The ballad of Jake and Josh

He first set eyes on this country in a covered wagon when he was only six weeks old, in 1917.

Since then he's fished and ridden horseback in the mountains, and watched a sleepy community wake up to enormous growth. And though change furthers change, some things just haven't changed for Jake Harris.

Like being country. Harris lives in Ruidoso Downs with his wife Florence on top of a hill. If followed too far, there is a sign that says, "Dead End Dummy" (or something similar).

He says "it might take this town another 20 years to adjust to the changes" when talking about how Ruidoso Downs must adapt.

Harris has been a trustee on the governing body for nearly 10 years. Before that he was mayor.

But there's no subject that can make Harris' eyes glisten like when he's talking about the sawmill he ran, which must have been part of the lifeblood of the community.

"It was rough, hard work. It employed around 59-60 men," he said, smiling. He ran the mill for about 25 years, and when he talks about it, pictures of the millers' lifestyle in the midst of the early 20th century industrial revolution come to mind.

Harris has a quality of truth about him in which being a cowboy brings to mind gentility, and love of open spaces and natural beauty, rather than an abrasive machismo so often portrayed by movies.

He has a readiness to smile, which he did recently when talking about Josh, his dog of eight years. Josh made his way back from Colorado after he disappeared on a

camping trip.

Harris and Florence were near Williams Lake in southern Colorado around October 1 when Josh separated from them at their lake camp near the Continental Divide.

About two weeks ago Harris picked up Josh, who apparently made his way back on foot the approximately 400 miles.

Though he guesses the dog probably followed the Rio Grande and other rivers most of the way home, Harris is at a loss about explaining it.

"He could have come across country, but he would have had a really hard time making a living," he said.

When asked what Josh would do if he could talk, Harris looked real serious.

"I sure would like to know," he said.

Highway Department singing money blues

State Highway Department officials painted an austere picture of future road projects during a meeting with village and county officials Thursday at Ruidoso village hall.

Cooperative funds, which Ruidoso used to pave close to 10 miles of streets this fall, are not included in next year's State Highway Department budget, reported Highway Commissioner Phil Lee.

Expansion of U.S. Highway 70 to four lanes will stop at the Inn of the Mountain Gods turnoff and motorists will be directed over a detour through mountainous reservation land while expansion work is done over Apache Summit, explained Lee and District II Engineer Worth Smelser.

Lee and Smelser did deliver good news, as well. They outlined the department's five-year plan, which includes widening of Mechem Drive, and improvements to highways 380, 54 and 70.

Due to a predicted shortfall in revenues of as much as \$50 million in the next few years, the department has decided to cut out all cooperative funding projects in its 1984-85 budget, said Lee.

"You better take care of the system you've got before you start spending lots of money on new construction,"

said Lee. "We've built more roads than we can take care of."

Ruidoso has received approximately \$250,000 in cooperative funds in the last year and a half, said village manager Jim Hine. Almost all paving projects within the village limits, including the Gavilan Road bypass, have been done with cooperative funds from the state and village.

Lee did say that the Highway Department will sponsor and support a bill in the January New Mexico Legislature session asking for \$10 million in cooperative funds from the state coffers.

Discretionary funds supplied by the federal government—and paying for expansion of Highway 70 to four lanes—have been cut off as well, said Lee.

Previously contracted projects for expansion from the western edge of the Mescalero Apache Reservation to the Inn of the Mountain Gods turnoff will be completed, said Lee. Further expansion of the highway, however, is very unlikely unless the discretionary funds are reinstated, he added.

Lee advised Ruidoso Mayor George White to join officials from other towns along Highway 70 in a committee to lobby U.S. congressmen for the reinstatement of those funds.

As expansion work continues over Apache Summit next summer, motorists will have to drive on a

detour road that will exit Highway 70 just east of the intersection with Highway 24 (Cloudford road), travel up Goat Canyon and intersect with the Inn of the Mountain Gods road, said Smelser.

While Highway 70 will not be expanded beyond the Inn of the Mountain Gods road, Smelser said the department will repave the highway from Ruidoso Downs east to San Patricio and on a 5.87-mile stretch near the Lincoln-Chaves County line.

