



## Motorcycles for police use

The State Transportation Department thinks the Ruidoso Police Department's traffic section has done such a good job since its inception early this year, it has given \$28,000 toward increasing the section's size.

State representative M. B. "Mickey" McGuire Thursday presented a grant to the Ruidoso Police Department from the Traffic Safety Bureau of the State Transportation Department that provides Federal Traffic Safety Funds for a Selective Traffic Enforcement Program.

The funds will purchase two fully equipped police motorcycles and provide salary and fringe benefits for one officer. The Village of Ruidoso will provide a second officer.

This will increase the traffic section to four officers, all riding motorcycles. Officers Robert Achterberg and Jerry Warf will join Fred Smith and Robert Kenney as full-time traffic enforcement officers.

The objectives of the Selective Traffic Enforcement Program are to reduce Driving While Intoxicated (DWI) incidents by increasing the public awareness of the problem through increased enforcement, said McGuire.

Ruidoso started its unique traffic section early this year when it purchased two motorcycles for Smith and Kenney. The bikes, Honda 500's, are unique because of their smaller size. Most police bikes are at least 1,000 cubic centimeters.

Kenney said Ruidoso decided to go with the smaller bikes because of the mountainous terrain and winding roads in Ruidoso. The bikes also are considerably less expensive to purchase and easier to maintain, said Kenney.

The motorcycles can patrol some

areas more effectively than the police cars, said Chief of Police Dick Swenor. On narrow and winding roads such as Paradise Canyon, motorcycles can turn and pursue speeding vehicles more quickly, he said.

Kenney said the motorcycles can move better through heavy traffic on Sudderth Drive and get to accidents more quickly.

Although the number of traffic accidents continues to rise in Ruidoso, injury accidents have leveled off since the purchase of the motorcycles and increased attention to traffic enforcement.

During 1982, there were 506 wrecks with 221 injuries and two fatalities. Through September this year, there have been 453 accidents with 165 injuries and no fatalities.

Kenney also believes Ruidosians are obeying traffic laws better. He said he and Smith are issuing fewer citations now than they were when they first began patrolling on their motorcycles.

The Safety Bureau has seen results of the traffic section's work, and the wisdom of the smaller bikes, said Lieutenant Jim Alston. As a result, they were willing to provide funds for two more bikes and one officer.

The police department will seek bids on two more Honda 650's (Honda no longer makes a 500-cc bike) and expects to have them on the road by the first of the year, said Alston.

Warf and Achterberg have already been state certified for motorcycles and are ready to begin their work as soon as the bikes arrive.

More officers concentrating on traffic enforcement frees the other officers to concentrate on regular patrol duties, said Alston. He expressed the hope that the larger traffic section will help the Ruidoso Police Department more effectively fight all types of crime.

## Officers fired upon after foiled burglary

Ruidoso police officers interrupted a burglary in progress late Sunday night, and combined with officers from three other agencies to arrest two of three suspects after a chase and gunfight above the Prime Time Restaurant.

Enrique Herrera, 28, and Jose Enriquez, 23, both of Ruidoso Downs, are being held at the Lincoln County Jail with a bond of \$17,500. They are awaiting arraignment on charges of larceny over \$100, aggravated burglary and aggravated assault on peace officers.

An unknown Hispanic male in his mid to late 20's was still at large Monday morning. He is described as five foot, eight inches tall with a slender build and close-cropped curly hair. He also has a thick mustache and was last seen wearing faded blue jeans and a dark T-shirt or sweater. He may be armed and is considered dangerous.

Ruidoso Police Department officer Skip Hazel and dispatcher Betty Bennett drove to 107 Monjeau Drive after receiving a report of a burglary in progress. Three suspects fled the scene in a silver 1976 Pontiac Firebird as Bennett and Hazel arrived. They

begin pursuing the suspects and Ruidoso officer Ron Hart joined the chase.

The car went off the road and crashed at the corner of Woodlane and DiPaolo Drives. Two suspects fled on foot through the woods and Herrera remained in the car. Herrera was arrested by Ruidoso Downs Police officer Roger Riley.

Lincoln County deputy Chuck Flanagan and Hart chased the two other suspects through the forest, said Hart.

At one point, Hart said, he saw the glint of metal, followed by a gunshot from approximately 15 feet. Neither officer was injured but both were temporarily blinded by the flash of the gun, said Hart.

