## O-Bar-O trial postponed again

The upcoming trial between Lincoln County and the O Bar O Ranch continues to be surrounded by controversy.

The date for the upcoming trial had been set for December 28, then was delayed, and then was taken off the District Court docket, according to Lincoln County Court Clerk Margo Lindsay. Lindsay said determination of the trial date is entirely up to the judge who will hear the case. District Judge Robert Doughty will preside over the O Bar O case.

According to Paul Lietzman, who owns the O Bar O with his brother Robert, the county is hesitant to go to trial.

"They don't want this to come out," Lietzman said. "The longer they can

postpone this trial, the better for them.

District Attorney Steve Sanders said that although he would like to comment on the trial, it is an office policy that prevents him from commenting on pending litigation.

The Lietzmans claim a road running through their ranch belongs to them. Paul Lietzman said the road is rightfully theirs because they pay taxes on the land the road is on.

He said the county continues to claim the road for state funding reasons. According to Lietzman, the more miles of road the county has, the more revenue they can collect. But they don't use those funds to properly maintain the road, he said.

"They haven't put \$1 worth of stone on the road in the past 10 years. They can't have it both ways," he said.

Lietzman said if he wins the suit, he will continue paying taxes on the property, but the county won't be able to claim the road and the Lietzmans will be able to control access to the road. If the county wins, he said, then the county will be able to claim the road and control access to it, but the Lietzmans will not have to pay taxes on the property. In addition, Lietzman said they will expect to be reimbursed for all the back taxes that were paid on the land in past years.

Lietzman predicted either outcome would set precedents across the county.

"We're not the only ones," Lietzman said. He spoke of numerous other ranchers in the county in similar situations on their ranches.

"It's just that nobody's ever posed the issue," he said.

## Ski attendance records set

Good snow, good weather and the return of the Mexicans helped Sierra Blanca Ski Resort break single day attendance records three days in a row last week.

After a storm dropped more than 20 inches of snow Tuesday and Wednesday, 6,400 skiers flocked to the mountain Thursday, extending the parking lot onto Ski Run Road and lift lines beyond the ropes. The previous one day record had been 5,600 skiers, said area manager Roy Parker.

Attendance continued at a record pace with 6,900 skiers Friday and 5,700 Saturday.

"It just all came together," said Parker.

Although he had not added up final figures, Parker estimated Sunday that lift ticket sales would be 18 to 20 percent ahead of the same nine days last year from Christmas Eve to New Year's Day.

Eagle Creek Ski Area owner Paul Southwick did not know how many lift tickets he had sold during the week, but reported good attendance after Wednesday's storm. Before that lack

of snow hurt attendance at the lower area. Southwick did report excellent lift ticket sales Wednesday when Ski Run Road was temporarily closed due to a bus wreck.

Even Wednesday, however, 4,000 skiers bought lift tickets at Sierra Blanca, said Parker.

Lift ticket sales, which usually drop off considerably as New Year's approaches, remained high through the weekend. New Year's Eve saw 4,550 skiers purchase lift tickets.

## Five shot near Nogal

A simmering dispute among some Hondo Valley residents erupted New Year's Day, resulting in the shooting of five people on Nogal Hill.

Lela Baca, Pete Baca, John Baca, Greg Baca and Cedrick Rue, all of the Hondo Valley between Glencoe and San Patricio, were taken to Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital for gunshot wounds, reported Lincoln County Deputy Charles Cox.

Although the hospital would release

no names, administrator Ken Moore said three victims were kept overnight and that all involved were in satisfactory condition.

Warrants have been issued for the arrest of Antonio Ramirez, Juan Herrera and Larry Herrera, all of the Hondo Valley. Ramirez, 27, is listed as five foot seven inches, 138 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes. Juan Herrera, 31, is six foot even, 190 pounds with brown hair and brown eyes. Larry Herrera, 27, is five foot eight inches, 157 pounds, with black hair and hazel eyes.

Cox said Lincoln County Deputy talked to relatives Sunday but no one knows where the suspects are.

Cox said he did not know who started the dispute, but the suspects apparently been brewing for three weeks before the shooting.

## Frank Potter village man for all seasons

He gave up a promising rock 'n roll career to grab a jackhammer, then disappeared into the bureaucratic jungle at village hall.

He has spent over half his life working for the Village of Ruidoso and done just about every job around.

On January 1, 1984, assistant village manager Frank Potter, 39, celebrated 20 years of employment with the Village of Ruidoso. He swears he won't get a gold watch, but said he will stick around as long as the village wants him.

"I love my job. I really do," said Potter. "I love Ruidoso."

He appears to have loved the job since he first signed on with the village in January 1964. At the time, he was a member of a promising band, the Shondells. Although not connected with the famous Tommy James and the Shondells, his band had a contract with Dot Records and recorded three or four singles.

jackhammer to dig down to broken water mains.

