



Ski race go—Chamber

"Everything is in high gear, it's on," said Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Advertising Committee chairman Tommy Morel of the upcoming U.S. Open professional ski race to be held this March at Eagle Creek Ski Area.

"We need to have the community jump on the bandwagon. We have committed to this and we need to really get on it."

Morel made his remarks at a Chamber board of directors meeting Wednesday afternoon. He explained the progress of the pro ski program to board members. One important part of the event, he said, will be the coverage Ruidoso will receive through televising of the races by the U.S.A. network. Morel stressed the importance of community involvement in the event.

"People are going to be looking at us so I think we need to support it," he said. "Ruidoso can really shine. It's going to be as good as the community's going to make it."

Sixteen committees have been formed to help organize the happenings surrounding the races. He mentioned Security, Press Relations Liaison and the Hospitality Tent as a few of the committees. Morel said they need volunteers to help with the committees.

According to Morel, the purse for the race will be lowered to \$70,000 from \$100,000, but it will still be the world's richest ski race.

A press conference will be arranged by the governor's office in Albuquerque this Saturday, according to Morel, to announce the race and the state's part in the funding of the race.

"The state is proud to be participating in this," Morel said.

Also during his report, Morel outlined the agenda for the week of the

race. Thursday, March 1, will be the first day of the event. A private party will be held that evening for the racers and the sponsors of the race.

Friday will be the first day of racing, followed by a "Pick-the-Winner" party to be held at the Mon Jeu Lounge at the Ruidoso Inn. Proceeds from the party will go to the Handicapped Skiers Program.

Saturday will conclude the skiing and will be followed by a formal dinner at Jerry Dale's. The dinner will feature six to 12 celebrities, Morel said.

"It's going to be quite a week," said Morel.

Also during the meeting, the directors heard a proposal from Lodgers' Tax Committee chairman Archer Wilson. Wilson outlined the progress the Lodgers' Tax Committee has made, especially in cooperation with the village council and the Chamber.

Wilson said although so much progress has been made in the efforts to promote Ruidoso, many people are not aware of it.

"Somehow or the other, we're not getting across to the people what we're doing," he said.

Wilson then explained his proposal that board members make an attempt to spread the word of the programs now being implemented through the cooperation and work of the three bodies. He said Chamber president James Paxton, Tommy Morel and Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth will be making a presentation to the Rotary Club at their meeting Tuesday, January 24, and that other presentations will follow to other service clubs and organizations in Ruidoso.

"Let's get everybody in on this. Ruidoso," Wilson said. "People just do not know what you're doing. Let's get behind this and make it go. I'm ready to do my part."

In other business, the board:

—Heard an Advertising Committee report from Morel. A report received from Epstein Communications representative Shannon Reeves outlined the budget for the state advertising funds to date. According to the report, Ruidoso has committed to \$86,500 so far in advertising in New Mexico, Texas and Mexico newspapers and several magazines.

—The report also included a Mexican Media Plan that centered on newspaper in bordering Mexican areas. According to Morel, advertising will not start in the newspapers until Sunday, January 22, due to problems at the Albuquerque agency.

—Heard a report from Jungbluth that the Retail Merchants Committee did not meet in January due to a lack of a quorum in town.

—Heard a report from Paxton, Jungbluth and director Sue Spidow on the San Antonio Sports Show. According to Jungbluth, response at the show was tremendous.

—Heard a report from Paxton on the progress of the peso program. Paxton said the stickers have arrived and are available to any business who wants them. He also reported that the Spanish language Ruidoso brochures are also now available.

—Heard a report from Jungbluth on the Mexican travel agents familiarization tour. The agents will be picked up in El Paso Monday, January 23, and will be treated to a joint party with area lodgers at Nottingham's Pub that evening. The agents will be staying at the Ruidoso Inn during their stay.

Tuesday will be a day of touring the area and skiing, followed by a cocktail party at the Ruidoso Inn for the agents. Local dignitaries will be invited to the party. The agents will depart Ruidoso Wednesday morning.

The next meeting of the Chamber board will be Wednesday, February 15.

Visit to El Paso trash compactor impresses P&Z members

Two Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) members came back with positive reports after visiting garbage transfer/compactor systems in El Paso and Dallas.

Tom Kelham and Ray Bishop said the systems they saw in operation operated odorlessly and almost completely noiselessly. They also said they believe the systems are safe.

Bishop said he thought if any of the people opposed to a transfer/compactor system visited the one in El Paso, they would drop their objections.

Efforts, led mainly by councilman Al Junge, to purchase a garbage transfer/compactor system have met opposition by a number of residents in the Hollywood area. Junge has proposed that the system be placed at the site of the old sewer plant.

Residents in the area say the system will create additional noise, odor, flies and blowing trash.

Junge claims the system will save the Village of Ruidoso over \$100,000 per year in maintenance, labor and gasoline costs. Garbage trucks now make the 26-mile round trip to the Fort Stanton Mesa landfill every time they are full. With the transfer/com-

packtor system, one truck would make one or two trips a day, said Junge.

P&Z is considering only environmental aspects of the system.

Bishop said he thought the system would pose no trash problems in the area of the system. He explained garbage is dumped directly from trucks into a 12-foot deep bin and then immediately pushed into the compaction area four to six feet deeper.

