El Paso Street now

The Ruidoso village council Tues day helped pave the way for future expansion of the midtown business district when it approved commercial rezoning of El Paso Street from Center Avenue to Juanita

Several persons attending the public hearing on the R1 (single family zoning) to C 1 (light commercial) rezoning request spoke in favor of the rezoning

Two persons spoke in opposi tion Marian Treat, owner of Covered Wagon gift shop, and Budgie Green, owner of The Wild Snail Green said El Paso Street is not wide enough for commercial activity and that traffic congestion could hinder access for fire fighting equipment since the main fire station is at the west end of the street

He suggested waiting for the results of a traffic study now under way, and added that he would like to see a study of the street all the way from River side to the telephone company "This is purely spot zoning - said

Green Treat said commercial develop ment would aggravate an existing

problem of vehicles using the parking

area behind her business Lindsay Rusler, who noted she has owned property and run a business on Sudderth Drive for 15 years, said Ruidoso is striving for a commercial area in which to expand, and called Ell Paso Street a logical and natural ex-

She said development there would draw shoppers to off-street parking now seldom used

It It just enhance our total downtown area. Said Mike Radziewicz of West Winds Lodge, who pointed out the block is in a "run down" condition now

Tommy Morel of the proposed Painted Lady Square said he and his partners hope their project will set a trend in revitalization of downtown He added that the village has shown itself capable of enforcing parking requirements for businesses

Archer Wilson of the Roadrunner also endorsed the rezoning "T've got everything I have sunk down there and I'd like to see it prosper,'

Also favoring the rezoning were Bob and Margie Rech of Alamogordo, who own property on the block. Bob Rech said the action would facilitate later conversion of the block into a one way street or part of a walking

He added that similar development of Ohio Street in Alamogordo was one of the best things that city has done for its central business district

Gary Hall of Nottingham's Pub said he pays to lease parking space for his business, but that if people park and shop downtown the money is well

Benny Coulston's motion to approve the rezoning was seconded by Frank Sayner Those two and Al Junge voted ave Don Dale was absent



Downs trustees approve bond sale to finance fire equipment

The Ruidos Downs Board of Trustees accepted bids for a pumper tanker and approved the sale and issuance of \$160,000 in tax revenue bonds for the fire fighting equipment at their meeting Monday

A bid at \$86,394 was accepted from Artesia Fire Equipment They will deliver a 1,250 gallon capacity standard transmission Ford C8000 pumper tanker. It has a 750 gallon

per minute pump The board approved Ordinance 84.1 Village of Ruidoso Downs sales tax tions slightly revenue bonds, series 1984.

The \$160,000 bond would make \$152,000 available for the new fire department building and pumper tanker

The maturity schedule is 1995, at an interest rate of 9.81 percent with an option to refinance in 1988. The State Fire Marshal Allotment

will contribute \$15,000 a year.

Estimated use of the bond proceeds breaks down into \$151,700 for estimated construction and purchase

pumper tanker, \$1,500 for bond counsel, \$5,600 for the 15 percent bond discount by Quinn and Company, and \$1,200 for estimated bond printing and registration agent

Ray Parnell, who has worked with the village water well, said when the well was drilled it made 200 gallons a minute, and a larger pump cannot be put on it. The pump on it now cannot achieve more than 50 gallons per minute

Mayor Day pointed out that the control system is not obsolete, it just does not work

The board approved a motion to draw up specifications for the drilling of a well

The board also approved Ordinance 84-3, relating to the Mandatory Financial Responsibilty Act of the State of New Mexico

A special election to increase the Ruidoso village council size set the stage for a full slate of candidates in March Longterm quests for a new airport and more water continued their dominance of news in 1983.

