Warriors blank St. Mike's 28-0; Artesia here Friday

The Ruidoso Warriors blanked St. Michael's Horsemen 28-0 in a football game Saturday night at the Ruidoso High School stadium. The Warriors, who have a record of 10-1, took a 28-0 lead in the first quarter and never trailed.

Now the Warriors will take their 3-21 overall record into the semifinals against defending state champion Aztec at 7:30 Friday night at the same stadium.

Yan Tillery, it was our best defensive player of the season," said a happy Warriors head coach Cooper Henderson. "The whole team played great. It's just a good feeling to be in the final four."

The Warriors took control from the opening minutes of the contest on the way to St. Michael's field.

Ruidoso moved to the St. Michael's 25 and 13 in the first period, but lost the ball on downs.

But the Warriors scored on their third series, driving 54 yards in eight plays for the touchdown early in the second period.

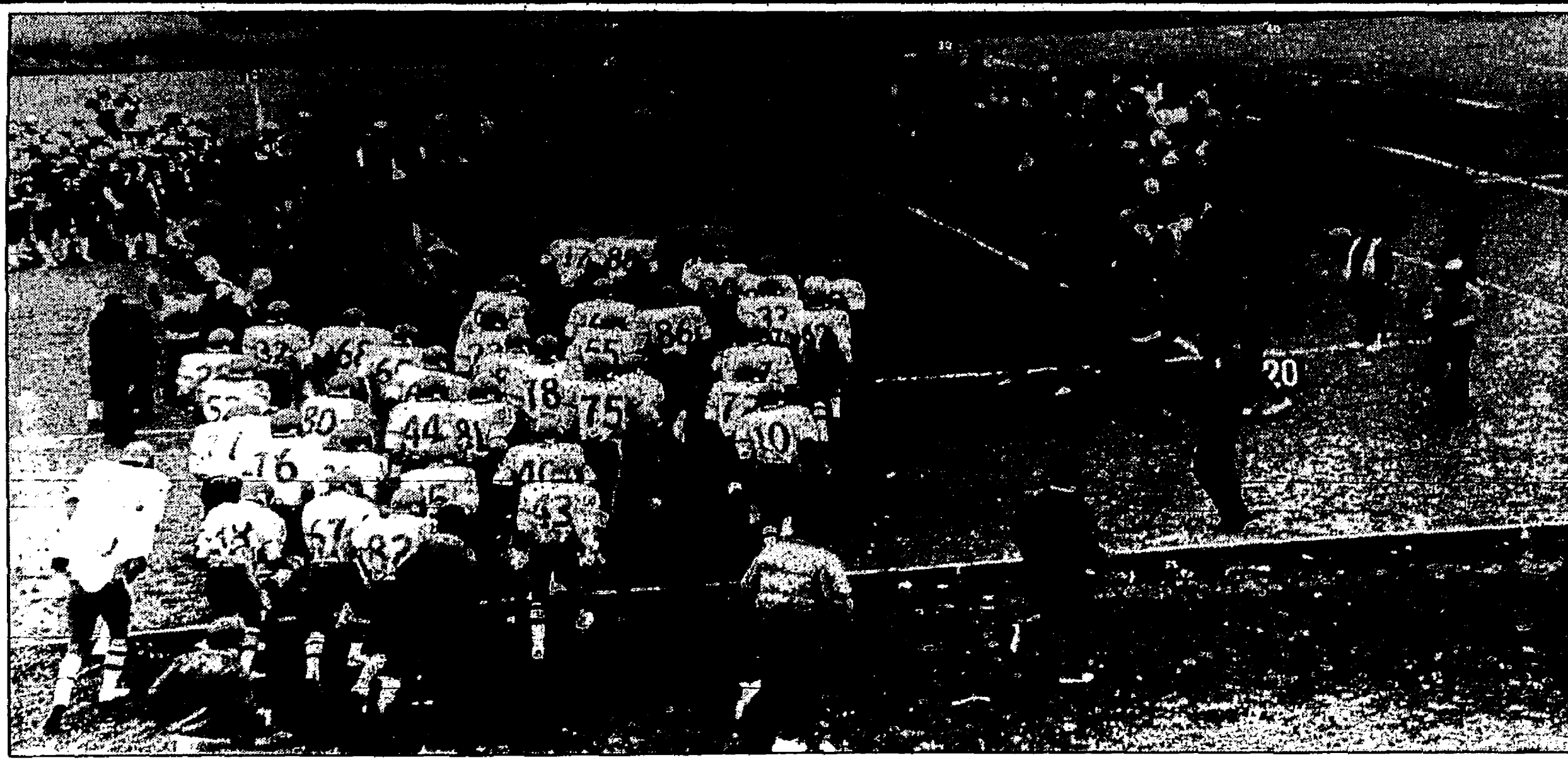
Sophomore quarterback Jeff Williamson threw an eight-yard pass to senior split end Mike Smith in the middle of the end zone for the score.

The extra point kick was wide, but St. Michael's was called for a penalty, giving the Warriors another chance. Williamson then completed a pass to Justin Smith for the two-point conversion. Ruidoso led 8-0.

Junior fullback Michael Williamson keyed the drive, carrying the ball five times for 40 yards.

Ruidoso's next points came near the end of the first half.

St. Michael's tried to punt from its own 17, but the Warriors' Bobby Dickinson rushed in to block the

28-0. A large contingent of Warrior fans made the trip to Santa Fe for the game.

punt into the end zone for an automatic safety. Ruidoso took a 10-0 lead into halftime.

The Warriors' offense moved into high gear in the second half.

After the Horsemen failed to gain a first down on the opening series, the Warriors drove 53 yards in six plays to take a 16-0 lead.

Again, it was some excellent running by the 5-7, 140-pound William-

The junior ripped off runs of six, five and 12 yards to put the ball on the St. Michael's 30.

Justin Smith gained 17 yards to the Horsemen 13. On the next play, Williamson found the sure-handed Mike Smith for a 13-yard scoring pass.

The two-point conversion attempt failed, but the Warriors had a 16-0 advantage and control of the con-

After holding the hosts on their next offensive series, the Warriors came right back and drove 50 yards for another score.

The big play was a 22-yard pass from Williamson to another sophomore, Brian Davis. That put the ball on the St. Michael's 28.

Williamson then ran for five yards and fullback Manuel Montano added nine yards to put the ball on the 19.

On the next play, Williamson broke through several tacklers and ran 14 yards for the touchdown. The extra point attempt was no good, but the Warriors took a 22-0 edge in the final quarter.

Williamson added another touchdown on a seven-yard run with 8:49 left in the fourth period.

Another Williamson to Davis pass—this one a 24-yarder—helped set up the final touchdown.

Williamson, who has scored 17 touchdowns on the season, had 164 yards in 21 carries to lead the Warrior running attack.

Ruidoso finished with 258 yards on the ground and 118 through the air for a 376-yard total.

Besides his two touchdowns, Williamson ran well with the ball, intercepted his eighth pass of the season, and kept the Horsemen pinned in their own territory with some excellent punting.

"Our pass defense has really been good the past few games," Henderson said.

St. Michael's didn't complete a pass until the final period, and crossed the 50 yard line only once.

Dickinson, senior tackle Patric Pearson and sophomore tackle Shayne Fredrick keyed the excellent Warrior defensive effort against the run, as Ruidoso shut off the Horsemen both inside and outside.

"The fans also helped us a lot," said Henderson. "They got down on the field before the game and cheered us. The band also helped."

"Some of our players said they felt like they had the home advantage because of the support."

Now comes Artesia. The Bulldogs topped the Warriors 23-6 earlier in the season, and topped previously unbeaten St. Pius 9-6 Friday night in Artesia.

"Our team is playing really well now," said Henderson. "To have gotten to the final four, you have to have played well."

NOTES: In other AAA-division games over the weekend, Silver City rolled over Belen 27-7 Friday night and Aztec topped Las Vegas Robertson 27-12 Saturday ... The Warrior coaches named Dickinson as this week's winner of the Golden Helmet award. Williamson won the top offensive player honor, Pearson took the top defensive player award, Williamson won the kickoff team honor and Randy Reynolds gained the scout team award.

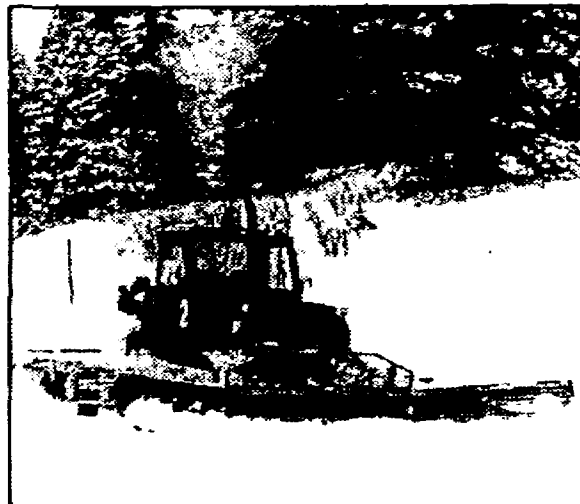

State casts doubt on movie project

The prospects of a film on Ruidoso area movie locations, as envisioned by Ruidosoan Wally Hesse, may have been dimmed Wednesday.

The New Mexico Film Commission advised the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce that it has no money for the intended project, and no desire to use a 30-minute film with storyline.

"What they want," said Tommy Morel, acting executive director of the chamber, "is a five- to 10-minute strictly documentary on three quarters-inch video."

Morel said the commission was interested in showing the film to location scouts in Santa Fe and Los Angeles. Location scouts act as advance people for the film industry,

looking for good places to shoot a movie.

But the documentary would have to be shortened, he noted, and would have to be used solely as a vehicle for introducing Ruidoso-area locations.

In other words, Morel said, there could be no storyline associated with the film.

He also said the commission has already committed its \$64,000 advertising budget.

"They don't have a penny to give us," he said.

Hesse, when notified of the commission's decision, said he was willing to adjust his original plans.

"It's quite possible that we can get the money from another source," he said Friday. "And we can shorten it. It won't be the same quality, but I can adjust it."

