

New council sworn in

Magistrate Jim Wheeler Thursday swore in six new Ruidoso village council members, who then received a "crash course" into what municipal government is from three members of the New Mexico Municipal League.

The council also elected council member Sherman Atwood as mayor pro tem. Atwood will serve as mayor in the absence of Mayor George White.

After reciting the oath of office, council members Atwood, Ray Dean Carpenter, Jerry Shaw, Bill Karn, John Underwood and Rick Evans listened to a welcoming speech from Mayor White.

"I look forward to the next two years as being real productive for Ruidoso," said White.

He extended a special welcome to Jerry Shaw, the first woman to serve on Ruidoso's council, and complimented all village council candidates for professional campaigns devoid of mudslinging.

He then challenged the council members to remember the trust and faith the electorate had in electing them as their representatives.

"Sometimes I think we forget the people we are representing," warned White.

White also challenged the council members to read and become familiar with the municipal code which contains the village's laws and regulations.

Later in the meeting, Carpenter suggested the council meet with all department heads to learn more about village operations and depart-

ment goals. The council decided to meet with department heads at 2 p.m., Tuesday, March 13, in the village hall auditorium.

In his opening speech, White recommended the council consider having its meetings in the afternoon and reconsider the former council's policy on consent agendas and pre-meeting workshops. The council will discuss these issues at its Tuesday meeting.

White then introduced the three municipal representatives he invited to Ruidoso to educate the new council about its duties, responsibilities,

powers and limitations.

The council is a completely new one, with five of the seven members never having served on the governing body. All former council members except the mayor had to resign after voters passed a referendum increasing the council from five to seven members. Atwood served eight years on the council, from 1974 to 1982.

Robert Jerkins, Sotero Sanchez and Melesia Helberg informed the council about parliamentary procedure, closed meetings ethics, administrative functions, budgeting

process, conflict of interest, and bidding procedures.

"Right now, you're on your honeymoon," Helberg told the council. "But I guarantee you it will be over sometime."

She advised council members they will be angry with each other at one time or another and that it will be important how they handle their differences. She advised them to "look at everything with a fair eye" and to deal honestly and openly with each other.

She said closed listening, backed by facts and good listening, make for efficient government. It is not necessary for council members to agree with or even to like each other, but it is essential that they respect each other, said Helberg.

Sanchez also asked for the council's support of the capital outlay bill to be considered in the special session of the state Legislature that began Friday. Sanchez said individual council members and the council as a whole should tell the local legislators of their support for the bill, which could provide more than \$40 million in assistance to cities around the state.

In other business, the council:

Hear White read a letter from Dona Nunnally thanking the village for dedicating the police/courts complex to her late husband.

Approved low bids of \$9,162.21 and \$22,436 for a four-wheel drive pickup and a dump truck for the water department.

Passed the New Mexico Open Meetings Act, which defines requirements for notification of public meetings and exceptions under which closed meetings may be held.

Mayor sounds positive note

"I love it," said Mayor George White last Tuesday evening after hearing names of the six new council members he will work with during the next two years.

He remains as optimistic, if not more so, after the council's first meeting Thursday.

"I had the gut feeling that we are on our way to better things for the village because of the spirit of cooperation exemplified in the meeting," said White Friday.

Although White originally opposed the expansion of the council to seven members, he said he now sees no reason why seven members cannot work together as well as five members.

White believes the increased council size and the relative inexperience of the new members of-

fers him an opportunity to assume more of a leadership role than in the past. White invited members of the New Mexico Municipal League to Ruidoso to deliver a short seminar on municipal government for the education of the new council.

He said his door would always be open to any of the village council members who wanted to discuss a particular problem or initiate a new idea.

"With a brand-new council, there is a challenge to do things we've been promising for so many years," said White.

White mentioned increased involvement in the fight for a new airport, purchase of water rights, and recreation and convention facilities as primary goals.

"I think they'll sink their teeth into some of those things," said White of the new council.

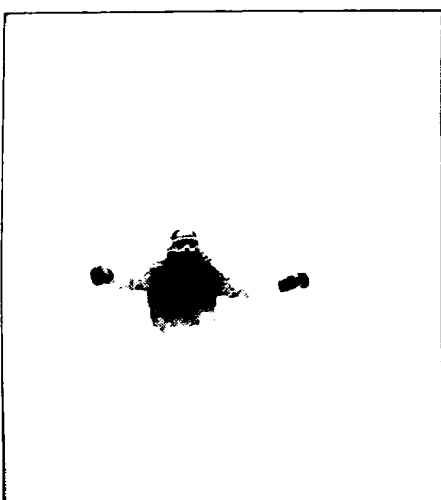

Gavilan Canyon Road subject of meeting

A meeting Thursday morning between the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners and officials from the Village of Ruidoso and the State Highway Department centered around discussion of Gavilan Canyon Road.

County officials have proposed trading the road with the state in exchange for Devil's Canyon Road, which is State Route 214. The county can no longer afford maintenance on Gavilan Canyon Road, which has become a major bypass around Ruidoso, according to a letter sent by the county to the State Highway Department on October 11, 1983.

According to county commissioner Kenneth Nosker, causes of the rapid deterioration of the road include heavy traffic and high truck usage.

"Big trucks are wiping out that road," Nosker said. "This road is beyond our means."

According to Nosker, the county spent over \$38,000 on Gavilan Canyon Road last year, but the repairs did not hold up to the high traffic on the road.

"We might as well have taken the money and sent someone to Hawaii," Nosker said of the effect of the funds on the condition of the road.

Instead of making a trade between the two roads, State Highway District Engineer Louis Medrano suggested at the meeting that the state, county and Village of Ruidoso all work together on the project.

"I think if we can continue to work jointly on this roadway we have a lot better chance to get it fixed," Medrano said. "If we were to make the exchange, we may lose more ground than we'd gain."

Medrano explained that if the state took over the road, it then would be listed on the state's five-year road development program. He said all roads in the program compete with each other for available funds. Roads are fixed in order of priority statewide, according to Medrano.

