

Water hearing Tuesday

What one village official called "the most important thing the Village of Ruidoso has ever been involved in" gets under way at 9 a.m. Tuesday at village hall.

The State Engineer's Office will conduct a hearing Tuesday and possibly Wednesday on a water protest affecting Ruidoso's plans to use its effluent water credit.

Property owners between Ruidoso's old and new sewer plants filed a protest in June 1982 against the village's application for a change in the point of discharge of treated wastewater into the Rio Ruidoso. Efforts to settle the protest through negotiation failed, thus the hearing this week.

Until the matter is settled, the village is prohibited from using its effluent credit water rights on the river. Plans call for using those rights—which give the village credit for a portion of water that goes through its system and is then discharged as treated wastewater—to fill the Grindstone reservoir approved by voters last year.

"Our whole water planning has been centered around the permitted

use of the sewage credit waters that we do have a permit for," said village manager Jim Hine last week. He noted that the protestants are not protesting those plans but the change in discharge points.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter, who made the "most important thing ever" comment, pointed out that a "tremendous amount of work" has gone into preparing for this week's hearing.

Hine said the village has retained two expert witnesses—hydrologist-engineer Ralph Vail and engineer Jack Atkins. Hine predicts a cut and dried verdict from the hearing, but he noted that the State Engineer's Office could present options for arbitration that would suggest a way to resolve the dispute.

The verdict will not be announced at the conclusion of the hearing, but Hine said it can be expected within 30 days.

Attorney Dan Sanchez of Santa Fe, counsel to the State Engineer's Office, explained the hearing procedure.

"Basically it's pretty much a court hearing without all the strict rules of the court," he said.

Sanchez explained that the applicant (Village of Ruidoso) will present

its position, followed by the protestants. The State Engineer's Office will then present its position, if it decides to take one.

The procedure will then be repeated, with each party presenting its case, including witnesses and evidence. This step is also optional for the State Engineer's Office—it is used when the state feels there are areas that have not been brought out but need to be.

Sanchez did say he has four expert witnesses he expects to call. Cross-examination by the other parties also takes place at this stage.

Next and finally, each party makes a closing statement (again, optional for State Engineer).

Eluid Martinez of the State Engineer's Office will act as hearing officer. Sanchez compared the position with that of Special Master. The hearing officer takes evidence and hears testimony, then goes back through the evidence in preparing a written report for the State Engineer.

That report includes a recommendation, but the final decision on the valley water protest will be up to State Engineer Steve Reynolds. Sanchez said the hearing officer's recommendation is usually followed.

Revenue sharing funds coming

A sigh of relief could be heard in Ruidoso and Carrizozo recently when revenue sharing funds were approved in Washington, D.C.

In the closing hours of the 1983 legislative session, the U.S. Senate reauthorized the General Revenue Sharing Program, which will contribute \$37 million to communities in New Mexico.

"The General Revenue Sharing Program is one of the best federal aid programs," said Senator Pete Domenici. "It passes funds directly to local governments without unnecessary federal strings. It is cost-effective. It holds down regressive local taxes and it provides for vitally needed local services."

Ruidoso will receive \$176,607 of revenue sharing funds. Village manager Jim Hine said the village anticipated the funding and has already determined how the money will be spent. Ruidoso will allocate \$39,000 for animal control; \$23,000 towards the purchase of a building at the corner of Sudderth and Mechem now owned by the fire department; \$26,000 for the purchase of land in the Bog Springs Road right of way; \$30,000 for a traffic planning study; \$33,000 into the general fund; and \$18,570 towards the new police complex.

Lincoln County will receive \$122,563. County manager Suzanne Cox said the county also anticipated the funding and determined during budget hearings in June how it would be spent. The county will allocate \$7,200 to the Lincoln County Mental

Health Association; \$34,496 to the Lincoln County Extension Service; \$2,500 to the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District; \$885 to the State Fair exhibit; \$2,500 to the Lincoln County Fair; \$1,400 to the New Mexico State Library; \$3,000 to the Ruidoso Public Library; \$12,000 to the Senior Citizens Center in Carrizozo; \$4,000 to the Carrizozo ballpark; \$2,500 to the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District; \$2,523 to the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District; \$2,500 to the South Central Mountain Resource Conservation and Development Program; \$2,000 to the Chaves Soil and Water Conservation District; \$15,000 to the Ruidoso Emergency Medical Service; and \$3,200 to the Lincoln

County Ambulance Service. The \$2,007 in unallocated funds will be carried over to the next fiscal year and allocated next June, said Cox.

