## Absentee vote due March 2

Absentee voters have until 5 p.m. Friday, March 2, to cast their ballots in the March 6 municipal elections. Ruidoso village clerk Leon Eggleston said registered voters have to fill out an application for an absentee ballot, which must be notarized by a notary public.

Eggleston can send the applications in the mail or voters can pick them up in his office at village hall.

After receiving the application, Eggleston will issue the absentee ballot to the voter.

While absentee voting can take a week to 10 days to complete if done completely by mail, Eggleston said the whole process can be completed in one visit to his office.

Voters in Ruidoso Downs and Capitan follow the same procedure.

Eggleston said he had issued 11 absentee ballots so far for the March 6 election. Registered voters will elect village council members and municipal judges in Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan.



## H. Rick Henson racetracks GM

H. Rick Henson was named to the post of general manager for Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated, after former general manager and treasurer Donald "Curly" Smith resigned Saturday.

Henson, 42, will become general manager effective March 1. He has been connected with racing for the last 21 years. His father, Sunland Park announcer Harry Henson, introduced him to racing in 1963.

"I'm very happy that the board of directors has enough confidence to elevate me to this position," Henson said. "I'm sorry that Mr. Smith is leaving. He put in some very progressive changes. His policies will be continued."

Henson worked at Sunland Park for the Video Patrol and Photo Finishing Company for eight years, before going to Santa Fe Downs where he was track announcer and assistant racing secretary.

He then moved on to Delta Downs in Louisiana, where he was racing secretary.

After Delta Downs, Henson moved to Denver and served as racing secretary until 1980. He then returned to Santa Fe Downs to become director of marketing.

He became manager of the All-American Sale at Ruidoso Downs in 1982 and became Smith's assistant that year.

Smith refused to give a reason for his resignation, saying he wanted to return to California and rest.

## Gavilan next for ET

Gavilan Canyon will be the next area to be considered for zoning recommendations. Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission members decided during their meeting Thursday in Carrizozo.

"We decided to go with the original plan we had set up all along," chairman Milt Alcorn said.

The commission is responsible for making zoning recommendations for all areas in the county within a one-mile radius of Ruidoso. Those recommendations will go before the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Zoning Authority for final approval.

According to Alcorn, the commission will determine what areas of Gavilan Canyon will be recommend-

ed for zoning after it receives a list of property owners in the canyon from the county. Alcorn said if the number of property owners is too large for one public hearing, two will be scheduled.

The commission has scheduled a public hearing for all or part of the property in Gavilan Canyon within the one-mile radius. The meeting will be at 2 p.m. Thursday, March 15, in the Ruidoso village hall auditorium.

Alcorn said letters will be sent to all property owners in the one-mile radius area and to all property owners within 100 feet of those properties to be recommended for zoning. Alcorn said that is done to notify adjacent land-owners of possible zoning changes.

Alcorn said the public hearing will be similarly conducted as the first extraterritorial public hearing of Thursday, January 19.

## Condemnations set

A sewer system Ponderosa Heights residents have waited years for may be delayed further by some residents who are unwilling to grant the village easements to build the system.

After six months of unsuccessful negotiations, village attorney Lee Huckstep is expected to file in District Court this week for condemnation and immediate right of entry to 18 easements in Ponderosa Heights.

The 18 easements are all that remain to be negotiated for a system that will supply sewer to 600 units, said assistant village manager Frank Potter.

Until the easement problem is cleared up, the Farmers Home Administration will not grant a \$1.25 million revenue bond loan necessary for the project, said village manager Jim Hine. Ruidoso voters also approved a \$1.4 million general obligation bond for the construction of the sewer.

"The area needs the sewer and we just can't let holdouts on the

easements prevent us from building the sewer," said Hine.

Construction of the sewer is slated to begin sometime this summer, said Potter. If condemnation proceedings proceed as expected construction will not be delayed, he said.

The village is asking for permanent easements of up to 10 feet and construction easements of up to 20 feet along lot lines, said Huckstep.

While Huckstep was not sure what percentage of the whole project the 18 easements accounted for, he did call it a "significant number."

"We never expected this type of opposition," said Huckstep.

While some of the easement problems are due to difficulty locating all the necessary parties, some property owners have refused to go along with the village's proposals.

"People have been very selfish," said Potter. "That's what they're wanting is money, I guess."

The village has refused to pay any money for the easements, claiming the sewer system will increase property value more than the value of the easement taken.

Huckstep said one property owner asked for \$35,000 or an offer to buy his property for the easement.

Although Huckstep said some people were concerned about damage to trees on their property, Potter said property owners have given him no real reasons for refusing to grant the easements.

If granted, the immediate right of entry will allow the village access to the easements while condemnation proceedings continue, said Huckstep. Condemnation allows the village to obtain the land for a public purpose. The price, if any, of the easements will be determined in court.

The location of the easements is fixed because of the hilly terrain in the subdivision and the fact that the system will rely on gravity flow.

One small area of the project has been abandoned due to overwhelming opposition to the easements, said Huckstep.

Homes in Ponderosa Heights now rely on septic tanks. Some areas of the subdivision have had problems with sewage bubbling to the surface in the steep and hilly terrain.

## Hospital talks cash and care

The Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital Board of Trustees discussed finances, impending records changes and the need for loving care at their regular meeting Thursday night.

Reviewing the current budget was an initial item of business. Administrator Ken Moore noted inventories had been slimmed down to contain costs.

He also said the profit of this fiscal year, to date, is \$123,686. That is down substantially from \$173,736 at the same time last year. He said much of the decrease is attributable to bad debts and charity cases.

"The year-to-date profit is basically

equal to one week of operating expense," Moore said.

In the next financial item, board members voted unanimously to accept an 11 percent operating budget increase for next fiscal year. The board had proposed a 12 percent increase to Southwest Community Health Services (SCHS). SCHS is an umbrella organization for hospitals in Albuquerque and other New Mexico communities.

