Retailers group on hold

The Retail Merchants Committee of the Chamber of Commerce may be on its last legs after committee president Richard Sandoval abruptly resigned earlier this week.

The official resignation followed a no-show event Monday afternoon when the majority of the members of the committee failed to appear for the committee's regularly scheduled meeting.

"I don't have time," Sandoval said in reference to his decision to resign. "It takes a great effort to make the committee work and I just don't have the time to do it."

He said he was in Albuquerque at the time of the meeting, having privately resigned prior to that time.

The committee's plans for the future, including the sidewalk sale in August, remain in question until a decision is made on the viability of continuing the committee.

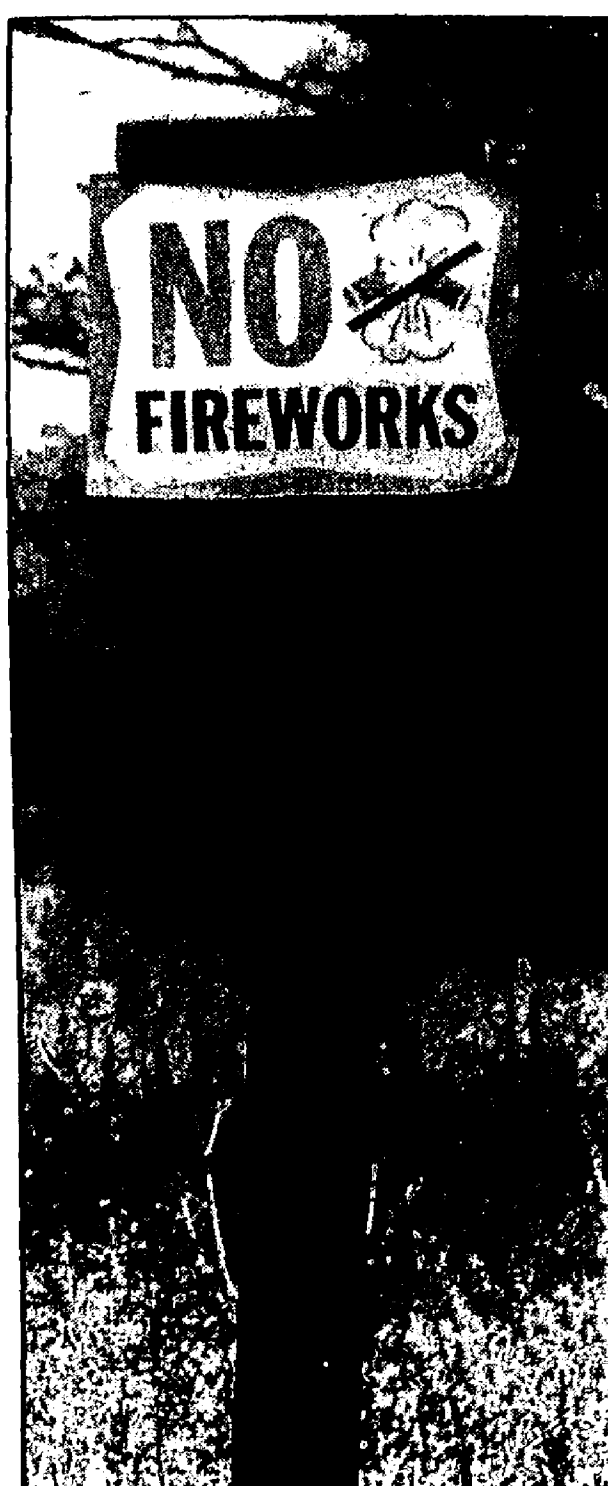
At Monday's meeting, Tom Kelham, Budgie Green and George Smith, the only members present, passed a motion to cancel the committee's meeting scheduled for August 6.

The three set September 10 for a reorganization meeting, at which time non-present members will be dropped from the committee.

Green said Wednesday he doubted that the sidewalk sale would go on as planned. But he was confident that the committee would continue as a working body.

"I think it's time to do some scouting and find some interested people," he said. Sandoval was the spark of the group, Green said, but he added that he felt other merchants contacted between now and the September meeting would want to help make the group function as it should.

"It's going to survive," Green said of the committee. "It's got to survive, because we need it."

Mobile home permit law flops

An ordinance that would have required all installers of mobile homes in Ruidoso to first obtain a permit from the Ruidoso Building Inspector's Office before installation was not passed by the Ruidoso Village Council at their meeting Tuesday night.

Councillor Rick Evans' motion to pass Ordinance 84-15 died for lack of a second. According to Village Attorney Lee Huckstep, the ordinance would have required persons installing a mobile home to first obtain a certified plot plan of the mobile home lot. Huckstep said the move was designed to curb the number of incorrectly placed mobile homes in Ruidoso, many of which violate village lot line setback requirements.

"All this is going to do is add an additional cost to the customer," complained mobile home dealer Alex Adams. He said the requirement will add \$300 to \$600 in unnecessary costs to the purchaser of a mobile home. He said the requirement of an additional survey will cost around \$150, and will result in a delay of two to three weeks. Adams also listed previous village council ordinances which have so far added up to \$2,960 in extra costs to purchase of a mobile home.

"That's just out of the blue," Adams said of the extra village-added costs. "Then we wonder why the working people can't live in Ruidoso. I'm arguing about the cost."

Adams suggested that the village instead tax violators of setback requirements only, and not tax each installation.

According to Planning and Zoning Enforcement Officer Paul Davis, the reasoning behind the ordinance is to

enforce setback requirements. However it was learned during the meeting that requirement of the certified plot plan does not necessarily insure that the mobile home will be placed correctly.

After the vote, Planning and Zoning Committee Chairman Greg Masters asked the council for further direction in the matter. His opinion was that if certified plot plans are to be required for "stick-built" homes, as they are now, then the plans should be required for mobile homes also.

Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter suggested that an ordinance be formed that would insure the proper placement of mobile homes before the homes are permanently set in place without imposing unnecessary costs. "Let's get some enforcement at the onset," he said. Other councillors agreed.

"Why create another rule without a benefit?" Councillor John Underwood queried.

Masters suggested the formation of a committee to study the problem, but Mayor George White decided instead to let the councillors "get some sleep on it" before taking additional action.

Also during the meeting, the councillors heard a request from Al Junge that the road he lives on be renamed Royal Drive. In action during the June 12 meeting of the village council, the councillors voted to designate the street as a continuation of Heath Drive. The street was then earlier believed to be named Roy Drive.

Junge explained that because all city utilities except the Water Department know the street as Royal Drive, and because residents of the area have long known the street as Royal Drive, it should remain Royal Drive. He also pointed out that the street is 25 to 50 times as busy as Heath Drive,

and so should take precedence as the name of the two streets.

"Let's get this thing corrected," he said. "Everybody else knows it as Royal Drive."

White said the request will be taken under consideration.

Junge also asked that the council supply a podium for speakers making presentations to the council.

In other business, the councillors: —Scheduled a special session for 4 p.m. Tuesday July 24, for consideration of the liquor license application of Peter Piper Pizza. The meeting will serve as the public hearing for the request.

—Referred back to the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) a request by Condel Architecture and Engineers of El Paso that the council consider Condel's plan to build a 128-unit hotel complex. Company representative Richard Araiza said the request that the councillors first consider the project was in hopes of saving time so the project could be started as soon as possible.

"This is cold to us and we really need to take a look at it," Masters commented.

—Referred back to P&Z a request for a rear lot line variance on lots 19-21, block 1, of Paradise Canyon subdivision for Tom McNeil.

—Approved Ordinance 84-16, fulfilling the final step needed to make official an annexation petition by B.H. Buchanan, first approved in 1978. According to Huckstep, the annexation ordinance never came before the council after the annexation was first approved. The ordinance specifically deals with Unit 2 of Mountain View Estates.

"It died a natural death somewhere down the line," White said of the ordinance.

—Approved Ordinance 84-17, abolishing the cemetery board and limiting the library board as a purely advisory board. The councillors also voted, on Carpenter's motion, to establish a cemetery board that would only perform as an advisory board.

—Approved a restaurant beer and wine license for Jeremiah Moon's restaurant.

—Approved the final budget for the village.

—Heard a request from Lodgers' Tax Committee member Joan Bailey for direction from the council in the committee's dealing with the Lodgers' Tax budget, since the budget was approved without specific line items. The council voted to set a special workshop session to deal with the budget between committee and council members for 3 to 4 p.m. Tuesday, July 24.

—Heard Huckstep report that an ordinance will be drawn up designed to replace a current ordinance requiring security guards at places with live entertainment at Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor's suggestion.

—Voted on Evans' suggestion that the council form a special committee to study the possibilities of establishing a convention center for Ruidoso. Councillors Jerry Shaw, Carpenter and Evans were appointed to the committee.

—Voted to reject all bids for an ambulance for the Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services and have bidders resubmit bids under the proper specifications.

—Voted to accept the bid of the G.D. Boyd Company of \$42,987 for the construction of a utility shed for the village Sewer Department.

—Approved previously approved P&Z items.

School board decides radio sports coverage

Beginning with a 25-minute executive session, the Ruidoso Board of Education cleaned up some new high school business at their regular meeting Tuesday.

Permission to broadcast high school athletic events was given to radio station KOAW. The station was told, however, that another local radio station, KTNT, was previously granted broadcasting rights, and the two stations must work together.

Roger Coble, KOAW sales manager, expressed to the board a willingness to work together with KTNT. He also said KOAW plans to donate the air time to high school clubs and organizations during halftime.

"They can sell the time for commercial use and keep the money, or they can do some promotional work for their club. There is one stipulation. It has to be done well. The program director will listen to it, and if it's not good, they'll do it again," Coble explained.

The board also heard feedback concerning their pending decision on whether to rule the new high school campus closed during lunch recess. High school senior Mitch Rhodes successfully appealed to members to leave the campus open.

"Number one, I don't think Mr. Hansen (high school principal) should be a warden ... two, I think the main reason for high school is to prepare students to be adults ... three, and this

is my philosophy, trust us until we break that trust, then give us a second chance," Rhodes said in his persuasive speech.

Board president Stormy Edwards said he hoped the Ruidoso Police Department would provide the area with additional patrols during the recesses. Hansen said he had spoken with traffic officer Bob Kenney, and that the department was anticipating the open campus policy.

A report on phase II of new construction of the high school was discussed with board members. Hansen cited a building leakage problem as a main concern with inspectors.

He said that communication between building contractor Seegee Engineering and architect Alley Connell-Strain, is necessary to determine responsibility for the repairs.

"There are some things that Mr. Hansen is concerned about in this phase, but these will be worked out," said superintendent Sid Miller.

Miller also marked his one-year anniversary as superintendent by reading a list of accomplished goals to the board. After thanking administration secretary Kathy Garrett for the surprise celebration rum cake, Miller said many of the yearly goals had been met.

He cited special education programs, improved busing, revamped and reorganized departments and the hiring of qualified personnel as major accomplishments.

"I feel we have accomplished many goals that we set for ourselves. It's time people recognized there has been change, and it's been good change," Miller said.

In other business the board:

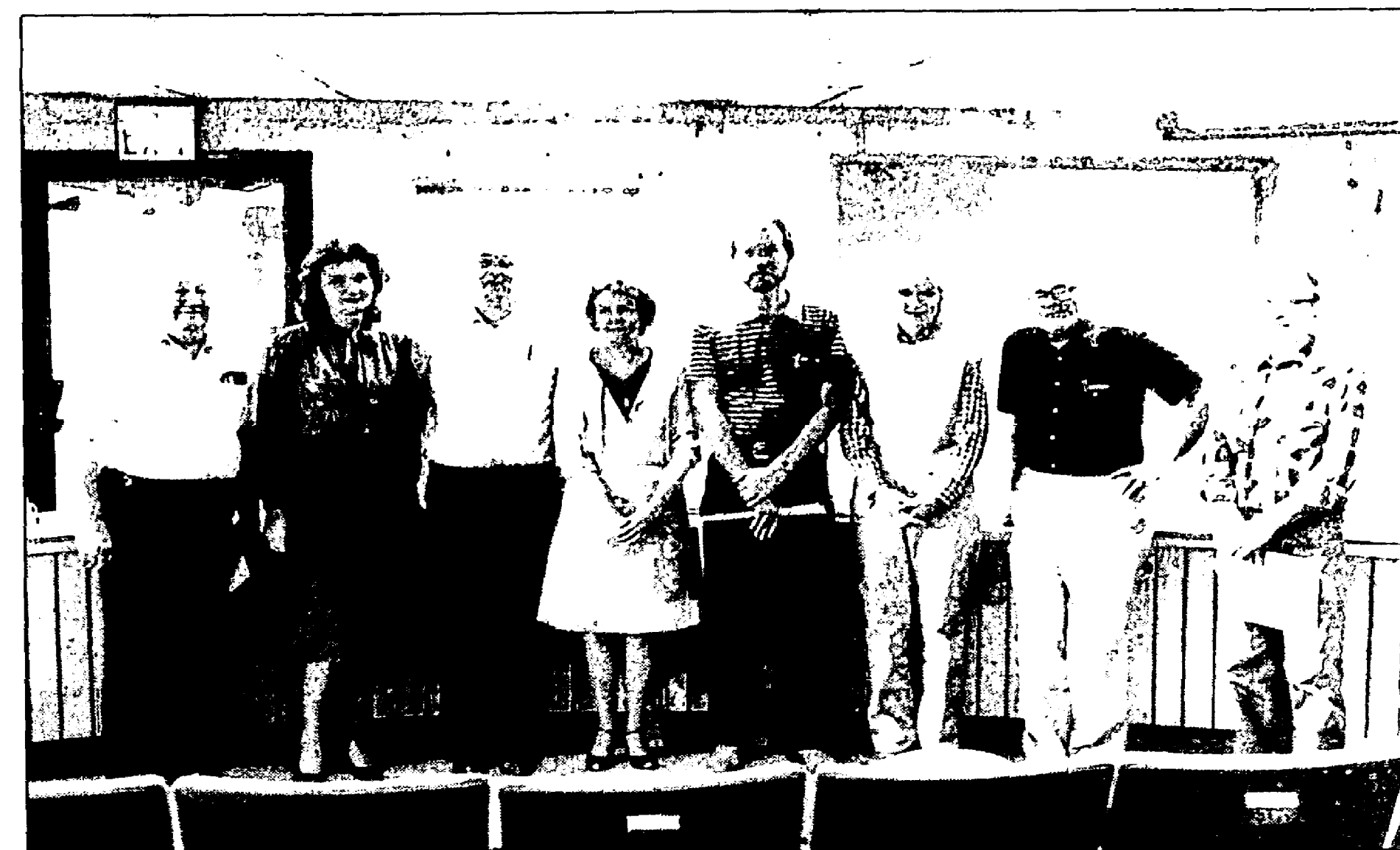
—Extended a rent extension request from Trinity Mountain Fellowship. Reverend W. Peter Church read the board a letter thanking the Ruidoso Municipal Schools for the use of the White Mountain Elementary School facilities while a new church is being built for the Trinity Mountain Fellowship.

—Accepted the resignation of first grade teacher Ric Higginbotham and custodian Allen Temple.

—Approved hiring custodians Ralph Reed and Norma Reed, math instructor and coach Ridge Bowden, special education teacher Donna Reed and first grade teacher Debbie Isaacs.

—Opened and approved low bids for school milk products, cafeteria tables and track surfacing.

—Approved a request from Bonnie Brock Wood for special budget increase for the high school cafeteria.

LTC elects new slate of officers

New officers were elected to lead the Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) through 1984-1985 at Wednesday's meeting of the group.

Elected as chairperson was Joan Bailey. Ann George was elected vice chairperson; Rod Adamson returned for another term as treasurer; and Jack Foster was elected secretary. It was the first meeting of this fiscal year for the group, which includes new members George, Bill Rawlins, Don Parsons, Budgie Green and Phil Hamilton. Returning members include Bailey, Adamson, Foster and Linda Flack.

Discussion during the meeting centered on the lack of approved line items for the lodgers' tax budget. The

village council approved the lodgers' budget during its June 12 meeting only as a lump sum, with no specifications regarding line items.

The council voted this week to set up a special workshop to consider specific line items with LTC members. The workshop is set for 3 p.m. Tuesday, July 24.