Ruidoso Downs will receive \$39,342. Village clerk Wilma Webb said the village plans to use the money to drill a well for the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) does not help with the project. If FmHA does contribute to the well drilling, Webb said, the village will decide later how to spend the revenue sharing funds.

Capitan received \$17,673, of which none has been allocated, said village clerk Virginia Spall. Carrizozo will receive \$24,761. Cloudercroft will receive \$8,507. The Mescalero Apache Tribe will receive \$44,270.



Hospital announces visiting hours

Visiting hours at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital are changing to meet the needs of patients and their families and friends—as well as to move the hospital out of an old-fashioned system—said Mary Lou Brown, director of nursing.

Brown said the system of restricted hours in the afternoon and evening probably was a set-up for failure because not all people can go to the hospital during those hours. Also, sometimes too many people might be visiting at one time, causing stress for the patient and the staff.

The new visiting hours will be from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m., with no more than two visitors at a time. There is a limit of 15 minutes on each visit. Visitors should leave the hospital by 8 p.m. The intensive care unit will have

separate hours for visiting—8 a.m. to noon and 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. The hospital encourages only immediate family members to visit there, however.

The obstetrical department maintains an open visiting policy for fathers and a special time for siblings. Routine visiting is scheduled 3 p.m. to 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Brown is hopeful the new hours for general visiting will allow for more

rest for the patient because visiting will be spread out and not so long. She added it offers more flexibility for the visitor who could "stop and see someone on the way to work."

Brown said often people may not be aware of how expensive the different types of care given at the hospital are.

"We have a very complete intensive care unit—as complete as any in the state," she noted.

Help available to victims of domestic abuse

A few weeks ago a story on the front page of The News described domestic abuse as the "silent crime."

It was stated that in Ruidoso Downs the police receive nearly one call a night. Chief Charles Robinson said this may have been overstated, although the calls are frequent.

Robinson said his officers seem sensitized to the problem and use their discretionary power in arresting the person doing the battering. He said the main problem is lack of a shelter to place a person who is being battered.

Robinson said part of the problem is getting money designated for social services.

"I spend a lot of my time dealing with social services," he said. Robinson has a background in social work, though this is his first position in law enforcement.

He said the police officer is placed in a "tough situation." Often a

woman may not want to leave the person who is battering her, or have him arrested. (Domestic abuse involves a woman being battered more often than a man.)

"She's worried about financial support," said Robinson.

Pat Ciraulo, client service agent for the Department of Human Services in Ruidoso, said they are involved in finding protection for a battered woman and her children. She said sometimes people come in off the street, but often the referral is from the police.

Ciraulo said she believes high rent costs in Ruidoso and low public assistance available could prevent women from leaving a battering situation.

"If you're a woman with three kids to support, you're in trouble," she said.

There is a place for battered women to go in Alamogordo called the Center of Protective Environment (COPE).

Though it receives people from the surrounding areas, Ciraulo said, "I

can't think of one from here who has gone there."

Beverly Cavanaugh, director at COPE, said women from Ruidoso have been at the center. She said the problem beyond getting women to reach out is finding the transportation there.

Cavanaugh said she and other employees have met a person in an "extremely dangerous" situation halfway, but often because of their shortage of staff this leaves them at a loss at the center.

Cavanaugh said a woman in a crisis could go to the police station, and the police will call COPE and help with the transportation.

She said the "safehome" has some eligibility requirements, but the staff is extremely flexible in allowing people there. She said there is no charge and there is a 30-day limit on the stay.

While there, children will be able to attend their own schools, and a child psychologist has just been hired.

She said often people might have so many problems that the children are

neglected. Cavanaugh said abuse may be physical, mental or emotional. Often it is physical.

"We just had a woman come in with two broken arms—she couldn't even go to the bathroom herself," she said.

Cavanaugh said about 80 percent of battered women will eventually return to their husbands. She said "this is because they want the abuse to end, but not the relationship."