Moore also discussed remodeling in the hospital and thanked Bones Wright for a \$500 donation. Wright also gave \$500 to the Pink Ladies, the hospital auxiliary.

The board also discussed a planned switch in computer record-keeping. Dr. Paul Echols put in a plea for using

the best data system from the beginning. He is chief of staff at the hospital.

His group examined hard data about diagnostic-related groups (DRGs) for the first time, he said, and found some of the information sobering. DRGs are new devices for recording information about patients which will soon be required in all hospitals.

"We already have a medical records log jam now," Echols said. Increased paperwork will further crimp space and time available.

At the close of the meeting, Joan Guntzelman spoke with board members about continuing to stress human values in the face of opportunities and threats.

## Neighborhood Watch seeks to expand

The Neighborhood Watch crime prevention program appears to be very effective, but organizers are frustrated by a lack of community involvement.

According to Ruidoso police officer Mark Paz, crime in organized Neighborhood Watch areas has dropped drastically, but only about half of Ruidoso's 16 designated areas are organized.

Crime statistics for the Upper Canyon, one of the most organized areas, show a dramatic decline in burglaries and larcenies since the start of the Neighborhood Watch program.

During November and December 1983 and January 1984—before the Neighborhood Watch program had been organized there—residents reported 27 burglaries or larcenies in the Upper Canyon resulting in the loss of goods worth \$7,292.

During the same period in 1983 and 1984, after the Neighborhood Watch program had become well organized,

police received no reports of burglaries or larcenies.

Neighborhood Watch relies on a network of block captains and coordinators to watch for any unusual or suspicious activities in their neighborhoods. If any suspicious activities do occur, block captains call the police to investigate.

Former Neighborhood Watch president Milt Alcorn reminded citizens their responsibility was to observe and report, not to enforce. They merely call the police if they think something is amiss in their neighborhoods.

"The people who stayed active realize the police department wants you to call," said Alcorn.

Alcorn is stepping down as president due to an increasingly busy schedule as village council candidate. Upper Canyon coordinator Bill Rawlins is assuming the presidency.

Paz believes the reduction in crime is largely attributable to scaring off potential burglars. He said the police department usually receives calls about a strange car driving without lights or possibly parked at a residence, or about unfamiliar people

hanging around some area.

Police then look for the people, ask for identification, and find out what they are doing in the area.

Paz said potential burglars are scared off by this kind of questioning. He believes someone who plans a burglary will drive into the neighborhood a number of times to check out the area before committing the crime.

Neighborhood residents recognize strange cars or activity and can notify police about it, said Paz.

Alcorn said much of the program was based on neighbors getting to know each other and recognizing unusual or suspicious activity.

"There's a sense of security," said Alcorn of an effective Neighborhood Watch program.

The cost to belong to Neighborhood Watch is \$12 per year.

"I don't know where you could get cheaper security," said Alcorn.

He noted that insurance companies in California, which rely heavily on statistics, often give discounts to residents who live in areas with strong Neighborhood Watch programs.

The key to establishing a Neighborhood Watch program is finding coordinators for the areas, said president Rawlins. A coordinator has to organize sub-coordinators and block captains to watch the neighborhoods.

Rawlins said most of the work is during the organizational period and can be done mainly by phone. Once the organization is established, the work is mainly keeping your eyes and ears open, said Rawlins.

White Mountain 2, 3, 4 and 5; the Two Rivers area; and the Airport West/Del Norte area have organized effective programs, said Paz. Coordinators are needed for Camelot, Pinecliff, Wingfield, Paradise Heights, Ruidoso Pine Lodge and Gateway areas.

The coordinators meet once a month. In addition to discussing mutual areas of concern, members will learn more about crime prevention during programs presented by Paz.

### P&Z acts

The Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission met Thursday. The commission tabled a replat of lot 1, block 1, of Palo Verde Slopes subdivision as requested by Bob Pope until a representative of the request

can appear before the commission. Commission members denied a replat of lot 27 of the Little Creek Hills subdivision of Rancho Ruidoso Village. According to county manager Suzanne Cox, the replat was denied because the commission members felt there would be a better way to divide the property to get the best use of both of the lots.

The commission approved a replat of lot 15, block 1, K and M, of the Middle Cedar subdivision requested by Otis Pearson. Also approved was a replat of part of lot 9, block 2, of the Hudson Carrizo subdivision as requested by Donald George. A preliminary plat of Turkey Park Ranchettes requested by Edsel Young was also approved.

### Otis Spears running for municipal judge

Otis Spears is a candidate for the position of Ruidoso municipal judge. Spears said he had been involved in schools for 40 years as a teacher, principal and superintendent. Spears said his school experience took place in Texas, Quemado, New Mexico; Peru, South America, and Ruidoso. According to Spears, it is his background in the schools that helps qualify him for the position of judge. "I think my background in dealing with people as a school administrator qualifies me, to a degree," he said. Spears said his bid for judge was the first time he had sought a political office. When asked why he was running for office, Spears said it was because of his feelings about people. "I think it will be a good, interesting

job. I think I will enjoy the work because I enjoy working with people." When asked why he felt he would be a good person for the job, Spears replied, "I've always been fair in my dealings. I have the time to devote to it and would be sure to be fair." Spears said he would treat the position as a full-time job. He said he felt very strongly about driving while intoxicated and drug abuse cases. Spears said he would utilize a common sense approach if elected. "The common sense approach to dealing with people wherever you are gets the best results," Spears said. Spears is married to Christine Ross Spears. Spears said he had lived in Ruidoso from 1967 to 1970, and from 1978 to the present.

