarded in these races.

Everyone knows what to expect at a horse race, but a mule race is unpredictable.

"Mules are harder to race. They are not used to running in a straight line as they're more used to dodging and hiding from their enemies. Horses just escape from their enemies by sheer speed," says Means. The stubborn-as-a-mule strain has not been erased with the new scientific breeding, or is a mule just smarter than a jockey?

If a mule gets tired, it will stop on the spot and no amount of urging on the part of the jockey can convince the tired mule to cross the finish line. A mule might be 17 lengths in front and see green grass on the other side of the rail, or at the entrance to the paddock, and just like that, the race is over

for that mule. Except for an unfortunate accident a horse makes it around the track, but a mule might decide the long way around the track is too long, jump the rail and take a shortcut, and triumphantly cross the finish line.

Mule racing has moved full speed ahead with fans coming to Ruidoso from 35 states, boosting attendance to 12,000 for the three

day meet in 1982. Attendance and purses have gone far beyond the first Mule-O-Rama held in a meadow in 1976, just for fun. After an all-day program of races, everyone gathered for a chuckwagon cookout with 1,400 pounds of beef, hundreds of sour-dough biscuits, and a barrel full of beans. A fiddlers' contest and dance topped off Ruidoso's in-

troductio n to mule racing.

Now the Mule Skinners look for a whole new industry when pari-mutuel betting is approved. The current system of betting is to make whatever deal you can with your friends or the person sitting in the next row. New Mexico's attorney general has ruled that an

act of the Legislature is required to allow pari-mutuel betting on the mule races. The Mule Skinners, with the support of the American Mule Association, are readying their request.

The races are a community effort in Ruidoso and everyone benefits. The high school football team handles the cleanup, another high school group, getting an introduction to business through DECA, works the concession stands; the Shriners sell the program. The Lions Club and Boy Scouts lend a hand and all organizations profit from their respective efforts. Visitors' food and lodging totaling half a million dollars boost the tourist industry.

The fiddlers' tunes, the

camaraderie of a chuckwagon dinner, the dosey-do's of whirling dancers at the first mule race in Ruidoso may be just a memory, but the mules will be on the track this fall, and enthusiastic Mule Skinners look to the future and an "All-American Mule Futurity" with a sizeable purse as the feature attraction.



Arabian Show for noble breed

More than 100 head of the horse many believe to be the most beautiful in the world will be here for the fourth annual Ruidoso All Arabian Horse Show September 16-18.

The "A" rated show, sponsored by the Ruidoso Arabian Horse Association, will take place at Western Highlands—the Ruidoso Downs Race Track training track east of the main racetrack. Many categories of competition are scheduled.

Friday the 18th will be taken up mostly with halter classes, noted association president Gail Adams. He described this competition as "stand 'em up and let 'em look pretty." Horses are judged according to how closely they meet conformation standards.

Riding classes are the feature attraction Saturday, September 19. One interesting event is the Trail Course. This requires horse and rider to negotiate a trail with obstacles similar to what they would encounter in the wild.

The horse must be able to sidestep and back in a straight line from an obstacle, and must contend with a "distracting obstacle," such as a pen full of squealing geese.

"That really tests how well the

horse is trained," said Adams.

A favorite event of spectators, the Native Costume class, is also scheduled. Adams noted, however, that there must be sufficient entries and suitable weather for this competition to take place.

Along with all that, there is a class for youngsters who bring their dogs. Adams called the Show Dog class "just a little add-on fun thing for kids."

Among the states expected to be represented at the All Arabian Show are New Mexico, California, Arizona, Texas, Oklahoma and Wyoming. Adams noted that the Ruidoso event follows a major show in Albuquerque, which helps bring many fine horses to the local show.

The fact that the Ruidoso show is "A" rated means points can be earned toward qualifying for the national Arabian show. The International Arabian Horse Association sanctions the competition.

Adams predicted about 20 horses from the Lincoln and Otero counties area will participate. The sponsoring Ruidoso Arabian Horse Association has about 20 members, he noted.

The group came to be after Ronda Moore of High Country Arabians moved to this area. She was



followed by the Adams', Gail and Christa. Gail credits Ronda with getting the show going, noting that he laughed when she first told him Ruidoso would have an "A" rated show.

"This whole thing is principally because of her dedication and hard work," he said.

Adams was asked what it is about the Arabian horse that at-

tracts the interest of owners and horse aficionados.

"Intelligence," he replied. "They seem to learn faster than many horse breeds." He also noted versatility, along with the fact that the Arabian is the oldest recorded breed.

Adams also pointed out that the

Johnny Williams golf event

The sixth annual Johnny Williams Memorial Partnership Golf Tournament will be played Friday through Sunday, September 30-October 2, at Cree Meadows Country Club.

The tournament is named in honor of the late Johnny Williams, who owned the country club in the mid 1950s. Along with several other people, Williams worked to expand and improve the country club and golf course. He sold the country club to Stormy Edwards in 1958.

Some of the best amateur golfers in the Southwest annually compete in the tournament.