She said referrals to counseling are made and that the center wants to help "in any way that it can."

Cavanaugh said she wants to emphasize that the safehome is a center with nurturing staff. She said some areas are only equipped to put someone up in a motel for a night. Though she said this is some help, she asked, "Can you imagine being in a motel, after being battered, with a bunch of kids crawling all over you?"

Condo project honored

The New Mexico Chapter of the National Rehabilitation Association (NRA) recently honored Crown Point Condominiums with its annual award for the "Removal of Architectural Barriers."

During ceremonies at the Camelot Mountain resort, Lucy Bartlett, NRA board member, presented Gene Duvall, president of Crown Point, a plaque designating the facility as accessible to the handicapped. Crown Point was nominated for the award by Velma Gadberrry of Roswell.

The condominium offers vacation ownership for intervals as short as one week with exchanges for similar handicapped facilities at 50 resorts in the U.S., the Caribbean, Europe and

the South Pacific. Two of Crown Point's 60 units can accommodate annually up to 104 families with handicapped members. Special construction and equipment include: ramps from the parking area to ground level, extra wide front and interior doors to accommodate wheelchairs, lowered counters and sinks, and closets with lowered clothing rods.

An electric chair lift carries the disabled person to the second floor of the clubhouse, while an elevator designed for a wheelchair provides access to the upper level swimming pool. There's even a water pressure chair to lower the occupant into the pool or raise him out of the water.

Super 8 Motel now under construction

A new Super 8 Motel is under construction in Ruidoso. Expected to open January 30, 1984, the 63-unit motel will be located off U.S. Highway 70, across from the Ruidoso Inn and next to Village Inn Pancake House.

The Ruidoso Super 8 is being developed by Southwest Developer of Carlsbad, Cornudas Corporation, Carlsbad, is the general contractor of the motel project. Financing for the project was obtained through Pioneer Savings and Trust, Ruidoso. Ruidoso's new motel will feature traditional Super 8 amenities including direct dial telephones, free

color television, tub/shower combinations, attractive room furnishings, access to a nationwide toll-free reservation system and special V.I.P. Club privileges for business travelers. Additionally, the motel will offer both a men's and women's sauna and a hot tub.

A member of Super 8 Motels, Incorporated, the Aberdeen, South Dakota-based economy motel chain, the Ruidoso motel will be the sixth Super 8 Motel in the state of New Mexico. Super 8 Motels is the fourth largest economy motel chain in the nation, with 176 motels open in 24 states and Canada.

More foster homes are needed here

The number of children needing foster care exceeds the number of homes available to them, according to state Department of Human Services officials in Ruidoso.

Pat Ciraulo, a client service agent at the Ruidoso office of the department, said, "There are only three foster families that can be called on at the moment."

According to Ciraulo, if there were 10 foster parents available it would allow placement of children here, rather than having to send them to Roswell or Alamogordo.

She said there are one or two places to send children temporarily, but after two or three days, homes which would offer a long-term stay are needed. She added that often children will return to their own homes if the problems causing the placement can be solved.

Ciraulo said separating children or sending them to an area away from their parents causes an added stress to families. For example, finances could be a factor in the neglect initially.

Then, if parents need to drive to see the children, it is an added strain to an already stressed situation, she emphasized.

The reasons for the removal of children from their homes may be physical, emotional or mental abuse. She said "there are an awful lot of neglect cases for this little town."

The department is working on 123 cases now, and 70 of them are attributed to neglect, such as children not being fed, said Ciraulo. She said

referrals may come from the police, schools, hospital or a concerned neighbor.

To be a foster parent requires going to the Department of Human Services office (across from the post office) and talking to social worker Betsy Seiler. In a month an interested person could be issued a license or denied. The only absolute elimination from becoming a foster parent is having a previous arrest resulting from child molesting or any type of history relating to abuse.

The home requirements are quite basic, according to Ciraulo. She added that people interested should be financially capable. She said the state is interested in helping people financially with being a foster parent, but that "they don't want people to do it just for the money."

Foster parents may be married or single. There are two single parents now, said Ciraulo.

Seiler stressed that people who are interested in receiving certain ages or who have reservations about "receiving any child, regardless of age or other factors," are wanted.