The garbage is almost immediately compacted directly into a waiting truck that is hooked to the system by large metal hooks, said Bishop.

Kelham said noise from the system is almost negligible from more than 50 feet away. He suggested it might serve as a good buffer zone between the village's existing hot mix plant

and nearby residential areas.

Kelham said increased traffic in the area would be the only adverse effect he could see. Junge has said gravel roads in the area will be paved if the system is installed.

P&Z member Martin Rose suggested Ruidoso might even be able to work out an arrangement with Ruidoso Downs to compact and transfer their garbage.

At a previous public hearing, Ruidoso Downs officials expressed concern over the environmental aspects of the system which would affect many of that village's residents. P&Z plans to meet with that village's trustees in the near future.

P&Z postponed a decision on the system at a recent public hearing on

consider environmental effects, alternate sites and possible zoning.

Commission members have begun an inventory of village properties that might serve as a site, but so far have found no other suitable site, said Rose. They will continue to review possible sites until the next public hearing February 6, said Rose.

They expressed reluctance to zone the property for industrial use until the village council approves installation of the system. The property currently has no zoning designation.

In other business, P&Z:

—Approved a replat of lots 7, 11, 12, 13 and 14, block 6 of Palmer Gateway for Service Contractors Incorporated. The replat documented property acquired by Ruidoso for the Gavilan Canyon bypass. It also corrected existing encroachments.



—Set 3:30 p.m. Friday, February 10, for a public hearing on proposed changes to the village's sign ordinance.

—Heard Ray Bishop advise members to pay attention and work closely with members of the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission since that body's actions affect property that may eventually be annexed into Ruidoso.

Sierra Blanca. Undisturbed snow depth midway on the mountain is 59 inches. A total of 12 inches of snow fell Monday and Tuesday. Skiing conditions are excellent. Surface conditions are powder and packed powder. All lifts and trails are open daily. Weather at report time is overcast. Chains are not required on the road to the ski area Thursday morning, but it's a good idea to have chains in the car.



Eagle Creek. Snow depth average is 30 inches. Six inches of snow has fallen in the last three days. Skiing conditions are good to excellent on the lower mountain. There is night skiing Friday and Saturday. The resort is open daily from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The restaurant, rental shop, cross-country skiing, horseback riding and ski school are open daily.

Eagle Creek Ski Area spices life with variety of activities

Variety. It may not be very big, but you can find just about any kind of winter fun at Eagle Creek Ski Area.

From cross-country and alpine skiing to tubing, night skiing, horseback riding and ice skating (in the future), a visitor to Eagle Creek has plenty of options.

The area will be the site of the Southern New Mexico Winter Special Olympics and the U.S. Open professional ski race.

Paul Southwick opened the ski area in the winter of 1978-79 with a mitymite, a chairlift and about 700 feet of vertical drop. Although it seems surprising that a small ski area at 7,200 feet above sea level could survive in southern New Mex-

ico, Southwick has been able to keep the lifts running for five years.

With new snowmaking equipment, a new lodge, and an ice skating rink under construction, Eagle Creek appears to be further establishing itself as a business that will last in the Ruidoso area.

The 5,000-square-foot lodge at the base of the hill is the most visible change at the area. Instead of having to climb to hidden offices at the side of the slope, visitors can now buy food and lift tickets, rent skis and enjoy excellent views of the mountain from the inviting lodge at the foot of the hill.

Southwick said the new lodge has attracted the attention of people driving by on Ski Run Road, and he believes it is helping his weekday business.

With an array of large windows facing the slopes and a deck outside, it is a much more pleasant spot to spend time than the old lodge.

Southwick pointed out that a large part of skiing is being able to sit around afterwards, look back where you've been skiing, and talk about the day's fun. The new lodge definitely offers that, and could increase its attractiveness with a bar Southwick is considering installing.

A new skating rink is in the testing phase and will hopefully be ready for broom hockey before the winter is over.

The main attraction of the area, however, is alpine skiing. Touted as "the place to learn," Eagle Creek has about a dozen instructors, and classes start almost every hour, said Southwick. There is a good-sized beginner slope at the base of the hill serviced by the mitymite lift. The chairlift also takes skiers to the beginner/novice slope Chisolm trail, which leads skiers along a road through the forest.

Box Canyon, also reached from the chairlift, loops into a gully on the other side of the hill for beginning to intermediate skiers.

Southwick, however, wants to promote the area for more advanced skiers as well. Boot Hill, where the world's best professional skiers will race in March, is much more challenging.

But it is short. The area is rarely open to the top. A good intermediate or advanced skier starting from halfway will feel he has just gotten started when he reaches the bottom of the hill. But Southwick does not expect to attract better skiers to enjoy a whole day of skiing at Eagle Creek.

He does believe the hill provides a good place to do some serious work on technique for an hour or two at a time. Much closer to town, easier to get to, and cheaper, Eagle Creek offers a good opportunity for locals to polish technique on a reasonably challenging hill.

Racing gates are often available for

placement on the hill, and Southwick can teach any level of skier.

