## Crime rate up in '83

Ruidoso's overall crime rate rose five percent in 1983, with over half a million dollars worth of property stolen during the year.

The Ruidoso Police Department's crime resolution rate, however, was an extraordinarily high 53 percent in 1983.

Fraud-forgery (+80 percent), burglary (+71 percent), criminal trespass (+73 percent) and criminal damage (+69 percent) increased the most during 1983.

Burglary, with 189 recorded incidents, was the most common offense. Resolution rate for burglaries was 11 percent.

It is common in Ruidoso for a house to be burglarized and for the theft not to be discovered until a vacationing family goes to the house weeks or months later. Ruidoso police chief Dick Swenor said this situation contributes to the relatively low resolution rate.

The recovery rate for all stolen prop-

erty was 23 percent. Swenor wrote in his semi-annual report to the village council that \$525,246 worth of property was stolen in 1983, with \$120,007 being recovered.

Swenor called the unbelievable property figure "almost unbelievable," but stated the department's recovery rate is well above national and state averages.

The 53 percent overall resolution rate is one of the highest, if not the highest in the nation, according to Swenor.

"I defy you to find any other law enforcement agency in the United States or Canada that has a higher resolution rate," Swenor challenged Ruidoso Crime Stoppers board members Thursday evening.

All levels of larceny (-14 percent), shoplifting (-26 percent), aggravated assault (-43 percent) and narcotics arrests (-29 percent) decreased in 1983. Auto theft also decreased 21 percent in 1983.

There were no murders or manslaughters in Ruidoso in 1983. There was one reported rape, one

case of arson and three cases of larceny over \$2,500.


National statistics for Crime Index Offenses reflected a five percent decrease during the first six months of 1983. Swenor attributed Ruidoso's five percent increase to a growing community.

"It is apparent that our criminal activity is keeping pace with our community's growth," wrote Swenor in his report.

"Traffic accidents also increased slightly in 1983, but injuries and fatalities decreased. First-offense driving while intoxicated arrests also decreased from 156 in 1982 to 114 in 1983.

In 1982 there were a total of 506 motor vehicle accidents—with 147 involving injuries to 221 people, and two fatalities. In 1983, there were 538 accidents—with 136 involving injuries to 198 people, and no fatalities.

Swenor characterized traffic as "one of Ruidoso's major problems," but attributed some of the decreased injuries to the department's traffic section that was created this year.

## Youth-operated center here?

The idea of a recreation center to be used exclusively by young people—financed and built by young people and managed by young people—had its beginnings during the Thursday night meeting of the "Chemical People" task force.

The five teen-agers present at the meeting were challenged by other meeting goers to initiate the project.

The proposed center would be used by the teens as a place to go for dancing, music and other entertainment. It would be governed by a board of directors composed of high school and middle school students. All maintenance and upkeep would also be the responsibility of the students.

The idea came as a result of nearly two hours of discussion at the third meeting of the group. Discussion began with Karen Tillman of the Ruidoso Education Association detailing present programs in use in the school system that deal with

substance abuse.

Tillman also mentioned an upcoming presentation on the topic of substance abuse to be held Tuesday, February 7, at the Ruidoso High School gymnasium.

The presentation will be a part of the national "Students Against Drunk Drivers" program. Against Drunk Drivers, the program also includes class plans and films that can be used in the classroom.

"It's a very productive program," she said. She noted that the program has resulted in a 40 percent drop in student fatalities in connection with drinking and traffic accidents where it has been implemented. The program is being made available for use by the Ruidoso school system.

Discussion then focused on the extent of the substance abuse problem in Ruidoso. According to the students attending the meeting, the problem is not substance abuse, but the lack of something for young people to do for recreation.

"You can stay home, but that's a

drag," said one high school senior at the meeting.

Ruidoso High School science teacher Dub Williams agreed there is not much of a substance abuse problem in Ruidoso. He said the present concern over national statistics heralding the horrors of substance abuse do not necessarily apply to Ruidoso.

