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

P&Z okays three subdivision final plats

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) paved the way for future residential expansion Monday, approving final plats for three new subdivisions. The commission also agreed to have public hearings for commercial rezoning on Rio and Wingfield streets.

P&Z approved the final plat for phase one of Don Dorman's Grindstone Canyon Resort Community, which includes 142 lots on 80.7 acres. Civil engineer Tim Collins said some private roads had been changed since the presentation of the preliminary plat, to provide adequate turning space for emergency vehicles such as fire fighting equipment.

All the lots will be zoned for single-family residential construction. P&Z member James Paxton's motion to approve the plat included distribution of plat copies to fire, police, sanitation and Emergency Medical Service departments for their input.

Dorman said Tuesday he has completed most of the roadwork in the

subdivision and is in the process of installing utilities. He said he expects to have some lots for sale in early spring.

P&Z also approved final plats of Sunny Slopes and White Mountain Meadows, Unit 3, for White Mountain Development Company. Both subdivisions are on the north side of town and will contain primarily single-family residential construction.

Sunny Slopes will have five lots for multiple-family dwellings in the 64-lot subdivision. Although the original applicants have apparently lost interest, P&Z decided to have a public hearing for rezoning one block of Rio Street between Juanita and Riverside drives from R-1 (single-family residential) to C-1 (light commercial).

The original request for two lots on the block was placed in committee May 3, 1982. P&Z enforcement officer Paul Davis said he sent letters to the original applicants to see if they still wanted the property rezoned, and received no replies.

The commission decided to consider rezoning the whole block after

appropriate notice has been posted. P&Z recommended during its last meeting to rezone to C-1 the adjacent block on El Paso Street.

P&Z also decided to consider rezoning to C-1 four lots on the east end of Wingfield Street. The original request for two lots was tabled in May 1982, and the applicants did not respond to letters from Davis.

In other business, P&Z:

—Approved a three-foot 10-inch rear lot line variance for Lot 12, Block 10, of Golf Course Estates for X Y, Limited, after hearing that the Cree Meadows Architectural Plans Review Committee and neighboring landowners had no objections.

—Tabled a replat of commercial property across Sudderth Drive from Jack's Trolley Burger so engineer Collins can inform the owner of possible problems with driveway easements.

—Approved a replat of lots 1A and 2, Block 1, Airport West for Three Bees, Incorporated. P&Z member Margaret Gaddy, who abstained from voting on her son-in-law's property, said Danny Brown intends to sell a lot

between Three Bees and the gas station on Mechem to a person who will build a cleaning establishment.

—Approved a replat of the Loverin Tract on Mechem across from Holiday Home Sales that included a new piece of property. The approved plat will include 10 lots on 6.84 acres.

—Agreed to consider a rezoning request from C-1 to C-2 (general commercial) for Lot 3, Block 1, Airport West, second addition, after sufficient public notice.

—Decided to discuss possible areas for C-2 zoning at its next workshop.

—Appointed Ray Bishop, Tom Kelham, Greg Masters and Martin Rose to a committee to study density and green space requirements for apartments.

—Appointed Ray Bishop, Tom Kelham and Greg Masters to a committee to study a possible parking assessment district in midtown.

—Approved Kelham's motion of wholehearted support for Masters' presentation to the village council last week and Paxton's recent letter to the editor in The News.

Political group formed here

Ruidoso, "a little town with cosmopolitan problems," now has a committee that aims to put good people in office to deal with those problems.

"The Ruidoso Committee," a 13-member group formed several weeks ago, had a press conference at Ruidoso State Bank Monday to announce its intentions.

Chairman Greg Masters said that some months ago he, James Paxton, John Schuller and Bill Carrigan were discussing the political future of Ruidoso. They decided to form a group of respected and influential citizens "to encourage excellence in city government."

Masters said the organizers were pleased with the response from committee members, who joined "by invitation." Later, Masters noted, the group might concern itself with county and state politics.

The March election to elect six village council members provided impetus for the committee's formation, according to Paxton.

By using what Masters called a "low-key but effective" approach, the group plans to encourage good government through support of candidates committee members feel are qualified and will excel.

Those candidates will be determined through a screening process, explained member Rick Evans. A person's background and philosophy on election issues will be examined

through "very informal but very thorough interviews."

Evans explained the group will not endorse a candidate simply for being "a good 'ol boy."

"The main thing is to seek out the most qualified people," said Evans. Masters indicated that honesty will be the most important criterion for candidates.

Committee member Ron MacWhorter said candidates will be rated on a point system—taking into account stand on the issues, personality and background—to allow the group to determine their qualifications for office.

Once a candidate receives the endorsement of The Ruidoso Committee, he or she can count on financial support in the election campaign. Paxton said the group has filed for non-profit corporation status.

The committee will solicit and accept contributions once that status is achieved, said Masters.

He predicts candidates will want the endorsement of the group.

"We have a lot of civic influence," said Masters. "There's a lot of influence just sitting right here."

John Schuller indicated that qualified people who would not run for office otherwise might do so with the support of the committee. He said capable people with a good business background are desirable.

Schuller qualified the statement Tuesday, saying people who "understand the intricacies of the job" are needed to serve on the village council.

Auto insurance required by law after January 1

Beginning January 1, 1984, not having automobile insurance could get you in trouble with the law, even if you don't have an accident. From that date on, all licensed New Mexico drivers will be required to have automobile insurance.

According to various police departments, enforcement of the law will begin right away, with possible penalties of up to \$1,000 and six months in prison.

The Mandatory Financial Responsibility Act requires all drivers to have \$25,000 worth of liability insurance for one injured person; \$50,000 liability insurance for each accident; and \$10,000 for destruction of property. In place of that, drivers can deposit \$60,000 with the state Treasurer or obtain a \$60,000 surety bond.

Drivers must also carry proof of financial responsibility in their cars. They can either carry the original insurance policy or a card verifying they have adequate insurance. Insurance companies are sending out the proof of insurance cards to all their policy holders.

State Police public information officer David Kingsbury said there has been sufficient time and publicity since the law was enacted in 1981 for officers to begin enforcing the law immediately. He said officers will include a check of financial responsibility along with licenses and

registration on all routine stops. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and Ruidoso Police said they will follow the same procedures.

Not only will the police be checking you for insurance, the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) also will be randomly selecting 16,000 names from its files for proof of financial responsibility.

Drivers will have to send insurance and automobile information to the DMV, which will in turn verify the information with insurance companies. Police will be authorized to pick up license plates if drivers do not respond.

According to insurance agent Rich Seeley, there are quite a few drivers who don't have proper insurance. He said initial figures showed approximately 40 percent of New Mexico drivers do not have adequate insurance. But after the recent rush for automobile insurance his and other offices have been experiencing, he upped the estimate to 60 percent.

"We're being inundated," said Seeley, who commented that it is not only the poor or supposedly irresponsible citizens who do not have insurance. He said his office is now writing three to four new policies a day.

Although policies differ for each case, Seeley said a family of four with two drivers, one of whom uses a car for traveling to work, can expect to pay around \$140 every six months for the required insurance.

Thief grabs brass rings

A burglar or burglars who hit Tim Wishard Goldsmith got away with numerous rings Tuesday night, but has probably discovered by now all that glitters is not gold.

The 26 rings stolen from a display case may have looked golden, but were actually highly polished brass rings used for display models. The rings, valued at about \$50 apiece, would have been worth closer to \$500 each if they were gold. The rings also had spurs on the bottom to secure

them to the display case.

"They didn't do too much damage at all," said Wishard.

The crime, which occurred about midnight, still did \$700 to \$1,000 damage, according to Ruidoso Police Sergeant T. J. McBride. A front window was broken with a cinderblock, and one display case was destroyed.

By the time police arrived at the store, within two minutes after the alarm sounded, the thief or thieves had already fled, said McBride.

CSB inmate at large

A Camp Sierra Blanca inmate has been reported missing after he failed to return Monday from a 36-hour furlough in Albuquerque.

Joe Lea Luna, 30, is described as five foot five inches, 170 pounds, with dark brown hair and an olive complexion. He is considered armed and

dangerous.

Luna had only about one month left on his assault with a deadly weapon sentence when he failed to return to the minimum security prison, said prison superintendent Hob Marrs. The escape could cost him up to three additional years on his sentence.

'The hills are alive' with skiers' Walkmans

Cabbage Patch dolls may be the hottest present in the rest of the country, but the kids on top of Sierra Blanca are asking Santa for pocket-size tape players and radios this year.