"I just loved my first job because it was running a jackhammer 24 hours a day," said Potter, whose soft chuckle reminds one not to take everything he says seriously.

But he stuck with it. He worked for eight months in the water department before becoming a dispatcher for the police department. He was later transferred to the Ruidoso municipal airport, where he worked for 10 years seven of them as airport manager.

He continued to be involved in the music business until 1974, booking many bands, such as Paul Revere and the Raiders and the Yardbirds into Ruidoso.

Although he professes not to be thrilled by airplanes, he did pick up an amateur's interest in weather forecasting while working at the airport. Given the chance, he will draw you maps of jetstreams and pressure systems and talk about long-range forecasts. The Farmer's Almanac is handy in his desk drawer.

In 1974, Frank moved to village hall to become assistant village manager, and he has remained to this day. The same year, he began a seven-year stint as a member of the Planning and Zoning Commission. He has also served two terms on the Chamber of Commerce board of directors.

Frank Potter has seen Ruidoso from many angles, and he has seen it change.

Oldtimers used to tell him about the roaring days of the '40s when gambling was big and Ruidoso was a booming town. In the '60s, he recalls,

gambling was gone and it was a pretty quiet and poor town.

"Ruidoso is very affluent compared to the 1960s," said Potter. "There just wasn't money in Ruidoso."

He mentioned townspeople sharing deer meat, and closer friendships among business people.

"Everybody was real close."

But Potter said he could see land changing hands in the '70s, and thought the village was going to grow again.

Standing on the porch of the airport terminal, he told people there eventually would be houses on all those forested hills around.

And Ruidoso did grow. By 1976, the Comprehensive Plan formulated six years before had become obsolete. The 1970 plan did not even consider land past Cree Meadows Drive, where village hall is now located.

Potter helped formulate the 1976 Comprehensive Plan, which he considers one of his biggest accomplishments. In spite of recent criticism it has received, the plan guided the village through a period of vast growth and numerous major public works.

When that plan was formulated, the village set design standards for utilities, and put the burden on developers to supply those utilities. Potter points to that as a major accomplishment that has shaped Ruidoso since.

He believes those standards, including required underground utilities, increased property values and saved the village money which it used on other projects.

In 1980, the growth really took off. It

was more than anybody expected.

"It scared the dickens out of me," said Potter. Supplying services to a town growing at such a tremendous pace was a difficult job, and Potter acknowledges the village administration is still struggling to supply services to the whole town.

"I want the good things for Ruidoso that other towns have," said Potter. He talks of a day when all Ruidoso's streets will be paved and every house will be hooked to the village sewer system.

At the same time, however, he is proud that Ruidoso has been able to avoid many of the problems of a large city, such as pollution. He says he has no interest in bringing industry to Ruidoso other than the "clean" industry of tourism already here.

As assistant manager, Potter is in charge of day to day operations of all village departments, as well as overseeing major public works. Village manager Hine concentrates on fiscal and personnel matters.

When asked down at village hall, nobody seemed to know exactly what Potter does.

"I'm like a quarterback on a football team," said Potter, referring to Hine as the coach and the village councilmen as the owners.

He directs department heads, meets with engineers, talks to upset residents, and tries to plan the future on top of that. Yet his door is always open.

"No matter how organized I try to be, I still have to be flexible enough to have an open door policy," said Potter.

Frank and his brothers owned the auditorium by the police station and played for dances there at night.

Then in January 1964, Ruidoso suffered a severe cold snap that Potter says froze the ground four feet deep and qualified Ruidoso as a disaster area. He knew Ruidoso village manager Jim Hine (one of the few people who has worked for the village longer than Potter) and offered to help the village with some of its cold weather problems.

## S.N.M.E.D.D. helps

S.N.M.E.D.D. To most of us, these could be the initials of almost anything. But to the governments of financially hard pressed communities in this region, these initials symbolize greatly needed assistance. The Southeast New Mexico Economic Development District's major goal is to "strengthen the regional economic base which is responsible for providing jobs to area residents at acceptable income levels, according to organization of funds. One specific function within the broader goal is the development of community facilities. Water and sewer system improvements, recreation facilities, industrial park improvements, public buildings and transportation related investments make up the main community facilities S.N.M.E.D.D. is concerned with. The organization aids communities by assisting the communities' planning for major capital improvements through programming techniques. The group also helps communities procure federal and state aid for those capital improvements. This assistance is important, said S.N.M.E.D.D. executive director Hubert Quintana, so that when money does become available, some firm documentation is available that we can use to prove that there is a need. S.N.M.E.D.D. began in 1971 due to a need that local leaders of small communities had for a planning and development assistance organization on a "shared services" basis. That way, several communities could benefit from the efforts of a profes-

