'No' to more P.O. boxes

The Ruidoso village council decided Tuesday this was not the time to lift the moratorium on placement of neighborhood box units (NBUs) by the U.S. Postal Service.

Postmaster Bernie Lechman told the council at its regular meeting the Postal Service would be willing to work with the village to determine "pleasing locations" for NBUs. The council, however, told Lechman to request that his superior from the district office come to Ruidoso for an on-site study of the mail situation.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter acknowledged "a very good working relationship" with Lechman. Potter expressed doubts about the workability of NBUs in Ruidoso, citing traffic and encroachment problems in the village.

Asked about alternatives to NBUs, Lechman mentioned a "contract station" on Highway 37 north, and an unmanned station or stations where standard post office boxes could be used

Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter said the council would be willing to work with the Postal Service, but that he wanted to see some concrete proposals

Also Tuesday, the council approved a compromise on a proposed sign for the planned Taco Villa restaurant, although a spokesman for the business said the compromise was unacceptable

Architect Kenneth Taft had asked the council to overrule the Planning and Zoning Commission and grant two variances to the new (and as yet unadopted) sign ordinance. The first

would have allowed a sign on the building front as well as on the street, and the second would have allowed the signs' total square footage to exceed the allowable limit in the ordinance

The restaurant site on Sudderth is technically a corner lot, because of an access right of way running next to it, so it was allowed a building sign on the side. Taft wanted that sign to be on the building front.

'A sign ordinance should have a human element to make it work," said Taft, arguing for the variances Councillors expressed concern about granting a variance before the sign ordinance was adopted formally, however

Evans' compromise would have allowed the front and street signs, but

only if their total square footage was within the allowable limit for one sign. His motion passed 4-2, with Sherman Atwood and John Underwood voting against

Taft had said the compromise would force the business to reduce the size of its signs to below the standards needed to compete, and that such a reduction was not a possibility

The council also heard a presenta tion from Al McChesney and Rex Skellett, who were contracted by the village to draw up plans for a proposed community recreation and cultural center The center would be built around the present municipal swimming pool at School House Park

Council drops three committees

The Ruidoso village council cleaned house Tuesday afternoon, abolishing several village committees and requiring better accountability from others. The council also gave the Planning and Zoning Commission broader powers

The council dissolved the cemetery board, the Ruidoso water board and the business registration committee herause all three were inactive Village manager Jim Hine assured the council that former cemetery board chairman Billie Clark would keep him informed of cemetery needs

She said she did not think the funds were being misused, but that she wanted LT(' to see actual invoices and approve expenditures before village clerk Leon Eggleston wrote a check She also moved that original invoices be submitted to Eggleston Shaw also moved that bids be invited whenever possible such as for printing-on lodgers' tax expenditures

Her motion, which passed nanin per diem limit for any trips funded by lodgers' tax funds. The limit would be the same as required for any village officials

The council also agreed that since P&Z member Ray Bishop has moved within the village limits and has a term that does not expire until March 1985, he will remain a member in good standing

P&Z members are required to live within the village limits Bishop formerly lived in Alto and had been suggested for replacement by Mayor George White

Approval for sign permits will be shifted from the Architectural Plans Review Committee to the Planning

Softball was the topic again at the Ruidoso Downs trustees meeting Mondav

Garnet Andres, of the Men's Fast Pitch Softball League, requested four nights including Tuesday for use of the village's ballfield However. trustees told him they had decided during their last meeting how to divide the seven nights this summer

The Women's Slow-Pitch League plays on Mondays, the Men's Slow-Pitch League plays on Tuesdays and Fridays, and the Fast-Pitch league gets Wednesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays

Four groups seek lodgers' tax funds

The Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) Wednesday accepted 1984-85 budget requests from four groups, and discussed possible ways of increasing advertising funds for Ruidoso

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, Ruidoso Business Association, the American Contract Bridge League and the Gerald Tully Team Roping Contest all submitted requests.

LTC will be conducting several workshops in the near future to determine a budget that it will submit to the village council for approval next month.

The Chamber of Commerce submitted an official request for \$56,960, with a request to consider an additional \$5,000 to \$6,000 to cover lobbying efforts for such measures as matching state funds for promotional expenditures

The request includes \$2,000 for membership in Sun Country regional tourism organization; \$15,000 for printing costs directly related to tourism promotion; \$7,500 for travel agent familiarization tours; \$12,500 for trade shows; and \$12,460 for contractual services.

The request is for \$21,460 more than the chamber received last year for the same items. The request does not include funds for Ruidoso advertising that are funneled through the Chamber.

The largest increase is for familiarization tours, which were not budgeted for last year.

