Halsnes takes pro ski title

Norwegian Jarle Halsnes overcame a potentially disastrous fall in his semi-final match Sunday to win the slalom race and combined title in the First Interstate Cup professional ski race at Winter Park, Colorado.

The race and accompanying activities showed the excitement Ruidoso is in for when it hosts the U.S. Open pro ski race March 2-4 at Eagle Creek Ski Area.

Halsnes defeated the Argentinian Juan Olivieri in the final match, slipping past American Dave Stapleton in the process for the combined title.

Stapleton, of Aspen, Colorado, won the Super Giant Slalom race on Saturday with six near perfect runs averaging close to 50 miles per hour.

The two races were the highlights of a festive weekend at the Colorado resort that included a celebrity pro-am race, a handicapped skier race and numerous parties.

The pro-am, a silent auction Saturday night and other fund-raisers during the weekend raised more than \$30,000 for Winter Park's Handicapped Skiers Program.

The skiers competed for the \$60,000 purse in elimination head-to-head races on parallel courses. The first

racer to cross the finish line starts a clock. The second racer stops the clock, creating a time differential.

The racers then switch courses and race again. The racer who wins by the greatest time differential advances to the next round.

Halsnes' bid for the championship appeared to be in serious trouble when his ski hooked a racing gate and he fell during his semi-final match against American Cary Adgate. This gave Adgate an almost insurmountable 1.5 second advantage going into the second race.

Adgate, however, fell during the second race, sending Halsnes into the finals against Olivieri.

Olivieri had also overcome a 1.5 second disadvantage in his semi-final match against American Steve Bounous. After falling in his first run, Olivieri thrilled the crowd with a terrific run that was 1.65 seconds faster than Bounous.

Halsnes defeated Olivieri by almost half a second in the first run and held on in spite of admitted weariness during the second run to claim the slalom championship.

Halsnes had competed in the demanding Super Giant Slalom competition the day before and said he felt tired early Sunday. He was strong enough, however, to win the slalom.

"I had some power left in my body, so I used it," said the six-foot Norwegian. "I had a little luck in my pocket also."

His fifth-place finish in the Super Giant Slalom Saturday and the slalom victory Sunday gave him the combined title and \$7,400 for the weekend. His slalom victory gave him just enough points to beat Stapleton, the Super Giant Slalom winner and last year's combined champion. Stapleton earned \$4,400 for his Super Giant Slalom victory.

The Super Giant Slalom is a hybrid race of the giant slalom and the downhill. Racers still reach speeds of more than 50 miles per hour, but must make turns similar to giant slalom. Saturday's race was the first dual super giant slalom in the world. World Cup racers, who race against the clock rather than head-to-head, have competed in the super giant slalom this year.

Firemen discuss tax, radio

Representatives from area fire departments discussed four main points of common interest at a meeting Saturday. They concentrated on a fire tax election proposal and a county radio system.

During this second meeting of the Association of Fire Departments of Lincoln County, members also chose D. A. Kincaid as head of the group. Kincaid is assistant chief of the Bonito Fire Department.

About \$58,000 per year for five years could go to six rural fire districts in Lincoln County if voters approve an excise tax, said Roger Riley. He is director of the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department and was representing Glencoe-Palo Verde Fire District. Riley was informal chairman of the meeting.

Firefighters form the county association to increase funding possibilities and cooperation for departments. One item that would help the departments, the men agreed, is a county fire and rescue radio repeater system.

A frequency with powerful base stations at Carrizozo, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs could cut response time and aid departments when they called others to back them.

Representatives from the departments were concerned about how proceeds from an excise tax would be divided between departments, if voters approved one. Other departments represented at the meeting were Bonito, Hondo Valley and Fort Stanton.

County voters who live outside towns would decide whether to pass such an excise tax, and rural departments would get the money from it, Riley said.

He plans to propose the quarter-cent tax to county commissioners for placement on a ballot soon. Voters in other New Mexico counties have overwhelmingly approved similar taxes, it was reported.

Mayor stays neutral

"I am endorsing no one candidate because I have to work with any of the six that are elected," announced Mayor George White last week.

The mayor, who will have a new council to work with soon after the March 6 municipal election, said he wants to start with a feeling of cooperation "so we can do great things for the village with the two working as a team."

He added that he wanted the public to know he would be open and aboveboard in all decisions involving the village council and the mayor.