sional organization without shouldering the whole cost of such a service. The organization drew up contracts with the municipal and county governments of Lincoln, Chaves, Eddy, Lea and Otero counties. S.N.M.E.D.D. is one of seven similar organizations statewide. Today, S.N.M.E.D.D. is a non-profit organization governed by a 20-member board of directors, made up of four representatives from each of the five counties in this area. Each county commission is responsible for the selection of the board members from their area. Overseeing the fiscal operations of the organization is the policy-making executive committee. As executive director, Quintana is responsible for execution and completion of board actions with the help of his staff. S.N.M.E.D.D. receives its primary funding from the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Economic Development Administration and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Services planned by the organization for 1984 include making local officials aware of the changes in federal and state programs through the publication of a quarterly newsletter. The organization also plans for direct technical assistance to local communities in the form of joint sponsorship of town, county or area meetings; public hearings for the determination of local priorities; workshop sponsorship; and data collection. The organization also plans to continue keeping clear lines of communication to top state and federal officials. In working for the area communities, Quintana said, "We will keep tabs on things."

Although he is in charge of all departments, Potter is proud of the fact that he allows department heads to have as much responsibility as possible. When he began as assistant village manager, he performed many extra jobs and was able to personally check on everything that was happening. Now he can't and doesn't. The delegation of authority appears to please those who work for him as well. Village clerk Leon Eggleston had only the highest praise for both Potter and Hine, saying they do not unnecessarily interfere with his work but are helpful when needed. The only charge for a visit with Potter appears to be a cigarette. Any smoking village employee who walks into his office at village hall knows Potter will cadge a cigarette from him at one time or another. He justifies himself, saying he would smoke himself to death if he bought cigarettes and had them available all the time. Parks and Recreation director Pam Graves also appreciates the lack of interference, but goes to Potter when she has questions. As with most areas of village administration, Potter was once in charge of the parks. "He amazes you at times with what he knows," said Graves. Parks and Recreation is one of the areas Potter wants to expand in the future. He plays racquetball three to

four times a week himself, often discussing how he has taken care of the younger players at the club. He also gardens, studies paleontology, and still writes the occasional song. He was married from 1966 through 1969, and has a son, Chad, who occasionally comes to Ruidoso from his home in Phoenix. Frank now spends much of his time with girlfriend Donna Dutton. But his hobbies and his girlfriend must often compete with the study of subjects related to his work. "This job is like going to college," said the man who attended one year at Western New Mexico University on a football scholarship. In the course of his job, he often meets with experts from a variety of fields. Although he regrets not furthering his formal education, he believes his diverse practical experience with the village is very helpful. His experience and knowledge of Ruidoso is also helpful when planning for the future of the village, one of his favorite duties. Although many believe development happens haphazardly, Potter refutes that. He said the village has worked with all the major developers long before they started their projects. "We knew all the developers' plans years ago," said Potter. Grindstone dam and Ponderosa Heights sewer, both of which will

change Ruidoso considerably, take up much of his time now. In addition to Parks and Recreation, Potter believes fire protection will need more attention in the future. Water, however, is the most critical factor in the future of Ruidoso and the Southwest, believes Potter. "Water is going to be a problem," said Potter. "Without water you don't do anything." Potter also believes you shouldn't do anything in Ruidoso without appreciating its beauty. While looking at Ruidoso, said the fourth-generation New Mexican, one has to see the beauty and the problems. But one can't let the solutions destroy the area's beauty. That attitude, says village manager Hine, has kept Frank Potter working for the village of Ruidoso for so many years. And it will probably keep him there for some time to come.

Parker attributed the late week lift ticket sales to the good weather and extensive grooming of slopes. With three grooming machines in operation this season, resort employees are able to groom more runs each night and make them more attractive to the beginner and intermediate skiers, said Parker. Excellent snow conditions and sunny, warm weather also lured skiers to the mountain later in the week. Parker said he timed 25-minute lift lines on the gondola and five- to 10-minute waits on Apache Bowl and Captain triple chairlifts Friday. Chair one averaged lift lines of about 15 to 20 minutes on Saturday. The excellent weather attracted many skiers to the Apache Bowl, which helped take pressure off other lifts, said Parker. Although the parking lot extended onto the road at times during the week, Parker said he was pleased with expansions that comfortably accommodated 5,000 skiers in the lot. ## Mexico proposal reactions mixed

