

Message clear: ski in bounds

After a long night out in a snowy canyon, a cold and tired Roy Ranne finally saw a tent and an old white Pontiac parked near Three Rivers campground. He had finally reached civilization, food and warmth.

But as he trudged in his heavy ski boots towards the apparent refuge, it disappeared before his eyes, only to be replaced by two cold boulders. There was still more hiking through stream bed, around rocks and over logs before he and Bill Keller would really reach the campground and eventually be rescued.

"We got real delirious there for a while," said the 22-year-old Ranne. "That car, I was ready to get into it."

The delirium came Monday morning after Ranne and Keller, both of Ruidoso, had skied out of the Sierra Blanca Ski Resort boundaries in search of better skiing. In their search for the untracked powder they became disoriented and spent the night out in the snow.

At about 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon Ranne and Keller crossed the boundary ropes by Ambush trail, hoping to gain a little extra altitude for some better skiing, they said.

"If we hadn't cut the rope we wouldn't have gotten lost," said Ranne. But they did and soon they were

"Before we knew it, we were seeing things we didn't recognize," said Keller.

Ranne then hiked up another ridge looking for landmarks, but found another unfamiliar valley on the other side.

"I realized then we weren't going home that night," said Ranne, who has skied in the area for 10 years and was once a member of the National Ski Patrol.

As darkness closed in, Ranne skied back down to Keller who had begun downhill on the Three Rivers side of Sierra Blanca. Ranne said he could barely see his hand in front of his face and had to feel for Keller's tracks with his ski poles.

He found Keller, who had made an ice igloo. They huddled inside and tried to make a fire. Two empty lighters, a bunch of wet matches,

burnt lift tickets and a melted ski hat later, there was no fire and little hope of one.

The weather cleared and the temperatures dropped. The pair soon realized that the ice igloo was providing no warmth and might be their grave if they stayed in it all night.

Leaving their skis behind, the tired skiers began hiking down the creek bed, planning to go as far as they could. By a stroke of luck, Ranne found another lighter in his pocket as he pulled out the last candy bar he had.

They later found a protected spot under a rock and eventually lit a fire with the tag off Ranne's clothing. Ranne said he was so tired from trudging through the snow in his ski boots that he could barely rip the tag from his clothing.

They huddled close and carefully tended the fire through the night even to the point of getting sick from smoke inhalation.

"That was a long night," said Keller.

At daybreak, the pair hiked on down the streambed, eventually reaching the Three Rivers campground. As they knew they were getting closer to the campground, their

hopes turned to hallucinations. They saw tents and refuges time and again, which melted into boulders as they drew close.

A helicopter from Holloman Air Force Base eventually spotted them around noon and took them back to the base.

The two were relatively unscathed; only a few scrapes and a little frostbite. They were very, very weary. But they realized it easily could have been much worse, and that it happened because they were looking for greener grass (or fluffier powder) on the far side of the hill.

Although it seemed like a great idea at the time, both Ranne and Keller stressed numerous times what a poor idea it really was.

"It's not worth going over there," said Ranne.

If you want the untracked powder, get up to the mountain early in the morning and ski within the area, advised Keller. Ranne said the skiing they found was no better than the skiing within the boundaries.

Sierra Blanca Ski Resort manager Roy Parker said he has even moved the boundary ropes higher this year so skiers can traverse and find untracked snow on the far side of Moon-

shine Gulch. He emphasized that the boundary ropes are not placed to prevent skiers from enjoying good skiing, but to protect skiers from getting lost. Ranne testified that it is very easy to get disoriented because of the confusing lie of the ridges and valleys.

But the ropes are all the area has to keep people in bounds.

"We can't really put up barriers that prevent people from leaving the area," said Parker.

And people continue to have a "very cavalier attitude" about leaving the area, said Parker.

"We want to stop this now," he said. He noted the lure of the Bonito drainage has been especially troublesome.

"Getting out of there at night ... is very difficult and can be hazardous," said Parker.

Although Keller and Ranne escaped with few physical consequences, Larry November, a hiker lost on Sierra Blanca two weeks ago, is still in the hospital. His five-day trek in the snow is going to cost him the last joint on most of his toes in addition to two weeks of fever and infection in the hospital.

The hours put in by White Mountain Search and Rescue, Sierra Blanca Ski Patrol and Holloman Air Force Base have to be added to the cost of a lost skier.

Ski Patrol searched for Keller and Ranne until after dark. It was only because they knew the lost skiers were healthy young men that they did not search longer, said Parker.

WMSAR members began searching at 10:30 Sunday night and were hiking the trails in the Bonito drainage all night, said search coordinator Rex Skellett.

"We want to thank every one of them," said Keller. It was the knowledge that people were looking for them that helped keep the men going, said Ranne. Otherwise, it might have been more than tempting to just climb in a hole and give it up, he said.

Skis left at the ice igloo, melted ski boots (from sitting too close to the fire), and possible loss of skiing privileges are just a few more costs of the trip out of bounds.

"It's not worth risking your life," said Keller.

El Paso street rezoning okayed by P&Z

After lengthy discussion about the effects on midtown parking, the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) approved a rezoning request from R-1 (single-family residential) to C-1 (light commercial) for 20 lots on El Paso Street.

El Paso Street runs parallel to Sudderth Drive, one block closer to the Rio Ruidoso. The land, on the river side of El Paso Street between Center and Juanita streets, will probably be used for small retail stores, said Lindsay Rusler. She represented requestor William Wilson.

Wilson owns seven of the lots and the rest are owned by various citizens. Six of the rezoned lots do not actually front on El Paso Street, but adjoin El Paso Street lots.

"We feel that this area ... could use very much some expansion and coordination in traffic control," said Rusler.

Rusler argued that commercial development would create more parking spaces on El Paso Street, as well as remove some of the heavy traffic from Sudderth Drive. Current village ordinances require any new business to provide a specified

number of off-street parking spaces. Numerous merchants with businesses along Sudderth argued that commercial development would only increase traffic and parking problems in the midtown area.

Wild Snail owner Budgie Green noted that the village has not required giftshop Potpourri to comply with parking ordinances. Potpourri opened in a new building on Sudderth early last summer.

Don Huband, owner of Four Seasons Mall, and others expressed skepticism that the village would require businesses on El Paso Street to provide adequate parking. Huband said he might agree to the C-1 zoning if the village proved that it is serious about enforcing parking regulations.

"We're ready to make an issue of enforcing that parking ordinance," said P&Z member James Paxton.

P&Z chairman Greg Masters noted that the village is in the process of requiring Potpourri to provide parking. P&Z enforcement officer Paul Davis said he is drafting a letter warning Potpourri of court action if it does not comply with the parking regulations.