"They're real popular," said Western Auto owner Pat Schrader. "We can hardly keep them in."

Sony first introduced its Walkman several years ago, but this appears to be the year Ruidoso's skiers have discovered the joys of music on the slopes. Gibson's Discount Center and Radio Shack reported sharply increased sales this year.

"I think they're great!" said skier John Raven.

Raven said he held off from buying one of the portable stereos because he thought it was just a fad. But he tried a friend's radio last summer while grass skiing, and has been using it ever since. He is hoping Santa will bring him one of his own this Christmas.

"It definitely helps me tune in with the skiing," said Raven. "I like that because you have to have that intense concentration for skiing."

"I can hardly ski without it anymore," said Gail Adams, who has owned his tape player for two years.

Adams, an avid music buff, said he enjoys the addition of that art form to

the already enjoyable experience of skiing.

"It just kind of heightens the whole effect," said Adams.

The tape players, now manufactured by numerous companies, are generally five by seven inches and about an inch and a half thick. Skiers carry them in their pockets or in cases strapped to their chests. Many of the radios are small enough to fit in a regular shirt pocket.

There are a variety of headphones available—from separate speakers that fit in the ear almost like an earplug, to an earmuff-style headset with small foam-covered speakers. One of the newest innovations has speakers that attach to dark glasses or goggles.

Prices range from about \$20 to \$300, depending upon accessories such as hookups for speakers and recording capability. Radio Shack manager Jim Stevens said his customers are mostly buying the middle-priced units for about \$80.

While Radio Shack and Western Auto report much higher tape player sales, Gibson's is selling more radios. Raven likes the small radios that fit in his pocket and are easier on batteries. He said it is especially fun when he and his friends are all listening to the same music while they ski down the slopes.

Although radios in town usually on-

ly pick up KREE, Raven said he listens to any of three stations in Albuquerque, Artesia or Santa Fe when he's on top of the mountain. Reception starts to fade when he gets down to Captain run, said Raven.

Adams, on the other hand, listens only to tapes. In fact he even has different types of music for the different slopes. Coming out onto the face of the mountain with its moderate slope and panoramic view, Adams likes to listen to the "massive and romantic" Mahler's 10th Symphony.

When he moves to the more challenging slopes like Terrible or Incredible, he listens to jazz artists like Miles Davis or Chick Corea. He feels the faster music helps on the slopes requiring more turns.

John Williams' soundtrack from Star Wars is excellent if you are having a good day, said Adams.

"It kicks you up another notch," he explained. But if you are struggling, forget it, said Adams, because it will just make you more frustrated.

Raven and many of the other skiers on the mountain listen to rock and roll with its strong beat. David Heath of San Angelo, Texas, said he likes listening to the group Boston. Z Z Top is one of Raven's favorites.

The different music does make a difference in the tempo he skis, but Raven said the mountain and the moguls still determine the turns.

Heath said he even found the music distracting when he first tried to ski while listening to it.

"But once you get used to it, you can't beat it," said Heath.

Raven warned that listening to Led Zeppelin is almost dangerous because you might want to get going too fast.

But everything slows down when the batteries die. And in the cold mountain air, batteries wear out even quicker.

"That's the worst thing about it, when you discover your batteries are dead," said Raven, who lamented the day all his friends were boogieing to good tunes and he had to ski silent. He has learned since to carry an extra pair of batteries with him.

Listening to music while skiing also cuts you off from most communication. With the speakers in your ear and a reasonably high volume, you are pretty much cut off from the rest of the world.

That can be good as far as distractions go, but can be dangerous if you don't keep an eye out for other people.

But, as Raven said, everyone who tries one on goes running to Santa to tell him what they want.

So if you still have a skier to take care of on your Christmas list, think about buying him some slope-side music and tuning him into what Heath called a "little feeling of euphoria."

Member Sandy Gladden pointed out that the committee hopes to provide a service that voters should perform for themselves—encourage, screen and endorse candidates. Once it endorses a candidate, the committee plans to help their choice by distributing information and educating voters.

It can also provide a forum for the candidate to air his or her views, Gladden noted.

Evans said that in theory, the committee will endorse a slate of six candidates for the six council seats to be contested in March. MacWhorter said spending \$500 on behalf of each candidate on the slate has been discussed.

The committee will control how and where the money is spent, it was noted.

Masters stressed that candidates

who are well briefed on the issues and willing to work to get information are the type the committee is seeking. He indicated that political philosophy is a lesser consideration.

"It doesn't really matter as long as they're true in their beliefs and have the information," said Masters.

In response to a question about possible charges the committee will try to control the election, Masters said trying to educate the community would not necessarily constitute control. Getting people involved and participating is a natural part of the political process, he added.

Paxton said all candidates are welcome to appear before the committee to seek its endorsement, and that all will be judged by the same criteria. He added that candidates will be able to get information in advance on the kinds of questions they will be asked.

Masters was asked if the screening process will be completed before January 31, filing date for the March election.

"I doubt that," he said. He pointed out the committee probably will not know who all the candidates are until filing day.

Members of the group who might decide to run for office themselves must resign from the committee and go through the same screening process if they want an endorsement.

Paxton pointed to the fact that six seats will be filled in March.

"The implications are very serious to us," he said. MacWhorter acknowledged that a concern over unqualified candidates being elected "definitely" influenced formation of the committee.

"Maybe in the initial stages it'll be to prevent bad government," Masters said. He added that can-

didates will be expected to make a commitment to serve, and to take the office more seriously than have some past officeholders.

There were allusions to "winging" and "shooting from the hip" on the part of previously elected officials.

"We don't want to take over the running of this community," said Schuller. He mentioned that the committee will not try to dictate to a council member's judgement once elected.

The whole committee has the right to bring names before the body for consideration, it was noted. Interested candidates should contact Masters.

Other members of The Ruidoso Committee present Monday were secretary Jerry Bigham, Otis Spears and Linda Swalander. Members not present were Chuck Hawthorne, Bill Carrigan, Lamar Osborn and Gayle Martin.

Two rezoning denials challenged in court

Ruidoso's zoning battles have been increasingly heated in recent months, and now two of them have landed in court.

White Mountain Development Company and Lincoln County Investments have both appealed recent village council zoning decisions to District Court.

Village attorney Lee Huckstep said he has not prepared a response to the complaints, but he expects the actions to go to trial.

White Mountain Development Company, represented by attorney Ron Harris, appealed the council's denial of a rezoning request from R-1 (single-family residential) to C-1 (light commercial) of a tract of land along Hull Road near White Mountain Schools.

Stating that the council, Mayor George White and village clerk Leon Eggleston acted in an "arbitrary,

capricious, unreasonable and illegal" manner, White Mountain Development Company has asked that the decision be reversed.

In a petition to the court, White Mountain's claim states that the decision should be reversed because the C-1 zoning is in accordance with the 1976 Comprehensive Plan. It also claims that the council's decision "prohibits Petitioners (White Mountain) from putting its property to the use for which it is most appropriately suited and situated."

White Mountain general manager and stockholder Bill McCarty argued at the October 31 public hearing that White Mountain has always intended to commercially develop the Hull Road property and that former village employee Chuck Davis' original R-1 zoning designation was a mistake.

White Mountain has outlined plans to develop a small shopping center for

offices and retail businesses.

Residents of the area argued against the zone change, citing increased traffic, child safety and reductions in property value.

Lincoln County Investments, represented by Chuck Hawthorne, filed a complaint Monday against the council, the mayor and the village clerk for the October 31 denial of a zone change request from R-1 to C-1 for a piece of property at the east end of Paradise Canyon.

Lincoln County Investments claims that the 2-1 vote against the zone change was not a majority of the council, and thus void because it does not comply with state statutes concerning zone changes. Councilman Frank Sayner was absent from that meeting and Benny Coulston voted in favor of the change.

Lincoln County Investments also claims that the decision was "arbitrary, capricious and contrary to

law as they failed to take proper consideration of the fact that the Premises is almost completely surrounded by commercial property."

Romeo Klein's Laundry, Gardner Pipe and Steel, Broasted Chicken and a mobile home park are all within a few hundred yards of the property.

Opponents of the zone change claimed that a C-1 zoning would go against the 1976 Comprehensive Plan and would increase an already hazardous traffic situation.

Lincoln County Investments also states that it bought the property based upon the representation made to it by the Planning and Zoning Officer, his agents or employees, that the property was zoned C-1.

The company also claims that all other C-1 rezoning requests in the area have been approved. The council has denied one C-1 rezoning request since acting on Lincoln County Investments' property.

