PZ, council talk signs

Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) chairman Greg Masters said after a meeting Monday with village officials the commission will reconsider sign appeals recently placed in committee.

Council members, P&Z and members of the Architectural Plans Review Committee (APRC) met Monday to discuss recent difficulties with the village sign ordinance and APRC denials of sign requests and rezoning requests.

Masters said he believed the council provided him with assurance that P&Z should strictly follow village zoning and sign ordinances in all cases they face.

The commission placed five sign permit appeals in committee after being accused of inconsistently enforcing the village sign ordinance. The commission planned to review the sign ordinance before making any rulings on the signs.

"I'd like to be assured some way that everybody's treated equal," said councilman Don Dale during the meeting.

Dale asked about alleged inconsistencies by APRC and P&Z in sign permit rulings.

Masters acknowledged many of the signs are in violation of the sign ordinance. APRC chairman Bill Carrigan said none of the violating signs had been approved by the current APRC members.

Masters explained many of the illegal signs existed before the village sign ordinance was adopted, and were grandfathered in. He also said a number of business owners received a sign permit, then built signs very different from those presented to APRC. Others never even came before the committee, said Masters.

"We would like something to back us up," said APRC member Margaret Gaddy.

Councilman Frank Sayner said the present sign and zoning ordinances have teeth, but added that he thought the administration and enforcement of the ordinances may be lacking.

Questions also arose about approval of plans by village administrators other than APRC or P&Z.

Dale told Masters P&Z should come to council members when they feel their rulings are not being upheld.

Masters said P&Z also has taken a soft stance on a number of questionable signs because of advice by village attorney Lee Huckstep to keep the village out of court. Masters said

Huckstep thought the sign ordinance might not be enforceable in court.

The village sign ordinance was modeled after Albuquerque's ordinance, which survived a close court decision. The State of New Mexico has no sign ordinance.

Sayner noted people are eventually going to test the sign ordinance in court no matter what it says, and indicated P&Z should enforce the ordinance that is on the books.

The ordinance on the books may change soon. Masters announced that he would present five sign ordinance amendments to the council at next Tuesday's meeting.

One of the proposed amendments states that P&Z will be able to approve signs in excess of the 32-square-foot limit if a larger one is needed for "reasonable identification." Signs larger than 32 square feet have been a recurring problem for P&Z.

P&Z enforcement officer Paul Davis suggested another amendment that would regulate sizes of signs according to the size of the building. The council appeared to agree with the idea.

The amendments also include prohibition of neon lighted signs except those constructed with indirect fluorescent lighting.

LTC Mexico budget \$25,000

The Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) Tuesday approved a \$25,000 special advertising budget for Mexico City that it plans to present at the next village council meeting, Tuesday, October 11.

The advertising is designed to publicize a program to accept pesos in Ruidoso. It allocates \$10,000 for printing and distribution of 50,000 Ruidoso brochures in Spanish, \$6,000 for advertising in the Aero Mexico in-flight magazine, and \$9,000 for newspaper advertising.

LTC member Rod Adamson and Chamber of Commerce president James Paxton will ask the council to allocate the special advertising funds from sources other than lodgers' tax funds or the \$30,000 allocated for advertising out of the general fund.

Paxton said last week he believed the village should not split up the limited funds it has already allocated for advertising in the United States. LTC approved a \$51,586 winter and summer advertising budget last week.

Paxton and Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth were hopeful that the State of New Mexico might contribute matching funds to the advertising campaign, thus costing the village less.

"We think we've got a lot going for us," said Paxton.

He reminded LTC members the state has already contributed \$40,000 matching funds to the U.S. Open ski race. Paxton also said conversations with Secretary of Commerce and Industry Alex Mercure led him to believe the state might have money for this type of advertising campaign.

Jungbluth said he would try to get some indication about matching funds from Mercure or Governor

Toney Anaya before Tuesday's council meeting.

The committee approved the budget in spite of mixed reaction to the peso idea from local lodgers Robert Ivey, president of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association, said some agreed with the idea and some did not.

He said lodgers to whom he talked were concerned about handling large amounts of pesos and not knowing denominations of the peso notes. He said they were generally in favor of advertising in Mexico but that none of them liked dealing with travel agencies.

It has been brought out that Mexicans do a large proportion of their vacation planning through travel agents. Travel agents generally require a 10 percent commission on any bookings they make.

LTC member and Alto Crest Cabins manager Jim Biggs suggested after the meeting that 90 cents on every dollar spent by Mexicans is better than no dollars spent by Mexicans.

He and Dan Dee Cabin owner Clark Carpenter said they have had no problems dealing with Mexican travel agents in the past. Biggs said the travel agents usually call to make the reservation, then send a check in U.S. dollars for the deposit.

Texas Club owner - and originator of the peso idea - Arturo Lojero suggested any lodgers' opposition to the idea may be due to lack of education about pesos. He said they will get used to handling the Mexican currency quickly.

Paxton suggested to Ivey that the Ruidoso Lodgers Association have a meeting to discuss the idea before the council meeting.

LTC member Linda Flack also

reported negative feedback from Realtors in the area. She said most Realtors thought Mexicans would not come to Ruidoso because their money will not buy very much in the United States. She said Realtors thought Mexicans are going to Europe because their money goes further there.

The majority of the committee, however, voiced strong approval of the idea.

"There ought to be a way to get them up here," said Biggs.

"When we quit trying anything new I think we are being stagnant," said Carpenter, who advocated moving full speed ahead on the project.

Jungbluth also informed the council that proposed ads for newspapers in the United States will be 26 column inches, not 16 inches as previously indicated. The larger size explains the discrepancy in prices Mithoff Advertising Incorporated quoted and prices LTC member Joann Farris obtained from newspapers, said Jungbluth.

Carpenter moved that LTC treat Mithoff's advertising proposal as a bid and contact other agencies for bids on the same advertising plan.

"We're not locked in on Mithoff," said Carpenter.

Carpenter said bids from other companies should settle any doubts people have about the professionalism of the company and prices they quote.

The committee agreed with the idea and LTC member Richard Sandoval suggested the same procedure for Mexico City advertising.

Chamber president Paxton said the Chamber will be able to seek the other bids.

Community responds after family loses belongings in fire Monday

"Mom, the bathtub's hot."

It seemed an innocuous statement by a young boy, and Jan Lloyd paid no attention to her son's comment early Monday morning. But a few minutes later, she saw smoke coming out of the walls in the bedroom, and she knew a fire was burning in her home.

She grabbed her three children and scooted out of the mobile home near Nogal. By the time the fire department arrived, there was no chance to save the home. The Lloyds were left with only the clothes they escaped in. Son Len did not even have any shoes on.

"There's nothing but ashes now," said Jan Lloyd. "We won't get anything out of it."

What makes it even more painful is that they just finished putting all their belongings into the mobile home the night before. The Lloyds, who have been running the Horseshoe Courts in Ruidoso for the past year, had just moved out to their land near Nogal.