By the time they regained enough night vision to continue the chase, the suspects had fled and officers did not know where to look, said Hart.

Ruidoso Police lieutenant Dave Pfeffer and Riley found Enriquez trying to kick in a door at the Palo Verde Apartments, where he and Herrera lived. Pfeffer arrested Enriquez.

The other suspect who fled on foot is still at large this morning.

The occasion Thursday was the presenting of a \$28,000 grant to the Ruidoso Police Department for two more motorcycles. Officer Robert Kenney, Mayor George White and Chief of Police Dick Swenor were on hand.

## Village negotiating for more water rights

The Village of Ruidoso may have more water rights for the first time in 12 years if current negotiations are successful.

Village manager Jim Hine last week said the village is now negotiating to acquire additional water rights in the Eagle Creek watershed that were offered to it earlier this year.

The additional water rights would allow the village to use two test wells existing in the Eagle Creek watershed, said Hine. The wells appeared to supply a good flow of water that is better quality than that from wells the village currently uses during dry periods.

The wells are on Eagle Creek Inter Community Water Supply Associa-

tion (ECWSA) land. Ruidoso is a partner with Capitan in ECWSA, but the water rights would belong solely to Ruidoso.

Hine would not state the amount of rights or the owners. He did say that less than 20 acre feet of water would not be worth purchasing because of the complicated process of transferring the rights.

When the village last bought water rights in 1971, it paid approximately \$1,500 per acre foot of right, said Hine. Water rights now cost an average of \$10,000 per acre foot, he said.

The rights will be purchased with money in the water revenue reserve fund, said Hine. The fund is supplied by Water Department revenue after the department's operating costs are paid. The fund was created in early 1982 to pay for repairs and extensions

of the water system, and purchase of additional water rights, said Hine.

Hine did not know when negotiations would be completed but said he hoped to be able to apply to the State Engineer for transfer of the water rights by December.

ECWSA currently owns rights that allow it to take up to six cubic feet per second (cfs) out of Eagle Creek. That is equivalent to 4,343 acre feet of water. The river, however, historically flows at only 1.8 cfs, said assistant village manager Frank Potter.

Ruidoso currently uses approximately 1,500 acre feet of Eagle Creek water a year, said Potter.

ECWSA applied to change the flow right to a quantity water right in the spring of 1983, said Potter. While a flow right of six cubic feet per second would translate to 4,343 acre feet, Pot-

ter said the State Engineer would probably not give rights to more water than historically flows down Eagle Creek, which he said is closer to 1,500 acre feet.

The State Engineer has not acted on the application, said Potter.

He indicated the village may have changed its mind and does not plan to push for action on the application. Even if it is approved, the village may ask the State Engineer to set it aside, said Potter.

If ECWSA keeps the six cfs flow right, it may eventually be able to drill a well field in Eagle Creek to supplement the stream flow as Ruidoso currently does with Rio Ruidoso and the Cherokee Well, said Potter.

For now, however, the village will work to acquire rights that will allow it to use the two existing wells.

Lincoln County Investments will ask the council to rezone a piece of property on the east end of Cedar Creek Drive to light commercial use.

Levi Self will ask the council to rezone a piece of property behind the Starlite Cabins that P&Z denied because of spot zoning.

The council will hear 10 other replats, lot line variances and rezones previously approved by P&Z.

The village council meets 7:30 p.m. Tuesday at village hall. The council also conducts a study session beginning at 6:30 p.m.

## School board to hear bi-lingual report

Shirley Neuhaus will speak Tuesday night at the school board meeting about her involvement in the bilingual program.

Neuhaus teaches English to students with no or very little English skills with hopes they will acquire "survival English." She has been working the past three years with the bilingual program, and will present her experiences to the board.

Many of the students she works with are recent arrivals to the United States, and she must start them from the ground up in learning English. This is difficult when they are already in the fourth or fifth grade, she said, because they are in the midst of learning so many other things.

Neuhaus lived in Mexico for 20 years and speaks Spanish fluently. This is a necessity as she is often asked to translate or to act as a liaison between parent and teacher or student and teacher.

She emphasizes that she teaches English, not Spanish, though she says she believes more classes of Spanish will be available in the future.

She is now working with 10 elementary and six middle school students. She often has to explain in Spanish but tries very hard to use mostly English with her students.

Though she wants them to learn English she said, "I don't want them to forget Spanish—we are living in a multi-lingual world."

