P&Z tables compactor

After considerable public protesting, the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Tuesday delayed a decision on a proposed garbage transfer system until alternate sites and possible zoning designations can be studied.

The transfer system, which councilman Al Junge has been supporting, is proposed for construction on the site of the old sewer plant in the Hollywood area of Ruidoso.

Instead of making numerous trips to the landfill site on Fort Stanton Mesa, garbage trucks would dump garbage into a compactor at the transfer site. A large flatbed truck would then take the compacted garbage of about five trucks to the landfill area, according to Junge.

Landowners near the proposed site protested, saying flies, odor and decreased property values would result from construction of the transfer system near their property.

"I'm tired of sitting there smelling everything everybody else don't want," said Harlan McCraw, whose suggestion to put the transfer system in somebody else's backyard was greeted by applause from about 15 protestors.

"We don't want any more odor down there," said Joyce Williamson, who explained that residents were happy to get rid of the sewer plant two years ago.

Junge and two Environmental Improvement Division (EID) representatives said odor and flies could be closely controlled with proper operation of the transfer system, which Junge promised would hold no garbage overnight.

Junge said he visited similar transfer systems in Dallas or El Paso, Texas, that had no odor or fly problems.

He also suggested the relatively small transfer system would be a big improvement over the old sewer plant, which still contains sludge from operating days. Junge said the old sewer plant would be cleaned up regardless of action on the transfer system.

P&Z was supposed to consider if the

property is conducive to use as a transfer system site. P&Z enforcement officer Paul Davis noted that the property currently has no zoning designation.

P&Z member James Paxton's motion—that the question be tabled for one month until P&Z can study possible zoning for the land and alternate sites for the system—passed. P&Z members Martin Rose, Greg Masters and Margaret Gaddy said they would study the proposal. Other P&Z members said they would examine transfer systems in Dallas or El Paso.

The commission denied a requested rezoning from R-1 (single-family dwelling) to R-2 (multiple-family dwelling) of 24 lots bordering the fifth and ninth fairways and the fourth green of the Cree Meadows golf course.

Stephen Stout, representing Cree Joint Venture, said the company wanted to rezone the property because there appears to be more interest among builders and buyers for multiple-family dwellings.

P&Z member Tom Kelham said the increased marketability of the property was not a "compelling reason" to change the current zoning. Margaret Gaddy's motion to deny the rezoning carried unanimously, with Paxton and Ray Bishop abstaining.

The commission did approve a requested rezoning from C-1 (light commercial) to C-2 (general commercial) of Lots 1-4, Block 1, Cree Meadows Heights, for Nick Griffin. Griffin said he wanted the property restored to the zoning it had when he first built Rocky Mountain Builder Supply, which stands on the property. It was originally zoned C before the commission began to more specifically zone property.

In other business Monday, P&Z —Approved a replat of lots 5, 6 and 7, Block 1, Palmer Gateway, for Bobby D. Cox, after easements to off-street property had been increased. Civil engineer Tim Collins said Cox plans to build a Taco Villa restaurant on the property across from Jack's Trolley Burger.

—Approved a replat into two lots of tracts A, B and C, Airport West third addition, for Blackwell Industries. The property is directly north of First City National Bank on Mechem Drive.

—Approved a replat of lots 19 and 20, Block 6, Hamilton Terrace, for Ronnie Hemphill. The replat decreased the lot on which the new Coulston and Associates building stands, and increased the adjacent lot.

FBI checking weekend shooting involving Ruidoso policeman

Ruidoso police were involved in a high speed chase after a stolen car early New Year's Eve that ended in a shooting and is now being investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

Ruidoso police chief Dick Swenor said he thinks Ruidoso police officer Hugh Anderson acted appropriately during the incident.

David Smith, 18, of Mescalero was reported in stable condition Wednesday at Gerald Champion Memorial Hospital in Alamogordo after apparently being shot in the upper left thigh by Anderson.

He has been arrested by the Ruidoso Police Department on a charge of unlawful taking of a motor vehicle, and by the Bureau of Indian Affairs Law Enforcement Services for careless driving.

Ruidoso police received a report at approximately 5:30 a.m. New Year's Eve that Diane E. Dawson's 1979 Ford LTD had been stolen from the Swiss Chalet parking lot. According to officer Parnley Bryant's report, Dawson had started the car to warm it up when it was stolen.

Bryant and Dawson were en route to the Ruidoso police station to file a

stolen car affidavit at about 5:45 a.m. when Anderson spotted the stolen car at the corner of Sudderth and Mechem Drives.

According to Bryant's report, the police were informed there was a loaded .38 revolver under the front seat of the stolen vehicle.

According to Ruidoso police chief Dick Swenor, Anderson stopped the vehicle on Evergreen Street when Anderson got out of his car, the driver of the stolen vehicle took off at a high speed and headed up Carrizo Canyon Road.

Anderson pursued, but stopped to check the condition of a woman whose car was forced off the road by the fleeing vehicle. Anderson then continued his pursuit and came upon the stolen vehicle past the Inn of the Mountain Gods, where it had stopped after striking a horse and killing it.

According to Swenor, Smith fled the car as Anderson approached. As Anderson was yelling at Smith to stop, he heard a "pop" that he thought was a gunshot, said Swenor. Anderson then fired.

Ruidoso police lieutenant Dave Pfeiffer said Anderson fired five shots. The suspect then fled into the

woods, said Swenor, and Anderson lost him.

The Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) Law Enforcement Services received a report just after 7 Saturday night that Smith had shown up at a residence on the Palmer loop, about a mile and a half from the wrecked car, said Lieutenant Mark Chino. The BIA police then arrested Smith on a careless driving warrant.

Chino said Smith had apparently been outside in the cold for close to 13 hours and was suffering from exposure and loss of blood due to the wound.

Swenor said BIA police found the revolver under the front seat of the stolen car and it had not been fired.

There appeared to be some question whether Smith had another gun and if he had actually fired a shot.

"Given the circumstances, it appears the officer acted appropriately," said Swenor.

