

The pilot and his wife, Mike and Gwen Bengfort, walked away from the plane without a scratch, said Pat Taylor. She and her husband, Dale, own the turbine-powered eight-place plane. It is registered in Ardmore, Oklahoma, said Tim Morris, airport manager. The plane slid to a stop in turf about halfway down the runway and 50 feet west of it. The wheels were still up after the crash. The force of the landing curled both propellers and crumpled the plane's belly. ## Apartment zoning planned

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Monday approved plats for two multi-family housing projects, then discussed a new zoning designation specifically for apartment complexes.

P&Z approved the final plat of Camelot Place Apartments, which will contain 70 apartment units on 5.65 acres directly behind the Camelot Theater. The request was submitted by Jim Anthony.

The commission also approved a replat of the Springs Condominiums at the corner of Leon Farrar and University Drives. The two-phase project on 4.3 acres will contain 52 units. The request was submitted by Sun County Savings Bank of New Mexico.

The new plat contained two new units but more green space due to additional stories on some of the buildings.

After approval of the two projects,

the commission discussed a proposed R-4 zoning designation specifically for apartment complexes. P&Z chairman Greg Masters said the new designation was being considered because current density requirements allowed too few units and made potential rental property very expensive.

The new designation would allow owners to build apartment complexes that contain half the square footage of the land on which they sit. Green space and parking requirements would remain the same, said P&Z member Ray Bishop.

The current density requirements allow 15 units per acre if the units average less than two bedrooms and 12 units per acre if the average is more than two bedrooms.

Bishop said the new designation would allow more density on some apartment projects while maintaining green space and parking space requirements.

P&Z member Margaret Gaddy recommended that the R-4 designation should include a requirement

that all proposed apartment complexes go before the Architectural Plans Review Committee to ensure that aesthetics of the project be maintained. She also recommended that green space requirements for R-4 projects include requirements for playgrounds and an off-road bus stop.

The Planning and Zoning office now will begin the process required for the adoption of the new zoning designation.

The commission also increased the commercially zoned property near Sudderth Drive. P&Z agreed to rezone from R-1 (single-family residential) to C-1 (light commercial) lots 1 through 18 on the river side of Rio Street between Riverside and Country Club Drives.

The commission also zoned four lots on the east end of Wingfield Street from R-1 to C-1.

These two requests had originally been submitted to P&Z in May 1982, but were tabled. The commission brought the requests off the table and increased them to include whole blocks instead of a few lots on each

block. It refused, however, to rezone a lot on Mechem Drive where Fox Plaza now stands from C-1 to C-2 (general commercial).

The owner of the land had originally intended to put in a recreational vehicle sales and service business when he submitted the rezoning request in August 1982. The request had been tabled and the owner since built the Fox Plaza.


In other business, P&Z:

- Approved a replat of blocks I, K and M in Middle Cedar Subdivision for Otis Pearson. The replat divided one lot into three lots.

- Approved the replat into two lots of property adjacent to The Carrizo Lodge for Donald L. George.

- Approved a replat of property on which the Cro's Nest Motel and Apartments sits to include a 20-foot easement for driveway access to one of the lots.

- Approved the replat of one lot into two lots, lot 9, block 3, Cree Meadows Heights second addition, for Johnny Durham.

## Tuesday fire controlled

Firefighters quickly controlled a blaze at the Ruidoso Truss Company Tuesday night, preventing what could have been a more serious fire.

A back room was totally destroyed and a front room of the office building on Sudderth Drive sustained smoke damage. Wooden building materials and a diesel tank, however, were untouched by the flames.

Firefighter Danny Garcia said the fire was under control 10 to 15 minutes after the Ruidoso Fire Department arrived. The fire siren sounded shortly after 7:30 p.m., when the alarm was raised. About 18 paid and volunteer firefighters rushed to fight the blaze.

The department does not ordinarily make public damage estimates or name the cause of the fire, Garcia said. However, he did say the blaze appeared to be an accident, and that he saw no reason to suspect arson.

Chris Ferguson, who owns the building, said the fire may have started in old wiring. A stove in the room apparently did not ignite the blaze, he said. The Carrizo man said the cabin was constructed during the 1930s.

Ruidoso Truss is continuing operations as close to normal as possible. Ferguson said deliveries were made Wednesday.

## Condo Share officers sentenced

Ruidoso Condo Share officers Jim Vincent and Dean Shade were sentenced Tuesday afternoon for their convictions in the District Court trial that ended with the jury returning a guilty verdict on December 16, 1983.

