Capitan council okays contract with water engineering firm

The Capitan village council Thursday approved a contract with the engineering firm of Andrews, Asbury and Robert for improvements in the water system, and heard optimistic reports about a \$500,000 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) application.

Under the terms of the contract, the Albuquerque engineering firm will conduct a study of the entire water system and prepare plans and specifications for proposed improvements. The outlined improvements include:

- Development of new, alternate or additional water supply sources
 - Water transmission facilities including pumping
 - Water storage and treatment facilities including telemetry
 - Water distribution, pumping and metering facilities, and miscellaneous and appurtenant work
- The project, as outlined in the CDBG grant, should cost approximately \$693,000, said village clerk Virginia Spall. She said the engineers' fees should total about 10 percent of the project's cost, or \$69,300.

Capitan hopes to pay for the project with CDBG funds and a Water Supply Construction Act Grant.

The CDBG application has been filed, and Mayor David Cummins said he is optimistic about the village's chances of receiving the money. He and a representative from Andrews, Asbury and Robert went to the ap-

plication hearing in Santa Fe last week. Cummins said they also talked to other legislators and bureaucrats while in the capital.

"I think we've got a good chance of getting the money," said Cummins. The village will be notified about the grant November 15, said Cummins.

The village will apply for a \$193,000 Water Supply Construction Act later in the year, said Spall.

Although it is not specifically stated in the contract, Spall said the engineering firm has agreed to cancel the contract if Capitan does not receive the grants.

The council also agreed to initiate the procedure for increasing the Municipal Gross Receipts Tax from three-quarter percent to a full one percent.

"I kind of feel it's necessary," said Cummins. He explained that the village expects to hire an additional maintenance person and a police officer in the near future.

"It will help our budget considerably," said Cummins.

Jack Pogue, chairman of the defunct Emergency Water Board, noted that the state is more willing to allocate grant funds to towns that are helping themselves.

The tax increase would bring the total sales tax in Capitan to four and three-quarter percent, up from the current four and a half percent.

Village clerk Spall said the council will hold a public hearing on the issue at next month's council meeting if public notice requirements are met.

In other business Thursday, the council:

Gave its blessing to the Chamber of Commerce, which is considering organizing a Smokey the Bear Day and sending a Capitan representative to be on the Smokey the Bear float in the Rose Bowl parade.

The activities will be coordinated with the issuance of a Smokey the Bear stamp next August, said Mary Thiedt.

Thiedt said a group of citizens thought Capitan should send a person who was involved in the discovery of Smokey in 1950 after a forest fire in the Lincoln National Forest. Thiedt mentioned Dorothy Guck as one who might ride on the float.

The Capitan Chamber of Commerce will discuss the idea during a meeting Tuesday night at Thiedt's home.

Heard Alice Traylor suggest a cleanup day in Capitan. Mayor Cummins said a group from Capitan High School had also approached him on the subject. Cummins said some village employees may be able to help with the project. The Chamber of Commerce plans to set a date for the cleanup and begin organizing the project at Tuesday evening's meeting.

Approved resolution 83-10, establishing a local government correction fee in the village budget and increasing office costs to pay for a new copying machine.

Tabled a proposal for a new telephone system until council members get a chance to study it further.

Water slide safety questioned in letter from state official

The water slide at the municipal swimming pool will undergo a number of repairs before it is ready for use next summer. Although there is currently some confusion about which repairs are needed, village officials have agreed to do whatever is necessary to make the slide safe.

"We're just as concerned about public safety as any other public agency," said village manager Jim Hine.

There appear to be concerns about stability of the structure, handrails, and a boiler stack.

State Construction Industries Division (CID) personnel have inspected the slide twice after being notified of possible building code violations by Ruidoso architect John Vanoy Moore. CID Mechanical Bureau chief Larry Nelson inspected the slide early last summer. Soon after the inspection, Frank Murray of the Attorney General's office drafted a letter noting four code violations, said Moore.

The letter stated that the slide appears to be anchored by expansion bolts rather than anchor bolts through the concrete roof of the swimming pool dressing room, and that it is in violation of the Uniform Building Code. The strength of expansion bolts is unknown, according to numerous sources.

"It was also discovered that the ventilator shaft from the municipal boiler room was placed where exhaust is directly beneath the entrance to the slide ramp," stated the letter.