The department will also repave a 17.9-mile stretch on Highway 54 from State Road 14 north to Corona during this fiscal year.

The department's five-year plan calls for widening of Mechem Drive to four lanes from the end of the current four-lane section near Sudderth Drive at least three miles, and possibly as far as Ski Run Road, said Smelser. It is currently scheduled for the 1986-87 fiscal year, but Smelser said it is very likely that project could be done earlier.

"I think there should be an effort to move it up," said Smelser.

The railroad overpass on Highway 380 in Carrizozo will also be widened, said Smelser. The department is also considering improving Highway 380 from Carrizozo west to a point 10 miles east of the Socorro County line.

Humane Society discusses shelter

The Lincoln County Humane Society Thursday night discussed numerous ideas for raising money to build an animal shelter, but made no decisions for actual fund-raising events.

The society owns land in Gavilan Canyon near the village hot mix plant that was donated to the group. Donated plans have been partially drawn for an animal shelter, but not completed, reported advisory board member Vicki Eckerdt.

The society has approximately \$2,000 it has earned in past fund-raising work, according to Eckerdt.

It was estimated that the animal shelter would cost \$70,000 to \$80,000 to construct without any donated materials or labor.

Society members discussed trying to have the Ruidoso Downs Race Track hold a benefit horse race for the society. They also discussed holding a benefit run and placing donation jars with a drawing of Diana Meyer's recently deceased dog at businesses around town.

The society wants to build an animal shelter close to town so it can work out some form of arrangement for supervising or taking over the village's animal control duties.

Society members discussed what they considered poor conditions for animals now held at the kennels in Fort Stanton. They complained of unclean, unheated kennels. Meyer said she saw animals without water during times she visited the kennels.

The society also expressed concern over the distance to the kennels and

the lack of around-the-clock supervision at the kennels.

"I think people have to be out there 24 hours a day," said Wayne Perry.

Meyer said she wants to go before the village council to ask for a complete disclosure of the animal control operating procedures and expenditures.

She said the Humane Society should be put in a supervisory position over animal control. The Humane Society should be given keys to the kennels so they can make unannounced inspections, said Meyer.

While society members appeared to agree with her idea, no one volunteered to join her at the council meeting.

The meeting also ended without any concrete plans for further fund-raising.

Woman dies in Sunday fire

A woman died and a young boy is in very critical condition Monday morning after being pulled out of a house fire in the Upper Canyon late Saturday night.

Eloise A. Hash, in her early 30's, died in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital early Sunday morning from burns and smoke inhalation she suffered in a fire at the corner of White Drive and Rose Avenue.

Jonathan Hash, 10, is in the intensive care unit of the hospital suffering from smoke inhalation, according to a hospital spokesperson.

The fire department reported that a young lady, Roxanne Hash, was uninjured in the fire. Two dogs also died in the fire, according to fire department personnel.

The Hash family recently moved to Ruidoso from Oklahoma.

The fire department responded to an alarm at 12:55 a.m. Sunday morning. The kitchen area of the house was totally destroyed, with extensive damage to the north side of the house, reported the fire department. The cause of the fire was undetermined as of Monday morning. A representative from the State Fire Marshal's office was scheduled to investigate the fire Monday morning.

Search on for man reported missing

White Mountain Search and Rescue (WMSAR) members and Ruidoso and Mescalero police began searching Monday morning for a man missing on the Mescalero Apache Reservation since Thursday.

WMSAR president Cleston Pritchett said the search for Larry November, approximately 32 years old, would be centered around the south fork of the Rio Ruidoso and Cieneguita Springs on the reservation.

November—five foot, 11 inches tall and weighing 155 pounds—reportedly left on foot from the Upper Canyon Thursday wearing blue jeans, an ar-

my fatigue jacket and a small backpack. He was reported to be carrying no survival gear but is a member of Alamogordo Search and Rescue, said Pritchett.

According to Pritchett, November told a friend, Perry Stockard, that he would return Friday afternoon. Stockard reported the missing man at 1:30 p.m. Sunday.

Pritchett said positive identification of the missing person was not possible until late Sunday night. WMSAR, and both police departments began searching for November early Monday morning.