"This is the second biggest tournament on our schedule (after the Cree Meadows Match-Play Tournament)," said Cree Meadows head golf pro Bob Hickson. "No question about it."

There will be competition in five flights, with 10 teams in each flight. A total of 100 golfers will compete in the tournament.

Larry Seligmann and Mo

Turner of Texas won the 1982 championship flight, shooting a 192. Steve Earsley and Charlie Snuggs were second with a 199, while Billy Carson and Mickey Wilson were third at 202. Local golfers Howard Hassell and Doug Bass finished fourth at 206.

Another local team—Tommy Hornbuckle and Ted Martinez—captured the 1981 championship flight, and were fifth in 1982 with a 210 score.

Hornbuckle and Martinez are two of the best amateur golfers in Lincoln County. Both generally finish among the leaders in local

tournaments.

The country club was started in the late 1940s with just nine golf holes. The golf course was expanded to 18 holes in 1976-77 and is one of the most popular courses in New Mexico.

Par for the course is 71. The course plays at about 6,000 yards and offers a beautiful view of Sierra Blanca, the tallest peak in the area.

There is a \$225 entry fee per team. The entry fee will give the golfers use of a cart, favors, dinner and dance, ladies' luncheon, prizes and a practice round.





Pat and Linda's Street Rod

Before all the motorcycles hit town this fall, a different kind of machine will be revving its engine around the streets of Ruidoso. About 80 street rods are expected to be in town September 17 and 18 for what has now become an annual Aspen Festival event, Pat and Linda's Street Rod Picnic.

Pat and Linda Newell, now of Cloudcroft, first hosted a gathering for street rodders back in 1976, in Las Cruces. Sixteen cars and about 50 people showed up at that event, intended to introduce New Mexicans to the sport of hot rodding. Pat Newell was the state's representative in the National

Street Rod Association (NSRA) at that time. The picnic offered games, hot dogs, fireworks and fun for all in attendance, plus a tour to a local museum.

A new activity was off and running after the first Pat and Linda's Picnic.

In 1977, the City of Las Cruces permitted the Newells to host the street rod gathering in Young Park, where it grew to 36 car entries. The following year, a total of 78 street rods from five states, including one from Georgia, were displayed at the picnic.

The street rod picnic in Las Cruces had become a popular an-

nual event, but in 1980 the Newells, who had been the main force behind its organization, moved to Texas. Pat served as South Texas state NSRA rep and later as NSRA South Central Division director.

But due to popular demand, the Newells returned to New Mexico last year and hosted an auto festival in Ruidoso, at School House Park, at the time of Aspen Festival.

"Of all the Pat and Linda's Picnics, this one was one of the greatest," the Newells said. "Participation was at an all-time high."

And they're back again this year. Approximately 80 street rods and more than twice as many rodders are expected to convene at School House Park Saturday, the 17th, for two days of games, competition and exhibition of their machines.

Registration will open at 9 a.m. Saturday at the park. Games will begin in the afternoon, with a can stack set for 1:30 and a children's coloring contest at 2.

Street rodders will take a 16-mile scenic tour of the area at 3 p.m., and then enjoy free time un-





QUAKING ASPEN
(*Populus tremuloides* Michx.)

Also called aspen, golden aspen, quaking asp, trembling popular. Botanical synonyms: *P. tremuloides* var. *aurea* (Tidestr.) Daniels, *P. aurea* Tidestr.

Description: Small to medium-sized tree usually less than 40 feet in height and 1 foot in trunk diameter, rarely 80 feet tall and 2½ feet in diameter, with slender, rounded crown of thin foliage. Leafstalks 1¼ to 3 inches long, slender and flattened. Leafblades

nearly round, 1¼ to 3 inches long, short-pointed, rounded at base, finely saw-toothed, shiny green above, dull green beneath, turning golden or orange in autumn before falling. Seed capsules in-catkins, with many cottony seeds. Bark smooth, thin, whitish or yellowish, on very large trunks becoming thick, furrowed and dark gray. Wood soft and brittle, lightweight, light brown with very thick whitish sapwood.

Distribution: Commonly and widely distributed in upper part of ponderosa pine forest, Douglas-fir

forest and spruce-fir forest in high mountains and plateaus, on cool, shaded mountain slopes, in canyons and along streams, often forming pure stands or groves, 6,500 to 10,000 feet elevation. New Mexico: western two-thirds, on all the higher mountains. Arizona: high mountains and plateaus in northeastern half, from Chiricahua Mountains west to Pima and Mohave Counties and Kaibab Plateau. Range very broad, one of the most extensive of all native North American trees, from Labrador across Canada to Alaska, in northeastern United States south to West Virginia and Missouri and south in Rocky Mountains and mountains of Pacific coast region to California, Arizona, southwestern Texas and northern Mexico.

Quaking aspen is so named

because the slender, flattened leaf-stalks enable the leaves to tremble in the slightest breeze. The soft smooth whitish bark, which is favored by persons carving initials on trees, makes identification easy. The form in western United States, characterized largely by the deeper, golden color of autumn foliage, is considered by some botanists as varietally distinct.