If and when the pre-meeting study sessions are continued, White added, he hopes they will take place in a room big enough to accommodate any and all interested persons. He noted that the decision on the study sessions will be up to the council.

The mayor said his prime objective in the coming weeks was to stay free of any and all politics involved with the election. He did not rule out indicating a preference to voters who might ask his opinion on the candidates, however.

"I was surprised that there were that many," said White of the 21 contestants for the six council seats. He said he was surprised also at the diversity of backgrounds of candidates, and noted there were several office-seekers he had not met.

The mayor acknowledged concern about voters having such a large

number to choose from, "unless the candidates get out and make themselves known."

He said he did not know whether any candidate forums were planned, but that he hoped there would be one or more.

Asked whether he expected any adjustment problems with the new council, the mayor said he planned to have the New Mexico Municipal League conduct a school to show what the council's duties were.

White said he hoped to brief new council members on current activities of the village and goals for the coming year at the same time.

The mayor gave a rundown on those activities:

•20 acres of water rights acquired last year have been protested.

•Acquisition of right of way from Carrizo Canyon Road to the Grindstone dam project is proceeding well. (The dam project itself is on hold until the State Engineer rules on the valley farmers' protest.)

•Acquisition of easements for the Ponderosa Heights sewer project is also going well. Only 20 easements need to be acquired before construction bids can be called, White said.

•The Alto Crest/Snowflake Ridge special assessment sewer district is going to bid now.

•All necessary land has been acquired for the Bog Springs road to the new high school. \$190,000 county-

financed project). The road is being built, with sub-base and drainage expected to be complete within two months.

•The new Ruidoso police-courts complex (\$780,000 project) is nearly complete.

•Plans have been ordered for a new fire station on the west side of the airport off Highway 37. A new pumper truck is to be purchased.

•Updating of a comprehensive plan for Ruidoso is under way, with the traffic section 75 percent complete.

White pointed to the improved access from Highway 70 to Gavilan Canyon Road—a step toward making Gavilan Canyon a viable bypass route—as "a feather in our cap." He gave State Senator Charlie Lee credit for working to get the road into the state highway system.

Regarding another project under consideration by the village—a trash compactor and transfer system—Mayor White said he is opposed to locating the compactor at the old sewer plant site.

As far as working with the new council, the mayor is optimistic the governing of the village can continue without a hitch.

"I think they can dig right in—I really believe this," he said.

When 21 people sign up to run for council, it shows great interest, he said.

"And the interest should lead to the betterment of the village."

Schools superintendent Sid Miller optimistic about Tuesday election

Ruidoso Municipal Schools Superintendent Sid Miller thinks voters will pass two monetary proposals Tuesday.

"I'm very confident people will support schools," he said. "I really believe this will pass."

The two proposals include extending a two-mill levy for three years and approving a million-dollar bond issue.

"This will not raise anybody's taxes," Miller stated, because assessed valuations are expected to continue to increase.

Passage of the two proposals will

help the district meet requirements for obtaining state capital outlay funds.

Miller urged registered voters living within the school district to cast ballots between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. at Ruidoso High School. They can use either parking lot, since voting will be conducted in the gym lobby.

The district includes Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Glencoe and other areas. It does not include Alto.

The superintendent expects hundreds of people to vote tomorrow. The usual turnout in a school election is about 800, he said.

Miller praised district administrators, teachers and employees for supporting the two issues by spreading information, rather than

taking a "hard-sell" approach. The district's new high school is in phase III of construction, which should be complete this spring.

Phase IV, which the proposed bond would help fund, includes a fine arts facility, Miller said. Activities in the facility could include music and painting classes.

The new school is being built so that it can be expanded to serve a steadily rising number of students. About 500 residents now attend Ruidoso High School.

Classrooms in the new building can accommodate 750 students as soon as it opens. When that limit is reached, more classrooms can be added. The central core is designed to serve up to 1,200 students.

Carrizozo to vote on school bonds, levy

The Carrizozo Board of Education has called for a bond issue and Capital Improvements Tax Election on Tuesday, February 7.

The board's tax financing program includes a maximum of \$160,000 in general obligation bonds and a two-mill tax on all property, expected to raise about \$55,000 from local and state sources each year for three

years. Since 1981, district improvements include remodeling the high school and elementary school, adding a library and building a vocational agriculture complex.

The board proposes to reduce current operating costs with building improvements including insulating all

buildings and adding some vestibule entrances.

