# Anaya, Skeen feel Watt's departure won't affect airport

Both Governor Toney Anaya and U.S. Representative Joe Skeen remain optimistic about chances for a regional airport on the Fort Stanton mesa in spite of the resignation of Interior Secretary James Watt.

"I don't think that is as significant as most people think," said Skeen.

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission filed an application this spring for the transfer of approximately 1,700 acres of land on Fort Stanton Mesa from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). The final decision on the application will come from the Interior Department.

New Mexico State University currently leases 26,000 acres on the mesa from BLM for range research. The proposed airport is within the range research land. NMSU opposes the transfer, claiming the airport would disrupt research.

Recent efforts by Anaya and Skeen had focused on convincing former Secretary Watt of the need for an airport on the mesa. Watt appeared to be seriously reconsidering his earlier stance opposing the land transfer.

Watt resigned before having a chance to act on the application. The application is still at the Transportation Department and has not yet been forwarded to the Interior Department, according to Skeen.

Although Anaya guessed new Interior Secretary William Clark would not even know where Ruidoso is, he remains optimistic about chances for the transfer.

"There's a lot of groundswell being laid," said Anaya Wednesday.

He explained that both Skeen and staff within the Federal Aviation Administration are lobbying the Interior Department for approval of the application.

"Skeen said he will be talking with Transportation Department Secretary Elizabeth Dole. The FAA, which is a part of the Transportation

Department, will be making recommendations to the Interior Department, said Skeen.

He also said he hopes to talk to Secretary Clark within a week. Skeen said he knows Clark well and should have no problem talking to him.

"We're going to talk with the guy himself," said Skeen. "I am going to impose myself."

Skeen said he plans to talk to NMSU officials about the airport as well. He said he wants to work out a solution to the airport problem that will be compatible to all parties.

Anaya said his staff and the New Mexico Transportation Department are monitoring the situation. He said he plans no direct involvement in the issue now but will be available to help if asked.

"We're going to get an airport before I leave office and I just hope it's on the site we want," said Anaya.

"We're going to get this thing done. We have to," said Skeen.

# County asks Gavilan Canyon be state road

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners voted unanimously Wednesday to send a letter to the State Highway Commission requesting the state make Gavilan Canyon Road a state road.

According to the letter, the road has had "much increased use due to the year-round tourists and heavy truck traffic as they use this road for a bypass for Ruidoso."

This heavy use, the letter continues, "has caused the road to develop many potholes and crumble at the edge."

According to the letter, the Lincoln County Road Department spent over \$38,000 last spring repairing the road, and recent inspections have shown the road is in need of more repair. The letter states the County does "not have the funds to properly maintain this road." The commissioners' letter proposes a swap be made in exchange for Devil's Canyon Road, which is presently State Road 214.

# State commits to \$25,000 matching funds

The State of New Mexico approved to match the \$25,000 provided by the Ruidoso village council for an advertising program in Mexico, the Chamber of Commerce board of directors was told Wednesday.

Board members also endorsed the Ruidoso Lodgers Association proposal to request a 25 percent local gross receipts tax for promotion of tourism.

"That's come as a shocking surprise to us—a marvelous surprise," said Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth of the \$25,000 match. Jungbluth said the commitment had been made by Alex Mercure, Secretary of the state Commerce and Industry Department.

Chamber president James Paxton said Chamber advertising committee

members would meet early next week to discuss the additional funding. It was reported that all the \$25,000 does not have to go to the Mexico program.

"Ruidoso is really in the spotlight as far as accepting pesos goes," said Jungbluth, referring to an Associated Press wire story on the program, as well as mention on television.

He added that all foreseeable snags in the program should be worked out well in advance, to help ensure its success. The "acceptamos pesos" logo is designed and ready to go to bid, said Jungbluth. Paxton noted that Security Bank, as well as the other two banks in town, accepts pesos.

Advertising committee chairman Tommy Morel reported on developments in advertising. He noted that New Mexico has been divided into eight regions and an ad agency has been assigned to each, with the services of that agency re-

quired for advertising using state matching funds. Ruidoso is in the region of the Epstein agency of Albuquerque.

Morel noted that time is growing short for ski season magazine ads, and an agency to handle that campaign must be chosen soon. He said Epstein is energetic and appears to have a direct line to Mercure and Governor Toney Anaya.

It was pointed out that matching funds committed to Ruidoso now total \$65,000—with \$40,000 for the U.S. Open pro ski race—and more may be available.

The ski race is waiting on the signing of a contract between the promoter and Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, Jungbluth indicated. He said promoter Paul Carson, ski area manager Roy Parker and legal counsel for the Mescalero Apache Tribe (owners of the ski area) will meet next week to discuss the event.

Endorsement of the quarter percent sales tax came after RLA president Robert Ivey reported his group has decided to push for it. Ivey said he was told by village manager Jim Hine the tax would bring an estimated \$225,000 a year into the village.

Tom Kelham recommended the Chamber get behind the sales tax effort and lobby the village council to keep them from "shuffling it (tax revenue) off to other programs. His motion to endorse the tax passed with no dissenters.

Paxton expressed pleasure at the turnaround in relations between the Chamber and RLA, noting the lodgers' support of the peso proposal.

Also Wednesday, the Chamber board discussed whether to have Jungbluth spend one day a week calling on Chamber members. It was decided he will do so on a trial basis and report back to the board.

# P&Z calls for local zoning reevaluation

After completing a short agenda, the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) called for reevaluation of zoning in three areas of Ruidoso.

P&Z member Tom Kelham recommended the village council reassess zoning at the east end of Cedar Creek Drive (Paradise Canyon). P&Z has recently heard two rezoning requests by land owners in the area, which currently includes property with a variety of zonings.

On August 30, the council overturned P&Z's recommendation to rezone property owned by Gardner Pipe and Steel Company from single-family dwellings to multi-family dwellings.

The council will hear another appeal October 31 of a P&Z decision to deny rezoning a piece of property in

the same area to light commercial use.

"I feel it should be zoned the same," said Kelham.

P&Z member Martin Rose then moved that the commission go on record opposing any new developments in the Bog Springs area until the whole valley, including the airport and White Mountain Schools, has been reevaluated.

White Mountain Development Company is appealing a P&Z denial of rezoning from single-family dwellings to light commercial. White Mountain owner Bill McCarty has said he plans to put a shopping center along a section of Hull Road adjacent to school property.

Kelham also moved that P&Z form a committee to study zoning in a section of Ponderosa Heights near Redwood Drive currently zoned for multi-

family dwellings. Commission members have generally agreed that the residential area should be zoned for either mobile homes or single-family dwellings.

The council will consider a rezoning request to mobile homes for one lot in the area during the next council meeting.

Kelham, Greg Masters and Bill Carrigan agreed to study the area.

P&Z chairman Masters said he will consult midtown merchants on the issue of parking for their businesses.

P&Z enforcement officer Paul Davis said a village ordinance requires businesses to provide adequate off-street parking whenever adequate use changes. He said it is almost impossible for midtown business owners to comply with the ordinance because of the lack of open land along Sud-

derth.

In other business, P&Z approved a conditional use permit for Juanita Davis to conduct a body rubdown and massage business at the Cree Manor Inn.

P&Z and the village council previously approved a similar permit for Davis at Serenity Plaza. Davis told the commission that she was unable to rent an office at Serenity Plaza and had decided to conduct her business at the Cree Manor Inn.

