# One prisoner tells his story

Imagine yourself convicted for a crime or crimes—serving the last days in a prison without walls. Imagine, yet, being a first-time offender spending time with 69 men whose background is very different from yours.

This is the story of Tom, a pseudonym for a prisoner now serving time at Camp Sierra Blanca.

Camp Sierra Blanca is a minimum security prison outside of Capitan and set close to the mountains by the Fort Stanton Hospital. There are no bars, and the living quarters of the men resemble buildings used for a church retreat.

Long lines of beds with a central recreation area composed of a pool table and shelves sparsely filled with books make up living space for the prisoners.

Tom had been there one year to the day he was interviewed last Friday.

"This is quite an anniversary," he said, smiling.

When Tom says, "I'm not your usual con," it sounds like something a "con" might say. But in his case it seems possible.

He was arrested in June of 1982 for embezzlement. This was his first offense. He said he never wants to have to go to prison again.

Tom is 52 years old. He is from a small town in southern New Mexico. Before he was arrested for embezzlement, he had gone through treatment for alcoholism and had been sober a few months.

"This prison term was a final consequence of my alcoholism," he said.

He said his drinking covered a lifespan of maybe 30 years, but that it was only since his parents died that it really spiraled.

"I never had to fully take responsibility for myself," he said. "Though I worked, it was performance, only, for I knew my parents would be there."

Tom's parents had a family floral business and he is trained as a florist. When they died, he took over the business, but he ran it into the ground because of his drinking.

He described the months of May through December in 1980 as "living in a house with no water, heat or electricity. I was in poverty, misery and nearly starving."

Tom said that once in a while he would "take an old account payable from the floral shop" and use it for getting drinks.

With the help of a friend he entered treatment in 1980, and he had been sober for a few months when he went to work.

He had been working for close to a year when he was arrested. During that year he had managed to embezzle \$5,000, which is a third-degree felony in New Mexico.

He was sentenced August 5, 1982, two months after his arrest. He said this was the toughest part of his prison term.

"I had it much worse when I was presumed innocent than when I was determined guilty," he said. His time was spent in county jails then, and he described them as "something you see in a movie." He lost 25 pounds during this two-month stay.

Though he said, "This is progress," referring to Camp Sierra Blanca, it is clear prison life has left its mark on him.

It's possible that his four years of college, along with his ability to articulate and his philosophical nature, posed a double-edged dilemma for him. It may have made it so much harder to relate to others with years of criminal behavior, and yet it may have given him extra resources to draw from.

He said he is hopeful for the future but cautious in the present.

"I'm living with a great deal of hostility and with people who believe it's perfectly acceptable to get what you want in any way possible," he said.

Tom said many of the other inmates voice a concern for "what will happen after leaving." He also said several of them talked of extremely overcrowded conditions at the maximum security prison in Santa Fe, where they have done time.

"It's a shame places like that have to exist," he said, sadly.

If all goes as planned, Tom will leave Camp Sierra Blanca in December. He said he has a job lined up as a florist in Albuquerque.

Having had time to think, and living skills gained from attending an alcoholic support group, Tom believes he is ready.

"I have a great hope in the future," he said.

## The counselor

Camp Sierra Blanca counselor Henry Davis has an edge about him one would expect from working with criminals day in and day out.

But his voice fills with warmth and his face softens when talking about someone he thinks might "make it."

"The man's intelligent," he said, referring to Tom. Davis said Tom's unique case makes him stand out as an unusual prisoner, not "typical" in background or personality.

Davis has huge dislike for "playing games"—something he runs up against constantly in his work.

"Tom doesn't play games. He is respected by staff and other prisoners," he said.

Davis has been at Camp Sierra Blanca for about four years. He has varied assignments in his job, called "Classification Officer. II."

When in college, he said, he wanted to be a mortician. Getting into the prison system was somewhat accidental.

He has a degree in psychology and natural science, which must be put to the test when he "runs interference between us and whomever," as Tom described it.

# Bingaman likes his job

How does it feel to be a member of "the world's most exclusive club?"

"I'm starting to enjoy it—it's a sweat," said U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman on a brief visit to Ruidoso Saturday.

Bingaman was in the area to address a gathering of health care personnel.

New Mexico's junior senator is a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, and much of his time this first year has been taken up with defense-related matters.

"I've taken the view the administration has asked for more in the way of defense spending than the country needed or could afford," he said. Bingaman noted that he had supported a five percent spending increase (half of what President Reagan wanted) and specifically opposed the B-1 bomber and MX missile programs.

