Amelia Naiche passes on

Amelia Naiche, a Chiricahua Apache who was the daughter of Chief Naiche and the granddaughter of Chief Cochise, died Monday at Mescalero Public Health Service Hospital.

Although the local mortuary gave her date of birth as about February 21, 1896, her son Samuel Cooper said the actual birthdate is unknown. She was born at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, and traveled with her parents to the Mescalero Reservation in 1913.

Mrs. Naiche raised two sons and two daughters at White Tail Community on the reservation. Sons Samuel Cooper and Silas Cochise of Mescalero survive her, along with daughters Virginia Evans and Ollie Chino of Mescalero, and brother Barney Naiche.

Other survivors include 36 grandchildren, 58 great-grandchildren and three great-great-grandchildren.

Along with being very active in the White Tail Community, Samuel recalled her victory gardens from the World War II years. Mrs. Naiche was a very strong member of the Reformed Church. She also served as a policewoman during the annual summer ceremonial.

Samuel Cooper recalled that his mother took good care of the church building at White Tail.

On New Year's night, I remember it she went over there and rang that bell for about 15 minutes," he said. "It was in her blood that's how strongly she believed in that community."

Services will be this afternoon at 2 at Mescalero Reformed Church with the Reverend Robert Zapp of Andrews, Texas, officiating. Interment will follow at Mescalero Cemetery.

Referendum Nov. 8

The Ruidoso village council Tuesday passed Resolution 83-19, scheduling a special election on the question of increasing the size of the council for November 8.

Anyone wanting to vote in the election must register to vote before 5 p.m. Tuesday, September 27.

The question on the ballot will be, "Shall the number of Councilmen be increased from the present four council members to six council members in addition to the mayor?"

The council passed the resolution during a special meeting Monday to allow time for residents to register to vote, said village clerk Leon Eggleston. He explained that state statutes require residents to have registered at least 42 days before the election to be eligible to vote.

Only those who are registered to vote in Lincoln County and have lived in Ruidoso for at least 30 days before the election are eligible to vote in the election.

The election will be held in the multi-purpose room of the Ruidoso Public Library between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Ruth Wimberly will be the presiding judge of the election, with Mary Woodriddle judge. Emadair Jones, Edith R. Beale and Barbara Duff will be election clerks.

If Ruidoso voters do decide to increase the size of the council, all the present councilmen will have to resign and run for reelection in March. Don Dale and Benny Coulston will have to run in any case since their terms expire in March 1984. Frank Sayner and Al Junge will not have to run until March 1986 if the council remains the same size.

There is still some debate whether Mayor George White will have to run for reelection. White contends that he does not have to run for reelection.

Different attorneys have said both that he will and that he will not have to run, said Eggleston. Eggleston speculated that the question will have to be decided in court if Ruidoso residents do vote for an increased council.

Councilman Frank Sayner said the mayor was not affected in other towns which increased their council size. He said he read the state statute to mean that the mayor would have to run for office.

The special election was forced by a petition originated by Ruidoso resident Ralph Rush. Five percent of the 1,982 registered voters in Ruidoso (99) must sign the petition to force a special election. Of the 145 signatures gathered, 107 were found valid.

Giardia found-water to blame?

Laboratory tests have revealed two persons in Ruidoso and one person in Roswell who have contracted the disease giardiasis.

However, Jeff Sheyka, epidemiologist for the state Environmental Improvement Division (EID), said Tuesday he needs more positive tests before he will be convinced the Ruidoso water system is the source of the giardia parasite. "We need something a little more concrete," said Sheyka.

Giardia lamblia is a parasite that causes diarrhea, cramps, nausea and low-grade fever. It can be transmitted through water or food. Warm-blooded vertebrates carry the disease and spread it through their feces.

Besides the positive tests for giardia, approximately 12 other laboratory tests have produced no evidence of the parasite in Ruidoso.

The person in Roswell who has giardiasis did visit Ruidoso, but Sheyka said the symptoms appeared before the person came to town. Since the person works with farm animals, Sheyka speculated that the person could have caught the disease from them.

Sheyka said he will need more confirmed cases of giardiasis before requiring any changes in the village's water treatment system.

Sheyka did express some concern over the turbidity of water coming out of the water treatment plant in the Upper Canyon. According to an EID telephone poll, more Upper Canyon residents have contracted the disease than residents of other parts of town. The Upper Canyon treatment plant (plant number one) supplies water to Upper Canyon residents.

Local EID environmentalist Hari Mukhoty said there have been some

inconsistencies in turbidity reports from the Upper Canyon. Sheyka said he is recommending changes in turbidity reading procedures.

While turbidity is not necessarily linked to the existence of giardia in water, it can be related. According to Mukhoty, giardia cysts could possibly be running through the filter system as is the silt which causes the turbidity.

Sheyka did note that chlorine residual readings have been very satisfactory in village water. Chlorine, however, will not kill giardia except in concentrations higher than generally acceptable in drinking water.

Sheyka also said he is informing village personnel that they will have to notify residents when turbidity exceeds normal standards. He said the water from the Upper Canyon plant has exceeded standards during the last week.

Sheyka also said the village has purchased equipment that will shut down the Upper Canyon plant whenever the Rio Ruidoso becomes too turbid to adequately filter. Village

employees currently shut down the plant manually whenever heavy runoff makes the river muddy.

"We are going to monitor turbidity very closely," said Sheyka.

If the village cannot maintain low turbidity in the water, EID will make recommendations for changes in the treatment plant, said Mukhoty.

Although the occurrence of the disease has dropped off considerably, people are still reporting some cases, Sheyka said he learned from local doctors. In spite of the decreased occurrence, Sheyka said EID is still actively investigating the disease.

"I think we're going to nail it. I think it is probably a combination of things," said Sheyka.

He said he believes people who have suffered the disease probably have a virus, but that some may have giardiasis.

Mary Lou Moore, receptionist for doctors Arlene Brown and Paul Whitman, confirmed that Sheyka has been actively pursuing a solution to the question. She said he has been in contact with Dr. Brown's office almost daily.

Chamber adds 'Visitors Bureau' to name

In an attempt to better suit its function, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board of directors Wednesday changed the organization's name to Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and Visitors Bureau.

Board member Joan Bailey emphasized that the Chamber is not changing any of its functions, but merely bringing the name more in line with its primarily tourist-related activities.

The board decided to change the name after discussing last week's meeting at the Inn of the Mountain Gods concerning the sharing of funds for promotional activities. Board members and executive director Ed Jungbluth indicated a belief that many people do not understand the Chamber focuses most of its efforts on attracting more tourists to town.

They hoped the addition of "Visitors Bureau" would better reflect this focus.

Board member Tommie Morel said he believes the Chamber is a better vehicle for a cooperative promotional effort than a whole new organization to handle the additional money.

"It would be great and wonderful," if the Mescalero Apache Tribe, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs can work out a method to share promotional funds, said board member Ronnie Hemphill.

Morel also presented two proposals for advertising campaigns. Both proposals allocate approximately \$30,000 for winter advertising and \$20,000 for summer advertising. They both include advertising in Southwest Airlines and Texas Monthly magazines, plus newspapers in Albuquerque, Dallas, El Paso and Houston.

Chamber also includes more advertising in the two magazines and plan B emphasizes advertising in the newspapers.

Jungbluth said later that the two proposals will be submitted to the Lodgers' Tax Committee for consideration.

The plans may be altered depending upon results of Evelyn Paxton's trip to Mexico. The Chamber is considering a substantial advertising campaign in Mexico in conjunction with a local program to accept pesos.

Paxton left for Mexico Wednesday and will return to Ruidoso Sunday. She will bring back firsthand information about advertising rates, demographics and mechanics of ad placement, said Morel. Paxton, who has spent considerable time in Mexico, will also be talking to numerous tourism and business people about the peso program and advertising while she is in Mexico.

Chamber president James Paxton said he has learned that matching funds may be available from the state for advertising done in Mexico. Jungbluth said Mithoff Advertising figured that a very good saturation advertising campaign could be done in Mexico for approximately \$10,000.

In other business, the board: —Heard that the number of delinquent Chamber dues had dropped from approximately 205 businesses to 108 after Chamber staff member Carla Beasley made numerous calls. The board divided up the remaining names and agreed to contact the businesses about their past due accounts.

—Heard that the Village of Ruidoso is now giving the Chamber a list of new occupational licenses. The Chamber will be able to welcome all new businesses in town and contact them for possible Chamber membership by using the list, said Jungbluth.

