It's U.S. Open Ski Race time!

Close to 10 months of discussions, preparations and negotiations will come to a head this week as Ruidoso and Eagle Creek Ski Area host the U.S. Open professional ski race.

Over 50 of the world's best professional ski racers, plus celebrities, Governor Toney Anaya, national television crews and press from all over the country will be on hand for four days of racing and celebrating.

According to local organizers of the race, preparations are running right on schedule. 'It's gone extremely well,'' said

Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth of community efforts to prepare for the race. "The cooperation between different

groups in town has been tremendous,'' said Gary Hall. Race Chief Ray Heid said the slope at Eagle Creek is in excellent condition, with the two six- to eight-foot probumps already in place.

'The hill is holding up great,'' said Heid, who noted that crews at Eagle

Creek have been making snow, packing it and even wetting it to harden

the surface. Although Heid has garnered numerous volunteers, he said he could still use seven or eight more gatekeepers during any of the four days of racing-Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday

Ski racers from all over the world will begin arriving Tuesday, with preliminary qualifications Thursday morning. The U.S. Open will consist of both

slalom and giant slalom races. Pros will race head to head in elimination races, with the winner having to run 10 races to claim his prize money.

The giant slalom race will be Friday afternoon and Saturday morning. The slalom race will be Sunday. The winner of the slalom and giant slalom races will race each other in a final match on a combined slalom and giant slalom course to determine the U.S. Open Champion. The final match will be for a \$10,000 grand prize, add-

ed to the champion's winnings from

the previous races.

Amateurs will get their chance to race with the pros at 1:30 p.m. Saturday afternoon during the Celebrity Pro-Am. Competing on a triple course, 27 teams, consisting of one pro and three amateurs, will vie for the Pro Am championship.

Sprinkled among the amateurs will be 10 celebrities on hand for the event. Singers Trini Lopez and Ralna English and television stars Lyle Waggoner, Christopher Holder, Tim Culbertson and Adam West will be among the celebrities in Ruidoso for the weekend.

Governor Toney Anaya, Economic Development and Tourism Secretary Alex Mercure, and close to 30 others from the state capital will also be in Ruidoso for the race.

Amateurs will get a chance to meet their pro captains during the Opening Ceremonies and Pick the Winner Party at Cree Meadows, beginning at 7 Friday evening.

The Pick the Winner Party and Saturday night's Pro Am awards dinner will both be fund-raisers for the Sierra Blanca Handicapped Skiers Association Celebrities Lopez, Jungbluth.

English and Holder will also entertain during the awards dinner at Jerry Dale's.



Snow conditions ready for ski racing

"Right now the hill's in fanastic shape,"' said Ray Heid of the slopes at Eagle Creek Ski Area Heid, Race Chief of the upcoming Pro Ski International U.S. Open pro ski race, said conditions at Eagle Creek were perfect for the race.

Heid said two piles of snow collected at Eagle Creek measure up to 18 feet deep in places He said those two piles of snow alone could be used to cover the entire race run. Eagle Creek is presently reporting a snow depth average of 24 inches, so it is unlikely that there will be a snow

Capitan lands Smokey issue

It's official! The Smokey Bear commemorative stamp's first day of issue will be at Capitan, according to the New Mexico Congressional Projects office

A group of Capitan residents have been pushing for the stamp to be issued there since the U.S. Postal System announced the stamp would be issued

"We think it's great," Smokey Bear Committee chairperson Rose Garner said of the news. "A lot of people worked real hard for a long time for this." Garner and other Capitan residents have organized a special day, set for May 26, to celebrate the 35th anniversary of the Forest Service's Smokey Bear Fire Prevention program and the issuance of the stamp. Smokey Bear Day will be held in Capitan, and will include a parade and an arts and crafts fair. The stamp will be officially issued sometime in August

Garner said some type of celebration will surround the ceremonies the day of issuance.

Heid said any fears of not having enough snow for the event at Eagle Creek are unfounded

"If we get 80 degree weather and three days of sand storms, then we're in trouble," he said

According to Heid, if extreme weather conditions do deplete or degrade the snow at Eagle Creek, there are several options available to race officials.

