## Council buys compactor

Ruidoso apparently will be getting a trash compactor/transfer system—following Tuesday's village council decision to purchase the machinery—but its site remains unclear.

The council—by a 3-1 vote—accepted the only bid on a modular push-pit compactor and a 75-cubic yard transfer trailer. The \$172,677 bid was made by Border Machinery of El Paso, Texas.

Prior to the vote, councilman Don Dale (the lone dissenter) asked village manager Jim Hine if the village had the money to pay for the system. Hine replied that it did not.

Councilman Al Junge proceeded to explain, however, that the system can be financed at around \$4,850 a month (including \$60,000 cost of a tractor to pull the trailer), with trash collection fees covering that obligation.

Junge said Wednesday other projected expenses—\$15,000 for a compactor building cover, \$5,000 for concrete work and \$10,000 for utility hookups—can be paid from sanitation department revenues as needed. A \$20,000 flatbed truck to complete the system has been purchased already.

Dale opposed the purchase on the grounds that if the incoming council did not want the compactor, it still would have \$172,000 in equipment. He said he was not against the system if it would save the village money.

Junge said the village administration had been thinking about a transfer system for four years, and that zoning for the preferred site (the old sewer plant) had been under study since December.

Last week, the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) tabled action on zoning the old sewer plant site for industrial use. P&Z wanted to consider all of the 40 acres of village-owned property in the area, which includes the hot mix plant and municipal barn.

for possible industrial zoning.

"The P&Z's frustrated when they have a zoning change jammed down their throats," P&Z chairman Greg Masters told the council.

Councilman Benny Coulston pointed out the litter problem on the road to the Fort Stanton Mesa landfill. He noted that the problem would be alleviated if people could take trash to the compactor in town.

Councilman Frank Sayner amended his motion to accept the bid, stipulating that the machinery not be delivered for 90 days, so a site could be determined. Masters suggested the council and P&Z collaborate on groundwork for a site.

Masters had reiterated the three potential sites chosen by P&Z: an unused water treatment plant on Hull Road; adjacent to or near village hall; the old sewer plant.

Airplane fuel was another topic of discussion Tuesday. Assistant village manager Frank Potter recommended acceptance of a bid from Pride Refinery, at \$1.47 per gallon on aviation gas and \$997.50 per gallon on jet fuel. The bid was the only one received after a final change in specifications.

Potter acknowledged that a stipulation the supplier carry \$30 million in liability insurance had ruled out local suppliers. He and airport manager Tim Morris pointed out, however, that such a requirement was justified. "This is one of those areas where you get sued for more than a half million (a municipality's statutory liability limit)," Potter told the council.

Dale expressed concern over there being only one bid, however, and moved that action be tabled so council members and village attorney Lee Huckstep could review the specifications. The motion passed unanimously, and Huckstep was instructed to give a report before the next council meeting.

Junge asked Potter to prepare a report on councilmen's personal liability and exposure.

In other business, the council:

—Approved a call for bids on part of the pipeline for the Grindstone dam project, after Potter noted that sewer work was under way in the Grindstone Development, and laying pipe now would save tearing up streets later.

—Heard Potter report that widening Highway 37 to four-lane from Bennett's to Ski Run Road had been moved back a year by the State Highway Department—to 1988-89. "This is really serious to the Ruidoso area," said Potter, who suggested the council get involved.

—Heard Potter report that design work on the Grindstone dam project was complete and under review by the State Engineer. He noted a protest by Carlsbad Irrigation District was still pending and had to be resolved before construction could start. He said it would take 45 days to bid the dam and 90 days to build it, and that the project could be accomplished this summer if started soon enough.

—Instructed Potter, at Coulston's request, to estimate the cost in damage to village streets if the village did not build a road from Carrizo Canyon to the dam site.

—Approved a proposed lease of Ruidoso Municipal Schools land for a village recreation complex near the White Mountain schools. Sayner and Junge were optimistic the school board would approve the lease with the most recent changes. Those changes clarified parking, set the hour to begin use at 4 p.m., and defined which improvements could be removed if the complex were dismantled.

—Heard Hine give an update on the Ponderosa Heights sewer project. He said all but 18 easements have been acquired, and that the village attorney had been instructed to start condemnation proceedings on those.

—Heard Mayor George White announce the dedication of the police

courts complex, set for 2 p.m. Friday, February 24.

—Heard White report on his trip to Santa Fe to hear Secretary of the Interior William Clark. White said Clark was non-committal on the proposed Fort Stanton mesa airport. But the mayor said he had been assured of support by congressman Manuel Lujan, who told him he would start some action and even talk to President Reagan if necessary.

—Approved the low bid on 75 1.5-yard dumpsters and 25 three-yard dumpsters from Richardson Sunbelt Supply at \$19,700.

—Denied request from Dr. H. F. Boggiano to change name of Corte Del Sol Street to Boggiano Street.

—Approved items previously approved by P&Z, with some discussion of rezoning of 5.72 acres of Havens Tract for Bill McCarty Construction from R-3 (mobile homes) to industrial. The land is near the old sewer plant, but it was noted again it had had continuous industrial use since the 1960s.

—Heard Coulston invite them to his oldest daughter's wedding a week from Saturday in Odessa, Texas.


—Heard Coulston report the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority had approved zoning of Carrizo Canyon and set Gavilan Canyon as the next area to be zoned by the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission.

—Heard Junge announce the Republican Party county meeting set for 1:30 p.m. Saturday at village hall.

—Heard White read a letter from Ruidoso fireman Jesse Reynolds and Danny Garcia commending fire superintendent Virgil Reynolds.

—Heard White read a county commissioners' resolution of congratulations to Ruidoso for hosting the U.S. Open pro ski race.

—Heard Coulston suggest the Lodgers' Tax Committee study the possibility of spending council-allocated money on billboards promoting Ruidoso.

## Hn-Zhu-Ne award limited

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board of directors voted Wednesday to award only remodeled buildings in this year's Hn Zhu Ne competition.

According to Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth, the committee last year made awards in two categories: remodeled buildings and new buildings.

Discussion on the topic began with Hn-Zhu-Ne Committee chairperson Sue Snidow voicing the committee's

troubles in choosing between buildings of varied sizes. She said it was hard to consider smaller businesses in the face of larger, more costly buildings constructed by institutions.

Board member Morgan Clough said he was concerned for the smaller businessman who comes to Ruidoso and remodels an existing building, but he agreed that the village needs the new construction of larger concerns.

After discussing the origins of the

award, the board voted to award only remodeled businesses. The award will be made from the results of Chamber members' votes on a ballot listing the committee's nominees.

In other business, the board:

—Heard a report from Joan Bailey on the Monday, February 6, meeting of the Retail Merchants Committee.

—Heard a report from Tommy Morel of the Advertising Committee. "Everything is in place and ongoing," he said. He outlined advertising the committee will be placing to promote the pro ski race. Morel said ads will be placed in city and college newspapers across the Southwest.

—Heard a report from Morel on the pro ski race. Morel said preliminary work for the event is going smoothly, but that many volunteers are needed to ensure its success. Morel also said some of the celebrities coming for the event have been chosen, and that the list continues to grow.

—Heard a report from Ronnie Hemphill of the nominating committee. Hemphill said 14 board of directors candidates will be listed on ballots, and will be voted on by Chamber members.

—Heard a report from Jungbluth that the Jeep party will be in late March.

—Voted in support of the Smokey Bear Day, set for May 26 in Capitan.

Next year's class schedule and plans for next week's in-service days were among many items approved by the Board of Education Tuesday.

Students in the Ruidoso Municipal School District will attend no classes February 22-24, but teachers will.

They will become students themselves in classes on topics ranging from curriculum and communication to stress and money management. The short sessions, taught by educators and local business people, even include "Car Care for the Mechanically Handicapped."

During the meeting Tuesday, board members voted unanimously to accept next year's class schedule. They passed it pending any changes the state Legislature might mandate. Students would attend classes from August 27 through May 31. The two long vacations would run from December 22 through January 6 and April 6 through 14.

A snow day is included among 181 class days. The schedule also includes a holiday at Washington's birthday, which could be used as a snow day if necessary.

The board also passed unanimously a special budget because of increased

student enrollment.

An additional \$30,104 will be spent on everything from water for portable classrooms to library and audiovisual materials. Administrative staff members will also receive computer training with part of the new funding.

The money was added to the budget for the year ending this June.

The board accepted one resignation. Al Quick will leave the custodial staff at White Mountain Middle School.

Superintendent Sid Miller gave a brief report about the bond and tax election a week earlier. Voters passed both measures by huge margins February 7. Miller said, "We never did get to brag much about this. It's another vote of confidence in the schools."

Board members discussed the summer Ruidoso Art Festival with Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth. Jungbluth said the Chamber had been negligent about asking to use the high school in past years, and wanted to change that.

This year, construction at the present high school may force a change in the dates, July 27-29, or the site for the festival.

Miller suggested an alternate location. Details of either possibility

should be confirmed by April.

Jungbluth and schools officials discussed tents, parking and sanitary facilities. He said the Chamber made a \$13,000 profit on the festival last year.

Following the amicable Art Festival discussion, Roy Propsner addressed the board about educational quality.

"I know the value of an education," he said, "because I don't have a good one."

"I demand that you be demanding for a demanding world."

Propsner said he respected the Pledge of Allegiance to the American flag, and asked why it was not required in all classrooms. He disagreed with the explanation he received from one teacher, he said.

He also quoted from President Reagan's position on the quality of education. Then board president Stormy Edwards asked him to get on with his own point.

Propsner apologized for boring his listeners with material they had already heard, and left the meeting.