Heard that the Chamber membership stands at 527 after adding five new members and dropping 26 during the past month. Members quit for a variety of reasons, including non-payment, selling of the businesses and dissatisfaction with the Chamber's operations.

Heard that the contract for the U.S. Open ski race has been returned to race organizer Paul Carson, who was agreeable to proposed changes. Morel expressed some concern that Carson has not yet lined up a major sponsor for the race.

Board member Morgan Clough said Carson should be required to provide a list of all racers that are under contract for the race, and the name of a major sponsor, before the Chamber pays the \$16,000 required upon signing of the contract.

—Heard that the high school will choose this year's Aspen Festival Queen and that no grand marshal had yet been selected for the Aspen Festival parade. Jungbluth reported shortly after the meeting that Pat Healy had agreed to be the grand marshal for this year's parade.

—Heard that several area bands will participate in the parade and that band booster Mary Myers is looking for help feeding the visiting band members.

—Heard that everything except beer sellers are lined up for the Chili Cookoff Saturday. Jungbluth said more cooks have preregistered this year and he is expecting close to 50 chili cooking teams.

"Everything's looking great," said Jungbluth.

—Decided to try Coffee Carts until December with the new emphasis of a chance for business people getting together rather than a chance to meet Chamber board members. If attendance remains low at the Coffee Carts, the board will consider ending

them in December.

Responded favorably to Bill Braudt's proposal that the Chamber sponsor "Messiah of the Mountains" early in December. Braudt said his church sponsored the event for three years before cancelling it last year.

"I can't believe how many people called and asked why we didn't do it last year," said Braudt.

"I think it's a chance we could make some money," said Hemphill. Braudt will bring a proposed budget to the next executive board meeting.

—Heard that the American Automobile Association Familiarization Tour for 38 travel counselors went very well and that Sun Country will probably sponsor it again next year.

—Heard that the Ruidoso Business Association needs volunteers from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. for their games at Bonito Lake next Friday.

Involvement sought

The local chapter of the Gifted and Talented Program met Tuesday evening, and decided the focus is steered toward increased community involvement for 1983-1984.

Katherine Finley, who has received national attention for her role in the gifted program, stressed the importance of the group to change as needs change.

"Programs need to change, as people change," she said.

Sue Dolgener, parent and former teacher, led the group into a discussion and presentation given by local teacher Mickey McGuire.

McGuire stressed the importance of community involvement and said, "I urge you to go out and contact at least one more person before the next meeting."

According to McGuire, changes in technology and the world in general are forcing educators to examine present teaching methods.

"We have turned a corner and educators have to catch up," he said. McGuire singled out areas that gifted and talented programs focus on. He said skills that need attention include: reasoning, problem-solving, recognizing inductive and deductive reasoning (including existing fallacies), defending conclusions rationally, comprehending and distinguishing fact from opinion, and forming interpersonal relationships.

"It's tough to be gifted and talented in a common world," he said. Often a child who is gifted has problems coping with the normal everyday things such as punctuality, according to McGuire.

"When you are thinking of really important things—getting somewhere on time may seem trivial," he said.

Dolgener expressed a concern that the program could elicit a response from people calling it elitist.

"We believe all children are gifted and talented," she said.

All of today's featured new teachers at White Mountain Middle School have experience with special education, and two work in it full time.

Cathy Palmer, sixth grade teacher, teaches language arts. Palmer has traveled extensively and hopes to draw from her experiences when she teaches writing and creative expression.

Born in Berkeley, California, she moved to Bangladesh when she was three. She lived in Kenya, East Africa, for about 10 years, with the exception of her sixth and ninth grades spent in the United States.

After receiving a bachelor's degree at Southwest Baptist University in Bolivar, Missouri, she taught 10th

grade in Cali, Colombia. She has worked in school systems since. She also earned a master's degree from Baylor University at Waco, Texas, and has completed a historical novel.

Palmer is concerned about the basics and also "wants to open children's minds to the world of reading."

Karen Seitz teaches gifted children. This is her first year in teaching and also in Ruidoso. She said she loves it here.

Seitz is from Los Alamos and graduated from Eastern New Mexico University at Portales. She said she is concerned that the gifted program turn a corner into "a new direction and include the involvement of the entire school."

Jim Hofstadt also works in special education but works with learning

disabilities.

He works with children with varying degrees of difficulties, with ranges of difficulties varying from moderate to severe.

"Some have combinations of problems, including behavioral and learning," he said.

This requires heavy one-to-one contact with each student, said Hofstadt.

Hofstadt has traveled the past eight years and has taught in Los Angeles, Kansas and New Mexico. He graduated from Eastern New Mexico University in Portales, where he has taught also.

Every summer he works as a camp director at a rafting camp in Colorado. The combination of life in Ruidoso and summer in Colorado give him what he loves.

"I love the mountains," he said.

Weems comments on principal's job

"We are on the move," is the way Don Weems describes Ruidoso schools.

Weems is the new principal at White Mountain Elementary. He spent the last six years at Nob Hill, after working as a teacher several years.

Responding to the needs of the nation's children is a number one priority according to Weems, and he seems confident that will happen.

"We're all in this together—we're going to require more of kids and more parents. We're going to ask them to read to them and help them with their homework," he said.

He said the entire system is challenged by the well-publicized government report entitled "A Nation at Risk" and wants to respond to it positively.

Weems pointed out the student population here is growing and this is a contradiction compared to other schools nationwide. The school will hire as needed, he added.

Ruidoso has a large transient population and this poses problems for the teachers, according to Weems

He added that the problems can be worked out, though they often require more flexibility on the part of the teacher.

Keeping classroom sizes to 25 is one of Weems' goals because he believes beyond that number, attention of each child is stretched to the limit.

Weems vacillates between calling himself a native Texan or New Mex-

ican. He actually grew up in Portales and attended Eastern New Mexico University there, but he has worked as a teacher in Texas.

At 2:30 every afternoon, Weems can be found out by the buses making sure all the children get on the bus.

"We have a student population of 429 and I think 428 ride the bus," he laughed.

Travel counselors enjoy stay in Ruidoso-Mescalero area

"Each trip you do it's like you're going with them," said travel counselor George Racine.

When you plan anywhere from 30 to 100 trips for American Automobile Association (AAA) members every day, you get to be a well traveled person in your mind.

But this week 38 AAA travel counselors from all over the country got the chance to do a little traveling themselves, and saw a few new places to send their customers.

The group spent a week touring the attractions of Sun Country Sun Country is a regional tourism organization with 12 member communities in New Mexico, West Texas and Old Mexico. The group visited Ruidoso and the Inn of the Mountain Gods Tuesday and Wednesday.

"They've shown us just enough to arouse our interest and make us want to come back," said Linda Steger of Hartford, Connecticut.

But it may be a while before they do come back. Most AAA travel counselors get to travel on one of these "familiarization tours" only once every year or two.

They spend a lot more time telling people where to go than going themselves. And they haven't been to most of the places. With people looking to them for the authoritative word on places to go and see, many of the counselors said they have learned how to be convincing about places they have never seen.

During dinner conversation names of different towns around the country were tossed about with familiarity.

"San Luis Obispo? A great place. The coast there is beautiful."

"Glacier Park? Go in late summer when the flowers are blooming."

It's only when you ask them directly that you find out they have never been there. But they know all about it from studying tour books, feedback from customers, and briefing from other counselors who have visited a place.

It's no wonder people think they are some of the best traveled people in the country. They are convincing. But that's their job. People traipse into their offices with money, time and a desire to travel.

Sometimes the customers know just where they want to go and other times they have no idea. Sometimes they want to go to the coast of Kentucky or travel across the country without crossing any mountains.

The counselors sit them down, pull out the maps and tour books, and plan a trip.

"We draw the green lines," said Tomie Bonnas, referring to AAA maps and tripticks with planned routes drawn on them with felt markers.

Bonnas said she has learned how to read anything upside down from showing people maps and books across her desk.

Part of the counseling involves fin-

ding out the customers' interests so they can help plan an enjoyable trip.

"It's a real fun job," said Racine. Meeting the people, talking to them and helping them plan the trips is what he said he enjoys. He said most people are excited about their trips and that makes the job more fun.

Racine said some people have even invited him to go along with them. That's when the job can be difficult. "It's frustrating," said Racine about planning so many trips and only rarely enjoying one himself.

But this week, they got their chance. While the whirlwind familiarization tour involves long hours and written reports for many, it is clearly a fringe benefit of the job. Mixed in with 5:30 a. m. mornings and seemingly endless bus rides are riverboat rides, trips to the tops of mountains and plenty of food and drink.

"It's a very good duty. I am glad to do it any time," said Linda Steger.