"We didn't know what we were going to do," said Jan.

A helpful friend had an idea, though. Bob Brown called Ida Koehler at the Sitzmark and Ida

she offered the Lloyd family a room at her motel.

Bob and Ida began calling people they knew who might be able to donate clothes, food or money Monday evening. Two Ruidoso police officers, Mark Paz and Danny Steward, heard about the tragedy. They called all the people they could think of and started a bank account at First City National Bank for donations.

The donations—of all sorts—have come pouring in. Jan and Steve said individuals and businesses have donated food, clothing, furniture, meals in restaurants, places to stay, plants and more. Paz and Steward picked up donations Tuesday from eight in the morning until 11 at night.

One lady gave so many linens, dishes and food items, Paz and Steward finally had to tell her to stop after she filled the police car with donations.

"People are really fantastic," said Steve Lloyd.

People have been so generous, in fact, that donations have filled an extra room at the Sitzmark and a room at the police station.

Jan said she has tried to keep track of all the people that have donated things, but has found it impossible. Many have made anonymous donations, including so-

meone who donated a washer and dryer.

Of course, everything cannot be replaced. Daughter Mimi remembered with a moan the loss of the two trophies she received for an American Diabetes Association swimathon. They, like everything else, were destroyed in the fire.

But through the generosity of Ruidoso residents, the Lloyds have a small cushion to fall back on while they reassemble their lives.

"The people of Ruidoso have been real nice," said Jan. "We really appreciate what everybody's done."

Jan said the Lloyds will probably accept one of the offers for housing they have received and move into a small place by the end of the week. They have received numerous supplies and clothes that will see them through the transition period until they receive insurance money for the destroyed property.

"We're doing fine," said Jan.

Donations the Lloyds have not been able to use will be given to the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department for their Happy Holidays Drive.

"It's hard to feel sad when people have been so nice," said Jan.

Other towns have tried recall through governing body change

(Editor's note: This is the second in a series of articles dealing with the November 8 special election on increasing the size of the Ruidoso village council.)

A special election to change the size of the village council in three New Mexico towns arose out of dissatisfaction with the governing bodies, and passed in two of the three towns. The special election was generally acknowledged to be a recall of the council in Cimarron and Eunice, while it was an attempt to take away the mayor's tie-breaking vote in Columbus.

Cimarron and Columbus increased the size of their councils, but Eunice failed by 21 votes to change its council size.

In Cimarron, the firing of the police chief and subsequent dissension among council members triggered a controversy that resulted in a petition to increase the size of the council, said Cimarron council member Dr. Raymond Isberg.

Village clerk-treasurer Linda Martinez said the citizens became quite involved in the issue.

"They were really concerned," said Martinez.

Isberg noted that the special election aroused enough interest to cause the largest voter turnout in the village's history.

Village coordinator Nick Cardenas said residents did not get "super upset," but Isberg said a few "nasty letters" about coun-

cil members did circulate around the town.

Voters approved an increase in the council from four members and the mayor to six members and the mayor in June of this year, by a margin of 106 to 89.

All four of the council members ran for reelection in September, but only one was reelected. The three who did not get reelected were involved in the firing of the police chief, Isberg, who opposed the council's action, was reelected.

Although the election occurred just recently, Isberg said he believes the controversy has quieted down.

"It seems to have settled down quite well," said Isberg.

The council, which will include five new members and Isberg, does not take office until November. No one in Cimarron knows yet how a larger council or a largely inexperienced council will affect the governing process in that town.

Carlos Ogden, mayor of Columbus, believes the Columbus council, which contains four new members and one former member, has largely hampered the governing process in that town.

"It's like reinventing the wheel," said Ogden, who noted that the village's attorney fees have tripled since the new council took over in April 1983.

In Columbus, residents were upset with the mayor more than the council. They increased the council size by one member, to five, thus eliminating the need for the mayor to cast any tie-breaking votes.

Ogden, who has been mayor of Columbus for five years, said there was no particular

issue that aroused the voters' ire.

"Some people did not like the mayor's style," said Ogden. "I got my way for five years."

Residents at first tried to disincorporate the small town, but discovered numerous difficulties with that, said former village clerk Jackie Cook.

They then decided to take away the mayor's vote by increasing the council size. Ogden said the issue did not raise a large controversy, and said he was actually surprised at how much it was downplayed. He attributed the lack of controversy to his and two council members' refusal to get upset about the issue.

The question passed by nearly two to one, largely because no one organized any opposition to the increase, said Ogden.

The two council members who were opposed to the council increase decided not to run for reelection, said Ogden. They had just been elected six months before and were upset at being recalled so soon. They decided it was not worth running again, said Ogden.

The council member who was the largest supporter of the council increase ran again and was not reelected, said former village clerk Cook. The other supporter of the council increase was reelected.

Ogden, who cast three tie-breaking votes in his first five years in office, said he now is getting his way more than before because of the inexperience of the new council members.

Eunice, on the other hand, decided not to change its council size. Petitioners asked the voters to decrease the Eunice council from eight members to four.

Former village attorney Gary Reagan said proponents of the council change presented the issue as a broad question of government efficiency. It was generally acknowledged by those contacted that the election was in reality a recall.

State Representative Dan Berry, in whose district Eunice lies, was the initiator of the state statute providing for the council size change. He said he intended the statute to serve as a recall.

It is unclear what issue, if any specific one, triggered residents' dissatisfaction with the council. Berry mentioned the council's lack of efforts to clean up the town. The mayor's dissatisfaction with his council and a doctor's dissatisfaction with efforts to bring another doctor to town were also mentioned.

The lack of a dominant issue in the election appears to have been the reason for the voters' rejection of a council change.

"There were no overwhelming arguments in favor of the change," said Reagan.

In spite of voters' rejection of a council change, the issue appears to have caused quite a controversy in Eunice.

The Eunice Chamber of Commerce organized a town meeting to discuss the special election. Reagan said there was a "tremendous turnout" at the meeting.

"The town meeting was kind of ugly," said village clerk Harriet Reed.

Representative Berry said individual personalities of council members became subjects of discussion during the campaign.

"It really stirred up some very bitter and hostile emotions," said Reagan.

Even after the election was over, some peo-

ple were upset, said Reagan. After another controversy developed concerning a personnel issue, some citizens attempted again to recall the council, he said.

The state statute, however, prohibits the question being posed more than once every four years, and the issue died, said Reagan. "There were a few hard words, but everything has been resolved," said Eunice mayor Ross Robinson. "It's liable to get a little nasty (in Ruidoso) but things will quiet down."

Berry agreed that things have quieted down in Eunice since the election, and he believes the election served a purpose.

"It seems to have settled the town," he said. "It stopped all the griping."

The debate in Ruidoso has not yet heated up. Judging by other villages' experiences, it could become rather personal if it does.