## Youth killed in auto accident

Harry Austin Ensor III, 17, of Ruidoso died Saturday from massive chest and head injuries sustained in a one-car accident near Riverside on U.S. Highway 70.

Dwight Blaney, 21, of Ruidoso also sustained head injuries in the accident. He was taken to Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital and discharged Sunday.

The accident occurred late Friday night when H. A. Ensor II was driving eastbound on Highway 70 and lost control of his 1981 Pontiac Trans Am, according to police records. The car

crossed into the westbound lane, then back off the east side of the road where it hit a bluff, reported State Police in Roswell.

The older Ensor was not injured.

Harry Austin Ensor III, was born in Baltimore, Maryland, on March 25, 1966. He was employed by his father, H. A. Ensor II, as a painter.

Survivors include his parents, H. A. Ensor II and Sherry C. Ensor, both of Ruidoso; sisters Sherry Jarvis of Roswell and Annie Ensor of Ruidoso; brothers Irving and Joe Ensor, both of Ruidoso; nephew Joe Austin Jarvis

of Roswell; grandmothers Catherine Lloyd and Gladys Coombs, both of Maryland; uncles E. Scott Lloyd and Donnie Lloyd, both of Medford, Oregon.

Graveside services will be at 10 a.m. Tuesday, October 11, at Forest Lawn Cemetery in Ruidoso.

## September building permits \$1.7 million

The Village of Ruidoso issued 41 building permits valued at \$1,703,194 during the month of September. September's permits included 30 single-family dwellings valued at \$1,410,938; seven residential additions worth \$95,113; and three new commercial buildings worth \$197,143. No permits were issued for apartments or condominiums. The permits issued in September show a similar rate of construction to that in August. The village issued six more permits in September than in August, valued at \$20,966 less. The village issued 10 more permits—for buildings valued at \$505,837 more in September 1983 than in September 1982. September's permits bring the 1983

totals to 308 permits valued at a total of \$17,153,773. That compares with 382 permits valued at \$23,848,007 at the end of September 1982. ## Hazels awarded large settlement for loss

In one of the state's largest settlements for wrongful death of a minor, a six-person jury Friday awarded Alan and Jerri Hazel of Ruidoso Downs \$458,475 for the death of their 16-month-old daughter Mindy Lynn in an auto accident in June 1982. The federal court jury in Albuquerque

also awarded Cecilia Silva, 60, of Ruidoso Downs \$39,000 for injuries she received when a semi tractor-trailer smashed into the back of two cars on Highway 70.

The jury deliberated nine hours on the case after hearing five days of testimony, said the Hazels' attorney, Gary Mitchell. Mitchell called it one of the largest settlements that he

knew of in New Mexico for the wrongful death of a minor.

The accident occurred June 1, 1982, when Silva was preparing to turn left from the eastbound lane on U.S. Highway 70 near Ruidoso Downs Baptist Church. Silva was waiting for traffic to clear. Jerri Hazel, with her children Jeremy and Mindy Lynn, was waiting behind Silva in another

car. The tractor-trailer, driven by Francis Scott Trimble, 36, of Phoenix, Arizona, ran over the back of Hazel's car.

The infant, Mindy Lynn, was pronounced dead at the scene. Jerri and Jeremy Hazel were treated for minor injuries and released the next day. Silva sustained injuries to her back and neck.

## Irrigation keeps valley green

Driving up and down the Hondo Valley, one would give irrigation little thought, even though one might be fully aware of the green pasture areas, vegetation and sunflowers baked by the sun. "But without irrigation there would be nothing," said Ernest McDaniel, local rancher and resident of the valley since the 1930s. McDaniel and his brother Robert have been ranching together since approximately 1940. They have grazing cattle at home (about a 30-minute drive from Ruidoso) and at a ranch about 13 miles away. The McDaniels are also active in the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District, which is designed to implement farming measures

while conserving as much soil and water as possible. Greg Haussler, district conservationist who has his office in Capitan, works with the McDaniels and others like them and talks frequently about members having a "conservation ethic." Besides giving advice about using fertilizer and other consultations regarding planting, Haussler works to help build devices like a community ditch. He says his number one goal is to help conserve water, reduce soil erosion, and then slow down the erosion caused by natural erosion processes. Building community ditches is one way several ranchers can benefit from one main reservoir of water. Several local ranchers are now working on a ditch about two miles out of Ruidoso Downs. The ditch is going to divert water from the Ruidoso River. It is close to completion and when finished will serve 13 ranchers. Rancher Alfred Baca of Ruidoso Downs said the ditch will "increase water supply about 1,000 percent." Much of Haussler's job is in creating solutions for problems with landscape.