If the snow becomes slushy during

the race due to high temperatures. Heid said ammonium nitrate, commonly used as a fertilizer, can be spread over the race surface. The chemical will cause the snow to freeze at a higher temperature in a matter of seconds


"That will make it rock hard." Heid said of the snow conditioning techni-

Should Eagle Creek experience a severe loss of snow through melting, Heid said, snow can be trucked in to the area from higher on the Ski Run Road He said a similar technique was used this year in Yugoslavia and at past Olympic competitions in Innsbruck. Austria. This year, a week prior to the Olympics, very little snow had fallen in Saravejo. Yugoslavia Snow was trucked in and spread over the runs, forming a proper surface for racing. Heid estimated that 50 area volunteers could gather and distribute enough snow to cover the race run at Eagle Creek

Heid said volunteers from this area. more than improved snow conditions. are necessary for the success of the event

Heid said Eagle Creek is ready for the event.

"It's the best racing hill in the country," he said. "We've got an ideal setup. We're ready!"

The Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department had a full schedule of firefighting late last week with three house fires and a grass fire in just over 24 hours.

No one was injured in any of the fires. The grass fire burned most of one

lot at Rainbow and Barcus drives Thursday afternoon before firefighters could extinguish it.

Hot ashes dumped on the lot started the fire, according to firefighters at the scene. The department also fought two dumpster fires earlier in the week caused by improper disposal of ashes

Just before 10 Thursday night, the department received another call to a house fire on Socorro Drive. The cause of the fire that almost com-

pletely destroyed the house is under investigation. According to firefighters, the fire started at two separate ends of the house.

The string of fires continued Friday when the department answered a call to the home of L. C. Burt at the corner of Spruce and Davis drives at 12:45 p.m. Fire damage was contained primarily to the living room, but smoke damaged most of the house. The fire apparently started in a kerosene heater, said fire chief Virgil Reynolds.

No sooner were they putting away the hoses from that fire when firefighters were called to another house fire on Juniper Road. The fire was confined to the bedroom, but smoke damaged much of the rest of the house rented by "Irish" Dave Hobson and his family. It was apparently caused by faulty wiring, said Ruidoso fireman Collie Parks.

Teachers' in-service days a success

Ruidoso Municipal Schools officials had nothing but praise for three days, of in-service workshops last week. classes to allow, their teachers to become students on February 22, 23-

and 24. Topics ranged from curriculum and computers to banking and first aid. Teachers of the workshops included local business people, district employees and educational consultants.

Superintendent Sid Miller called the workshops "just tremendous," The district has always had three to five in-service days each year, he said. 'We just scattered them out before."

The continuous in-service days will be repeated next year, he said, with some refinements. District officials believe three days in a row at this time provide a good break for teachers, he said.

They weren't always a good break for parents. Children were home for five days, counting the weekend. Some of the high school students worked added hours at jobs, or slept

Students in knots of two or three shopped for everything from comia books to clothes. Others stayed home and watched cartoons or did chores. Those were on the agenda for teacher Jim Dickinson's family. While the children were home, he was teaching two groups of colleagues about computers about computers;

Computers were new to him, five ears ago when one was installed in a his classroom. Now he's looking forward to a computer laboratory in the new high school.

His adult students blocked out about nine hours of time during the workshops, "I needed three days in a row, for continuity in what I was teaching," Dickinson said. He did wish he could have been a

student in some of the other' workshops, he said, because they looked interesting.

Other teachers who led workshops were Galen Farrington, who spoke about cameras in the classroom, and Jim Ramsey, whose topic was the group process in education,

Consultants also came to the workshops from as far away as Colorado. In addition, teachers thinking about retirement scheduled in-

dividual sessions with a state official, Teachers who became students were generally, enthusiastic. White Mountain Elementary teacher Jim Hickerson said one session was terrific .

He walked out of "Good Morning to You" recharged with ideas about how to teach language arts in a fun way Hickerson also attended a cardio pulmönary resuscitation: (CPR) class.

About 25 or 30 teachers participated in the CPR class. It will continue on Wednesday, February 29, from 1 to 4 p.m. Miller said teachers will be relieved of classroom duties then to complete their training.

