## Joe Skeen to NMSU: it's Site B

U.S. Representative Joe Skeen Monday told the New Mexico State University (NMSU) Board of Regents he supports a regional airport on the Fort Stanton Mesa and that the problem will not go away unless a solution is found.

"This issue will arise and arise again if we don't find some solution," said Skeen.

Monday's meeting in Las Cruces was the first time Skeen has personally stated his position to the board. Although the regents voiced continued opposition to the airport at Site B on the mesa, Skeen appeared pleased with the meeting.

"We opened the lines of communication," said Skeen after the meeting.

Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) chairman Fred Heckman, whose group favors the airport on the mesa, was less enthusiastic. He was asked if anything of substance had occurred at the meeting.

"Nope... They're not any better informed than they were 10 years ago," said Heckman.

The regents have opposed the construction of an airport on the mesa, claiming it will disrupt range research the university conducts on its 26,000-acre experimental ranch

Site B is located within that ranch. Skeen reminded the regents that he was a strong advocate of the university's experimental ranch when it began in the 1950s. He also said he has been a businessman in the Ruidoso area for many years, including two years operating a flying service out of the airport.

"It is still one of the most hazardous airports in New Mexico," said Skeen, who added that anyone flying in the state knows Ruidoso has a very dangerous airport.

Skeen said he wants to work with the university to find a solution that will satisfy both sides of the controversy.

"I'm going to do the best (I can) to make a compromise situation work," said Skeen. "I want to work closely with you."

He said alternatives, including an airport near Carrizozo, had been discussed at length, but that there appears only one viable site now.

"What are the proper alternatives? In my view there is only one," said Skeen.

Skeen said he realized the proposed airport would cause difficulty with the university's research, but that public safety and public good demand a new airport on the mesa. He thanked L. S. Pope for sending him literature on all the research con-

ducted at the ranch, but said he could not determine any research that would have been impossible if the airport existed.

Regents Houston MacKenzie and William Humphries both mentioned an airport at Carrizozo as an alternative, but Skeen noted difficulties with instrument landing, and funding of an airport so far from Ruidoso.

Humphries also stated that if Ruidoso had begun work on Site A (west of Site B and only partially on NMSU land) 15 years ago the problem would be mute now.

Skeen said there were attempts to secure Site A, including an unsuccessful bid to have the state Legislature help with the additional construction costs at that site.

Humphries also accused supporters of Site B of reneging on a deal that both sides had struck to abide by a National Academy of Sciences report. The report stated that the range research and the airport could not coexist and that the university's activities could not be reproduced anywhere.

After the meeting, Heckman referred to a March 1981 letter from former U.S. Senator Jack Schmitt stating that the NAS study was only the first step in a two-step process. The second step was to weigh the findings "in relationship to the economic, operational, environmen-

tal and land transfer advantages we agreed favored Site B."

Schmitt was acting as mediator between the university and SBAC, but was defeated in his reelection bid and is no longer a senator.

Regent David King sounded a more conciliatory note than other university representatives. He emphasized the need for research but did acknowledge the safety factor as a serious problem.

King said Site B is the one if an airport must be built near Ruidoso, but said the board should look at other alternatives. He also mentioned land trades that would allow the university to continue research in other areas.

NMSU president Gerald Thomas said the university will remain opposed to the airport at Site B, but pointed out that U.S. Interior Secretary William Clark will make the final decision about the airport.

SBAC has applied to Clark for a transfer of jurisdiction of the airport land from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). NMSU leases its experimental ranch from the BLM. FAA supports SBAC's efforts to place an airport at Site B.

Skeen will meet with Clark Friday morning to discuss the airport. He said he plans to tell Clark the same things he told the Board of Regents.

## Mayor White left out of March election

The Ruidoso village council Tuesday night scheduled a March 6 municipal election that does not include the mayor, and denied two rezoning requests in spite of favorable Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) recommendations.

Voters will elect six new councilmen and a municipal judge March 6, 1984, in a combined regular and special election. The special election of six councilmen comes as a result of a November 8 referendum increasing the size of the council from four to six members.

It had been a matter of speculation for some time whether Mayor George White would be included in the election that will include all six council seats created by the referendum. The present four councilmen will have to run for election along with all other candidates if they want to remain on the council.

Terms of two and four years will be determined by lot among the six candidates receiving the most votes in the election. According to resolution 83-24, candidates must register between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Tuesday, January 31, 1984.

Unregistered voters have until 5 p.m. Tuesday, January 24, to register with the village clerk if they want to

vote in the March election. P&Z chairman Greg Masters presented the council results of zoning studies on the Paradise Canyon and Ponderosa Heights areas requested by the council. The council, with Benny Coulston dissenting in both cases, then denied two rezoning requests previously approved by P&Z.

Bob Johnson's rezoning request from R-1 (single-family residential) to C-1 (light commercial) for a tract of land at the east end of Paradise Canyon had been approved by P&Z in September 1982, but had not come before the council due to an administrative error. The council tabled the request October 25, 1983, and requested a study of the whole area, which has been the site of other rezoning controversies.

P&Z chairman Masters told the council that a P&Z committee had found a trend of commercial development in the area after studying current usage and aerial photographs and viewing the area from a nearby hilltop.

The committee recommended that land west from the intersection of Meander and Cedar Creek drives—including Johnson's property, most of the Kennedy subdivision tract F, and the Gardner Pipe and Steel Company property—be zoned C-1.

Attorney Ron Harris, representing landowners Helga and Floyd Haake, opposed the C-1 zoning, stating that increased traffic due to commercial development would increase an already hazardous situation. He also questioned the P&Z committee's expertise in the area of zoning.

Coulston stated that the community had already determined the area is commercial, noting the pipe and steel company, Broasted Chicken restaurant and a mobile home park existing in the area. He moved to approve the rezone.

Councilman Don Dale pointed out that Paradise Canyon Drive is one of the busiest streets in the village, and opposed the rezone, saying it would multiply traffic problems.

Just as the question was about to come to a vote, Johnson, who had repeatedly raised his hand for attention, spoke out loudly requesting recognition.

Johnson said six of seven property owners in the area operate businesses and are in favor of a C-1 zoning. He asked what is wrong with the council doing what the people want.

In a roll call vote, councilmen Dale, Al Junge and Frank Sayner voted against the C-1 zoning.

The same three councilmen denied Lawrence and Barbara Paschish's rezoning request from R-2 (multi-family dwellings) to R-3 (mobile

homes) for a lot in Ponderosa Heights Unit III.

The council had tabled this request on November 29 and asked P&Z to study the area.

Masters said a P&Z committee studied the area and found a mixture of mobile homes and frame houses. He said the committee noted the extremely steep terrain in the area and small lots that would make R-1 and R-2 development difficult.

The rest of Ponderosa Heights is zoned R-3 and Masters speculated that the R-2 designation had been a clerical error. He said original restrictive covenants denied mobile homes in the area except by consent of the developer in the original land sale.