The commission approved the conditional use permit in spite of 30 letters opposing Davis' business at the Inn. P&Z chairman Greg Masters read the letters of protest and said they mostly pertained to general items such as traffic concerns and appropriateness of the neighborhood for Davis' business. The commission received four letters in favor of the business.

# Some favor bigger council, some new council, some say leave it

Those who plan to vote for an increase in the size of the Ruidoso village council during the November 8 special election are divided into two distinct groups.

While many have not decided how they will vote, the desire to see a larger council and the desire to see a new council will convince many to vote for the increase.

"The complexities of this town warrant more than a minimal council," said Realtor Dan Barrow.

Time and again, people mentioned the phrase "more input" when talking about a larger council.

"More input is valuable," said merchant Herb Brunell, who is undecided how he will vote.

Contractor H. Ray Bishop called Ruidoso a "little town with big city problems," and he thinks a larger council would provide more ideas from which to select solutions.

Water, traffic, city services, annexation, planned growth, Grindstone reservoir and a new airport are all issues vital to Ruidoso. With a permanent population in the village of more than 5,000, the council has to make deci-

sions for a population that sometimes swells to 35,000.

Many of the people who favor a larger council said they would vote for present council members in the March election. They were generally satisfied with the present council but wanted to see more people with more ideas working on the problems of Ruidoso.

Other people who will vote for the council increase said they would not vote for the present council members in March. They will vote for the council increase because they are unhappy with the present council.

The reasons for their displeasure come from a variety of sources, often depending upon how they make a living.

A number of lodgers at a recent Ruidoso Lodgers Association meeting expressed dissatisfaction with the council for appropriating \$55,000 in Lodgers' Tax funds to the Parks and Recreation Department instead of spending it on advertising Ruidoso. Many in that industry see the special election as a recall and intend to recall at least some of the present council.

Realtors, whose names appeared frequently on the original petition for the special election, appear to be concerned about the council's policy on annexation.

"I don't like people shutting the door," said Realtor Mike Larkey.

Ruidoso is a tourist town and will continue to grow, believes Larkey.

"You can't stop it," he said. Barrow was less concerned about shutting the door than with an inconsistent annexation policy shown by the council. He pointed to a large annexation of Don Dorman's land around the proposed Grindstone reservoir, and the subsequent refusal to annex Keith Mills' Sleepy Hollow subdivision.

Some school teachers mentioned the friction that developed between the school board and the council over annexation of the new high school site and the village's lease of school property for a recreation complex. With the annexation approved and the lease moving smoothly, that issue may not make much difference in the election.

Others mentioned the issue of study sessions prior to the village council meetings as a source of discontent among voters. People believe the study sessions, held in a small room, are a form of closed government.

The valley farmers' water protest has others upset, as do concerns about the Grindstone reservoir.

Ralph Rush, the original circulator of the petition, said many people who originally signed the petition were angry with the council

and were looking for a recall. He said he has recently heard many more people who will vote for the increased council because they believe a larger council with more input would be better for Ruidoso.

There is also a substantial number of people who plan to vote against the council increase. They do not agree with everything the council has done, but realize it is a difficult job.

"You can't please everyone," said Les Crews, a member of the "coffee board" that meets regularly at Ruidoso State Bank.

Merchant Brunell, who was on the council from 1966 through 1970, said those who are angry with the council members should have to sit on the council to see what is involved in the job.

"There's some pretty sound thinking going on there," said Brunell.

"We've got them. I'm willing to sweat it out until we get some new ones," said Crews.

Merchant Archer Wilson pointed out that two of the councilmen, Don Dale and Benny Coulston, will be up for election in March, regardless of the outcome of November's special election. He believes the size of the council is less important than the quality of the council members.

"I don't know that expanding it will help," said high school teacher Dub Williams.

Many people said it is difficult enough for the council to make a decision with four members, and that adding two more will only make the council meetings longer. Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital administrator Ken Moore thinks a six-member council would create "just a more cumbersome situation."

A majority of the people interviewed said they are going to vote for the council increase. The method of selection was far from scientific and many had not decided how they planned to vote.

Many were very little about the election. A general consensus among those interviewed was that the election has not raised much concern.

"I don't think people are very excited," said high school teacher Gerald Ames.

"The big question is how many people are going to vote," said Barrow.

Ruidoso has just over 2,000 registered voters (approximately 50 have registered to vote since the certification of the petition). An organized block of 100 to 200 voters could make a large difference in the election's outcome. Who organizes what during the next two and a half weeks could make a big difference.

"I just hope people turn out and vote," said Wilson.

# Schools personnel, members of public meet to discuss education

Teachers, along with service club members doubling as parents, met Monday at the middle school as a follow-up to a meeting in July.

In July the group met to discuss a report issued in June by the National Commission on Excellence in Education. The report had given a somewhat stark and even gloomy picture of the state of education in America.

"America is at risk," the report said.

In a newspaper article dated July 7, several school board members and staff talked about the commission's findings. They emphasized the performance of the Ruidoso students and what they felt were strong points of the school system.

They also talked about a stronger bond needed between the community and the school, and though they believed some of the report might not apply to the Ruidoso school system, they were challenged to try to find ways of improving.

Teacher Mickey McGuire made

available a copy of the report, "A Nation At Risk," at the library.

Three months later teachers are optimistic, but they are sorting out how public education in the Ruidoso school system can become better.

Assistant superintendent Mike Gladden said it is obvious there are "lots of things going on in the classrooms. A question asked is, 'When are we going to see the end product?'"

Gladden said much of this year is preoccupied with building a good framework for next year.

Some teachers recently returned from a workshop titled "Blueprint of the '90s" sponsored by the state School Board Association.

McGuire referred to the workshop as he spoke about blaming. "Parents blame teachers—boards blame parents—teachers—boards blame teachers and parents," he said.

McGuire said Florida recently instituted a competency requirement for graduation. "Knowledge is of no value, if it is not retained," he said.

He said the federal attitude on education must be based on a double standard: each person involved in the

educational process must perform as though the entire system depended on him or her.

Kathy Weems reported on the workshop she attended, and stressed the parallel between the economy and education. She said to prepare for and attract high-technology industries "will cost."

## Longer school year?

Do you think the school year should be longer? Days longer or the same? Should a competency test be required of all graduating seniors? How should extra-curricular activities be inserted into the curriculum? Should the curriculum be rewritten?

Teachers and some members of the community met in small groups to discuss these and other issues Monday afternoon.

One group made up of teachers from kindergarten through high school concentrated heavily on attendance problems and questioned the value of social promotions.

A high school teacher said 10 days

absent are excusable during a semester. She said this is often extended and "abused" so a student ends up not being able to graduate.

Lowering the number of days and lowering potential abuse was discussed.

One teacher said, "We really have some parents raising hell when their kids don't graduate because of this."

Teacher Mike Crocker said continuing to give social promotions when students fail will backfire in the future.

"We are going to have lower SAT scores (scores used to test a student's skill level before entering college) and we're going to have people suing us because they can't read," he said.

Middle school principal Textie Cole said, "We have been very concerned about children's emotional development—maybe we need to switch gears."

A strong point made by Cole was that the schools are open to visiting parents whenever they want to visit.

A recurring theme in the group was the necessity of concerned parents working with the teachers. A teacher referred to a father who had been

complaining about the school system, but was unable to name the grade his child was in.

"Can you imagine not knowing what grade your child is in?" Cole asked.

## Questions posed

"Open up your creative minds. Think of ways to answer problems we've talked about. Is it important to continue with the ski program, for example? How can you solve these problems?"