Chamber president James Paxton said he thought the personal contact involved in the familiarization tours and the trade shows were very effective in promoting Ruidoso.

Printing costs also increased to \$15,000 from last year's allotment of \$10,500. Printing costs cover the Ruidoso brochure, lodging guide, restaurant guide and other community brochures.

Contractual services covers expenses for a tourist counselor at the chamber who handles phone, mail and personal inquiries, according to a chamber note attached to the budget request

The request for contractual services has been increased from last year's allotment of \$7,500, to \$12,460.

The Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) ordinance also will be changed to give the commission broader powers and bring it in conformity with state statutes.


The council agreed to give the commission final authority on all planning and zoning matters except annexations, vacation of rights of way, and appeals Currently the commission has final say only on platting and planning matters, said village attorney Lee Huckstep

The ordinance also will be changed to require a majority vote of the complete village council, not just a quorum, to overrule any P&Z recommendations.

Councillor Bill Karn requested that Sierra Blanca Airport Commission chairman Fred Heckman submit a written report updating the council on progress toward obtaining a new air port on Fort Stanton mesa. The council reappointed Heckman to the commission

Huckstep was also instructed to rewrite the village ordinance concerning the library board, changing it from a controlling to an advisory board Huckstep also will add a clause to the personnel board or dinance requiring that its members live within the village limits

Cut your fuelwood early, Forest Service suggests

Spring is here, so it's time to oil up your chainsaw and go cut firewood for next winter.

"Wait a minute," you might say. "I never cut my firewood until the frost is on the pumpkin."

U.S. Forest Service Timber Management Specialist Mike Funston wants people to get into the habit of cutting fuelwood early. And he can

cite several good reasons for doing so. Cool weather is nice to work in. he pointed out. Also, the fact that the roads and the forest floor are dry means woodcutters' vehicles do less damage to soil and vegetation.

Cutting early also gives green wood time to dry, Funston noted. He noted that the wood cutting public gradually will have to get used to cutting and burning commercial soft wood-ponderosa pine, white flr, Douglas fir-as the supply of accessible pinon and juniper on the Lincoln National Forest runs out.

The soft woods need four to six months' drying time, while pinon and juniper can burn "green" (the same day they are cut).

All wood cutting on the Lincoln Forest requires a permit, which is available at the Smokey Bear Ranger Station in Ruidoso. Funston compares the permit to a hunting license-call-

ing it a "down dead wood hunting permit.'

A permit does not guarantee that the bearer will find wood on every acre of land in the permit area, he pointed out.

The Forest Service does what it can to help wood cutters succeed, however. Along with the permits, people are given a map of the fuelwood area for which they are permitted.

Wood cutting is concentrated into certain areas for several reasons, Funston noted. Because Forest Service manpower is limited, limiting the areas helps allow interaction of the agency and the public in the field, This interaction is something Funston values. He said that when wood cutters understand what the Forest Service is trying to do in managing wood resources, they are better about complying with the rules.

Areas are rotated on a one year on, one year off basis. This limits impact on the land and improves relations with private landowners whose property might be impacted by wood cutters seeking access to the National Forest.

A tree that falls in an area closed to wood cutting will not have time to rot before the area is open again, Funston pointed out.

other areas more noticeable. Funston acknowledged a serious problem of illegal cutting, and said the Forest Service catches relatively few offenders. Stiffer fines imposed recently put more teeth in the laws against illegal cutting, however, and he hopes this will help. Persons who notice suspicious activity in the forest are

The limit on wood taken from the forest is 10 cords per household per year. Funston, who heats his own home with wood, said he used less than three cords per season. Efficient use of wood as a fuel is

urged to report it to the Forest Ser-

something else the Forest Service seeks to educate the public on. According to Funston, wood goes three times further as a fuel in a woodstove than in a ficeplace.

Emphasis is also placed on cutting efficiency. Cutters are asked to take everything down to a two-inch diameter, and to cut stumps as close to the ground as possible.

Funston pointed out that most people-better than 95 percent-do try to comply with what the Forest ervice asks of wood cutters.

"It's very gratifying," he said. Those people gather wood to help heat their homes, they have a fun recreational experience on the forest. Also, designating specific areas and they help the Forest Service makes persons who are cutting in manage a very valuable resource.

School board handles personnel, finances, school names

During a three-hour meeting Tuesday, the Ruidoso Board of Education named the new middle school, rehired most district employees, and handled financial matters.

The board voted unanimously on the monetary items, including moving about \$4,000 from one part of the budget to another to help pay for Cooper Henderson, the new athletic director.

The middle school will move to the present high school building near Sudderth Drive and be called Ruidoso Middle School.