In other action, board members made a quick annual review of their resolution about public notice of meetings and approved it.

The board also called for bids for furniture for the new high school.

Earlier, board members spoke with U.S. Forest Service representative Randy Herzberg about buying 1,232 acres. The land is next to the proposed fine arts center of the new high school.

"We originally talked about land exchange," Herzberg said. But the Forest Service was not interested in any acreage the school district owned, he pointed out.

Besides, red tape blocked such trades and complicated any special use permit arrangements, it was noted.

The district will probably pay about \$18,000 to \$24,000 for the land. More than a year is expected to pass before any deed would change hands.

The Forest Service must appraise the land and study the environmental effect of a sale. But, said Herzberg, "We're really interested in the school getting it rather than someone else."

No formal board action was needed on the land sale, and none was taken.

After about 90 minutes of considering items, the board went into closed session to discuss teacher evaluations.

When it returned around midnight, the board offered new one-year contracts to Miller and assistant superintendent Mike Gladden, Miller said. Both accepted.

# Lodgers Association hosts candidates for council and judge

Ruidoso Lodgers Association (RLA) members heard from 18 candidates for the Ruidoso village council and three candidates for Ruidoso municipal judge during the lodgers Tuesday meeting at the Ruidoso Public Library.

Addressing the group were council candidates Al Junge, Bill Karn, Jerry Shaw, Elmer Pirelli, Jon Denny, Ray Dean Carpenter, Romeo Klein, Alma Russell, Michael Radziewicz, Rick Evans, John Carver, Bill Streeter, Clark Carpenter, H. John Underwood, Michael Callaghan, Mill Alcorn, JoAnn Farris and Sherman Atwood. Candidates for municipal judge at the meeting were John Cupp, Otis Spears and John R. Barton.

The lodgers invited the council candidates to appear before them and answer four questions. The questions probed the candidates' thoughts on: "Increasing the lodgers' tax from the current two percent to the proposed three percent;

"increasing the gross receipts tax by one-quarter of one percent to be used strictly for promotions;

"best usage of the village's advertising funds; "growth in Ruidoso.

RLA vice president Don Wenner conducted the meeting and asked that each candidate address the questions in a three- to four-minute presentation. The candidates' comments follow, in reverse order of ballot position, as the candidates spoke at the meeting.

Sherman Atwood. Of the lodgers' tax and the gross receipts tax, Atwood said, "I can't see that at this time." Atwood commented on the use of advertising funds. "I would like to see the lodgers tax spent to attract tourists rather than to attract people to come up here and live."

Atwood said he was not a no-growth advocate, but said he would like to see growth in an orderly manner.

JoAnn Farris. Of the proposed increases in the lodgers' tax, Farris said, "I think you've been taxed enough." She said if a good program were presented to her, she would reconsider raising the tax.

Of the proposed gross receipts tax increase, Farris said, "Just raising taxes without programs is no good."

Farris said she was for growth. "If we watch what we build and have a real good plan, we'll have one heck of a village."

Mill Alcorn. Alcorn proposed looking into

other avenues for funding rather than raising either of the taxes. "If all are going to benefit, then all should contribute," he said.

Alcorn said advertising dollars should be spent on well-designed and well-executed campaigns. He said growth should be planned around the village's future water supply.

Michael Callaghan. "Ruidoso is one of the heaviest taxed cities in the state. Unless we really need it, let's hold off," he said of the proposed tax increases.

Callaghan praised the current advertising campaign, but added that he would like to see more efforts made to advertise Ruidoso in southern New Mexico markets.

On growth, Callaghan said, "I'm for it if it's orderly." Callaghan also said he favored increased efforts to improve present conditions in Ruidoso before pushing growth.

H. John Underwood. On the two taxes, Underwood said, "Let's keep the level of taxes where they are now." Underwood said he would like to explore the possibilities of leveling a lodgers' tax on the condominiums in Ruidoso.

Underwood said he felt the best form of advertising is word-of-mouth. "You get a tremendous return on your own good will," he said. Underwood said of growth, "It's not a problem, it's a challenge. Bring it on."

Clark Carpenter. Carpenter said he was for raising the lodgers tax because he realized the need to promote Ruidoso. Carpenter said he was also in favor of increasing the gross receipts tax because of the minor cost and the high benefits.

Carpenter said the council needed to be more involved in the tourist and hospitality business. "We're all in the visitor business," he said.

Bill Streeter. Of the lodgers' tax, Streeter said it was not fair that the lodgers alone are taxed. He said for that reason he was against raising the tax. He said he felt the increase in the gross receipts tax was "a little more fair," and that he supported an increase in that tax.

Of growth, Streeter said, "We're growing, we need to face that. Growth is good." He said he would encourage advertising in Mexico to attract Mexican families, which he said would protect smaller unit lodgers. He said he would support advertising to the television and film industries.

John Carver. Carver said he was for an increase in lodgers' tax. "The people who pay it are the people who come up here. It does enhance your business," he said. Carver said the decision about the gross receipts tax was

in the hands of the state legislators.

Carver said word-of-mouth advertising is "the very best." He suggested starting "some sort of policing action" to be set up between the lodgers to ensure that guests were treated well.

Carver said he would favor "taking care of what we have now," before encouraging growth.

Rick Evans. Evans said he would support an increase in lodgers' tax. He said Ruidoso and Clouderoff were the only two cities in this area that did not charge at least a three percent tax, and he felt that is deleterious to Ruidoso's marketing position. "We need to be constantly striving to be competitive in these industries," he said.

Evans said he strongly supported the concept of raising the gross receipts tax, but felt it would be a challenge to get the increase passed in the Legislature.

Evans said he supported achieving the greatest exposure for dollars spent in advertising efforts. He said he would support more radio and television advertising than is now being done. Evans said he is pro-growth.

Michael Radziewicz. Of an increase in lodgers' tax, Radziewicz said, "The council's job is to follow through what the people want." He said that if it were properly spent, he would be for an increase in the tax. Radziewicz said he would like to see the tax uniformly applied across the county.

Radziewicz said the village had no control over the gross receipts tax. "That's up to Santa Fe. We have no cause or effect over that law."

Radziewicz said he would like to see a public relations firm take over the advertising for the village.

On growth, Radziewicz said, "I favor planned growth and strict planning and growth. I am greatly in favor of a convention center being built."

Alma Russell. On raising the lodgers' tax, Russell said since it is the lodgers who collect it, it is they who should be able to decide if it should be raised. "I don't feel obliged to comment on that," she said.

On the gross receipts tax, Russell said, "I would have to vote no. That reaches into the pockets of everybody."

Russell said she favored the present advertising efforts. "It is good, but word-of-mouth is our very best friend," she said.

On growth, Russell said, "There's no way not to grow. We are going to grow."

Romeo Klein. Klein said the question of raising the lodgers' tax was up to the lodgers.

He said the village did not have anything to do with the raising of gross receipts tax.

Klein said the present advertising program is good, and said the more "mouth-to-mouth" advertising the better. Klein said he was against more growth. "Let's stay within our limits, let's not annex any more."

Ray Dean Carpenter. Carpenter said he would favor an increase in lodgers' tax if the lodgers were behind it. He said the increase in gross receipts tax is a "moot question" and that he doubted it would be passed by the Legislature. Carpenter said he would favor an advertising campaign similar to the one he observed while living in Roswell. That campaign, he said, was operated on funds raised by increasing the amount of the Roswell Chamber of Commerce members' dues.

Carpenter said he was for growth.

Jon Denny. Denny said he would like to see other avenues for funding explored before raising the lodgers' tax or the gross receipts tax.

On advertising, Denny said the village is "missing the boat." He suggested forming a budget and setting an emergency contingency fund aside for possible impromptu advertising. He said he would especially like to see more television advertising in Texas markets.

Elmer Pirelli. Pirelli said he would oppose an increase in the lodgers' tax. He said he favored increasing the gross receipts tax because most of it would be paid for by summer visitors. Pirelli said he is pleased with the current efforts being made in advertising. On growth, Pirelli said he had voted against growth in the past as a former council member.

Jerry Shaw. Shaw sent a letter to the group to express her stands, citing a hospital visit for a shoulder problem as reason to not attend the meeting. In the letter, Shaw said the lodgers' tax is up to the lodgers themselves. Shaw said she would accept an increase in the gross receipts tax, but would be much more interested in seeing how the present funds were being spent.

Shaw said she favored the current advertising efforts but said she would like to see more television advertising.

Bill Karn. "Taxes are a necessary evil," Karn said. He said he would not vote for an increase in the lodgers' tax unless he saw a good program for those funds. Karn said the gross receipts tax depended on what the state legislators decided. If the measure passed, he said, he would like to see a portion of the funds earmarked for the construction of a convention center.

Karn said he favored the current advertis-

ing program by the Chamber of Commerce. On growth, Karn said, "Growth is here. Either a village grows or dies."

Al Junge. Junge said an increase in the lodgers' tax was up to the people. He said a gross receipts tax would not be passed until an increase in the lodgers' tax was accomplished. He said the gross receipts tax would bring the village about \$350,000, and that he would like to see that figure halved, for a convention center and advertising. He said it might be possible to drop the lodgers' tax increase after the gross receipts tax was passed.

Junge said he was pleased with the current efforts of the Chamber of Commerce and the Lodgers' Tax Committee in their advertising efforts.

On growth, Junge said, "You can't stop the inevitable. It's up to the council to take care of that growth."

During the meeting, the lodgers also heard from a number of candidates for the position of municipal judge. Their comments follow.

John R. Barton. Barton said he would like to see more advertising efforts directed to the Texas market, particularly through television snow reports. He said he would favor channeling growth in a positive direction. He said the village could improve its image by having positive law enforcement policies.