The senator was asked if the downing of a Korean airliner by the Soviets had a marked impact on Capitol Hill thinking regarding defense spending.

He said, noting the Defense Authorization Bill cleared the House of Representatives shortly afterward without the expected fight.

But the incident will not have a great long-term impact, Bingaman believes.

"I think what it hit home for me more than anything was the extremely high level of paranoia that exists—particularly on the part of the Soviet side," he said. He called it "frightening" that a decision to shoot could be made without checking an aircraft's civilian status.

Bingaman said the number of international "brush fire" incidents has kept Congress busy trying to monitor them, but that New Mexico concerns also command his attention.

He named protection of defense installations in the state; federal-level action regarding the El Paso water suit; and agricultural policy.

The senator said he has been following the Sierra Blanca Airport issue, but he is leaving the land transfer effort to U.S. Representative Joe Skeen.

"I think, realistically, Congressman Skeen has taken the lead on it—we're staying in touch, anxious to help if he calls on us to help."

# Banks explain peso policies

For many business owners considering accepting them in their businesses, pesos are a cause for concern. The big question is: how to exchange them for "good ol' U.S. dinero."

All three banks in town—Ruidoso State Bank, Security Bank of Ruidoso and First City National Bank—accept pesos by various methods.

In many ways the three banks are similar. The banks only accept pesos from account holders. When pesos are taken to one of the banks, a deposit slip is filled out and taken to a teller's window.

First City has a special collections teller and Ruidoso State Bank has a special collections department. But these are as simple as transacting at a teller's window, according to Ruidoso State Bank's Becky Lavanchy, of the collections department; and Bill Mayton, vice president and cashier at First City National Bank.

The big difference occurs in the actual transaction. According to bank president Don Shaw at Security Bank, the teller simply makes a phone call to a correspondent bank in El Paso, verifies the current exchange rate for U.S. dollars, and credits the account immediately.

"The whole transaction only takes a few minutes," Shaw said. "We've been accepting pesos for the past two years."

According to Shaw, the bank only accepts transactions of 50 pesos or more. After the transaction, the pesos are shipped by courier to the correspondent bank in El Paso.

At the Ruidoso State Bank Collections Department, a deposit is made in the normal way, but it is not immediately credited to the account. The pesos are sent by courier to a correspondent bank in El Paso, and the correspondent bank notifies Ruidoso State Bank—when it receives the pesos—at what rate of exchange it will credit the bank's account. It is not until then that the depositor's account is credited.

"There's about a three or four day delay," said Jack Foster, executive vice president of Ruidoso State Bank. The bank only charges a service charge if the correspondent bank charges one, Foster added.

A wait of up to 10 days is in store for customers at First City National Bank, according to Mayton. After the pesos are received at First City by the collections teller, they are sent by mail to a correspondent bank in El Paso. That bank notifies First City of the rate its account is to be credited, and the local bank notifies the customer by mail. No service charge is added if there is no charge from the correspondent bank.

Both Ruidoso State Bank and First City National Bank indicated they are considering new plans for the handling of pesos.

# Two nominees for Policeman of Year

Lincoln County Chief Deputy Charles Cox and Ruidoso Police Sergeant Michael Lovelace have been nominated for Crime Stoppers' 1983 Police Officer of the Year.

The Ruidoso Crime Stoppers board of directors will select one of the men and announce the Police Officer of the Year at the Crime Stoppers fundraising party, set for 8 p.m. Thursday, November 3, at Prime Time Restaurant.

The Ruidoso Police Department and the Ruidoso Downs Police Department nominated Lovelace.

He initially joined the department as a uniformed officer in 1975. After demonstrating expertise in the area of complex criminal investigations, he was assigned to the Criminal Investigation Division in 1981. He was later promoted to sergeant based upon documented merit and proficiency.

Lovelace is responsible for the conduct of his own complex investigations, the daily supervision of his assigned personnel and their investigations; and the efficient operations of his division.

The Ruidoso Criminal Investigations Division surpasses all existing federal and state standards for crime resolutions and property recoveries.

Lovelace is also the Crime Stoppers Police Liaison Officer. Ruidoso police chief Dick Swenor calls Crime Stoppers "the most effective crime deterrent factor in our community," and said Lovelace's efforts have been instrumental to the program's success.

as a real Christian, whose dedication to his family, his subordinates and the well-being of the department and his community, sets an example for all of his professional peers," wrote Swenor in his nominating letter.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department nominated veteran law enforcement officer Charles Cox for officer of the year.