Hesse's original idea was to film a

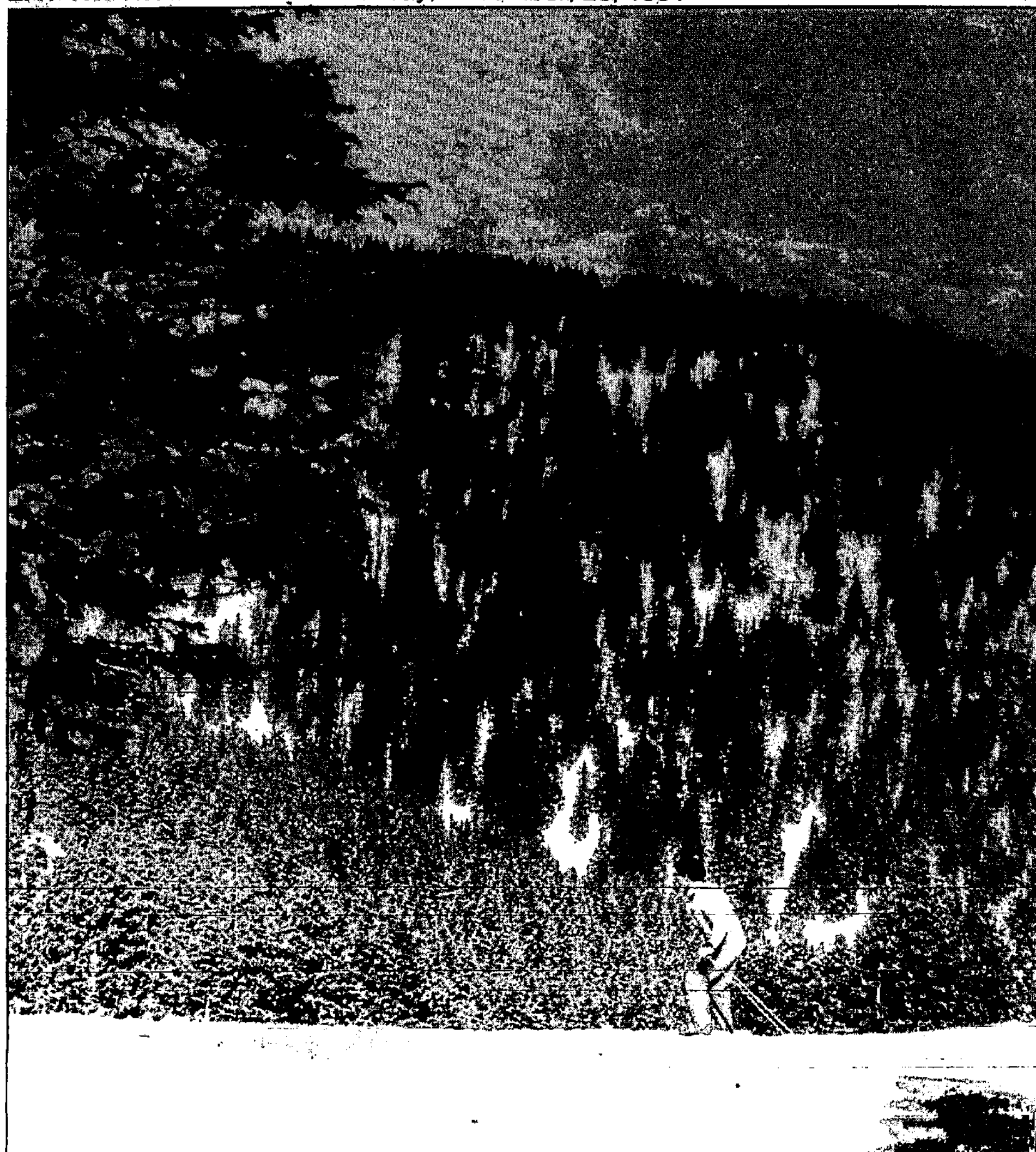
30-minute "painless documentary" that would be 80 percent storyline and 20 percent straight documentary.

The film was to have been set in the 1800s at the time of Billy the Kid, and was to have shown over 30 locations within an hour's drive of Ruidoso.

According to Hesse, the film would have cost approximately \$12,000, with none of it directed to salaries, only expenses.

"This will be a Levi's production, not designer jeans," he said recently. "There will not be a director running around with sunglasses."

Morel said Hesse will ask the chamber's board of directors Wednesday for \$500 to make a pilot version of the film. If the board agrees to that, Hesse said, he will go ahead and produce a brief video for viewing by the chamber, and for presentation to the film commission.

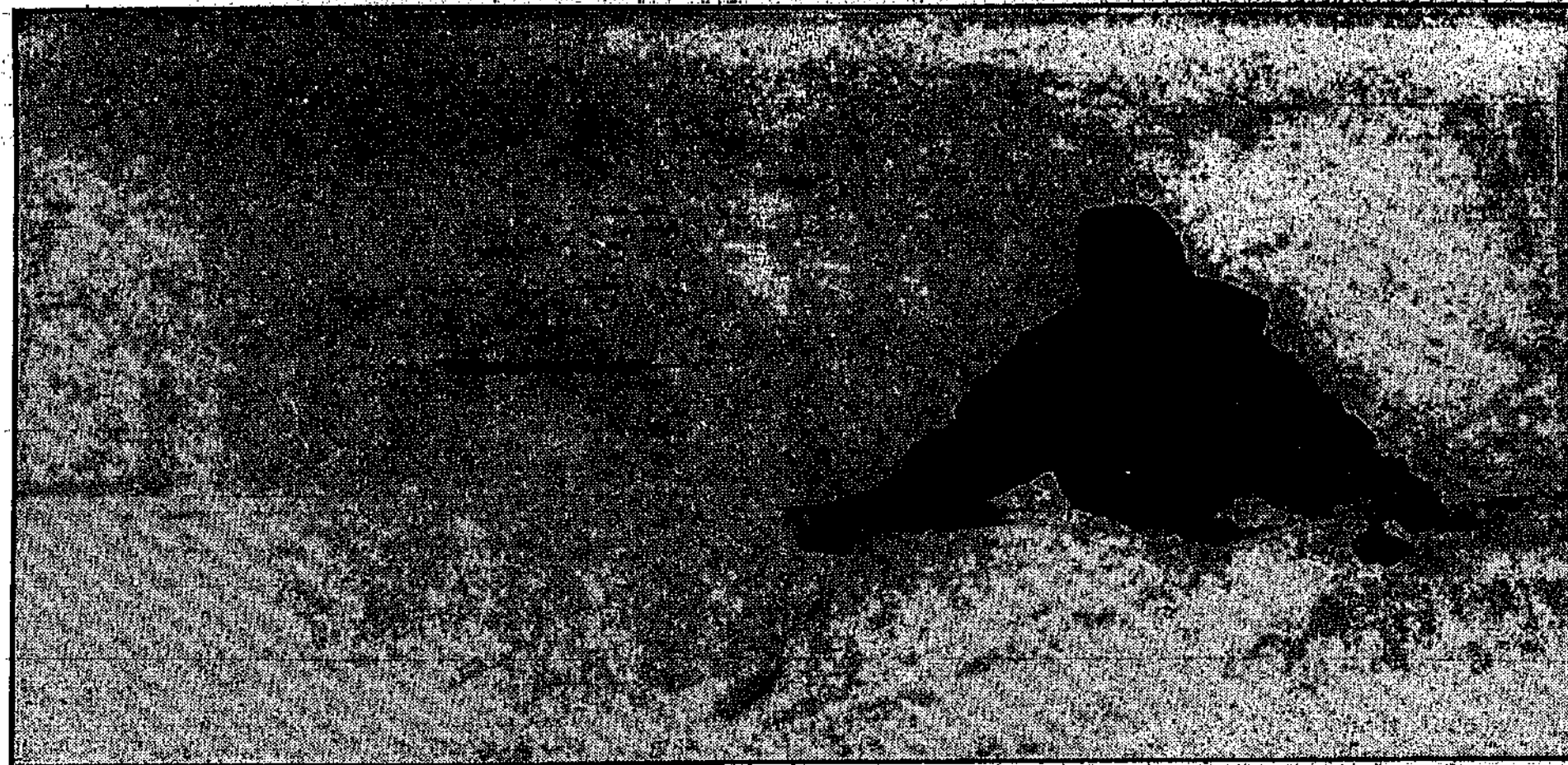

Skiers were treated to a Thanksgiving Day opening at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort that manager Roy Parker called "one of the best."

"Everything's covered very well," he said, noting that snowmaking had been done most nights during the week prior to the opening of the area. Parker said the 27 inches of snow that fell at the area in the last week of October provided a good base for the 16 additional inches received at Sierra Blanca last week.

Meadows, Geronimo, Chino and Sierra Blanca Trail opened Thursday, with other trails opening throughout the weekend.

Parker estimated 700 to 800 skiers arrived for Thanksgiving Day skiing—"about right" for the holiday. As the weekend progressed, larger

"I think it's great," he said.

