The first day of skiing for the athletes of the 1984 Southern New Mexico Special Olympic Winter Games began Wednesday with instruction and training under bright, cloudless skies at Eagle Creek Ski Area.

"This is nice, we're lucky about the weather. It makes it real easy to instruct," said Penny Zannes, executive director of the New Mexico Special Olympics. According to Zannes, 125 athletes from all over southern New Mexico arrived to compete in the Games.

"We're up 25 athletes this year; each year it gets bigger," she said. According to Zannes, the people in the Ruidoso area are a big part in the success of the program.

"There's a real big community spirit here," she said. "Everything was done by the volunteers from the community."

Breakfast Wednesday was served by the Ruidoso Evening Lions Club. Midway through the morning, hot cocoa was served by The Bank of Ruidoso Lunch Wednesday was served by the Rio Ruidoso Lioness Club, and dinner was dished out by the members of the Altrusa Club of Ruidoso.

Wednesday's skiing was followed by a spectacular torchlight parade as part of the opening ceremonies. Local Boy Scouts skied down the face of Eagle Creek with blazing torches marking their progress down the hill.

The actual competition will begin today, with alpine races taking place at Eagle Creek Ski Area and cross-country events being run at Ski Cloudcroft ski area. Awards and closing ceremonies will follow the competition at 3:30 p.m. A victory dance and dinner are set for tonight at the White Mountain School cafeteria.

"I think it's going to be a real successful event for the athletes," Zannes said.

21 candidates file for council

A record 21 people filed Monday as candidates for six village council seats to be determined in the March 6 Ruidoso municipal election.

Councilman Al Junge was the only incumbent to file for candidacy.

The six openings were created after a November 1983 special election enlarged the council from four to six members, plus the mayor. According to the state statute providing for the increase, all existing council members must resign within 120 days of the special election.

Councilmen Benny Coulston, Don Dale and Frank Sayner did not register for reelection.

Those who did register were (in order of appearance on the ballot) Junge, Jerry Shaw, Elmer Pirelli, Jon Denny, Ray Dean Carpenter, Romeo Klein, Terry L. Coe, Alma O. Russell, Joseph W. Collier, Mike Radziewicz, Frederick Evans, Bill Karn, John M. Carver, Bill Streeter, Clark Carpenter, H. John Underwood, Michael Callaghan, Milt Alcorn, JoAnn Farris, Ralph Rush and Sherman Atwood.

Village manager Jim Hine said the list of candidates was the largest for any municipal election in Ruidoso. It also included three women. There never has been a woman council member, said Hine.

After lots had been drawn for ballot position, Hine shook hands with Coulston and Sayner, who had been watching the proceedings. He thanked them for their service as councilmen. The three men and Junge then stood around for a few minutes discussing the past two years.

Hine noted that the present council had the best attendance record of any council, with more special meetings than any other Ruidoso council.

Six candidates registered for the municipal judgeship, which is also a record, according to Hine. Many

believe the recent salary increase from \$1,000 to \$1,500 per month may have encouraged the numerous candidates for the judgeship.

Municipal judge candidates, in order of ballot appearance, are Jack F. Spall, incumbent John Cupp, Don Hendricks, John R. Barton, Otis Spears and Ron Harris.

Ruidoso Downs voters will elect three members to the village board of trustees, and one municipal judge.

Candidates for the two four-year

trustee terms, in order of appearance on the ballot, are Yolanda Flanagan, Scott L. Tillman, incumbent Conrad Buchanan, Camille Mansell, Jacquelyn Branum and Loran Houston Parnell.

Candidates for the two-year trustee term are Barry J. Smith, Joe T. Southard, Rick Simpson and incumbent LeVerne Cole.

Ruidoso Downs incumbent municipal judge Paula Smith will face trustee Harrold Mansell in the

contest for the judgeship.

In Capitan, four candidates signed up for the two open seats on the board of trustees. Pat L. Huey, incumbent Norman Calvin Renfro, Vernon Kelley Beavers and Larry E. Caywood all registered Monday. Incumbent Maggie Trujillo did not seek reelection.

Incumbent Alfred Leroy Montes, Johnnie Romero Johnson and Michael D. Points will all vie for the Capitan municipal judgeship.

Pro ski race drawing lots of attention

The U.S. Open pro ski race began getting recognition from northern New Mexico this week, and a number of Ruidosians headed for Winter Park, Colorado, to get a first-hand look at the pro racing circuit.

The Albuquerque Journal ran an editorial Saturday on Ruidoso's hosting of the world's richest ski race.

"It will bring nationwide attention to Ruidoso, New Mexico and our skiing resorts. It will be the culmination of a job well done by Ruidoso officials and state officials," stated the editorialist.

The Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce also congratulated the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce and offered to help in any way possible.

"I know you and all of the residents of Ruidoso worked very hard to get Ruidoso on the Pro Ski International Tour. What an accomplishment!"

