

State won't play airport lease card?

It appears that Governor Toney Anaya and the state Transportation Department will not use a 1956 deed to the Fort Stanton Hospital to claim land for a regional airport on the Fort Stanton Mesa.

Attorney General Paul Bardacke Friday delivered to Transportation Secretary Judith Espinosa a confidential memorandum on the validity of a clause granting the state an easement to use the existing airstrip under certain conditions.

Espinosa said the memo was privileged information protected by the attorney-client relationship.

"There is nothing in the memo that would change our stance," said Espinosa Monday.

That stance has involved asking the United States Interior Department to transfer administration of the proposed airport site from the Bureau of Land Management to the Federal Aviation Administration.

New Mexico State University (NMSU) currently leases the proposed site—1,666 acres known as Site B—for range research. NMSU opposes construction of the airport, claiming that an airport would disrupt research. NMSU leases approximately 26,000 acres on the mesa. The deed to the land says the state

will retain an easement for the unused airstrip on the mesa "for so long as the Fort Stanton Hospital facility is owned or operated by the New Mexico Department of Public Welfare or by the state of New Mexico or any of its departments eligible for ownership of the above described lands, provided said airport is necessary for use in conjunction with the above described land."


New Mexico currently runs a facility for the mentally handicapped at the Fort Stanton Hospital.

Espinosa said she has heard nothing recently from the United States Transportation Department, which is currently holding the transfer application.

Efforts to have the application approved stalled after the resignation of former Interior Secretary James Watt. With the recent confirmation of William Clark as the new Interior Secretary, Espinosa expressed hope that the application would soon be forwarded to the Interior Department for his consideration.

Although Watt initially opposed the transfer, he later said he would reconsider his position.

"It did appear that Watt was leaning toward turning over the land to the state," said Espinosa. She said the state has "no reason to believe" that Clark will not also approve the transfer.

Nice big payday for Ruidoso Downs

Monday was a happy day for Ruidoso Downs and for Mayor J. C. Day. The village received the \$50,000 from the State Racing Commission that it has been waiting for months.

State Senator Charlie Lee went to White Mountain Middle School, where he and State Representative Mickey McGuire presented the check to Day. "We can really use this," said Day. "We have a sanitation truck to pur-

chase and all departments will benefit from this."

Day said the \$15,000 received from a racetrack donation last year was used to purchase two new police vehicles.

The \$50,000 payment was the result of legislation approved this year aiding Ruidoso Downs because it has a racetrack within its municipal limits.

"Senator Lee introduced the bill in the Legislature and Mickey McGuire helped carry it through," said Day. "We appreciate it," he added.

Yipes! Stripes crumbling off

An experimental street-striping material that was supposed to last two or three times longer than conventional paint began to flake off Ruidoso streets after only two days.

Two State Highway Department officials said Tuesday that the contractor will not be paid if the striping job proves faulty. The bill for the striping could amount to more than \$60,000.

"That's horrible. I was really hoping it would stay," said assistant village manager Frank Potter of the striping job.

Hug Concrete and Pavement Marking Company laid down street striping on approximately 18 miles of road from Highway 70 in Ruidoso Downs, up Sudderth and Mechem Drives to Ski Run Road. The contractor also painted some stripes along U.S. Highway 70 west of the "Y."

The striping, called epoxy thermoplastic, is laid down on pavement heated to 450° fahrenheit, and has lasted two to three times longer than conventional paint in other locations, said State Highway Department traf-

fic technician Leo Salazar.

But it began flaking off within two days, before any storms hit the Ruidoso area, according to street superintendent Jack LaMay.



"It just crumbles up like sand," said LaMay.

The striping was also laid down in nine other communities as part of a federally funded program, Pavement for Better Safety, said Salazar. Alamogordo, Farmington, Taos and Cedar Crest were among other communities included in the program, said Salazar.

Another traffic technician with the department, Dave McQuarie, said the striping has not come off in other communities in the state. Officials in Taos and Farmington confirmed Tuesday that they have seen no problems with the week- to two-week-old striping in their communities.

McQuarie said the contractor has not been paid and will not be paid if the striping comes off within a short time, such as 30 days. He said the contractor would have to either repaint the stripes or not receive money for the job.

"It's that simple," said McQuarie. "If it doesn't work, we won't pay for it," said Salazar.

McQuarie said the state has agreed to pay 16 cents a linear foot for the

striping. With two white stripes along the sides and double yellow lines in the center of 18 miles of road, the price for the striping would be more than \$60,000.

McQuarie said he thought poorly cleaned streets may have partly caused the flaking paint. Potter and LaMay disagreed, saying the streets were swept before painting.

LaMay and Potter, in fact, were grumbling last Wednesday about having to sweep the streets for a project that was supposed to be free to the village.

Gus Byrom, transportation director in Farmington, said low temperatures also may have been a problem. Byrom, who said he has had excellent success with the epoxy thermoplastic in other cities, said he thought the temperature should be 60° outside before applying the paint. The official high for the day was only 62° and the crews were painting all day.

Other special striping projects, such as raised pavement markers and rubberized paint, have also failed in Ruidoso, said Salazar. McQuarie said Ruidoso presents "our most adverse conditions in the state."

Peace and Pleiadians on Snowflake Ridge

It started out eerily enough. As dark and wind descended on Snowflake Ridge, Mike and I wandered into the Swiss Chalet, where we had heard a lady was going to pass out prisms so we could see flying saucers from outer space.

"There are those who have the Pleiadian information," read the notice above a list of 200 names on the front desk. "Meeting in room 33 at 6 p.m."

Pleiadian information? Room 33 was dark at 5:55. We saw some people we knew and some we didn't wandering the halls and knocking on the door. No one would really say what they were hoping to discover in room 33.

Finally, we saw an older man open the door with his key and step inside. He seemed a little surprised when we approached and asked him what was going to happen.

"Hmm? Oh, just a little meditation," he said. When we asked about the Pleiadian information, he handed us a letter. I tried to read the letter as people filtered into the room.