Ed Jungbluth, Chamber of Com-merce executive director, and others taught the first part of the CPR class. The instructors included Bill and Ver-na Adams, Yvonne Lanelli, Jack Miller and Caroline Lechel. Many of them are emergency medical technicians.

Local business people also taught seminars, including lawyer Gary Mitchell and banker Lamar Osbourn. Osbourn, a Board of Education member, is senior vice president in charge of real estate lending at Ruidoso State Bank.

Osbourn spoke about mortgages and car loans to a score of district employees. He also called the three in-service days a good break for the teachers.

Miller said workshop, topics included "fun things and very serious things that are depressing but necessary." The workshops included one about physical and emotional abuse and another titled, "Car Care for the Mechanically Handicapped."

Both the personal-oriented workshops and the ones on professional topics will enhance teaching. Hickerson believes

Miller said providing a range of workshops that might be characterized as continuing education for the teachers is not a duty of a school district.

However, the state does encourage it, he said. Santa Fe education of-ficials congratulated the district on the planned topics. The workshops also follow the trend of big business offerings, Miller said.

In addition, the three continuous days without students had a side benefit, he said. "They open avenues for cleaning and repairing schools wecan't do while the kids are there."

Things looking up with Highway Dept?

In a rare note of optimism, village officials reacted positively after a meeting with State Highway Department representative Lou Medrano.

Both village manager Jim Hine and assistant village manager Frank Potter expressed guarded optimism after meeting with Medrano Thursday morning.

"I think there's a lot of hope there with Lou," said Potter Thursday afternoon.

Medrano was making his first visit to Ruidoso as the newly appointed District II highway engineer. Medrano is in charge of District II, which encompasses the southeast corner of the state. He recently transferred from Santa Fe, where he was the head of the Traffic Services Division.

Hine said he thought Medrano recognized the needs of Ruidoso and would cooperate with the village on matters of importance. Hine also said he thought Medrano would not make false promises about what the Highway Department would do.

Medrano agreed to try an experimental program to slow down traffic in the midtown area of Sudderth Drive. The village will put up flashing signs somewhere near Lincoln County Wrecker at one end and Continental Telephone Company at the other end. The signs will warn drivers of heavy pedestrian traffic and advise them to slow down.

The meeting, attended by Ruldoso police chief Dick Swenor, Planning and Zoning Commission chairman Greg Masters, street superintendent

Jack LaMay, citizen Don Samuels, Hine and Potter, did not start out so positively.

"It seems like we're regressing in-stead of progressing," said Potter, in reference to a two-year delay of widening Highway 97 from Bennett's to Ski Run Road.

Potter also mentioned unsuccessful attempts to work out an agreement for the maintenance of Sudderth and Mechem drives, along with drainage, signing, lighting, striping and snow removal problems on state highways, Sudderth and Mechem are

technically considered part of State Highway 37 and are maintained by the State Highway Department.

Potter asked Medrano how projects around Ruidoso could be set back in light of the fast growth reflected in gross receipts and building permits. Medrano acknowledged that more work needed to be done to assure that proposed studies and projects were followed through to their conclusions.

He also mentioned political realities determining which projects are funded and completed.

Medrano suggested Ruidoso work more with its state legislators, who he said can have an effect on Highway Department funding. He said Ruidoso has to emphasize and make known what is going on here and its economic impact on the state.

"I think the key word is com-munication," said Medrano,

Medrano and village officials also discussed needed improvements on Gavilan Canyon and Carrizo Canyon roads, Although both are county roads, they mentioned the possibility of joint ventures between Ruidoso, the county and state.

As others broke into tears, Swenor unveiled a bronze and wooden plaque dedicating the building to Nunnally.






J.L. Barnhill

Gervase Peso and Joe LaRue came through with excellent performances to give the Ruidoso High School wrestling team one of the Warriors' best performances ever at the state AAA division tournament Friday and Saturday at Tucumcari High School,

Peso, a junior, finished second in the 155-pound division, and LaRue took third in the heavyweight competition. The Warriors scored 361/2 points to finish 12th in the team scoring.

Scott Ciraulo at 167 pounds and Gary Burgess at 185 pounds also did well for Ruidoso, although they didn't place.