Local businessman Ralph Rush began circulating a petition in August calling for a special election on the question of increasing the council from four councilmen and the mayor to six councilmen and the mayor

Rush said he thought a larger coun cil would better represent the varied interests of Ruidoso Many question ed his motives, however, when it became known that all current council members would have to resign if the larger council were chosen by the

Within two weeks, Rush had collected signatures from five percent of Ruidoso's voters, and the election was set for November 8

Council members and the mayor expressed opposition to the measure. mentioning problems that would be created by a completely new council dealing with complex issues such as Grindstone reservoir and the valley wa'er protest. Their opposition was only mild, however, and they were generally silent on the subject

Around town, people seemed to be considering two different aspects of the special election. Some people were displeased with the council and were planning to vote for the increase just so the present councilmen would have to resign. Others were against the increase for the same reason -that it would mean a recall. Others believed a larger council would indeed better represent a grow-

ing Ruidoso. They thought more coun-

cil members would have more ideas for solutions to a growing Ruidoso's problems

It was unclear if the mayor would have to resign if the council were enlarged Mayor George White in sisted he would not be included in the recall, but it appeared some council members thought he would

The whole issue stayed fairly quiet in contrast to hard feelings raised in other towns that had faced the same

As election day approached, coffee shop debates increased, but neither side could predict an easy victory

But come election day, voters soundly approved the increase, 345 to 220 One month later, the council set March 6 for an election that did not in clude the mayor Councilman Frank Sayner said he

plans not to run for reelection, but the other three have kept quiet on the subject. Regardless of which council members seek reelection, there appear to be numerous citizens ready to run for the six open council seats

Candidates must all register on Tuesday, January 31, and it will probably be a busy political season for the five weeks after that

Soon after the special election, a hearing before State Engineer's representatives brought the valley water protest to a head

A number of farmers filed a protest in 1982 against the village's application to move its point of sewage discharge six miles downstream to the new Biscuit Hill treatment plant.

The farmers, whose irrigation ditches lay between the old and new discharge points, argued that the change in discharge points would be detrimental to their water rights.

The State Engineer took the protest seriously enough to hold up the ap-

plication and suspend Ruidoso's ef fluent credit. The effluent credit allows Ruidoso to draw additional water out of the Rio Ruidoso based on Eagle Creek water it uses and eventually discharges into the river as sewage. Ruidoso plans to use the effluent credit, amounting to over 600 acre feet per year in recent years, to fill the Grindstone reservoir.

The village appointed a three-man committee to seek a settlement of the problem with the protesting farmers. Negotiations appeared to be proceeding well at first, but a disagreement arose between the protest committee and the council over access to an attorney

The council decided not to retain an attorney for the protest committee and chose Santa Fe attorney Neil Stillinger to handle the protest.

Committee members John Schuller and Newton Page wrote the council a letter suggesting the dissolution of the committee "if we cannot have certain services afforded us which would be

acceptable to the Protestants

The council took this as a letter of resignation and accepted it during a study session in February Although the committee was reestablished, Page was later removed from the committee during a skirmish with the council. The committee faded from

The village council passed an or dinance in July stating "all reasonable effort shall be made to assure that the persons that heretofore have depended upon the treated effluent water from the old sewer plant will continue to have as much water as they had in the past. The ordinance, however, is not binding upon future councils, and farmers did not consider it an acceptable compromise.

A pre-hearing conference before the State Engineer's representatives brought the sides no closer, and a hearing was set for late November.

Lawyers for both sides brought graphs, maps and expert witnesses to village hall, and argued their positions for two days before State

Engineer's representatives. The farmers claimed they already experienced water shortages almost every year. They contended that with the new sewage discharge point below their irrigation ditches and with Ruidoso claiming its effluent credit, they would experience even worse and more frequent shortages.

Attorney Stillinger argued the water shortages are relatively rare and would be only slightly affected by Ruidoso's plan to fill the Grindstone

reservoir. The State Engineer should rule on the protest near the first of February, but it seems likely the losing side will appeal the decision to District Court.

Capitan gets big water grant

Capitan's water problems may be on the road to being quenched. Mayor David Cummins reported during the Monday night meeting of the Capitan village council that the village has been awarded \$193,000 in funding from the Water Supply Construction

'We're on our way," Cummins said with a smile as he told the trustees of the funds. Cummins also expressed optimism about Capitan's chances for further funding from the Com-munities Development Block Grant (CDBG) hearing that will be held sometime in the spring or early summer. The village has applied for over \$500,000 in CDBG funds.