Green also expressed concern about rezoning the area before a transportation study is complete. BRW, a planning company, is cur-

rently making a Comprehensive Transportation Plan that will address the problem of parking and traffic in midtown.

He and others said they might be for the rezoning once the BRW plan is completed.

Huband said the already congested intersection of Juanita and Sudderth may become worse with commercial businesses on El Paso Street. A number of merchants said their parking lots are already full with people not shopping at their stores, and worried that the situation may become worse.

It was apparent throughout the meeting that most of the P&Z members thought parking would improve with the addition of commercial businesses on El Paso Street. Tom Kelham motioned to approve the rezoning and P&Z voted for it 4 to 1. Dissenting voter Martin Rose said he wanted to see the whole midtown area studied before rezoning one part of it.

In related business, enforcement officer Davis asked the commission's opinion about a request to provide additional parking and exits on the back and sides of the Safeway parking lot. Commission members said they thought a parking lot on R-1 land would be illegal, but they appeared to

be amenable to more exits on Aspen Circle and Cedar Place.

Davis also handed commission members copies of Portales' parking regulations, which he said he prefers over Ruidoso's. P&Z members questioned if Portales regulations would work in Ruidoso, but Masters said he would draft a letter to BRW asking their opinion about Ruidoso's parking regulations.

P&Z also directed the P&Z office staff to take all approved plans to the county office for recording. Surveyors or engineers have been allowed to take approved plans to the county office in the past, but P&Z secretary Becky Morris said there have been two recent cases of altered plans appearing at the county office.

In other business, P&Z: —Approved a 10-foot front lot line variance on Swallow Place in Pinecliff because an arroyo on the property made it difficult to build a house and provide a septic tank and parking without infringing on the front lot line.

—Approved a replat of lots 11, 12, 13 Sky View Heights, and lot 8, Block 3, of Cree Meadows Heights, second addition, for Emma Lee Emde. The replat rearranged lot lines that had previously run under Emde's house.

Local Happy Holidays drive continues

The holiday season is a time for celebration. It is a time for exchanging gifts, festive feasts with the family, and sharing of holiday cheer. But for those who don't have the gifts or food, holiday cheer can be a difficult thing to muster.


He is quick, however, to downplay his and the departments' contributions. It is the people of Ruidoso who donate gifts, he said. The police and fire departments only pick up and distribute the gifts.

The White Mountain schools have been excellent contributors, usually providing a truckload of food each.

"The schools have done a great job," said Garcia.

Garcia, however, held his greatest compliments for Safeway manager Karl Franzer.

"That guy's super," said Garcia. When it appeared there would be almost nothing to give at Thanksgiving this year, Franzer donated 26 complete Thanksgiving feasts, said Garcia. In the past, he has always been more than generous when the fire department brought money to

purchase food, Garcia added. Although past Happy Holiday drives have exceeded Garcia's expectations, donations have been meager this year, said Garcia. He said people have not donated half of what they donated last year.

The fire and police departments will be collecting gifts until two days before Christmas, said Garcia. Anyone wanting to donate toys, food, money or anything else can bring

their donations by the main fire station or call the police department to have them picked up.

"We collect whatever people give," said Garcia. He did say the departments can only accept toys in working order, since they do not have enough time to repair them.

"We're trying to help people," said Garcia. "We give to people who need."

"It sounds to me like they are trying to improve," said Lincoln County Humane Society president Kay Allison after touring the Fort Stanton kennels Tuesday.

She remained concerned, however, about the lack of heat and sanitation in the kennels Ruidoso animal control officer Buddy Dean uses to hold animals he picks up.

Allison also seemed reluctant to accept assistant village manager Frank Potter's suggestion that the Humane Society contribute money towards improving the Fort Stanton facilities. The Humane Society owns land in Gavilan Canyon near Ruidoso's hot mix plant, and Allison said she thinks building a new shelter there would be

preferable.

Allison, Humane Society board member Rita Kent, Potter and Dean visited the former Fort Stanton horse stables Tuesday. At the time, Dean had three dogs, a couple of puppies and a few cats in the kennels.

Allison said Dean told her that he has recently lost a number of dogs to parvovirus. He did say he has finally cleaned the feces out of the dog runs, which was almost a foot deep in some places when he began as animal control officer.

Dean said he has recently deputized another animal control officer. At the time of the visit, he was interviewing a young man who lives at Fort Stanton for a possible job involving watching over the kennels more closely. Currently Dean makes the 45-minute

trip to the kennels once a day and sometimes more if needed.

He said animal control contractor Jim Woodriddle plans to improve the facilities once he gets permission from the State of New Mexico, which owns the property. Dean said Woodriddle plans to run electricity to the kennels so space heaters can be installed. Dean also pointed out old milking barns Woodriddle hopes to convert to additional kennels.

Potter suggested to Allison and Kent that the Humane Society contribute funds toward the improvement of the facilities. He said it might be very hard to build an animal shelter on the Humane Society land because of local opposition. He also mentioned the possibility of having the county and Ruidoso Downs con-

tribute toward improvement of the facilities.

Potter will be making a recommendation to the Ruidoso village council to authorize a 60-hour work week for animal control during the winter. The current arrangement is for animal control to patrol Ruidoso only 40 hours a week during the winter.

He said there is the need for additional patrolling and that police chief Dick Swenor completely endorsed the idea. The extra patrol hours would cost the village \$1,238 a month, said Potter.


"Everybody better keep their dogs off the streets," said Potter, who warned that Dean would be enforcing the local ordinance requiring an animal to be kept under control at all times it is not in the owner's yard.

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Retail Merchants endorse Christmas carolers plans

The Retail Merchants Committee (RMC) of the Chamber of Commerce tried to breathe a little extra life into Ruidoso's Christmas spirit Monday by arranging for Christmas carolers in the business districts and giving merchants and residents one more week to enter the decorating contest.

At Christmas, we just kind of ignore the town," said Chamber board member Joan Bailey, who encouraged the RMC to organize more events during the holiday season.

Local merchant George Smith told committee members he has contacted a number of local churches and musicians about caroling at various locations in Ruidoso. Smith said high school music director Danny Flores has agreed to perform with a brass choir on the next two Thursday evenings.

Smith indicated others will probably agree to join Flores and invited any interested persons to join the festivities. He has tentatively planned for the carolers to sing about a half an hour at the Serenity Plaza, the Ski West Center and the Paddock.

The caroling will coincide with the committee's program of encouraging stores to stay open evenings during the Christmas season. Although some committee members felt the program has been unsuccessful the past two years, the committee agreed to try it again this year. Participating merchants will stay open evenings the next three Thursdays.

Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth said he has

learned that Santa may be able to make appearances all three Thursday nights. Smith said after the meeting that he has also arranged for a hay wagon to be available for hayrides on the Thursday nights.