"The guys did real well, all of them," said Ruidoso coach Gerald Ames. "We doubled our state meet total in this meet. Before this year, we had a third and a fourth, and we added two more this time.

Peso's performance was especially impressive. The Warrior athlete won three matches Friday in

superb style before losing the final Saturday night to Brian Gonzales of St. Michael's.

In the first round Friday, Peso took an impressive 18-8 decision over Tim Archuleta of Goddard.

According to Ames, Peso jumped off to a big lead against the Goddard wrestler, tired a bit in the second round, then came on strong in the final round.

Peso took a third-period pin in the second round and a second-period pin in the third round of the tourney. Against Gonzales in the final, Peso jumped off to a 5-0

lead in the first period, "I thought we had him then," said Ames. "But that

other kid was tough. He came back strong. He was as quick as Gervase and as strong as him and he was also a senior.'

LaRue gained third-place honors by defeating Daniel Sedillo of Grants 9-3.

The Warrior matman got two takedowns, an escape, a reversal and a near-fall in his victory over Sedillo. LaRue wrestled three times Friday and twice Saturday. He defeated Edwin Cohoe of Tohatehi 8-5 in the first round, and topped Joe Givens of Kirtland Central 5-3 in the second round.

In the third round, LaRue had to wrestle David Lopez of Tucumcari and was pinned.

Saturday LaRue came back to pin Bob Slaughter of Deming in the second period to gain a spot in the thirdplace competition. LaRue also pinned Slaughter in the finals of the District 3-AAA tournament last week.

Burgess won one of three matches and gained the Warriors a point in the team scoring. The 187-pound senior competitor was pinned by Patric

Marquez of Tucumcari in the opening round of the tournament. Marquez was one of the top-rated wrestlers coming into the tournament.

In the second round, however, Burgess came back to defeat David Allesandro of St. Michael's 7-3.

Burgess was eliminated from further competition when he lost a tight 9-7 decision to Shane Rodgers of Albu-

querque Academy in the third round.

Giraulo lost his first two matches and was eliminated. However, he wrestled well against tough competition, losing a 9-4 decision in the first round and getting pinned in the third period of his second match.

"I'm very satisfied with the way we wrestled," Ames remarked. "Particularly after we were kind of disappointed with our district meet. It shows how tough our district is now.

'We've got most of our guys back next season. We had a lot of sophomores and freshmen this year who wrestled against mostly seniors and juniors."

Ruidoso will lose LaRue, Ciraulo and Burgess to graduation, but the rest of the Warrior wrestlers will return.

What will Ruidoso have to do to win the game?



Even though the Warriors lost, a lot of the people who attended the game could look back on many Ruidoso victories in the gymnasium.

One of the most recent high points of the gymnasium's history, of course, was Ruidoso's drive to the District 3-AAA boys varsity championship and fourth place in the state tournament in 1981.

Ruidoso clinched the 1981 district regular season title with a 62-57 victory over Cobre on Saturday, February 28, that year.

That victory gave the Warriors a bye in the first round of the district tournament. Ruidoso then defeated Silver City 50-48 in the semi-finals and Tularosa 65-54 in the finals to gain the overall district championship and a

berth in the state AAA division tournament.

There were plenty of other victories for Ruidoso in the Warrior gymnasium.

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Downs residents hear from candidates

Eight people seeking political of-fices addressed about 30 Ruidoso Downs residents at a candidates' forum Friday night in the village hall.

Roy Norman of radio station KREE acted as moderator and introduced the candidates.

Six people are running for two fouryear terms as village trustees. Another four people are seeking a two-year term. Two more oppose each other to become municipal judge.

Although judge candidate Harrold Mansell strongly criticized opponent Paula Smith's positions, most of the candidates spoke briefly and amicably.

Norman called upon them in approximately the order they will appear on the ballot.

Yolanda Flanagan, who is first on the ballot for a four-year term, came into the hall after the meeting began, because of another commitment. Like most of the candidates, she spoke about her family and her experience. Scott Tillman, who spoke first, is

running for a four-year term. He said

the village should fill out the forms needed to receive state and federal aid,

Conrad Buchanan, also a four-year term candidate, was appointed to the board to complete an unexpired term. He said, "I would like to see this town prosper and I would like to prosper with it." He also praised fellow candidate Jackie Branum,

. Camille Mansell said she decided to run for council when her husband chose not to seek reelection to that position. "We have a lot of problems here, and have to try to find answers."