"We've got to let them know that not only will we protect them, but we will also treat them fairly," he said of tourists.

John Cupp. Cupp said he still considered himself the best for the position he seeks. He said the image of the village was his primary concern. "We've instituted some new programs in court, and I'd like to stay there to continue them," he said.

Otis Spears. Spears noted his experience in school administration and asked for the support of the lodgers.

The lodgers then heard from Jim Shell, of the American Linen Service. Shell said he was present at the meeting to answer any questions from the group. He also discussed various policies of the company.

Vice president Wenner then outlined a proposal to change the by-laws of the association to include an officer for both secretary and treasurer of the group. Currently, according to Wenner, the two positions are held by one person.

The association also heard a presentation from A. J. Amos and Fred Volquardsen on a proposed new laundry to be located in Ruidoso. They passed out a questionnaire to be distributed to other lodgers that would give them information for their business.

## John Cupp candidate for municipal judge

John Cupp, incumbent municipal judge, believes his experience as judge and in law enforcement makes him a qualified candidate for municipal judge.

Cupp has been the municipal judge since May 1983, and served as alternate judge under Sam Nunnally for eight years before that.

He said he had become very familiar with village ordinances during his tenure. He is also proud of numerous procedural changes he has instituted that he says are now saving the village time and money.

Cupp also said he had developed rapport with many agencies in Lincoln County to which he can refer defendants as positive alternatives to

incarceration.

Cupp also served as an investigator with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department for two years, which he views as very valuable for any judge.

Cupp also owns Cupp's Clock Shop. Cupp has lived in Ruidoso for 10 years. He owned a hardware store for five years and helped start Ruidoso Truck Company.

Before coming to Ruidoso, he spent five years developing and farming land at Lake of the Ozarks in Missouri. Before that, he worked for Andrew Corporation for 17 years, first as an engineer, and later in marketing.

He and his wife, Mary, have five grown children and 12 grandchildren.

Bill Streeter has announced his candidacy for the Ruidoso village council.

He and his wife, LuLynne, have four children: Danny, 21; Lisa, 19; Conrad, 12; and Charity, 7.

Streeter has an associate degree in anthropology from Metropolitan State College in Denver, Colorado; a bachelor's degree in biology from Adams State in Alamosa, Colorado; and a master's degree in education from New Mexico State University.

Presently he is self-employed, with AR/EN, an archaeological and environmental consulting firm; and

Treks International, which promotes bass fishing in Mexico and Mexican tourism in Ruidoso.

Streeter has lived in Ruidoso for 11 years.

"With my education and experiences I feel I have something to offer to the city," Streeter said. "I believe that the best kind of work there is to help serve your fellow man."

Asked about campaign issues, Streeter said "same old same old—water and growth."

"Where we're behind in water we need to be ahead."

Streeter said he had always been in favor of a youth center of some sort, especially for visitors in the 16 to 21 age group. He called cooperation between the council and the mayor "an absolute must."

The candidate said he was in favor of growth.

"I think other communities wish they had the growth we have," he said. He said the job of the council is

to meet the town's needs—water, utilities, etc.

But he stated that growth should be planned growth—not helter-skelter. He also spoke in favor of increased tourism.

## Milton Alcorn seeks seat on village council

Milton R. "Milt" Alcorn has announced his candidacy for the Ruidoso village council.

He and his wife, Barbara, have lived in Ruidoso for five years. Alcorn began his career with the Boy Scouts of America in 1925, rising from volunteer status to the position of administrative aide of the Los Angeles district.

Alcorn said experience in Scouting helped qualify him for the council. He has worked with a staff of over 100 people, coordinating fund-raising, budget preparation and budget control activities. He also served as director of development for trust funds for the organization.

"You have to be dedicated to service to others. I've had 55 professional and volunteer years of Scouting," he said.

In Scouting, a major part of his efforts revolved around volunteers. In Ruidoso, however, he has been the volunteer.

Alcorn's volunteer experience here includes serving as president of the

League; chairman of the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission; and vice president of the Golden Age Club.

Alcorn said what he has seen over the last two years as a regular village council meeting-goer caused him to run for the office.

"I have a very strong feeling that there's an area that needs strengthening," Alcorn said of the relationship between Ruidoso and surrounding communities. He said those relationships, and the relationships between the council and administrative personnel of the village, are key issues.

"Ruidoso is no longer a little place on the side of the road," he said. "The administration of the village must be just as modern and up to date as any larger town. It just takes hard work and an honest approach to it."

"I classify myself as a patriot and as a Christian," he said. "I'm a hard-nosed administrator when it comes time. I love to get a job done."

"I can apply good administration and I think I can help provide it."

## Romeo Klein candidate for village council

Romeo Klein feels his knowledge of Ruidoso's history and water issues make him a good candidate for Ruidoso's village council.

Klein has lived in Ruidoso for 38 years, which he believes makes him familiar with the history and current needs of the town.

He is retired from the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Mescalero, where he worked for 13 years. During that time he worked in water and sewer plant management. He also attended numerous BIA seminars on water and sewer.

Klein said his water and sewer experience puts him in a good position to negotiate for more water rights with the Mescalero Apache Tribe and Hondo Valley residents. Klein is also very concerned that the Grindstone dam is constructed as planned.

He also hopes to see a new airport for Ruidoso, as well as a community center for Ruidoso's young people.

Klein said he is not opposed to growth but that it must include more organized planning. He said Ruidoso should take care of problems within the village limits, such as sewer for Ponderosa Heights and Brady Canyon, before growing larger.

Klein is now retired, which he believes gives him more time to look into the village's problems. He believes he is not obligated to any special interests.

"I'd like to represent everybody equally," said Klein.

Klein served with the United States Marines in World War II. He is active in the American Legion and with Disabled Veterans. He is also a member of the National Association of Federal Retired Employees and a board member of the Ruidoso Care Center Auxiliary.

Klein and his wife Katie have raised seven children, who all graduated from Ruidoso High School.

## Jo Ann Farris seeks seat on village council

"I've always made my own decisions," said village council candidate JoAnn Farris.

Farris has been owner and publisher of All-American Publications for seven years, four of them in Ruidoso. The company produces a monthly newspaper and quarterly magazine on the quarter horse industry.

Farris grew up in New Mexico but left for California to attend California State University at Fresno, where she earned her bachelor's degree in education.

While in California, she worked for Ronald Reagan's successful gubernatorial campaign. She later also worked for his presidential campaign.

She always returned to Ruidoso during summers, but came as a permanent resident to start All-American Publications.

Farris has served two and a half years on the Lodgers' Tax Committee. She believes she was instrumental in changes that have resulted in better accounting of lodgers' tax expenditures.

She belongs to the United Way Fund and was a member of the Businesswomen's Association in Midland, Texas.

Having watched Ruidoso change for 23 years, she is concerned about planning for the future.

"Water, of course is going to be one of the major issues," said Farris.

She said she was concerned about Ruidoso's streets, parks and recreation, senior citizens and annexation.

Farris said she offered no specific solutions but would take each issue as it came up. She said she believed she can be a fair council member with no axe to grind or special benefits to reap from any decision.

## Jon Denny running for village council seat

Jon Denny, candidate for village council, believes the village council should be a "melting pot" for ideas from the community.

"I don't know any of the answers," said Denny. "I do have the ability to listen to people."

Denny believes the council and mayor should seek as many opinions as possible on public issues before deciding on a course of action.

That is how successful businesses run, said Denny, and how successful government should run.

Denny has a strong business background that he believes would be helpful to him as village councilman.

In the seven and a half years he and his wife Bessie have lived in Ruidoso, he has owned Denny Tire and Auto for three years and International Galleries for four years.

# Capitan candidates speak out

Capitan board of trustees and municipal judge candidates faced some pointed questions and a vocal audience during a "Meet the Candidates" night Tuesday in Capitan.

The meeting threatened at times to degenerate into a free for all shouting match, especially with the vocal contributions of Olan Booher. It was saved only by the gavel of Capitan Chamber of Commerce president-elect Dave Strickland.

The Chamber of Commerce sponsored the evening at the meeting room of the Smokey Bear Restaurant. Individual candidates introduced themselves, then answered written questions that had been dropped into a box at the door of the meeting room. The questions were directed at

specific candidates. Leroy Montes, incumbent and candidate for municipal judge, faced a series of questions at the start of the evening.

Montes said he believed there are many ways to punish people other than by fining them, after being asked why he should be reelected since he did not enforce the ordinances. He said a judge should see that justice was done and that probation, suspended or deferred sentences often served that purpose.

He noted that he had only had one repeat offender in four years who was fined the maximum \$300 for the second offense.

Montes said he was not prejudiced and tried to treat all people the same—with respect. He acknowledged that his records have not cleared a state audit, but said he had not been found guilty of any wrongdoing. He said the lack of a court clerk added to the difficulty of keeping accurate records.

He said he did issue bench warrants for people who "skip," but not always because they were not valid in Texas and he had never had one served outside of Lincoln County.

Johannie Ramero Johnson, candidate for municipal judge, said she had no experience as a judge but would be honest and fair. She said her objective was to treat equally

everyone who appeared in court.

Mike Points, the third candidate for municipal judge, said he had lived in Capitan for 11 years and that he believed he could "do the city a good turn" by being judge. He served as a Capitan police officer for two years and has two children.

Points said he was willing to learn and help the community.

"I'd like to put some common sense back into city politics," said trustee candidate Pat Huey.

Huey said he had lived in Capitan 38 years, 12 of which he served on the Capitan school board. During that time, he said, he voted for bond issues to improve the school system. He also said he would endorse a bond issue for the village if the need arose.