"Dear Star Seed—Walk-In's and Light Workers:

"The planet of earth is changing in vibration—readying itself to go into the Fourth Dimension ... The Pleiadians will place golden frequencies of attunement in the structure of the pyramid."

People, young and old, filed into the room, smiling, excited and talkative. They seated themselves on the floor, the beds and chairs as the room filled. "One of Twelve Power Centers which will directly receive the golden frequency will be at Ruidoso, New Mexico which is one of Twelve Power Centers hooked directly to the

Pyramid of Giza. I will have made crystals available to you which have been coded in the sun on 26° days ... join in the gigantic event by helping to bring balance and harmony to the planet. Signed Beverly Criswell and LAVANDAR."

A woman stood up and welcomed us. One man said he was so excited he would remember this for the rest of his life. Another mentioned the intense energy in the room.

Mike and I looked at each other, wondering what we had gotten ourselves into.

We introduced ourselves. People had come from Colorado, Arkansas and Florida to be at the only place in the United States scheduled to receive the "golden frequencies of attunement."

A woman stood up and moved around the room holding a small coin purse out of which everyone pulled their crystals. She mentioned the Pleiadians.

Her husband, Van Warren, told me the next day that Criswell said she had received the crystals from the Pleiadians. The crystals are charged with vibrations and will help us expand our awareness, said Warren.

"It helps you become a receiver," he explained.

Some people said the crystals tingled. Some said they were hot. My clear half-inch by sixteenth-inch crystal just sat in my hand.

There was vague talk of the Pleiadians, visitations, Hebrew greetings, positive energy and receptivity.

Then someone turned out the lights and told us to get comfortable. Someone else led us in a meditation. I don't really remember what he said, but it included things about galactic beings and receiving their energy to help us attain peace and harmony. It was very quiet and I relaxed as I rolled my crystal between my fingers.

Later that night, Mike, Sheila and I stood at a window, sipping wine, holding our crystals and scanning the skies for UFO's. We laughed at ourselves for such foolishness but kept our eyes on the skies.

I dropped by the motel the next day, the second of three supposedly charged with special energy. People were gathered in a two-room suite, sitting around drinking coffee, talking, laughing. Much of the three days was spent informally talking about subjects from skiing to peace to Atlantis. No one ever seemed to be leading the group and there was no apparent schedule. The people were friendly and easy to talk to.

After a while 40 to 50 of us gathered in one of the rooms like the night before. We were told the energy was peaking at 3:22 and that would be the best time to meditate on world peace. A woman guided our concentration to images of a peaceful world and then let us drift silently inside our minds.

Afterwards people talked about what they had seen—peace, "creative imagination" and the 100th monkey.

In an experiment, a bunch of monkeys were given potatoes to eat, she said. One discovered that they tasted better after being washed in the water. Others learned from that monkey.

But at one point, the method of washing seemed to spontaneously spread, and monkeys that had no contact with the potato washers somehow learned to wash theirs. The knowledge had spread through means other than direct teaching. Telepathy?

We all stood up, held hands and sang "Let there be peace."

This was all way out of my normal way of living, and I would think it impossible weird if I hadn't been there. Even being there, it was weird. But I liked it. The people were relaxed.

There was a warmth in the room. I knew only a few, but they all seemed friends.

Van Warren told me more about the reason for the gathering.

He said Criswell had been made aware that beings from numerous other planets were focusing a beam of positive energy on the planet earth. The main beam would be focused on the pyramid in Egypt November 16, 17 and 18. Criswell was in Egypt for the event.

The energy would be directed along ley lines that encircle the earth to other power centers in the world. Ruidoso, specifically Sierra Blanca, is the only such power center in the United States. The pyramids of the Sun and Moon near Mexico City and some ruins in Peru are other power centers Warren knew about.

Through raised vibrations properly attuned people would become more aware. Of what is not exactly clear. But it seemed each person would receive some message of use in creating a better world.

"I am involved in raising the consciousness of this planet for the betterment of mankind," said Warren.

Diana Person, a member of the Ruidoso Circle of Light, which helped sponsor the gathering, said she was not concerned about the beings from outer space. According to astrology, that was a time of high energy for the earth and thought to be a good time for projecting for world peace. She had talked to Criswell, who had sent out the letter.

Dan Austin came from Manitou Springs, Colorado, to be at the "happening in Ruidoso." He said a friend had told him that many people were coming together to be receptive to energies passing to earth. He talked of intuitive people coming together.

Post Office to work with village on boxes

Ruidoso postmaster Bernie Lechman said Tuesday the U.S. Postal Service will move unsafe and inconveniently placed cluster mail boxes and plans to work with village officials on their future placement.

At a special called meeting of the village council, Lechman also said the post office does not plan to install any more boxes this year. He said the post office will install no more at all if the council keeps its resolution requesting no further installation of the boxes.

Lechman also said there are parcel lockers available which the Postal Service could install to handle parcels larger than will fit in the boxes.

Lechman's statements came after numerous village officials and citizens explained their displeasure with the cluster boxes that have been installed.

Street superintendent Jack LaMay said the postal units make it difficult

for his crews to clean up the borrow ditches on the sides of the roads. He also said snow plows throwing snow on the sides of the roads may make access to the mailboxes difficult to impossible this winter.

Ruidoso traffic officer Robert Kenney said some boxes are in high accident areas and could conceivably be considered contributors to accidents.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter said his office was never consulted about the placement of the boxes and that boxes in Ponderosa Heights may cause difficulty when new sewer lines are installed there.

Citizen Gordon Keeler, who lives in Ponderosa Heights, said the boxes are inconvenient for many in the neighborhood who will have a difficult time getting to the boxes.

Businesspeople in town have said the boxes are too small for them because they cannot accommodate large parcels they receive, said councilman Don Dale. He also said he has heard complaints about increased

post office rates for those to whom the boxes are available.

Texas-New Mexico Power Company local manager Buddy Bundick said the later delivery time at the boxes also causes problems with his business operations.