Because of the recent setback of the Mechem Drive Highway 37 widening project, Medrano said chances for the Gavilan project to be completed would be slim.

"In my experience with the department, I'm afraid we might lose ground with it," he said.

"I think we need to work with it just a little longer in terms of a cooperative solution. I think that one way or the other, we will come up with some cooperative funds."

According to Medrano, the state's cooperative funding agreement provides 60 percent of the money for roadway projects, with local governmental entities supplying the other 40 percent of the funds.

"We can get started on this as soon as cooperative funds become available," Medrano said.

According to State Highway Maintenance Engineer Worth Smelser, all available Highway Department funds for this year have been committed, but funding may be available for the next fiscal year.

"It would be July 1," Smelser said of the availability of the funds.

In addition to seeking cooperative funds from the state, the county commissioners decided to approach the State Highway Commission for funds.

"The way to go is to the Highway Commissioners," Nosker said. "I know that it helps to go talk with them. Most of them—they're very understanding New Mexicans."

The county commissioners agreed to request that the county and the Village of Ruidoso be on the next Highway Commission agenda.

It was also suggested during the meeting that the Village of Ruidoso annex the Gavilan Canyon Road right of way. Assistant village manager Frank Potter said he would take that suggestion to the Ruidoso village council for a decision at their next meeting.

Potter added that the village wanted to work with the county on the road project. Potter cited the tripling of traffic in Ruidoso over the past

seven years and the uniqueness of Gavilan Canyon Road as a bypass as reasons the village is concerned with the future of the road.

"It's going to be a major carrier," Potter said.

Potter also mentioned during the meeting that Ruidoso will be starting an educational campaign aimed at directing more motorists to use Gavilan Canyon Road as a bypass.

All agreed at the meeting that the road may eventually be taken over by the state. Bringing the road up to the state's specifications if the road is, indeed, taken over by the state was also discussed during the meeting.

"We do need to come to a meeting of minds about what needs to be done to this roadway," Medrano said. "Nothing has been laid out definitely as to what the future development of this road will be."

"We would want a documented roadway," said State Highway Department Right Of Way Director Bill Garner. Garner said questions existed about the actual right of way

the county has acquired for the road. In addition, questions arose during the meeting about the roadway's width and encroachments on the right of way by private landowners and utility companies.

"Those will have to be resolved as to who's in the way," Nosker said.

According to Medrano, the state would require approximately 100 feet in width of right of way throughout the length of the road. Medrano said it would be a major project to bring the road to the state's standards.

"We're talking about a much more sophisticated roadway," he said. Officials at the meeting estimated the project would cost at least \$250,000.

Garner said he would complete studies on the necessary right of way in the canyon, and relay that information to the county, so acquisition of the needed land for the right of way could begin.

Nosker said he saw the need for haste in the project.

"The longer we put it off, the worse problem we're going to have," he said.

County answers road charges

The condition of subdivision roads in Lincoln County has been a subject of much discussion recently. The conflict between the limited budget of the county Road Department and the wishes of the citizens of Lincoln County who must travel those roads came to a head with a letter an Alto resident sent to the county commissioners recently.

In the letter, dated January 12, 1984, Weldon O. Spencer wrote, "I have noticed, much to my disappointment, that the paved subdivision roads in some areas of Alto Village have continued to deteriorate to the point of becoming almost impassable."

Spencer's letter continued, questioning why an area that is growing as fast as Alto, thus boosting the tax base of the county, would not then benefit in the form of well-maintained roads. Spencer's letter mentioned the abundance of influential residents of Alto, and the level of concern they all share.

The letter continued, "We feel that adequate paving of our roads is essential to maintaining our property values and we will not accept the downgrading of them to gravel or dirt. Neither will we allow our roads to become so dotted with large pot holes that they become almost impassable."

Spencer's letter then mentioned

specific avenues of action the concerned Alto residents may take.

"We are all ready to see some action on this issue and if that means campaigning for candidates that are more sympathetic to our problems, then we have the resources and time to do just that. Contrary to popular belief, many of us who live in Alto Village have come from humble beginnings, have fought and worked hard to get here, and know how to protect that which we have earned."

County commissioner Kenneth Nosker said he felt distressed when he received the letter, and he and the other commissioners decided to write to Spencer, explaining the county's position.

In the letter, dated March 7, 1984, Nosker wrote, "We share your concern of the condition of the paved subdivision roads and are trying to find solutions. We have 1,499 miles of county roads and approximately 302 of these miles are in subdivisions. These roads were accepted for maintenance before Lincoln County had regulations that required roads to be built to certain specifications. Consequently, in the past, roads were accepted that were not of good quality."

The letter then explained the method of funding for the county's road maintenance.

"Our source of funds for road maintenance is from a distribution of Motor Vehicle Fees which the Legislature passed in 1955. The

amount of our distribution is \$241,181.20. The Road Fund does not receive any funds from property taxes.

"The County Commission did pass a road frontage tax which is \$.10 per frontage foot. For the 13.83 miles in Alto Village, we collect \$7,297.81. This tax was passed in hopes that in time we could re-surface these roads, but the amount received from this tax is not sufficient. It takes approximately \$11,000 to gravel one mile of road and \$30,000 per mile to put a double penetration chip seal on the roads.

The letter continued, "In the past, we were able to obtain some State Highway Coop Agreement funds to improve our roads, but this past year, these funds were cut. The Legislature did provide funds for the coming year."

The letter concluded with a mention of the ways the county may deal with the problem.

"As a possible solution, we are now looking to convert some of the paved roads to gravel or establishing special assessment paving districts.

"We hope you will have a better understanding of our position and if you have any suggestions, we will greatly appreciate hearing from you."

Nosker said he hoped the letter would help explain the difficult position the commissioners face on the issue of paving in the county subdivisions.

Crime Stoppers plan party for April

The Ruidoso Crime Stoppers board of directors Thursday made further plans for a fund-raising party in April, and heard positive feedback from the state organization.