He said a bond issue or increased water rates would be the only way to raise money for improvements to the water system if grant money were not available.

He said he would be in favor of constructing a new village hall if the money were in the budget. He also said improvement of the streets was one of the main issues of the campaign. He spoke in favor of cleaning up the trashy areas of Capitan, and suggested village employees may be able to help clean up weeds in some yards for people who cannot do it themselves.

He said he would refer people to city hall if they have complaints. The employees are hired to do a job and can be fired if they do not fulfill their

duties, said Huey.

Huey said two policemen are sufficient for now.

Upon being questioned about having a piece of land taken out of the village limits, then annexed a few years later, Huey said the two actions involved different lots of land.

Norman Renfro, who was appointed to the board of trustees last summer, said he believed Capitan was in bad need of water. He said he would like to see the village create a planning and zoning commission, and that he supported Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan's drug abuse program. He said, as a businessman, he was in favor of growth in Capitan.

He said subdivisions should be annexed only if water is available to supply them. The subdivisions must also have roads and other basics so annexation will not be costly to the village, he noted.

He said he was opposed to the water tap moratorium last summer because the problem was a lack of a booster pump for residents in the subdivisions and not a lack of water.

He said he intended to enforce ordinances requiring the village to be cleaned up, and suggested Camp Sierra Blanca inmates might be able to help as they did in the past at no cost to the village.

He also suggested spending some of the recently acquired grant money on installing valves within the water system so one leak would not stop water supply to the whole village.

He said complaints he received would be referred to city hall rather than the mayor. He also said he thought the current two-man police department was sufficient.

Vernon Kelly Beavers, candidate for trustee, is retired from the Air Force and has lived in Capitan for four and a half years. He said the position of village trustee took more than attendance at the monthly meetings and that he had the time to devote to the job.

Beavers refuted the claim that he was against growth and development for Capitan, but said the village needed water before annexing more property, and that growth should be planned.

He said he was in favor of a planning and zoning commission.

He supported the moratorium on water taps because additional water taps would have aggravated an already serious water supply problem.

He was opposed to the idea of a booster pump to supply water to residents on the hill in the subdivision because he was concerned about possible breaks in the water lines due to too much pressure at lower elevations. He would support the idea if it included reducer valves, he said.

Beavers said increased water rates and general obligation bonds could not raise enough money for the required improvements to the water system and that Capitan must obtain grant money.

He said he was in favor of cleaning up the town but that the effort must begin at village hall. He said the village should increase the size of its police force.

He said he had experience with personnel, having directed 100 to 150 people while in the Air Force. He said he also had experience with budgets of up to \$186 million. He also worked on his own as a Realtor and a sales representative for Orkin.

Larry Caywood said his main objective as trustee would be to upgrade Capitan's water system. He said he had 13 years' experience with water plants and sewage.

He served two years as Capitan's water superintendent, during which time he rebuilt the filtration plant and replaced many water lines in town.

He said he never used any village equipment for private work on his property.

He said everyone should live where they want to but that the village would have to improve its water system if more people were going to depend upon it. He said water system improvements would have to come before increasing the size of the police force.

Caywood plans to enforce all ordinances including ones requiring clean yards. All residents should get satisfaction from the local government even if it means going to the mayor, said Caywood.

He also favored the creation of a planning and zoning commission.

## Capitan office-seekers

Pat L. Huey is a candidate for a seat on the village council in Capitan.

He is a general contractor and has lived in Capitan 38 years. He is married and is the father of three daughters. He was on the Capitan school board for 12 years.

"I have a great investment in Capitan," said Huey. "I think any interested person should have an interest in town government. I think we need common sense in town hall."

Huey pointed out that he had experience in all phases of construction and equipment.

"I would be fair on all my decisions," he said.

Huey said water was the major campaign issue. "We need to pursue all avenues to improve it."

Regarding growth, he said, "we need to plan and go with a planned controlled program."

Vernon Kelly Beavers, a resident of Capitan since June 1979, is seeking a position on the village council.

He was in the Air Force for 27 years, and was in the real estate business in Roswell from December 1974 until the time he moved to Capitan.

"Capitan is faced with many water problems," said Beavers. "I am fully aware of these problems and actions that should be taken. I am a retiree and can give many hours to the job."

Beavers cited water, road maintenance and city cleanup as the major issues of the campaign.


He and his wife, Maria, have three children.

## Replat, animal control occupy Capitan

The Monday night meeting of the Capitan village council was peppered with discussion and comments from a standing-room-only crowd at village hall. At times during the evening, as many as a half-dozen people attempted to voice their opinion on various subjects.

Mayor David Cummins was kept busy throughout the meeting, conducting the heavy load of business and maintaining order in the audience.

The heaviest discussion centered around a request from Steve Makowski for a replat of his property in Unit 1 of the Mesa Verde subdivision. Makowski requested that approval be given to split the property into four sections. The replat, presented by Wyatt Sparks of Ruidoso Land Surveying, was met with some criticism from the audience. One concern raised by meeting-goers was that the split would lead to the installation of four water meters, instead of one. Audience members voiced concern over the addition of new water meters to the already overloaded water system in Capitan.

"It's one meter versus four," Capitan resident Kelly Beavers said. Discussion then turned to the problem of roads on the property. Capitan resident Olan Booher said he was concerned with Makowski's plans for putting in a road, and with the village's ability to maintain another road.

"Pretty soon we're going to have roads all over the country," Booher said. "We have too many roads to maintain now. You all can put the road in, but the city doesn't have to accept it."

Council member Sharon Horton then spoke.

"Isn't it just a courtesy that they come before us?" she asked.

"Legally you don't have to come before us," she said to Makowski.

"Yes you do," retorted Beavers.

"You're acting in place of the P and Z," he said to the council.

Village Attorney H. John Underwood said usually any request for a replat has to come before the local governing body for approval. Because the village does not have an active planning and zoning committee, he said, the council is the body to make such decisions.

Council member Benny Coker motioned to table the matter until further investigation can be made, and the motion passed unanimously.

Another matter of great discussion during the meeting was the animal control problem in Capitan. Many people spoke on the problem of loose dogs in the village.

"The number that takes the morning trip through my yard has increased, so I know there's a problem," Coker said. His comments were followed by several audience members' accounts of their confrontations with the problem.

All agreed the need exists for an animal control officer in Capitan. The suggestion was made that the animal control officer for the county could be funded by Capitan for more work in the village. Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan said that would be possible with the approval of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, if the village chose to take that course of action.

Council members then discussed the possibility of the village hiring their own part-time animal control officer. Council member Sharon Horton said she would take the job for \$1,000 a month. Horton's comments were met with a round of laughter from council members and the audience.

Horton then proposed the establishment of a code enforcement officer who could enforce other violations such as the presence of "junk" cars and tall weeds in the village. After some discussion, the council voted to pursue the hiring of a part-time animal control officer.

"If it (a dog) chases a kid and catches him, it's too late," one audience member cautioned the council.

In other business, the council:

—Heard a report from Jim Millington, of the Albuquerque engineering firm of Andrews, Asbury and Robert, the engineers studying the water situation for the village. Millington expressed optimism that the village will be awarded \$500,000 from the Communities Development Block Grant program in addition to the \$193,000 the village has already been awarded from the Water Supply Construction Act program.

He outlined the steps proposed by his company that the village should take with the grant money to remedy the water problem. Millington included in his recommendation the installation of a new 400,000 gallon per day water treatment plant, a booster pump for the higher altitude areas of the village, and renewed use of an existing 100,000-gallon storage tank.

—Heard a report from Vernon Goodwin on the progress of the Water Advisory Board. Goodwin said with the use of the \$18,000 from the Interstate Streams Commission, the board will test an existing well in the

village on the Pierson property for San Andreas water. The council also voted to incorporate the board as a standing committee.

—Tabled a request from the Capitan Cemetery Board that the number of members be increased from five to eight members until a representative from that board could come before the council and make a presentation.

—Approved nominees for the election board.

—Reviewed a notice of a change in revenue sharing funds from the state Department of Finance and Administration.

—Voted to contact A.J. Amos about his plans for the Village co-op building. Amos' lease expired in December.

—Discussed delinquent water bills. Cummins informed the council that he would begin billing the new fire department sub-station for a water meter.

—Voted to set the cost of two water meters for a Housing and Urban Development low-income housing project at the cost of a regular meter plus the added cost of the HUD meters.

—Approved the purchase of four fire hydrants at a total cost of \$3,069.64.

—Voted to set up a committee to explore the possibilities of changing the location of the Village government offices through the purchase of an existing building, an addition to the present building or the construction of a new building.

—Approved increasing the judge's compensation to \$300 per month from \$100.

—Conducted an executive session to discuss legal and employee matters.

## Jungbluth pauses for breath, update

"I think we're in some exciting times, there are exciting things happening now," said Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, of the current situation of events in the Ruidoso area.

Jungbluth spent a full day at the Chamber office for the first time in nearly two weeks, ending a flurry of activity filled travel across New Mexico and Colorado.

Jungbluth was in Santa Fe, Friday, February 3, for a Sun Country, U.S.A. luncheon. Designed to provide Sun Country members an opportunity to meet with state legislators, the luncheon, unfortunately, was poorly attended by House and Senate members.

"They were in session all day, they didn't get a lunch break," Jungbluth said. "I was a little disappointed we did not have any of our legislators there."

According to Jungbluth, Governor Tony Anaya did attend the function.

Jungbluth said Anaya stressed his gratitude to the Sun Country organization since it is the most active tourism promoting group in the Southwest. Anaya also reported to the group on his efforts to secure similar funding for tourism to that allocated last year.