No specific issues have yet developed. Ralph Rush, originator of the petition, at first said he thought six council members would better represent Ruidoso. Later, he was quoted in The El Paso Times as saying his main objective is to replace the present council with people who will better spend lodgers' tax.

Concern over the council's annexation policy is presumed to be another issue with Keith Mills involved in the petition. The council has refused to annex Mills' property in Sleepy Hollow a number of times.

But without a primary issue of concern to a large number of people—or a specific person who is targeted—it is questionable whether voters will want to recall the present council and elect six new members.

Watt coming around on mesa?

Interior Secretary James Watt appears to be moving closer to approval of the application for transfer of land on Fort Stanton Mesa to the Federal Aviation Administration for use as a regional airport for Lincoln County.

According to Ruidoso resident Wilton Howell, who visited with Watt Tuesday morning, the secretary indicated he will be approving the land transfer application submitted this summer.

"We're going your way," Howell quoted Watt as telling him.

The transfer would allow Ruidoso to build a regional airport on the mesa, replacing the present airport in Ruidoso. New Mexico State University

currently performs range research on the land and opposes the transfer.

Howell, who ran unsuccessfully in 1980 for state senator against Charlie Lee, said a "mutual friend" set up the 20-minute meeting with Watt. Howell would not name the friend.

Howell said he emphasized safety problems with the present airport, which is surrounded by mountains, homes and a school. He said Watt was not aware that White Mountain Elementary and Middle School are next to the airport.

"That seemed to impress him," said Howell.


Howell said nearby homeowners and pilots who fly into the Ruidoso airport do so by choice, but that school children go there because they must.

Howell said he also showed Watt numerous economic impact studies that he said presented arguments for both sides of the issue.

"The one thing you couldn't argue was that you had an unsafe situation," said Howell.

As Howell was about to leave Watt's office, he said, he offered to leave some of the studies and other material with Watt. But according to Howell, Watt said that was unnecessary because he would be approving the transfer to the Federal Aviation Administration.

Howell said Watt gave him no indication when he would make an official announcement of his decision. According to Howell, Watt did say he wanted U.S. Representative Joe Skeen to discuss the issue further with NMSU officials before making any announcements.

Downs P&Z discusses zoning, trash

The Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission met Wednesday night and discussed changes in the zoning ordinance, but their concern was mostly about an increasing garbage problem in the area.

"I'm not on the council, but people are calling me to complain about it," said Jackie Branum, commission member.

According to chairman George Smith, there has been little garbage picked up in the River Park Trailer Park in the past eight weeks. Smith

said the garbage is piled up and as a result dogs are getting into it and the fly population is increasing.

The committee is working on the present zoning ordinance to bring it up to zoning standards throughout the state. Plans include presenting an approved ordinance to the council in the next few weeks.

Village clerk Wilma Webb is concerned that people are aware that funds are available for loans to connect to the village sewer system. Webb said the sewer system was installed in June 1982 and residents had until June 1983 to get connected to the system.

Webb said there are several people who are not connected, and that she believes it is because they do not have the money. She said they are still being billed the monthly charge of \$6, even though they provide their own sewer service.

Persons who qualify must meet the definitions of "low income" and can receive up to \$1,200 in a loan that must be paid in a five-year period at a rate of seven percent.

Webb said she has forms for information about the loan.

Al J. angry at mail system

Like Eddie Childs, Al Junge is mad.

Childs, who like Junge is from Dallas-Fort Worth, is known for TV commercials in which he vents his anger—often at big government.

Right now, Junge too is mad at the federal bureaucracy—namely, the Postal Service.

The reason he is angry is the initiation of neighborhood mail delivery in Ruidoso.

"I think it's coercion and it's fraud on the people of Ruidoso and the Post Office department itself," said Junge.

The village councilman explained that his interest in mail service started two and a half years ago when he talked to their postmaster Elwood Gradine about the lack of boxes. He said he and Gradine paced off an area into which the present Ruidoso Post

Office could be expanded.

"The problem became acute when they ran out of boxes and started using general delivery," Junge said.

This summer, the Post Office started delivering mail to 68 "neighborhood box units" along Sudderth Drive. On October 1, delivery started to 204 additional units placed on and near Mechem Drive.

Junge claimed the system will not work in Ruidoso. He inquired as to how it is determined a city should have neighborhood delivery, and was given a copy of the appropriate regulation in the Domestic Mail Manual.

He found that Ruidoso met just one of the eight criteria.

"They didn't make a feasibility study—that's my big gripe," said Junge. When he wrote to Kenneth Primrose with the Postal Service in Roswell detailing his reasons why neighborhood delivery will not work

here, Junge received what he called a "snotty letter" of rebuttal.

Primrose said Junge's was "the first information that we have received that is not supportive of this," and that neighborhood delivery does work in Ruidoso.

Junge emphasized that he does not oppose residential (door-to-door) mail delivery, but "to force us to take residential mail that is not residential mail under the guise of residential mail, I think it's coercion." It is coercion, he indicated, because the Postal Service has said post office box charges will increase when the neighborhood system is complete.

The village had no say in the placement of the neighborhood boxes, said Junge, who claimed the state was also told to "bug off" when it questioned placement of boxes in state right of way.

Junge, who has already corresponded with several elected officials, said he will continue to make his unhappiness over neighborhood mail delivery known.

Reading Association wants action

P&Z seeks to 'demobilize' variances

After approving two lot line variances for two improperly placed mobile homes, the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) passed a resolution Monday asking the village council to require permits for the placement of all mobile homes.

P&Z's resolution also asked the council to require the same setbacks for mobile homes as for single-family dwellings. Single-family residences must be built at least 20 feet from front and back lot lines and 10 feet from side lot lines.

Both Gary Monroe and Donald Russell said they hired a local contractor who placed their mobile homes improperly on their property.

Russell said he made efforts to make sure his mobile home was placed properly on the property a year and a half ago. He said he hired a surveyor to mark the edges of his property and set flags himself to make sure the mobile home was set back far enough from the street. The con-

tractor still set the mobile home too close to the side of the lot, said Russell.

Mobile home owners are not now required to obtain permits for the placement of their homes. P&Z enforcement officer Paul Davis said he usually does not know the homes are being placed unless he happens to see them or someone reports one.

P&Z regularly hears lot line variance requests for mobile homes improperly placed on lots.

The permits would alert the village that a mobile home is being placed, and would allow Davis or building inspector Karre Haddenland to oversee the placement.

P&Z also will present a petition to the council requesting speed limit reductions along Sudderth Drive of 10 to 15 miles per hour. The petition is signed by members of the Architectural Plans Review Committee and close to 90 business people along the street.

Although there were some questions by P&Z members about the extent of the speed limit reductions, the commission agreed to pass the petition on to the village council, endorsing

the general idea of speed limit reductions.

The commission approved one rezoning request and denied another.