Support around Ruidoso for a Mexican advertising campaign spearheaded by Mexican businessman Arturo Lojero ranges all the way from complete concurrence to absolute opposition. The Ruidoso Board of Realtors has been approached already by Lojero, who said he plans to go to them again for support. "No one seems to be that interested," Jim Carpenter, president of the board said of the Realtors. Carpenter said Lojero had come before the Realtors asking for support in the form of a contribution linked with each real estate sale. "He wanted us to pay him a percentage of each deal we made, which, by law, isn't legal," Carpenter said. "I think he's got some good ideas, but I don't think he's going about it right. He's got to do some more selling before the Realtors go for it." Sid Alford of Ruidoso Recreation Incorporated, the company that is developing the Fantasy Mountain amusement park, said he will support the proposal completely. "I think if it's done right, it will be a big help to Ruidoso," he said. "I told him I'd support it. I think it's going to help us (Fantasy Mountain) a lot. I think the business community can look at this and say 'We can benefit from this.'" Opinions from the downtown merchants, another group Lojero plans to approach for help, likewise vary in degree of support. "I don't like to see anyone starting anything separate," said Archer Wilson, owner of the Roadrunner and the Christmas Annex. "We've got a good program going through the Lodger's Tax Committee and the Chamber. I know I'm not going to support it." Tom Kelham, owner of Kelham's said that although he felt Lojero's

goal of \$110,000 was a little too high, he thought focusing the campaign in Mexico City might be more beneficial to Ruidoso. "We should make the effort to try that market," Kelham said. "Whether or not Arturo is correct in suggesting that we put all our efforts in that market, I'm not sure." Kelham said he did think additional advertising directed toward the Mexico market was a good idea. "I would be inclined to chip in and help that effort." Another group Lojero plans to approach is the Rotary Club. President-elect Rod Adamson said the club will welcome him to their meetings. "We're very open to hear what he's got to say," Adamson said of the Rotary membership. He predicted, however, that a request by Lojero for funding from the group would be unsuccessful. "It's normally not the type of thing they would do. Generally, funds are spent right back here in the community," he said. Lojero said he also plans to meet with members of the Ruidoso Lodger's Association. Association President Robert Ivy said he met briefly with Lojero earlier, but had not yet been able to study the proposal in depth. "I really don't have an opinion right now," he said. "Until we know everything, I really couldn't say if we'll support it." James Paxton, President of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, voiced several concerns about the campaign. He said there was no connection between Lojero's campaign and the Chamber's campaign. He also stressed he did not want to start a confrontation between the two groups, but wanted to ensure that there was no confusion over similar elements of the two campaigns. According to Paxton, the campaign the Chamber is mounting in Mexico is proceeding as planned and will not be affected by the Lojero campaign.

## Skateland: popular recreation spot has long colorful history

The smell of popcorn fills the air as skaters glide across the smooth wooden floor. An occasional loud thud is met with giggles or a quickly dried tear. Music pumps out a rhythmic beat as one of the town's most enduring businesses, Ruidoso Skateland, gears up for the evening. The building, which was built in 1938, has always been used as a skating rink. Owners Bill and Anne Wilson bought it in 1975 and have formed a partnership with their daughter, Carol Pearch. The original floor was constructed before electric sanders were available, Mrs. Wilson related. Builder Harry Eckert planed it down as smooth as possible with hand tools. He then hauled sand up from the Rio Ruidoso, spread it on the floor and let it dry. To complete his plan, Eckert publicized a free dance. "Everybody came from miles around," Wilson said. The dancers' feet finished the sanding process beautifully. The maple skating floor now requires very little upkeep. It is just mopped and swept, Pearch said. Since construction of the all wood building, the business has changed hands a few times. The owners previous to the Wilsons had it for seven years, and the ones before that for 13. Mrs. Wilson believes that the family oriented nature of the business makes it very satisfying. Pearch mentioned a couple she knows who met at the skating rink and were later married. Mrs. Wilson remembered meeting a doctor who told her he had once worked at Skateland as a buckle-boy. When skates were buckled rather than laced, boys could work for eight hours in return for one hour of skating, the man told her. Skateland offers more than just the fun of wheels underfoot, however. A concession stand holds candy, popcorn, hot dogs, pickles and beef jerky. Soft drinks are also available. A jukebox plays everything from top 40 to country. The management usually keeps the jukebox playing, although customers are welcome to play their own selections.

The juke box is basically stocked with "music you can move your feet to," Wilson noted. In addition, a wide selection of video games is available, including such favorites as Ms. Pac-Man, Frogger, Donkey Kong and Mr. Do. This pastime is extremely popular at the rink. But, of course, skating is the main activity. During the afternoon sessions from 1 to 5, younger children usually fill the rink. A friendly atmosphere prevails, and the management looks after the children for their parents, Pearch said. Managers patrol the rink keeping an eye out for rowdiness or possible injury. Every 15 minutes they start an activity in order to keep the children calm and busy. Limbo, crazy trio, snowball, stretch, hokey-pokey and shoot-the-duck are some of the musical games played. Teenagers and families comprise the main crowd in the evening sessions from 7 to 11. They enjoy many different sorts of races and "couple dances." Rink guards are hired for the later sessions to keep control of the situation in the rink. Wilson stressed that at any sign of drinking or serious trouble, skaters are ordered off the floor or sent away. "We handle it immediately," she said. The usual method of behavior reform, however, involves changing the activity on the floor. Normally a game is begun, Wilson said. She calls this a "form of crowd control." Rules are strictly enforced. "It's a major theme of ours to keep it well controlled," she said. Skating goes beyond just the daily sessions for the Wilsons. When they purchased the business, they began