Cox has been instrumental in the reorganization of the department. He has written an Operations Manual and a Jail Manual, and he organized the Sheriff's Reserve Program.

He has personally solved major theft cases of well over \$100,000 worth of stolen property, stated Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan.

Cox is also the coordinator of the Carrizozo Crime Stoppers program.

"Chief Deputy Cox has been my right hand man since I took over the Sheriff's Department in January 1983, and if there is a finer and more professional police officer anywhere, I have not met him," wrote Sullivan in his nominating letter.

The man selected as officer of the year will receive \$250 and a plaque commemorating his honor.

Crime Stoppers will also be giving away several thousand dollars worth of door prizes at the "Policeman of the Year" award party, said Crime Stoppers chairman Richard Sandoval. Cocktails and country and western music by Ronnie Warner's Random Stop will also be featured at the party.

# Judge-purchaser John Cupp: the village 'man of two hats'

"Is it any cheaper if we buy six?" asked village purchasing agent John

Cupp. Municipal judge John Cupp often obliges parents of juvenile delinquents by giving a lecture to the kids that "scares the pants off 'em."

Every working day Cupp starts out as a municipal judge, then changes hats and offices to become the village's purchasing agent. "It's unique all right," said Cupp. As municipal judge, Cupp listens to any cases concerning violations of village ordinances. Traffic violations make up about 80 percent of his cases, he said.

In his office at the police station, he also listens to misdemeanor cases such as first arrests for driving while intoxicated, disturbing the peace and petty larceny under \$100.

A man trained originally as an engineer who later worked in marketing, Cupp said he had no law enforcement or judging experience before starting as alternate judge for Sam Nunnally seven or eight years ago.

He said he almost always sat in on Nunnally's court, learning from the municipal judge. Some mornings Nunnally would surprise Cupp, saying he had to do something else that day and leaving the hearings to Cupp. The training was very good, said Cupp.

"Anyone who takes that job has a lot to learn," he said.

In addition to learning the judge's code of ethics, court procedures and village ordinances, a municipal judge has to be able to listen to a lot of

"malarkey" and sift out the actual facts of a case.

"You hear a lot of them," said Cupp of the wild stories and excuses told in municipal court.

Sifting out the facts of a case is not always easy. Cupp said it gets very difficult making decisions in some cases.

He mentioned an incident where three people faced a variety of disorderly conduct, reckless driving and driving while intoxicated charges. After listening to lengthy and sometimes conflicting testimony, he upheld some charges and dismissed others. It was satisfying to him when an appeal court upheld his judgments, said Cupp.

Despite the difficult decisions involving people, their actions and intentions, Cupp said he has no difficulty shifting gears and working as the village purchasing agent during the afternoon.

He has almost no difficulty, that is. Cupp admitted that he occasionally forgets he is one of the "peons" at village hall and begins to issue orders like a judge.

Purchasing is a very different job, however, from being a municipal judge. Catalogues, state contracts and price negotiations take the place of people and their pleas.

Cupp began as purchasing agent in May 1982 when it became apparent

that a growing Ruidoso required more time than assistant village manager Frank Potter could spare from his many other duties.

Although he works at the job only half time, Cupp has a secretary who does much of the administrative work.

"It's a time-consuming job," said village manager Jim Hine.

State law requires specific bidding procedures for different products, depending upon their cost. From catalogue searches and telephone bids to formal sealed bids, Cupp oversees everything the village buys.

Cupp, who owned a hardware store in Ruidoso and worked in marketing for years before that, believes he was qualified for the purchasing agent's job when he started.

"You know all the tricks the peddlers use," Cupp said of his experience in marketing.

Cupp, who helped organize the Planning and Zoning Department when he was the enforcement officer, is now trying to reorganize the purchasing department. In addition to centralizing purchasing authority solely with the purchasing agent, he has reduced the number of order requisition forms and is writing a purchasing procedure manual.

He talks often about efficiency, cost effectiveness and saving money as he sits at his village hall office.

He said he sort of took it as a compliment when a village council member called him "arrogant" for his policies as purchasing agent.

"I am pretty bull-headed," said Cupp, who indicated that it takes that kind of attitude to succeed at purchasing.

"You get satisfaction out of saving money," said Cupp.

He also enjoys "helping people, trying to get them to straighten up their act," during his morning hours as judge.