The commission approved a Greater Southwestern Development Company request for rezoning from single-family residential to light commercial use for two lots northwest of the Sierra Development Company (SDC) offices.

The commission later approved a replat of five lots into one for the Greater Southwestern Development Company. The five lots included the two rezoned lots and lots on which SDC has its offices.

The commission declined to rezone from single-family residential to light commercial use one lot on Virginia Canyon Drive behind the Starlite Cabins, noting it would be spot zoning. Although there are commercial lots nearby, the surrounding property is all zoned for single-family residences.

"I don't think we can spot zone under any circumstances," said P&Z member Tom Kelham.

In other business, P&Z approved a seven-foot rear lot

line variance for L. L. Davis on his property on Blazer's Mill Road.

Approved a replat of four lots in the Upper Canyon, including land on which the Noisy Water Lodge sits, for Albert Coca. The replat was approved with the stipulation that small lots not be sold separately from the larger lots.

Approved a replat of a condominium project in Eagle Creek Ski Area for Eagle Creek West, Limited. The replat showed slightly different placement of previously approved buildings.

Approved a plat of a one-acre tract of land in the Red Cedar Subdivision. The land was not previously platted.

Approved a replat of Deer Park Woods Townhomes in Deer Park subdivision for the Lakeside Corporation. The replat divided the land into one less lot and included three less homes because Lakeside Corporation plans to use two lots for landscaping.

Approved a replat of lot on Bonanza and White Mountain Drives in Airport West for Danny Brown. Brown vacated a portion of land on which the village built a road.

Warriors open district action against Tigers

Now the real race begins. The Ruidoso High School varsity football team will open district 3-AAA competition at 7:30 Friday night when it hosts Hot Springs High School of Truth or Consequences in the Warriors' homecoming game.

Although the Warriors were 0-5 in the non-district season (with one forfeit), Ruidoso has shown improvement since the beginning of the season and is aiming for a berth in the state AAA division playoffs.

The Warriors are also hoping history will repeat itself. Last season Ruidoso defeated Hot Springs 20-16 in its only victory of the season.

The Warriors lost a 13-7 decision to New Mexico Military Institute last week, but gained 208 yards total offense, their highest total of the season.

Still, Ruidoso head coach Darrel Stierwalt respects Hot Springs.

"They're a big, fast ball club," he said. "They've got a couple of good running backs and a quarterback who can throw and run with the ball. One

of their running backs ran 45 yards against us in last year's game before fumbling the ball on our one-yard line."

Hot Springs is 4-1 on the season and is ranked in a couple of state polls. The Tigers run out of a pro set offense and are hoping to break the Warriors' two-game winning streak against them.

But Stierwalt and the rest of his staff have alternated the Warrior backfield for the Hot Springs contest.

George Gresham, a 190-pound offensive guard, has been switched to fullback. He lends both speed and power to the Ruidoso offense.

Senior Cyrus Simmons and sophomore Russell Easter will probably alternate at quarterback. Simmons is also likely to see some time at running back.

Eric Strobel and Mike Williamson will probably share the halfback position, while Patric Pearson should also see some time at fullback. Justin Smith and Mike Smith will probably share the wingback spot.

The Warriors have good size in the offensive line with Kip McClellan,

Scott Ciraulo, Gary Burgess, Kevin Jameson and Craig Carson.

Bobby Dickinson will go at tight end and also start at middle linebacker on defense.

The Warriors' defense has shown great improvement since the beginning of the season. Ruidoso has allowed 105 points in five games, a considerable improvement over last season.

Ruidoso's defensive secondary has picked off seven passes this season. Easter, Simmons, Kenny Espinoza, Williamson, Chuck Jarrell and Mitch Mullican have all played well in the secondary.

The Warrior defensive line and linebacking corps have also done a good job this season stopping the run. But Hot Springs will provide a tough test with its stable of running backs.

"They're a good team, all right," Stierwalt said of Hot Springs. "They're about the same size as Portales."

Stopping the Tiger running game may be the key to the game's outcome for the Warriors.

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Forfeit result of misinterpretation

Ruidoso High School's forfeit of a varsity football victory over Clint, Texas, because of an ineligible player was apparently the result of a misinterpretation of the state rules.

John Antol, a junior tackle transfer from Scottsdale, Arizona, was the ineligible player. He was declared ineligible because his mother does not live in Ruidoso. Antol was academically ineligible to play in Arizona, but wanted to play football.

He came to Ruidoso late this summer to live with George Gresham, a Ruidoso High School player who went to school with Antol in Scottsdale two years ago. Gresham's parents, Jerry and Jacquelyn Strong, became Antol's legal guardians. That is where the confusion over the state laws came into being.

According to the New Mexico Activities Association, a transfer student who does not live with his parents and is a junior or sophomore must wait a semester before playing varsity sports. The transfer student is eligible to play junior varsity sports, however.

"I knew that John's mother was in Arizona, but I thought under the legal guardian rule that John would be eligible now," said Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt. "We were also concerned about his academic eligibility. Mr. Hansen (high school principal Tom Hansen) and I checked

the rule book to see if he was academically eligible. It's loosely defined, but apparently he is."

Hansen said he assumed that John's mother (Niki Antol) was living in Ruidoso. He did not ask Stierwalt about that, however.

"I didn't know until last week that his mother wasn't living here," Hansen said.

"A couple weeks ago, Coach Maskew (Ronny Maskew, the defensive coordinator) read the rule book and came to me saying perhaps we should check on John's eligibility before the district season started. Coach Howell (Doyle Howell, the athletic director) called the activities association and they told him John wasn't eligible."

However, there is some disagreement between Coach Stierwalt, the Strongs and John Antol's mother about another subject.

"Coach Stierwalt told me that he would help John with a part-time job," Gresham said. "He also told John, his mother and older brother that he would help out with John's food. He also told my mom that."

Jacqueline Strong agreed that Stierwalt told her he would help out with Antol's food money.

But Stierwalt says he did not agree to help out with food money.

"The only thing we ever offered John was a part-time weekend job if

he wanted it," Stierwalt said. "There's nothing wrong or illegal with that. We help lots of kids at school that way. John never came to me about a job, though."

"We're just trying to help the kids. We've always bent over backwards for all the kids."

Hansen backs up Stierwalt completely.

"Coach Stierwalt has been with me for 12 years and he's never done anything wrong," he said. "In fact, we got a letter from the activities association complimenting us for contacting them about the possible ineligibility."

Niki Antol says she was at first reluctant to let John come to Ruidoso. "At first I didn't want him to go," she said. "But he wants to play football, so I let him."

"I can't afford to send him to college. We were hoping he'd be able to get an athletic scholarship to New Mexico State University. That's the only reason I let him go. He wanted to play football. He was eligible for junior varsity football, but he didn't want to stay there and play junior varsity football."