"It was also found that the entrance to the ramp does not comply with the minimum 42 inch height requirements for railings," the letter also pointed out. The sides of the slide do not comply with the 42-inch requirement, but the letter asked for no alterations there since no one stands up while riding the slide.

The letter also questioned the wind loading capacity of the slide and the soundness of the structure.

"We are unable to determine whether the structure is fit for its intended purpose or conforms with its original design," stated the letter.

The letter recommended that an engineer examine the slide. The letter was dated July 6, 1983, with the name of Gilbert Velarde, Director of the Construction Industries Division, at the bottom. It was addressed to the City Commission for the Village of Ruidoso.

Village officials say they never saw the letter until three weeks ago, when Moore delivered a copy to park and recreation director Pam Graves. Neither Murray nor Velarde were available for comment last week.

Fred Nevarez, state General Construction Bureau chief, also inspected

the slide Wednesday, October 5. Nevarez pointed out other problems he noticed with the slide's construction.

He said structural four-by-fours imbedded into the concrete roof are not treated wood and may eventually rot. He also said the railing up the steps is difficult for children to grab.

Plywood around the loading area leaves too large a gap at the bottom where small children could slip through and fall, said Nevarez. He also said he found nails sticking out of the wood.

"I brought all of that to their attention," said Nevarez.

Village building inspector Kaare Haddenland said assistant village manager Frank Potter has advised him to inspect the slide and recommend the necessary improvements needed to bring the slide up to code.

Haddenland questioned the need for changes in the boiler stack.

"I believe we've got a good

pressure relief valve system. That should be adequate," said Haddenland.

Architect Moore said he first expressed his doubts about the slide to the village in the spring of 1981 when it was being built. In a letter to village manager Jim Hine, dated May 13, 1983, Moore stated he approached former building Inspector John Emde and councilmen Frank Sawyer and Benny Coulston about the slide.

Hine, Potter and Graves stated that a structural engineer employed by Boyle Engineering made a brief inspection of the slide last summer.

According to the village employees, the engineer determined the slide was safe. None could recall the name of the engineer, nor could a written report be produced.

The slide was originally built for local businessman Ralph Rush during the term of his lease of the village pool. The slide was later purchased by the village.

New judgeship for Lincoln County endorsed by council

The New Mexico Judicial Council Saturday accepted a subcommittee report endorsing the immediate addition of five new judgeships, including one in the 12th Judicial District.

The recommendations will be forwarded to Governor Toney Anaya. Lincoln County Bar Association president Mel O'Reilly said he thinks it is likely the governor will ask for the additional judgeships during the legislative session in January 1984.

The governor submitted a letter to the council this summer asking it to present him with statistical evidence supporting the need for additional judgeships. He stated that he previously vetoed a bill establishing new judgeships because the council was not given the opportunity to review and make recommendations regarding several of the new positions named in the bill.

The subcommittee used travel time and increasing caseload as criteria for its recommendation to add a district judge for Lincoln County, said O'Reilly. The 12th Judicial District covers Otero and Lincoln counties.

O'Reilly said the two district judges spent 75 days hearing cases in Carrizozo during the year ending June 30, 1983. The judges normally hold court in Alamogordo and must make a 66-mile drive to hear cases in Carrizozo, said O'Reilly.

During the same year, 2,306 new cases were filed in the 12th Judicial District with 523 cases being reopened. Lincoln County had 788 of those new cases and 309 of the reopened cases.

Joe Galvan, 3rd District Judge, stated it is a rule of thumb that each judge should handle about 1,000 cases a year. He also stated he believed this number should be closer to 700 cases a year to alleviate "this assembly line type of justice."

The 12th Judicial District currently has two judges, Robert Doughty and George L. Zimmerman. If they remained full time in Alamogordo, they would have a full caseload of approximately 1,700 cases, stated O'Reilly. The 1,097 cases last year in Lincoln County easily would have occupied a judge in Carrizozo, said O'Reilly.

O'Reilly estimated it takes 30 days to get a 15-minute hearing in Lincoln County and three to four months to have a trial of more than two hours. The subcommittee also recommended additional judgeships in the 5th District, serving Eddy, Chaves and Lea Counties. It recommended adding judgeships to Bernalillo's 2nd District and the 11th Judicial District of San Juan and McKinley Counties.

The subcommittee recommended an additional judgeship for the 3rd Judicial District after July 1, 1985, in order to give the county time to provide space for the new court.