During their meeting Wednesday, LTC members set up another workshop, this one for the members of the committee to discuss the line items of the budget. That meeting was prompted by councillor Jerry Shaw, who said she would like to see the committee members look over the budget before the meeting with the council.

"The council felt that with the new membership on the committee now you all could go ahead and work on

line items," Shaw said. "The council does not intend to sit here and tell you what to do."

That workshop will be at 3 p.m. Monday, July 16, at village hall.

Due to the lack of specific line item amounts, the committee tabled a request by Roy Seay for funding of the Aspen Run auto race, and a request by Rawlins for funding of the Golden Years Jubilee.

Also during the meeting, the committee heard a report from Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. Jungbluth explained several aspects of the lodgers' tax budget that relate to the chamber. He also pointed out that the chamber is now three months behind in its advertising of fort due to the inaction on the line items.

Lodgers advised on bad checks problem

Quinn Martin of the 12th District Attorney's Office appeared before members of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association Tuesday to discuss hot checks, motel skips and criminal mischief.

Addressing a dozen lodgers, Martin said bad checks are a way of life with some people.

"In a lot of instances, people are just sloppy with their checkbooks, with their accounts," he said. "But that's their problem."

It can easily become the lodgers' problem if they fail to obtain sufficient information to recover on a worthless check. In fact, said Martin, information is "vital for a complete prosecution."

Obvious information that could be useful would be the check writer's license plate number, driver's license number and date of birth.

But Martin also stressed getting the person's social security number, description of the vehicle driven, and a general physical description of the individual.

"The better information the police and district attorneys' offices have," he said, "the better the chance of catching the person."

The same holds true whether a check is used for food, drinks or lodgings. If the information is available, a warrant can be issued for the violator's arrest. Martin said skipping out on services in excess of \$2,500 is a third-degree felony.

His suggestion for situations in which people have busted up motel furniture or walls was simple: file a police report. Between the police and the district attorney's office, a prosecution may be possible.

During a brief question and answer period that followed Martin's talk, association vice president Phil

Hamilton asked whether a person who skips a bill and dashes across a state line can be arrested.

Martin said that extradition is tough in such cases. But he noted that whenever the visitor reenters New Mexico, an arrest warrant will be waiting.

On a question about charging a customer extra for sneaking people or pets into motel rooms, Martin said such situations are not covered by state statute.

"Those are business decisions you have to make on your own," he said. "It's really up to you."

In other association business, lodgers:

Heard a financial report that placed the group savings at \$541.25. To date, 34 association members are paid in full.

Heard from president Bill Rawlins that he had appointed Mac McDougal to represent the association on the advertising committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

Announced a membership drive to take place Tuesday, July 17, beginning at 7:30 a.m. The meeting place will be the Ranch House Restaurant, where a kickoff breakfast will initiate the drive.

Teams of two will be contacting non-member lodgers, with a prize going to the team that pulls in the most new members.

Heard from Nancy Radziewicz concerning the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival, slated for Wednesday, September 26, through Saturday, September 29.

She said at least 10,000 people are expected to attend the event, which will represent all the major motorcycle manufacturers except for Suzuki.

Decided to dispatch a note of thanks to Peter Piper Pizza for hosting a get-together for lodgers prior to Tuesday's meeting.

Downs considering sales tax increase

Ruidoso Downs board of trustees members discussed a gross receipts tax increase at their regular meeting Monday, but tabled the proposed ordinance until a special meeting next week.

The tax on gross receipts, or sales, is 4.5 percent in the village. A proposal to increase the tax one-half of one percent has been published, but trustees discussed putting a larger increase before voters.

The council plans to discuss the tax increase proposal to put before voters during a special meeting at 7 p.m. Monday, July 16, in the village hall.

Council members also formally accepted Police Chief Charles Robinson's resignation. He plans a move to Florida.

Trustee Jake Harris said, "I hate to lose the chief." Robinson responded, "I sure appreciate the support I've received from council." Trustee Conrad Buchanan wished him the best of luck.

Also, trustee Jackie Brannum and clerk Wilma Webb discussed their recent two-day water grant seminar in Santa Fe.

"Our first impression was, we ought to give the money back and forget it," Brannum said. The paperwork involved is complex.

However, she said, "It really was a good conference." Brannum said of the grant procedure, "Once we get set up

for this one, we'll know for the next one."

In addition, trustees received a letter from James Stover, director of Emergency Medical Services at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

Stover wrote to express appreciation of help from Ruidoso Downs volunteer firefighters during accident calls on Highway 70 east of the village.

At recent meetings, trustees have expressed concern about volunteers leaving the village without protection to help ambulance crews outside the village.

Fire Chief Chet Southard assured the officials the Downs department sends two emergency technicians and maybe one other volunteer on a rescue truck. Other volunteers stay in the fire station, he said.

Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs fire departments are the only ones in the county with rescue equipment, Southard added.

"Ruidoso responds this way," he said, gesturing with an arm toward the north and west. "Ruidoso Downs responds this way," he added, gesturing toward the east.

Trustee Conrad Buchanan said he recalled occasions when more than three volunteers left the village on a truck. He asked Southard to bring written procedures about accident response to the board.

In other business, village officials: —Voted 4-0 to accept a replat of land occupied by Frank's Fruit

Market. John Shaw presented drawings before the council granted a zoning variance for trailers and other equipment in the area.

—Heard Webb report about a fire which razed assistant clerk Lida McIntyre's home. Webb said the McIntyre family recently lost its mobile home on Gavilan Canyon Road.

It was suggested that anyone interested in donating furniture, kitchen or other equipment, or clothes for the boys and girl in the family call Ruidoso Downs village hall.

—Discussed ways to reduce the gap between income and expenses for the sanitation department. Ruidoso Downs has its own operation.

Brannum said the village leases dumpsters to customers for \$18, compared to \$40 in Ruidoso.

"Several areas in town are not paying their fair share," Buchanan said, "and I'm one of them." He explained he has both a residence and a business using his business dumpster.

The trustees also listened to Joseph Lewandowski propose that he contract for garbage service in the village. His Waste Control company serves areas near Ruidoso Downs.

The village recently bought a garbage truck for \$65,000. If he received a contract in the Downs, Lewandowski said, he would buy the village's equipment, including the new truck.

He said Tularosa makes a profit of more than \$1,000 in their sanitation collection. That amount is the dif-

ference between what he charges Tularosa and what it charges to area residents and businesses, he explained.

"You hit the key words: make a profit," Mayor J. C. Day said. "If you can make a profit, why can't we?"

Lewandowski said he makes a profit because of volume. His trucks serve a much wider area than a single village.

Brannum saw advantages in using a private sanitation collector. "If we can get by without maintenance, without all the headaches, we come out way ahead," she said.

Day said, "I think we ought to give it some serious thought."

Harris cautioned that if the village sells its own equipment, it will be dependent on an outsider.

—Voted unanimously in a related action to buy an extended warranty on the new garbage truck.

—Heard Webb ask for reservations for the New Mexico Municipal League Conference in Santa Fe on September 5-7.

If Brannum attends, she must pay for a substitute teacher for her classes at Ruidoso Middle School. She explained that Ruidoso schools require teachers to do that if they leave classes for work within their political offices.

—Went into closed-door session to discuss acquisitions and legal action.

The next regular session, after the special meeting next week, is planned at 7 p.m. Monday, July 23.

Capitan council wants bigger village hall

The Capitan village council Monday night moved one step closer to settling on a new or expanded village hall, a project that has been discussed for several months.

In a three-hour session, the council debated whether it was better to build a new village hall or have the fire department move out of the present village hall building into a new building of its own.

The latter choice would allow the council to take over the west side of the combined village hall-fire department building to allow for a larger village council meeting room. The expansion would allow seating of considerably more people than the current meeting room, which holds approximately a dozen visitors.

Mayor David Cummins suggested that a formal request be sought from the fire department as to what it wants and needs in terms of a new station or station expansion.

A motion was proposed to that effect and passed by the council, which also authorized village attorney John Underwood to put straight the deed to two village-owned lots and to obtain an appraisal and survey of the land.

Underwood had reported earlier that the village owns several lots on the west end of Highway 380 within the village limits, on which a new fire department or village hall building could be built.

He said the deed to two of the lots was in question, with the land having been owned by the Otero County Electric Co-op and the deed not coming in to possession of the village administration during the time of sale. Underwood said the deed mixup

would be resolved sometime this week, and suggested that an appraisal and survey of the land follow.

Trustee V. Kelly Beavers said that in a few years, the fire department will require a new truck and other equipment that will not fit in the bays at its present location.

He said the fire department would be better off building from scratch on the lots on Highway 380, giving the department a new structure and giving village hall the expansion needed.

"It's something we're going to have to face eventually," Beavers said. "It's an expense."

Ideas were batted about for half an hour before trustee Benny Coker said he would like to see the fire department "come up with some figures on paper and sketches on what we're talking about so we know what we're doing."

In other action, the council:

—Heard from Jack Atkins, a consulting engineer from Roswell, that the water drilled for east of town is unusable.

Atkins said a five-day pumping exploration into the San Andreas formation two miles east of Capitan yielded water that was high in sulfates. The water was tested at 1,000 feet, then again at 800 feet.

Vernon Goodwin of the water advisory board recommended getting permission to search for water on state-owned property and looking for possibilities in the Fort Stanton area.

"We need to continue to look for water," Goodwin noted. "And we will find it."

It was decided to apply for grant money to enable the search to move five miles east of the village.

—Approved budget transfers during the budget year.

—Accepted the single bid offer for the tennis court improvement project. Rio Grande Parks and Recreation Associates of Albuquerque placed a bid of \$7,900 for the work, which will be paid through a grant to the village.

—Approved budget increases for the motor vehicle department (MVD) and highways, and announced the new hours for the MVD. Business pertaining to motor vehicle use will be conducted solely on Mondays and Tuesdays, and only until noon.

—Reviewed and reworded personnel practices in an effort to clarify vacation time and sick leave.

—Amended the business registration ordinance to include the assessment of a penalty for delinquent business registrations.

All business registrations are due and payable the first of July. At present, there are no penalty or interest fees if a business fails to register and pay the \$15 registration fee.

The council proposed assessing a \$10 late charge for any registration delinquent beyond 30 days, and a citation in municipal court for delinquency beyond 60 days. The citation could result in a fine of up to \$100.

The proposal was turned over to Underwood for formal wording and preparation for a public hearing.

—Heard from Underwood on flood plan insurance and the planning and zoning commission (P&Z).

Noting that the village is considered a "special flood hazard area," Underwood suggested that the village comply with federal regulations and

specifications for flood containment.

He said it would help residents to obtain flood insurance and enable new home owners in the village to qualify for FHA and Fanny Mae home mortgages.

Concerning the P&Z, Underwood urged the council to set a study session date to review matters pertaining to the new commission. The session was scheduled for 6 p.m. Thursday, August 2.

—Set the time and place for the Economic Development District profile meetings planned for July 13 and 14. The profile is a look at where the village is now and what to expect in the next 20 years.

In order to draw as much public input as possible, the council set both meetings at the Senior Citizen Center in Capitan, where more people can be accommodated.

Friday's meeting is set for 7 p.m., while Saturday's session begins at 9 a.m.

—Approved a special municipal election on September 14 to present before the voters two proposed increases in the gross receipts tax.

The first proposal would raise the tax one-quarter of one percent, and would be added to the general fund.

The second proposal would increase the tax by one-half of one percent, and would be earmarked for infrastructure improvements, such as sewer line repairs and street repairs.

"The one thing good about this tax is that we keep it all," said Beavers. "The state doesn't keep it."

The council set 7:30 p.m. Monday, July 16, for a dinner-discussion on the ordinances at the Senior Citizen Center.

Fellow artist Gordon Snidow lives near the headwaters of the Rio Ruidoso, which flows toward the Hondo Valley Hurd loved.

Snidow called Hurd's death in Roswell Monday a great loss.

"When you think of New Mexico, you think of two artists," the cowboy artist said, "Hurd and Georgia O'Keeffe."

"I never met him face to face, but I've admired his work, and he's admired my work."

When Snidow was starting out, Hurd saw an exhibit of his work, and wrote him an encouraging note, Snidow said.

Hurd encouraged other artists. Decades ago, the Taos Group dominated art in New Mexico. Now contemporary artists are at work. Hurd was almost a bridge, a transition between the two, Snidow said.

"He was one of the artists who kept art alive in New Mexico."

At work, Hurd used watercolor, egg tempera and charcoal to evoke his home state. At play, Hurd used mallets and horses on the polo field.

Snidow has been a spectator on the Hurd family polo field at their Sentinel Ranch in San Patricio.

"When you drive down that valley, it's a Peter Hurd experience," Snidow said. The drive varies depending on the time of the year and the light.

"It's like driving through a Peter Hurd painting. I just love it," Snidow said.

Area residents often have favorite Hurd paintings. His works hang in galleries up and down the Rio Ruidoso. For instance, Hurd prints flank a photograph of the artist at the Artisan's Shop and Gallery in Ruidoso.

At Smith Ltd. Gallery, Sonya Smith recalled the first time Hurd saw her. "I met him in the early '50s at his

ranch," she said.

"The day I met the man, I had on a lavender dress. He reached up and said, 'Oh, you're a painting.'" Remembering, she made a frame with her fingers.

"He said to me, 'Ah, you're a picture. I'd like to paint you.'" Her dress, in a hue like orchid, was what attracted him, she said. She still has the dress.

Smith recalls Hurd as a slender man of about 5-foot-10, with beautiful blue eyes. Her favorite among his works is a classic, "The Eve of St. John." The girl holding the candle in the print lived near Hurd.

"He loved the Hondo Valley," Smith said. "He painted those colors, the hills, exactly as he saw them."

Hurd faithfully portrayed colors in a 1974 oil painting of the Fort Stanton pasture. Ralph Petty, president of The Bank of Ruidoso, hung the recent work in his office.

It might be his favorite Hurd work, although he said, "I like all of them." Petty knew Hurd for years. "I met him when I was a little kid, I imagine."

The banker was raised in Carrizozo, where his family ran a hardware store. In 1959, they moved to Ruidoso to run another store. Hurd was their customer.

He is fond of Hurd as a person as well as a painter. His favorite memory of Hurd is from years ago.

"I listened to him sing and play the guitar at a corn roast near Nogal," Petty said. Hurd's music included Spanish and English lyrics.

Peter Hurd has admirers in Ruidoso, but has more farther down the river. As the river cascades toward San Patricio through the Hondo Valley, people who call themselves neighbors and admirers increase.

United States Representative Joe Skeen lives near Picacho, and near the Hurd's ranch.

"Of course we're all mourning his death," Skeen said. "He was one of the finest men we've known in this part of the country."

"I enjoyed knowing him, particularly as a neighbor," Skeen continued. "We sorely miss him."

The congressman credited Hurd with perpetuating polo in the area, and Spanish music. "He could speak and sing and play Spanish."

In addition, Skeen said, "He had a brilliant mind. He could remember everything and everyone up to the time of his illness."

In recent years, Hurd lived at Casa Maria Health Care Center in Roswell. He suffered from Alzheimer's disease.

"We haven't been able to see him for a year," Skeen said with regret.

The Hurd's are a distinguished family, he said. "Of course he has a tremendous wealth of talent in his children." Peter, Carol and Michael are the children of Hurd and Henriette Wyeth.

"Mike characterizes the very best of both his mother and father. The love of the Hondo Valley will be perpetuated," Skeen said.

He called Peter Hurd a living, lively man.

"He left so much for all of us to be proud of," Skeen summed up. "He's left us so many treasures."

Some of the treasures are art

works. Others are memories. Skeen released more comments through Jerry McKinney, his press secretary in Washington, D.C. A favorite story happened years ago.

"When Mary and I moved back to the ranch in 1951, he was the first person to come by and see us," Skeen said.

"I certainly am sorry to see him go. He was probably one of the most brilliant men we've ever had in this part of the country. I hope he goes with God."

Louise Babers also misses Hurd and his visits to the San Patricio post office. "I was postmaster 34 years," she said. Her memories of the artist involve polo and the post office.

"Peter Hurd was our most famous patron." He also strongly supported her. When closing small post offices was proposed, Hurd wrote to Washington to help save it.

Hurd enjoyed the valley people, rich or poor, Babers said. "He was so sympathetic with all the people. He had a true interest in everyone he met. He could talk to anyone."