The party, which will include dancing and drawings for numerous door prizes, will be Friday, April 27, at the Prime Time Restaurant. Tickets will be available for five dollars, of which \$1.50 will go to the local Crime Stoppers organization. A percentage of the bar will also be contributed to the organization.

Funds raised by Crime Stoppers are used to pay rewards for information given to police which leads to Grand Jury indictments or Magistrate Court bindovers of criminals.

Crime Stoppers board members discussed the possibility of auctioning several of the most valuable gifts at the party, and finally decided to auction one large item there.

Local Crime Stoppers president and State Crime Stoppers Commission member Richard Sandoval said he heard very good comments about Ruidoso's program during his first state commission meeting.

"They seem to think ours is one of the best programs in the state," said Sandoval.

Sandoval also reported that he had been elected as vice-chairman of the State Crime Stoppers Commission. The state program paid \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest of a suspected major heroin dealer in Albuquerque and \$250 for the arrest of an alleged Christmas tree thief.

The Ruidoso board did not pay any money for information this month,

but Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor said his department is now following up on one call that appears to have provided valuable information.

Swenor said both the Neighborhood Watch and Crime Stoppers have helped fight crime, especially burglaries.

"Crime Stoppers is a damn good deterrent," said Swenor.

Sandoval also distributed statistics which showed that information provided through Ruidoso Crime Stoppers helped solve 27 criminal cases in 1983. Crime Stoppers tips have also led directly to 14 prosecutions and 12 convictions.

According to the statistics, \$40,000 worth of narcotics and stolen property have been recovered with the help of Crime Stoppers information.

The board also decided to have its second annual poker run in early May. Board member Glen Ferguson said he would organize the event with help from Mark Paz, Steven Stillman and Michael Radziewicz.

Radziewicz said he would talk to representatives from public television station KENW about airing dramatic reenactments of the Crime Stoppers Crime of the Week.

The board also discussed the possibility of raising funds by selling swings at a wrecked car with a sledgehammer later in the summer.

Sandoval introduced new board members Bob Dugger, Bill Rawlins and Albert Richardson.

The board then elected Ferguson as chairman of the nominating committee. The board still has two vacant spots, but Crime Stoppers is looking for people truly interested in working for the program, said Sandoval.

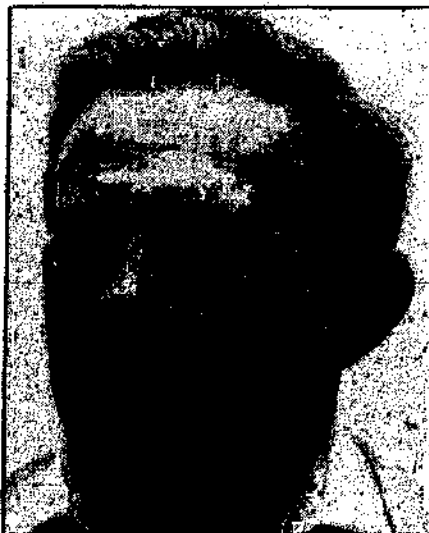
the New Mexico State Fair Sheep to Shawl Exhibit.

Ice cream will be sold, and fortunes will be told. At 4 p.m., a local expert will speak about the disease.

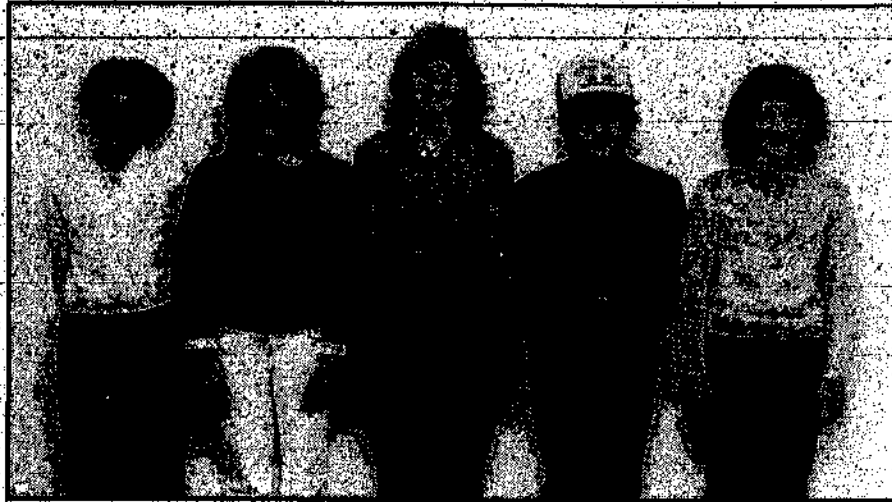

The Scan-Tron 888 is faster than a speeding red pencil. It scores dozens of tests in a single hour. Is it a teacher's fantasy? An unobtainable bit of Star Wars technology?

No, and it isn't Superman, either. It's a super machine, a test-grading machine about the size of a small office copier.

It has been quite real in Ruidoso schools for about a month. White Mountain Middle School principal Texanita Cole demonstrated it recently.

The Scan-Tron uses fill-in-the-oval test forms familiar to a generation of American students. Some of the

forms add a twist, however. They contain blanks for write-in answers or even essay spaces.

"It has freed teachers for a lot more planning and preparation," Cole said of the machine. What once took hours

of hand checking now takes a handful of minutes.

"It makes the job of teaching so much better," she added.

The scratching of heavy black pencils on standardized forms can lead quickly to the hum of the machine in

operation. It hums when it rejects improperly prepared tests or quizzes. Then teachers find the problem.