Superintendent Sid Miller reported on budget progress to the board. He suggested a pay raise for employees of about four percent next year, which could amount to more for some individuals because of the salary structure.

Miller also outlined tentative plans for hiring eight more certified employees and four non-certified workers.

"I can never remember hiring more than four additional teachers in a year before," he said.

However, it was pointed out that the district must keep pace with ballooning enrollment. Miller said the district waited to add personnel until completion of the new high school and other facilities.

Possibilities for added teachers in-

clude a second-grade teacher, a \downarrow physical education teacher for lower grades, a middle school counselor. English and shop teachers, a high school teacher and a special education teacher. An assistant principal at Ruidoso High School also might be ad-

Additional non-certified employees could include a library aide and three custodians. Miller stressed the proposals were tentative. "We may have to drop this back," he said. During the April meeting each

year, school boards handle many personnel matters. Tuesday was no exception.

The board named Sarah Austin a new bus driver. She expects to go to bus driving school this summer.

Board members also accepted the resignation of Pat Torrez as White Mountain schools custodian. They named Josephine Para to replace her. In addition, third-grade teacher Mark Kashmar resigned effective at the end of this year. He plans to teach in Santa Cruz, Bolivia, next year.

High school secretary Debbje Owen also resigned. She and her husband, Wayne, are opening a nursery. "I would be doing less than my best at both jobs," Owen wrote in her

resignation letter. Judy Shaw, high school speech and drama teacher, also resigned at the end of the year. Her one-year certificate is expiring.

The upper elementary grades will move to the current middle school building near the airport. It will be called White Mountain Intermediate School.

The locations and names of White Mountain Elementary School and Nob Hill Elementary School will remain the same.

Before the closed meeting, the board members voted 5-0 to increase per diem allowances for teachers who travel outside the district.

Miller asked for an in-state allowance increase of about 14 percent to \$50 per day. Out-of-state allowances were also raised, but mileage pay stayed at 22 cents per mile. Employees use the allowances on school business trips.

The board also discussed district attempts to get three additional school buses for 1984-1985. Although orders have been put in, the buses will not arrive by the beginning of the school year, transportation head Don Weems warned.

The school officials discussed the merits of having one contractor running all buses for the district. Presently, five contractors split the buses. Most have one bus, but Rick Simpson runs 10.

Miller said having just one contractor would increase efficiency. Board member Don Swalander countered, "That seems kind of like a restraint of trade."

After some discussion, Swalander said, "I kind of changed my mind." He moved to direct the staff to form a policy about bus contract arrangements. He also moved for approval of the three new buses. The board agreed unanimously.

Permission also was granted to KTNT-FM to broadcast school athletic events next year. The station is expected to go on the air soon. In two matters of cooperation with

the Village of Ruidoso, the board

agreed the district should pay \$50,000 per year for three years to help pay for sewer on Gavilan Canyon, The board also reviewed a lease

with the village that had been approved by the state Board of Finance. About 22 acres of land will be leased for three years, with an option for up to five more years.

The village plans to use the land for recreational purposes. It will pay a

fee of \$1 per year. High school' diagnostician Sandy Gladden gave a brief presentation about Career Day, which was Monday. She and board members warmly thanked members of the Altrusa Club of Ruidoso for their work on the project,

"I can't express appreciation to Altrusa enough, and to the presenters," Gladden said. The fourth annual event featured speakers from 60 fields. This year's focus was telecommunications.

In other action, board members opened three bids on football uniforms. Miller, Ruidoso High School principal Tom Hansen and new coach Henderson will review them.

In addition, the board called for bids on instructional supplies.

The next school board meeting is a special session planned for Tuesday, April 24. Members expect to open bids on athletic equipment and supplies and on site improvement.

Robbery of cabin clerk reported

'What a way to start a week off,' Donna Garlisi said after lunchtime Monday. The office clerk at Sherwood Forest Cabins reported she was robbed of about \$55 by three Hispanic men in their late teens to early 30s.

The cabins are on Main Road in the Upper Canyon.

One guy came up with a gun. It looked like a cannon," she said. She said he held it to her head and twisted her arm behind her back to get her to open the office cabinet.

The armed robber and the other two men spoke in Spanish and broken English, according to Garlisi. "I've never seen them before," she added.

"One guy opened the cabinet with a switchblade," she said. The men took \$40 from the office and \$15 from her wallet, Garlisi reported.

The trio left on three three-wheel all

terrain vehicles, she said. One was

red, one yellow, and one was blue and white. The vehicles had New Mexico license plates, she said.

The robbers rode in three directions, she said. "The one with the money went toward town.

"The police were here in seconds," she said.