The day before the luncheon, Jungbluth attended a Sun Country, U.S.A. board of directors meeting in Santa Fe. He said the group decided to hold two familiarization tours for travel writers from all over the country.

Scheduled for late May and September, the tours will be composed of about 25 writers in each tour. Jungbluth said the first tour will be in this area.

The group also spent a considerable amount of the meeting time discussing publications of the group. According to Jungbluth, the group publishes a brochure, Sun Country "Sights and Highlights," a calendar, and the Sun Country Magazine.

Discussion at the meeting touched on the possibility of deleting some of the publications in favor of printing more magazines. According to Jungbluth, the magazines quickly became scarce last year.

"We just didn't print enough," he said. "At the trade show in San Antonio I brought one case of magazines, but I could've used three."

Jungbluth said the group also discussed distribution of the magazine, deciding to make an effort to circulate it in Sun Country area lodging establishments.

Jungbluth also said the group considered the possibility of printing the

magazine more frequently.

"We feel there's enough going on to print the magazine even twice a year," Jungbluth said. He said the group will consider bids from Albuquerque Living Magazine, New Mexico Magazine and the New Mexico Business Journal to publish the magazine this year. It will be the second issue of the publication. Jungbluth estimated the magazine will be published by late May or early June.

Jungbluth said the meeting was very successful.

"We got more accomplished and more done than ever. It went smooth as glass."

From Santa Fe, Jungbluth traveled to Winter Park, Colorado, the site of a Pro Ski International race. The race was organized by the same group that will organize the Pro Ski International "world's richest" race at Eagle Creek Ski Area in March.

"I thought the event at Winter Park was very well done," Jungbluth said. He said the organization of the race here is proceeding on schedule.

"Our efforts now are going full bore."

After the Colorado trip, Jungbluth returned to the Chamber office last Friday morning. But he immediately left for another trip to Santa Fe, this time to hear from Secretary of the Interior William Clark on the possibility

of the proposed regional airport on Fort Stanton Mesa.

Clark met privately with Anaya, then held a press conference. Jungbluth said he was a little disappointed with the outcome of the secretary's visit.

"We were kind of led to believe he was going to make some kind of statement. He said he was willing to look at the proposal, but nothing more than that. I don't think we're back to square one, but we're not far from it."

Jungbluth said he was optimistic about the Secretary's decision.

"I've heard he's a very fair man. I think the optimism is kind of high."

Jungbluth returned for a full day at the Chamber office Monday, but a strong possibility exists that he again may be leaving at the end of the week.

Jungbluth said he might be called to Santa Fe to testify before the Senate Finance Committee. He said he and other area tourism organization members may be called to speak on the direction they have taken with funds from the state to promote tourism, to ensure that similar funds are allocated for next year.

"We want to be able to go and testify on how these funds can be used," he said.

Jungbluth said he felt the past two weeks were busy, but not hectic.

"It was an exciting busy," he said. "I thrive on the activity level. That's what makes the job what it is."

## Downs okays water well, police car expenditures

The Ruidoso Downs board of trustees voted unanimously Monday night to make large expenditures—including drilling a water well and buying police cars and office carpet.

The trustees accepted the lower of two bids for drilling the well. Ray Parnell made the winning bid of \$19,541. Kenneth D. Huey bid \$24,850.

The original estimate had been \$16,857. The two bids had been opened that day.

Also, the board voted to buy two police cruisers from the New Mexico State Police. They expect to pay

about \$4,800 for the two cars.

Each car will cost \$1,800. Another \$200 per car will be used for paint, and the rest will pay for the installation of lights, a siren and radio.

The cruisers will use unleaded gasoline, so all of the police cars will use unleaded gas. Ruidoso Downs Fire Department vehicles use regular gasoline.

The village has bought state police cars in the past. Trustee Harold Mansell said, "We've gotten some good ones and we've gotten some that cost thousands of dollars the first month we had them."

However, he said, "they're probably one of the better bargains offered, if there's a need."

Mansell was one of many officials to urge a thorough mechanic's inspection before buying the cars. State officers routinely replace all vehicles when the odometers reach 72,000 miles.

In addition, the trustees voted unanimously to buy carpet for the village office in a gold tweed color. The carpet will cover floors in the mayor's office and daily work areas. It will not be used in the board's meeting room.

Another agenda item, a Cablevision rate increase, was tabled until the February 27 meeting.

Disagreements erupted at the end of the meeting. Mansell is not seeking to return during the upcoming elec-

tion. He said that, before he leaves office, he would like to see sewer rates decrease.

Mansell said water and garbage bills should match what is spent on those services.

He claimed the village has charged about \$8,000 or \$7,000 more in sewer fees than it has paid for that service.

Mayor J. C. Day, Jr. said, "I wish it were that simple." He said the money was needed as a cushion during annual operation of the sewer system.

"We're not talking about a big surplus."

Trustee Conrad Buchanan asked that figures be projected over the year and brought to the next board

meeting. "If we have the money to give back to the citizens, let's," he said, "but let's not be foolish."

Rick Volquardsen also spoke about remarks he said officials had made during a previous board meeting.

Volquardsen, Day and trustee Jake Harris talked during and after the meeting about board meeting room microphones and a village services radio system.

## John Cupp bounces back

"I had no idea what was going on," said John Cupp.

One week he was feeling fine, and a week later Dr. J. E. Goss was performing emergency open heart surgery to replace four arteries on his heart. And two weeks later he is looking healthy and walking around village hall visiting with people.

"Thank God the way it turned out," said Cupp at his home Monday.

It could have easily turned out much worse.

Cupp had no idea there was any problem until he was taken from work to the hospital with some pains in his chest about three weeks ago. Dr. Lance Kirkegaard concluded that he had not had a heart attack, but stress tests proved confusing, said Cupp.

So, he made an appointment with Dr. Goss in Albuquerque for further testing. He had originally planned to

drive alone to Albuquerque, but Benny Coulston happened to overhear a conversation and offered to fly Cupp.

Luckily he did, because Cupp began suffering severe chest pains again when he checked in for tests. Hospital personnel gave him nitroglycerin intravenously but the pains would not go away.

They called Goss out of an important meeting to look at Cupp. An angiogram revealed three completely blocked arteries and two almost completely blocked arteries on his heart. Goss decided to operate immediately. Using veins taken from Cupp's leg, Goss replaced four of the arteries supplying blood to his heart.

Goss determined that no damage had occurred to Cupp's heart.

Within three weeks, Cupp says, he will be "right back in the saddle" as municipal judge.

## Warrior girls to meet Cobre

## Warriors edged on foul line

It was a different opponent and different date, but the Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team's 51-48 loss to visiting Tularosa Tuesday night was almost an exact replica of the Warriors' losses to Hot Springs and Deming last weekend.

The Warriors lost the Tularosa game on the free throw line, hitting just eight of 27 attempts. Against Hot Springs, Ruidoso made 13 of 26 charity attempts, and against Deming hit just nine of 21.

Ruidoso hopes to lick its free throw shooting problems when it travels to Cobre for a District 3-AAA game Saturday night. The Indians are in first place in the district standings with a 4-1 record. There will be a boys junior varsity game at 4 p.m. with the girls varsity and boys varsity games following.

The Tularosa loss was probably one of the most frustrating losses Warrior coach Ron Geyer and his players have had this season.

Ruidoso entered the final quarter leading 34-32 and had a three-point lead (42-39) with less than four minutes left in the contest.

But Tularosa came back with five straight points to take a 44-42 edge. Warrior sophomore Russell Easter then hit a layup off a fast break to tie the score at 44-44.

But then the Warriors' problems showed themselves at the foul line. Ruidoso missed three straight one-and-one foul shot situations and Tularosa took the lead for good.

Tularosa built its lead to five points with just over a minute left. Tommy Crow hit a field goal for the Warriors but the Wildcats made several free throws to hold off Ruidoso.

The game was literally even the entire first half. The score was tied 12-12 at the first-quarter break and 25-25 at halftime.

The Warriors had a four-point lead several times in the first half, but Tularosa came back to tie the score at halftime.

Ruidoso built up a 32-27 advantage late in the third period as sophomore Dan Ullmann hit two free throws and Crow added one. Tularosa fought back to tie the score at 32-32 before Crow hit a jump shot to give Ruidoso its two-point lead at the period break.

Easter led the Warrior scoring with 15 points while Ullmann added 13. The 6-6 Ullmann played his first game in over a week as he has been ill.

Crow added nine points. Gilbert Rivera and Patric Pearson each scored four points. Cyrus Simmons tallied two and Kenny Espinosa scored one for the Warriors.

Guard Danny Provencio led Tularosa with his shooting and playmaking. He scored 24 points.

Now comes Cobre, a team that defeated the Warriors 77-43 in the first meeting between the two teams.

"It was probably our worst game of the season," said Warrior coach Ron Geyer. "This time we can't let their pressure force us out of our offense."

"They're an excellent defensive team."

Cobre is small but the Indians like to run and pressure a team on defense. Ray Soto and Jesus Saez are the main cogs in Cobre's machine.

Geyer is hopeful the Warriors will shoot better from the line than they have in the past three games.

"Our guys hustled a lot and played with great intensity against Tularosa," Geyer commented. "We've practiced hard on our free throw shooting all year."

The Warriors are still weak from the flu that has bothered the players the past two weeks, but the situation is better than it has been.

Most of the players have been able to practice this week. Last week several players missed practice on both the varsity and junior varsity because of the flu.

The Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team will be trying to overcome two obstacles when the Warriors travel to Cobre Saturday for the district regular season's final game.

Ruidoso, 1-6 in district play and 6-15 overall, has several players who are bothered by the flu. The Warriors have also been plagued with poor foul shooting most of the season, but particularly in the past few games.