"You have boosted the prestige and recognition factor of not only Ruidoso, but the entire state of New Mexico as the eyes of the world focus on you in March," wrote Albuquerque Chamber president J. B. Mulcock.

In order to make sure the world sees a good thing when it does focus on Ruidoso, three Ruidosians involved in the race have traveled to Winter Park for the First Interstate Cup this weekend. Ed Jungbluth, Elona Rush and Ray Heid all traveled to the Winter Park race, which is the last stop on the Pro Ski International tour before the pros come to Ruidoso the first week of March.

Winter Park has been hosting the pro race for nine years, and is generally acknowledged as a superior race producer.

Heid, who is in charge of the race crew for the U.S. Open, said he plans to latch onto the race director at Winter Park, follow him for three

days and find out "what it takes to put on the best race in the country."

"Let's get excited and get up there," said Heid.

Rush and Jungbluth said they plan to watch how all the peripheral events are handled, including hospitality tents, pro-am dinners, press tents, volunteers and celebrities.

David Mirisch, who is in charge of bringing celebrities to Ruidoso, began announcing names of stars who plan to be here for the race.

Mirisch said Trini Lopez, Lyle Waggoner, Richard Dean Anderson and Raina English have all made commitments to come to Ruidoso provided they do not become involved in any filming projects.

Lopez is a singer whose songs, "If I Had a Hammer" and "Lemon Tree," made him famous during the 1960s.

Anderson now plays Simon Adams on the television show, "Emerald Point." He played Jeff Webber on "General Hospital" for five years.

English performed on the "Lawrence Welk Show" as part of "Guy and Raina" for 10 years, before striking out on her own to perform "up tempo, contemporary" acts in nightclubs around the country.

Waggoner appeared on the "Carol Burnett Show" for seven years and was on "Wonder Woman" for three years.


Mirisch said he expects to bring eight to 10 celebrities to Ruidoso. They will all compete in the pro-am race Saturday, and some will perform at the pro-am dinner Saturday night.

Although sponsors of the race have the first spots in the pro-am, there are still some spots open for any interested skiers. For \$250, the amateur will receive a skiing clinic from his professional team captain; ski in the race; and attend the pro-am party.

The Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce is handling all entries into the pro-am race.

Sierra Blanca. Undisturbed snow depth midway on the mountain is 52 inches. Skiing conditions are generally good with some high traffic areas fair and the lower mountain novice areas excellent. Surface conditions are packed and machine groomed. All lifts and trails are open daily. Weather at report time is clear and chains are not required on the road to the ski area Monday.



Eagle Creek. Snow depth average is 30 inches. The resort is open on Boot Hill, Lower Box Canyon, Chisolm Trail and the beginners' slopes. The skiing conditions are good. There is night skiing from 8 to 10 Friday and Saturday. The resort is

Update on 3 shootings given

A followup of three shooting incidents that occurred within eight days in Lincoln County showed that of those allegedly involved, two are in jail, one is in the hospital, one has bonded out and one is still at large.

No trial dates for any of the suspects have been set.

A man police said was involved in a high-speed car chase and a shooting incident near Ruidoso January 7 has been released from the hospital but faces numerous criminal charges filed by several law enforcement agencies.

John Michael Schmidt, 20, is now being held in the Otero County Jail on \$50,000 bond after allegedly going on what one police officer termed a "one-man crime wave."

State Police have filed charges against Schmidt of aggravated assault on a police officer with intent to commit a violent felony with a firearm enhancement, aggravated assault on a police officer and possession of a stolen vehicle.

Schmidt was allegedly driving a 1979 Porsche reported stolen out of El Paso when Ruidoso police spotted him and began pursuit. The Ruidoso police department reported that Schmidt rammed officer Gonzalo Cordova's car at one point, then eluded officers on U.S. Highway 70. The car was later found on Highway 24 near Cloudcroft.

State Police reported that officer A. E. Archibeque found the suspect on the highway two hours after that and shot him in the left side and wrist. Available State Police reports do not indicate the circumstances surrounding the incident, but an agency investigation has cleared Archibeque of any wrongdoing.

Ruidoso police have filed two aggravated assault charges and three charges of fraudulent use of a credit card against Schmidt.

The El Paso Police Department has accused Schmidt of aggravated kidnapping, aggravated robbery and aggravated sexual assault.

The El Paso Sheriff's Department and the Dona Ana Sheriff's Department also said they anticipate filing multiple charges against Schmidt in the near future.

David Smith, 18, of Mesalero faces charges of unlawful taking of a motor vehicle and careless driving following a similar incident early New Year's Eve.

Ruidoso police said officer Hugh Anderson pursued Smith at high speed out of Ruidoso and onto the Mesalero Apache Reservation after spotting him in a reported stolen vehicle. It was known that the car contained a loaded pistol under the front seat.

According to Ruidoso police, Anderson came upon the vehicle and Smith past the Inn of the Mountain Gods, where the vehicle had stopped after striking a horse.

According to Ruidoso police chief Dick Swenor, Smith fled as Anderson approached. Anderson told Smith to stop, then heard a "pop" that he thought was a gunshot, said Swenor. Anderson fired five times, but Smith escaped into the woods.

