

Woodpeckers pick on house

"I never would think birds would have that much strength," D. J. Phillips said with a Louisiana drawl. Phillips, of Spring Hill, Louisiana, pointed to two cedar planks newly nailed to the side of his neighbor's house.

"That's where they done most of the damage. Those woodpeckers had holes big enough for two nests in there."

Phillips led the way across a wire fence for a closer inspection of the damage. The woodpeckers had been pecking away all summer on a side wall of the house, owned by Bill DuBois of Lubbock, Texas, Phillips said.


"We've tried to keep 'em away, but they keep coming back. I even took a shot at 'em with a pistol. They're brave birds."

Pointing to the top of a high ponderosa pine, he added, "That's where he was when I shot at him. He just hopped to the next tree. Brave birds."

Phillips steps over a clump of scrub oak.

"I get all my exercise chasin' these birds. Seems like as soon as we chase 'em off, by the time we get back to the house, they're back at work again."

"I'm more or less retired," he said, scratching a several-day-old beard. Phillips is of average height, slightly balding with thin black hair combed

straight back. His eyes are friendly and bright. He smiles when he talks.

"I used to be a machine tender with International Paper. Then I took early retirement. We came here July One to stay a week at my brother-in-law's place. We're still here," he said, laughing.

He squinted as he looked again to the cedar boards. "Mr. DuBois, he came this weekend and fixed it all up.

But you can see where they got started again." He pointed.

The damage is evident. The wood is chipped and eaten away, but no woodpeckers were in sight.

"Oh they come in the afternoon when it's warmer, they're here nearly every afternoon."

"I just hate to see 'em tear up a house like that. I've never seen nuthin' like it in my life."

Downs to buy water rights

Ruidoso Downs trustee Jake Harris said, "We'll never find water for this price again," and made a motion Monday night to start the legal works to buy 16 acre-feet of water rights.

The motion was seconded by Conrad Buchanan. LeVerne Cole, Harris and Buchanan voted yes and Mansell voted no on the motion to buy the water rights for \$45,000.

Also Monday, Municipal Judge Paula Smith gave the council a detailed budget for money needed to complete the 1983-84 fiscal year.

The budget asked for money for a court clerk, which, according to Smith, would cost the court \$100 a month.

A lengthy dialogue persisted between Smith and Mansell, who said other municipalities do not have court clerks but have judges performing the clerk's duties.

Smith said she cannot perform the clerk's duties without "prejudicing cases." She said time needed for the duties would be about one to two hours a day and cost about \$100 a month.

Mayor J. C. Day said he is concerned about being informed regarding court legalities, and that "if you are legally correct I want to abide by it, but not if we don't have to."

Policeman Roger Riley said, "I think we need to do more to update the court system. This is the first judge to give Miranda warnings to people arrested. This is the most legal court I've seen since I started here."

Mansell said, "The judge is new in politics and not all municipalities are paying for court clerks."

Mayor Day suggested Sotero Sanchez come to a trustees meeting and provide information about legalities required in running a municipal court. Village clerk Wilma Webb said Tuesday a letter has been sent to Sanchez, who is a member of the New Mexico Municipal League.

In other business, the trustees:

—Heard a short talk by a sales representative from Contractors Equipment in Albuquerque

—Acknowledged a letter from the Deputy State Fire Marshal endorsing a Fire District Improvement Bond Issue that was approved by the trustees on September 26

—Discussed the \$50,000 still not received from the State Racing Commission. Webb confirmed that a spokesperson from the State Taxation and Revenue Department said the money would be available in November

—Decided to lease a copy machine from Automatic Business Systems of Roswell

Judge-trustees dispute continues

Municipal Judge Paula Smith said in a telephone interview Tuesday night she is "being harassed by at least one-half of the council in Ruidoso Downs."

Smith presented a budget to the council Monday night including money for a court clerk. The total of the budget is \$2,282.46 for the 1983-84 fiscal year. This includes \$800 for a court clerk, which Smith said she needs in order for the court to be run legally.

The council decided Monday night to ask Sotero Sanchez of the New

Mexico Municipal League to present information to the council about legalities in a municipal court.

Smith is expecting the council to take appropriate action on whatever Sanchez suggests to the council.

In the meantime she is without a court clerk, and says she cannot do the duties of a clerk while working as a judge without facing the possibility of prejudicing cases.

She said she is basing this on a state Supreme Court ruling that interprets the two jobs as "incompatible to each other."

Ruidoso Municipal Judge John Cupp said "yes" when asked if a court clerk is necessary.

When asked whether a judge working as a clerk also could prejudice a case, he said, "There is that possibility. A judge is not supposed to know anything about a case before it is heard. Working as a clerk allows a person to find out information about the person involved."

Debbie Floyd, Ruidoso court clerk, said she is paid over \$900 a month in her position, working from 8-5 Monday through Friday.

Downs trustee Conrad Buchanan said after Monday's trustees meeting that he believes the council is "not used to the changes brought about by Smith."

He added that he believes she is the "most qualified person that's been in the position for a long time."

Buchanan said, "I hope she doesn't get discouraged and give up."

Smith said the previous judge had resigned over the issue of a clerk.

Fred Bernard, who had been judge for two years said, "This is true." He said he had asked for \$125 a month for a court clerk's fees and was denied.

Trustee Harrold Mansell confirmed Wednesday that he talked openly about running for judge in the next election.

"I think this gal has a bad attitude—she's the worst I've ever seen."

Mansell said, "You can have a legally run court without asking for all the things she is asking for."

He also said, "We can't afford to have money for every indigent person that comes through the doors in Ruidoso Downs," referring to Smith's requests for attorneys for indigent people.

Council tables rezoning, asks stop on mailboxes

That "the wheels of government grind slowly"—as Councilman Benny Coulston commented—was proven by the four-hour duration of Tuesday night's village council meeting.