They made only eight of 32 free throw attempts in a 53-42 loss to Deming last week. Ruidoso's inability to hit free throws was especially evident in the final quarter against the Wildcats. The Warriors made just four of 18 attempts.

"We've worked on our free throw shooting this week," said Ruidoso head coach Sergio Castanon. "I predict we'll see some improvement."

Castanon thinks his team must improve its free throw shooting to have a chance in the district tournament. It begins next week.

"We'll probably have to shoot about 50 percent of our free throws to have a chance," the veteran mentor remarked.

Free throws aside, Ruidoso's flu problems have also been evident this week. Starting guard Gia Rose hasn't been able to practice because she's been sick. Back-up guard Sheila Espinosa has also been sick. Whether they'll be able to play against Cobre is questionable.

On the brighter side, the Warriors have been getting steady performances from their front line.


Center Diane McClure has scored 29 points in the past three games and has also done a good job on the boards, as have Stacy Ivy and Jackie Jefferson.

Sophomore Mavis Geronimo has come on strong in the second half of the season and senior Lillian Lopez has been a leader.

In the first meeting between Ruidoso and Cobre, the Indians took a 43-33 victory. However, the score was tied 20-20 at halftime. The Warriors lost the game in the third period when

they scored just two points to 10 for the Indians.

Even if the Warriors defeat Cobre Saturday, they can't finish higher than fifth place in the district round-robin season. Ruidoso will have to play the second place team in the first round of the district tournament at the latter squad's home court.


Valentine's day was the wedding anniversary of Jim and Beth DeAngelo. And we wish this great little couple many happy returns of the day and all God's Blessings.

**DEAR EDITOR:**

May I present the true facts of why, this fiasco of a historical zoning ordinance, should forever be stopped and voided?

Many provisions of zoning code violated in the fifteen years of its existence. Has only further obliterated the shape and exterior of many of the older buildings. Window sizes, location of new buildings in relation to the proper distance between buildings. Many cases of new additions to oldest buildings, being covered in part or completely by very modern exteriors.

In reports and surveys of Historic Old Lincoln, just where did the history buffs find the authority, to palm off the Old Mill as being a mill? That very building was NEVER a mill! True the man Ellis, who once owned this property, certainly had a mill; but not this. Why not get their

facts, before going into rhapsodies of detail, on the construction thereof?

Another detail concerning construction in those days: "The world can not blossom with statues if the hills are not full of marble." Just where did all the lumber come from for building with boards? Why call in an architect from Santa Fe to tell US what the construction was in the Territorial Period? Territorial period there and here were vastly different.

Consider: Santa Fe had approximately 300 years of donkey, ox-cart and wagon freight before the first wheels rolled in Lincoln. Even as late as the construction of the Murphy and Tunstall stores, some of that lumber was cut, sawn and freighted out here from Missouri. Besides which, even after rough sawn boards were available locally, were used mostly around windows, doors, ceilings and roofs: for adobe was until recent times, far more comfortable, being cooler in summer and warmer in winter. Some had only hard packed mud floors, long after the territorial period. Even at near by Fort Stanton the soldiers barracks had only such mud floors to it's end as a military post in 1886. While working there in the 1940's and 50's, on removing a window casing, was amused on reading a shipping tag; TO THE COMMANDING OFFICER FORT STANTON NEW MEXICO, VIA EL PASO, TEXAS. That shows three things.

This whole casing was made elsewhere, shipped by rail to El Paso, hauled by wagon freight to Stanton. My Uncle Fred Pfingsten, engaged in just such wagon freighting, before railway reached Carrizozo. I ask you just how common was lumber at the end of Territorial Period HERE? Entirely overlooked in all this bunk of restoring "Old Lincoln", is the total disregard of the jacial type of house. (mud daubed pole picket.) Yet this type was as common as adobe, if not more prevalent. Were also houses of mud, made building walls directly of mud, filled with random sizes and shapes of rocks. Drying each layer enough to be firm for trimming with a shovel blade. Advantage: Mud handled only once. Even a few houses were of coursed stone laid with adobe mortar. Should not at least one of each of these types be put up to make it a bit more authentic?

Consider the cost factor—just who will determine what is suitable in building and restoration? Enforcement? Penalties? All those tasks and more need be done by someone. That costs money? Just who, in his right mind, needs any more taxes, laws, or unnecessary expenses these days? Very, very doubtful that I need any help in spending my own money! Next thing you know there will be a half mile wide strip, fenced off from here to Fort Sumner, to commemorate Billy The Kid's escape route from Old Lincoln!

What anyone raised outside this valley does not understand, are the facts of present Lincoln. That early period of Lincoln County War, most would be happy to forget! Because the Territorial Governor of that time, was too busy writing a book, to do his duty as governor for the people of this area. The corrupt local, state, and federal officials of that time, were the direct cause of that disgraceful episode. Why try to keep alive such a sordid memory? Just who needs any more management from that quarter?

Even question the wisdom of ANY area set aside as being Historical or the buildings thereof. Mostly it is cheaper to rebuild than repair and keep repairing an old building. Consider the oldest settlers here (Amerindians) had the right idea. Abandon a while, return, level, build anew on top of the heap. Sure, those people had a far more workable plan.

This original ordinance, I see by map and outline has now been expanded beyond the Lincoln ditch, south—How come? Also in scope to include archaeology and other purposes—Again how come? The village

originally had a cemetery outside the east end of town, south of the highway, he advised it is still outside of village limits. So let this be the very end of the whole foolish controversy.

Hopefully, in time we will live down this Historiamania, that has over taken so much of our nation. As I view the new and rebuilt or remodeled buildings, I see no limiting pattern emerging. Am forced to think, "Just get elected to the board, then build as you please."

History as a scientific discipline, may be said to have taken it's rise with Lorenzo della Valla, (1405-1457). He demonstrated that the DONATION OF CONSTANTINE, on which the secular claims of the Roman Catholic Church were originally based, was a medieval forgery. Certainly! Do you want any more History?

That is what this ordinance was from first to last, a FORGERY. A thing that those responsible for it's being, wish to remain anonymous.

There was never an area-wide consultation or meeting with a majority of those in the area to be considered. Even arrived at the first public meeting to vote on it with a show of hands, with several non residents to vote for it. Being non residents of the area concerned, why were they here? Not one meeting has been held with a majority of eligible voters present or represented.. So tell me how these meetings can be viewed as legal?

Concerning fences: Owing to several temporary factors, as well as long range ones, this whole village and valley are grazed by deer year around. (Several being run over by motor vehicles every year, through out the whole village.) For that reason, a pole picket, woven wire, barbed wire or chain link fence should be legal, if high enough to turn deer or other snooping varmints.

No longer need we save, every tree, bush, rock and building for miles around as a background, for an event that occurred in a small area. Besides as pointed out, owing to the one ordinance fiasco, the historic buildings are now in large part, mostly covered up by recent additions.

In regard to the defacing and covering up of the older structures there are a few exceptions: The restorations of the Heritage Trust, Ellis house, San Juan church and two houses about four miles east of Lincoln. Some newer buildings, now reaching completion, which emphasize the wood work, are especially good as a contrast to the "Old".

I believe the only remedy, is to take inventory NOW and place signs marking ONLY present buildings of actual historic value. For the rest only preserve the scattered nature of the original village. Limit the village to size of original village limits. Which are from Ellis house to Old Court house. No new developments on the steeper slopes. Houses there, with their necessary leveling, roads and utilities access, would cause excessive flooding on valley floor with it's gentler slopes. So only the valley floor proper, be used for building.

That as you know is never the case, as note the ache at Ruidoso of those on the lower levels. Roswell, Albuquerque, all river sides, drainways and oceansides; Why are habitations ever allowed in such risky places? Take action to preserve only those buildings that are OLD. All new buildings limited to a reasonable size, retaining much open area as was the nature of original village. Outside the original village: To be limited only with these last few restrictions. Size to be limited as reasonable, nothing larger than at present. Open areas not less than ten times the building areas. No developments on steeper slopes, as noted above. With that I believe ALL can and must live.

Thanking you for the opportunity to express my views. Will be glad to act as your guide in case you wish a tour to explain anything expressed about the present buildings and their additions.

## Reporter's Round

Ruidoso and I fit each other. After all, I'd only been here a week when I caught the town's cold.

What could be more natural for a reporter who covers schools than to catch the same bug that has gotten to teachers and students?

Whenever I read one of Gary Brown's sports stories about a team struggling because members are home with the flu, I sympathize.

I also think about the problem schools face. Teachers are a dedicated bunch, and call in sick only when they must. Then substitutes are called. When the flu zaps lots of teachers at once, however, it also hits substitutes. Then what's a principal to do?

Seriously, teachers, students and I all did our health a world of good standing outside Ruidoso High School Friday afternoon. Why were we there? I was taking pictures of them, and they were evacuating the building because of a telephoned bomb threat.

Now, I'm not going to waste insults talking about the infantile jerk who committed a crime by making that fake threat. Words are my business, and I could utter some that would singe hair, but this is a family newspaper.

What I am going to do is use the incident as a window into a journalist's thinking about what goes into a newspaper and what doesn't.

Reporters sometimes ask each other whether events are being staged just to get attention. Was a bomb threat made Monday to provoke that attention? If we printed an article, would it encourage that kind of thing?

I might. Unfortunately, that wasn't all of the question. Exaggerated rumors about the situation were floating around town. If we printed no article, would it also encourage that kind of thing?

We weighed the alternatives, and decided to print something. After all, our business is presenting information to you, not learning it and then doing nothing.

If we sit on the bomb story because of a person or two, what story will we sit on next? Something that might embarrass an important citizen?