Ruidoso police searched the surrounding area extensively, said Ruidoso detective Gonzalo Cordova. The department also set up roadblocks at the intersection of Sudderth and Mechem drives, in Ponderosa Heights and on 5th Street, said Cordova.

Officers found no suspects.

The police are now searching for three Hispanic males in connection

with the armed robbery. One suspect

is described as being in his early 30s, six-foot tall and thin, with brown eyes, long kinky brown hair in a pony tail, and a large scar near his left elbow.

The second suspect is described as being in his late 20s or early 30s, fivefoot two inches with a heavy build. He is believed to have brown eyes, short

brown kinky hair and dark pockmarks.

The third suspect is described as five feet tall and thin, with hazel eyes and brown hair.

Garlisi was the victim of a robbery in Roswell before moving to Ruidoso, she said. She has lived here since January.

'You can be sure I'm going to keep the doors locked from now on," she said after the robbery.

It would include an all-purpose room, a cover over the pool, a theatre and four racquetball courts. Total cost of the project, planned in four phases, was put at slightly more than \$3.5 million.

-Heard from engineer Tim Collins that sewer construction projects would be starting next week at Alto Crest and Gavilan Canyon. Gavilan Canyon Road from Meander to Bog Springs will be closed for two to three months, it was reported.

-Discussed lack of water pressure for fire fighting in Ponderosa Heights. Kay Hatcher, who saw two neighboring houses burn down Saturday night, brought up the matter.

Potter said there were plans for a water storage tank in Ponderosa Heights, but no money to pay for one. It was decided the village administra-, tion would investigate recent rulings of the Legislature that allow for supplemental gross receipts taxes to finance infrastructure improvements.

--Approved Ordinance 84-5, for the Ponderosa Heights sewer project.

-Approved Ordinance 84-6, setting fines for the penalty assessment program for traffic misdemeanors.

-Approved Ordinance 84-7, changing the designation of councilmen to councillors, increasing the governing body from five to seven members, and removing items from the Municipal Code that were duplicated in the Uniform Traffic Code.

-Heard from councillor Evans thatthe BRW planning firm would develop guidelines for an annexation policy in its work on a new comprehensive plan.

-Agreed to have Potter negotiate with the school system on having the village do some paving work at the new high school, to help the school deal with its revenue shortfall created by the Legislature. Atwood wondered if the street department had time to spare.

"I don't like government competing with private enterprise," Atwood added.

Potter said other municipalities, particularly-Hobbs, have worked with school systems to good results. He noted that any agreements would be taken to the council for approval.

-Approved hiring of McChesney Associates and Tim Collins to write bid specifications for the White Mountain recreational complex.

-Approved the lone bid of Barnett Carpet for carpeting for the public library, \$3,066.35.

-Approved the bid of Lewallen Hobbs for water lines labor, noting that the previously awarded bidder did not have the license to do the work.

-Approved the bid of Ed Black Chevrolet, Albuquerque, on a dump truck for the sewer department, \$11,929.68.

-Approved board and committee appointments with the exception of Personnel Board and Planning and Zoning Commission. Mayor George White was asked to present his choices for those committees at the next regular council meeting.

-Set a public hearing on an annexation request for land adjoining Alpine Village Road and Forest Heights subdivision for 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 1, at village hall. —Approved various Planning and

Zoning items previously approved by Planning and Zoning Commission.

The Ruidoso Business Association (RBA) submitted a request for \$4,792 based on expenditures for travel to trade shows, a slide presentation exhibited at the shows, and advertising in national magazines.

RBA was originally allotted \$2,000 this year for aid in producing the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival. LTC approved an additional \$2,000 at Wednesday's meeting to cover trade show and advertising expenditures

RBA president Glen Ferguson was instructed to submit the \$4,000 expenditure to the state for possible matching funds. Any of the funds provid-ed by the state will be returned to the lodgers' tax fund.

The Alamogordo Unit of the American Contract Bridge League requested \$1,000 to help promotion of its annual Sectional Bridge Tournament. The tournament will be at the Inn of

the Mountain Gods November 2-4. It attracted 700 to 800 people last year. The Gerald Tully Team Roping

Contest requested \$1,400 to purchase two saddles for the contest, which is expected to attract over 1,000 twoman teams early in June.

After all budget requests had been submitted, LTC member Rod Adamson said he hoped the committee would receive some unusual advertising requests outside of conventional newspaper and magazine advertising. LTC member JoAnn Farris said she would like to see Ruidoso pur-chase billboard space for advertising.