It is extremely important not to attempt to irrigate land that is too steep, he said, because it causes water to move across the land too fast and takes the soil into the streams. For this he recommends bench leveling, which levels off the land and allows the water to pass through with less erosion. Using water in the most effective way possible and making sure it gets to the root zone are two other goals, and everywhere he goes the watchword is conservation. In an average year Haussler works with about 140 to 150 different landowners. He is concerned with providing assistance to them, but also with knowing he is contributing to soil and water availability for the future. Burt Pfingsten, who says he has "been here since 1897," seems concerned about the future of water availability especially, but emphasizes the necessity of saving topsoil. Pfingsten, one of the founding members of the Hondo District, lives down in the valley about 30 miles from Ruidoso. He has seen changes in

the valley and lived through rough times. Recently he described the 1941 flood, which "knocked every irrigation dam down and we had to enlist help to get the irrigation back into shape." He talked about the project on the Salado Dam, when he and other ranchers ran into trouble with red tape with government bureaucracy. "This is when we used to say the Big Dam people don't give a damn for the little people," he said, laughing. Pfingsten is still very active with the District. He maintains cattle at grazing lands close to his home and tends a pond stocked with rainbow trout, which is open to the public. Both he and Ernest McDaniels expressed concern over the accelerated growth in Ruidoso and surrounding areas, because of how this relates to water availability. McDaniels said he thinks many condominiums are "unattractive and shoddily built." Haussler said the growth poses

worry over the potential loss of water needed to irrigate the land. He also said most people are pleased with the jobs growth has provided for people, but the worries remain concerning the water. Haussler said he believes there has been more erosion coming "from town" than there there has agriculturally, and he said this is evidenced by the murky color of the water. He said education for homeowners is extremely important. Erosion is

prevented by planting trees correctly. "One of the most important things to remember is just to keep the ground covered—natural vegetation is the best. Also, keep water on the lot—and all neighbors do the same," he said. Haussler suggests that before growers order or install a water meter they consult the following table to make sure the water meter is the correct size for the intended use: For information call Haussler at the USDA Soil Conservation Office, Capitan, at 354-2220.

# Police teaching child car seat law

State Police in New Mexico will be educating the public about the child car seat law in an attempt to save more children's lives, local State Police officer Jeff Darden announced Friday.

The 1983 law, which took effect June 17, requires that children younger than five who are passengers in a motor vehicle be secured in an approved child restraint device.

The penalty for violation of the law is a \$50 fine.

The State Police will be working with the Health and Environment Department and the Traffic Safety Bureau of the Transportation Department to educate motorists about the law.

Police will be distributing information cards describing the new law to

motorists with small children as passengers at routine roadblocks, said state Chief of Police Maurice Cordova. Darden said he will also be distributing the cards during routine traffic stops.

"That's the main thing, just to inform everybody," said Darden. "We want to see if we can get these kids fastened down."

Darden said many parents let their small children stand next to them on the seat while they are driving. In case of an accident or an emergency stop, those children can easily fall and hit a dashboard or windshield, said Darden.

Car seats can save a child from serious injury, he said.

While the State Police are aiming primarily at educating motorists, Darden said he will also be citing some motorists.

The child restraint requirement is a

related offense, according to the law. It cannot be enforced alone, but must be associated with the enforcement of another section of the Motor Vehicle Code.

For example, a motorist stopped for speeding who is found to be carrying a child not riding in a restraint device can be cited.

Darden said he will probably cite people who are involved in accidents in which a non-restrained child is injured.

New Mexico led the nation in traffic fatalities per mile traveled in 1981, according to Health and Environment Secretary Robert McNeill. Traffic accidents were the leading cause of death for children four and younger that year, said McNeill.

"We need to slowly change the public's perception of why we need to protect our children in cars," said Jeff Pine, manager of the injury control program.

## Mayor honors Pilot Club

Mayor George White has proclaimed October 18 as Founders Day for the Ruidoso Pilot Club. The Pilot Club International was first organized in Macon, Georgia, on October 18, 1921.

The Tigers came back with another touchdown late in the opening period. Little Ronnie Montoya sprinted 30 yards to the Warrior 35 and, two plays later, ran 15 yards for the touchdown.