The money will be initially used to formulate a complete five-year plan for Capitan, according to engineer Jim Millington of Andrews, Asbury

and Robert, the Albuquerque engineering firm working for the village. Millington said a detailed engineering report, the five-year plan, and design of the system will be the first projects to be funded by the

Much of the money, along with the anticipated CDBG money, will go towards actual construction of the water system improvements, Millington said. He said initial work will include construction of a new water treatment facility and booster pump. Also during the meeting, the



Bond election explained

The Ruidoso school district is in the process of trying to gain funds for the completion of the new high school through a two-mill tax levy and a

In addition to the local bond issues that have passed, the major amount of funds have come from state capital outlay, superintendent Sid Miller

The state capital outlay program is a state program designed to help schools that do not have the bonding capacity to complete building projects. The Ruidoso school district has received from this fund \$4,719,313. This spring they will request \$2,076,511 to help complete the building projects.

On February 3, 1981 the voters of the Ruidoso school district took the first step to improve the schools by authorizing a two-mill levy for capital improvements, Miller said. This authority expires in 1984.

Voters are being asked to extend this tax for an additional three years,

he said. The levy has been on tax bills for the past three years and by approving the extension of this levy taxes will not be raised.

For each \$1 that the two-mill levy produces in local taxes, the district will receive approximately an additional \$1 from the state for capital improvements, Miller noted.

The approval of the two-mill levy will not increase taxes, but will provide the schools with much needed revenues for capital improvements, he emphasized. The improvements will include erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for and furnishing school buildings, purchasing and improving school grounds and maintenance of public school grounds and public school buildings.

There will be two propositions on the ballot on February 7: approval of the extension on the two-mill levy and authorization of the issuance of a

\$1,000,000 bond issue. Phase III of the new high school is now under construction and is expected to be completed in the spring of 1984, Miller said. If approved, this \$1,000,000 bond issue will be used to complete the construction and equip the new high school and to remodel the old high school to accommodate grades six through eight.

The approval of the \$1,000,000 bond issue will increase the district's debt service by \$80,000 per year, he explained. This increase will be offset by increased assessed valuation and the pay-off of old bonds. Therefore. there will be no tax increase for a \$1,000,000 bond issue.

The assessed valuation of the district increased about \$5,000,000 in 1983 and \$9,000,000 in 1982, he said. It is estimated this kind of growth will continue.

If the district is not bonded to capacity, the funds from the state will not be received, Miller emphasized. Therefore, the bond issue must be approved in order to receive state capital improvement funds.

Even if the farmers' protest is settled, Ruidoso may still have trouble filling its reservoir. The Carlsbad Irrigation District filed a protest in October against Ruidoso's application to change its point of diversion from the Mescalero Apache Reservation boundary downstream to a pipeline for the Grandstone reservoir

In spite of uncertainties caused by the protests. Ruidoso continued work on the \$8 million Grindstone dam and reservoir project

The council agreed in April to pay developer Don Dorman \$525,000 for 45 acres of land in the Grindstone Canyon to be used for the dam and reser-

Along with purchase of land, the council agreed to annex 148 acres of Dorman's land bordering the reservoir site. Dorman has begun construction on a planned residential development on that land

Dorman agreed to dedicate five acres of land on the proposed reservoir shore to the village for a public

The purchase contract also includes a clause giving Dorman the right to reclaim the land if the village does not use the land as a reservoir for three consecutive years.

Questions were raised about the "reverter clause," possible leakage out of the reservoir, and expenses of building the reservoir in Grindstone Canyon as opposed to other sites. Councilman Don Dale and Mayor White opposed the purchase because of the annexation condition, but White signed the purchase contract in July. Supporters of a regional airport on the Fort Stanton Mesa rode a roller coaster of ups and downs throughout

When a National Academy of Sciences study concluded in the fall of 1982 that an airport and New Mexico State University range research could not coexist on the mesa, advocates of the airport suffered a setback. But according to an agreement worked out between New Mexico State University and the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), the



U.S. Representative Joe Skeen argued for an airport.

study was only one part of a two-part

The second part of the process involves a political decision on the fate of the airport

In June, Governor Toney Anaya told SBAC to apply to the United States Interior Department for the transfer of 1,600 acres on Fort Stanton Mesa from Bureau of Land Management (BLM) jurisdiction to Federal Aviation Administration jurisdiction Anaya wrote a letter to the Interior Secretary James Watt asking him to approve the transfer

This signaled the first time any New Mexico governor had come out strongly in favor of the airport at Site B. Optimism ran high among sup-

porters of the airport. New Mexico State University remained opposed to the airport at Site B. The land is right in the middle of 26,000 acres the universty leases from the BLM for experimental range research. The university claims an airport would disrupt important longterm research.