Hurd was also brilliant, and spoke fluent Spanish as well as singing Mexican songs while playing the guitar, she said.

The artist also shared his sport with generations of the Babers family. "He taught my husband to play polo," she said.

At the time, Tom and Louise Babers had a 13-year-old son named Bill, who also learned the game. Then Bill's son Roe picked up the sport.

When she spoke of Hurd the worker instead of Hurd the player, Babers favored his paintings that show Hondo hills against a night sky, or houses with lights shining after dark.

She added, "He gave me a watercolor of my own home."

John Meigs also owns Peter Hurd art. "I have quite a cross-section of his early works," he said.

Meigs plans a month-long Hurd show which will open September 8 in the Americana Museum of the El Paso Civic Center in Texas.

The San Patricio man regards Hurd as a mentor. "He certainly inspired me, although I don't paint in the same manner," Meigs said.

Meigs has known Hurd for 30 years. "We met in 1948 in Hawaii. I did an article on him and we became good friends," Meigs said.

"In 1951 I came to New Mexico planning to stay six months. I stayed 30 years."

"At Mr. Hurd's encouragement, I went on to become a full-fledged artist," he said.

His favorite Peter Hurd works involve Hondo Valley land, its special light and its people, Meigs said.

People remember Hurd as being wonderfully social, Meigs said. However, his favorite recollections involve the artist on the job.

"I remember periods of very intense concentration on his work, what he did to eventually create the things for which he is most famous."

One of those things is a portrait of Lyndon Johnson. The president vehemently rejected it. Meigs said the portrait doesn't represent Hurd at his best, and that the flap about it attracted attention to the least important Hurd work.

Many people less famous than the president have been models for Hurd paintings. Dorothy Gomez is one.

Hondo Valley waters eventually pass homes in Roswell like hers. She and her husband Luis live there with their two children now.

Years ago, when she held the candle for "The Eve of St. John," she was a child herself. "I must have been about 10. I'm 36 now," she said.

Gomez was Dorothy Herrera of San Patricio then. She moved away when she married.

Hurd signed the portrait of her hanging in her home. Her own little girl was at home Monday, listening to the news, when she ran in to tell Gomez of Hurd's death.

Water continues to flow through the artist's home valley, and people pour out memories of him and his work, but Peter Hurd is gone.

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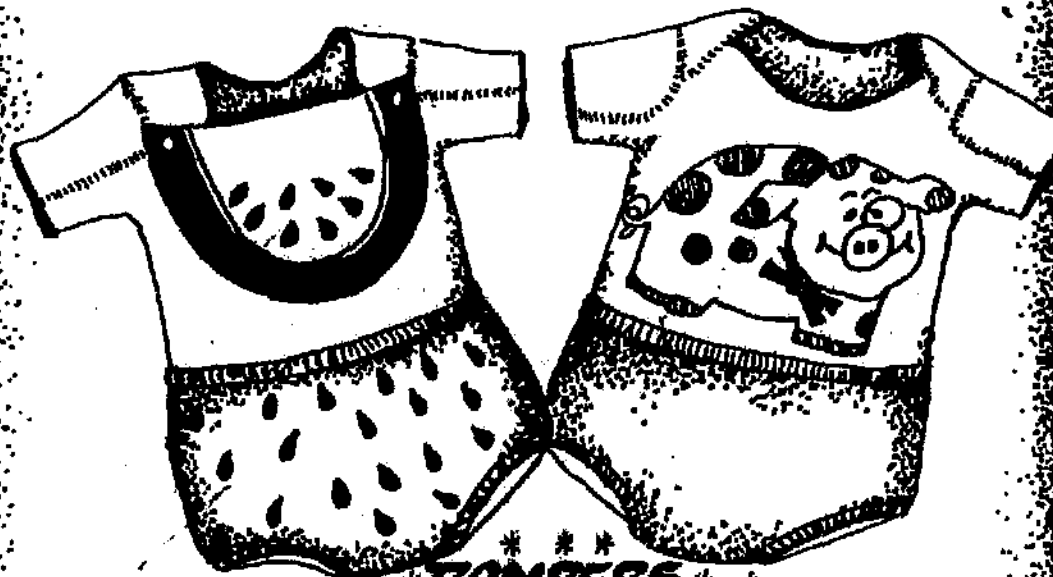
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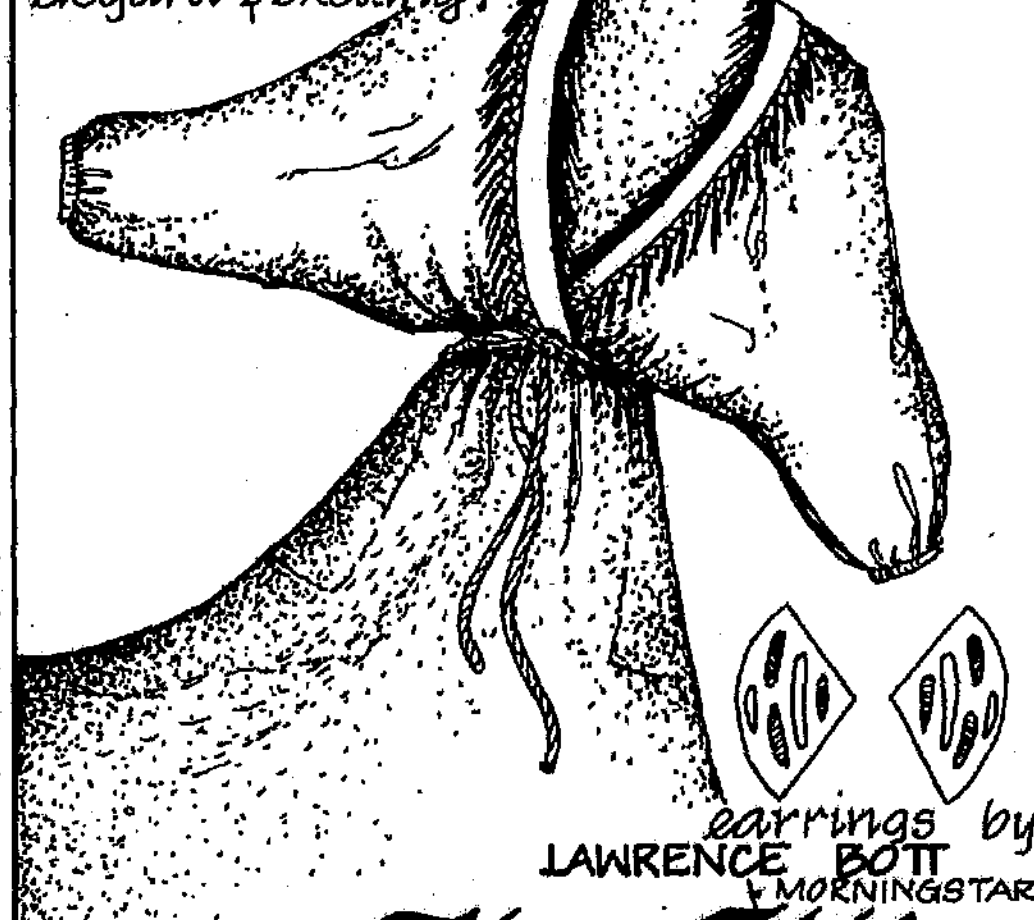

by August 1. Over 200 people attended an open house at the building last Sunday.

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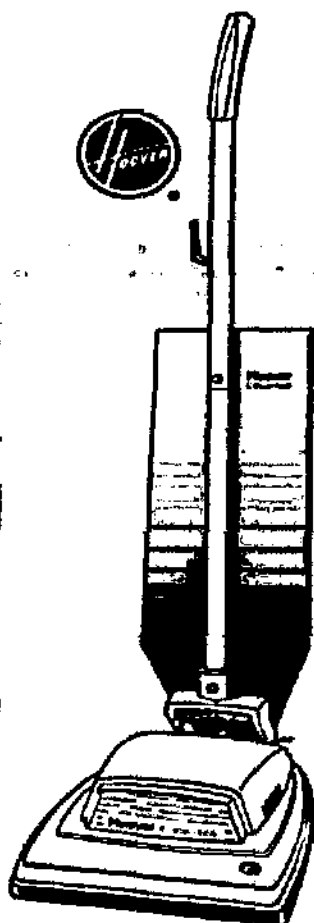
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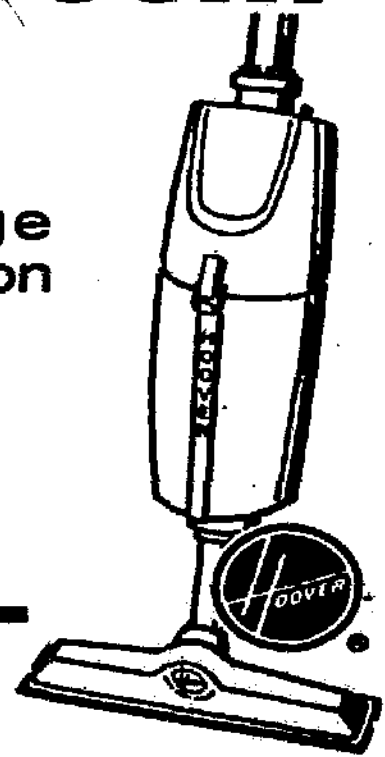
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Around Sports with Gary Brown



Ruidoso Parks and Recreation director Pam Graves now has to go through the same routine she went through a while ago to get approval to build a sports complex.

Graves can have two softball fields built on 22 acres of Eagle Creek-area land once the Ruidoso village council and the federal government approve a 12-year lease the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association has offered the recreation department.

Last month the New Mexico Natural Resources Department refused to pass on to the Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund an application to use \$20,000 in federal funds to help build the sports complex near White Mountain Middle School with a three-year lease.

Now Graves has to go through the same thing all over again to get approval of the 12-year lease on the Eagle Creek land. The government usually wants at least a 10-year lease for permission to use federal funds.

Graves thinks the project could be started soon after the department gets approval from the federal government and the village council.

The project probably will go before the village council in about two weeks. After that, it might be another 30 days before the federal government makes a decision.

Thus, early September or late August would be the earliest time the project could be started.

According to Graves, a couple of softball fields most likely would be the first projects built on the Eagle Creek land. There is a possibility that some soccer fields also could be built on the land in a later phase.

The sooner the project is approved and started, the better off local sports will be.

As I've said before, we need more softball, baseball and soccer fields to fill the needs of an expanding population.

All-American Park Field in Ruidoso Downs has limited parking and seating facilities for softball fans. A larger and more modern sports complex must be built.

Turning to football for a second, the second annual United States Football League championship game will be played between the Philadelphia Stars and Arizona Wranglers Sunday night in Tampa, Florida.

This will be Philadelphia's second trip to the championship game. Last year the Stars lost a 24-22 decision to Michigan.

But this year should be different. Philadelphia has the league's best record with an 18-2 mark and is a well-balanced team.

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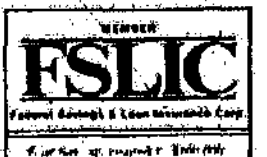


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Softball Results

Appalachian Mountain Club works on Three Rivers Trail

They came from different parts of the country and from diverse lifestyles. One was a professional mediator, some were students, another was an insurance manager. Yet for two weeks they were like a well-honed machine, working in synch and side by side, breaking a trail for future hikers.

The crew are members of the Appalachian Mountain Club, a Boston-based outdoors club devoted to recreation, conservation and working with the Forest Service.

The group returned to Ruidoso last week tired but pleased, having relocated part of Trail 44, the Three Rivers trail, up in the White Mountain Wilderness.

According to forester Randy Herzberg, the trail had suffered severe water erosion problems over a stretch of several hundred yards, which the crew replaced with half a mile of reinforced trail.

Crew leader Peter Flemings said the repair job was one of just five club-sponsored projects using volunteer crews for trail maintenance and trail building this summer.

Similar projects will take different club members into the Teton and Wind River Mountains in Wyoming, to national forest land in Alaska, and to the Virgin Islands.

"I think, historically, the Appalachian Mountain Club has been Eastern-oriented," said Flemings. "But they believe strongly that their methods of trail maintenance and trail building should be extended out West."

He said the club is trying to spread

good trail construction practices throughout the country, thereby improving hiking areas and benefiting the club through recognition.

Originally made up of eight members, the team lost two volunteers to altitude and sickness, leaving six camped out at 10,000 feet. They maintained contact with the Forest Service via radio.

Led by Flemings and Brooke Farquhar, volunteers each paid \$150 plus travel costs for the privilege of participating in the trail program. Most of them were first-timers.

Julie Sanders, 21, a student in Oregon, said not only was trail building a new experience, but that outdoor camping in general was foreign to her.

She said she had never done much outdoor recreation, and found her two weeks in the wild "real enriching."

Assistant insurance manager Graceann Mayo, 33, of Massachusetts, also said the experience was rewarding. It was her first effort at trail work, she said, and was such a change from her desk job routine that she plans to repeat the experience next year.

Zoila Ramirez had had some familiarity with parks and camping before, though not on as large a scale as trail work.

A professional mediator and public relations expert in New York City, the 25-year-old crew member said the open spaces impressed her the most, being in stark contrast to the tall buildings and congestion of the city.

Bob Hansen, 33, remembered doing trail work for the Forest Service a dozen years ago. He said he has always enjoyed being outside and working.

Most of his time is usually spent indoors in Colorado, as a manager of product regulation.

As for Flemings, 24, of Massachusetts, and Farquhar, 23, of New Hampshire, trail building has been a part of their lives for several years.

Both are members of professional trail crews for the mountain club, and both are active in leading club groups into the wilderness.

Farquhar said the volunteer program, new this year, attracted 1,500 inquiries from potential volunteers. She said normally the two-week project would have cost the club \$5,000. But volunteers cut the club's expense by more than half.

Also, she said, the program allows people from different backgrounds to get together and learn about each other.

"You really get to know a group of people when you sweat next to them," she said.

Herzberg said the Lincoln National Forest was one of several forest areas nationally to request the volunteers from the club. He estimated the program cost the government about \$1,000 in food and equipment.

According to Flemings, the club dates back to the 19th century. It is the oldest mountaineering and conservation organization in the nation, and, with 24,000 members, the largest in the Northeast.

He said the club is not well known in the Western states, unlike the Sierra Club. But with volunteer programs of trail maintenance and other projects, he said, that may change.

"If we keep up with projects like this one," he said, "I think it's going to happen as time goes on."