Gene Armijo kicked the extra point and the visitors took a 15-0 edge into the second quarter.

The Warriors drove to the Tiger 37 on some fine running by fullback George Gresham and halfback

Michael Williamson. However, Ruidoso had to give the ball up on downs.

Ruidoso had another first-half drive stall on the Tiger six.

Hot Springs tallied its' third touchdown late in the second period as Randy Baca ran 16 yards for the score. Armijo's extra point kick made it 23-0 Hot Springs at halftime.

Ruidoso Park and Recreation Director Pam Graves hopes to find out in the next six months what kind of programs the community is interested in.

Graves has sent out a survey sheet with examples of sports activities, arts and crafts, music clubs and other activities to over 500 businesses in town. She has also gone door-to-door in some neighborhoods handing the sheets out.

"We're trying to see which programs the community is most interested in," Graves said. "From the survey, we'll decide which programs the department should start and where our funding should go."

Graves plans to make the survey extensive, with at least 3,000 sheets going out. She wants to keep the survey going until the spring.

"We want to get a real good idea of what people want to do in this area," she remarked.

There are about 30 activities listed in the sports area of the survey sheet.

The list includes sports like soccer, boxing, baseball, track, volleyball, archery, adult football, hockey, judo and karate, gymnastics, swimming and wrestling.

By the spring, Graves hopes to have a good idea what sports programs the community wants. As for now, the recreation schedule is quiet.

"We really haven't got anything going now," she said. "I've talked with the schools about setting up some adult basketball and volleyball pro-

grams in the school gyms, but I haven't received dates from the schools yet."

A lot of adults in the Ruidoso area are interested in sports like basketball and volleyball, and formal leagues may be just the thing for them.

Outside of softball and bowling, there isn't much for Ruidoso adults to choose from in terms of recreational sports.

Some youth recreation programs have struggled in the past year, but hopefully they'll improve in the next six months.

The Parks and Recreation Department survey may be just what Ruidoso needs to get some firm, long-lasting sports programs going.

Turning to high school football, Tularosa has dominated Ruidoso on the varsity level for many years, having won 21 victories to just six for the Warriors in the overall series. Ruidoso has won just once since 1983.

However, it appears that the future could bring a change in the series.

Ruidoso lost a close 9-6 decision to Tularosa in the varsity game this season, but the Warriors won the junior varsity contest 14-13 and the freshman game 14-6. Also, White Mountain Middle School took a crushing 34-0 victory over Tularosa last Thursday.

## Inside The Outdoors

Last year, during the deer seasons, problems were encountered by both the landowner and the hunter on several different issues. Most of these problems occurred in the southeastern part of the state where private and public lands are intermingled making it difficult to determine the ownership of the land. Hunters ran into locked gates and had trouble finding access routes to public and state lands. Landowners complained about trespassing, destruction of habitat by off-road-vehicles and littering.

This year, the Department of Game and Fish is taking several steps to try to eliminate these problems. Two laws were passed by the 1983 State Legislature that will be enforced by Conservation Officers during the up-

coming seasons. The first, makes it illegal to drive off established roads while hunting on all types of land, whether it is private, public or state land. This includes four wheel drive vehicles, motorcycles or three wheelers bearing a licensed hunter. Hunters, however, will be able to retrieve downed game with a vehicle on public and state land and with the permission of the landowner on private lands. The second law gives Conservation Officers the power to enforce the trespass laws.

To help enforce these new laws, the Department is going to have a greater number of Conservation Officers in the field in the southeastern part of the State for the deer seasons this year. Meetings are also underway with county law enforcement agencies to gain their help in enforcing game laws this fall.

Alterations are done as a service to customers, she noted.



## Editorial

In case you missed it on the sports page:

Isidro "Gino" Perez died Thursday, six days after being knocked out in the seventh round of a lightweight fight at the Felt Forum in New York.

His death was the eighth ring fatality in the world this year, according to The Ring magazine, and second in a month.

On February 28, 1981, Perez knocked out Fred Bowman in the sixth round at Atlantic City, New Jersey. Bowman lapsed into a coma and died a year later.

The 24-year-old Perez, a native of Mexico who lived in West New York, New Jersey, died at 10:20 a.m., said Dan Sorrenti, a spokesman for St. Vincent's Hospital Medical Center of New York.