Zoning of Unit 3 in Ponderosa Heights and neighborhood postal delivery were the major topics of discussion. The council unanimously passed a resolution against further installation of neighborhood postal box units.

A scheduled hearing on a protest of a proposed rezoning of one lot in Ponderosa Heights from R-2 (multi-family residential) to R-3 (mobile homes), was tabled until December 13. In recommending the hearing be tabled, Councilman Frank Saylor said the council's ruling on the one lot would set a precedent for the whole unit. He suggested the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) study the matter in order to make a zoning recommendation.

Mike Herd, a property owner protesting the rezoning, said many people had traveled to Ruidoso to be present for Tuesday's hearing. Several persons expressed opposition to mobile homes being allowed in the unit, but E. J. Fouratt pointed out that several are already in place in Unit 3.

He said the unit was zoned R-3 in the 1976 comprehensive plan and designated "public land" in the P&Z blue book. Saylor had questioned whether the land was ever intended to be R-2.

Coulston told the protesters they perhaps face a greater immediate danger with an R-2 zoning than they would with R-3, due to the lack of property in the village for multi-family housing (apartments and condominiums).

"This zoning—you're in jeopardy right now," he said.

The resolution on neighborhood mail boxes followed comments from several individuals on neighborhood postal service.

Buddy Bundick, district manager for Texas-New Mexico Power Company, said his business cannot use the service because the boxes are too small, delivery time is too late and an address change would be expensive and confusing. He added that an increase in his box rate at the post office from \$17 to \$69 a year was "uncalled for."

Bundick said his feelings represent a consensus of business people who handle a large volume of mail.

"I object to the whole thing— I think it's ridiculous," said Gordon Keeler of Yellow Pine Road. "They've defaced the property—it looks terrible," added Bob Payne of Redwood Drive. Councilman Al Junge, who introduced the resolution and moved for its adoption, reiterated his reasons for opposing neighborhood mail service. "The service is atrocious as far as mail's concerned," said Junge.

He said he has had letters and

phone calls complaining about placement of the neighborhood boxes. "This is absolutely a fraud as far as the city of Ruidoso is concerned," he said.

The resolution states the "delivery system is proving not to be beneficial to the citizens . . . from savings, service or safety standpoint," and "will result in an expensive, unworkable plan, including dangerous traffic problems."

It calls for a stop to further installations until Postal Service representatives arrange to meet with village officials to discuss the system. The resolution, which Councilman Don Dale seconded, passed unanimously.

In other business Tuesday, the council:

—Discussed a protest filed by Carlsbad against the proposed change in the diversion point of Rio Ruidoso water by the Village of Ruidoso. Mayor George White said he would be traveling to Roswell to discuss the protest with the State Engineer's Office.

—Was informed by park and recreation director Pam Graves she has received 120 completed surveys on parks and recreation, and hopes to receive more.

—Approved \$406 for village clerk Leon Eggleston to attend federal elections school in Tulsa, Oklahoma, next month.

—Heard a report from Dale on progress with the police building remodeling project. It was reported that \$69,410 over the available funds was needed to complete the project. Payment to the previous architect on the project accounted for most of the overage, it was noted. The council approved a motion to increase the

budget by that amount, with funds to come from budget surplus and possibly from revenue sharing.

—Discussed a problem of property rezonings approved by P&Z over a period of time but never acted on by the council. Village attorney Lee Huckstep said rezonings, which are amendments to the zoning ordinance, must be approved by the council. He suggested lumping all the affected rezonings together and voting on them at a future meeting.

—Approved street paving and maintenance ordinance allowing property owners to have streets paved at their expense.

—Approved purchase of carwash and vacuum equipment from JMJ Sales of El Paso, Texas, for \$1,936, four-wheel drive pickup truck from Ed Black Chevrolet of Albuquerque for \$9,688.62, road grader from Rust Tractor of Albuquerque for \$33,203 (with trade-in); two police motorcycles from Wheelworld Honda of Albuquerque for \$2,095 each. Low bid on a four-wheel drive vehicle for Emergency Medical Services, \$16,538.78, was taken under advisement.

—Approved redemption of property offer on lot foreclosed upon by the village.

—Approved conditional use, replat and variance previously approved by P&Z.

—Decided to have a workshop with P&Z at 3 p.m. Monday, October 31, after P&Z chairman Greg Masters outlined several matters that need attention. The council will meet at 1 p.m. Monday for public hearings on two rezoning request denials. A one-hour time limit has been set on each hearing.

Promotion funds looking good

As much as \$100,000 in matching and cooperative funds has been verbally committed to Ruidoso from the state by Commerce and Industry Secretary Alex Mercure, said Tommy Morel, Chamber of Commerce advertising committee chairman at Wednesday's joint meeting of the advertising committee and the Lodgers' Tax Committee.

Of the statewide \$2.5 million budget, \$350,000 has been promised to the Sun Country Region, Morel said. He explained that the state has been divided into six regions, and that Ruidoso—along with Roswell, Artesia, Carlsbad, Deming, Alamogordo, Las Cruces, Silver City and Truth or Consequences—is included in the Sun Country Region.

How that \$350,000 will be divided will be dependent on several factors. To qualify, a community group—such as one that collects lodgers' tax, or a chamber of commerce or community tourism organization—must spend at least 50 percent of its budget on promotion. The Ruidoso Chamber's promotion share of last year's budget was nearly 90 percent. One stipulation made by the state is that matching state monies also must be spent on promotion.

Communities then must complete a complicated application process. This step may serve Ruidoso very well since the available funds will be allocated on a percentage based on the amount of funds requested by

groups, according to Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Chamber of Commerce. Because the process is so new and complex, Jungbluth said, Ruidoso may have an advantageous position.

"Every community has the same opportunity to do what we've done," Jungbluth said. "There just aren't that many communities who understand this program. We've taken the time to become educated about this. It was just a matter of getting our name in there and going after it. It's basically first come, first served," he said.