Councilman Al Junge, who has led the fight against the cluster boxes, said there was no planning and no cooperation with village officials on the installation of the boxes.

He also read a letter from Innsbrook Village owner Jack Stahl complaining about the boxes.

"I can't even begin to comprehend how the U.S. Postal service is squandering money in Ruidoso," wrote Stahl.

Stahl said the Postal Service installed 200 boxes for the six year-round occupants of the condominium project. He wrote that he intended to file complaints with the congressional delegation and "everybody else in sight."

Former postmaster Elwood Gradine said he requested an addi-

tional post office with more boxes in the area near the Cousins' complex. He said he presumed the decision to use the cluster boxes was made in Roswell and that he had no input on the decision.

Once the decision was made, a postmaster from Tucumcari, familiar with cluster boxes, laid out the location of the boxes, said Gradine. The Roswell office then completely revised the plan, said Gradine. At that point he left the Ruidoso postmaster's job.

Kenneth Primrose, Postal Service manager for southeastern New Mexico, was invited to Tuesday's special meeting. Junge said he was invited three weeks ago, but called Monday to say he could not make it.

Primrose is on the agenda for the next regular council meeting, November 29. Lechman said he believes other Postal Service representatives from Roswell and the Rocky Mountain regional office in Denver will also be at that meeting.



First snow

After weeks of Indian Summer weather, Ruidosoans felt the presence of winter as Monday's storm left nearly an inch of cold rain and an official inch and a quarter of snow. A trace of additional snow was reported Tuesday night.

Overnight hike turns to five-day ordeal when Sunspot man becomes disoriented

"I should be very distrustful of fall hikes in the future," said Sunspot resident Larry November.

November's overnight fall hike to the top of Sierra Blanca turned into a five day nightmare when snow, wind and fog caused him to lose his way.

November stumbled, sock footed and severely frostbitten into a remote house on the west side of the mountain Monday afternoon after being lost on the mountainside for five days.

It was something "approaching a miracle" that November survived, said Robin Stebbins, coordinator of the Alamogordo Search and Rescue Squad. "We've all been asking ourselves how he made it."

November, 42, said he began hiking up the Middle Fork of the Ruidoso River Thursday. He said he carried a small backpack containing a sleeping

bag, a down vest and parka and a small amount of food. He did not have any mittens, which he termed a "severe mistake."

He camped about 300 feet below the peak of Sierra Blanca Thursday night after a nice day of hiking.

He reached the peak Friday, but became lost in the fog, wind and snow that blew in that day.

"It was pretty intense up there," said November Tuesday.

He said he tried to find the gondola of the Sierra Blanca Ski Resort but lost his way several times. He hiked down to caves on the west side of the mountain and lit a fire Friday before returning to the ridge where he camped Friday night.

He still could not find the gondola Saturday and decided to hike down any way he could. He began hiking down Indian Canyon on the west side of the mountain Saturday.

By then he was quite dazed, he said. He was hiking down a canyon, walking in a river with his boots unlaced. He said he did not notice when he lost the boots but just looked down and saw that they were gone.

He camped in a cave Saturday night, hiked the next day and camped again Sunday night.

White Mountain Search and Rescue and Mescalero Police began searching for him Monday morning after he was reported missing Sunday.

Monday afternoon he reached the house of Virginia Klinekole about six miles southwest of the peak and lay down in a greenhouse.

Klinekole returned several hours later and found him. She said she summoned two Mescalero conservation officers who took November to the Gerald Champion Memorial Hospital in Alamogordo. November was severely frostbitten and delirious Monday night, said Stebbins.

November was listed in satisfactory condition Tuesday. He said his hands were bandaged and that feeling was beginning to return Tuesday. He said his feet were still numb and that the extent of his injuries would not be known for a few days.

In addition to facing unknown consequences of frostbite, November may face charges from the Mescalero Apache Tribe for trespassing on their land without a permit.

Klinekole, a tribal council member, said the tribe was upset and has discussed the possibility of pressing charges against November.

"I do respect their land and I want to apologize to them," said November Tuesday.

November said he was also concerned about the fate of a small cocker spaniel that followed him from the Upper Canyon to the mountain peak but did not follow him down the west side.

Strange, very strange. I never felt the tingling people spoke of when the beings spoke. My crystal never did anything and I almost fell asleep during one of the meditations.

I tried to keep my journalistic cynicism and hold fast to the visible, rational world. But something was infectious.

I felt excited both times I left the Chalet. I had a great weekend, full of activity and friendship. Mike mentioned how good he had felt about his family all weekend.

"It has to come from inside," he said.

I don't know. I think I'll hold onto my crystal. How was your weekend?

Who else but the Washington Redskins as the top team in my National Football League (NFL) poll again this week.

The defending Super Bowl champions looked every bit as good or better than the team that beat Miami for the crown last season when they crushed the tough Los Angeles Rams 42-20 last Sunday.

Washington built up a 42-6 lead before the Rams came back to make the score a bit more respectable.

Most of the signs point to Washington's upcoming battle with the Dallas Cowboys as the game that will decide which team will end up with the league's best record this season.

The Los Angeles Raiders move up to second place as a result of Pittsburgh's loss to Minnesota.

What can I say about the Raiders' ability to perform in the clutch!

Place kicker Chris Bahr has won the Raiders' past two games with field goals in the final seconds of the contest. Quarterback Jim Plunkett has shown he's far from over the hill by driving Los Angeles to those winning field goals.

The Raider defense has always been tough in the clutch even though it has given up 288 points this season.

The teams that consistently win throughout the years are the teams that win close games, and the Raiders are probably the prime example of that.

Dallas is third and looked very impressive in its 41-21 victory over Kansas City Sunday. The Cowboys clinched a playoff spot when New Orleans fell to the New York Jets Monday night.

However, the 49ers have a well-balanced offense this season, and their defense has played fairly well. Some letdowns by the young and supposedly talented defensive secondary have hurt San Francisco. The 49ers have lost several close games this season, and could very easily be 9-3 instead of 7-5.