Club manager Vincent received a sentence of five concurrent 18-month periods of incarceration at the New Mexico State Penitentiary for his conviction on two counts of criminal solicitation, one count of criminal conspiracy, one count of the sale of unregistered securities and one count of securities fraud.

According to District Judge Robert Doughty, all but 12 months of that incarceration will be suspended. Vincent also was sentenced to two concurrent 36-month periods of incarceration at the New Mexico State Penitentiary for his conviction on two counts of fraud over \$2,500. Doughty said that time will be suspended on the condition that Vincent serve five years of probation after he is released from the state penitentiary. Other conditions imposed are that he not hold or apply for a license to sell land, time shares or securities; and that he obtain and retain employment in a field in which he is not involved in sales of any kind and does not have direct contact with consumers, subject to the approval of his parole officer.

Before Doughty read the sentence, Vincent made a series of remarks.

"At no time did I ever try to hide that there was a problem in the past," he said. "I felt this was a new start for myself and my family. At no time did I refuse to refund anybody who had a complaint. I believe in my heart that I did not intend to defraud anybody. I'm not saying that I didn't get a good trial, but that some evidence wasn't placed before the jury. I took a lie detector test seven times and passed seven times. I do

not have any idea why that was not entered into evidence.

"All this could have been handled civilly," he said. "I have a lot of remorse."

Vincent's comments were followed by remarks from Vincent's attorney, Gary Mitchell. Mitchell was hired by Vincent in place of Vincent's former attorney, James Brandenburg, who represented Vincent in the Condo Share trial.

Mitchell said he was surprised by the outcome of the trial.

"Nobody lost any money," he said. "All checks and debts were paid, or arrangements were made to be paid."

Mitchell also pointed to the unfamiliarity of the jurors with the subject of the trial.

"They have very little knowledge in this case," he said.

"There's no reason this should have been a criminal case."

While Doughty read the sentence, Vincent remained expressionless.

Condo Share sales manager Dean Shade also was sentenced Tuesday. For his conviction of one count each of criminal conspiracy, criminal solicitation and tampering with evidence, Shade was sentenced to three consecutive 18-month periods of incarceration at the New Mexico State Penitentiary, all of which will be suspended, according to Doughty, on the condition that Shade obtain and retain employment in a field that does not involve the practice of real estate or time-sharing.

Before the sentence was read by Doughty, Shade said, "In my own mind, and in a clear conscience, I have never committed a crime against anybody."

Doughty commented to Shade after the sentencing was read, "If you can have a clear conscience in the face of the facts that have been presented in this court, I feel an obligation to the people of the state of New Mexico to keep you from the practice of real estate."

# Shane Watts: handicapped ski star plans trip to nationals

Losing a leg does not seem to have slowed him down very much at all. Within months of an operation that removed a gangrenous leg at the hip, Shane Watts was swimming. He played Little League football for three years; he high jumped over five feet. Today, he often drives a manual shift car.

But possibly his greatest achievements are in skiing.

Soon after the operation that left Shane with one leg, Dr. Ron Annala recommended he take up skiing.

Although he only had been skiing one time before his accident, Shane and his mother, Judy Miller, traveled up to Sierra Blanca Ski Resort and the handicapped ski office.

Diana Person, head of the Sierra Blanca Handicapped Skiers Association, took him right out on the snow. Shane skied four more times before leaving.

Along with several other handicapped skiers at Sierra Blanca, Shane left for the National Handicapped Skier Championships, where he won the Class C championship.

He has returned to the national championships each of the five years since then, and won the Class A overall championship for junior men every year but one.

"He's just an incredibly strong athlete," said Person. "There are very few like him."

The handicapped skiers don't race on simple courses either. They are almost the same as those for skiers with two healthy legs.


Last year Shane skied down the mile and a half downhill course at Squaw Valley, California, in one minute and thirty seconds. If you think about it, that is an average of 60 miles per hour.

"I've gone 80 at least," said Shane. On one leg? Shane insists that skiing on one leg is easier than doing it on two.

"You don't have to worry about crossing a tip," said Shane.

He did admit a little later that learning to turn left on his left leg had been a difficult lesson. He credits Person with much of what he has learned.

"She's the best. She can teach any type of handicapped person to ski," said Shane, who has taken lessons from her off and on for five years.