If all communities in this region applied and were awarded the maximum amount of matching money, Ruidoso's share would be around \$40,000 to \$50,000, according to Morel.

Community groups have the option when applying for funds to either ask for half their existing budget and save the other half, or they can double the existing budget and have state monies cover the new part of the budget.

For example, with the peso program, the village council stipulated when those funds were approved that it would decide whether funds would be left at the \$25,000 level, thus increasing the budget to \$50,000, or whether funds would be cut to \$12,500 with the state paying the additional \$12,500.

In either case, both the pro ski race program and the peso program monies already have been approved by the state and are in addition to the

newly promised \$90,000 to \$100,000, according to Morel. The committees will come up with a figure this community will apply for within the next few weeks, according to Morel, and Ruidoso will receive notice of the final amount of money to be allocated by January.

Also during the meeting, the committees voted to accept Epstein Communications advertising agency of Albuquerque as the assigned agency for this region. The agency was originally chosen by a state process where 100 letters were sent out to agencies in the state inviting them to make an application, according to Morel. Of those, 24 replied wanting to make a presentation.

Of those, 12 were invited to make a presentation. Eight agencies were finally chosen. Six agencies were assigned to regions around the state, an additional agency was assigned to the Albuquerque region, and one agency was assigned to the state as a whole.

Morel also said that an attempt would be made to allow this region to accept bids on certain creative work involved in the upcoming promotions. This would allow some participation in the project from local advertising agency people.

"It will be money well spent to have two choices for the creative, as well as keeping some of the money in town," he said.

All work will be channeled through the Epstein agency to the state.

Ambulance service improved but costs are rising alarmingly

Ambulance service in Ruidoso appears to be improving since the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital took over administration of the operation, but costs are rising along with the level of service.

The interplay between money and level of care will force Ruidoso to face difficult decisions about the value of quality medical care.

"I personally think the ambulance service has been handled extremely well ... I am pleased with the ambulance service," village manager Jim Hine told the village council Tuesday evening.

He said that shortly after informing council members that ambulance service costs have risen an alarming 53 percent in the first four months of this fiscal year.

The Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital took over the administration of the ambulance service last November. The ambulance service was previously administered by the village and housed behind the police station. It now runs out of a trailer next to the hospital.

The village pays for costs not covered by ambulance charges. Lincoln County and Ruidoso Downs also

contribute to the operations of the ambulance service. Stover said ambulance charges cover only about one-third of the operating costs, in spite of doubled collection rates since the hospital took over the service.

Higher costs, due largely to different regulations, counterbalance benefits gained by working more closely with the hospital.

The transition has been difficult at times, said emergency medical technician (EMT) Keith Starnes, but he believes the change has been for the better.

"The service has been upgraded," said Starnes.

Transitional difficulties involved undefined responsibilities for EMTs within the hospital, along with the absence of a director for close to a year, said Starnes and fellow EMT Jack Miller.

With Jim Stover, new director of Emergency Medical Services—and a better understanding between hospital staff and EMTs—the service is improving, believe the two EMTs.

"I think Jim Stover, as director, has done a great job," said hospital administrator Ken Moore.

Stover said he has been evaluating the training of personnel, equipment on the ambulances and general

maintenance of the ambulances since he arrived two months ago.

With the training of one staff member, all the EMTs now have intravenous technician ratings, one step above the basic EMT training. Stover said he would like to see the EMTs become even more qualified so they can begin treatment of patients in the field rather than the "scoop and run" technique that was common practice in the past.

"The critical factor is how fast we can start caring for them," said Stover.

He pointed out that the first four to eight minutes of a cardiac arrest are the most crucial ones as far as damage and eventual recovery of the patient.

Achieving higher levels of training for EMTs, however, costs more money. It costs money to train the EMTs and more money to pay their salaries once they are trained.

Salaries have already been the main cause of the sharply increased operating expenses, said Stover.

The hospital, as a private contractor, is subject to many different wage and hour regulations that a municipality does not have to obey.

The hospital has to pay the second ambulance crew, which is on call 24

hours a day, \$1 an hour. This costs EMS \$1,440 a month. Sleep time for the on-call crews also costs EMS \$1 an hour. During weekends crews must be paid 20 percent more for their time, which amounts to \$4,000 a year, said Stover. The Department of Labor does not require a municipality to pay any of these costs.

The hiring of Stover is another cost that was not reflected in the seven months of the fiscal year the hospital has run EMS. As Moore pointed out, it takes money to get someone qualified to fill the position. The village had been paying EMS directors less. It had difficulty getting qualified directors and keeping them, said village manager Hine.

Stover said he has also been purchasing equipment for ambulances that bring them up to State Corporation Commission standards. He said the ambulances were previously lacking in some of the required areas.

"We're doing a lot better equipment-wise," said EMT Starnes. Stover has also instituted a regular preventive maintenance program of which Moore highly approves.

"You need to have everything there. You need to know everything works," said Moore.

One of the main benefits of the new

EMS arrangement is the closer contact EMTs have with the hospital staff. The EMTs spend much of their time helping in the hospital.

The EMTs do "whatever needs to be done," from taking admission information from emergency room patients, to starting intravenous solutions, to holding a hand or administering cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

Working closely with the EMTs, doctors become familiar with the EMTs' abilities and limitations. Starnes said the EMTs have been able to build up a confidence among many doctors by working with them.

This can be especially important when the EMTs are on an emergency call asking for instructions from a doctor at the hospital. The doctors know better what an EMT is capable of doing in a specific situation and can advise appropriate treatment, said Starnes.

The regular exposure to emergency situations in the emergency room also helps when it comes time to answer an ambulance call.

"We're exposed to a whole lot more," said Starnes.

He explained that the exposure allows the EMTs to be more relaxed during the life and death situations, to think more clearly and cope better

with the stress of the situation. Moore also noted this aspect as an advantage of the current arrangement.