### Rick Evans announces for Ruidoso Council

Rick Evans, founder, broker and president of Aspen Real Estate Incorporated, has announced his candidacy for the Ruidoso village council. Evans has been a self-employed businessman in Ruidoso for 12 years. Before founding Aspen Real Estate, he owned and operated Frontier Wrecker Service, Frontier Motor Company and Frontier Exxon from 1972 through 1979. He is a native New Mexican and graduated from Texas Tech University in 1970 with a degree in financial administration and accounting. He believes his education and business background qualify him as a candidate for village council. He also believes Ruidoso's problems should be addressed in a positive, aggressive manner. "I take a real aggressive approach to everything I get involved in," said Evans. He said he was for growth and a strong business community in Ruidoso, but that he would not be insensitive to other considerations such as the aesthetics of Ruidoso. As an example of his approach, Evans said Ruidoso should approach state officials to help with Ruidoso's water problems. If they become informed and involved, Ruidoso may see more progress as it has recently on the airport issue, said Evans. Evans believes his current occupation also helps keep him informed about village affairs and the people of Ruidoso. "Basically, I feel I'm very in tune with what's going on in town," said Evans. He believes growth, streets and other municipal services, annexation and traffic will be some of the major

problems Ruidoso will face in the future. Evans strongly supports the compilation of a new Comprehensive Plan and believes it should be strictly adhered to even if it means politically unpopular decisions. Evans said relations with the state of New Mexico, especially the Highway Department, should be improved. Ruidoso should also strive to improve relations with the Mescalero Apache Tribe, he said. Evans has served on the Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission and was involved with the U.S. Highway 70 corridor study in the Downs. Evans is divorced and has two daughters.

### Spall running for judge

Jack F. Spall has announced his candidacy for Ruidoso municipal judge. "I think I can be a very fair and impartial judge," said Spall, who explained he thought he had the maturity to perform the job. Spall has lived in Ruidoso for 22 years and has owned and operated a number of retail businesses, including Spall Sundries and Adobe Ski Rental. He is now self-employed. "Should I be elected I will be a full-time judge," said Spall. Spall has no political experience, but said he had the willingness to learn. ### Clark Carpenter village council candidate

Clark Carpenter believes his background in community, civil and political work qualify him for the Ruidoso village council. Carpenter is co-owner of Dan Dee Cabins and has lived in Ruidoso for five years. He was raised in Fort Stockton, Texas, where he worked for the Fort Stockton Chamber of Commerce for five and a half years. While in Fort Stockton, he also served as president of the Permian Basin and West Texas Chamber of Commerce executive associations. He served as the vice-president of the Lawton, Oklahoma, Chamber of Commerce for four years, and served a stint as president of the Oklahoma Chamber of Commerce Executive Association. He said he spent much of his time lobbying county and state officials and obtaining state and federal monies. "Ruidoso needs a lot of that sort of thing," said Carpenter. Carpenter has four daughters.

Carpenter also served on Oklahoma's Industrial Development Team, which successfully brought Goodyear's largest plant to Lawton. Carpenter noted, however, that he did not want any "smokestacks" in Ruidoso. He does believe the village council should promote a good business climate, which will in turn provide tax revenues that can be used for community services. He said he had no special interests and saw many tough decisions ahead for this fast growing community. "The way Ruidoso is growing, the majority of our problems are arising from all these needs rushing at us so fast," said Carpenter. Carpenter served as president of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association for two and a half years and now sits on the Lodgers' Tax Committee. He also sat on the board of directors of the New Mexico Hotel and Motel Association.

She described a Chinese symbol that represents both opportunity and threat. Guntzelman added that health care providers must fight the inclination toward pessimism and cynicism. She is associate director of medical, hospital and community education for the Southwest Community Hospital Association. Guntzelman is a counseling consultant for the group, based in Albuquerque. She has a doctorate in counseling psychology and is a nurse. "In our health care business," she said, "there are two dimensions. We

are a business, but the mission is different than in other businesses." Hospitals have a moral responsibility to patients, she said. "Patients are not a means to an end, they are the end." "Two essentials are competence and compassion. Neither is sufficient alone," she said. Doctors and nurses need more than training, she said. They must also fight the tendency to pay more attention to things that can be measured than those that cannot, she said. "An important dimension of patient

care is being human beings ourselves," she stressed. Hospitals must strive for personalized care, she said. Board member James Sanchez said this hospital offers the personal touch. "It's unbelievable what we do here," he said. Other members repeated praise patients had offered about care in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital. The meeting had opened with a Cajun dinner prepared by board member Robert Finley. The next meeting is scheduled March 15.

## Candidate faces several charges after incidents early Friday

Ruidoso village council candidate Ralph Rush was arrested early Friday morning and charged with assault, aggravated battery and criminal damage to property. Rush was charged with aggravated battery upon Mike Stewart during an alleged incident at Jerry Dale's bar just after closing time early Friday morning.

The Ruidoso Police department received a call at 2:33 a.m. Friday from a store clerk at the Sudderth and Mechem 7-11 store saying a woman who had been beaten was there. Ruidoso Police officer B. J. Barnes reported that he found Joy Rush at the store bleeding from the mouth. Upon Mrs. Rush's request, police went to the Rush's home to arrest Ralph Rush. He was also charged with intentionally kicking a Chevrolet Blazer belonging to the Ruidoso Police Department. Ruidoso Police officer Michael

Lovelace filed the complaint in Magistrate Court in Carrizozo. Rush was released Friday afternoon after paying a \$1,000 bond. Rush was also charged in the Ruidoso Downs municipal court with criminal damage to property. He allegedly tore the sink and commode off a wall Friday morning in the Ruidoso Downs jail, flooding the cell. Prisoners arrested by Ruidoso Police are routinely transported to the Ruidoso Downs jail since the Ruidoso Police department's jail is currently under construction.

## Action on sign violations on hold

Business owners who violate the existing sign ordinance may still be notified, but it is unlikely they will face any punitive action for the time being, said Planning and Zoning (P&Z) field enforcement officer Ollie Cuddy. Cuddy said the P&Z enforcement office is continuing to send enforcement letters to violating sign owners.