The P&Z committee recommended that the whole area be zoned R-3.

Dale asked how many mobile homes there are in the area and how many permanent frame houses there are. After some discussion, it was determined that approximately 14 mobile homes and 45 permanent homes exist in the 336-lot area.

Sayner and Junge noted that many nicer frame houses were concentrated in the higher area near Tamarack Road. Sayner moved to deny the rezone request and direct P&Z to rezone the area block by block.

## Mike Morris named to school board

The Ruidoso Board of Education passed a resolution for a bond election February 7, 1984, and named Mike Morris as a board member at its monthly meeting Tuesday night at Nob Hill Elementary School.

Morris was named a board member to take the place of the late Charles McClellan. Morris is active in youth affairs and is president of the Ruidoso Little League football program.

He has a bachelor of arts degree in psychology from the University of New Mexico, and he owns and operates Mountain Pest Control. He was also a banker for 16 years with Bank Securities Incorporated. Morris has three children in the school district.

"I feel privileged to be a member of the board," he said. "I'm going to try and have a good rapport with the teachers, pupils and family members."

"I think we should try and get our academic standards as high as we possibly can."

Voters in the February election will decide two issues.

One will be an extension of a tax that has to be voted on every three years. For each dollar the community pays, the state matches it. Money from the tax will be for capital improvements, such as repair of buildings and equipment.

The other issue is a \$1 million bond that will go toward the next phase of the new high school scheduled to open in September 1984.

Both issues will require simple majorities to pass.

The school board also awarded the bid on a \$250,000 school bond sale to First National Bank of Albuquerque.

In other business, the board accepted the retirement of Mary Hud-

son, head bookkeeper and administrative aide, and approved the hiring of Bonnie Brock Wood to replace her.

School superintendent Sid Miller praised both women.

"I don't think anyone has any idea what this gal knows and does," Miller said of Hudson. "If anyone in the state of New Mexico can come close to her, Bonnie would. She will be good."

The board also accepted the resignation of Diane Fey, special education aide at White Mountain Middle School.

Other business included the passing of a motion to approve the Higher Education Survey done by Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU), and approval of a request by Trinity

Mountain Fellowship to use the White Mountain cafeteria and three classrooms for services for six months.

Approval of the Higher Education Survey means that ENMU can now present its ideas to the school board in terms of an educational or learning center that the community might want.


Funds for any such project would come from the state.

The board also approved a contract leasing some land to the Village of Ruidoso just south of the middle school for a recreational center.

However, the Ruidoso village council rejected the contract at its meeting Tuesday night, and will probably make some changes in it.

It was also announced that the school district administration office will be closed for the Christmas holidays on the following days: Thursday, December 22 (half day); Friday, December 23; Thursday, December 29 (half day); and Friday, December 30.

The board's next meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, January 10.

Coulston noted that Ponderosa Heights is commonly understood to be a mobile home area and that it contains both nice and "trashy" mobile homes and frame houses. He pointed out that frame houses are still allowed in an R-3 area and voted against Sayner's motion.

"Frankly gentlemen, it's frustrating to kick those recommendations out the door," said Masters. He left, visibly upset, when the meeting ended.

In other P&Z action, the council approved a 10-foot front lot line variance for Jim Hughes in Pinecliff because topography made it difficult to build the house within normal setbacks. It also approved a replat of three lots in Skyvue Heights for Emma Lee Emde.

The council also tabled a rezoning request for 14 lots on the north side of El Paso Street between Center Street and Juanita Avenue until sufficient notice can be given for a public hearing on the request.

It also tabled approval of Blaney's Mountain for Blaney Land Company because not all requirements had been met for final plat approval.

In other business, the council: —Approved an increase in the animal control contract from 40 hours to 60 hours of animal control patrolling per week from December through March at a cost of \$1,238.40 per month.

—Rejected during executive session a proposed lease contract with

the Ruidoso school system for a proposed recreation complex on White Mountain School property. The council directed village manager Jim Hine, assistant village manager Frank Potter and village attorney Lee Huckstep to draft a lease acceptable to the council.

—Heard from engineer Leroy Givens that drawings for different phases of the Grindstone reservoir project are from 75-99 percent complete. Givens said the drawings will be ready for bid in January if the State Engineer rules in Ruidoso's favor in the valley water protest.

—Heard that village manager Hine and Mayor White are trying to arrange a meeting with Carlsbad officials to discuss that town's protest over Ruidoso's water diversion plans.

—Heard Coulston express concern over Carrizozo citizens' recent suggestions about the construction of a regional airport near that town after Carrizozo had agreed to abide by Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) recommendations. SBAC is in favor of an airport on Fort Stanton Mesa.

—Heard attorney Huckstep say that easement negotiations for the new Ponderosa Heights sewer were meeting an inordinate amount of resistance. Assistant village manager Potter, however, expressed optimism that meetings with residents in the near future will prove fruitful.

—Directed village manager Hine and Mayor White to make a recommendation at the next council meeting about the Ruidoso Gymnastic

Association's request to temporarily use the temporary police headquarters once the police have vacated the building.

—Approved the sale of land in the Upper Canyon to Peggy West for the appraised value, with the stipulations that she build nothing on the land and that the sale money go to the Parks and Recreation Department.

—Heard Sid Alford briefly describe the Fantasy Mountain amusement park, which he said will open in the summer of 1984 and increase visitors to the area by 20 percent. Fantasy Mountain Limited representatives will further describe the project at 3 p.m. Thursday, December 15, at Cree Meadows Restaurant.

—Approved the single bid of \$17,888.28 by SOLR Rig Sales and Service for hydraulic tools and a power unit for the water department.

—Reapproved \$176,000 worth of revenue sharing expenditures previously approved during budget hearings. The expenditures had been deleted from the budget until Congress passed a revenue sharing bill in November.

—Heard Mayor White read two letters of commendation by Ruidoso fire superintendent Virgil Reynolds on the efforts of firemen Collie Parks and Eddie Espinoza and police officers Jerry Warf and Pete Esquelbe in a recent Upper Canyon house fire that killed two people.

—Heard Roy Proppner suggest that the village require all houses to have a large metal drum for safe disposal of coals and ashes.

## Ski ads ready, U.S. Open shaky

The Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) Wednesday heard good news about Ruidoso's winter advertising campaign but had news about the U.S. Open ski race.

Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth told LTC members that race organizer Paul Carson did not have a national sponsor for television coverage of the race as of two weeks ago. He said Carson will let Jungbluth know about sponsors by today (Thursday).

If Carson has not found a sponsor by Thursday, the U.S. Open and Carson's whole Pro Ski International tour will likely fold, said Jungbluth.

Jungbluth said Carson has run into difficulty competing with the Winter Olympics for advertising dollars.