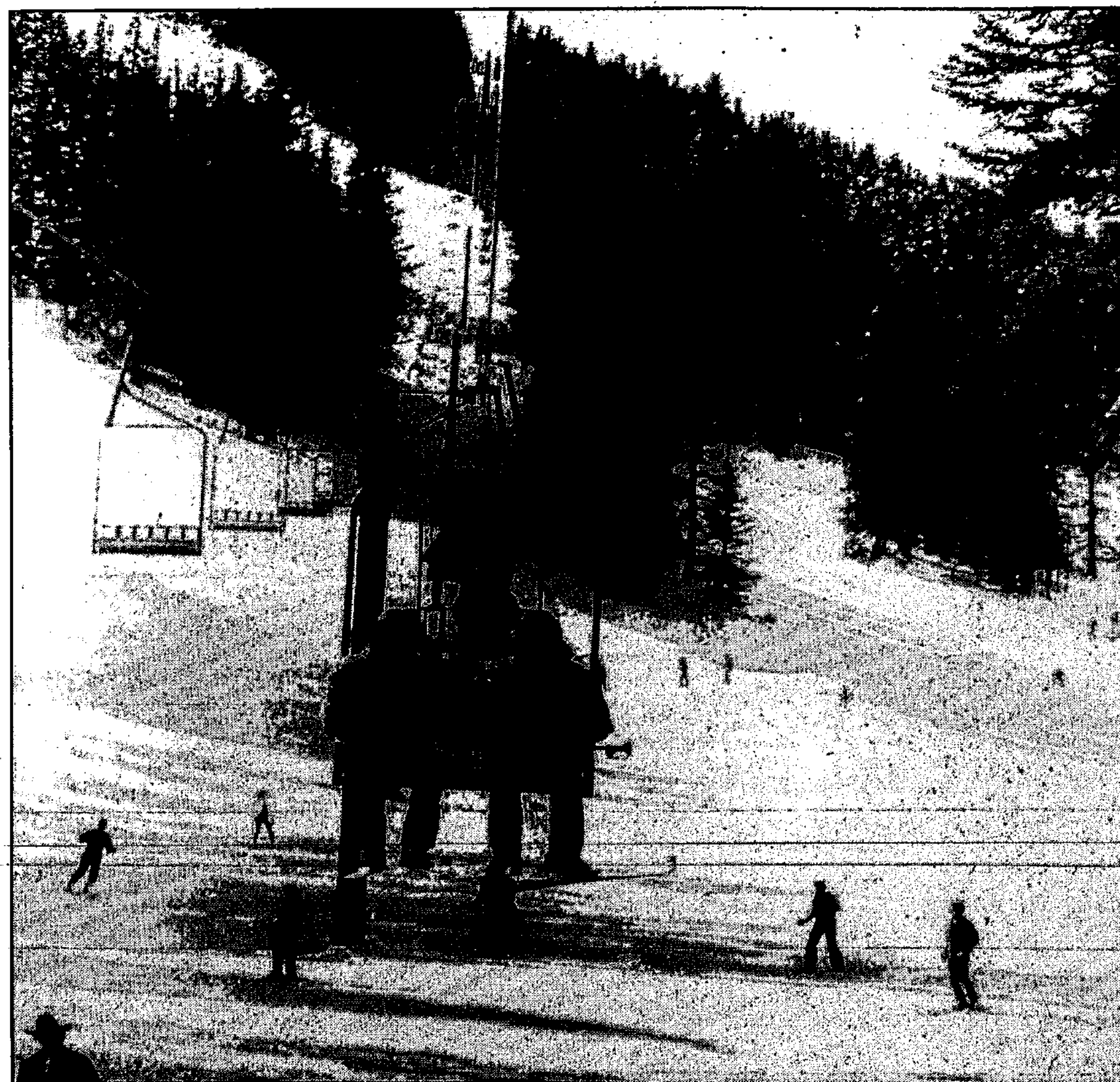

Savings accounts: maze of options

How to handle our money and where to put it for a safe return are questions being answered more frequently these days by banking institutions, as they battle for the dollars of investors and savers.

With the ceiling taken off interest rates on deposits, money market certificates and certificates of deposit have nudged the once-popular passbook accounts as preferred financial devices for yielding solid returns.

Banks can pay whatever interest rate their boards of directors decide upon, although they usually do not tread too far from the rates offered by their competitors.

But the investor is well advised to shop around. While there are substantial similarities, the few differences from one bank to another can mean more money in your pocket.

Following is a guide to savings accounts and certificates offered by the five banking institutions in Ruidoso. The rates given were for last week. Check new rates before you invest.

•RUIDOSO STATE BANK: The bank offers certificates of deposit at seven investment levels, from \$2,500 minimum to over \$100,000. Each level is provided with at least four separate maturity periods.

Amounts from \$2,500 to \$75,000 can be invested in fixed-rate certificates of 91 days, at 8.5 to 9 percent interest; 182 days, at 9 percent to 9.75; 365 days, at 9.125 to 10 percent; and 18 months, at 9.375 to 10.25 percent interest.

Investments of over \$100,000 can go for 14 days to a year, from 9.25 percent interest to 10.25 percent.

The bank also offers a regular savings passbook account at 5.5 percent interest.

•THE BANK OF RUIDOSO: Offering time certificates of deposit, the bank requires a \$2,500 minimum to invest for up to a year.

For less than \$100,000, investments of 32 days to 90 days earn 8.25 percent interest. From 91 days to 181 days, the rate is 8.75 percent. And from 182 days to a year, interest is earned at a rate of 8.99 percent.

Amounts of over \$100,000 can be invested for six different periods, from 30 days to a year. The accounts earn 9.15 percent interest at the bottom, 9.9 percent at the top.

The bank also offers a regular savings passbook account at 5.5 percent interest.

•MONCOR BANK: The bank offers a great variety of fixed and variable rates for varying lengths of investment time, including a short-term certificate of deposit for seven days at 8.25 percent.

Variable rates, tied to the prime rate, can change from week to week once the deposit is made, with no guarantee or safeguard that the rate will not drop too low. Fixed rates, on the other hand, remain constant through the investment or deposit period.

For the investor or saver of \$2,500 to \$10,000 who wants a better return than the seven-day yield, the 90-day deposit earns a fixed 8.5 percent interest, or a variable 9 percent. At 180 days, both fixed and variable rates yield 9.5 percent. And at a year or more, both yield 9.75.

The investor with \$10,000 to \$100,000 has a few more options, starting with a 30-day certificate. For 30 days, the rate is 8.75 fixed, 9.25 variable.

For 60 days, the fixed rate is 9 percent, the variable is 9.5. At 90 days, the fixed rate jumps to 9.5, the variable to 10 percent. At 180 days, the fixed stands at 9.75, the variable at 10.25. A year's deposit yields a fixed 10 percent interest or variable 10.5.

The jumbo investor (over \$100,000) is presented with fixed rates that are somewhat negotiable. The rates begin at 9 percent for 30 days, 9.125 for 60 days, 9.25 for 90 days, and 10 percent for 180 days.

If you hold a jumbo account for a year, the rate begins at 10.25 percent. It begins at 11.5 percent for a two-year deposit.

The bank also provides a regular savings passbook account at 5.25 percent interest.

•FIRST FEDERAL SAVINGS BANK OF NEW MEXICO: First Federal has several accounts to choose from. The minimum required amount to participate ranges from a high of \$2,500 to a low of only \$100.

For certificates of seven to 31 days, the minimum is \$2,500 to earn a fixed 8.85 percent interest. The rate is the same for 91 days, but the minimum is \$500.

At six months, the rate is 10 percent; at a year, 10.5. The minimum for both is \$500.

The minimum drops to \$100 for the 18-month certificate, which earns 10.75 percent interest. Then it climbs again to a \$500 minimum for a certificate of two and a half years earning 11.25 percent interest.

The variable rate certificates start at deposits for a year at 10.5 percent; then go to 18 months at 10.75 percent; two and a half years at 11.25 percent; and five years at 11.5 percent. The minimum required to deposit in the certificates is \$100 for the 18-month deposit, \$500 for the rest.

Mini-jumbo certificates requiring a \$25,000 minimum deposit yield 9.75 for three months, 10.25 for six months, and 10.75 for a year.

The jumbo accounts (\$100,000 and more) earn 9.5 percent interest for 30 days; 9.75 percent for 60 days; 10 percent for 90 days; 10.5 percent for 180 days; and 11 percent for one year.

The bank also offers a regular savings passbook account at 5.5 percent interest.

•PIONEER SAVINGS AND TRUST: This institution has a variety of certificates for different purposes.

The money market account is the same as a savings account but earns more. There is no maturity date, and no penalty for closing the account.

It maintains a variable rate of interest, starting at 8.25 percent for the minimum deposit of \$2,500; going to 8.75 for \$10,000 to \$100,000; and topping out at 9.25 for amounts over \$100,000.

The regular certificates require a minimum deposit of \$500, and earn fixed rates ranging from 9 percent for 91 days to 11.75 percent for five years.

The popular six-month certificate earns 9.75 percent interest.

The mini-jumbo account (\$25,000 to \$100,000) earns 9.5 percent interest for 91 days, 10.25 percent for six months, and 11 percent for one year.

The jumbo account (over \$100,000) starts at 14-day deposits at 9.25 percent, and climbs to 11.25 percent for deposits of one year.

Pioneer also provides savers with a regular savings passbook account at 5.5 percent interest.

When dealing with certificates of deposit, it is important to understand that there are heavy penalties for early withdrawals. The law allows financial institutions to assess a penalty equal to about half the projected interest, regardless of whether that interest already has been earned.

For more information, shop around and ask questions. It could be worth your time in earnings.

"I think we played best against Silver City," Castanon remarked. "We played consistent ball against them. Against the other opponents, we played erratic at times and good at times."

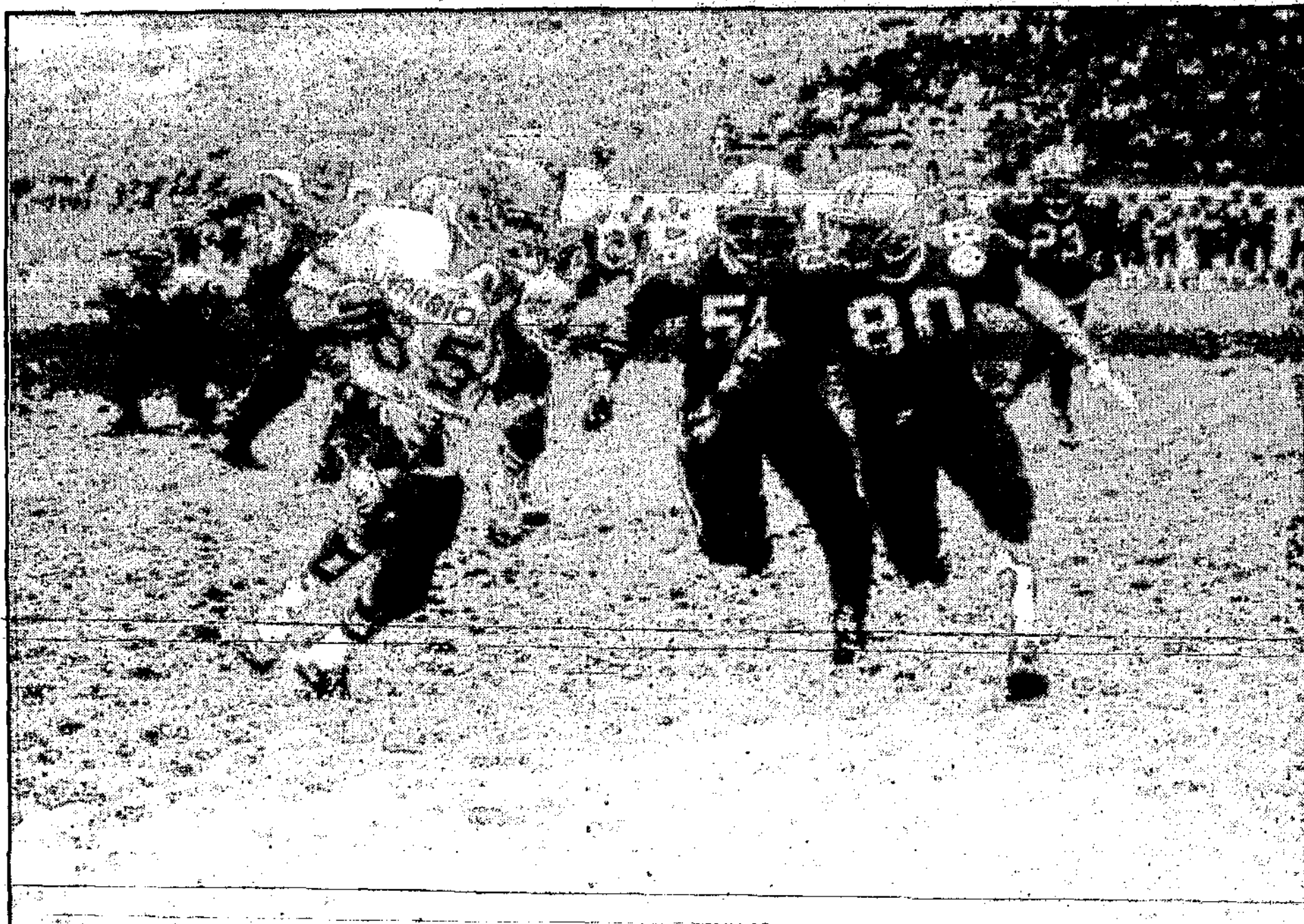
The Warriors also competed against Weed, Gadsden, St. Plus, Alamogordo, Capitan and Albuquerque High. The competing schools ranged from the A division to the

"We did a pretty good job," Castanon said. "We only had eight days of practice before the scrimmage."