Of course, not all those lessons were smooth and cheery. Shane remembered when Diana refused to allow him to go back to a shorter ski when he was having trouble learning how to handle the longer, more difficult one.

Diana mentioned the time she decided to give Shane poles to ski with, rather than outriggers which have ski tips on the ends. She said he moaned about it for a while, but that it made him a better skier. It also saved on outriggers, three of which Shane had broken while flying off of jumps.

And saving money is a crucial thing to the program. The program relies almost completely on fund-raisers and volunteer teachers.

In the past, the Businessmen's Handicapped Ski Race and a dinner associated with it have been the

primary fund-raisers for the program.

This year the program also will receive funds from U.S. Open ski race events—the Celebrity Pro-Am awards dinner and a "Pick the Winner" party.

The Businessmen's Handicapped Ski Race will be Wednesday, March 29, with the dinner the night before at Cree Meadows Restaurant. Food is being donated by Sonny's Bar B Q and Steak Pit, Nottingham's Pub, Cousins and Cree Meadows. A \$5 donation will benefit the handicapped ski program. There will also be a "Pick the Winner" party after the dinner.

The U.S. Open "Pick the Winner" party will also be at Cree Meadows, on Friday, March 2, with a percentage of the bar donated to the pro-

to the national championships at Jackson Hole, Wyoming, March 17-25.

The program used to sponsor skiers at the championships a few years ago. But it was costing thousands of dollars to take a few students and their teachers to the championships.

Program directors decided to spend the money at home, where it would better benefit all the handicapped skiers, said program instructor Bobby Palm.

Shane is hoping to raise \$600 for his trip to Jackson Hole.

At 18, he now will be competing with the men for the first time. Although he is moving to a more competitive class, he is still confident he will do well.

"There shouldn't be any difficulties," said the muscular young blond.

His mother said the men already were watching Shane last year when he raced in the championships at Squaw Valley.

In addition to competing with the

best, Shane said, he enjoys seeing friends he has made at the championships in past years. They may race in the day, but the handicapped can raise a ruckus at night in the lodges, indicated Shane.

When asked if the handicapped are any different, Shane answered, "Crazier, I guess." He said they "boller more" while sliding down the hill.

Why shouldn't they? Person pointed out that many handicapped skiers were experiencing speed and grace otherwise inaccessible in a life of crutches and leg braces.

"It opens up a whole new world to them," said Person. "What it does to their psychology is amazing."

She explained that success on the slopes often translated into boosted confidence and the will to try new challenges on the slopes.

Shane Watts appears ready to take on almost any challenge coming his way.

## John R. Barton announces for judgeship

John R. Barton has announced his candidacy for Ruidoso municipal judge.

Barton moved to Ruidoso three years ago after visiting the area for 50 years. He owns and operates Der Klocken Shoppen in Sierra Vista Mall.

Barton said he had worked with clocks and watches for 20 years since retiring from the Air Force. He served in the Air Force for 27 years.

He said he learned that military techniques often did not work well in civilian life. But he believes the practical experience he gained in the service is valuable.

As base commander, Barton said, he was essentially in charge of a small city. He learned how all the small city services of a base mesh and complement each other.

Barton said he thought he had the

experience, maturity, capability and dependability to be a judge.

"If we are to continue to invite the world to visit our beautiful home and share its business and pleasure, it is imperative we ensure for them and ourselves adequate protection and honest law enforcement. To this end I will work tirelessly," said Barton.

Barton said the increased salary had nothing to do with his decision to run for office, and that he did not even know about the increase when he made his decision.

"I live here and enjoy it and I'd like to offer something in return," said Barton.

He pledged to donate 20 percent of his salary as judge to civic and charitable organizations, among which would be Crime Stoppers and the Ruidoso Care Center.

## Alma Russell candidate for council

## Al Junge seeks return to council seat

Al Junge has announced his candidacy for the Ruidoso village council. He was the only member of the present council to choose to run.

Junge, who is from Dallas-Fort Worth, has worked for Commercial Credit Corporation, Pacific Finance Corporation and Montgomery Ward. He also had an insurance business for 22 years.

He and his wife, Esther, bought the Storybook Cabins in 1975 and moved here permanently in 1977. The two have a son, a daughter, six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Junge said he was active in Ronald Reagan's campaign in the 1960s. After moving here, Junge began attending council meetings regularly, and was on committees that worked on ordinances on animal control, street cuts and water rates.