Those were questions posed by superintendent of Schools Sid Miller Monday.

Miller and Mike Gladden led a small panel that wrapped up the workshop on Monday.

Some questions were asked of the panel that came about as a result of the small groups held earlier.

Teacher Jim Dickerson referred to several years ago when the teachers got together to revise the curriculum. "What it involved was a lot of work," said Dickerson.

Gladden said a group of people has

been chosen to form a steering committee to begin revisions in the curriculum. He added that curriculum should be worked for the staff and that it is not intended to be guides and objectives sitting on shelves never used.

Kathy Echols, panel member representing the Altrusa Club, referred to when her daughter attended school in England.

"She had six weeks off in the summer, more small breaks throughout the year, and teachers said they did not have to re-teach material lost over the summer."

Several people commented that quality is still more important than quantity, and one teacher angrily said he would fight longer days.

Over and over a desire to have good public relations between parents, community and schools was emphasized.

"What do you want us to do?" asked Textie Cole, in effect placing the question to business owners, parents, students and all the community: "What do you want changed or improved on in the public school system?"

# Disease cause never determined

More than two months after the initial outbreak of a mysterious gastrointestinal disease in the Ruidoso area, the state Environmental Improvement Division (EID) has not determined its cause and does not hold high hopes of finding one, said EID epidemiologist Jeff Sheyka.

EID did, however, discover violations of water testing procedures and inadequacies in the Upper Canyon water treatment plant during its investigation.

EID has been unable to confirm that the disease was waterborne due to a "very limited number of positive cases," said Sheyka.

EID officials were looking closely at the water after finding a concentration of the disease among Upper Canyon residents and a "very antiquated" water treatment plant supplying that area.

Sheyka said approximately 36 people suffering the disease sent stool samples to state laboratories for testing. Three of those tests came back with positive results for the parasite giardia lamblia while the rest showed no evidence of parasites or bacteria.

Sheyka was unsure if he had complete results from all samples submitted because patients send the samples in themselves and the laboratory will not reveal test results unless a name is given.

He said he plans to obtain a list of all Lincoln County test results next week when he completes a summary report of the investigation.

The parasite giardia, which causes diarrhea, cramps and low fever, is carried primarily in water. It can, however, be carried in a number of other ways, and Sheyka indicated that may be the situation with Ruidoso's cases.

"These are very frustrating things," Sheyka said of epidemiological investigations that produce no conclusive results.

Sheyka said some cases of diarrhea are still showing up in Ruidoso and that test kits are still available to ill people. He said there is a chance that new or undiscovered tests may produce some answers, but he was not optimistic.

In the course of the investigation, EID did discover violations of water testing procedures. Sheyka said the village supplied water more turbid than normally allowed and failed to properly test for turbidity during September.

EID allows a municipality to supply water that registers no more than five turbidity units (NTU) and an average of no more than one NTU during one month. Ruidoso's monthly average for September was 3.28 with readings on September 14 of 27 and 22.

Local EID environmentalist Hari Mukhoty said he believes the water

department shut down the Upper Canyon treatment after finding the very high turbidity readings.

Sheyka said the village also failed to properly test for turbidity. Sheyka said whenever tests reveal high turbidity, the water must be tested again within an hour.

He has sent the village a letter outlining violations.

Sheyka said he will also be working with the village to improve the Upper Canyon treatment plant.

"The principal goal will be to get that plant upgraded," said Sheyka.

He said the plant needs more pretreatment facilities such as sedimentation and coagulation tanks.

He did not say how much those improvements would cost but indicated funds may be available through the Water Supply Construction Act or emergency funding through the Department of Finance and Administration.

"We're putting this on the front burner," said Sheyka of the improvements.

The village has also been in contact with the civil engineering department at New Mexico State University about a possible study of the water supply and giardia.

Sheyka said he plans to meet with area physicians and medical personnel to share information and discuss coordination of possible future epidemiological investigations.

# GOP Women not alone

Yvonne Lanelli of Alto recently returned from the National Federation of Republican Women convention in Louisville, Kentucky. Tuesday she spoke to the Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County at their regular meeting at Gregson's Restaurant.

"We are not alone," said Lanelli, referring to over 100,000 other women who were at the conference.

Lanelli said that Republican Women need to be concerned with the economy, peace and schools.

A primary focus, according to Lanelli, needs to be placed on increasing the number of women in the organization. This focus needs to be directed toward two groups—working women and women with small children.

She cited a statistic that 51 percent of women over age 16 work. Meetings need to start and stop on time and sometimes be scheduled during evenings, she said, to accommodate them. She also said she is working to locate babysitters for children of young mothers, so they can be free to attend the meetings.

Lanelli said she heard minority leader of the Rhode Island State

Senate Lila Sapinsley say that in state legislatures and in the Senate and Congress, there are more women Republicans than Democrats. This, according to Lanelli, is not always supported by the media.

She referred to what Betty Rendel, president of the National Federated Republican Women, called the "media-conceived gender gap." This is not an accurate account of President Reagan's relationship with women, said Lanelli. She noted that though Reagan did not support ERA, he said he would improve the status of women through legislation.

Lanelli referred to startling statistics given her by Rendel. They include that one out of three families headed by women is at the poverty level; that older women face increased poverty as they age, compared to older men; that in the last 20 years the number of women raising children and working has risen 95 percent.

Lanelli added that "Reagan had done the best thing he could for all the economy, including women, when he lowered the inflation rate."

Lanelli referred to Secretary of Transportation Elizabeth Dole as "my favorite person, who received a law degree at Harvard when they were hard to come by."

## Man killed in accident

McFadden suffered back and minor injuries. He was transported to Saint Mary's hospital in Roswell.

## Man guilty of embezzlement

District Attorney Steve Sanders announced this week that a former employee of Ruidoso Downs Race Track was found guilty of embezzling in a jury trial Friday in District Court.

Sanders said Steven Holmquest, 25, of Ruidoso Downs and Colorado, was charged with embezzling in excess of \$14,000 in pari-mutuel tickets from the racetrack on July 2, 1982. Holmquest was a pari-mutuel ticket clerk, Sanders said.

After deliberating for an hour and a half, the jury found Holmquest guilty of embezzlement over \$2,500. The of-

fense is a third degree felony, punishable by three years in the state penitentiary and a fine of \$10,000. Sentencing will be at a later date.

Sanders said the pari-mutuel tickets were run up on the favorite in a race, Go For Bugs, and that the horse finished fourth. Track security personnel and James Jennings of the State Police were involved in the investigation, said Sanders.

"I think this is an important case from the standpoint my office has taken a very active role concerning allegations of illegalities at the track," said Sanders.

The Raiders' defense is still tough, and it has one of the better offenses in the league despite some erratic performances by quarterback Jim Plunkett.


San Francisco is 5-2 and staged a strong second-half comeback to beat New Orleans Sunday.

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
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
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
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
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
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# Willard a busy man in Ruidoso sports circles

You can see him at almost any sports activity in Ruidoso. He could be giving instructions to a Little League football player, hitting the ball in a softball game, or playing and coaching basketball.

"I've got the best of both worlds," said Dr. Lynn Willard. "I'm working in my chosen profession, and getting time to play and coach sports."

Willard, a veterinarian who runs the Ruidoso Animal Clinic, has been involved in sports since he was a youth on a Kansas farm.

"I got involved in sports early because it was a good way to get out of work on the farm," Willard laughed. "My younger brother and I went to a small school."