Other planned expenditures include matching funds to buy classroom computers and vocational equipment.

The superintendent's office at 800 D Avenue in Carrizozo has been designated as the consolidated precinct for the election. Voting will take place between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Stapleton survived a near fall Friday and overcame a strong challenge from Edwin Halsnes (Jarle's younger brother) in the semi-final match to win the competition.

Stapleton, who had set the pace during qualifications earlier in the week, beat Austrian Ewald Zirblsegger by a comfortable 620 seconds in their first race. But during the second race, Stapleton came off the last six-foot pro bump on the backs of his skis and appeared to roll to his right side.

Somehow, the American racer used his strength to move around the final two gates while pulling himself out of the fall and back into a tuck position at the finish.

In the semi-final match, Edwin Halsnes edged out Stapleton for the first time all week by a mere .123 seconds. The second run looked like another dead heat, but Stapleton pulled away in the bottom of the course to win by nearly half a second.

Stapleton then went on to defeat American Mack Lyons in both runs of

the championship match to claim the super giant slalom title.

Stapleton and Jarle Halsnes also led their teams to victory in the Pro Handicap Race and the Celebrity Pro-am race.

Stapleton, racing on one ski with an outrigger, combined with his three handicapped teammates to win that race. Halsnes and his three amateur teammates won the celebrity pro-am.

Also competing in the pro-am were Richard Dean Anderson, star of "Emerald Point," "Fame" television star Cynthia Gibb, "Dallas" star Chris Atkins, "Hill Street Blues" performer Ed Marinaro, "Tattletales" host Bert Convy and other celebrities.

The \$70,000 purse for the upcoming U.S. Open will make it the world's richest ski race and should attract the best professional skiers in the world for slalom and giant slalom races.

Halsnes had to run the demanding slalom course 10 times before claiming the championship from a field of racers representing nine different nations.

Special Olympics a special memory

Standing on top of the slope, chubby-cheeked Julie readies herself for the slalom course laid out before her. A crowd of cheering skiers behind her, awaiting their turn at the course, shout words of encouragement.

At the signal, she pushes herself forward with chin-high ski poles. A smile breaks across her face, and then it becomes a laugh as she picks up speed through the racing gates. Then one of her skis sneaks across the other, causing her to fall, but she only laughs harder.

Helping arms from her instructor and other volunteers reach to help her up. She brushes herself off, takes a firm grasp on her poles, and is off again. As she approaches the finish line, spectators shout hearteningly. She crosses the line, jubilantly raising her arms, and falls into welcoming hands.

Julie is special. She is a Special Olympian.

Thursday, the second day of skiing for 125 Special Olympians from across southern New Mexico, included competitions in downhill, slalom and giant slalom alpine skiing; and

100-meter, one-kilometer and three-kilometer cross-country skiing. The alpine and shorter distance cross-country events were held at Eagle Creek Ski Area, and the long distance cross-country events were at Ski Cloudcroft ski area.

During the day, Olympians were served breakfast by the Pilot and Sertoma Clubs, lunch by the Noon Lions Club and dinner by the Ruidoso Woman's Club. Hot cocoa was served Thursday by the high school student council. The day of skiing was followed by dinner and dancing at the White Mountain School cafeteria. The event ended with a Friday morning breakfast served by the Rotary Club.

Awards ceremonies Thursday afternoon included the presentation of special awards to athletes and volunteers.

According to Special Olympics Executive Director Penny Zannes, the Games were successful.

"It went real well," she said. "I saw a lot of people having fun. I know I had fun."

Zannes said 21 athletes will be chosen from the participants to go to the International Olympic Games to be held next year at Park City, Utah. She said the choice will not be easy.

"I saw a lot of progress today from

a lot of people. They did some real good races today," she said.

Next year will be the fourth year of winter games at Eagle Creek.

"We'll do it next year for sure," Zannes said. "We'll be back."

Jerry Shaw seeks village council seat

Jerry Shaw has announced her candidacy for a position on the Ruidoso village council.

She has been the publisher of Best Bet magazine for six years. She has lived in Ruidoso since 1976, and also lived here three years in the 1960s. She and her husband, Dick, have two grown daughters.

Shaw formerly worked for The Ruidoso News and the Roswell Record as a reporter. She was an inventory control manager for Montgomery Ward in Texas and Florida.