Carson has been looking outside of the state for sponsors, but is now contacting New Mexico distributors of national products about possible television sponsorship. Jungbluth said he has put Carson in touch with Epstein Communications, a New Mexico advertising agency, to help him with possible sponsors.

Jungbluth said the village has not spent any money yet on the race and that \$10,000 to \$12,000 collected from the private sector is still in a special account.

Jungbluth said he tried unsuccessfully to contact Carson Wednesday about the sponsorship.

On a brighter note, Jungbluth showed the committee camera-ready color

advertisements that will be placed in the January, February and March issues of Aero Mexico and Southwest Airlines inflight magazines and Texas Monthly magazine.

He said the advertisements, created by Epstein Communications and Ruidoso's Adworks, have already attracted media attention and garnered some free publicity.

Ruidoso has also been featured in a two-page plus article in a national magazine, Skiing, said Jungbluth. The title of the article, "So Close to Texas," ties in with the theme of one of Ruidoso's color ads asking the question, "Ski in Texas?" he noted.

Chamber advertising committee chairman Tommy Morel also expressed enthusiasm about the Skiing article.

"This is a landmark situation," said Morel, who said he thought the article was the first time Sierra Blanca and Ruidoso have received such national exposure.

Morel said the Skiing article was a result of public relations efforts and that Ruidoso should concentrate more on that strategy. He said Epstein Communications will make a presentation Friday for public relations work that might cost Ruidoso anywhere from \$2,000 to \$10,000.

Jungbluth said Acceptamos Pesos decals will be ready within 10 days and will be included in information packets for local merchants who plan to accept Mexican pesos this year. He also said the 50,000 Spanish language Ruidoso brochures which will be distributed throughout Mexico will be

ready very soon. Jungbluth also suggested that the Ruidoso Business Association's request for \$1,500 to help with trade show expenses should be funneled through the state's matching funds program instead of lodgers' tax funds.

He said Ruidoso expects to receive close to \$50,000 in matching funds and that trade show expenditures are eligible under the program. Jungbluth noted that the color advertisements, newspaper advertisements, Ruidoso's proposed U.S. Open contributions, the Spanish language brochure and decals are all possible because of the matching funds.

"If it weren't for state matching funds, we wouldn't be looking at any of this," said Jungbluth.

LTC members complimented Jungbluth on his successful efforts to obtain so much state money for Ruidoso.

"I think your pursuit of matching funds has been outstanding," said LTC member Clark Carpenter.

Morel told LTC members that Jungbluth and White City's Jack White are the most knowledgeable people in the state about the matching funds.

In other business, LTC learned that lodgers' tax collections through November total \$57,923.37, up \$8,629.07 from the same period last fiscal year. LTC chairman Archer Wilson said collections were about what had been expected.

The Federal Reserve Board of Governors has already approved the change of ownership, Shaw noted.

According to Ralph Petty Jr., the bank will be privately home-owned and home-operated. All of the policies will be set locally by the board of directors. The composition of that board will remain the same, with the addition of the owners of the Mexico Holding Corporation. Petty said the new ownership will not affect the current bank staff.

# Around Sports with Gary Brown



There's no doubt about it, The Washington Redskins are number one in the National Football League (NFL) in my poll and probably any other poll.

The Super Bowl champions showed they are ready to defend their crown by dumping the Dallas Cowboys 31-10 Sunday.

Washington defeated Dallas in almost every phase of the game. The Redskins are probably one of the best teams to have played in the NFL the past 10 years.

If Washington beats the New York Giants Saturday, they're the National Conference (NFC) champions regardless of what Dallas does against San Francisco Monday.

The Cowboys and Los Angeles Raiders are tied for second. It's hard to choose between these two teams. Both lost Sunday (although the Raiders' loss to the Cardinals didn't hurt them as they had already clinched their division title). But they are different types of teams.

Dallas is a finesse type team that can strike quickly. The Raiders are a more physical team that generally tries to "beat the other team up."

Miami is ranked fourth. The Dolphins are tied with the Raiders for the best record in the American Conference (AFC) at 11-4, but Los Angeles beat the Dolphins earlier in the season.

Still, the Dolphins can gain the home field advantage for the conference playoffs if they beat the Jets Friday and Los Angeles loses to San Diego Sunday.

Pittsburgh has moved up to fifth place. The Steelers had perhaps their most convincing win of the season Saturday, taking a 34-7 victory over the New York Jets and clinching the AFC Central crown.

Quarterback Terry Bradshaw played for the first time this season and threw two touchdown passes to

get Pittsburgh off to a fast start against the Jets.

The Steelers' defense is still their strong point, having given up 273 points this season, the third lowest total in the conference.

There's a host of teams in the honorable mention ratings again.

San Francisco and Denver lead the way with 9-8 records.

The 49ers have scored 390 points while giving up just 276 this season. However, they've lost several close games. Denver has scored 285 points and allowed 279.

Give San Francisco the top honorable mention rating.

Other teams on the honorable mention list include Green Bay, New Orleans, Detroit, Cleveland, Seattle, New England, Buffalo and the Los Angeles Rams.

There's just one week left in the season and a number of playoff spots are still open.

In the NFC, Dallas and Washington have already clinched playoff berths.

San Francisco has the best chance of the remaining teams to make the playoffs. They can be Western Division champions if they beat Dallas or New Orleans defeats the Rams. The 49ers can also make the playoffs as a wild card team if Green Bay or Detroit lose their final game.

Detroit can win the Central Division by defeating Tampa Bay. Green Bay, New Orleans and the Rams still have playoff hopes, mainly as the remaining wild card team.

In the AFC, the picture is a lot clearer. Miami, Pittsburgh and the Raiders have already won the division titles. Denver has clinched a wild card berth.

New England, Seattle, Buffalo and Cleveland are vying for the remaining wild card berth. Give the edge to Seattle because the Seahawks are hosting New England and a victory would clinch their first-ever playoff berth.

Two house fires earlier this week destroyed a house near Fox Cave and one in Mesquero, but injured no one.

At about midnight Sunday night, the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department was unable to put out a fire at the house of Craig Whipple about one-half mile east of Fox Cave.

The cause of the fire is unknown, but Garcia said Whipple heard an explosion before getting out of bed and finding the house full of smoke. All the Whipples' belongings were destroyed.

The Pauline Zissus family's house and belongings were also destroyed in a fire Monday night near Gallito Flats on the Mesquero Apache Reservation. By the time the Mesquero Police and Fire Department arrived, the front of the house was already engulfed in flames.

## Editorial

Governor Toney Anaya personally has a lot at stake in his upcoming effort to sell the Legislature on a \$732.5 million 1984 spending plan for New Mexico public schools.

But if he is successful, the state will be the big winner in the long run.

Coupled with the \$262 million the governor will ask for the state's colleges and universities, the public schools spending plan would bring the state's total education budget to nearly \$1 billion.

That's not bad for a sparsely populated state in the Sunbelt.