"We want people who are interested to become foster parents, even if they have certain conditions under which they don't want to become parents," she said.

There are some children who have a harder time getting placed, according to Ciraulo.

"Teenagers and black children are harder to place sometimes," she said. For further information on becoming a foster parent, call the Department of Human Services office at 257-2549.

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

Warrior boy hoopsters to open season tonight

Hopes are bright for an improved season when the Ruidoso High School varsity and junior varsity boys basketball teams jump off the 1983-84 season tonight and tomorrow.

Ruidoso's junior varsity will host the Hondo varsity at 4 p.m. today. Tuesday the Warrior varsity and junior varsity will travel to Roswell High School for contests. The junior varsity game will begin at 6 p.m. with the varsity contest following.

Warrior head coach Ron Geyer thinks this year's varsity team will be improved over last season's 0-20 record.

"I'm very optimistic," the second-year mentor said. "We're still young but we're going to be very competitive this season."

Ruidoso scrimmaged against Tularosa and Alamogordo Saturday in Alamogordo. Geyer said the Warriors played well against Tularosa but had problems against the Tigers.

"There wasn't any score kept but I felt we outplayed Tularosa," Geyer remarked. "We rebounded well and played good defense."

"Against Alamogordo their press hurt us. We turned the ball over against their press too often. They have a lot of team speed."

"We were taller than them but they just had a lot of speed. We're going to have to work on bringing the ball up against the press. There are some teams in our district with just as much team speed as Alamogordo."

Geyer has nine players definitely set for the varsity game against Roswell, and also might bring up some players from the junior varsity for the varsity tilt.

The players that will definitely suit up for the Roswell varsity contest include Dan Ullmann, Tracy Gann, Gilbert Rivera, Cyrus Simmons, Russell Easter, Tommy Crow, Kenny Espinosa, Patric Pearson and Jesse Reynolds.

Ullmann—a 6-4 sophomore center—made all-district, honorable mention last season as did the 5-8 Rivera, a playmaking guard. Simmons also started often on last year's varsity squad.

Geyer thinks the guard position is the biggest key to his team's success this season.

"We've got to get our guards to handle the ball," he said.

The Warriors will have decent height with Ullmann and the 6-3 Gann. Both Easter and Espinosa are around 6-0.

Roswell is paced by seniors Tony Kellum and Tim Roberts. Kellum is probably one of the best shooters in Roswell's district.

Geyer expects Roswell to be similar to Alamogordo in its style of play.

With the gradual increase in Ruidoso High School's enrollment, there is always the possibility of adding some more sports to the school schedule.

Within the last year, tennis and cross-country have been added to the program, and if the enrollment continues to climb, some more programs may be added in the next few years.

A lot of people have expressed interest in baseball and swimming as additions to the Warrior sports calendar. Gymnastics is another sport that has been suggested.

According to some school officials, girls' sports are needed as much as boys' sports. And rightly so.

Realistically, in order to add two or three more sports and not make the existing sports suffer, the school would probably have to have around 600 students.

At present, the high school enrollment is around 450 students, making it one of the smallest schools in the state's AAA division.

However, unlike that of some other school districts in New Mexico, Ruidoso's total high school, middle school and elementary school enrollment has been increasing in recent years.

When the new high school is opened in September 1984, it may pave the way for additional sports.

Youth baseball supporters have been particularly anxious to see a high school baseball program started. "Oh definitely," said Ronnie Taylor, a former Little League

manager. "We need it. We've had some kids with excellent talent who could have gotten scholarships if they could have played baseball in high school."

"A high school baseball program would also help Little League and Babe Ruth programs."

Gymnastics is very popular with girls in Ruidoso and a high school program would be very helpful in improving their skills. A high school program might also increase interest in gymnastics among boys in this community. At present girls are more drawn to gymnastics in Ruidoso than are boys, but that could change with a high school program.

Several Warrior athletes have expressed an interest in swimming added to the high school program. Perhaps the Ruidoso pool could be used for the prep program.

But these programs may still be far off in the future.

The sports funds at the high school are already being stretched to nearly the breaking point.

More community involvement is needed, along with more funds allocated, in order to have additional sports.

But it still could happen within the next five or six years.