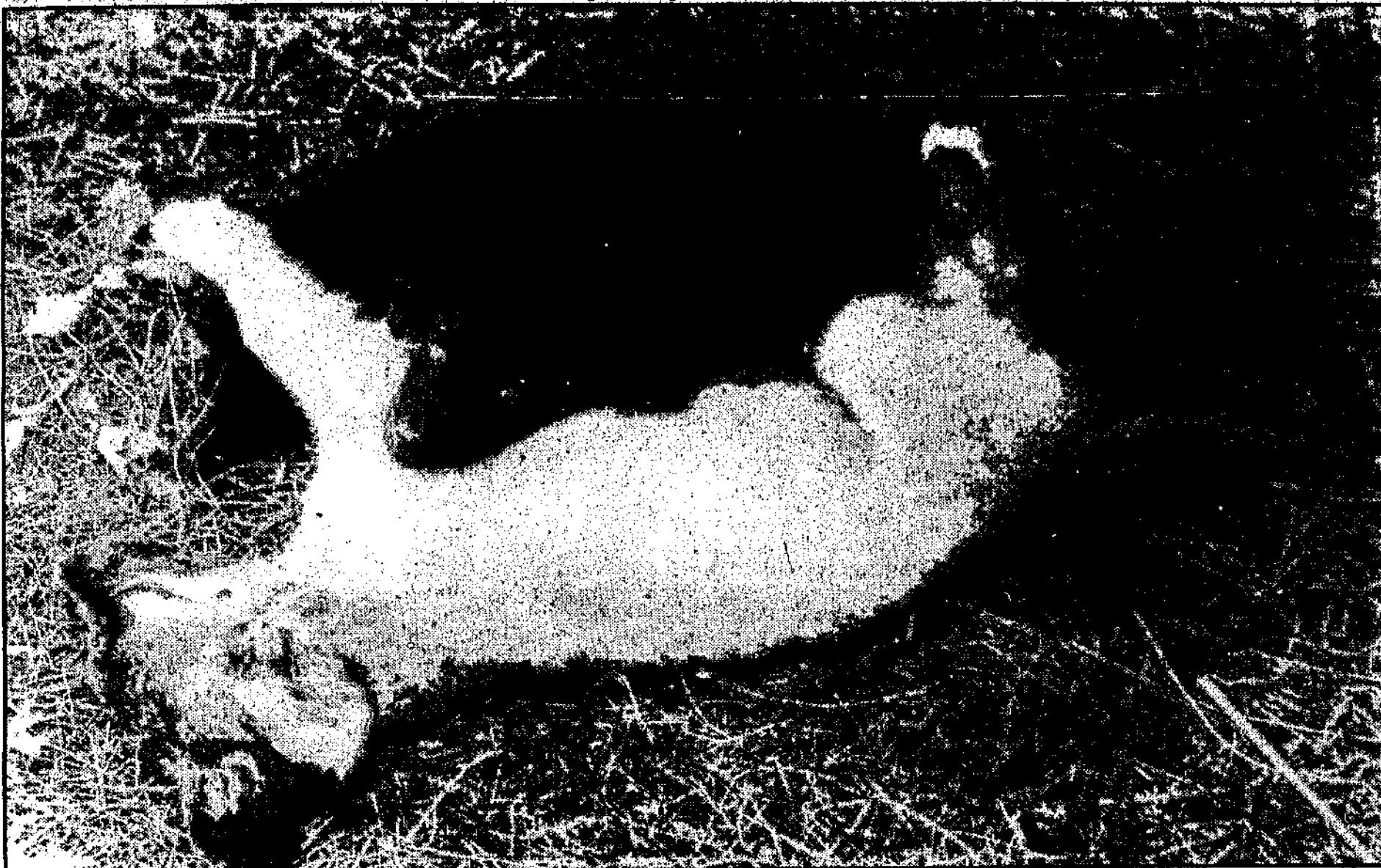

After graduating from high school in Lovington, Pat Ward attended the University of Oklahoma and graduated with a degree in library science and a minor in geology.

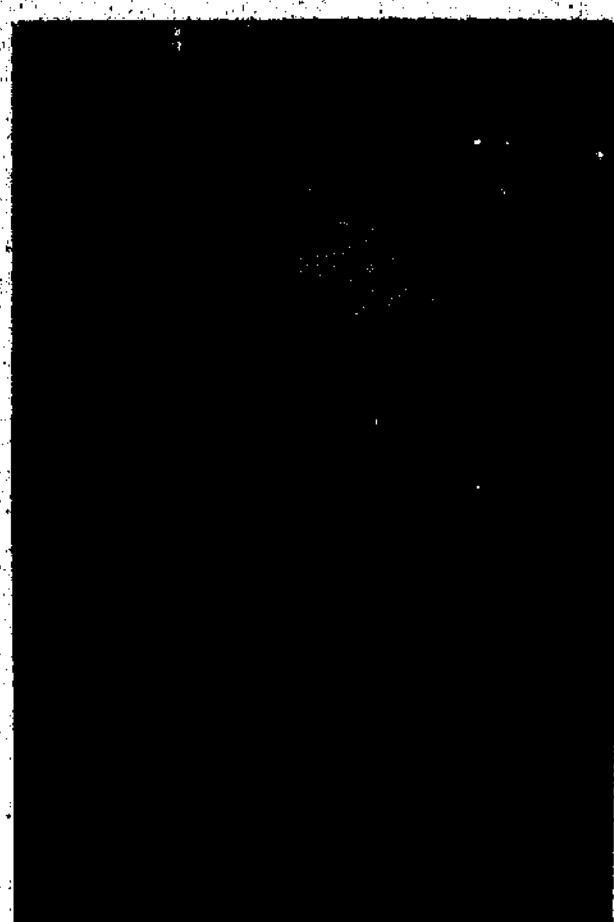
She has ranching experience and presently owns a ranch near Lovington, in Lea County.

Outdoor retail displays regulated

Warm summer breezes and plenty of pedestrian traffic have caused local business owners to take to the streets. Take their merchandise, that is.

Clothing, shoes, hats and arts and crafts are among some of the items being displayed outdoors by merchants hoping to attract cruising shoppers, either on foot or in vehicles.

Although this popular marketing technique apparently is successful in selling wares, various community members have questioned the legality of the display method.

Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis suggests that all retail merchants participating in outdoor displays review village ordinances pertaining to them. He supplied The News with a list of those ordinances.

Ordinance number 76-3, Article 9-7. Revised 10-10-81.

Outdoor display or sale of merchandise permitted in this zoning designation shall be allowed only as follows:

—No parking lot or driveway may be used for outdoor display or sale of merchandise.

—Any outdoor display or sale of merchandise shall be totally upon the merchant's property and shall not en-

croach upon any public right of way.

—Any outdoor display or sale of merchandise shall not impose an impediment to motor vehicular traffic, pedestrian traffic, or otherwise create a hazard by obstructing the view of vehicular traffic, even if said outdoor display or sale of merchandise is totally upon the merchant's property.

In the event any hanging apparatus connected or attached to a building is used for the outdoor display or sale of merchandise, then said hanging display shall be a minimum of seven (7) feet from ground level and in no ways shall hang over any public right of way.

Tip sheet sign permit suggested

A workshop group of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) met Monday to formulate a proposal on the fate of tip sheet advertising signs.

The workshop was necessitated when members of P&Z wanted to establish the legality of the present display methods. Many of the signs do not meet present village sign ordinance requirements, such as those for size and posting apparatuses.

During the meeting, it was propos-

ed that tip sheet signs should qualify for a special seasonal permit, to be issued by the village. The seasonal advertising period, it was suggested, would be designated as two weeks prior to the beginning of a racing season through one week after the close of that season.

All sign owners would be required to obtain a permit in order to qualify for the sign variance. After a permit had been obtained, the village would issue a blanket waiver for all registered signs. The owners would have to specify the location of each sign.

It was recommended by H. Ray Bishop that no individual sign exceed the measurement of one square foot. Signs would then be displayed in one central location, not to exceed a total of nine square feet.

"Tip sheet signs are not to be considered by business owners as additional signage allowed by law. This space will be used to display tip sheet signs only," said P&Z member Martin Rose.

The tip sheet sign proposal will be brought to the full P&Z for approval at the regular scheduled meeting at 3 p.m. Monday at village hall.

A full selection of wines is available to begin the evening. Our choice was the Pouilly Fuisse wine, as suggested by restaurant manager Richard Girot.

Girot and his wife, Pascale, operate the restaurant, located at the Best Western Swiss Chalet Motel. Richard handles the public relations end of the restaurant, greeting diners and orchestrating the activities in the dining room. Pascale operates the kitchen half of the restaurant, overseeing the exquisite creations of the cuisine.

The Girots bring to the restaurant years of experience, having operated restaurants in France, Morocco and Scotland before coming to the United States. According to Pascale, the menu at the Vieux Chalet is typical of better French restaurants. The Girots have been at the Vieux Chalet for 18 months.

After a taste of the wine, which comes from a small vineyard in Burgundy, France, according to Richard, we began on les Crevettes

After dinner, we enjoyed Deserts Pascale de Black Forest cake and cheesecake amaretto. Aussi bien!

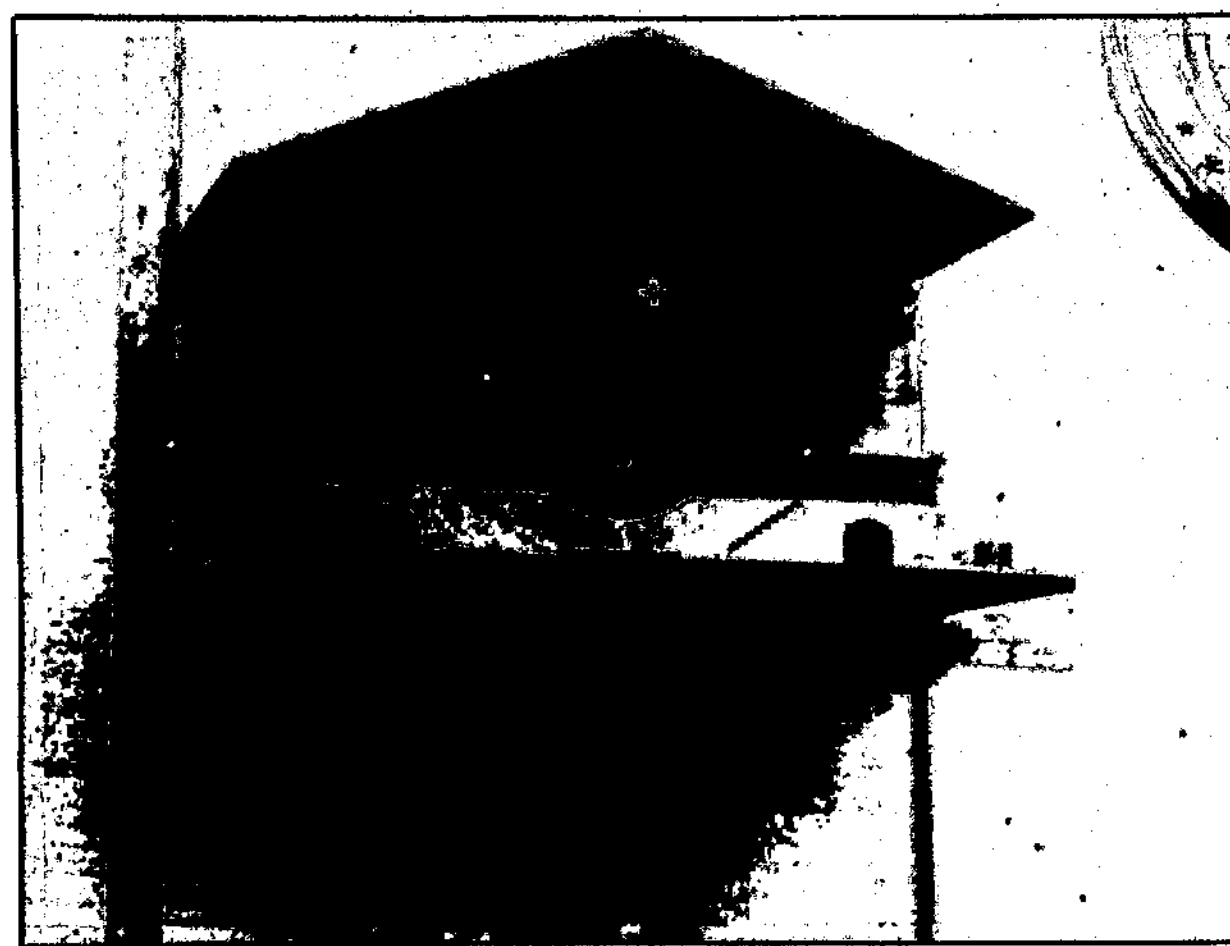

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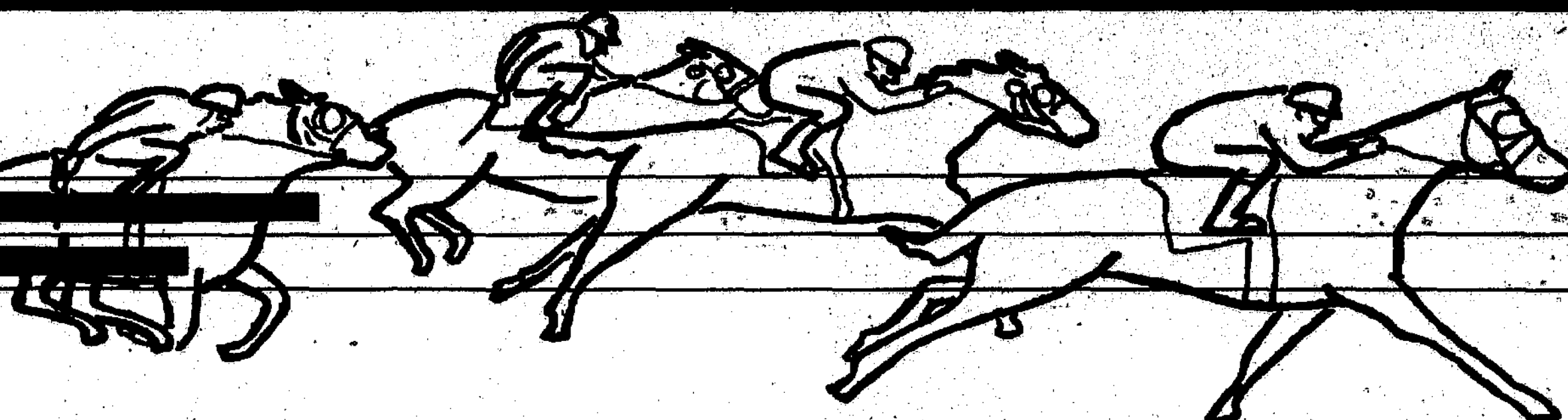

Make Mine Cash returns Friday; Pocket Coin 'Cap Saturday

Make Mine Cash, the filly who 'backed' into a victory purse of almost \$565,000 last summer at Ruidoso Downs, returns to the mountain course for Friday's headliner.

The spin for fillies and mares in the 3-year-old and up category will cover 400 yards and puts up a \$4,700 purse.

Weekend activity at Ruidoso continues on Saturday and Sunday. First post each day is 1 p.m.

Saturday's agenda is topped by the 5 1/2-furlong Pocket Coin Handicap, while Sunday's key event is the six-furlong Crazy Frills Handicap. The Pocket Coin is conditioned for two-year-olds and offers added money of \$7,000. The Crazy Frills is for three-year-olds and up and puts up a \$7,500-added pot.

In Friday's headliner, Make Mine Cash will break from the number three post and will share the top load of 122 pounds with three rivals in the 10-horse field. She is owned by the prominent sportsman, R.D. Hubbard of Wichita, Kansas.

Last summer, Make Mine Cash (a daughter of the top stallion, Dash For Cash) wrangled her way into the finale of the \$1,696,244 All-American Derby. A central irony is the fact that the filly checked in with the bottom qualifying time of 21.94 seconds for 440 yards.

In the finale, Make Mine Cash had to tangle with the mighty Mr Master Bug, winner of the 1982 All-American Futurity and more recently, the Rainbow Derby. The fans turned Make Mine Cash loose at nearly 7-1.

Mr Master Bug swooped to a 1 1/4-length win, but along the way he bothered Bartendress (who had wound up third). So Mr Master Bug had to pay a severe price for his wayward course, and was disqualified from first and placed third. That moved Bartendress into second.

Make Mine Cash, who was in no way involved in the fracas, had finished second. But with the disqualification of Mr Master Bug, Make Mine Cash was elevated to first and collected a mind-numbing \$564,849.

That was the filly's final score of 1983. So far this year, she has won twice—both at the Peninsula Meeting at Bay Meadows in California. The first came in a 400-yard allowance dash, the second in the Peninsula Handicap, again at 400 yards. The latter coughed up a paycheck of \$21,875.

As a two-year-old, Make Mine Cash scored big at Los Alamitos, where she won the Faberge Special Effort Futurity, and hauled in a tremendous \$411,540.

Make Mine Cash is the sixth-richest quarter horse of all time, with a bulging bankroll of over \$1,125,000.

San Rosa Leah, who may give Make Mine Cash her toughest argument, ran second in a 440-yard allowance duel on June 30. Earlier in the meeting, she made the finale of the \$154,010 Rainbow Silver Cup, but did not threaten. Previously, she ran third (to the great filly Indigo Illusion) in a division of the Go Together Handicap at 350 yards.

Groton Going, a stakes-winning gelding who was purchased for only \$10,000 in the 1983 Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings, goes after

and will be staged in the All-American Sales Arena on the track grounds on July 27 and 28. Both sessions begin at 7:30 p.m.

Groton Going made his racing debut on March 2 at Sunland Park, finishing second in a four-furlong event. Two weeks later he was back at the same distance, again against maidens, and ran second once again, this time as a 9-5 favorite.

His third crack at maidens came on April 6, and once more he finished second. In late April, he ran in the five-furlong trials for the \$38,519 Riley Allison Thoroughbred Futurity. He finished third, but that was enough to put him in the \$10,000 Consolation.

The gelding came into his own in

the Consolation, jumping into a quick lead and fattening his advantage up to 5 1/2 lengths when he glided across the finish line. He earned six grand in the romp.