Some will say it's too much, and that the taxpayers should not be made to shoulder such a heavy burden.

New Mexico is due its share of Sunbelt prosperity, by virtue of its natural resources and climate. But if the state is to collect its due, it must create the "intellectual infrastructure" to service the industry it seeks to attract. Thus the emphasis on education should be considered an investment that will pay off in the future.

Admittedly, it is easy to sing the praises of programs that sound so good on paper—higher teacher salaries, computer literacy, vocational education. It is harder to find the money to pay for them.

But we hope the lawmakers keep in mind that next year's decisions will affect the state for a long time. And we hope the public will let their representatives know where they stand on this issue.—TP

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—The Big Hat's don't want a tax increase. Just the opposite, as a matter of fact. New Mexico Cattle Growers Association is now calling for a reduction in state taxes and a "strong move toward fiscal efficiency."

Adoption of that resolution came immediately after the group had heard a discussion of Governor Anaya's proposals for raising \$200 million in additional tax revenue during the up-coming fiscal year.

Cattlegrowers in the state, it is clear, do not see things the way Anaya sees them.

They aren't the only ones who feel that way. Here are some pertinent observations from legislators, the people who will enact none, some or all of the Governor's proposals;

—From Mike Alarid, majority floor leader in the State Senate: "Increasing taxes is repugnant to any legislator, especially in an election year. All I know is that it looks like a hell of a lot of money. I just don't believe we need that much more money."

—From Ike M. Smalley, president pro tempore of the Senate, and, like Alarid, a member of Anaya's own political party: "There's certainly nobody I've found who wants a tax increase...He's going to have to show the Legislature very, very carefully how it's going to be spent before we'll enact the whole package."

—From Senator Charlie T. Lee, a Republican, who is also one of those cattlegrowers: "The people who have contacted me are not in favor of it (a tax raise). The state's revenue is down, and the Governor is asking people to dig down in their pockets to fund the state government at a higher level."

—From State Representative Boyd Scott of Farmington, who usually expresses the spirit of his constituency faithfully: "A tax increase may be needed in some small measure, but nothing like a quarter of a billion dollars... There's been a smokescreen thrown up about this education thing,

which has not been thought through. Just throwing money at it (education) is not going to solve all the problems."

—From the Speaker of the House, Ray Sanchez, a leading Democrat who might be expected to support the Governor's plans: "I think that some tax increase is inevitable next year, but I'm not sure it will be as sizeable as the Governor's proposal. We need to look at the final figures on revenue for the state next year, and look carefully at some alternatives people are working on now."

Some of those quoted, a good sampling of both houses of the Legislature, disagree with the Governor more than others. It is worth noting, however, that not one of them, nor any other legislator so far quoted in the news, to this column's knowledge, has come out in solid support of what Anaya is asking for.

Between now and the time the Legislature goes home you will also hear a whole lot more about the second point the Cattle Growers Association raised—fiscal efficiency in state government.

Governor Anaya recently removed three of his appointees to an obscure but important board before the public ever knew they had been named to the posts.

The reason the public was not aware of the removal of most of those on the Radiation Technical Advisory Council and their replacement by Anaya choices, who turned out to be appointed in contravention of the law, is that the Governor's office no longer announces appointments to routine board and commissions.

We were told that was because it was too much trouble to accomplish that when the Governor had only one press aide.

He now has three such aides, earning between them something like \$90,000 a year.

Certainly they should be able to provide the public that information—to which it has a right.

Seems as though most of what I read and hear about the Ruidoso Airport is Fiction not Facts. Majority of the people do not know what they are talking about when they call the Airport Dangerous. The many years I have flown into Ruidoso in Jets and Prop Planes I have felt at ease.

When you fly into any Airport like Ruidoso with high elevation, strictly daytime operation and strictly non-instrument flying, you have to fly by the FAA Rules, and by the numbers published for the particular Aircraft for a safe operation.

If you go back and review the facts on accidents far and near the Ruidoso Airport, most of them were Pilot errors, things that were taught in basic training; check density altitude, overloading with fuel, passengers etc., center of gravity not in limits, not leaning piston engines properly for altitude, flying instruments when all mountains are obscured into a non instrument airport, etc. etc. etc., it seems that the Airport always gets the blame. I'm sure that you will find that not any of these Pilots were drinking as referred to by Mr. Lojero in letter to editor 12-1-83. Corporate Pilots are professionals and have very close FAA and Company rules to abide by and they do respect their Jobs and Families.

I will be the first to admit we do need a new Airport on Fort Stanton Mesa and will be one of the first to move my Plane there if and when built. The new Airport will have night flying, instrument flying and with a longer runway that will face into the prevailing winds.

With a new Airport Ruidoso would be in a very good position to get badly needed Scheduled Airline Service.

In no way will a new airport stop the aircraft accidents since it will still be at the same basic altitude.

Until we get a new airport we all need to appreciate what we now have and give it all the due credit.

When they handle over 700 aircraft operations on a weekend at Ruidoso with no incidents, SOBER Pilots and the Airport Personnel are doing something right.

These are Facts and not Fiction, it's also hard for me to believe that all of the Homes and Schools were built so close to the Airport (that was there first) if they did not feel it safe.

# Drainage occupies Downs trustees

How to correct a drainage problem on Bob Power's land in Spaghetti Flats was the major topic of discussion at Monday's meeting of the Ruidoso Downs trustees.

Power claims a dike above his property is causing water to run across three lots he owns. He said he brought the matter to the governing body's attention last summer and had been waiting since then for an answer.

Asked if he would allow a drainage to be put in at village expense, Power said an underground pipe would be okay, but "absolutely not" a ditch. He suggested putting dips in the road, noting they would help slow traffic as well as aiding drainage.

Eventually it was decided that

village road grader operator Pappy Johnson would take his equipment to the site and try to correct the problem.

In other business, trustees:

—Discussed purchase of a gasoline tank to save fuel costs, but took no action.

—Received report from Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), and noted P&Z will have a study session at 7 p.m. Tuesday, December 20.

—Decided to discuss the audit report next meeting.

—Approved the low bid of \$8,316.53 for a four-wheel-drive pickup from Ed Black Chevrolet in Albuquerque.

—Took no action on Ordinance 82, setting compensation for the mayor, because the village attorney was not present and the ordinance has not been published. "We'll wear it out

before long before we ever get anything done about it," said Mayor J. C. Day.

—Accepted the low bid on a 5-horsepower air compressor of \$1,376 plus maximum \$100 freight from Ruidoso Sales and Supply. Trustee Harold Mansell voted nay, saying, "I just can't conceive the need for that big a unit."

—Decided to try a system of numbering street light poles to help the power company know which lights are out and which are turned off to save power costs.

—Approved appointment of Glen Brumlow to P&Z.

—Approved authorization of Jack Atkins as agent for the village in water rights purchases.

—Decided to go ahead and meet at 7 p.m. Monday, December 26, despite the legal holiday.