P&Z secretary Becky Morris said the office currently had about 20 letters out to violators. Cuddy said most of the violators have improperly sized signs or have no permit for their sign. Most of the enforcement action, however, has been put on the "back burner" until a new ordinance is adopted, said Cuddy.

The Planning and Zoning Commission has recommended the village council adopt a revised ordinance. The proposed ordinance has provisions for larger signs and moveable letters on the signs. The proposed ordinance has been sent to the village attorney for his review before consideration by the village council.

## Jackie Branum candidate for Downs trustee

Jackie Branum has announced her candidacy for the position of Ruidoso Downs trustee. Branum, a teacher for 25 years, is a member of the Ruidoso Downs Planning and Zoning Commission. She teaches at White Mountain Middle School. Branum said she was running for the trustee seat because she was asked to. "I'm running because a group of citizens there asked me if I would," she said. When asked why she would be a good trustee, Branum said, "I think I am aware of the problem areas we have." Branum said she was concerned with the services provided by the village. "I think there's a big dissatisfaction in the city services," she said. "I feel we have to look at all the alternatives and find the most economically feasible way to do it." "We have a very small budget for what we have to do. We have to watch that the city doesn't get saddled with

a huge debt." Branum said she would like to see more enforcement of zoning ordinances in the growing village. "Ruidoso Downs is getting new businesses in and we have to work with people who want to build down there," she said. "We have to find some way of enforcing ordinances that have been put through." Branum said a concern of hers is cooperation between village officials. "Everybody needs to work together. The mayor, trustees and the police have to work to help the people in the village. We can't look at special interest groups over the needs of the people of the village." Branum said she feels the board of trustees is ready for a change. "We need some new ideas on the council. We need people who can listen to two sides of a question and make responsible decisions." Branum has lived in the Ruidoso area for 10 years, of which five have been in Ruidoso Downs. She has four daughters.

## Conrad Buchanan seeks Downs trustee seat

Conrad Buchanan wants to keep putting his business experience to work for the village of Ruidoso Downs. He was appointed to a vacancy on the village board of trustees in July, and is running for a full four-year term. Buchanan worked for the Bell telephone system for nearly 20 years—the last two in New York City. Then he started C & S distributors with his wife, Shirley. They handle Texaco and Firestone products in Lincoln County. He has been a Downs resident for 14 months, after moving from New York City. Problems in large and small communities are similar, he said. "I don't really see a major political issue," Buchanan said. "The main thing is that we get the best-qualified people as trustees. I hope I fit into that category." He said he was a good candidate because of his experience as an incumbent, because he is both a business owner and a resident of Ruidoso Downs, and because he worked in a decision-making position for Bell for 19 and a half years. "I got to be district manager for construction in Corpus Christi," he said. He handled a \$62 million annual budget there. Buchanan is running because, "I want to see the Downs prosper, get more businesses to move there, get more of a tax base," he said. "Ruidoso Downs is on the verge of just breaking loose," he said. "We'll be giving Ruidoso a real run for its money." Being a trustee, Buchanan said, is "one heck of an experience. As a trustee, you've got to be open-minded and listen to all sides." He said a trustee should pay attention to all


residents, including those on fixed incomes, before making decisions. "The person who pays \$1 for taxes is just as important as the person who pays \$1,000," he said. "You've got to consider all needs." Buchanan headed the Corpus Christi Political Action Committee for Bell. He also helped run other candidates' campaigns. He and Shirley have two children, Gregg, 20, lives in New Jersey, and Kandace, 19, works with her parents. 

## Lady Warrior cagers lose, begin tourney at Silver City

Ruidoso High School's girls varsity basketball team will be hoping for more consistent play when the Warriors travel to Silver City Tuesday night for the first game of the District 3-AAA playoffs.

Ruidoso finished the district regular season Saturday night with a 45-26 loss to host Cobre. The Warriors ended the district season with a 1-7 record and are 6-14 overall.

"We've got to play our best game of the season," said Warrior coach Sergio Castanon when asked what his team had to do to beat Silver City. "We've got to hustle like we have been but cut down on our mental errors and be more confident."

Silver City beat regular-season champion Hot Springs Saturday night to earn second place in the district. Cobre and Deming tied for third ahead of the Warriors and will play in the other opening round game.

If the Warriors beat Silver City, they will advance to a Friday game against the winner of the Cobre-Deming contest. The winner of the second-round game will earn a state tournament berth and play Hot Springs Saturday night for the district overall championship.

Against Cobre last Saturday, the Warriors jumped off to an 11-8 first quarter edge. But then Ruidoso started to make turnovers and the In-

dians pulled ahead to stay.

Cobre led 22-13 at halftime and 34-19 at the third-quarter break. Ruidoso never really got back into contention in the second half.

The Warriors committed 30 errors in the contest, something that has plagued them most of the season.

Sophomore Mavis Geronimo led the Ruidoso attack with six points on two field goals and two free throws. Diane McClure and Gia Rose each added five points and freshman Veralyn Platta scored four points.

Despite playing an outstanding game, the Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team lost a 38-35 decision to tough Cobre on the winners' court Saturday night.

Ruidoso, now 1-4 in District 3-AAA action and 4-16 overall, gave the co-district leaders a tough game the entire way and fell just short at the end.

With Ruidoso leading 24-23 at the end of the third period, Cobre gradually pulled ahead.

The Warriors drew a couple of offensive fouls in the last three minutes and that helped Cobre win.

The Indians led by three points with two minutes to go and forced the Warriors to foul them to get the ball. The lead alternated between five and

three points in the final moments of the contest.

Ruidoso trailed 6-2 at the end of the first period after the Indians went into a stall to try to pull the Warriors out of their zone defense. However, the Warriors stayed in their zone defense most of the night.

In the second quarter the Warriors gradually pulled even with the Indians, outscoring them 14-10 and drawing to a 16-16 halftime tie.

The game continued close in the third period with Ruidoso holding a one-point advantage at the end of the quarter.