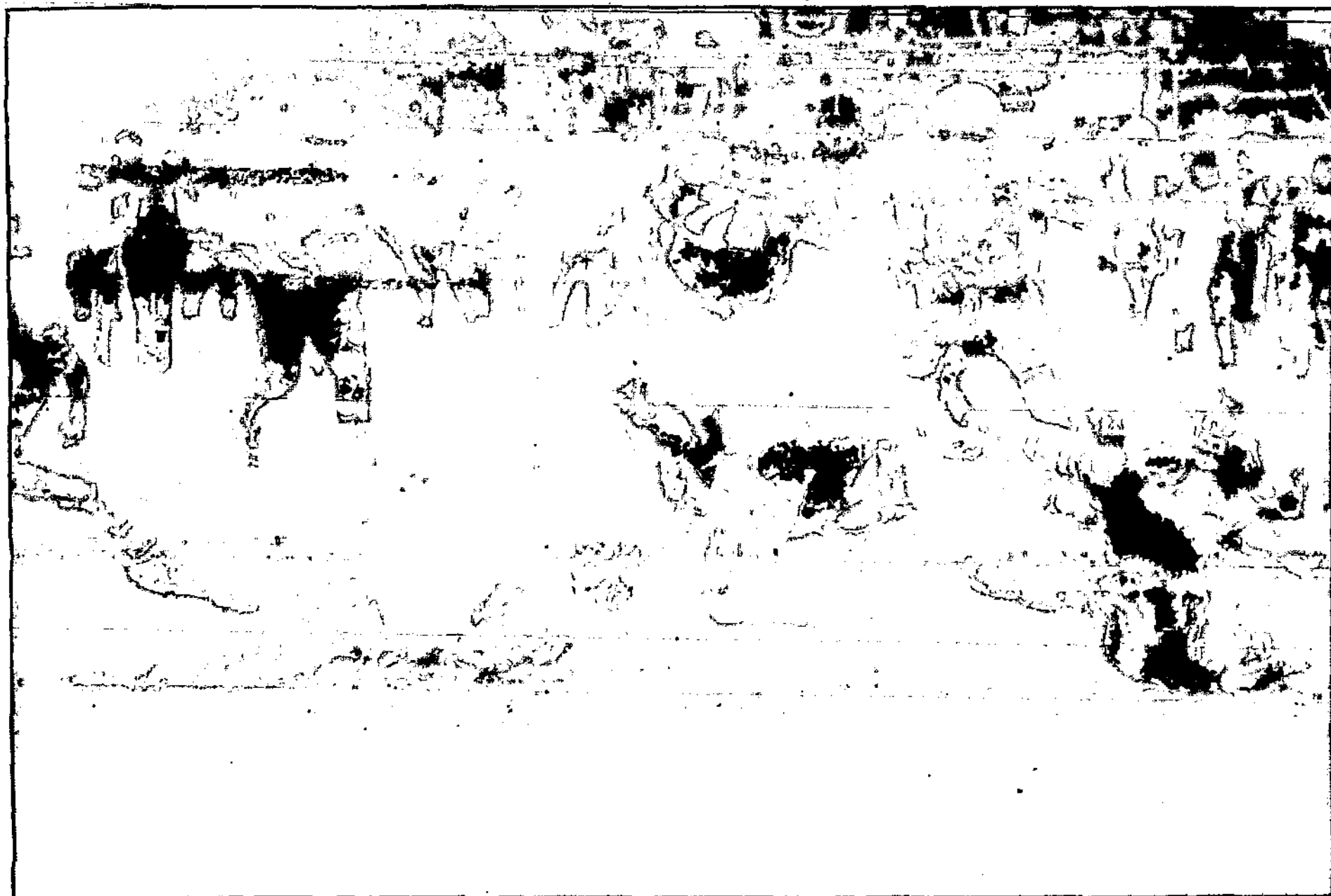

Wrestling is one of those sports in which the individual gets to test his strength and skill on a purely one-on-one basis.

Nationwide, this ancient sport's popularity has risen in the past few years, particularly in New Mexico. The skill level of the sport in this state seems to get better every season.

Ruidoso wrestling fans should get a chance to see plenty of top-flight wrestling action when the Warrior Invitational takes place at Ruidoso High School this Saturday.

The tournament will be the Warriors' season opener and will be conducted in three sessions: one in the morning, one in the afternoon and one in the evening. The first session will start at 9 a.m.

"It should be a good tournament," said Warrior wrestling coach Gerald Ames. "There will be four AAAA-division level teams and four AAA-division teams entered in it."

Besides the Warriors, other teams scheduled to compete are Tucumcari, Carlsbad, Coronado and Irvin of El Paso, Goddard, Roswell and New Mexico Military Institute.

Ames won't have a complete team entered in the tournament because many of his matmen still are playing football.

But the Warrior mentor still plans to have a lot of wrestlers competing in the tournament.

"We'll probably have four varsity-type wrestlers in the tournament," he said. "The rest of the wrestlers will probably be new to the sport of junior varsity wrestling."

Zach Swalander, Mark Langston, Cory Garner and George Bristow are the top Warrior prospects for the tournament. However, Ames isn't sure what weight classes they'll compete in yet.

They will probably compete in the 120-pound to 145-pound classes. Garner, Swalander and Bristow started for the Warriors last season, while Langston has done well in several sports.

Ames isn't concerned about the absence of several wrestlers for the remainder of the football playoffs.

"We'll just get ready during

December and then have two full months of wrestling beginning in January," he remarked.

Despite the fact Ruidoso won't have an experienced team in the tournament, the competition should give the Warriors some good experience.

El Paso schools are traditionally strong in wrestling, while Carlsbad is annually one of the top AAAA-division teams in New Mexico.

So anyone interested in watching one of the oldest and most classic sports in the world should take in the Warrior Invitational.

Turning to college football, it looks like the Orange Bowl will be the top draw of the bowl season.

The University of Oklahoma Sooners, co-champions of the Big Eight Conference and sporting a 9-1-1 record, will take on the 10-1 University of Washington from the Pac-10 Conference.

Washington finished second in the Pac-10 to the University of Southern California, but had a better overall record than the Trojans.

The game between Washington and Oklahoma should be a close and exciting one. It's also possible that either the Sooners or the Huskies could be ranked first in the country after the bowl games, if undefeated Brigham Young University loses to the University of Michigan in the Holiday Bowl Friday, December 21, in San Diego, California.

But that's not likely. Brigham Young will probably defeat Michigan and gain the top ranking in both the United Press International and Associated Press polls.

But it's too bad that Brigham Young didn't accept a bid to one of the most prestigious bowls.

Then we'd be able to find out just how good the Cougars really are. Michigan did not have a very good season this year, only going 6-5 and finishing down the ladder in the Big Ten Conference.

As it is, the national collegiate championship in both major polls will probably be decided before New Year's Day, no matter how good the Orange Bowl contest is.

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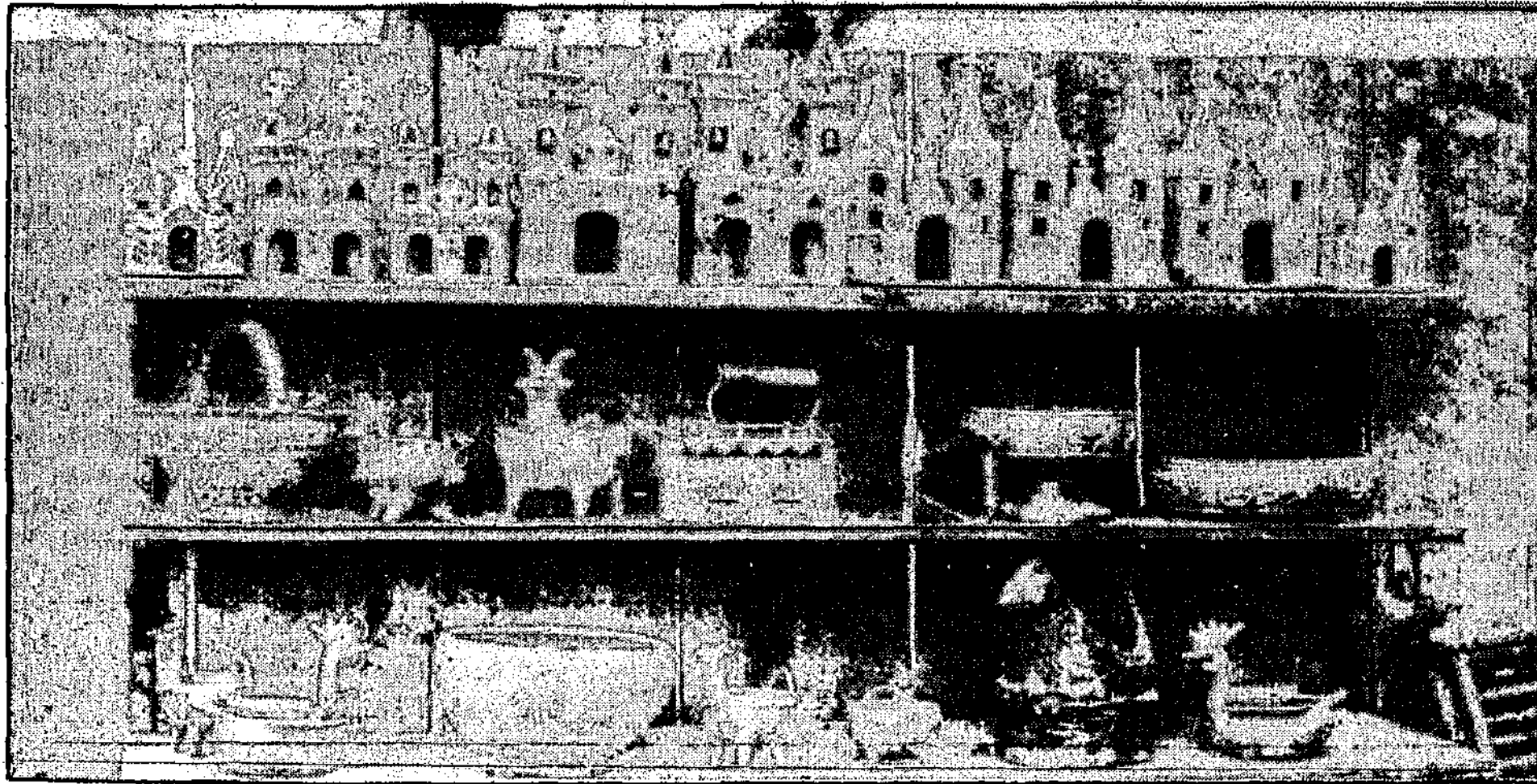