# Rabies case confirmed in Mayhill

The New Mexico State Health and Environment Department December 8 confirmed a case of rabies in the Mayhill area, stated Alamogordo Animal Control director C. H. Dean.

A rabid skunk bit two dogs, said Dean. One dog has been destroyed and the other will be destroyed Friday, December 17.

"This case serves as a reminder that certain wild animals, especially skunks and bats ... can carry rabies,"

said State Epidemiologist Dr. Jonathan Mann. "This shows why it is so important to vaccinate your pets."

Mann said this is the first confirmed case of rabies since March in Otero County. He said there have been no confirmed rabies cases in Lincoln County in 1983, but that there have been 15 cases since 1970.

He said foxes, raccoons and coyotes are also potential carriers of rabies. If a skunk, normally a nocturnal creature, or any other animal, is ac-

ting abnormally, he advised avoiding it.

If bitten by a suspected rabid animal, he advised, try to catch it if possible for rabies tests. People should try to keep the head undamaged since tests are performed on the brain.

If it is impossible to catch the animal, wash the wound thoroughly and contact your personal physician as soon as possible, recommended Mann.

# Capitan receives well funding

The Capitan village council heard some good news and some bad news at Monday night's meeting.

The good news, according to Mayor David Cummins, was the success of an application to the Interstate Streams Commission for funding. The village was awarded \$18,000 to drill two exploratory wells.

"We can work with that amount," Capitan resident Vernon Goodwin said.

Council members also learned of an unsuccessful application to the Community Development Block Grant program for nearly \$600,000. According to Capitan trustee Benny Coker, the village did not receive the funds simply because the program ran out of funds.

Coker said the village is still eligible for funding through the Water Supply Construction Act portion of the grant program. Up to \$193,000 may

still be awarded.

Work will not begin on the well-drilling until a contract arrives from the Interstate Streams Commission.

Council members discussed several prospects for funding for the village water supply. All agreed the situation is serious and something has to be done. The Capitan water supply is being studied by Andrews, Asbury and Robert, an Albuquerque engineering firm.

The firm has identified the quality, quantity and distribution of water as the major problems. Finding a source for funding is vital before any improvements can be done, according to the engineers.

"There's always hopes, so let's keep plugging," Goodwin said of the funding situation.

Goodwin also said the 75 acres of water rights he reported he believed were in jeopardy at the last council meeting are in fact not in jeopardy. Goodwin said a misinterpretation of a document led to the mistake.

In other business, the council:

- Heard a presentation from Ruidoso attorney John Underwood. The council is considering a change of attorneys.
- Voted to raise by three percent the share of sanitation fees collected paid to Wayne Hobbs, village refuse collector.
- Voted to appoint Randy Spears as Chief of Police.
- Voted to set Tuesday, January 24, as the final date for voter registration, and Tuesday, January 31, as the day for candidacy filing for the upcoming election; Tuesday, March 8, Two four-year trustee positions and one municipal judge position will be open.
- Voted to set Monday, January 9, as the date of a public hearing for a beer and wine license application. The hearing will be held during the next village council meeting.
- Voted to include a bill for \$5,500 for a grader payment in the next revenue sharing entitlement period.

# Capitan water problems go on

Water. A life-giver. In few other places is it so scarce, so valuable or so vital as it is in the Southwest.

Capitan has serious water problems.

"It kind of looks like coffee," Jim Millington said of a sample of water taken from Capitan's water supply. Millington and the company he works for—Andrews, Asbury and Robert, an Albuquerque engineering firm—have been hired by the Village of Capitan to identify and pose solutions to the water problems that face the people of Capitan.

"They've got so many water problems we're talking millions to fix them. The water stains everything, ruins clothes that are laundered in it and is sickening to drink," Millington said. The water, coming from Bonito Lake, runs through leaky pipes and faulty filtration systems to the homes and businesses of Capitan.

Millington said analyzed water samples from Capitan have shown levels of up to 50 milligrams of iron per liter. The maximum acceptable is .05 milligrams, Millington said. The iron causes a growth to develop that absorbs chlorine, thus defeating the effectiveness of the chlorine.

"We're going to have to oxidize it somehow," Millington said. He suggested a lime-soda ash water softening system would be very helpful.

"That type of system would be useful for the Bonito water or for any wells that they may find," he said.

Millington said that the village will be drilling exploratory wells in search of another water supply. He said if they find a source that is adequate in quantity, it could replace the Bonito water as the primary source. But he added the likelihood of finding that much water is slim.

Another big problem for Capitan is distribution.

"They have a single zone system with a 300-foot elevation difference," Millington said. He explained that when a system has only one pressure zone, water users at higher elevations will have very low pressure compared to the pressure at lower elevations.

Millington suggested the installation of a two-zone system and a highly elevated storage facility to deal with the pressure problems.

Millington said the root of most of the problems at Capitan is the lack of long-range planning.

"They've been solving things on an emergency basis. We need to identify the 10 worst problems and decide how to approach them."

The biggest problem standing in the way of any solutions, according to Capitan Mayor David Cummins, is the lack of funding.

"Right now, we're waiting for a grant," he said. Cummins reported during Monday night's village council meeting the success of an application to the Interstate Streams Commission for funds to drill two exploratory wells. Although the village didn't get the full \$72,000 it applied for, it did get

\$18,000. The news drew applause at the meeting. Cummins said that amount will be enough to start exploration.

But there was bad news at the meeting as well. The council learned that an application for \$500,000 from the Community Development Block Grant program was not successful, although the village will be "high on the list" at the next hearing sometime in April, according to Cummins.

Other prospects for water project funding may be in the offing. According to Hubert Quintana of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, Capitan may have additional alternatives.

He indicated the Legislature has proposed the creation of a local government infrastructure grant program. Quintana said the program would have a \$1 million limit and only require communities to match about 3 percent of the funds.

Quintana also mentioned the Communities Assistance Council program for possible funding. He said the governor's office has supported the program, particularly pushing to open the program to all needy communities.

Quintana said his office will help Capitan in any way it can.

"We know that it is a very critical situation," he said.

In the meantime, the pipes are still leaking, the filters are still not working, and neither the quality nor quantity of the water so vital to the people of Capitan is available.

# Postmaster concerned with P.O.'s image

"My main goal is to change the image of the Post Office in Ruidoso," said newly appointed Ruidoso Postmaster Bernie Lechman.

Lechman, a 38-year veteran with the Postal Service, had formerly been postmaster at three post offices and acting postmaster at two offices. He is an active person, moving quickly to answer the black wall phone near his desk or to discuss a problem with an employee.

"It's not that I'm new at this," he said.

Lechman said new policies concerning the installation of neighborhood box units will be his main concern.

"If they would have done a better job when they first began installing the neighborhood box units, more people would have made the switch. We're going to continue with the neighborhood box units for the present time," Lechman said.