Smith was arrested later that night at a residence on the reservation.

Smith is still in the Mesalero Indian Hospital in good condition. It was originally reported that Smith was injured in the upper thigh. A spokesman at the Gerald Champion Memorial Hospital in Alamogordo, where Smith was originally taken, said Smith's genitals were also injured.

Smith's attorney Michael Lilley of Las Cruces has served notice that he may file civil rights charges against the Village of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Police Department in connection with the incident.

An inhouse investigation by the Ruidoso Police Department found Anderson's action to be justified and legal, said deputy chief Jim Alston. An FBI investigation into the incident has not been completed.

Two suspects in a third shooting incident January 1 have been arrested, but another remains at large. Juan Herrera, 31, remains in the Lincoln County jail on charges of aggravated assault and aggravated battery following a shooting incident on Nogal Hill in which five people were wounded. Antonio Ramirez, 27, has bonded out on the same charges.

Larry Herrera, 27, remains at large. Lincoln County Sheriff's Department personnel say they have heard rumors he has fled to California. Deputy Charles Cox said the department has sent a teletype to California authorities but has received no new information.

Larry Herrera has served two terms in the state penitentiary at Santa Fe. He first served time for aggravated battery, residential burglary and larceny. He served a second term of almost two years for armed robbery with a firearm. He was paroled November 17, 1983.

Harrold Mansell runs for Downs judge

Harrold Mansell has announced his candidacy for the four-year term as municipal judge in Ruidoso Downs.


Mansell, general foreman and accountant for Crawley Construction Company of Alto, is presently serving his second term as a village trustee. He has been a full-time resident of Ruidoso Downs for nine years.

"Everything I own is invested in Ruidoso Downs," he said. Mansell's wife, Camille, is a candidate for village trustee.

Mansell has a bachelor of science degree in business, and he completed classroom work for a master's degree in business administration. While living in Duncan, Oklahoma, he was a policeman and an assistant city clerk.

He formerly owned the Hollywood Food Mart. He also has been affiliated with accountant Bill Dean, North American Land Developers and the Chaparral Lounge.

The trustee, who served from 1976 to 1978 and from 1980 to the present,

was asked why he is choosing to leave the governing body.

"I feel that a hundred percent new blood needs to be on the council," he said. This will allow new ideas for problems facing the village, he added.

Mansell said his decisions as a trustee were made "one hundred percent for the betterment of Ruidoso Downs and its citizens," and that they were made with a totally clear conscience.

He would bring a common sense attitude to the position of municipal judge, Mansell said. He stated that the budget for municipal court would be a minimum budget with necessary items to fulfill the job.

Mansell sees the judgeship as a way to continue to work for the betterment of Ruidoso Downs. He said a good court system is tied to what gets accomplished in the village—being available to the police department and helping keep down crime and controlling traffic.

He pointed to his attendance record as a trustee—one absence (medical) in six years.

"I'm dedicated to whatever I get into," he said.

P&Z hearing on trash compactor

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Monday will conduct a second public hearing on a garbage transfer and compactor system proposed for the old sewer plant site in the Hollywood area.

P&Z meets at 3 p.m., after a workshop that begins at 2 p.m.

The commission has already had one hearing, but postponed any decisions until alternate sites and possible zoning designations could be considered. The land at the proposed site is currently unzoned and P&Z will

consider zoning it for industrial use. The commission will also conduct a public hearing on a rezoning request from multiple-family dwellings to industrial for 5.27 acres of land behind Gibson's Discount Center. The land is currently used as a gravel pit by Bill McCarty.

Club closes over zoning questions

One of Ruidoso's most popular nightclubs closed this week after being notified of possible zoning violations.

Ruidoso Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis said he sent a letter to Rick Scoggins, manager of Rick's at the Top of the Racquet Club, stating the club was illegally operating as an open club in an area zoned for multi-family dwell-

ings. The zoning designation allows private clubs but not public commercial operations, said Davis.

Davis said he became aware of the operation after seeing advertising that stated the club was open to the public.

Scoggins said he wants to work with the village, but has to talk to building owner Paul Thorpe before deciding

what to do. Davis said Thorpe would have to request a zone change to light commercial use to operate a public club.

The Ruidoso village council zoned the property for light commercial use in the spring of 1982 when it appeared a Hilton Inn would be built in the area. The zoning was overruled in District Court, however, and returned to multi-family dwelling use.

The Brave boys B team also defeated Socorro in the last few seconds, taking a 34-33 win.



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Concern about road expressed to county commissioners

"I can't even count the number of accidents on this road this winter," said Tony Rank, a property owner in the Pine Meadows Subdivision. "It's a dangerous, dangerous turn."

Rank made his comments at the Tuesday morning meeting of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners. Speaking about an "S curve" on the Lower Eagle Creek Road, Rank said the road is constantly shadowed and is currently covered with ice.