But in August, Watt wrote Anaya and Mayor George White a letter saying he opposed the transfer, dashing previously raised hopes

U.S. Representative Joe Skeen, however, remained hopeful and began to actively campaign for an airport on Site B.

It turned out that Watt had not received the application and had not officially acted on it. Skeen began trying to convince Watt to reconsider his decision by educating him about the dangerous conditions at the present Ruidoso airport.

Just as it appeared that Watt was reconsidering his opinion, he verbally blundered for the last time and was forced to resign

His successor, William Clark, has not yet acted on the application, but both Skeen and Anaya have urged him to approve the transfer. A decision is expected in the near future.

In other big stories of 1983, zoning battles in Ruidoso heated up with two council decisions now headed for District Court. McCarty Construction and Lincoln County Investments have appealed the council's refusal to rezone land on Hull Road and Paradise Canyon for light commer-

During the course of the zoning batties, it became clear Ruidoso's Comprehensive Plan, which is a guide for much of the village's development and zoning, has become outdated and no longer reflects the actual nature of

The village council commissioned a comprehensive traffic study, which began in late November. Recently, the council agreed to look further into the possibility of commissioning a full Comprehensive Plan.

Horsemen also flexed their muscles for the first time by threatening to strike against all New Mexico tracks if unclaimed winning parimutuel tickets were not paid into purse struc-. tures. Although the strike never occurred, an arbitration panel did award the out-tickets to the horsemen.

A mysterious gastrointestinal disease struck residents and visitors to Ruidoso late in the summer. The disease was characterized by severe diarrhea, some vomiting and lowgrade fever. Two cases of giardiasis were confirmed in the area, but no cause was ever positively identified.

Water and an airport will no doubt continue to be major issues in the area in 1984. Six open council seats should provide for plenty of political rhetoric. But other issues of 1984 will no doubt surprise all observers.

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

MLS helps simplify a complex business

In Ruidoso the sale of real estate is a profitable business, but it is also very complex.

The real estate brokers in Ruidoso have banded together to help themselves and their clients. The Ruidoso Board of Realtors is a nonprofit trade association of licensed real estate brokers in town.

One major service the board provides is the Multiple Listing Service. MLS lists all properties available, which amounts to about 1,515, from a total of 50 member real estate offices and 211 individual affiliated salesmen.

"The primary function of the MLS is the dissemination of information on the listings," sald Alton Lane; executive director of the Board of

Realtors. The MLS book comes out every two weeks and is brought up to date two or three times a week, he explained.

"The big advantage of the MLS is that it shows everything that is available in the village, and it is all compiled into one book," Lane remarked. The book is published in San Diego, California.

Member Realtors get together and take tours of the new properties so they can get acquainted with them.

Mike Larkey, chairman of the MLS committee, explained how Realtors work together to make sales.

If the real estate is listed with one Realtor and another Realtor sells it, the Realtors work out the percentage each receives of the commission. for finding a buyer better.

"A part of the pie is better than none at all," Larkey explains. "The more information you have, the better your chances to sell the real estate

All the Realtors will have keys to listed houses. If a client drives by a house and wants to see it, a Realtor can quickly pick up his MLS book and get the information about the house if he had not planned to show it, Larkey mentioned

"A Realtor has to know everything about a property, and any kind of real property is listed in the MLS," he

The Realtors pay a nominal fee when they submit a listing and when a transaction is completed, and they buy the MLS book, Lane said,

'Knowledge is power, and that's

what makes MLS important," Larkey pointed out. "Realtors in order to better serve the public can share the information. This makes the chances

He also explains the selling climate in Ruidoso makes MLS even more important.