Willard played basketball and track in the seventh and eighth grades and baseball in the eighth grade. At Madison High School (a school of about 120 students), he played football, baseball, basketball and track before graduating in 1963.

"It's hard to say which sport is my favorite," Willard said. "I guess it depends which season it is. When softball season comes around, I can't wait to get started. Basketball and football the same way. My high school coaches felt my best sport was baseball."

Willard was offered an athletic scholarship to the College of Emporia in Kansas. However, it was a liberal

arts college and Willard wanted to be a veterinarian, so he went to Kansas State University.

He didn't get an athletic scholarship to Kansas State, so he played for the football and baseball teams as a walk-on. Willard was a quarterback on the football team and a first baseman in baseball.

"I only played one year because I found it hard to split time between school and sports," he said. "I wanted to concentrate on my studies and on becoming a veterinarian. I played intermural sports the rest of the time in college."

After graduating from Kansas State, Willard spent two years in the Air Force as a veterinarian officer. He dealt mainly with public health while stationed at Kirtland Air Force Base in Albuquerque.

While stationed in the Duke City, Willard got his start with coaching Little League sports. He coached a Little League football team that was made up of youths from the airbase and the southern part of Albuquerque. He also coached Little League baseball.

"We weren't supposed to do very well that year," Willard remarked about his first Little League football team. "But we went out and won three games, lost none and tied three. Another team which had less ties won the championship."

Willard then lived in Roswell for two years, coaching Little League

football. He moved to Ruidoso in 1973 and started the animal clinic.

Since then, he has been very active in coaching youths sports and playing adult sports.

He has been a member of the Blues softball team of the Ruidoso Men's Fast-Pitch Softball Association for several years. He has also played on the Cobras adult basketball team, which competes in an Alamogordo league.

The Blues have won the league title several years in a row. The Cobras won the Alamogordo title in 1978 with a 16-0 record.

Willard has coached Little League football and basketball in Ruidoso. He started coaching basketball in 1974, quit in 1977, and started again in 1979.

In Little League football, Willard started with the Broncos before becoming an assistant coach with the Colts four years ago.

"We had a lot of good players on the Broncos," he said. "Lon and Don Nunley (former Ruidoso High School stars) played for me, as well as Ric Pearson and David Swalander."

"One year while the Nunleys were playing for me, another player named Brent Jacques left our team and moved to Roswell. He went on to make all-state and got a scholarship to the NMMI (New Mexico Military Institute) junior college."

Willard didn't win a title with the Broncos but had several good teams. The Colts have won the championship every year since the Little League

program was started. The Broncos took second behind the Colts in 1976.

But with the Colts, Willard has enjoyed championships. Last year's championship was especially satisfying to him.

Willard's two sons, Lance, 13, and Cody, 11, and his daughter, Lindsay, six, are also active in sports.

Lance, currently a running back and linebacker on the White Mountain Middle School football team, also played Little League football, basketball, baseball and soccer. He was a member of the Ruidoso Little League baseball all-stars in 1982.

Cody has played Little League football, basketball and soccer. Lindsay also plays soccer.

With his veterinary business, how does Willard have time for sports? "I sleep every night from about 11 to 6 in the morning," he laughed. "The rest of the time I'm pretty busy. 'Sometimes when I get ready to play or coach a game, I get a call and I have to work on an animal.'"

How much longer does Willard plan to coach? "I don't know, probably until my kids stop playing Little League sports," he said. "I still like to play softball, winning a championship helps."

"I play basketball now mainly to stay in shape."

Until he quits, Lynn Willard will be a familiar figure on the sports fields of Ruidoso.





## Editorial

A lot has been written and said about the proposal to establish a federal holiday in honor of the late Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

The major opponent of the proposal in the U.S. Senate, Republican Jesse Helms of North Carolina, has been accused of running a "smear campaign" to block the King's birthday holiday.

Others have made the point that there are other black figures more appropriate to honor than King.

This seems doubtful. There indeed may be others whose lives would stand up better to the scrutiny to which Helms and his cohorts are determined to subject King. But none did more to advance the cause of civil rights for his people.

Of course, there is the question of whether another federal holiday is needed at all. It seems like no one but federal, state and bank employees get to take the day off on most of those holidays, and some have been so unkind to suggest that federal and state government function best on holidays.

At any rate, if any black leader merits a holiday to commemorate his birthday, it is Dr. King.

Perhaps a movement will start to honor one of the great Indian leaders in the same way. After all, weren't they fighting for the civil rights of their people?—TP

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—If education is going to be the big issue during the coming legislative session, we ought to know more about it.

One set of figures is very clear: what it costs us.

Of the state's present annual budget of \$1.228 billion, almost 70 percent goes for public schools and higher education. Rounded off, these are the figures which make up that total: for public schools, \$618 million; for higher education, \$191 million; and for vocational education, \$18 million.

All the rest of state government gets only \$400 million, less than half of what goes to education.

What we need, however, is some better figures on what that money is used for.

There are two sources of data on that topic, the Office of Education and the State Department of Education. (The former of those two used to be called the Public School Finance Division till recently, when its name was changed.)

Both groups collect information about the schools. Unfortunately, their figures do not always match.

There is probably also considerable overlap in the effort to compile the data, which could be avoided if we gathered all the information into a single source.

For instance, the Office of Education says the average teacher in the 1981-1982 school year was paid \$18,888. That's not what the Department of Education believes. Their figures show an annual salary for teachers of \$18,510 for the same scholastic year. That's a difference of \$378, which may not seem very significant. When it is multiplied by the 12,157 teachers we think we had that year, however, it comes to a total disagreement between the two operations of \$2,139,632.

That isn't peanuts.

And there is even a disagreement between the two on how many teachers we actually have. The State Department of Education asks principals to tell them the number of such people they employ, and the Office of Education gets its figures from school

fiscal officers. To complicate the problem further, the two sets of headcounts are taken at different times in the school year.

And here's a footnote to all that information: The Office of Education, which is solely in charge of distributing all those dollars (the Department of Education has nothing to do with that) has exactly one computer person on its staff.

That would appear to be considerably less than needed for what is essentially a bookkeeping operation, which can be done better by computers than by unaided human minds.

The Office of Education, which is anxious to gobble up the State Department of Education, may tell you these facts, compiled by the Legislative Education Study Committee staff, are proof that the two major agencies should be combined into one—and that the one, of course, should be placed directly under the power of the Governor.

A simpler conclusion, which would not require a change in the constitution, as the previous suggestion would, might simply be that the two already existing agencies should cooperate in the area of data collection.

That seems to be what the Education Study Committee is likely to recommend.

Representatives of both the present sets of fact-gatherers, along with the Board of Educational Finance, which oversees higher education, appear to agree that some sort of council should be created to study how to set up such a combined system.

Uniformity and consistency are what we should be looking for.

It's too bad we haven't had that up to now, because we need very much to compare the past with the present as we project the future.

Such an effort should not be too much to ask for from the people who consume so much of the state's substance. We're sure they will report "hard" and exact figures if we ask them all to do so.

### THE FORCE OF NUMBERS!

During the past several weeks I have talked to many people concerning their thoughts on our new proposed "RESIDENTIAL MAIL DELIVERY."

With minor exceptions the vast majority are upset by the Post Office installation of "Cluster" boxes which are passed off as residential service.

Residential mail delivery means just what it says—that all mail, including letters of all sizes, packages, catalogues and other mailings including the handling of registered and certified letters will be handled at a box installed at the residence—not down the street or up the hill around the corner.