Lift lines are never a problem at Eagle Creek. Adult lift tickets are \$12 on weekdays and \$18 on weekends. Children ski for \$8 and \$11. Half-day tickets, beginning at 12:30 p.m., are also available every day. Beginner packages include one day of ski school, rentals and lift ticket for \$30.

At the relatively low altitude, Eagle Creek relies heavily on snowmaking for its snow cover. Southwick said he and his employees have been making snow as much as possible this winter. Some areas now have more than four feet of cover.

Southwick said Tuesday he could hold the U.S. Open in March even if no more snow falls on the area this year. The U.S. Open, March 3 and 4, will be the "World's Richest Ski Race," with the winner taking home at least \$15,000.

The snowmaking has also covered a tubing area next to the lodge. Eagle Creek has tubes for rent for \$2 to \$3, and Southwick said he rented all the tubes during snowy days earlier this week. This area is also much safer than the tubing area used by foolhardy souls at the top of Alto Hill.

Cross-country skis are also available for rent at the area, and


Eagle Creek staff can direct skiers to good areas to kick and glide.

Eagle Creek is open for night skiing Friday and Saturday nights from 6 to 10 p.m. With a party of 10 to 15 people, you and your friends can essentially own the hill.

Icy conditions can develop when it has been warm during the day, but try it after a snowfall for a different perspective on skiing.


Horse enthusiasts can also take a ride through snow-covered fields on weekends for \$7 per hour.

So, if you want something a little different, check out Eagle Creek.

School system officials credit community

Ruidoso Municipal Schools officials are proud of the support given to the schools by the community, and they hope this support will continue with the upcoming bond election.

Sid Miller, superintendent of schools, said the school district has never had a bond issue defeated, and the last bond issue was a 4-1 margin win. This is unusual in New Mexico, he noted.

The growth of the Ruidoso area is reflected in growth in the schools, and the community needs to continue to support and continue to provide facilities, he said.

He praised the many service clubs in town that have been supportive of projects. From helping build a football field down to getting clothes for individual students, they have pitched in.

"There has been all-encompassing support from the community," Miller pointed out.

He also appreciates the many parent volunteers. At parent-teacher conferences, they are disappointed if they do not have 95 to 98 percent participation, said Mike Gladden, assistant superintendent. Parents turn out for all the school programs.

By having the community stay in touch with the school, Ruidoso has a responsible, informed community, Miller said.

He pointed out Ruidoso's statewide recognition as one of the best school

systems in the state. In 1976 all the schools were accredited with a commendation. It is very unusual for an entire district to be accredited with a commendation, Miller said.

The system will be renewing the accreditation in the 1984-85 school year, and they feel sure it can be accredited with a commendation again, he said.

Another indicator of the quality of the schools is the large number of applications received from all levels of teachers, Miller said.

"We have more applications than we can handle," he noted.

Miller explained that the school district has a new logo representing the fact the schools are going for-



ward, looking for new methods and ways of increasing education potential.

Gladden noted that one of the things that make a community exemplary is being committed to providing its youth with the best facilities.

"We want the schools to be an integral part of the community, rather than separate," Miller said.

Texie Cole, principal of White Mountain Middle School, pointed out that school facilities are made available to the community.

Tom Hansen, principal of the high school, pointed out the overwhelming support by clubs and individuals in giving scholarships to graduating

seniors.

The Mentor Program is another example of community support, Cole said. People in the community who are experts in a field come to the classroom and speak, or students go out and observe their work.

Hansen also gave the example of the ski programs in which both ski areas give greatly reduced rates on lift tickets and classes, while shops in town give reduced rates on rentals.

Gladden pointed out the areas and shops realize little profit from the ski program, but it is just another example of providing an opportunity for youth.

The school officials complimented the village and county governments for their cooperation with the schools, especially in the construction of the new high school.

Miller explains that education is an investment not an expense, and he feels the students will be qualified to go into the community.

"You're helping yourselves by helping the schools," he said.

"In most communities you can't feel the beat of enthusiasm like you can in Ruidoso," Gladden noted. "The teachers are glad to teach here and that goes down to the students."

This is a vibrant community, and the schools are going right with it, Miller said.

"The schools reflect the excitement of Ruidoso," he pointed out.

Coach James Sanchez's Warriors rolled over Capitan 44-26 last weekend and have been getting good scoring from several people.


Katherine Sanchez and Kristal Enjady led the Warrior scoring effort against Capitan. Sanchez scored 12 points and Enjady 10.

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Village water plans protested

Anytime Ruidoso makes plans involving water, it appears someone is bound to protest. It has happened once again.

A group of water rights owners on the Rio Ruidoso, Alto Village Service Corporation, and Lakeside Corporation have protested the village's application to drill supplemental wells in the Eagle Creek basin.

Rio Ruidoso water rights owners C. L. Wright, Joetyme Wright, Carol Phelps, E. E. Miller and Lezy H. Limited also protested the application of Lea Ware and James Kerley to transfer 88.24 acre feet of water rights from near San Patria to the proposed wells in the Eagle Creek basin. The protesters were all involved in the valley water protest that the State Engineer is now considering.

Ware and Kerley have agreed to sell their water rights to Ruidoso if

the transfer is approved by the State Engineer.