He said that when he ran for council in 1982, he promised to use good business practices he had gained working for various companies.

"While I feel that there was some resistance at first to new ideas, nevertheless I feel we did make some pro-

gress," said Junge. Pros and cons were duly reported in the newspaper, he added.

He pointed out that he was elected in 1982 to a four-year term, and said he would like to complete at least two more years to finish some projects still on the drawing boards.

Junge said that whether elected again or not he would remain active and work closely with the new council to improve local government.

He mentioned the land now occupied by the Ruidoso Municipal Airport—which would be vacated if a new airport were built—as an important issue.

"I'd recommend to the mayor that he appoint a blue ribbon committee to make a study and recommend a use for the present airport land," said Junge.

The councilman said he also would like to complete plans to improve pickup of solid waste. This would include repair and replacement of damaged dumpsters and use of a new flatbed truck to pick up large items such as refrigerators.

Don Hendricks has announced his candidacy for Ruidoso municipal judge.

He and his wife, Donna, have two children: Brian, 20, and Mishawn, 19. Hendricks said he had been in the construction business nearly all his working life.

He was building inspector for the Village of Ruidoso for two years, and was a building inspector in Roswell for a year. He has lived in Ruidoso two and a half years.

Hendricks is presently the owner of Ruidoso Wholesale Lumber.

"I'm running to give the voters of Ruidoso a choice," said Hendricks. He pointed out that as building inspector, he interpreted and enforced the building code. "I think that's somewhat like the municipal judge would have to interpret the laws of the state."

Hendricks said he did not see any major issues in the race for judge. He said the judge worked a lot with the young people of the village, and that

## Warrior girls drop last game as late comeback falls short

## Warriors host Silver City in last game in old gymnasium

The Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team hopes to add a victory to a bit of history Friday night when the Warriors host Silver City. The contest will be the last high school varsity contest to be played in the Warrior gymnasium. Ruidoso will move into the new high school plant next fall.

History aside, Ruidoso, 1-6 in district action and 4-17 overall, will finish in last place in the regular season standings even if the Warriors beat Silver City.

However, a victory would give the young Ruidoso squad confidence going into the playoffs.

Silver City is a quick team that likes to run the ball up and down the floor and press on defense.

Still, the Warriors gave the Colts all they could handle in the first meeting between the two clubs in Silver City, losing 59-56. Ruidoso cut the Colt lead to two points late in the game before Silver City hung on for the win.

"They're a good team," admitted Warrior head coach Ron Geyer about Silver City. "They like to run a lot and we'll have to get back on defense quickly."

The Warriors also will have to stop the Colts' fast break and make a high percentage of their own shots, both from the field and from the free throw line.

Ruidoso has been bothered by poor foul shooting in recent games. The Warriors hit just seven of 16 in last week's 38-35 loss to Cobre, and made only eight of 27 against Tularosa.

A key to the outcome of the game may be the Warriors' defensive play. Ruidoso played excellent defense against the talented Cobre squad.

Gus Sierra is the Colts' tallest player. Oscar Franco (6-2) is another standout, and the Colts also have some good guards. Tim Perez is a good shooter, having scored 12 points against the Warriors in the first contest.

But the Warriors can at least match Silver City height-wise.

Sophomore center Dan Ullmann is 6-8, while junior Tracy Gann is 6-3 and sophomore Russell Easter is 6-2.

Easter, especially, has performed well in recent weeks. The sophomore has scored in double figures three of the last four games. He has also done a good job on the boards.

Ullmann has been the Warriors' leading scorer and rebounder most of the season. However, he was ill for a couple of weeks and is still winding back into top shape. Still, the sophomore has averaged 19.3 points a game on the season.

Gilbert Rivera, Cyrus Simmons, Patric Pearson, Tommy Crow, Dion Lopez and Kenny Espinosa are other key Warrior players.

Simmons, Rivera, Espinosa and Bobby Dominguez will be playing their final home game for the Warriors. All four players are seniors.

Rivera has been the Warriors' best outside shooter most of the season and brings the ball up court well, as does Simmons.

The Ruidoso junior varsity will be seeking a third straight win when it plays Silver City in the 5:30 p.m. preliminary contest.

Ruidoso defeated Cobre 48-47 last weekend. Freshman Brian Davis led the Warrior scoring with 19 points.