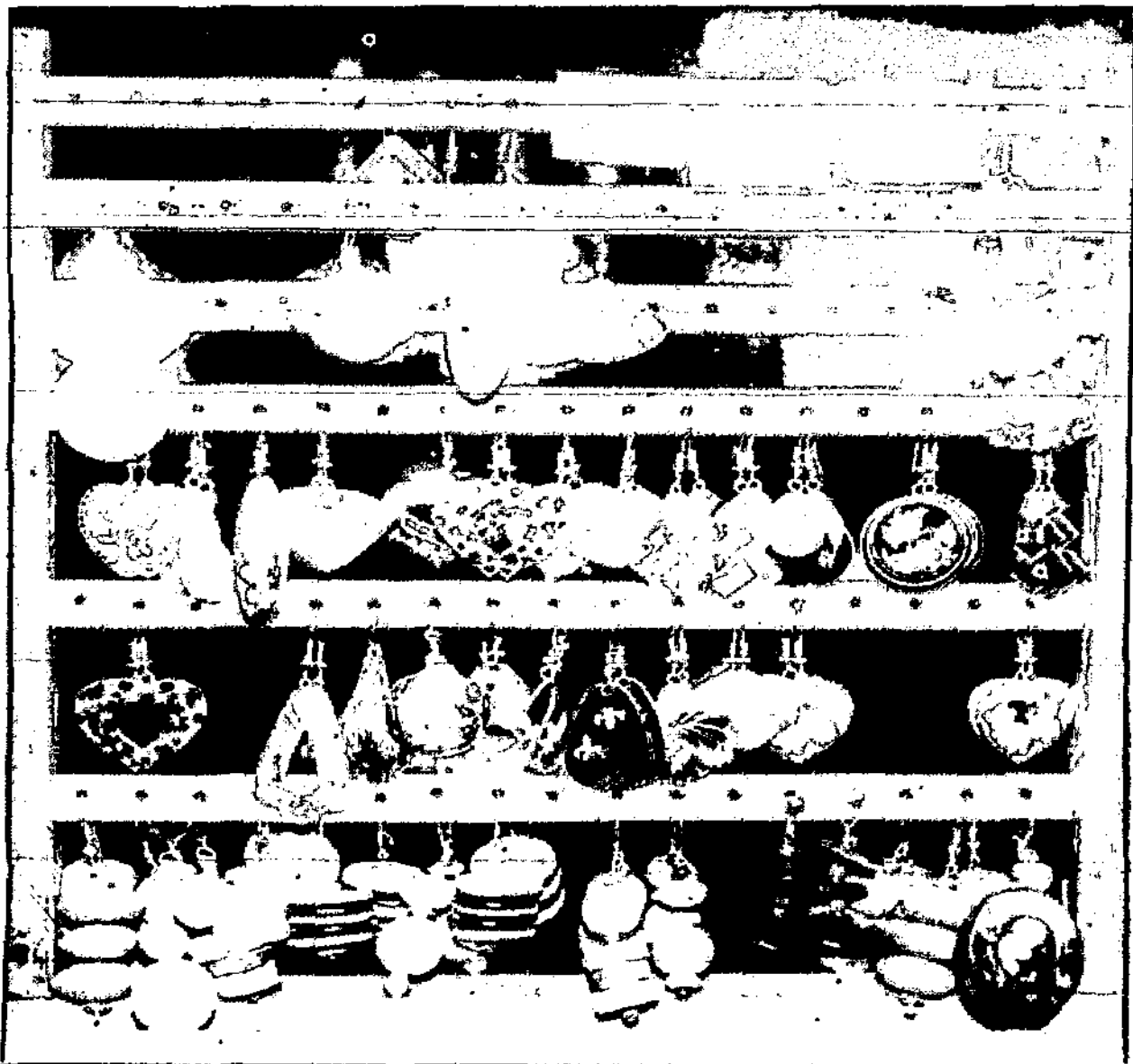

Pair hoping to be Rotary foreign exchange students

Bobbi Rogers and Brendan Wolff are two Capitan high school seniors who hope to spend a year after graduation in another country.

Rogers and Wolff are currently in the process of trying to become Rotary International Foreign Exchange students. If they are selected, they will be given room, board and a monthly stipend to live abroad next year. All they will have to pay is their airfare.

Competition for the program is stiff. According to school counselor Dick Effthimou, the Rotary organization does not have enough host countries, so there are about 40 spots and 250 applicants.

Originally, 10 Capitan students applied for the program. The other eight students were Shawmarie LaRue, Tiffany Huey, Scott Burch, Jed Hall, Angie Trujillo, Monica Montoya, Becky Phillips and Pete Haussler. After the first round of interviews, Rogers and Wolff were chosen to continue.

Students entering the program must have at least a 3.0 grade point average and be a junior or senior. Seniors are preferred because they are older and because they do not have to worry about finishing high school when they return.

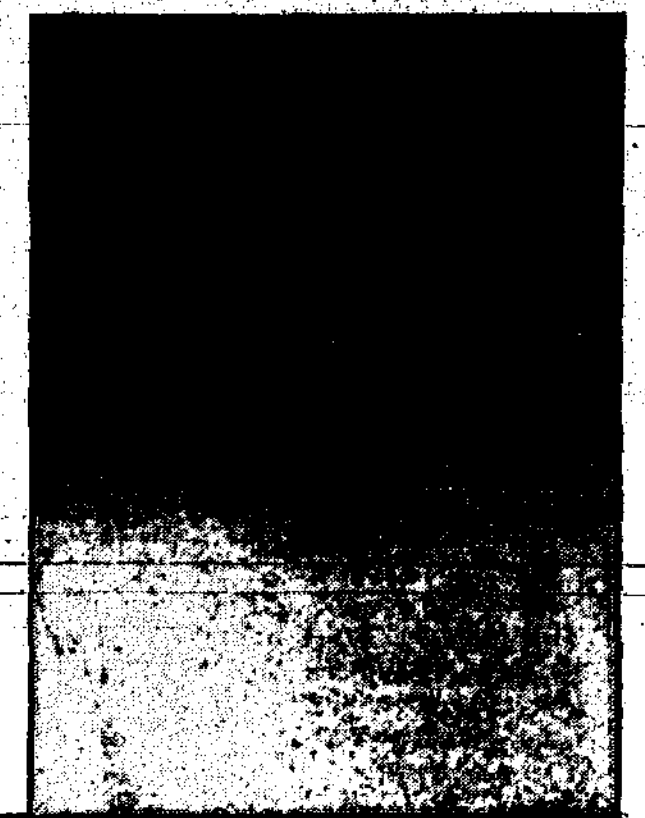
"They are looking for an ambassador to represent our country wherever he goes," said Effthimou. The counselor was proud that two of his students made it as far as they did in the competition. Ruidoso High School also has two students in the running, and that is a much larger school.

The students accepted into the program can choose where they want to go, but there is no guarantee they will receive their first choice.

"It's kind of like the army in that

respect," said Effthimou. When in the foreign country, the student will live with a host family and attend high school.

Neither Rogers nor Wolff minds the prospect of an extra year of school. "I'll be glad to go (abroad)," said Rogers. "I think it's neat, it would help me as a person."

Rogers is excited at the prospect of experiencing new things, meeting new people and learning a new language. She said she would be required to give a two-minute speech in English when she arrived in her host country, and repeat the same speech in their language when she left.

"I'm a little scared, but real excited," said Rogers enthusiastically.

Both Rogers and Wolff are boning up on their knowledge of United

States government and history and New Mexico history so they can answer any questions asked of them in foreign places.

"When I think about it (the program), I think about the experience," said Wolff. "I hope to gain a better insight to the world around me—to see what's going on in their eyes." Wolff hopes to share his American viewpoints for a "broader range of understanding."

Wolff already has completed the second phase of his application process—a lengthy panel interview in Roswell. Rogers has her panel date in early December.

Those students chosen from the panel interviews will attend an overnight retreat in El Paso for further interviews and selection.

Happy Birthday to
Mrs. Wilbur Coe

This will reach you on a landmark birthday of one of New Mexico's great ladies, Mrs. Louise Holland Coe, born November twenty-six, 1894, in Bartlett, Texas, to W.P. Holland and the former Emily Elizabeth Connell. At the age of ten she came west with her parents and settled on an irrigated farm in the Pecos Valley. In 1920 she was married to Wilbur Frank Coe, son of famous Lincoln County pioneer, Frank Coe, and together through the years they made the Coe Ranch in Glencoe a colorful landmark for hospitality, fine apples and cattle, and the center of programs for the county and the state.

Among Louise's many gifts was music. Many are the happy hours passed at the Coe Ranch and the Bonnell Ranch at dances and community gatherings—all to the music of the Coe Ranch Orchestra. Louise played the piano while Wilbur played his magic violin in a great variety of music: popular songs of the day, very old-time numbers, Mexican songs and ballads.

Members of the orchestra from time to time were Harold Coe, Junior Perry, Ralph Bonnell, Arron McNeil. Some of my fondest memories were when I was honored to play the banjo in the Coe Ranch Orchestra.

Louise graduated from the University of New Mexico and soon began a career in the world of education, beginning as a teacher in a one-room school at the Bonnell Ranch and later becoming County School Superintendent.

She became the first woman Senator to the State Legislature in 1925 and served sixteen years, during which time she helped pass many laws of permanent benefit to education in New Mexico. She and Wilbur also worked for rural electrification, highway development and soil conservation.

In 1940 Louise was appointed Lincoln County Chairman of Cuatro Centennial Committee, New Mexico's Four Hundredth Birthday.

She and Wilbur established "A Day in Old Lincoln" as Lincoln County's contribution to the state-wide celebration. This day was set aside for the honoring of the pioneers and featured introduction of old-timers, special meetings and visits for pioneers, barbecues, a parade, old-time music contests, quadrille dances, Mexican music and many other events.