All the counselors said it also makes a big difference when they get back to the office.

"It really helps if you've seen it," said David This.

Many counselors said they think of a place more often after they have seen it. Bonnie Elworth said she has sent many people to Alabama and Kentucky, places she visited on other familiarization tours.

In spite of their skill at talking about places they have never been, they can give even better information about places they have visited. First-hand experience of road conditions is especially valuable, many said.

They can also send people to many of the smaller, out of the way places they would have never thought of if they had not seen them. For example, the group seemed to be especially impressed by the town of Lincoln.

The counselors' tours often include presentations by people who know about the area or the attraction. This gives them additional information they can pass on to their customers. "It really helps to talk to the experts," said David This.

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth acted as the expert for the counselors during their tour of Ruidoso.

After lunch at Cochera Restaurant, the group climbed onto an Inn of the Mountain Gods bus for the climb to Sierra Blanca Ski Resort. It may have been a cold and cloudy day in town,

but just below Windy Point, the bus popped out into clear blue skies to the oohs and aaahs of the group.

After Sierra Blanca, the group took a quick tour of Ruidoso, shopped in town briefly and returned to the Ruidoso Inn for a cocktail party attended by numerous local dignitaries. The group ate dinner at Carrizo Lodge and spent the night at the Ruidoso Inn.

The next morning they ate breakfast at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, a separate member of Sun Country, and headed west to Alamogordo and other Sun Country cities.

Bonnas said she pays attention to the restaurants and motels in a town when considering whether to recommend it to her customers.

"This town is set up for tourists," said Bonnas, commenting on the large number of motels and restaurants.

When asked if we would see more tourists from her home town of Buffalo, New York, she answered, "You will."

Ruidoso's lack of developed ski packages may cost it some business, however.

"We book a lot of ski packages," said Bonnas, who mentioned many Colorado and Utah areas with ski packages.

"I think people look for ski packages when they go skiing," said This.

Bonnas said most of her customers are travelers up and down the East Coast, but that there are growing numbers of people traveling to the Sunbelt and the Southwest.

David This said it is common for people from Southern California to make a loop tour of Arizona and New Mexico, and that he sends many people this way.

"It's given me a much better understanding of New Mexico," said Louise Fisher from Allentown, Pennsylvania. She said she thought New Mexico was primarily flat and that there were almost no cities outside of Albuquerque she might send people to.

After their own trip to New Mexico, the AAA travel counselors will be able to describe the state's attractions better and more convincingly. Hopefully, that will bring more tourists to Ruidoso.

"You can bet I will send people here," said Bonnie Elworth.

Ruidoso High School's varsity football team will be playing one of the traditional powerhouses in New Mexico when the Warriors host Portales at 7:30 Friday night.

The Warrior junior varsity will also be in action this weekend, hosting the Tularosa junior varsity at 2 p.m. Saturday.

Portales won the state AAA division championship two years ago, and advanced as far as the semi-finals last season. However, this year the Rams are 0-2 on the season—losing to Muleshoe, Texas, 33-14, and Alamogordo 27-0.

Still, Portales is a tough foe for the 1-2 Warriors. Alamogordo is ranked first in the state in the AAAA division.

"It should be a tough ball game," said Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt. "They like to run a double-wing offense with lots of reverses, counters, and they also pass a lot."

Ruidoso is coming off a heartbreaking 9-6 loss to Tularosa last Friday. The Warriors moved 9-0 ball well in the first half against the Wildcats, but only got beyond their own 20 once in the second half. The defense made several key stands inside the Warrior 10-yard line.

"The key for us will be to stop their passing game," Stierwalt said. "They'll probably try to work our secondary over. We've got to be ready for that."

Portales is probably one of the bigger teams in the AAA division. The Rams average over 190 pounds in the defensive line, and some of their reserves are even bigger.

A three-year starter returns at fullback and the offensive line is talented.

But the Warriors are almost completely healthy for the encounter.

Senior tackle-defensive end Kip McClellan, who dislocated his shoulder in a pre-season scrimmage, will probably play in the game. The 160-pounder started on offense last season and has good speed and quickness.

Linebacker Jesse Reynolds and defensive end Scott Ciraulo are nursing sore knees but will probably see some action. Only split end-defensive back Matt Porter is doubtful for the contest.

The Warriors will start basically the same lineup they had against Tularosa.

Senior Cyrus Simmons will go again at quarterback, but sophomore Russell Easter could also see some playing time.

Eric Strobel and Mike Williamson will share the halfback spot, while Patric Pearson will go at fullback.

Mike Smith and Justin Smith will probably share the wingback duties.

In the offensive line, sophomore Bobby Dickinson will start at tight end. Craig Carson and George Gresham will start at guard, and sophomore James Herrera will go at center.

Gary Burgess and John Antol will probably start at tackle, but McClellan might also get some playing time at that position.

Mike Smith and Justin Smith could share duties at split end as well as wingback.

Defensively, Eric Bell and Chris Woodul will probably go at tackle. Kevin Jameson and Ciraulo are slated to start at end.

Dickinson will be the starting middle linebacker. Wade Proctor and Justin Smith will start on the outside.

Kenny Espinosa and Mitch Mullican are the probably starters at cornerback. Easter and Williamson will go at safety.

In the junior varsity encounter, Warrior coach Jim Ramsey is optimistic his squad can do well against Tularosa.

"Some of our guys who played in both games (Tularosa and the 25-3 junior varsity loss to Artesia Saturday) felt Artesia hit harder," Ramsey said. "We played well against Artesia, as it was close until the last few minutes."

Last year the Warrior junior varsity lost a 28-0 decision to Tularosa, but this year's Ruidoso squad appears much improved. The Warriors have good size and more depth.

The Dallas Cowboys and Los Angeles Raiders are tied for first place in my second National Football League (NFL) rankings of the season.

Dallas was ranked first in my first poll last week, and took a convincing 28-13 victory over the New York Giants last Sunday. The defense and special teams played outstanding ball.

However, the Raiders stayed undefeated by taking an impressive 27-14 victory over defending American Conference (AFC) champion Miami in the Monday night game.

Los Angeles showed an outstanding defense and didn't allow any points until it let its reserves in. Any team that can shut out the Dolphins for over three quarters deserves to be rated first.

The defending Super Bowl champion Washington Redskins are ranked third off a 27-12 win over a defensively tough Kansas City squad.

Washington lost to Dallas in the first game of the season by one point. But the Redskins dominated play most of the way, with the Cowboys coming back via the long bomb. Washington is still a very solid team.

Atlanta is a very slim choice for fifth place. The Falcons are 2-1 on the season, and looked very good in beating Detroit 30-14. Atlanta has one of the most explosive offenses in the NFL and has an improved defense.

Seattle, San Francisco, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia all have looked good.

P&Z commission postpones action on sign applications

After being presented evidence showing unequal enforcement of the Ruidoso sign ordinance, the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Monday postponed action on three sign applications until it can completely review the ordinance.

Stansell Jones, representing his grandson T. L. Wilson, showed the commission pictures of 30 signs he claimed had been erected illegally since the sign ordinance was adopted in October. T. L. Wilson's sign application had been denied by the Architectural Plans Review Committee (APRC) because he built more signs with more square footage than are allowed under the village sign ordinance.

"What's good for the goose is good for the gander," said Jones, who accused the commission of unequal enforcement of the ordinance.

"You've got a sign menagerie," said Bob Mayfield, a Las Cruces attorney representing Gateway Shell on a sign permit appeal.

P&Z chairman Greg Masters noted that many of the oversize signs were legal because they were grandfathered in or because they were in a shopping center where larger signs are allowed. P&Z member Tom Kelham, however, noted that many of the illegal signs had been approved by APRC. Masters added, "There are a lot of sign violations."

"I think this thing has been kind of unequally enforced," said Terry Whitaker, who was appealing a sign

permit denial for Ruidoso Rent All. P&Z member James Paxton noted that consistency of enforcement was a problem, but said it is a difficult thing to begin.

"Nobody wants us to start the consistency with them," said Paxton.

"It seems pretty out of line with what the majority of the people want," said Whitaker, noting the recent number of sign permit denials and appeals. There were five sign permit appeals on Monday's agenda. Whitaker said government is supposed to do what the majority of people want.

Masters acknowledged that the current sign ordinance was a stopgap measure to keep sign construction from continuing completely uncontrolled. He said P&Z is in the process of analyzing the current sign ordinance so amendments can be made.

P&Z submitted a list of five amendments to the village attorney for consideration earlier in the year. Masters said the attorney has not given his opinion on the legality of the amendments.