"He's coming home Sunday, and I'm glad he's going back because I miss him. John feels bad, but I told him it was probably just an honest mistake. There wasn't any personal vendetta against John Antol."

English couple enjoys look at football

The Ruidoso High School-New Mexico Military Institute varsity football game last Friday was a whole new experience for a couple of spectators in the Warrior cheering section.

Jack and Dorothy Ryan of Hadfield, England, were watching American football for the first time. The Ryans were visiting their daughter and son-in-law, Sue and Bob Gregson of Ruidoso.

Their grandson, Gary, is a placekicker on the Warrior team, and their granddaughter, Melanie, plays the flute in the Ruidoso 24-Karat Gold Band, which performed at the game.

What were their impressions of American football after just one game?

"We were really impressed with it," Jack Ryan said. "It was good, clean sports and the kids showed a lot of spirit. It was enjoyable to be amongst them."

"We took a roll of film of the game and are anxious to develop it and show it to our friends back in England."

But the Ryans admitted they were a little confused at first by the way football is played.

"We were confused at first," Dorothy said. "We couldn't really figure out what they were trying to do, going up and down the field. But

we think we've got it now."

According to the Ryans, American football seems like a combination of English soccer and rugby.

"Rugby is similar, but they don't play with all that gear," Dorothy said. "It's tough. They do a lot of the same things like American football."

"In some ways, soccer is also similar to American football in that they kick the ball."

Soccer, cricket and rugby are the most popular sports in England, the Ryans said. Soccer is called football in England.

Soccer is generally considered the most popular sport in the world, and England is no exception.

"The pro season starts around the end of August and ends in May at Wembley Stadium near London," Jack said. "Every town has a pro soccer team and they play every Saturday. Points are given for the wins. At the end of the season, the two teams with the most points play in Wembley Stadium for the national championship."

The Ryans say many pro matches are plagued by fan violence.

"A lot of families used to go to soccer games," Jack said. "But in the past few years, fan violence has increased and not as many families go."

"The trouble is usually caused by hooligans looking for trouble. They're really dedicated fans and they fight with fans of the other teams."

Some soccer fields in England have fences around them so the fans can't throw things on the field or at each other.

But the sport is still very popular. Some of the matches at Wembley Stadium attract over 100,000 spectators.

Soccer is also played on the amateur and school levels.

"One of the differences between our school soccer and American football is that we don't have cheerleaders at our games," Jack said. "The games are also played in the daytime and not as many parents attend them. There isn't any trouble at school soccer games like there is in some of the pro games."

But when the national school championships are held in Wembley Stadium, huge crowds attend and a lot of spirit is shown.

"The whole crowd will get up and sing 'Abide by Thee' before the game," Dorothy said. "It's like when you have a prayer before your football games. They also have bands. It's really nice."

Although soccer is still the most popular sport in England, American football is catching on.

"A lot of chaps are becoming interested in American football," Jack said. "A few of our games have been shown on our television. Sometimes they show football games on the news."

The Ryans found their first experience with American football interesting, and wish they could see more games.

"We really liked it," Jack said. "We thought the game was interesting and we liked watching the teams with their color uniforms and the bands."

The Ryans will return to England next week, and plan to tell their friends all about their first experience with American football.

The Dallas Cowboys are a narrow pick for first place in this week's National Football League (NFL) rankings.

Dallas is the only undefeated team left in the NFL, and while they haven't looked really impressive in their first five games, the Cowboys have played well when they had to.

The defending Super Bowl champion Washington Redskins are ranked second after a thrilling 37-35 win over the Los Angeles Raiders, last week's top-rated team.

Washington is moving into high gear now, both offensively and defensively. Unlike some of the previous Super Bowl winners, the Redskins haven't lost any of their intensity or desire this season.

The 4-1 Raiders are a narrow choice for third place over the San Francisco 49ers. Los Angeles looks like the class of the American Conference (AFC) now, and the Raiders were without standout running back Marcus Allen against Washington.

San Francisco is fourth and has the highest-scoring offense in the league, having tallied 164 points in five games.

Quarterback Joe Montana is playing better than ever, and the 49er defense is much improved over last season.

The New York Jets and New Orleans Saints are tied for fifth place.

New York has looked impressive the last two games, particularly the Monday night win over Buffalo.

The Jets' defense is back in form and the New York running game is doing well despite the loss of running back Freeman McNeil to an injury.

New Orleans could be this year's Cinderella team. The Saints' defense was outstanding in the 17-7 victory over Miami last Sunday.

Kenny Stabler has done a good job of directing the New Orleans offense at quarterback. Even though he's almost 38, Stabler can still lead a team on a fourth-quarter rally, something he was a master at doing when he played for the Raiders.

A number of teams deserve honorable mention status.

They include Miami, Baltimore, Buffalo, Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Seattle, Philadelphia, Minnesota, Green Bay and the Los Angeles Rams.

So far this season, the National Conference (NFC) appears to be stronger than the AFC. It's two up on the AFC in games between the two conferences, and has four of the top six teams.

At this point, only the Raiders seem capable of beating the top NFC representative in the Super Bowl. The Jets have the talent, but are lacking in consistency.

Dallas, Washington and San Francisco all seem like legitimate Super Bowl contenders for the NFC.

It looks like the NFC has finally gained some dominance over the AFC after the latter dominated action during the 1970s.

Hornbuckle, Jumper winners of Williams tournament

Strobel cut to his left and caught the pass from Easter. He then ran into the end zone for the score.


The touchdown closed the Colts' edge to 13-7, but Ruidoso was unable to score any more points despite several drives.

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

TODAY, the vaginal sponge, used as a method of birth control, is available in Ruidoso. The sponge is available in Ruidoso. The sponge is available in only 12 states—all of them in the Southwest and Southeast.

According to Peggy Stern, a spokesperson for the VLI Corporation, which manufactures the product, the sponge compares to the diaphragm in its effectiveness. She set its effectiveness at about 85 percent—with ineffectiveness due main-

Stern said the advantages of the sponge compare with the "pill" and IUD because of the spontaneity it allows—but compares with the diaphragm in safety.

"Because of the health risks sometimes involved with the pill and IUD and the messiness of the diaphragm, this involves the best of both worlds," said Stern.

The sponge is about two inches wide and has a woven loop on one side. It is folded in half and inserted, similarly

to a tampon.

It contains a substance called Noxynol 9, which has been commonly used as a spermicide the last 20 years, according to Stern.

The Noxynol is released gradually, so the sponge can be inserted 24 hours before needed. Allergic reactions have been reported in about two percent of those who have used it, according to Stern.

One way to see Mexico pass through on a morning run

More than 3,000 runners decided to ride their feet to Mexico Saturday in the 4th Annual Nike Run Against Crime at El Paso-Juarez.

For all of September, I lived with the idea of participating in the run. When race day finally came, it proved to be a fitting climax to a memorable month.