The FBI investigates all shootings on federal property, said Swenor. Special agent Dick Baxter was in Ruidoso Wednesday investigating the incident, but was not available for comment.

Anderson was out of town and also unavailable for comment.

Pfeiffer said final charges on Smith will depend upon the FBI investigation.

Shooting suspect turns himself in

One suspect in a New Year's Day shooting incident in which five people were wounded turned himself in Monday, but two others remain at large.

Antonio Ramirez, 27, turned himself into the Ruidoso Downs Police Department and is now being held in the Lincoln County Jail in Carrizozo on charges of aggravated battery and aggravated assault. Bond has been set at \$50,000.

Larry and Juan Herrera were reportedly seen in Roswell, but Lincoln County deputies Ray Garner and

Charles Cox turned up no clues on a visit to that city Wednesday.

Ramirez and both Herreras are suspects in a shooting incident on Nogal Hill that occurred Sunday afternoon. The incident was apparently the latest in a series of confrontations in a family feud that has been brewing for some time.

Police could not say what started the feud, but they said it had flared in a fight New Year's Eve at the Nike nightclub in Carrizozo that resulted in the arrest of John Baca.


As he and his friends returned to the Hondo Valley area the next day, they were forced off the road by Ramirez

and the Herreras, said Cox. He reported three suspects then jumped out of their car and began shooting and clubbing Baca and his friends.

Injured were Lela Baca, Pete Baca, John Baca, Greg Baca and Cedric Rue. All five were taken to Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

Lela and Pete Baca were treated for gunshot wounds and released. John Baca was discharged from the hospital Wednesday afternoon.

Greg Baca, with a gunshot wound to the torso, and Cedric Rue, who was shot in the thigh, remain in the hospital in stable condition.

Lodgers president discusses association

The lodging business in Ruidoso was a good business to be in during 1983, provided you put a little work into it. That is the assessment of Robert Ivy, president of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association (RLA).

"You can make a living as well here as anywhere. You just have to work hard," Ivy said. He laughed and told of the frozen water pipes he had been fixing all during the frigid weather of the busy Christmas week.

"I think every lodger was fixing some pipes last week," he laughed again. Ivy is a friendly person who says he likes talking to and meeting people.

"I enjoy it," he said of his business, Casey's Cabins, located at 2640 Sudderth Drive. "If you like to meet people and talk to people, this business is good for you."

Ivy said that because the lodging business is a service business, attitudes count.

"You have to sell them a service. You have to make them want to stay in your place rather than somewhere else."

Ivy said that although the lodging establishments in town are in direct competition with each other, as far as he knows, they all are getting along well.

"Everybody has different places,

so everybody sells their good points. Everybody is getting along. Nobody's in a price conflict, they're all pretty good about knowing what their place is worth."

Ivy said one factor in those good relations is that many lodgers belong to RLA. The association was formed, according to Ivy, so that lodgers could have a voice as a whole in village politics.

"We're just an association that's trying to protect our best interests. We wanted to protect ourselves from being bowled over by village government!" he said, laughing.

Ivy said that although he estimates the association represents 85 percent of the rooms in the Ruidoso area, its voice is not as strong as he would like.

"I want to make the Lodgers Association a more powerful voice in the community, make the village more aware of our problems and what situations we have to go through to make ends meet."

Ivy talked about the recent effort by lodgers to oppose the increase in lodgers' tax from two to three percent.

"We got by with it once, but I don't think we'll get by with it again."

Ivy said problems between the Lodgers' Tax Committee and the village council cause difficulties for lodgers. He said that when the Lodgers' Tax Committee proposed a budget he felt was favorable to the

lodgers, it was almost completely rewritten by the village council.

"They just denounce it, renounce it or whatever," he said. Ivy said the situation is not a new one to Ruidoso.

"You just get a lot of factions in town that fight each other. Everybody has their opinion but nobody wants to compromise on anything."

Ivy said that although the Lodgers Association is not a political faction, its members want their voice to be heard.

"We haven't as yet gotten behind any council candidate," Ivy said.

One issue recently raised concerns the low amount of participation between lodgers and travel agents.

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce sponsored a seminar on Thursday, December 15, designed to bring area travel agents together with local lodgers. Turnout for that meeting was extremely low, with only one lodging couple attending.

Ivy said because the meeting was held during a very busy time for lodgers, and was also in a very busy week for Christmas parties, the lodgers had problems making the meeting. Ivy himself was unable to make the meeting because of a bout with pneumonia.

"It was just a bad time," he said.

Ivy said the problem he has with working with travel agents is the introduction of a third party in the reservation process, which leads to

communication problems.

"You just added a third party in there to confuse things. That leaves it where the buck can be passed."

Plans for 1984 for the association, according to Ivy, include pushing for a one-quarter of one percent increase in the sales tax in Ruidoso. The lodgers support the increase over an increase in lodgers' tax, according to Ivy, because they feel it would be more fair for everybody.

"The lodgers are bearing the brunt of the advertising campaign," Ivy said of the lodgers' tax dollars collected in Ruidoso for promotion of the area.

"The merchants and businesses in town are benefiting from the taxes collected from us. It's totally unfair."


Other goals for the new year include building the number of members in the association.

"We're always membership-driving," Ivy said with a grin. "We'd like to have 100 percent, including all of Alto, Ruidoso Downs and Ruidoso."

Ivy is serving the remainder of Glen Ferguson's term as RLA president, which is up sometime in May. When Ferguson got out of the lodging business, Ivy was appointed in Ferguson's place. Ivy said he is not sure if he will seek election at the end of his term.

He laughed at the mention of another term.

"I'll just play it by ear."

Highway 37 to be re-striped by state, using conventional epoxy paint method

If at first you don't succeed, try, try again. So it goes with the State Highway Department.

After failing dismally with an experimental street-striping program on Sudderth and Mechem drives just before Thanksgiving, the State Highway Department will return next week to paint the roads with a more conventional epoxy paint, said traffic services engineer Lou Medrano.