Sticking to high school sports, readers can look forward to my high school basketball tabloid next Monday and an extensive photo-feature on the improved Ruidoso High School wrestling team soon after.

Letters to the editor

DEAR EDITOR:

My husband and I recently visited your state and had a very unpleasant experience of which we feel perhaps you should be apprised.

On Friday, September 23, 1983, we were en route to a motorcycle trade show in Carlsbad and from there to another trade show in Ruidoso at which we were to be an exhibitor.

Shortly after entering New Mexico, just east of Eunice in Lea County, we approached two State Policemen and a Deputy Sheriff standing in the center of the road. As we further approached the officers, we were discussing between ourselves whether we were supposed to stop or what we were to do as they didn't have their hands up or a sign or

anything indicating any kind of signal or instruction. We decided we were not being instructed to stop and proceeded on past at the rate of approximately twenty-five to thirty miles an hour. Just as our vehicle passed the officers, one of them shouted at us, "Stop that goddamn vehicle," which we did immediately. When my husband stepped out of the pickup, the officers were irate because we had "run their road block." We explained to them that we didn't realize what they were doing and that had we realized they wanted us to stop, we certainly would have done so.

We were driving a three-quarter ton pickup, pulling a fifth-wheel trailer with a motorcycle trailer behind that. As evidenced by the enclosed copies of the citations, we were cited for "Height and Length of Vehicles," however, the height and length of the vehicles were not measured. Further under Essential Facts: "Vehicle pulling 5th wheel trailer with third unit not having any lights or brake lights." In this connection, admittedly, we did not have lights or brake lights on this motorcycle trailer. This was a very small trailer which did not belong to us. The manufacturer of the trailer here in Dallas had asked us if we would pull the trailer over to the trade show for him to be exhibited, which we consented to do. If you will, please imagine this situation: Here is a travel trailer pulling a very small trailer behind; obviously, all turn signals, brake lights, et cetera, were clearly visible on either side of the small trailer. In addition, we are in the business of manufacturing and selling decorative lights for motorcycles. This trailer was carrying a motorcycle equipped with approximately 150 lights on it, and had lights been necessary, this unit would have been heavily lighted. However, we had left Lewisville, Texas early enough in the morning to ensure that all driving would be done in daylight hours. We could have reached Carlsbad by 5:30 p.m., well before dark.

The second citation was for the offense of "Vehicles to be registered." "Trailer has no License Plates." As transported for exhibition purposes. However in this connection, we did have MSO papers with us, which were shown to the officers.

We believe the only reason we were not cited by the officers for as they stated, "Running their road block" was because they knew they were not performing their jobs properly, but instead were standing in the middle of the road having a gab session and they knew they were in the wrong there and didn't want that brought before the Judge.

After signing the citations, we asked to go before a Judge at that time. The officers called several places then informed us that they had located a Magistrate in Jal, New Mexico and we followed one of the officers to his office. Upon arriving in Jal, Magistrate Frank Montgomery was there. The first thing he informed us was that we had interrupted his evening meal. We explained the above circumstances to him and he informed us that he would access fines in the amount of \$100.00 for the two citations. We informed him we felt that fine was quite excessive and requested that we be allowed to post bond and have the case heard before a jury. He informed us that we could put up the necessary money for a jury fee, however, we were guilty and we were going to pay the fines just the same, which we did.

Further, there is a sign entitled "Notice to the Public" posted outside of Magistrate Montgomery's office door stating essentially that in the State of New Mexico, a magistrate can collect money only for docket fees, jury fees and fees for photocopies and that no other monies shall be collected. A fine is none of the above. We asked him about this and he said that didn't apply, as that was an old sign. If it doesn't apply, why is

it posted there? When we paid the fine, it took him approximately thirty minutes to write out the enclosed three receipts. When we indicated that we wanted to post the necessary jury fee, he rummaged around his office and in an adjoining room for another thirty minutes or so trying to find some instructions as to what he was supposed to do in this regard, which he never found, so he just took the money and said he would find that stuff later.

In summary, first I feel we were stopped by these three officers because we irritated them by not stopping at their so-called "road block." In my opinion, three officers standing in the middle of the road gabbing by no stretch of the imagination constitutes a road block.