Fort Stanton use announced

Robert McNeill, state Health and Environment (HED) Secretary, has officially made a request to Governor Toney Anaya that Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School be used as a facility to treat alcoholism, according to Ed Baca, spokesperson for HED.

McNeill said in a news release Friday "alcoholism in New Mexico has reached epidemic proportions." He added that he believes there are approximately 67,000 alcoholics and that two-thirds of the state's highway deaths are alcohol related.

There are some treatment centers in the state, but they treat on a short-term basis, according to McNeill.

He said there "is a major need for long term care for both adults and juveniles."

McNeill said the proposal must be approved by the governor, but he believes Anaya will approve because of his past support of alcohol programs. McNeill said a proposal will be made for the upcoming legislative session for converting the hospital, and that with minimum capital outlay the facility can be turned into a long-term center.

He emphasized that "HED is committed to using existing Fort Stanton

facilities and that administrative staff and support services could be redirected without major disruption."

McNeill said there are six state-run treatment centers but they provide treatment for up to 30 days. He proposes that if Fort Stanton is converted into a treatment center, it would be long term, up to a year.

Fort Stanton administrator Mark Delgado said Friday night he is not surprised at the recommendation.

"It's good we're going to have some kind of direction," he said.

This was McNeill's last proposal as Secretary to HED, according to Baca. Last week McNeill was assigned to Chief of Staff of the governor's office.





New Care Center activity director discusses programs

Jan Bennett is nearing the end of her first month as activity director at Ruidoso Care Center.

Bennett said she works more as a team with social service director Rick Glenn though activities is a department itself.

This team approach seems more effective to both her and the residents according to Bennett.

Bennett spent the last couple of years as a social worker for Lincoln County and she treasures the contact with another co worker.

"Now if I goof up, I don't have to wait a month to find out about it," she said with a laugh.

Bennett moved to Ruidoso about three years ago with her husband, Randy. They had come from Los Angeles and were traveling and here is "where we ran out of money and we had to go to work."

Bennett's job at the center includes working with residents doing crafts, exercise, or other activities. She is a liaison with volunteers and the residents.

She said she is looking for volunteers to teach at the Care Center. What they teach might be a craft, art or skill that a community member is capable of teaching.

She emphasized she wants to have volunteers feel free to go to the Care Center to talk to people, they don't have to teach or bring some skill with them.

She said one problem with a volunteer program is a person coming one time and "never returning again." She believes this is because the volunteer feels the Care Center expected a certain commitment.

There are no strings attached," noted Rick Glenn.

Bennett is excited about several activities recently started.

On Wednesday mornings, high school students spend time with residents, and are incorporating this time as fieldwork with one of their classes.

There is a Saint Bernard introduced in the pet therapy program, which Bennett believes will be very successful.

Nob Hill kindergarten classes will adopt a person for each class as part

of the Foster Grandparent Program.

"I'd be happy if each student chose a resident, but this is how the school has chosen to do this," said Bennett.

One of her favorites is the Dine-a-friend program. About 12 local restaurants provide a free meal to two or three residents. The number of restaurants providing the meals could increase, but now they rotate.

Bennett said this activity is limited to "people who can enjoy the experience." It is not limited to ambulatory residents, however, as the Care Center van has a lift.

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

Warrior gridder finds Bulldogs tough as ever

It took just 14 seconds Friday night for the Ruidoso High School varsity football team to find out why Artesia is a good bet to defend its state AAA division championship.

That's how long it took Jeff Sanders of Artesia to run 88 yards for a touchdown on the opening kickoff. From then on, the Bulldogs dominated play en route to a 35-7 victory over the visiting Warriors.

Ruidoso, now 0-6 on the season, kicked the ball to Sanders to open the contest. The 5-6, 140-pound senior ran up the middle, broke a couple of tackles and outsped the Warrior players to the end zone.

Martin White kicked the extra point and the Bulldogs held a 7-0 lead while some fans were still filing into the stadium.

"That killed us," Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt said of the Sanders kickoff return. "That kind of got our confidence down for a while."

The Bulldogs scored 21 more points in the first half to gain a big edge on Ruidoso.

The Warriors gained nine yards in three downs on their first series and had to punt.

Artesia then went 45 yards in eight plays for its second score. Quarterback Shawn Smith finished the drive with a one-yard pass for the score. White again kicked the extra point and Artesia led 14-0 with 5:20 remaining in the opening period.

