Race at Eagle Creek?

The world's richest ski race may still take place in the Ruidoso area if Eagle Creek Ski and Recreation Area owner Paul Southwick agrees to host the event.

After Sierra Blanca Ski Resort manager Roy Parker refused last week to host the U.S. Open pro ski race, promoter Paul Carson approached Southwick about the race.

Southwick said he will decide over the weekend whether or not to host the race.

"I just wish I had seen it before," said Carson of Eagle Creek.

Carson said he thinks the slope at Eagle Creek may be better than the one considered at Sierra Blanca because it is a varied slope that could

better test the skills of professional skiers.

He also said hosting the event at Eagle Creek will eliminate any potential problems associated with having to climb the winding road up to Sierra Blanca.

If Southwick agrees to host the event, the race date will be moved up to March 3 and 4 to improve chances for good snow conditions. Eagle Creek is considerably lower in elevation than Sierra Blanca and snow conditions late in the season are more of a concern there.

Southwick said he is confident Eagle Creek could host the race.

"There is no doubt in my mind we can do it," said Southwick.

He is concerned, however, about the financial burden of hosting the race. Unlike Sierra Blanca,

Southwick would probably have to close the mountain to non-racers during the race days and would lose a number of lift ticket sales.

Southwick said he has been contacted by many people who think he should host the race, and that both the business community and the village council have indicated they are in favor of running the race at Eagle Creek.

Southwick said the race would be of no immediate benefit to him but that it would help the Ruidoso community because of the extensive media coverage the race would attract.

"I don't want Ruidoso to lose that opportunity," said Southwick.

Southwick has built a new ski lodge at the area and is in the process of installing a skating rink.

Chamber endorses Eagle Creek

Eagle Creek Ski Area may be chosen as the site for the U.S. Open Pro Ski Race—billed as the world's richest ski race—and the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors voted unanimously during Wednesday's meeting to support the location of the race at Eagle Creek.

"We were surprised at the facilities," Chamber president Jim Paxton said. Officials from the board, the village council and the Lodgers' Tax Committee were invited out to tour the facilities by Eagle Creek owner Paul Southwick. Paxton said Southwick wanted the race at Eagle Creek only if the community was in favor of it.

Board members said competitive snowmaking abilities, excellent accessibility and updated facilities formed the basis for their decision.

The board also heard a report from Advertising Committee chairman Tommy Morel. Morel detailed the advertising plans for the upcoming winter season. Touching on the winter ski program and the peso program,

Morel indicated things were progressing.

"Everything is finally on schedule," Morel said. "We'll make all the deadlines."

The direction of the peso program has taken a specific approach, according to Morel.

"We did a lot of research on the state's research," he said. "We are advertising where we are better known."

Morel said the committee was not concentrating on Mexico City because they have been advised their budget wouldn't allow them to get that far in the Mexico City market.

"We're not changing direction, we're expanding," Paxton added.

According to Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Chamber, last Monday's peso seminar will be aired on Channel 11 at 6 p.m. Monday, November 21.

In other action, the board:

—Gave an award to Florence Wilson for her yearly participation and leadership in the Arts Festival.

—Heard a report from Jungbluth on the Tuesday, November 8, meeting of the Retail Merchants Committee.

—Voted funds to support the presentation of the "Messiah" at the First Christian Church on Saturday, December 17.

—Heard a presentation of the Golden Years Jubilee program by Nancy Radciewicz of the Ruidoso Business Association. Radciewicz proposed that the board consider adopting the program. The board decided to set up committee to determine the pros and cons of taking over the program.

—Heard a report from Jungbluth on his plans to attend a tourism convention in San Antonio, Texas. The convention runs from Tuesday through Sunday, January 10 to 15.

—Voted to move the date of the Jeep Party to late February or March.

—Heard a report from Jungbluth about a scheduled Spanish class that will be taught by Lynda Sanchez, a Spanish teacher at Ruidoso High School. The two-hour sessions will be held two nights a week for six weeks. The first session starts January 10.

Capitan discusses water rights

"We need to take every opportunity to protect our water rights that we can," said Vernon Goodwin, speaking at Monday night's meeting of the Capitan village council. "There's always a possibility that Eagle Creek or Bonito Lake could be cut off. You're going to have to find some underground water."

Vernon urged the council to fight for their rights in the upcoming meeting of the Interstate Streams Commission to be held Thursday, November 17, in Santa Fe. The Village of Capitan is listed on the commission agenda, seeking funding for the possible construction of exploratory wells, according to Mayor David Cummins. Village officials will travel to the capital city to air their views on the water situation.

The council also heard a presentation by Paul Crown, president of the

Utility Council. Crown proposed that the council join the Utility Council or adopt a policy that would serve the same purpose. Crown explained that the council is a non-profit organization in business since the first of September, operating in the Ruidoso area. According to Crown, the council consists of a telephone hotline that all excavators must call 48 hours before digging. The system is designed to enable the telephone, electricity, gas, cable television, sewer and water utilities to go out and mark their lines before any digging starts.

"I've seen an 80 percent decrease in the number of cut lines I get," said Crown, manager of Cablevision of Lincoln County. The council decided to deliberate the matter and come to a decision before the next meeting.

In other business, the council:

—Voted to accept the uniform traffic ordinance.

—Approved a resolution to comply with the state open meetings law.

—Appointed the village clerk-treasurer as the central purchasing agent for the village.

—Approved a call for quotes for 100 yards of gravel.

—Tabled a proposal to purchase a new telephone system for the village office until the January meeting so council members can watch developments in the telephone industry.

—Heard a request from Glenda Booher that the police department patrol the school area during the morning, lunch and afternoon periods when students are moving outdoors.

—Tabled a request from Judge Leroy Montes that the village repair a water line on his property until further research can be done.

—Approved a name change on a budget item, changing the item name from the Women's Club to the County Extension Club.

Indigent fees Downs issue

The ongoing dispute between municipal judge Paula Smith and the Ruidoso Downs trustees ignited again Monday evening when Smith presented a bill to the trustees for \$118 for attorney fees for indigent people.

The trustees approved the money for the fees, with approval from all but Harold Mansell.

After the meeting trustee Jake Harris said "she has the choice of whether or not to send an indigent person to magistrate court." He added that the village did not have the money needed to pay for attorney fees for indigent people.

Chief Public Defender Janet Clow in Santa Fe said, "In the city limits, a police officer has a great deal of discretionary power in deciding when a case is handled in the municipality or magistrate court."

A spokesperson from the Ruidoso municipal court said in some instances a police officer would automatically move a person on into magistrate court. One instance cited was a second-time drinking while driving charge. The spokesperson

said many other violations such as traffic fees and disorderly conduct would be handled better in municipal court. The person, who asked to be anonymous, said there needs to be a reason for a case moved to magistrate court besides the person being indigent.