Due to a lack of entries, RMC decided to allow residents and merchants one more week to decorate their buildings and enter the Chamber's contest. Judging was originally scheduled for Tuesday and Wednesday nights of this week, but as of Monday, only three businesses and no residences had entered the contest.

RMC postponed the judging until the same nights next week. To enter in either the business or residential categories, call the Chamber at 257-7395. The first three places in both categories will receive 11-inch by 14-inch color photos of their decorated buildings.

In an attempt to spur on a few more entries, Jungbluth challenged any business to a head-on competition. He said he would buy a steak dinner for any business owner who placed higher than the Chamber building does in the contest. He promised to find independent judges to determine the best decorated buildings in Ruidoso.

RMC member Nancy Shaver reported a lack of Christmas spirit at the decorating of the Christmas trees in town, as well. She said only she and RMC member Bob Gregson showed up for the decorating, with a few other members showing up sporadically.

Jungbluth said RMC should possibly quit calling the decoration their own since employees and equipment from the electric and telephone companies did most of the decorating.

RMC took over the decorating of the trees at the "Y" and the library last year in an attempt to save the village approximately \$3,000 a year on decorating costs. RMC originally planned to use the saved money for purchasing additional decorations.

None of the RMC members knew what had happened to the money or the decorations. RMC member James Paxton said he would talk to assistant village manager Frank Potter about the money.

Tuesday, Paxton reported that the \$6,000 saved over two years is available for the purchase of more decorations. He said Potter had been waiting for direction from the RMC about decoration purchases.

According to Paxton, Potter also said that the decorations must be ordered during the summer to be available for Christmas. Paxton said RMC members would get together with Potter next June or July to plan purchases for next Christmas.

In other business, RMC: —Voted to elect one permanent chairman as opposed to the current practice of rotating the chairmanship each month. RMC members Budgie Green and Janet Goodwin said they would make recommendations for terms of office and subcommittees to handle individual events during next month's meeting.

—Heard Ed Jungbluth announce that Lynda Sanchez will begin her conversational Spanish lessons Tuesday, January 10. Jungbluth said she may teach either one class a week for 12 weeks or two classes a week for six weeks. The cost of the course is \$75. For more information, call the Chamber.

Capitan bids for first Smokey stamp

The Capitan Chamber of Commerce voted during Monday's meeting to circulate petitions to gather support for the Chamber's bid to have the first Smokey Bear Stamp issued nationally to be issued at the Capitan post office.

According to Pat Shear, Chamber president, the petitions will be distributed for signatures from residents of New Mexico, then sent to one of New Mexico's national representatives in Washington, D.C.

The chamber also heard a report from Rose Garner on the progress of

"Everything's running just perfect," Garner said.

Garner said progress is being made toward the \$1,500 she said is needed to fund the day's activities. Garner said the State Highway Department will require a \$1 million liability insurance policy before they will give the go-ahead for the Smokey Bear Day parade. Garner estimated the policy would cost \$600 to \$700.

"We'll shop around before we do anything," she said.

Garner also reported that efforts to get longtime Smokey Bear supporter Dorothy Guck on the Forest Service float at the Tournament of Roses

Parade do not look promising due to lack of time.

"We'll get her on the float some year," Garner said.

The Chamber also heard a suggestion from Forest Service district ranger Paul Gordon to invite to the Smokey Bear Day festivities Harlow Yeager, chief of the fire crew that brought the original bear cub out of the fire.

In other action, the Chamber decided to send letters to area organizations, asking for entries for the parade and donations.

The next meeting of the chamber will be Monday, January 2.

Help needed for U.S. Open ski race

"We need as much help as we can get," said Paul Southwick, owner of Eagle Creek Ski and Recreation Area. Southwick said preparations for the upcoming Pro Ski International Race, the world's richest ski race, are progressing.

Television crews will begin arriving in the area during the last week of February, Southwick said.

Ullmann hit a field goal and Pearson made one of two free throws to close the gap to 22-15.

The National Football League (NFL) can be divided into three categories: the superpowers, the average-to-good teams, and the have-nots.

Dallas, Washington, Miami and the Los Angeles Raiders stand head and shoulders above the rest of the league right now—they rate as superpowers.

The Raiders, Cowboys and Redskins rate at the top of my weekly poll this week, with Miami just behind them.

At least one of the top three teams will drop down this weekend when Dallas and Washington tangle for the National Conference (NFC) Eastern Division championship and the home field advantage in the playoffs.

Comparing the Cowboys and Redskins is like comparing fine wine and beer.

Dallas is a finesse-type team that can strike quickly rather than overpower you. Washington, on the other hand, is a power-oriented, grind-it-out team that generally uses short and middle-range passes rather than the long bomb.

On overall ability, the two teams are about equal, but their strengths are in different categories.

Who will win? I'm picking Dallas by two points, mainly because of the Cowboys' home-field advantage.

The Raiders are similar to Washington in their style of play. They're a big, powerful team that generally wears down an opponent.

But Los Angeles (or should the Raiders be called the Fresno-Bakersfield Raiders?) can also strike quickly with quarterback Jim Plunkett throwing to Cliff Branch, Todd Christenson or running back Marcus Allen.

If Plunkett is "on" the rest of the way, I think the Raiders will win the Super Bowl.

Miami is ranked fourth because it was beaten decisively by the Raiders earlier in the season.

However, the Dolphins have caught fire in recent weeks and clinched the American Conference (AFC) Eastern Division crown last weekend.

Who should be ranked fifth?

Pittsburgh has the fifth best record in the NFL at 9-5. However, the Steelers have lost three straight games and aren't playing like a playoff team now.

I've got to pick Detroit as the fifth best team, mainly because the Lions are on a winning streak and running back Barry Sanders has taken charge, both as a runner and a leader.

There's a host of teams ranked in the honorable mention class just behind Detroit.

Denver, Buffalo, Pittsburgh, San

Francisco, Cleveland, the Los Angeles Rams and the New York Jets are in this category.

The first six teams have either 9-5 or 8-6 records. The Jets are only 7-7, but have won three straight games and have one of the most talented squads in the NFL.

Here are some views on the NFL playoff picture.

Dallas, Washington, Miami and the Raiders have already clinched playoff spots. Los Angeles has won the AFC Western Division while the Dolphins have captured the Eastern title. This weekend's Dallas-Washington contest will decide the NFC Eastern championship and one of the wild-card berths.

But the rest of the picture is a bit confusing.

In the National Conference, Detroit has the edge for the Central title. It has to beat either Cincinnati or Tampa Bay to win the title. However, both of those teams have improved in recent weeks and could give the Lions trouble.

The NFC Western Division is tied between San Francisco and the Rams. Los Angeles has the easier schedule left, playing New England at home and traveling to New Orleans.