"You have to go about two miles an hour to make the turn, otherwise you'll have an accident," he said. According to commissioners chairman John Hightower, the problem is not a new one.

"It's been going on for five years," Hightower said. Because the road is included in the county road maintenance program, the county is responsible for the upkeep of the road.

According to Rank and Howard Puckett, another property owner in the area, owners of the property at the curve have been approached with the problem, but no progress was made. According to Rank and Puckett, the curve could be straightened if the property lines were redrawn.

"Condemnation is the only answer," Rank said. The commissioners voted to continue work on the problem—with the help of District Attorney Steve Sanders—as soon as possible.

Also Tuesday, the commissioners heard a report from county manager Suzanne Cox on the mid-year budget

review. Cox reported that due to the new computer system in use by the county, the rate of tax collection processing was much more rapid than in past years.

"The computer system allowed a much faster processing rate," Cox said in the report, noting that \$3.2 million had been collected by December 1983, compared to \$1 million collected by December 1982.

"It is right in line," Cox said of the budget. "I'm real pleased with it."

In other business, the commissioners:

- Approved a resolution drawn up by Commissioner Bill Elliott congratulating those responsible for bringing the U.S. Open pro ski race to Eagle Creek Ski Area. The resolution offers the support and best wishes of the commissioners to all those organizing and participating in the event.

- Approved the transfer of a liquor license for the Rodeo Bar in Capitán.

- Approved the replat of lot 16, blocks I, K and M of the Middle Cedar Subdivision.

- Approved the replat of part of block B of the Red Cedar Subdivision.
- Approved the replat of lots 20A and 20B of lots 20-21 of the Middle Cedar Subdivision.

- Approved a variance of the Subdivision Regulations for John Ryan of the Woodland Subdivision. Regulations require that all subdivisions the size of Woodland be paved. Smokey Bear Visitors Center and State Park

A small black bear cub, rescued from the flames and ashes of a 4950 forest fire in the Lincoln National Forest near Capitan, quickly became known to the country as Smokey Bear.

The story of the bear, and the forest fire prevention program of the Forest Service that surrounded him most of his life, is traced in the exhibits and film at the Smokey Bear Visitors Center and State Park in Capitan.

The Park, open since June 21, 1979, is composed of the visitors center, a theater, playground, tennis courts, picnic area and nature walk. The nature walk features an interpretive trail through various vegetative zones

found in New Mexico. According to Park Ranger Patsy Feralta, there are no fees for the use of any of the facilities of the park.


Feralta said the theater shows a film about Smokey Bear at 10 a.m., 12 noon, 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. most days. She said at least two people must be present to show the film.

Feralta said the park was built with state funds, and the help of the Forest Service and the Village of Capitan. She said the park had over 26,000 visitors last year from all over the world. The park is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. seven days a week. Occasionally the park is closed during lunch, Feralta said. The phone number is 354-2748.

J-4 winners included Jackson McIntosh, first; Justin Whitcomb, second; and Gifford Davis, third. The J-3 winners were Eric Collins, first; Toby O'Neill, second; and Jeffrey Bigham, third. The J-2 category included racers Lance Tomlinson, first; Vince Tognaci, second; and Wayne Watts, third. Winner of the J-1 category was Keith Pipkin, who also had the fastest men's time.

Winners in the girls J-5 category in the slalom competition included

Neeley Schwab, first; Katie Graham, second; and Sage Anderson, third. Winner of the J-3 category was Cassie McIntosh. The J-2 category was won by Hillary Held, followed by Tricia Walsh. Held also had the fastest women's time on the course.

The giant slalom competition winners included, in the boys J-5 category, Casey Kerns, first; and Ashley Halladay, second. J-4 winners included Jackson McIntosh, first; Kenan Alexander, second; and Joel Berquist, third. Winners of the J-3 category were Jessie Foster, first; Toby O'Neill, second; and Eric Collins, third. In the slalom competition Sunday, Maul placed fifth in his class and 28th overall despite a fall, according to Vogel. He said Maul will be moving up to the Mid Series level of USSA competition.

Vogel also outlined plans to send eight team skiers to the USSA Age Class Series qualifying races this weekend at Monarch Ski Area in Colorado. The racers include Kenan Alexander, Jackson McIntosh, Jessie Foster, Toby O'Neill, Eric Collins, Jeffrey Bigham, Neeley Schwab and Sage Alexander. The racers will be accompanied by coach Schar Ward.

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Forget the crowds and enjoy wide-open slopes on weekdays

For locals it's almost a must. Visitors who can swing it get a good deal, and almost everybody agrees it's more fun. So what are you doing always skiing on Saturdays and Sundays when Monday through Friday have so much to offer?

Anybody who has skied for any amount of time has suffered from the lift line blues, frightening traffic jams on the slopes, and heaving masses of soggy skiers in the lodge.

You curse the world as you sidestep your way along a snaky lift line that

eats heartily into your skiing time. The lines at the bathroom and the food counter inspire you to pass up those pleasures. Even skiing can be difficult without a qualified air traffic controller directing traffic.