As a result of two meetings he has had with village officials, Lechman said, no more boxes will be installed until a study can be done of the existing boxes. Lechman said he and assistant village manager Frank Potter will conduct an inspection of all boxes, then consult with the Ruidoso fire and police departments for their recommendations.

"From there, we'll submit a recommendation to my boss in Roswell for approval, then put it up to a bid from contractors to move the necessary boxes," he said.

Lechman mentioned the possibility of installing boxes on a "lazy susan" type base that would swivel, making it easier for the carrier and box-holders to use. He also discussed the parcel lockers, which will be installed on certain units used by businesses that receive a large number of parcels or letters. Lechman explained that the carrier would simply put the keys for the locker in the box of the person receiving the parcel, to enable them to gain entry to the locker.

Among Lechman's other goals for the Post Office is his desire to make the post office a more enjoyable place to visit.

"I want to make the post office more attractive to the public. I want to make it a pleasant place to visit. We've had some complaints about the

clerks being unfriendly—that will change."

Lechman said he is having informal meetings with the members of his staff. Customer service attitudes are stressed in those meetings. Lechman also indicated he will be working on having a more personable relationship with the public.

"I have an open door policy. If someone wants to come in and complain, that's okay. If someone wants to come in and tell us we're doing a good job, that's okay too."

Lechman pointed out the new parcel policy as an example of the Post Office's awareness of customer service. When a customer receives a notice of a parcel, he can simply step to the Dutch doors in the postal box area to pick up the parcel, thus avoiding the line at the windows.

Lechman also said he will be promoting stamp collecting, using a display of his own collection to spark interest in the hobby.

Physical improvements to the postal building are also part of the overall appearance change. Lechman said. He mentioned the retilling of the floor of the customer lobby area, plans for enlargement of the parking lot, recent repainting of the building and reroofing of the roof as the major improvements.


Lechman said many of the improvements will be done soon, and that several projects have already been completed since the first week of November, when he became postmaster.

Lechman's previous appointment was as manager of budget and cost in Albuquerque. He said applying for the Ruidoso Postmaster position was a family choice.

"My wife, my stepson and I had been here several times," he said, leaning back in his chair while running his hand through his reddish hair. "And we had fallen in love with the area. I asked them what they thought about coming here, and they said 'go for it.'"

Lechman said the growth of the Ruidoso area and the tempo here are the things he finds most exciting about living here. He said his family plans to make Ruidoso their home.

Lechman smiles. "I think I'll be around for a while. I have no intentions of going anywhere else. We love the mountains."

## Booging Boo Boo in upset

One of the biggest upsets in the 25-year history of the Texas Derby popped up Saturday as the oddly named Booging Boo Boo easily ran down favored Code's Draconic in the stretch of the mile classic. Sunland patrons put odds of 22 1/2-1 on Booging Boo Boo as she faced seven other three-year-olds in a struggle over a total purse of \$14,525. That was the richest purse, by far, in the long history of the Texas Derby. Booging Boo Boo won by a comfortable three-quarter lengths, earned

\$8,715 and returned portly mutual payoffs of \$47, \$15.60, \$6.40. The filly, who now holds a 4-4-2 record from 18 starts this year, is owned by the Double B. Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico. The upset also marked the first acquisition of the Texas Derby in the long and highly successful trainer career of Cliff Lambert Sr.

Pedro Benitez was up on Booging Boo Boo at 113 pounds, while Code's Draconic, a 2-1 shot, had Betty Harless up at the top impost of 120 pounds. Code's Draconic earned \$3,195 and refunded the prices of \$4.40 and \$2.80.

Rhome Red, a 40-1 outsider handled by Salustio Burgos as 116 pounds, hit the wire in third place, one and three-quarter lengths behind Code's Draconic.

Rhome Red, owned by William A. Hudson of Artesia, New Mexico, collected \$1,743 for third. The colt returned \$7.60 to show.

In the early going, Set Score (6-1) and Smooth Wind (5-2) fought it out in side-by-side fashion while Code's Draconic and Booging Boo Boo decided to bide their time. As Set Score turned for home, the gelding was still full of run.

## Crowvista says 'Hasta la vista' in Marathon

Crowvista, a 6-1 shot ridden by Dale Cordova, saved his best punch for the end and cruised to a two and one-half length victory in Sunday's Rio Grande Marathon Series number 1 at Sunland Park.

The struggle covered a mile and one furlong and lured nine contenders from the \$4,000 claiming bracket.

Crowvista collected \$2,100 out of the \$3,500 purse and returned mutual payoffs of \$14, \$5.80 and \$5.20. The six-year-old gelding is owned by Gene Garcia and Eugene Sanchez of Los Chavez, New Mexico.

Sunday's victory boosted his 1983 income to an impressive \$14,584.

A pair of 12-1 shots, Rebel Soldier and Dr. Traffic, also wrangled their way into the money. Rebel Soldier finished second, earning \$770 and returning \$9.90 and \$5.40. Dr. Traffic, hauling Kevin Cogburn, called down third for a \$420 paycheck. The show payoff was \$6.

Smooth And Fast, the 2-1 public choice, tried to get the job done with early speed and maintained a head lead over the 7-1 outsider, Afimura.

Those two remained in those positions for the first two-thirds of the race, but neither was able to keep up that energy output after reaching the stretch. Brainstorm, an 18-1 longshot, moved quickly at mid-stretch to assume the lead, but he too began conking out.

All this maneuvering appeared to work into Crowvista's hands, because he found hardly any resistance when his steady advance brought him into contention deep in the stretch. The gelding took control easily and piled up his advantage as he swept toward the wire.

Rebel Soldier rallied out of fourth

place to finish second, a half-length in front of the onrushing Dr. Traffic.

Crowvista, trained by Joe R. Chavez, picked up his second win at the meeting. The earlier score came at six and one-half furlongs. His record for the year now stands at 3-10-2 from 22 starts.

Sunday's program also spotlighted

\$16,000 claimers going five and one-half furlongs and honors went to Bourbon And Blues, a heavy favorite piloted by Betty Harless. The sophomore colt won by seven and one-half lengths.

# Jim Curry has been at Sunland Park from the beginning

As Sunland Park celebrates its 25th anniversary this season, so does trainer Jim Curry.

"I watched them build this place and I've raced here every year it's been open," noted the veteran trainer, who has been conditioning race horses for more than 30 years. "Sunland Park's well established. They've done a lot of fine things to make this a good place to race horses."

Curry should know what makes a fine racetrack. Before he settled down in El Paso, he went from track to track from east to west.

"I was at Turf Paradise (in Phoenix) when it opened in the '50s. But most of my bosses were from Texas and New Mexico. So the first year, I put in for 23 stalls. I've had a large stable here ever since. I like it here better than all the other places. I bought a home in El Paso in 1960, the second year Sunland opened. I just decided to quit winding up and down the road."