The 49ers must play Buffalo in New York before hosting the Cowboys. However, San Francisco has the edge over all the other contending teams in the tie-breaker system and probably could make the playoffs by winning just one game.

San Francisco already defeated Minnesota and St. Louis, teams that have 7-7 and 6-7-1 records, respectively. The 49ers have also topped New Orleans (another 7-7 team) twice. San Francisco has also outscored its opponents by 101 points (367 to 266).

Thus, I see Dallas winning the NFC Eastern Division with Washington as a wild-card team. Detroit should take the Central Division while both San Francisco and the Rams should make the playoffs as either the Western Division champions or as a wild-card team.

In the AFC, Miami and the Raiders are set as the Eastern Division and Western Division champions.

Either Pittsburgh or Cleveland will win the Central Division title. I'm picking Cleveland because the Browns play the Steelers at home in the final game and Pittsburgh must play the Jets this weekend.

I see Denver and the Steelers taking the wild-card berths. The Broncos looked good in a 27-6 win over Cleveland last weekend as rookie quarterback John Elway had his best game of the season.

Anyone interested in Warrior sports is encouraged to attend the meeting.

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

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The Silver Lining

On December Seven
When the bells began ringing and the great loud horns began blowing down at the railroad station in Ashland, Oregon, and our Mother came running to the door both laughing and crying, her blue eyes shining, and said again and again,

"The war is over. The war is over!"—something told me I would be in the next war. (Although everybody was saying that this had been "The war to end all wars.")

This was one of the big days in our history, November eleven, 1918. There was not a person in this country, especially, the men returning, who did not hope with all heart and soul that this was truly the last war. That day brought us the most thankful of Thanksgiving seasons, and a joyous and blessed Christmas.

Then on December seven, 1941, with our nation clinging dearly to the hope that we might yet be spared war's "wide desolation," without warning came Pearl Harbor.

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Forest Service to spray Spruce Budworm

Concern that if left unchecked, the Western Spruce Budworm will "eat itself out of house and home"—and in the process defoliate a good portion of the Lincoln National Forest—has led to a decision to declare war on the insect.

Forest supervisor James Abbot Friday announced the decision to use aerial spraying of the chemical Carbaryl and the bacterial agent BT on up to 109,000 acres of the forest next spring, if funding is available. The decision came after an environmental assessment by a team of experts from the State of New Mexico, the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the U.S. Forest Service.

About 65,000 acres of forest on the Mescalero Apache Reservation is also heavily infested by the Spruce Budworm, according to Abbot.

The Forest Service will begin in January or February if funds are available to carry out the spraying program. If they are, spraying will be done in the spring, conditions permitting.

Abbot addressed the Ruidoso Rotary Club Tuesday on the Spruce

Budworm problem.

He pointed out the insect is misnamed, in that it actually prefers white fir and Douglas fir over other trees. The native American pest occurs wherever fir grows, said Abbot, but only occasionally breaks out in a serious epidemic, and for unknown reasons.

Abbot called the outbreak on the Lincoln "a very serious one."

The insect is hatched as a larva in late summer, winters as a hibernaculum, then emerges in the spring to bore into the bud of the host tree. This destroys the bud and the flower that would eventually become the seed cone.

Thus the tree's natural regeneration process is stopped by the pest. After it emerges from the bud, it feeds on foliage (needles). Infested trees begin to look skinny, especially after two or three years.

"We're in the third year here now of a fairly widespread outbreak," said Abbot. Now is the time to spray to control the pest, he added.

While older trees are usually affected near their tops, younger trees can be wiped out by the Spruce Budworm in four to five years. The problem on the Lincoln was noticed in

1981, when aerial surveys showed 400 acres with defoliation. That total grew to 4,000 acres in 1982; to 45,000 acres in 1983; to the estimated 109,000 acres by next spring.

Abbot said the spread of the outbreak has been uncommonly rapid in this area.

He explained the team of experts looked at the option of doing nothing. The pest would eventually deplete its food supply and fall prey to parasites and disease itself through overpopulation.

But it is what the forest would look like by then that gives cause for concern, he indicated.

The only viable option, the team decided, is to control the outbreak through aerial spraying. Carbaryl, also known as "Seven," is a chemical insecticide that is mixed with kerosene and sprayed at a one pound per one gallon per one acre ratio.

BT (*Bacillus thuringiensis*) is a biological agent that is ingested by the pest and kills it. Abbot said BT will be used in sensitive areas of the forest such as the Alamogordo water supply and Cloudcroft.

Cost for either agent is about \$10 per acre, he said, but economic analysis shows a positive benefit.

Abbot acknowledged that use of any

chemical in the environment is "a doggone sensitive issue." He pointed out, however, that the team took a year to carefully analyze the problem and possible solutions before deciding on spraying.

"So it's this spring or never in my view," he said. He noted that other insects are affected by Seven, but said studies show no significant loss to life forms that feed on insects. Both Seven and BT dissipate in a matter of days, he pointed out.

In the Carson National Forest in Northern New Mexico, 50,000 to 60,000 acres were successfully sprayed with Seven last year, said Abbot. BT was used with less success on a smaller area.

Abbot explained that another tree on the Lincoln forest, the Ponderosa pine, has a serious mistletoe problem. If the firs fall to the Spruce Budworm, only the white pine will be left. The forest will be very vulnerable if it is a monoculture—left with one type tree that could be attacked by something else.

The forest supervisor said in public input on the problem, no one said, "Don't do anything about it."

"I think it (spraying) is a right decision," Abbot concluded.

In 1982, there were 365 deaths in New Mexico that were partly or wholly attributable to people who were driving while under the influence.

Drunk and Drugged Driving Week seeks to:

—1) Emphasize the need for increased care by motorists and

students because the number of DWI drivers greatly increases during the holiday season.

—2) Remind every motorist to buckle up for every trip and ask your passengers to do so also. Safety belts are the greatest protection we have against drunk and drugged drivers.

—3) Do Not Be an over-generous host - provide plenty of hearty food and stop serving drinks early. Offer to drive tipsy individuals home or invite them to spend the night. FRIENDS DON'T LET FRIENDS DRIVE DRUNK.



But with their passing, it seems Ruidoso loses just a little more of its sense of community. Change will go on at its rapid pace around us, but we will have one less setting in which to discuss it.

Perhaps the Coffee Cart will be revived, or something similar will replace it. Or perhaps it will go the way of many things—a victim of modern times.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—It's worth repeating: All the people at the top in state government are temporary employees.

That fact affects some areas of government more sharply than others. One is promotion of the state, which in logic ought to be a continuing process, but which takes on a start-up, stop-off quality because the folks at the top keep coming and going.

Each new group which takes control at the end of every quadrennium wants to start an advertising campaign all over again, as though there had never been one before it came.

Right now, for example, we are reinventing the wheel in connection with state advertising—for about the fortieth time.