Ruidoso has applied for a permit to divert 1,404 acre feet per year of shallow ground water from the Honor Underground Water Basin to supplement water rights on Eagle Creek. Village officials have said the water would be used during times of low flow on Eagle Creek. The water would be pumped out of wells drilled in the Eagle Creek basin.

All the protesters base their protests on the claim that the wells will adversely affect their water rights.

Don Blaugrund, president of Alto Village Service Corporation and Lakeside Corporation, claimed the wells will adversely affect wells and water rights owned by the corporations. Alto Village relies almost completely on wells for its water, said Blaugrund.

Douglas Perrin, attorney for the valley protesters, said his clients are concerned the wells may possibly increase Ruidoso's effluent credit from

Eagle Creek and thus allow Ruidoso to divert more water from the Rio Ruidoso.

"Both Blaugrund and Perrin called the protest a 'prudent' measure to make sure the wells will not hurt them. With the protest, Ruidoso has to prove the wells will not adversely affect any other water rights.

"It is just a prudent thing to do when you rely so much on wells," said Blaugrund, who explained that he informed the village before filing the protest. "There's a good chance we'll be able to work something out."

Blaugrund and Perrin said they want to consult with their own and the village's water experts to determine Ruidoso's exact plans and the possible effects of the wells.

"I just want to be sure I know exactly what they have in mind," said Perrin.

If an agreement cannot be worked out, all involved parties will have to argue their cases before the State Engineer. The State Engineer makes all decisions concerning water rights.

Sheriff notes accomplishments

"I think we had a great year," said Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan of the accomplishments of his department during 1983.

"I feel we are on our way to making the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office a professional law enforcement agency," he said in his recently released 1983 yearly report.

According to the report, the Sheriff's Department recovered 58.4 percent of the total stolen property reported in the county. That compares to a national average of about 32 percent, Sullivan said. The total value of the property recovered totaled \$120,694, according to the report.

The department handled 26 narcotic cases and seized 2,360 marijuana plants that would have been worth an estimated \$2,832,000 if they had been allowed to mature, Sullivan said.

The department reported that 302 worthless check cases were handled, resulting in the collection of \$21,643.71 on those checks.

The department's three vehicles were tripled to the present nine, and personnel including seven deputies, an administrative officer, two jailers and a dispatcher were added to the ranks of the Sheriff's Department.

Also detailed in the report were:

-7,257 people walked into the Sheriff's Office requesting assistance. That breaks down to nearly 20 people a day.

-85,501 phone calls were logged. That breaks down to over 100 calls a day.

-78,484 radio calls were logged. That breaks down to a daily total of over 200 calls.

-1,916 legal papers were served throughout the county, an average of 5.5 per day.

-237,721 miles were traveled by Sheriff's Office vehicles, which breaks down to over 650 miles a day.

"We weren't just sitting around the office," Sullivan said of the workload performed by the Sheriff's Office last year.

Sullivan mentioned continuing a high rate of visibility as a major goal for 1984.

"I get comments from people who say, 'Hey, we see you all the time now,'" Sullivan said.

Sullivan said help from the community has aided the officers in their work. He said the office has received many calls this year that have helped them solve cases and respond to situations.

"That shows the public is supporting our effort," he said.

Another goal for 1984 is increased

training for officers.

"Law enforcement officers must have constant training to keep up with the trends," Sullivan said.

Sullivan also noted excellent cooperation from the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners as a great help in the success of the department.

Sullivan said the department will strive in 1984 to increase their overall professionalism.

"We can make it a better year," he said in the report.

E.T. zoning hearing today

The Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission Tuesday discussed and reviewed requests from several residents in the Carrizo Canyon area who asked that their property be zoned C-1, or general commercial.

In a letter sent to 277 area property owners, the commission proposed zoning all the land in the area R-1, or single-family residential. The com-

mission considered 12 mail responses and a 14-signature petition that asked for a C-1 zoning.

According to commission chairman Milt Alcorn, the commission will make a decision on those requests and other proposed zoning during a public hearing scheduled for 2 p.m. today (Thursday). The meeting will be in the Lincoln County Suboffice in Ruidoso.

County P&Z meets this evening

The Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission will hold its monthly meeting at 7 p.m. Thursday, January 19, at the county courthouse in Carrizozo. The commission members will discuss a report from the Lincoln Historical Board and other reports.

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
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
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
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Water corporation enlists Realtors

The Ruidoso Water Development Corporation (RWDC) decided Tuesday to approach Realtors and all local water rights owners in their attempts to secure more water for Ruidoso.

"The Village of Ruidoso has to have additional water rights," said RWDC president Dan Swearingen. "You need to figure some way to do marketing."

RWDC was created in 1982 to search for and acquire water rights for Ruidoso.

Corporation members agreed with

Wayne Townsend's suggestion that they make a "fact sheet" for potential water rights sellers to fill out. The sheet would have basic questions about location, type, amount and priority dates of water rights.

Townsend's suggestion came after assistant village manager Frank Potter said many people called last fall about water rights but did not know enough about their rights to be of use to the village.