"It's kind of like when you get a bill in the mail and it's already paid," he said of the problem.

The discussion then centered around providing a recreation facility to be used by young people in Ruidoso. Roy Proppner said he saw the need for a "YMCA type" facility for the use of teenagers. Police chief Dick Swenor disagreed, saying the new high school will provide many such recreational services to students.

The idea of a center built by students with money they raise themselves was proposed by Dr. T. T. Marquardt. He told of a similar project he had been connected with that was very successful.

"If they pay for it, and they build it, and they administer it, it will be a success. That way it will be their place, not our place for them," Marquardt said.

The teens will present a report on the progress of the project at the next meeting of the group, set for 7 p.m. Thursday, February 9.

## E.T. ordinance has some errorz

Although typographical errors clutter its pages and some questions have been raised concerning its validity, the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Ordinance will be invoked for the first time at a public hearing Thursday.

The Extraterritorial Zoning Commission will have a public hearing on zoning of Carrizo Creek Road between Ruidoso village limits and the Mesalero Apache Reservation at 2 p.m. Thursday, January 19, at Ruidoso village hall.

Ruidoso's village limit on Carrizo Creek Road is at the intersection of Tomahawk Trail Road, which leads into Apache Park subdivision, said Ruidoso planning and zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis.

The commission has recommended the land be zoned for single family residential dwellings. Anyone protesting such a zoning may appear at the public hearing.

According to Ruidoso planning and zoning secretary Becky Morris, the office has received 10 letters of protest. Eight of those protesters want the land to be zoned for commercial use, said Morris.

Ruidoso's planning and zoning office is administering the ordinance.

The ordinance as passed, however, has numerous typographical errors that make some sections read very differently than apparently intended. In one place it appears none of the land can be used at all.

"No land shall be used, or occupied, and no building, structure, or part thereof, shall be erected, constructed, enlarged, altered, moved, or used in any district as shown on the zoning maps or described in this ordinance for the district or zone in which it is located." The Roswell-Chaves County Ex-

traterritorial Zoning Ordinance, which was used to help compile the Lincoln County ordinance, includes the phrase "except in conformity with the regulations established by this ordinance."

Another section of the Lincoln County ordinance states, "No new residences shall be built after the effective date of this ordinance." A phrase locating the residences "in the Flight Zone," is missing.

Another section establishes jurisdiction of the ordinance to be determined by the Ruidoso municipal boundary as of September 1972. Ruidoso has annexed considerable property since 1972, thus changing the apparent jurisdiction of the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission.

John Cupp, who was Ruidoso's planning and zoning enforcement officer when the ordinance was typed, said a number of people at village hall typed the 69-page document. He said he did not read the ordinance at that time because the Ruidoso planning and zoning office had not yet been chosen to enforce the ordinance.

Commission chairman Milt Alcorn said both Ruidoso village attorney Lee Huckstep and District Attorney Steve Sanders reviewed the documents. He also claimed Cupp reviewed the document. He said he read his "share" of the ordinance before it was passed into law.

In a letter to Alcorn, dated January 4, 1983, Huckstep qualified his comments on the proposed ordinance by writing, "I have not examined this draft with meticulous detail."

"That's his problem," said Alcorn Friday.

Alcorn said he is not worried about the errors and that they will be corrected in the future.

District Attorney Sanders was out of town Friday and unavailable for comment. He was, however, present at the May 24, 1983, meeting of the

Lincoln County Board of Commissioners when the ordinance was passed.

Even the passage of the ordinance has been questioned by the county commissioners, but not Ruidoso.

According to New Mexico State Statutes, the Zoning Authority, consisting of Ruidoso village councilman Benny Coulston and Lincoln County commissioners Ken Nosker and Bill Elliott, must pass the ordinance.

Nosker and Elliott approved the ordinance just before a regular Lincoln County Board of Commissioners meeting, but after a public hearing Coulston was not present at the meeting.