Scan-Trons are set up in the district's schools to handle much

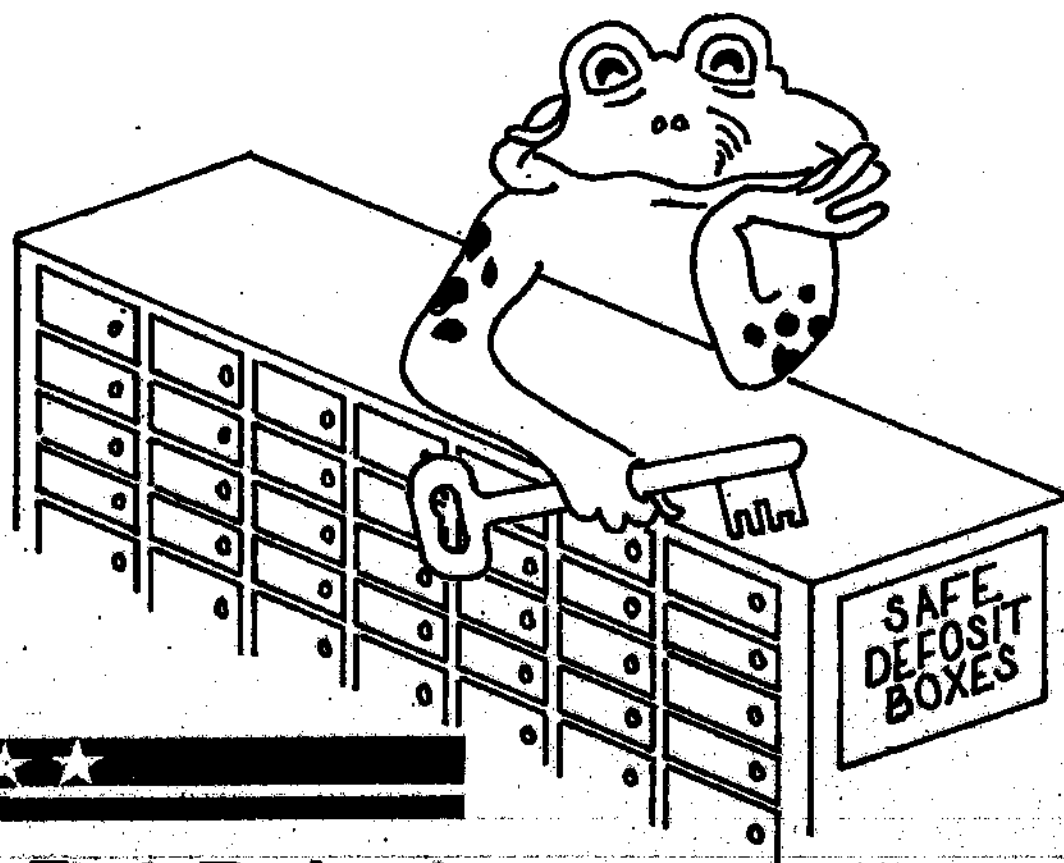

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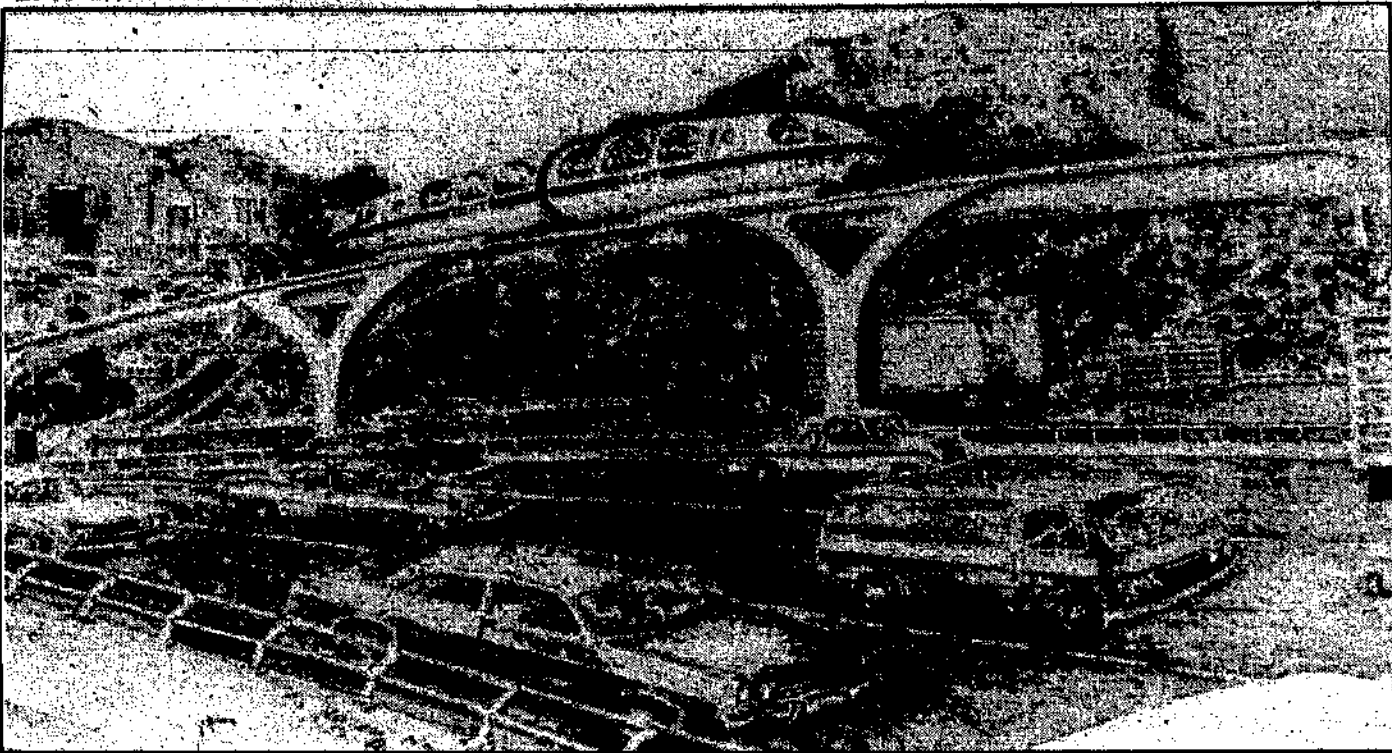

Monorail system envisioned

A transportation system that would make the trip from the site of the proposed airport on Fort Stanton Mesa to Sierra Blanca Ski Resort in 15 minutes?