Writer Zollinger on profession

"It seems that everyone in this country who owns a Big Chief Tablet and a number two pencil wants to be a writer," said author Norman Zollinger, speaking to a Friends of the Library-sponsored talk Wednesday night.

Zollinger spoke in the multipurpose room of the Ruidoso Public Library. Author of "Riders To Cibola," "Corey Lane" and numerous articles, Zollinger advised the group on the experience of becoming an author.

"There's a big difference between

being a writer and writing," he said. "I will not submit to the tyranny of the typewriter. If I'm sitting there, I'm typing. My message to the beginning writer is to never quit, never give up."

Zollinger said much of his writing is based on the Tularosa Basin area of New Mexico, an area he became enchanted with as an aviation cadet stationed at Roswell during World War II. His first novel, "Riders To Cibola," a western, took two years to write and eight years to sell, he said.

"It takes stamina, genius and talent to be a writer, but the greatest requisite is luck," he said. "Riders To



Cibola" was finally published by the Museum of New Mexico Press. It was the first fiction book they published, and eventually turned out to be their all-time bestseller.

"My heroes have always been writers," Zollinger said. He was 47 when he started his lifetime ambition, writing. He had spent 25 years as a manufacturing executive in Chicago before coming to Albuquerque to open the Little Professor Book Center that he still operates.

Zollinger's current project, "Mortal Innocence," a murder-mystery novel, is being considered for publication in New York.

The department does not, however, plan to rebuild Highway 380 near Lincoln, in spite of complaints about a dangerous curve west of that town.

"We feel that it's a very dangerous situation," said citizen Ralph Dunlap of the curve at Double Crossing that has been the sight of a number of fatal accidents. "We definitely feel something needs to be done."

Smelser said the curve at the intersection of Highway 380 and a county road has been brought to his attention. He suggested the county apply for cooperative funds to improve the entrance of the county road.

Area resident Joe Salazar said that would not fix the situation because of the limited visibility and improper banking of the turn on the highway. Salazar said he does not let his children ride on the school bus that enters the highway at the intersection, and that he is considering asking for a court order to stop the school bus from using that route.

"They are taking this all too lightly," said Salazar.

Smelser and Dunlap discussed the possibility of putting up more visible signs and ripple bumps to warn motorists of the curve.

While Smelser appeared receptive to the idea of trading maintenance on Gavilan Canyon for a road now maintained by the state, he did not accept the trade proposed by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners.

Lincoln County now maintains Gavilan Canyon Road but does not have enough funds to continue maintenance, said county commissioner John A. Hightower. Mayor White noted that traffic will increase along that road with the new bypass and the high school under construction in Bog Spring.

In a letter dated October 19, the county commissioners proposed trading maintenance of Gavilan Canyon Road for Devil's Canyon Road, which they believed was maintained by the state. Smelser said most of Devil's Canyon Road is supposed to

be maintained by the county.


"It's really not a good candidate for a trade," said Smelser.

He suggested a possible trade for maintenance on the Arabela Road, and proposed a meeting soon with Lincoln County commissioners and the Highway Department to work out an agreement.


Ruidoso Downs Mayor J. C. Day also received little good news about possible paving of streets in that village. Smelser informed him that there are almost no department programs that will pay for 100 percent of paving in municipalities.

Day countered that his village has no money available for cooperative funds, and complained that Ruidoso Downs has received no help in spite of carrying racetrack traffic that brings in millions of tax dollars to the state.

Lee did say the Highway Department could possibly do something about dirt and gravel roads leading directly into Highway 70 in Ruidoso Downs that spill gravel onto the highway after heavy rainstorms.

Kevin Jefferson and David Ordorica of the Las Piedras Boxing Team (LPBT) of Ruidoso both came through with impressive performances at the "Rumble in Ruidoso" Saturday night at Jerry's Dale's.

Jefferson had probably the best performance of his career in taking a decision over James Chavez of Strubhar's of Las Cruces in an 80-pound bout. Jefferson's victory was roundly cheered by the crowd of over 200 people.

Ordorica, who won a bronze medal in the National Junior Olympics Tournament last summer, fought an exhibition bout against Frutosu Lovato of the Albuquerque Police Athletic League (PAL) and looked good.