an immediate survey of other rinks around the country. They formed the Rollerettes in 1975. At that time, it was the only such organization in the nation other than in California. Though they started the performing team for high school girls, they later expanded it to include all ages. The Rollerettes have performed in the Tularosa Rose Festival Parade and at Aspencade in Ruidoso. The 40 to 60 members also travel to schools for benefit shows. This spring, the Rollerettes were able to see the Ice Capades in Albuquerque. Wilson believes the team provides valuable experience for the members. Providing fun, experience and exercise seems to be what Ruidoso Skateland is all about. "We have a good time, and we like our crowds to have a good time," Pearch said. "Skateland is just a good place to make friends."

**New nurse to promote health**

A new public health nurse arrived recently in Ruidoso to serve the public health needs of this area of Lincoln County.

Cathy Johnson, a registered nurse who has been a public health nurse for 15 years, will work out of the new Lincoln County sub-office. She transferred from the Gallup Field Health Office in Gallup.

Previously, there was just one public health nurse, Hazel English. The public health services were located in Carrizozo, except for a once-a-month immunization clinic in Ruidoso.

The new Ruidoso facilities include two examination rooms, the nurse's office and an outer desk area, where a clerk will greet patients.

She is still in the process of equipping the office, Johnson said, but most of the public health services are available now. She has been participating in some community outreach—visiting with other agency people—while waiting for her office to become fully equipped.

As public health nurse, Johnson said she hopes to accomplish health promotion and disease prevention in Ruidoso and the surrounding area.

By being in an area with a larger concentration of the county's population, her office will provide more availability to health services, she noted. All the public health services are free.

Johnson will give both individual and group health education and home visitations. She will refer patients to doctors if she finds anything needing their attention while providing her services.

The services her office will provide include:

- Immunizations. Her office offers immunizations to prevent diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough), tetanus, polio, measles, rubella and mumps. Immunizations are available from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday through Friday.
- Hypertension. This includes screening, referral, follow-up and education.
- Tuberculosis Services. This includes screening, treatment and consultation.
- Venereal Disease. Services will be screening, diagnosis, treatment, contact investigation and education.
- Communicable Diseases. She will conduct epidemiological investigations for hepatitis, hemophilus, influenza, botulism, salmonella, shigella and giardia.
- Health Education. Services range from providing information on the

health related services available through the division and other community resources to conducting educational sessions on a variety of health topics. These services are available but not limited to community groups and organizations.

developmental screening, education on nutrition and injury control, education and periodic screening for vision, hearing, hypertension, anemia and scoliosis.

- Home visits. These will be to encourage better health practices of individuals and families and to provide follow-up for specific health problems.
- Child Health Services. (not available yet) This includes a complete medical history, periodic physical examinations, updating immunizations,

- Family planning. (not available yet) Services offer physical exams and lab tests, including pap smear, contraceptive supplies, referral, follow-ups and education.
- Johnson encourages anyone to come by for use of any of these services. For further information she can be reached at her office at 258-3252.

# Warrior teams resume action

Seattle's only hope is to make a couple of big plays early in the game and then give the ball to outstanding rookie running back Curt Warner. However, even Warner should have trouble running against the big and physical Raider defense.

The 49er-Redskin game should be closer than the Washington victory over the Rams, but only if San Francisco plays better than it did against Detroit.

The Lions outgained the 49ers by over 100 yards and seemed to be gathering steam in the second half.

But in the end, it was several big plays by the San Francisco defense and the skill of 49er quarterback Joe Montana which proved the difference.

But the 49ers will need much more than that against the giant Redskin offensive and defensive lines.

San Francisco is basically a finesse team which depends on overall quickness and talent at the so-called skill positions to win.

Washington can also move through the air with NFL Player of the Year Joe Theismann throwing the ball to a number of talented receivers.

Washington's pass defense was ranked low during the regular season, but much of the yardage gained on the Redskin pass defense was due to the fact that Washington's opponents were behind and had to throw a lot to catch up.

The Redskins are also hard to move against on the ground. With big Dave Butz anchoring the defensive line, 49er running backs Wendell Tyler and Roger Craig will have a tough time getting yardage.

San Francisco's only real shot at winning would be to strike quickly, take at least a touchdown lead and throw a balanced offensive attack at Washington in the second half.