Secondly, I feel we were taken before a Magistrate whom I believe to be totally and completely incompetent and had no interest whatsoever in seeing that justice was done, but merely saw an opportunity to bring in \$100.00 revenue for the State of New Mexico from a couple of tourists. I would certainly hope this is not the caliber of officials you want representing your state. I can understand that you do not want careless, reckless driving in your state, however, this was not the case. We were driving in a prudent, cautious manner, observing all speed warnings, driving in daylight hours and under all perfect driving conditions. We were by no means creating any hazard whatsoever and had the fines assessed been commensurate with the offenses, we would have simply paid the fines and been on our way and not given it a second thought.

We have participated in this trade show at Ruidoso for fourteen years but due to this experience, have decided this will be the last. During our stay in New Mexico, we spent approximately \$1,000.00. True your Judge Montgomery collected \$100.00 in revenue, but it will cost you by the loss of future monies we will spend in some other state, as we plan to avoid New Mexico altogether in future travels whenever possible and hope other tourists will eventually do the same. New Mexico has the reputation of being a state that really sticks it to tourists. It seems to me that if effort was put forth creating goodwill and hospitality to tourists rather than subjecting them to undue harassment, in the long run you'd be more benefited by that.

I'm sure this will just end up in the trash can after you read it, (if you read it) but we thought just maybe you might be interested as to what effect the actions and attitudes of your appointed state officials is having on outsiders visiting your state.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Relationships, relationships...

They're what makes politician-watching so fascinating.

—Example one:

When Jack Daniels got beaten by Pete Domenici in a race for the U.S. Senate, Nick Franklin ran Daniels' campaign.

Now Franklin is considering running against Domenici in his turn, and he might have expected Daniels' support in the race.

But then Nick shows up as one of the hired guns trying to get Citicorp, massive New York banking operation, approved to go into the banking business in New Mexico.

One local banker most notably opposed to the granting of that permission is Jack Daniels.

Mightn't that tend to cool any enthusiasm Jack might otherwise feel for Franklin's proposed run for the Senate?

—Example two:

Citicorp probably retained Franklin, state Democratic chairman, to guarantee access to Tony Ayasa, Democratic Governor.

To draft the bill they hope to get introduced into the Legislature, they hired Franklin Jones, well known attorney and lobbyist, who has little or no access to the present Governor.

But Jones is a member of the board of directors of Bank Securities, Inc., a large financial holding company which might be expected to oppose Citicorp's move as vigorously as Jack Daniels does.

Bank Securities is masterminded by Robert O. Anderson and family, so Jones' presence as local attorney for Citicorp leads some to speculate that Anderson & Co. may want the big New York Operation in the state, possibly so they can sell all or part of their own chain of banks to them.

—Example three:

Citicorp, as a large international operation, might be expected to wish to remain close to the chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, especially if that man is also a member of Ap-

propriations.

Such a one is, of course, Senator Pete Domenici.

Why then would Citicorp, on coming to New Mexico, hire, presumably at a generous fee, the very man who seems intent on trying to knock Domenici off at the polls next November?

Do you think they didn't know Franklin was a putative candidate? Smart operatives are supposed to know everything.

—Example four:

The folks at Southern Union in Dallas seem intent on selling Gas Company of New Mexico to a private educational foundation—an unusual buyer, to say the least, for a large utility.

The name of that group which might be the buyer is the Robert O. Anderson Foundation. It raises money for the Robert O. Anderson Management School at the University of New Mexico.

The Robert O. Anderson mentioned above, for whom both entities are named, is not on the board of the foundation and has little to say directly about what it does.

The fact that the mouthpiece in this whole matter is board member Al Hamilton, who also happens to be the chief executive officer of Robert O. Anderson's Bank Securities, Inc., however, gives a Robert-O. flavor to this additional proposal as well.

That leads some proponents of the conspiracy theory to further conclude that this deal, along with the Citicorp invasion, is somehow being masterminded by Mr. Anderson, who is not, it must be confessed, a bad mastermind.

Relationships, relationships... Sometimes people see them even when they aren't really there...

Question a legislative committee hearing last week: Why don't Citicorp people appear in person to plead their case instead of merely sending Franklin and Jones?