Jefferson, who had won Most Valuable Junior Boxer awards at the past two Ruidoso Invationals, dominated his three-round bout with Chavez.

The wiry LPBT boxer got Chavez into the corner several times and used his jab well, particularly in the se-

cond round. Chavez threw a lot of punches, but was wild on most of them and never hurt Jefferson.

toppled Tim Lopez of St. John's at 115 pounds.



Is this year's edition of the University of Nebraska football team college football's best ever?

After watching the Cornhuskers demolish the University of Kansas last week, I've come to the conclusion that they're certainly one of the best teams in the last 10 or 15 years.

The Cornhuskers have everything. A great runner in Mike Rozier, an outstanding quarterback in Turner Gill, an excellent offensive line and a strong defense.

In fact, Nebraska's offense is probably the best in the country in the past several years. It has scored over 50 points several times this season, even with the reserves playing the second half.

Rozier will probably win the Heisman Trophy this season, and the Cornhuskers have two or three other players who could go in the first round of the National Football League (NFL) draft.

If there was a better team in college football over the past 12 years, I'm not aware of it.

The 1972 University of Southern California team was touted as one of the best ever, but it didn't play up to its capacity all the time and wasn't as consistent as this year's Cornhusker squad.

You would probably have to go back to 1971 to find a team that could compare with this season's Nebraska team. That was another Cornhusker team.

The 1971 Nebraska squad won the national championship and defeated arch-rival Oklahoma in one of the better games of the 1970s.

But this year's Cornhusker team is probably a bit stronger in most categories than the 1971 squad.

What makes Nebraska's accomplishments this season even more impressive is the fact the Cornhuskers play in the Big Eight Conference, one of the toughest in the country.

Nebraska's teams are always big and physical, and just generally wear down their opponents.

The Cornhuskers will probably play in the Orange Bowl, and their opponent will have an awfully tough battle on its hands just to stay in the contest.

Oops, it seems I made a mistake in last Monday's edition of The News.

I referred to Goddard as the second-place finisher in the girls competition of the state AAA division cross-country meet. Actually, Lovington finished second in the state meet and was undefeated during the regular season.

Lovington has an outstanding record in high school sports on all levels, and a number of Wildcat athletes have relatives in the Ruidoso area.

Lovington should continue its outstanding sports tradition for a long time—just as long as their success doesn't come against Ruidoso.

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

County P&Z wants county to get out of the paving business

"It's time for the county to get out of the paving business," Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission chairman Bill Seelbach said as the group voted at Thursday night's meeting to recommend to the county commissioners that the county not accept any more paved roads as their responsibility. The committee also recommended that paved roads accepted in the past that have disintegrated beyond repair be converted to gravel.

The recommendation came as a result of increasing costs to the county due to the number of paved roads the county has accepted that are in need of repair. With the cost of paving one mile of road set at \$60,000, compared with \$11,000 a mile for gravel, county manager Suzanne Cox said the county can no longer afford to maintain as many paved roads.

According to Cox, the county policy currently accepts a road from a subdivider only after a set of design standards is met. The subdivider then must maintain the roads "in good repair" for 24 months. Nearing the end of that period, the roads are in-

spected by the county road supervisor and the county manager. If the roads are judged in good repair, they are accepted. If they are judged in bad repair, the subdivider is notified and requested to bring the road up to standards.

According to Cox, many roads that have been accepted in the past have rapidly deteriorated soon after the county received them. Many of these roads are paved because paved roads tend to increase property values in a subdivision. The combination of these factors has resulted in an impossible situation for the county, according to Cox.

The committee also heard a report from Seelbach on the progress of the rewriting of the Lincoln Historical District Ordinance.

"We've had two meetings so far, I think they went off really well," Seelbach said of the rewrite committee meetings. "We're trying to make it fair for the people and fair for the people who have to regulate it. We're going to have the best ordinance in the state when we get through."

According to Cox, the committee will begin holding hearings around

the first of the year on each section of the ordinance as it is rewritten. In other action, the commission:

—Heard a report from Cox on proposed changes to the Planning and Zoning Commission that would in-

crease the number of committee members from seven to nine; require that members be selected at large instead of from specific communities; and increase the number of members needed for a quorum from four to five.