He also said he would like to see better monitoring of response to advertising,

Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth said Ruidoso ranked fourth among 61 advertisers in responses to a Texas Monthly magazine travel planner. He also said

he has requested some sort of response monitoring for Ruidoso's ads from the Epstein advertising agency.

LTC member Clark Carpenter also lamented the amount of money Ruidoso has for advertising. The LTC had a budget of \$159,235 for 1983-84.

"We really have an embarrassingly small amount of money for media advertising," said Carpenter. He. suggested a one-quarter percent increase in the local gross receipts tax to be used for advertising. He predicted the tax would generate in the range of \$400,000 for Ruidoso.

Chamber president James Paxton said LTC could generate approximately \$60,000 immediately by raising the lodgers' tax from the current two percent to three percent. The quarter-percent gross receipts tax would have to be authorized the state Legislature.

Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball coach Ron Geyer has been relieved of his coaching duties effective the end of the 1983-84 school year.

Geyer, who was the Warriors' head coach for two seasons, also will be relieved of his teaching duties at the end of the school year. That announcement was made at-Tuesday's monthly school board meeting at the Ruldoso school district administrative office, Girls assistant volleyball coach Nancy Holland also was relieved of her coaching and teaching duties effective the end of the 1983-84 school year.

"I'm very disappointed in not being rehired as basketball coach after only two years of being head coach, because I feel there has been tremendous improvement in the basketball program," Geyer said. "I have become very close to all of the boys and we are now competitive with all the schools in our district."

Ruidoso High School prinicipal Tom Hansen would not comment on the decision not to rehire Geyer and Holland.

Geyer had a 4-38 record in his two seasons as head coach, In 1982-83, his record was 0-20,

and this past season the Warriors posted a 4-18 record. However, the 1983-84 Warrior varsity was competitive in most of the games, with the majority of

The Capitan village council took a few steps closer to the establishment. of a planning and zoning commission for the Village of Capitan.

During the Monday night meeting of the council. Capitan trustees heard Mayor David Cummins name David Strickland and Bill Allred to the proposed Capitan Planning and Zoning Commission. Cummins said he would meet with three other Capitan residents before the next meeting of the council, and complete the fivemember commission at that meeting.

In other planning and zoning developments, trustees heard a presentation from Lincoln County **Planning and Zoning Commission** chairman Bill Seelbach and county manager Suzanne Cox.

Seelbach outlined the development of the county's planning and zoning organization, from reliance on a vague, two-page document 10 years ago, to present efforts at further defining the detailed Subdivision Regulations. Seelbach suggested that the future Capitan Planning and Zoning Commission first do a complete inventory of the village.

"You may be very surprised at what's out there," he said.

Seelbach also stressed the amount of information and technical help available to the village from such groups as the Soil Conservation Service, the Environmental Improvement Division of the state Health and Environment Department, the State Engineer and the State Highway Department. He also mentioned the importance of zoning in the county and in Capitan.

She suggested that the Capitan group and the county Planning and Zoning Commission set up a joint workshop to go over the process of establishing a planning and zoning commission for Capitan.

village's insurance. Heard comments from Capitan resident Virginia Pogue on the water situation. Pogue complained that she had been left without water several times recently, and suggested that the trustees not consider any capital simprovement expenses until the water situation is resolved.

She also said she would bring a lawsuit for discrimination against the village if she were again left without water while other parts of the village had water.

"I want water up there if you have water down,here," she said. "I am just fed up with this,"

Pogue also complained that she had had to pay for water never received, alleging that her water meter continued to run even when there was no water reaching her home.

"I've paid for a lot of hot air from this village," she said.

-Heard a report from Cummins on several proposals the village has received for a new village hall. He said offers to sell property to the village have been received from Tommy Allen, Olan Booher and Pat L. Huey.

Cummins also outlined a proposal of enlarging the present village hall, as submitted by the village ad-ministrative staff. The trustees voted to make arrangements to view the subject properties.

The mayor stressed that these were only proposals, and that the council

would probably not take any action soon on expenditure of capital improvement funds.

ding water of good quality would be given more emphasis than finding water in quantity. Goodwin said the board had voted to recommend that the bid of Keys Drilling of Roswell be accepted, The trustees did accept Keys' bid.

Goodwin-also-reported the arrival Friday in Capitan of Jim Millington of the Albuquerque firm of Andrews, Asbury and Robert, the firm that has been hired by the village for work on the water situation.

According to Goodwin, Millington began working to bring the 100,000-gallon tank into commission. Goodwin also reported that a Forest Service helicopter pad was being considered as a site for the future filtration system.





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Dale Light new IMG tennis pro



New inn of the Mountain Gods tennis pro Dale Light plans several tennis activities in coming weeks to acquaint local players with tennis facilities and programs at the resort.