Other teams on the honorable mention list include Buffalo, Cleveland, Denver, Minnesota, New Orleans and the Rams.

New Orleans has the worst record of the honorable mention teams (6-6), but they have played well in most of their games and probably should have won the Jets contest.

The National Conference Western and Central division races continue to be the closest in the NFL.

San Francisco and the Rams are tied for the Western lead, with New Orleans just a game behind.

Minnesota leads the Central Division race by one game over Green Bay and Detroit. None of these teams have been consistent over the season.

The next four weeks should be very exciting for fans of the teams in those two divisions.

"He looks pretty good," Ames commented. "He's aggressive. He placed in his regional meet in Georgia and qualified for the state meet."


Other wrestlers who have looked good in practice include Zack Swalander and the Jameson brothers, Kevin, Kyle and Kerry.

Editorial

Like lingering fallout, the impact of the film, "The Day After," stays on, occasionally flashing into the consciousness of those who saw it.

Presentation of the film truly can be ranked as a public service—whatever critics who howled "propaganda" say—because it confronted the public with a realistic image of nuclear war and its aftermath.

Now when a person is weighing his feelings about living with the possibility of nuclear war, he can contemplate a scenario like that presented in the film.

"I just wish the leaders of the world could have watched it and seen how horrible that would be," said one watcher.

ABC-TV did call on an impressive array of public officials—past and present—and thinkers to discuss the film afterward. Their consensus, it was reassuring to note, seemed to be that nuclear war cannot be allowed to happen.

Americans differ widely in their opinions as to how this can be accomplished—from freeze advocates to hard-line militarists. But it is hard to imagine that anyone—especially anyone who saw the film—could differ on the end goal: avoiding nuclear war.

It was interesting to note that many communities around the country set up meetings and other means to help watchers deal with their feelings after "The Day After." Something of that nature might have been helpful here.

Ruidoso is isolated, but our young people are fully aware of our proximity to high-priority targets, and they do think about it.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Don't be misled when some politician tells you a tax raise in New Mexico will only cost "a few dollars per person."

Quoting the tax bite on a "per person" basis is hardly square. There are lots of persons counted in the population (like infants, prisoners, wards of the state and others) who pay few if any taxes.

Politicians know that. They choose this method of talking about the distribution of the tax load because it makes things sound better than they are.

Right now there are about 1,359,000 people in the state, counting everybody anyone could find.

Of that total, however, 417,907 are under 18. Another 115,906 are 65 years old or older. Those in both groups pay some taxes, but normally the burden on each one of them is somewhat diminished as compared to that on the 825,187 New Mexicans in the job-holding, most productive age groups.

Of those, only 534,000 actually hold jobs.

When you talk about tax burden, those are the people who carry the major part of it. The others help, but these get hit the hardest.

For understanding how that affects things, let's say, for the sake of argument, there are about half a million jobholders in the state.

If the tax burden goes up a million dollars, that means the jobholder and his or her family is going to have to absorb about \$2 extra per year in taxes.

There is just no getting around that, because these are the folks who yield the taxes—the golden geese, you might say, who have to lay the eggs because nobody else can.

If you are fortunate enough to be one of those who hold the jobs and pay the toll, you can think of yourself and what it will cost you every time one of these people mouths off about "a few dollars per year" for this, that or the other good cause.

To take one example, without making any judgment of its ultimate value: When Governor Anaya tells

people in the southwestern quadrant of the state that he is bound and determined that he will see the completion of the Columbus-to-Anapra highway, you know that is going to cost you money.

In this instance, the total cost of that project is expected to come to \$30 million. That wouldn't all be spent in one year, maybe, and it might be possible to find some federal source or other for some of the total.

But every million the state has to put up for the job is going to cost you around two bucks, no matter what.

If it takes almost \$16 million in new taxes just to pay school teachers to work ten more days per school year, the wage-earners are going to be bitten something on the order of \$32 each per year to get that job done.

Now, admittedly the state grows, and with that growth, revenues increase.

But the National Planning Association says the number of jobs in New Mexico during the period between 1980 and the year 2000 will only go up by 1.99 percent per year. That means the number of jobholders—the major generators of tax revenue, remember—will only go up by about that same figure. (The National Planning Association is a little more cold-eyed and realistic than the state's Department of Economic Development and Tourism, which would have you believe the job availability will grow at many times that figure.)

This column has already suggested that anyone sounding off on the subject of some "minor" tax increase or other should immediately be stopped and asked to specify what the source of that tax increase should be.

We now add this further suggestion: For every million in increased taxes such persons speak about, jobholders should mutter to themselves, "That's liable to cost me something like two bucks next year."

Nothing will cool the fervor for tax increases nearly so much as realizing clearly what they are liable to do to your own pocketbook.

Ruidoso Hospital to Presbyterian Hospital Albuquerque, I would like to express my opinion about the ambulance service.

A group of five dedicated people who took more abuse from the village council and the hospital than anyone should be expected to take is the reason Ruidoso had, notice I said had, one of the best services in the area this last year. These people have been referred to as working in a department of the village, described as the step child of the village services, to being threatened with their jobs by Ken Moore, hospital administrator, if they cause any problems.

I had been thinking about transferring earlier this year, but my decision was made for me on August 15th when the hospital hired Jim Stover. Mr. Stover, the very inconsistent Mr. Stover, made it plain to us he was going to have a paramedic service. This is an interesting idea. The only problem, we were not included in his plans.

A little history, last year before and after the transition to the hospital from the village, we were led to believe nothing but the best would come from the change. We hung in there hoping for the best. Wages got a little better while hours increased substantially. Training, also got a little better until Mr. Stover arrived. We are now being told it is more cost effective to hire paramedics than to train us.

