

It's official—Chamber dues up

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board of directors unanimously approved a flat \$40 membership dues increase Friday, then went on to approve the chamber's budget for 1984-85.

Excluding new chamber members, the dues will now be \$150 a year for about 75 percent of the membership. more for the larger businesses. The increase is retroactive to July 1

The meeting was called specifically to review and look at the budget, explained board president James Paxton. He said the budget committee, which met in special session last Monday, had devised a new form for reporting the budget that he felt was now more readable and understandable

Bill Carrigan presented the new form to members, going over the

breakdown of income and expenses, including lodgers' tax funds income and how the funds will be spent.

The bottom line, according to the approved budget proposal, is that incoming and outgoing funds offset each other, leaving the chamber with a balanced budget.

Carrigan said that the budget could go into surplus if all members paid their dues. He said the chamber has an 87 percent collection rate at present, giving it an anticipated dues total of \$75,000.

That figure would jump to \$90,000, Carrigan said, if the entire membership came through on dues payments. Budgie Green, who attended the meeting as a chamber member, said last year's \$10 dues increase resulted in a 15 percent drop in membership

He predicted that this year's \$40 increase, which represents a jump of 36 percent, will result in a larger number of businesses dropping out of

the chamber. He urged the board to delay the increase.

Buddy Bundick responded, "When you go up at all you're going to lose some people." He said he did not think too many members would drop out because of the increase.

Paxton said that the dues increase still will keep chamber members at a dues level lower than or comparable to other chambers of commerce throughout the state.

On a motion from Paul Crown, the board approved the across-the-board increase. A dues increase for associate members also was approved, raising the annual payment from \$25 to \$35.

Board members also approved the budget with minor wording amendments.

The entry for "Travel and Entertainment" was changed to just "Travel," and "Other Promotions" became "Special Promotions."

Amphitheater opposed

A proposed amphitheater for the Ruidoso Summer Festival is in the center of a growing controversy between the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association (ECICWSA) and landowners adjacent to the amphitheater site.

"I can guarantee that nobody wants it up there," real estate agent Rose Peebles said of property owners in the Enchanted Mesa subdivision, which abuts the Eagle Creek land. That land has been suggested as a site for an outdoor amphitheater for the Ruidoso Summer Festival.

Peebles explained that many people had bought lots in Enchanted Mesa because of the seclusion, never suspecting that commercial development would spring up in the area. She also pointed out restrictive covenants of the subdivision that forbid commercial development.

"When I bought the land, I was given to understand that that land was not to be developed," said Lance Kirkegaard, a property owner in Enchanted Mesa, referring to the Eagle Creek land. "I didn't want to be surrounded by development."

Kirkegaard said he was concerned about the situation, and the responsibilities of the ECICWSA board members.

"It seems like their position is to protect the watershed," he said. He added that he felt the encouragement of commercial development may be outside the board's intended jurisdic-

According to Ruidoso village manager Jim Hine, an ECICWSA board member, the Eagle Creek Association is much like a private corporation. The board is formed of members appointed by the village councils of Ruidoso and Capitan.

Hine said the association was formed when the two villages went together on a purchase of former railroad land. Although the main purpose of the board originally was to provide water for the villages, the board also controls purchases and sales of the 600 acres the association currently owns.

According to Hine, the board functions "for the benefit of the corporation serving public needs."

"It's the feelings of the present board to retain ownership of land so

we have control over it," Hine said. He maintained that the board has never made representations that the land would remain undeveloped.

He pointed out that the board recently sold land which is presently being used as a site for condominiums near Eagle Creek Ski Area.

The ECICWSA land is not affected by the restrictive covenants of the surrounding subdivisions, Hine said. "Nobody else can covenant our pro-

perty," he said. According to Leon Eggleston, clerk for the association, the proposed site for the amphitheater is on about 40 acres along Ski Run and Mon Jeau roads. He added that a 20-acre buffer zone of undeveloped Eagle Creek land would separate the amphitheater

from Enchanted Mesa. Jackie Spencer of the Summer Festival board of directors made the original request of the association that the land be leased for the amphitheater site, at an ECICWSA meeting June 20.

According to Peter Strobel, also a member of the festival board, no decision has yet been made by the board to accept the lease drawn up by the association for use of the land.

Fireworks blamed for forest fire

Firefighters of the Smokey Bear Hot Shot Crew and Forest Service personnel responded Thursday to three separate forest fires in Lincoln County, one of which burned about a half-acre just outside the Ruidoso village limits.