Magistrate Judge James Wheeler in Ruidoso said, "We will not stand for that if asked whether or not indigents from Ruidoso Downs could be passed on to the magistrate court in Ruidoso." He added that "Ruidoso Downs is just going to have to provide attorneys—every other city does."

In other business Monday, the trustees:

—Heard specifications about a fire truck and equipment that will total \$150,000 from Roger Riley. Trustee Conrad Buchanan made a motion that the specifications be put up for bid and that written documentation be supplied from the State Fire Marshal's office. Mansell seconded the motion and it was approved by trustees Harris and LaVerne Cole.

—Heard a short presentation from Richard Young, representing Contractors Equipment in Albuquerque, about purchasing a garbage truck.

—Discussed the intentions of Sotero Sanchez of the New Mexico Municipal League to speak about legalities of running a court to the trustees. No information was available.

—Heard reappointments of Jackie Branum and Martha Smith to the Planning and Zoning Board by Mayor J. C. Day.

—Approved a pay increase for police officer David Hightower as requested by Chief Charles Robinson. Robinson told the trustees he is having difficulty keeping "competent" people on the force with the salary rates now offered. He said base wages are now \$750 a month for uncertified officers and \$800 for certified officers. Trustee Buchanan made a motion to approve the salary increase and Mansell seconded it. The motion passed.

—Heard a request from Paul Crown of Cablevision, who asked that the municipality provide \$150 to the Ruidoso Utility Council. He said the council is designed to help prevent heavy equipment operators from cutting into utility lines, such as water and sewer. The council made no decision. The number for the utility council is 258-5239.

Chemical task force meets again

Police chief Dick Swenor headed the second meeting of the "Chemical People" task force Tuesday night at village hall. Swenor asked what the people there wanted to do and what type of strategies could be suggested to increase the awareness of chemical abuse in this area.

He said, "We do have resources here. People don't ask until it's too late. We also have officers trained to work with chemical abuse."

Karen Tillman, representing the Ruidoso Education Association, said she would talk to teachers in the elementary school about the future possibility of drug talks there.

Ernestine Kipp and Tom Beal,

counselors at the Lincoln County Alcoholism Association, said the focus of the task force needs to be on prevention and possibly intervention.

Kipp said her job involves counseling, but "without community involvement we can only do so much." She added that the "number one drug" is alcohol.

Swenor pointed out that two years ago there was no alcohol counseling service in Ruidoso.

One person said that without State Representative Mickey McGuire, there would not be one now.

People talked about the possibility of having education seminars for parents and children together.

Dr. T. T. Marquardt said it is important to start the education early enough because of the changes children go through.

"Junior high children don't always want to be seen with their parents," he said.

Marquardt suggested the possibility of having a "drug fair" where education and pamphlets would be available. He added that not only should education be provided but an alternative made available.

He talked about "having built a teen center ourselves" when referring to his teenage years.

Each person present agreed to think about plans of action before the next task force.

The next task force meeting will be at 7 p.m. Thursday, January 12, at village hall.

First-grade teachers emphasize reading

First-grade teachers at Nob Hill Elementary School are faced with the challenge of teaching children to read—a skill that has received a lot of attention in the news media and especially in the schools.

Getting back to the basics is part of a national trend that teacher Nellie Jones said "we never left." Jones has taught 28 years, and all but one have been with first graders.

"Six-year-olds are my first love—they are so eager," she said.

Jones said teaching reading is the number one priority in first grade, but the children also should gain a vocabulary of 1,500-2,000 words; develop phonetic skills; and learn basic adding and subtracting. She added that learning to work independently and finishing work are two more goals.

This is when the importance of children having attended kindergarten is crucial, Jones said.

"When children have not attended kindergarten, we spend the first one or two months teaching skills they should know already."

She said this might be a little different for children who have watched children's programs or had parents read to them. She said she would like increased parent and community development, and possibly the formation of a professional organization.

Jones brings some added history to her students because of her own background. She is a native of the Hondo Valley, and her father fought Billy the Kid.

She received a bachelor of art degree in elementary education from Colorado Women's College (now part of Denver University) and a master's degree in reading from New Mexico State University.

One of her three grown daughters has chosen to teach, also, and works in Roswell. Nellie and her husband Paul live on a ranch in the valley.

Greta Cabot, who shares a classroom with Jones, said "she has been my greatest mentor." She added that working with Jones has benefited her class and her teaching.

Cabot is responsible for bringing the old-fashioned bathtub so "kids can read in the tub." She said there is nearly always someone in the tub.

Cabot seems to be sort of a pioneer in her time. She divorced when her children were young while living in San Angelo, Texas. She has run a day school, taught remedial reading and operated a motel.

She has taught off and on for 21 years, and said this seemed to fit in with her single parent lifestyle.

"This is a nice job, if you have kids by yourself, because of the hours," she said.

Like Jones, Cabot stresses reading. She said she wants to instill the love of reading; encourage kids' creative abilities; and help build their self-esteem.

Students in her classroom work with the New MacMillan Reading Program.

Cabot received a bachelor of arts degree in elementary education at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, and has done some graduate work in Wyoming and New Mexico.

Her daughter Lisa has chosen to be a writer and works for a magazine in

Denver, and her son John works for Sierra Blanca Ski Resort.

Cabot and Jones have a traditional-appearing classroom, and across from them is Ric Higginbotham, who is in his first year at Nob Hill. According to Higginbotham, all three share teaching, and he said it has advantages.

Higginbotham said he believes being male in an elementary school is filling an important need. He said this is because of the increase of single parent homes, where the father is often absent.

There are 23 students in his class (roughly the same number as the other first-grade classes since a new teacher was hired), and he said this is a good number to work with.

He said the combination of Indian, Anglo and Mexican children "seems to be a comfortable situation." He added that he tries to integrate all cultures in his teaching.

Higginbotham moved from White Mountain Elementary, where he spent five years. He taught fourth grade there.

He was born and raised in Roswell and received a bachelor of arts and a master's in elementary education from Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. He is single.

Principal Roger Sowder said all the teachers at Nob Hill "are probably a little more conscious of their teaching" since the publication of the report "A Nation At Risk."

He said one of the greatest changes experienced by the teachers in the next year will be the move of second grade to the White Mountain Elementary School. Besides the inside classrooms at Nob Hill, there are four portable ones outside. These, Sowder said, should not be needed next year.

Three of the four portable classrooms contain first grade classes.

First-grade teacher Linda Lott is spending "my first time home in seven years." She is in Ruidoso after spending those years in Saudi Arabia.

She has worked in education for the last 10 years, and has worked in curriculum development besides teaching. She said she has learned by observing different teaching processes and through her various roles in education that children have "multiple ways" of developing concepts.