"Don't let anyone think it's not possible," said Jerry Theidt, designer of the Commuter Shuttle System (CSS II). Theidt, president of S & J Technologies, said he had spent the past three years researching high-speed mass transit systems.

His company has come up with what they think is a viable form of transportation. Theidt is presently in the process of making presentation of the S & J system to governmental and private investor groups. Theidt said he would be addressing the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce on his proposal for a transportation system up to the ski area.

"It's light duty, it's high tech and it's fast," Theidt said of the CSS II system.

According to Theidt, the transportation vehicle would be built similar to the fuselage of an airplane. A Tay Rolls Royce engine, capable of achieving 24,000 pounds of thrust, would be mounted on each end of the vehicle. The vehicle would run on a single track, and be able to travel in either direction.

Theidt said it would run on a cushion of magnetic repulsion, with magnets of opposing magnetic fields in the rails and the running gear of the vehicle. That way, Theidt said, the vehicle would encounter a minimum of friction.

According to Theidt, the vehicle would be capable of travel at speeds up to 400 miles per hour. He said normal cruise speed would be about 240 miles per hour, and speed up to Sierra Blanca would average about 180 miles per hour.

Theidt said the vehicle would be modular, capable of carrying either 140 or 210 passengers. It would have a pressurized cabin. The vehicle would ride on an elevated aluminum rail, which would be computer-controlled.

The sensitive aluminum rails would be able to tell the vehicle's operator if any obstructions were on the rails, even miles in advance. Theidt said the computer would be able to control the vehicle, which is especially important in emergencies.

Theidt said it was important to have computer control because, when the vehicle is traveling at 400 miles per hour, control reactions must be immediate.

According to Theidt, no such systems have yet been constructed, but the know-how needed to build one already exists.

"All the technology involving this vehicle currently exists," Theidt said. "It is composed of a combination of a multitude of technology that currently exists."

Theidt said he had approached the New Mexico state government on the possibilities of such a system to carry passengers from Las Cruces to Albuquerque. He has also made presentations to state officials in Texas, California and in several Eastern states.

Theidt said one government seriously considering the system is

the government of Mexico, for a transportation system in Mexico City. According to Theidt, whatever community is the first to go with installing a CSS II system will greatly benefit from the decision.

"The community that gobbles this thing up is going to like it," he said. Theidt listed low cost of maintenance, economy of operation and low cost of construction as benefits to the system.

In addition, he said, whichever community first installs the system will benefit because the facility to build other such systems will be located at that community. Theidt said the facility would provide about 15,000 jobs related to the construction of the system.

Theidt said that a cost estimate for such a system was not yet available. He did estimate the system would be millions of dollars cheaper than other similar systems.

"Where they're talking billions of dollars, we're talking hundreds of millions," he said. "We're looking at saving the traveling public hundreds of millions of dollars."

Theidt said he felt it was important that some community start the project soon, because of the threat of foreign competitors.

"What I'm trying to do is get the U.S. to divert their attention away from foreign technologies. This is a very serious thing coming up and the U.S. is going to be left behind."

"I am looking for investors in the project," Theidt said. "I think this thing will be rolling by the end of the year. There's a new kid on the block, it's called hi-tech."

Pecos Valley Compost for gardeners

It's the bacteria that makes the difference, believes Sandy Ochoa. That and the plain plastic bags, the direct contact with the consumer and the price.

Pecos Valley Compost is coming to Ruidoso. It will be available through Danny Allison in 10-pound bags to truckloads, said Ochoa, president of the company.

Although most companies claim they are selling composted steer manure, Ochoa said his product is one of the few that is really processed. This processing makes the manure weedfree, odorless, easy to handle and better for plants, he claims.

Ochoa and his employees remove raw steer manure from the Pecos Valley Feedlot near Roswell and place it in windrows. They sprinkle a starter suspension of special bacterial organism, then grind and mix the material.

The bacteria then goes to work, digesting the manure. The heat generated from the process—up to 140°—kills any seed or disease organisms, said Ochoa. It also gets rid of any unpleasant manure odor, said Ochoa.

The digesting changes the plant food—such as nitrogen, potash and phosphate—into a more readily available state. The composted manure contains necessary trace minerals such as zinc, manganese

and calcium, as well, said Ochoa.

Ralph Hahn, who also markets compost, emphasizes that compost is not necessarily a complete replacement for chemical fertilizers. But the compost does build the organic matter properties of soil.

"Compost encourages root growth, while raw manure and uncomposted sludge can inhibit it. Improved root growth, in turn, loosens the soil, improves tilth and adds to the organic matter content," wrote Bill Stiffen, president of Bio Ag, Incorporated.

Ochoa has been selling his product only to farmers before this. Ruidoso will be his first attempt to sell to home gardeners as well. The material will sell for \$2.50 per 100 pounds, said Ochoa. For more information, call Danny Allison at 378-8378.

Kerby became pastor of the First Baptist Church of Carrizozo two years ago. "I don't know why Carrizozo attracted me," he said.