The seamy side of life that he sees when sitting on the bench and the bureaucratic runaround at the purchasing office are drawbacks to the job, but Cupp appears to enjoy his dual role.

Village manager Hine said the job of purchasing will eventually be shifted to the village financial administration department and out of Cupp's hands.

Hine predicted Cupp will become busier with his court cases in the future, and he hopes Cupp will continue at that job.

"I think he's good at it," said Hine.

Cupp, whose term as municipal judge ends in March 1984, said he "probably" will run for reelection.

For the time being, however, John Cupp will continue to deliver judgements in the mornings and supplies in the afternoons.

## Lincoln ordinance to get rewrite

The long embattled Lincoln Historical District Ordinance will receive some much needed rewriting, according to Suzanne Cox, Lincoln County manager.

An ad hoc committee composed of Lincoln County Planning Commission members Walt Wilson, Bill Seelbach and Mike Bell and Lincoln Historical Review Board members Glen Dennis and Ofelia Salas was set up at Thursday's Lincoln County Planning Commission meeting. Appointed as alternates were commissioner Wes Grigsby and Review Board member Leota Pfingsten.

The ad hoc committee will work up an ordinance which Cox will revise

and update the existing ordinance. According to Cox, those reworked ordinances will be presented for consideration by the commission at the next commission meeting, scheduled for Thursday, November 17.

Also present at the meeting was Boyd Pratt, historical architect for the New Mexico Historical Preservation Division of the Office of Cultural Affairs. Pratt advised the group on what constituted a model ordinance, outlining 10 specific areas of consideration.

Pratt found problems with the current ordinance in the areas of determination of what type structures are covered by the ordinance, a clear definition of "Territorial Style," and the specific powers and duties of the board.

Also during the meeting, Historical Board members announced three current alleged violations of the ordinance—by Lincoln property owners Mike Hainer, Sally Canning, E. R. Black, Stanley French and Richard Phillips.

Hainer and Canning allegedly made unapproved additions to their house; Black and French, who had their initial plans approved, allegedly installed skylights and solar panels that were not included in those plans; and Phillips allegedly installed unapproved skylights on his house.

District Attorney Steve Sanders said enforcement action could be taken if the violations were clear, but he made no mention of any action that would be forthcoming.

## More blood needed here still

Though the number of blood donors hovered over 100 at 6 p.m. Friday, it still does not cover the amount of blood needed to replace units used in Ruidoso, according to Sharon Kelly, spokesperson of United Blood Services in El Paso.

Kelly returned to El Paso with around 30 units at noon and said the blood donation center at the hospital

had requested increased coverage by the radio station in an attempt to get more donors.

Kelly said the "local people trying to organize a blood drive have worked very hard," but the need for blood has increased. She said this is partly because there are doctors in Ruidoso who are very knowledgeable about blood component therapy. She believes the growth in the community has also contributed to a greater blood need.

Ruidoso is replacing only one-third of blood received from United Blood Services, and must be assisted in replacement from surrounding communities, such as Alamogordo, said Kelly. This is spurring local people to consider a third community drive besides the two existing, and maybe start a drive in Mesalero, she added.

The next drive is planned for February, said Kelly.

"One unit of blood can save up to four lives," she pointed out.

## A lifesaver: 257-9111

Knowing four numbers could save a life, according to Jim Stover, director of Emergency Medical Services in Ruidoso.

Stover said it is crucial for people to know the emergency number, 257-9111. Even more crucial is recognizing coronary symptoms and using beginning cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR), he added.

He said beginning manual CPR within the first four minutes and then providing emergency medical personnel to the person within eight minutes could save 30 percent of people who suffer coronary attacks.

Stover wants to implement a massive public education campaign and possibly hire paramedics as part

of his new position as ambulance director.

He became director two months ago and recently was honored at a national Emergency Medical Services Conference in Charleston, West Virginia.

While there he was given a silver pewter tray with these words: "Presented in Appreciation For Your Years of Service and Dedication to the Emergency Medical Service System in West Virginia from October 1975 through August 1983."

Stover said he wants Ruidoso residents "to know that they can expect quality care if they need it and know where their tax dollars are going."

He said classes for people to become certified in CPR are being planned for the future.

## Ski Cloudcroft expanding

"We're trying to enhance the whole experience," said Tom Dorgan as he stood atop a heavy mat of wood chips and evergreen branches.

Dorgan, new owner of Ski Cloudcroft, has an ambitious plan to enlarge and enhance the nation's southernmost ski resort. The plan is especially ambitious since he closed the deal for the area just two weeks ago.