Hug Concrete and Pavement Marking Company, the contractor that laid down the experimental thermoplastic striping, has not been paid yet for any

of its work in the state and will not be paid for the work it did in Ruidoso, said Medrano.

The contractor striped approximately 18 miles of road with the thermoplastic as a part of an experimental program being conducted throughout the state. The striping, which was supposed to last two to three times as long as conventional paint, began flaking off Ruidoso streets within two days.

Traffic services engineer Anthony Garcia said the contract with Hug included provisions requiring the striping to stay on the road for a certain amount of time in order to be paid for

Although Garcia did not specify that time, two days is apparently not long enough.

Garcia said the thermoplastic has had mixed results. It is apparently coming off in some of the other experimental sites, but Garcia could not name which ones. He also said he understood it is holding well in some towns, and named Alamogordo specifically.

Medrano said the epoxy paint is a medium-duration paint that usually lasts longer than conventional paint but less than the thermoplastic.

He said the department used the epoxy paint in Ruidoso about eight years ago with good results. The paint

was very expensive at that time and not practical for normal street striping, but has since become less expensive, said Medrano.

Ruidoso has to pay for none of the street maintenance on Highway 37 (Sudderth and Mechem drives) since it is a state highway. The State Highway Department has \$41,000 allotted for maintenance on Sudderth and Mechem, said assistant village manager Frank Potter.

He said the village has been unsuccessfully negotiating with the State Highway Department to receive the money directly and take care of the streets itself.

Bible distribution practice discontinued

A long-time practice of allowing Bibles to be passed out in the elementary school will be discontinued after a parent complained, Ruidoso Municipal Schools officials said.

For two decades and perhaps longer, members of the Gideons have passed out Bibles to students in the fifth grade who wanted them. But a complaint after it was done just before the schools let out for Christmas vacation prompted school officials to check on the legality of the practice.

They were advised by counsel for the state Department of Education that it possibly is in violation of the law, said associate superintendent, Mike Gladden. It was then decided the practice will be discontinued.

"I didn't think a thing of it," said first-year White Mountain Elementary School principal Don Weems of

the Gideons' annual visit. He said he did get a couple of calls on the matter.

Gladden, who was principal at White Mountain Elementary School before moving to the superintendent's office, said the Bibles had been passed out for as long as he could remember, and there had never been a complaint.

Superintendent Sid Miller said the Bibles had been handed out for as long as he has been with the school system—20-plus years.

The Gideons were described by member C. R. Patterson of Alto as a nondenominational and nonsectarian group of Christian businessmen. "Well, I'm disappointed that they would rob the kids of the opportunity of the free choice of accepting one," said Patterson of the school system's decision. He stressed that school children were by no means forced to take a Bible.

Wilfred Beich of Las Cruces, state president of the Protestant organization, was asked if the Gideons often have to stop distributing Bibles at the request of a school system. "We do once in a great while—and we back off," he said.

Police vehicles can slide, too

Although the Ruidoso Police Department spends much of its time fighting problems, once in a while its personnel cause them.

Officer Ron Hart could not stop his patrol car New Year's morning on an icy Center Street and slid into Sudderth Drive. According to a State Police report, Hart hit a 1983 Subaru traveling east on Sudderth Drive, which then struck a parked car which hit another parked car.

Damage was minor, according to Ruidoso police chief Dick Swenor, and no one was injured.

Hart was cited by State Police for failure to stop, and was given a letter of admonishment, said Swenor.

Magistrate judge Jim Wheeler said Hart appeared in his court and pled nolo contendere. The judge said he sentenced Hart to a \$10 deferred fine, which will be dismissed if he has no other citations within the next month.

Wheeler said he often defers sentences when accidents occur on icy or snowy streets.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter said the village's insurance will pay for damage to the vehicles.

Ruidoso girls lose to Rockets

Despite a vastly improved effort over the first time the two teams played, the Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team dropped their second game, to Goddard Tuesday night, losing a 53-31 decision to the visitors.

Ruidoso, now 2-4 on the season, will compete against Carrizozo at 6 p.m. today in the opening round of the Smokey Bear Classic in Capitan.

The loss to Goddard was a lot closer than the first time the two teams met this season in December. Goddard took a 78-34 victory in Roswell.

But Tuesday the Warriors slowed the pace down in an effort to win, and it worked for a while.

Ruidoso held a 4-3 edge at the end of the first period before the talented Rockets began to take control of the contest.

After Lillian Lopez hit a jump shot

to give the Warriors an 8-7 edge early in the second quarter, Goddard outscored Ruidoso 8-2 to take a 15-10 lead.

The Warriors sank three straight free throws to close the gap to two at 15-13. However, the Rockets added a field goal near the end of the half to take a 17-13 advantage into the locker room at intermission.

Diane McClure sank a layup after the opening tip of the second half to close the gap to 17-15. But the Rockets then scored six straight points to take a 23-15 lead.

After Stacy Ivy hit a free throw to pull the Warriors within seven points at 23-16, Goddard scored five consecutive points for a 28-16 edge.

Lopez and McClure sank field goals to close the lead to 28-20, but the Rockets put the game away with eight straight points in the latter part of the

third quarter and early part of the fourth period.

Goddard built its lead up to 45-27 with less than a minute remaining in the contest, but Jackie Jefferson sank a 20-foot jump shot and drove for a layup as the game ended to pull the Warriors within 14 points.

McClure led the Ruidoso scoring with eight points on four field goals. Lopez and Jefferson each added six points; Gia Rose and Ivy had five; and Sheila Espinosa scored one.

Betty Denison led the balanced Goddard attack with 12 points.

Warrior head coach Sergio Castanon praised his team's efforts.

"This was the best game the girls played this season," he said. "They (Goddard) are one of the top teams in the state. We slowed the tempo down to win the game, but they've got some good players who can really jump."

Castanon only played five varsity players and a couple of junior varsity players in the game. Several other varsity players didn't play because they missed practice during the holidays.

Castanon is optimistic about the Warriors' chances in the Smokey Bear Classic.

"We're looking to win it," he remarked. "But we're going to take it one game at a time."

Does the national championship in college football's Division 1 mean anything anymore?