Like many tennis players, Dale Light has taken a wandering route to where he is now.

The new tennis professional at the Inn of the Mountain Gods has played and taught tennis from Pennsylvania to Puerto Rico. He spent four years as head tennis coach at New Mexico State University.

Now he is faced with the job of waking up a sleeping tennis program at the Inn, and he sees the Ruldoso tennis community as a key element in his plans.

"My feeling is that I want to see those courts occupied," he said, referring to the six outdoor and two indoor courts at the Inn.

Light, who hails from Hershey, Pennsylvania, took up tennis at an early age. But he played baseball well enough to start college with a baseball scholarship. Walking by the tennis courts one day, he decided the racquet sport was

more for him.

"My real love was really tennis, he said. Light played collegiate tennis at Shippensburg State University in Pennsylvania, holding down the number one position on his team for two years.

Following college, he had a go at the pro circuit, playing money tour-naments along the East Coast. A shoulder injury and a desire to make a more dependable living than pro tennis offered led him to a tennis teaching job in Pennsylvania.

Two years later, Light went to Puerto Rico to take a pro's job at The Caribbean resort. He was employed by Peter Burwash International. an organization that places tennis pros all over the world.

Light was very impressed with the Burwash teaching method.

"I consider (Burwash) to be the foremost teacher in the country today," he said.

In 1979, Light went to Las Cruces. He coached the men's and women's teams at NMSU through the 1963

Today, Light lists the psychology of competition, along with fitness through tennis, as areas of interest to him as a teacher. He wants to see players get a lot of physical workout while playing tennis, through what he calls "aerobic tennis."

Light points out that his first concern here, however, is promoting his tennis program, He said it seemed a lot of local people were not aware of the "beautiful bubble" (the Inn's twocourt indoor facility).

Light wants to encourage yearround tennis, through programs like round-robin doubles leagues for local men and women players. He invited any tennis players-or persons who would like to learn the game—to con-tact him to discuss ideas for programs.

The pro plans a "Tennis Kickoff Week" April 23-30 to help familiarize the public with the tennis program at the Inn,

Wednesday, April 25, will be Ladies Day, with free clinics and play for beginners (9 a.m. to 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. to 6 p.m.) and intermediates (10 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. to 7 p.m.). Saturday, April 28, will be Youth

Day, Beginning at 9 a.m., clinics for kids will run all morning.

On Sunday, April 29, there will be a men's tennis clinic and doubles play with Light from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

A spring clearance sale in the pro shop will coincide with the week of clinics. Light also plans a tournament for local players in May.

There will be no charge for any of the kickoff week tennis activities, Light said, but he asked that players. sign up beforehand by calling the tennis shop at 257-5141, extension 7425.

Light's enthusiasm for his favorite sport is something he wants others to. share.

"The fun is there," he said. "It's just a question of getting the people

The National Association of Realtors has adopted that saying as the theme for national Private Property Week, April 8-14.

It has always been part of "The American Dream" to own one's home, and our right to do so is another of those freedoms we tend to take for granted—but shouldn't.

Private property rights can be defined as an aggregate of rights guaranteed and protected by the government. It generally includes the rights to dispose of property in every legal way, to possess it, to use it and to exclude everyone else from interfering with it.

According to the United Nations, the U.S. has more home ownership than any other nation, with 64 percent of the adult population owning homes. Comparative figures are 54 percent for the United Kingdom, 51 percent for France and 37 percent for West Germany.

Count that as one more affirmation of our good fortune to be Americans.

The contribution of the real estate industry to the economy of Ruidoso is something else that probably tends to be taken for granted. More than \$70 million in property changes hands each year through Board of Realtors-affiliated offices alone, and the industry's work force helps support the entire business community.

When you sit back in your "castle" tonight, or when you dream of someday owning one, be thankful for private property.—TP

Signs, signs, signs. The Ruidoso area is well populated with nearly every description of signs, ranging from squatty real estate signs that spot the front yards of many homes and businesses in Ruidoso, to mammoth billboards that broadcast the oohs and aahs of lower Lincoln Coun-

Among the multitudes, however, are some signs that are more com-plex in meaning than first glance will tell.

Take, for example, a sign along a lonely stretch of Highway 70 in Ruidoso Downs. It reads, "Do Not Throw Trash." Sounds simple enough, right?

But what about motorists who simply "toss" their trash on the roadside? Does this sign imply that it is okay to "dump" trash or "pitch" trash? And what about people who "jettison" their trash?

Imagine, if you will, two police of-ficers carefully watching the stretch of road protected by this sign, A motorist passes by, and left-handed, flings a balled-up brown bag of unknown contents into the roadside ditch.