P&Z formed a committee Monday to look into further amendments to the sign ordinance. Paxton, Kelham, Bill Carrigan and Martin Rose will serve on the committee.

Tom Kelham's motion that P&Z approve the T. L. Wilson signs because there are so many other signs that violate the ordinance died for lack of a second.

Rose then moved that the T. L. Wilson appeal be put in committee for a period not exceeding six months while P&Z reevaluates the whole sign

ordinance. The motion passed, and Wilson will be allowed to keep his signs up until P&Z takes up the matter again.

P&Z also passed "the Rose motion" for Gateway Shell and Ruidoso Rent All, delaying action on those signs until the ordinance is reviewed.

The commission did approve a sign permit for Sonya Smith of Nambé Showroom and Gallery in spite of APRC denial. The sign is only slightly over the 32 square foot limit, said Carrigan. Smith also said she had been told the sign, originally erected by Jim Carpenter and Associates Real Estate, was previously approved.

P&Z tabled a sign permit appeal from Carpenter when no one showed to present Carpenter's case.

The commission did approve a rezone from multi-family dwellings to trailers and mobile homes for Lawrence and Barbara Paschich of a lot in Ponderosa Heights, Unit 2.

The commission approved the rezone over the objection of nearby landowner Mike Hurd, who said he bought his home because the zoning did not allow any more mobile homes in the area.

"I don't want a trailer house in my neighborhood," said Hurd, who expressed concern about the decrease in his property value.

Kelham and Paxton said there are more mobile homes in the area than anything else, but Hurd disagreed.

E. J. Fouratt, representing the Paschichs, said many of the lots are too small to put multi-family or even single-family dwellings. He also noted that the Paschichs' lot at the corner of

Maple and Redwood drives previously had a mobile home. The commission approved the rezone 3-2 with Rose and Kelham voting against it. In other business, P&Z:

—Approved a replat of Lots 19, 20, 21 and the south half of 22 in Hamilton Terrace for Jon H. and Ina C. Acornb. The replat of land on which the Cro's Nest Motel and Apartments sits included driveway easements which

had been previously left off. —Changed the cutoff date for P&Z agenda applications from the Wednesday before the meeting to the Tuesday before the meeting.

Park director progress report

After six months on the job, village park and recreation director Pam Graves is feeling pretty good about her young department.

Graves became Ruidoso's first park and recreation director March 15 after her department was created by the village council.

"Good—so far so good," she responded when asked recently how things were going. She noted that the department is at "kind of a frustrating point," with a lot of projects developing but nothing set.

A major concern of Graves' has been to coordinate efforts of the village administration and Ruidoso Schools on a recreation complex near the White Mountain schools. The contract for lease of the land is in the hands of the school system's legal counsel, she said.

Graves added that she feels positive the agreement will be approved by both parties.

The director will be turning her efforts in the coming weeks to getting input from the public on what they want from their park and recreation

department. This will come in the form of a survey form that she will ask people to fill out and return.

Identification of interests is one area addressed in the survey. People are invited to indicate their interest in sports from archery to water ballet; in arts and crafts from ceramics to weaving; and in club activities from bird watching to scuba diving.

There are also categories for continuing education classes, scheduled trips, special events and music. Those completing the survey may express a preference for different facilities or projects they would like to see the department undertake.

A final category allows citizens to state types of funding they prefer. A 25 percent sales tax and dedication of land or money by developers are among the suggestions.

Graves said she will be taking the survey forms around to local businesses and asking that their employees complete them. She said she may also distribute some forms through the schools.

Her aim is to have as many forms completed as possible, "because

that's how we'll know what the people want."

Funding for capital outlay will be a continuing concern of her department in the future, Graves indicated. But she predicted the public will support it.

"I think the public has just been so supportive of this program," she said. Graves was encouraged by what she learned at park and recreation seminars she attended this summer.

"You just realize the country is going more and more toward recreation," she pointed out. Graves believes people's willingness to pay for recreation privately means they will approve spending public money in that area.

She pointed out there is a trend toward local funding from the public and private sectors and away from federal and state funding for parks and recreation. Asked if that will be the case here, Graves said Ruidoso already has been funding itself locally, and ought to get its fair share of federal and state funds.

The director noted she is glad village councilman Frank Sayner has been working to obtain outside fun-

ding. An application has been submitted for \$75,000 in state and federal monies, Graves noted, and she will travel to Santa Fe soon to make a presentation.

That money, if received, will help the village build several softball and soccer fields at the White Mountain complex. It is too late to plant grass

for the fields this fall, said Graves, but she has been talking to specialists about turf, irrigation and fencing.

Another area receiving attention from the department is Two Rivers Park. Graves hopes to upgrade the playground equipment and separate the play area so the rest of the park will receive more use.

A similar play area is being considered for School House Park. It would be located between the swimming pool and the tennis courts, Graves said. Two of the tennis courts are to be resurfaced in October, she noted.

Graves has also been working with the Ruidoso Gymnastics Academy (RGA) in trying to find a building for its programs. A village-owned building near the intersection of Sudderth and Mechem drives may be used for that purpose if it is not sold, and could also house an office for the park and recreation department.

In the meantime, Graves continues to work out of her office at the municipal swimming pool. She and her newly designated full-time employee, Rafael Salas, have been eagerly awaiting delivery of a new tractor for the department.

"I'm just thrilled beyond measure to get a tractor," said Graves, whose enthusiasm will no doubt contribute to a continued emphasis on parks and recreation in Ruidoso.

The Silver Lining

Benino Carahajal Sanchez
"Our Beloved Ben."

The Spanish people have a delightful way of taking the virtues and the traits of character and giving them for first names to their children:

Caridad, Charity; Merced, Mercy; Consolation, Consolation; Perfecto, Perfect; Modesto, Modest; and so on. Last Saturday, the mortal remains were laid to rest of a very widely-

beloved man who lived up to his name, Benino (Benign), known to us all affectionately as Ben.

Looking through our father's Spanish-English Dictionary and his Oxford Universal English Dictionary, some of the meanings of the word "Benign" come to light:

"Of a kind disposition, gracious, merciful, gentle, disposed toward kindly and generous deeds, forgiving."

There is a word I remember from my boyhood in Mexico that says a lot. And I have never found a word in English that exactly fits the meaning

of this word, "Simpatico." About the nicest thing a Mexican can say about you is that you are "Muy Simpatico." Our modern phrase aims at the same thing — "A nice guy."

In countless ways, large and small, during his long life here among us, Ben was always Una Persona Muy Simpatico, and the classic type of the Nice Guy.

The services at Saint Jude Church in San Patricio were under the direction of Father Bernard Bissonette, assisted by Ben's son-in-law, Deacon Richard DeBlasie.

Many at the large gathering remarked that they had never heard a eulogy so befitting and so full of appreciation.

Referring to Ben as "Our Beloved Ben" Deacon DeBlasie touched upon Ben's many talents which he used unsparingly in his work as a Christian. Pointing out that Ben was an artist in the making and laying of adobes, Deacon DeBlasie said,



The band practices every weekday during school. It also holds practices Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights.

Flores has been director of the 24-Karat Gold Band for six years, as long as he's been at the school.

"When I graduated from ENMU (Eastern New Mexico University) there weren't any jobs available at most places," he said. "When this job came up, I jumped at the chance and took it."

The band director also helps out with the White Mountain Middle School band and teaches high school choir.

"I like working with the kids," Flores said. "They have a lot of ups and downs, and sometimes you have to help them with their problems."

Next April Flores and the band will take a trip to Hawaii.



New racing year at Sunland Park features 37 stakes races

A total of 37 stakes, including two in the \$300,000 range and a handful of others in the \$100,000-and-up category, are on the 1983-84 Sunland Park stakes schedule.

"We're especially pleased with our major spring races, which offer huge purses for the best thoroughbreds and quarter horses in the Southwest," commented general manager Donald F. Smith.

The new season, which kicks off on Saturday, October 15, covers 90 race

days. The meeting extends through May 13. Once again, the basic pattern is Friday-through-Sunday racing. There's one Monday card — February 20, which is Washington's Birthday.

February 20 is also Fan Appreciation Day, which means free general admission.

The two richest jewels on the Sunland stakes list are the five-furlong Riley Allison Futurity and the 350-yard Sun Country Futurity. The

purse for each is projected at \$300,000.