While we do, of course, no advertising gets done.

For once, the state is adequately funded in this regard. The last Legislature was unbelievably generous in what it appropriated to promote the state, and the executive branch has an obligation to show it has spent that money wisely.

What's slowing things down to an inordinate degree is the insistence on the part of the Department of Economic Development and Tourism that we go with a clumsy system of retaining eight advertising agencies, with each of six of them responsible for promoting various geographical areas of the state.

That may or may not work. Many here, including the Governor, are not sure it will.

Alex Mercure, boss at Economic Development, is sure it will, and he insists on it strongly.

Senator Tom Rutherford, who sits in with the advisory committee which oversees the department, is clear in his warnings to Mercure. "Legislatures like to see facts arranged in columns," he says, "and if there are no facts by the time the 1984 Legislature convenes, somebody is going to be sorry."

There's another problem which is perhaps not so clearly perceived by those who have some oversight of this

program. Those people at the top we have called "temporary employees" could be described with another title: They are, essentially, amateurs.

When that means that they do not even know the extent of their own ignorance—about things like advertising, for example—they can be dangerous.

That attitude keeps the professionals they presumably hire from working effectively.

No committee ever created good ads, yet that is how government tries to create them.

Passing around a layout and copy so a lot of people can give you their off-the-cuff impressions is not the way the job gets done, as anyone with professional experience in the ad game can tell you. No business, which is spending its own money for advertising, would attempt to create campaigns that way. Neither should government.

So Mercure's department will not have anything in the way of results to present to the Legislature when it comes back to town, and results are what would impress lawmakers the most. A lot of "gonnas" ("We're gonna do this, and we're gonna do that") is not what those who put up the money are looking to hear.

Yet when Mercure hears Rutherford tell him that, and when he hears the Governor himself express some reservations about his insistence on an all-out effort of one kind and one kind only, he just gets defensive. He shows no evidence that he really perceives the depths of his problem.

Maybe the fact that he can step out of his present job anytime he wants to and go back to running his cable television firm is not necessarily a good thing.

Perhaps somebody who wanted the job a little more might do a better job of considering the measured doubts of others.

In this area at least, what government should do is hire the professionals, and let them get on about their business.

Texas Open to Secret Mountain

Secret Mountain, a 3-1 shot ridden by Carlos Rivas, rolled to a decisive two and one-half length win in Saturday's \$128,719 Texas Open Futurity at Sunland Park.

Secret Mountain earned \$60,825 and ruined the storybook finish the stakes newcomer, San Simon, was trying to tag onto the race.

San Simon, honored as the favorite in only the third start of his career, had to settle for second. He earned \$20,275. Dragon Song, 30-1 outsider, hit the wire in third place, three and one-half lengths behind San Simon. Third was worth \$10,137.

Secret Mountain, the property of Jerry R. Vaught of Athens, Texas, ballooned his career income up to \$99,203 and returned mutual payoffs of \$8.60, \$3.20, \$3. Gilbert A. Ciavaglia trains the colt.

In winning the richest thoroughbred race in the history of fall racing at Sunland, Secret Mountain logged his third win from 10 starts. He also holds five seconds.

Before shipping to Sunland for the Texas Open Futurity, Secret Mountain campaigned at Louisiana Downs, where he'd raced in stakes and allowance circles and earned nearly \$40,000.

But the colt's chances in the Texas Open Futurity appeared to dim in the

trials when he was unable to do anything with San Simon and finished second, almost six lengths in arrears.

In Saturday's showdown, San Simon again showed his front-running speed and engaged the speedburning darkhorse, Internat'l Velvet (117-1 odds). Secret Mountain, never far out of it, moved up to engage San Simon in the upper stretch after that one had put away Internat'l Velvet.

Secret Mountain quickly approached San Simon, then took charge with authority to win going away in a windy 1:11 4/5 seconds (three ticks short of the impressive clocking San Simon had registered in the trials).

Immediately after the race, Cecil Crabtree, the trainer of San Simon, lodged an objection against the winner, claiming Secret Mountain had bothered his horse at mid-stretch. The stewards rejected the plea.

San Simon, owned by Cleber and Patricia Massey of Abilene, Texas, still gained considerable stature with that second-place finish against seasoned stakes horses. The colt returned \$2.80 both to place and show.

Dragon Song, a field horse owned by Virgil Callaway and Billy Hitt of Hobbs, collected \$10,137 and refunded \$3.80 to show. Haria Webb was up.

Red Spider turned in a game job while getting fourth-place money of

\$8,082. Larrocca, the second favorite at 2-1, was never a factor but got \$4,055 for fifth. The remaining order of finish (no purse earned): 6th - Troup Leader, 7th - Hot N Sandy, 8th - Mr Muffit, 9th - Break And Take, 10th - Luscious, 11th - Internat'l Velvet, 12th - Atomic Angel.

Secret Mountain is by Syntariat out of Pollys Gal.

The '83 Texas Open Futurity was earmarked expressly for two-year-olds sired by stallions participating in the Texas-Thoroughbred Breeders Association Texas Open Futurity program during the 1980 breeding season.

Three trial races were staged, with the top four finishers in each gaining a berth in the finale. The trial winners were Red Spider by five and one-half lengths in 1:13 3/5 seconds, Larrocca by five and one-quarter lengths in 1:14 flat, and San Simon by five and three-quarter lengths in 1:11 1/5.

Included in the gross purse were stallion awards broken down this way: 1st-\$15,206; 2nd-\$5,068; 3rd-\$2,534; 4th-\$1,520; 5th-\$1,013.

Secret Mountain, in winning the Texas Open Futurity so impressively, stamped himself as most likely a leading contender for the upcoming \$100,000 (estimated) Sunland Park Fall Thoroughbred Futurity.

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

Cogburn a doer, not a sayer

Kevin Cogburn, 21, is the fellow no one ever heard of at Sunland Park. He doesn't say much, he doesn't worry a lot, he doesn't waste energy in useless prattle. Put him in a room full of people and you'll mistake him for the wallpaper.

Ask him to talk about the low points of his life as a jockey, and he'll shift his expression and tell you: "There haven't been any low points."

Okay, then. What about the high points? "There haven't been any high points, either. At least none that I can remember." Ask him to enumerate on the best horses he's ridden, and he'll give you another expression, one which says: I'll think about it and let you know sometime.

So Cogburn may not be the swiftest PR man in town. But he's quickly become one of the leading riders at Sunland Park. After the first seven weeks of the meeting, Cogburn was comfortably settled in the top 10 jockey standings.

But don't get the idea Cogburn is revved up over his success. "I'll just wait and see how the rest of the season goes, then decide what to do. Maybe I'll go to Ruidoso. That would be the next step, but right now, Ruidoso is too far in the future."