There are some basic reasons for disliking the Post Office plan and here are a few of them:

1. The original plan was to furnish residential mail delivery to those who would, in turn, give up their post office box and thereby eliminate the need for more post office boxes.

2. Since the cluster boxes won't hold all sizes of mail many people feel that they must make a trip to the Post Office anyway—so they retain the Post Office box.

3. When the Post Office furnishes a cluster box and if you refuse to use it would rather retain the Post Office box the rates are being increased up to 300%±. You are not given the choice of which box to use.

4. Local businessmen say that the cluster boxes are not satisfactory—too small—they don't want to give up post office box numbers they have used for many years which is known to suppliers. Also would require new printing of forms which bear cluster box numbers.

5. Cluster boxes which are being installed with little regard to safety from auto traffic. The side open to the home owner is on the back side from the street and in many cases the home owner must stand in a ditch to open his side of the box.

I feel sure that our winter weather will open up new areas for complaints, however, after the installation is completed, it is doubtful that the Post Office will make any effort to correct the obvious mistakes they are now making.

How do you—the Public—feel about this situation? It is not enough to read letters like this one—agree—and then go on to something else. If you are unhappy with what the Post Office is doing—please let me know. My Post Office Box number is DRAWER 2244—Ruidoso, or you may call me at 257-7615 and I will be happy to talk to you and get your input.

I think we have a serious situation here and one which will cause many problems over years to come.

It is up to us if we want to do something to remedy the situation.

## Reporter's Round

Several months ago while working on a story for a health paper, I was fortunate to meet a second cousin for the first time. We had a lot in common.

What I remember mostly about our breakfast meeting was the intensity with which she talked about what she was doing. She was involved in the groundwork of the "The Chemical People"—a national public broadcast hosted by Nancy Reagan November 2 and 9.

"I want every community in Minnesota talking about chemicals during those broadcasts," she said. She was very serious when she said, "I think it can make a difference in people's lives."

Since then, I've moved about 1,400 miles away, the first broadcast is about three weeks away and I am in a position to report about it again.

But this time, I'm finding it difficult to talk to someone who talks about the broadcast as if it has some potential for benefiting lives. Oh, there are people who are interested, but I sense a detachment.

Some facts:  
 •The single leading cause of death among 15- to 24-year-olds is drunk driving.

•Roughly two-thirds of all Americans try an illicit drug before they finish high school.

•One in 16 high school seniors smoke marijuana daily.

•Over one-third have illicitly used drugs other than marijuana.

•34 per cent of high school seniors regularly abuse drugs.

•About one in 16 drinks alcohol daily; 41 percent regularly abuse alcohol, with most of them starting chemical use between the ages of 11 and 14.

While the use of many illicit drugs is declining from peak levels attained in the '70s, substance abuse in America is the highest of any developed country in the world.

These statistics come from the Public Health Service, National Center for Health Statistics, and the University of Michigan Institute of Social Research for the National Institute on Drug Abuse.

One of the points in a pamphlet I have is that often people think of these problems occurring in neighborhoods other than their own. It continues to say that the problem belongs to each and all of us, thus eliminating the "pointing of fingers."

What can you, one person, do?

First of all, know that it exists.

On November 2 and 9 public television will broadcast "The Chemical People," a two-part series designed to bring concerned parents and citizens together and offer guidelines for helping our young people. It is hosted by Nancy Reagan, and has the participation of over 30 national organizations and nearly 300 local PBS stations all across the country.

Following the broadcast other communities plan to have town meetings, in which local judges, police, teachers, counselors and teens will discuss the local situation.

Everyone will be invited to watch program two, when a community task force will be organized. This will show how other parents, schools and neighbors are fighting drugs, and what a task force does.

Secondly, you can contact and pressure local officials. Key people include:

•Lincoln County Alcoholism Association, director Ray Hayhurst, 378-8030. When I called him, he had never heard of The Chemical People.

•Ruidoso Downs Police, 378-4421: Chief Charles Robinson sounded very interested and called the number for more information from the national office.

•Ruidoso Police, 257-7365. Ask for Chief Swenor.

•Woman's Club, 257-2309: President Genevieve Duncan has shown interest and has voiced sadness that so far no town meetings are organized in this area.

•Schools: Mickey McGuire, 378-4151, said his number can be used and he is interested.

It seems there is enough interest but no one is taking the lead in pulling everyone together.

Awareness and action now can prevent problems later. A few weeks ago the state Health and Environment Department in Santa Fe announced funding would be available to La Placita, a halfway house for boys, to treat drug abuse.

The article said it is needed because 60 to 80 percent of the boys sent to La Placita are drug abusers, according to the director.

It goes further to say that alcohol is the biggest problem, followed by marijuana and paint.

## Painted Lady to offer shops, personal hotel

It was an unbeatable day on the slopes—blue cloudless skies and run after run through feather-light powder. As you pull into your hotel parking space, you feel how tired you really are.

A hotel attendant is at the trunk of your car almost before it stops rolling. He removes your ski equipment while inquiring about your day of skiing. The attendant walks with you to the main entrance of the hotel, cornerstone of the Painted Lady Square.

Downhill to your right as you approach the hotel runs a line of five

shops housed in Italianate, Stick-Eastlake and Queen Anne-styled two-story buildings. You hear the rushing waters of the nearby river down the street.

Along the main street to your left on the ground floor of the hotel is an outdoor sidewalk cafe. Waitresses in brightly colored outfits buzz from table to table in the fading evening light. Sounds from a jazz band playing its first number filter out to the street.

As you enter the hotel, your ski gear is stored in a nearby closet. Overnight, the equipment will be cleaned and readied for the next day of skiing. The desk attendant hands you a list of messages and inquiries of your day, calling you by name.

A short elevator ride up the three-story hotel takes you to your suite. A rush of heated air from the pre-lit fireplace warms your face as the door opens. A bottle of your favorite brandy sits on an end table near the balcony. The attendant takes and hangs up your ski jacket, and asks you what time you will be ready for breakfast in bed tomorrow morning. He leaves as another attendant wheels in a light dinner featuring your favorite entree and pastry

dessert. You ease into the jacuzzi and the swirling waters start working those ski aches away.

The Painted Lady Square is the brainchild of three Ruidoso residents: Gary and Melinda Hall, part owners, and Tommy Morel, future general manager, president and part owner. Plans for the \$2 million-plus project are nearing completion, according to Morel, and construction will begin in mid-January 1984. The Square, to be built at the site of the former Chris's Lounge on Sudderth Drive, will consist of an eight-room hotel adjoined by five shops.

The hotel rooms will be furnished at a luxury level, according to Morel, with approximately \$15,000 going to each room's furnishings alone. The rooms will rent for \$125-135 a night, Morel said, and some discount will be allowed for yearly off periods. The hotel will also feature Ruidoso's first commercial elevator.

Downstairs, the hotel will have a bar, lobby and live entertainment area that will feature mainstream jazz, piano and comedy acts. Facing Sudderth Drive will be an outdoor cafe serving breakfast and lunch, and featuring telephones at each table. "People are going back to that 'homey' feeling," Morel said, "and

for us, it will be like having guests in our own homes. We know what people are looking for, it's personalized service.

"This kind of thing is working all across the country," he added.

According to Gary Hall, "We're going to have on computer the guest's name, his wife's name, their birthdays, their favorite drinks ... everything will be on the computer. That way, we'll know in advance

when their birthday is, so we can send them a card, and we'll know if they would prefer to have the fireplace lit when they check in. The emphasis is on personalized service."