It's a part of skiing and has to be endured from time to time. But not all the time.

And we all know when this is more likely to happen—weekends and holidays. That's why sly skiers slip up to the snowy mountain during the week.

"When you have the chance to ski on weekdays, do," said ski patrol auxiliary member Yvonne Lanelli. "You

just have an all-around better experience."

Sierra Blanca Ski Resort manager Roy Parker said the area averaged about 1,100 skiers on weekdays as opposed to 2,700 during weekends last year. That's just an average. During the heavy skiing season of January through the first half of March, the weekend crowds swell to much larger numbers.

It's a whole different world on weekdays. The slopes are wide open. There are far fewer careening juggernauts with their unpredictable flight patterns. The limp bundles of skis,

arms and legs that seem to hide out of sight in a mogul trough or around the next turn during weekends have all been swept away by Monday. It's you, a friend and the hill.

And the lift lines, those dreaded flypaper traps of the weekend, have been banished from the hill. Instead of choosing your runs because they lead to less crowded lift lines, you can ski the slope you want. Follow the sun instead of the lift lines.

Now some people enjoy the festive atmosphere of the weekends, and it's a known fact that the visual delights of foxy men or women are fewer during the week. But generally, the skiers you see on the hill during the week are more skilled—and worth watching.

Parker said ski classes are smaller during the week as well. If you are an intermediate or above, your class can often consist of you and the instructor.

For locals, weekdays are almost a private party. Many who have to tend their businesses during the weekends go up and ski during the week. Restaurant owner Buster Hill said he sees more friends at Sierra Blanca when he sits during the week.

Hill said he usually buys a half-day ticket, which is not available on weekends. And if you are a regular weekday skier, the season pass is a deal. If you ski 11 weekdays on your weekday pass, you have essentially paid for the \$230 pass.

Of course, many of us work during the week. It's an unescapable fact of life that is hard to get around. But Phil Szensei of Odessa, Texas, recently used two days of his vacation time to create a four-day vacation with two completely uncrowded skiing days.

Parker said more people are taking advantage of some uncrowded skiing

by adding a couple of days on either side of the weekend.

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

Woman rider finds success breeding winning horses

Betty Harless is among the more prominent riders in the Southwest. But now she has found a new aspect of horses which may become her new career—the breeding industry.

"It's so fascinating," said the blonde-haired rider. "When I started riding, that's all I wanted to do. I didn't think of anything else. But once I started breeding, that's all I could think of. It takes quite a little bit of study to find the proper horses for breeding."

"But I'm getting into breeding horses now and that's my big thing. I don't know how much longer I will ride, but this is something I really want to get into," she added.

Her major breeding pupil is Hookem. Idle almost eight months, he made a triumphant return to the races by scampering to a two-length victory in a 4 1/2 furlong allowance race on January 27 at Sunland Park.

The New Mexico-bred runner showed his ability in his first race since finishing unplaced last June 5 in the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity at Ruidoso Downs. He took the lead down the backstretch run, held the advantage around the turn and started pulling away to a two-length win in 1:19—certainly a fine time for a horse who has been laid off for so long.

But the Sunland Park patrons certainly had few doubts as to Hookem's talent. He was bet to \$2,401 as the wagering favorite and returned a meager \$6.80 to win. Ironically, Harless also rode Hookem to the win.

Hookem is a three-year-old colt by Platoon Leader out of Carrie Jean.

The broodmare was given to Harless as a gift from her owner George Williams of Lovington, New Mexico.

"I rode for Mr. Williams for a while and he gave me Carrie Jean. I wanted to get into the breeding aspect and I wanted to cross Carrie Jean with the Nasrullah line. Coy Hendrix got Platoon Leader, who is by Fleet Nasrullah, a son of Nasrullah, so I figured that was as close as I was go-

ing to get," she said.

"I raised the colt myself and I'm so pleased with him. It's always a thrill when you breed them, raise them and watch them win," said the 31-year-old jockey.

Hookem debuted by finishing second in a trial race over five furlongs last April 15 at Sunland Park for the rich Riley Allison Futurity. Although he was awarded first place when the winner was disqualified for interference, he hurt himself during the race.

"He grabbed a quarter during the race so we were really hesitant to run him back in the Riley-Alison. But with a race worth that much money and with that much prestige, it was a tough decision. It was quite a thrill just to qualify for it. There's so many who started out and didn't make it."

"They (owner Agnes Irvin of Roswell, New Mexico and trainer Coy Hendrix) decided to stop on him at Ruidoso Downs after his fourth race. I think they made the right decision since he came back so well. He had

some really fast workouts (in December and January prior to his January 27th return). He showed he could really run. I'm pretty excited about his race and looking forward to this year," she explained.

Harless said so far Hookem is the finest horse of the five she has bred.

Harless has been riding professionally for the past six years and has bred race horses for the last three years. She has seven broodmares on her farm near Anthony, New Mexico, just a short hop from Sunland Park.