The only trouble with the current arrangement is that it has cost the village \$83,943 during the first four months of fiscal 1983-84. The total expenses for seven months of the previous fiscal year were only \$68,170. Costs to the village increased 53 percent in the last four months and are running approximately 17 percent over the budget.

Stover talked to the village council Tuesday evening about steps he is taking in an attempt to reduce some of the expenses. He warned, however, not to expect any great cost reductions.

He did mention some possible alternative methods of funding EMS that he and hospital administrator Moore are working on.

Council member Don Dale suggested the possibility of EMS staff doubling as members of the fire department to reduce costs.

The council, Moore and Stover will meet in the near future to discuss the EMS budget.

"The bottom line is that it is expensive to run a quality system," said Stover. "What is that one life worth? ... It's a hard decision to make."

She added that the decline is "because of less bodies" not because more students are dropping out.

Second water protest filed

Ruidoso's water system is now under siege at both ends. The valley farmers, who are protesting Ruidoso's application to change water discharge points, have been joined by the Carlsbad Irrigation District, which is protesting the village's application to change the point of diversion.

Mayor George White Friday received a certified letter from the State Engineer's office notifying him of the Carlsbad Irrigation District's protest.

"This is news to everybody," said White at Tuesday evening's village council meeting.

The village applied in July to the State Engineer for an alternate point of diversion of water on the Rio Ruidoso. The alternate point of diversion, 126.5 feet downstream from the present Upper Canyon treatment plant intake, would be for a water transmission line to fill the Grindstone Reservoir.

The Rio Ruidoso is a tributary of the Rio Hondo, which in turn is a tributary of the Pecos River. The Carlsbad Irrigation District has extensive water rights on the Pecos River. It serves approximately 450 farms on 25,055 acres of irrigated land.

"Protestant (Carlsbad Irrigation District) would further show that the granting of the said application and the use by the Applicant (Ruidoso) of the waters applied for will impair and/or be detrimental to the rights of the Protestant ... on the Pecos River," claims the Carlsbad Irrigation District.

"No water will be taken in addition to that previously permitted or adjudicated under the existing water rights," stated a legal notice of the village's application.

"Protestant alleges the fact to be that said application asks for the appropriation of waters in a basin that are fully appropriated," states the protest.

"Protestant would further show that if the application is granted, that it will operate to lower and decrease the flow of the Pecos River," which would be against a compact with the state of Texas not to decrease its flow below 1947 conditions.

"We think they have no rhyme or reason to their protest," said Mayor White.

White surmised that the legal notice of the application was possibly ambiguous so that the Carlsbad Irrigation District believed Ruidoso was asking for more water.

White travelled to Roswell Wednesday to talk to R. B. Collins, district

engineer for the State Engineer's Office.

"I didn't really learn very much," said White of his visit with Collins.

White did say that Collins recommended the village not concern itself with Carlsbad's protest until the first water protest is taken care of. Hearings for the valley farmers' water protest are scheduled for November 29 and 30 in Ruidoso.

A copy of the new protest has been sent to Ruidoso's water lawyer, Neil Stillinger.

As of Wednesday evening Stillinger had not received a copy of the protest.

"It's probably their standard protest," said Stillinger. "They protest every application above their headgates."

After being read portions of the protest, he said he believed it was indeed the district's standard protest. He said Carlsbad will probably drop the protest once the State Engineer asks for a \$250 deposit on the protest.

Without seeing the protest, however, he could not be sure of the validity of the protest.

"They could be dead serious, for all I know," he said.

"Anytime we plan to make improvements, somebody will make a protest," said village manager Jim Hine.

Committee members also decided to keep the village council informed on all developments and action taken in the program.

Also presented at the meeting was an extensive study on Mexican tourism in New Mexico done by Drs. Lee Hageman and Donald A. Michie, marketing experts at New Mexico State University. According to the state-funded, two-year study, Ruidoso ranks very high in recognition in most cities in Mexico. The report also said winter sports and horse racing were among the top reasons Mexican tourists came to the U.S.

Also detailed in the report were problems with drawing tourists to the Ruidoso area. Difficulties crossing the border into the U.S. and the reluctance of Mexican travel agents to send people here because of Ruidoso businessmen's reluctance to pay agency commissions were the largest problems, according to the report.

"We need to work more closely with immigration officials," Jungbluth said. "Also, we need to send someone down to talk with these travel agents. There is the key to the success of the peso program. It's a problem of education with the lodgers here and the travel agents there."

One major benefit touched on at the meeting was the upcoming acceptance of pesos by Ruidoso business owners. According to a poll taken by the Chamber of Commerce members and lodgers, 65 of 71 lodgers have committed to accept pesos, Jungbluth said.

According to Jungbluth, report writer Donald Michie will meet with the two groups and the Epstein agency next week to discuss the report in full.

"It's a doozy," Jungbluth said.

Energy saving tips suggested

Saturday marks the end of American Energy Awareness Week.

With frosty mornings becoming a reality and car maintenance a necessity to get through the colder months, it causes one to become extra aware of the increased energy needs in running a household, as well.

Probably the most practical ways everyone can contribute to energy conservation are taking showers instead of baths, turning lights off when not in a room, and keeping the thermostat at around 68 degrees or less.

Buying special devices such as solar equipment is another. According to Dr. Clyde Eastman, an author of "Energy Conservation and the Use of Solar Technology in New Mexico Residences," solar technology is

more feasible in New Mexico because of the mild winters and clear skies.

He said in a newsletter, "If our nation is to make its goal of meeting 20 percent of the national energy needs through solar energy sources by the year 2000, a significant portion of the solar contribution will have to occur in the residential sector."

Eastman said the slow conversion to solar technology is not a result of resistance but a matter of economics. "When people can start seeing a benefit or a payback, then they will be more willing to use solar equipment."

Here are some facts about solar water heating from the Solar Web, a firm in Albuquerque:

—25-30 percent of your utility bill is what it costs to heat water bathed and washed in.

A solar water heater can take care of a significant portion of that water heating.