"Looked like a hook-shot to me," one officer might say. "I think it was

a throw, whaddaya think, Sam." "Oh, I don't know, Joe. There was a lot of wrist action there," the other of-ficer might respond. "I'd say it was a toss.'


Then there's the sign, also on the side of Highway 70, that reads, "No Parking Between Signs." The next closest sign-reading 17'-10'*-is about three feet away. The signs are in an area that is bounded within five fast or alther side by Highway 70 and feet on either side by Highway 70 and a sidewalk,

The signs make it very clear that no parking shall take place in that three-foot by five-foot space. These signs are doing an excellent job of preventing congestion in this prime parking area.

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Heavy Rail derails Derby foes

Easy Demand and Kingdom set, the two favorites in Sunday's \$92,636 West Texas Derby at Sunland Park, slugged it out with one another during most of the prestigious 400-yard dash. The two, running in side by side

positions, were practically on even terms from start to finish.

But neither was able to hold off a-wilting onslaught from the 30-1 longshot, Heavy Rail.

Heavy Rail rushed up powerfully in the final two or three strides and surged to a head victory before a seasonalrecord crowd of 4,196. Larry Hunt, who was able to wring every ounce of energy out of his mount, was the winning pilot. First place was worth \$46,318.

Easy Demand, a 4-5 favorite owned by the Easy Demand Partnership of El Paso, Texas, finished second and pulled in \$15,748. Jerry Nicodemus was up. Kingdom Jet, piloted by Lawrence Young at 7-2 odds, hit the wire only a nose behind Easy Demand. Third was worth \$9.263.

Heavy Rail refunded mutual prices of \$82.80 to win, \$10 to place, \$5 to show. The colt—who held the seventhbest qualifying time—is the property of Kenneth and Charlotte Hutchison of Pine, Colorado. Charles Knight is the trainer.

His conquest of the West Texas Derby marked his second outing of 1984, and his first triumph of the year. As a two-year-old in 1983, he was a crack performer, running up a 4-2-1 record from 11 starts and banking \$50,829.

Sunday clearly a red letter day for the owners of Heavy Rail, but it was also a special occasion for the Sunland Park management. Wagering on the 12-race program ballooned up to \$475,253, That was the highest handle so far in the '83-84 season) the previous high was \$457,665 on Sunday, March 4). Sunday's handle was also the tenth-best in Sunland Park history.

Easy Demand, a gelding, earned the role of West Texas Derby favorite on the strength of his impressive length win in the trials, and his top qualifying time of 19.645 seconds. -Fans who backed-him in the Derbycollected mutuel payoffs of \$3 and \$2.60. H. Don Farris is the trainer.

Kingdom Jet, the third-top qualifier at 19.770, handed out \$4.20 to show. The colt is owned by David Young of Belle Glade, Florida.

Both Easy Demand (coming out of the number 9 post) and Kingdom Jet (number 10) broke alertly, but just off the lead. The two quickly dug in and began fighting it out. In the early go-ing, Heavy Rail (who came out of number 7) was about one and one-half to two lengths off the lead,

On A Stormy Day, a 5-1 shot, wrangled the early lead from the 50-1 outsider, Amazing Prophecy. At the midway point, On A Stormy Day was still in front, and still moving at a rapid clip.

Easy Demand and Kingdom Jet gained steadily in the final portions of the dash, but Heavy Rail swept by the two of them with a remarkable acceleration. The move came near the wire and left little doubt as to Heavy Rail's superiority.

Heavy Rail was clocked in 19.66 seconds (with a slight tailwind).

On A Stormy Day held on for fourth and earned \$6,484. The rest of the field checked in this way: 5th-Truly A Bunny, earning \$4,631; 6th—Amazing Prophecy, \$3,705; 7th—Sassy Wrangler, 3\$2,779; 8th—Warm Thoughts, \$1,852; 9th-BCR Hempens Baby, \$926; 10th-Patti Dash, \$926. Heavy Rail is by Angel's Jet Rail out of Heavy Copper (a

thoroughbred).

Here's how owner Hutchison sized up the win: "I knew he could run that kind of race. That trial race was his first of the year, and he ran a poor race. We knew if he broke well he'd have a shot. He has a heck of a late kick.?

Jockey 'Hunt observed: "In the trials we were four lengths behind at the start. This time, we were only a length behind. I didn't think we had won it until we got to the wire."

For trainer Knight, the West Texas Derby marked his 19th start of the Sunland season—and his first win.


Hutchison indicated the colt would be shipped to Los Alamitos on the West Coast, then to Ruidoso Downs.