Perez was knocked out in the seventh round by Juan Ramon Cruz of New York after being ahead after six rounds on the cards of two of the three officials scoring the fight.

After congratulating the winner, Perez returned to his corner where he collapsed. (Associated Press.)

The American people continue to be indifferent to the loss of lives in professional boxing. Therefore their lawmakers remain disinclined to doing anything about it.

## Sense & Nonsense

U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici



The Soviet Union often stuns the free world with atrocities. Throughout its brief history the Soviet Union has disregarded human rights and common decency that the civilized world cherishes.

But no event struck home with more fury than the murderous missile fire from the Soviet fighter plane that shot down the unarmed and defenseless Korean airliner. Flight 007 will forever remind us of the vast human gulf between the civilized world and the Soviets. Communist Party leaders have offered several absurd explanations for the attack, but their attempts to justify the atrocity have failed on Capital Hill and around the world.

All of us in Congress were as repulsed as the rest of America as news of the brutal act unfolded. It was an inconceivable action to the civilized world, this war-like mission against a passenger airliner. And it struck particularly close to our hearts here in America because many of us fly on commercial airliners or have family and friends who do. There is that helplessness in the sky when, as passengers, our own lives or the lives of our loved ones are placed in the hands of an experienced pilot. No one expects a belligerent foreign power to fire at an unarmed airline.

A cruel twist now, to realize that in the clouded mind of the Soviet Union, we are all targets—game birds in the electronic sights of Soviet fighters like the one that stopped Flight 007 and ended the lives of 269 innocent people over the Sea of Japan.

What action could we take as a nation, what action could the Congress do to express our condemnation of the attack and prevent another incident in the future? Unfortunately, there were very few options before us as a civilized nation responding strongly to barbarity. It was frustrating to me that no punishment fits this crime.

It was our desire in the Senate to join Mr. President and send a clear and angry message on the Soviet handling of the entire nightmare, and to send that message as one voice from Capital Hill, in unison with the House of Representatives.

The House had voted unanimously to condemn the attack as a crime. With a unanimous vote from the Senate, the resolution would go straight to the White House. Several Senators offered amendments to the House resolution, calling for more than just strong rhetoric against the Soviets—echoing the cries heard across the nation for some type of punitive action.

But amendments would have delayed passage of the resolution, possibly for days, and we hoped to speak clearly and quickly with one voice in Washington.

After some debate, the proposed amendments were tabled for later consideration. The Senate's unanimous approval of the resolution sent the condemnation of the Soviet Union on to the White House.

One week later, with the Soviet massacre still fresh in our minds, the Senate took up consideration of the 1904 State Department Authorization Bill. This was the opportunity Congress had to impose restrictions and punish the Soviets for their brutal action through amendments to the bill that would be adopted as law.

I supported the amendment calling for a balance between the number of Soviet officials here in the U.S. and the number of our diplomats stationed there. This amendment will also equalize U.S. and Soviet travel restrictions and living conditions.

This amendment achieves a dual purpose. By reducing the number of Soviet officials, we reduce the number of KGB agents, who operate with impunity in our free and open society as members of their diplomatic corps. We also force the Soviet Union to treat our diplomats the same as we treat theirs. While they live here free to travel and enjoy the luxuries and openness of our country, our officials find themselves constantly harassed and restricted in their travel.

The Senate also inserted language in the bill for a full report from the President on the Soviet Union's compliance to all existing arms control agreements, both in the letter and the spirit of the agreements.

But one of the most important provisions that the Senate adopted was to reduce the U.S. contribution to the United Nations. I supported this action for its budget savings of nearly half a billion dollars over the next four years, and because it will force the United Nations to make other nations pay their fair share of subsidizing the world organization.

Furthermore, this strong action serves as a signal to the rest of the world that the U.S. is no longer willing to foot the bill for what the U.N. has become, a forum for irresponsible criticism of the U.S. The anti-American bias of the U.N. became unashamedly evident when its Security Council could not put together a strong unified condemnation of the Soviets' criminal attack on KAL Flight 007.

While I agree that other countries are free to express their opinion against the U.S. and its policies before the world at the U.N., there is no reason that the U.S., which currently pays more than a quarter of the U.N.'s bill, must continue to subsidize its critics. More nations must pick up their fair share of the cost of this experiment in world government, including the Soviet Union, which pays only about 12 percent as their share.