After Monday's bowl games, the University of Miami was crowned national champion by the Associated Press and United Press International, beating out the University of Nebraska (a team it defeated 31-30 in the Orange Bowl). Auburn University was rated third in both polls.

But it's still hard to decide which team is really the national champion. Nebraska was ranked first in both major polls before the bowls began. The Cornhuskers scored an average of 52 points a game during the season, the most ever by a college team.

If Nebraska had defeated Miami in the Orange Bowl, there would have been little doubt as to which team deserved the national title.

But the Cornhuskers lost by one point, despite the fact they had a chance to clinch the national crown by kicking the extra point for the tie instead of going for the two-point conversion and the win.

Nebraska coach Tom Osborne deserves credit for his decision to go for the two-pointer. A tie would have undoubtedly given the Cornhuskers the title, but it would have ended a 22-game winning streak and made the national title less meaningful.

However, we now have a good deal of discussion as to which team is really the national champion, regardless of what the polls say.

A number of teams can say they're the top-ranked team and have justification for their cases.

Miami finished the season with an 11-1 record and did beat the previously top-ranked team. However, the Hurricanes were ranked fourth in the United Press International poll and fifth in the Associated Press poll before the bowls began.

Auburn was ranked third in the final polls, the same position the War

Eagles had before the bowl games. Auburn didn't look impressive in taking a 9-7 victory over Michigan in the Sugar Bowl, but they still won.

Auburn was ranked higher than Miami before the bowls and the War Eagles won their bowl, as did the Hurricanes.

In some previous seasons, when the top-ranked team in the nation lost a bowl game, the next highest rated team that won a bowl game was crowned champion.

If that formula were followed this season, Auburn would have been crowned champion since second-ranked University of Texas lost to Georgia 16-9.

Some people might say that Texas deserved a chance at the top ranking, along with Nebraska.

Both teams were undefeated going into the bowl games and each lost its bowl by one point.

What probably hurt Texas' chances more than anything was the 0-3 record the Southwest Conference had in bowl games this season.

Besides the Longhorns' tight loss, Southern Methodist University fell to the University of Alabama 28-7 in the Sun Bowl and Baylor University lost a 24-14 decision to Oklahoma State in the Bluebonnet Bowl.

Nebraska still deserved some consideration for the top spot because they undoubtedly had the best talent and could have won the national title if Osborne had taken the easy way out and gone for the tie instead of the win against Miami.

But they didn't and the Hurricanes reign today as national champions.

Still, there must be a better way of determining a true national champion.

A playoff system might be the answer, but the season could be drawn out to an absurd length, where the winner might have to play 15 or 16 games.

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School provides students learning with Christian perspective

The children fill the air with high squeals as they run and yell on the playground, but the adult voice calls, summoning the children into the building. Recess is over.

The kindergarten class files into a classroom filled with elf-sized tables and chairs. It's storytime, and the children begin to cock their ears in anticipation.

However, they are listening to a special story—one that could not be read in most of the schools around the nation. It is a Bible story. But this is not just any school, it is the Ruidoso Christian School, and Christianity is part of the curriculum.

The three-year-old school was a dream of pastor Dale McCleskey of the First Baptist Church of Ruidoso Downs. Offering classes from three- and four-year-old kindergarten all the way through high school, the school combines the traditional school subjects with a Christian philosophy.

"I came to see that education is the responsibility of the family, not the government," McCleskey said. "I think the private school is the way to go, and I saw the need for a Christian school."

He hopes that a Christian school can instill character into the students. McCleskey defines character as the ability to make responsible decisions.

That takes a strength of character, and it also takes a good education, McCleskey noted.

"School has a tremendous influence on a kid's life," he remarked. He feels public school has to be amoral and cannot teach values.

"We're free from that," McCleskey related. Because the Ruidoso Christian School is not government sponsored or controlled, it can come at education differently.

"There are clear values, and God does determine what is right and wrong," he said. But McCleskey is quick to explain the Ruidoso Christian School is not an indoctrination center.

He toured many different Christian schools for several years before starting the Ruidoso Christian School, and realizes some Christian schools are indoctrination centers.

"Many people see Christians as less free, but I see it just the other way around," McCleskey emphasized. "Christian education should not be a haven from education; it should enhance education."

Another motive for the formation of the school was giving children a good education.

"I want to see kids who are able to read and use the English language," he said. "It's just obvious that kids aren't being taught to read."

Administrator and associate pastor Jerry Mauldin said he knows the Ruidoso public schools are excellent, but the Ruidoso Christian School is able to teach from a Christian philosophy.

McCleskey realizes they have an advantage—"with smaller classes and the help of concerned parents, we have a stacked deck."

Mauldin said the school has been growing since its beginning. The first year the school had 58 students. It now has 87 students.

The school consists of an eight-person staff. Mauldin explained that the school uses a curriculum called A Beka books, designed for Christian schools by the Pensacola Christian School in Pensacola, Florida.

The curriculum meets the State of New Mexico's requirements, Mauldin noted.

The Ruidoso Christian School has adopted a one-room schoolhouse method because of its size.

"One teacher may teach several grades of a subject together," Mauldin said. The whole class may be in language arts, but the first row is fourth grade; the second row is third grade; and the last two rows are second grade.

There are more students in the younger grades, Mauldin noted. "High school has less students because we can't offer as many extracurricular activities. The social aspect of high school is something we're unable to meet."

Ruidoso Christian School will have its first two high school graduates on January 23. The high school curriculum is college preparatory.

The school is trying to gradually add more classes, to have more of a variety, and to add extracurricular activities, Mauldin said. The school has a fine arts program, which consists of choir and art. It offered a half semester of industrial drawing, and it may offer driver's education next semester.

Mauldin would like the school to participate in some sports activities. Right now the school has a physical education program. The school is involved in the ski program and plans to get into a swimming program also. He would also like to form a team so the school could participate in the village soccer league.

Ruidoso Christian School is a ministry of the First Baptist Church of Ruidoso Downs.