Mr. Stover likes to make statements like "How much value can you put on a life". My questions to the village are:

1. Can paramedics stay proficient at their level of training with as few calls as the service has?

2. Does Mr. Stover have the support of the physicians? This is a must for the service to even consider paramedics.

3. Does Mr. Stover have the support of the council? The cost will continue to rise for this type of service.

4. Ask the people on the ambulance service about problems and solutions. Better hurry, three have left the service since Mr. Stover's arrival, and more plan to leave.

5. How is Mr. Stover spending the money of the service? Ask about the gas usage in his village furnished vehicle versus gas usage in the ambulances.

6. How much is his salary?

7. Why couldn't the fire department take over the ambulance service and save some of the local people their jobs and the village a large amount of money?

I am sure this letter will cause a rash of rebuttals but that is not important. What is important is that the people and the council of Ruidoso start to ask questions and get straight answers, not double talk.

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

Lidberg copes with injuries

David Lidberg is becoming a veteran at coping with broken collarbones.

The 19-year-old jockey sustained his second one in less than four months when his mount, Bold Swinger, in Sunland Park's second race on Sunday, November 13, reared in the starting gate. But the popular blond-haired rider is taking his second serious injury realistically.

"Sure, I'm disappointed, but I'm just glad it wasn't any worse than it was," he said. "This one doesn't hurt as badly as the last time. I hope I won't be out any more than three or four weeks, I really want to start riding again around Christmas time."

"The first time I broke my other collarbone, I was out about five weeks, so maybe it won't be as long this time," he said. Lidberg broke his first collarbone while riding in a race in mid-July at Bowie Race Course near Baltimore.

"It happened right out of the gate. The horse broke so hard his front feet missed the ground and threw me down to the ground. I then went back to Ruidoso to get better. I rode the last meet at Ruidoso and then went to the State Fair (in Albuquerque). I won nine races there," Lidberg said.

After the State Fair, Lidberg and his agent, Reeves McGuire, tried Keeneland Race Course in Lexington, Kentucky. Although they had limited

success, both enjoyed the experience of working one of thoroughbred racing's most traditional and oldest race meetings.

When Lidberg returned to Sunland Park, he was returning to the track where he made a huge impression last season. The youngster was the leading rider for much of last season until he left with about a month remaining at the west El Paso track to compete at major west coast tracks such as Santa Anita Park and Hollywood Park near Los Angeles.

Lidberg still finished second in last year's standings with 67 victories, 36 seconds and 46 thirds from 394 mounts. His winning percentage was an excellent .170.

His older brother, Mike Lidberg, passed him to capture the jockey championship.

Still, Lidberg had been enjoying another sensational campaign at Sunland Park before the accident. He tallied eight victories with one second and two thirds from 28 mounts in just five racing days. His winning percentage was a superb 28.6.

But just before the second race started last Sunday, Lidberg was in the one post position aboard Bold Swinger, a two-year-old filly.

"The horse got in the gate. She was a little fidgety. She was still, then she reared up and my right leg got hung up between her and the back of the gate. It turned me upside down and snapped the opposite collarbone from the one which was hurt the first

time," he explained. "It hurt just a little. I can move around pretty easily, but I can't pick up anything really heavy."

"They gave me a thing to support my shoulders and to keep them even. It's not a real cast," he said.

Lidberg said his brother Mike, currently fourth in the Sunland Park jockey standings, offered encouragement as did his grandfather Willie Hayhurst, a former national steeplechase champion who was his agent during last season's success at Sunland Park.

The youngster said he plans to resume riding at Sunland Park, but isn't certain if he will stay for the meet's duration until May 13. He may ride at Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Arkansas, when that meet begins in early February.

Lidberg is able to tack 107 pounds, light by any standards and with his proven riding talent, he could possibly do well at Oaklawn Park, one of the country's finest thoroughbred meetings.

Still, Lidberg is partial to the El Paso area and Sunland Park.

"It's my home here and I know everyone. I started out doing really well here. I won't be doing well for a while, though," he said.

"You get a little discouraged when something like this happens, but you can't let it get the best of you. I can't wait to get back," he said.

David Lidberg's many fans are also anxious for the talented rider to return.

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

Bubbly Bobbie outlegs opponents for Sale Futurity victory

Bubbly Bobbie, a filly who had started the current Sunland Park meeting without a win to her name, easily outlegged her foes in the fourth running of the \$174,684 All-American Sale Futurity at Sunland Park on Sunday, November 20.

It was a triumph of major proportions, since Bubbly Bobbie collected \$88,233. She also logged her third straight win, all of them at Sunland. The only previous spin on her record was a second-place finish (at 3-1 against maidens) at Ruidoso Downs during the summer.

Bubbly Bobbie is owned by the well-known horseman, Gordon Howell of Sunland Park. The filly, a daughter of Raise Your Glass out of Truckling Bobbi, was made eligible for the Sale Futurity when Howell entered her in the 1982 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs.

When the filly failed to draw a bid to Howell's liking, he repurchased her for \$11,000. Howell's faith in the filly was clearly vindicated with her powerful, front-running win in the Sale Futurity.

With Mike Lidberg turning in a picture-perfect ride, Bubbly Bobbie exploded out of the rail slot, quickly threw a three-length hammerlock on her seven rivals, and stayed in control all the way.

Key ironic overtones to the triumph included the fact that Lidberg, who's built a tall reputation as a thoroughbred rider, was up for his first quarter horse stakes win. Another significant aspect is that Bubbly Bobbie, despite having won by

one and one-quarter lengths in the trials and set the top qualifying time of 19.94 seconds for the 400 yards, was made a 7-2 shot in the finale.

But the filly was in command by a bulging one and three-quarter lengths when she hit the wire. At no point did she face a serious threat. The mutual payoffs: \$9.60, \$4 and \$3.60. Simon J. Buechler is the trainer.

Tinys Rose Bud, the 3-5 favorite who went into the Sale Futurity with a money line of \$139,644, broke a bit slowly, and was unable to generate an adequate stretch charge. But the filly (a \$28,000 purchase in the All-American Sale), moved well enough to best out Score (almost 6-1) for the runnerup slot. Tinys Rose Bud, who is by Tiny's Gay out of Runnin Rose, is trained by Jack Dube of Willie R. Talley of Athens, Texas.