From a vantage point atop the mountain, Dorgan pointed out four new ski trails being cut through the forest. Behind him a young man was preparing ground for footings that will support a new chairlift Dorgan is installing. Out of sight were new machines that will increase the snowmaking capacity of the mountain 50 percent. The ski lodge is being remodeled.

"I think there's a lot of potential up here," said Dorgan.

Right now, he and his 12-man crew are working seven days a week to have a good portion of that potential realized by the time the snow flies.

The double chairlift they are installing will carry 1,200 skiers an hour 750 feet up the side of the mountain, one-third higher than the existing T-bar and poma lift do now.

Although the project is a large one—the crew is pouring 200 cubic yards of concrete for the footings

alone—Dorgan is confident he will finish it in time for the ski season. This chair will be the eighth one he has installed.

The other seven were in Wisconsin, where he worked in the skiing industry 14 years. Before coming to Ruidoso, he was part owner and general manager of Cascade Mountain in Portage, Wisconsin.

In Ruidoso he is better known as the owner of the Incredible restaurant and bar, and for his involvement with the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival. Dorgan said he wanted to get back into the skiing business and saw an opportunity with Ski Cloudcroft.

Negotiations began last spring, but contractual snafus delayed the closing of the deal until just recently. Almost all the improvements on the mountain have been done in the last three weeks.

The four new trails fanning out from the top of the chairlift have been cut. There is still considerable clearing and trail sculpturing to do, which Dorgan predicts will take two more weeks. The cleared areas are covered with a mat of wood chips and evergreen branches.

The new trails will include three intermediate slopes and one for beginners.

Dorgan, who designed the slopes, said both he and the United States Forest Service are pleased with the results. When discussing a "good trail," he spoke of varied terrain that

is both interesting and esthetically pleasing to the skier.

Before cutting a swath through the forest, Dorgan said, he studied topographic maps and aerial photos as well as spending "a lot of hours walking back and forth, up and down."

As with chairlifts, Dorgan has cut many ski trails before. He admits that the experience is as big a help as anything, and that the trail cutting is "kind of by the seat of the pants."

He said adjustments were made as the cutting proceeded. He pointed to a stand of large trees in the middle of one trail that he decided to keep because they looked good.

"We feel we can be one of the better small ski areas in the state," said Dorgan. "We are offering a different experience."

Dorgan said the nearby community of Cloudcroft is away from the hustle and bustle of its resort neighbor, Ruidoso. He thinks the folksy town and unique turn of the century lodge are attractions for skiers.

The ski area operated profitably last year, and Dorgan plans to continue advertising in west Texas and nearby parts of New Mexico. The area is within 15 minutes of nine or 10 church group facilities, and he hopes to attract skiers who come to those places.

"I want group business," said Dorgan, who explained that he will give substantial discounts to groups.

Despite one of its best efforts of the season, the Ruidoso High School varsity football team lost a 13-6 decision to Cobre Friday night in Bayard.

Ruidoso, now 0-2 in district 3-AAA action, held the Indians to just 120 yards total offense while gaining 193 yards of its own. However, mistakes hurt the Warriors' cause.

On the opening series of the game, Ruidoso fumbled on its own 22.

Cobre then marched in for the touchdown with John Luna banging over from one yard out for the score. The kick was good and the Indians held a 7-0 advantage.

Cobre made two first downs on the short drive, but only made three more the entire game as the Warrior defense hung tough.

Ruidoso came back with a touchdown of its own in the second quarter, driving 65 yards for the score.

Senior quarterback Cyrus Simmons—who completed six of eight passes for 60 yards on the night—sparked the drive with several completions.

On a third-down situation near mid-field, Simmons hit sophomore-Bobby

Dickinson for eight yards and a first down.

Simmons again came through in the clutch on another third-down situation at the Indian 13. He went back and hit halfback Eric Strobel for 12 yards to the one yard line.

On the next play, Simmons went over for the touchdown. The Warriors tried a two-point conversion, but Simmons was stopped short.

The Warrior defense kept Cobre contained the rest of the contest, but the hosts still hit the scoreboard one more time.

With about eight minutes left in the game, the Warriors got off a poor punt from their own 40. Tim Rozales of Cobre got the angle on the Ruidoso coverage men and ran 58 yards for the touchdown.

The kick failed but the Indians held their final 13-6 margin.