"We try to match the people with the house, and the people want the best buy," he said. The average house in Ruidoso costs \$118,000.

MLS represented \$75 million in real estate sales in one year, Larkey said. "Eighty percent of the market is buying a second home," Larkey notic-'It's different because people,

don't have to buy a house here. Lane said houses in Ruidoso have appreciated 15 percent a year in the last 10 years, and Ruidoso has more repeat business than anywhere else.

Larkey explained that the next step to make MLS more effective will be going to computers.

We're three days late now because of the hand system," he noticed, Computers would enhance the use of MLS

On Wednesday the board listened to a presentation from the National Association of Realtors about the use and and cost of computers for MLS

Each Realtor would have a terminal that would be connected by telephone lines to the main computer at the Board of Realtors office. Realtors would be able to quickly update listings and print out information

about property for their clients. In addition to the MLS, the Board of Realtors offers educational programs through the Graduate Realtor Institute.

The Ruidoso board will be offering the second in the three-course curriculum soon. The GRI classes teach various facets of the real estate business.

Also, the Board of Realtors en-

forces a code of ethics. Larkey explains that licensed Realtors have to adhere to many rules and regulations.

"The code of ethics tells us how we're going to do it," he said. "In real estate 'buyer beware' is not true; you have to be ethical."

One committee of the Board of Realtors hears complaints and can

suspend members for violations of the code of ethics, he remarked. "The successful members of the

real estate business have to be honest," Larkey concluded.

Lodgers' tax collections up, committee learns

Lodgers' Tax collections are close to \$10,000 ahead of last year, and Ruidoso will probably receive about \$55,000 in matching funds from the state, the Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) learned during its meeting

Wednesday. State matching and promotional funds may be cut back sharply, however, during fiscal 1984-85, reported Chamber of Commerce Advertising Committee chairman Tommy Morel.

December's Lodgers' Tax collections, which reflect November's lodging income, were \$5,019.75, up from only \$2,488.42 in December 1982, reported treasurer Rod Adamson. December's collections also included approximately \$2,000 owed on prior months, said Adamson later.

E.P 84

That brings the 1983-84 fiscal year's collections to \$62,942.20, up from

53,787.80 last year at the same time. Morel said estimates of how much the state will match Ruidoso's promotional expenditures are still fluctuating, but appear to be in the range of \$55,000.

This money does not include the \$40,000 the state has pledged for support of the U.S. Open pro ski race, but does include matching funds for advertising in Mexico, said Morel after the meeting.

Morel said the Chamber and the advertising agency Epstein Enterprises have not relied on the matching funds while planning promotional expenditures.

Morel distributed copies of Ruidoso's advertising plan for 983-84, which totals \$86,500.

Ruidoso will advertise for three consecutive Sundays at the end of

January and early February in newspapers in Albuquerque, Dallas, El Paso and Houston. Ruidoso will advertise five times in January and February in Mexican newspapers in Juarez, Chihuahua, Guadalajara and

Torreon. Ruidoso will advertise in Southwest Airlines, Texas Monthly, Southern Living, Travel Weekly, Aero Mexico, Pasaporte 2000 and Club de Gourmetz

magazines. Morel estimated Ruidoso could have as much as \$150,000 available for advertising with the state funds.

After the meeting, he said the Chamber would likely double summer advertising and try to carry some of the money into fall advertising if the matching funds come through.

Ruidoso may need to carry as much money as possible into the next year. Morel said the Legislative Finance Committee currently lists state promotional expenditures at \$0, as opposed to \$3 million budgeted this year. Ruidoso will get its state matching funds this year from the \$3 million.

"We've got a big battle ahead of us in the Legislature," said Morel. "We have to do some lobbying."

Morel said Sun Country, a regional

tourism organization of which Ruidoso is a member, has plans to visit Santa Fe at least twice for lobbying efforts.



SANTA FE-Are the liberals already routed?

That's one way you could read that total reversal by our Governor of his plans for raising more taxes.