A feature of the day was the historical pageant, "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid." This pageant captured the imagination of people all over the world, so that it has continued to this day, every year in the first weekend in August, and it grows more popular through the years.

Louise has written several books, among which is "High Roads to Friendship," in which she tells of her travels to practically every country in the world. With her help and encouragement, Wilbur wrote a history of the Coe Ranch and also of Lincoln County entitled, "Rancho on the Ruidoso," a colorful and very valuable volume.

Although her heart is in Lincoln County, Louise today lives in Roswell where she remains active and helpful, still the great and beloved lady as always. On this landmark birthday we extend our congratulations to Louise and wish her many happy returns of the day, and all God's blessings.

We might go over a little sketch first of Jeannette, born November twenty-eight, 1925, to Roy Coe and the former Alma Curry, hardly a stone's cast down the hill from where the Browning home now stands.

Jeannette is the granddaughter of the beloved pioneer couple George and Phoebe Coe, and she is surely a chip off the old block. Also from her mother she inherited her great charm and her gift for music.

I used to hear the smart guys talking back in my youth saying that a woman cannot have both beauty and brains. This is off the mark—way off. Jeannette is fully as intelligent as she is beautiful—tops in both.

As a teenager she passed the test as a telegraph operator and worked at every station on the railroad from Vaughn and Clovis—four years in all.

In 1946 she was married to Dude Browning, another descendant of pioneers, and from this union six fine children were born: Dudette Caudle, Graham, Texas; Becca Dorrell, Durango, Colorado; D'Aun Berry, Alto; Roy Todd, Gruber, Texas; JoeBob-Watrous, New Mexico; and Cody Bill, New Mexico State University.

Roy Todd, also known as "Mustang Red" is named for both his grandfathers, Roy Coe and Todd Browning. He and brother JoeBob are top hands for the Holt Ranches of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. Cody Bill will soon get his degree in geology from New Mexico State.

On April first, 1965, Jeannette went to work for the United States Forest Service at what is now Smokey Bear Ranger Station. She is business management assistant and has maintained an excellent record all these years.

We come now to a few words about Lynn Walter Storm, named for our father and our mother's middle brother, Walter Kennedy of Denver, Colorado, a handsome and well-liked fellow with a gift for side-splitting humor, who "never met a stranger." Lynn was born November 28, 1914, in Juneau, Alaska, to Lynn Whippo Storm and the former Bertha Cathrine Kennedy. The Whippes were famous Quakers of Pennsylvania and the Storms came from Switzerland. The Kennedys are descendants of the earliest inhabitants of Scotland, the Picts, who figured prominently in causing the Romans to change their minds and leave the island of Britain and go back to Rome.

Mark and Lynn have given me strict orders not to brag on them, so here I go walking on eggs.

Lynn has visited his native land of Alaska twice, taking me with him the last time—an experience never to be forgotten. Lynn's lucky star shone brightly in 1936 when he was married to the former Maxine Richter of Austin, Texas. They have three children, Lynnette, Ann and Scott Joseph, and seven grandchildren: Joshua Storm, Grant Geis, Kristen Geis, Lissa Burnett, Andy Burnett, Grady Burnett, and Molly Burnett, all of Austin.

During the season of his birthday, I am sending up a prayer of thanks to God for this great brother, and I wish him every blessing and many happy returns of the day.

Editorial

News that the United States and the Soviet Union will be talking arms control in January made a welcome Thanksgiving present.

If it's true that President Reagan hopes to leave an arms control treaty between the superpowers as a legacy of his second term, the new talks are certainly a step in the right direction.

What will take place in January are preliminary talks. The two sides will get together and discuss guidelines for future talks at which, presumably, actual agreements on arms control can be reached.

It would be easy to become impatient or sarcastic about the involved process required just to get representatives of the two nations to sit down together.

But the issue of arms control is so critical—it deals with nothing less than the survival of the world as we know it—that any signal of cooperation should be met with encouragement and hope by all Americans.

It was interesting to note speculation that a U.S. arms control envoy might, if appointed, help resolve differences within the U.S. government on the best approach to take in the negotiations.

That question opens itself to involvement of the legislative branch of government, and to the citizenry. Letters of concern about arms control to members of Congress would be very appropriate at this early stage.—TP

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—The mess we've gotten ourselves into: a backward and a forward view.

First the mess itself, and how we got here.

The expense of keeping state government operating grew faster in recent years than the revenues to pay for it. Then an unusually mean-spirited Legislature, primarily interested in blocking gubernatorial efforts to raise taxes and without the courage to slash expenses proportionately, deliberately adopted an out-of-balance budget and forced us to consume our savings to pay the tab.

That left us in the parlous fix in which we find ourselves today, using up money faster than we take it in.

A major factor in creating that dangerous situation was excessive dependence, for far too long, on the oil and gas industry to be the Goose That Lays The Golden Eggs of taxes.

Another was the presence in office, just as the revenue slide reached dangerous proportions, of a Governor with no clear grasp of economic matters, who named agency heads because of their sex or ethnicity instead of their competence.

His Little Napoleon complex also got crossways with legislators, without whose cooperation he can accomplish almost nothing.

The third element was the impotence of legislative leaders, whose gutlessness allowed their bodies' work to be taken over by irresponsible junior members. Those wild-eyed radicals of the right then more or less held all other members for ransom until they got exactly what they wanted—which may have been good for them, but was certainly bad for the state.

So where do we stand today, and what is the prognosis for improving the situation?

At least we know exactly what our problem is, and there should be little temptation to confuse our aim: We have to cut the cost of state government, to raise taxes, or to do some of both. Put technically, we have to assure that hereafter recurring revenues match or exceed recurring expenses, instead of the other way

around, as is the situation we have created for ourselves today.

Citizens at large naturally moan at the prospect of paying higher taxes; that is only to be expected.

A real leader in the Governor's office or a few legislators who are highly respected statewide should be able to make a convincing case to New Mexicans that some tax raises are essential. Unfortunately, none of the quality needed for that is presently on the scene in New Mexico.

So it is clear that whatever is done will have to be accomplished by the Legislature as a whole.

At the moment, we don't even know who's going to be in charge during the coming legislative session. Whoever that turns out to be, however, it is a safe bet the general cast of mind will be toward conservatism. That should mean minimal tax raises, if any, and an effort at least to cut the cost of keeping government in business.

That latter is a tough thing to do. If you don't think so, watch our President and our Congress as they squirm over the problem while we are facing it here at home. Just when you think you've developed a plan, the one-interest constituencies come out of the woodwork in an attempt to convince you should cut somewhere else, not right at this point where you intend to.

If you don't understand why that makes things difficult, you've never been around when the teachers' unions or the university presidents or the providers of day care or the small loan agencies descended on the capital en masse, with only one message: "You can't do that to us!"

Maybe we ought to stop here for a moment so you can say a quiet prayer that a few courageous leaders in Senate and House emerge from the present obscurity and gloom.

If that doesn't happen, given the fact that the administrative side of our government as presently constituted is as good as useless in legislative affairs, we're in for another long year of the same sort of fiscal stress and strain, during which our present problem will first grow worse and then downright dangerous.

It has been a yearly custom of The Ruidoso News to publish some of the Thanksgiving essays written by fourth grade students at White Mountain Intermediate School.

This year, with a short week and a full-staff effort to give the Warriors a nice sendoff to the state football playoffs, we didn't get the essays into the pre-Thanksgiving paper.

Both the U.S. attorney and the Michigan attorney general are seeking an injunction to halt operations of bar-casino in the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community. Fred and Sybil Dakota opened the establishment with a gambling license issued by the Upper Peninsula Indian Group.

Casino gambling isn't otherwise legal in Michigan, just as it isn't in New Mexico. The state and federal authorities in Michigan are seeking a court determination that casino gambling is also not legal on Indian

land, and that the Indian government lacks the authority to license gambling.

The outcome of that case could determine the future potential for similar enterprises wherever there are Indian reservations.

Many in New Mexico will follow the Michigan case with more than passing interest.

When Posey became a postal clerk at the Ruidoso Downs Post Office in 1961, she was one of three employees at that branch. She said in a small operation like that they all did everything.

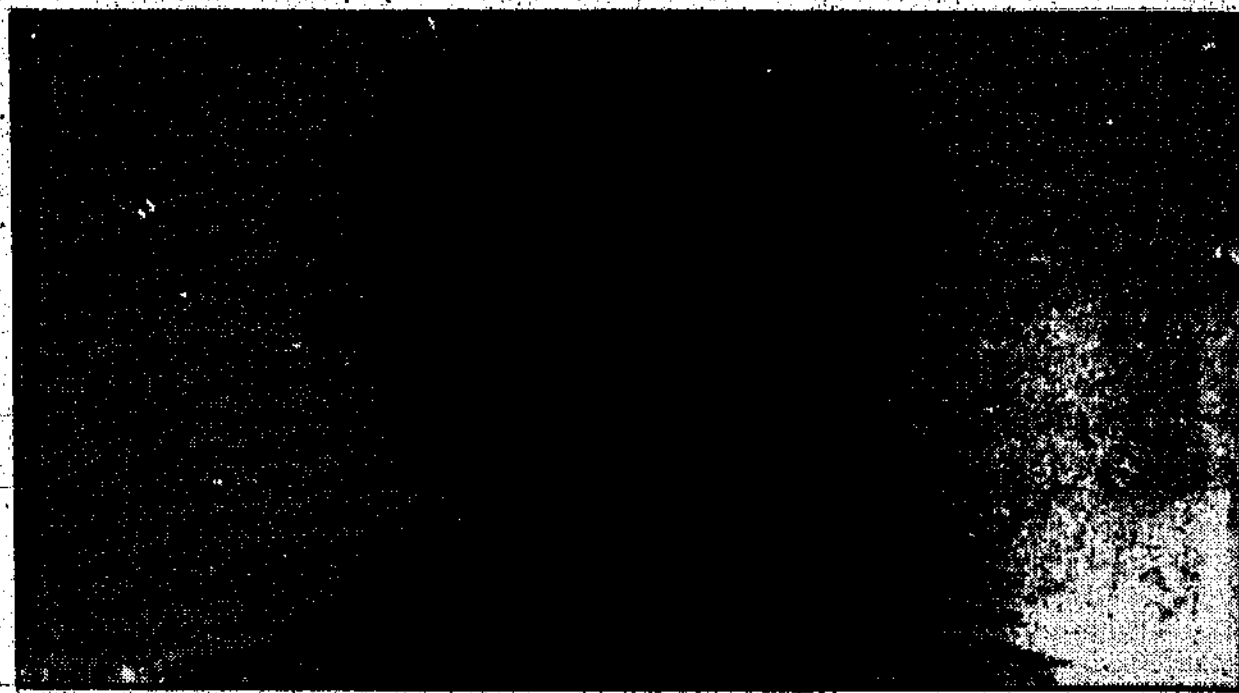
"I sorted, faced, distributed and boxed mail," she said.