There are several things about the Run Against Crime to interest an aspiring runner from Ruidoso. First of all, El Paso is close. Second, the event attracts world-class runners. Third, it takes place in two countries, giving it an international flavor.

So when I saw an ad for this year's race in *The El Paso Times* (one of the sponsors), I sent off for an entry form and made plans to start training. I had not been in training—the idea was to use the run as motivation to get started again.

A month seemed like enough time to get ready for a 10-kilometer (6.2-mile) run, which I thought the Run Against Crime was to be. So it came as a shock to learn a few days into September the race is a "15 K"—9.3 miles.

But I figured I would keep training and decide when it got close whether to go for it.

One of the nice things about running is that it requires minimal concentration. The mind is free to dwell on things or to wander.

So a month of training yields a series of insights—some related to running and some not.

For example, jogging along on the distance loop at the Forest Service trail a day or two into training, I was thinking about something exciting. (Actually, it was an idea someone had about promoting Ruidoso.) Suddenly I noticed I was moving faster with less effort.

That realization brought a flash of familiar feeling, as one side of me

asked the other, "Where have you been?"

I recognized that side of me. He is the me who does get excited about things—the one who is interested in seeing me fulfill my potential.

He is the me who comes out when I run.

I overdid it about the third day out. The next day, as I trudged along feeling sore all over, I acknowledged that side—pain.

"Oh yeah, you're in on this too."

But, no pain no gain.

And when you reach the point where you ask your legs to carry you up a hill and you feel them respond, or you find yourself heading eagerly into that last lap you thought you'd be dreading, it begins to pay off.

A lot of my month of training was spent wondering whether I would be able to run nine miles by October 1. Since I never had run that far, I didn't know.

Then one day, running along, it occurred to me there had been days when I pounded out quite a few miles on the tennis court. I knew I had read estimates of how far a player runs in a match, I just couldn't recall them.

But a flash of insight followed.

"Hey, maybe I've been training for this race my whole life."

I knew I wanted to write a story about the run, and I thought about keeping a journal of my progress. As it turned out, the journal had just one entry—a half-page dashed off in the middle of September.

"And there was that other flash Friday—that my training for this run has given definition to my life for two weeks. While I've been husband, to wife starting new job; editor, with staff in transition and big news breaking; I've been runner—a private thing just for me."

We need things to define ourselves to ourselves, don't we?

One can get to feeling pretty spiritual as well as philosophical while running, especially on our beautiful track. I had built up to running an hour and more without stopping—kind of amazing in itself—and I felt thankful to be able to do that.

And I sort of hit upon the idea to dedicate the El Paso run to Christ. My makeup is such that I kind of inwardly squirm when I have thoughts like that or hear others express them. But I got a Christian T-shirt to run the race in, and it was all right.

The run itself was quite an experience. Waiting for the starting gun on Alameda Avenue with thousands of others, I savored the moment, knowing there would never be another first time for me.

Then off we went. My memories of the event are like a slide show of images... an old man running in a swimming cap (he turned out to be 84-year-old Paul Spangler)... a swallow or two of Gatorade before tossing the cup on the wet pavement where hundreds already lay... the sight of so many runners on the Good Neighbor Bridge conjuring magazine images of the big Eastern marathons... the people of Juarez clapping and shouting encouragement... a Mexican military band and an El Paso high school bagpipe band...

It was great. My post-race insight was that a big race like that is a unique sporting event. Instead of thousands of people watching a very few players, you have thousands of players. And the event is totally geared to the participants. It's neat.

And my post-month insight was that I'm really glad I did it. When you start something, and you follow through on it, and it's good—it makes you wonder what other things you may have been training all your life to do.

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

DEAR EDITOR:
 After twenty-eight years of silent property ownership, this is my first letter to you and a first expression on any public issue. . . pro or con.
 "Shall we add two more members to the Council?"

Yes, and unless we do it now, in the coming election, New Mexico law prohibits our making any change "for a period of four years."
 Recent events and Council decisions clearly demonstrate that we have reached a point of growth where our problems are too complex to find their answers in the decisions of only four men no matter how able. . . decisions which, from scarcity of numbers, must, of necessity, be more narrowed than is desirable.

This is NOT a recall election, nor should it be considered as such, and, although the law provides for the resignation of incumbents, the proposition is neither a recall nor a condemnation of the Council. If they have rendered honest, selfless service to the community, they will be reelected. As to whether the Mayor does or does not resign, His Honor can win election to any office of his choosing.

So the basic question is and will continue to be "Can six good members serve us better than only four good members?"

Objectively, I can find no valid reason against adding two new members.

One cannot, in conscience, ignore the orchestrated smokescreen against the proposition. No, "we will not be without a Council for X number of days". These are honorable men, proud of their records who will not stand by and watch Court-appointed replacements serve out their unexpired terms. No, the passage of the proposition will NOT "endanger the job security of Village appointees and other workers" and to suggest it by threat, hint or innuendo, is a clear violation of a Federal Election law known as "The Hatch Act". Nor will the minimal salaries overburden the taxpayer. Their new input on some recent purchases and settlements could have saved their salaries many times over. Passage will not damage "ongoing negotiations" as stated of the important ones are stalled, awaiting Court action. The others could benefit by fresh ideas.

To date, most of the arguments against the proposition have been self-serving. That is understandable. No one welcomes the dissolution of his personal power base.

Yes, two new members would make the Council more argumentative! It will also broaden Village input. More argument on recent decisions could have altered and/or improved them through the resulting public "disclosure" which is far better than public "discussion" which allows only those carefully chosen items of agenda to be heard in Council.

"Disclosure" provides an airing for ALL reports and opinions, favorable and unfavorable, in ample time for Village perusal and participation. It insures our right to know before the fact rather than after.

"Should we add two new members?" Yes, for certainly no one will contend that the wisdom to govern resides solely with ANY four members and that, beyond their particular expertise, no other worthwhile opinions or ideas exist.

Ruidoso is a multi-million dollar business. State law provides for a maximum of ten, we are operating with the minimum of four. No other municipality of comparable size relies on the judgements of so few.

The problems of the next four years will far outweigh any of the past or present.

Crucial decisions must be made about: (1) Grindstone; streets, bridges, paving, access, grade and other variances, its ongoing contracts, construction and supervision. (2) The New Airport; its acquisition, bids and contracts for runways, aprons, taxi-strips, hangars, parking areas, the assessment of fees and their collection, construction and leasing of space, the awarding of leases and granting of concessions. (3) The disposition of the existing Airport; by sale? lease? partial sale to provide funds for a Convention Center? Rezoning for parks and recreation? commercial? residential? a combination? and how shall these be decided? after public discussion? By councilmanic action? (4) The Hospital; its expansion and possible relocation. (5) New annexations? With water rights, as required by Taos and Espanola? Or some solution for their purchase equitable to both developer and the Village alike? (6) Gambling? Location and rezoning? The relaxation of height limits?