Earlier this summer, he raced at Santa Fe, where he scored an upset win in the \$80,465 La Esperanza Futurity. First place was worth nearly \$50,000.

Black Jack Mack and Barrtime will be coupled as the entry of Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas.

Black Jack Mack is a key up-and-comer, whose last outing came as a 6-5 favorite (in a three-horse entry) in the \$124,423 Norgor Futurity at Ruidoso. Black Jack Mack rallied from out of sixth place to finish third, earning \$14,930.

Before that, he rolled to a front-running 1 1/2-length win in the four-furlong Norgor trials. His first of two career wins was hung up at Sunland on March 10 when he banged out a four-length win against maidens, carrying 2-3 odds.

Braugh won his career debut at Sunland, overturning maidens by a head. Next came a pair of thirds at Sunland. Braugh made his Ruidoso

debut on July 1 in a 5 1/2-furlong allowance sprint, and charged from out of fourth place to win by a length as a 7-2 shot.

Barrtime, Duck 'N Dive and Mac Askus are also last-out winners.

Barrtime comes off a booming 6 1/2-length win over maidens traveling four furlongs. The colt raced as an odds-on favorite. Duck 'N Dive faced maidens at 5 1/2 furlongs on July 4 and won by more than six lengths at 5 1/2-1. Mac Askus won by 3 1/2 lengths as a 7-5 shot going 5 1/2 furlongs.

First post is 1 p.m.

Baldillez, O'Neill, Gilbreath tops

Jockey Alex Baldillez Jr. and apprentice Eugene O'Neill shared the jockey of the week honors—both nabbing five wins over the holiday weekend.

Baldillez scored four of his wins in time trials for the \$768,123 Rainbow Futurity. He qualified three head for the finale slated for Sunday, July 22.

The jockey's five victories came from 12 starts for an impressive .416 win percentage for the week. Baldillez also brought in one second and two thirds. The rider is now 24-14-12 from 81 starts for the season and overall win percentage of .296—the highest in the seasonal standings.

O'Neill's five scores boosted him from fourth to first in the seasonal standings. The jockey was up 12 times during the weekend, bringing his overall record for the meet to 28-15-12 from 138 starts and a win percentage of .203.

Mike Lidberg jumped from third in the seasonal standings to tie with O'Neill on seasonal wins. Lidberg had four wins during the weekend and is second in the overall standings on the basis of his .151 win percentage. Ramon Apodaca and Richard Bickel also made four trips to the winner's circle.

O.A. Martinez moved from ninth to eighth with his three wins over the holiday program. Steve Harris broke into the standings with three wins last week to tie with Larry Byers at 14 for the season. Jockeys Keith Asmussen and Jackey Martin also scored three wins.

Trainer C. Dwayne Gilbreath took the weekly trainer crown with eight trips to the winner's circle. Three of the scores earned his charges berths in the Rainbow Futurity for a shot at a

winner's purse of \$268,843. The victories came from 14 starts to put his win percentage for the week at an astounding .500 percent. The work included three seconds and one third.

Fred I. Danley was second with six wins and one second from 12 starts—also an incredible .500 win percentage. Gilbreath and Danley are tied at 25 wins for the season, with Gilbreath taking the number two slot on the basis of his higher seasonal win percentage.

Trainer Bob E. Arnett jumped from tenth to eighth in the seasonal standings with four victories over the weekend. Marilyn Asmussen was the closest contender, bringing in three

winners.

Clifford C. Lambert moved up one notch to sixth in the seasonal standings, while Terrell E. Davidson broke onto the roster to tie with R.W. Werner for eight scores during the meet.

Racing resumes Thursday and continues through Sunday with a 1 p.m. starting time each day.

Two stakes are on the schedule, starting with Saturday's \$7,000-added Pocket Coin Handicap at 5 1/2 furlongs. The event is for two-year-olds. On Sunday, it's the \$7,500-added Crazy Frills Handicap for three-year-olds and up. The distance is six furlongs.

To be a young gifted jockey

Apprentice jockey Eugene O'Neill has come a long way since taking his first mount at Ruidoso Downs last season. The young El Pasoan finished the spring meet at Sunland Park as sixth leading rider and has held his position among the top five jockeys at Ruidoso Downs since early in the meet.

With no family in the racing business, O'Neill learned the trade from the ground up. Attending Coronado High School in El Paso, the 18-year-old jockey began galloping thoroughbreds for trainer Jim Curry at Sunland Park two years ago.

"My parents didn't want me to do it," O'Neill recalled. "They thought it was too dangerous. They didn't grow up around horses, so they didn't know."

O'Neill worked at Sunland the following season and moved to Ruidoso last summer to work for trainer Clifford Lambert. Lambert gave the rider his first shot.

"He took me over to the gates and I got my first OK from the gates on a mare named Rita Fols, who ran second in the Norgor Futurity last year. He took me and got my license and told me to go ahead and give it a try to see what I liked."

O'Neill admitted he was naive about the racing business.

"Last year when I started riding, I didn't know you got paid unless you ran first, second or third. When I rode my first race, I ran fifth. When they handed me a check a week later, I said 'What's this for?'"

O'Neill went on to pilot close to 100 thoroughbreds in the meet and win 15 races.

"With what I know now, I wonder how I won any races at all last year. I guess just my will to learn kept me motivated," he recalled.

With 112 mounts under his belt at the current Ruidoso Downs meet, O'Neill has pulled in 23 winners. His success has attracted offers from racing connections around the country, but O'Neill said he is not interested in leaving the Southwest.

"I'm happy here. I win two or three races a weekend and my friends are here. Why would I want to go to Detroit or some other place where I don't know anybody? I could probably make ten times as much, but money isn't everything."

Besides, the young rider apparently is doing fine in the income department.

"The first week I was up here (this season) I made \$3,500," O'Neill said. The jockey is investing his earnings in real estate.

With more than 50 wins to his credit, O'Neill will be losing his apprentice status on August 14. The young jockey admits being apprehensive about dropping the weight advantage he has had, but thinks his abilities will overcome the loss.

"I guess I'm just like any of the jockeys, I'm afraid people will stop riding me," O'Neill said. "But my agent feels that I will still do well."

"Let's put it this way. I give it 150 percent out here and I'm going to give it 200 percent when I finish my apprenticeship."

O'Neill plans to ride at the Albuquerque State Fair after the Ruidoso meet and then travel to Turf Paradise.

"I'm taking this riding career of mine day-by-day," he said. "I know this isn't going to last forever. One of these mornings I'm going to wake up and weigh 115 and say 'What am I going to do now?'"

But for now O'Neill sees nothing but thoroughbred racing in his future. He doesn't think he has enough experience to steer quarter horses yet.

"Things happen fast in a quarter horse race. In a thoroughbred race if I drop my reins coming out of the gate, I've got plenty of time to make up for the mistake."

In a few years, O'Neill may make the switch to quarter horses.

"Right now I'm doing well on thoroughbreds and I'm going to stick with them."

"To me this isn't work—this is pleasure. If I could do this for another five years, that would be ideal to me."

Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

A CINCH OR BETTER, the gelding who turned in the fifth fastest qualifying time for the \$768,123 Rainbow Futurity, was repurchased for \$15,000 at the 1983 Ruidoso Downs All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale.

He already has earned more than \$100,000 in his freshman year at the track. The earnings include \$83,453 pocketed for his second in the \$605,384 Kansas Futurity on June 3.

Raise The Gamble, the colt who slipped into the Rainbow Futurity

final with the tenth fastest qualifying time, was purchased for \$18,000 at the All-American Yearling Sale.

His earnings this year total \$14,465, but he stands to make at least \$26,118 for placing last in the Rainbow Futurity finale.

THE WINNER OF THIS SUMMER'S \$605,384 Kansas Futurity—Flying Ark—couldn't come through in Thursday's time trials for the \$768,123 Rainbow Futurity. The gelding hit the stretch of the 400-yard dash trailing by two lengths

and crossed the wire third behind the winner Miss Mito and the 48-1 shot Mickey Dancer.

Miss Mito's qualifying time was so fast—19:820—that Flying Ark broke into the consolation field with the third-fastest time.

He now has a shot at a winner's purse of \$23,044 in the \$112,146 Rainbow Futurity Consolation slated for July 21.

THE JOCKEY-TRAINER COMBINATION of Alex Baldille Jr. and William F. Leach turned in a good

day's work on Thursday—winning four time trial elimination races for the \$768,123 Rainbow Futurity.

The four wins qualified three head for berths in the finale slated for Sunday, July 22. The winner of that race deposits \$835,977.

Baldille's first victory came in the opener on A Cinch Or Better. The second-place finisher in this summer's \$605,384 Kansas Futurity went postward as the odds-on favorite to win by a half-length.

Baldille was up on Flow Of Cash in

the third to win by one length as the odds-on favorite. The filly pocketed \$39,025 for her third-place finish in the Kansas Futurity June 3.

Dash For Destiny took the fourth division with Baldille at the reins. The colt turned a 20:215 time—not fast enough to earn a berth in the finale or the consolation. The colt won by a head over the 14-1 shot Aamerican Moon Fun.

The jockey's last win came in the sixth with the filly Cash For Sis. At 2-1, she showed phenomenal closing

form to win by 3/4 lengths in 19:770—the top qualifying time for the Rainbow Futurity finale field.

THE RACING COMMUNITY was saddened over the week by the passing of Felix Turner, 49, a long-time racing figure at Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park. Turner, at one time an official at both tracks, was engaged as a jockey agent for the past 10 years or so. At the time of his death (on Friday) he was handling the book for Carlos Rivas. He was buried Saturday morning in Ruidoso.

"We have met the enemy and he is us."

How else do you account for the fact that just this week—18 years after a law was passed that would have required air bags or other "passive restraints" for vehicles—we learn that in 1988, such a law might take effect.

The original 1966 law was to have taken effect in 1969. It was put off until 1976, but never became enforceable as the Ford, Carter and Reagan administrations alternately said "no," "yes" and "no."

A year ago, the Supreme Court overruled Reagan's "no," which led his administration to announce this week that the law would take effect. If three-fourths of the states did not pass mandatory seat-belt laws in the meantime.

The question is: how many lives will have been lost in the 22 years from 1966 to 1988 because people didn't have mandatory seat-belts?

The answer is: the same number of lives as were lost because people with the kind of seat-belts you have to buckle yourself didn't have sense to use them.

It's funny, in a morbid sort of way, that all of this legislative, executive and judicial wrangling is over something people should know enough to do without devices or laws requiring them to—buckle up.

One way to look at it is that people who do not and who pay the consequences in an accident get what's coming to them. But that seems like a crying shame.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Ken Newton, of Santa Fe Downs, has had second thoughts. He now says he is going to rebid on that deal to run a Spring racing season at the State Fair grounds in Albuquerque.

He ought to. It could be a sweet deal for somebody—though not necessarily for the state of New Mexico.

You remember the situation here. The State Fair people asked for bids on this project in such low voices that nobody but Newton heard them the first time out.

When the Attorney General told them to go back and do that over, at least for the sake of propriety, Newton got irate and said he had no intention of going on with what had begun to look like a farce.

Now he has been back to his calculator, and has concluded it's worth his while to rebid the contract.

If his second bid comes in at about the same level of the first one, the principal advantage to the state in the arrangement would appear to be that \$3.5 million worth of improvements Newton plans to the State Fair grandstand. We taxpayers could come out pretty well on that one.

Newton's original plans called for enclosing the grandstand, redoing the heating and air conditioning and making other improvements to upgrade the place, especially the Jockey Club.

Much of that expense, of course, would be paid for out of the portion of the take the state now allows management to hold back for purposes of capital improvements. The question of whether or not that expenditure would be depreciable to Newton appears not to have been addressed publicly. If it would, that might prove another advantage to the contractor.

As for the one percent of the handle per day the original bid called for, that would not seem like much of a sacrifice to the operator. He would likely end up paying something like \$150,000 to \$200,000 to the state for "rental" of our facility. He probably pays that much in property taxes on Santa Fe Downs, which he owns; the State Fair, of course, is charged no taxes of that kind.

Whether or not Newton will get any opposing bids appears questionable. Rick Henson, general manager of

Ruidoso-Sunland Incorporated, is clearly reluctant to bid; he says his group will do so only if forced to. What's more, they would want more time to prepare their bid than the Fair seems to be planning to allow for. And there is the fact that this group might have to shut down one of its present tracks if it got the State Fair contract, because present state law says you cannot operate more than two tracks in New Mexico.

Some of the moaning from Henson and others involved in racing in southern New Mexico appears to be a little exaggerated. It is hard to believe Albuquerque business is so essential to the Anapra (Sunland Park) track, which has a metropolitan area three times the size of Albuquerque to draw business from. Maybe if the people there promoted as effectively as Newton does, they would not now be talking such poornmouth.

Of course, there is still no assurance any of this will get by the state Racing Commission. That body is, at the time of this writing, still short one member, apparently because Toney Anaya does not know many non-Democratic horsemen who can be considered candidates. The latest appointee to the commission is from Ruidoso; he is not likely to look kindly on Spring racing in Albuquerque. Nor is the member from Farmington, where racing, only recently begun, could be totally wiped out if Albuquerque has Spring dates. And if Sharon Janecka, one of the few long-term commission members, wanted to take a long, hard look at Farmington racing, she should want even more detail on this proposal.

And there is another question nobody has so far answered clearly: How does Albuquerque feel about this whole suggestion?

Suppose 1500 horses were held at the Fair grounds from the end of the annual fair till the Spring racing meeting. Each horse produces, by weight, 25 pounds of solid waste (as we delicately put it) each day. That comes to almost two tons daily—at a location that is really in the heart of Albuquerque.

You would think some might find that a little offensive.

I think of myself as being fairly new at the job of editor. It was two years ago in April that I moved into the job. It was a surprise to start counting and realize that a total of 11 reporters have worked for the paper since then. I got to wondering how some of them who have moved on were doing, so I thought I'd see.

"Oh, it's all right. The red tape is a little hard to take sometimes," Barb likes her job more than she thought she would, especially the part that brings her into contact with the public.

I asked her if she missed the newspaper business.

"Yes, I do," she said. "I miss getting a byline in the paper." The press releases she writes for her department are used with no acknowledgment of the author, she explained.

"I like getting credit for my work—when it's good."

Barb also noted that working for a newspaper lets one keep up with what's going on in the world, and makes it easy to get to know the community one lives in.

"I don't miss the hours—that's for sure," she hastened to add.

Miss Grant is keeping her options open for the future. She has looked into the possibility of relocating to Phoenix, but she also has considered returning to the South—perhaps to Atlanta.

Barb summed up a major drawback of pulling up stakes and

moving across the country, like she did when she came from Maryland via Tennessee to New Mexico. She had gone home in May and spent much of the two weeks with her new niece.

"It's hard knowing I won't be able to see her grow up," she said of the prospect of remaining in the West.

David Sheppard was another veteran of the early part of my tenure as editor. He must be about to complete a year as the Alamogordo bureau person for The El Paso Times.

I tried to call Dave and got a recording. As far as I know, he and his wife, Charlie, are doing fine. They recently purchased a home and were looking forward to the visit of Charlie's father from Germany.

Billy Allstetter, the most recent staff member to depart The News, is still in Ruidoso. He has been working construction to build up a grubstake for a move to the West Coast.

Although he knew he would be leaving, Billy got a new fishing license and continues to pursue the wily and not so wily trout. Billy has an enviable knack for making the most of where he lives.

Of the other reporters who have come and gone, Pam Field moved to Albuquerque, which "Megatrends" told her was a city with a future; and Cathy Palmer is at Cedar Creek, working on a second novel while wondering what her new crop of sixth-grade students will be like.

One thing I have learned in these two years plus is that you're only as good as your people. I have been fortunate in the people I've had to work with, and I think the present staff of Gary Brown, Darrell Pehr, Cathy Reuter, Matt Bosio and "super intern" Lois Grushka is the strongest ever.

As editor, I sometimes am bugged by my own decisions of what to use and what not to use, as far as the effect a decision might have on a reporter's morale.

For example, when we had that partial solar eclipse some weeks ago, Darrell Pehr photographed it. Now photographing an eclipse is not your basic snapshot—it has to be set up carefully.