Other big-money events include the \$250,000 (estimated) West Texas Futurity at 330 yards, the \$100,000 (estimated) Sunland Park Fall Thoroughbred Futurity at six furlongs, the \$100,000 (estimated) Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity, the \$200,000 (estimated) All-American Sale Futurity at 400 yards, the \$50,000 (estimated) Riley Allison Derby at a mile and the \$25,000 (estimated) Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Derby at 440 yards.

There are two major additions to the stakes calendar, and both come up in the fall: the \$15,000-added Thoroughbred Sale Futurity at six furlongs and the \$25,000-added Texas Open Futurity, also at six furlongs.

Sunland Park's overnight handicaps have received dramatic purse boosts. For example, the Sunland Park Handicap at one and one fourth miles is now \$20,000-added. The Herald-Post Handicap at six and one half furlongs and The El Paso Times Handicap at one and one eighth miles each pack added money of \$15,000.

Compared to last year, the Sunland Park Handicap shows a gain in added money of \$12,500 and The Herald-Post and Times Handicaps each reflect a gain of \$10,000.

Other typical increases are

reflected in the Winsham Lad Handicap at one and one sixteenth miles, which goes from \$5,500-added to \$12,500-added; the Savannah Swinger Series Number 3 at 440 yards, up from \$6,000-added to \$12,500-added; the Texas Derby at one mile, which was raised from \$5,000-added to \$12,500-added; the six-furlong City of El Paso Handicap, which was \$5,000-added last time around and now becomes \$12,500-added.

More of the time last Friday was spent talking about the pros and cons of the Chamber of Commerce than about the idea of sharing promotional funds.

At different times many people said they were in favor of sharing funds, but the group could never come to a consensus. At such early stages of discussion a smaller group would have worked much better.

Wendell Chino's absence was also a hindrance to fruitful discussion about cooperative promotional efforts.

By the end of the meeting nothing had been done, and many left disgusted with the whole thing.

If the Ruidoso area hopes to achieve any sort of major resort status, it will have to better promote itself.

The idea of combining funds to advertise the whole area is an excellent one. The Tribe, the Downs, Ruidoso and the ski areas all benefit from the same tourists.

A united effort to attract those tourists could be more effective than several different efforts.

Let's hope the frustration of last week's meeting does not kill this excellent idea before it gets a chance to work.—BA

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE — With politicians, you sometimes have to read between the lines.

In this case, there are a lot of lines. The Attorney General wrote a ten-page, single-spaced report to the Governor to tell him there was no truth to some allegations his people had made.

The charge was that, in seven cases, contractors on that big job of remodeling and reconstructing the penitentiary outside Santa Fe might have been improperly paid.

The AG's investigation showed that wasn't true. The state didn't get gyped, and the payments as made had been earned. So much for that.

What's interesting about this is the cast of characters.

The person who raised the issue was Don Montoya, a Santa Fe attorney, whom Toney Anaya named to "clean up things" in the Property Control Division.

Montoya replaced Alice Hester of the King administration at Property Control. She's an attorney too — as is Toney Anaya for that matter.

So is the Bruce King Cabinet Secretary to whom Hester reported, Kay Marr, who has just been admitted to the bar.

And what's interesting is that Hester and Marr, whom some thought Montoya was out to get, are both on the staff of Attorney General Paul Bardacke, who was asked to investigate the matter.

(If the Anaya people weren't after them they could have been gunning for David Harris, who had the Property Control job before Hester. He, it is a pleasure to say, is the only one without a law degree in this whole scenario.)

You can bet the AG's investigators took lots of time and trouble over this one. They didn't want the word "whitewash" mentioned anywhere in connection with what they did here. So if they said there was no substance to any of the charges, you can safely take their word for it.

But you can also bet that those against whom the charges seem to

have been directed are not happy, and that they will remember the affair.

We could indeed be moving toward a battle of the attorneys in state government.

Most top-rankers in the Anaya administration are lawyers, as you know. But that doesn't necessarily mean the Attorney General respects their legal ability.

Since he's aware that legal foul-ups in Santa Fe could become his babies, he's watching things carefully.

Kay Marr, we are told, heads a group inside Bardacke's shop that brings together all assistant AGs who work for agencies handling great amounts of money.

Money is a topic she knows something about after her years in Finance and Administration, where state bills get paid.

Reportedly she is not popular with Anaya or Denise Fort, who replaced her when the King administration's franchise ran out.

She is tough, however — and you can be sure she has the full backing of her boss, who got elected on his own and owes Anaya no favors.

Bardacke won't hesitate to step in if he feels Anaya's people are screwing up. He did it already in the case of that Sangre de Cristo mental health organization, when Bob McNeil and Tom Udall, both attorneys, needed their chestnuts removed from the fire.

This one could be a continuing story.

A note to the Bob McNeil mentioned above, head man at Health and Environment:

You'd better tell you public relations folks to slack off.

During the first two days of last week, we got nine separate press releases from your department.

Some might consider that a little excessive in the first place, but here's the real problem. Six of them made you sound like a big hero, while only one mentioned Toney Anaya.

Not smart, Bob. Not smart at all.

On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer



Hey, I was country when country wasn't cool.

My editorial on country music and drinking (September 12 issue) provoked more comment than anything I've written in some time. (Note "Letters to the editor" this page.)

That's good. It is sort of an ongoing aggravation in this business that we often don't get much feedback on things we write.

Opinion on that particular editorial has been pretty much split between those who liked it and those who disagreed with it.

Persons in the latter category told me in no uncertain terms what they thought. Within a few hours of the paper coming off the press that day, a woman was on the phone telling me the editorial was ridiculous.

Then a fellow called to say he was a fan of country music and a musician himself. This fellow did not like the editorial one bit. He felt strongly enough to call our business manager, too (the publisher was out of town).

This gentleman seemed to think it was hypocritical of the newspaper to carry advertisements for liquor and honky-tonks on some pages while editorializing about drinking on another page.

"So you don't like country music?" a guy I know asked me the day after the editorial ran. And that's the thing I want to clear up.

I love country music. When I discovered the joys of listening to music on the radio—at the tender age of ten or thereabouts—the first song I remember really liking was "Please Help Me, I'm Falling" by Hank Locklin.

In those days, maybe there was less separation of musical types. A good Country and Western song (as it was called then) would be heard even by someone who was an inveterate listener of the local rock 'n roll station (KREO in Albuquerque).

Or maybe it was the same then as now, only the term "cross-over" hadn't been coined yet. Anyway, it is easy to recall songs like "Mr. Tambourine Man" by Denny Laine, "End of the World," by Burt Ives, "Big Bad John" by Jimmy Dean, and "The Tips of My Fingers," by Eddy Arnold.

Later on, probably influenced by working five straight years at the State Fair as a hay hauler, I started listening to the country station—KREO in Albuquerque—more and more.

I used to fantasize about producing a TV special featuring the songs and artists that were hot during a particularly good week in late 1971. Sort of a "then and now" type of thing.

The only songs I now can recall from that week are "Who Am I?" by Charley Pride and "Carolina Moonshiner" by Porter Wagoner, but there were several others.

I guess a test of how far your country music roots go back is whether you remember when Dolly Parton

was Porter Wagoner's singing partner.

Later on, many of the country songs of the mid-70s grew to be part of the soundtrack of the life Cathy and I have had together. "I Couldn't Be Without You" by Johnny Rodriguez sort of said it all for us back then, and still does.

It took a while to turn Cathy into a Tanya Tucker fan, but she finally came around to agreeing that "Blood Red and Goin' Down" is an all-time classic.

"It Was Almost Like a Song" by Ronnie Millsap followed us on our six-state honeymoon trip. Hey, I'm talking sad. But I believe there is a place for sad songs, and I have the greatest admiration for an artist who can evoke that all too prevalent human emotion in his music.

And I believe the popular pastime of drinking is a valid subject for country music, just as it is for plays and movies. My beef is with songs that encourage people to go overboard with it, as I wrote.

I was driving out to Capitan the day my editorial came out when my favorite recent country song came on the radio. That's "Close Enough to Perfect," by Alabama.

My editorial, by the way, was not meant to be a criticism of KREE. I think the radio station has improved considerably in the past year or so.

One of the persons who called to protest the editorial had asked me, "Why even print something like this?" He meant why print something ridiculous, but his question got me thinking as I drove, "What good does it do?"

All you have to do is look around you to start drawing parallels between late 20th century America and the Roman Empire. Have you seen those commercials on Albuquerque TV for the "tough man" contest?

And, yes, I know, rock music embraces drugs, profanity, anarchy, etc. But I wasn't writing about rock music.

What good does it do to write about anything you think is wrong? I don't know, but you have to try.

It's an interesting aspect of my job that twice a week I have a chance to state my opinion on something in an editorial. Sometimes I look on it as an opportunity, other times it's a chore.