His first travelling circus cum dogand-pony show to whip up the enthusiasm of the native in Las Cruces knocked all his previous proposals into a cocked hat. He has now decided, he told us in effect, that both the total amount of new money he needs and the way he planned to generate it are totally wrong,

The need has suddenly been reduced to a mere \$173.2 million (plus about \$30 million more he forgot to mention in Las Cruces.) In addition, he isn't any longer for closing all those tax loopholes that were going to solve all our problems. He's been converted by somebody to raising the money from that good old stand-by—the sales tax.

One of the most embarrassing portions of this change was the news conference being held in Albuquerque the same day by House Speaker Ray San-chez, at which he tried to prove the sales tax in not really regressive.

Anaya and Sanchez, both of whom like to be looked upon as leading liberals, must have been co-opted by

It only shows what raising enough

noise can do. After the Governor's young assistants drew up that laundry list of taxes they said he proposed to raise, the phone lines almost melted on their way into Santa Fe. Every special interest on the list was on the horn telling Toney exactly why he couldn't do that to them.

They won. Toney has now decided to do it to the common folks, who have no known lobbyists and nobody to speak up for their interests.

Hence the return to the gross receipts tax as the source of all that

money. After Colin McMillan successfully guided through the last big tax cut, named "Big Mac" in his honor, he admitted we would have to go back and raise taxes again in five to eight years. He also predicted the sales tax

would be the method of choice when

McMillan failed to predict the slump in the oil and gas business which made that tax raise necessary before some of us looked for it. But he was on the money with his notion that the sales tax would be the scene of the

But what are Toney Anaya and Raymond Sanchez doing following a script by Colin McMillan?

Well, as we have said here before, Anaya's plans really don't make much difference.

The governor may propose, but on-ly legislators can dispose.

Besides, Anaya will still be revising his recommendations (and holding dramatic news conferences to announce them) right up to the last available minute.

Don't be too impressed by the turnouts at those Anaya Flying Circus ap-

house and say, "Wow! Look how many citizens showed up!"

What needs to be counted is how many citizens who are not going to make more money if the Anaya program is adopted take the time and trouble to come and listen to the presentations.

As one of the people in the Anaya office said, "If I can't get out those crowds, my job is on the line."

If the Anaya's couldn't turn out employees of universities, school districts and the state for such revival meetings they would be incompetents

They aren't-at least not at show biz. The last Anaya political campaign showed that, and the same people are in charge of these show-and-

But the ability to fake mass enthusiasm is a whole lot different from the ability to produce legislators' votes when they are needed.

It remains to be seen whether 30,000 blue ribbons, 10,000 bumper stickers and 20,000 brochures will get that latter job done.

If you want to bet on Anaya's success, demand some very long odds.

After that it gets confusing. What the letter attempts to say is that if your address has changed since you registered to vote, you have to register You do not have to go to Carrizozo to do this. As the

letter points out, you can go to any bank and ask for the registration officer.

Or, and the letter fails to tell you this, you can go to Ruidoso village hall and register with one of three deputy registrars there.

What you cannot do is go to the new county suboffice, because they do not have a registration officer

This seems strange, since we were told the suboffice was going to allow Ruidosoans to do their business here instead of traveling to the county

But even if residents cannot take care of their registration at the suboffice, it would be nice if the county clerk's office had issued some understandable directions.—TP

I had been in too many college dormitory rooms with illegal substances passing from hand to hand to be com-

I tossed and turned the night before. What if they got people I knew? Would they think I had turned them in? Would I want to see the expression on their faces as the police slipped on the

Then again, maybe it would be the big one. A roomful of marijuana. pounds of cocaine, guns, "dangerous" ople. "Major drug ring broken in Ruidoso," was the headline I envisag-

But in my preoccupation I forgot to turn on the alarm and awoke horrified at 5 a.m. Oh my God! I'm supposed to be there. They'll think I'm out telling everybody in town and ruining the bust. They'll be after me!

In one of the quickest morning acts in history I had dressed, grabbed camera and pad, and was on the road in five minutes.

"Predawn raid." The cliche occurred to me as my headlights shone on fifteen police cars parked in front of the Ruidoso Police Department.