The 61-year-old trainer noted the

racetrack and the track's facilities have contributed greatly to his decision to stay put in the El Paso area.

"To me, it's home and the facilities are outstanding. The racetrack is a sandy loam and they take quite good care of it. They really maintain the racetrack. It's been a good surface for all these years. Sure, there's been some accidents on it, but you're going to see that at any racetrack," he explained. "I think the condition of the track is as good as any in the country."

"But I really like the people here. A lot of us have been here from the very beginning, and we've been good friends for so many years," he said. "That hasn't changed in all the years Sunland's been open."

Curry noted the purse structure has changed over the years. "When they first started the meet (in 1959), they started out with the purses higher than what the track could handle. Then they leveled off and the purses became a lot more realistic. But gradually, they built the purses up," he said.

Curry also noted that winning races has been increasingly harder through the years at Sunland Park.

"It's harder now than when I first came here. Before, we used to all split up over the winter. Some would go to Arizona, others to Louisiana or the West Coast. But now everyone is here and they all want to win. It makes it that much harder," he noted.

"Winter racing is still the hardest time of the year to win races. Many, many racetracks are open in the summer, but only a few are open in the winter. For a winter racetrack, this is way the best," he added.

While Sunland Park enters its 25th season of horse racing, Curry said its major race, the Riley Allison Thoroughbred Futurity, has been a major reason for the track's success for a quarter-century.

"The Riley Allison Futurity is still something everyone in the Southwest looks forward to winning. I've never

won it. I've come close. One year, Deep Water won the consolation. I raised him and bred him. I've qualified for the finals before.

"Some of the fastest horses I've seen in all my years around the tracks ran in the Riley Allison. I think Tamran's Jet (who won the 1983 Riley Allison Futurity) was one of the very fastest horses I ever saw. The Riley Allison is quite an achievement. It's a credit to Sunland Park to have a race of this magnitude run here," said Curry.

Curry raises mares and colts on 96 acres he has with his wife's brother near Anthony, New Mexico, just a short hop from Sunland Park. The Brown and Curry Ranch has produced such outstanding runners as the popular Bet On Me, an eight-year-old Jeanenes Lark gelding, who is ap-

proaching the \$100,000 career earnings plateau.

He cited general manager Donald F. Smith for his part in maintaining the high standards.

"Curly Smith is a very intelligent man. He's had this place leveled off. He's treated me fabulously. I've been through five or six general managers and, for some reason, they've all treated me very well," he said.

Despite the changes in the past 25 years, Curry is still more than satisfied with his decision to remain in the Sun City.

"I've had many opportunities to go back east, but I've decided to stay here. I have no interest at all in leaving. I hope I can be here another 25 years. Sunland Park's been awfully good to me."

**BOOGING BOO BOO SCORED** a major surprise when she rallied strongly through the stretch to win Saturday's \$14,525 Texas Derby at one mile. The Texas Derby was the 25th rendition of a race that has been held each season since Sunland Park opened in 1959. Booging Boo Boo was held in the second flight of horses as Set Score and Smooth Wind battled for the early lead. As the two leaders began tiring from their early efforts, jockey Pedro Benitez began looting Booging Boo Boo to the outside as the field turned into the stretch. Through the stretch, the three-year-old Hula Chief filly gradually took the lead, but battled furiously with favored and topweighted Code's Draconic. But she drew clear to prevail by almost one length in 1:41. Code's Draconic topweighted at 120 pounds and the \$2.40-1 wagering choice, also burst through the stretch in a powerful move under Betty Harless, but couldn't quite catch Booging Boo Boo. Overlooked in the wagering, Booging Boo Boo returned \$47.00, \$15.00 and \$6.40. Code's Draconic placed for \$4.40 and \$2.80 while Rhome Red, a 40-1 outsider under Salustio Burgos was third and paid \$7.00 to show. Booging Boo Boo is trained by veteran Southwest trainer Clifford C. Lambert Sr., who won his first Texas Derby. The Double B Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico, was the winning owner. The victory was the fourth this year for the New Mexico-bred miss. She also has four seconds and two thirds from 18 appearances. The winner's share of \$5,715 boosted her 1983 bankroll to \$26,906. For Code's Draconic, it was her second consecutive runner-up finish at Sunland Park. She's been remarkably consistent this year with two triumphs, six seconds and three thirds from 14 outings for trainer Coy Hendrix and owners George H. and Lois M. Williams of Lovington.

**FIELD HAND**, who ran second behind Addendum in Friday's fourth race, set a seasonal high place payoff when the High Echelon gelding returned \$105.00 to place. Field Hand was dismissed as a \$156.00-1 outsider in the field of 12 two-year-old maidens running six and one-half furlongs. On-

ly \$13 of the \$2,410 in the place pool was wagered on Field Hand. The previous high place payoff this season was \$79.40 on Ethels Physique on October 16. Field Hand was ridden by Kevin Scholl for trainer H. Duane Sterling and owner Alan J. Antwell of Hobbs. The all-time Sunland Park place payoff record is \$220.00 on Bantie Chick on November 11, 1979.

**IN STEWARDS' RULINGS:** Jockey Ramon Apodaca was suspended three racing days (December 9-11) for careless riding resulting in his mount, Iron Slash, being disqualified from first to fifth for causing interference during the third race on December 3.

Jockey O. A. Martinez Jr. was suspended three racing days (December 9-11) for careless riding resulting in his mount, Irish Antics, being disqualified from second to sixth for interference in the ninth race on December 4.

**JOCKEY CASEY LAMBERT**, Sunland Park's leading rider, won three races on Friday's program, including two consecutive events. He took the sixth on Promise To Pay (\$10.00) for trainer Clifford C. Lambert Sr., then won the seventh on Regal Holiday (\$5.00) and took the ninth on Never Love (\$4.20). Both Regal Holiday and Never Love are trained by Frank Cappellucci.

**THE NUMBER FIVE HORSE** was successful during Friday's program. It captured six races, including three straight during one stretch. Winning horses wearing program number five included Please Expedite (\$7.20) in the first, Murette (\$10.00) in the second, Promise To Pay (\$10.00) in the sixth, Regal Holiday (\$5.00) in the seventh, Winning Margin (\$13.40) in the eighth and Mr. Laico Bird (\$10.00) in the featured 10th race. In addition, Field Hand finished second in fourth place and paid \$105.00 to place.

**SATURDAY'S FINAL TRIFECTA** was the lowest this season. Texas Polka, the second wagering choice at \$3.60-1 under Kevin Cogburn, won the mile race for \$2,500 claiming horses while My Dad Jess, the 9-5 wagering favorite under Casey Lambert, finished second and Never Dispair, the 5-1 third-wagering risk under Harla Webb, was third. The 2-9-3 combination returned \$73.40, beating the

previous lowest trifecta payoff of \$73.60 by 20 cents. That former payoff was set on November 13 when Pop's Spirit, Banquero and Stone Ruler took the first three places.