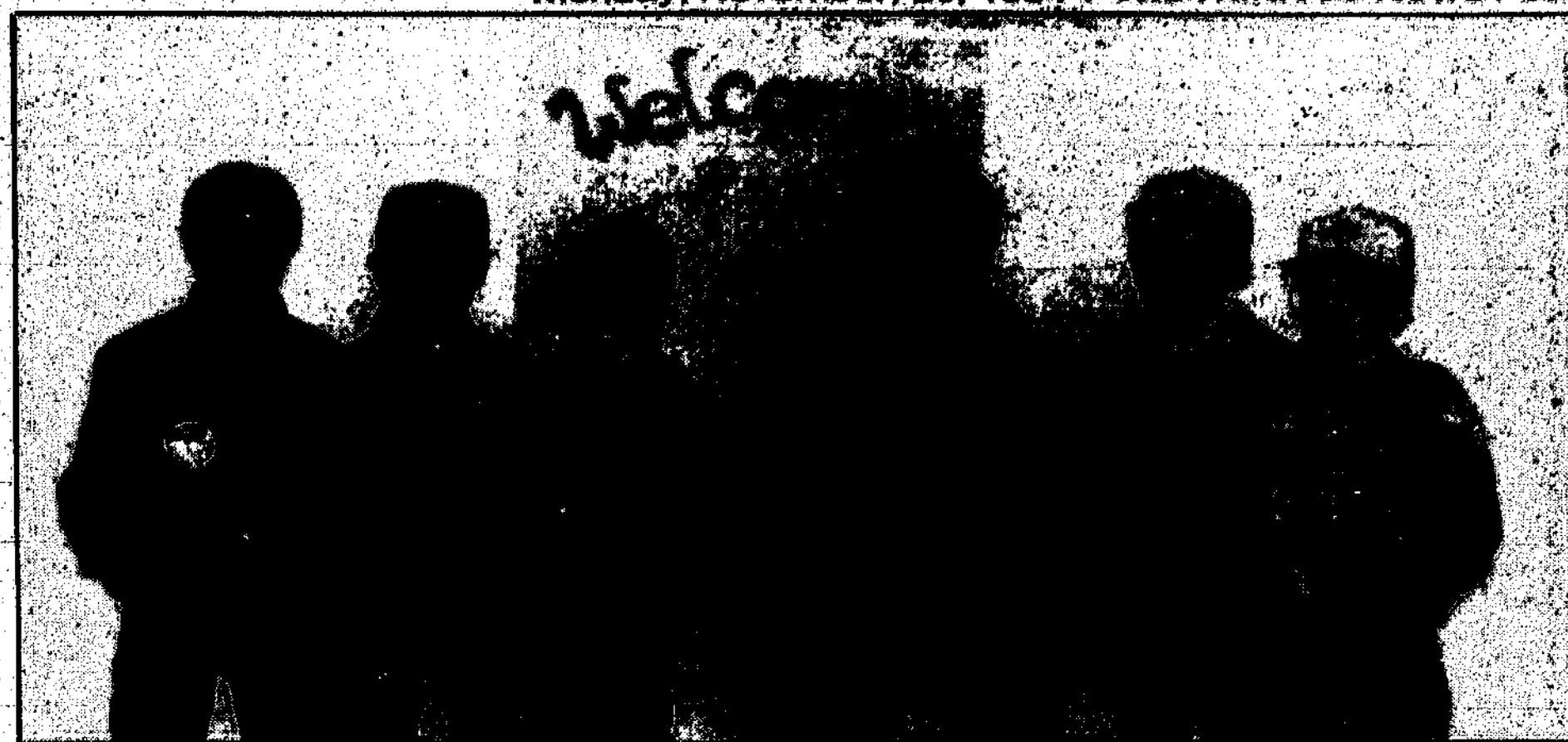
"We used to be asked to weigh babies, and we did it. It might not have been very professional, but when you know everybody it's different," she said.

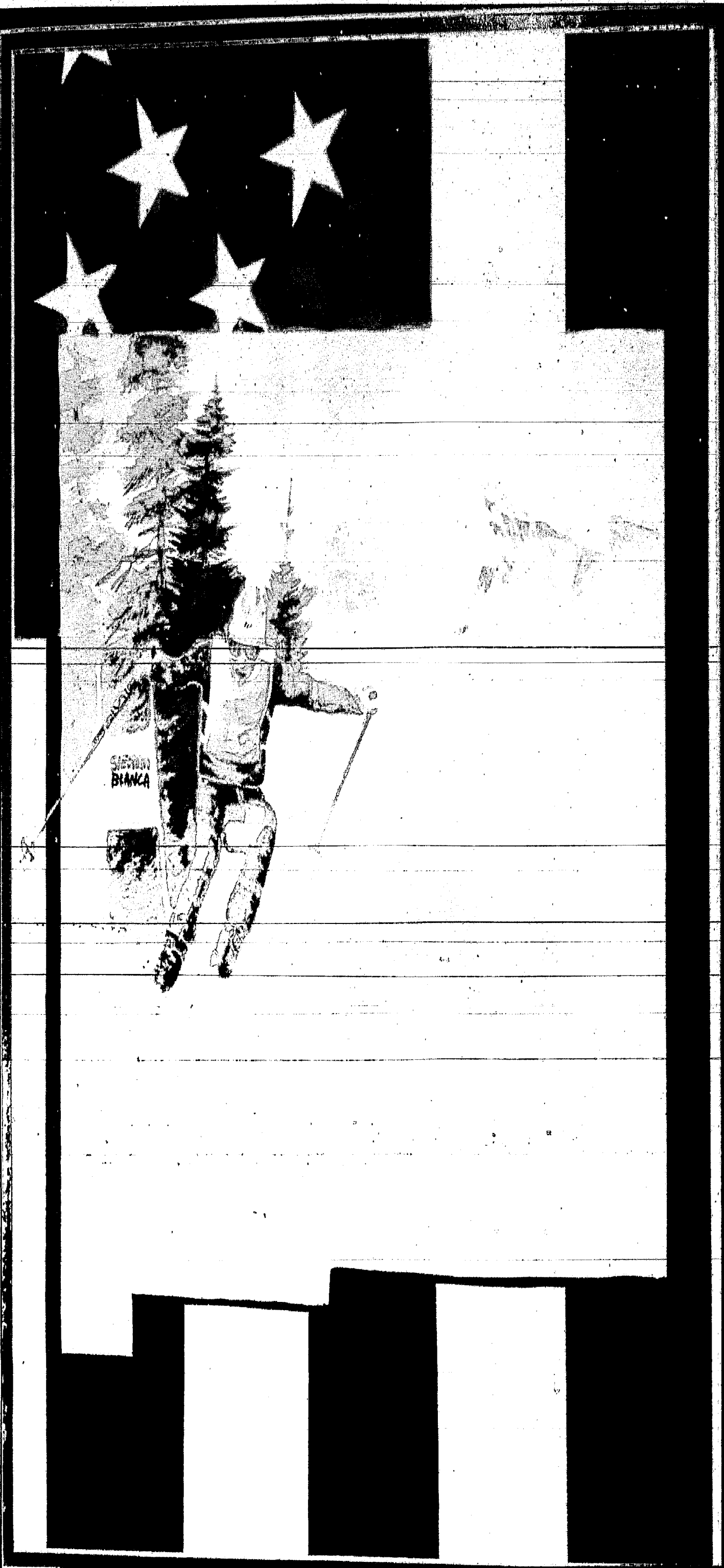

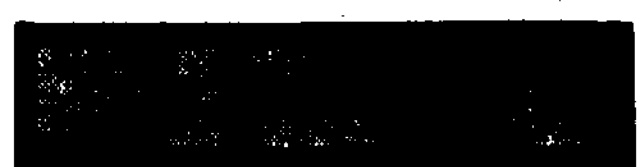

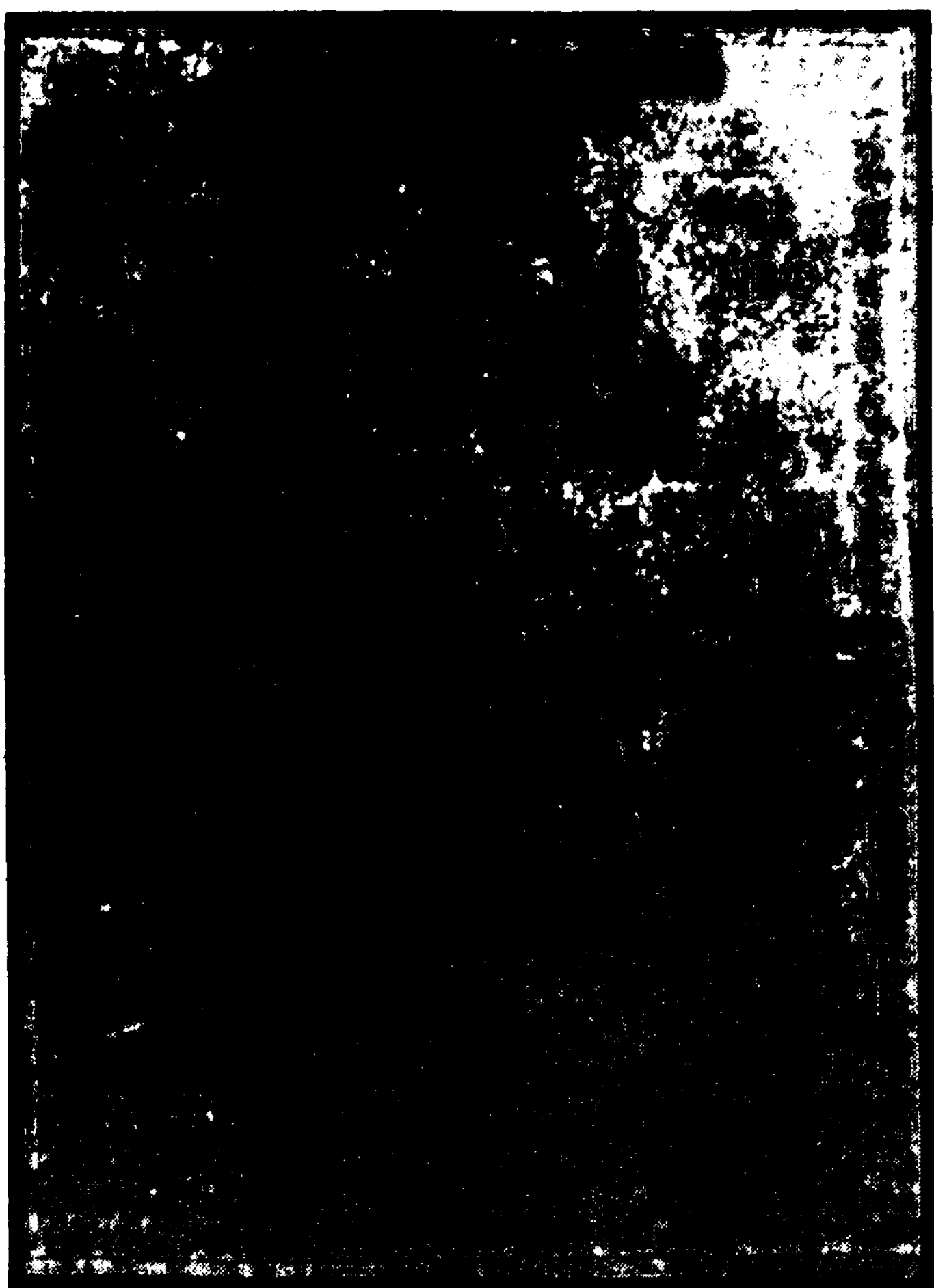

'Children in the Crossfire'

Charles Haid, best known for his portrayal of blustery Officer Andy "Cowboy" Renko on NBC's "Hill Street Blues," now tackles another role as co-producer and star of the NBC movie, "Children in the Crossfire," airing Monday, Dec. 3. Karen Valentine, Julia Duffy and David Huffman also star.