The Bulldogs added two more scores in the first half on a four-yard run by Sanders late in the first quarter and a 12-yard pass from Smith to Jimmy Munoz with 5:45 left in the half.

Ruidoso had one good drive in the first half, going from its 27 to the Bulldog 37 before losing the ball on a fumble. Quarterback Cyrus Simmons ran for 23 yard in two plays to spark the drive.

Artesia added its final touchdown in the fourth period on a 13-yard run by Robbie Bellew. White again kicked the extra point and the Bulldogs led 35-0.

Stierwalt wasn't surprised that Artesia was as strong as it was.

"We knew they'd be good," he said. "In fact, I kind of thought they'd be better than they were."

"Our kids hadn't played Artesia before, and might have been a little bit intimidated. We moved the ball well at times and played well at times."

The Warriors will resume district 3-AAA action this Friday with an away game at Cobre. The game will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Sherwood opened the scoring with a five-yard run early in the second quarter. He then ran in for the two-point conversion and White Mountain held an 8-0 lead.



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
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Around Sports

Most people probably already realize it, but the best high school football in New Mexico is played in the southeastern part of the state.

The past two years the champions in both the AAAA and AAA divisions have been from this end of New Mexico. Clovis won the AAAA title in 1981 and 1982, while Portales won the AAA crown in 1981 and Artesia took it in 1982.

And the trend towards southeastern dominance will probably continue this season.

Southeastern teams are usually strong because they play tough non-district schedules against highly rated Texas teams. Very few people will question the caliber of high school football in Texas, and teams that play Lone Star schools regularly gain from the experience.

Artesia looks like the best bet to win the AAA state championship. The Bulldogs were the best team I've seen this season when they defeated Ruidoso 35-7 Friday night.

Artesia does everything well. It has an outstanding running back in Jeff Sanders, a tough offensive line, excellent defense and great punt and kickoff return coverage.

The Warriors have done well in the last category this season, but Artesia shut down the Ruidoso return game completely Friday night.

The Bulldogs are better than Hot Springs, and far superior to either Lovington or Portales. They also have the advantage of being traditional winners.

Artesia annually plays a tough non-district schedule against AAAA schools and Texas powerhouses. By

the time district and state play rolls around, the Bulldogs know how to handle any situation.

I can't see any team beating Artesia out for the state title. Moriarty has an effective single wing attack, but lacks the balance Artesia has.

St. Pius is ranked first in the state, but it has about as much chance of winning the state title as there is of little green men from Mars arriving in Ruidoso tomorrow and zapping the entire population with their ray guns.

On the AAAA level, defending champion Clovis, Alamogordo and Roswell appear to be the best. These three teams are all in the same district and play very tough schedules.

The only northern team with a chance at beating the southern powerhouses would appear to be Eldorado.

The Eagles won the state title in 1980, edging Clovis. They also defeated Carlsbad this season.

But Alamogordo has more firepower than Eldorado, Clovis has a better defense, and Roswell has beaten up on Albuquerque schools the past two years.

I'll pick Alamogordo by a slight margin over Clovis for the state AAAA championship. Eldorado might make the semi-finals, but not any further.

If I'm wrong about my predictions, I'll admit it. But the only way I could see a northern team winning either the AAAA or AAA championship is for it to have an enormous amount of luck, or the southeastern schools to have a lack of it.

ORDINANCE NO. 83-14

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF A TEMPORARY MUNICIPAL JUDGE; PROVIDING FOR SALARIES, BOND, SALARY AND DUTIES; AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 83-11 OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, AND PROCLAIMING AN EMERGENCY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, THAT THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, IS HEREBY AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 5-2-5 APPOINTMENT OF TEMPORARY MUNICIPAL JUDGE

A. Whenever the municipal judge determines that he will be temporarily unable to avail himself to perform the duties of municipal judge, whether by reason of recusal or disqualification, absence, sickness, or other incapacity, he shall appoint in advance of the event a temporary municipal judge to serve during his temporary absence. For the purposes of this subsection, "appointment" shall mean the municipal judge's designation of a temporary judge by actual notice to the temporary judge and by written notice filed with the clerk of the court. Written notice shall indicate the name of the temporary judge, the reason for the appointment and the anticipated duration of the appointment. The appointment shall automatically cease when the municipal judge returns to his duties.