Sophomore Russell Easter scored 12 points to lead the Warrior effort, the third time in the last four games he's scored in doubles figures.

Dan Ullmann, another sophomore, scored 11 points, and senior guard

Gilbert Rivera added six points. Jesus Saenz led the Cobre scoring with 17 points.

Both teams were hurt by their free throw shooting. Ruidoso made seven of 16 while Cobre hit on just six of 16 attempts.

Despite the defeat, Warrior head coach Ron Geyer was pleased with the way his team played.

"I felt the kids played real well," he said. "We played exceptional defense. We're still a young team and perhaps that's the reason we've lost some close games."

The Warriors have lost 11 games by 12 points or less and seven by six points or less this campaign.

Ruidoso won the junior varsity game, taking a 49-47 decision over the Indians. The Warriors are now 6-13 on the junior varsity season.

Joe LaRue and Gary Burgess took first-place honors to highlight the Ruidoso High School wrestling team's performance in the District 3-AAA tournament Friday at New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) in Roswell.

Besides Burgess and LaRue, other Warrior wrestlers who qualified for this coming weekend's state AAA tournament in Tucumcari were Scott Ciraulo and Gervase Pese.

Ruidoso finished fifth in the six-team tournament, although no exact scores were available. Deming won the championship.

LaRue won the heavyweight crown while Burgess captured the 185-pound championship. Ciraulo took second in the 167-pound division and Pese finished third in the 155-pound division.

Other Ruidoso wrestlers who did well were Bronson Rue in the 105-pound division and Jeff Slatton in the 119-pound competition. Both finished fourth, but only the top three in each weight class go on to the state tournament.

Burgess' district crown was his first, but it was the third straight time the tall, wiry Warrior senior has qualified for the state tournament. He was fourth last season (when four athletes in each class went to the state tourney) and took second in 1982.

Burgess won the championship with a 6-5 victory over Tom Valdosta of Deming. The Warrior athlete built up an early lead before the Wildcat wrestler came back to make it close.

LaRue, who competed in the Georgia state tournament last season before moving to Ruidoso, took an im-

pressive second-period pin of Bob Slaughter of Deming. The Warrior senior was in control of the match most of the time before pinning Slaughter.

Ciraulo lost a heartbreaking 10-8 decision to Mike Kuhn of Silver City in the 167-pound division.

Kuhn got a takedown (two points) and near fall (three points) in the first period before Ciraulo came back strong in the third period to almost win the match.

Ciraulo, who won the district championship last season, almost pinned Kuhn in the final seconds of the match, but the Silver City athlete hung on just long enough before time ran out.

Pese took a second period pin of Cobre's Victor Holquien to earn third place and a trip to the state tourna-

ment. The Warrior wrestler also qualified for the state tournament last season, finishing fourth at district.

Rue and Slatton both wrestled well, as did most of the other Ruidoso matmen.

Calling Martin Rose an artist is like saying Ruidoso is a town of 7,000 people.

Neither statement tells the whole story. Ruidoso's population booms each summer, and Martin Rose is a man of many parts.

He is a painter, to be sure, but he is also a real estate agent; a Ruidoso booster; a former Texan and oil man; a family man; a hunter and former prep athlete; a former ad agency artist; and more.

Now, "I do have a good life, boy, howdy," he says. "If I feel like painting, I'll paint all day, or be in the office at 7 a.m."

Generally, he works in his studio in the morning and at Resort Properties in the afternoon. He takes a short stroll to his studio around a corner of his family's home.

Martin Rose the town booster thinks a sign ordinance is important in Ruidoso, to protect the natural beauty here.

Martin Rose the oil man was born in Wink, Texas, a place he calls the last oil boom town. He has lived in various towns in his home state and is a graduate of the Kansas City Art Institute.

"I enjoyed Kansas City, but was overjoyed to leave," he says. The art institute and cultural opportunities were magnificent, he says, but the people weren't as friendly as Texans he knew.

Rose sold his first painting during that time decades ago, and did some freelance art work for Hallmark cards.

He settled in Ruidoso about seven years ago, after discovering this "little pimple of mountains in the middle of the desert."

Martin Rose loves it here, enthusiastically talking about driving from arctic to tropic conditions within a few miles, as you descend from Sierra Blanca.

"I moved here for the mountains, the trees, and to get out of the social and business rat race of West Texas," he says.

Ruidosians are all brave independent, he says.

"It takes courage to stay on this mountain. You have to be gutsy. It's a struggle to stay here. The turnover is unbelievable. Many can't hack it and leave."

Martin Rose the proud family man calls himself "my parents' youngest son," and still sees his older brother.

The brothers had "an easy upbringing," Martin said. Dad was there when needed, but didn't demand too much.

One thing his dad did was watch him play high school football. Martin Rose doesn't look like the he-man hulk image of a football player, but that's deceiving. He was a 132-pound All-State halfback in high school, he recalls. In Texas, that was no mean

Today, he and his wife, Susie, have two children. Marty is a University of New Mexico student. Grace and her family live nearby.

Martin Rose the artist sells works in galleries throughout the Southwest.

"My market is in Santa Fe, Arizona and West Texas," he says. Perhaps as few as a dozen people in Ruidoso own his works, mostly those who own second homes here.

He calls Ruidoso an art colony made up of artists who live here but sell their work elsewhere.

Rose frequently reflects on his work, and why he likes people but paints landscapes.

"I'm really people-oriented, I love to visit, but I paint nature," he says.

"There's enough material within a 20-mile radius to fill the rest of my life."

When he goes on location he makes many sketches and snaps pictures, as well as jotting notes to use as reference material in his studio.

Once he gets there, he occasionally runs into problems executing the painting. Sometimes he sits at the easel for 30 minutes before he becomes involved in the work.

"If I can't see the total sum of the painting, I'm lost," he says. But "with a good, firm image (in mind), it flows like water on canvas."