Lodgers reporting lots of holiday guests

Ruidoso will be the host of a town full of visitors—including many visitors from Mexico—during the Christmas and New Year holidays, with many cabins, condos and motels reporting full houses.

According to Resort Properties property manager Ron Wright, their 36 home, condo and cabin properties are all reserved.

"We're absolutely booked from the 26th to the 2nd," he said. "We could have filled another 15 units if we had them."

Wright said he feels more people are coming to Ruidoso this season, but that they're staying less time. Wright also said in addition to the majority of guests coming from the West Texas area, they are getting a large number of people from Mexico.

"When someone called for reservations from Mexico, and I told them we'll take the pesos, they were real excited," he added.

The larger motels are also reporting brisk business. According to Betsy Jones, general manager of the Best Western Swiss Chalet, they are book-

ed solid from the December 27 to January 1.

"Until then, we are about 75 percent full," Jones said. "We had been filling up very well, but now some are calling and cancelling."

Jones explained that due to recent bad weather in Texas, some people are unable to make scheduled trips to Ruidoso.

"Other than that, we've got a full house," she said.


Jones said that although they've had no requests yet from their Mexican guests to accept pesos, many Mexicans are paying with new credit cards issued on American banks.

One cabin owner, Alicia Dix of Dan Dee Cabins, said a full third of their reservations are from Mexicans. Dix said this season looks very good for them.

"I think this is probably the best we have been booked. We have plenty of reservations," she said.

Dix also reported a good response from the travel agents she has been dealing with.

Pines Motel owners John and Dixie Brown said although they had not been completely booked this week, a

family from Mexico filled up their remaining empty rooms. They also reported full reservations for the week from Christmas to New Year's.

Chamber questions ski race likelihood

Serious questions about whether or not the Pro Ski International ski race will be held as scheduled this March were raised at the Wednesday meeting of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors.

"I had hoped to hear from Paul Carson (executive director of Pro Ski International) by now with some news," said Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Chamber. Carson is having some trouble finding a sponsor for the race and had planned negotiations with a major cowboy boot manufacturer during the past few days, Jungbluth said. Carson was to phone Jungbluth with news of the negotiations.

"Our position still has not changed, it is still on the go," Jungbluth said. "We have not disbursed any funds nor do we intend to until we can see the sponsors and find out who they are."

According to Morgan Clough, a problem exists in the overall business of the promotion of pro skiing.

"The feeling in the industry is that they're holding very, very quickly. I wouldn't disperse any money until you have them on the courthouse steps, I really wouldn't," Clough said.

Board members decided to wait until word from Carson before taking any action.

Also during the meeting, copies of a letter from local businessman Arturo Lojero were passed around to board members. The letter suggested alternative advertising plans for Mexico and the advantages Lojero sees in advertising in Mexico.

Chamber president Jim Paxton stressed to meeting-goers that the letter contained ideas and plans that were those of Lojero himself, and not to be confused with those of the Chamber.

"This is his own program," Paxton said, holding up a copy of the letter. "We are still not going to take one person's decisions to determine what action we take. This does not have to do with the Chamber program as it currently exists."

In other business, the board heard a report from Jungbluth on the progress of the printing of the new program brochures and window stickers. The brochures will be shipped on Wednesday, December 28, and the stickers will be shipped on Friday, December 30.

Heard a report from board member Bill Braudt on the results of the Chamber-sponsored "Messiah on the Mountain" performance Saturday, December 17, at First Christian Church. Braudt said an excellent performance was held, but that it was poorly attended. Braudt blamed difficulties in advertising and lack of community awareness as the cause for the poor attendance.

Appointed Sue Sclow as chairperson for the Elv-Zhu-Ne committee and Ronnie Hemphill as chairman for the nominating committee.


The Bears increased their advantage in the third period, holding a 57-29 lead at the quarter break.

Jason Willard, 18 and a former resident of Fortales, is a new addition to the LPBT program. He hasn't boxed in competition yet, but has worked out a lot in the LPBT gymnasium.

Ordorica, who has boxed for about three years with the LPBT, is also a fine runner on the Ruidoso High School track and cross-country teams. He runs the 8,000 meters and 1,500 meters in track.

"Getting the bronze medal was a thrill," he said. "Especially since I went up there (Minnesota) to get it."

Bank presidents discuss economic prospect

The presidents of Ruidoso's three banks all see some improvement in the local economy during the next year.

Joe Loving of First City National Bank, Buzz Browning of Ruidoso State Bank and Don Shaw of Security Bank presented their views in a round-table discussion at a weekly meeting of the Ruidoso Sertoma Club Wednesday at The Carrizo Lodge.

Members of the club asked the three presidents what their views are on several issues—the local economy in particular.

"Improvement in the local economy depends heavily on three areas," said Browning. "West Texas agriculture, West Texas oil and the Mexico economy. New Mexico's oil industry doesn't have that big an impact on us."

"If they don't improve, the economy might stay soft for a while."

However, the future looks very, very bright."

Shaw agreed with Browning about the key areas for improvement, and estimated how long it will be before the economy picked up.

"This particular area always lags behind the rest of the country for about six months to a year," Shaw said. "I would say the economy here will probably bottom out in the early spring and then pick up. However, it probably won't be the boom we had a couple of years ago."

"By mid-summer or fall we should start seeing it really pick up."

Loving was perhaps the most optimistic about the future economy.

"I'm pretty optimistic about next year," he commented. "I've seen a little improvement already in the oil industry. People are coming back to us and the national economy looks good."

"We could be on the second leg of a real good recovery even if we do lag behind."

Other issues discussed were interest rates and the impact of the Mexican peso on the local economy.

The three presidents also see interest rates staying at about the same level they are now, around 10 1/2 percent nationally and between 12 1/2 and 13 percent locally.

"I don't see any big shift in it," Shaw said. "There could be a change after the national elections next year. After that, they could go down or up. If the government increases taxes or reduces spending, they could go down."

Browning and Loving also see interest rates remaining fairly stable through the year.

On the subject of the Mexican peso, the presidents generally see the effect as limited so far. The local "aceptamos pesos" program got under way this fall.

"We haven't had much activity so far," Loving said. "There's not much of an impact yet. Our Mexican customers generally bring dollars in-

stead."

Browning agreed with much of what Loving said.

"We don't really know how to gauge it," he said. "The benefits over the winter are hard to say because it's such a short time. We're optimistic what next year will bring."


Shaw doesn't think pesos themselves will have that much effect on the local economy.

"I think the advertising of it will be very positive eventually," he said. "However, I don't think the peso per se will have that much effect on our economy."

"I would say the majority of our Mexican visitors are upper-middle class or affluent, and they generally are going to have cash with them."

"The middle and lower middle-class people who might come here for just a day could bring pesos."

"I think the advertising end of it could help us a lot in the long run. I like the program."

Section 1. A special election shall be held on Tuesday, February 7, 1984, at which time there shall be submitted to the qualified, registered electors of Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3 (the "District"), the following question:

PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TAX QUESTION

Section 2. The polls for the election will be open between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on the election day.

Section 3. Precincts shall be consolidated for this election and the District shall consist of a single consolidated precinct. The boundaries of the entire District shall constitute the boundaries of such single consolidated precinct and all voters of the District, except absentee voters, shall vote at the Ruidoso Municipal School Gymnasium, School Campus, Ruidoso, New Mexico. The judges of election for such polling place shall be Mr. Romeo Kline, Mrs. Frank Crown and Mrs. W.O. Woodbridge, and the clerk of election for such polling place shall be Mrs. John D. Quinn and Mrs. Ronnie Taylor.

Section 4. In order to vote, qualified electors of the District must have previously registered with the County Clerk of Lincoln County. Any qualified elector of the District who is not now registered and who wishes to vote at such special election should register during regular office hours at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, at the County Courthouse in Carrizozo, New Mexico, or at the office of any deputy registrar of the County appointed prior to 5:00 p.m. on December 27, 1983.

Section 5. The tax contemplated by the capital improvements tax shall be levied and collected in the manner authorized by the bond question and to any tax imposed to pay debt service on any bonds or for any other purpose. Such capital improvements tax shall be authorized pursuant to the Public School Capital Improvements Act, i.e., Sections 22-25-1 through 22-25-10, NMSA 1978 (Special Chapter 5, Laws of New Mexico, 1975, Special Session, as amended and supplemented).