I'd hate to be accused of doing that.

I don't think a journalist should, in effect, tell readers, "I know this fact, but you don't need to know it, so I won't print it."

It sounds a lot like, "I can't explain this, but it's for your own good." Remember when you were a kid, and mom or dad or someone told you that? Remember how much it bugged you? It used to drive me crazy.

Something that drove me crazy recently was a person telling me I should use a quarter of the front page for a certain event. If it didn't get that much attention, he said, it was obvious that someone important at The Ruidoso News didn't like him or didn't agree with him.

Wrong. Ironically, what I personally believe happens to be similar to what that person believes about the issue in question.

However, a journalist's private thoughts aren't what determine placement of items.

Once a decision to publish something is made, it doesn't end there. The story or photo must be placed somewhere. Lots of folks think they deserve front-page attention, and many do. However, space limitations force choices.

One factor is the amount of interest. If every reader cared about snail racing, stories and photos about it would go on page one.

Since we think you don't want that, you don't see it. Good journalists try to get a feel for their town, a sense of what makes readers yawn or look twice.

We do this by listening to you when you ask us to ignore a story or to print one in an important spot. Whether you're just a parent (if there is such a thing) or a bigwig, we're interested in what you want to tell us.

We may not do as you ask, but we do respect what you say. Please keep saying it to us. The more you do, the more we know about what to say to you.

Just please respect us at the same time. We try to put our personal beliefs and biases aside on the job, and consider readers.

Now if I could only put aside this cold, I'd like Ruidoso even more.

You can be sure Toney Anaya noticed.

The new man is James Halligan, vice chancellor for academic affairs at the University of Arkansas.

He is not what Anaya ordered. Our Governor had specified that a

Hispanic female was to get that post and to hell with the search committee's recommendations.

He is livid when his orders are not followed.

Members of the board of regents of that institution are lucky that their positions are constitutional ones and that the Supreme Court must be convinced of their "incompetence, neglect of duty or malfeasance in office" before they can be removed. If that were not so, you can be sure Toney Anaya would call enough of them to give him the kind of board which will obey his injunctions, and a new president would have to be chosen.

Maybe the leaders of that tax rebellion on the floor of the Senate should have heeded the old adage which says, "Be careful what you pray for; you may get it."

Having achieved power—at least the ability to block the will of the Governor—they milled around headlessly while making up their collective mind what to do with it.

One rural member of the Senate had a sage observation on their conduct.

He said, "I've been a cowboy long enough to know you can put a few cattle in a tiny corral. But when you stuff it so tight those cows don't have room to move, they get to acting spooky."

For city folks, what that means is "when two sets of desires clash, you have to leave the other guy some room for maneuvers. If you crowd him too hard, all he can do is strike out at you."

The John Pemberton family of Alamogordo desires to thank the jurors of Lincoln County who sat in judgment of our son from January 30 through February 2, 1984 on trial on charges of rape with a gun. The victim gave positive identification (which was obviously a case of mistaken identity) and the case was scheduled for jury trial on September 21, 1983. But at that time, with all the witnesses present, our attorney Albert J. Rivera of Alamogordo, a veteran dedicated attorney who believed in our son's innocence, requested a continuance to have new scientific tests done which was granted by the court. The continuance was requested to ascertain whether the sperm found in the victim's vaginal wash matched the sperm of Kirk Pemberton.

It took the jury 13 minutes on February 2, 1984 in which to acquit Kirk Pemberton as Dr. C. Alvin Paulson of The University of Washington testified our son was born with Klinefelters Syndrome, confirmed after 4 tests, including one by The University of New Mexico, which confirmed that since birth our son has been unable to produce sperm. Therefore, the sperm found in the victim was not our son's and the jury acquitted him.

We give our thanks to the people of Lincoln County and to the Honorable George L. Zimmerman, a fair and impartial judge who gave the Pemberton family the chance to restore themselves in the eyes of the area after 15 months of agony.

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
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
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
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
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


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


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


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# Sunland Park Hoofbeats

**BUBBLY BOBBIE**, a career winner of more than \$210,000, heads a list of 99 three-year-old quarter horses still eligible for this spring's West Texas Derby at Sunland Park. The West Texas Derby, set for 400 yards on Sunday, April 8, is Sunland Park's featured spring race for three-year-old quarter horses. The total amount on deposit for this year's race is \$51,100. Last season's West Texas Derby, won by Realeasy Chick, was worth \$94,604. Bubbly Bobbie won five straight races during the fall at Sunland Park, including a win by almost one length in the \$120,055 Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity, the meet's top race for two-year-old quarter horses in the fall. Bubbly Bobbie also tallied an upset triumph in the Sunland Park All-American Sale Futurity race on November 20 at 400 yards. The Raise Your Glass filly is trained by Simon Buechler for owner Gordon B. Howell of Sunland Park. The first four finishers behind Bubbly Bobbie in the Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity are also candidates for the West Texas Derby. They include Superblulady (second-place Fall Futurity finisher); Truly A Bunny (third-place); Easy Demand (fourth) and Raise Again (fifth). Another key entrant is The Good Ship, who scored an upset win by a neck over Superblulady in the \$22,358 Shue Fly Stakes at 400 yards on October 28 at Sunland Park. On A Stormy Day, a participant in last Labor Day's \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, is also a possible contender. The Rocket Wrangler filly ran in last spring's Sunland Park Sun Country Futurity, won the Kansas Futurity Consolation at Ruidoso Downs, and was third in the Rainbow Futurity Consolation. Trained by Fred I. Danley, On A Stormy Day is owned by L.G. Stephenson of Wichita, Kansas. Tiny Victory, who also ran in last year's All-American Futurity, is still eligible. Trained by H. Don Faris, the Victory Stride gelding is owned by the Burnett Ranches and Clarence Scharbauer Jr. of Midland Texas. Trials for the West Texas Derby are set for Friday, March 23.

**POST TIME WILL SWITCH** to 1 p.m. on Friday and will continue at that time through the remainder of the 90-day Sunland Park season which concludes on Sunday, May 13. The increasing daylight hours has enabled officials to advance post time by one-half hour.

**MONDAY, FEBRUARY 20** will be a special holiday racing day at Sunland Park. A special 12-race program is set for Sunland Park's Fan Appreciation Day. In honor of the loyal patrons who have supported Sunland Park throughout the season, all fans will receive free general admission for the holiday program. It will be the only Monday card this season.

**AN UPDATE FROM** a hoofbeat from February 5: Trainer Gerald E. Marr has received a stay from the New Mexico State Racing Commission, pending a hearing before the Commission on a ruling

issued by the Sunland Park stewards on February 4.

**THE SUNLAND PARK HORSEWOMEN** United and the New Mexico Horsemen's Association sponsored a St. Valentine's Day Dance in the Sunland Park grandstand area. The dance began at 7 p.m. Tuesday and featured entertainment and dancing.

**APPRENTICE JOCKEY** Brenda Alfieri was recently married to former jockey agent Ronnie Hartnett. She will be listed in the official Sunland Park program as Brenda Hartnett.

**RICH CLASSIC LADY** became the first horse who passed through the sale ring in the 1983 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs to win a race at Sunland Park. The Time To Think Rich filly won Saturday's sixth race by almost one length. She was timed in 17:50 for the 330-yard dash that drew 10 two-year-old maidens. The California-bred dasher was a \$17,000 purchase last August at the All-American Sales Arena on the track grounds. Ridden by Gary Sumpter, Rich Classic Lady is trained by J.B. Montgomery for owner Everett B. Stamm of Benkleman, Nebraska. As a \$9,401 outsider, Rich Classic Lady returned \$20.80 to win.

**FALL COMMAND**, a \$169,70-1 longshot, returned the season's largest show payoff when he ran third in Saturday's eighth race. Fall Command paid \$38.80 to show. Just \$24 of the total show pool of \$2,293 was wagered to show on the eight-year-old Grenfall gelding ridden by Joel Sherman. The previous highest show payoff was a \$31.80 return on Arvid on December 2. Fall Command's third-place finish combined with a second-place finish by Duke's Commander, a \$69,60-1 risk under Matt Gurule, helped produce a huge trifecta payoff of \$8,243.40 on Saturday's eighth race. The winner, Mr. Golden Zipper, a \$3.30-1 second-wagering choice under Pedro Benitez, won the six-furlong

chase for four-year-old and older horses running for a \$3,500 claiming price.

**JOCKEY PEDRO BENITEZ** rode three winners on Saturday's program. He started with Mr. Golden Zipper (\$3.60) in the eighth for trainer Harold E. Nolen, then took the last two races. He captured the featured eleventh aboard Starhitch (\$6.00) for trainer Johnny R. Dennis and won the twelfth with Hi. Boom (\$5.80) for owner-trainer James H. Gubanski.

**BUGS BRIGHT KITTEN** set a seasonal fastest time when she captured Sunday's fourth race. The Bug Me Bright filly was clocked in 17:04 while winning the 330-yard dash for nine two-year-old New Mexico-bred maidens. The filly, under Kevin Cogburn, took a three and one-half length win over heavily favored Gable. Trained by Fred I. Danley, Bugs Bright Kitten is owned by Max D. Webb or E.L. Botkin of Farmington. As the \$1,70-1 second-wagering choice, Bugs Bright Kitten paid \$5.40 to win.