According to minutes of the meeting, Nosker and Elliott made it clear they were acting as Extraterritorial Zoning Authority members and not as Lincoln County commissioners.

When asked about the typographical errors in the ordinance, Nosker said Friday he understood that he was merely approving the "concept" of the zoning ordinance. He later recalled approving the ordinance, but did not state why he approved one with so many errors.

Bill Elliott could not be reached Friday. Lincoln County manager Suzanne Cox said the original working copy of the ordinance did not have so many typographical errors and the commissioners had assumed the final draft was similarly correct. She also believes the ordinance is legal.

"I have no question it is a legal document," said Cox.

Legal or illegal, understandable or not, the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission plans to use the ordinance Thursday when making zoning recommendations for Carrizo Creek Road.

## Local youths hope to travel to Rome

Three area youths may be flying to Rome, Italy, to participate in a Youth Pilgrimage called by Pope John Paul II, if their fund-raising efforts are successful.

The youths, Danny Sanchez and Virgil Reynolds Jr. of Ruidoso and Flora Garcia of San Patricio, will be representing Saint Eleanor's Catholic Church Parish of Ruidoso.

After arriving in Rome on Tuesday, April 10, the youths will attend teachings by the Pontifical Council and will hear Mass said by the Pope. According to local organizer Sister Sofia Berrones of the Office of Youth Ministry in Las Cruces, groups of youths will be traveling to the pilgrimage from all over the world.

She said the Pope will be personally speaking to the youths, and the New Mexico group's request for a special audience with the Pope may be granted.

Sister Berrones estimated up to 40 people will be attending the pilgrimage from New Mexico. Along with the youth participants, several sponsors also will be making the trip.

She said the pilgrimage will also include trips to Florence and Assisi, Italy, where a special service will be held for the youths from this Diocese, since the patron saint of this Diocese is Saint Francis of Assisi.

The youths will return to New Mexico on Thursday, April 19. All three said they are excited about the trip.

"It's something I can remember for a long time," said Sanchez.

"I'm looking forward to knowing more about my church and my religion," commented Garcia. "Just

thinking of being there is exciting." Reynolds is also anticipating the trip as a learning experience.


"I'm trying to learn more about the church, and being that's where it started, I think it will help me learn. I'll never forget it," he said of the trip.

# Intrepid reporter (but first-time skier) tackles Eagle Creek

Skiing for the first time is something most locals can probably barely remember; they seem to have been born on skis. But for a fugitive from the flatlands, it's something unusual.

I had never been skiing, and I'd never even seen anyone ski, except on television.

I approached Eagle Creek Ski Area with caution. I have a strong aversion to breaking bones, since I recently injured a knee. However, I put all fear aside and programmed my mental attitude—"I'm going to love skiing."

It was a bright sunny day, warm as spring. Friends had equipped me with the proper attire—ski pants, sunglasses and scarves.

I sauntered into the Eagle Creek rental area and was equipped with skis, boots and poles. Thankfully, I was instructed in how to put all this paraphernalia on.

That seemed simple enough, but it was an hour until my ski lesson. So I walked to the slope and put on my skis. I would get the "feel" of skis before my lesson.

The small mountain loomed above me. I hoped they didn't make beginners go down that big hill. I again put fear behind me.

I slid around on my skis some. I also walked around, after hearing a father tell his daughter how to sidestep up

the hill. This was to become my biggest obstacle.

I gradually became surrounded by my future ski classmates—three men and a woman. The children were separated into their own class. Too bad, I felt I was more in their class, so to speak.

Finally, our ski instructor arrived. He wasn't exactly the Swedish type I had imagined, but he was blond.

He began with the basics, how to walk. We sidestepped up the hill. He explained how to go down the hill and stop. He told us skiing is like roller-skating, not water skiing.

Well, the time had come. We were going to ski down the hill and supposedly take baby steps to the side to stop.