The hotel will have a solar hot water system, a sound engineering-designed entertainment center, and fire protection systems including two fire escapes, a sprinkler system and smoke alarms, said Hall. The hotel will employ 25-30 people, he added.

The Painted Lady Square was designed by a team of Rex Skellett and Al McChesney, the architect on the project. According to Morel, the shops will be leased to independent shopowners. Construction on the shops is expected to be complete June 1, 1984; and the hotel's expected completion date will be in October or November 1984, added Morel. The entire structure will be handicapped-accessible, he said.



Guest balconies on the two upper levels of the \$2 million-plus Painted Lady project will overlook the outdoor sidewalk cafe. Surrounding the street sides of the building will be a simulated cobblestone sidewalk. Construction on the project is expected to begin in January 1984.



## Savannah Swinger Winner

Six Doubles (Number 8) lunges ahead on the final jump to score a nose victory in Sunday's first leg of the Savannah Swinger Series at Sunland Park. Casey Lambert is up. Six Doubles beat out heavily favored Maskeo Lady and earned \$5,955 in the 350-yard powerburst.

## Six Doubles takes Savannah No. 1

Six Doubles broke a little sluggishly in Sunday's first leg of the Savannah Swinger Series at Sunland Park. But the four-year-old ended the 350-yard spin with a high-powered rush and pulled out a nose victory. The duel carried a total purse of \$9,925 and put \$5,955 into Six Doubles' account. The winning owner is LeRoy Spires Jr. of Snyder, Texas.

W.A. Cochran of Odessa, Texas. It was a closely bunched finish, with the top four horses separated by about a half length. Six Doubles held that tissue-thin margin over Maskeo Lady, who was only a neck in front of the third-place finisher, Big Bad Boz (nearly 8-1). The latter was only a nose in front of the fourth-place horse, Sugars Hulk.

Quarter Horse Handicap at Albuquerque, a 440-yard struggle. In Sunday's outing, Six Doubles appeared to lose all chance when he broke in fifth place and found himself a good two lengths away from the front-running Maskeo Lady. The latter, full of run in the early stages, was beginning to fade when she neared the wire.

Maskeo Lady, a 3-5 favorite, was in the thick of things from the start and appeared to have matters wrapped up when she reached the final strides. Six Doubles snared the win with a mighty jump as he hit the wire. Casey Lambert was up in a 118-pound lead. Casey's pop, Cliff Lambert Sr., trained Six Doubles.

Here's the way the mutuel payoffs went: Six Doubles, \$9.60, \$3, \$2.60; Maskeo Lady, \$3.20, \$2.40; Big Bad Boz, \$3.40. Maskeo Lady and Six Doubles constituted a popular combination in the quinela, so the payoff was a modest \$9.80.

The winning time (with no wind) was a snappy 17.89 seconds. The victory slice of the Savannah Swinger purse hiked Six Doubles' 1983 bank account up to \$14,725. His record for the year is now 2-2-2 from 14 starts.

Although Six Doubles has been campaigning against first-class competition, Sunland patrons may have felt the 350-yard distance wasn't to his liking. In his previous outing, he'd gotten in a close fifth in the State Fair

Sunday's program was also sparked by Ethels Physique, a filly who won the 400-yard seventh race by a length and handed out a hefty \$173 on a \$2 win ticket. Kevin Scholl was aboard.

## Pop's Spirit easy winner at Sunland

Pop's Spirit, the 1982 three-year-old champ at Ruidoso Downs, made his first appearance at Sunland Park as a four-year-old and easily won the feature event.

The six and one half furlong sprint, which carried a \$15,000 claiming price kicked off Sunland's 25th year of racing. The 1983-84 season covers 90 race days through May 13.

Pop's Spirit was hustled into an early lead by jockey Casey Lambert in Saturday's topper and stayed in control all the way. Platoon Star tried his best to overtake Pop's Spirit throughout the early portions of the sprint, but had to throw in the towel in the stretch.

Pop's Spirit hit the wire with a one and one half length lead over the fading Platoon Star and returned \$6 70 to \$3 and \$2.40. Pop's Spirit earned

\$1,920 out of the \$3,200 purse, and that lifted his 1983 money line to \$13,923. Last year, he earned \$28,298.

Backers of Platoon Star collected \$3.20, \$2.80. The onrushing Refresh returned a \$3 show price.

Saturday's program also included three 400-yard trials for the \$22,359 Shue Fly. The qualifiers: Lil Motor Scooter, 19:96; The Good Ship, 20:19; Superbludady, 20:24; Venice, 20:31; Pony Rod, 20:33; Waywards Way, 20:41; Scout Baby, 20:42; Feature Tru, 20:48; So Im It, 20:56; Easy Goin Elvira, 20:58.

Saturday's opening-day card was viewed by an excellent 3,953 patrons who bet a strong \$370,398 — despite the fact a starting gate malfunction cancelled the first race and daily double pools.

## Trainer Bob Arnett keeps on keepin' on

Even after all these years, winning is never dull for Bob Arnett.

"The feeling of accomplishment is still there," said Sunland Park's all-time winning horse trainer. "It's just like a victory in a football game. I don't think that feeling will ever leave, but when I don't get that feeling after winning, then I think I should leave."

Arnett has received "that winning feeling" more than any trainer who has ever raced at Sunland Park or the state of New Mexico. Arnett and his wife, Wilma, figured he has visited Sunland Park winner's circle nearly 1,500 times since the track opened in 1959.

Arnett hoped to achieve that magic 1,500 number shortly after the 25th anniversary season began Saturday at the west El Paso track. Opening weekend included Saturday and Sunday programs, with Friday, Saturday and Sunday each weekend through Sunday, May 13.

The 50-year-old trainer has been at Sunland Park every year except one. He received his first trainer's license at age 18 at Tucson and has been conditioning horses for 32 years, follow-

ing in his parents' footsteps.

But things have changed at Sunland Park since it started back in the '50s.

"I've seen it grow from year to year. The handle has increased and I've seen improvements with the racetrack and the grandstand. But one thing has really changed," he said. "Before a person could have two or three cheap horses and make some money. Now it takes a little more backing than it used to. Then we had \$1,000 claimers at the bottom level. Now, it's \$2,500. You've got to have better horses to make it. The competition is much greater for better horses."

Still, Arnett would like to see Sunland Park continue to prosper.

"I'd like to see Sunland Park get a better attendance and handle and better purses. It will happen in the near future. But the public gets to see better racing, better trainers and better horses in the winter at Sunland Park than in the summer."

"The competition is tremendous and the public really benefits in the winter, but it's tougher on the trainers to survive," Arnett explained. "At Sunland, all the top trainers from La Mesa Park, the Downs at Santa Fe and Ruidoso Downs are here. You're

competing with the better trainers from all those tracks in New Mexico. In the summer, everyone's split up. It makes it that much tougher to win at Sunland Park."

Nevertheless, Arnett has accomplished training feats no one may ever match at Sunland Park. His best season was in 1974-75 when he won 75 races, and he gathered 64 triumphs in the 1975-76 campaign.

He's annually among the top ten trainers at Sunland Park. Last season, Arnett placed sixth with 29 victories, 37 seconds and 24 thirds from 195 starts for a .1149 winning percentage.

Arnett will have a full stable this season at Sunland Park, including several top thoroughbreds and quarter horses.