The cultural expectations of being female in Saudi Arabia were difficult for her and for her marriage, she said. She added that the strain eventually made a stronger bond between her and her husband, though at times it could have torn them apart.

She and her husband Lindy are native New Mexicans from Eunice. He is now attending school at Eastern New Mexico University.

Linda received her bachelor of art degree in elementary education from ENMU and a master's degree in reading from California Polytechnical in San Luis Obispo.

One of the gains Lott seems to have from her experience in the Middle East is a sense of perspective about the space problems at Nob Hill School.

Situated in a portable classroom, she finds she has to work around

things like not having a bathroom or water in the building.

"We had a water shortage there frequently," she said. "You work with what you have and then try to make it better."

Lott said she wants to give students "the benefit of what is the best for them. Normally, they will give you their best. How they feel is really a projection of how you feel about them."

She has a daughter, Rusty, in eighth grade.

Pernina Martin is new to the Ruidoso school system this year. She also has a portable classroom.

Her past experiences of working with a migrant program in Texas are an advantage this year, though she says she does not speak Spanish fluently.

Martin "fell in love with Ruidoso when coming here for summers." She is not married. She has a bachelor of arts degree in elementary education from Tarleton State University in Stephenville, Texas.

Ellen Hightower occupies the portable classroom between Martin and Lott. This is her second year teaching first grade at Nob Hill. She taught fourth grade in Carrizozo before this job.

Hightower has spent quite a lot of time in Dallas, and received a bachelor of arts degree from North Texas State University at Denton, Texas.


Hightower said she is concerned about the problems non-English speaking students have, and said some of them have to repeat grades because of it. She is currently having the parent of one of her students come in and spend a few minutes one day a week to work on her Spanish. She said having a bi-lingual program is "essential."

Hightower's husband Steven is a pilot instructor, and when not working he is often home with their children, Jessica, 20 months, and Jason, nine.

"I think teaching first grade is a tremendous responsibility," she said.

Superintendent comments

Superintendent Sid Miller said students in the first grade "need a basic background in reading and math." They are promoted to the next grade after passing a combination of tested performance skills and after achieving a certain level of maturity.

He also said promotion is "not based completely on grades, but effort is included."

Teachers at Nob Hill are working around their space problems but looking forward to next year's move of the

second grade to White Mountain Elementary. They seem to think the move could alleviate some stress, simply because less students will be housed in one building.

Miller said the new high school comes first, then the old high school will be remodeled, and refurbishing Nob Hill will follow.

He said he would like to see a bi-lingual language program started, but funding prohibits it now.

Proctor came to the United States from England in 1947, but her accent remains strong. She said after kids get over her "talking funny" she has a good time with them. For her, giving unconditional caring to the children is important.

"It's good for kids to know that someone cares and it does not depend on how good they are doing," she said.

Proctor and her husband Odell have four children. She believes having children has given her skills to work with children, especially in the primary grades.

Her son Wade is a junior in high school here and her daughter is in Houston. Both grown sons are in the army in Oklahoma and Missouri. She also has six grandchildren.

"Hopefully we will all get together for Christmas," said Jean.

If the award presentations at Tuesday night's first Ruidoso High School fall sports banquet are any indication, the Warriors' athletic future is a bright one.

Six of the nine most valuable winners were either sophomores, freshmen or juniors. Letters were also given out to squad members of the football, cross-country and volleyball teams before a crowd of 250 people in the Warrior gymnasium.

Six awards were given out to football players, two to cross-country athletes and one to a volleyball player.

Master of ceremonies Dub Williams introduced the football team first.

Senior Jesse Reynolds was named most valuable linebacker on the football team. Another senior—Craig Carson—was named most valuable offensive lineman.

The rest of the football honors went to underclassmen.

All-around sophomore standout Russell Easter was named the outstanding defensive back. Easter was also the Warriors' leading scorer for the season, tallying seven touchdowns.

Junior Manuel Montano was named most valuable defensive lineman and sophomore Bobby Dickinson was selected as most valuable receiver.

George Gresham, a 190-pound junior, was named most valuable offensive back. Gresham also played a lot in the offensive line and at outside linebacker on defense.

Head football coach Darrel Stierwalt praised the efforts of his young football team that went through a winless district campaign.

"We relied a lot on our sophomores," Stierwalt said. "They were young but they came through with flying colors."

Stierwalt also spoke highly of his nine senior players.

"Most of them played for me for four years," he said. "They've learned to be winners in life and they will always be winners as far as I'm concerned."

A total of 32 letters were awarded to members of the varsity and junior

varsity football teams. The freshmen players didn't receive letters but were introduced at the beginning of the banquet.

This was the first season Ruidoso has had boys and girls cross-country teams.

Junior Cisco Bob was named most valuable runner on the boys' cross-country team and freshman Rachel Kaydahzinne was selected as the most valuable girl runner.

Bob won the district 3-AAA title and finished 11th in the state meet. The talented athlete took second in the state track 1,500 meters last season.

Ruidoso finished seventh in the team competition at state, highest of any Southern New Mexico school.

Kaydahzinne was fourth in the district meet and 34th in the state competition. With three more years ahead of her, she should be one of the top runners in the state by her senior year.

Both boys coach Ronny Maskew and girls coach Sergio Castanon praised the efforts of their young teams, citing their athletes' youth and performances against tough competition.

"The state meet was only our second competition of the season," Castanon said.

Both squads should be stronger next season as most of the runners are juniors and sophomores.

Head volleyball coach Pixie Arthur and assistant Nancy Holland introduced their varsity and junior varsity players.

Senior Laura Trapp, a two-time all-district first-team player, was named most valuable player by her teammates. Senior Lillian Lopez also made the all-district first team.

Both the varsity and junior varsity teams went winless in district action, but were involved in several close matches.

The junior varsity won three non-district matches and the varsity took two matches. The junior varsity also won nine sets.

There will be another sports banquet in the spring, honoring the winter and spring athletic teams.

"The biggest problem will be if Jackie comes back from her injury and doesn't recover fast from it or injures it again."


Jefferson is one of four returning veterans from last season's team. The other returnees are Stacy Ivy,

There will be a lot of excitement at Jerry Dale's Saturday night.

The Las Piedras Boxing Team (LPBT) of Ruidoso is acting as host for "Rumble in Ruidoso," which will feature some of the top amateur youth boxers in New Mexico.

It will give local sports fans a good chance to look at AMATEUR boxing and enjoy some good bouts.

You see, there's a great difference between amateur boxing and professional boxing.

Professional boxing has been criticized as brutal in many quarters, and some people have called for its abolishment.

However, amateur boxing is one of the safest sports for youths to participate in.

Unlike professional boxing, protective headgear is required in Olympic-style amateur boxing in the United States.