—Gave preliminary plat approval to the Pines of Gavilan Subdivision.

—Gave preliminary plat approval to the High Mesa Subdivision, Unit 4.

—Tabled a requested replat of Lot 2, Block 4, "C" Hill Subdivision, until the persons requesting the replat appear before the commission.

—Recommended that typo-

graphical errors in the Subdivision Regulations amendment be corrected pending an opinion from the district attorney.

—Heard a report from Cox that legal action by the county is under way against a trailer park that the county alleges is an illegal subdivision.







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

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—It's going to be an "education" session of the Legislature all right—but the Governor will be the one getting the education.

He gave it that designation, to suggest schools will be the major topic considered. In other speeches on other topics, however, he has told us what other material he wants legislators to work on, and the list keeps expanding.

That's one thing we already know he needs to learn: that no legislative session will ever be able to consider everything Anaya wants.

That's because he wants too much. The list of topics his staff has prepared for possible inclusion in his "call" for the session now has over 200 headings. It will take great discrimination to pick out of that list the few that are of real import—and discrimination is what the Anaya administration most notably lacks.

Anaya himself, it is now clear, has little ability to pick and choose. He wants it all, and he wants it now. He hasn't learned that nobody ever gets it all.

In addition, he has too many people around him bending his ear about their pet projects, all of them presented as essential for the people of New Mexico.

Example: The day The New Mexican, capitol city daily, had permission to follow the Governor around, he had not planned to go to Albuquerque to address a group of environmentalists. An irate memo from Sally Rodgers, his policy aide for environmental matters, made him change his mind and fit the trip into a schedule already too crowded. In this instance Rodgers was acting as an advocate, not an advisor. That's the role most of the people close to the Governor play, while he bounces around trying to fulfill their promises.

Anaya hasn't really yet shown what he can do during a legislative session. In 1983, he was the new kid on the block as the Legislature met, mostly defending a budget produced by his predecessor and with few measures of his own devising.

This year that's changed. Now Anaya bears full responsibility for anything his administration asks

for. Its voice is his voice. What it proposes, he proposes—and vice versa.

Now it is the Legislature on one side, and the Governor on the other.

In that mano a mano, Anaya, despite his ebullience and self-confidence, could well find himself a loser.

For one thing, legislators have been watching his performance in office, which went up like a rocket and is now falling like the stick.

They have noted how badly he wants to be top dog, the man with the power. That may lead them to remind him how powerless he is without their cooperation.

He has spent more time courting the national press than he has local legislators, yet local legislators will have more to do with his success or failure than all the network cameras ever built.

Some loyalist lawmakers, inclined to help the man in the governor's chair no matter what, complain of being treated like lackies. Others say he simply cannot spare the time to talk to them.

Because governors get the spotlight, some citizens forget the Legislature is a coequal branch of government. Legislators are well aware of that—and they incline to use their power to remind the fourth floor of it whenever the heads up there grow too large.

Even when they give a governor what he wants, they give it the way they want—and that often fails to satisfy the man who lays on the people the glowing language about his dreams.

When the session isn't on, the Governor is surrounded by people who work for him, do his will, tell him what he wants to hear and try to keep him happy.

Not a single one of those words applies to the role of a legislator.

Their job is to represent what the people want. Often that is totally different from the desires of the Governor and his personal staff.

The Anaya folks, still in the first flush of their youthful administration, will learn that with great clarity by the end of January.

And the sessions after 1984 will be even tougher.

Sense & Nonsense

U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici



Mr. President, recently the Washington Post food editor, Linda Greider, ran an excellent story on foods from back home that certain individuals living in our nation's capitol really miss. I was flattered when she contacted me and I presented her with my New Mexico favorite - Posole.

Linda did an excellent job describing posole and provided a tremendous public service through her article to exiled New Mexicans in Washington who needed a recipe, and did journalistic research far and beyond the call of duty when she listed an address New Mexicans in Washington can write to and order these rare and exotic ingredients for the recipe.

But there was one error in the story which the casual reader might have passed over, and it seems such a small error that most would think I was nitpicking. Referring to chile pods and chile stew and chile sauce, the Washington Post food editor committed New Mexican's definition of original sin when she spelled chile with an "i" at the end instead of an "e".