I walked into the building to find officers from the Ruidoso Police Department, the Lincoln County Sherriff's Department, State Police, and the District Attorney's office standing around in small groups drinking coffee, talking quietly.

Lots of cops, early in the morning. It was still dark outside and the rest of the sane world was still asleep. I drifted around listening to snip-

pets of conversation. Jokes, old war stories. After a while Ruidoso detective

Gonzalo Cordova called everybody together. He assigned officers to groups and handed them packets of material with arrest warrants and

Officers began examining the packets, apparently recognizing some suspects and not others. They mentioned past offenses, friends, connections and possible residences. Possible residences. It seems many

of the suspects were pretty mobile and hard to keep track of. Ruidoso lieutenant Dave Pfeffer told me to come with him and we

headed, with two other officers, through the night to a mobile home near Čarrizo Canyon. Dave, who had the warrant, knocked on the door as the other two officers stood at the sides of the trailer. Early morning knock on the door by

police waking you up. I saw a curtain pulled aside, then dropped. What a frightening way to start the day. I tried to imagine what it would be like. Darkness, knocking, trying to wake up. Police? Trouble, a sinking feeling in the stomach. Thoughts of

running, lying, hiding. Somebody answered the door and Pfeffer asked for "Ken" (not his real name). Not here. The warrant was an arrest warrant, not a search warrant. Pfeffer couldn't go in. The guy said

We climbed back in the car and headed for the other residence. On the way, we passed other police cars moving slowly, just about the only

Ken lived somewhere else.

ones on the road at that time of morn-

A light was on at the second place... Same knock. Same delay but Ken was there. Pfeffer read him his rights, told him to get dressed and handcuff-

Some confusion, wandering around, questions about charges, but not too much concern. It seemed this was not Ken's first acquaintance with local

The arrest warrant for distribution of marijuana was based on the purchase of a bag of pot in September. I was a little disappointed.

How many bags of pot had been sold in this town since September? Is it worth the effort of all these officers to arrest somebody for the sale of one

At the station a woman was being brought in at the same time. As opposed to Ken, she looked very worried. She had no identification and said she wasn't the one they were

looking for. Officers continued to come and go. No one seemed to be living where the police expected. Numerous false tries. Lots of discussion about people they had seen, cars they drove, where they might live.

Out and back again. Officers brought in a suspect here and there as the day dawned. Five were eventually booked at the Ruidoso Police station. A simultaneous raid in Otero County netted 10 people.

While the prisoners sat in the middle of the room being booked, officers laughed louder at more jokes. They seemed more at ease. They had done their job.

The prisoners sat mostly silent in the middle of the room. Except Ken. One officer asked him how his life was going, aside from this morning's

"Crossbar motel? All right, I'm ready to check in," said Ken.

But he made me think about him and the bag of pot police allege he sold almost four months ago, How about all those arrests in the fall that netted paraphernalia and small amounts of marijuana? Is this an effective war on drugs?

But all the people picked up Tuesday in Ruidoso were arrested for distribution of illegal substances. A number were arrested for distribution of methamphetamines.

Two were arrested out of a house that Cordova said was dealing methamphetamines on a daily basis. A subsequent search warrant, however, only produced small amounts of marijuana.

Detective Michael Lovelace seemed to think the effect of the busts would reach further than just those

"It'll make them paranold for a said Lovelace of others involved with drugs.

The detectives explained the difficulties they face due to a lack of money. Without the bucks it is hard to pay the imported undercover agent or

make the big buys.
"Our goal is to do whatever we can, whenever we can, to keep the pressure on these people."



Ski at night!? Sure—at Eagle Creek

Tall, softly lit ponderosa pines reach dimly into the star-sprinkled black sky. The chairlift moves you slowly up the hill out of the dark area to the next chairlift support mounted floodlight. The starry sight disappears, and your gaze turns to the orange glow of the slopes of Eagle Creek Ski Area.

As you unload from the lift, you notice that every movement of your skis and poles is reflected in 20-foot shadows. You start down the slope cautiously. It is not as bright here on the run as on the lift, but after a few turns you find that visibility is not a problem.