NOTES: Ruidoso will play either Cobre, Deming or Silver City in the first round of the district playoffs next week. The Warriors will tangle with the second-place team on the latter's home court. Deming and Cobre are currently tied for the district lead, but Silver City still has a chance of tying for first place.

Despite a valiant comeback effort, the Ruidoso High School girls varsity basketball team ended the season Tuesday night with a 63-52 loss to host Silver City in the first round of the district tournament.

Ruidoso, which ended the season with a 6-17 record, trailed by as much as 15 points in the second half before almost pulling the game off in the final minutes.

Silver City led 52-37 with five minutes remaining in the contest when the Warriors made their move.

A field goal and two free throws by junior Stacy Ivy closed the gap to 52-41. The Colts added three more points but the Warriors came back with four points to trail 55-46.

Senior Jackie Jefferson hit a layup on a rebound and Lillian Lopez followed with a steal and layup to cut the Colts' margin to five points, 55-50, with just under two minutes remaining in the game.

Then the Warriors' hopes went down the drain.

Ruidoso put a full-court press on, but the Colts found a player open down court who made a short jump shot to make the score 57-50.

Silver City then cashed in at the free throw line to put the game away. Diane McClure finished the Warriors' scoring with a layup just before the buzzer.

Ruidoso never led in the contest as the quick and well-balanced hosts took a 4-0 edge in the opening moments of the game and kept it the rest of the way.

The Colts led 12-0 at the end of the first quarter and increased the lead to 29-16 at halftime.

Ruidoso played much better in the second half, playing Silver City evenly in the third quarter.

Silver City had a 14-point advantage twice in the third period but the Warriors kept fighting.

Junior Gia Rose scored on a fast break layup as the period ended to close the Colts' edge to 11 points, (44-33).

That set the stage for Ruidoso's unsuccessful comeback in the final quarter.

McClure, a junior, led the Warrior scoring with 18 points on seven field goals and four free throws. Ivy added nine, Lopez scored seven and Jefferson tallied six. Sophomore Mavis Geronimo added five points.

Maria Quintana led the Silver City scoring with 18 points, eight of them

in the first quarter when the Colts got off to a fast start. Patricia Carbajal added 11 points.

The Warriors' foul shooting was improved over previous games as Ruidoso hit 16 of 31 attempts.

However, turnovers hurt the Warriors' effort, particularly in the first half.

Despite the defeat, Ruidoso head coach Sergio Castanon was proud of his team.

"It was their best effort of the season," he said. "They have nothing to be ashamed about. They played their hearts out and did a very good job of representing Ruidoso, the school, community, everybody."

One bright spot for the Warriors is the return of most of the team next season. Lopez, Jefferson and Tami Goldsmith are the only seniors on the squad.

Silver City will now play Cobre Friday night for the right to meet Hot Springs for the district title Saturday night. Cobre defeated Deming 48-27 Tuesday night.

## Tigers, Grizzlies play tonight

# Ruidoso matmen ready for state

## Wrestlers have chance to place

"He's the best heavyweight in the state," said Ames of Carlson. "He's about 6-6."  
Peso is an outstanding wrestler when at his best and could be a longshot for the state championship, according to Ames.  
The Ruidoso junior won the Los Lunas Invitational championship, pinning his three opponents there in

3:17 minutes. If he can duplicate that performance at Tucumcari, he has a good chance of placing high.  
Ames doesn't think the Warriors have much of a chance at the team championship, despite high individual prospects.  
"I'd say Aztec, Albuquerque Academy, Bloomfield and maybe Deming will be up there," Ames

remarked. "Possibly Silver City too."  
Deming won the District 3-AAA championship with Silver City second and Ruidoso fifth.  
There will be 12 men entered in each weight class, with the seeding meeting scheduled for Thursday night at Tucumcari.  
Competition will begin at 10 a.m. Friday.

It should be a very interesting post-season for local college basketball fans.

Both the University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP) and the University of New Mexico (UNM) have excellent chances of playing in either the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Tournament or the National Invitational Tournament (NIT).

In UTEP's case, the NCAA tournament is a good possibility. The Miners are leading the Western Athletic Conference (WAC) standings with an 11-2 record and have a good chance at an NCAA berth even if they finish second.

The Miners have won a lot of close games this season, something that is the mark of a good team.

Now I'm not comparing UTEP to traditional powers like the University of North Carolina, Houston and Georgetown. But the Miners are still a very solid team that should do well in the NCAA tournament.