Townsend also suggested the fact sheets be distributed among local Realtors for their use. RWDC has been reluctant to work with Realtors because their commissions would

drive up the cost of water rights. The group agreed, however, that Realtors' knowledge of rights and ability to gather pertinent information is worth the commission. Exactly who pays commissions will be determined with each transaction.

RWDC vice-president Preston Isaacs suggested gathering a list of all water rights owners in the area so the village can contact them regarding the sale of their rights.

The corporation also elected Swearingen, president; Isaacs, vice-president; and Jim Hine, treasurer, to serve one-year terms. They elected Mike Seelbach as secretary, replacing Newton Page, who is no longer a member of the corporation.

Corporation members agreed they will serve only until March when a new village council takes office. They will continue to serve if the council reappoints them.

James Weldon announces for District Attorney

James J. Weldon recently announced he will be a candidate for the Democratic nomination as district attorney for the 12th Judicial District.

In the 11-day write-in campaign Weldon conducted in a previous race, he claimed he received the majority of the votes but that because of minor imperfections in the spelling of his name, many votes were not given to him.

This time, Weldon said, his name will be on the ballot and not subject to judicial interpretation.

In the previous campaign, he gave three reasons for running: the misuse of the office for political purposes, conflict of interest and lack of experience of the current district attorney.

He will add others as the campaign proceeds, he said. "I will in each case

supply the voters with facts, not opinions, documentary evidence, not hearsay statements. I will not do or say anything I can't back up."

Weldon said it is his firm conviction that for the proper administration of justice, the citizens are entitled to a professional, experienced, honest and impartial district attorney.

"Favoritism should play no part in prosecutorial decisions nor should political differences be settled by false accusations," he said. "It is, and will continue to be my policy, that no one fear retribution merely because we differ philosophically or politically."

His legal qualifications include many years experience in law, including eight years as public defender—trying more criminal trials in this district than anyone—and familiarity with the rules of criminal procedure, he said. Weldon has always been a member of the Democratic Party.

With his background and experience, he thinks he is fully competent to perform the duties of the office.

"I intend to operate the office of the district attorney for the benefit of the public and not to further my own or any other person's political ambitions," he explained.

Weldon has been living in Alamogordo since 1969, when he opened his law practice. In 1974 he became the first district public defender. All of his children attended and finished their schooling in Alamogordo public schools.

He is a member of the Alamogordo Rotary Club and the Elks. Weldon was elected president of the Otero County Bar Association for 1983.

He and his campaign staff will open his campaign headquarters soon, and he invites anyone to stop by and discuss the issues personally.

Ray Serna senator hopeful

Democrat Ray Serna of Socorro has announced his candidacy for the office of State Senator from District 39.

The district includes all of Lincoln County, plus Socorro and part of Alamogordo. Serna has lived in Socorro since 1966, but he graduated from Capitlan High School and has family in Ruidoso.

He is employed by the Very Large Array radiotelescope project, where he is a group leader in charge of a wave guide communications system.

"Because I'm familiar with the needs of the district, I felt I would be the prime candidate," said Serna. His motivation to run, he said, was the district's need for good representation in the Legislature.

Serna considers himself a people-oriented person, and said he has always tried to represent the under-represented.

He cited economic development and employment opportunities as needs for this area.

"I think that Ruidoso should diversify more," said Serna. He feels the town should seek to attract other clean industry so that if tourism fell off, the local economy would not suffer.

He believes there is a lot of industry that a community like Ruidoso could attract—such as manufacture of chips for electronic circuit boards—but he stated the need for someone who knows how to go after it.

Consulting businesses and magazine publishing are two other areas he feels have potential here. He predicted construction will peak sooner or later, and said the state as a

whole should increase its advertising of "our Land of Enchantment."

Serna said he sees himself as a focal point for leaders to come together.

"We're all probably working toward a common goal," he said. "A united effort is better than any divided effort."

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land used for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by non-governmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.

If you made improvements to your real property and:

- 1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and
- 2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued.

you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by the assessor.

If you believe your property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report, on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement which:

- 1. describes the property affected;
- 2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value; and
- 3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased.

This statement must be filed with the assessor not later than the last day of February.

If the veteran's exemption was claimed and allowed in 1983, no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1983 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1983, no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1983 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

Beginning in the 1985 tax year, taxpayers are responsible for declaring their property classification to the assessor as residential or non-residential. When the declaration is accepted by the assessor, it shall remain as such and need not be made in subsequent years unless the classification changes. If a taxpayer has not declared their prop-

erty to be residential in 1983 and desires that classification for 1984, they must complete a declaration of residential classification and return the signed declaration to the county assessor's office by the last day of February, 1984.

Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division of the State of New Mexico in Santa Fe. Information about property to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division, can be obtained from the county assessor or the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87503; Phone: (505) 862-2200, Ext. 541.



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

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Housing loans available

James F. Hudson, state director of Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), announced today that because of recent legislation passed by Congress, beginning this month, "very-low" income residents of Lincoln and Otero Counties will receive priority consideration for FmHA housing loans.

Arthur D. Baca, county supervisor for FmHA, said about \$172,000 is available to fund housing loans in Lin-

coln and Otero Counties through March 31. He urged very-low income applicants in need of housing to apply to the County Office at 1007 Mechem Drive, Ruidoso, 258-5294.