Of all the parts of Martin Rose, the artist may be most important. "I have to paint or I wouldn't be a happy person," he says.

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





## LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 84-4  
AN ORDINANCE REGULATING EXCAVATION; REQUIRING PERSONS TO GIVE NOTICE OF INTENT TO EXCAVATE; PROVIDING FOR EMERGENCY EXCAVATION; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO DOWNS, NEW MEXICO THAT CHAPTER V OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO DOWNS IS HEREBY AMENDED TO INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING:

- 1. SHORT TITLE:** This chapter shall be referred to as the "one call excavation Ordinance of the Village of Ruidoso Downs, New Mexico."
- 2. DEFINITIONS:** In this chapter the following words will have the meanings stated unless the context otherwise requires:
  - "Excavator" means any person required by this Ordinance to give advance notice of excavation.
  - "Excavation" means a hole, trench, ditch, depression or displacement, whether on public property or private easements appearing on record or acquired by adverse possession or prescriptive use, resulting from the removal or displacement by a person or pavement, dirt or other material.
  - "Emergency" means any situation necessitating excavation for the purpose of locating trouble or making repairs in a facility for the immediate protection of life, property or the public welfare.
  - "Facility" means any pipe, pipeline, tube, main, sewer, manhole, meter, regulator, valve, conduit, cable, or object of any kind or character, whether enumerated herein or not, which is or may be lawfully constructed, left, placed or maintained in, upon, along, across, or under any public property or private easements appearing on record or acquired by adverse possession or prescriptive use.
  - "Person" means any person or persons, singular or plural, male or female, natural or artificial, including but not limited to a firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.
  - "Utility" means any person furnishing the public gas, water, electricity, sewer service, telephone service, cable television, or similar product or service.
  - "Utility Council" means the Ruidoso Utility Council Non-Profit Corporation, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New Mexico.
- 3. ADVANCE NOTICE REQUIRED:** No person shall make any excavation until, at least 48 hours prior to excavation, he has given the Utility Council notice of the place, time and the type of the proposed excavation. Notice may be given in person at the offices of the Utility Council at such place as they may be from time to time maintaining, or notice may be given to the Utility Council by telephone at such number as the Council may, from time to time establish and maintain. Any Saturday, Sunday, legal holiday or other day when the Village Hall of the Village of Ruidoso Downs, New Mexico, is closed shall not count as part of the 48 hours. Immediately after receiving notice of the intended excavation, the Utility Council shall give notice to its member utilities of the place and type of the proposed excavation. Each member utility shall then mark, within 48 hours of the above described notice, the location of its utility at the place of the proposed excavation. No excavation shall begin until 48 hours have passed from the giving of the above described notice. After 48 hours have passed, a person may make excavation even though the member utilities of the Utility Council have not located and marked their utility at the place of the proposed excavation. If excavation is not commenced within twenty-four (24) hours of the time specified in the notice given to the Utility Council, a person shall be required to repeat the advance notice provisions of this Ordinance.
- 4. EMERGENCY EXCAVATION:** In cases of emergencies, a person may make an excavation without giving 48 hours advance notice to the Utility Council. Provided that, prior to an emergency excavation, if the emergency excavation is discovered during working hours, the person shall give notice to the Utility Council.
- 5. NOTIFICATION OF DAMAGE:** Any person doing excavation, including emergency excavation, which results in damage to any facility shall, as soon as practicable possible after the incurrence of the damage, give notice to the owner of the facility of the place and type of damage.
- 6. ENFORCEMENT:** This Ordinance may be enforced by the filing of a complaint in the Municipal Code of the Village of Ruidoso Downs, New Mexico. Persons authorized to file complaints are the Water Superintendent of the Village of Ruidoso Downs, New Mexico, and a person duly authorized by the Utility Council for this purpose as that person may from time to time be designated.
- 7. PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS:** Any person not giving the notices to the Utility Council as required by this Ordinance shall, upon conviction, pay a fine of \$100.00 for the first offense, \$200.00 for the second offense, and \$300.00 for the third offense and each offense thereafter.
- 8. CIVIL PENALTIES:** Nothing contained herein shall be construed to bar the owner of any facility from pursuing its remedies at law or in equity against any person damaging any facility.

"Effective Date." The effective date of this Ordinance shall be the 31st day of February, 1984.

At the time and place so designated for hearing objections, the Village Council shall hear and determine all objections which have been filed by any party interested, to the regularity of the proceedings in making the assessments and to the correctness of the assessments, or of the amount levied on any particular tract or parcel of land to be assessed, and the Village Council shall have the power to adjourn the hearing from time to time and, by resolution, shall have the power, in its discretion, to revise, correct, confirm or set aside any assessment in order that another assessment be made de novo.

After the hearing and at the meeting, the Village Council will consider a resolution passing on the objections heard and considered at the assessment hearing, and modifying and confirming the assessment roll, and will consider and will consider such other matters as may come before the Council.

Within the time provided by law, any person who has filed an objection may commence an action in district court to set aside the determination of the Village Council; however, after such time for commencing an action in district court has lapsed, any such actions (including the defense of prescription) shall be perpetually barred.

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—Question: Can you name three men who have worked extremely hard to make sure New Mexico has a Republican Legislature in 1985?

Answer: Ronald Reagan, Pete Domenici and Toney Anaya.

More Monday-morning quarterbacking on the 1984 legislative session:

—It was like a boulder in the road, that question of whether to raise taxes. It blocked almost all forward movement.

Feeling on the issue, both pro and con, was so intense it looked like we might not get government funded at all.

Doing that is so fundamental—and necessary—it's taken for granted in any ordinary session.

The tug-of-war was between authorizing expenditures which would require a boost in taxes, and trimming government to fit the available revenues.

And suddenly a third choice was being considered:

That called for a spending bill some millions larger than expected income, with no accompanying rise in taxes. The Legislature would then go home, leaving the problem of what to do to the man they blamed for all their difficulties, Governor Anaya.