She was asked why she is running for a council seat.

"I do feel that a woman is needed on the council because we have a large number of women in business here—and they could be better represented with a woman on the council," she said.

Shaw said water is the most important issue facing the village, pointing out the village must have water before it can have growth. The village must strive constantly for more water

rights, she stated. She also is interested in parks and recreation. She said she would like to see the Parks and Recreation Department grow—with increased use of and improvements to existing facilities.

Shaw noted that activities not now under the parks and rec department could be handled by it—such as Christmas decorations for the village. She favors more funding for the department.

Traffic control in midtown is another concern of Shaw's. She said she supported the commercial rezoning of El Paso Street because it gives the central business district a place to grow, so it does not become blighted as it has in some cities.

She said she envisions a river development similar to that in San Antonio, Texas, though on a smaller scale.

One more aspect of the midtown traffic situation she mentioned was seeking a way for people to cross the

William L. Karn announces for council

William L. "Bill" Karn has announced his candidacy for a position on the Ruidoso village council.

He has been a permanent resident of the village for 10 years, but his family has owned land and a home here for 29 years. He is married; his wife's name is Carol.

Karn's occupations are oil and gas leasing and construction. He graduated from New Mexico Military Institute and the University of Texas at El Paso. His college degree is in psychology.

Asked why he is seeking the councilman's job, Karn said he feels the village can develop a program that can handle annexations and water in a better way than the Grindstone annexation was handled.

He said that when an annexation is considered, records of historical water use within the village limits must be studied so a "water profile" can be developed. Then, based on land use in the annexation, a program can be developed to allow the development to pay for itself, water-wise.

Karn mentioned utility expansion charges, meter tap and rental fees

and water rates—tailored to the annexation—as potential revenue sources. He indicated programs can be worked out that would be workable for developers and homebuyers. He noted that water rights are the

only major service not paid for by developers now. But he pointed out that requiring developers to bring water rights in with their annexations would not work if water rights owners are not willing to sell.

Karn said he would like to see interest and reserve fund monies from the Grindstone dam project put in rollover accounts to earn revenue that could be applied to water rights purchases.

He summed up his view of the major campaign issues as: making sure that Ruidoso has continued growth and development; setting a water policy for annexations; and continuing to purchase water rights.

"As a landowner, I just feel I have an interest in the village and how well it does economically," he said.

Karn said he has attended almost every regular and special village council and Planning and Zoning Commission meeting the past four and a half years. He is a member of the village water board and is chairman of the Grindstone Dam Oversight Committee.

The half-dozen men at the meeting also discussed a feasibility study for a state fire academy, and federal safety regulations.

The state Legislature has okayed a study for establishing a firefighters' school, said Riley.

Governor Toney Anaya must sign the bill before any study could begin. Fort Stanton Fire Chief Barney Mancha objected to some of the federal safety regulations. He believes rules the Occupational Safety and Health Administration presented may be too time-

consuming or expensive for volunteers to meet.

Firefighters also discussed creating a list of all available manpower, equipment and water sources in fire districts in the county.

With such an inventory, said Riley, a department with enough people to fight a fire could quickly find one that could lend specific apparatus, such as a tanker. One with enough equipment could call for more firefighters.

The March meeting is planned at Bonito. A disaster management class is also planned March 6-7 for the area.

Coffee for council hopefuls

The Ruidoso Woman's Club will host a coffee for village council candidates and the public at 2 p.m. Wednesday, February 8, at the Woman's Club Building on Evergreen Road.

Ruidoso girls defeated twice, lose ground in district race

The Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team received a serious blow to their hopes of a high regular season district finish when the Warriors lost to Cobre and Silver City over the weekend.

Ruidoso, now 1-4 in district 3-AAA play and 6-12 overall, lost a 43-33 decision to visiting Cobre Friday night. Saturday the Warriors traveled to Silver City and dropped a 65-45 decision to the Colts.

Against Cobre, a poor third quarter proved fatal for Ruidoso.


But Geyer feels the Warriors are still in the district regular season race, particularly because of Deming's 62-61 loss to Hot Springs Friday night.

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Lee proposes tax cut as Legislature nears half way point

Although the New Mexico House of Representatives approved a \$79 million tax increase last week to help fund the \$1.347 billion state budget it passed, a tax hike this year is far from assured, according to State Senator Charlie Lee.