"The church provides the physical plant," Mauldin explained. "Tuition and donations pay expenses. We try to keep tuition low, and so far we've been able to pay our bills and stay above water."

The church is supportive, he noted. The men of the church do much of the building in the building projects. People without children in the school have helped with financial gifts, and men and women have given whole days of work.

The church elects a five-member school board, which is a committee of the church. They have monthly business meetings.

Mauldin explains their concept of getting "double mileage" out of the buildings. They are used for the school during the week and for the church on Wednesday night and Sunday. The church is a well-used facility.

The sanctuary is even used for weekly chapel services and Bible classes for the school. Although a ministry of the Baptist

church, the school is interdenominational, and has chapel speakers from different churches around town, Mauldin said. The children learn Bible verses and how to apply Christianity.

They take regular subjects such as language arts, math and science, but there are Christian overtones. The stories may be Biblical or the literature may emphasize a Christian ethic.

Science is taught from a Christian perspective. Evolution is taught as a scientific theory, and creationism is taught as the way it is.

Mauldin said they are lucky to have highly qualified teachers.

"When we've needed a teacher, God has provided," he noted. The teachers are required to take continuing education programs, which include Bible education.

Nadyne Gartman, who teaches language arts and science, taught in the public schools for 15 years. She sees the Christian school as something totally different.

"It has a much more relaxed atmosphere," she noted. "There is more closeness; it is almost a family feeling."

The students are not afraid of her but respect her, Gartman said.

"I'm very strong on discipline, but it is done with love," she com-

mented—there is less rebellion. Mauldin explains that they encourage discipline, but it is discipline from a Christian perspective. It is never done in anger; there is always a witness, and the student is allowed to share his thoughts.

Gartman thinks the Christian school has taken students who have done poorly and had little self-concept and convinced them they can make it.

"I try to teach them to have no fear of failing—if they make a mistake, it is a learning experience," she said. "I'm very strict, and I expect a child

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

to give me everything they can give. I expect that out of me and them. Most can do more than they think they can."

In the Christian school environment, she said, she can relate better to her students.

"I don't feel intimidated if I want to show love and concern for my students," Gartman noted.

Another big difference she sees is in the textbooks. Humanism is not in the Christian school's texts.

She also likes the smaller classes. In public schools she averaged from 17 to 32 students. At the Christian school she averages seven to 12 students. This makes up for the low salary, she said.

When people ask her why she teaches at the Christian school when she could be making three times the salary at a public school, she says working there gives her a sense of success.

"I feel like I'm where I'm supposed to be," Gartman explained. "The old cliché 'He will supply our needs' holds true. He does."

The faculty shares in a prayer time each morning. It is not unusual to see teachers praying, and the students have no qualms about asking a teacher to pray about a problem the student or someone else may have, she said.

"I think we're building a concern and compassion into the students," Gartman commented. "They're not embarrassed about feeling concern about someone."

The teachers encourage involvement by the parents. A Parent Teacher Fellowship meets once a month.

Maudin explained that "our desire is to encourage parents to have as much input as they want."

He tries to have an open door policy.

"The idea of a Christian school is still a new concept," he noted.

"We're not geared for everybody," he acknowledged, "and we're not intended to be that way."


The school draws from the Christian community at large, drawing students from Alto, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Glencoe and Mescalero. Maudin ventures to guess that First Baptist Church of Ruidoso Downs does not have the largest representation of students in the school.

The biggest problem for the school, he notes, is room. Ever since the first year, the school has been remodeled.

Recently a portable building was completed, which will be dedicated on Sunday. The new building will house classrooms for the school.

The church itself is growing, and if the school continues to grow, they will need more buildings soon to keep up with the growth, Maudin remarked.

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


ORDINANCE NO. 83-18 AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE 1983 NEW MEXICO UNIFORM TRAFFIC ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. CODE ADOPTED BY REFERENCE.

A. Except as otherwise provided in this ordinance, the 1983 New Mexico Uniform Traffic Ordinance, together with amendments and corrections thereto, being a traffic code, is adopted by reference pursuant to Section 5-17-4a, New Mexico Statutes Annotated 1978 Comp.

Section 2. ORDINANCE AVAILABLE FOR INSPECTION. A copy of the 1983 New Mexico Uniform Traffic Ordinance together with amendments thereto is available for inspection during the Municipal Clerk's normal and regular business hours at the Municipal Building in Ruidoso, Lincoln County, New Mexico.

Property which was valued in 1983 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or revalued for 1984 or subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR:

- 1. mobile homes,
2. livestock and

If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's office.

All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claim to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1984, if the exemption was not claimed in 1983.

2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued,

you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by the assessor.

If you believe your property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report, on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement which:

- 1. describes the property affected,
2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and
3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased.

This statement must be filed with the assessor not later than the last day of February.

If the veterans exemption was claimed and allowed in 1983, no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1983 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1983, no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1983 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

Beginning in the 1984 tax year, taxpayers are responsible for declaring their property classification to the assessor as residential or nonresidential. When the declaration is accepted by the assessor, it shall remain in such and need not be made in subsequent years unless the classification changes. If a taxpayer has not declared their pro-

erty to be residential in 1983 and desires that classification for 1984, they must complete a declaration of residential classification and return the signed declaration to the county assessor's office by the last day of February, 1984.

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Can you, in one word, single out a major cause of all our problems in education?

Try this one: tenure. You don't have motivation to go out there and give your all running the bases if you know you're already safe at home.

That's the condition of tenured teachers, at any grade level from kindergarten through graduate school. Once they've got tenure, they are safe at home.

Take away from any employer the ultimate job sanction—the right to fire those who deserve to be fired—and you have totally altered the relationship between those who are employed and the institutions which hire them.

Oh, tenured people can be fired, but to accomplish that is so incredibly difficult that it becomes a merely theoretical possibility.

Even government employees of other kinds, like those who work for the state, for example, can be discharged more easily—and it's almost impossible to get rid of most of them.

That's a major part of the reason why schools and governments contain so many people who do not work very hard or very efficiently and do not care about doing their job better.