But as long as I'm doing it, I'll keep in mind the words of the fellow they used to call "The Nashville Rebel," when he tells how he "Beat the Devil."

You can still hear me singing to the people who don't listen to the things that I am saying praying someone's gonna hear.

And I guess I'll die explaining how the things that they complain about are things they could be changing. Keeping someone's gonna hear.

If I never have a nickle, I won't die ashamed, because I do believe that someone wants to know.





By the end of the meeting nothing had been done, and many left disgusted with the whole thing.

If the Ruidoso area hopes to achieve any sort of major resort status, it will have to better promote itself.

The idea of combining funds to advertise the whole area is an excellent one. The Tribe, the Downs, Ruidoso and the ski areas all benefit from the same tourists.

A united effort to attract those tourists could be more effective than several different efforts.

Let's hope the frustration of last week's meeting does not kill this excellent idea before it gets a chance to work.—BA

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE — With politicians, you sometimes have to read between the lines.

In this case, there are a lot of lines. The Attorney General wrote a ten-page, single-spaced report to the Governor to tell him there was no truth to some allegations his people had made.

The charge was that, in seven cases, contractors on that big job of remodeling and reconstructing the penitentiary outside Santa Fe might have been improperly paid.

The AG's investigation showed that wasn't true. The state didn't get yeped, and the payments as made had been earned. So much for that.

What's interesting about this one is the cast of characters.

The person who raised the issue was Don Montoya, a Santa Fe attorney, whom Toney Anaya named to "clean up things" in the Property Control Division.

Montoya replaced Alice Hester of the King administration at Property Control. She's an attorney too — as is Toney Anaya for that matter.

So is the Bruce King Cabinet Secretary to whom Hester reported, Kay Marr, who has just been admitted to the bar.

And what's interesting is that Hester and Marr, whom some thought Montoya was out to get, are both on the staff of Attorney General Paul Bardacke, who was asked to investigate the matter.

(If the Anaya people weren't after them they could have been gunning for David Harris, who had the Property Control job before Hester. He, it is a pleasure to say, is the only one without a law degree in this whole scenario.)

You can bet the AG's investigators took lots of time and trouble over this one. They didn't want the word "whitewash" mentioned anywhere in connection with what they did here. So if they said there was no substance to any of the charges, you can safely take their word for it.

But you can also bet that those against whom the charges seem to

have been directed are not happy, and that they will remember the affair.

We could indeed be moving toward a battle of the attorneys in state government.

Most top-rankers in the Anaya administration are lawyers, as you know. But, that doesn't necessarily mean the Attorney General respects their legal ability.

Since he's aware that legal foul-ups in Santa Fe could become his babies, he's watching things carefully.

Kay Marr, we are told, heads a group inside Bardacke's shop that brings together all assistant AGs who work for agencies handling great amounts of money.

Money is a topic she knows something about after her years in Finance and Administration, where state bills get paid.

Reportedly she is not popular with Anaya or Denise Fort, who replaced her when the King administration's franchise ran out.

She is tough, however — and you can be sure she has the full backing of her boss, who got elected on his own and owes Anaya no favors.

Bardacke won't hesitate to step in if he feels Anaya's people are screwing up. He did it already in the case of that Sangre de Cristo mental health organization, when Bob McNeill and Tom Udall, both attorneys, needed their chestnuts removed from the fire.

This one could be a continuing story.

...

A note to the Bob McNeill mentioned above, head man at Health and Environment.

You'd better tell you public relations folks to slack off.

During the first two days of last week, we got nine separate press releases from your department.

Some might consider that a little excessive in the first place, but here's the real problem. Six of them made you sound like a big hero, while only one mentioned Toney Anaya.

Not smart, Bob. Not smart at all.

On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer



Hey, I was country when country wasn't cool.

My editorial on country music and drinking (September 12 issue) provoked more comment than anything I've written in some time. (Note "Letters to the editor" this page.)

That's good. It is sort of an ongoing aggravation in this business that we often don't get much feedback on things we write.

Opinion on that particular editorial has been pretty much split between those who liked it and those who disagreed with it.

Persons in the latter category told me in no uncertain terms what they thought. Within a few hours of the paper coming off the press that day, a woman was on the phone telling me the editorial was ridiculous.

Then a fellow called to say he was a fan of country music and a musician himself. This fellow did not like the editorial one bit. He felt strongly enough to call our business manager, too (the publisher was out of town).

This gentleman seemed to think it was hypocritical of the newspaper to carry advertisements for liquor and honky-tonks on some pages while editorializing about drinking on another page.

"So you don't like country music?" a guy I know asked me the day after the editorial ran. And that's the thing I want to clear up.

I love country music. When I discovered the joys of listening to music on the radio—at the tender age of ten or thereabouts—the first song I remember really liking was "Please Help Me, I'm Falling" by Hank Locklin.

In those days, maybe there was less separation of musical types. A good Country and Western song (as it was called then) would be heard even by someone who was an inveterate listener of the local rock 'n' roll station (KQEO in Albuquerque).

Or maybe it was the same then as now, only the term "cross-over" hadn't been coined yet. Anyway, it is easy to recall songs like "Mr. In-between," by Burl Ives, "End of the World," by Skeeter Davis, "Big Bad John" by Jimmy Dean, and "The Tips of My Fingers," by Eddy Arnold.

Later on, probably influenced by working five straight years at the State Fair as a hay hauler, I started listening to the country station—KREZ in Albuquerque—more and more.

I used to fantasize about producing a TV special featuring the songs and artists that were "not during a particularly good week in late 1971. Sort of a "then and now" type of thing.

The only songs I now can recall from that week are "Who Am I?" by Charley Pride and "Carolina Moonshiner" by Porter Wagoner, but there were several others.

I guess a test of how far your country music roots go back is whether you remember when Dolly Parton

was Porter Wagoner's singing partner.

Later on, many of the country songs of the mid-70s grew to be part of the soundtrack of the life Cathy and I have had together. "I Couldn't Be Me Without You" by Johnny Rodriguez sort of said it all for us back then, and still does.

It took a while to turn Cathy into a Tanya Tucker fan, but she finally came around to agreeing that "Blood Red and Goin' Down" is an all-time classic.

"It Was Almost Like a Song" by Ronnie Millsap followed us on our six-state honeymoon trip. Hey, I'm talking sad. But I believe there is a place for sad songs, and I have the greatest admiration for an artist who can evoke that all too prevalent human emotion in his music.

And I believe the popular pastime of drinking is a valid subject for country music, just as it is for plays and movies. My beef is with songs that encourage people to go overboard with it, as I wrote.

I was driving out to Capitan the day my editorial came out when my favorite recent country song came on the radio. That's "Close Enough to Perfect," by Alabama.

My editorial, by the way, was not meant to be a criticism of KREE. I think the radio station has improved considerably in the past year or so.

One of the persons who called to protest the editorial had asked me, "Why even print something like this?" He meant why print something ridiculous, but his question got me thinking as I drove, "What good does it do?"

All you have to do is look around you to start drawing parallels between late 20th century America and the Roman Empire. Have you seen those commercials on Albuquerque TV for the "tough man" contest?

And, yes, I know, rock music embraces drugs, profanity, anarchy, etc. But I wasn't writing about rock music.

What good does it do to write about anything you think is wrong? I don't know, but you have to try.

It's an interesting aspect of my job that twice a week I have a chance to state my opinion on something in an editorial. Sometimes I look on it as an opportunity, other times it's a chore.

But as long as I'm doing it, I'll keep in mind the words of the fellow they used to call "The Nashville Rebel," when he tells how he "Beat the Devil."

You can still hear me singing to the people who don't listen to the things that I am saying praying someone's gonna hear.

And I guess I'll die explaining how the things that they complain about are things that they could be changing, hoping someone's gonna hear.

If I never have a nickle, I won't die ashamed, because I do believe that someone wants to know.


Warrior play of the week



Mule races kick things off

The roar of the crowd and the thunder of racing hooves at Ruidoso Downs Race Track will be heard again September 16-18. Mules with their speed clocked just two seconds less than a quarter horse are putting horse racing fans on their feet.

"Mule racing is the fastest growing sport in the country," says Briscoe West, a director of the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners. "Farmers and ranchers aren't the only ones interested in racing mules. Many business executives and professional people are getting involved in mules."