The print Darrell gave me was every bit as good as those that appeared on the front pages of the Albuquerque and Roswell papers. But we must have been tight for space that week, because I didn't run the picture.

Well, it doesn't make up for that or similar misjudgements on my part. But I do want my past and present reporters to know how much I appreciate them, and here's Darrell's eclipse photo.

Resident ag man states views on research vs. airport

The appearance of the land does not immediately suggest an airport. Much of it is rolling rangeland inhabited by cattle and sheep, surrounded by distant mountains.

A quiet place stretching over 26,000 acres, the land has been devoted for some 30 years to range, livestock and wildlife research under the direction of New Mexico State University.

Known officially as Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch, the project has produced during those years studies that have contributed to improved range management, greater beef yields and better nutritional guidelines for local ranchers and farmers.

Lately, however, the ranch has been concerned with more than just field experiments. It has been embroiled in controversy as the probable site of a new airport for Lincoln County.

Gene Parker, superintendent of the ranch, believes the controversy is a "political ball game" right now. But he quickly adds that that is just his personal opinion.

"This thing is going to be settled by the politicians. It doesn't matter what I think," said Parker.

What Parker thinks is that locating an airport on Site B on Fort Stanton Mesa would ruin research projects that have been in place since 1978. It also would prevent similar projects from getting started, he believes.

"Essentially, (the airport) is going to cut that part of the ranch in half," Parker said, "and essentially put us out of this type of research."

The research he refers to is a grazing study being worked on 6,100 acres. Parker calls the study "a dynamic thing" that is examining how rangeland and livestock production can be improved.

Some of what has been learned to date is that continuous grazing, as opposed to rotation grazing, results in higher calf weaning weights on average.

The main advantage of rotation grazing, according to the studies, was in vegetational growth and not livestock improvement.

Another study demonstrated that a given range area could support one-third more dry cows than lactating cows. The study was based on rangeland forage consumption.

Other projects have shown "the benefit of crossbred cows over straightbred. A study comparing Hereford and Angus-Hereford showed that crossbred cows had a 92 percent calf crop, compared to 84 percent for the straightbred."

Parker feels these are some examples of research projects going on at the ranch that benefit area ranchers directly. He said the experiments "explain things down the road, even though you don't see it right away."

He said it has been suggested that he could simply pick up his research projects and relocate them to other parts of the ranch, thus freeing up the acreage needed for Site B.

But Parker claims that is impossible. He believes that not only would years of precise research be wiped

out, there also is no suitable replacement for the land in question.

He listed his reasons for that belief. Hundreds of acres at the ranch are

too rough for the grazing study; another parcel is a flood control area; 3,000 acres are devoted to sheep; and another 3,000 acres have been set

aside by the Bureau of Land Management as a natural area for wildlife.

Parker suggests, instead, that the new airport be built just outside the research acreage on a section of rangeland known as Site A.

The site is made up of state and private lands that are alternately flat and hilly. The area is similar to Site B in terrain, but contains gullies that are substantially deeper.

"We think there's potential there," Parker said. "And we've offered, if they would accept it, to trade some of our acres for private land to help cut the costs so it's economically feasible."

Parker admits that Site A has certain physical drawbacks that make it a less attractive location than Site B.

"But compared with the current airport by the schoolhouse," he said, "it certainly would be an improvement."

That is not to say that Site B is a much better choice, Parker went on. He said phase one of the three-phase proposal to build the airport would be cheaper at Site B. But phase two would involve considerable cost filling in 40-foot canyon drifts, he claimed.

"Where is the fill dirt going to come from?" he asked. "The dirt will most economically come from either side of the runway, which would impact even greater in this area."

He said that while 1,666 acres are planned for the airport at Site B, "it will severely impact 7,000 acres."

In short, Parker believes that Site A would be as safe as Site B; that land trades would make it economical to build there; that phase three of the proposal for Site B is not likely to ever

get started, due to the cost; and that nearby residents would be opposed to "big jets flying in over their houses."

Parker claims that one of the approach patterns for Site B would cut across Alto Village.

"Can you imagine how upset those people are going to be when those planes fly over their homes?" he speculated. "Most people move here to get away from the city. Now they want to bring the city to them."

A 20-year cooperative research agreement between the Bureau of Land Management and New Mexico State University expires in 1990. According to the agreement, the term can be altered only with the consent of both parties.

"Parker would not predict what will happen during those years, or whether Site B will be selected as the new airport site. What he hopes is that research can continue at the Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch in the same manner as it has since the early 1960s."

An airport would not end study projects on the mesa. Parker noted, though, that it would curtail some types of research.

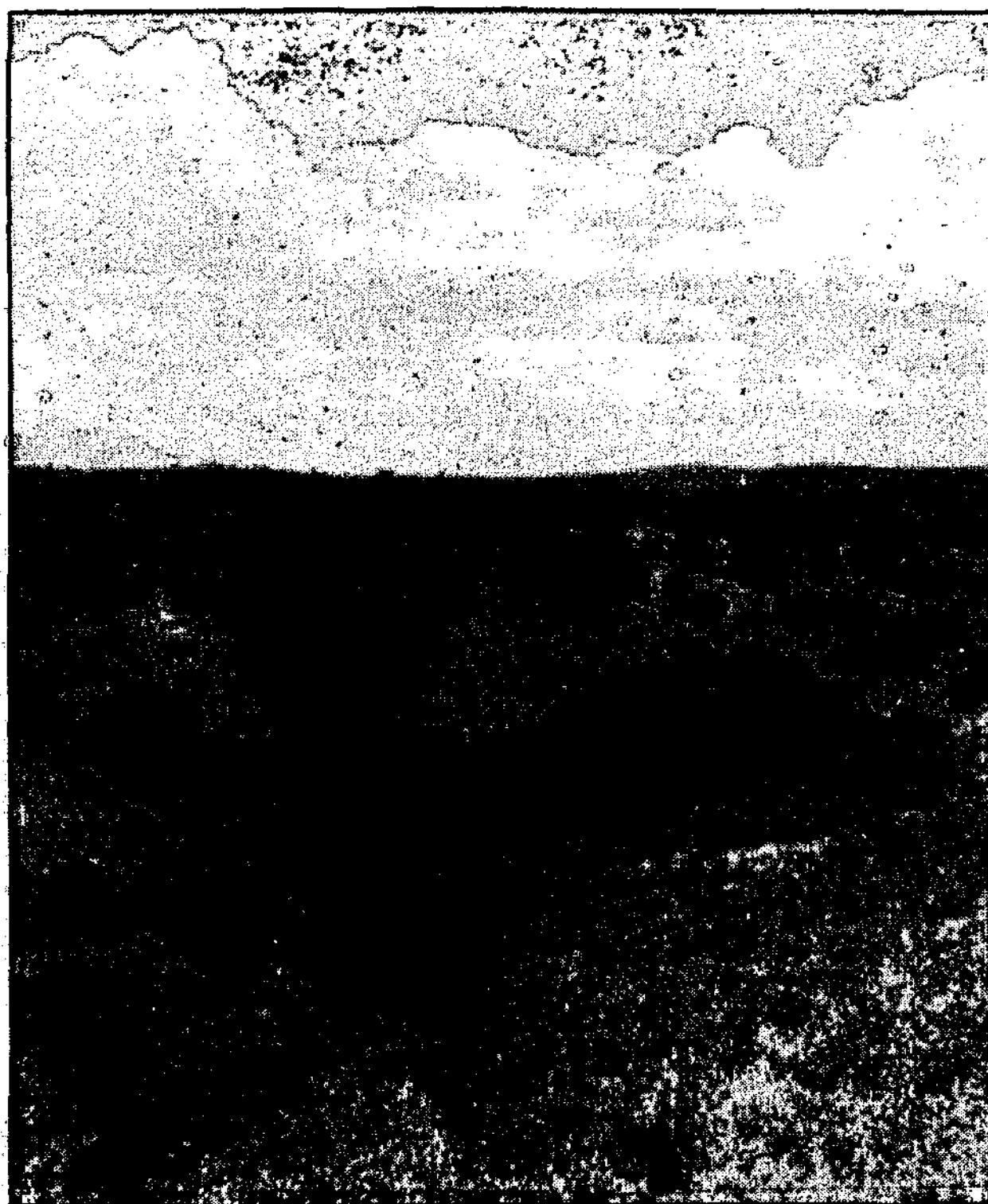
"We will still be able to do small plot work and this sort of thing," he said. "But we will not be able to do large grazing work that's desperately needed."

He explained that the objective of the ranch is "to learn more about managing rangelands and apply this to production and efficiency of production."

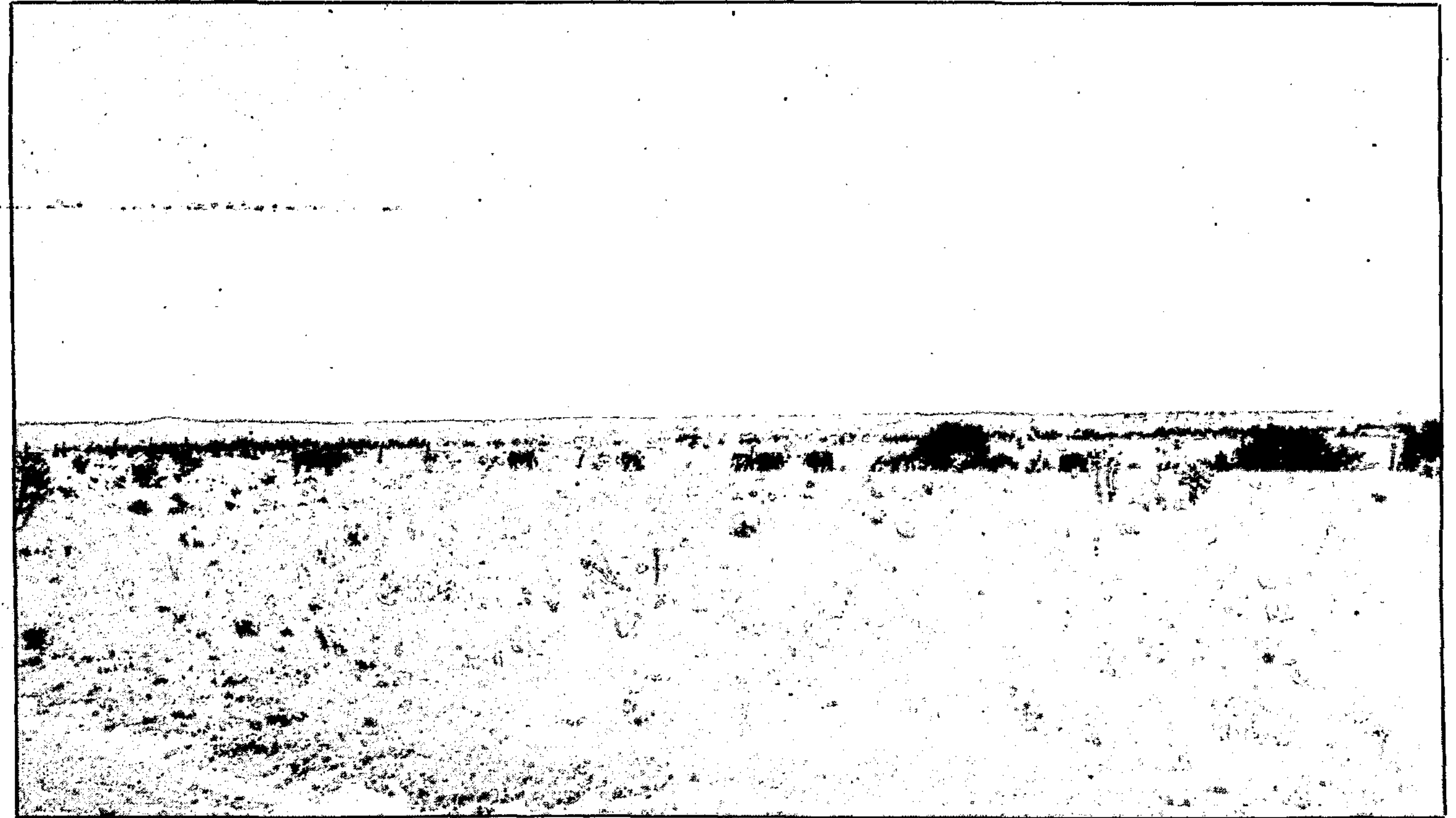
Doing that to the best of his capacity—with or without an airport—is all Gene Parker is really concerned with.



Gene Parker studies maps of Site B, where a proposed airport may be built. He feels Site A would be a better and equally safe site.

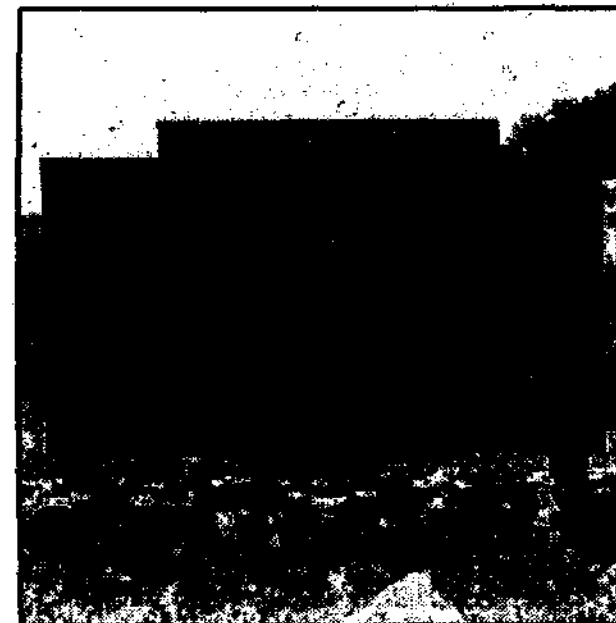

according to Gene Parker. He said the airport would cut off some research.



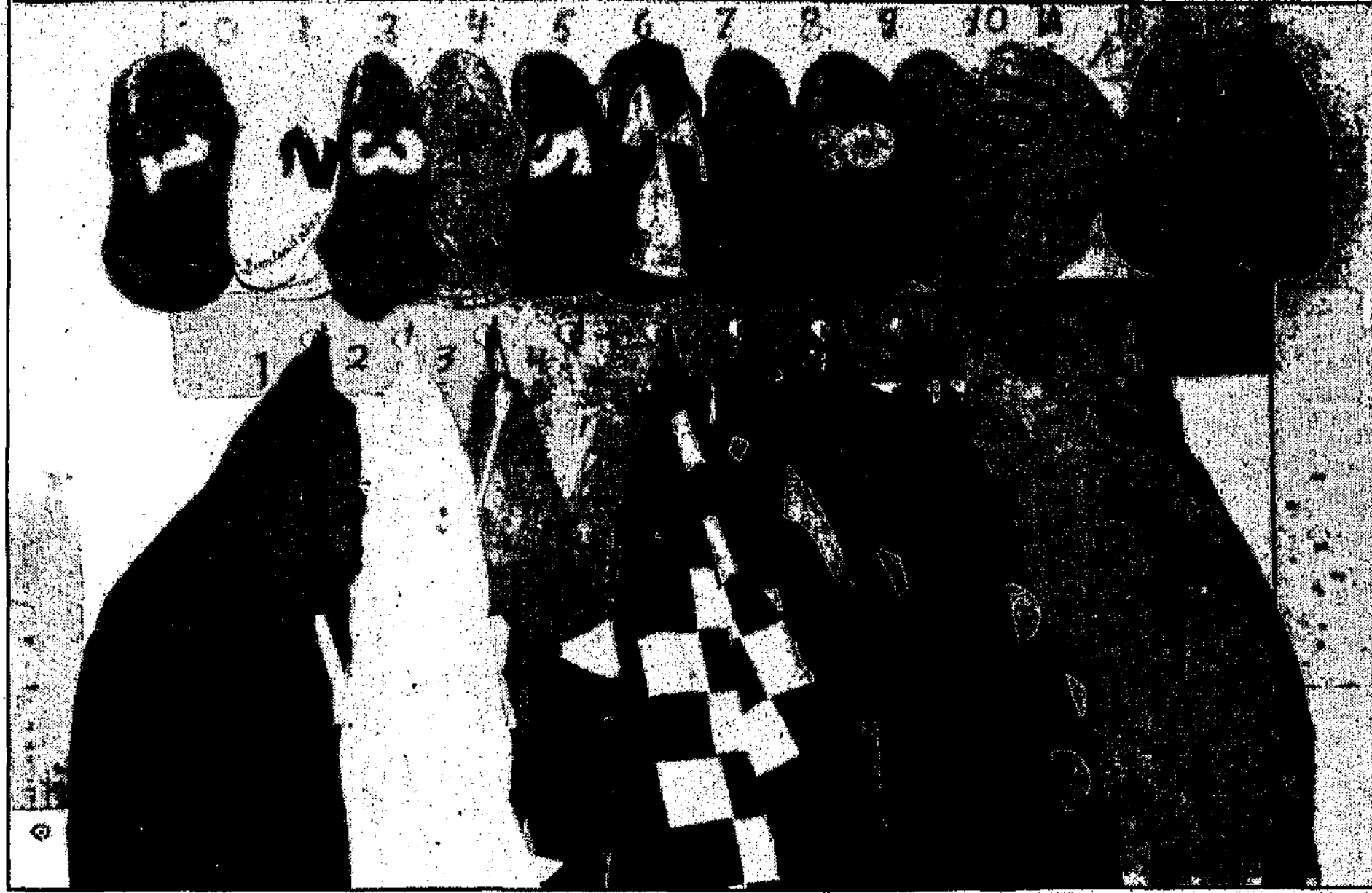
First established in the early 1960s, the experimental ranch is directed by research staff from New Mexico State University in Las Cruces.