According to Ira Caster, fire prevention officer for the Ruidoso area, two of the fires, one in the Capitan mountains and one near Bonito Lake, probably were caused by lightning. The third, just off Gavilan Canyon Road on Forest Road 120, was definitely caused by the illegal use of fireworks on Forest Service land, Caster said.

Caster collected a handful of various rocket and firecracker fireworks at the site of the Gavilan fire while the Hot Shot crew continued the "mop-up" part of the firefighting process.

According to Hot Shot foreman Andy Hale, the fire was first

reported by the Mon Jeau lookout at about 10:30 a.m., and the Hot Shot crew had the blaze under control about an hour later. The extensive mop-up procedure, which includes carefully extinguishing all remaining traces of fire throughout a burn area, was expected to continue until late Thursday afternoon.

A rainy month of June helped prevent the fireworks-caused fire from spreading further. Caster said even though notices of the illegality of fireworks on Forest Service land have been posted at the entrance to all forest areas, some careless people continue to ignore the warning.

"One of the reasons we ban fireworks is because even when you think it's wet, it'll burn," Caster said, pointing to the patches of green meadow grass between the

burned-out areas. According to Forest Service employee Randy Herzburg, the penalty for anyone caught discharging or in possession of fireworks on Forest Service land is a \$50 fine.

by DARRELL J. PEHR **News Staff Writer** Pilots flying in to the Ruidoso Municipal Airport had the benefit of two extra pairs of eyes looking out for them during the Fourth of July holiday, with the presence of two Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) air

traffic controllers. Robert Watts and Patricia Osborn braved the shaky control tower to aid the tremendous volume of aircraft using the airport during the holiday. The two controlled the airport from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday through Sun-

According to the controllers, pilots using the airport appreciated the controlled situation.

"Everyone I've talked to has been real cooperative," Osborn said.

"They're all glad to have us here," Watts added.

'Controlled' airport means extra eyes out

Normally the Ruidoso airport is not controlled. During times when the airport is not controlled, most pilots use the unicomm system, a radio frequency for uncontrolled airports. The pilots use the system to obtain weather information and state their position and intentions.

Watts said the pilots who frequent the airport are very good about using their radios when approaching the airport.

The airport is controlled each year during the Fourth of July and Labor Day holidays. When under the supervision of the controllers, pilots are directed in landing and takeoff maneuvers; informed of the altimeter reading (an indication of the current barometric pressure); and giver information on the speed

and direction of the winds and the location of other planes in the vicini-

Osborn said the surrounding terrain also comes into play when pilots ap-

proach the airport. "With all the hills around here, it's hard for them to see all the planes: coming in. It's kind of like an extra set of eyes for them." she said of the controllers' presence.

Neither controller thought the Ruidoso airport, with its mountainous topography and shifting wind conditions, was extraordinarily dangerous when compared with other airports in the state.

"They've all got drawbacks, advantages and disadvantages," Osborn said of New Mexico airports.

"Weather and terrain are factors in any mountain airport," Watts commented.

The controllers said they observed that most of the pilots coming in for the holiday had flown in to Ruidoso

"Most people are definitely familiar with this airport," Osborn said. She noted that only one pilot had informed the controllers that it was

Of the proposed Sierra Blanca Airport, Watts said, "I think it'll pro-bably help ... but you've still got mountain flying."

her first time in to Ruidoso.

This was Watts' second time controlling the Ruidoso airport and Osborn's first. The two said they were enjoying their stay in Ruidoso very much, and looked forward to returning August 30 to September 4, when the airport again will have those extra eyes out.





The four-year-old filly literally came out of nowhere to pull out a heart-stopping victory in the distaff sprint which carried a purse of \$10,025

Most of the credit for the win has to go to jockey Betty Harless, who refused to give up when her cause looked hopeless deep in the stretch. Betty managed to get her horse in high gear, then courageously urged her through tight quarters in the final

Somehow, Code's Draconic found daylight in a four-horse jumble fighting for a foothold. The filly suddenly boomed into the lead-with Betty eagerly slinging leather—and outfought the high-weighted 13-1 iongshot, Creme De Cassis.

Annies Dancer, the gelding who won the recent \$35,577 Norgor Derby as an 11-1 outsider, proved he's no fluke by winning Saurday's Jockey Club Prep Handicap at Ruidoso

Downs This time, he raced as a 6-1 shot and ended the 6 1/2-furlong sprint with a head lead over the oncoming evenmoney favorite, Golden Ribet.

Annies Dancer, owned by Bowers Z-B Western Wear of Colorado City, Texas, covered the distance in 1:19 4/5 seconds, which equalled the seasonal record. He also collected \$5,730, which boosted his 1984 bankroll up to \$24,468.