The path to the West Texas Derby The path to the West Texas Derby began on Friday, March 23, when five trial heats were held. The star of that day was Easy Demand, who turned his sixth career outing into the top qualifying performance for the Der-by. Heavy Rail wound up fifth in that same heat (one and one-marter same heat (one and one-quarter lengths behind) as a 16-1 shot.

Shortly after the trials, a partner-ship headed by El Paso insurance executive Don Luciano was formed to purchase Easy Demand from ownertrainer H. Don Farris. The sale price was not disclosed.





Heavy Rail derails Derby foes

Easy Demand and Kingdom set, the two favorites in Sunday's \$92,636 West, Texas Derby at Sunland Park, slugged it out with one another during most of the prestigious 400-yard dash.

The two, running in side by side positions, were practically on even terms from start to finish.

But neither was able to hold off a wilting onslaught from the 30-1 longshot, Heavy Rail.

Heavy Rail rushed up powerfully in the final two or three strides and surged to a head victory before a seasonalrecord crowd of 4,196. Larry Hunt, who was able to wring every ounce of energy out of his mount, was the winning pilot. First place was worth \$46,318.

Easy Demand, a 4-5 favorite owned by the Easy Demand Partnership of El Paso, Texas, finished second and pulled in \$15,748. Jerry Nicodemus was up. Kingdom Jet, piloted by Lawrence Young at 7-2 odds, hit the wire only a nose behind Easy Demand. Third was worth \$9,263.

Heavy Rail refunded mutuel prices of \$62.80 to win, \$10 to place, \$5 to show. The colt-who held the seventhbest qualifying time—is the property of Kenneth and Charlotte Hutchison of Pine, Colorado, Charles Knight is the trainer.

His conquest of the West Texas Derby marked his second outing of 1984, and his first triumph of the year. As a two-year-old in 1983, he was a crack performer, running up a 4-2-1 record from 11 starts and banking \$50,829.

Sunday clearly a red letter day for the owners of Heavy Rail, but it was also a special occasion for the Sunland Park management. Wagering on the 12-race program ballooned up to \$475.253. That was the highest handle so far in the '83-84 season) the previous high was \$457,665 on Sunday, March 4). Sunday's handle was also the tenth-best in Sunland Park history

Easy Demand, a gelding, earned the role of West Texas Derby favorite on the strength of his impressive length win in the trials, and his top qualifying time of 19.645 seconds. Fans who backed him in the Derby collected mutuel payoffs of \$3 and \$2,60. H. Don Farris is the trainer.

Kingdom Jet, the third-top qualifier at 19.770, handed out \$4,20 to show. The colt is owned by David Young of Belle Glade, Florida.

Both Easy Demand (coming out of the number 9 post) and Kingdom Jet (number 10) broke alertly, but just off the lead. The two quickly dug in and began fighting it out. In the early going, Heavy Rail (who came out of number 7) was about one and one-half

to two lengths off the lead. On A Stormy Day, a 5-1 shot, wrangled the early lead from the 50-1 outsider, Amazing Prophecy. At the midway point, On A Stormy Day was still in front, and still moving at a

rapid clip. Easy Demand and Kingdom Jet gained steadily in the final portions of the dash, but Heavy Rail swept by the two of them with a remarkable acceleration. The move came near the wire and left little doubt as to Heavy Rail's superiority.

Heavy Rail was clocked in 19.66 seconds (with a slight tailwind).

On A Stormy Day held on for fourth and earned \$6,484. The rest of the field checked in this way: 5th-Truly A Bunny, earning \$4,631; 6th-Amazing Prophecy, \$3,705; 7th-Sassy Wrangler, \$2,779; 8th-Warm Thoughts, \$1,852; 9th—BCR Hempens Baby, \$926; 10th—Patti Dash, \$926. Heavy Rall is by Angel's Jet Rail out of Heavy Copper (a out of Heavy

thoroughbred).

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Here's how owner Hutchison sized up the win: "I knew he could run that kind of race. That trial race was his first of the year, and he ran a poor race. We knew if he broke well he'd have a shot. He has a heck of a late kick."

Jockey Hunt observed: "In the trials we were four lengths behind at the start. This time, we were only a length behind, I tlidn't think we had won it until we got to the wire."


For trainer Knight, the West Texas Derby marked his 19th start of the Sunland season-and his first win.

Hutchison indicated the colt would be shipped to Los Alamitos on the West Coast, then to Ruldoso Downs. West Goast, then to Ruidoso Downs. The path to the West Texas Derby began on Friday, March 23, when five trial heats were held. The star of that day was Easy Demand, who turned his sixth career outing into the top qualifying performance for the Der-by. 