She said she also has a one-fourth interest in Platoon Leader, who has developed into one of New Mexico's finest stallions.

"I still have some babies coming that I'm anxious to see how they develop," she said. "I start putting my thoughts on paper and then compare horses, sire and broodmares to determine what would be best for me. It worked out really good with Hookem. But they don't always work out that well."

Set Score takes close win

Although Set Score had run up winnings of nearly \$50,000 in 1982, he didn't impress Sunland Park patrons too much in Saturday's headliner.

What probably caught the attention of Sunland patrons was the fact his earnings had dipped to \$7,275 last year, and he was beaten by a 12-length margin in his last start.

But Set Score, ridden by Brent Overton as a 19-1 outsider, snuck through on the rail at the turn for home in Saturday's 6 1/2-furlong topper. The five-year-old gelding refused to buckle when put to a seige by the 11-1 longshot, Christian Name, and held on for a head victory.

Set Score covered the distance in a heads-up 1:18 1/5 seconds, not far off

the seasonal mark of 1:17 3/5. The gelding is trained by Grady Overton for Margaret Bloss and Margaret Dupont of El Paso. The mutual returns: \$41.80, \$12.80, \$7.60.

Christian Name, ridden by F.O. Martinez, refunded \$9.40 and \$3. Miss Aggie Lue, a 2-1 shot, closed rapidly to bag third, returning \$3.

Stormy Sailing and Code's Draconic, both well-backed by the public, were unable to threaten at any point.

SET SCORE won one of the season's most competitive allowance races with a thrilling victory in Saturday's eleventh race at 6 1/2 furlongs. The field included Stormy Sailing, who has done well at Sunland Park as well as Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Arkansas; Miss Aggie Lue, who was coming off an upset win in a Sunland Park allowance race and Code's Draconic, an impressive four-year-old Draconic filly. Under a fine ride by Brent Overton, the four-year-old Scout Leader gelding took the lead just inside the stretch run, then held off a late charge by runnerup Christian Name and rapidly-closing Miss Aggie Lue who finished third. The time was a fine 1:18 1/5 reading under perfect racing conditions. The New Mexico-bred stand-out enjoyed a fine season as a two-year-old in 1982. He won one race with four seconds and one third from 11 appearances and earned \$48,999. His strong performance on Saturday indicated he will be a definite factor this spring in the allowance and handicap divisions. Trained by Grady Overton, Set Score is owned by Margaret V. Bloss and Margaret O. Dupont of El Paso, Texas. As a \$19,901 outsider in the field of 12 four-year-old and older horses, Set Score returned \$41.80 for his head triumph. Christian Name, an 11-1 risk under F.O. Martinez, took second, while Miss Aggie Lue, the 2-1 second wagering favorite under Harla Webb and one length behind Christian Name, was third. Code's Draconic, the 5-2 third-wagering choice under Betty Harless, finished fifth.

TRAINER J. DOYAL ROBERTS saddled two consecutive winners on Friday's program. He started in the third with Dock's Folly (\$3.80) for owner Jay C. Childers of Borger, Texas then captured the fourth with Diamond Collector (\$3.80) for owner Alan J. Antwell of Hobbs, New Mexico. Casey Lambert rode Dock's Folly while Lyndell Rutherford was aboard Diamond Collector. Ironically, each horse was a 9-10 wagering favorite.

HOOKEM, a participant in last May's prestigious Riley Allison Futurity at Sunland Park, made a triumphant return to the races by taking a two-length victory in Friday's featured race. The three-year-old

Platoon Leader colt took the lead down the backstretch run of the 6 1/2 furlong race which attracted nine sophomores running under allowance conditions. The colt held off repeated challenges from The Girl I Love and Release The Wind, a 15-1 outsider under David Lidberg, who closed rapidly to finish second. Hookem ran the distance in 1:19. The victory was the second with one second in just five outings for the lightly-raced New Mexico-bred colt. Trained by Coy Hendrix, Hookem is owned by Agnes M. Irvin of Roswell, New Mexico. As the \$2,401 wagering choice, Hookem paid \$6.80 to win. Betty Harless who bred Hookem, was aboard.

OWNER PAUL D. GOAR of Bosque Farms, New Mexico, trainer Michael G. Felter and jockey Dale Cordava combined to capture two races on Friday's program. They started in the fifth with Mr. Rocket Ridge (\$7.20) and then took the eighth with Foggy King (\$19.20).

H. DON FARRIS and Jerry Nicodemus, two of quarter horse racing's more prominent individuals, had more than a rooting interest in Easy Demand's performance in Saturday's fifth race. Farris and Nicodemus combined to breed the three-year-old Easy Dozen gelding and had to be excited as the Oklahoma-bred dasher led throughout in registering an easy 1 1/2-length win in the 350-yard dash for three-year-olds running in his last three races. As the 4-5 wagering favorite, Easy Demand paid \$3.60 for his popular triumph.