"The devil made me do it," I would tell her. "The devil made me take that last run."

I was riding up the Lincoln chairlift at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort Thursday, prior to my second last run of the day.

I had just completed my first last run of the day, which took me to the base of the chairlift. A check of my watch had showed me it was time to stop skiing, in order to be on time for Thanksgiving dinner.

But there I was, riding up the mountain again.

Like I say, the devil made me do it. As it was, I got off at midway, and managed to make it home within tolerable standards of punctuality. ("Tolerable to whom?" I can hear her ask.)

That last run—the second one—had a dual effect. It let me get in a few more minutes of Thursday's great skiing, and it whetted my appetite for more of the same.

Unlike my colleague Mr. Allstetter, I have not been able to classify myself an "avid skier" for a long time.

When Billy first wrote The Ruidoso News to inquire about a reporter's job, he referred to himself as "an avid skier and a mediocre flyfisherman."

That certainly didn't hurt his chances of landing the job. Anyone who appreciates skiing and trout fishing can't be all bad, right?

I remember several years ago when Gerald Ford was running for president, a friend of mine pointed out something he considered strongly in Ford's favor. The president loved to ski.

Now the first thought that probably comes to mind is: what does being a skier have to do with being president? Well, nothing, really. But what my friend was saying was that Ford was a guy he more readily could trust because they shared the same interest.

Here is another example from the same field, politics, but at a different angle. When Nixon (remember him?) was president, I remember reading that in order to keep his weight down, the chief executive lunched every day on a big bowl of cottage cheese.

But, the article went on, the president hated the taste of cottage cheese, so he smothered it with catsup.

"Yechhh," I remember thinking, appalled that the guy with his finger on "the button" ate cottage cheese smothered in catsup every day!

Well, I digress, but the point is that you are what you do just as you are what you eat. And if one of the things you do is ski, that's a point in your favor, at least in the eyes of other skiers.

I skied a lot while I was in high school in Albuquerque. In fact, our ski club made a trip to Ruidoso and a big storm hit while we were here.

We got in some memorable skiing—some of it in total "whiteout" conditions where you couldn't

distinguish between surface and air and sky. That was a neat sensation.

We also got snowed in—road conditions forced us to stay an extra night. So I knew back then that this part of southern New Mexico has some real winter weather.

And we certainly had that fact confirmed last winter, with good-sized snowstorms in every month from November into April.

In Ruidoso, fortunately, the same snow that falls in November doesn't stay on the ground until spring, unlike some other places.

But the winter can get you down if you don't make a point of enjoying it. And that's where skiing comes in.

I figured out that my Thanksgiving outing was my fourth time skiing in the past 10 years. Most of those years, I was living places where skiing isn't readily accessible—like Missouri, Colombia and Texas.

A visit from my brother-in-law prompted the lone outing our first winter here. Then last year, I didn't get around to going until after that big April snow, when they kept Sierra Blanca open an extra two weeks.

I went with Dave Sheppard, who is now languishing in Alamogordo with all his new equipment. We had a blast, which is something I think I can honestly say about every time I have ever gone skiing.

Skiing is world-class fun.

I used that expression to describe the Balloon Fiesta in Albuquerque earlier this fall. But, looking back, I see that it was the balloonists who were really having the fun.

Several sports have certain elements in common that make them so appealing: speed, danger and, most of all, freedom.

When you're skiing at the edge of control, everything but staying just this side of the line is sort of stripped away from your life. It's a very clean feeling, and one that stays with you at the end of the day.

Well, you can tell I'm pretty pumped—"pretty jazzed," as Billy would say. Of course, to put things in perspective, I'm strictly an intermediate, and I was skiing on rented equipment.

But darned if that didn't get me thinking, "Boy, if I had good boots, I'll bet my control would be worlds better," and "Boy, if I got some instruction, I could make turns like Crocker does."

And it is the face of my buddy Mike Crocker that sticks in my mind from my Thanksgiving ski trip. I was stopped a little below the top gondola terminal when he came skiing up with a huge grin on his face.

I thought he was grinning because he saw me, until I realized he hadn't noticed me. His grin was one of sheer exultation at the snow.

It was for the snow, for the feeling of being back on skis, and for the promise of the brand-new season.

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