Since the best riders in the Southwest tend to assemble for the Sunland Park meeting, it's a gold-star achievement for a jockey to grab a spot in the top 10. For a newcomer, it's a success of the first order—especially if this jockey came to town without a batch of hand-shake agreements with big stables.

Cogburn may have been a blank face in the minds of Sunland Park fans when he showed up for the current meeting, but he was known in the northern end of New Mexico, and he could tip his hat at most jockeys riding the New Mexico circuit. "I wasn't a complete stranger," he explains. "I met most of the jockeys at La Mesa Park, and when I went down to Santa Fe to ride a few times, I also rode at the New Mexico State Fair the last two years."

Ask him how he did at the high-powered State Fair meeting, and he

says: "No good at all." Which means he won one race during the '83 meeting, none the year before. But his big talking points came during the last La Mesa season, where he went to the post 502 times, won 87 times and scored 64 seconds and 51 thirds.

This success packs extra luster in view of the fact Cogburn had to sit out the final two weeks of the season. The vacation was the result of a two-year-old colt he rode in the trials for the Oklahoma Futurity. Cogburn recalls the incident: "This colt—I can't remember his name—tried to buck me off about 50 yards away from the gate. Then he ducked to the outside. I had to slip off and I landed hard on my left elbow. I began bleeding but I didn't know about it until I got back to the jockey's room and took my shirt off. It took seven stitches, and I couldn't ride for the rest of the season."

But Cogburn's championship was secure. He finished some 10 wins ahead of Fred Watson.

Raised in Cement (pronounced Seement), Oklahoma, Cogburn began fixing his attention on racehorses when his father (James Cogburn) set up shop as a quarter horse trainer about six years ago. "I started riding as soon as I turned 16 and could get a license," Cogburn goes on. "I rode at Blue Ribbon Downs, and other Oklahoma tracks. I didn't do too well

at first—just well enough to keep my interest up."

In 1982, his pop's racing enterprise had expanded to the point he was ready to try the pari-mutuel circuit, and took a string to La Mesa. Kevin went along. "I figured La Mesa was a good place to start," he says. The elder Cogburn had a so-so meeting, but Kevin, expanding his talents to include thoroughbreds ("I rode about half-and-half"), wound up sixth. He confesses to having been a big surprised at his success, and "pretty encouraged" as well.

After winning the La Mesa championship earlier this year, he decided the time was ready to try Sunland. The fact that his brother, Orrin, 20, had decided to campaign a small string at Sunland was another point in Kevin's favor. He had also lined up riding agreements with trainers Frank Cappellucci and Elmer Shepard. "I was kind of worried at first," Kevin allows. "I didn't know if I could get on enough horses. But so far I'm doing pretty well."

Given a choice between quarter horses and thoroughbreds, he favors the short-running breed. "I started out on them, so I've been riding them longer, and I just feel more at home with quarter horses."

So what's the secret in getting ahead so quickly in such a tough business? He tends to shrug off a question of this sort, but finally gets almost chatty: "You've got to know what you're doing, and you've got to work. You can learn to be a jockey, but you need to have balance, coordination, quick reflexes, and you have to use your head—especially when you're on a thoroughbred. I started out pretty quick. It wasn't too difficult."

But if he makes it sound easy, he brings you back to reality with this afterthought: "If the trainers don't like the way you ride, you usually don't ride anymore..."

Cliff Sr. in high spirits over Pop's

Clifford C. Lambert Sr. has been training race horses for more than 20 years. He can't even remember how many hundreds of horses he has claimed.

But he's sure of one thing—Pop's Spirit is the best claim he's made in his distinguished career.

"We just got him at the right time," Lambert said. "He'd only run four times as a two-year-old. Evidently he shined bucked and he was laid up all winter. They started him for \$5,000 (at Ruidoso Downs) and I thought he was probably worth \$5,000 as a three-year-old, so we got him."

Lambert claimed the Red Viking gelding on May 15, 1982, from a \$5,000 claiming race which he drew clear for a four-length victory. He went on to win six races with two seconds from 11 starts that summer at Ruidoso Downs and earned \$27,655 for the Double B Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico.

He won several important tests, including the \$28,889 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby at one mile, plus an allowance race and a \$25,000 claiming race during the 1982 season when he was a three-year-old. He was named Ruidoso Downs' best three-year-old colt or gelding and the meet's most improved thoroughbred. But Pop's Spirit may be running even better now.

The Texas-bred runner has cap-

tured five consecutive races, including four straight during the first two months of the Sunland Park race meeting.

Pop's Spirit won a mile chase for \$10,000 claimers on the final day of the New Mexico State Fair meeting in September at Albuquerque, then beat \$15,000 claimers on October 15, and took allowance races at five and one-half furlongs and six furlongs before winning his fifth straight effort against allowance horses at one mile on November 19.

"I think he's running as good now as he did in 1982 at Ruidoso," Lambert said. "He's a real free-running type of horse. He doesn't like to be hit during a race. He runs all he can."

"He hasn't come from behind to win yet. He likes to be on the lead. He ran a couple of 870-yard races last spring and he came from behind to be third. The times he's been beaten, something's been in front of him," he added.

Besides his current streak of five straight wins in a row is the most any horse I've ever trained has won," Lambert noted. "Bold Ego once did it and I think Bounding Jo did, but I can't ever remember one winning more straight races."

"I think he's the best horse on the Sunland grounds. It's possible to win six straight, but it doesn't happen very often."

Lambert said he's been more than

pleased with his son, Casey Lambert, who has been aboard all of Pop's Spirit's 1983 triumphs.

"I just let Casey ride the horse like he wants to. He fits him pretty well," he said. "Pop's Spirit has a real good disposition. He's just a nice horse. I wish all my horses were like him."

Lambert said he will keep Pop's Spirit at Sunland Park as long as he can find races for the gelding.

Pop's Spirit has won 12 of 30 career races with two seconds and one third. He's earned \$48,485.

Although Pop's Spirit has a remarkable winning record, Lambert refused to compare him with Bold Ego, who Lambert trained as a two-year-old and later went on to compete in the Triple Crown classics and become the first New Mexico thoroughbred to earn more than a half million dollars.

"It's pretty hard to compare him to Bold Ego, but he wins a lot just like Bold Ego. We're really proud of him and what he's done," he noted.

Bubbly Bobbie top QH qualifier

Bubbly Bobbie, the filly who collected over \$80,000 at Sunland Park last month for winning the \$174,684 All-American Sale Futurity, will be getting a crack at more big money.

The filly kept up her razor-sharp form on Friday, winning the third race at 400 yards and setting the top qualifying time for the \$120,055 Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity.

Seven of Friday's 11 races were devoted to elimination trials.