Section 6. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner authorized by Sections 22-4-21 through 22-4-34, NMSA 1978. Applications for absentee ballots may be obtained from the office of the Superintendent of Schools at the Ruidoso Municipal School Administration Building, in Ruidoso, New Mexico; but at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, February 3, 1984 the Superintendent is required by law to deliver unopened absentee ballots, so completed applications must be received by the Superintendent prior to such time. The absentee voters polling place shall be located at the Office of the Superintendent of Schools, School Administrative Building, Ruidoso, New Mexico. The judges of election for absent voters shall be Mr. Sid Miller, Ms. Kathy Garrett and Ms. Karen Snow and the clerk of election for absent voters shall be Gerry Tully and Mike Gladden.



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
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

Formation of a political action committee in Ruidoso (see story, front section) is an interesting development, to say the least.

But what about the prospect of NOT being endorsed? It seems a candidate might choose not to seek the endorsement in order to maintain indifference to not having it.

Or what if a candidate seeks the endorsement but fails to get it. What's to stop him or her from forming a separate committee to grant its endorsement?

We may have several PACs before we're through.

One thing is for sure—it's going to be an interesting campaign. And we do hope people get involved.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—More than the climate has been cold in the capital city this December.

The reception given Governor Anaya's plans for education has been chillier than the air blowing off the Sange de Cristo range.

That calculated rebuff at the joint meeting of two legislative committees last Friday was the biggest chill reporters here have ever seen.

What happened was this: Jim Miller, the man who heads the Office of Education, which is a part of the Anaya administration, had been invited to appear before the Legislative Finance Committee and the Legislative Education Study Committee.

It's unusual to be given such an opportunity—a chance to explain your plans before two groups of key legislators, including all those you want to be sure to have for you when education bills come up for consideration.

Miller, of course, was there to discuss the Anaya plan for improving the lot of the public schools.

Legislators have not previously expressed anything like an official opinion of that plan.

Something of their feelings was suggested when the presiding officer, Representative Fred Luna of Valencia county, asked Leonard DeLayo to present "the opposing view," after Miller concluded. DeLayo, as almost everybody must know by now, runs the Department of Education, which is not part of the Anaya administration. He also frequently disagrees with the Governor.

DeLayo said the views of his group, specifically of the State Board of Education, would be forthcoming at a later date.

Then it was time for Miller to field questions from the committee. That's the normal procedure, and often the most interesting part of the meeting.

But when Luna called for questions, there was a strange and ominous silence from all lawmakers in the room.

Nobody had a question. Not anybody.

No one raised a hand, and after an embarrassing interval, Miller was dismissed.

Why "embarrassing"? Because to everyone in the room who understands legislative procedure it was clear that the total absence of inquiries was an arranged affair. In normal situations, if somebody asserts it's Friday, there will be some queries of some nature. But not here. Just dead and leaden silence.

But that silence bore a message. It was addressed to Governor Anaya, and it went like this: "We do not even want to give your plan the courtesy of our serious consideration."

Not a good omen for the Anaya proposals.

What should be even more galling to the fourth floor of the Roundhouse, chairman of the two committees meeting that day, as well as 11 out of the 15 legislators officially convened, are members of the Governor's own party. This was no ambush arranged by Anaya's loyal opposition; it was a stand taken by those who would normally make every effort to stick with their man on the top floor.

Anaya, in other words, has more going against him than just the normal disagreements which come from those with opposite philosophical positions. He also has a bundle of animosity built up among those who should be his friends.

Part of that comes from the fact that they are seldom privy to his plans. Most often they learn about them from the same place you do—the front page of the daily newspaper.

Professional courtesy is not Anaya's long suit. Its lack will come back to haunt him during the coming legislative session.

Even the dean of the capital city news corps, Bill Feather of the Associated Press, says he cannot remember a previous occasion on which no questions were asked.

That ought to tell Toney something—if he's listening.

Anyhow, if any civic organization wants to use my idea for a dart board calendar, they are welcome to it.

Hurling barbs at the press has become an increasingly popular pastime, according to the cover story in the December 12 issue of TIME magazine.

You get a pretty good idea of the story's drift by the headline on the cover, "ACCUSING THE PRESS:

What Are Its Sins?" The story inside the magazine is headed, "Journalism Under Fire: A growing perception of arrogance threatens the American press."

TIME reports that public "respect for journalism has fallen dramatically in recent years, threatening one of the foundations of the country's democratic system." A poll found that only 13.7 percent of the population has "a great deal of confidence in the press," compared to 29 percent in 1976.

One factor in provoking distrust, says TIME, is "the suspicion that journalists care little about accuracy." It used to surprise me as a reporter that people were paranoid about being misquoted, and that they often acted like it was a major feat for me to have quoted them correctly.

But I have learned the hard way that not all reporters have engraved on their brains the commandment, "Thou shall not place between quotation marks something that is not EXACTLY as the speaker said it."

A couple of ex-reporters for this newspaper hadn't learned that rule, and the newspaper's credibility suffered as a result.

Much of the TIME article is devoted to television journalism. It notes that some print journalists believe TV has tarnished the reputation of the entire profession, through its "you-are-there intrusiveness" and emphasis on conflict.

Collisions between the desire for a good story and an individual's right to privacy are some of the most controversial actions of journalists, TIME reports. It gives the example of reporters and camera crews surrounding the homes of victims of the Beirut massacre to record the families' grief.

The article points out that people in the business recognize a real problem in public discontent with the press.

Reporters have sometimes lost sight of the fundamental truth that their job is to provide a service to the community rather than to seek the glamour and glory that now often seem to draw people into the craft," it states.

What we in the journalistic profession and we at this newspaper have to do is never lose sight of our potential to hurt people. We must ask ourselves, as the story in TIME suggests, "Is this fair?" rather than, "Will this make Page One?"

The responsibility of always being right and being fair is heavy to contemplate sometimes. But I just wanted our readers to know it is a responsibility we acknowledge and take very seriously. Have a Merry Christmas.

I'm writing to let everyone in town know that there will be a public meeting on Tuesday, January 3rd, at 3 p.m. at City Hall. They will discuss putting a trash compactor in the Hollywood area of town. That means dumping trash barely two blocks from the entrance to Ruidoso on Highway 70. I know our town thrives on tourism. Just think of driving into our pretty little mountain town, and opening your windows to get a breath of fresh air, and if the wind is blowing right they'll be able to smell garbage. I called the environmentalist in Santa Fe, about these compactors. He told me that we would be able to smell it for 1/2 mile around and unless it has a covered building over it, that we would see garbage at all times. 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

County still mulling over paving

To pave or not to pave? The question was discussed extensively during the Tuesday morning meeting of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners.

An amendment to the Subdivision Regulations concerning the paving of subdivision roads drawn up by commissioners during their last meeting was the center of the debate. The proposed amendment deleted all of Section 1-4-23 of the regulations, which requires that all roads in Type I, II and III subdivisions shall be paved by double penetration oiling.

The amendment was to be approved or disapproved during Tuesday's session, but questions by members of the gallery and commissioners themselves about those changes quickly made it clear that no one knew for sure exactly what was intended to be changed.

During discussion at the previous commission meeting, it had been decided that the county could no longer afford to maintain paved roads. Commissioners decided then that by not accepting any more paved roads into the county road plan, and changing the subdivision regulations to no longer require that paving be done, the problem would be solved. Commissioners also said then that any subdivider who paved roads would be responsible for the maintenance of those roads.

"When you talk about maintenance, are you talking about just maintaining the asphalt surface, or the culverts and the snowplowing and everything that goes into maintaining a road?" engineer Tim Collins asked during Tuesday's meeting.

Collins' question went unanswered. Other questions were raised.

Commissioner Bill Elliott said that he felt the cost of maintaining a gravel road continuously over a long period of time might actually be more expensive than installing a near maintenance-free paved road. Other commissioners agreed that more study would have to be done to answer that question.

Commissioners then discussed alternative avenues for the funding of paved roads if they would indeed prove to be cheaper. It was suggested that a Special Assessment District could be set up in the areas where the roads are the worst.

"Those that's to enjoy them's going to have to pay for them," commissioner Kenneth Nosker said of the roads.

Alto Village developer M. H. "Don" Blaugrund also spoke on the possibility of a special assessment.

"Speaking for Alto Village, I believe the people are ready to be charged more to get something better," he said.

The county currently charges property owners 15 cents for each foot of property running along county roads. One meeting-goer suggested that the figure be upped to as much as \$1 a foot, or that one rate be charged for gravel roads and another rate be charged for paved roads.

After extensive discussion, the commissioners voted to table the matter until further study and discussion.