I was to go last: I watched as two of my classmates went "spit" onto the snow.

I stood at the top of the hill, hyper with anticipation. I pushed off. Suddenly, I was gliding over the snow, looking at every bump and crevasse in the white pillows before me. I miraculously came to a stop without falling.

We made our way over to the mitymite lift. We filed one after another up the hill.

Who said snow skiing is not like water skiing? Every time I grabbed one of the handles on the lift to pull me

up the hill, I was reminded of a boat on a Texas lake jerking me out of the water with my arms yanked like a rubber band.

But it's better than walking. We next learned about bending our knees and leaning forward and snowplowing.

We all practiced skiing down the hill, over and over. In several fits of fear, I crash-landed into the snow. I would be skiing down the hill and suddenly realize I was heading for something that would be painful if I hit it. Instead of conscientiously thinking about how to turn, fear takes over and knocks me down.

After what seemed like hundreds of times skiing down the hill and having the mitymite pull me back up, fatigue was beginning to set in.

However, I found out that fatigue is actually a help for a beginner. I became so tired that I relaxed and finally let the skis work for me, instead of me working against them.

Anger also became a help in learning to sidestep. I would get so mad at sliding back down that I started really digging my skis into the snow, and I sidestepped up the mountain in no time.

The day at Eagle Creek—which I can heartily agree is "the place to learn"—ended much too quickly. I'm definitely still a beginner. I haven't

made it up a chairlift yet. But my second day out, I did sidestep my way up slightly larger hills.

Fear is always going to be something to combat, but I don't want to lose it totally. Without a touch of

fear I'd lose the exhilaration and "mountain high" of conquering a big hill.

# Crime doesn't pay; Crime Stoppers does

"Crime Stoppers is paying off," Ruidoso police chief Dick Swenor told Ruidoso Crime Stoppers board members Thursday night.

The group did, in fact, pay one informant \$500. And chairman Richard Sandoval has been appointed to the state Crime Stoppers Commission.

Swenor told the board that Ruidoso Crime Stoppers has received 68 valid confidential crime information reports in 1983. Those have resulted in eight felony and 16 misdemeanor ar-

rests and convictions, with property recoveries or illicit substance seizures estimated at over \$40,000.

Swenor said calls to Crime Stoppers have also provided "extremely valuable and immeasurable intelligence on criminal activities."

One call to Ruidoso Crime Stoppers in early December led to an arrest and Magistrate Court bind-over of a murder suspect in Carlsbad. The Eddy County and Ruidoso Crime Stoppers each paid half of a \$1,000 reward for that information.

The success of the local program has apparently been brought to the at-

tention of Governor Toney Anaya. On January 5, he appointed local chairman Sandoval to the 10-member state Crime Stoppers Commission.

Sandoval said Thursday evening he does not know what his duties will be but that the board meets once a month at locations around the state.

The board also learned that Crime Stoppers netted \$1,855.23 from the Crime Stoppers party in November.

Pleased by the results of the fund-raising party, the board scheduled another one for late April. Exact date and location will be determined later. The board reelected members Mike

Radziewicz, Fran Nevins and Steve Stillman to three-year terms. The board also elected Ruidoso police officer Mark Paz to serve as an ex-officio board member for one year. Paz, as a policeman, is not allowed a vote on the board.

The board now has nine members, but can have as many as 15. Sandoval said at least three people have approached him about serving on the board. Board members indicated they are interested in hearing from anyone else who wants to serve on the board.

## Via's protest of Mescalero election dropped

Mescalero Apache Tribal Council member Harlyn Via has dropped his protest of last November's Tribal Council elections.

Via, who is serving his second term on the Tribal Council, called for an investigation of the election after being told by a tribal member that a primary ballot was used in the general election.

Via lost a bid for the vice-presidency of the tribe during the November elections.

Via said conflicting tribal and federal laws made the issue a difficult one to legally resolve.