Lorna Parnell also seeks a fouryear term. She focused on cleaning up the village and the water problem. Her husband, Ray, is a water well driller.

Jackie Branum completes the list of four-year candidates. The teacher believes the village should improve services, including water. Ruidoso Downs should also consider annexing nearby land to increase the tax base, she said.

Barry Smith seeks the single two-

year term. The former Walt Disney World worker said he has seen some innovations that could be implemented in the village.

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Joe Southard also seeks that seat. He said, "The city has problems in nearly every department and I'd like to try to solve them."

Candidates Layerne Cole and Rick Simpson also seek the two-year term, but did not attend the candidates' forum.

Harrold Mansell, who is now on the village board, is running against Paula Smith for the seat as municipal judge.

His speech came closest to reaching the 10-minute limit Norman had set for each candidate.

Mansell passed around to the audience newspaper photos to demonstrate he had been a uniformed officer. He said he wanted to halt claims he had no police experience.

He said he would ask for an annual budget of \$775 and criticized his opponent's spending. Mansell also cited budgets from surrounding towns of similar size.

"On any issue, I'm never in the middle of the road," Mansell said. He said he nominated Paula Smith to replace Fred Bernard as municipal judge in July, but now regrets appoin-ting the wife of a police officer as

Judge, Husbands and wives influence each other, he said. "I influence Camille, she influences me.''

Paula Smith then spoke. She said she has been criticized for modern views, but that they follow strictly the position of the New Mexico Supreme Court.

Smith has been municipal judge for six months. She said her family has owned land in the area all of her life. She also cited a degree in criminal justice from Eastern New Mexico University and six years of law enforcement work.

In response to a guestion from the audience, she said she proposes an annual budget of \$2,500. That is higher than it has been in recent years, she said, because in the past, the police

department has paid three-fourths of

the court's actual costs.

mid-sentence when the caller's phone cord allegedly was ripped out. Catherine Ann Sanders, 80, of Ruidoso Downs was arrested and charged with aggravated burglary, criminal damage to property and driving while intoxicated.

Edgar Torres, 43, of Mescalero, and Joe Gonzäles Sanchez, 55, of Ruidoso Downs were both charged with aggravated burglary and criminal damage to property.

The three suspects remained in the Ruidoso Downs jail Monday morning. Police answered another burglar

alarm on Sudderth Drive Sunday night that almost ended in the shooting of Ralph Treat, said Lieutenant Dave Pfeffer.

Police arrived at the scene of the alarm shortly before 9 p.m. and saw a man running into the darkness holding a shotgun, said Pfeffer. Officers told the man to stop for the police and the man furned toward them with the shotgun, said Pfeffer.

Just as the officers were about to fire on the man, they recognized Treat, owner of a nearby gift shop. Treat was apparently searching for a burglar, police said.

"We don't need that kind of citizen involvement," said Pfeffer. "Somebody's going to get hurt."

Two other burglaries were reported at the end of last week. Robert Lewis Mooney reported a missing white purse containing \$1,000 cash. He said he thought the purse was taken from his vehicle sometime between 2:30 and 4 p.m. Friday.

Dusty L. Casey also reported the theft from 213 5th Street of two Mit-subishi speakers valued at \$200; one two and a quarter-inch Rolaflex camera, \$1,200; a Titleist golf bag, \$200; and assorted golf clubs worth \$100.

Police officer Hugh Smith commended citizen Roy Ranne, who found and attended to Deborah Mc-Carty late Friday night after she fell off a bridge on Mechem Drive near Sudderth Drive. According to Smith's report, Ranne saw the woman stumble and fall off the bridge.

Action possible on unfinished building

Village building inspector Jimmy Neeley said he thinks a half-finished building across the street from the post office is structurally unsound, but he is unsure what will be done about it.

The building, owned by Lloyd L. Davis Jr., has been pointed out by village councilman Don Dale as a potential health hazard and an eyesore. He said he is concerned about children playing in the twostory building.