Even with Grindstone, Ruidoso has not solved its basic water problem and until, and unless we do, growth and expansion will eventually cease, either through lack of potable water or by possible class action suits of its citizens.

Yes, we need two new members for the job is too big for any four members, regardless of abilities. It will lighten the load on an already overtaxed Council and provide a broader platform more responsive to Village needs and wishes.

This is not a condemnation of the incumbents and the passage of the proposition need not be their recall. There will be no chaos. Even the deaths of Presidents cannot cause that!

Passage merely means that, in all probability, the incumbents will be reelected, together with two more good members whom the Village will select to assist them.

Editorial

One of the busiest weekends of the year has come and gone. And the fact that it passed uneventfully as far as problems go is largely a tribute to cooperation between several law enforcement agencies.

"Visibility cuts down problems," is the philosophy of Ruidoso's Chief of Police, Dick Swenor. He pointed to the fact that a person could not go very far from Ruidoso in any direction without seeing one or two patrol cars.

The coordination of effort of several agencies requires a military-like approach. Personnel were briefed and supplied with maps, then hit the streets.

Agencies pooling manpower were Ruidoso Police Department, Ruidoso Downs Police Department, Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, New Mexico State Police and New Mexico Mounted Patrol.

The new Sheriff's Department Auxiliary was also very helpful, according to Swenor. "You gotta have the bodies—that's all there is to it," he said.

All the officers kept up their energy with coffee and donuts donated by local businesses, Swenor acknowledged.

Overall, the chief was very pleased with the way things went. "It was one of the easiest ones we've ever had," he said.

But it took a lot of hard work to make things seem easy, and the public can be grateful to all the law enforcement personnel who were on duty last weekend.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—The biggest highway contractor in the state doesn't pay any taxes.

That's because that "firm" is part of state government itself, and is therefore tax-exempt. It's called the State Highway Department.

The original notion when our state started was that we would always hire our highway construction done. Our department in charge of that kind of thing was to limit itself to deciding what work needed to be done, designing it, selecting an outside firm to do it and supervising the work while it went on.

Because of that, contracting firms have invested millions of dollars in equipment and personnel to be ready to perform that part of the function the private business sector should be called upon to perform.

But a wave of "let's do it ourselves" sweeps over those many employees of the Highway Department every few years, and they set to work acquiring the machines and people they need for major construction jobs.

One reason that should affect every citizen is that we pay for what they acquire.

Right now, for instance, they have got some machinery no private contractor would be able to afford, because they buy with tax funds, and for those there is no bottom line.

One of the major reasons it is possible for this virus to affect the giant road agency so deeply is that is decentralized.

That sounds like a healthy thing, and there are ways in which it would be good if more of state government could be conducted that way.

But the Highway Department cuts the state into what are now six districts, each the size of many of the states east of the Mississippi. In charge of each of those districts is a top engineer, and there to keep an eye on him is a Highway Commissioner.

As history teaches us, that leads often to a kind of baronial mentality,

which sometimes afflicts the district engineer and sometimes bites the Commissioner. Either way, the results are the same. We start to build an empire.

What's the first step in that direction? We decide to do much of the work ourselves, because, after all, that gives us the power.

And the highway construction firms, the ones which do pay the taxes, start to wither on the vine. If they have no work, they begin to disappear.

When they do, the state loses. We need a healthy, vigorous highway construction industry in the state so the competition keeps down the price of building those roads which go to bid.

The legislative committee which is presently scrutinizing contracts let by state agencies may ask some of them to do more of their work in house. They are likely to tell the Highway Department to bring in those private contractors instead.

That's the way the system was designed to work, but somebody has to remind the Highway Department of that every few years.

In connection with the above, we might add here that New Mexico will miss highway contractor Ted Brown, who has decided to pack it in after many years.

Brown had one strong characteristic: He was thoroughly and irretrievably honest.

That helps a lot when it comes to keeping bid lettings square. If there's one firm that won't get into hanky-panky with the others, it's tough for them to rig the bids.

Ted Brown was and is also a thoroughly just man. His firm never filed a formal grievance against the Highway Department during all his years of road building. He was always able to come to a satisfactory agreement without reaching higher levels.

Even his toughest competitors will miss him and his ways.

Reporter's Round

I'm a die-hard. For years I have been recycling paper, glass and bottles.

When I first moved here I asked about a place to take recyclable material, and the answers interested me. I've sort of taken things in stride and not dwelled on it. Still, I've had nagging thoughts about it.

Then, I read an article in The El Paso Times over the weekend and I got inspired all over again.

The writer of the article is vice chairperson of the City of El Paso Sanitation Advisory Board. She was writing about having received several honors the past several years because of her involvement with recycling. She said she even had received the highest award the city gives—the Conquistador.

Then she said, "Now I surely hope you can understand this: I am sorry you concentrated on me because, you see, I feel so strongly that conservation through recycling is right and I in no way was doing this to make a name for myself."

What humility! She then went on to talk about the pragmatic aspects of recycling.

She pointed out that the basis is conservation of finite resources. Then she noted the prediction by a member of the U.S. Bureau of Mines that by the year 2000, we will be importing seven times the raw materials we are today.

I agree with her next concern about the growing dependence on foreign oil for basic necessities, which is an unfair spot to place the children today who will be leaders then. She said "by that time, many will have taken their places of leadership in our society and may wonder about our generation."

Part of the problem of recycling lies with needing to have a system of storage and dispersal of the collectibles.

I've heard the argument used here that "because we are an isolated community in the mountains, the costs of moving material to a pickup spot will be more than what it's worth. The writer was talking about a similar transferring problem and she was from a large city.

Some of the benefits of recycling include philosophical reasonings, but as she pointed out, it can also be cost-effective. She described a two-year program in which 10 percent or less of the nearly 100,000 people participated in a program, and put out more than \$110,000 worth of recyclable waste.

The next part is the stickler. She

said buyers of the materials were local firms that hired local people. The provided materials helped the plants to continue to exist, which in turn helped to keep people working.

The stickler is that restaurants, motels and tourism are what keep many people here working. It's easy to understand how someone who is dealing in food service may not feel the cost-effectiveness of recycling paper, for example, is important.

But, I still don't want to give up. For there is another side of recycling, and that is education. Ruidoso prides itself in having an outstanding school system, and from what I've seen the teachers are concerned, caring people who are very AWARE.

Maybe there's a person connected with the schools who will read this and contact one of the city officials.

I know I may be dreaming because the writer of that story also commented on the current mayor of her city as being the only mayor in the past 12 years interested in recycling. Still, I think there is a way.

When I first started writing this column I mentioned the writer's humility. And I thought about how the word fits in with recycling.

When I haul a car full of newspapers, glass, bottles and tin to a pickup place, I feel like I am giving instead of only taking. I want to believe there is some humility in that.