REQUEST A MAID set a seasonal fastest time in Saturday's tenth race. The three-year-old Azure Request horse drew clear for an easy 4 length win in the 670-yard dash which drew eight three-year-old and older horses running under allowance conditions. The California-bred dasher was clocked in a rapid 45:68, which eclipsed the previous season's best timing of 45:91 set by Lovely Lou Anne on January 7. Ironically, Request A Maid ran fourth, beaten just one length by Lovely Lou Anne in that race. Request A Maid was ridden by Kevin Scholl for trainer Gregory K. Henson and owners Ingersoll-McFarlin and Dr. Dorwin Hawthorne of Inola, Oklahoma.





Promise to Pay wins headliner

Promise To Pay took his first crack at the mile distance in Sunday's allowance headliner at Sunland Park. The colt was right at home and easily fended off an attack from the favorite, Draconic's Sign.

When Jockey Casey Lambert asked Promise To Pay for an extra powerburst, the colt took off and zipped across the wire with a five-length lead.

Besides being his first try at the mile, it was also his initial start of '84. The test offered a \$3,200 purse to seven three-year-olds.

Promise To Pay is owned by Marcella D. White of Odessa, Texas. The trainer is Clifford C. Lambert Sr. The mutual returns: \$8.80, \$4.60, \$2.80.

Break And Take, a 20-1 outsider directed by Salustio Burgos, came alive in the stretch and made up much ground. The colt finished second by a head over Miss Blue Blade. The latter, a 14-1 outsider, showed good early luck, but began dropping back just as Promise To Pay was sewing up the match with that stretch move.

Break And Take returned \$8.80 and \$8.20, while Miss Blue Blade handed out a \$5.40 show price. Mike Lidberg was up.

Promise To Pay covered the mile in 1:40 1/5 seconds.

The lukewarm favorite, Draconic's Sign (who went into headliner with career earnings of nearly \$17,000), showed plenty of eagerness in the early going, and moved into the lead at the half-way point. But the colt was unable to keep up once he hit the stretch, and faded to fourth.

Business at Sunland continued to boom as 3,678 fans turned out for the 12-race program and wagered \$398,804. It was the third-best handle so far this season, surpassed only by the \$407,388 on January 15 and the \$405,563 on January 14.

Editorial

Next Tuesday, February 7, Ruidoso voters have the opportunity to register support for our outstanding local public school system.

We strongly encourage you to vote—and to vote **FOR** the two propositions on the ballot.

They are: extension of the two-mill Public School Capital Improvements Tax approved locally in 1981; and authorization to issue \$1 million worth of new bonds.

Increased property valuation in the district and retirement of old bonds is expected to absorb the cost of debt service on the new bond issue. So no property tax increase is expected to result from the new bond issue or the two-mill levy, which is already in effect.

The new issue will bond the school district to capacity, which is a prerequisite for obtaining state Capital Outlay funds.

Our district partly owes its reputation as one of the best in the state to the fact it has been very successful at obtaining those funds (over \$4.7 million) and putting them to good use.

Extension of the two-mill levy will ensure matching funds from the state. That and local initiative shown by approval of the new bond issue will help the state look favorably on our next request for Capital Outlay funds (\$2 million, this spring).

Together, these funds will allow for completion of the beautiful new high school and remodeling of the present high school to house the middle school.

Our schools do us proud. Let's do them right by voting "for" the two propositions Tuesday.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Governor Anaya would like us to believe that President Reagan and all parts of his administration are "unsympathetic," "arrogant" and "anti-West."

Those are quotes from the speech endorsing Walter Mondale's candidacy for the Democratic nomination which he gave last week.

So how come that same unsympathetic, arrogant and anti-Western administration, within 72 hours of that ringing condemnation, delivered to Anaya's state one of the scientific plums of the year?

Kinda makes you scratch your head in wonder, doesn't it?

The project to be built in New Mexico is called the Very Large Baseline Array. It will involve the expenditure of about \$60 million and could eventually lead to as many as 200 new jobs.

New Mexico already has the Very Large Array radio astronomy installation on the San Agustin plains outside Socorro. This additional presence of the VLBA operations center in Socorro, plus two out of the ten antennae for this project, will make that city an even more important part of the nation's scientific community.

The decision to locate in New Mexico was not made because no other state wanted the project. Competition for it was in fact intense.

So why would our state be chosen? Curious to know, this writer talked to a couple of scientists, who understand such matters. They were a little jumpy to be called by a newsmen, and they agreed to talk freely only after being assured their names would not be used.

Gift of their conversation was this: Sorry, Toney, but you have to give the Republicans credit for this one.

Not only was the decision made at a time when that political party controls the administration just as surely as Anaya controls his, but the clear trail of evidence of how this came to be works out like this:

—Anaya's bete noir, Senator Pete Domenici, clearly a member of the GOP, recommended to the Reagan White House, where his name is

revered more widely than that of Toney Anaya, the appointment of Dr. Edward Knapp to head the National Science Foundation. That recommendation was accepted.