Saturday's program also included the \$8,250 Ruffast Handicap, a 5 1/2-furlong sprint for juvenile fillies. The victory went to Old Broad, an invader from Florida.

Countin The Cash got away winging in Friday's \$10,700 Jet Deck Handicap at Ruidoso Downs and led all the way for a neck win.

The three-year-old gelding fought well in the final stages of the 440 yard dash and beat off a persistent attack from the second favorite, Betts Full

Aided by a slight tailwind, Countin The Cash zipped over the distance in a furlongs.

stinging 21.56 seconds—which surpassed the previous seasonal record of 21.59, set by Indigo Illusion while

Cash For Sis went into Thursday's program with career earnings of only \$3,158 and came away with the top qualifying time for the \$768,123 Rainbow Futurity

June building permits up to 67

The number of building permits issued by the Village of Ruidoso increased again during the month of June, but total valuation of those building projects was less than that for the month of May.

The village recorded 67 permits issued with a total valuation of \$3,775,134, compared with 58 permits issued in May with a valuation of



"Cool Water"

We have had one of the coolest Junes in memory, and here it is July eight, a little after high noon, and the termperature is up to only eighty-six. The only reason it is not ninety-five or one hundred is that the East wind is blowing steadily from off the rain clouds down on the plains.

The hot weather is on its way-depend on that; and people all over the nation will be heading for the water-rivers, creeks, pools, lakes,

ponds, swimming pools. One of the favorite stories of all time is "Kidnapped" by Robert Louis

Stevenson. In this novel the co-hero, Alan Breck Stewart, has certainly the most giant ego in all literature. He wants one and all to know that he comes from a line of the greatest kings in history, that he is the greatest swordsman that ever lived, and that he is the bravest man in the world.

The only reason he believes this is that it is more than likely true.

At one point in the story, he and his young companion, David Balfour, in their escape from the English Red Coats, have to jump from rock to rock across a raging torrent near Glencoe, Scotland.

Shortly afterwards Alan is trying to cheer David up for being afraid to

"Hoots: small blame to ye. To be afeared of a thing and yet to do it, is what makes the prettiest kind of a man. And then there was water there, and water's a thing that dauntons even me."

("Pretty" in the Scotch dialect of the time means, brave, steadfast, courageous. And "dauntons" means frightens.)

As one who has nearly drowned twice, and who still bears a scar from diving into too shallow muddy water at Barton Springs, Austin, Texas—water should be a thing that "dauntons" me.

And yet strange to say, I am not the least bit afraid of water, not for myself. But I am deathly afraid of the water for the other person.

I have seen people around lakes and rivers taking chances that make my blood run cold. Generally speak-

ing, people do not "savvy" the water.
A newspaper article the other day was headlined: "Water, Summer's Killer."

Although my mission in life is to cheer folks up, to bring out the positive, the uplifting, the hopeful things of life, yet it is the duty of all of

us to sound warnings, to point out dangers ahead, Our brother, Mark, said he might work up a column en-titled something like "The Warning Clouds" Or "The Gathering Clouds." Have A Healthy Respect

For All Kinds of Water It is bone-chilling to realize how suddenly a happy occasion around the water can turn to tragedy before you know what is happening.

In life we make playthings out of things that are no such thing. I can tell you from personal experience—in spite of the fact that swimming is a world wide favorite exercise and enjoyable pastime, and a very vital part of our self-preservation—that water is no plaything.

There is no end to the ways you must be careful around different bodies of water. The main thing is to keep your wits about you; think before you do something; and use common sense.

If you see someone drowning, if you possibly can, grab something that will float and get out there to him. This will perhaps save both of you from going down, unless you are an expert at life saving in the water. (And by the way this is a very worthwhile study—life saving of all kinds.)

Many a time expert swimmers have gone out to the middle of a lake in a light canoe, and decided to dive overboard and swim a while-and then find that the wind has drifted their canoe away and that it is traveling faster that they can swim.

This is just one of the countless ways in which the water can be dangerous.


The most treacherous of all bodies of water is the river-whirlpools. undertows, hidden currents, quicksand, hidden rocks.

I have always loved the water, and many is the happy hour spent swimm-

And after what I have said about the dangers of the water, you might think it strange that I say everyone should learn to swim and swim well. Learn about the water, so it can be your friend. Do not go beyond your ability as a swimmer. Point out the mistakes of others around the water.

One of these days I will explain my system of teaching people to swim. Until then, be careful in the summer, on the highway, in the traffic of the city, and in swimming and boating, so that then you can enjoy the hot summer and the cool water.