Still, the Warriors drove the ball into scoring position twice more in the contest but failed to punch the ball over.

Ruidoso had an edge over Cobre in almost every statistical category. The Warriors gained 133 of their total yards on the ground. The Indians were held to 64 yards rushing and 56 passing. Ruidoso gained 10 first downs to just five for the Indians.

Each team fumbled once. Sophomore halfback Michael Williamson ran well with the ball, as did fullback George Gresham and Strobel.

"We had a well-balanced attack," said Warrior offensive coordinator Vince Collins.

The amount of yardage the Warrior defense gave up was the lowest total by a Ruidoso opponent in two years.

Warrior defensive coordinator Ronny Maskew felt the defense played well.

"I'd say it was one of our better efforts," he said. "Manuel Montano (defensive tackle) did a good job. He was constantly in the Cobre backfield during the game."

"Patric Pearson and Chip Ramsey (defensive ends) also played well, as did Jesse Reynolds (middle linebacker)."

The Warriors will travel to defending district champion Silver City Friday for a 7:30 p.m. contest.

Although a frail child, Roosevelt by strength of will built himself in to a physical specimen. He became a westerner at heart and soul, liking nothing better than to be riding horseback on his ranch in South Dakota.

John A. Lomax, who as a boy listened to the cowboy songs echoing from the trail bedground near his home, became inspired to record these native American ballads.

It was slow going to get support and aid in his project until he had a personal interview with Roosevelt, who expressed delight with the undertaking, and made arrangements for financial backing. The result was the "Cowboy Songs, and Other Frontier Ballads" by John and his son Allen, and other volumes of American Folk Songs.

The Encyclopedia Britannica says of Roosevelt in part:

"His administration had a profound effect on the National prestige of the country. He found the government of the United States, when he took up the reins, in the position among world powers, of a new boy in school. He left it firmly entrenched in the first rank, admired and feared, its favors sought after, its citizenship respected in the remotest corners of the globe."

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—Now the Big East is telling us about Hispanics.

What do they know? It is their belief, if you can credit the news commentators from there, that all Reagan had to do was name a Hispanic Secretary of Interior and all those of Spanish descent would rush to enlist under his banner.

How insulting. As though this particular group of people (they are not a "bloc," at all) did not make individual decisions on such matters, and support politicians for reasons as unique to each individual as voters of any other background.

Like every other kind of people, Hispanics share some interests and concerns; that does not reduce them to lemming-like status, so each must do what everyone else does, or make them patsies for political manipulators.

Governor Anaya is right to demand citizens be told the details of legal settlements made by those who represent us.

His current insistence on that point comes after a large lawsuit against the state was settled out of court with the stipulation that no details be released till a long time has gone by.

The Governor appreciates the fact that the people who pick up the tab—the state's taxpayers—are in reality parties to the lawsuit. They have a right to be told how their money is being used.

Refusal to make those details public apparently contributed to the recent departure of Harvey Collier, named just a few months ago to head the branch of government which handles insurance matters.

The case was instituted by Jeanette Antunez, widow of Jesus Jose Antunez, stabbed to death by other prisoners in the state pen on April 6 in 1981.

We'll tell you here and now what the settlement was: The state agreed to pay Mrs. Antunez something in the neighborhood of a quarter of a million dollars.

And, though some news media keep saying there was no explanation for the state's willingness to settle, the facts are quite different.

There was little for the state to do after Warden Harvey Winans, under oath, admitted on the stand that he and Corrections Secretary Roger Crist were told in advance that Antunez was going to be murdered and failed to protect him.

Readers of this column ask a double-barreled question. You may answer it for yourself.

It goes like this: Isn't Governor Anaya's decision to commute all death sentences till his term in office is completed actually selective enforcement of the law?

Shouldn't the oath he took at inauguration (to uphold the laws of the state) take precedence over his personal religious scruples?

You can be sure the Governor's office will denounce that draft report from a state-federal study group which talks about the economic consequences of failing to mine the Ahsis-sie-pah area in the north-western part of the state.

The Governor himself, along with most of the greens and tree-huggers around him, wants the area made formally into a wilderness, which would preclude mining of any kind.

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management has recommended the opposite.

Comes now this group to say failure to mine there will cost the feds and the state \$978 million in revenue. That would be \$250 million lost to the state in severance tax income, plus \$364 million each to the federal government and New Mexico for royalty payments.

If the 400 million tons of coal there is not mined, the study says, we in the state will also lose in the neighborhood of \$78 million in personal income and—what's worse—about 3000 job opportunities.