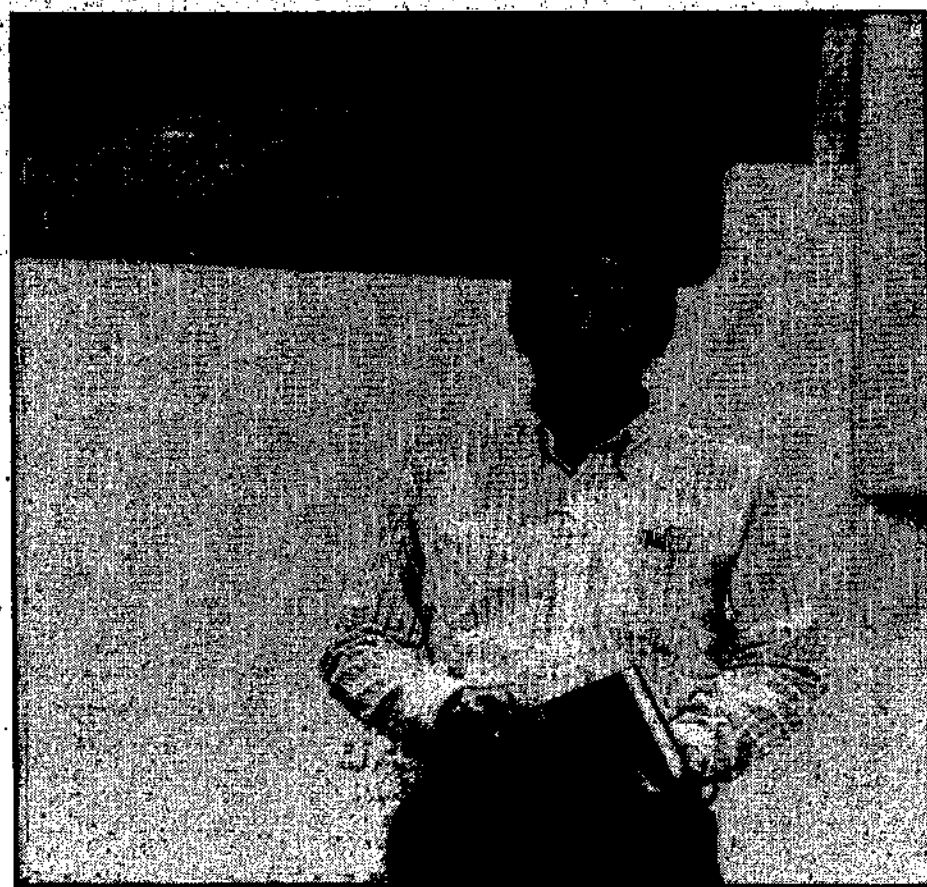
The draw could have been the rich culture and heritage of New Mexicans, he noted. He had visited Lincoln County years ago during family vacations.

SANTA FE—Some words of praise for the Governor of New Mexico.

He made the right decision about calling a special session, and he made it for good reasons.

He told us there were really three things in his mind as he reached this conclusion:

—Government should act in the open. Yet here he was, dealing with legislators on a one-on-one basis, with the public not privy to what was going on, trying to work out a deal which would then be ratified publicly. Not a healthy way to go.

—All anyone seemed to be considering in those private discussions was politics. But there is more at stake here than that. The good of the state is more important than which party or group triumphs by making the other look bad.

—And finally: Calling the session now was the proper thing to do, everyone knew it was the proper thing to do, so the only thing was to get on with it.

Those are sound reasons, and it's hard to disagree with any of them.

During a time when he has been under a lot of pressure, the Governor managed to back off a bit and get some perspective on his immediate problem. Instead of asking whether legislators would give him what he wants, he started asking what is best for New Mexico.

The answer to that is that it is best if we have in place an appropriations act which sets out how we are to spend money next year. Whether the legislators make the Governor look bad or the Governor wins some momentary triumph over the legislators is not important. Keeping the state properly solvent and properly funded is.

One further thing made it sound as if the Governor may have learned something from his recent experience. He told us he would be content to make his suggestions on what should be done at the beginning of a session and then go away, "if it helps," he said, "I will let the lawmakers strictly along, and will abide by their decisions."

That's not so dumb, of course. That way, whatever they decide is on their heads, and he can't be accused of either cajoling or prodding them to do it.

He further said publicly that he will not retaliate or attempt to punish any legislator who does not see things his way.

That statement may have been made when he was in a fit of fervor, rising above politics, and it may not be operative come primary or general election time. But he did say it—and we heard him with our own ears.

In short, there seems to be a strong effort from Anaya's side to create the kind of atmosphere in which something may be accomplished.

That's all to the good, and we can only hope it lasts. With 112 legislators actually back in town, rehearsing old gripes and remembering old favors, things may not be quite so high-toned.

But it has been a pleasure to write some complimentary things about the Governor.

One might almost hesitantly hope that occasion presents itself for more of the same. We could all stand a little dignified activity from both the Governor and the legislators—a little rising above narrow political interests of this very kind.

Wouldn't it be nice to see the job done by Friday and everyone off for

home, not to return until 1985?

One hesitation: It may not have yet become clear to the people who dwell on the fourth floor of the capitol how totally opposed to any tax increase most New Mexicans actually are.

They are now saying things like this: "Well, after all, our taxes are not very high compared to most states."

True, but not to the point. Most of our citizens want our state government to operate in a non-wasteful way, which does not require annual upping of the ante.

Let's put it simply: They don't want tax increases of any kind.

As for my job, I've shot pictures of actor Robert Walden talking with Governor Toney Anaya during the world's richest ski race. I've also taken pictures at fires and after a gear-up landing at the airport.

We should all live in the real world, and realize that lots of teenagers drink. They don't care that they're disobeying their parents and the law. That makes it more of a challenge.

After they're drunk, they drive. They trust their quick reflexes to keep them out of trouble. All the teenage boys I've ever known secretly think they're as good as race car drivers, whether they're drunk or sober.