A bill co-sponsored by Lee and introduced Tuesday would, in fact, reduce taxes. The gross receipts and compensating (use) taxes, would decrease by 0.25 percent, and personal income taxes would be cut by 10 percent. Corporate income taxes would drop five percent.

Another provision in the bill would reduce the income tax rebate for passed-on gross receipts tax on food and medical-dental expenses, from \$45 to \$20 per exemption for the food rebate and from \$7.50 to \$3.50 for the medical-dental.

Lee said he is optimistic about

chances for passage of the bill, stating legislators are feeling pressure from their constituents not to increase taxes.

"People want to see government operate within its means," Lee commented.

With the proposed decrease in tax revenue, adequate funds still would be available to fund state government at current spending levels and provide a five percent salary increase for state workers, Lee said.

He believes the measure would help speed up New Mexico's economic recovery and "set a downward trend as far as taxation."

If nothing else, Lee's bill and the House tax bill could "balance themselves out," the senator noted, leaving current tax rates unchanged.

"If a lot of people come forward" to voice opposition to a tax increase or support for a tax decrease, chances are good Senate Bill 154 will gain enough support for passage, Lee

predicted. Other legislation heard last week that will have a direct impact on New Mexicans' pocketbooks was a bill to lower natural gas prices. A recent Public Service Commission report revealed the state's current gas price control law results in higher prices being paid by New Mexicans than by out-of-state users.

Legislation to equalize the gas prices was passed by the House Appropriations and Finance Committee last week, Representative Mickey McGuire reported.

The bill covers "an extremely difficult issue," McGuire stated. Although short-term effects of the bill appear beneficial for New Mexico natural gas users, he indicated, the longer term impact could be a negative one.

McGuire, who voted against the bill in committee, fears the tighter price controls may force producers to sell more gas out of state, resulting in a

gas supply shortage within the state. McGuire said he and other committee members reserved the right to reverse their votes on this measure when it is presented to the full House. He plans to study the issue further before reaching a decision on his final vote.

Many of the more than 300 House bills introduced this session still await action by the Appropriations and Finance Committee. McGuire said most of the monetary bills were heard and tabled last week, so the appropriations requests could be totaled and considered in light of available revenue.

"Far more bills can be introduced than can be funded," McGuire commented. Legislators, therefore, must set priorities for projects they believe deserve funding.

McGuire listed his priorities as education, assistance for parents with severely handicapped children, day care centers, community corrections

programs and Capital Outlay for colleges and universities.

A few bills have made it through one of the full chambers thus far in this session.

The House passed two measures that would again provide for a referendum on allowing extended terms for state and county elected officials. The measure would allow state officials to serve two consecutive four-year terms and county officials to serve four consecutive two-year terms.

McGuire said he favored the bill this year after voting for its defeat last year. He believes voters should have the opportunity to keep a good official in office if they choose.

The Senate passed a bill reducing the hours that alcohol may be served at bars and other liquor establishments, changing serving hours from 7 a.m. until 2 a.m. to 10 a.m. through 1 a.m.

The bill also allows buyers of a

business previously owning a liquor license to have first priority in obtaining a new license when the licenses revert to state ownership in 1991.

Senator Lee said he voted for the bill but did not favor the reduced serving hours. Lee said he doubted the necessity of disallowing liquor sales before ten in the morning.

One topic that will not come up in the Legislature this year is Gavilan Canyon Road. Senator Lee said he did not introduce a bill to put the road on the state highway system because the Highway department and Lincoln County have already agreed to an exchange that would do just that.

Although legislators have passed the halfway point in the current 30-day session, few bills have yet made it out of committee to the House or Senate floor. That activity as well as committee debate on the more controversial subjects of the sessions should pick up this week.

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
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
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The Dreamer

Happy Birthday To
A Dyed-In-The-Wool Okie.
This will reach you on February 6,
the birthday of two true-blue
Americans: Mrs. Jeanne Hamm, the
darling of the Hollywood Post office;
and Ronald Wilson Reagan, fortieth
president of the United States.

Let us go over a little sketch of
Jeanne first.
Jeanne was born February 6, 1925

In 1809 the Cherokees in the

Thomas Jefferson that they would
like to remove to hunting grounds
west of the Mississippi. By 1834 the
northern section of Texas and what is
now Oklahoma was set aside as Indian
Territory for possession of five
southern tribes: Cherokees, Creeks,
Seminoles, Choctaws and
Chickasaws.