**ROTTEN SCOTT SET** a seasonal fastest time when he led practically throughout in Sunday's eighth race at six and one-half furlongs. The six-year-old Doc Scott J gelding raced to a 1:17.45 clocking snatching the previous fastest six and one-half furlong reading of 1:18.2-5 shared by Incredible T. and Promise To Pay. Rotten Scott was ridden by Arturo Vallejo for trainer Lewis L. Germany and owner Milton Bronson of Los Angeles. It was the first win in five outings this year for the California-bred. As a \$16.30-1 outsider, Rotten Scott returned \$34.60 to win.

**BOURBON AND BLUES** set a seasonal fastest time when he zipped to a swift 1:03.4-5 clocking while winning Sunday's featured race at five and one-half furlongs. The three-year-old Olympiad colt really put on a strong stretch drive while winning by an impressive seven and one-quarter lengths. The previous fastest five and one-half furlong clocking was a 1:04.2-5 set by Pleasure Maker on December 3. Bourbon And Blues' time was just six ticks off the track record of 1:02.3-5 set by Bottle A. in April of 1973. Ridden by Betty Harless, Bourbon And Blues is trained by Coy Hendrix for owner Gerald Roberts of Lamesa, Texas. As the 7-10 wagering favorite, Bourbon And Blues returned \$3.40 to win.

**SUNLAND PARK PATRONS** really pushed the money through the mutual windows over the last three-day weekend. Friday's crowd of 2,005 wagered \$242,104, an impressive gain of 35.3 percent over the corresponding mutual handle of a year ago of \$187,817. On Saturday, the turnout of 2,676 wagered \$341,705, an increase of 14.2 percent over the same day in 1982 when \$299,029 was handled. Overall, for the weekend, a total of \$880,699 was wagered, which represented a gain of \$78,156 from the corresponding weekend in 1982. ## Favorite In \$120,000 futurity

Bubby Bobbie has already earned nearly \$93,000 this year, and the filly will be trying to stuff more money in her coffers when she goes to the post as a solid favorite in the \$120,000 Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity on Sunday

(December 18). She won her Fall Futurity trial race (above) by two lengths and set the top qualifying time of 19.72 seconds for 400 yards. She's ridden by Mike Lidberg for Gordon Howell of Sunland Park.

## Fall QH Futurity Sunday

Bubby Bobbie, a latecomer on the national quarter horse scene, tries to solidify her position as a stakes winner of major proportions when she goes after Sunday's Fall Quarter Horse Futurity at Sunland Park.

If she gets the job done, she'll own her fifth win of the current Sunland Park meeting, and she'll be enriched by \$60,027.

In addition, she will have conquered both big money two-year-old events of the fall season at Sunland.

Earlier in the meeting, Bubby Bobbie ripped up the \$174,684 All-American Sale Futurity, winning by nearly two lengths and raking in \$88,233.

The gross purse for Sunday's Fall Futurity is \$120,055. The distance is 400 yards—the same as the All-American Sale Futurity.

Bubby Bobbie is owned by Gordon Howell of Sunland Park. She's trained by Simon J. Buechler and ridden by Mike Lidberg.

The filly has been something of a juggernaut in recent weeks, establishing herself as a prime quarter horse standout. That's a far cry from her reputation prior to the start of the Sunland meeting. Previously, she was just another face in the crowd. Prior to the start of the current meeting, her background consisted of only one out. That came on July 2 in a maiden race at Ruidoso Downs. She raced as a 3-1 shot and finished second, two and one-quarter lengths out of it.

The filly was taken out of action, rested up, and returned to duty at Sunland on October 23. She raced as a 37-1 longshot in an allowance sprint and won by a half-length. Since then, it's been a straight jump to the top.

Her second out came in a trial spin for the All-American Sale Futurity, and she won by one and three-quarter lengths in the top qualifying time of 19.94 seconds. In the All-American

finale, she duplicated that performance.

Sunland patrons had no doubts as to the filly's ability when the trials for the Fall Futurity came around. She went off as a crushing favorite at 20 cents on the dollar and flashed in with a two-length cushion, again in the top qualifying time. She stopped the timing equipment in 19.72 seconds, which almost put her in a league by herself—27 hundredths in front of the second-best qualifier.

Bubby Bobbie goes into Sunday's showdown with a shimmering record of 4-1-0 from five starts. She's banked \$82,964 so far. Mike Lidberg, who's piloted the filly in each of her local starts, will again be back at the helm on Sunday.

If Bubby Bobbie wins the Fall Futurity, she'll become Sunland's first "Double Crown" winner—the first horse to conquer both the All-American Sale Futurity and the Fall Quarter Horse Futurity.

Here's a quick profile of the field, from the viewpoint of qualifying times: Bubby Bobbie, 19.72; Lady Be Loose, 19.99; Sheza Lotta Moon, 20.03; Galvan, 20.04; Rise Again, 20.04; Superbludady, 20.04; Easy Demand, 20.05; Truly A Bunny, 20.10; Warm Thoughts, 20.12; Sum Lil Budget, 20.12.

Here's the way the group looks in order of earnings: 1—Bubby Bobbie, \$92,964; 2—Warm Thoughts, \$82,584; 3—Truly A Bunny, \$66,082; 4—Superbludady, \$45,845; 5—Galvan, \$15,629; 6—Sheza Lotta Moon, \$9,678; 7—Sum Lil Budget, \$3,784; 8—Rise Again, \$2,374; 9—Easy Demand, \$1,683; 10—Lady Be Loose, \$9,678.

Five of the finalists are graduates of the 1982 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs. Bubby Bobbie was repurchased for \$11,000; Sheza Lotta Moon was purchased for \$4,300;

Galvan changed hands for only \$5,000; Rise Again was acquired for \$14,000; Sum Lil Budget traded hands for \$10,500.

The total price on the five Sale horses is a remarkably low \$44,800, as compared to their present earnings of \$128,449.


The hopeful with the most victories is the much-campaigned invader from Idaho, Truly A Bunny. The son of Bunny Mackay has been to the races 15 times in his busy career, compiling excellent marks of 8-3-1. The horses with the lowest number of wins are Lady Be Loose, Rise Again and Easy Demand, each tied with one.

The lowest moneymaker in the collection is Lady Be Loose, who has run up only \$713 so far. On Sunday, Lady Be Loose can win as much as \$60,027 for first, as little as \$1,200 for last.

The sire who is best represented in the futurity finale is Raise Your Glass, the papa of two contenders: Bubby Bobbie and Rise Again. The latter two will race as the entry of Gordon Howell.

Trial winners who made the finale: Bubby Bobbie, who won by two lengths; Sheza Lotta Moon, three-quarter lengths; Galvan, a nose; Superbludady, a half-length.

The Fall Quarter Horse Futurity, one of the nation's most prestigious late-season events, will be renewed for the 20th time on Sunday.