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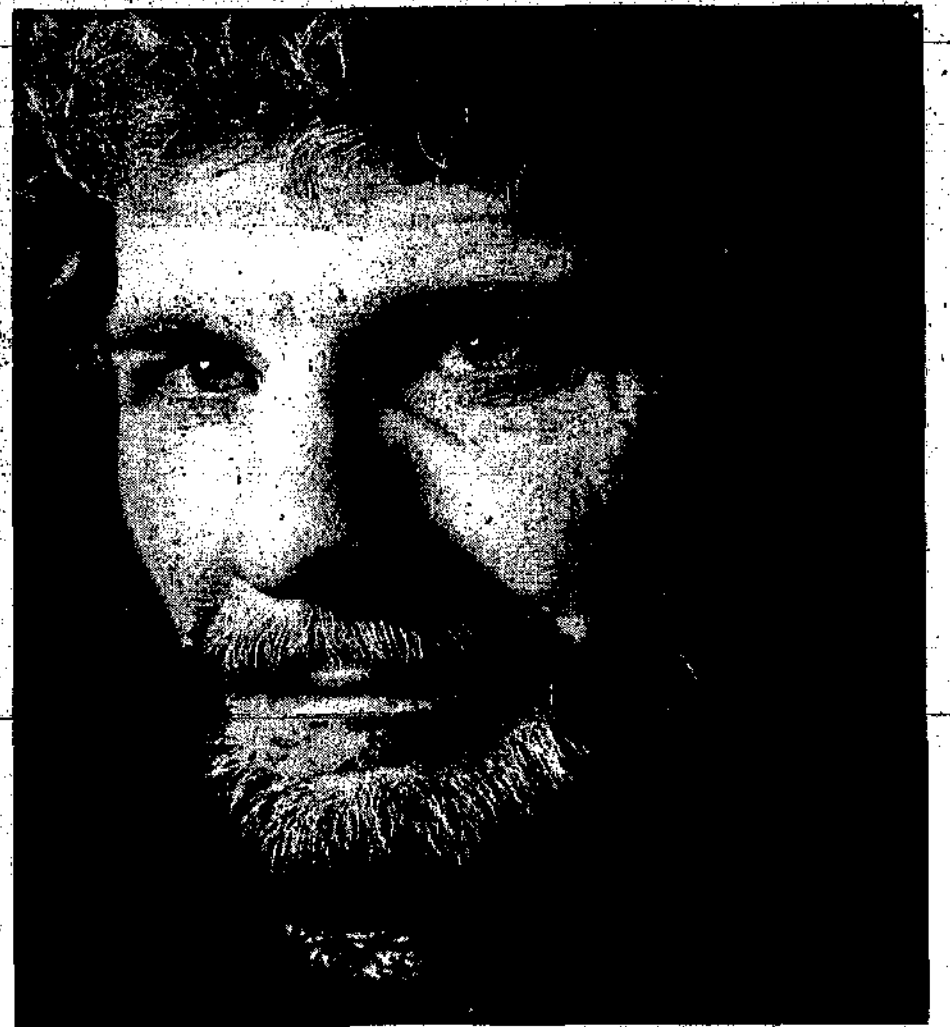

Mark Bagby: from kid with closet darkroom to award winner

Mark Bagby's photograph, "Eyes of the Artist," won first place in a recent contest.

The title describes his portrait of Ruidoso painter Martin Rose, but it also might describe Bagby.

He has the eyes of an artist, too, as well as the hands. He works with tripods and paper instead of brushes and canvas.

Bagby's most frequent subjects are people, in his work at Timber Trail Photography, 2313 Sudderth Drive. He also was honored recently for a commercial photograph of Ruidoso State Bank's North Branch.

The bank photo was accepted for hanging at the annual convention of Professional Photographers of New Mexico.

Also displayed at the Albuquerque

gathering were a color portrait of young Amber Gale of Alto, and a black and white portrait of "Li'l Bill" Myers of Ruidoso.

The Rose portrait won first place in the black and white portrait division in the yearly contest. No other black and white works were honored at the competition, Bagby said.

Black and white prints are one of his strong points. "Just because something's in color doesn't make it look interesting," he said.

Fine art prints are usually in black and white, he said—think of Ansel Adams' work.

In the United States today, amateur photographers tend to use color film. Bagby is hardly an amateur with that medium.

At Timber Trail, "We work primarily in color." That presents some long-range technical problems. The color photographs that hung at

Albuquerque are on display at Timber Trail now, but after a few decades they will fade.

In addition to Bagby's honored entries, he submitted three more that narrowly missed qualifying to hang at the convention.

He has been creating photographs for nearly 15 years, and has been honored for his work before. "But nothing has ever compared with this. I'm really thrilled with the award."

In addition to winning first place, Bagby was elected to the board of directors for the state photographers' group.

He didn't plan to become such an accomplished still photographer when he was a boy. "I wanted to be a movie director," Bagby said.

He read books about photography from the public library in McAlester, Oklahoma. He also read magazines, but, "my pictures never looked like

"Life," he said.

So he kept at it out of frustration.

His first darkroom was a four-foot-high closet, which was tall enough for him at the time. He used his mother's Pyrex baking dishes for developing trays.

In high school he worked on the yearbook and was a football placekicker. Then he entered the University of Oklahoma as a technical drama major, or scene designer.

"I learned a lot about lighting," he said. Bagby switched into journalism when he decided job possibilities in drama were slim.

"Unemployment in the film industry was 70 percent," he said.

After receiving his journalism bachelor's degree, he moved to New York and taught photography at a summer camp. He wanted to work for Kodak in Rochester, but he didn't get

that job.

He went to work at a small daily newspaper in Oklahoma and won photography awards. Then he became sports writer at The Ruidoso News.

In 1981, he started at Timber Trail. Bagby hasn't completely given up his dream of a movie career. "I've worked on a couple of screenplays," he said.

He and his wife, Antoinette, have four children, Gina, Michael, Monica and Ryan. They also own a liver-and-white spaniel named Freelance J. Photog.

At least the dog has a name. Many photographers remain anonymous.

"You can show a photo of Lee Harvey Oswald to people, but can they tell you the photographer's name?" he asked. People usually can't do that, even if they are impressed by the print.

"It bothers me a lot," Bagby admits. Photographs are an art medium along with oil and canvas, he said.

"Photography is kind of a poor man's art," he said. You don't have to be wealthy to own a photographic portrait of yourself.

"When you buy a photo, you're not buying paper," he said, "you're buying an image."

When he creates those images, Bagby isn't making photos or taking photos. "Once in a while I capture a photo," he said.

"A good photo should be a record and tell a story, even a simple one," he said.

"One of the neatest moments" that ever happened to him in photography occurred when a wedding photograph told a story. A mother looked at the bride and realized her little girl wasn't little any more.

A painter selects the most pleasant

profiles. Bagby also uses complimentary techniques.

"I try for a soft look on women, a cute look on children and a strong look on men," Bagby said.

He added, "Children are the best people in the world. I love to photograph them." They aren't as self-conscious as older people, he noted.