When I went out to the Smokey Bear Ranger Station I discovered many helpful people and received some useful pamphlets. Besides warnings against forest fires, Smokey is usually gently reminding people to be aware of their environment and try to keep it clean.

This makes me think of trash pickup and just garbage in general. Hmmm. I've noticed some real transgressions in this department.

I know preaching sounds so high and mighty but when first coming here and noticing the extreme contrasts between the beauty in the mountains and the extent of littering, it causes anger.

In one of the booklets I picked up at the Ranger Station (which includes suggestions on activities to do to keep the environment clean), there is a quote by Abraham Lincoln: "I like to see a man proud of the place in which he lives. I like to see a man live in it so his place will be proud of him."

In the meantime maybe someone has a suggestion for my glasses, bottles, paper and cans so I can get into my bedroom.

Cliff Sr. and Casey make potent father-son combination

The best father-son act in Southwest racing will be on hand when Sunland Park swings into the '83-84 season later this month.

The duo consists of trainer Cliff Lambert Sr. and his son, jockey Casey Lambert.

The elder Lambert has just finished wrapping up the trainer title at the New Mexico State Fair, where he logged 13 wins—including the \$75,000-added New Mexico State Fair Handicap with Copper Case.

During the summer, Lambert campaigned at Ruidoso Downs, where he wound up fourth in the standings with 35 wins. His efforts at the Sunland season of '82-83 produced a championship. He chalked up 48 wins to beat out Fred Danley by four notches.

Casey, meanwhile, hasn't been letting any grass grow under his feet. He won the Albuquerque crown with 16 scores. His summer output at Ruidoso resulted in 46 victories, good for the fourth slot in final standings. During the last Sunland meeting, Casey, now 18, finished third in the jockey race with 52 wins from 381 starts.

The new Sunland season, covering 90 race days, gets rolling at 12:30 p.m. on Saturday, October 15. Racing will be staged on a Friday-Saturday-Sunday basis through May 13. Once again, the track will be dark during Christmas week.

Ask Cliff Lambert to comment on his prospects during the coming season, and he says directly: "We have a solid, balanced stable, and we pretty well have a horse for every kind of race. All of our stock is in good shape. I'd say we'll be a contender for the Trainer Championship once again."

One horse Lambert won't be campaigning at Sunland (at least not immediately) is Copper Case. The six-year-old gelding has been turned out for a well-deserved rest. But Lambert has another handicap heavyweight—the ageless Double B Express. The gelding won two handicaps at Ruidoso Downs this summer—the Mescalero-Apache Handicap and the Isayolboy Handicap.

That helped push his career earnings to tally up to more than \$235,000. "He had some problems in the State Fair Handicap at Albuquerque, but he'll be ready for Sunland," Cliff goes on. "We're definitely pointing him toward those early season handicap events."

Lambert's 30-head group also includes Pop's Spirit, a former stakes star at Ruidoso who won smartly on closing day at Albuquerque. "We had him laid up during the summer, so he's fresh right now, and he should come back real well," Lambert adds.

Lambert also has the three-year-old allowance winner, Pleasure Maker; Booging Boo Boo, who won at Albuquerque; Smooth Wind, a three-time winner at Sunland last spring; Ban-

daid King, who won at Ruidoso and Albuquerque in the \$3,200 claiming range; and Heisdebsnatie, a four-time winner at Sunland last spring.

Lambert figures to take a good swipe at Sunland's upcoming Savannah Swinger Series for quarter horses. His prime candidate is the four-year-old Six Doubles, who clicked in Albuquerque allowance competition.

Lambert feels Sunland Park will be in for another record season, and he points out: "The track is in such good shape, and we're coming off such a successful season at Albuquerque."

Included among the Stellar Handicap stars already bedded down at Sunland is Curribot, who ran second under 127 pounds in the State Fair Handicap. A brilliant performer, Curribot has banked over \$100,000 this year—all of it in Handicap competition in the Southwest.

Bob Reeves, of the Sunland Park stable-gate crew, reports some 1,000 horses are already on hand. "They're coming in steadily, about 40-50 a day," he says. "By opening day, we should have close to 1,500 head in the barns."

Bob Arnett, one of the leading trainers in this part of the country, checked in with 30 head. Among other name trainers who recently got to town are Jimmie Claridge, Paul Smith, Doyal Roberts, Coy Hendrix, Ike Danley, Fred Danley, Frank Cappellucci, Johnie Jamison, Dooley Guinn, Gerald Marr, L.B. Johnson, Chuck Matox and Don Farris.

Draconic Ship tops nominees

Draconic Ship, winner of one of the state's richest futurities, heads the list of horses still eligible for the fall thoroughbred futurity at Sunland Park.

The Fall Thoroughbred Futurity will be a major attraction in the early portion of this season's 90-day horse race campaign at the west El Paso track. Sunland Park will open its longest season ever on Saturday, October 15, and will continue through Sunday, May 13, 1984.

Racing will be held each Friday, Saturday and Sunday throughout the winter and spring with only two exceptions. A special Monday holiday card will be held on February 20 and there will be no racing over the weekend of December 23-25.

The Fall Thoroughbred Futurity will be run over six furlongs on Saturday, December 31. Two-year-olds will be aiming for a purse of \$10,000-added. The gross purse is estimated at \$100,000. Trials will be staged on Friday, December 16.

Hot N Pearly collected \$44,432 for winning the 1982 Fall Thoroughbred Futurity, which was worth \$88,864.

Draconic Ship's impressive victory in the fifth running of the Santa Fe Futurity marks him as a key entrant among the 84 horses whose owners made the latest payment for Sunland Park's premier fall race for thoroughbreds.

The Draconic gelding raced to a 1:11 1-5 clocking while defeating 11 foes on August 28 at the Downs at Santa Fe. He collected \$147,748 from the total purse of \$254,800, the richest thoroughbred race ever held at the Northern New Mexico track.

Draconic Ship qualified for three major futurities before capturing the Santa Fe Futurity. He earned a spot in the Riley Allison Futurity Consolation last April at Sunland Park, the Rio Grande Kindergarten and the Norgor Futurities at Ruidoso Downs.

Trained by Clifton Dean, Draconic Ship is owned by Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas.

Machisma, one of the top juveniles at this summer's Ruidoso Downs meeting, is also a prime threat.

The Scout Leader filly won four races at Ruidoso Downs this summer, including both ends of the meet's featured races for two-year-old New Mexico-breds, the Rio Grande Kindergarten and the Rio Grande Futurities. She also won the Pocket Coin Handicap.

Trained by Fred I. Danley, Machisma is owned by H.T. Hornbuckle of Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Devilishly Smashed, a Sunny South filly; My Anna Lee, a daughter of the outstanding California runner J.O. Tobin; and What A Celebration, an entrant in the Rich Land of Enchantment Futurity in July at La Meas Park in Raton, New Mexico, remain eligible for Sunland Park's key fall thoroughbred stakes.