Bubbly Bobbie took charge at the first jump on Friday, led all the way and stopped the clock in 19.72 seconds. This clocking was, by far, the best of the day. Mike Lidberg was up. Bubbly Bobbie is owned by Gordon Howell of Sunland Park, Simon

Buechler is the trainer. The filly's victory margin on Friday was two lengths.

Sunland patrons were clearly sold on the filly, and their wagering affinity was reflected in low mutual payoffs of \$2.40, \$2.20, \$2.10. Bubbly Bobbie now holds a four-race win streak, and a career record of 4-1-0 from five starts.

The finale of the Fall Quarter Horse Futurity comes up on Sunday, December 18, and awards \$60,027 to the winner.

In order to survive Friday's qualifying round, a hopeful had to chalk up one of the 10 best clockings (regardless of finish).



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

Amy Jo Mito wins Derby easily

Amy Jo Mito, a filly who was purchased in the '81 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs for only \$4,000, made easy work of Sunday's Fall Quarter Horse Derby at Sunland Park.

The Derby covered 440 yards and put up a purse of \$23,687. The victory share amounted to \$11,883, and that fattened the filly's career earnings up to nearly \$261,000.

Amy Jo Mito's journey in the Derby was aided by a brisk tailwind, which put her winning time at an excellent 21.45 seconds. That was a big improvement over the previous seasonal mark of 21.56, which she set (with a tailwind) as the top qualifier for the Derby.

The Derby clocking was only seven hundredths of a second short of the track record set by Truckle Feature in 1973.

The three men behind Amy Jo Mito are Owner Tommy Joe Hoyt of Powderly, Texas; trainer M. Brent Davidson; and jockey Jerry Burgess. Sunland patrons were pretty well

sold on the filly, and made her an even-money choice in the Derby showdown. The victory margin was one and one-quarter lengths. The mutual returns: \$4.20, \$2.60, \$2.20.

The filly broke in sixth place, steadily emerged out of the pack and took the lead at mid-stretch. She appeared to be coasting as she opened up with those long-reaching strides. No challenges materialized in the second-half of the sprint. Jockey Burgess rode her confidently down to the wire.

She came out of the Derby with a career record of 5-5-1 from 14 starts. The daughter of Mito Paint out of Moon Gypsy now holds a career total of 13 wins.

No Tell Motel, a 7-2 shot ridden by Roy Brooks, broke in second place, and held that slot all the way. The runnerup prize was \$4,023. The payoff: \$4,220. No Tell Motel is owned by the McDermott Ranch of Madisonville, Texas.

Top Moons Gay, the 9-5 second

favorite, sailed in third, a length behind No Tell Motel. Jerry Nicodemus was up for Harriett C. Peckham of El Paso. The colt earned \$2,366 and refunded a \$2.20 show price.

Here's the way the rest of the field checked in: 4th—Lucks Moon and Oh My Featurette (deadheat), each earning \$1,420; 6th—Senors Roundtop, \$948; 7th—Free Tobe Me, \$710; 8th—Gonstruckin, \$473; 9th—Primetime Wrangler, \$236; 10th—Feature Fable, \$236.

BUBBLY BOBBIE CONTINUED HER amazing campaign this season at Sunland Park with another superb performance during Friday's seven trial races for the Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity. The Raise Your Glass filly captured her fourth straight race with an easy two-length triumph in the first trial heat. Her time of 19:72 was the fastest of the 62 two-year-olds who were seeking berths in the 20th running of the Fall Quarter Horse Futurity set for Sunday, December 18, at 400 yards. The winner will earn \$60,027.63 from the total purse of \$120,055.26. Bubbly Bobbie is hoping for her second major stakes triumph this season. In her last outing before Friday's trial event she won by nearly two lengths in the \$174,684 All-American Sale Futurity at Sunland Park on November 20. She was a bargain \$11,000 repurchase in the 1982 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs. Owned by Gordon B. Howell of Sunland Park, the New Mexico-bred filly is trained by Simon J. Buechler. Mike Lidberg again was aboard. Bubbly Bobbie has taken four of five races in her career and has earned \$82,984, the top moneyline of the 10 Futurity finalists. Bubbly Bobbie's ability was no surprise to Friday's crowd which bet her to 1-5 favoritism as she returned \$2.40 to win. Lady Bee Loose ran second behind Bubbly Bobbie but still had the second fastest clocking with a fine 19:99 clocking. The Rio Pego filly ran twice at Blue Ribbon Downs in Sallisaw, Oklahoma and once at Ruidoso Downs before her trial heat. She's trained by Jack F. Reamy for owner Alanzo F. Stanley of Macmill, Oklahoma, and was ridden by Benny Nelson. Warm Thoughts is the second biggest moneymaker in the finale with earnings of \$62,584 accomplished with two victories, four seconds and one third. The Kitaman filly ran third in the second division yet tied for the ninth-fastest clocking with a 20:12 reading. The Oklahoma-bred filly is trained by Jack W. Brooks for owner Jon F. Brannon of Choctaw, Oklahoma, and was ridden by Danny Cardoza.

FRIDAY'S FINAL TRIFECTA produced the season's biggest payoff. Arabian Host, ridden by O. A. Martinez Jr. and Arbid, ridden by apprentice Duane Sterling dead-heated for the win while Rebel Soldier was third. Both the 3-7-16 and 7-3-10 combination returned the same—\$14,162.20. The season's highest previous trifecta return was \$10,630 set by Royal Lately, Solim Roy and Duke of Balsamo on Saturday, October 15.

ARABIAN HOST was a \$12.30 outsider, Arbid was a \$13.60 risk while Rebel Soldier had odds of \$18.60-1. In addition, Arbid, with only \$21 bet on him to show returned the season's highest show payoff of \$31.66. The season's previous biggest show payoff was \$21.00 on Royal Lately October 28.

DONNA'S BOY SCOOTED to an easy win by nine and three-quarter lengths in Saturday's fifth race at one mile in a snappy 1:39, just short of the season's best mile reading of 1:38 3-5 set by Pop's Spirit on November 19. But afterwards, Donna's Boy became the season's highest priced claim when he was haltered for \$10,000 by trainer April Ward for owner William R. Burgess. Ridden by Casey Lambert, Donna's Boy was trained by Frank Cappellucci for owner Claude F. Zachry Jr. As the 4-5 wagering favorite, Donna's Boy returned \$3.60 to win.

PLEASURE MAKER set a seasonal fastest time when she roared to a frontrunning three and one-half length victory in Saturday's ninth race at five and one-half furlongs. The three-year-old Staunch Avenger filly blazed to a 1:04 2-5 clocking, snapping the previous fastest time of 1:05 1-5

Ruidoso Downs. The five horses and their selling prices included Bubbly Bobbie, the fastest qualifier with a 19:72 reading, who was an \$11,000 repurchase; Shesa Lotta Moon, the third-fastest qualifier with a 20:03 clocking, who was a \$4,300 purchase; Galvan who tied for the fourth-fastest qualifier with a 20:04 time, was a \$5,000 purchase; Rise Again, who tied for the fourth-fastest qualifying time with a 20:04, who was purchased for \$14,000 and Sum Lil Budget, who tied for the ninth-best qualifying time with a 20:12 who was a \$10,500 purchase.