The 49ers will have to establish ball control in order to keep the ball away from the Washington offense. The Redskins can wear a smaller team down, running Riggins constantly behind their "Hogs" offensive line.

Perhaps one thing both the 49ers and Seahawks have in their favor is that it's hard for any team to improve on a "perfect game."

The Raiders and Redskins (particularly the latter team) played close to the peak of their ability in Sunday's games. It's sometimes hard for a team to come back strong after playing a near-perfect game.

In 1968, the Baltimore Colts were awesome in taking a 34-0 victory over Cleveland in the NFL title game.

What happened two weeks later when Baltimore played the American Football League champion New York Jets (this was before the two leagues merged) is one of the biggest stories in sports history. The Jets took a 16-7 upset victory and turned the pro football world upside down.

But the Redskins and Raiders should still have enough to prevail in the conference title games.

Washington will ease past San Francisco 31-17 and the Raiders should topple Seattle 28-14.

As to who will win the Super Bowl, I'll hold off on that prediction for at least a week or so.

**Court Report**

Lincoln County Investments, Inc., a New Mexico Corporation, filed a complaint December 5 against the Village of Ruidoso, Mayor George White, all members of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso and Leon Eggleston, Village Clerk of the Village of Ruidoso, alleging that a vote of the trustees denying a zoning request from R-2 to C-1 of the subject property was made with the vote of only two trustees, which is not a majority; and that the action was arbitrary, capricious and contrary to the law as they allegedly failed to properly consider the request; and that the trustees discriminated against the corporation. The corporation is seeking that the court issue a writ of certiorari directed to the defendants and that the court review all the records on this matter and reverse the decision of the Board of Trustees.  
Helen J. Sanchez and Western Alliance Insurance Company filed a complaint December 6 against John R. Kuhn alleging Kuhn negligently operated his vehicle resulting in a collision with the Sanchez vehicle causing damage beyond repair, with a replacement cost of \$5,000 for the vehicle. Sanchez is seeking judgement in the amount of \$250 and Western Alliance Insurance Company is seeking judgement in the amount of \$4,750.  
Miles I. Johnson filed a complaint December 6 against William D. Crocker alleging Crocker negligently operated his vehicle resulting in a collision with Johnson's vehicle. Johnson seeks judgement in the amount of \$10,000 plus the costs of the action.  
A notice of appeal of Magistrate Cause No. 26-3-83-0312-B was filed December 8 by Don Sasser in his action against John Harlacker.  
Pioneer Savings and Trust Association, F.A. filed a complaint December 8 against Christopher J. Hicks; Beverly Hicks, his wife; Midwest Developers, Inc., a New Mexico Corporation; Herschel Pat Spurlin; Melinda Gladys Spurlin; Odell Spurlin; Patricia Spurlin, his wife; New Mexico Properties, Inc., a New Mexico Corporation; and Spurlin Properties, Inc., a Texas Corporation, alleging nonpayment of a promissory note by Hicks, and that the other defendants make some wrongful claim to the subject property. The plaintiff seeks judgement in the amount of \$69,328.93, plus interest, plus the cost of any advances made by the plaintiff to the subject property, plus foreclosure of the mortgage and sale of the property, plus costs of the action, plus attorney's fees.

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—Name a governor of New Mexico who took office with these qualities: great mental and physical energy; a determination to change the way the state is governed, starting at the top; and a commitment to redress the balance between the state's powerful and less powerful citizens.

If you said Toney Anaya, you were correct.

You were equally correct if you said Jerry Apodaca.

There is a lot more resemblance between the two than either is anxious to admit.

There is also one strong difference: By the end of his first month in office, Apodaca, who had hit the ground running on January 1, just as Anaya did, was beginning to adjust to the reality of the governor's job. He was telling friends, "This is a very sobering experience."

What he had discovered in a few short weeks was how difficult it is to overcome the drag of bureaucracy, how much harder it is to control legislators when you aren't one and how the news media can, when they so choose, flay you alive.

The reality of the job was forcing Jerry to grow up.

He never completely lost any of the drives he brought with him to the task, but he gradually moderated his approach to them.

Toney Anaya hasn't managed to do that.

At the end of his first year in office, to describe him as "moderate" about anything would be a misnomer.

He doesn't mind having that said about him. Moderate is not anything he wants to be. To a man of his drive and ambition, a moderate is a wet blanket, who holds back progress. Another definition for that term, Anaya seems to believe, is "Republican."

About the drag of bureaucracy, which helped to bring Apodaca's spirits down, Anaya cares little. He acts as though it did not exist. That would be okay, except for the fact that

it does exist. What Anaya decrees from his throne in the Roundhouse does not become ipso facto true. Apodaca noticed that; Anaya either doesn't know it or he simply chooses to ignore it.