Some of them should be fired. And until we have a government and a school system which can dismiss the incompetent, neither will function effectively.

Say that, and you get screams from those who are benefitted by the system. What we should be getting is screams to have such privileges brought to a halt. Those screams should come from taxpayers, who put up the money to fund these jobs and then are defrauded of what they have a right to expect from those holding them.

There are other problems in education and government which won't get talked about this year, when almost everybody seems concerned solely with deciding how much more money the two will get, not whether they deserve any at all.

One is the lack of any criterion by which job success can be certainly measured.

Forget about the greed which actuates so much of the profit motive and that motive still has other purposes. Those organizations which clearly show a profit or loss can be said to have succeeded or failed.

The bankruptcy court is a positive measure of lack of success which is hard to argue with.

Maybe we need a bankruptcy court for schools and government agencies.

If that's not feasible, we need to develop some other form by which each can be measured, a variety of that accountability which teachers, administrators and civil servants resist so vociferously.

And there's another item which doesn't get mentioned very often: exclusivity.

If you have the only game in town, there's no need to work hard to satisfy your clients.

Have you ever been treated snippily by some lower level clerk when you had to contact state government for something? Almost everybody has.

That's a result of the consciousness of exclusivity. Where else are you going to take your business?

Oh, sure, in the education field there are some competitors in private and parochial schools. But the public educational institutions have a difference from those which also gives them a remarkable degree of exclusivity: the taxpayers pick up most of the tab for non-private education.

If you don't think that's an advantage, try paying tuition at private schools for a kid from the first grade through a doctoral degree.

One thing all those who work in public education and in civil service share is that they need a thorough-going shaking up, from top to bottom. Among other things, they need to be imbued with a little healthy fear.

There's no fear quite as effective as that of unemployment. Unfortunately, for most of these people, we have already abrogated the right to make that threat.

Too bad.

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Typical days at the Chamber are often busy

A family of tourists from Texas, all bundled up against the cold, tromped into the lobby of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce recently during their second day of vacation in Ruidoso. They had been skiing the previous day and wanted to know what else there was to do in town.

Later, a similar family from Mexico arrived at the Chamber. They wanted to go snowmobiling somewhere near Ruidoso.

During this time, the phone rang endlessly with inquiries from people staying here or from people who would be staying here. Many calls

came inquiring if there was any public transportation available to the ski area.

"This is just a typical day for this time of year," said Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Chamber.

Jungbluth hurried around the vast, glass-topped Chamber counter, and picked out the proper brochure from the crammed display for a family planning a move to the Ruidoso area.

Another group came in. Jungbluth finished with the first family, then turned to the others.

"Hello, how are you today. How may I help you?" he said.

The scene repeated over and over, with Jungbluth, part-time tourist counselor Sunny Hirschfeld and book-

keeper and office manager Doris Baca running back and forth from the counter to the phones to the information display.

Jungbluth said the huge number of walk-in and phone inquiries the Chamber receives each month continues to increase. Jungbluth and the Chamber staff keep a running tally of the total daily walk-in, telephone and mail-in inquiries they receive. They compile the information for the use of Chamber members.

"We have truly become a year-round resort. We don't really have a bad business time," he said. Jungbluth said sometimes the businesses are a little slower in the spring, but the Chamber continues to

be busy then with budget preparation. Jungbluth said his duties at the Chamber center around the day-to-day activities of the physical side of the business, including the building and staff. Ordorica's wins top local sports story of 1983

He really doesn't look like an athlete, but 4-foot 9-inch, 78-pound David Ordorica of the Las Piedras Boxing Team more than makes up for his lack of size with plenty of ability and a big heart.

The dark-haired, wiry athlete won a host of state titles, and he took a bronze medal in the National Junior Olympics Tournament last summer. Thus, his accomplishments rate as the top local sports story for 1983. It's very rare (if ever) that a Lincoln County athlete has placed in a national tournament, so Ordorica's achievement is a notable one.

Other top stories in 1983 were the golf exploits of Tommy Hornbuckle, Ruidoso High School's whole sports program, the Capitan High School

boys track team's state championship, and the Carrizozo High School football team's trip to the state A division playoffs.

But Ordorica was the top Lincoln County sports story of 1983.

Besides taking a Junior Olympics bronze medal, the Ruidoso High School sophomore won regional and state Junior Olympics titles; the state Silver Cup crown; state Silver Gloves title; and New Mexico United States Amateur Boxing Federation championship.

Ordorica's reputation has built up to the point it's now difficult for Las Piedras coach Lucky Mulqueen to find someone to box him when the team goes to tournaments around the state.

Hornbuckle, who has been perhaps the top amateur golfer in the Ruidoso

area for several years, had one of his best seasons in 1983.

The Ruidoso golfer won the second annual Cree Meadows Country Club Men's Championship; won the consolation title of the championship flight of the 35th annual Cree Meadows Men's Match-Play Invitational; teamed with Frank Cornelius to win the Cree Meadows Member-Guest Golf Tournament; teamed with Ronnie Jumper to win the sixth annual Johnny Williams Memorial Partnership Golf Tournament; and teamed with Howard Hassell to win the Lonesome Pine Member-Guest Tournament at Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club.

"It was the best year I've had in quite a while," Hornbuckle said about the 1983 season. "I've been practicing some, but not a whole lot yet during the off season."

Hornbuckle will probably open his 1984 season at the Inn of the Mountain Gods Pro-Scratch Tournament April 23-24.

The Ruidoso High School sports teams had mixed fortunes in 1983. The varsity football and boys varsity basketball teams suffered through losing campaigns, but the boys and girls track teams, wrestling team and girls basketball team came through with competitive seasons.

Ruidoso's boys track team scored 14 points in the state meet, the most the school has scored since entering the AAA division.

The prospects look especially bright for the track team since Cisco Bob (second place in the 1,500 meters) and Curt McClellan (third in the 800 meters) have two more seasons of competition.

The girls track team scored two

points, with a fine effort from the 1,600-meter relay team.

Ruidoso's wrestling team sent nine athletes to the state meet, including several who are competing again this season.