"It's always been an eyesore," said Dale.

He reasoned that if Ruidoso has a sign ordinance controlling the kinds of signs put up in town, it should also be concerned with half-finished buildings. The building now stands as a concrete shell with no roof, windows or doors.


Dale has asked the Planning and Zoning office to see what it can do to have the building completed or torn down

Neeley said the Planning and Zon-ing office asked him to inspect it.

He said he discovered beams in the building that had begun to bend, and that he found some parts of the structure out of plumb.

He said he was not sure what he can require Davis to do, and that he wanted to be very careful about demanding any kind of action on the building. He mentioned one phrase in the New Mexico Uniform Building Code that requires owners to maintain buildings

He said Friday he planned to meet with the state building inspector to




talk about possible action. Davis said his father, Lloyd Davis



Pride is a matter of course for Martinez

Ted Martinez is proud of the golf course at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, and proud of his position as superintendent there.

He has reason to be. The carefully cultivated grass may look brown now, but the attention he has paid to golf courses for years will show as soon as it turns green again.

"In New Mexico you fight a lot of weather elements," he says. Those elements include spring wind, summer humidity and winter snowmelt.

Martinez should know. He's been fighting that weather as a golf course keeper for years.

"Golf probably got into my mind at a pretty early age," he says. His older brother was a caddy, and Ted took a job as a greenskeeper. His family lived in Artesia then.

Martinez also was a caddy in Cloudcroft.

"I started working on golf courses at the age of 17," says the man whose athletic build belies about three decades in the business.

He worked on what was essentially a two-man crew. "I learned a lot about golf course upkeep because I was it." he said.

The size of his crew has sprouted since then. During the summer, he supervises about 13 workers on the Inn's course. That tapers to about seven in the winter.

With all those years working on golf courses, does he play himself? Yes, he says. With a slight smile he adds that his handicap depends on his playing partners. "I don't play as much anymore," he

says, "but the only way to test a golf course is to play it."

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
Ted Martinez examines the manicured eighth hole at the inn of the Mountain Gods. He is a certified golf course superintendent there.

Skill is also needed with specialized vocabulary and equipment for the greens and tees.

Martinez passed much of his knowledge along to his son Henry, who at 24 has worked on golf courses for 10 years,

for 10 years. "None of the girls or my wife have ever participated in golf," Martinez says of his three daughters. The kids are pretty well grown now, he says. He also has a grandchild.

However, his son wasn't the only person to follow him. "I'm proud to say several of my employees went on to become golf course superintendents themselves," Martinez says.

That pride shows in other ways, too. The Inn of the Mountain Gods logo often appears on his sweaters in publicity pictures, for instance.

He started working as Inn superintendent four years ago, and knows he has made sound choices. "I consider myself a family man,"

he says, and now he's near his relatives.

District Attorney reports legislation

District Attorney Steve Sanders spent a considerable amount of time spent a considerable amount of time in Santa Fe during the recent session of the New Mexico State Legislature, both as District Attorney for Lincoin and Otero counties, and as president of the New Mexico District Attorneys Association. Sanders recently reported on the success of the session. New Mexico legislators passed a bill during their session in Santa Fe that will provide for an additional

bill during their session in Santa Fe that will provide for an additional district judge position for Lincoln and Otero counties, according to Sanders. Senate Bill 40 was approved by the Senate by a vote of 33-1 and by the House by a vote of 57-1 in the last week of the 30-day legislative session. According to Sanders, the measure will allow for a judge who will be re-quired to maintain an office and live in Lincoln County. Sanders said the candidates for the position will be elected by votes from both Otero elected by votes from both Otero County and Lincoln County. He said the first such elected judge will be

voted on this November and will take

office in January 1985. In other action, the legislators pass-ed House Bill 199, which deals with prohibition of the sexual exploitation of children, according to Sanders. Sanders said the bill increases penalties for crimes such as child pro-stitution and child abuse or neglect. The bill now makes it a crime in New Meylan to photomsuch children enver Mexico to photograph children engag-ed in sexual acts or to allow children to possess any visual material of such

It also prohibits the manufacture of such material. According to Sanders, this is the first legislation dealing with some of these offenses that has been enacted into law in New Mexico. Sanders said the District Attorneys Association drafted the measure and House representatives including local representative Mickey McGuire spon-

sored the bill.