Satisfactory credit ratings are required to qualify for these heavily subsidized loan funds and, in addition, the applicants must show repayment ability for their existing obligations, taxes, insurance, family living expenses and the subsidized housing payment.

Editorial

A few major issues are grabbing the headlines as the 30-day session of the Legislature opens in Santa Fe.

But the "also included" items in Governor Toney Anaya's legislative package also bear watching.

Of particular interest in Lincoln County is the governor's request for five new district judges—one of whom would serve the 12th Judicial District (us). The courtroom at the newly remodeled Ruidoso police-courts complex is designed to accommodate District Court business, and a third judge for the district would mean it could be so used more often.

The governor is also seeking to abolish at-large representation on county commissions, school boards and city councils—requiring those elected officials to be chosen from districts.

The possibility of districting was mentioned here when Ruidoso was considering an increase in its council size, but it is thought by most to be unworkable due to transient population and topography, and the fact we really are quite a small community.

But minorities have claimed discrimination by at-large representation (which motivated the proposal), and it seems there could be some validity to that claim.

Anaya is also suggesting a constitutional amendment that would allow the governor and other state officials to serve consecutive four-year terms.

That one is scary. Who knows when we might suffer the misfortune to have another like Bruce King in the Roundhouse—or, perish the thought, King himself.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—New Mexico's Democratic party—a model for the nation?

You would have thought it was in 1983, when the state party's triumphs the year before—particularly their success in knocking off Jack Schmitt—were being celebrated by the Democratic National Committee. Nick Franklin, state chairman of the party, was going around the country giving lectures on "The New Mexico Model," a computer plan which was being touted as one every state should follow.

So what happened between then and now to turn the New Mexico party into one which can only be said, in strictest charity, to be in a state of disarray?

Neither of the national committeepersons, Ben Alexander of Hobbs or Zora Hesse of Albuquerque, even wants to serve another term. And there is considerable trouble finding five bodies with which to replace them, though Bruce King will probably give in gracefully and take the seat reserved for the man of the party.

Of course, Franklin himself has moved on to greater things. He's quitting the chairman's post to run for the U.S. Senate.

His race for that nomination hardly qualifies him as a ball of fire. Since few people like to invest in a lost cause, the big money appears to be going exclusively to Pete Domenici, the man Franklin would like to return to the private practice of law.

What's worse, nobody really wants to step into Nick's shoes as party chairman.

Aubrey Dunn, who was being urged by many to make the race against Joe Skeen, has decided not to take on that burden—possibly because he understood that many trying to talk him into the race secretly hoped he would be beaten and thus end his political career permanently.

Neil Johnson of Artesia, another looking at the run against Joe, is involved with too many things in the family bank to allow him time for the

effort. So who's the candidate going to be? Will the Democrats give Skeen a free ride?

How humiliating. A thoughtful observer might well get the impression that smart and activist Democrats are fleeing the top party jobs in 1984 because they see small promise for their party this year.

There is little or no enthusiasm apparent in the state for any of the Democratic presidential candidates. That might suggest that on the evening of November 6 those fancy maps at network television's News Central will once again show New Mexico for the Republican at the top of the ticket.

And there's another risk. Who wants to be known for having presided over the party if this is the year in which it loses control in the state Senate and sees the House again turned over to a conservative coalition over which Republicans have veto power?

One or both of those things could happen, especially if voters are already pushing levers on the Republican line to vote for Reagan and Domenici.

All in all, the steam the Democrats built up with their near "sweep" in 1983 has all been dissipated.

It's probably closer to the truth to say they were given too much credit for what they did that year. Jack Schmitt, for example, who held one of the few Senate seats the Demos took back from Republicans, probably did at least as much to defeat himself as the local Democrats did.

The Governor gave his State of the State speech.

You might have looked here for some comments on that oration.

They will come later, after the writer has had time to sit down with the text and nit-pick it in some detail.

After all, the Nixon people once were able to convince even the powerful television networks that "instant analysis" is a disservice to the audience and the speechmaker alike.

I'll also be living with a German family during part of my stay. I'm really looking forward to this. Instead

of just being a tourist, I'll actually get to live somewhere.

Some people have also given me the line—"You should see your own country before you go traipsing off to Europe."

I agree there is a lot more of the United States for me to see, and I'm going to see it. I also think I'll appreciate it even more after seeing other countries.

Bernice McLaughlin, Ruidoso's Rotary exchange student, told me something interesting before she left. She said the year she spent in America made her realize how much she wants to see her own country.

I'm a bit of a skeptic, and America has to prove itself to me. How will I know it's a great country unless I see other countries?

Smugness is one of the reasons for countries' mutual misunderstanding. We can't sit around thinking our country's wonderful without constant work to improve it. We also can't think every other country is beneath us, because each country is great in its own way.

Bernice also had a comment when I asked her to compare Australia and America. She said she couldn't because each country is unique and has wonderful customs, governments and societies.

This is a good attitude that more people should adopt—just accepting each country on its own merits.

I want to go to Europe with an open mind and hopefully I'll come back with a lot of insight.

Although I'll be traveling and exploring most of the time, I also plan to do a little genealogical research for my parents. Getting in touch with my German roots so to speak. Maybe I'll meet some relatives I didn't know I had.