While none of the children in the movie have ever acted before, all were among the thousands in Ireland whose lives were dominated by unrest.

Haid, who took two of the children into his own home, felt they left quite an impact on the American crew, one of two separate crews who worked on the project. "We became the host family, the ones they related to," the actor says. "There were sparks, there was love. It shows up on the screen somehow. They showed extraordinary courage just getting on the plane and coming to America."

The actor hopes that eventually, sometime in the future, lessons will be learned from the involvement of the committee. "It gives the kids a much-needed break from the day-to-day danger they've always known and shows them that all the world isn't so bad and so hopeless. Even more important, we hope that they'll take this new perspective back home with them, that the seeds will be planted to eventually break the terrible cycle that their parents are caught in."

"If they can just take these feelings home and hold onto them," the actor continues, "then hopefully someday they'll look across some barrier and say 'No, I can't hurt that person.' But we won't know for sure if we succeeded until the children grow up."

"Television is starting to enlighten people and I hope we will become a part of it. The cooperation, the support from the very beginning that was shown (from MTM Enterprises) really mirrors the backing for this project, and I really thank them for it."

SAVE THE CHILDREN — "Television is becoming enlightened and it's about time we took some social responsibility," says Charles Hald, who plays Officer Andy Renko on "Hill Street Blues." So two summers ago he took into his California home a Catholic boy from Northern Ireland for a month's vacation away from the street strife in Belfast. Then he went to Ireland and asked four Protestant and Catholic children to join him on an American vacation. "These are children who are not allowed to be children," Hald says sadly. "The children are paying the price for the troubles over there." Hald co-produced and starred in the two-hour film "Children in the Crossfire," to air Dec. 3 on NBC, about this life-changing summer holiday for the Irish kids. "Their biggest impression," Hald says, "was the amount of material waste in the United States. The food we throw away could feed a family for a week in Ireland."

COVERING BOTH SIDES — It is unusual for a performer to have a TV show on both sides of the Atlantic at the same time. But comedian Kelly Montelth is managing to do just that. "The Kelly Montelth Show" is a Friday night feature on the Arts & Entertainment Network. He has a similar program in Britain. "It's a situation comedy that follows my real-life experiences," he says. "That's why my humor transfers across the ocean — people are the same everywhere."

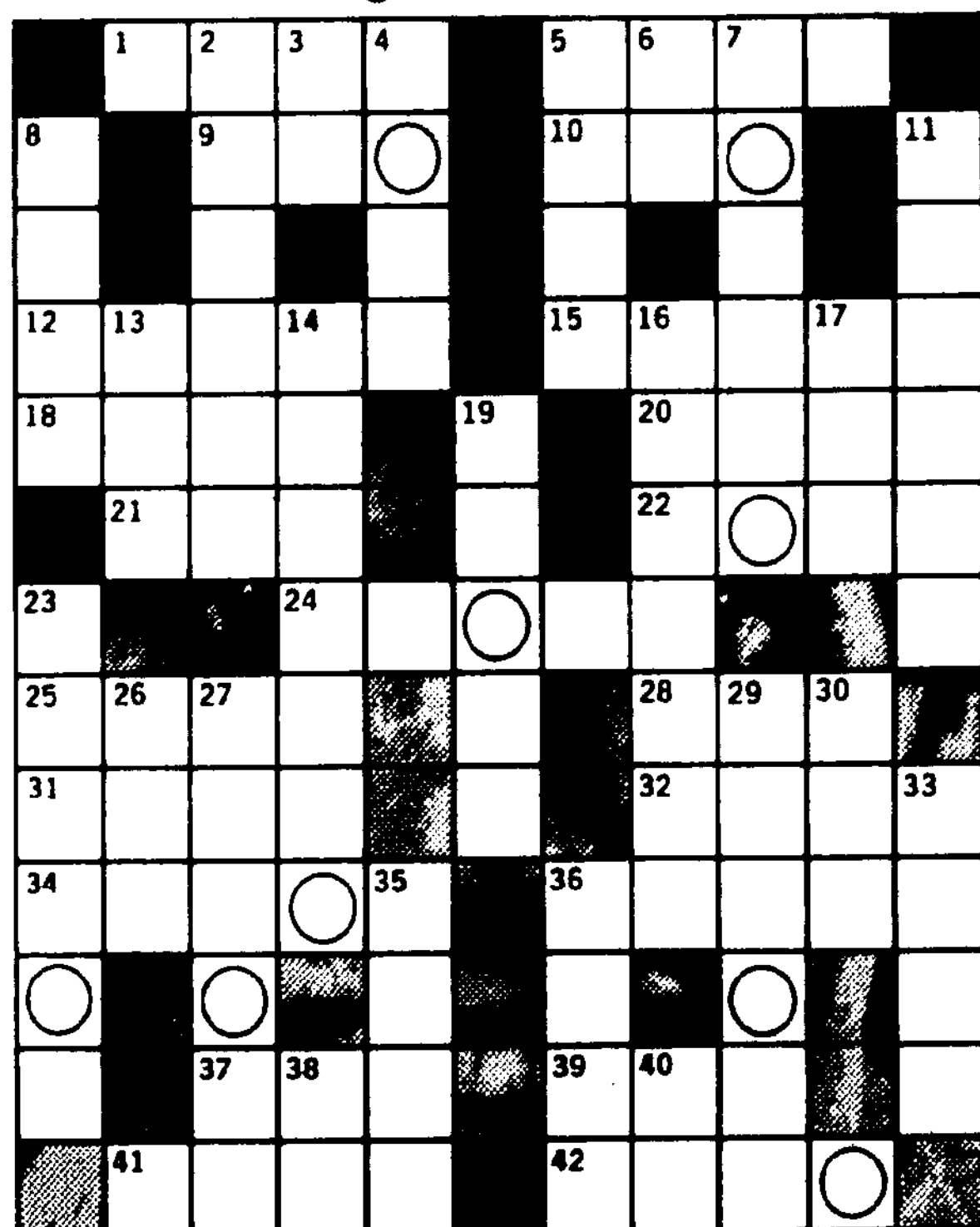

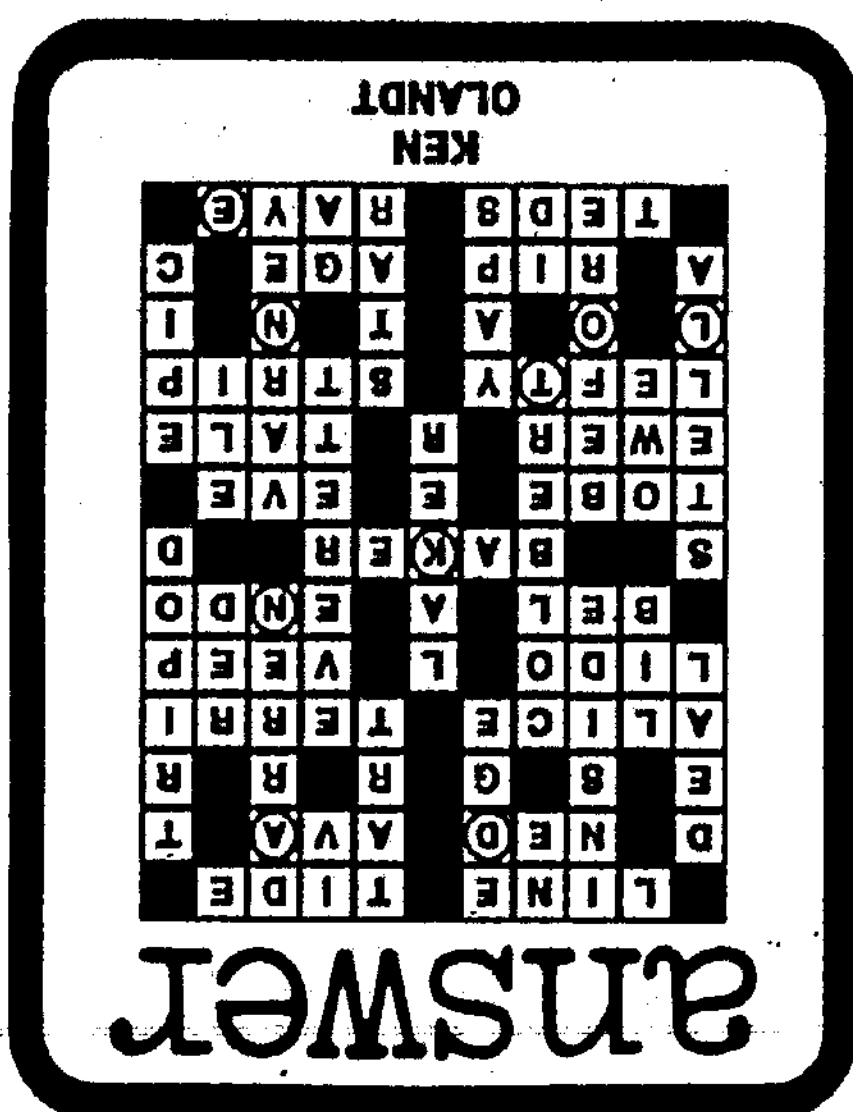