B. In the event the municipal judge becomes unable or unavailable to perform the duties of municipal judge and has failed to appoint a temporary judge, the governing body shall appoint a temporary judge who shall serve until the regular municipal judge returns to his duties. If the governing body declares a vacancy as provided by 115-1, N.M.S.A. 1978, it may appoint a temporary judge to serve until a successor municipal judge has been duly appointed by the governing body pursuant to §5-2-4, N.M.S.A. 1978.

C. QUALIFICATIONS. — The temporary municipal judge shall be a registered qualified elector of the Village of Ruidoso and shall reside within the corporate limits of the Village of Ruidoso.

SECTION 5-2-4 BOND AND OATH

A. The municipal judge shall be covered by the corporate surety bond covering all municipal officials, said bond being conditioned upon the faithful performance of his duties and to the paying over to the Clerk of Ruidoso all fines, forfeited bonds, and other monies which come into his hands by virtue of his office. The municipal judge shall take the oath of office as required in §5-10-2, N.M.S.A. 1978.

B. Before assuming the duties of temporary municipal judge, the temporary municipal judge shall take the oath of office as required by §5-10-2, N.M.S.A. 1978. Once a qualified elector has taken the oath of office as temporary municipal judge, he shall not be required to repeat the oath on subsequent appointments. Upon taking the oath of office, the temporary municipal judge shall be covered by the corporate surety bond covering all municipal officials.

SECTION 5-2-6 EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS AND SALARY

A. The municipal judge is entitled to vacation and sick leave, holidays, and all employee benefits granted to other municipal employees. The municipal judge shall receive a salary of \$12,000.00 per year, payable at a rate of \$1,000.00 per month.

B. The temporary municipal judge shall be paid the sum of \$25.00 each day that he is actually on duty and serve as municipal judge, such sum to be paid out of the General Fund of the Village of Ruidoso.

SECTION 5-2-8 REPEALER

Ordinance 83-11 of the Village of Ruidoso is hereby repealed.

SECTION 5-2-10 SEVERABILITY

If any section, subsection, paragraph, phrase, or other portion of this ordinance shall be declared invalid for any reason whatsoever by a court of competent jurisdiction, then such decision shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining portions of this ordinance.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days after its adoption, approval, and publication as provided by law.





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

The Snow Birds Move In With Jack Frost
On the evening of October Ten I was welcomed home by my totems (spirit birds), the Snow Birds, feeding at all the familiar feeding stations around the yard, and flashing their white tail feathers as they flew happily here and there, plainly glad to be back to their winter home.
Later on in the wee small hours of early morning of the eleventh, Jack Frost moved into the White Mountain region with his paints and brushes, and touched up the hill sides and valleys and higher reaches with the first colors of Fall.
Right here at the place you can see only the barest traces of Jack Frost's arrival — maybe touch of light gold high and all alone amidst the vast stretch of Oak Brush still green along the hillsides.
However as you travel up the valley, the Autumn picture unfolds more and more, with the cherry red leaves of the Woodbine or Virginia Creeper a solid mass of shining color rising the full height of a grey cliff, or climbing high through the branches of one of the river trees — a sight cheerful to the eye.
All in a day the leaves of the Box Elder have turned, showing a flash of light gold that grows brighter as the trees follow the river's winding course to the higher ground.
Leaf Boats Sailing Down The River
Though the signs of Autumn are very few here in the Vale, over at the crossing, the river is the very picture of Indian Summer.
The stream flows quietly shining clear, much clearer indeed than the air, which everywhere especially in the heads of the canyons, holds a purple and lavender haze. It is early afternoon and the West wind has been blowing down the valley at about half speed.
And the stream is filled with tiny leaf boats. They are all there in their own great Mississippi — the heart shaped cottonwood, the bronze oak, the crimson woodbine, the lemon-yellow wild grape, the walnut, the willow — all in their fall colors, blown by the wind from their branches away up stream.
Some have become a little water-logged from the long trip and have become little submarines, floating a while and then going under water to rise again to join the surface vessels.
The wind-harp branches overhead and the mummuring stream below, join in boat-song lullaby of early fall.
The Wild Harvest
Along the creek the wild grapes are purple on the yellow-leaved vines climbing high in the river trees. In the higher slopes the Elderberries and wild cherries are ripe.
The call of the Pinon Birds "re-sounds not through the glenn" only in passing over, going somewhere else, nearabouts.
That is because there are no Pinon Nuts close around. However there are good crops of this favorite food of many of the children of Mother Earth in many sections of Lincoln County.
If you listen closely you may find out where the golden brown small cones are beautiful to see against the soft green of the round shaped small evergreens.
For over the autumn air the Pinon Jay's song of Harvest Home will reach you — its bugle notes full of the pride of life and the joy of Indian Summer Time.