Tinys Rose Bud held a head lead over Score at the finish. Larry Byers was aboard the people's choice. The second-place purse of \$29,999 pushed Tinys Rose Bud's career income up to \$142,643. The mutual payoffs were \$3.40 and \$2.60.

Tinys Rose Bud, the third favorite in the '83 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, came out of the Sale Futurity with a career scorecard of 8-3-2 from 14 starts, and ranks as one of the best bargains in recent quarter horse history.

Score, piloted by Ralph Pauline for Jess Burner of El Paso, Texas, collected \$17,646 and returned \$3 to show. Score was repurchased in the All-American Sale for only \$2,700. His

career earnings are now \$61,882, and his record stands at 2-2-3 from eight starts. Elmer Shepard is the trainer.

Bubbly Bobbie covered the 400-yard course in 19.71 seconds (no wind was blowing). This was a solid improvement over her top qualifying time of 19.94 seconds.

Jockey Lidberg, obviously elated over his victory, commented: "This filly is just as good as she had to be. She got away well and we had no trouble whatever."

If Lidberg, has any partiality to a certain number, that number may well be 100. It was Lidberg's 100th ride at the '83-84 Sunland meeting.

Trainer Buechler indicated the filly's next assignment was to come in the trials for the \$100,000 (estimated) Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity. "There's just no telling how good this filly can be," Buechler said. "Unless we decide to ship her to California, we'll be pointing her at Sunland's West Texas Derby in the spring."

The Sale Futurity was pretty much a cut-and-dried affair, with Bubbly Bobbie getting that heads-up start and keeping her grip all the way. Kingly, who was coupled with Score in the wagering, veered in sharply from the number 4 post right after the break, and lost all chances.

Here's the complete order of finish, with purse-money earned and the All-American Futurity Sale price listed in parenthesis: 1st—Bubbly Bobbie, earning \$88,233 (\$11,000); 2nd—Tinys Rose Bud, earning \$29,999 (\$28,000);

3rd—Score, earning \$17,646 (\$2,700); 4th—Native Cookin, earning \$12,352 (\$5,000); 5th—Keepcomingback, earning \$8,823 (\$16,000); 6th—Feathers Plan, earning \$7,058 (\$16,500); 7th—Noble Pride, earning \$5,294 (\$20,000); 8th—Kingly, earning, \$3,529 (\$3,000).

There were two scratches: Miss

Hearts Alive and Dapper Dancer. Each earned \$873. Miss Hearts Alive was purchased in the All-American Sale for \$4,500. Dapper Dancer drew the same price.

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Pop's captures mile

Pop's Spirit reaffirmed his position as a giant among Sunland Park thoroughbreds with a front-running victory in Saturday's spotlighted mile headliner.

Pop's Spirit, owned by the Double B Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico, picked up his fifth straight win—four of them at the current meeting—and set a seasonal record of 1:38 3/5 seconds. That clocking knocked eight ticks off the previous mark set by Holy Mackrel on October 15.

Included among those eating Pop's Spirit's dust on Saturday was the stakes star, Sena Road, who raced as an even-money favorite (his recent victories included Sunland's Don Lewis Memorial Handicap). Sena Road got burned out trying to overhaul Pop's Spirit during the backstretch run and faded out of the money.

Pop's Spirit operated as an 8-5 second choice under Casey Lambert, collected \$1,980 from the allowance pot of \$3,300 and boosted his '83 income up to \$19,883. The mutual returns were \$5.20, \$4.20, \$3.20.

The winning margin was a half-length. Unicate, ridden by Kevin Scholl, mounted a strong bid late in the stretch but Pop's Spirit refused to let the outsider get by. Unicate refunded \$15.60 and \$4.80.

Tonkawa Charger, a 4-1 shot piloted by Duane Sterling, took his best shots at Pop's Spirit in the upper stretch but

weakened in the lane and finished third, returning \$2.80.

Since Pop's Spirit is considered mainly a sprinter, his victory on Saturday indicated the four-year-old gelding will most likely be squaring off in upcoming Sunland handicap events going both short and long.

Saturday's agenda also included two 440-yard trial heats for the \$23,667 Fall Quarter Horse Derby. The trial winners were Amy Jo Mito (in a seasonal record time of 21.55 seconds) in the first heat, and a deadheat in the second between Primetime Wrangler and No Tell Motel. Here are the qualifiers and their times: Amy Jo Mito, 21.58; Top Moons Gay, 21.85; Luck's Moon, 21.89; Primetime Wrangler, 21.74; No Tell Motel, 21.74; Feature Fable, 21.83; Free Tobe Me, 21.84; Oh My Featurette, 21.87; Gonetruckin, 21.92; Senors Roundtop, 21.96.

Another highlight of Saturday's program was the Paint Horse Champion of Champions at 440 yards, which went by a half-length to the 18-1 outsider, Color Me Trouble. The six-year-old, owned by Jno Fraser of Fort Smith, Arkansas, earned \$6,000 out of the \$20,000 purse and refunded mutual prices of \$39.40, \$22.60, \$6.20.

Passumhemp, a 14-1 outsider, collected \$3,200 for second and returned \$12.20, \$6.40. Jodi Bug (40-1) got in third, earning \$2,000. The show price was \$13.