Tennis was a new sport on the Warrior program, with competition in both the boys and girls divisions. Laura Trapp was undefeated in the girls division until the district tournament.

There were several coaching changes during the year, with athletic director Doyle Howell and head football coach Darrel Stierwalt scheduled for reassignment to classroom duties at the end of the school year in July 1984.

Capitan's boys track team overcame several injuries and some tough competition to win the state A division crown.

The Tigers' title was won in a dramatic fashion as the Capitan 1,600-meter relay team took first to conclude the meet and gain the team championship.

Carrizozo returned to the state A division football playoffs after an absence of several seasons.

The Grizzlies finished with a 7-3 record, dumping county rival Capitan 45-14 in the final regular-season game to earn a playoff berth. Carrizozo lost a 28-14 decision to Tatum in the first round of the playoffs, but reestablished itself as a powerful force in A division football.

Other stories worthy of mention were the volleyball teams from Carrizozo and Capitan making the state tournament, several tennis tournaments, and Capitan's boys varsity basketball team qualifying for the state playoffs.



The FCC originally scheduled interstate customer access charges to be implemented on January 1, 1984, but now has delayed them until April 3, 1984. Access charges were to be levied at an initial monthly cost of \$2 for residential customers and \$6 for business customers for interstate use.

7. Total Costs To Customers

With the exception of an occasional local rate increase, Contel customers can expect similar costs to continue past the breakup of Bell, at least until the access charge question is resolved.






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

There are two large greenhouse style planters Tom Hansen believes will contribute to a success-oriented environment for students.

"I don't think we could have a prettier place to build a school," said Ruidoso High School principal Tom Hansen as he showed a visitor around the new high school.

It is true, the view of Sierra Blanca up the valley defining Bog Springs is breathtaking. But the best of the new school is inside its doors.

Hansen repeatedly used phrases like "three times larger" and "four times as much space" in comparing the new facility with the present high school. The new school is being built to an enrollment of 1,200 students, he

has been built for them. This room, which Hansen said he knows of no other school having, can be used for things like Spanish and real estate classes.

Hansen pointed out that the building committee took every problem its members have had in other school buildings and addressed them in the plans for this one.

He showed his visitor a four-foot wide door to a janitor's closet, noting that a snow-blower or lawn-mower can be moved easily through it.


"We tried to think of everything,"



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

Machisma captures Futurity

Machisma withstood a gallant late bid by San Simon to capture the 20th running of the Sunland Park Fall Thoroughbred Futurity Saturday at Sunland Park.

The Scout Leader filly ended her first year of racing with outstanding credentials by winning one of the west El Paso track's most prestigious races for two-year-old thoroughbreds.

Under a superior ride by veteran jockey Salustio Burgos, Machisma broke alertly from the fifth post position and assumed a narrow lead about a furlong from the start of the six-furlong dash which lured 12 qualifiers from four trial races on December 16.

She took a slight lead down the backstretch over Draconic's Sign, ridden by Harla Webb and San Simon, ridden by Mike Lidberg.

The New Mexico-bred miss established fractions of :22 3-5 for the quarter mile, :45 2-5 for the half-mile, :58 1-5 for the five furlongs and was all out to get the distance in a fine 1:11 2-5.

Machisma hugged the rail throughout and opened a definite lead halfway through the stretch run, but San Simon zoomed into contention with less than a furlong to go.

The Smooth Stuff colt closed willingly under Mike Lidberg, but was a head behind at the wire in one of the most exciting stretch duels this season in a major stakes race.

As the \$110-1 wagering favorite of the crowd of 3,301, Machisma earned mutual backers \$4.20, \$3.20 and \$2.60. San Simon, the 9-2 third-wagering risk, placed for mutual payoffs of \$3.80 and \$3.00. Fly By Chopsticks, who held on for third, showed for \$2.80.

The victory proved Machisma's magnificent effort in her trial race was without a doubt a true indication of her ability.

Machisma had the fastest time of

the four trial heat winners with a 1:11 reading and posted the biggest victory margin with a three and one-quarter length decision.

The filly was one of the standouts at the 1983 summer meeting at Ruidoso Downs. She was named the meet's top two-year-old thoroughbred filly for sweeping the season's two biggest events for two-year-old New Mexico-bred thoroughbreds—the Rio Grande and Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurities.

She also captured the Pocket Coin Handicap.

Trained by Fred I. Danley, Machisma completed her juvenile campaign with eight triumphs, five seconds and two thirds in 16 appearances. Owned by H. T. Hornbuckle of Albuquerque, Machisma earned \$53,674 for her Fall Thoroughbred Futurity triumph. She collected \$135,451 in 1983.

For San Simon, it was his second consecutive second-place finish in a major Sunland Park event. The Texas-bred colt, who is trained by Cecil Crabtree, ran second in the \$126,719 Texas Open Futurity over six furlongs on December 3.

Still, San Simon collected \$23,616 for owners Cleber J. and Patricia J. Massey of Abilene, Texas. In 1983, he

gained two wins with two seconds and one third in five outings and earned \$46,400 in a fine initial season of racing.

Fly By Chopsticks, who finished three and one-quarter lengths behind San Simon, was the only one of the 12 finalists to have passed through the sales ring at the 1982 Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings at Ruidoso Downs. She more than justified her \$30,000 purchase price on the final day of 1983.

The Well Mannered filly collected \$12,881 to end her two-year-old season with two wins and eight thirds from 11 outings for trainer Thomas A. Riley. She earned \$42,898 for the J. A. Leonard Cattle Company of Abilene, Texas.

Here's the way the rest of the field checked in with their earnings: 4th—Draconic's Sign (\$6,440.91); 5th—Deifer (\$4,293.94); 6th—Delta Way (\$2,146.97); 7th—Wee, Ta (\$2,146.97); 8th—Red Spider (\$2,146.97); 9th—Tell Tommy; 10th—Light Will; 11th—Nativo Bravo; 12th—The Girl I Love.