That fight kept almost anything else from getting done.

The Governor, for instance, had declared this the "year of education" in the Legislature.

All educators got was a salary raise they consider paltry. The rest of us got nothing at all—certainly no promise that we will get anything other than our fairly dismal level of education for the year to come.

Another bad feature growing out of that never-ending battle over tax increases: what Rep. Gary Robbins accurately described as "putting the 'pork' in House Bill 2."

As you remember, Republicans in the Senate, with Senator Jimmy Rogers riding point, came up with a

total substitute for the spending plan passed by the House.

Unfortunately, their bill, which they wanted us to believe cut spending to the bone, included goodies for some of those in their newly minted coalition. Rogers put in a few for his district, and others had to be added to assure the staying power of Senator Francisco Gonzales of Taos, who wouldn't have stayed "bought" without them.

Then the bill went back to the House to be patched up.

Somebody there suggested that Robbins, who serves on the Appropriations Committee, might want to insure money for one of his favorite projects, building reintegration homes for kids leaving the Boys Home at Springer, by writing it into the basic funding measure.

Despite his deep interest in a worthwhile project, Robbins said, "That kind of spending should not be included in this measure. It belongs in a separate bill, where it can be considered, and passed or rejected, on its own merits. Pork from the porkbarrel shouldn't be in House Bill 2."

It's too bad not all legislators think as clearly on that topic as Gary does.

More than one member of Governor Anaya's Commission on Higher Education asked its chairman, former Oklahoma Senator Fred Harris, where the money was to come from to implement the extensive plan he was presenting.

Harris answered that he had found it best always to espouse what appeared to him worthy ideas and let somebody else worry about the mere detail of where the money is to come from.

That has all the charm of an innocent kid writing to Santa Claus. He knows what he wants, but he has no plans to worry about how it is to be paid for.

Legislators, whose jobs are closer to reality than Harris' apparently is, rejected most of the proposals his commission came up with.

They at least, understand that somebody has to balance the checkbook.

### "Two and the Ragged Tiger"

She does look a little ragged, still, but to us Fleable is more beautiful than ever. She's alive.

When Cathy and I moved here in September 1981, we rented an apartment off Wingfield near the police station. We were informed by our landlords, Jim George and John Winiford, that no pets were allowed.

No problem—we didn't have any pets. But there were some animals who hung around, and we took a particular liking to a tiger-striped calico cat who liked to go on walks with us.

We took to feeding table scraps to her, and she took to spending a fair amount of time inside the apartment. Her other food source was confirmed to us when we saw her poised on a dumpster one day.

Cat food was added to our shopping list. Fleable also learned that by meowing loudly, she could coerce me into giving her some milk in the morning. By then, of course, she was sleeping inside.

Fortunately, our landlords didn't come around too often. One day they were there, and Fleable was out front. Jim told John to pick her up so they could cart her away, but John ignored him.

They wanted to leave a message for someone in another apartment, so Jim told John to leave a card. Jim said he didn't want to leave one of his own cards, because they cost him eight cents apiece. I think John ignored him again.

At some point, Cathy discovered a flea in the apartment. She pointed the finger at the cat.

"You old fleabag," she accused her. Fleabag became Fleable, and she got a flea collar.

Gradually Fleable began take on that condition common to females of the feline and other species. One night, she was on our bed purring especially loudly, and suddenly we realized it was D (for delivery) day.

We put her on the floor by the bed and she proceeded to bear five kittens. Two were not well and didn't make it—and the first tears over our adopted family were shed.

But the other three nursed and grew and opened their eyes and played, providing us with great entertainment for many weeks. We were able to move them into the kitchen eventually, though not until Fleable was ready. The first time we tried she promptly carried the kittens back into the bedroom.

Our plan was to block off part of the kitchen from possible observation by the landlords. Kittens are tough to confine, though.

Too soon it was time for the kittens to go to their new homes. We were getting ready to move to a new home ourselves, though, and that meant the apartment was being shown.

One day, John brought over a prospective tenant when Cathy was home with Fleable. Cathy was very upset to be caught red-handed, but she said John just ignored Fleable and showed the person around.

Finally, in a fit of exasperation, Cathy (who truly has a great regard for rules) scooped Fleable up and put her out just as John was leaving.

As he walked away with his prospect, Cathy told me later, he off-handedly remarked to the person, "We don't allow pets, you know."

Fleable went with us to our new house, and shortly after we added a puppy named Brun to our family. She accepted him well enough, but cuffed him whenever he got out of line, establishing the pecking order that exists to this day.

Another move last fall was taken in stride by those two. But our idyllic kinship was shattered suddenly one night three weeks ago when Fleable was struck by a car.

It happened on a walk, as she followed Brun and I across a road. I scooped her up and rushed to the house. She was wheezing and sort of gurgling blood. Cathy called Dr. Willard, who said to meet him at the clinic.

Cathy drove, struggling with hysteria. Fleable breathed faster and faster. She was going into shock.

Dr. Willard quickly checked her over—most of the damage appeared to be in the mouth area. He shaved her forehead and inserted a needle into a vein. The needle was fed by a tube from an overhanging bottle; it carried medication to combat shock.

As he worked, Lynn occasionally gave a deep sigh. It occurred to me that was his body's way of dealing with the life or death situation confronting him.

His skill gave Fleable a chance to make it through that first night. Our prayers, we are convinced, allowed her to make it.

Cathy and I learned something about what we have that night. One of us would break down—the other would give support. And together we prayed.

I said a rosary for the first time since I was a boy. And Cathy, who has had doubts about both the efficacy of recited prayer and calling on the Virgin Mary, learned the Hall Mary that night and joined in.

And Fleable made it. And in the days after, every improvement she needed to make to progress in her recovery—that she stand, that she survive surgery, that she drink water, that she eat—we prayed for. And she made them.

Of course, through all of this, I could not help feeling that we fitted the stereotype of people who call on God for help only when they need Him.