**REQUEST A MAID** raced to a sensational time in Sunday's ninth race at 870 yards. The four-year-old Azare Request gelding was timed in 45:15 while winning by three and one-quarter lengths in a front-running performance. The California-bred runner won his second consecutive start at Sunland Park after gaining an easy four and one-quarter length decision over T.V. Repairman in an allowance chase at 870 yards on January 28. Sunday's race drew eight allowance 870-yard runners. Ridden by Kevin Scholl, Request A Maid is trained by Gregory K. Henson for Ingersoll-McFarlin Rn and Dr. Dorwin Hawthorne of Inola, Oklahoma. As the 1-2 wagering choice, Request A Maid paid \$3.00 to win. The 45:15 clocking was the fastest 870-yard reading at Sunland Park since Special Hank did a 45:13 on October 24, 1982 and snapped Request A Maid's previous seasonal fastest clocking of 45:68.

## Cinerson surges to win

Cinerson surged out of second place and rolled to a two-length win in Friday's six-furlong headliner at Sunland Park.

Sunland patrons liked Cinerson's chances in the sprint, since he was nosed out in his last try against similar claimers with a \$6,250 price tag.

John Brown, who had demolished five-grand claimers in his last outing, got away at just under 4-1. Jockey Ramon Deanda, aboard Cinerson, allowed John Brown to go storming into the early lead.

But John Brown was unable to keep up that stinging pace, and gave in to Cinerson when put to pressure in the upper stretch. Cinerson was under no threat during the stretch run, and stopped the clock in 1:12 3/5 seconds. The gelding is owned by Alvina Sanchez of Fairview, New Mexico. The mutual returns: \$5.80, \$2.80, \$2.80.

Felipe Sanchez does the training. The win was Cinerson's second of the meeting. John Brown, piloted by David Lidberg, held on for second, refunding \$3.20 both to place and show. Rob Rob, a 10-1 longshot, reached his best stride in the stretch and finished third for a \$6.20 payoff.

It's been an easy life for On A High since his victory in the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs last Labor Day.

Few demands have been made on him, and he doesn't want for the best medical science can offer. If he coughs, there's a lab technician ready to take a specimen. If he needs a glass of warm milk at night, all he has to do is ask.

Obviously, when you have a colt of On A High's value, it's good sense to pamper his every medical whim. But his case is a little special—since he has his own doctor in the house. The colt is partly owned by Dr. and Mrs. Jerry Rheudasil of Lewisville, Texas, and Dr. Rheudasil is a veterinarian who splits his time between the Phillips Ranch of Frisco, Texas, and his own 40-head operation.

On A High is Dr. Rheudasil's star patient, but that's not to say the good doctor has turned himself into a hypochondriac, worrying over every almost a race horse may encounter. Does merely knowing all possible complications of this malady or that drive Dr. Rheudasil to nuts with needless concern?

After all, the colt is a multi-million-dollar property, as well as the darling of the Rheudasils and his two other owners: B.F. Phillips Jr. and Preston Carter. But Dr. Rheudasil says being a veterinarian doesn't mean he's chewing his fingernails over phantom diseases which never materialize. He says: "If you're a veterinarian, you have less to worry about, since you're likely to detect potential problems in an early stage. This background gives you more of an ease, rather than an anxious or apprehensive feeling."

But there was genuine concern last summer when On A High suffered an intestinal infection—a situation undoubtedly worsened by the fact the colt was undergoing the stress of racing. "He was sick 11 days before the time trials for the All-American Futurity, and it did concern us some," Dr. Rheudasil goes on. "We were worried that the trials, and the futurity itself, coming so closely after his illness, would take something out of him."

But On A High hit full stride on Labor Day, charging out of fifth place as a 14-1 longshot for a narrow win in the All-American Futurity. The Ruidoso management handed the

colt's owners a check for \$1 million. Dr. Rheudasil recalls the experience this way: "When you breed a horse, and raise him, and watch him grow up, and then you watch him win the All-American Futurity—well, it's the most thrilling thing you can imagine, absolutely the ultimate. It's a feeling you just can't describe. When people ask me, even now, if I've come back down to earth, I tell them: 'Not yet—ask me that question sometime in the future.'"

Shortly after the All-American, On A High was returned home to Lewisville, where Dr. Rheudasil had assembled a team of four veterinarians to give the colt a thorough physical check-up, X-rays, blood samples, various and sundry clinical evaluations were taken, and studied. "We didn't find anything of concern," Dr. Rheudasil says.

So On A High, his medical charts stamped "super healthy," was relieved of any further examination, and was turned out in the warm Lewisville sunshine and allowed to wind down from his fast-grind campaign at Ruidoso.

When the first week of January came around, it was time to get back to work, and the colt returned to training at the Phillips Ranch, under the careful eye of his trainer, C. Dwayne Glibreath. "We'll be giving him plenty of time to get physically fit and ready for his three-year-old campaign," Dr. Rheudasil says. The colt is being aimed at three Ruidoso targets: the Kansas, Rainbow and All-American Derbies. Are any syndication plans in the colt's immediate future? "We might begin considering offers at the end of this year, or possibly at the conclusion of the colt's four-year-old season," Dr. Rheudasil notes.

On A High's success in the All-American Futurity is one of the great bounce-back stories in quarter horse history, so far as an owner-breeder is concerned. In 1982, the Rheudasil stable included the heavyweight two-year-old filly, Yankee Win. After winning the Rainbow Futurity, she qualified for the All-American Futurity, raced as the second favorite, but fell near the finish line. Her career obviously over (with winnings of nearly \$400,000), Dr. Rheudasil and five other veterinarians worked to save the filly's life. She responded marvelously to surgery, and all its stress, and was even up and about,

Walking on her cast. Dr. Rheudasil recalls: "She was doing so wonderfully well, we expected a complete recovery. But a blood clot freed itself, lodged in her lung, and brought about her death."

The Rheudasils were obviously despondent over the loss of the filly, particularly after she had been narrowly saved from the initial injury. At the time, the Rheudasils felt it was unlikely they would again produce a race horse of Yankee Win's quality.

But her baby brother was On A High, and in less than a year, he was to exceed Yankee Win's accomplishments by winning the All-American. The dam of both Yankee Win and On A High is Yankee Doll, and this part of the Rheudasil story began in the late 1960s. Dr. Rheudasil was at Ruidoso, when he took a liking to a \$2,500 claiming mare, Crafty Yankee. "She was a beautiful filly, and her form showed her to be a good front-runner," he recalls. He asked his trainer, Junior Marcom, to keep an eye on the filly, hopefully to acquire her on a claim. But Marcom was hesitant to do so, since Crafty Yankee's trainer had the stalls next door, and Marcom did not want to be in the position of claiming a "neighbor's" horse.

But it wasn't long afterward that Crafty Yankee was retired, and had found her way to Texas. Marcom called Dr. Rheudasil to let him know of the mare's status, and the fact she might be available. Rheudasil bought her for \$750, bred her to Mito Paint, and the result was Yankee Doll.

Yankee Doll ran about 10 times at Ruidoso Downs, Sunland Park and the New Mexico State Fair. She was basically a speed horse, and she earned about \$10,000. She was retired after her three-year-old season and bred to the quarter horse stallion, Windy Ryon, producing Yankee Win.

Next, Yankee Doll was bred to Dash For Cash, producing On A High. Her third engagement was again to Dash For Cash, and the result was the filly, Yankee Dash, a two-year-old. Dr. Rheudasil plans to race late this summer, hopefully as a candidate for the All-American Futurity. Yankee Doll's fourth foal is a yearling filly by Dash For Cash, unnamed as of this writing. The fifth was a recently delivered colt by Streakin Six.

## Mile turns into two-horse duel

Jogamo, a three-year-old who had won only one race in his career, and Fantastic Voyage, a four-year-old with no victories to his credit, slugged it out all the way in Sunday's mile headliner at Sunland Park. Jogamo carried odds of nearly 30-1 in the allowance test while Fantastic Voyage was just over 16-1.

It was a two-horse fight from start-to-finish with Jogamo generally playing the role of front-runner. For a few strides in the upper stretch, Fantastic Voyage appeared to inch in the clear. But Jogamo, hugging the rail, finished with a game powerburst. The stewards examined the photo-

finish picture and called it a deadheat. It was the fourth deadheat of the current Sunland season, and the first to occur in a feature race.

Jogamo was ridden by Pedro Benitez at 112 pounds. Fantastic Voyage had Salustio Burgos up at 117. Fans who had linked their hopes to Jogamo collected mutual payoffs of \$29.20, \$22.80 and \$8.20. The returns on Fantastic Voyage were almost as generous: \$17.60, \$12.80, \$6.20. Release The Wind, the 2-1 second favorite, finished a length back and returned \$3.60 to show. David Lidberg was aboard at 112.

Jogamo, except possibly for a few steps in the stretch and on the final

jump, was in front all the way. But he was under pressure throughout. Jogamo is owned and trained by Charles Allison of El Paso, while Fantastic Voyage runs for Dr. Victor Savino of Albuquerque.

Despite the tall odds on the two winners, the quintile combination was worth \$329.60—well under the seasonal high of \$1,215.60 (set on October 16).

## Starhitch gets richer

Starhitch, a five-year-old who had made over \$36,000 last year—and holds career earnings of almost \$90,000—reverted to his best form and easily knocked off Saturday's mile headliner at Sunland Park.

Starhitch raced as a 2-1 second favorite in the breezy allowance route which centered most of the mutual attention (4-5) on the seven-year-old gelding, Farmer County Kid.

But Farmer County Kid began to sputter when he reached the upper stretch, then got bogged down in the middle of heavy traffic.

Jockey Pedro Benitez elected to take the late-moving Starhitch well to

the outside in the turn for home, losing terrain but picking up a clear shot at the stretch run. Starhitch soared into the lead at midstretch and loafed down to the wire to win by two and one-quarter lengths in a 1:40 3/5 clocking.

Starhitch is trained by Johnny R. Dennis for Burleson Race Horse Company of Truth or Consequences.