UTEP doesn't have great height, except for 6-10 sophomore Dave Felti. The rest of the starting lineup is no taller than 6-6.

But UTEP's players work well as a team, another mark of a solid ballclub.

Perhaps the best thing about the 1983-84 Miners is the fact that five of the top six players are juniors or sophomores. Only 6-6 forward Fred Reynolds is a senior.

UNM's prospects for a post-season tournament berth aren't quite as good

as UTEP's, but the Lobos should still be in a tournament when the final bids are handed out next month.

The Lobos have been playing consistent winning basketball all season.

Head coach Gary Colson has done a good job molding a winning team with players of just average ability in most cases.

Guard Phil Smith and forward Tim Garrett have been the most outstanding Lobos this season, but the other players have also contributed to UNM's success.

Nelson Franse, T. J. Drake and Alan Dolensky have been starting most of the season, while Mike Winters and Kelvin Scarborough lead a talented freshman bench.

UTEP and Brigham Young University (BYU) appear to have better shots than UNM of making the NCAA tournament. Both of those teams have earned respect from the rest of the country, UTEP being ranked in the top 10 and BYU also having a winning record, including a victory over Norte Dame last Saturday.

But if the Lobos win the rest of their regular-season games, they should get an NCAA bid. Even if they don't get an NCAA bid, the Lobos should still earn an NIT berth.

That in itself would be a big achievement after UNM's Lobogate scandal of several seasons ago.

If UNM doesn't get a post-season bid, then Lobo fans will have a right to be upset.

Quality is often better than quantity in high school sports, and the Ruidoso High School wrestling team hopes to prove that at the state AAA division championships at Tucumcari High School Friday and Saturday.

Only four Warrior wrestlers have qualified for the state tournament, compared to nine last season. However, coach Gerald Ames thinks all four wrestlers have a good chance of placing in the top four.

Joe LaRue will wrestle in the heavyweight division. Gary Burgess will go at 185 pounds, Scott Ciraulo at 187 pounds and Gervase Peso at 155 pounds.

"They've all got a shot," Ames said. "Last year we sent nine guys and the highest we placed was fifth by Burgess. This year all four guys have an excellent chance of placing in the top four."

LaRue has a 14-4 seasonal record. Ciraulo is 13-9, Burgess is 17-6 and Peso is 7-7. Peso is the only junior in the group, while the others are seniors.

The four wrestlers are not lacking in state meet experience.

It will be the third straight year Ciraulo and Burgess have competed in the state tournament. Peso made it last season and LaRue is a transfer from Georgia, where he competed in the state tournament last season.

Burgess has probably been the most consistent Warrior wrestler over the past three seasons. He took fourth in the district last season but still did well at the state tournament. This year he won the district title and should be a tough contender in his weight class.

"Yes, I do think I can do well but I don't want to say I will for sure," Burgess said. "My toughest competition will probably be Marquez (Patrick) from Tucumcari."


Marquez beat Burgess at the Ruidoso Invitational in December and is highly rated as the wrestler to beat in the 185-pound class.

Ciraulo won the district championship last season and finished second this season. He lost a 10-8 decision to Mike Kuhn of Silver City in the district title match but almost pinned the Colt wrestler in the late going.

LaRue won the district heavyweight title by pinning Fred Slaughter of Deming in the second period.

However, the Warrior heavyweight has a tough task on his hands in search of the first-place title at state.

The favorite in the heavyweight division is Rolf Carlson of Albuquerque Academy. Carlson pinned LaRue in the title match at the Los Lunas Invitational and is a heavy favorite for the state championship.

A Visit To The Bosque Del Apache In The Last Week Of January

In the last week of January my wife, Natalia, and I had the pleasure of visiting Dan's brother, Lynn, and Maxine Storm at their place in Ruidoso. The Storms had previously discovered the Bosque Del Apache Wildlife Refuge and were so impressed with what they saw that a trip over there was made the high point of our stay.

On the day of our expedition the weather was crisp and sparkling clear, so that the descent from the mountains and the drive across the plains to the Rio Grande was, in itself, a beautiful experience. The visitors' entrance to the 57, 191-acre refuge is on New Mexico Route number 1 about eight miles south of San Antonio. We arrived in the late afternoon, well before sundown and in plenty of time for a leisurely drive around the fifteen mile tour loop.