SAN SIMON TURNED in an outstanding performance while winning his trial heat for the Texas Open Futurity on Friday. The Smooth Stuff colt registered an easy victory by almost six lengths in a rapid 1:11 1-5 clocking. That time tied Pop's Spirit, who also ran a 1:11 1-5 as the fastest six-furlong reading this season. In winning the third and final division of the six furlong trials, San Simon posted his first career victory after opening his career with a third-place finish in a five and one half furlong maiden race at Sunland Park on October 30. The Texas-bred colt is owned by Cleber J. and Patricia A. Massey of Abilene, Texas, and is trained by Cecil Crabtree. Mike Lidberg was the winning jockey. The other two winners also looked impressive. Red Spider took a five and one half length decision in winning the first trial heat in 1:13 3-5 while Larrocca zoomed to a five and one quarter length triumph in the middle division in 1:14. Red Spider, an Arachnid gelding scored his second straight Sunland victory while Larrocca also scored his second straight victory. He took a six-furlong race for \$25,000 claimers on October 26 at Bay Meadows near San Francisco. The first four finishers in each trial advanced to the finale on Saturday, December 3, over six furlongs. The winner will collect \$60,825.47 from the total purse of \$101,375.79. This is the second running of the Texas Open Futurity which is restricted to two-year-olds sired by stallions participating in the Texas Thoroughbred Breeders Association Texas Open Futurity program during the 1980 breeding season. The inaugural running was held in 1982 at Louisiana Downs in Bossier City, Louisiana, while the 1983, 1984 and 1985 editions are scheduled for Sunland Park.

POP'S SPIRIT turned in another sterling performance as he won his fifth straight race and set a seasonal record in the process while capturing Saturday's featured 10th race at one mile. The four-year-old Red Viking gelding was clocked in 1:38 3-5 for his wire-to-wire victory under an excellent ride by Casey Lambert. The previous fastest mile this season was a 1:40.1 set by Holy Mackrel on October 15. The Texas-bred speedster has won his first four races this season at Sunland after capturing his last outing in September at the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque.

Trained by Clifford C. Lambert Sr., Pop's Spirit is owned by the Double B Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico. Pop's Spirit carved rapid fractions of 22.2 for the quarter mile, 45.2 for the half-mile and took the six furlongs in 1:10 4-5 en route to his half-length triumph. As the \$1,600 second-wagering choice, Pop's Spirit paid \$5.20 to win.

COLOR ME TROUBLE scored an upset half-length victory in Saturday's Champion of Champions Paint Maturity at Sunland Park. The six-year-old Red Top Trouble horse ran a rapid 22.00 clocking over the 440 yards, which translates to an excellent 95 speed index. Color Me Trouble was ridden by Doug Page for trainer Tracy Reeves and owner Jno A. Fraser of Fort Smith, Arkansas. Color Me Trouble's victory over Passumhemp, a 14-1 outsider, was his second this year with one second and one third from six tries. He returned \$39.40, \$22.60 and \$6.20. Passumhemp ran second and paid \$12.20 and \$6.40 while Jodi Bug was third and returned \$13.00. Sky Jet, the 4-5 favorite took the early lead but finished ninth.

O.A. MARTINEZ JR. won three races on Friday's program, including wins in the final two events. He started by winning with Red Spider (\$3.80) for trainer Margie S. Renfro in the fourth, then took the tenth with Delfer (\$9.00) for trainer Billy Powell and then captured the eleventh with Arabian Host (\$9.20) for trainer Fred J. Hardy.

MR WISE DANCER set a seasonal fastest time when he posted an easy length win in Saturday's fourth race at 870 yards. The five-year-old Mito Wise Dancer gelding raced to a 45:92 clocking, aided by a strong tailwind. That was better than the previous fastest time of 46:02 set by Justa Hot Shot on November 13. The Texas-bred quarter horse is trained by Jerry L. Henson for owner Jim McCary of Littlefield, Texas. Kevin Scholl was the winning jockey. As the \$2.00-1 wagering favorite, Mr Wise Dancer paid \$8.00 to win.

THE TEAM OF JOCKEY Jerry Burgess, trainer M. Brent Davidson and owner Tommy Joe Hoyt of Powderly, Texas, were the big stars of the two trial races on Saturday for

the Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Derby. The trio gained a win in the first 440-yard trial with Amy Jo Mito and then dead-heated to win the second event with Primetime Wrangler, who tied with No Tell Motel. The 10 fastest qualifiers advanced to the Fall Quarter Horse Derby, set for 440-yards on Sunday, December 4. The winner will collect \$11,633.64 from the total purse of \$23,667.27. All three winning horses eclipsed the previous 440-yard seasonal fastest time of 21:84 set by Gonetruckin on November 5. Amy Jo Mito raced to a 21:56 clocking, one of the fastest 440-yard readings in recent years while No Tell Motel and Primetime Wrangler were each clocked in 21:74. No Tell Motel was ridden by Roy Brooks for trainer Thomas Zarate and owner McDermott Ranch of Madisonville, Texas.

Friday's seventh race at 350 yards. The nine-year-old Top Moon gelding started his streak on October 22 with a win by almost one length against \$8,000 claiming horses at 350 yards on October 29. The Oklahoma-bred runner defeated \$8,000 claimers on Friday under Larry Chavez. Trained by Donaki E. Mooney, Top Levan is owned by Donnie R. Stewart of Fort Worth, Texas. As the 9-10 wagering favorite, Top Levan returned \$3.80 to win.

MISS PASSERA SET a seasonal fastest time when she roared to a 19:59 clocking aided by a hefty tailwind, in Friday's ninth race. The Florida-bred runner is trained by Clifford C. Lambert Jr. for owner Mack Alitzer of Alpine, Texas. O.A. Martinez Jr. has been aboard all three triumphs. As the 3-5 wagering favorite on Sunday, Bad Companys Best returned \$3.20 to win.

STAR ROUTE SET a seasonal fastest time when she roared to a 19:59 clocking aided by a hefty tailwind, in Friday's ninth race at six furlongs. The six-year-old Somebody II gelding led throughout in scoring a widening win by almost five lengths over Christian Name in a rapid 1:10 3-5 clocking. That was better than the previous best six-furlong reading this season of 1:11 1-5 set by three horses. Star Route defeated eight foes running for \$10,000 claiming prices on Sunday. Ridden by O.A. Martinez Jr., Star Route is trained by Dawn M. McDaniel for owners Jackie D. McClanahan and Ralph N. Miller of Fluvanna, Texas. As the \$3.10-1 third wagering choice, Star Route returned \$3.20 to win.