—Solar water heaters have been in use since 1911 in Florida, where more than 50,000 systems were in use then.

Texas-New Mexico Power Company has a free brochure with 22 pages of energy saving ideas. One is, for washing dishes, use your dishwasher only when there is a full load; use a shorter wash cycle and cancel the drying cycle.

The National Fire Protection Association recommends that chimneys be inspected and cleaned once a year. When a wood-burning stove is used regularly, the chimney should be checked every six months.



Quarterback Dewey Keller and tight end-linebacker Eddie Davis are also standout players.

The state playoffs will begin next Friday, November 4. Other teams likely to compete in the playoffs are Reserve and Texico.

Warriors face rugged battle at Silver City

Defending district 3-AAA champion Silver City is up to its old tricks again.

The Ruidoso High School varsity football team, which will travel to the Colts' stable for a 7:30 game Friday night, will play a Silver City team that is rounding into shape rapidly.

Silver City got off to a slow start this season, something it has done often in the past. However, as in the past, the Colts have come on strong in District 3-AAA play. They've won their first two district games, including a 20-7 decision over a tough Hot Springs team last Friday. Silver City is 4-3-1 on the overall season.

Ruidoso is 0-2 in district play, having lost a tight 13-6 decision to Cobre last Friday.

"They'll be tough, no doubt about it," said Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt. "In order to beat them, we can't make any mistakes. We're going to have to run better and pass better than we've done this season."

One of the key cogs in the Colt offense is 200-pound fullback George Peru, a returning starter from last season. Peru has both power and speed.

Jess Montes, a 145-pounder, will be the Silver City quarterback. Brian Robinson (170 pounds) and Tim Perez (160 pounds) are the running backs.

The Colts are big in the line, averaging around 180 pounds per man.

"They're not going to do anything fancy," Stierwalt remarked. "They'll probably just line up in a power offense and try to run right over you."

The Colt defense is anchored by 205-pound Ed Flores. Silver City has several other players in the 180-pound range on defense.

But the Warriors are coming off an impressive performance in their loss to Cobre.

Ruidoso outgained the Indians 193 to 120, and held Cobre to just five first downs. The Warriors picked up 10 first downs of their own.

"I'd say it was one of our better games of the season, both offensively and defensively," Stierwalt said.

But mistakes again hurt the Warriors in the Cobre loss. A poor punt and a fumble led to the two Indian touchdowns.

The Warriors are almost completely healthy for the Colts, although defensive tackle Eric Bell has been ill with the flu for a couple of days.

Senior Cyrus Simmons will start at quarterback. Simmons had one of his best games of the season against Cobre, completing six of eight passes for 60 yards and scoring Ruidoso's only touchdown.

Mike Williamson and Eric Strobel will both play at halfback, while George Gresham will go at fullback.

Mike Smith and Justin Smith will rotate at split end and wingback. Bobby Dickinson is scheduled to start at tight end.

James Herrera will go at center, while Kip McClellan and Craig Car-

son are the guards. Gary Burgess and Kevin Jameson will start at tackle. On defense, Chip Ramsey and Patric Pearson are slated to start at end, Bell and Manuel Montano will go at tackle.

Jesse Reynolds will go at middle linebacker, although Dickinson could also see some time there. Justin Smith and Wade Proctor will go on the outside.

Russell Easter and Kenny Espinosa will start at safety. Mark Johnston, Mitch Mullican and Chuck Jarrell will all see playing time at cornerback.

The 130 yards given up by the Warrior defense in the Cobre game was the least Ruidoso has allowed in two years.

Moriarty is ranked second, followed by Portales, Lovington, Los Lunas, Artesia, Silver City, Raton, Hot Springs and Bloomfield. Local men compete in silhouette shooting contest

Just imagine, trying to shoot at a target from distances almost a third of a mile away.

That's what Gene Scott and Butch Jacobs of Ruidoso tried to do in the National High-Powered Silhouette Shoot October 8-10, in Reno, Nevada.

The two Ruidoso men were among 147 participants in the competition that drew rifle shooters from all over the United States, Canada and Mexico.

Scott finished in a sixth-place tie in the A division and Jacobs just missed placing in the AA division, falling two points short of fifth place each day. Jacobs finished fourth in the A division last year.

The AAA division was the highest division and the B division the lowest.

"We had to shoot at targets ranging from 200 meters to 500 meters," Scott said. "Silhouetted chickens were the targets at 200 meters, pigs were the targets at 300 meters, turkeys the targets at 385 meters and rams the targets at 500 meters."

"The turkey targets were probably the hardest because of the way they were shaped. We all had to knock them plumb off the stand they were on."

Every shooter had 10 shots at each of the fake animal targets each of the three days. That meant a total of 120 shots over the course of the tournament. Scott hit the target 47 times while Jacobs connected 45 times.

Before the regular competition started, the shooters had half a day to practice their shooting.

"It was the second year I competed in the tournament," Scott said. "Last

year I didn't place, but this time I felt I could have done better than I did. I should have been satisfied but I wasn't."

How is silhouette shooting tougher than regular target shooting?

"You have to shoot from a quarter mile away, and you can't rest on anything," answered Jacobs.

"It also requires good eyesight and your mental attitude is real important. You can't party the night before and expect to do well. Conditioning is also important."

Jacobs and Scott are both members of the Ruidoso Gun Club and have competed in silhouette shooting for two years. Jacobs owns B J's of Ruidoso, a gun-repair and machine shop. He custom made the high-powered rifles both men used in the national competition.

The next competition for Jacobs

and Scott will probably be the Roy Johnson Memorial Shoot in El Paso, Texas, in December. Charlie Moore, another member of the local gun club, is also likely to compete in the shoot.

Both men are avid hunters.

"I like to hunt deer, elk and birds," said Jacobs.

"I like to hunt just about everything," Scott said.

The local gun club holds monthly sessions from March to October. You can bet that Jacobs and Scott will be on the firing line a lot during that time!