Reporter's Round

On the north side of the Capitans, I came to know beautiful wide-open spaces of New Mexico and warm, friendly faces of New Mexicans.

If I'd left the office five minutes earlier one Saturday in June, I would have missed the chance. During a few moments that day, I almost wished I

I picked up the phone when it rang. Cleston Pritchett asked if someone from The Ruidoso News wanted to join a search for a seven-year-old boy. The kid was near Boy Scout Mountain about 15 miles the other side of

Capitan, he thought.
When you work in Ruidoso, that's quite a distance to go for something which may be a wild goose chase. I am living in Nogal, however, and that was much closer to home, I rationaliz-

My main reason was that it was a pretty evening for a drive.

Pritchett didn't sound as if he was in a huge rush, so I bought a Father's Day card and some groceries on the

My mind warned me as I bought the chocolate chips that they might melt into a chocolate lump by the time I got home, but I didn't listen closely

enough. Jane Deyo warned me as I bought the card at The Aspen Tree that her husband, Alden, had searched in that area, and that I should make sure exactly where it was before I left. I didn't listen closely enough to her,

I figured I could stop at the Capitan police office and get exact directions. I figured wrong. Nobody was there. Oh well, I said to myself, I'll just drive about 20 miles up Route 48, and if I don't see anything, I'll give up and come back.

I encountered the first indication of the wide-open spaces when I rounded a bend on the west flank of the Capitans and almost sideswiped a calf.

I slowed down. I didn't want one of the beasts which I saw in increasing numbers to run into my truck. (This all happened before my accident

wrecked it, of course.) In the way things usually work, as I drove a few miles more down the Capitans road, I saw the first Stock on

Highway sign. What I didn't see were many signs of humans. Then the terrain flattened out and widened out, near mile

marker 18. smoke.

I was raised in the big city, so I assumed it came from a chimney. I glanced at it sideways now and then, and watched it spread.

The road took a big bend east, on its way to Roswell. I noticed the smoke again in the side mirror. It looked wider and higher than it had been a few moments earlier.

. I've seen enough arson fires to be pretty sure the smoke wasn't coming from one of them. Even city slickers know something as wide as that is probably a grass fire.

Great, I thought. Here I am, possibly the only person for miles, trying to decide whether to ignore a fire and do my job or rush to report the fire.

It wasn't much of a decision. I went for a telephone. I couldn't count on someone else seeing it and reporting it. Besides, if it was really bad, it would

cut off my way home. The photographer in me recognized the possibility for dramatic pictures,

Getting to a phone was easier said than done, however. I increased my speed. Yes, I drove faster than 55 miles per hour.

After what seemed like a considerable distance, I spotted a sign that said W. K. Eubank, or something like that.

I hightailed up the dirt road, stirring up billows of dust. When I got to the ranch, a collie, her pup and some goats answered me. Someone was in the barn, so I trotted over to ask to use the phone.

Unfortunately, he didn't speak English. Also unfortunately, I don't speak Spanish. Through gestures and

a few words, we communicated.

I picked up the flame-orange phone in the kitchen and dialed the operator. She couldn't get anyone to answer the Capitan number she had, so she of-

fered to call Carrizozo. They were too far away, I guessed, and thanked her anyway, trying to shrug off the whole incident.

I thanked the gentleman, forgetting to ask his name. I walked back to my truck and he walked back to work.

I drove more slowly back to the main road, trying to put the fire out of my mind. Maybe someone had reported it already. Maybe it was planned and under control.

My glance kept going back to it, and I couldn't convince myself it was safe. I spotted a sign reading Canning Block Ranch 2 miles. I think the name was Jillson.

I turned onto the road. You haven't really driven fast until you've jounced along a dirt road in a pickup. The back started fishtailing and the dust hid everything behind

me, so I eased up on the gas.
When I got to the ranch buildings, an Anglo woman let me use her telephone.

I still couldn't get an answer in Capitan. She had a little card that said if nobody answered, you should call the Ruidoso fire dispatcher col-

I did. Now, I've called my grandmother collect, and someone I knew in high school made long distance calls and charged them to the Pitt-sburgh FBI, but I've never made a collect call to an official. What if she refused the charges?

She didn't. The fire dispatcher got That's the first spot where I saw the on the line, and told me that she thought a rancher was doing a controlled burn. I was relieved.

Then I asked for directions to the search and rescue, since the milepost on the road was right about where they were supposed to be gathering.