By treaties of 1866 the Cherokees
gave the United States permission to
settle other Indians in this territory,
with the result that many western and
southwestern tribes made their
homes there.

About nearly two million acres of
good farm land remained unassigned,
and many white folks wanted to
settle there. Finally this tract was
purchased from the Creeks and
Seminoles.

The Encyclopedia Britannica says:
"Soon after the purchase, President
Benjamin Harrison issued a pro-
clamation that this land would be
open to settlement at 12 o'clock noon,
on April 22, 1889. At that hour, no less
than 20,000 were on the border; and
when the signal was given, there en-
sued a remarkably spectacular race
for homes."

excited host was Jeanne's granddad,
young Robert Briscoe, mounted on his
favorite horse, who catching the spirit
of the occasion, was chomping the bit,
rearing and trembling, eager to be
off.

The oldest man ever to hold the
presidency, at seventy-three today, is

Ronald Wilson Reagan, our fortieth
president, has stumbled upon this

He is holding down the toughest job
in the world during not so easy times

presidents to be shot and live; has
laughed the whole thing off, even
though the bullet came within an inch
of his heart; and shows less wear and
tear than any president, after more
than three years, even seems to

Editorial

Emotion aside, the problem of what to do about the drunken driving problem in New Mexico and America is a very complicated one.

The state Legislature is tackling the DWI issue again this session, and it is hoped the lawmakers' efforts to tighten up drunken-driving laws will succeed.

As an example of the complexity of the issue, an amendment approved by the House Judiciary Committee would allow a multiple-DWI offender to drive a moped or small motorcycle. This would allow the offender to get to work and back, supporters argued, and endanger the motorcyclist more than others if he or she were DWI on the bike.

Others countered with the argument that a 150-pound person on a 100-pound motorcycle becomes a 250-pound projectile.

Another section of the bill gives stricter penalties for DWI offenders under age 18. Also addressed in the bill is the blood-alcohol level at which DWI is "declared" by the court—0.10 percent, compared to the present 0.15 percent. The bill also prohibits plea bargaining with a level of 0.10 percent or higher.

The main bill, given a "do pass" recommendation by the Judiciary Committee, has gone to the House floor. We support its passage through both houses of the Legislature, and we commend the legislators for diligently tackling this difficult issue.—TP

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—It's a classic conflict. You make a move to help one part of the economy, and you end up hurting another.

So what do you do? Which one should give way so the other can flourish?

Current example before the Legislature has the state's longtime support, the oil and gas industry, on one side and the new ethanol-methanol industry on the other.

The state gave temporary tax advantages to the fledgling industry, which uses grain grown by our farmers to produce the ethanol-methanol used as a supplement to enhance the octane rating of gasoline. Because of its present tax advantage, the product, usually designated "supreme unleaded" or something similar to that, can be sold at the pump at a price a few cents lower than ordinary gasoline.

What caught everybody by surprise, it would seem, is the way this new industry took off.

It was as though everything was in place just as the special tax arrangements became available.

Farmers, of course, were already growing the grain. But what is unusual in a situation of this kind is that planning had been done and financing obtained for plants that quickly went on line.

As a result, sales of ordinary gasoline took a dive. Representatives of that industry credit the new product, totally exempt from state gasoline taxes, for having taken between 8 and 10 percent of the fuel business away from them.

Naturally enough, they cried foul, largely on the grounds that they are already doing poorly and can't stand any further blows. What's more, they pointed out how much that dispensation from taxes is costing the state's road fund, used to build and repair highways.

The first noises they made led Governor Anaya to say he was planning to cut out the exemption from these taxes in one fell swoop, instead of over a period of years as the law presently calls for.

When it was forcefully pointed out to him that promises had been made to the people in the new industry, who had proceeded to borrow money for the construction of plants on the basis of the promises, he backed down.

Proponents of the present arrangement also impressed the Governor (or at least his emissary, Bob McNeill) with a direct question: What will other industries looking at New Mexico say if you wench on your commitments to us?

That's where things stood till the Legislature came to town.

One of the first bills put in for consideration, House Bill 10, from Rep. Brent Westmoreland of Las Cruces, calls for changing the tax arrangement on the new fuel to what some legislators say they thought they were voting for last time. It would exempt from state taxes only that 10 percent of the product pumped into cars and trucks which is grain alcohol. The portion of the mixture which is actually gasoline—90 percent of the product—would be subject to regular taxes.