Aspens are pioneer trees on burned areas, forming thickets of short-lived trees afterwards replaced by conifers. Propagation is chiefly from root sprouts. The wood has been used in the Southwest in manufacture of excelsior and elsewhere also for pulpwood, boxes and crates, food containers and matches. Domestic livestock and deer browse the foliage within reach.



Where to see them

As trees make their annual trek into winter's solitude, vibrant reds and rich golden colors will make for some scenic hiking and viewing. Among the most beautiful is the aspen.

Aspens are the most available specie in North America, according to Mike Funston, timber management officer at the Smokey Bear ranger station in Ruidoso. They thrive at elevations of 8,500 feet and higher so they are most prominent in the Northeast.

However, they are present in the Southwest. Though mostly in the wilderness, some are available and accessible by car. The most scenic spot locally, according to Funston, is Windy Point Vista near Sierra Blanca Ski Resort.

To get to Windy Point, follow

Highway 37 North to Ski Run Road, take a left and drive about 10 miles.

Two other local viewing spots can be reached by unpaved roads. One is via Highway 37 and Ski Run Road to Monjeau Lookout, and another is a very rough road northeast of Capitan. Funston advises using a four-wheel drive vehicle to get there.

Those wanting to drive for an hour can find bountiful aspens in the Cloudfcraft area. Drive to Cloudfcraft, continue on Highway 245 about two miles and turn right on Sunspot Road.

For more detailed information, call the ranger stations at Ruidoso, 257-4095; and Cloudfcraft, 682-2551.

The first week in October marks the peak of the aspens' yellow color. Happy viewing!

facility we've got," said RBA president Tom Dorgan.

Last year's festival was split between two locations, which caused difficulties for the organizers and festival participants. This year everything will be under one roof.

Motorcyclists will also have the chance to ride in the Aspen Festival Parade this year. Last year the motorcyclists were here on a different weekend than the parade, and the festival organizers heard many requests for a parade the bikers could ride in.

"That was the only complaint we had last year; that they couldn't ride in the parade," said RBA member Connie Brown.

But this year, the predicted 5,000 to 7,000 motorcyclists will be able to join the rest of the floats, bands and beauty queens in the parade with the theme of the Mountain Mardi Gras.




best dressed, youngest and oldest riders and many more.


If you're good at games such as bite the wiener, hang the wash and sidecar water cup, you can win a prize in those games as well.





The conclusion of another successful Aspen Festival will be celebrated in style this year with a parade of motorcycles, floats, Shrine units, bands, queens and costumed individuals.



State Chili Cookoff returns

This year's New Mexico State Chili Cookoff will take place Saturday, September 24, in the Ruidoso Downs Race Track parking lot.

The cooks will begin setting up their wares after 8 a.m. and will meet at 10 a.m. to discuss the rules. Judging begins at 3 p.m.

All cooks must follow the rules put out by the Chili Appreciation Society International (CASI). CASI rules specify what can be used in the chili; where it is to be cooked; what can and cannot take place in the showmanship contest; and how the chili is to be judged.

CASI uses Frank X. Tolbert's Secret Judging System, which determines a precise format for judging as well as establishing criteria in the areas of aroma, color, taste, consistency, aftertaste and more. Violations of these rules can result in official probation published in the Goat Gap Gazette, and disqualification from the World Championship Cookoff in Terlingua, Texas, November 5. Dr. Roy Nakayama, horticulturalist at New Mexico State University and the "father of green chile," will head the judging.

Awards will be given to the top 10 chili cooks and the three best showmen. First, second and third prizes in both categories will be pottery loving cups made by Al Potter.



Fourth through 10th places in the cookoff will be awarded wooden plaques made by Paul Crown. Both awards feature the logo of the chile pepper inside the outline of New Mexico.

T-shirts bearing this logo will also be available.

For all the seriousness of the

chili judging, there will be plenty of laughter throughout the cooking area. Tex Scofield, "the official mouth of the chili world," will be on hand to emcee the event.

Glen Tucker of the San Antonio Light called Scofield "a king in an activity cluttered with clowns."

Rick Smith wrote in the Austin American Statesman that Scofield is "a garrulous orator of prodigious adroitness, a verbal virtuoso with no peer ... with a non-stop barrage of words that



would have left Mr. Webster himself thumbing through a pocket dictionary."

In addition to Scofield, there will be a host of chili cookers competing for the Showmanship Awards during the three hours they cook the chili. Although shooting guns and amplifying are illegal, cooks will try almost anything to win this award.

Many of the competitors decorate their booths with a Western theme. Some may have rattlesnake skins or rabbit carcasses to show as the "secret ingredient" in their prize-winning chili.

Others have been known to have women in transparent blouses help cook the chili. The judges for showmanship will be anonymous, so the cooks will have to keep up a non-stop show the whole time.

All cooking will be done outside in the open air and live music will be played during the day. Beer, soft drinks and sandwiches will be available.

The cooks are not allowed to sell their chili. But once the judges have taken their samples to the judging tables, it is customary for chili cooks to share their culinary concoctions with the hungry crowd.

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce is an organization of which the local community is very proud.