"Environmentalists Howl Over Successor to Watt," read one headline last week after President Reagan named William P. Clark secretary of the Interior.

A political cartoonist could go to town on that one—portraying the Sierra Club, Friends of the Earth, et al. as a pack of coyotes on a pristine mountaintop, baying at the moon.

This "howling" tactic worked beautifully for environmentalists while Watt was in office. By perpetuating his image as "The Great Despoiler," they alarmed the populace and swelled their own numbers considerably.

And the immediate howls from their ranks when Clark was named to the Interior post seemed like a deliberate attempt to ensure that an adversary relationship continues between the government and the environmentalists.

It seems that a change at the top in Interior presented the opportunity to begin a meaningful, rational dialogue on environmental issues.

If any environmentalist of standing said something like, "We welcome the opportunity to work closely with Secretary Clark," the papers didn't quote him.

Instead, environmentalists called the appointment "preposterous" and said they were "dumbfounded."

That just doesn't seem like the smart way to achieve your aims. Or is the major aim of the environmentalists merely to increase their membership?—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Today may be a day for asking some questions. So many things in government are announced with great fanfare, and then we forget to follow up on them to see if they led anywhere at all.

First: How is Brian Sanderoff doing on his assignment?

You remember Sanderoff. He sat at the right hand of Bruce King, as one of his major aides. From there, he could hardly lead cheers for that upstart, Toney Anyaya. But Brian managed to be given leave just before the election to set up a get-out-the-vote drive, which was looked upon as highly successful. Since that time, he has been given a number of state contracts.

The latest one came from the Governor himself. It calls for Brian to research all the Anyaya campaign material to see what promises were made then. Next, he was to reduce the State of the State speech to its composite parts to see what was called for there.

Presumably he will now have to add the text of the speech on the statehouse steps, in which Anyaya reconsecrated himself to service, to develop a complete and up-to-date "platform" for the Governor.

This, as the contract specifies, is then to be broken down into the responsibilities of each Cabinet member ("You are hereby designated to fulfill the following promises," or words to that effect) and Sanderoff is to develop some sort of device for scoring the performances of each.

How has he done on all that? Do we now know what pledges were made? Have we begun to discover which have been kept?

Are Cabinet members presently being graded?

And will the public, which pays for the Sanderoff contact, ever be apprised of its success or failure?

(You see how easily one question leads to another.)

Second: What became of the plans for a complete Department of Information in the Governor's office which that speech on the statehouse steps proposed?

Are we any closer to achieving that than the day it was disclosed to us?

So far we are still operating with a single press secretary, who even has to add to her title the demeaning word "acting" each time she puts out a release.

If one of the major problems of the first year of the Anyaya regime has been his failure to tell his story properly, as we were told, shouldn't this take precedence over almost everything else?

Third: Do we intend to keep on adding to the size of the Governor's staff indefinitely?

If so, where is the money to come from?

Sure, the Governor has a rather generous budget, but it is not limitless.

Whenever a major problem is perceived (for instance, "The business community doesn't like me"), we can't just add another staffer (for instance, Larry Carter at \$75 an hour) to take care of it.

The problems will go on forever. Unfortunately, the money to solve them in this manner will not.

Fourth: Whatever happened to that trip Ms Witt took to Geneva and the one Mr. Robles took on the plane?

We know the short-lived Secretary of Natural Resources was not issued any state money for her plane fare or other expenses to that international conference at which she found herself fired. The Governor once said that if he felt she deserved some help on paying her bills, he would reach down into his own pocket.

Has he done so, or are we to consider the matter closed as it presently stands?

As for Mr. Robles, who spent a few weeks on the Racing Commission, he said he would reimburse the state for the flight he made to Ruidoso in a state plane, ostensibly to inspect the track there.

Has he paid that debt, or does he perhaps feel his later resignation from the Commission absolves him of it?

It isn't good management to leave loose ends, and these queries are only designed to clear up some matters about which we might otherwise be told nothing.