A hearing on the bill had to be held in the House chamber because no ordinary committee room could hold the crowd from the two sides which wanted to be heard.

Proponents of the new industry, particularly House Minority Leader Hoyt Pattison and Senator Caleb Chandler, credited with talking the Governor into dropping his plans on the topic originally, were highly vocal in their reminders that changing the rules of the game after the starting whistle has blown is not normally considered fair.

Pete Hanagan from the Oil and Gas Association and various representatives of refineries told the sad story of their industry.

What could possibly result is a bill which will "grandfather in" those ethanol-methanol producing plants already in operation here, but change the arrangement for any still to be developed.

When two industries, both of which contribute to the good of the state, clash head on, it's time to make a Solomonic decision.

BOTH SIDES OF THE COIN
On January 2, 1984, the Planning & Zoning Commission held a hearing on the proposal that the old sewer plant area use be changed to permit the installation of the proposed solid waste transfer system.

Several opponents were on hand to protest and their comments were reported in detail in The Ruidoso News of January 5, 1984.

The comments of an important speaker at that same meeting were completely ignored by The News.

Mr. Phillip Weston, Head of the Solid Waste Management of the Environmental Improvement Division of the State of New Mexico, appeared before the Commission and spoke in behalf of the solid waste transfer system. A portion of his comments, as taken from the tape transmission made at the time he spoke, are as follows:

"First, of all, the idea of the transfer system is very very good. It would be the (first) one, if you start to work on it, in the State. Bernalillo County is currently still working to get the land for their system"

"I have seen other transfer systems in work and I know they are not odorless when operated properly. The fly problem is almost non-existent. The idea of trucks making three or four trips a day out there (to the present land fill site) 26 miles one way is awfully expensive. Your trucks are not designed to run that way and do that kind of distance is a kind of drain on them. They are only for in-town use and that is how they are sold"

"The other things you were worried about were "blowing" and odor. Litter, once it is contained in a system like this, is going straight into the pit. There is no wind going in-you have no problems with litter."

E-Z PAC—"I am familiar with them and I am familiar with most of the different transfer systems. They are very good systems - E-Z-PAC is one of the better ones and I understand they have quite a few systems in operation across the nation."

"I know that I am probably the person that Judy Miller talked to on the telephone and I did not want to mislead her about the odor problem, that there can be odor problems. Most of the opinion against this type of system stems from New Mexico having a lot of modified land fills, which are very close to being OPEN DUMPS."

"Ruidoso is one of the cleanest cities we have in the state. Santa Fe is one of the dirtiest. People here are much more aware of what is going on."

"You can go downtown Chicago or downtown Dallas and find these transfer systems and you would never know they were there. Most of them look very, very, nice." The system works well."

As an expert in the field of Solid Waste Management I think that Mr. Weston's comments and recommendations are important and it is regrettable that both sides of the issue were not reported in the NEWS article. Only by knowing both sides of an issue can the public make a choice when an important decision is about to be made - such as we have before us at this time.

On the Village Beat

Horseplayers will be presented with a new challenge at Ruidoso Downs Race Track this season if a proposed type of wagering is approved by the State Racing Commission.

The bet is called a "Pic 6," and Ruidoso-Sunland general manager Don "Curly" Smith explained it to me over the phone last week.

Six consecutive races are designated for the Pic 6. The bettor must pick the winners of all six to cash his ticket.

Curly said the fifth through the 10th races probably would be the Pic 6 races at Ruidoso Downs.

The wager is used at racetracks on both coasts, including quarter horse, thoroughbred and harness racing tracks in California. It is very popular with the betting public, according to Smith.

He said that when the Big Q was discontinued at Ruidoso Downs, bettors asked about the possibility of a Pic 6. Ruidoso-Sunland studied the idea and decided to request it.

"We're going to request it on a trial basis," Curly said.

One other thing he mentioned that might be of interest to bettors: the Pic 6 payoff is generally much larger than the trifecta payoff.

As you may have heard, Ruidoso-Sunland is studying expansion of the running surface at Ruidoso Downs from five furlongs to seven furlongs (seven-eighths of a mile). But the project definitely will not be undertaken this spring, said Smith.

Expansion of the track is complicated by the fact it would require crossing of the Rio Ruidoso twice. This means federal, state and local agencies must be consulted.