"We figured it will do more harm to

the people involved and to us," said Via.

Via refuted reports in The El Paso Times and Albuquerque Journal that said he dropped the protest because of possible prison terms for all Election Board members.

Via said he does not know who released information about his protest but refuted quotes attributed to him.

"How could it be me when I was 230 miles out of town?" said Via, who said he was in Albuquerque when the stories were released.

El Paso Times staff writer David Sheppard, who wrote the original report, said Friday Villa had definitely said he was concerned about prison

terms for election officials.

"He told me," said Sheppard. "There was no question."

Whatever the reason, the protest has been dropped and Fred Kaydahzime, chairman of the Election Board, said the election results will stand.

Tribal president Wendell Chino was elected to his 12th two-year term. Vice-president Keith Miller and council members John Shendo Jr., Evelyn Breuninger, Berle Kenseah and Raymond Kirgan were all elected in November. They were all incumbents.

Incoming council members are usually inaugurated in January, but no inauguration is planned for this

year, said tribal administrator Dick Wardlaw.

Via, who has one more year of his term to serve, said he does not plan to run for office next year.

"It's best if I get out of politics and pursue my education," said Via. He said he plans to study law.

## Chopper makes emergency landing Friday

White Mountain Search and Rescue (WMSAR) member John Ellis said no one was injured in the emergency lan-

ding on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

The incident occurred during an exercise involving two helicopters and six Army pilots, said Janey Pritchett, wife of WMSAR member Cleston Pritchett.

The Army personnel spent the night at a motel in Ruidoso, although one

was left to guard the helicopter, said Ellis. WMSAR members helped transport the Army personnel back to the downed helicopter, said Pritchett.

The Army members returned to Fort Bliss after a mechanic repaired the helicopter Saturday evening, said Ellis.







The public is invited to hear Jonathan Hutchinson 10:30 a.m. Sunday, January 22.

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
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

From now until March, we will be carrying stories on announced candidates for office.



## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE—** "Confrontational" and "adversarial" are the adjectives for the 1984 legislative session—and it hasn't even started yet.

Major clash, as you might expect, will come over money.

It starts like this:

—The Anaya administration wants authority to spend \$1.453 billion next fiscal year, when expected revenue for that period is only \$1.289 billion. That's \$164 million more in outgo than we look for in income. Result: If their wishes are granted, additional taxes of at least \$164 million have to be added to the burden citizens already bear.

—The legislators, on the other hand, through their Legislative Finance Committee, are proposing a budget of only \$1.278 billion, which is \$13 million less than our expected income. Result: If this side prevails, no tax increase will be necessary.

Is that legislative budget a Scrooge-like document, which satisfies no one?

Not a bit of it.

In fact, it's got money in it for all those schoolteachers and university professors and state employees. It's not the 16 percent raise the Anaya people want to give some of them, but it is 5 percent for everybody. University presidents get the same bump upward as the lowliest utility worker.

Those two budgets will face each other this year head-on. The philosophy behind one is totally different from that behind the other.

Which one will win?

We shall see.

When this column checked 11 of the legislators already in town before the session kicks off, we got this composite answer to a simple question: "Nobody among my constituents has come out in favor of any tax raise except those who will personally benefit from it."

And here's another spot at which heads will be butted:

That same Legislative Finance Committee is mistrustful of the administration.

Its report suggests that the present system of lump-sum appropriations

to divisions and agencies allows for too much looseness in operation. No matter how the agency has said it plans to expend the money, the LFC points out, once it gets its hands on the dough, it can shift things around almost to suit itself.

In other words, legislative intent, which is supposed to govern, gets forgotten or ignored.

From now on, the LFC says, each agency should get its budget under nine headings, which will say things like "this is how much you may spend on salaries" and "this is how much you may spend on personal-service contracts" and so on. Much more detailed, in other words—and much more constraining on the recipients of the funds.