We sometimes have reservations about the retaining of far distant economic development consultants by the state, but the outreach to Mexico through a state office in Chihuahua would seem to be a move with great potential benefit for both Mexico and New Mexico.

Funded by the last Legislature and carried out by the office of Governor Toney Anyaya, the Chihuahua office becomes a reality with the signing of a contract with Chihuahua business consultant Francisco Delgadillo.

Historically, there hasn't been as much trade across the New Mexico-Mexico border as has been established across the line with Texas or California.

But Our Man in Chihuahua, with proper logistical and informational support from this state's Economic Development and Tourism Department, should be able to identify markets and sources of supply links that span the border and show potential for mutually beneficial trade.

The immediate economic benefits as well as the longer term international benefits are obvious.

Reporter's Round

Beauty is in the eye of the beholder. True but true. How can you determine by law what is beautiful and what is not?

Toss in the question of the public's right to tell an individual what he can do on his own property, and the question of a sign ordinance in Ruidoso becomes a very sticky one.

To what extent will individual business owners be allowed to identify their businesses? Who tells you what an ugly sign is? Can one group's esthetic opinions overrule a person's right to make a living?

A sign committee from the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) and the Architectural Plans Review Committee (APRC) has met three times so far in an attempt to amend the current sign ordinance. They have a very difficult job with many questions to be answered.

How do you decide what signs "look good" and what signs "look bad?" Whose opinion do you base the answers upon?

Many problem areas have been identified, but solutions have been difficult to work out.

The current ordinance was adopted in October 1982. It is much stricter than the previous ordinance and outlaws many previously legal signs.

P&Z member Martin Rose said the commission originally designed its own sign ordinance but that village attorney Lee Huckstep believed it was unenforceable in court. The committee then decided to adopt an ordinance based upon Albuquerque's sign ordinance, which had been successfully defended in court.

Rose said P&Z members knew the ordinance wasn't perfect when they passed it.

"We knew we had some real problems with it," said Rose.

P&Z members have said they passed the ordinance in order to get some sort of control over the chaos that was reigning in sign construction in Ruidoso. It was generally acknowledged that the commission would eventually suggest amendments to the ordinance.

In three meetings so far, committee members have determined a number of problem areas.

The 32 square foot limit on signs has surfaced as one of the most persistent problems. Time and again P&Z and APRC are faced with business owners who have signs larger than the 32 square foot limit.

Some have been denied, some granted a variance and some approved through a shaky interpretation of the ordinance allowing shopping centers to have larger signs.

Members of the sign committee all appear to agree that the strict 32

square foot limit is too small. They have discussed an amendment that would determine the permissible size of a sign according to the street frontage of the building it advertises.

Signs with changeable copy appear to be another controversial subject. Right now changeable copy is not allowed on any signs in Ruidoso, except those that had it prior to the passing of the 1982 ordinance.

Business owners are allowed to change the copy on their signs, but may not have temporary copy on the sign. This difference has come down to a suggestion that a restaurant owner could list his daily menu on the sign as long as he used screws to attach the daily menu rather than pegs.

The main objection appears to be towards plastic marquee type signs. But members have even wondered if those should be outlawed, thus denying movie theatres and gas stations the opportunity to properly identify products.

What to do with previously approved signs that do not comply with today's ordinance is another question the committee has considered.

Sign committee members discussed requiring signs to comply with the ordinance anytime ownership, business use or the name changes. Members also discussed giving a finite time limit for compliance with the ordinance.

Portable signs, signs on vehicles, fluorescent bulbs, neon lighting and many more issues face the committee in their review of the 11-page ordinance.

It is a difficult task to decide the esthetic taste of the town. Committee member Bill Carrigan even wondered if the village should have a sign ordinance. But most of the committee seems to agree a sign ordinance is necessary to create a safe and visually pleasing environment.

But what is that? Each committee member has his own opinion of what signs are good looking and which are ugly. But the sign ordinance is no good if the public does not go along with it.

"The important thing is to do what the public wants," said Rose.

P&Z member James Paxton agreed. He said the ordinance should allow 60 foot purple signs if the public wants them. He also believes the majority of the people want a strong sign ordinance.

The public will soon have its opportunity to say what it wants in a sign ordinance. Within the next few weeks P&Z plans to have a meeting to hear public input on the sign ordinance.