Now let's see whether Tony is really for economic development or not.

### PRESERVATION

It may be expensive, but keeping the historic buildings in Lincoln in serviceable condition is important.

Few western towns which were flourishing in the 1800s have been preserved in their original state as has old Lincoln town in Lincoln county. To walk down the streets of Lincoln is to turn back the clock 100 or more years. Building restrictions are stringent in Lincoln. Everything has to conform.

Since that town was the center of the Lincoln County War complete with Billy the Kid, Pat Garrett, Tunstall, Murphy-Dolan factions, McSweeney, etc., it has historical value beyond that of many other areas.

It's estimated it will cost \$650,000 to restore the Tunstall Store and Watson House. This will be money, if appropriated by the 1984 Legislature, well spent. After all, a mile of highway costs more than that.

And look what happened to White Oaks, another very historic place. It's lost its character because buildings were moved away or have decayed. That was tragic—Alamogordo Daily News.

### WHAT'S IN A SIX DAY FIELD TRIP?

The National Bipartisan Commission on Central America has planned a whirlwind trip to six countries to study the underlying problems of the region. They will hardly have time to identify the problems, much less study them.

The commission will visit Panama, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua in seven days. Even with modern air transportation, that schedule leaves little time for anything beyond travel and perfunctory meetings with officials in those countries.

Henry Kissinger, commission chairman, has had a low opinion of Latin America in general. It certainly won't be improved by bouncing in and out of Central American countries in what amounts to a fly-by mission. Fortunately, Kissinger is only one of 12 members of the commission. Perhaps the others can be counted on to deliver a final report that will help resolve the Central America crisis.—Albuquerque Journal

## Letters to the editor

### DEAR EDITOR:

On October 9, 1983, an article appeared in the Roswell Daily Record, and on October 17, 1983, The Ruidoso News had front page coverage on our unsafe, unsightly, but profitable, Municipal waterslide.

These articles culminate two and one-half years of verbal and written communications to various politicians and bureaucrats of our Village government, all with one simple theme...the waterslide is unsafe!

Following considerable verbiage from Spring 1981, to Fall of 1982, with Councilmen Coulston, Sayner, and Junge in effort to convince them of Building Code Violations and possible structural problems, they not only ignored my pleadings, but lead the move for the Village to purchase the "ghetto like" structure for \$35,000.00.

Prior to purchase, the least the

Village should have done is to have it inspected by Construction Industries since that State level department is responsible for all public funded building inspection.

In May of 1983, I went on record with a letter to the Village citing the violations of the Uniform Building Code and possible structural problems.

In addition, I asked that the slide not be opened to the public until an investigation was made.

The waterslide and pool were opened on schedule; the letter was ignored. In June, I wrote a second letter to the Village government, which was also ignored; thus, I turned to the State for help, which resulted in an investigation and letter from Construction Industries citing the violations and possible structural problems. That letter is dated July 6, 1983.

I am thankful for the State's help, although I feel it is a shame to have to broadcast our problems to Santa Fe.

So at this late date, the Village Manager and others say they did not know of the problems since they did not receive the letter from Construction Industries until it was mailed to them by me.

I think it should be obvious to all that the Village of Ruidoso should have checked this out before opening the pool.

They say they had asked Boyle Engineering for a structural analysis, yet no report can be produced. Even so, how about the problems other than structural?

In addition to the safety aspect, the slide is such a miserable image for the people of Ruidoso to be associated with.

Is this a fitting entrance to our Community?

As an architect, I feel a civic responsibility to see that this structure is made as safe as possible for our children, and that this municipal administrative and political default is recorded for all to see, come election time.

All documents referred to are available at the Village Hall.

## On the Village Beat

I went out to take a picture the other day at a fund-raising event for a charitable cause. Talking to the organizer, I learned the event had more or less bombed out—people weren't showing up for it.

This caused me to feel a twinge of guilt, because after the original notice of the event several weeks previous, the newspaper had made no mention of it. It was not a deliberate or accidental oversight on our part—after the organizer brought us the first announcement, we heard no more about the event until the call to photograph it.

Talking to the guy in charge, I learned he had put someone else in charge of publicity, and that person failed to follow through. This is a familiar story.

The Ruidoso News takes its role of announcing and publicizing events seriously. But I think we could do a much better job of it with a little more help from the people who organize them.

So I thought I would make some suggestions, in the hope that better publicity will result—and with it, better attendance and participation at different events.