Obviously, none of these measures will force the Soviet Union to rethink their overall philosophy of repression and persecution, nor will they extract from the Soviet Union a promise that other innocent passenger airliners will not be shot down should they stray off course and over Soviet airspace.

But the Senate showed the Soviets more than just an expression of moral outrage against their intolerable murderous action. It backed that up with amendments to existing law that stiffens our resolve against the Soviet Union and its inequities. The Senate demanded that our diplomats receive the same fair treatment that we generously afford theirs. The Senate voted to reduce our share of the cost of subsidizing the U.N., demanding that other nations, including the Soviet Union, pay their fair share.

In short, it was the right action at the right time, and shows that we have taken the necessary steps to be on guard against the unpredictable specter of the Soviet Union and to ensure the survival of civilized international relations and world peace.

**TOO MANY COOKS**  
About 10 days ago a group of 25-30 persons met at the Inn of the Mountain Gods to discuss the feasibility of creating a Tourist Information Center. A representative of the Tribe attended the meeting.  
Here is an idea which is basically sound but it was literally talked to death at this meeting. Too many persons attended the meeting, all asking questions, some relevant—some not. In the end, nothing was accomplished except the fact that a group did get together.  
The missing ingredient was the failure of the Tribe spokesperson to make a solid commitment on the funding of the Center. The question concerning funding by the Tribe was asked more than once but was not answered.  
This idea is too important to let die without a real effort to see if it will work. Perhaps a second meeting attended by a few selected individuals—less than 10—along with the Tribe representative prepared to talk about funding would be the answer.  
When the basis is established as to how the Center would be set up and funded, then a followup meeting attended by all concerned persons could be arranged to secure additional input and suggestions.

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—Toney Anaya reads his surveys—and he believes what they say.

This time last year, after all, they were predicting he would be elected governor. They were right, and they even foretold the margin of his victory.

The news they bring him these days is not nearly so pleasant. Among other things those surveys show him now is a drastic—almost catastrophic—decline in support for him in the state's business community.

That's why you see Larry Carter, former president of First National Bank in Albuquerque, being hired on contract to the state. He's going to try to bridge the gap between Toney and the state's business leaders.

He'll have to build a long bridge. It's a wide gap.  
And note this, please: It wasn't business which caused that gap. It was Toney and his actions.

Now he's trying to change his ways, with some interesting results. He has evidently passed the word to his people that they should dampen those anti-business statements which spotted the first months of his administration. They should quit flexing their muscles and bragging about what they are going to do to punish those who try to expand their businesses, to the ultimate good of the state.

That's why representatives of the Environmental Improvement Division were so conciliatory and even charming to members of the state's Oil and Gas Association at their recent convention here.

Businessmen we talk to were impressed with the Governor's conduct on a recent trip to study industrial development in North Carolina. He listened and learned, they say.

If he listened, he heard people there say the one thing which makes all the difference in drawing companies to your state is business "climate." That's hard to define precisely, but nobody who knows anything about it would say it is improved by surround-

ing yourself with radical environmentalists and those who make it their business to harass state government with lawsuits.

Those same businessmen who went on that trip with Toney are now saying, "Let's wait and see."

They don't consider promises of a change of heart proof of a change of heart.

They're glad for the Carter experiment, which could prove a happy one.

But they know the majority of true insiders in the Anaya administration, the Cabinet Secretaries and the policy advisors, brought to their job strong preconceptions about big business being evil.

And these are the people who are writing Toney's speeches and answering his mail. That means they have great power to shape the tone of his administration.

Example: a letter from the Governor to Senator Domenici, released to the news media, urging Pete to vote to fire Jim Watt. Release of that letter could have only one aim: to pressure the Senator. Now Pete, despite the fact that he belongs to the opposition party, is a man Anaya should be striving to get along with, not to irk, which is what this particular action is most likely to do. Author of that letter, which went out over the Governor's signature, is Sally Rodgers, whose dislike for Watt knows no bounds and who is Anaya's policy advisor on environmental affairs.

When rainfall and flooding did more than \$10 million in damages to southwestern New Mexico earlier this past week, did Toney Anaya take a plane to look at the area and hasten to do what he could to help?

No. The plane he took carried him instead to Hollywood, Florida, to address an AFL-CIO convention, while his own citizens were being washed to ruin.

If his close advisors give him counsel which leads to that kind of decision, you can see why business people—and many others—have so little faith in them.

people while there are 730 million living in India.



number of people continues to increase since the same percentage applies to a rising population base each year.