In addition, the LFC wants permission to approve any transfers between agencies or within an agency's budget to be sure that money appropriated to hire new employees isn't used to buy new automobiles, and so on.

The powers that be in the Anaya administration will hardly favor that kind of change—which lack of favor may make no difference at all. The chairman of House Appropriations, where the relevant changes can be simply made, is also the chairman of the LFC, which made the recommendation. In that group too is the chairman of Senate Finance, the committee on the opposite side of the capital which should also support such a change.

Figures being presently developed by our eagle-eyed State Auditor suggest the present administration is doing a poor job of living within its budgets even as the system now is. A change of the type the LFC contemplates would constrain them even further.

So there will be plenty to fight over when the Legislature is officially convened at noon next Tuesday.

When sessions of this kind happen, old friendships get ruptured—and the man on the fourth floor of the Roundhouse often finds out how few friends he really has.

## On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer



"The business of America is business," said President Calvin Coolidge in 1925.

"The business of Ruidoso is business," it can just as easily be said in 1984.

But as anyone who has lived here a while knows, individual businesses come and go very quickly.

So when a business celebrates its 10th anniversary, as The Aspen Tree did recently, it marks a noteworthy accomplishment—surviving for a decade.

"I'd always thought it would be fun to be in the retail business," recalled Jana Deyo, who owns the book and gift shop with her husband Alden.

The two had been living in Lubbock, where Alden was regional planning director for the South Plains Association of Governments.

"Between the two of us we thought, 'what the heck—let's do something different,'" said Alden.

The Deyos passed through Ruidoso Labor Day weekend of 1972, Alden recalled. They had camped at Cloudcroft, and were going to Carrizozo to see the old railroad station that was the subject of a Peter Hurd print Alden had.

But it wasn't love at first sight for Jana and Alden when they saw Ruidoso. They recall not being particularly impressed.

But in the spring of '73, the Deyos came over to see Ollie and Betty Cuddy, a couple they had known in Lubbock. Being shown around by people who lived here changed the Deyos' perspective.

"Suddenly we realized there was a whole of a lot more to the place than what you could see driving down the street," said Alden.

Soon after, they bought a failing candle shop across the street from their present location, and The Aspen Tree came into being as a candle, gift and card shop.

But though they were in business, there was still the matter of making a living.

Alden got his real estate license and sold and rented condos at Alto Alps. Jana taught piano lessons.

"Like everybody else, we were doing the thing so we could eat and pay the rent," recalled Jana.

In 1977, The Aspen Tree moved across Suddarth to a building that originally housed the first indoor theater in the village—the Pueblo. Best estimates put its construction at around 1941, according to Alden.

For many years, Lillie's Restaurant occupied the building. Pete and Lillie Ysasi lived upstairs, and Alden remembers their big parrot sitting in its cage outside on the balcony squawking.

At about the same time as the building went on the market, the local bookstore closed its doors.

"We—after much, much thinking—took the plunge and bought this

building and decided to expand into books," said Jana.

Carrying books would enable The Aspen Tree to provide a real service to the community, they believed.

Jane pointed out that since then, they have wanted to project an image of being both a gift shop and a book shop. But she is not sure the overriding image—that of a bookstore is a bad thing.

And for the past three years, book sales have accounted for 60 percent of their business. But according to Jane, the books end of the business requires four times more of their time than the gifts end.

She perceives a need for something to distinguish The Aspen Tree from other gift shops in town, however, "and the books are doing it."

Though the Deyos were novices—"absolutely"—when they went into the retail business, they did some things to help themselves.

While still in Lubbock, the two took a Small Business Administration night course. One thing they learned is that the SBA has a lot of good printed information available to small business owners—do's and don'ts, tips on record keeping, etc.

"It helped tremendously," they acknowledge.

Do they have other secrets of survival?

"Hard work," said Jana.

Alden pointed out that many businesses will hire a manager to run things, and he feels this can be a problem.