Maiden colt steals show

The first step toward the richest thoroughbred race in the history of fall racing at Sunland Park was taken Friday, and the show was stolen by a maiden colt who had been to the races only once in his career.

The main spotlight was on the three six-furlong trial races for the Texas Open Futurity.

With a gross purse of \$126,719, the Texas Open Futurity will hand the winner a handsome \$60,825 when the finale is staged on Saturday December 3.

That \$126,719 will easily surpass the previous all-time purse high in fall thoroughbred racing at Sunland. The previous mark was set at \$88,864 with last year's version of the Fall Thoroughbred Futurity.

The upstart colt who grabbed the spotlight in the trials was San Simon, a 10-1 shot owned by Cleber and Patricia Massey of Abilene, Texas. In his only previous try at racing (on October 30), San Simon ran a well-beaten third against maidens.

But the memory of that unimpressive racing debut was wiped out when San Simon led all the way in the eighth race, winning by a thumping five and three-quarters lengths.

clocking the distance in 1:11 1/5 seconds, and soundly whipping the stakes star, Nitap (who's earned \$73,484).

Nitap quit badly in the stretch (as an odds-on favorite), ended up fifth, and failed to make the qualifying cut. In order to make the finale, a hopeful had to finish in the top four in his trial heat.

San Simon's clocking was the fastest of the three heats. Mike Lidberg was up. The mutual returns were \$23.20, \$7.40, \$9.60.

Also qualifying from that trial were Secret Mountain, Dragon Song and Break And Take (who finished in that order). The sixth race (the day's second trial heat) was won by Larrocca (\$3 to win) in 1:14 flat. That trial also produced the following qualifiers: Hot N Sandy, Internat'l Velvet, Troup Leader.

The first trial race (fourth race) went to Red Spider (\$3.80) in 1:13 3/5 seconds, who was followed under the wire by Luscius, Mr. Muffitt, Atomic Angel.

Gusty winds in the 30-40 mile-per-hour range were blowing throughout the afternoon.



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Ancient 'accounts' aided Incans

A hundred years before Columbus, a man stood on the rugged slopes of the Peruvian Andes.

To his left, less than 100 miles away, glistened the waters of the Pacific Ocean. To his right, just over the nearby peaks, glaciers fed the headwaters of the Amazon River, flowing some 3,500 miles to the distant Atlantic.

But the man was oblivious to the grandeur around him, for his attention was on the laborers who were filling a remote government warehouse in the farflung Incan empire.

As the work proceeded, his fingers flew deftly over a cluster of knotted strings. They looked like the head of an old mop. With no written language, these strings formed the basis of recorded information. They were as important to the Incan civilization as the computer is to ours.

The man manipulating the strings was what we would consider an accountant. It was his job to record how much and what kinds of food and other supplies were stored in this and other warehouses to be used in times of famine or war.

The Incan empire flourished for some 400 years partly because of the managerial skills of this man and his fellow professional accountants, according to a University of New Mexico (UNM) professor.

Even without a written language, the Incan accountants used their knotted string devices, or quipus, to keep extensive records of population, taxation, production and supply inventories, says Dr. John A. Yeakel, professor of accounting at the UNM School of Management.

These records made possible a socialistic, planned economy over a 380,000-square-mile empire, an area approximately equal to all of the present Atlantic seaboard states combined.

Some information about how the accounting system was used has been reconstructed, however. For example, Yeakel says the accounting of the Incan quipucamayocs (or accountants) was somewhat different from today's accounting. Modern accounting is generally a matter of recording transactions by means of a common denominator — money.

"But the Incan civilization had no money, and its vast quantities of gold

and silver had no convertibility in our common-denominator sense," Yeakel says. "Quipucamayocs recorded statistical quantities, not monetary equivalents as do twentieth-century accountants."

Among the vital statistical chores done by the quipucamayocs was the recording of births and deaths on an annual basis within each province. Quipucamayocs also held critical positions in the operation of the taxation system.

Theirs was the job of calculating and recording the amount of labor and other items furnished or still due.

"If a conquered area was deemed too poor to pay tribute, the Inca ordered that each inhabitant turn in every four months a large quill full of live lice as a form of taxation, until such time as the natives became more prosperous," Yeakel says.

Another job of the quipucamayocs was to account for food stored in government warehouses.

Agricultural land was divided by the Inca into three parts. One part was cultivated for religion, a second part was assigned to the Inca and the general support of the government, while the third was left for food production for the ordinary citizens.

Although agricultural land was limited, its productivity was high.

"Land designated to support the government was farmed to fill warehouses that dotted the nation," Yeakel says. "During times of war, distribution of food and other provisions was made to the soldiers."

"If a particular region suffered crop failure, food was redistributed from the storehouses to the afflicted area. The warehouse system made famine virtually unknown."

The quipucamayocs recorded the transactions affecting inventories in these and other warehouses, and they were subject to audit from time to time.

In addition, even though the quantity of quipus and quipucamayocs needed for such an accounting system throughout the empire was considerable, Incan law further required duplicate quipus at the higher administrative levels for internal control purposes.

Historical evidence from Spanish records indicates there was specialization among the quipu experts. For example, while some controlled the system of taxation and the

contents of the government warehouses, others recorded the history of the rulers.

"Although quipu experts have often been thought of as managerial or government accountants, the writings of the early chroniclers of Peru reveal quipu specialists were more than accountants. Quipucamayocs were also the historians of the Incas."

Historical records were selective, and more than one version was kept, Yeakel says. The common people heard one and the Inca's family heard another.

"After the death of an Inca, the elders of the people decided which events, which took place during his reign, should be remembered. Expanding the empire, for example, was worthy of note by the quipucamayocs."

"Laziness, cowardliness or excessive indulgence in vice and pleasure warranted virtual oblivion in the historical record."

Most of the quipus were destroyed and the quipucamayocs killed, first in a civil war over which of two brothers would hold the Incan throne, and later by the Spaniards attempting to stamp out "pagan" practices.