The moguls and bumps are sharply outlined by their shadows, and so are easy to see. The crisp night air feels good against your face and the turns come easier and easier as your confidence builds,

Night skiing at Eagle Creek may not offer the warmth of the New Mexico sun, but there are several unique features of the nocturnal sport.

Lift lines are non-existant, And according to area owner Paul Southwick, after a good snow, the powder conditions at night can't be "It's just a different experience," he said. The skiing is also a lot more "mellow," according to one skier.
Other skiers agreed that the atmosphere at night is less hectic, and more easy-going.

Another benefit from night skiing is just that. It is at night. For many people who, for example, go to school during the week, and work on weekend days, nights may be the only time they can ski.

Cost at night is also less-\$10 for adults and \$7 for children—but the hours are also shorter. The area is open for skiing on Friday and Saturday nights from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. Rentals at night are \$7, the same as during the day.

According to Southwick, the numbers of night skiers at the area have increased over last year. He said night skiing will continue as long as the area is open, which will be pro-bably into March.

So the next time you are looking for something different to do on a weekend night, think night skiing at Eagle Creek.



County and village saw varied issues in'83

Ruidoso and communities around the county were sites for a host of activities during the final three months

The Board of Lincoln County Com-missioners wrestled with road problems throughout the period. During the October 19 meeting of the commissioners, it was decided that the county could no longer afford to maintain Gavilan Canyon road. Commissioners sent a letter to state highway officials requesting that the road be designated a state road. The decision

is still pending.

Road troubles continued for the county as the commissioners reviewed a recommendation during their meeting Tuesday, November 28, from the county Planning and Zoning Commission. The Board decided then to initiate an amendment to the county subdivision regulations declaring that the county would no longer accept any paved roads into the County Road Maintenance System. Then, during the public hearing for the amendment on Tuesday, December 20, so many questions were raised on the subject of roads, paving and the cost of voted to table the matter until further study could be done.

The county also helped spearhead the effort to rewrite the Lincoln Historical Ordinance, with the framework for the ordinance completed by early December and public hearings on the ordinance to begin in February.

Other concerns within the county were raised in the community of apitan: The question of water was a lightsue in that village curing the last three months of the year. With serious water shortages and water quality problems facing Capitan, good news was well received during the Monday, December 12, meeting of the Capitan village council that an application for funding from the Interstate Streams Commission was successful. The \$18,000 the village was granted will help a great deal in the drilling of exploratory wells, but falls far short of solving the overall water problems villagers still face.

Meanwhile, Capitan Chamber of Commerce members were pushing for support of a nationally recognized Smokey Bear Day. Because the U.S. Postal Service will issue a postage stamp commemorating Smokey Bear this year, Capitan residents decided

While more and more young people were moving into scouting, other folks were moving out of Fort Stanton. Support grew to change Fort Stanton from a facility for the care of the developmentally disabled to a facility for long-term alcoholic rehabilitation. By Monday, November 7, eight clients had been moved to the New Horizons group home in Carrizozo. By Thursday, December 1, a total of 17 clients had been moved to New Horizons, other group homes around the state, or to their family homes. Officials estimated 53 of the remaining 117

residents would be moved by July,

The Ruidoso Board of Realtors welcomed new Board officers for 1984 into office at a ceremony Tuesday, October 25. By the end of the year, Realtors had totaled over \$75 million in sales as reported by the Ruldoso Multiple Listing Service (MLS) in a "red-letter" year, according to MLS executive officer Alton Lane.

Precedents were also set in the Lin-coln County District Court with the guilty verdict of two Ruidoso Condoshare Vacation Club officers in connection with fraud charges. The marathon three-week trial found club manager Jim Vincent guilty on seven charges and club sales manager Dean Shade guilty on three charges of various third and fourth degrees felonies. According to state Attorney General Paul Bardacke's office, it was the first time nationwide that a conviction had been made for fraud in connection with time-share opera-

A busy time across the county, the final three months of 1983 will not soon be forgotten. In several of these stories, 1984 will be a year of decidiscoveries and determinasions.

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

In touring the mile in 1:38 2-5, Tonkawa Charger also snapped the season's best clocking for a mile. The previous fastest mile reading was a