The commissioners also heard a proposal from physician's assistant Nancy Guck of the Capitan medical clinic. Guck suggested the county take over the public clinic she and Dr. Dan Blodgett have been operating.

Guck said she owns the building housing the clinic, and offered either to sell it to the county or to have the county take over the business end of the clinic. She said overhead expenses, private business taxes and difficulty in collecting delinquent accounts made it impossible for her to continue the clinic.

Both Guck and Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan spoke on the need of such a clinic in Capitan.

The commissioners voted to assume control of the clinic for a trial period of three months, then review the progress of the clinic at the end of that period. Chairman John A. Hightower stressed the need to increase the percentage of collections from delinquent accounts to ensure the continued existence of the clinic. Both Blodgett and Guck will continue as the primary medical personnel at the clinic.

In other business, commissioners: —Approved the sending of Resolution 72-27 to Governor Toney Anaya and the New Mexico Legislature seeking support of Lincoln County's request to be considered for funding from the Highway Department Cooperative Road Program.

—Approved a budget increase for the Emergency Medical Services Grant in the amount of \$4,151, due to an increase in the grant amount.

—Approved a request from Jerry Keaton for the removal of gravel from a lot in the Homestead Acres subdivision. Keaton is to drill and blast the rock and the county will haul it off the property and distribute it over county roads.

—Tabled a request from White Mountain Search and Rescue for funds to buy additional equipment. The commissioners asked that the organization come before them to submit the request during regular yearly budget hearings.

—Heard a report from county manager Suzanne Cox on the recent 1982-83 fiscal year audit of the county. Cox said only minor computer problems were mentioned in the audit. The commissioners voted to accept the audit.

—Voted to accept the Planning Commission Ordinance amendments as written.

—Voted to sign the Revenue Sharing Certification necessary to ensure the county receives Revenue Sharing funds.

—Voted to appoint Fort Stanton administrator Mark Delgado as an ex-officio member of the Planning Commission.

—Voted to accept the recommendations of the Lincoln County Planning Commission from their meeting of Thursday, December 15.

—Approved an application from the Glencoe-Palo Verde Fire Department to be included in funding from the Fire Protection Fund.

—Approved a request from Blaugrund that he be able to proceed with subdivision roadbuilding activities, even though the subdivision, High Mesa Unit 4, has not been recorded.

"Here's our game plan for tonight, so listen up," the coach said. Then Geyer went on to explain how the Warriors hoped to stop the towering Rocket team.


The Warrior players' faces showed concentration as they gathered around the chalk board and listened to Geyer.

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
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Richer by \$60,027

Bubbly Bobbie comes through

Bubbly Bobbie kept her foes completely subdued in Sunday's \$120,055 Fall Quarter Horse Futurity at Sunland Park, leading all the way in the prestigious 400-yard dash.

Cold headwinds in the 35 mile-per-hour range were blowing during the Futurity, but Bubbly Bobbie turned in a steamy performance, reaching the wire with a one and three fourth length lead.

It was her fifth win in a row, and the \$60,027 victory purse hiked her career income up to \$153,039. Almost all of that income was generated in the current Sunland meeting, since the filly started the campaign as a maiden with only one out to her credit—a second-at Ruidoso Downs during the summer.

Earlier in the current Sunland meeting, Bubbly Bobbie stamped herself as big-league material by easily winning the \$174,684 All-American Sale Futurity. She earned \$83,233 in that one.

Thus, Bubbly Bobbie became the first horse to win both the All-American Sale Futurity and the Fall Quarter Horse Futurity. She also became one of the best money-makers in Sunland history.

Sunday's runaway victory was no surprise to Sunland patrons, who made the daughter of Raise Your Glass (out of Truckling Bobbie) a heavy favorite at 30 cents on the dollar. The filly is owned by her breeder, Gordon B. Howell of Sunland Park. Simon Buechler is the trainer, and Mike Lidberg is the rider. Those strong headwinds slowed the winning time to 20.34 seconds.

The mutual payoffs were \$2.60 to win, \$2.60 to place, \$2.20 to show. Superbludady, packing odds of just

over 7 1/2-1, found her sea legs at the halfway point of the dash, closed with a big run to finish second, but was never a threat to the winner. Superbludady enriched her owner, T&R Racing Stables of Las Cruces, by \$20,409. That put her total earnings at nearly \$70,000. Roy Brooks does the riding for trainer Marsha Massengale. The payoffs: \$4.60, \$3.

Truly A Bunny (15-1), who broke in seventh place, made headway in the final yards to finish third, a half-length behind Superbludady. Ellen Cockey was up for owner Robert Rhead of Meridan, Idaho. Third was worth \$12,005. The show price was \$3.40.

The remaining order of finish, with purse-money earned: 4th—Easy Demand, \$8,408; 5th—Rise Again (a stablemate of Bubbly Bobbie), \$6,002; 6th—Lady Bee Loose, \$4,802; 7th—Galvan, \$3,601; 8th—Warm Thoughts, \$2,401; 9th—Sheza Lotta Moon, \$1,200; 10th—\$1,200.

The Futurity was run in a cut-and-dried fashion, with Bubbly Bobbie taking command at the outset. She tightened the noose with every stride, and was not put to stress by jockey Lidberg.

Sunland will be dark during Christmas week, but racing resumes on Friday, December 30.

Here's the way the field qualified: Bubbly Bobbie, 19.72; Lady Be Loose, 19.99; Sheza Lotta Moon, 20.03; Galvan, 20.04; Rise Again, 20.04; Superbludady, 20.04; Easy Demand, 20.05; Truly A Bunny, 20.10; Warm Thoughts, 20.12; Sun Lil Budget, 20.12.

Five of the 10 finalists were in the 1982 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs. Bubbly Bobbie was a repurchase at \$11,000; Sheza Lotta Moon was purchased for only \$4,300; Galvan was taken for \$5,000; Rise Again was purchased for \$14,000; Sun Lil Budget was purchased for \$10,500.

Bubbly Bobbie came out of the Fall Quarter Horse Futurity with a brilliant record of 5-1-4 from six starts.

Briefly, here's the filly's background: she began her career at Ruidoso Downs on July 2, finishing second (by two and one fourth lengths) as a 3-1 shot in a 400-yard maiden spin. She was taken out of training, and didn't return to action until October 23 at Sunland, when she faced allowance competition at 400 yards. She was 37-1 in the betting, but she won by a half-length.

Next, she raced as 1-2 favorite in her trial race for the All-American Sale Futurity, won by one and three fourth lengths and set the top qualifying time of 19.94 seconds.

In the All-American Sale Futurity finale, she won by one and three fourth lengths, carrying the odds of nearly 4-1. In the trials for the Fall Quarter Horse Futurity, she raced as a topheavy 1-5 favorite and won by two lengths.

In her five Sunland outings (including the Fall Futurity), she found no serious competition.

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Sunland Park Hoofbeats

MACHISMA WAS ONE of the standouts during Friday's four trial races for the 20th running of the Sunland Park Fall Thoroughbred Futurity. The Scout Leader filly posted her first victory since last August at Ruidoso Downs when she tallied a front-running triumph by three and one fourth lengths over Light Will in the third trial heat. Her time of 1:11 was the fastest of the four winners and her victory margin of three and one fourth lengths was the biggest of the winners. The New Mexico-bred miss also has other impressive credentials compared to her 11 opponents in the finale. She has the most starts (15), the most victories (7), and has the biggest moneyline (\$81,777).

Machisma was one of the top runners at this summer's Ruidoso Downs campaign. She won four races at the mountain track, including a sweep of the Rio Grande and Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurities, the meet's two top races for two-year-old New Mexico-bred thoroughbreds. She also captured the Pocket Coin Handicap while earning laurels as the track's top two-year-old thoroughbred filly.

In 15 trips for trainer Fred I. Danley, Machisma has seven triumphs with five seconds and two thirds. She's owned by H.T. Hornbuckle of Albuquerque. The finale is scheduled for Saturday, December 31, (the last day these finalists will be considered two-year-olds) at six furlongs. The winner will collect \$53,674.22 from the total purse of \$107,342.44. Another impressive winner was San Simon, a Smooth Stuff colt. The Texas-bred colt has only made four starts in his budding career for trainer Cecil Crabtree and owners Cleber J. and Patricia Massey of Abilene, Texas. He won a trial race for the Texas Open Futurity at Sunland Park and then ran a strong second in the Texas Open Futurity over six furlongs on December 3 in his two best appearances. In his trial race, he blazed to a rapid 1:11 1-5 while winning by two and one half lengths over outsider The Girl I Love. In his trial race, Fly By Chopsticks ran third. Fly By Chopsticks collected \$228 for his effort and thus boosted his total earnings to \$30,017. That's \$17 more than the \$50,000 purchase price he commanded at last summer's Summer Select Sale of Thoroughbred Yearlings at Ruidoso Downs. Fly By Chopsticks was the only one of the 12 finalists to have participated in the prestigious thoroughbred sale held each summer at the All-American Sales Arena on the Ruidoso Downs track grounds.