The long-eared sprinters are a breed apart from their ancestors—the beasts of burden on farms and ranches who pulled the wagon and plowed the fields. Today's racing mule is the offspring of a male donkey (jack) and a mare horse; or a stallion horse and a female donkey (jenny). Strong racing genes produce mules that have been known to beat a horse. The mules have stepped up in class with their own trainers, jockeys and racing circuit starting at Bishop, California; then on to Victoria, California; up to Idaho; down to Farmington, Albuquerque and Ruidoso; over to Del Rio, Texas;

and west to Glove and Phoenix, Arizona.


The going price for a good racing mule is between \$6,000 and \$10,000. This may seem like a big investment for a sterile animal, but a mule can run two races a day and race 12 or even 14 years. With a quarter horse priced

\$30,000 to \$100,000 or even more, racing enthusiasts are showing great interest in mules.

Melvin Means, president of the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners, which was organized in 1979 to promote mule races, is a manufacturers' representative. He travels five states and uses

every opportunity to promote the races at the "Downs". Means' avid interest in mules has left his fishing pole and hunting gear in the closet, but he must be doing something right. From a purse of \$3,000 for a three day meet in 1979



to a \$55,000 purse in 1983, the mules are coming to Ruidoso. Three hundred and fifty mules arrived for the meet last fall.

"With commercial sponsors getting interested, the only way for purses to go is up," claims Means.

"The richest and best mule races in the country are not

chutes, starters and stewards apply for mule racing as for horse racing, but the mules spice up their 14-race program with races without fun," add the Mule Skinners. The same rules, equipment,

referred to as Coon Jump, Diaper Race, Pole Bending and a favorite with the fans, the Bloomer Race. Riders climb into bloomers, race down the track and give the bloomers to another rider who has to put them on and ride back to the starting line.

The Balloon Bust race is run past a course of poles holding balloons that the riders must pop as they ride by. Along with the laughs, purses are awarded in these races.

Everyone knows what to expect at a horse race, but a mule race is unpredictable.

"Mules are harder to race. They are not used to running in a straight line as they're more used to dodging and hiding from their enemies. Horses just escape from their enemies by sheer speed," says Means. The stubborn-as-a-mule strain has not been erased with the new scientific breeding, or is a mule just smarter than a jockey?

If a mule gets tired, it will stop on the spot and no amount of urging on the part of the jockey can convince the tired mule to cross the finish line. A mule might be 17 lengths in front and see green grass on the other side of the rail, or at the entrance to the paddock, and just like that, the race is over

for that mule. Except for an unfortunate accident a horse makes it around the track, but a mule might decide the long way around the track is too long, jump the rail and take a shortcut, and triumphantly cross the finish line.

Mule racing has moved full speed ahead with fans coming to Ruidoso from 35 states, boosting attendance to 12,000 for the three

day meet in 1982. Attendance and purses have gone far beyond the first Mule-O-Rama held in a meadow in 1976, just for fun. After an all-day program of races, everyone gathered for a chuckwagon cookout with 1,400 pounds of beef, hundreds of sourdough biscuits, and a barrel full of beans. A fiddlers' contest and dance topped off Ruidoso's in-

roduction to mule racing.

Now the Mule Skinners look for a whole new industry when pari-mutuel betting is approved. The current system of betting is to make whatever deal you can with your friends or the person sitting in the next row. New Mexico's attorney general has ruled that an

act of the Legislature is required to allow pari-mutuel betting on the mule races. The Mule Skinners, with the support of the American Mule Association, are readying their request.

The races are a community effort in Ruidoso and everyone benefits. The high school football team handles the cleanup, another high school group, getting an introduction to business through DECA, works the concession stands; the Shriners sell the program. The Lions Club and Boy Scouts lend a hand and all organizations profit from their respective efforts. Visitors' food and lodging totaling half a million dollars boost the tourist industry.

The fiddlers' tunes, the

camaraderie of a chuckwagon dinner, the dosey-do's of whirling dancers at the first mule race in Ruidoso may be just a memory, but the mules will be on the track this fall, and enthusiastic Mule Skinners look to the future and an "All-American Mule Futurity" with a sizeable purse as the feature attraction.

Arabian Show for noble breed

More than 100 head of the horse many believe to be the most beautiful in the world will be here for the fourth annual Ruidoso All Arabian Horse Show September 16-18.

The "A" rated show, sponsored by the Ruidoso Arabian Horse Association, will take place at Western Highlands—the Ruidoso Downs Race Track training track east of the main racetrack. Many categories of competition are scheduled.

Friday the 18th will be taken up mostly with halter classes, noted association president Gail Adams. He described this competition as "stand 'em up and let 'em look pretty." Horses are judged according to how closely they meet conformation standards.

Riding classes are the feature attraction Saturday, September 19. One interesting event is the Trail Course. This requires horse and rider to negotiate a trail with obstacles similar to what they would encounter in the wild.

The horse must be able to sidestep and back in a straight line from an obstacle, and must contend with a "distracting obstacle," such as a pen full of squealing geese.

"That really tests how well the

horse is trained," said Adams.

A favorite event of spectators, the Native Costume class, is also scheduled. Adams noted, however, that there must be sufficient entries and suitable weather for this competition to take place.

Along with all that, there is a class for youngsters who bring their dogs. Adams called the Show Dog class "just a little add-on fun thing for kids."

Among the states expected to be represented at the All Arabian Show are New Mexico, California, Arizona, Texas, Oklahoma and Wyoming. Adams noted that the Ruidoso event follows a major show in Albuquerque, which helps bring many fine horses to the local show.

The fact that the Ruidoso show is "A" rated means points can be earned toward qualifying for the national Arabian show. The International Arabian Horse Association sanctions the competition.

Adams predicted about 20 horses from the Lincoln and Otero counties area will participate. The sponsoring Ruidoso Arabian Horse Association has about 20 members, he noted.

The group came to be after Ronda Moore of High Country Arabians moved to this area. She was



followed by the Adams', Gail and Christa. Gail credits Ronda with getting the show going, noting that he laughed when she first told him Ruidoso would have an "A" rated show.

"This whole thing is principally because of her dedication and hard work," he said.

Adams was asked what it is about the Arabian horse that at-

tracts the interest of owners and horse aficionados.

"Intelligence," he replied. "They seem to learn faster than many horse breeds." He also noted versatility, along with the fact that the Arabian is the oldest recorded breed.

Adams also pointed out that the

Arabian is known for endurance. "People don't think of Arabians as race horses, but they're really the world's greatest race horses," he said. Arabians were bred to run mile after mile on the desert, he explained, and the breed consistently wins the famous endurance test, the 100-mile Teavis Cup.


Racing Arabians on racetracks

is a growing pastime, especially in California and Florida, Adams noted.

"Probably the biggest attraction is just their inherent beauty," said Adams of the elite breed. "There's probably no horse that's as aesthetically beautiful as the Arabian."

Spectators are welcome at all the Ruidoso Arabian events Friday, Saturday and Sunday, September 16-18. There is no admission charge.



Johnny Williams golf event

The sixth annual Johnny Williams Memorial Partnership Golf Tournament will be played Friday through Sunday, September 30-October 2, at Cree Meadows Country Club.

The tournament is named in honor of the late Johnny Williams, who owned the country club in the mid 1950s. Along with several other people, Williams worked to expand and improve the country club and golf course. He sold the country club to Stormy Edwards in 1958.

Some of the best amateur golfers in the Southwest annually compete in the tournament.

"This is the second biggest tournament on our schedule (after the Cree Meadows Match-Play Tournament)," said Cree Meadows head golf pro Bob Hickson. "No question about it."

There will be competition in five flights, with 10 teams in each flight. A total of 100 golfers will compete in the tournament.

Larry Seligmann and Mo

Turner of Texas won the 1982 championship flight, shooting a 192. Steve Earsley and Charlie Snuggs were second with a 199, while Billy Carson and Mickey Wilson were third at 202. Local golfers Howard Hassell and Doug Bass finished fourth at 206.

Another local team—Tommy Hornbuckle and Ted Martinez—captured the 1981 championship flight, and were fifth in 1982 with a 210 score.

Hornbuckle and Martinez are two of the best amateur golfers in Lincoln County. Both generally finish among the leaders in local

tournaments.

The country club was started in the late 1940s with just nine golf holes. The golf course was expanded to 18 holes in 1976-77 and is one of the most popular courses in New Mexico.

Par for the course is 71. The course plays at about 6,000 yards and offers a beautiful view of Sierra Blanca, the tallest peak in the area.

There is a \$225 entry fee per team. The entry fee will give the golfers use of a cart, favors, dinner and dance, ladies' luncheon, prizes and a practice round.