Amateur boxing also has one of the smallest injury rates of any sport.

A recent study by the Sports Medicine Committee of the United States of America Boxing Federation (USA-ABF) covered 6,050 amateur bouts and 12,100 amateur boxers. There were only 174 injuries in those bouts, an injury rate of just 1.43 percent.

Compared with the results of another study on injuries in amateur sports, published in "Pediatrics," amateur boxing comes out ahead of just about every other amateur sport.

According to the study, soccer had a 30 percent injury rate, gymnastics a 38 percent rate, baseball an 18 percent rate, volleyball a 10 percent rate and wrestling a 75 percent rate.

None of the above sports can be classified as being dangerous by any means, and most of the injuries that occur in those sports are of the minor variety.

However, that just goes to prove that amateur boxing is far from the injury-infected sport that many people think it is.

The boxers' heads are completely protected by their headgear and there are competent referees at every match.

Another advantage that amateur boxing has over professional boxing is the USA-ABF. It sets strict standards for safety that professional boxing doesn't have.

Pro boxing doesn't have a national commission. Thus, there is limited opportunity to improve safety standards. Many of the powers that be (but not all) in pro boxing rate the safety of the boxers secondary to the fight itself. They are more concerned with drawing a big crowd and plenty of media exposure.

But it's completely different in amateur boxing.

I've been to several amateur boxing tournaments and I've never seen any injury. The safety of the young boxers is first and foremost in the minds of the tournament organizers.

So, if you're interested in seeing a good sport and a lot of talented young boxers, get on over to Jerry Dale's at 7 p.m. Saturday.

Several of the LPBT could be in action, including David Ordorica, a bronze medal winner in the National Junior Olympics last summer.

You're bound to see a lot of good, exciting boxing that also happens to be safe.

Turning to my weekly National Football League (NFL) poll, the Washington Redskins reign on top this week.

The Redskins were tied with the Dallas Cowboys for first last week, but Dallas' upset 24-23 loss to San Diego knocks it out of the top spot.

Washington has won with consistency and ease in most of its games this season. Joe Theismann, John Riggins and Joe Washington pass and run behind a massive offensive line, and the defense has shown steady improvement.

The Pittsburgh Steelers have moved up to second place. The Steelers' defense may be the best in the league right now. It's only allowed 181 points, tied with Miami for the lowest amount of points given up.

Whether Pittsburgh's defense is as good or better than the Steelers' "Steel Curtain" defense of the mid-1970s is hard to say. But it certainly ranks with the best in the NFL.

The Steelers' offense has been steady if not spectacular, enough to help the defense earn a 9-2 record, best in the American Conference (AFC).

In third place are the Los Angeles Raiders. Los Angeles has a two-game lead in the AFC Western Division and has managed to win the games it's had to win so far this season.

The Raiders haven't dominated many of their opponents this season, but have won the way they've always won in the past: with clutch defense and an offense that scores whenever it has to.

Also, it's almost impossible to run against Los Angeles. The Raiders are big and physical in the defensive line and the linebacking corps.

Dallas is ranked fourth. Although their 9-2 record ties them with Washington and Pittsburgh for the best mark in the NFL, the Cowboys haven't looked impressive in many games this season.

Still, the Cowboy offense led by quarterback Danny White and running back Tony Dorsett is one of the league's best. Dallas has scored 341 points this season, second only to the Redskins' 372.

Fifth place is a tangle. Miami, Buffalo, San Francisco and the Los Angeles Rams are all 7-4 and tied for the lead in their respective divisions.

I'm going with San Francisco by a narrow margin because the 49ers have the leading offense and the second-ranked defense in the National Conference (NFC).

The 49ers' looked great in a 27-0 victory over New Orleans last Sunday. Their running game has improved and the defense has played well.

San Francisco's biggest problem is its inability to win at home. The 49ers are just 2-4 at Candlestick Park in San Francisco.

Thus, Miami, Buffalo and the Rams lead the honorable mention list. All three of these teams are solid and have an excellent chance of making the playoffs, particularly Miami, the defending AFC champion.

The rest of the honorable mention teams include New Orleans, New England, Baltimore, Cleveland, Denver, Seattle, Minnesota and Green Bay.

Turning to high school volleyball, both the Carrizozo and Capitan teams deserve some praise for making the state A division playoffs.

Carrizozo took third in the state and the Tigers lost a close decision in the opening round.



Dale said he had submitted the bid only to make sure that other bids were competitive.

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Village street improvements include paving, long-lasting stripe

Anyone who has lived in Ruidoso for a while knows that driving down Sudderth Drive can be a frightening experience. It seems that no sooner does the center stripe get painted on the street than it disappears.

"You drive down what you think is your side of the road only to find a huge pickup, who thinks he is in his lane, headed right for you."

If a State Highway Department pilot program works, some of the guesswork may be taken out of the Sudderth journey.

A private contractor hired by the village department Wednesday torched the center lines along U.S. Highway 70, and Sudderth and Mechem drives to a temperature of 450° and laid down a plastic material that is supposed to long outlive normal paint jobs.

Charles Jacques, foreman for Hug Concrete and Pavement Marking Company, said the thermoplastic street marking is much thicker than normal paint. The heat also allows the material to penetrate into the pavement, where it will remain.

"If it stays here, it'll stay anywhere," said Ruidoso street superintendent Jack LaMay.

The center line, however, is just one part of a busy fall for the street department. Trying to get as much done as possible between the rains of summer and the snows of winter, the street department has been working overtime to pave as many streets as possible.

"We really paved a lot," said LaMay.

He estimated the department has added about 10 miles of paving to village roads this fall. The Gavilan Canyon bypass, Rio, El Paso, University, Leon Farrar and numerous other streets have now been covered with a new hard surface.

"We're gaining on it," said LaMay.

He noted, however, that the village will probably never be able to pave all the streets by itself. With its hot mix

plant, the village can produce the pavement for the roads, but LaMay figures the village will not have enough money to pave all the streets for a long time to come.

LaMay is hoping residents take advantage of the new paving district ordinance the village council recently passed. If a sufficient number of property owners along an unpaved street want to have their street paved, they can pool their money and the village will pave it.

LaMay said landowners will have to pay about \$600 for each 100-foot lot on a newly paved street.

"It's really inexpensive the way we

do it," said LaMay.

Since the village has its own hot mix plant and laydown machine and collects no profit, it can pave streets for about one-third what a private contractor charges, said LaMay.

The village bought the hot mix plant last year and LaMay believes it is worth every penny of the \$350,000 the village paid for it. The village owned another one before that, but the new one is much better because the mixture of ingredients can be much better controlled.

"You're going to get out of it what you put in," said LaMay.

Ruidoso is the only city in the state

to be able to meet state specifications for paving, said LaMay.