Silks range across rainbow

Bettors at Ruidoso Downs Race Track don't have to wait until July to see red, white and blue.

They see those colors every day the racetrack is open, along with a rainbow of other shades on the racing silks.

Horse owners can use their own designs and colors on the shirts and caps jockeys wear, said Bobby Harmon, a track steward.

One favorite is yellow with green "Chicken Man" letters. Those are the colors of a Church's Fried Chicken chain executive, Harmon explained.

"Most of these have been around a long time," Harmon said as he pointed out owners' colors on a race program.

If stable owners don't have colors of their own, they use the track's set colors for the different pole positions,

Harmon said.

The number one position wears red, number two wears white, number three is blue, four is gold, five is green, six is black and white, seven is orange, eight is purple, nine is cerise and 10 is light blue.

If a stable enters a second horse in a race, the jockey wears red and white stripes and a cap numbered 1A. If another stable enters two horses, the second jockey wears 2B and blue and white stripes.

Cerise, the number nine color, is a deep pink, Harmon said. Jockeys will wear it, but many riders shied away from another color.

"Some jocks won't use solid black," Harmon said. Because of the superstition, the sixth-position colors were changed.

"For 20 years we've used these colors in New Mexico," he said. Before becoming a steward, Harmon was a jockey in the area.

Each race program lists the colors a jockey is wearing, so bettors can spot their horse during a race. The saddle towels horses wear also carry the pole position's color.

The racing silks usually still are made of silk, with caps to match. One woman in El Paso makes most of the colors and saddle towels for tracks around the area, Harmon said.

At Ruidoso Downs, jockey room custodian Mike Hedeman watches over all of those colors and caps. He neatly arranges them and keeps them ready for the riders. His job also includes making sure the correct silks are available to each rider.

One thing Hedeman doesn't have to worry about is matching sizes to individuals, Harmon said. One size fits all, so to speak, because only one size is available.

The variety of colors and designs more than makes up for the single size.

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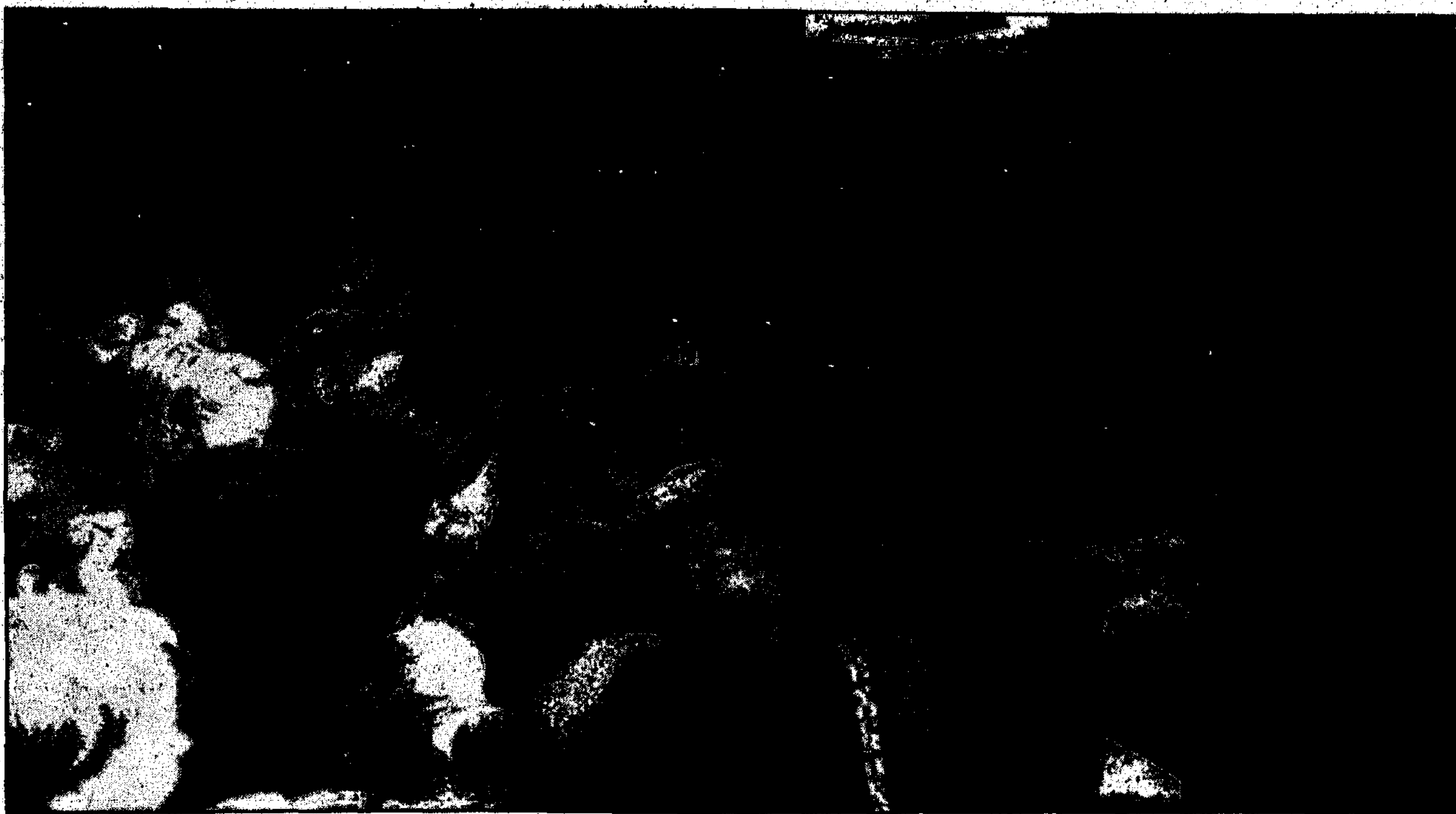
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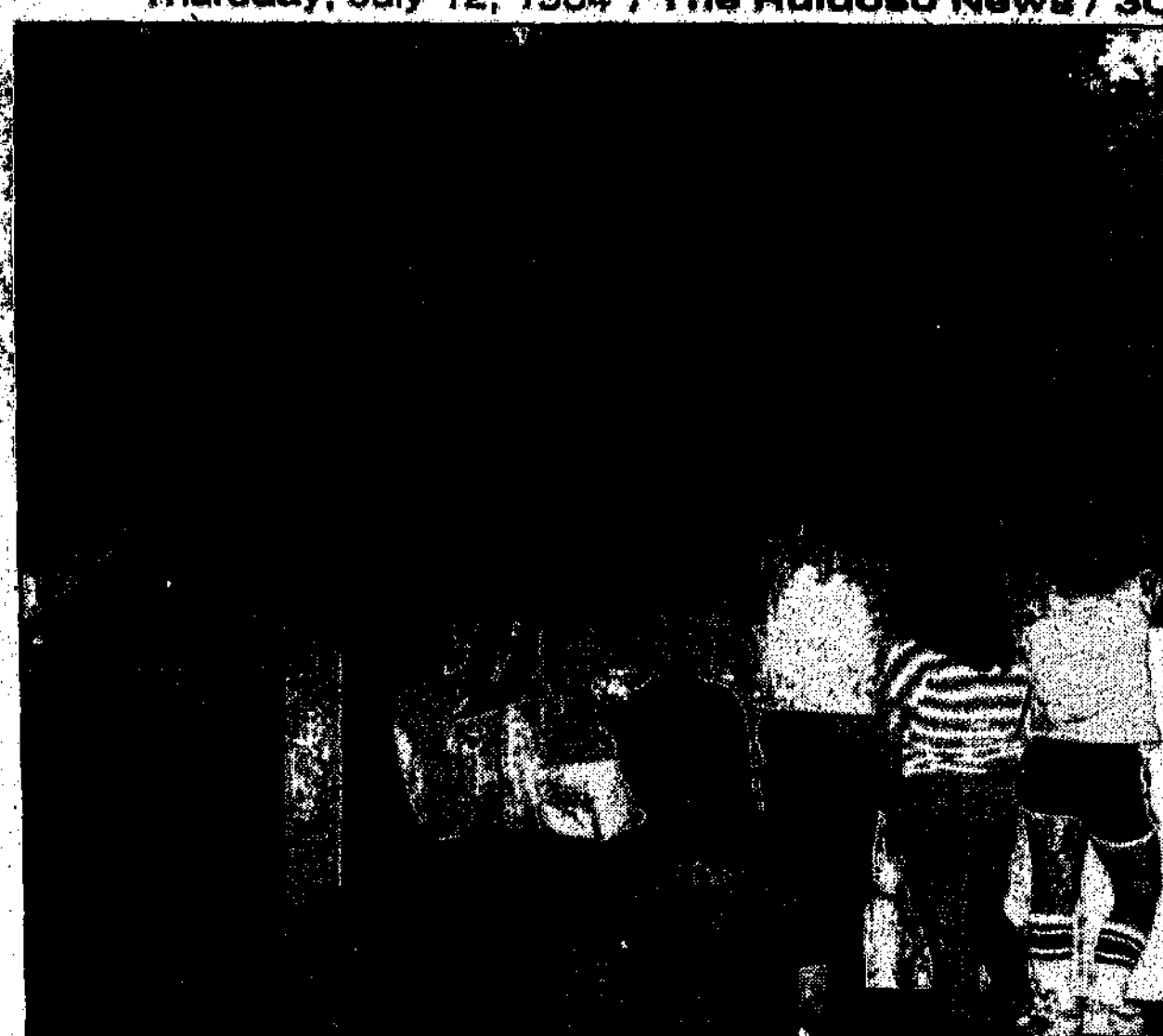

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"DO I NEED A WILL?" by Sandra A. Grisham

As an attorney practicing "people law", I am frequently asked that question. My usual answer is a definite yes.

Do you have children under the age of eighteen? If so, you have a say in who their guardian will be should they become orphaned. A bitter and expensive custody battle

may be prevented by a short clause in a will.

Did you own property before you were married, or have you acquired any by gift or through inheritance since? This is basically what is known as separate property, and if you die without a will, one-quarter of it will pass to your spouse and three quarters of it to your children. If you have a will, you can decide who gets what.

If you are married and have community property (all property acquired in this state which isn't separate property), your spouse will inherit all of it if you do not have a will. Through a will, you can decide what will happen to your half of any community property.

Do you want to leave your property to your children, but in such a way that they can spend a portion of it when they are eighteen, a portion of it when they are twenty-five, and the remainder when they are thirty? A simple trust can be included in your will.

If you have a ring from your great-grandmother that you specifically wish to go to your eldest daughter and a necklace from aunt Mary that you want to go to your youngest, you can now include in your will a reference to a list of specific items of personal possession that you wish to go to specific people. You can then change the list without writing a new will.

You may need a will for tax purposes, or to benefit a church or charity, or for many other reasons. See your attorney...a little planning and a few dollars spent now can save a lot of heartache and expense later.



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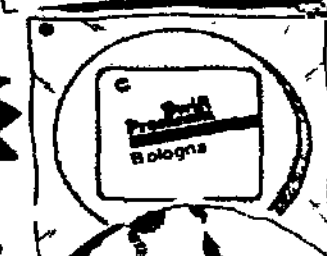
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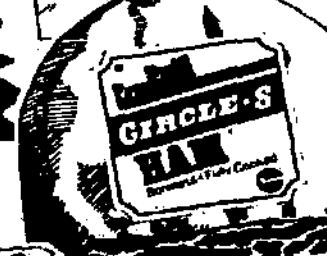
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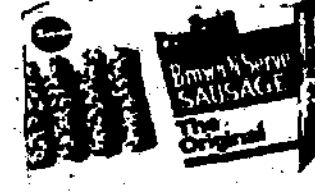
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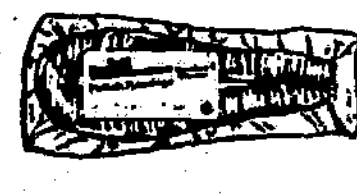
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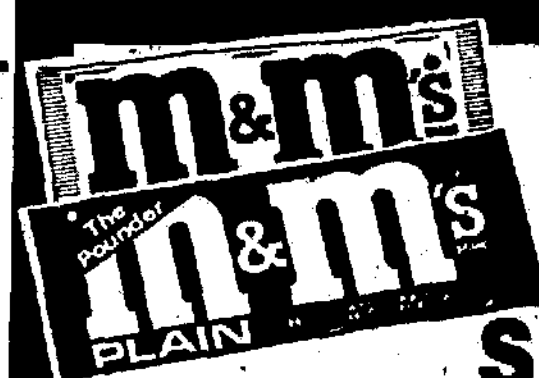
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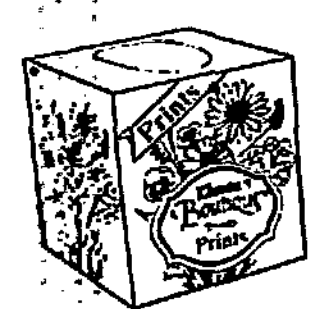


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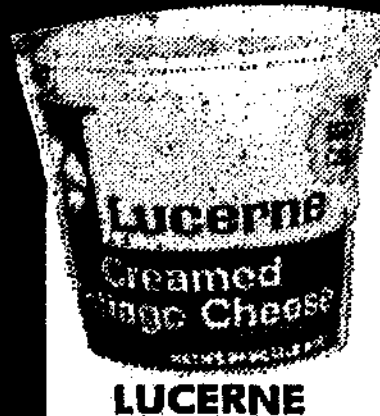


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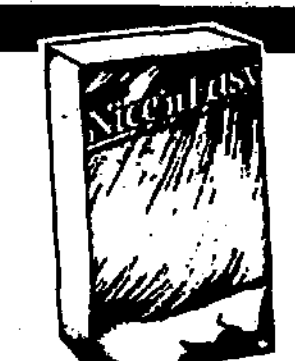


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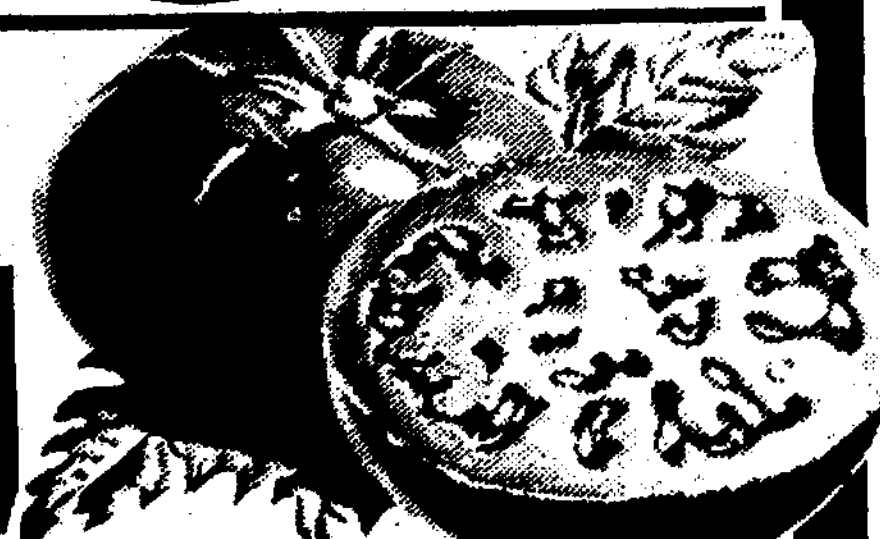
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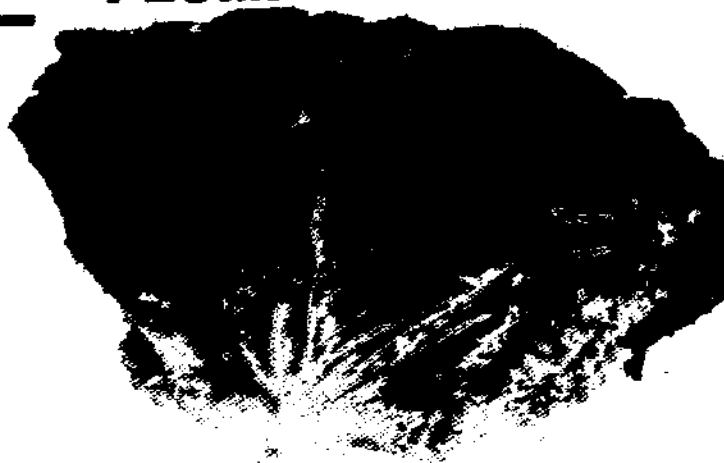
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Artists team up in Bonito Tile Company

Customers often wander into the new Bonito Tile Company in Capitan after they eat dinner across the street at the Hotel Chango. Both businesses are open in the evenings.