But Boyle Engineering of Albuquerque is working on it, and Curly said he hopes a decision on the project will be reached in 60 to 90 days.

"We're proceeding one step at a time," said Smith. He noted that work would have to be started the day after Labor Day in order to have the expansion completed for the 1986 season.

The biggest change from the expansion would be the radius of turns, Curly explained. Ruidoso Downs now has what are known in the racing industry as "bulging turns."

Some trainers do not like such tight turns, said Smith, and they take their thoroughbreds to tracks in Louisiana, Arkansas and Nebraska instead of racing them here.

Those trainers who have heard about the proposed expansion at Ruidoso Downs are excited about it, Curly noted.

I asked him whether the project meant an increased emphasis on thoroughbred racing at Ruidoso Downs.

But he asked me to make it clear that quarter horse racing here would benefit just as much as thoroughbred racing.

The reason is that the present 550-yard strip would be used exclusively by quarter horses. The new homestretch of the seven-furlong circuit would parallel that strip.

This would eliminate the gradual dip that exists now where the quarter horse strip joins the main track.

"I'm very enthused about it," said Curly of the expansion. He sees it as a way to bring thoroughbred horse racing here up to the status already enjoyed by quarter horse racing—"the best in the world."

"I see nothing but pluses for Ruidoso Downs as a racetrack," he added.

One improvement that will be ready for the coming season is a wing of eight new barns. Pads for the structures are being laid now, and the walls will be up by the end of March.

"I think that they're going to be the nicest stalls ever built in the state of New Mexico," said Curly.

Racing has been making news statewide lately, with San Juan Downs in Farmington apparently hoping to have a spring race meet and the State Fair asking for five more racing days this fall and proposing a 60-day spring meet for the future.

Curly didn't seem too concerned about the 24-day meet at Farmington. He pointed out that city is a long way from our end of the state, and said the San Juan track could serve as a place for horses to prep for the northern tracks—Santa Fe and Raton.

He did express concern over the proposed spring State Fair meet, because of the competition for good horses. The meet would coincide with Sunland Park's spring campaign.

"If we overlap too much it would not be beneficial for all of us," he said.

Things are going well this spring at Sunland, he indicated, with attendance up and the handle holding its own.

Smith was excited when we talked Friday, because that was the day of the season's first race for two-year-old quarter horses.

"We may have a future All-American Futurity winter running today," he said.

Curly Smith's enthusiasm is infectious.

When he talks about the ambitious plans for Ruidoso Downs (the expansion project may cost \$2.5 million), it is easy to fit the racetrack into the vision we all share of a growing, prosperous Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

Wharf specialty-catfish

"What this place offers is a very affordable price plus some atmosphere," said Doug Siddens, owner of the newly opened Wingfield's Wharf. "Our specialty is catfish."

The restaurant, at 2811 Sudderth Drive, features several selections of catfish, shrimp, oyster and chicken entrees on the menu.

The Wharf is located in the historical Wingfield home, whose former owners came to Ruidoso in 1884. The house dates back to 1929, according to the Ruidoso News article covering the back of the menus at the restaurant.

"This is the oldest residence in Ruidoso," said Siddens. "Ruidoso doesn't have much history preserved. It's nice to preserve some of that history."

The restaurant is decorated with plants and old farm implements. The wooden floors and polished staircase banister give the restaurant an atmosphere of warmth. According to Siddens, articles used to decorate the restaurant were donated by the Wingfield family; Dean and Evelyn Fite; Wayne and Evelyn Estes; and Buck and Claudine Morrison.

The restaurant has been very successful since opening on January 17,

according to Siddens. "They're standing in line to get in here," Siddens said. "We have a superb product. It has been excellent from day one."

"Our biggest complaint is that they get too much to eat. I can handle that kind of complaint," he said, smiling. Siddens said he is planning to open another seven similar restaurants in New Mexico within the next two years. He said each of the future restaurants also will be located in a historical building.

The restaurant also offers catering services, according to manager John Billhymer. Billhymer said he has a lifetime of restaurant experience and once catered for a group of 10,000 people.

"We're lucky to have him," Siddens said.

The restaurant also has a dining room capable of handling parties of up to 24 people. The Wharf will begin serving beer and wine in early February. Siddens said they will be painting the outside of the building and landscaping in the spring.


The restaurant is open every day from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Siddens said reservations are highly suggested. The phone number is 257-2624.

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