Now let me quickly point out that I find no fault with Linda Greider. If anyone is to blame for this travesty to New Mexican pride, it is my native New Mexican staff who helped Linda with some of her research. New Mexicans consume mass quantities of this magical and life-giving fruit from birth; and labels on chile products, descriptions of dishes at New Mexican restaurants, and billboards and advertisements all reinforce the fact that chile is spelled with an "e" and not an "i".

Even the dictionary makes the error, stating that chile is defined as "the pod of any species of capsicum, especially *Capsicum frutescens*". "Chili" is the preferred spelling and "chile" is only mentioned as an alternate spelling. Knowing that criticizing the dictionary is akin to criticizing the Bible, I nevertheless stand here before the full Senate and with the backing of my New Mexico constituents state unequivocally, that the dictionary is wrong.

Native New Mexicans are extremely sensitive about this spelling, for the *Capsicum frutescens*, commonly known as green chile, and when dried in the autumn sun in great strings called "ristras" becoming red chile, is New Mexico's most famous agricultural product. Though the

chile can be grown in other parts of the country, it is known worldwide that the New Mexico soil produces a chile pod which has a mouth-watering flavor that none can even brag about coming close to.

New Mexicans know that "chili" is the inedible mixture of watery tomato soup, dried gristle, half-cooked kidney beans, and a myriad of silly ingredients that is passed off as food in Texas and Oklahoma. The different tabascos and jalapeno sauces added to the mixture do little good and in most cases simply cause a casual visitor to suffer great gastrointestinal distress.

Contrast this to New Mexico, where ordering a bowl of chile is a delightful experience. Hospitable as we are to all visitors, we have chile that is mild enough to make a baby coo in delight, or hot enough to make even the strongest constitutions perspire in a sensual experience of both pleasure and pain.

There are those who would argue that the point I have made is a small one. But in defense of New Mexico's leading agricultural export, I must ask the questions: Would Florida be any less offended if oranges were suddenly spelled "orangis"? Would there be no outcry from the state of Washington if their apples were suddenly spelled "applis"?

I would suggest that those who argue with me should never bring up the subject with the International Connoisseurs of the Red and Green Chile. This society, of which I am a member, has an initiation ceremony which can be very painful for those of you who are not acquainted with the entire spectrum of tastes produced by our New Mexico red and green chile which is the finest in the world.

I would further tell you that if anyone is interested, they can ask for information regarding this New Mexican delicacy by writing the New Mexico Department of Agriculture, International Connoisseurs of the Red and Green Chile, P.O. Box 5600, Las Cruces, New Mexico 88003.

They are of the belief, and I support them, that chiles should become our national vegetable, even though some of us in New Mexico feel it is really a fruit.

I could go on and on about the wonders of red and green chile, but in reality, all I wanted to do was inform congress on the correct way to spell chile.

Editorial

Should athletically inclined youths in America aspire to play their sports professionally so they can make a good living and perhaps leave their mark on the history of the game ... or so they can afford to buy and use cocaine?

It has become so common to read of this or that player's drug problems on the sports pages that one begins to wonder.

A federal judge in Kansas City last week sentenced three members of the Kansas City Royals baseball team to short prison terms for trying to buy cocaine.

The judge—U.S. Magistrate J. Milton Sullivan—is to be commended. He noted the professional athlete's "special place in society" in sentencing Willie Wilson, Willie Aikens and Jerry Martin to three months each in a federal prison, and fining them up to \$5,000.

Wilson, the 1982 American League batting champion, claimed the judge "abided by the media" and made an example out of him, and that there was no justification for what the judge did.

There is some truth in the first two parts of that statement, but that does not mean Sullivan's action was not justified.

The judge undoubtedly knew the sentencing would be well publicized, and wanted other athletes to take note of it. The three players did break the law.

We all applaud the athletes who come back from problems with drugs and alcohol. Let's applaud the judge who did something to try to nip the problem in the bud.—TP


The newspaper business should be fun—there's no other reason for suffering the economic deprivation, long hours and burnt out livers inherent to the task.

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



"This is something I enjoy," she said.



Whether you're heading across the border or down the road a piece, stop first to visit your travel agent.

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