"You've got to have extremely good control over your operations and your expenses," he said. For a long time, Jana was the only person working at the shop. Alden left the real estate business at the time of the move in '77.

Even now, the two have no full-time employees, depending on their "superb, spectacular part-time help."

Alden said his words of advice to prospective business owners would be those spoken by a Presbyterian minister when asked how he sold religion—"intelligent persistent concern."

That concern includes making the best possible "guesstimate" of market and judging inventory and expenses accordingly; learning as much as possible about the particular line of business; and being adequately financed.

The latter means having enough money to keep the business going for two or three years with no profit.

A lot of people come to Ruidoso and get the idea to go into business here, the Deyos pointed out.

"Some of them make it and some of them don't—we were lucky."

It sounds like they made their own luck. But one thing is for sure: the many friends of Jana and Alden and customers of The Aspen Tree are glad they're here.

# Dedicated teachers help special children at Nob Hill School

A special group of teachers teaches at Nob Hill Elementary School, and they do just what their name implies—help special children.

The special education department at Nob Hill consists of three teachers and two aides. However, their educational areas vary. Caron Crane is a speech pathologist; Becky Johnston teaches C- and D-level special education; and Gloria Pafford teaches B-level special education.

Crane explained her work as a speech pathologist at Nob Hill. She said most of the children she helps have an articulation problem.

"This is the substitution of incorrect sounds," she said. "For example, they may say 'wabbit' instead of rabbit."

There are four types of speech problems, she remarked—articulation, stuttering, language impairment and cleft palate speech.

"The prognosis is very good for speech therapy," Crane emphasized. Speech problems are curable.

She tries to get her students referred as young as possible, she pointed out. If the speech problem is not corrected, it can bother them emotionally.

"Speech therapy helps their self-image and self-concept, and the child will be less hesitant to respond in the classroom," she stated.

The parents are very good about requesting speech therapy if their child needs it, Crane said.

Once the child has been recommended for speech therapy, she performs a battery of tests to pinpoint the problem.

She gives an oral peripheral exam, which tells which sounds are distorted. She checks the complete oral structure of the mouth.

She gives a language impairment or hearing test if needed.

"You have to be a jack of all trades," she noted.

To correct articulation problems, the child begins working on one sound at a time. The child has to learn auditory discrimination—the ability to hear the difference in speech sounds. Children with auditory discrimination problems may have trouble with reading and spelling.

The children use mirrors, so they can see how to form their mouth, she said. They learn to correctly pronounce the sounds in words, and then they work on sentences and conversational speech.

Tape recorders are used, so the children can hear their voices.

"Speech therapy is just repetition and drill," she remarked.

Crane uses a game to help with the therapy. If a child does not say a word correctly, he does not get a loop to put on the Buster Bunny game. She also gives out scratch n' sniffers for good work.

She sends home packets of words and poems for the children to work on at home, and she said the parents are

very supportive. She sees the children 30 minutes a day in groups of five or six. She has 36 students.

Crane said, "I find it very rewarding to see a child come in that is reluctant to speak, but after speech therapy is more self-confident and not afraid to talk to people and in class."

The therapy takes patience—it is more individualized, and the therapist has to work at the rate of each child, she remarked.

"You have to love your field to do a good job, and you have to love children," Crane said. "I have to build up each child's self-confidence, and the students establish a rapport with each other and me."

Crane has 13 years' experience in speech pathology, and this is her fourth year in Ruidoso. She has two master's degrees—one in speech pathology and audiology and one in special education.

"Speech therapy is just drill, drill, drill, but I make it fun for them, and they love it," she concluded.

Becky Johnston and her aide Donna Parker teach C- and D-level special education.

In the C-level program, the children are in her classroom half a day and mainstreamed half a day, Johnston explained. The D-level students stay in her classroom all day.

The children's problems range from behavioral problems to severe learning problems to the mentally handicapped, she said.