The second-biggest moneymaker in the field will be Delta Way, a Delta Oil colt, who ran third behind winning Draconic's Sign and runnerup Wee Ta in the opening trial event. In seven starts for trainer Paul A. Smith, Delta Way has two victories and two seconds with one third and earnings of \$41,547 for owners Henry T. Cota, Raymond D. Gallegos and Ronald L. Sugamosto of Alamosordo.

TRAINERS CECIL CRABTREE and Clifford C. Lambert Sr. will each have two runners in the 20th annual Sunland Park Fall Thoroughbred Futurity, set for Saturday, December 31. Crabtree will have Light Will, and Ask Us gelding, who was second behind Machisma in the third trial heat on Friday and San Simon, who took the final trial heat. Lambert will saddle Wee Ta, runnerup in the open-

ing trial and Tell Tommy, who returned \$41 to win the second trial event in 1:12 1-5. He won by a nose over Nativo Bravo in a thrilling stretch duel.

HALF OF THE FIELD for the Sunland Park Fall Thoroughbred Futurity paid the \$2,500 supplemental penalty. Those horses whose connections spent the extra money included Tell Tommy, Nativo Bravo, Red Spider, Light Will, The Girl I Love and Fly By Chopsticks.

TRAINER LARRY KEITER'S barn has been named barn-of-the-month for December by the Horsewomen's United. The award, presented each month, honors a Sunland Park trainer for a clean and well-maintained barn. The blanket is given by Globe, Grain and Seed from Anthony, New Mexico.

THIS WILL BE THE FINAL edition of Hoofbeats until Sunday, January 1, 1984. Sunland Park will be closed this weekend due to the holidays. Racing will resume on Friday, December 30 with an 11-race program. Post time, as usual will be 12:30 p.m.

AMY JO MITO CAPTURED her third straight win when she roared through the final strides to post a neck victory over Six Doubles in Saturday's featured Savannah Swinger Series Number 3 at 440 yards. The brilliant three-year-old Mito Paint filly carried topweight of 123 pounds under jockey Kevin Cogburn, who made his first trip on the Texas-bred miss. Amy Jo Mito won a trial race for the Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Derby on November 19, then won the Derby, a Grade III event, by a widening one and one fourth lengths on December 4. Amy Jo Mito has won six of 14 events this year with five seconds and one third from 15 trips this season for trainer M. Brent Davidson. She's earned \$49,808 for owner Tommy Joe Hoyt of Powderly, Texas. Six Doubles, the second topweight at 122 and the 5-2 second wagering favorite was seeking to become the first horse to sweep the three Savannah Swinger events. The four-year-old Easy Six horse had taken the first two Savannah Swinger races, had the early lead in the 440-yard finale on Saturday, but couldn't stave off Amy Jo Mito's final surge. As the 1-2 wagering favorite, Amy Jo Mito returned \$3.00 to win.

TOP LEVAN won his fifth straight race when he took Sunday's fourth race at 350 yards. The nine-year-old Top Moon gelding maintained his

perfect record this fall at Sunland Park with his head win in 18:41 clocking into a brisk headwind. Hidden by Larry Chavez, who has been aboard for the last three victories, Top Levan is trained by Donald E. Mooney for owner Donnie R. Stewart of Fort Worth, Texas. Overall this year, the Oklahoma-bred dasher has collected seven wins with one second and one third from 10 appearances and has earned \$14,644. Sunday's race was restricted to \$8,000 claiming horses who are three-years-old or older. As the \$1.70-1 second wagering choice, Top Levan paid \$4.40 to win.

JOCKEY LARRY CHAVEZ tallied three wins on Sunday's program. He started with Bold Remark (\$10.20) in the first for trainer Gerald E. Hobby, won the fourth with Top Levan (\$5.40) for trainer Donald E. Mooney and then captured the sixth on Trex-to-the-stars (\$7.80) for trainer Jimmy W. Jones.

DONNA'S BOY TURNED in a sharp effort in recording his third straight victory when he roared through the stretch to win going away by four lengths in Sunday's seventh race at six furlongs. The four-year-old Hall The Pirates gelding was clocked in 1:10 3-5 which tied the season's fastest clocking at the distance. Donna's Boy is moving up the claiming ladder. His initial triumph was against \$8,000 claimers, then he defeated \$10,000 horses. Sunday's victory was against horses running for \$17,500-\$15,000. Trained by April S. Ward, Donna's Boy is owned by William R. Burgess of Alto. Apprentice jockey Eugene O'Neill rode the Kentucky-bred runner in Sunday's easy victory.

BUBBLY BOBBIE CLEARLY demonstrated she's the class of the two-year-old quarter horses at Sunland Park when the Raise Your Glass filly led throughout in winning the Sunland Park Quarter Horse Futurity on Sunday. Bubbly Bobbie's win streak included an allowance race, a trial win, a victory in the \$174,684 Sunland Park All-American Sale Futurity and a trial heat for the Fall Quarter Horse Futurity. The New Mexico-bred filly has been magnificent this season for jockey Mike Lidberg, trainer Simon J. Buechler and owner Gordon B. Howell of Sunland Park. Running into a brisk headwind on Sunday, Bubbly Bobbie ran a 20:34 over the 440 yards. She returned \$2.60 to win as the overwhelming 3-10 favorite.

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

Winsham Lad Cap to Code's Draconic

Code's Draconic, perfectly ridden by Betty Harless, got within range of the leaders in the upper stretch and rolled to a strong length victory in Sunday's ninth running of the Winsham Lad Handicap at Sunland Park. The mile-and-sixteenth test offered a total purse of \$14,075. Seven three-year-olds contested the issue. Code's Draconic collected \$8,445, which boosted her '83 bankroll to \$34,786. The daughter of Draconic out of By The Code is owned by George and Lois Williams of Lovington.

Launched as the second favorite, Code's Draconic refunded mutual payoffs of \$7.60, \$3.60 and \$2.60. Parmer County Kid finished the race with a big stretch kick, earned \$3,096 for second and returned \$4 and \$3.40. Wayne Bucher was up. Walkin Boss, a 36-1 outsider who set the early pace, hung on for third and earned \$1,689. Salustio Burgos was up. Sunland patrons made Fager's Bid a 2-1 favorite, despite the fact the Hollywood Park import was making

his first start since May 27, 1982. He was unable to generate a challenge and finished sixth. Jockey Harless kept Code's Draconic in fourth place during the first portions of the race, brought her into contention after reaching the top of the stretch, then asked the filly for her best. Code's Draconic took command willingly and was in control throughout the stretch run. She was timed in a windswept clocking of 1:48 3/5 seconds.

San Simon looks good in trial

San Simon, the colt who ran second as the favorite in the recent \$128,719 Texas Open Futurity at Sunland Park, began getting his revenge on Friday. He won Friday's 10th race, which was one of four elimination trials for the \$107,348 Sunland Park Fall Thoroughbred Futurity. San Simon looked extremely impressive in Friday's outing. Launched as an 8-5 favorite under Mike Lidberg, he engaged Promise To Pay in a speed duel down the backstretch, took control willingly in the upper stretch, and was hand-riden down to the wire. The colt crossed the finish line with a two and one half length lead

and was timed in 1:11 1/5 seconds. The Girl I Love, a 19-1 outsider, ran gamely throughout the stretch to take second, while Fly By Chopsticks, a stakes-tested filly with earnings of nearly \$30,000, found her stretch punch neutralized by San Simon's power over the final furlong. Fly By Chopsticks ended up third. San Simon (\$5.20, \$3.80, \$2.80) is owned by Cleber and Patricia Massey of Abilene, Texas. Cecil Crabtree does the training. Another impressive performance was turned in by the filly, Machisma, who outlegged her foes in the seventh race and was timed in a sizzling 1:11 flat (only two ticks short of the

seasonal record). Machisma (\$3.20, \$3 and \$2.40) is owned by H.T. Hornbuckle of Albuquerque. Light Will ended up second in that heat, while Delifer took third. The top three finishers in each of the four heats will be shooting at that victory prize of \$53,674 on December 31. Also making the qualifying cut were Draconic's Sign (\$18.20), who won the third race in 1:11 2/5 and was chased under the wire by Wee Ta and Delta Way; and Tell Tommy (\$41), winner of the fifth race in 1:12 1/5, and followed by Nativo Bravo, Red Spider.