Two area artists display custom-designed and hand-glazed tiles in the Bonito Tile Company shop. In the back room of the building, Julie Urech and Elaine Howe paint tiles before firing them.

Much of their work is for home interiors. They sell single tiles at retail and also do custom pieces.

"We're trying to do a wide variety of things," Howe said.

Maggie Doyle sits at her loom in the front room of the building. She stores large, fuzzy spools for her weaving beside the shining surfaces of the hard tiles.

"We got together in February and have had our doors open since May," Urech said.

During their evening hours, the two-person tile company does everything from single accent pieces to border work. Both Howe and Urech work other full-time jobs, which is one reason they open Bonito after normal business hours.

Urech is an occupational therapist and private consultant. She is a native of Houston, Texas. Howe was raised in this area and now works at the Fort Stanton school. "Elaine oversees the ceramics shop at the Fort," Urech said.

The two women pooled artistic backgrounds and capital to start their tile business.

"Elaine was a quilter who got into ceramics," Urech said. Howe had created some hand-rolled tiles.

"I got a 'C' in my last art course 12 years ago," Urech said with a laugh. She is an amateur painter, but had not touched a tile before last spring.

Urech is learning fast. Both she and Howe create the tiles.

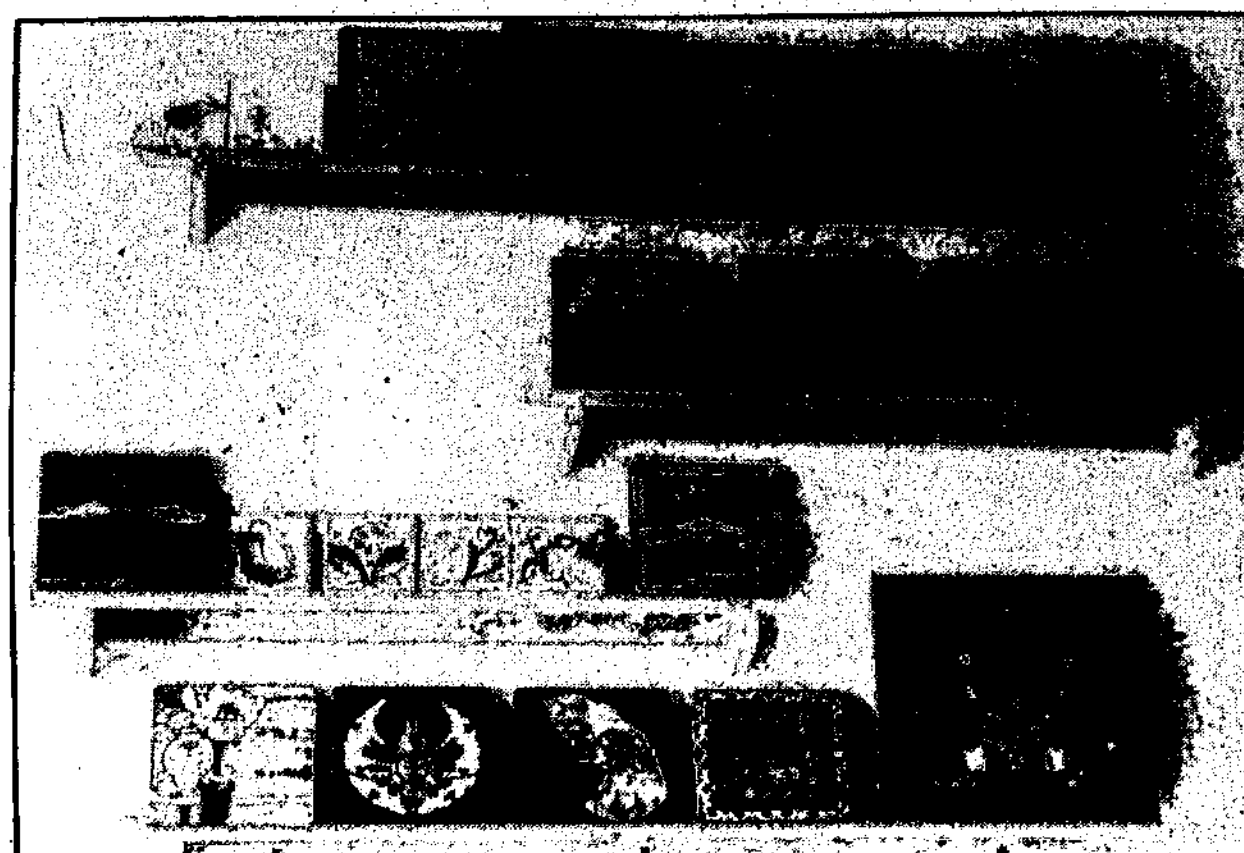
"I've never seen designs in tile like Elaine does," Urech said.

"Function can be beautiful," she said as she described her own design philosophy. A trivet or countertop can please the eye while it is used.

They hope to install their work in new homes being built in the area, but they also see customers who have lived in the area for years.

"We're finding old-timers saying, 'I'd like something a little special,'" Urech said.

With little urging, she enthusiastically discusses the designs and colors in their creations. Some of her work is done in Hungarian style, for instance.

Many of their tiles are single-item creations, some made to order. Other shops may sell 500 copies of a tile, but Bonito makes individual pieces.

"We have some samples already out, so you can say, 'I like this idea, but ...'" Urech said. The customer might then alter colors or size.

She described one large tile featuring scarlet and hyacinth macaws. It had been sold within a few days.

Bonito even can create tiles from photos of people, if customers ask for them.

The company's location in Capitan is no accident. When the pair looked for a place to open their business, Urech said, "We felt it would be lost in Ruidoso."

So far, Bonito hasn't had a lot of drop-in traffic, she said, so when the women are in the building, they are at work.

"People are welcome to come in," Urech said. They can watch the pair glazing tiles, although it's not all that different from painting.

On the other hand, she said, firing is like magic. The end results, she said, are always in doubt. "You don't know what's going to come out."

A tile may crack in the intense heat, or colors may not be quite the shade the artist expects. Blues are easy to create and predict, Urech said, but reds are difficult.

That's why color can affect the price of tiles. That's also why so many pieces are blue, she said.

Mass-produced tiles can be found in the region, Urech said. Such companies produce trivets and clocks and other common objects. Custom tile creators are more scarce in southern New Mexico, according to Urech.

The Bonito artists go to Ciudad Juarez, Mexico, to spark some ideas. When they see designs there, she said, "usually they're in geometric patterns and usually they're in blues."

Bonito tries to offer colors and subtleties customers don't see elsewhere.

A varied color chart like the ones in paint shops hangs in their workroom. Delicate water-colored tiles are spread on a table at the front of the shop.

The size and materials in the operation limit Bonito, of course. "In the underglazes we're using, you can't get a Santa Claus red," she said as an example.

The pair try to create a lightness of shading that can fade into or out of a tiled area.

Motif can vary widely, too. "We can be Hungarian or Black Forest," she said.

Bonito also can create geometric designs, as the two tile artists work in their shop across the street from the restaurant in Capitan.

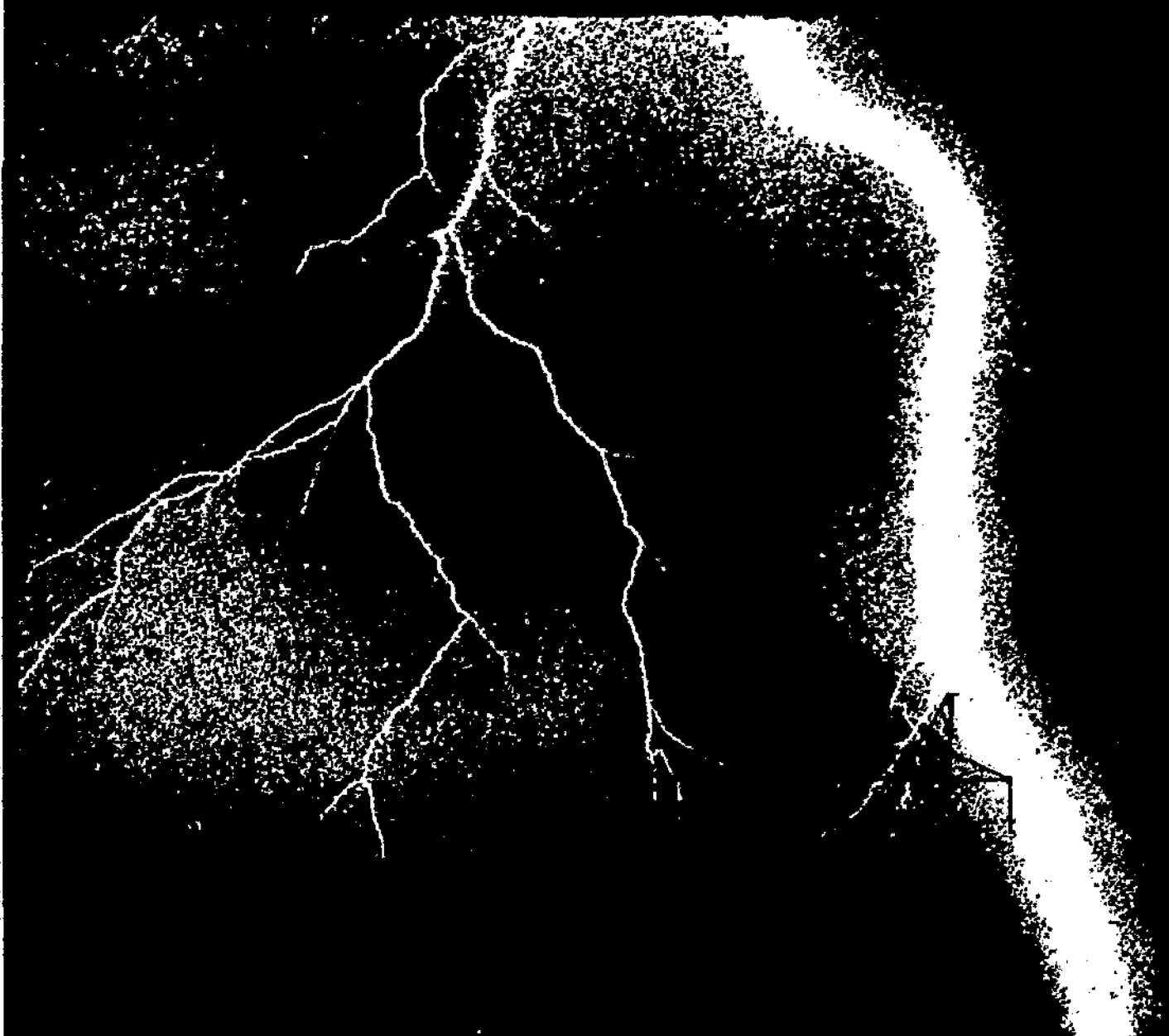
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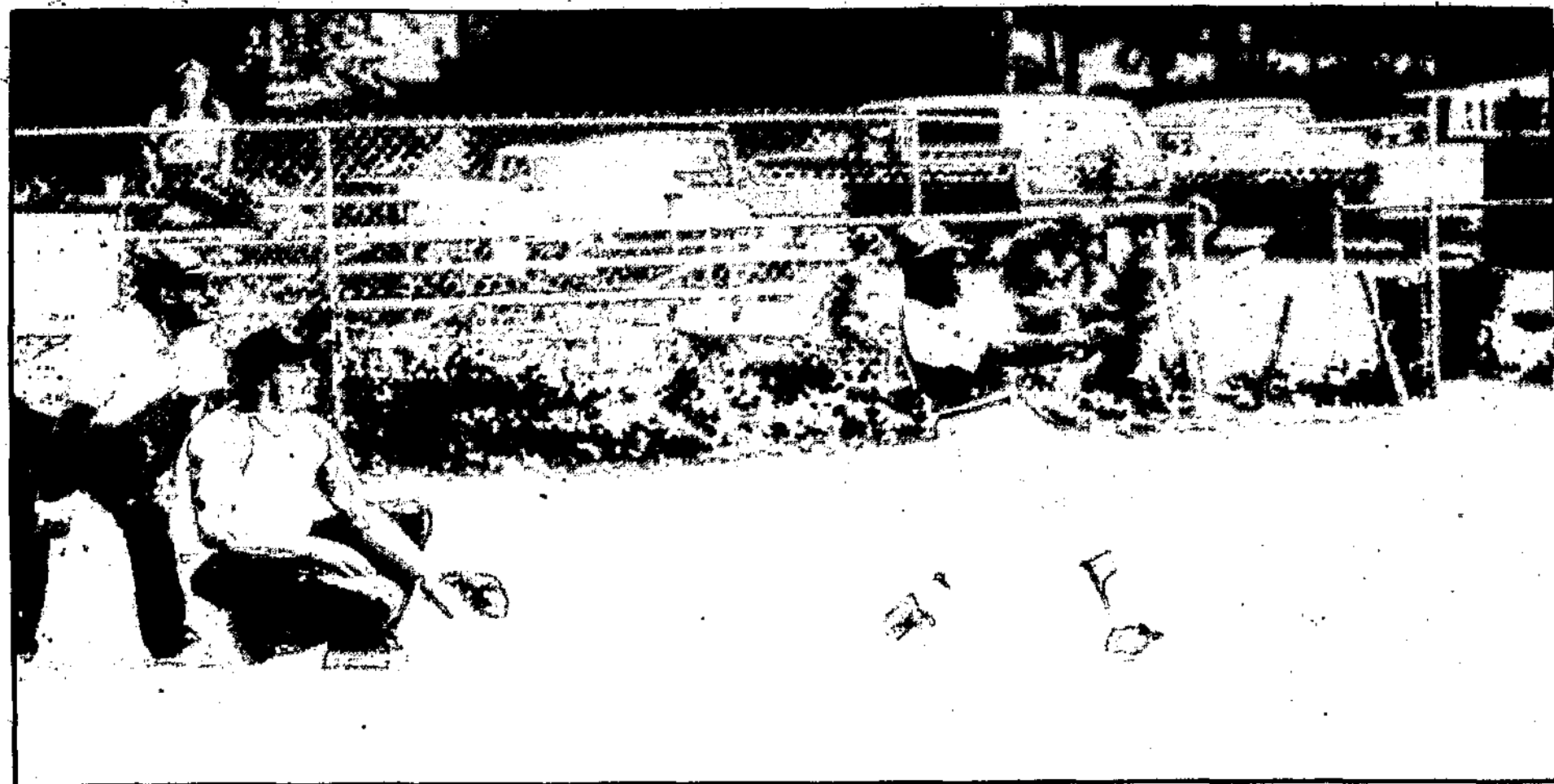