Editorial

The Planning and Zoning Commission has been called "the front line" and "the trenches." The element of truth in the "war" analogy is becoming more and more evident, and all Ruidosoans would do well to take an interest in the various "battles."

P&Z has demonstrated an awareness of the importance and magnitude of the task facing it. The commission has increased the frequency of its meetings to two a month, and has called for a workshop with the village council to discuss matters of mutual concern.

Those issues, which include parking in midtown, zoning in the Paradise Canyon area and possible planned development of the Bog Spring area, show P&Z is taking its name to heart—involving itself in both planning and zoning.

But take a situation like Ponderosa Heights Unit 3. This large area of town—which may or may not have been zoned one way or another for this reason or that—shows how a lack of integrated, professional planning in the past is hurting Ruidoso today and will continue to haunt it in the future.

Several elected and appointed village officials have acknowledged the need for a full-time village planner for some time. Why has nothing been done to hire one?

The front-line war in the trenches calls for a professionally qualified general to guide the troops.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Look for that fight over the way public education is managed to get hotter and hotter.

Leaders of the two sides in the battle are Governor Anaya and State Superintendent of School Leonard DeLayo.

Neither is expected to give the other quarter.

If you've been following this feud, now developing into a war, you know that Anaya is on solid ground when he says there should not be two state agencies in charge of schools.

As things are now, the Office of Education is responsible for disbursing state money for education and seeing that it is not misspent. A totally different group, the Department of Education, is responsible for things like choosing textbooks, overseeing curriculum and other matters which do not have to do with money.

By all logic, both those functions should be in one department, and the Governor is right in so saying.

The trouble with his position, however, is his determination that all such functions should be directly under his control.

That's what makes so many New Mexicans antsy.

Twice in recent years they have gone to the polls to defeat moves to make the State Board of Education, which runs the Department of Education, an appointed one. The people evidently feel better with folks they elect at the top in this important area.

And right at this point in history, they don't seem overcome with a desire to give all the power to run education to Toney Anaya.

They've seen this man, after all, make a ruthless and useless attempt to control the destiny of such an obscure and unknown body as the state Barber Board.

They have watched as he completely gutted the Board of Educational Finance, set up to run the funding end of postsecondary education in the state. He first cleaned out the board—even to the extent of going back to pick off another member in the middle of last week, apparently because he wouldn't knuckle under to the

Anaya style. He forced his selection for executive secretary on that body, in violation of the fundamentals of personnel policy. As a result, almost every experienced member of the staff has departed, leaving higher education with no one to speak for it before the coming Legislature.

They saw the Anaya appointees on the Personnel Board make themselves look foolish by first allowing and then forbidding agency shops in public employment.

And there are lots more—from the National Guard to the State Police.

Everywhere Anaya wants those who agree with him and will do what he tells them.

The regents at New Mexico State, for instance, know they are targets of his wrath because they did not insist that the president of that institution do something about the hiring of Frank Dubois, who got into the state's Department of Agriculture without Toney's permission.

Do you think he is going to allow those regents to select the successor for Gerald Thomas, who retires next year?

Do you think he will not insist that one of his appointees be named to run the University of New Mexico, which is also searching for a president?

The people understand these things very well—and if they don't, there are those of us who will remind them of them.

Do you think they will vote to give Toney Anaya total control, from top to bottom, of the department which affects more state spending than all the rest combined?

He'll fight hard for that privilege. If he'd make a stir over the Barber Board, you know he'll do anything for this one.

So it's a good thing that DeLayo has no reason to remain silent. Toney didn't hire him, and Toney can't fire him. Nor can the Governor touch the board to whom DeLayo reports.

You'll hear the shellfire in this battle picking up shortly, and the war could go on for a long time.

DEAR EDITOR: Maybe Al Junge has a point. Maybe those cluster boxes weren't such a great idea.

But I seem to recall filling out a survey form provided by Uncle Sam, about two years ago, which, as I recall, indicated at that time the plan was to install neighborhood boxes. If you didn't like that idea, all you had to do was say "nope" on said form and return it. Residential door-to-door delivery was not mentioned. So why all this flack now?

Just for the record, we have switched our business mail from the post office to a cluster box, which is exactly 66 steps round-trip from our front door. Sixty six steps a day isn't bad exercise. (It's certainly better than the exercise one gets from jumping to conclusions.)

"Nice trees, a supermarket, a fast food place and paved streets," read the list of things we hoped we would find in Ruidoso that my wife, Linda, and I compiled the night before my initial interview with Tim Palmer at The Ruidoso News.

Coming from Albuquerque, we had at most a vague idea of what kind of town Ruidoso really was. I had always grouped Ruidoso with Red River and Taos whenever I heard it mentioned, and Linda had only memories of a quick trip through town one rainy night several years ago.

Before the phone had come to a complete rest on the receiver after my first talk with Palmer, I had pulled out the atlas in a mad scramble to find out as much as I could about this town I might soon be moving to.

Afghan pine thirsty, fast

Richard White arrives at work two hours before dawn, straps on a leather holster and trudges off into the trees. A stubby mongrel named "Donner" ambles along behind. They won't be back until sundown.

On this early morning, his partner joins the patrol. They walk the two-acre plantation stopping long enough for White to take careful aim at one of the pines. His partner, Dr. James Fisher, a tree physiologist at New Mexico State University, is pleased with the results.

Fisher has done extensive research on Afghan pines and is now trying to determine the minimum water requirement for the trees. White, as his graduate research assistant, pulls the predawn duties armed with an infrared gun and a clip board.

Fisher says the infrared gun detects heat radiated from the surface of the pine needles. He explains

that leaf temperature indicates the tree's requirement for water. A healthy plant maintains an average temperature two to three degrees cooler than the air. The plant keeps its cool by a process called transpiration, where the plant releases water through pores in its leaves.

But when the tree lacks water, the pores close, transpiration decreases, and the tree overheats. "That's when the tree croaks," added White.