The C-level students are mainstreamed for arts and crafts, music, physical education and social development. The instruction in Johnston's classroom centers on reading, writing, spelling, phonics and fine motor skills.

The children learn to write in cursive because it has a smoother flow. And because the letters are connected, this helps children who have a tendency to reverse letters, she pointed out. It also improves coordination.

The children are taught to read printed letters. The children learn one sound before they move to the next sound, Johnston said.

She said she has a good rapport with parents, and they are able to see what their children are doing.

The D-level group works on basic skills such as learning colors, numbers and geometric shapes, and trying to develop fine motor skills.

They begin to learn how to write, Johnston said.

They learn basic kindergarten skills—socialization, being able to attend to the task at hand, and getting along with their peers, she said.

"I've seen a lot of improvement in behavior and attention span," Johnston noted.

"I enjoy the job because it's challenging," she explained. "It's rewarding when you see a child sit through an entire story without walk-

ing around."  
Johnston has seven students. She has been teaching special education for seven years.  
Gloria Pafford teaches in the B-level resource room. B-level students are pulled from the regular classroom for special help in areas they are academically deficient in, she said.  
"Most are deficient in reading or language," Pafford said. "The main goal is to catch them up, so they can be in their classroom all the time."  
The children learn sensory integration; and they do motor activities, which help vision and perception problems and eye-hand coordination, she explained.  
"Once we help those motor activities, we can see results in academic activities," Pafford noted. By correcting their reading, they are pulled up to the level of their peers.

"I really emphasize reading," she said. "I try to set an example by reading myself."  
For her 21 students, she makes many of her own materials.  
"If I can't find a commercial material that meets their needs, I have to make it myself," Pafford explained. "It takes persistence; if one thing doesn't work, I try something else. It's a hit or miss type of thing."  
She also uses rewards for good behavior and doing the work. Good behavior leads to better work, she said.

The majority of her students are classified as learning disabled. Some need visual learning and others may need oral learning, and this has to be compensated for, she said.  
Pafford tries to make a game out of it, and feels it is more fun than teaching out of a book.

She said she likes the age group she works with because she can see more progress, and if their problems are caught this young, they will have a more positive attitude about learning.  
This group of special teachers at Nob Hill are helping special children get back into the regular classroom.

## Service important at Printing Center

"Our product is service," said Ron Rockey, owner of the Printing Center, located at 2909 Sudderth Drive. The Center, open since late November, strives to meet the need of the businessman in Ruidoso, according to Rockey.

"We wanted to fill a need in the community," Rockey said. "We asked ourselves, what business would be an asset to the community ... to the calling of the community? We wanted to be a service to the community, and the printing service fulfilled that need."

Rockey stressed that he and his wife, Nancy, are the operators of the business.

"We are a family operated, owned and serviced business. Our motto is, 'If you have a complaint, go to the owner,'" Rockey said.

The business has the finest typesetter in the state, according to Rockey, and all new equipment. Rockey said they have everything from full four-color printing to quick printing capabilities. The Center has full darkroom facilities and complete art services, including handlettering, sketches, layout and logos.

"We have one of the most modern shops for miles," Rockey said.

A large part of their capabilities are due to some equipment known at the shop as "Nellie-Bell," according to Rockey.

"People will know that Nellie-Bell can do it," he said with a smile. "She's our Wonder Woman."

Another service at the Center is the sale of Mita and Toshiba copiers. According to Rockey, the copiers are among the best available, and reproduction is the clearest in town. The Center offers quick-copying services, with copies priced at 10 cents a

copy for a hundred or less copies and eight cents a copy for anything over a hundred copies.

The Center originally opened on October 13, but a small fire that day put a delay on the opening. Because of the fire, the Center was closed for nearly six weeks. across the country. As their involvement in family therapy grew, so did their paperwork.


When they moved to Ruidoso, they found their printing needs were not being met locally. Because the need for a printing business was there, they decided to open the business.

The Printing Center is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and is closed on weekends. The phone number is 257-5069.