LaMay hopes to patch five or six miles of streets including Porr, Ike Wingfield, High Loop and Glade Drives before winter sets in. But as soon as the first snow falls in town, LaMay says he will stop paving except for occasional patching along main streets during warm spells in the winter.

This winter, when not clearing snow-covered streets, the street department will concentrate on laying the subgrade on the Bog Springs Road. With as much as three feet of fill required in some places, LaMay expects to spend a lot of time hauling

this winter.

He plans to pave Bog Springs, Fifth Street and Course View Drives next spring and summer. Plans for other paving have not been made yet.

But revenue sharing requests are due into the state by December 9 and the village administration will be working out a plan in the next few weeks, said LaMay.

Village animal control a lively issue at present

"You go messing with people's pets, it's bad news," said Ruidoso animal control officer Buddy Dean.

Dean should know. He has been the center of increasing controversy about animal control in Ruidoso since he put a dog to sleep after holding it only about two hours.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter said he severely reprimanded Dean and animal control contractor Jim Woodriddle for putting Diana Meyer's 16-year-old cocker spaniel cross to sleep without holding the dog for three days as required by village ordinance.

Arrangements also have been made for sick animals to be taken to a veterinarian for evaluation when picked up by animal control. (Dean contends Meyer's dog was sick when it was brought to him. He told The News he destroyed the dog because he thought it might have the disease parvovirus, which is contagious and might have been transmitted to other animals at the Fort Stanton kennels.)

A full-time secretary is now at the animal control office behind the police station to handle animal registration and questions.

Diana Meyer, who asked for an investigation into the destruction of her dog, says she is still not happy with the village's actions.

"I don't feel like I've gotten any satisfaction," said Meyer Wednesday.

She said she has received no apologies or admissions of wrongdoing from the village. She mentioned the possibility of a lawsuit against the village for the death of her dog, although she said she would prefer not to resort to that action.

Potter and Meyer visited the animal control kennels last week and came back with contradictory reports. While Potter said he thought the kennels were fine, Meyer called them "absolutely filthy." She said there were animal feces in the animal pens, and she was unhappy that there is no quarantine area at the kennels.

Meyer said she would like to see the Humane Society take over the animal control contract. She has asked Potter to attend a Humane Society meeting at 7 p.m. Thursday at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Com-

merce. Potter said he will attend.

Vicki Eckerdt, Lincoln County Humane Society advisory board member, said she is very interested in having the society take over animal control. She said the society has land in Gavilan Canyon and blueprints for an animal shelter that have been donated to the society.

She said she thought a cooperative arrangement could be worked out between the village and the Humane Society for animal control.

Meanwhile, there have been a number of accusations and complaints for animal control officer Dean since news of the Meyer incident first surfaced.

In a five-page letter to Mayor George White, E. Marilyn Smalley accused Dean of numerous "cold blooded" acts, including unfastening the chain of a female dog with puppies and taking her away.

Dean denied the charge, saying he

picked up the dog only after being notified that it was wandering lost near Highway 37. R. A. Bennett Wednesday confirmed that he had called Dean about the dog and said Dean handled the dog with "all the patience in the world" when he came to pick it up.

Although Dean released the dog that night after being contacted by its owner, Smalley said she had to loan the owner \$38 to pay Dean before he and Woodriddle would release it.

Smalley said she saw Dean take a dog away from two children who were trying to return the animal to its owners. Dean said he does not remember the incident.

On the other side, Connie Crosby complimented Dean for his care of her dog after it had been hit by a car. Crosby said her champion hunting dog escaped from her yard and was apparently hit by a car. Dean picked

up the dog and took it to a vet where it was cared for, said Crosby. When Crosby contacted Dean a few days later, she said, the dog was fine and Dean gave her antibiotics for care of its wounds.

"It had been taken care of properly," said Crosby. "I don't know what else could have been done."

Dean said much of the current controversy has arisen because he has begun to enforce animal control laws that were ignored before. Potter said complaints have come only from people whose animals were running loose, and advised that owners make sure their animals are securely confined.

"This (animal control) is the number one problem in cities around the country," said Potter, who cited municipal studies he has received.

It doesn't look like the problem will immediately fade away in Ruidoso either.

Raid nets marijuana

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and the Ruidoso Police Department combined on a raid of a Ruidoso residence Tuesday that netted 15 six- to seven-foot marijuana plants, 50 bags of marijuana, strings of drying marijuana and a small amount of cocaine.

Fran Heid, 42, was arrested Tuesday afternoon and charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute and possession of cocaine. A warrant for her husband Ray Heid, 46, was issued on similar charges. Police reported that he turned himself in Thursday morning.

The raid was the result of investigation that included two weeks of surveillance, reported Ruidoso Police investigator Gonzalo Cordova. The high quality sinsemilla marijuana was growing in a greenhouse at the Heids' residence, said Cordova.

Editorial

Ruidoso and Lincoln County residents have indicated they want some type of postsecondary education program here.

Recent surveys show a great deal of interest in higher education. We hope those findings will provide momentum for action.

Eastern New Mexico University conducted a needs assessment survey in the county—polling high school students and their parents, as well as business and professional people affiliated with the Chamber of Commerce.

The survey concludes there is a local need for postsecondary educational services, and suggests a pilot program offering "a conservative range of academic and vocational/technical courses."

A Ruidoso Park and Recreation Department survey also reflects interest in some type of higher education.

The ENMU report notes that the document is "for use by the Ruidoso Board of Education in determining their next steps in pursuing the establishment of an Off-Campus Instructional Program."

The school board has the ball in its court because state legislation providing for such programs requires the board to initiate the effort.

So, while the administration and the school board certainly have their hands full looking after the community's elementary and secondary education needs, we encourage them to pursue means to meet the newly demonstrated need for postsecondary education.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—None of our current legislators is being investigated on drug charges.

That's good to know—but the fact that a member of the Legislative Finance Committee felt it necessary to ask about the matter is somewhat disturbing.

What's worse, the Attorney General of the state went on to admit that his office is now investigating some legislators on other matters.

That makes things very touchy. It's bad that some of those who make our laws have generated sufficient suspicion about their activities to require investigation.

And the timing is also unfortunate. We are on the verge of an extremely important meeting of the state Legislature. During the 30-day session which commences in January, we will need to develop new patterns in state government. Most important of all will be an adjustment in the thinking of those who have not yet mastered the idea that lowered revenues must inevitably lead to lowered expenditures.

For some in government that's a major change of attitude.

Already too many distractions are planned for the coming session to allow the attention to that over riding need which it truly merits.

Adding to that doubt about the integrity of some members of the Legislature, accompanied by rumors of grand juries and possible indictments, will double the burden.