I hope to learn a lot on my travels, things you can't learn about countries from books.

This adventure should sustain me for a while, especially since I'll come back to the United States to become among the ranks of the unemployed.

Once I do find a job, I can be entertained during monotonous moments by my memories of Europe.

My trip to Europe will also bring another first. When I fly to London February 3, it will be my first time to fly in a plane.

Oh well, to mix a few cliches, "you're only young once, so you have to go for the gusto."



Capitan proud of Smokey, his museum



The Smokey Bear Museum is located on Highway 380 in downtown Capitan. The museum is a 30-minute drive from Ruidoso.



Built by the people of Capitan, the museum was constructed with donated materials and manpower between 1958 and 1960.

Smokey Bear. The words conjure thoughts of a big black talking bear warning us to be careful of causing forest fires.

"Only you can prevent forest fires" is his motto, and a fire shovel and forester's hat are his trademarks. The story of the bear, found in a raging wildfire in the Lincoln National Forest in 1950, is preserved in photographs and drawings in the Smokey Bear Museum in Capitan.

The museum was built between 1958 and 1960 by the people of Capitan, ac-

ording to curator Willie Hobbs. She said everything for the museum was donated by villagers, from materials to build the museum to the labor that constructed it.

Full of Smokey Bear memorabilia, the museum features objects from the history of the bear. Found as a cub during the fire, Smokey was soon on his way to the National Zoo in Washington, D.C., to become the official national symbol of forest fire prevention.

Over the years, through extensive advertising efforts, Smokey Bear

became a nationally recognized figure. After his death in 1976 at the age of 28, the bear was returned to Capitan for burial.

A new Smokey Bear now carries on for the bear in the National Zoo as a national symbol for forest fire prevention.

According to Hobbs, over 41,000 people visited the museum last year. She said there were visitors from all 50 states and 27 foreign countries.

"We're hoping for even more this year," she said. She added that because this year is the 40th year of

the Smokey Bear program, and the official Smokey Bear commemorative stamp will be issued, it should be a big year for Smokey.

"We are proud of Smokey and he has done a lot of good," she said. "I think he means a lot to the people of Capitan."

Smokey Bear lives on in the thoughts of many of us with his cautious message urging prevention of forest fires.

The museum is just a 30-minute drive from Ruidoso. For information call 354-2812.



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



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Sunland Park Hoofbeats

CROW'S REQUEST TOOK THE LEAD on the far turn and held off a determined bid by Pop's Spirit to win Saturday's featured allowance race, which drew one of the season's toughest fields of sprinters. The win by Crow's Request snapped a five-race winning streak by Pop's Spirit, who has been outstanding in four consecutive local triumphs. Crow's Request had just missed in two 870-yard races in his two previous races, finishing second by a nose to My Native Son on December 4 and running second, just a head behind Lovely Lou Anne on January 7. He broke sharply from the sixth post position under David Lidberg, to be third behind pacesetter Pop's Spirit and Living Pleasure, under Betty Harless. He moved even with Pop's Spirit entering the far turn as Living Pleasure began to drop back and then assumed command entering the stretch. He was never seriously menaced through the stretch in setting the five furlongs in :58 1-5, less than two seconds off the track record of :56 2-5 set by Draconic's Loom in 1980. Despite finishing second, Pop's Spirit showed his ability while competing for the first time since November 19 when he won a mile race by a half-length and set the season's fastest mile reading of 1:33 2-5. The five-year-old Red Viking gelding is trained by Clifford C. Lambert Sr. for the Double B Ranch of Anthony, New Mexico. Crow's Request, meanwhile, is trained by Simon Buechler for Gordon B. Howell of Sunland Park. As the 3-2 second wagering risk, the nine-year-old Jerry Crow gelding paid \$5.00 to win. Pop's Spirit, who was two lengths behind Crow's Request, was the 4-5 wagering favorite. Ferro Fair, ridden by Dale Cordova finished third and was five and one-half lengths behind Pop's Spirit.

TOP LEVAN WON HIS SIXTH race of the meeting when he rallied for a driving nose victory in Friday's eighth race at 350 yards. The 10-year-old Top Moon gelding has been one of the campaign's most successful runners. His five-race winning streak was snapped in his previous start before Friday when he ran fourth, only a length behind favored Badest Bug Alive in a 400-yard chase for \$8,000 claimers. Top Levan broke slowly on Friday in a 350-yard dash for \$6,250 claimers, but rallied strongly to just

nip Camp Town Round in 18:40 against a strong headwind. Kevin Cogburn rode the Oklahoma-bred dasher on Friday for trainer Donald E. Mooney and owner Donnie R. Stewart of Fort Worth, Texas. As the even-money wagering favorite, Top Levan returned \$4.00 to win.

TWELVE JOCKEYS EACH WON a race on Friday's program. Winning riders included Pedro Benitez, Larry Urioste, David Lidberg, Gary Sumpter, Santos Toquinto, Ramon Apodaca, O. A. Martinez Jr., Kevin Cogburn, F. O. Martinez, Kevin Scholl, Mike Lidberg and Arturo Vallejo. It was one of the few times this season one rider didn't win at least two races during a day.