—Dr. Knapp, who left his residence in Los Alamos to take his new post, is also a Republican, and so one of those persons our Governor has nothing but bad words for. He understood the cogency of New Mexico's claims on the new project, and that helped till the decision toward our state.

Neither Reagan, Domencio nor Knapp would be in Washington if Toney had his way, yet in this case their presence there benefited us all. A direct quote from one of our anonymous scientists: "I doubt if the National Radio Astronomy Observatory would have paid anything but the most perfunctory attention to that letter Governor Anaya wrote them last October if Pete hadn't been pushing hard for this one since long before Toney knew it was even being contemplated."

The Governor's communications expert reported that his boss was "elated" when this decision came down. So should we all be.

But when credit is being passed out for pulling this off, maybe the Governor should be grateful enough to allow some share of the thanks to go to those he dislikes so intensely.

Tuesday was the last day on which state legislators are allowed to introduce bills in the 1984 session. The Governor's office, however, may continue to send down messages on proposed legislation till the end of the 30 days appointed for the meeting.

That means we now move into Act II of the Big Circus of 1984. Legislators have shown their hands by the bills they introduced or sponsored. All of those bills are now on the table, and the horse trading can begin.

But it's Act III which really matters. That is the one that takes place in the last 72 hours of the session, when the true powers in both bodies work day and night to decide what new laws we will actually have.

Stayed tuned for reports on those meaningful hours.

Reporter's Round

It occurred to me yesterday with a mild shock that the ski season is just about half over. December and January gone, February and March to come, with anything in April an extra bonus.

I got that same sort of feeling I do some days when two o'clock rolls around on the hill and I haven't completed near my minimum daily requirement of turns.

My normal sociable, patient self is replaced by a driven, bit-chomping crazed skier. There are no friends on a powder day and only a few otherwise. If they can't keep the pace or want to linger in the Broken Ski over lunch, then adios.

Quick! I've got to slam a few midways to get back on schedule and calm myself down.

If you want to get in lots of skiing in a short time, hit Lincoln midway. And now with that sneaky trail cutting through the woods, Lincoln midway is accessible from just about anywhere on the mountain. But duck low for the tree!

It was a great way to escape the crowds during the Christmas surge, although it didn't do any good a couple of weekends ago—when lifts seemed to be breaking down all over the mountain and Lincoln was only carrying skiers on every other chair.

A good year so far. Different from last year and not quite enough of the soft stuff for me, but I've learned quite a bit on the hard and fast bumpy bumps.

Like you don't just come lollygagging into those ski-eating monsters. You don't sit back when setting an edge, and eating your knees is not bad if they have a little whipped cream on them.

But if you can stay on top of the boards and not get slammed by too many deep troughs, the bumps can be a blast. It's kind of a rolling ballet with dips, dives and an occasional pop into the air.

You stand on Sierra Blanca Trail with beginners streaming behind you, starting into the maze. Even though I've done it a hundred times, I still occasionally get that nervous feeling.

Can I really do this? Look at all those bumps. How can I get through that alive?

But then it is a quick push over the edge and you are in them. The moguls. A million different angles, pitches, troughs, peaks, valleys, and the occasional rock to avoid. Once you have pushed off the edge, they and gravity have you. As if on a broiling, rapid-filled river you are streaming

down the hill, taking everything as it comes rushing at you. A million choices within fractions of a second.

I have read about athletes who describe a sort of expanded time awareness during peak moments in their playing careers. They say it is as if everything and everybody around them has slowed down. They alone are fully aware in the swirling chaos surrounding them.

A good run through the moguls can be like that. You find a line, a path snaking its way down the slope. Once into it, you are locked in and your vision extends further down the mountain as you plan two, three, four turns down the hill. The rough, bump and smash of earlier runs is replaced by smooth, accelerating carves. The smooth, instantaneous shift from edge to edge with skis always on the snow. The power of a long hard edge. You are almost one with the moguls; in them, surrounded by them, on them and through them like quicksilver.

But the real speed has been found on the groomed slopes this year. The gang up at Sierra Blanca have been much busier this year running those cats up and down the slopes—turning hard, unforgiving snow into some soft, smooth high-speed cruisers. An early morning blaze down an empty and flat Geronomo can be true bliss.

I only wish they would bring those mogul-mashers to the top of Terrible. I recently read a scathing put-down of the modern bump, or "bimp," as one writer put it: A bimp is a full-sized bump cut into four parts.

The top of Terrible is full of bimps, fangs, ledges, stairsteps and slots that make it just about impossible to get some good carving going. It's more of a flapper dance from edge to edge, with none of the speed and grace that makes skiing the addicting sport it can be.

Speed and grace. A newly addicted skier came to me recently demanding a reason for her incurable enthusiasm. In no other sport that I have tried do you reach such high speeds with such little equipment to separate you from the experience.

And the feel of a clean hard edge cutting through the snow, accelerating you through an arcing turn just in time to pop up for an instant and slice down through the next turn.

"Your skis must swim down the mountain and then you are very fast." World Cup racer Peter Mueller