The race was worth \$107,348.44, the largest purse in the race's history. The previous biggest purse was \$88,894 for the 1982 edition, which was won by Hot N Pearly.

creased his winning margin. In touring the distance in 1:04 4-5, Christian Name returned mutual payoffs of \$4.00, \$2.60 and \$2.20. Jarales, a neck better than Platoon Star for second, paid \$3.20 and \$2.20 while Platoon Star returned \$2.40 for running third.

The victory was the first in 1983 for Christian Name who is trained by Ike Danley for the Macy Ranch of Post, Texas. As a three-year-old in 1983, Christian Name registered three triumphs with four seconds and one third from 12 appearances. He collected \$8,114.

Bug Bopper, a 15-1 outsider under Casey Lambert, finished in fourth place, two and one-quarter lengths behind Platoon Star.

Racing resumes on Friday at Sunland Park with a 12:30 post time.

The Scout Leader filly led practically throughout, establishing early fractions of :22 3-5 for the quarter mile, :45 2-5 for the half-mile, and :58 1-5 for the five furlongs. Machisma was all out at the end to withstand a closing bid by San Simon, under Mike Lidberg. San Simon, who broke from the 12th post position as the 9-2 third wagering choice, was gaining ground on Machisma with each jump, but his bid fell short. Fly By Chopsticks, under Pedro Benitez, was third. Fly By Chopsticks was the only Fall Thoroughbred Futurity finalist who went through the 1982 Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings at Ruidoso Downs. She commanded a \$30,000 purchase. With the \$12,881.81 she earned for her effort on Saturday, the Well Mannered filly earned \$42,898 in her first season of racing. Machisma, meanwhile, paid \$4.20 to win as the \$1.10-1 wagering choice of a fine Saturday crowd of 3,301. Trained by Fred I. Danley, the New Mexico-bred miss tallied eight victories with five seconds and two thirds from 16 appearances in 1983.

Machisma had the fastest time of the four trial race winners on December 16 while registering the biggest victory margin—three and one-quarter lengths. Martinez Jr. was aboard for the first three triumphs. As the 7-5 wagering choice, Bad Companys Best returned \$4.80 for his Friday win.

IT WAS ALL IN THE FAMILY as the Lambert trainers took the first two places in Friday's fourth race. Bad Companys Best, trained by Clifford C. Lambert Jr. won the five and one-half furlong sprint, while Royal Sin, conditioned by Clifford C. Lambert Sr. ran second in the race for two-year-olds competing for \$12,500 claiming prices. Kevin Cogburn rode the winner while Mike Lidberg was on Royal Sin. The "Lambert quiniela" returned \$32.20 for the 1-5 combination.

TONKAWA CHARGER SET a seasonal fastest time when he roared through the final furlong to capture Friday's featured 10th race. The four-year-old Foggy Road gelding zipped to a win by almost seven lengths in a rapid 1:17 3-5 clocking. That eclipsed the previous fastest time at the distance this season of 1:17 4-5 set by Rotten Scott on November 19. Ridden by O. A. Riggs of Fort Stockton, Texas. As a \$5.10-1 outsider, Tonkawa Charger returned \$12.20 to win.

SUNLAND PARK'S LEADING RIDER, Casey Lambert, added another three-day win effort to his record on Friday. Lambert began with Jetta Mia (\$7.40) for trainer J. Doyal Roberts in the third, then prevailed with Promise To Pay (\$4.40) for trainer Clifford C. Lambert Sr. in the sixth and captured the ninth on Regal Holiday (\$8.40) for trainer Frank Cappellucci. It was the fourth time this season Lambert has

won three races on a program. TACK TALK AND BROKER'S DINK combined for the highest daily double payoff this season when they captured Sunday's first two races. Tack Talk won the opener under Lyndell Rutherford and returned \$130.40. Broker's Dink took the second race under Larry Chavez and returned \$6.40 as the \$2.30-1 wagering favorite. The 7-2 combination returned \$629.40. The previous highest daily double payoff was a \$572.20 return on Stretch And Go and Rockettes Request on November 25.

SUNDAY'S EIGHTH RACE produced the season's lowest trifecta payoff. Drop Out, the 7-5-wagering choice under Salustio Burgos won the five and one-half-furlong dash as Ha Cha Jo, the 4-1 third-wagering risk under Wayne Buehrer finished second and Mag's Policy, the 3-1 second favorite under Leroy Coombs, was third. The 3-10-1 combination returned \$53.80. The previous lowest trifecta return was \$73.40 with Texas Polka, My Dad Jess and Never Despair on December 10.

TRAINER IKE DANLEY, the Macy Ranch of Post, Texas and jockey F. O. Martinez combined to win two races on Sunday's program. They started with Mr. Gaelic (\$6.20) in the sixth and then captured the featured 10th race with Christian Name (\$4.00). Both winning horses were sired by Gaelic Christian.

WAGERING FAVORITES enjoyed their best day of the season Sunday as seven public selections posted victories, including the last five favorites. Winning choices included Broker's Dink (\$6.40) in the second, Cowboy Wars (\$7.80) in the fifth, Lady Climax (\$3.80) in the seventh, Drop Out (\$4.80) in the eighth, Falcon King (\$5.00) in the ninth, Christian Name (\$4.00) in the tenth and Musical King (\$5.00) in the eleventh.

SUNLAND PARK FANS returned from the one-week break due to the holidays and really enjoyed the first weekend back. On Friday, the crowd of 2,642 wagered \$268,677. On Saturday, boosted by a handle of \$43,598 on the featured Fall Thoroughbred Futurity, the handle soared to \$377,977. It was the second largest handle this season, trailing only the \$384,128 on Saturday, November 12. Compared to a year ago in 1982 when the El Paso area was still feeling the effects of an eight-inch snowstorm which struck the community the previous day, the Saturday handle was 62.35 percent higher than the corresponding day's handle of \$232,780 in 1982. Overall, a total of \$989,013 went through the windows. Overall, the weekend's total was a staggering 88.52 percent higher than the corresponding weekend a year ago. The three-day attendance total of 9,367 was 88.69 percent better than the weekend last year.