Power in both House and Senate, as presently constituted, is in a state of tension. The Senate is almost equally divided between Republicans and Democrats. The House is in the same state as between conservatives and liberals.

Public embarrassment of any member or members could affect that balance sharply.

So for that matter could disagreements between top-ranking Democrats in the House, which recently led to loud, harsh words, broken furniture and reportedly a few thrown punches in a Santa Fe watering hole.

Some other interesting information the Attorney General provided the LFC:

—He told Governor Anaya, in the matter of that disputed Senate seat in Roosevelt and Chaves counties, that the Senate itself would be the ultimate arbiter.

Paul Bardacke says there was nothing to prevent the Governor from naming somebody to replace Mickey Barnett when one set of county commissioners requested him to do so. Since the other county concerned had made no such request, Bardacke says he added, it would not be appropriate for one county to frustrate the will of the other.

In the last analysis, the Attorney General says, it will be the Senate which will decide who will get seated. That could well be the first order of business for that body in the coming legislative get-together.

—He is preparing legislation which will void that portion of a statute on the books which allows Risk Management to enter into settlements of money with plaintiffs which require both sides to keep the amount involved secret.

Aim of that law, pushed by the state's in-house insurance people, was to make settling cases resulting from events at the New Mexico State Penitentiary a little easier. The adjusters were worried that if one convict found out what another was getting, lawsuits and high claims would proliferate.

That's probably true. Counterbalancing that fact, as the AG sees it, is one which clearly says the citizens have a right to know what arrangements have been entered into in their names.

—In the matter of that famous Syn-Cronamics group which did some work for the Department of Corrections, some with contract and some without, we could well end up like this: Bardacke, as the state's attorney, could end up suing Corrections as well as Finance and Administration for paying out money his office had already told them they shouldn't pay.

Your article "Owner distressed at dog's death, animal control defends action", published in the 11-7-83 News, was a sad commentary on the state of the animal control system in Ruidoso.

Mr. Buddy Dean, animal control officer, seems "trigger happy" to me. It is entirely within the realm of possibilities that a properly licensed and supervised (leashed) dog could, in a rare instance, become unleashed and wander off. What if:

1. A leash or line became unknotted or broken?
2. A mischievous child undid a dog's leash and/or collar?

Even under the most controlled circumstances, pet owners are human, and as such are not perfect. Mistakes and loose dogs are bound to happen at one time or another. However, I certainly feel that a pet owner should be given more than two hours to recover his animal!

As a new resident of Ruidoso, as yet I am not entirely familiar with the city's pet laws and the methods of animal control used.

However, I am familiar with humane and reasonable treatment of animals—and their owners. I find it despicable and appalling that any responsible governing body would allow the continued abuse of animals. The situation with the Meyer family dog "Christian" was apparently a repetition of an earlier incident concerning the Woolbridge dog, as reported in your 11-10-83 article "Animal control, EMS council topics."

Mr. Buddy Dean should be relieved of his animal control responsibilities. His decision regarding the Meyer dog was disgusting! How does Mr. Dean think Christian got to be so old? Certainly not by neglect! A three-day holding period should be mandatory, and no layman should be authorized to make the decision to kill an animal.

Mr. Dean should look up "Euthanasia" in the dictionary. By his own admission, as quoted in your 11-7-83 article, the Meyer pet was not deathly ill.

Due to this incident, I was motivated to send my membership application and donation to the Lincoln County Humane Society. I urge other people who were as offended by this horrible incident as myself to do the same.

Losing a pet, under any circumstances, is a sad experience. To lose one, as the Meyer family did, is a tragedy.

DEAR EDITOR:

The arrogance of even considering using nuclear weapons astonishes me. But many people opposed to this government's nuclear arms policy are often perceived to be alarmists, radicals, doomsayers and kooks. I find that the kooks are the politicians who play at this arms race, not the people who are terrified of nuclear war and who realize that more and more bombs will likely lead to war, inadvertent or not. Isn't it frightening to realize that through our complacency and acceptance of these weapons we have allowed the future of the entire planet to be jeopardized?

We have been coerced into protecting Europe with nuclear weapons because Europe couldn't protect itself with standing armies large enough to repel the Soviets, and now it seems we will have to destroy Europe to save it.

Millions of Europeans realize this finally, and now want our weapons out. But this arms race has become an insane game — an end in itself — and there seems no way out. So we all just keep on deploying larger and more weapons and telling ourselves it really doesn't matter anymore.

This is what I find so terribly frightening; this acceptance of the inevitability of nuclear war, and yet an unwillingness to think about it. We have the power to totally destroy this planet and all its life, not just its Capitalists and Socialists and Communists — but all life, and we just wring our hands.

What can we do? We surely can't trust the fingers on the myriad triggers much longer. The odds are against that.

We can try to look at it sanely. Are political differences worth settling with total annihilation? Does that even make sense?

Does it make sense for a man of God, Jerry Fallwell of the moral majority, to condone the use of nuclear weapons because "Jesus wasn't a sissy" as he did Monday? Does he have a death wish to fulfill a Biblical prophecy?

We must all strive to bring perspective into this deadly debate. And common sense.

But first we must begin thinking about the unthinkable. If we don't, we'll soon be living and dying it.

Reporter's Round

A tree is growing through the roof of a trailer on Birch Drive! I first saw it as I was driving to one of those convenience stores the other day. Surprised, I slammed on the brakes, ground my reluctant transmission into reverse, and backed up for another look.

It was a tree, and it was growing right through the roof of this innocent little gray mobile home trailer. I wondered if it was a freak of nature, or the result of some spectacular accident. I continued down the road, puzzled. I had never seen anything like that. Of course, coming from Albuquerque, I wasn't really used to seeing forests of trees every day, but this was certainly something of national importance.

I decided to tell my editor as soon as possible and get right on the story that would scream from headlines across America.

"Tree Sprouts Through Trailer!" Since that time I have been surprised almost daily. A residence on Porr Drive has a tree growing through the front porch, a home on Fir Drive has a tree growing through the overhang of the roof, and a home on Oak Drive has a tree growing through both the porch and the roof. One house on Juniper Road has three trees growing through the deck.

The phenomenon does not stop there. Businesses are no different. Shopping center decks dodge trees on Sudderth Drive, porches along apartments on Mechem Drive sprout several trees, and fences and cabins along Riverside Drive are wound with trees.

Even the government seems to be tree-happy. A village road near Cree Meadows divides into two lanes to avoid several junipers, and the sidewalk to village hall loops around a pine.

I wondered if some municipal ordinance was responsible, so I went to village hall, walked around the pine and spoke to Paul H. Davis, enforcement officer for the village Planning and Zoning Office.

"A lot of people think there's an ordinance, but there's not," Davis said. "I would like to see one: The idea has been proposed before, but the council has never adopted one."