TEXTAN RALLIED STRONGLY from the outside to capture a widening decision by almost one length from Maparoni in Saturday's Sunland Park Claiming Series Number 2 at five and one-half furlongs. The seven-year-old Windex gelding laid off the early leaders and then caught pacesetter Maparoni near the wire under a fine ride by O.A. Martinez Jr. The Florida-bred runner tallied his first victory since winning in Mid-September at the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque. Textan toured the distance in 1:07 1-5. Trained by Barry H. Germany, Textan is owned by Larry E. Pomeroy and William D. Sirkel of Albuquerque. As the \$3.40-1 second wagering choice, Textan paid \$8.80 to win. Ironically, none of the horses who competed in the first Sunland Park Claiming Series Number 1 on October 29 at six and one-half furlongs returned to compete in Saturday's second Claiming Series event.

SUNLAND PARK'S LEADING JOCKEY and trainer combined to win three races on Saturday's program. Casey Lambert rode and Clifford C. Lambert Sr. trained Corky's Kool (\$11.00) in the seventh for owner Carl F. Smith of Round Rock, Texas, Toparino (\$3.20) in the tenth for owner Dock E. Ringo of Mineral Wells, Texas, and then won the twelfth on Fuzz's Dream (\$10.00) for owner Cooper D. Campbell of Odessa, Texas. It was the fifth three-win day this season for Casey and the second for Clifford.


IT TOOK 18 TRIES but Jerry's Prize found the winner's circle when he scored a popular victory in Sun-

day's fourth race at one mile. The three-year-old Distinctive Prize colt was winless in 16 outings in 1983 as a two-year-old, but won in his second try this year. Ridden by O.A. Martinez Jr., the New Mexico-bred toured the mile in 1:44 4-5 as the 2-5 wagering favorite. He is trained by Billy Powell for owner Dallas M. McCasland of Eunice. Jerry's Prize returned \$2.80 to win.

SUNLAND PARK PATRONS really flocked to the windows on Saturday and Sunday, producing the two top handles this season. Sunday's crowd of 3,635, the third highest attendance this season, wagered \$407,288, the best handle this campaign. The 12th race trifecta pool of \$57,793 was the highest this season. In addition, the eighth-race trifecta wagering of \$52,456 was also one of the highest this season. Both the one-day handle and the top trifecta pool standards this season were set just one day earlier on Saturday when the crowd of 3,062 wagered \$405,563. Saturday's twelfth-race trifecta pool of \$55,644 was the second-best this season. The per capita wagering on Saturday was an excellent \$135.09 per person while Sunday's average patron pushed \$112.00 through the windows. With the fine mutual handles over the weekend, the daily average and total mutual handles are now ahead of last year's record-setting pace. Through 38 days, the total mutual handle of \$12,062,460 is \$12,045 better than the corresponding figure of last season of \$12,050,415. The daily average handle of \$317,433 is 0.10 percent better than the figure a year ago of \$317,116. The attendance is also showing a healthy gain over last season. The total crowds of 109,603 are ahead of last season's 101,252. The daily average turnout of 2,884 is 8.25 percent higher than the figure of last season of 2,664.

SUNDAY'S DAILY DOUBLE combining Cold Spot (\$4.00) in the first race with Ha Cha Jo (\$5.00) in the second produced the lowest daily double payoff this season. The 2-3 combination paid \$14.00, snapping the previous low return of \$19.80 set by Chauncey Gardner and Pittsburgh Flirt on November 26. Cold Spot was ridden by Brenda Alfieri for trainer Bobby D. Crenshaw while Wayne Buehrer rode Ha Cha Jo for trainer Johnny R. Dennis.

Bourbon And Blues knocks off foes

Bourbon And Blues, the colt who holds the seasonal five and one-half furlong record at Sunland Park, was back at his favorite distance for Sunday's headliner and knocked off his foes with ease.

Bourbon And Blues, under no urging from jockey Betty Harless, zoomed into the clear at the top of the stretch and easily pried up his advantage as he sprinted toward the wire. The winning margin was a decisive six and three-quarter lengths, recorded in a crisp 1:05 flat. The seasonal mark was set by the four-year-old at 1:03 4/5 on December 11, when he won by seven and one-half lengths. It was another day of big business at Sunland as the crowd of 3,635

(third-biggest so far this season) wagered a thumping \$407,288 on the 12-race program. That was the highest handle so far at the meeting. The previous high was set a day earlier (Saturday) at \$405,563.

Sunland patrons made Bourbon And Blues the choice at just over even odds in the seven-head field of four-year-olds and up. The payoffs were \$4.20, \$2.40, \$2.40. Ferro Fair, pegged at almost 3 1/2-1 in the six-head field, ended up third, five and one-half lengths behind Pop's Spirit. The gelding was never a factor. Ferro Fair's mutual supporters got a \$2.10 show price.

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Miss Blue Blade wins headliner

Miss Blue Blade was in fifth place when she turned for home in Friday's five and one-half furlong headliner at Sunland Park.

If that weren't bad enough, the 8-5 favorite, Dear Tess, was in fourth place close to the rail and building up momentum for a big stretch run between horses.