Amy Jo Mito tops Six Doubles

Amy Jo Mito, the queen of three-year-old quarter horses now campaigning at Sunland Park, took on older competition in Saturday's third leg of the Savannah Swinger Series and methodically overpowered Six Doubles in the 440-yard powerburst.

Although Amy Jo Mito is used to hauling in hefty paychecks, Saturday's effort was still worth her trouble. She picked up \$3,910 out of the gross purse of \$14,850.

The victory was her second straight at Sunland (both in stakes competition) and further enhanced Amy Jo Mito's stature as one of the best bargain horses in quarter horse history. The filly was purchased in the 1981 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale for only \$4,000.

With her conquest of the Savannah Swinger Number 3, the filly owns a 1983 money line of \$49,808. Her career

income is a soaring \$289,885. She's owned by Tommy Joe Hoyt of Powderly, Texas. M. Brent Davidson is the trainer and Kevin Cogburn does the riding.

Amy Jo Mito, in her previous outing before Sunland patrons, easily whipped fellow three-year-olds in the \$23,667 Fall Quarter Horse Derby. She was installed as a 1-3 favorite in the Savannah Swinger, despite the fact her foes included Six Doubles, the menacing four-year-old who had taken both previous stops on this season's Savannah Swinger Series.


Six Doubles had won the 350-yard edition by a nose on October 16 and the 400-yard version by three-fourths length on November 13. He broke smartly in Saturday's 440-yard version, opened an early lead, and ran crisply throughout. But Amy Jo Mito, looking confident and unhurried, set-

led in second place, a half-length off the lead.

With half the distance to go, Amy Jo Mito made up ground slowly and steadily. In the final 50 yards, she took the lead, and was hand-riden to a neck victory. Six Doubles kept up his game fight, but was unable to bet off the filly's assault.

Amy Jo Mito packed 123 pounds, one more than the load handed Six Doubles, and returned betting payoffs (as a 1-2 favorite) of \$3, \$2.60, \$2.40. Six Doubles, piloted by Casey Lambert for Leroy Spires Jr. of Snyder, Texas, earned \$3,267 and returned \$2.60 \$2.40. Big Bad Boz (10-1) finished third, a half-length behind Six Doubles, and returned \$2.60. Larry Byars was up.

The winning time of 21.83 seconds (with no wind) did not approach Amy Jo Mito's own seasonal record clocking of 21.45 seconds.



Amy Jo Mito wins Savannah Swinger



Frank Cappellucci says Sunland Park racing better than ever

Take it from one of New Mexico's pioneer trainers—Sunland Park's racing is far superior now than when the west El Paso track opened.

"There's no comparison between then and now," observed veteran trainer Frank Cappellucci, a long-time trainer who has trained here since Sunland Park started horse racing in 1959. "I like it here. I've never had any desire to go anyplace else."

The 76-year-old conditioner remembers the first few years when Sunland Park just raced in the fall.

"I had no place else to go in the winter, so I came here. The first year, I asked for 10 stalls. They gave me six. I did that for two or three years, but I couldn't make it on that. So I went to see about getting more stalls. I got 12 then. Now I have 20."

"The first year, we had \$600 purses. But we could get along with it. Grain was \$5.75-\$.8. Now it's \$10, \$11 or \$12. The track is so much better now," Cappellucci said. "The soil and the mixture is just right today. It gets better each year. In the early years, it was bad and deep. Our barn area is clean."

"The track is lots safer today than when it opened," he recalled. "Sure, there is an occasional horse who breaks down now, but it's not the track's fault. The horse was probably already sore."

"We used to walk horses by hand. Now we have electric hot walkers. The track today picks up the trash and manure, so there aren't any flies. It just seems that everyone who works for the track has a far better attitude," he said.

Cappellucci said with more mutual windows today than 25 years ago, there is less delay between races, which increases the enjoyment for the fan.

Trainers, nevertheless, are finding it harder to win races in the 1990s than in the 1950s.

"With the pots (purses) getting bigger all the time, especially in the spring, it's getting tougher and tougher to win at Sunland," he explained.

"We're running faster and better horses all the time. You can breed New Mexico horses and get a New Mexico Breeder's bonus when they win to encourage the breeding. But more people are trying to take advantage of it, so there's more New Mexico-bred horses running," he said.

"It used to be you could buy a cheap horse for say \$1,000 or \$2,000. Now some people are spending \$50,000 or even more for horses. There's far better stock. It makes a nice race when you race better horses. It's also better for the fans and that's why the handle has been increasing each year," Cappellucci said.

He praised general manager

Donald F. Smith, now in his second year at Sunland, for his close supervision of the entire racing program.

"Curly Smith is a nice man who will do anything he can for you if you go in and ask him for something. He does a good job at Sunland and has tried to help the horsemen in any way he can," he said.

Cappellucci said giving all horsemen an opportunity to win races is the best way to produce a pleasant environment.

"When everyone can win a race or two, it makes everyone happy and that's the main thing—to give everyone a chance to win races. If the same horses and trainers win all the races, that's not good. But when they write out horses who have won a certain kind of race, it allows someone else to win."

Cappellucci and his wife, Helen, who works in the Sunland Park mutual department, have purchased a trailer home. They spend from September to May in El Paso and then spend the summer running horses at the Downs at Santa Fe.

"I've been training since I was a kid," said the native of Trinidad, Colorado. "I'm going to do it until the end. I'll stay here until they run me off. I like El Paso and I've really enjoyed all my years at Sunland Park."

"The people are really nice here and everybody gets along just fine," he said. "That's why I want to stay here."



More depth and several state tournament returnees should present a bright outlook for the 1983-84 Ruidoso High School wrestling team.

The Warriors have five wrestlers on this year's team who competed in the state tournament last season.

They include Gary Burgess at 185 pounds, Scott Ciraulo at 167 pounds, Gervase Peso at 138 pounds (now at 155 pounds), Chad Surmick at 105 pounds (now 112 pounds), and James Herrera at 157 pounds (now 146 pounds).

The Warriors also have a highly rated transfer in heavyweight Joe LaRue, a transfer from Georgia who placed in his regional tournament last season.

"We've got a competitive program right now," said Warrior head coach Gerald Ames. "And we're looking to improve on that."

Last season Ruidoso tied for third with Cobre in the district tournament behind Deming and Silver City.

Ames sees Deming and Silver City as the teams to beat in the district tournament again this season.

"They're both always tough," he remarked. "I haven't seen Deming yet this season but I've seen Silver City, and they're impressive."

The Warrior coach has around 35 athletes to work with this season, so both varsity and junior varsity teams have seen action in tournaments so far.

"We've got a good group of sophomores," Ames remarked. "And

our seniors are good and showing leadership.

"I think we'll have just four seniors graduating this year and three next year, so the future could be bright."

Besides the state tournament returnees and LaRue, several other wrestlers have looked good for the Warriors so far.

Kyle and Kerry Jameson, both sophomores, have done well in competition. They generally compete in the 132-pound division.

Kerry has won several junior varsity matches and Kyle has done well in varsity competition.

The Jamesons' older brother, Kevin, is another fine competitor at 155 pounds.

Zach Swalander, a 138-pound sophomore, is a potential state tournament competitor.

Swalander has been impressive in early-season results and has improved a lot since last season.

Cory Garner, a 105-pound freshman, has won several matches so far, including a pin against Goddard. Jeff Slatton at 119 pounds is another wrestler with promise.

There is also a host of junior varsity prospects who should help the Warriors later this season or in the 1984-85 campaign.

The Warriors are 1-0 on the varsity dual match season, having defeated Goddard 42-29. Ruidoso will host Roswell and the Carlsbad junior varsity Saturday, January 7.





Big cities have squads of patrol cars, "paddy wagons," and sometimes even helicopters manned by ranks upon ranks of officers, meter maids and S.W.A.T. teams, well armed with the latest in law enforcement equipment.

In Capitan, the job of law enforcement is handled by far fewer people, and less equipment and machinery.

Randy Spears is the newly appointed Capitan Chief of Police. He and officer Larry Brinkley, make up the entire Capitan Police Department.

"We are our own detectives, our own investigators. We handle things from start to finish," Spears said.