THE COMBINATION OF owner Gordon B. Howell of Sunland Park, trainer Simon J. Buechler and jockey Mike Lidberg qualified two horses in to the 20th edition of the Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity. They earned spots with Bubbly Bobbie, the fastest-qualifier and with Rise Again, a Raise Your Glass gelding, who tied for the fourth-swiftest reading.

The Texas-bred filly set fractions of :23 3-5 for the quarter-mile, :46 for the half mile and a rapid :58 for the five furlongs under a fine ride by Pedro Benitez. Trained by Clifford C. Lambert Sr., Pleasure Maker is owned by Bobby D. Cox of Odessa, Texas. As a \$4,100-1 third wagering choice, Pleasure Maker returned \$10.20 to win.

JOCKEY CASEY LAMBERT captured four races on Sunday's program. He started with Topario (\$8.60) in the second for trainer Clifford C. Lambert Sr. and owner Glenna Lambert of Ruidoso, then won two races for trainer J. Doyal Roberts. He won with Hecaharb, (\$9.60) owned by Les Lucas of Ruidoso, in the fourth and then prevailed with Dock's Folly (\$11.40) for owner Jay C. Childers of Borger, Texas, in the sixth. Lambert won the eighth race with Mark Ten (\$18.60) for trainer Frank Cappellucci and owner Edward McAlvain of Wichita Falls, Texas.

TOP LEVAN WON his fourth straight race this season when he led throughout to record a head triumph over Jack Strawman in Sunday's third race at 440 yards. The nine-year-old Top Moon gelding started his streak on October 22 when he defeated \$8,000 claimers, then stopped \$10,000 claiming horses on October 29 and defeated \$8,000 claimers on November 18. Sunday's race was for \$8,000 claiming horses. Trained by Donald E. Mooney, Top Levan is owned by Donnie Stewart of Fort Worth, Texas.

AMY JO MITO set a seasonal fastest time when she blazed to a 21:45 reading while capturing Sunday's featured Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Derby at 440 yards. It was one of the fastest clockings in recent years and was just barely off the track record of 21:38 set by Truckle Feature on November 25, 1973. It was faster than the 21:56 (the season's previous fastest 440-yard reading) set by Amy Jo Mito while qualifying on November 19 for the Derby.

BUSINESS CONTINUED to pick up steam as 8,168 fans showed up for the three-day weekend and put \$962,445 through the betting machinery. On the same weekend last year, 6,780 fans wagered \$880,443. The current weekend wagering total is a gain of 9.36 percent, while the weekend turnstile count is an excellent increase of 20.47 percent. Such bonds were authorized for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings, and purchasing and improving school grounds.

INTEREST RATE AND LIMITATIONS

The following interest limitations are applicable:
 (1) The maximum net effective interest rate permitted for such issue is fourteen percent (14%) per annum; provided, however, that if the net effective interest rate on such issue is greater than ten percent (10%) per annum (based on the actual price to be paid to the District for such issue, calculated to maturity according to standard tables of bond values), such rate shall be approved by the Board of Education. BASIS OF AWARD

The bonds will be awarded to the best bidder considering the stated interest rate specified and the premium offered, if any, and subject to the right of the Board of Education to reject any and all bids and readvertise. The best bid will be determined by deducting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the amount of interest which the District would be required to pay from the original date of the bonds, i.e., December 15, 1983, to the maturity date at the stated rate specified in the proposal, and said bonds will be awarded on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the District. The purchaser must pay accrued interest from the date of the bonds to the date of delivery. The bonds will not be sold for less than par and accrued interest. The District reserves the privilege of waiving any irregularity or informality in any bid.

CUSIP IDENTIFICATION
 CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on the bonds, but neither the failure to print such number on any bond nor any error with respect thereto will constitute cause for failure or refusal by the purchaser to accept or delivery of the bonds to pay for the same. All expenses in relation to the printing of CUSIP numbers on the bonds will be paid for by the District, but the CUSIP Service Bureau charge for the same amount as herein provided for the responsibility of and will be paid for by the purchaser.

GOOD FAITH DEPOSIT

All bids shall be sealed and, except the bid of the State of New Mexico, one is required, shall be accompanied by a good faith deposit of not less than \$5,000 (1% - two percent (2%) of the principal amount of the bonds) either in cash or by cashier's or treasurer's check of, or by certified check drawn on a solvent commercial bank or trust company in the United States and payable to "Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3." Such good faith deposit shall be returned if the bid is not accepted. Delivery of the bonds will be made to the successful bidder at the principal office of the registrar without charge to the successful bidder or elsewhere at the request and at the expense of the successful bidder, within sixty (60) days of the acceptance of the bid. Chapter 350, Laws of New Mexico, 1979, provides that any action attacking the validity of any proceedings had or taken by any public body (such as the Board) preliminary to and in the authorization of any public securities (such as the bonds herein offered) is perpetually barred after the passage of 90 days following publication of a notice of adoption of the resolution authorizing such public securities. As noted above, the District expects to deliver such bonds within 30 days following such publication, and submission of a bid for the bonds shall constitute consent to delivery at such time, subject to receipt by the successful bidder of the opinion of bond counsel (as hereinbelow provided) at the time of delivery of the bonds.

TRANSCRIPT, PRINTED BONDS AND LEGAL OPINION

Pursuant to Section 23-2-2, NMSA 1979, as last amended, the written approval of the New Mexico Attorney General of the bonds as to form and legality will be applied. The validity and enforceability of the bonds, in addition, will be approved by Sherman & Howard, Attorneys at Law, Suite 2000, 633 Seventeenth Street, Denver, Colorado 80202, whose unqualified opinion appears on the legality of the bonds will be furnished to the successful bidder at no cost to the successful bidder. - "3. Interest on said bonds is exempt from taxation by the United States of America under present federal income tax laws.
- "4. The obligations of the District are subject to the reasonable exercise in the future by the State of New Mexico and its governmental bodies of the police power inherent in the sovereignty of the State and to the exercise by the United States of the powers delegated to it by the Federal Constitution.
- "5. As Bond Counsel, we are passing upon only those matters set forth in this opinion and are not passing upon the accuracy or completeness of any statements made in connection with any sale of such bonds."

The successful bidder (without cost to such bidder) will also be furnished with the printed bonds and a complete transcript of the legal proceedings including a certificate stating that there is no litigation pending affecting the validity of the bonds as of the date of their delivery and other closing documents.