Sanders said the legislators also passed stiffer penalties in a new Driv-ing While Intoxicated bill. Sanders said the most significant provision of the bill deals with the actions of a law enforcement officer upon stopping a

DWI suspect. According to Sanders, if the officer determines the driver has more than 1 percent by weight of alcohol in the blood, he can immediately take away the suspect's driver's license.

The officer may then issue a temporary 10-day license to the driver, which expires unless the driver contacts the courts within 10 days. That way, Sanders said, drivers suspected

way, Sanders said, drivers suspected of drunk driving will be off the road in a short period of time. He said that in the past, he has seen drivers accumulate as many as seven or eight DWI offenses before they were required to appear before the courts for their first offense.

"We couldn't get them off the roads," Sanders said of the situation. Sanders said the legislation also


makes it mandatory that a police officer arrest a person found driving with a blood alcohol level of more than .1 percent. It is also now man-datory that the person be prosecuted and go to trial.

and go to trial. Sanders said arrest and prosecution decisions were formerly left up to the discretion of the arresting and pro-secuting officials. The bill lowers the allowable level of alcohol in the blood of drivers under the age of 18 to .05 percent, Sanders said. He said that measure takes into account the fact that

Sanders said. He said that measure takes into account the fact that drivers that age are not supposed to be drinking anyway, and the lack of their driving experience. Sanders said the bill also made it mandatory that a driver lose his license for a period of five years on the third DWI conviction. We are relieved to note progress in an area that long has been an understated concern in the Ruidoso area: lack of moderately priced rental housing.

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission last week revealed that a new zoning designation specifically for apartments is under consideration.

Density requirements in R-2 zoning, under which all multi-family housing now falls, have discouraged development of apartment housing.

For example, a local property owner had one acre on which he wanted to build efficiency apartments. R-2 requirements would have limited the project to 22 units.

He looked at the numbers and figured he could not keep the rent low (\$300 a month with utilities paid was the plan) and have the project be cost effective.

The R-4 zoning designation under consideration would allow buildings to occupy half the total square footage of the property they sit on. This would have made that particular project a different ball game.

Instead of being limited to 22 units, the project could have had 54 units and been feasible.

Density and green space are two very important considerations in housing projects. But it is sensible to adapt requirements to property use, i.e., to treat condominiums and apartments differently.

Careful consideration of where R-4 zoning is appropriate will be needed, but this presumably will be addressed in the new comprehensive plan.

More rental housing will meet a pressing need-providing for the service work force of the ambitious development projects that regularly are announced.—TP

have miserably failed to improve education in the past.

All that was really going to change

was their pay. That's okay. Maybe they need raises. But if they do, they should not be so heartless as to run a scam about that guaranteeing us excellence in the classroom.

That can't come without changes-substantial and deep philosophical and practical changes. Those they are not willing to make, because changes would imperil their jobs.

We aren't allowed to suggest even a study of the tenure system. To change that, they say, would leave them sub-ject to unfair firing—something everyone else who holds a job is subject to at all times.

We shouldn't propose testing their competence, either as scholars or as teachers. That, they claim, would bruise their dignity-though other professional people have their com-petence tested daily in such arenas as the hurlyburly of the courtroom.

And we mustn't even direct school systems how to pass out the raises they have all along been after; to do that, we are told, is to imperil local control of the schools-the thing

Don't they understand we are long past the stage where an increase of that size could even be seriously considered?

Don't they comprehend that Anaya, the teachers' friend, is now wheeling and dealing in an attempt to get a miniscule tax increase on the order of \$35 million?

And how do they intend to ac-complish this clearly impossible task? Possibly with the team they boast about in that same news release: "NEA-New Mexico averaged five lobbyists at the Capitol every day during the 30-day session, and members sent thousands of letters and phone meassages to legislators."

True. But the question is, did any of that do any good? If it didn't in the regular session, the likelihood of it af-fecting things in the short special session still to come is almost too small to be discernible.

If they and their supporters mismanage things further, they could end up without even the one thing they truly want—a raise in pay.