"I try to get adults to relax," he said. That could mean working in their homes rather than in the studio. Photos can be like paintings in some ways, but have an advantage over acrylic or pastel portraits.

"Photography, by its very nature, allows you to work rapidly," he said. A photographer can create a certain pose, then change a subject's clothes, position or background. A painter

can't do that.

Also, just as some people are better painters than others, some photographers are better.

"Talent's kind of like a really dull knife," he said. "You have to keep sharpening it against a hone." That keeps it sharpened. Some knives are sharper than others from the start, he added.

Those who have talent for creating images can be commercial photographers of things and scenes, or they can be "people photographers."

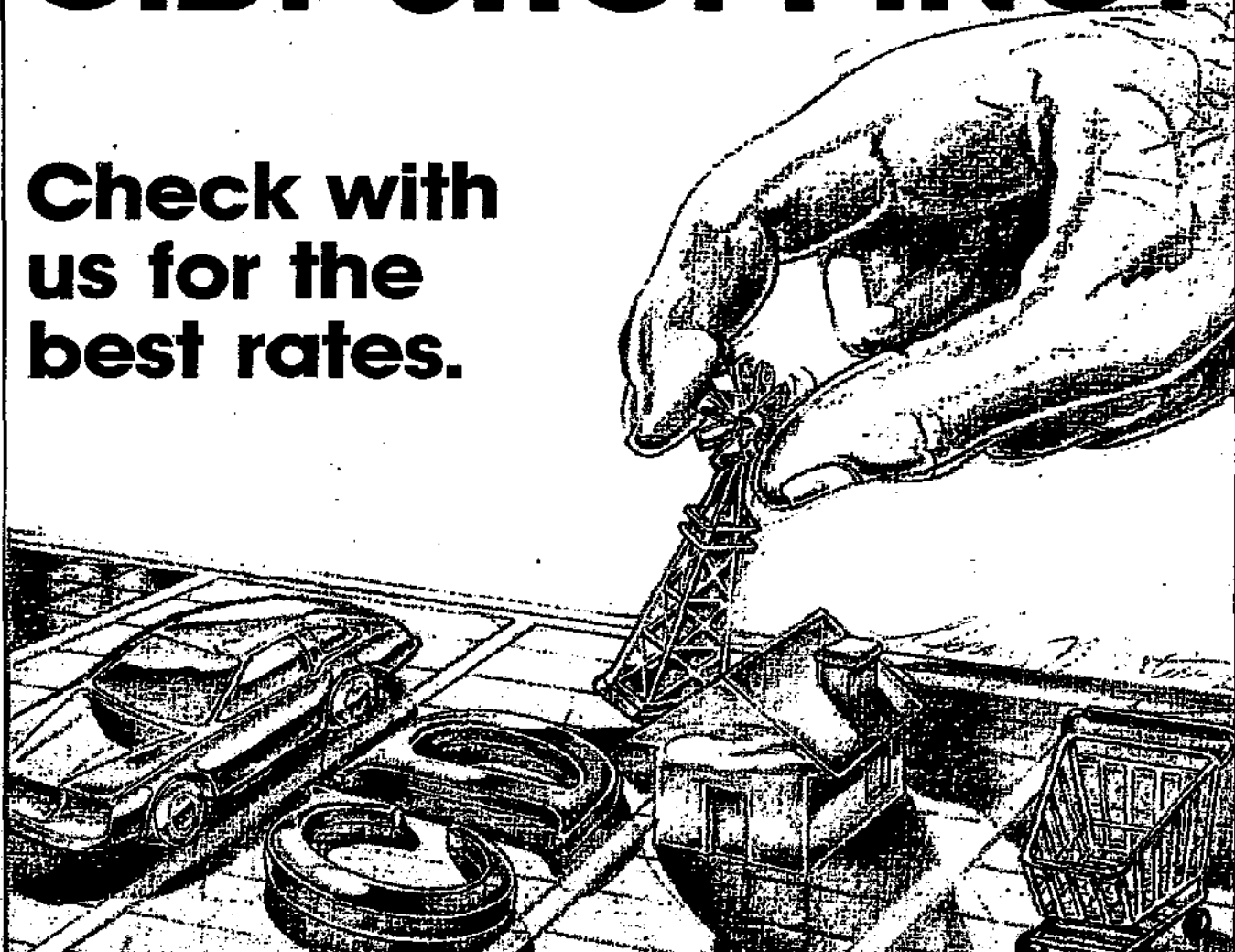
"If I had my druthers, I'd be a commercial photographer," Bagby said, noting the financial rewards associated with advertising work. For personal satisfaction, however, he prefers his work with people.



A portrait in black and white titled "Li'l Bill" won accolades of New Mexico photographers. Subject of the portrait is Bill Myers of Ruidoso.

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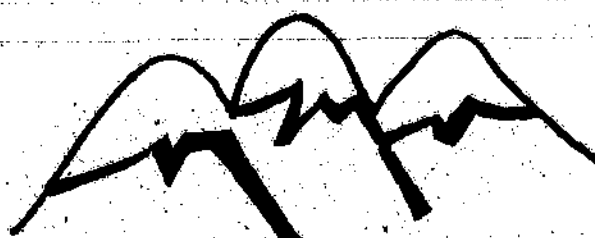
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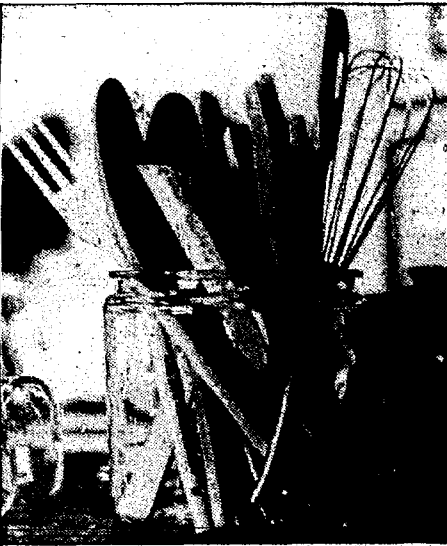