A higher temperature also indicates that less water is moving from the soil and through the plant's system. As a result, less water is available for photosynthesis, the tree's manufacturing process.

The temperature signals when the tree needs water, but more importantly, it also indicates how long the tree can go without water. Knowing this limit helps the researchers pinpoint the pine's irrigation needs.

Every five days, White takes hourly infrared readings on selected trees beginning at 4 a.m. and ending at dusk. Once a week he also takes neutron probe readings at a squared-off plot planted with a single tree. The probe measures the soil moisture under carefully controlled conditions.

Fisher says the painstaking controls are important because until now, the Afghan pine has not undergone systematic monitoring.

We want to know exactly how much water is needed to grow a tall, good quality tree and under what kind of irrigation method," he said.

The irrigation study, which is barely into its second year, is sponsored by the New Mexico Water Resources Research Institute. Fisher already is enthusiastic about their first results.

"It looks like this crop requires one-third to one-half (about 11 to 15 acre-inches) the water needed to grow pecans. We can probably bring that down considerably with drip irrigation, maybe to one-tenth the pecan irrigation requirement," he said.

White and Donner head for the

shade of the field laboratory. There under the screen canopy, White places pine needles inside a tiny pressure chamber two inches across in yet another controlled measure of the pine's ability to survive on stingy rations of water.

Fisher praises the pine for its ability to survive in the Southwest where alkaline soil, high temperatures and

aridity are unkind to most pine species.


The Afghan also is nice looking and fast growing. Fisher says the trees will grow to six feet tall in three years and be ready for the Christmas tree lot.

The Afghan already has proved successful in commercial production. Christmas tree and ornamental plan-

tations now occupy about 200 acres in southern New Mexico. Farmers also are discovering the value of the fast-growing pines for windbreaks and shelter belts. Ultimately, Fisher foresees thousands of acres under production in the Southwest.

The pine also may prove the salvation for its native Asian continent.

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
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

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
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It's a hard road

Sena Road leaves foes in dust

The distance may not have been exactly to Sena Road's liking, but the classy gelding churned up the dust in the final stages to win Sunday's 10th running of the Don Lewis Memorial Handicap at Sunland Park.

The four-year-old gelding was made a 5-2 shot in the five and one half furlong sprint which offered a purse of \$11,350.

In his last four races, Sena Road had traveled distances of seven furlongs to a mile-and-sixteenth, so some patrons may have backed off him a bit, thinking the five and one half furlong assignment in the Don Lewis was a bit too short.

But Sena Road exploded with a powerburst at mid-stretch to go charging past the two speeders Ferro Fair and Raazor Blade. The latter two had little left for the stretch after exchanging fiery shots in a killing duel for the early lead.

With Mike Lidberg turning in a perfectly judged ride, Sena Road took charge with authority and looked like an easy winner with about a half-dozen strides to go.

But Sena Road, carrying the top load of 122 pounds in the six-head field, was no casual winner, by any means. A furious late salvo was delivered by the sturdy eight-year-old stakes star, Double B. Express.

The gelding hit the final strides with a mean look in his eye and was clearly moving the swiftest of all. Double B. Express may have lost the race when, in his eagerness to get rolling at mid-stretch, he drifted in slightly, then had to get back on course. When he reached the wire, he was overhauling Sena Road rapidly.

Sena Road got the victory by a head, collected \$6,810 and boosted his career money line up to \$86,654. The mutuel returns: \$7.60, \$3.40, \$2.40. The winning time, on a track described as good, was 1:06 1/5 seconds.

The victory was Sena Road's sixth of the year and increased his '83 earnings up to \$34,587. The gelding is trained by J. Doyal Roberts for Jay C. Childers of Borger, Texas. Double B. Express, the proud pro-

perty of the Double B. Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico, raked in a \$2,497 paycheck, which boosted his career total up to \$239,572. The gelding hauled Casey Lambert at 121 pounds. The mutuel payoffs: \$3.40, \$2.40. Double B. Express was an 8-5 favorite.

Ferro Fair, a 7-2 shot piloted by Dale Cordova, earned \$1,362 for third and returned \$2.80 to show. Racing at Sunland resumes Friday at 12:30 p.m.

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

FANJET, who campaigned with considerable success against some of the finest allowance and higher-priced claimers on the West Coast, made his Sunland Park racing debut a winning one when he won Friday's featured allowance race. Under a well-judged ride by Wayne Buehrer, the four-year-old Bob's Dusty gelding hugged the rail in the middle of the pack for much of the mile race, started gaining momentum around the far turn and then barely nipped pacesetter Tonkawa Charger by a nose in a thrilling stretch duel. The North Carolina-bred gelding had raced at Hollywood Park near Los Angeles and Del Mar near San Diego before two starts at the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque in September. He finished second, just a half-length behind Curribot, in the Clyde Tingley Memorial Handicap and then was fifth in the New Mexico State Fair Handicap. It was the fourth lifetime victory for Fanjet with six seconds and three thirds from 26 appearances. He's collected \$87,063 in his career. As the even-money wagering favorite, Fanjet paid \$4.00 to win for his 1:41 1-5 clocking over a track rated as slow after mid-week rains. Trained by Johnny R. Dennis, Fanjet is owned by the Bursleson Race Horse Co. of Truth or Consequences.

AN ODDITY OCCURRED in Friday's featured 11th race when Fanjet, the even-money wagering choice, paid more to show than he did to win. With only \$206 of the total show pool of \$1,485 wagered on Fanjet to show, he returned \$4.40 to show. He paid \$4.00 to win and \$3.80 to place.

SUNLAND PARK PATRONS will be treated to the only Friday stakes race this season on Friday when the Shue Fly Stakes will be presented at 400 yards. The race matches the 10 fastest qualifiers from trial races held on opening day on October 15. The chase is designed for two-year-old New Mexico-breds. The winner will collect \$11,179.81 from the purse of \$22,359.61. Lil Motor Scooter, with the fastest qualifying time of 19.96, appears to be a solid favorite. The Good Ship, with the second-fastest qualifying time of 20.19, is also a contender. Other entrants include

Superbludady, Venice, Pony Rod, Wars Waywards Way, Scout Baby, Feature Tru, So In It and Easy Goin Elvira.