About the Legislature, Anaya seems badly confused. He is the first man chosen governor of the state since Clyde Tingley, who served from 1935 to 1938, who has had no previous legislative experience. He acts as though lawmakers worked for him. They don't. They can ignore the wishes of governors even more easily than the bureaucrats can.

Because of those two failures to take into account realities it is painful to admit, it does not matter much that Toney has not suffered the slings and arrows of the media to anything like the degree Apodaca did.

For some reason, most members of the media (this column most obviously excepted) are still kind to Anaya. Where Apodaca used to anger many news people, causing editors to more or less order their folks to catch him at something, Anaya is still treated relatively well.

After all, he's always good for 90 seconds on the evening news.

That being so, few seem to note how much he is facade, with little or no follow-through on the ideas which pour from him and his staff in a stream which some veteran reporters find childlike in its naivete. Few comment on the fact that with one-fourth of his term already finished, he is still trying to decide just what his aims are and just what it is he wants to do.

All in all, there is little evidence that Anaya has suffered that sobering experience Jerry Apodaca went through. As Apodaca was the better for having had it, so Anaya is weaker for not having acquired that chilling dash of realization.

He may get a good press, but more and more of those who cover him are coming to think his accomplishments are thin indeed.

I lost friends in Viet Nam and I lost a friend over in El Salvador.

When my good friend Jenny began carrying her Bible around expounding on the needs to increase military aid to El Salvador, I shuddered. I discovered she had spent much of her time watching Jerry Fallwell and others proclaiming simplistic, militaristic answers to complex world problems. Jenny had moved away, had lost both of her parents, within a year, had a serious illness and was a prime target for her New Right indoctrination. Last week's intensive, lengthy and I believe accurate reporting by Craig Ryes in the Albuquerque Tribune about U. S. involvement and New Right influence in El Salvador should evoke a response from New Mexicans.

An editorial in the same paper painted the dilemma we are faced with: continuing aid if there is a right-wing victory in March implies support for a vicious right-wing underground that bombed and murdered itself to political respectability, or withholding aid in the event of an Arena victory signals the leftists that the time is right for another Nicaragua. (Sounds the same, but has a slightly different beat

than Nam.)

Senator Jeff Bingham has voiced concern and disfavor about the present administration's Central American Policy. I plan to write to him.

The last time I saw Jenny we both listened to a radio broadcast of a Salvadoran refugee who sought haven in a South Minneapolis church. He'd been in the military or the right-wing death squad and he couldn't stand the bloody horrors. His voice rings so clearly yet when I remember him saying: "You who call yourself Christians please don't send money to my country to buy guns. My people do not know what Communism means they only know they are hungry."

Jenny went to Honduras on a mission. I ordered more bumper stickers and continued an on-going letter writing campaign to Minnesota Senator David Durenburger, asking him to relate what our government is doing in El Salvador, telling him how I feel, what we are contributing to will fill pages of horror in future history.

This year I'm going to continue the letter writing campaign with Senator Bingham.

## On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer



Well, 1984 is finally here. I number myself among the many people to whom that year—1984—has always conveyed a feeling of dread.

That is to say, I read English author George Orwell's novel, "1984," at a relatively young age, and have since been stuck with the image of the world he portrayed.

Maybe now that the year is finally here, we can all breathe a sigh of relief that things are not as Orwell predicted. I don't guess he actually expected a world like he wrote about to evolve by 1984, since he supposedly got the title by reversing the last two digits of the year in which he was writing, 1948.

But he must have been concerned that things were going in that direction.

I thought it might be interesting to contrast the way it is in "1984" with the way it is, 1984.

In recalling the book, I know one thing that made a strong impression on me was the telescreen. Protagonist Winston Smith, like everyone else, has one on the wall of his flat.

Continuous propaganda drones through the telescreen, but the machines cannot be turned off. And the watchers can be and are themselves watched through the screen.

In one memorable scene, Winston is doing the required "Physical Jerks" one morning when suddenly the instructor screams at him to do better.

He warns himself, "Never show dismay! Never show resentment!" and succeeds in touching his toes.

In our world today, TV has become the all-pervasive eye Orwell imagined. But you can turn it off, and as far as we know, no one can watch the watcher through it.

We do exercise to TV. But we do them voluntarily, and Richard Simmons is a far cry from the shrewish instructor in the novel.

Another thing that stuck in my mind is a scene in which an old gent asks for a pint of beer and the bartender gives him a hair-utter.

"E could 'a drawn me off a pint," grumbled the old man as he settled down behind his glass. "A 'alf liter ain't enough. It don't satisfy. And a 'ole liter's too much."

The pint/liter question is more relevant in England, I'm sure—here we drink mostly 8- or 10-ounce drafts.

But our society certainly has a taste for beer—be it regular beer, light beer or foreign beer. That we might have too much freedom to drink it is more of a concern than any fear of its regulation—Ruidoso just adopted a law making it illegal to have an open beer can (or any other alcoholic beverage container) in a vehicle.