But how much we fit it is really a moot point. The real point is, do we acknowledge what has been done for us by leading a better life as Christians?

I pray that we do. And though if she hadn't made it we could take comfort knowing she was safe and happy with Our Lord in Heaven (that phrase really is a blessing, Dannie), we are very very happy to have her home with us.

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

Maybe photographers aren't such cynics, after all.



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
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

# Ruidosoan Ted Marolt hopes to beat the best in U.S. Open

He's manager of a health club, has skied about five times this year and hopes to beat some of the best professional ski racers in the world. In his name—Walter—Mitty? No, it's Ted Marolt.

And he might have a chance. Although his current training schedule consists more of hustling memberships to the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club rather than hustling through racing gates, he was a top qualifier in the professional ski race at Winter Park, Colorado, a couple of weeks ago.

And he's no stranger to the racers or the racing circuit.

For four years Marolt made his living skiing professionally. He traveled all over the United States and, at one point, was ranked third on the American Pro Tour.

Before that, it was skiing all over the world with the United States National Ski Team.

It's not hard to get started in the sport when you are born and raised in Aspen, and your father and two uncles were on the national ski team. Ted said he was never pressured into

skiing competitively but just took to it naturally.

Racing first on the junior national team and later with the national team, Ted spent years competing all over the world as an amateur. But at the age of 21, he decided to go pro.

"I wanted more of my own time," said Ted.

With the national team, schedules were stricter and his time was dictated much by the team's schedule. Pro racing, on the other hand, offered more independence and a friendlier atmosphere.

On the pro circuit, the skiers often train with their friends and help each other. Although the competition on the hill is fierce, the camaraderie was more sincere off the hill, said Marolt.

"The atmosphere is much more relaxed," said Ted.

The traveling week in and week out got to be a strain, but the places he saw and the experiences of the tour were well worth it. With his wife, Pam, as a traveling companion for two of those years, the rigors of the road were softened somewhat.

And there was always the excitement. Ted couldn't pick out any specific highlight of his pro racing career.

"Just about every race was a highlight," said Marolt.

But two years ago the racing circuit hit hard times and it became much harder to make a living on the tour. Family, in the way of a daughter Mandi, also helped change some of his priorities.

And he returned to Ruidoso full time.

Ted moved to Ruidoso six years ago after a good first impression. On his first visit, he won both the slalom and giant slalom in a Southwest Pro Tour race, and was offered a job at the Jockey Club by Lloyd Davis.

He came back the next summer and has been living here since when not racing. Six years is long enough for the town to adopt him, and now he's the hometown boy trying to take on racers from all over the world.

"I'm frightened as much as anything," said Ted Wednesday. "There's a lot of pressure. My main objective is to qualify."

He has qualified in two of the three races he entered so far this year and missed by one spot in the third. At Winter Park, he was the sixth best qualifier. Unfortunately, a fall in the first round kept him from advancing any further. But the results in Winter Park pleased him.

"I was definitely encouraged. I think I've got a chance of going a few rounds."

But to go a few rounds, he has to qualify. And 60 of the world's best pro

skiers will be in Ruidoso the first week of March to vie for the 32 spots in the slalom and giant slalom races and the biggest purse in pro skiing.

Ted, however, feels the hill at Eagle

Creek may offer him some advantage.

"I like the hill," said Ted, who said his skiing style is better suited to steep hills than flatter terrain.

But even if he doesn't achieve his goals, Ted will probably enjoy the race. For him, it will be a chance to see many of the friends he has skied with all his life, still keep a hand in the

racing industry and get away from work for a week.

And what boss could argue with an excuse like racing for the world's biggest purse?

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

## Papa Juan's Restaurante proud of food, prices

"We have good food fixed daily at a good price," said Joyce Taylor, part owner of Papa Juan's Mexican Restaurante, located at 2913 Sudderth Drive. "If you're in business in Ruidoso or wherever, you've got to have a good price."

Taylor owns the newly opened business with her husband, John. Taylor said the restaurant features menu items starting at \$2.90 for lunch and \$3.50 for dinner.

"It's an excellent price, there's nobody in town who comes close to it."

The Taylors have been in the restaurant business for 17 years, of which 12 were in Fort Worth, Texas, and five in Ruidoso. The Taylors also own Big John's Texas Bar-B-Q, located at 2919 Sudderth Drive.

Papa Juan's opened December 18. "Business has been just incredible since we opened," Taylor said.

According to her, it is a combination of factors that makes their business good.

"They will support you if you give them good food at a good price," she said of the people in Ruidoso. "This town has supported us phenomenally."

Taylor said the 40-plus menu items are derived from recipes that originated all over the Southwest, California and several foreign countries. She said each final recipe was created by John.

"We're real particular about the way our food's prepared," she said. "You can tell it's made from scratch."

The menu at Papa Juan's is a Mex-

ican food lover's dream, featuring such items as chicken, guacamole and meat chalupas; stuffed sopaipillas; chile rellenos; and a variety of enchiladas. Taylor said all entrees are served with tostadas and sopaipillas.

"Our sopaipillas are great," Taylor said. They are made in a \$3,000 sopaipilla machine.

Taylor said the restaurant caters to families.

"We have basically a family atmosphere for family dining," she said.

According to Taylor, they are in the process of applying for a beer and wine liquor license for the restaurant. The restaurant seats a total of 106 people, with 36 of those seats in a private, "romantic" dining room, according to Taylor. She said the room is available for groups of 36 or less on a reservation basis.

Papa Juan's offers 10 percent discount cards that are distributed throughout the lodging establishments in town for use by their visitors, Taylor said. She also mentioned that senior citizens can get a 10 percent discount, and businesses, clubs and organizations that use the private dining room are also entitled to the 10 percent discount.

Once a month, Papa Juan's offers a free dinner to residents of the Ruidoso Care Center and their sponsors, according to Taylor.



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