JOCKEY CASEY LAMBERT won three races on a single program for the second time this season when he accomplished that feat during Saturday's races. Lambert, who won three races on opening day on October 15, started his streak with Trextohestars (\$3.80) in the fourth, captured the eighth on Heisdebsnatie (\$7.40) and then won the twelfth on Windy's Gift (\$12.40) for trainer Harold E. Nolen. Casey's father, Clifford C. Lambert, Sr. trains both Trextohestars and Heisdebsnatie. It was the first time this season the elder Lambert has saddled two winners. He also won three races the opening day.

Lambert, Jr. won the five and one-half furlong event while Troup Leader, ridden by Casey Lambert for his father, Clifford C. Lambert, Sr. ran second. Those patrons who combined the Lambert clan in the quiniela wagering received \$11.60 for the winning 4-1 combination. Bad Companys Best was a 3-1 third wagering choice, while Troup Leader was the 9-5 favorite.

IN STEWARDS' RULINGS: Jockey Ruben Miranda was suspended three racing days (October 21-23) for careless riding, resulting in his mount, Easy A Lady, being disqualified from fourth and placed sixth, for causing interference in the seventh race on October 16.

Apprentice jockey Eugene O'Neill was suspended three racing days (October 28-30) for careless riding on Bilshir's Princess, who finished second, but was disqualified and placed fourth during the second race on Friday.

ETHEL'S PHYSIQUE became the season's first two-time winner when she rallied for a widening half-length victory in Saturday's ninth race at 440 yards. The three-year-old Noble Kingdom filly won a 400-yard dash on October 16 against allowance company and paid \$173.00 to win, the largest win price this season. On

Saturday, the Texas-bred dasher defeated eight sophomores running for a \$16,000 claiming price. Trained by Billy D. Harper, Ethels Physique is owned by Robert A. Prado of Odessa, Texas. Kevin Scholl was aboard for both triumphs. Ethels Physique returned \$16.00 to win on Saturday as a 7-1 risk.





When Bold Stick reached the straightaway, he responded to urging from jockey Martinez and steadily opened up a fat lead. At the midway point of the stretch, there was no doubt as to the outcome.

Jarales, the 2-1 second-favorite,

managed a mild rally (after helping force the early pace, then dropping back a bit) to finish second. The 3-2 favorite, Bag Of Money, was never in the chase but held on well enough to take third.

Bold Stick earned \$1,740 to go with the \$10,911 money line he brought into the race. The mutual returns were \$8.20, \$3.80, \$2.40. The winning time, on a track labeled good, was 1:14 1/5 seconds.

Jarales, with Larry Urioste up, returned \$3.40 to place, \$2.20 to show. Bag Of Money was good for a \$2.20 return.

Bold Stick is trained by Bob E. Arnett. The victory was the fourth of the year for Bold Stick and the 13th of his career.

Steve Hill tells it like it is on hotline

If you dial the Sunland Park hotline, the voice you hear will be telling you about scratches, payoffs and upcoming track events.

But don't be surprised if the voice seems familiar—or if it somehow evokes memories of football and basketball.

It's just that Steve Hill, the man on the other end of the hotline, was a well-established El Paso broadcaster before switching careers in favor of racing.

Steve's voice and TV presence became known outside El Paso boundaries for a two-year period when he did play-by-play announcing for col-

lege basketball games being televised regionally by the TVS Network. "During that period, I probably did about 30 games, and they were flying me all over the country," Steve says. "It was fun—and the money was good."

So was the exposure, since a typical audience was in the two to three million range.

Steve began his broadcast career in 1969 as sports assistant to Gary Gallup on KROD-TV (now KDBC-TV) in El Paso. In 1972, Steve was promoted to the top sports job when Gallup left to take another post in Wisconsin.

During his stay at KROD-TV

(which lasted until mid-1978), Steve also did play-by-play broadcasts (for KROD Radio) of football and basketball games at the University of Texas at El Paso. Steve then put in a two-year stint as sports director for KINT Radio in El Paso, then got back into TV when he accepted the post of sports director for KOSA-TV (1981-82) in Odessa, Texas.

But a desire to return to family and friends in El Paso prompted him to leave the Odessa Assignment, and he signed up as trackman for Sports Eye, a racing publication based in Port Washington, N.Y.

In that capacity, Steve charts the

races at Sunland Park, Ruidoso Downs and the New Mexico State Fair.

At the start of the current Sunland meeting, general manager Donald Smith, well-aware of Steve's lengthy background in broadcasting, asked him to handle the track's hotline (as well as his Sports Eye duties).

So how does Steve like his new career? "I enjoy the challenge," he says. "And there's no monotony. Every race is different."

The hotline is co-sponsored by Track Magazine in Fort Worth. The number is (505) 589-8989, and it's in operation around the clock.

Fanjet, ridden by Wayne Buehrer at 113 pounds, managed to stick his nose in front on the last jump. The

gelding, owned by Burleson Race Horse Company of Truth or Consequences, covered the mile in an excellent off-track clocking of 1:41 1/5 seconds. The winner's share of the \$3,200 purse amounted to \$1,920.

Fanjet returned \$4, \$3.80, \$4.40.

Tonkawa Charger, the property of Melvin Riggs of Fort Stockton, Texas, earned \$704 for his plucky second and refunded mutual payoffs of \$7.20, \$5.20. Duane Sterling was up.

Walkin Boss, who hit the wire eight lengths behind the two leaders, returned \$6.80 to show.

Friday's program lured 2,046 patrons who wagered \$229,254, which was a solid gain over the \$216,005 wagered on the same Friday a year ago.