Davis explained that the village does have an ordinance that requires all commercial building to be inspected by village officials prior to any excavation being done. Davis said they can recommend that trees be avoided or built around instead of being cut, but no enforcement action can be taken if tree-cutting is done.

"You have to have an ordinance on the books to enforce it, and there's no ordinance."

In residential building, an inspection by village officials is not necessary, according to Davis. In one area of its jurisdiction, the village has some input on the fate of trees. One criterion the village has to enable a variance to be granted—is trees. The village requires that all residences be built certain distances from the borders of the lot. In some cases, these restrictions can be altered if it is judged that trees can be saved. Again, this is only a recommendation by the village.

So most of this tree-preservation is by choice. The residents of Ruidoso take measures that often involve great amounts of time and effort to preserve their surroundings. That shows Ruidosians have a strong concern for the environment and the future, and I for one applaud that. When I build my first house, I'm going to be absolutely certain there is at least one tree growing through the house, even if I have to plant one!




DEAR EDITOR:



Incredible answer to Mr. T

Incredible T. established himself as the kingpin three-year-old of the current Sunland Park season with a workmanlike conquest of Saturday's \$12,175 Cutarusty Handicap.

The chestnut colt, hauling Mike Lidberg in the top load of 121 pounds, lumbered into the lead late in the stretch of the six and one half furlong sprint and won by a half-length in going-away fashion.

The outcome was a far cry from the situation in the early going when Incredible T. seemed almost certain to fall in his role of people's choice at 3-2.

He was in ninth place during most of the early furlongs, and didn't really get within shouting range until he started making up ground in the turn home.

I'duvtoo, part of a three-horse field entry at 4-1, moved eagerly throughout the stretch and looked like a winner. But Incredible T. is the type of horse who moves faster than his long, easygoing stride indicates.

There was an unhurried air about the colt when he came on at mid-stretch to challenge I'duvtoo. The latter was unable to hold him off, and gave in without much fight.

Incredible T. picked up the winner's purse of \$7,305, which pushed his 1983 income up to a robust \$40,136. The win was the colt's fifth of the year from eleven starts. He's trained by H. Don Farris for Fred L. Tidwell of Alamogordo.


The winning time of 1:18 2/5

seconds trimmed a fifth of a second off the seasonal record.

The mutual returns on the Cutarusty champ were \$5, \$3.40 and a generous \$3.60 to show. I'duvtoo, with Dale Cordova up at 113 pounds, earned \$2,578 to go with the '83 money line of \$9,749 he brought into the race.

The payoffs: \$4.60, \$3. Walkin Boss, an 18-1 outsider ridden by Gary Sumpster (at 115 pounds) for William Burgess of Alto, came from far back to take third. The gelding earned \$1,461 and refunded a \$6.20 show price.

Wagering on the 11-race card \$384,128, a solid gain over the \$351,398 recorded on the same day a year ago.

Six Doubles takes Savannah II

Six Doubles, the four-year-old who scored a nose victory in the first leg of the Savannah Series at Sunland Park on October 16, had a far easier time of it in Sunday's second installment.

In that October 16, outing he had to scramble out of fifth place to barely win the 350-yard spin.

But Sunday's test, covered 400 yards, and the extra distance made the assignment that much easier. A total purse of \$11,400 was on the line.

Ridden by Casey Lambert as a 6-5 favorite, Six Doubles broke in second place and raced just a little behind the 6-1 shot, Big Bad Boz.

But before the two leaders had reached the halfway point, Six Doubles was rapidly gaining control. He was under no pressure in the final 50 yards or so. The victory margin was three-quarter lengths.

The winning time—with a brisk tail-

wind blowing—was a rapid 19.67 seconds, which easily surpassed the previous seasonal record of 19.94 seconds set by Bubbly Bobbie a week ago.

Six Doubles is owned by LeRoy Spires Jr. of Snyder, Texas, and trained by Cliff Lambert Sr. The winner's slice of \$6,840 lifted Six Doubles's 1983 earnings total up to \$21,565. More than half his income for the year has been generated in the first two stops of the three-part Savannah Series.

Sunland patrons who'd made Six Doubles the favorite in Sunday's outing collected mutual returns of \$4.60, \$3.60 and \$3.80.

Big Bad Boz, ridden by Larry Byers, finished second and earned \$2,508. The gelding is the property of the Circle S Ranch, of Terre Haute, Indiana. The mutual payoffs were \$4.20, \$4.40.

Lovely Lou Anne, a 9-2 shot piloted by Jerry Nicodemus, broke in sixth place, then had to pick up the pace markedly in the final half of the sprint in order to take third. Lovely Lou Ann hit the wire one and one-half lengths behind Big Bad Boz. The third-place purse was \$1,368. The show price: \$3.80.

Badest Bug Alive, the second favorite at nearly 3-1, got away sluggishly and offered no threat while finishing sixth.

Sunday's program was also highlighted by Pop's Spirit, the one-time stakes star who outlegged a tough allowance field in the eighth race. The four-year-old gelding led all the way in the six-furlong sprint, won by four and three-quarter lengths and set a seasonal record of 1:11 1/5 seconds. He also became the first three-time winner of the season.

Sunland Park Will Host the Champion of Champions Paint Maturity race Saturday at 440 yards. This classic event for paint horses will be carded as a regular race on Saturday's program with pari-mutuel wagering. The race, for three-year-old and older runners, will be shown nationally on Posttime by the SPN Sports network. The 10 entrants, who were selected by the American Paint Racing Council, have captured a total of 27 stakes races and have an average top speed index of 98.5 and have average earnings of \$21,000. There are five mares and five colts in the field. By color, there are six overo horses and four tobiano. Key horses to watch include Sky Jet, a three-year-old Sky Top Bar colt, who won 12 of his 16 races in 1983 and collected almost \$24,000; Color Me Trouble, who set a world paint record for 660 yards while winning the Watermelon Special this August at Ross Meadows at Ada, Oklahoma; Swift Loretta who has won four of 15 starts this year with five seconds and two thirds; Jodi Bug, who has earned more than \$10,000 in 1983; and Mr. Showman, a four-year-old See Him Go horse, who is owned by Del Burner of El Paso and trained by well-known southern New Mexico horseman Elmer Shepard. There is a regular paint pari-mutuel circuit in California, Colorado, Utah and Montana and paints will begin running with pari-mutuels in Oklahoma in February at Blue Ribbon Downs at Salisaw. Sunland Park officials have been told more than 300 paint enthusiasts will be at the west El Paso track this weekend for the Champion of Champions Maturity.