Heading the thoroughbred contingent will be Scots Sissy, a four-year-old Native John colt, who was named Sunland Park's most improved horse last season.

Other top runners include Handy Dandy, a six-year-old Loom gelding who won three races last spring at Sunland Park; Stash It, Zoom Corporation and Ho Chi's Star.

Facing the quarter horse group will be Make Or Break, a five-year-old

Tiny's Gay gelding, who has captured five races this year. He won four contests this summer at Ruidoso Downs and then triumphed at the New Mexico State Fair at Albuquerque.

Arnett will also have Bold Tiny, a four-year-old Tiny Charger gelding, and Via Moon, an eight-year-old Top Moon gelding who specializes at 870-yard races.

After such a distinguished career, Arnett admits at times, he considers turning his stable over to his competent and able son, Jon, who is one of the finest younger trainers in the Southwest.

"I don't know how long I'll keep training. Really you think you want to let up and take it easier. But when it's something you like to do, it doesn't get that boring. When you do something you like, the time passes fast and you don't mind it all."

"I'm looking forward to the new season. I'm getting ready again and hoping for another good year. Each year, I say I'm going to kind of let up, but at the start of each season, I'm so anxious to start," he said.

It's that type of enthusiastic attitude that has made Bob Arnett a consistent winner for 32 years in the training business.

## Sunland Park Hoofbeats

Lil Motor Scooter turned in a fine performance during Saturday's three trial races for the Shue Fly Stakes. The race, set for 400 yards on Friday, October 28, will provide the winner with \$11,179.81 from the total purse of \$22,359.61. It's designed for two-year-old New Mexico-bred quarter horses.

Lil Motor Scooter tallied a frontrunning win by almost two lengths in the first trial heat in a 19:96, the fastest of the 22 trial hopefuls. The Jet Oh colt won his third race in the last four outings for owner-trainer Bob V. Ballard Jr. of Carlsbad. Lil Motor Scooter had taken third in the prestigious New Mexico Futurity on September 21 at the New Mexico State Fair meeting in Albuquerque. Overall, it was the colt's fourth triumph with three thirds from eight trips this season. O.A. Martinez Jr. rode him in his trial effort.

The Good Ship, second to Lil Motor Scooter had the second-fastest clocking with a 20:19. The Gray Ship gelding is trained by L. LaRae Lovell for owners Richard B. and Sharon

Swallows of Albuquerque. Gary Sumpter was aboard. The biggest moneymaker among the 10 finalists will be Superbludady, a Liberty Jet Line filly who tallied a third-best reading. Ridden by Kevin Cogburn, the filly is owned by the T & R Racing Stables of Las Cruces and is trained by Marsha J. Massengale. It was her eighth victory (the most of any Shue Fly finalist) with three seconds in 15 appearances. The \$1,200 winner's share from her trial race boosted Superbludady's career earnings to \$40,904.

It is a toll-free call only from the El Paso metropolitan area.

Trainer Clifford C. Lambert Sr. who won last season's Sunland Park trainer championship, began the season in great fashion. He combined with son, rider Casey Lambert, to capture three races on Saturday's

opening day program. The Lamberts began their efforts in the seventh race with Holy Mackrel (\$12.20) for owner Glenna Lambert, Cliff's wife and Casey's mother; then took the ninth with Smooth Wind (\$7.20) for owner Troy A. McCarty of Midland, Texas, and then closed by taking the featured eleventh aboard Pop's Spirit (\$8.20) for the Double B Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico.

Pop's Spirit who was named Ruidoso Downs' top three-year-old colt or gelding in 1982, returned to his old form by scoring an impressive one and one half length victory in Saturday's featured event at six and one half furlongs. The four-year-old Red Viking gelding led throughout under jockey Casey Lambert and set fractions 22-1-5 for the quarter-mile, 45-1-5 for the half-mile, ran the six furlongs in 1:11 1-5, and completed the distance in 1:18 3-5. Pop's Spirit won

his second consecutive race after winning at the New Mexico State Fair on closing day (September 25) against \$10,000 claimers going one mile. Pop's Spirit is trainer by Clifford C. Lambert Sr. for the Double B Ranch.

Correct handicappers of the season's first trifecta were extremely happy after Saturday's eighth race.

The 6-10-2 combination returned \$10,630 one of the highest payoffs since trifecta wagering was introduced to Sunland Park in the fall of 1982.

Royal Lately, ridden by apprentice Duane Sterling, tallied a two and one half length victory at odds of \$28.20-1 for \$58.40 payoff. Solim Roy, a \$5.20-1 third wagering choice under Gary Sumpter ran second, while Duke Of Balsamo, an \$8.80-1 fifth wagering favorite under Dale Cordova, was third. The highest trifecta payoff ever at Sunland Park was \$15,386 payoff on

January 1, 1983 when Amadivista, Crowvista and Hi Wan were the first three finishers.

Jockey Harla Webb rode both halves of the daily double winners on Sunday's program. She started in the first race with favored Dragon Tracks (\$5.20) for trainer Billy H. Hitt and owner Billy H. And Myrtle W. Hitt of El Paso. She then captured the second race on Lotta Coins (\$19.60) for trainer Johnnie L. Jamison, who owns the four-year-old Full Pocket gelding with Wood B. Craig of Sunray, Texas.

Trainer Clifton Dean and owner Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas had two winners on Sunday's program. They took the fifth with Shecky Who (\$5.00) over 870 yards and then won the tenth with Irish Antics (\$17.40) at six furlongs. Salustio Burgos rode Shecky Who while O.A. Martinez Jr. was aboard Irish Antics.

## Who are the Air Force Thunderbirds?

You hear a lot about the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds, Tactical Air Command's famous air demonstration squadron. We know they're going to perform at Holloman's Open House October 29. We know they always put on a fantastic show, but who are these men?

In 30 years only 149 officers have joined the ranks of the Thunderbirds since selection is an honor accorded few. These officers have proven themselves to be dedicated professionals who have constantly employed their training, natural talents and desire to excel at their profession, ahead of other goals.

Currently 11 officers are assigned to the team, and with the Air Force officer corps numbering more than 100,000, competition to become a Thunderbird officer is keen. Thunderbird flying officers normally serve a two-year tour, with the exception of the narrator who serves three years. Usually close to one-half of the team changes each year to ensure a smooth transition.

### Thunderbird Commander

Major Jim Latham of Shawnee Mission, Kansas, is the commander of the Thunderbirds for the 1983 season, and he flies the number one aircraft during air demonstrations. Major Latham has logged more than 3,200 flying hours, including 778 combat hours and 323 combat missions during the Vietnam War. In October 1972, five months into his second combat tour, he was shot down while on an F-4 combat mission over North Vietnam and interned as a prisoner of war until March 1973. This is Major Latham's second assignment with the Thunderbirds. As right wingman, he flew 148 air demonstrations in the T-38A Talon during 1978-1980.

Captain Steven R. Chealander flies the number two aircraft as the left wing pilot in the Thunderbird diamond formation. The Bakersfield, California, native and University of Southern California graduate entered the Air Force in February 1974. He joined the Thunderbirds in 1981 after assignments in which he flew the F-4 Phantom and F-16.

Captain Wayne K. Holum is the right wingman, flying the number three aircraft in the diamond formation. It is his first year as a Thunderbird. A Twin Valley, Minnesota, native and 1973 U.S. Air Force Academy graduate, he had 12 actual

intercepts of Soviet TU-95 Bear bombers during a tour of duty at Keflavik Air Base, Iceland. He was an F-16 instructor pilot at Hill AFB, Utah, before joining the Thunderbirds.