She asked someone in the office, and told me it was at milepost 41. I was at milepost 25, so my direc-

tions were only half wrong. I thanked the dispatcher, I thanked the woman on the ranch, and I drove more slowly eastward, until I eventually found the search.

After a short time, they found the boy, and I got a good picture. I also got a good feeling about the White Mountain Search and Rescue people and the residents of the area who are so willing to help a stranger.

On the north side of the Capitans, it's hard to find telephones in the beautiful wide-open spaces, but it's easy to find friendly faces.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE— Hey, folks. We have got to change our system. The one we have just isn't working.

We have had almost 15 years in which the state's top elected officials have been allowed to serve only a single four-year term. We thought that might be the way to go when we shifted from a two-year term with the right to succeed yourself once. But by now, many New Mexicans doubt that the change improved things.

We were told the old way made it certain that everyone we elected to one of the posts under this rule would immediately begin running for office.
The whole two-year period, this theory goes, would be dedicted to that process, leaving little or no time for governing.

Maybe so, but how come that arrangement is okay for members of Congress, for members of our state House of Representatives and for other officeholders? If it is such a bad system, why isn't it bad for all?

The fact is that part of the reason some voted to go to the four-year single term was that we had a succession of one-term governors who didn't get much done during their two years

in office. But is that necessarily bad?

Sure, Johnny Simms only had two years in office before he was succeeded by Ed Mechem, who had only two years in office before he was succeeded by John Burroughs, who had only two years in office before he was succeeded by Ed Mechem. It took Jack Campbell, back in the mid-'60s, to break the two-year pattern. But that was the way the voters wanted it.

Before the four-year term came in-to being, 19 individuals had served as governor of our state. Ten of those were either turned out by the voters at the end of two years or chose not to run to succeed themselves.

Jerry Apodaca, one of the three men to have served since the new system was adopted, wanted to give those under the present restriction the right to run for re-election. The voters opposed that idea rather sharply.

The feeling here now is that if there is an impetus to change, it is back toward the shorter term, with the power to run for re-election.

That gives the voters a chance to express their opinion of an incumbent's performance at the end of a biennium. If they are satisfied, he or she is welcome to stay on. If not, pack up and get out, as the citizens told those already mentioned who were given two years and no more.

You might say under that system we get a sort of referendum at the end of the second year, in which the voters' voices can be heard.

That is not entirely bad. As it is now, four years can seem awfully long.

Admittedly, much of the talk at the present time may have its root in dissatisfaction with the particular performance of the incumbent governor. (Let's face it. That is the only office under this arrangement anyone

cares that much about. It is hard to get up much excitement about who is Secretary of State or Land Commis-

sioner.)

It probably would not be proper to change the Constitution, as would be necessary to alter the present arrangement, just because of what is happening under a single individual. Still, it is that factor which has stirred the most recent discussions.

And the dissatisfaction is very real. It is almost guaranteed to be of such depth that action will be taken by the 1985 Legislature to at least begin consideration of a return to the old method.

For that reason, if for no other, citizens might do well to begin thinking about the two alternatives—and might begin discussing other systems if those seem attractive.

Maybe we could put together a panel of living ex-governors (there are five of them, counting Dave Cargo, who, after leaving office, fled the jurisdiction; and not counting Tom Bolack, who only served a token few weeks) and solicit their views on the subject. They probably have firm—and differing—opinions.

Any change we make would not af-fect the term of Governor Anaya, but he could go down in history as the major impetus for change, if it comes.

Editorial

The horsemen have a high-priced attorney arguing their case for relaxed drug rules in New Mexico horse racing, and already they have taken their case to the state Supreme Court.

But who speaks for the horses?

Horse racing is a sport with a certain level of attrition. It is not uncommon for race horses to suffer career-ending and even life-ending injuries. Of course, the same holds true for football players.

If there were no horse racing, there would be no race horses. That would mean no horses getting injured or dying because they were raced, but it would deny the function these beautiful animals were bred and born to perform.

It also would deny those who appreciate the sport and those who make their livelihood from it.

The question is, should the horsemen's privilege to run their horses extend to administering drugs in quantities that make it easier to run injured horses?

We think not.

A human athlete who takes a shot of cortisone for a sore elbow or who takes steroids or amphetamines to try to improve his performance does so of his own free will and with knowledge of the possible consequences.

A horse has no free will in the matter, and must rely on the humans who make the rules. The rules setting limits on bute and Lasix use were made for good reasons, and we see no reason for relaxing those rules.—TP

Ron Hentges took a few days away from his job to be with his wife. daughters. He works for Texas-New Mexico Power Company.