Pat and Linda's Street Rod

Before all the motorcycles hit town this fall, a different kind of machine will be revving its engine around the streets of Ruidoso. About 80 street rods are expected to be in town September 17 and 18 for what has now become an annual Aspen Festival event, Pat and Linda's Street Rod Picnic.

Pat and Linda Newell, now of Cloudcroft, first hosted a gathering for street rodders back in 1976, in Las Cruces. Sixteen cars and about 50 people showed up at that event, intended to introduce New Mexicans to the sport of hot rodding. Pat Newell was the state's representative in the National

Street Rod Association (NSRA) at that time. The picnic offered games, hot dogs, fireworks and fun for all in attendance, plus a tour to a local museum.

A new activity was off and running after the first Pat and Linda's Picnic.

In 1977, the City of Las Cruces permitted the Newells to host the street rod gathering in Young Park, where it grew to 36 car entries. The following year, a total of 78 street rods from five states, including one from Georgia, were displayed at the picnic.

The street rod picnic in Las Cruces had become a popular an-

nual event, but in 1980 the Newells, who had been the main force behind its organization, moved to Texas. Pat served as South Texas state NSRA rep and later as NSRA South Central Division director.

But due to popular demand, the Newells returned to New Mexico last year and hosted an auto festival in Ruidoso, at School House Park, at the time of Aspen Festival.

"Of all the Pat and Linda's Picnics, this one was one of the greatest," the Newells said. "Participation was at an all-time high."

And they're back again this year. Approximately 80 street rods and more than twice as many rodders are expected to convene at School House Park Saturday, the 17th, for two days of games, competition and exhibition of their machines.

Registration will open at 9 a.m. Saturday at the park. Games will begin in the afternoon, with a can stack set for 1:30 and a children's coloring contest at 2.

Street rodders will take a 16-mile scenic tour of the area at 3 p.m., and then enjoy free time un-

QUAKING ASPEN
(*Populus tremuloides* Michx.)

Also called aspen, golden aspen, quaking asp, trembling popular. Botanical synonyms: *P. tremuloides* var. *aurea* (Tidestr.) Daniels, *P. aurea* Tidestr.

Description: Small to medium-sized tree usually less than 40 feet in height and 1 foot in trunk diameter, rarely 80 feet tall and 2½ feet in diameter, with slender, rounded crown of thin foliage. Leafstalks 1¼ to 3 inches long, slender and flattened. Leafblades

nearly round, 1¼ to 3 inches long, short-pointed, rounded at base,

finely saw-toothed, shiny green above, dull green beneath, turning golden or orange in autumn before falling. Seed capsules in-catkins, with many cottony seeds. Bark smooth, thin, whitish or yellowish, on very large trunks becoming thick, furrowed and dark gray. Wood soft and brittle, lightweight, light brown with very thick whitish sapwood.

Distribution: Commonly and widely distributed in upper part of ponderosa pine forest, Douglas-fir

forest and spruce-fir forest in high mountains and plateaus, on cool, shaded mountain slopes, in canyons and along streams, often forming pure stands or groves, 6,500 to 10,000 feet elevation. New Mexico: western two-thirds, on all the higher mountains. Arizona: high mountains and plateaus in northeastern half, from Chiricahua Mountains west to Pima and Mohave Counties and Kaibab Plateau. Range very broad, one of the most extensive of all native North American trees, from Labrador across Canada to Alaska, in northeastern United States south to West Virginia and Missouri and south in Rocky Mountains and mountains of Pacific coast region to California, Arizona, southwestern Texas and northern Mexico.

Quaking aspen is so named

because the slender, flattened leaf-stalks enable the leaves to tremble in the slightest breeze. The soft smooth whitish bark, which is favored by persons carving initials on trees, makes identification easy. The form in western United States, characterized largely by the deeper, golden color of autumn foliage, is considered by some botanists as varietally distinct.

Aspens are pioneer trees on burned areas, forming thickets of short-lived trees afterwards replaced by conifers. Propagation is chiefly from root sprouts. The wood has been used in the Southwest in manufacture of excelsior and elsewhere also for pulpwood, boxes and crates, food containers and matches. Domestic livestock and deer browse the foliage within reach.





Where to see them

As trees make their annual trek into winter's solitude, vibrant reds and rich golden colors will make for some scenic hiking and viewing. Among the most beautiful is the aspen.

Aspens are the most available specie in North America, according to Mike Funston, timber management officer at the Smokey Bear ranger station in Ruidoso. They thrive at elevations of 8,500 feet and higher so they are most prominent in the Northeast.

However, they are present in the Southwest. Though mostly in the wilderness, some are available and accessible by car. The most scenic spot locally, according to Funston, is Windy Point Vista near Sierra Blanca Ski Resort.

To get to Windy Point, follow

Highway 37 North to Ski Run Road, take a left and drive about 10 miles.

Two other local viewing spots can be reached by unpaved roads. One is via Highway 37 and Ski Run Road to Monjeau Lookout, and another is a very rough road northeast of Capitan. Funston advises using a four-wheel drive vehicle to get there.

Those wanting to drive for an hour can find bountiful aspens in the Cloudcroft area. Drive to Cloudcroft, continue on Highway 245 about two miles and turn right on Sunspot Road.

For more detailed information, call the ranger stations at Ruidoso, 257-4095; and Cloudcroft, 682-2551.

The first week in October marks the peak of the aspens' yellow color. Happy viewing!

facility we've got," said RBA president Tom Dorgan.

Last year's festival was split between two locations, which caused difficulties for the organizers and festival participants. This year everything will be under one roof.

Motorcyclists will also have the chance to ride in the Aspen Festival Parade this year. Last year the motorcyclists were here on a different weekend than the parade, and the festival organizers heard many requests for a parade the bikers could ride in.





best dressed, youngest and oldest riders and many more.


If you're good at games such as bite the wiener, hang the wash and sidecar water cup, you can win a prize in those games as well.



The conclusion of another successful Aspen Festival will be celebrated in style this year with a parade of motorcycles, floats, Shrine units, bands, queens and costumed individuals.



State Chili Cookoff returns

This year's New Mexico State Chili Cookoff will take place Saturday, September 24, in the Ruidoso Downs Race Track parking lot.

The cooks will begin setting up their wares after 8 a.m. and will meet at 10 a.m. to discuss the rules. Judging begins at 3 p.m.

All cooks must follow the rules put out by the Chili Appreciation Society International (CASI). CASI rules specify what can be used in the chili; where it is to be cooked; what can and cannot take place in the showmanship contest; and how the chili is to be judged.

CASI uses Frank X. Tolbert's Secret Judging System, which determines a precise format for judging as well as establishing criteria in the areas of aroma, color, taste, consistency, aftertaste and more. Violations of these rules can result in official probation published in the Goat Gap Gazette, and disqualification from the World Championship Cookoff in Terlingua, Texas, November 5. Dr. Roy Nakayama, horticulturalist at New Mexico State University and the "father of green chile," will head the judging.

Awards will be given to the top 10 chili cooks and the three best showmen. First, second and third prizes in both categories will be pottery loving cups made by Al Potter.



Fourth through 10th places in the cookoff will be awarded wooden plaques made by Paul Crown. Both awards feature the logo of the chile pepper inside the outline of New Mexico.

T-shirts bearing this logo will also be available. For all the seriousness of the

chili judging, there will be plenty of laughter throughout the cooking area. Tex Scofield, "the official mouth of the chili world," will be on hand to emcee the event.

Glen Tucker of the San Antonio Light called Scofield "a king in an activity cluttered with clowns."

Rick Smith wrote in the Austin American Statesman that Scofield is "a garrulous orator of prodigious adroitness, a verbal virtuoso with no peer ... with a non-stop barrage of words that



would have left Mr. Webster himself thumbing through a pocket dictionary."

In addition to Scofield, there will be a host of chili cooks competing for the Showmanship Awards during the three hours they cook the chili. Although shooting guns and amplifying are illegal, cooks will try almost anything to win this award.

Many of the competitors decorate their booths with a Western theme. Some may have rattlesnake skins or rabbit carcasses to show as the "secret ingredient" in their prize-winning chili.

Others have been known to have women in transparent blouses help cook the chili. The judges for showmanship will be anonymous, so the cooks will have to keep up a non-stop show the whole time.

All cooking will be done outside in the open air and live music will be played during the day. Beer, soft drinks and sandwiches will be available.

The cooks are not allowed to sell their chili. But once the judges have taken their samples to the judging tables, it is customary for chili cooks to share their culinary concoctions with the hungry crowd.



The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce is an organization of which the local community is very proud.


More than 500 local businesses support the Chamber through their membership.