Jockey Carlos Rivas won his first race since late in the Ruidoso Downs meeting when he piloted favored Heidi Badgett to a driving four-length win victory in Friday's fourth race. Rivas was riding a horse at Ruidoso Downs when he said he felt a sharp pain in his chest. "I had it checked out and I had a collapsed left lung. I had surgery on it on September 1 at Providence (Memorial Hospital in El Paso)," said the veteran rider who is one of the Southwest's top jockeys. "It sure feels good to get a win again." Rivas' last triumph was on My Windy Mel for trainer Lewis Germano on August 14 at Ruidoso Downs. He took Heidi Badgett a two-year-old Raise A Native filly to her victory in 1:13 4-5 in a six-furlong maiden test. Trained by Jose L. Dominguez, Heidi Badgett is owned by Thomas B. Badgett of Fort Lauderdale, Florida. As the 2-5 wagering choice, the Kentucky-bred returned \$2.80 to win.

Carla deserves an "A" for perseverance. After 14 unsuccessful attempts at breaking her maiden, the three-year-old Scout Leader filly found the winner's circle by scoring a one-length victory in Friday's sixth race at six furlongs. The New Mexico-

bred filly was unraced as a two-year-old and had three seconds and two thirds in her 14 races this year. Trained by Alberto Dominguez, Carla is owned by Johnnie L. Nall of Abilene, Texas. As the \$3.50-1 second wagering risk, Carla paid \$9.00 to win.

This Friday (November 18) will be Turkey Day at Sunland Park. After each race, a fan will be selected to take home a ready-for-the-oven Thanksgiving turkey. Fans can pick up a free drawing coupon when they enter the clubhouse or grandstand on Friday. The winning jockey and winning trainer of each race on Friday will also receive a Thanksgiving turkey.

Incredible T, established himself as one of the finest three-year-old New Mexico breeds with a rallying victory in Saturday's Cutarusty Handicap at six and one-half furlongs. The Li'l King colt broke fast in the 12-horse field, started moving up around the far turn and gradually wore down the leaders to post a widening half-length win over I'duvtoo. His time of 1:18 2-5 was a seasonal best for the distance, snapping the previous top time of 1:18 3-5 set by Pop's Spirit on October 15 and Candy Flight on October 28. The victory gave Incredible T. five wins this season with one second from 11 outings.

The number 10 was a lucky number for patrons on Saturday. There were nine races in which a number 10 was listed on the program. Those rapid horses wearing program ten posted one victory, five seconds and one third. Barbara's Victory (\$9.60) was the winning number 10 horse while Splinter Pere, Rock Shadow, Credit Kites Acct, Cash Arrival and I'duvtoo ran second. Murfette was the show horse.

Jockey Gary Sampter captured three races on Saturday's program. The veteran rider started with Play Dolls (\$12.00) in the fifth and then took the seventh on Flight Eight Staff (\$16.40) and won the eleventh with Love N Believe (\$10.40). W.L. Mooring owns and trains Play Dolls and trains Flight Eight Staff for owner Billy Ray Tivis of Portales, Lewis L. Germany trains Love N Believe for owner Guy M. Bowers of Pampa, Texas.

Daddy's Reign and Tres Prizes finished in the season's first dead-heat for win when they finished on even terms in Sunday's first race. Daddy's Reign, a \$10.80-1 outsider under Isaac Flores closed along the rail; while Tres Prizes, a \$6.90-1 risk under Kevin Cogburn, closed on the outside. Daddy's Reign is trained by Joe R. Chavez for owner Henry S. Wolfel of Albuquerque, while Tres Prizes is trained by Johnie L. Jamison. Jamison owns Tres Prizes with Wood B. Craig of Sunray, Texas. Daddy's Reign paid \$11.20 to win and Tres Prizes returned \$8.20 for his victory.

Ease Up Brother set a seasonal fastest time in Sunday's third race. Aided by a strong tailwind, the two-

year-old Pass 'Em Up colt raced to a 17:64 clocking for the 350 yards under Salustio Burgos. The Texas-bred dasher snapped the previous fastest 350-yard time of 17:83 set by Top Moons Gay on November 6. Trained by Richard A. Nolen, Ease Up Brother is owned by Monte R. and Marilyn B. Ferrell of Artesia. As a \$13.80-1 outsider, Ease Up Brother returned \$29.80 for his head victory against nine other two-year-old maidens.

Justa Hot Shot set a seasonal fastest time when he tallied a neck triumph in Sunday's fifth race at 870 yards. The five-year-old Easy Jet horse was clocked in a rapid 46:02 time, to eclipse the previous best reading of 46:02 set by Crow's Request on November 13. Ridden by Salustio Burgos, Justa Hot Shot is trained by Fred L. Danley for owner Larry G. Stephenson of Wichita, Kansas.

Pop's Spirit won his fourth straight race this season with a sparkling performance in Saturday's eighth race at six furlongs. Pop's Spirit defeated a rugged group of allowance runners at six furlongs, including the favored Banquero, who has won nearly a quarter of a million dollars. His time of 1:11 1-5 was the fastest six-furlongs this season, snapping the previous best of 1:11 3-5 set by Wild Blade on October 20. Pop's Spirit won his last race in September at the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque and then captured his first two Sunland Park Tests, beating \$15,000 claimers on October 15 and allowance competitors on November 5.

David Lidberg suffered a broken collarbone in a starting gate mishap on Sunday. Lidberg was hurt when his mount, Bold Swinger, flipped in the starting gate. Lidberg sustained the same injury during an accident in Maryland over the summer. Lidberg was Sunland Park's leading rider for much of last season before leaving a few weeks before the meet ended to ride in California.

Six Doubles set a seasonal fastest time in Sunday's featured Savannah Swinger Series No. 2 at 400 yards. Six Doubles, who has now won both Savannah Series races, was clocked in 19:67, beating the previous best 400-yard clocking this season of 19:94 set by Bubbly Bobbie on November 4. The four-year-old Easy Six horse is trained by Clifford C. Lambert Sr. for owner LeRoy Spires of Snyder, Texas, and was ridden by Casey Lambert. As the \$1.30-1 wagering choice, Six Doubles returned \$4.60 to win.

Business was really humming over the weekend as the total handle for the three days surpassed the \$1 million level. Fans bet \$264,697 on Friday, \$384,128 on Saturday, \$356,952 on Sunday. The weekend total of \$1,005,777 was up 5.41 percent over the same weekend a year ago. Attendance for the weekend was 9,054, a gain of 2.17 percent.

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

He added that the average earnings for those 66 horses prior to the trials came to \$7,730, which is more than half of their selling price.







We have recorded copious collector flow under full sun load and proportionately reduced flow speed through the collectors, allowing more insulation time under limited solar input periods (flea clouds, low incidence angles, etc.).

The Ultima II system is fully appropriate to the technological state we attempted to design into our nearly self-sufficient earth-integrated/passive solar home.

Congratulations on an excellent design that has in our opinion made all others obsolete.