Seated at a small, cluttered desk, Spears leaned back in his chair and placed one cowboy-booted foot on the desk top. Spears has been an officer at Capitan for five years. He began work in law enforcement in Roswell, as a member of the police department auxiliary there. Spears' short brown hair, combed to the side, and heavy black-framed glasses give him a boyish look. His confident mannerisms and a habit of casually

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"From family problems to school problems to working people's problems, we handle it all."

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"We have a problem here with the kids drinking and raising Cain at nighttime. They've got loud pipes and they get to hotrodding around, leaving black marks all over the place."

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Capitan Mayor David Cummins told of the extra hours of time off Spears has put in working on emergency village problems, such as the water situation.

"He can run a backhoe," Cummins said of Spears. One year Spears, along with other officials in Capitan, responded to an emergency water shortage in the village, tracing leaks and repairing water lines.

Spears said he plans to stay in Capitan because he enjoys the people and living in the town.

"The people here are very receptive to the police department. They'll help us. I like the people of Capitan. I enjoy being a part of the community."

Spears said as of December 23, Brinkley will be resigning. Spears will be looking for as many as three more officers.

"The town's growing, and naturally we're growing with it. As long as I'm working for the people of Capitan, we'll try to provide the best in law enforcement that we can."



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Fantasy Mountain amusement park could open by next summer

The developer of Fantasy Mountain—a \$3.5 million amusement park planned for an 18-acre site across from Ruidoso Downs Race Track—is hopeful the facility will open by next June.

"That's what we're needing to do," Sid Alford of Ruidoso Recreation Incorporated said last week. Alford, who conceived of the project, hosted a preview of Fantasy Mountain at Cree Meadows Country Club.

The prediction was made at the meeting that Fantasy Mountain will boost overall tourism in the Ruidoso area by 15 to 20 percent.

Alford said construction, which will take six and a half months, could begin in late January or early

February. Building will begin after all shares in the enterprise are sold.

The limited partnership project is being financed through the sale of 700 units at a cost of \$5,000 each. Ruidoso Recreation will be the general partner, with 25 percent ownership.

As of last week, approximately one-third of the 700 units had been committed, Alford said. He noted that delays in getting the issue registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission held up the offering, but added there has been strong interest the past 45 days.

Alford, who has lived in Ruidoso four and a half years, said people used to ask him, "What is there for kids to do?" Looking around, he said, he saw that entertainment for children is limited.

A Dallas firm, Leisure and Recrea-

tion Concepts Incorporated (LARC), was consulted. Alford said Mike Jenkins, president of LARC, was so enthused by the results of the Fantasy Mountain feasibility study that he doubled the projected size of the park.

Edward McLaughlin, LARC's vice president for market research, was present at last week's meeting to explain the layout of the park.

Fantasy Mountain will be built on a loop plan around a lake with fountains. The loop will carry visitors past focal points and revenue centers. These will include two major rides, a "sky hook" and a log flume ride.

Other attractions will include a restaurant; a puppet theater; an arts and crafts area with glass-blowers and wood-carvers; arcades; remote-control boats; and a petting zoo.

A charge of \$8 for adults and \$7 for children ages 4-11 will include admission to the park and all rides. Food and beverages will be extra, and there will be no alcohol served.

McLaughlin said the projected number of annual visitors to Fantasy Mountain is 145,000. The park is designed to accommodate 2,500 visitors in a day—1,700 at a given time. The rides have a 3,500 per hour use capacity.

He described the park as having "kind of a Victorian turn of the century theme," and being "heavy on landscaping."

Fantasy Mountain will employ an estimated 200 people. Alford said young people and school teachers are two groups he hopes to draw from for employees.

The staff will establish a "host-guest" as opposed to an "employee-customer" relationship with visitors, said McLaughlin. Employees will fit a clean-cut image.

"We feel that this is key to create an ambiance in a project like this," said McLaughlin. He said the park wants to operate on the basis of a "quality family-oriented project."

Fantasy Mountain will be open for a 125-day summer season, beginning in mid-May, but it will also be at least partly open during ski season, McLaughlin indicated. Tentative summer hours are 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Group sales will be a substantial part of this business," said McLaughlin. He noted that a discount of 8-12 percent will be offered to groups.



The point was made that Fantasy Mountain has a market of 780,000 million people within 160 miles, not including El Paso-Juarez. McLaughlin said the park's immediate market is 500,000 ("the tourists"), out of the estimated 1.8 million people who travel through this area each year.

He added that LARC has tried to be conservative in its projections for the park. He also pointed out that dollars spent at Fantasy Mountain will turn over six to eight times in the community.

Alford, who will manage the park once it is open, is optimistic the partnerships will be committed so construction can start early next year.

"We can have a good season if we open in June," he said.



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





Ruidoso boys hope to press and run this year

Expect to see a lot of running and pressing defensive play from the Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team this season.

Although the Warriors are 0-3 on the season, Ruidoso fans should see a lot of improvement from last season's winless team.

Ruidoso was close to both Roswell and Portales early in the third period before foul trouble caused the Warriors' demise.

"I expect us to be a contender by the time district season rolls around," said Warrior head coach Ron Geyer.

The Warriors plan to use the transition game and a man-to-man full-court press as much as possible.

Ruidoso has greater team speed than last season.

Senior guards Cyrus Simmons and Gilbert Rivera both lack height (Simmons is 5-8 and Rivera 5-6) but both started last season and have a lot of quickness and passing ability. Rivera made the all-district 3-AAA squad last season.

Patric Pearson, Tommy Crow, Kenny Espinosa and Russell Easter are all excellent passers.

But the key to the Warrior season could be the play of

sophomore standout Dan Ullmann.

The 6-4 postman has scored 56 points in the first three contests and has done a fine job rebounding. Ullmann has excellent moves around the basket and can jump.

Junior Tracy Gann (6-3) gives the Warriors added height and good rebounding. However, he had leg problems last season.

The Warrior junior varsity is 0-3 on the season, but has shown steady progress in each contest.

Juniors Matt Porter and Randy Reynolds are probably the best scorers on the squad. Sophomore Ricardo Garcia is a playmaker who can pass and shoot from the outside.

Other promising junior varsity players include Chuck Jarrell, Justin Smith, Trent Tolbert, Chris Garner and Jason Bigham.

The Warrior freshman team is 0-1 on the season, having lost a close decision to the Carrizozo junior varsity last week.

Some of the top frosh players include Brian Davis, Justin Shaw, Jeff Willingham and Kirk Ryan.

Davis and Shaw have good height and rebound well. Willingham and Ryan are

playmakers.

Cobre won the district varsity championship last season and Deming finished second. However, the Wildcats took third in the state tournament while

Cobre was eliminated in the first round.

Both of those teams should be tough again. Silver City, Ruidoso and Hot Springs also figure as tough contenders.



Defense could be key if Warrior girl cagers improve overall mark

Defense should play a key part in the Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team's plans this season.

Ruidoso, which went 9-13 last season, must learn to win the close games this season, and good defense is a key to that.

Last season most of the Warriors' defeats were by eight points or less.

"Determination, discipline and defense are the three elements we need to have a successful program this season," said Warrior head coach Sergio Castanon. "If we can do that, we should be okay."

The Warriors have four girls returning from last season's team who started at one time or another. They provide a good foundation for a winning team.

Stacy Ivy, a 5-9 junior, made the all-district honorable mention list last season. She's a good rebounder, scorer and jumper.

Gia Rose is a playmaking guard who is an all-around athlete. She also competes for the Warrior volleyball and track teams.

Lillian Lopez is a three-year starter who is an excellent leader

and playmaker. She is one of the Warriors' best defensive players.

Jackie Jefferson has been recovering from a broken finger, but should return this week. The 5-8 senior is a good rebounder and jumper.

Castanon and assistant James Sanchez have several other promising players to work with.

Mavis Geronimo and Deanna Peso has done well in practice and in a recent scrimmage defensively. Diane McClure, a 5-11 transfer from Texas, is the Warriors' tallest player. Castanon says she is coming along and should be a factor in the team's play.

Tami Goldsmith, a 5-6 athlete, doesn't have great height but jumps well. She was very impressive in the scrimmage.

The Warriors also have several fine players on the junior varsity team who could help them in the future. The junior Warriors opened the season with a 41-37 victory over Carrizozo in overtime.


Castanon sees this season's 3-AAA district race as a close one.




White Mountain Middle School boys basketball coach Sergio Castanon watches as some of his players do pushups during a re-