Major Lawrence Stellmon flies the number four slot. It's his first year as a Thunderbird. A native of Hot Springs, Montana, he is a 1969 graduate of the Air Force Academy. He served a year in Southeast Asia flying the F-4D and F-4E Phantom aircraft. Before joining the team, he flew F-4 and F-16 aircraft at Hill AFB, Utah, and then spent a year as the F-16 program manager at TAC headquarters.

### Lead Solo

Major Schumpert C. "Hoss" Jones flies the number five aircraft as the Thunderbird lead solo pilot. A native of Ruston, Louisiana, he has, during his Air Force career, served as a military assistant to the assistant secretary of the Air Force for Manpower, Reserve Affairs and Installations. Before joining the Thunderbirds in October 1981, he was an F-16 instructor pilot at MacDill AFB, Florida.

Captain John R. Bostick flies the number six aircraft as the Thunderbird opposing solo flight. During a tour at George AFB, California, the Water Valley, Kentucky, native was a fighter weapons instructor pilot, instructing German pilots in F-4 tactics. At the time of his selection to the Thunderbirds in June 1982, he was chief of F-15 Weapons and Tactics with the 58th Tactical Fighter Squadron at Eglin AFB, Florida.

Other Thunderbird pilots and officers include Major Bob Fleer, the number seven pilot and the team's logistics officer; Captain Howard Altarian, the number eight pilot and narrator; Major Brian L. Haugen, team executive officer; First Lieutenant Dan Cooley, maintenance officer; and Captain Jerry Thomas, Thunderbird public affairs officer.

Come out to Holloman's Open House October 29 and watch the Thunderbirds perform in their new F-16 Fighting Falcons, along with other exciting demonstrations, displays, entertainment and food. Gates open to the public at 11 a.m., and there is no admission charge. Activities will continue until 4 p.m.

FRY: 1 1/2 pounds chopped pork with 3 T. flour for 1/2 hour.

ADD: 2-3 medium potatoes cut into small pieces  
1-2 cloves (pressed or chopped)  
4 2-ounce mushrooms (reserve juice)  
1/2 tsp. salt

Measure juice of the mushrooms in cup and add water to make 2 cups. Let simmer until meat and potatoes are done.

Add: 8-10 chiles chopped which have been roasted and peller.

Let simmer 5-10 minutes more. Remove from stove.

2 cups refried beans

Taco sauce to taste (or make your own red chile salsa from red chile pods:  
1 dozen red chile pods, cumin, pinch oregano, pinch garlic, 1 clove, 1 tsp. salt.)

1 cup sour cream  
Shredded lettuce  
1 chopped tomato  
Shredded cheddar cheese  
Ripe olives, sliced  
Tortilla chips (home-made ones are nice.)

In bowl mix refried beans, green chiles and taco seasoning. Spread mixture in serving bowl. Blend avocado, lemon juice and taco sauce till smooth, spread over refried bean mixture. Top with sour cream and sprinkle lettuce, tomato, olives and cheese. Serve with tortilla chips.

### 1983 NEW MEXICO STATE FAIR BEST NON-MEAT CHILE CASSEROLE "GREEN VEGIE FRITATTA"

2 T. butter  
1 bunch green onions, diced  
1/2 cup chopped green chiles  
1 jar (5 ounce) marinated artichokes, chopped  
1 medium zucchini, sliced  
3/4 cup mushrooms, sliced  
1/2 cup spinach, chopped  
2 cups cheddar cheese, grated  
9 eggs  
1/4 cup parsley  
Pinch thyme and oregano  
Salt and pepper to taste

Saute onions, zucchini and mushrooms in butter and oil drained from artichoke jar. Beat eggs, blend in cheese and seasonings. Fold in drained cooked vegetables, artichokes, chiles and spinach. Pour into quiche pan and bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

### 1983 NEW MEXICO STATE FAIR BEST MEAT CHILE CASSEROLE

"CHICKEN CHILI QUICHE" by Ann Hillmeyer of Albuquerque

1 unbaked pastry shell (9 inch)  
1 cup chopped cooked chicken  
1 cup shredded longhorn and Monterey Jack cheese (1/2 & 1/2)  
1/2 cup chopped green chile  
1/4 cup finely chopped onion  
2 eggs, lightly beaten  
3/4 cup mayonaise  
3/4 tsp. parsley  
3/4 cup milk  
1/2 tsp. oregano leaves  
1/8 tsp. pepper  
1/4 tsp. garlic

Pierce pastry shell thoroughly with fork. Bake in 375 degree oven for ten minutes. Remove. In large bowl, toss together chicken, cheese and onion; spoon into pastry shell. In small bowl stir together eggs, mayonaise, milk, oregano, garlic and pepper until smooth. Pour over chicken mixture. Sprinkle finely chopped fresh parsley and paprika over all before baking. Bake in 350 degree oven 40 minutes or until golden and knife inserted in center comes out clean.

The prize-winning homemade candy on display at the New Mexico State Fair may make your mouth water to see it, but if you'd like to try some yourself, here are some of the top winner's recipes:

### 1983 NEW MEXICO STATE FAIR

First Place Peanut Brittle

by Helen McCauley, Albuquerque

3 cups sugar  
2 cups water  
1 cup white Karo syrup

1 pound raw Spanish peanuts  
1/4 pound butter  
2 tsp. soda

Combine sugar, water and white Karo syrup in a 3 quart heavy sauce pan; mix well until sugar dissolves. Cook over medium high heat until mixture reaches 230 degrees. (Do not stir)

When mixture reaches 230 degrees add peanuts and butter and stir constantly with a WOODEN SPOON until mixture reaches 300 degrees. Remove

from heat. Add soda, stir well to blend. STIR FAST as mixture will foam. Pour out on a heavy buttered formica counter top.

Spread as thin as possible with wooden spoon. As soon as brittle is cool enough so that you can work it, start at edge, lift up and pull to stretch as thin as possible. Continue

pulling from inner edge until all brittle is stretched. Break off and place on wax paper to cool. (The temperature on this recipe is for Albuquerque altitude.)

First Place Peanut Butter Fudge

by Mrs. J.C. (Adele) Stuhmann, Albuquerque

2 cups sugar  
1/2 cup corn syrup  
1/2 cup water  
1/2 cup peanut butter

1/4 tsp. salt  
1 T. vinegar  
2 T. evaporated milk

Combine sugar, syrup, water, salt, vinegar, butter and milk. Cook over medium heat stirring constantly, un-

til mixture boils. Continue cooking, stirring occasionally, until soft ball stage, 238° F. Remove from heat; add peanut butter. Do not stir. Let Cool. Beat until mixture thickens and loses its gloss. Pour into greased plate.

First Place Pralines

by William Baker, Albuquerque

1 1-pound box light brown sugar  
1/8 tsp. salt  
1/4 cup evaporated milk  
1 T. butter  
2 cups pecan halves

Mix the brown sugar, salt, evaporated milk and butter in a 2-quart saucepan. Cook and stir over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Add pecans and cook over medium heat to soft-ball stage or to 234 degrees on candy thermometer, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and cool for five minutes. Stir rapidly until mixture is thickened. Drop rapidly from a tablespoon onto aluminum foil

or a lightly greased baking sheet to form patties. Stir in several drops of hot water if candy becomes too stiff to handle easily. Let stand until cool and set. About 20 pralines.