It's also interesting to note that despite the highly trumpeted efforts to switch over to the metric system, we are still measuring things in inches, feet, miles, gallons, etc.

Maybe that shows something in itself. Does our society have an ingrained resistance to imposition of the kind of controls in "1984"?

The final thing that comes easily to mind from the book is an acquaintance of Winston getting arrested by the Thought Police for Thoughtcrime.

He was guilty of saying "Down with Big Brother" in his sleep, and he was turned in by his little seven-year-old daughter, a member of the youthful Spies.

In the days of the "generation gap," it almost seemed battle lines were being drawn between young and old. You had Bob Dylan singing, "Your sons and your daughters are beyond your command, Your old road is rapidly aging."

But today we have not a generation gap as much as a family gap—with children deprived of the traditional family unit anchored by two natural parents.

It will be interesting to watch the ramifications of that change unfold.

But all in all, we seem to have escaped the Orwellian vision. There is no Big Brother.

And, God willing, there never will be in the free world.

# Rockets, satellites soar at Space Center

A titanic "Little Joe" rocket breaks over the horizon, stretching against its tie-downs into the desert sky. Needle-tipped Lance and Aerobee rockets mimic the sharp blades of nearby yucca, pointing arrow-straight to the heavens. Mounted atop rusting rails, a sled no snow-seeking child will ever ride seems to strain ahead to the 600 mile per hour speeds it had once been powered to by its 12 rockets.

Surrounded by mountains dotted with prickly pear and yucca spectators, the manmade actors on this arid stage stand as brazen testimony to past achievements of their human creators into the vast skies above.

The International Space Hall of Fame in Alamogordo, a 60-minute drive from Ruidoso, is a vivid monument of man's explorations in space. From early attempts at rocketry to actual manned flight to the moon, the Hall of Fame covers it all.

After the four-floor elevator ride to the top level of the Hall of Fame building, you begin descending through succeeding floors of space history. Scaled-down models of actual


satellites and moon-roving equipment hang motionless above hall inductees from the USSR, United States, Germany and other countries.

The building is modern and comfortable, having just been opened in October 1976. The exhibit is sponsored by the State of New Mexico, and is part of an overall complex, the Space Center.


The Center includes the Hall of Fame, the spectacular Omnimax Theater and the Planetarium. The Omnimax features the world's largest projector, a 40-foot wrap-around screen and a six-channel audio system that "surrounds you with breathtaking realism."

The theater shows everything from the maiden voyage of the Space Shuttle Columbia to rock concerts and laser light shows. The Planetarium features a Spitz 512 projector that captures views of space from across the galaxy.

The Space Center is open every day from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. For Space Center information and show times at the Omnimax, call 437-2840.





## Ruidoso EZE Clean a family business

"We want to encourage everybody in town to keep their carpets clean," said Paul Wersich of Ruidoso's newest carpet cleaning business, Ruidoso EZE Clean. "The little money you invest in keeping the carpets clean is marginal compared to the cost of replacing it."

Wersich and his step-son, Lee Whittenton, own the business, which has been in operation since September. The cleaning company specializes in carpet, upholstery, and automobile cleaning. They also clean flood and fire damaged buildings. Other services they provide include water ex-

traction, smoke and odor removal and some carpet repair.

The business is a franchise of an El Paso carpet cleaning business, Moore's EZE Clean. Wersich said he and Whittenton attended the company school for seven weeks in El Paso.

"We learned every phase of it," Wersich said. He said they have about \$45,000 invested in the company, and it is well worth it.

"We have all the technical answers we need just down the street in El Paso. And that's nice to know," said Wersich's wife, Mary Jane.

The cleaning company operates anywhere within a 60-mile radius of Ruidoso, according to Wersich. They are available 24 hours a day for jobs

by appointment.

The business has been in the planning for a long time, according to Wersich.

"We knew we'd move up here sooner or later," Wersich said. "Finally it all fell into place. We had the house up here and we thought we'd get a little family business going."

According to Wersich, business so far has been good.

"Every month it's better," he said. The one major problem with the business is the lack of awareness by the public, due mostly to the fact that Ruidoso EZE Clean is not yet in the phone book, Wersich said.

Wersich predicted the busiest time

will be in the spring, when many cabin, condominium and motel owners clean up for the coming summer crowds. Wersich said the bulk of their work so far has been for commercial businesses, but they have also had residential customers.

According to Wersich, both he and Whittenton are relatively new to the cleaning business. Whittenton had a trucking company in Riverside, California, and Wersich retired as a Captain after 22 years in the El Paso Police Detective Department.


"I just want to occupy my time and make a comfortable living," Wersich said. The phone number for Ruidoso EZE Clean is 257-4442.