First of all, think of publicity when the event is first being conceived or planned—in other words, at the first meeting. Publicizing your event should take the same priority as deciding a time, day and date, and arranging for a place to have it.

Second, when you decide on a person to handle publicity, stress to him that the success of the event largely depends on his efforts. Of course, that could scare a lot of people out of accepting the job.

But it needn't be scary. In fact, we will do most of the work if you just let us know what you want done.

The first thing you need to do when you've been named publicity person is write down all the information you would like to make known. Verify with the other organizers that everything is there.

This can be very basic—it is just a place to start. The info can be typed or printed, but should not be written in longhand unless your handwriting is exceptionally easy to read.

If you will be going around to several places to arrange for publicity—to the newspaper, radio station and printer, for example—make enough copies to be able to leave one at each place.

When you're ready to come see us, give me a call to say you're coming. This is not completely necessary. But since things get pretty hectic here at times, a call in advance will ensure that I or one of the reporters can set aside time to help you.

Try to come in well in advance of the event. The sooner people know about your event, the longer they

have to plan to attend or participate. What we will do when you come in is work out a plan to publicize your happening. Let's imagine your church group is planning a Christmas bazaar for Saturday, December 3.

A notice in the Thursday, November 3, issue of The News will start people thinking of the event. People who keep calendars on their refrigerators or kitchen bulletin boards can write it in.

Looking at a calendar, you and I might decide that with the Thursday, November 17, paper, we will announce the event every issue. That story might lead off, "Plans are now complete for the Fourth Annual Holiday Bazaar... featuring handmade gift items and mouth-watering confections."

It is desirable to be able to add some new information in each announcement. Let's imagine Mrs. Brown will be making peanut brittle for the bazaar—she does every year and it always sells well.

Our item in the Monday, November 21, issue might lead, "Mrs. Brown's famous peanut brittle will be among the delicacies offered at the Holiday Bazaar..."

Now we come to the idea of a publicity photo. On the tried and true notion that a picture is worth a thousand words, you and I arrange for the newspaper to take a picture of Mrs. Smith sewing one of her famous dolls for the bazaar. That goes in the Monday, November 28, issue.

By the time December 3 rolls around, everyone in town knows about the Holiday Bazaar. If you have done your job, they are hearing about it on the radio, too.


Mrs. Brown's peanut brittle stocks will be decimated within minutes, and customers will fight over Mrs. Smith's dolls.

Seriously, if all goes according to plan, the publicity will help the event and we will all feel good about it.

So communication is the main thing. On your initial visit, give us your phone number, and get the name and number of the person at the newspaper who will be your contact here. That way we can communicate on late-breaking developments. (FLASH! Mr. Goode's crochet pillows a Holiday Bazaar exclusive!)

We can't guarantee to give as much space to publicizing your event as you might hope—there is only so much room and time. And we reserve the right to word the announcements as we see fit. This sometimes gets us crossways with people, but we leave religious doctrine to the churches and to individuals.

I hope these suggestions are helpful to people who want to publicize their events. Call us—we'll be glad to work with you.

## Quotations from Chairman Ed

"We had a lot of tire-kickers," said Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Jungbluth, commenting on the success of the summer season at Ruidoso, said emotions were mixed. "There were conflicting reports from the business owners. On one side of the street they'd say their summer went just fine. Then an owner on the other side of the street would say it wasn't a very good summer," Jungbluth said.

"I would say it was a leveling off, not a decline. We've been a boom town, and I think we still are, but I think things may have reached a level and are beginning to stabilize," he said.

According to Jungbluth, most people said the numbers of people were there, but the money wasn't.

"Take the restaurants for example, this year there are three times as many as there were last year. That means a lot more people were fighting for the eating-out dollar," he added.

A big impact will be felt this winter with the condominiums, according to

Jungbluth.

"Skiers are a different sort of cat. Condos are often more appealing to them. We've got a lot of unsold condos sitting up here. Joe Texan is finding out he can't quite afford to have that 'toy' anymore," Jungbluth said, "so he's forced to rent it out."

"So we've got a lot of nice condos, three bedrooms, color TVs, jacuzzis... everything, going for \$80 a night. You get a few couples in there, that's \$240 a couple. That's hard to compete with."

Jungbluth said the Chamber has many upcoming events to look forward to. The Chamber may sponsor a Halloween haunted house if they can find a location and some people to help in the project.

"We've got a few good places in mind," Jungbluth said.