The terrain there is marshy with tall grass, many ponds, cultivated fields of grain for the birds, and low trees in some places. We were struck by the quiet beauty of the spot with its many shades of yellow, brown, orange and red, all against a background of distant blue mountains and clear light blue sky.

We are not precise nature watchers in the Audubon sense, so a slow casual drive around the loop was sufficient to provide a succession of interesting sights — a variety of geese and ducks on the pond, including one incredibly large Canadian Goose standing on the bank; groups of big gray Sandhill Cranes feeding in the ponds and fields; an occasional lonesome-looking great Blue Heron; large

hawks surveying the scene from vantage points on dead tree limbs; groups of tiny dark birds wheeling about just above the ground; a single large coyote wandering casually through the field; small groups of Mule Deer here and there and one large herd of about thirty, including some great antlered bucks, two of which squared off and clashed horns while we were looking on.

All of this was of much interest but in no way prepared us for the real climax, which began to unfold around sundown. I was standing atop a look-out tower at the northern end of the loop when I gradually became aware of a faint chorus of short high-pitched honks from somewhere up the river. This sound grew steadily louder as a long wavering line of dark specks came into view against the evening sky. Slowly these specks assumed the form of Snow Geese with black-tipped wings as they came abreast of my

position. Presently, wave after wave of Snows, Canadians, Sandhill Cranes

and others, all honking and croaking by the thousands, seemed to envelope us on all sides.

As we resumed our drive, turning southward toward the entrance, we and other car loads of visitors stopped

beside a corn field literally packed with frantically feeding and crying birds, mostly Sandhill Cranes and

various kinds of geese. Here we saw two of the rare White Whooping Cranes, hatched at an Idaho refuge in

Sandhill nests from eggs brought there by man from the Canadian feeding grounds of the Whooper.


Further down the loop we stood at the roadside in awe at the grand finale on the ponds just north of the entrance. There, only feet in front of us, flock after flock of beautiful large birds were lighting in and around the

water. The geese came braking in on spread wings, lowering their tails just before hitting the water. Most impressive were the groups of big Sandhill Cranes which came floating along in the air, gracefully lowering their long legs just before touching down.

The various cries of all pitches together in a joyful, jubilant din of almost deafening volume. We all looked at each other, asking the same question, "What are they saying?" James E. Kreisle

## County nixes road acceptance

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners voted during their meeting Tuesday morning to not accept the roads of the Woodlands Subdivision as requested by developer John Ryan.

According to a report by Pajo Technical Services of Las Cruces, the roads in the subdivision do not meet the county's specifications in width, distribution of gravel or lack of encroachments.

The roads vary in width from 28 to 18 feet, while the Subdivision Regulations call for a minimum road width of 28 feet. The report also states that most of the large aggregate of the base course has been pushed to the sides of the roads, and should be redistributed. According to the report, trees and utility hardware lining the roads are encroaching upon the roads, and should either be removed or be protected from traffic.

According to county manager Suzanne Cox, this was the first refusal of acceptance of roads in a subdivision by the county in many months. She said Pajo Technical Services, the new engineering firm for the county, was following the guidelines set forth in the County Subdivision Regulations much more closely than they had been followed in the past.

—Approved the transfer of a liquor license from Ardovino's, of Sunland Park, to Michael Janis, of The Barn, located west of Ruidoso on Highway 70.

—Approved a request from Martin J. Molloy for use of computer time from the county.

—Approved a request from Michael L. Eicher for use of computer time from the county.

—Voted to delay the acceptance of bids for emergency medical supplies until Cox can meet with county personnel advisors for their input.

—Tabled a request for approval of the use of mill levy funds for the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital for an icemaker until Cox can meet with hospital administrator Ken Moore and determine if the request meets the specifications of the State Purchasing Act.

—Accepted a request for approval of the use of mill levy funds for the purchase of a desk-top copier.

—Heard a report from Jenny Kelly of the New Horizons Developmental Center on the center's organization and policies.

—Voted to negotiate to purchase two lots adjacent to the county parking lot from Beverly Smouse.

—Tabled any action on a request from the State Highway Department that the county participate in the cost of two bridge projects until more research on the bridges can be done by the county Roads Department.

—Heard a request from Gladys Nosker that the county repair or

replace a fence that runs along a county road through the Nosker property. The commissioners informed Nosker that the county does not own fences along county roads, and so would not be able to fix or replace the fence.

—Heard a report from Guy Henley of the Roads Department on the department's progress. Henley said county crews would be working on roads in Gavilan Canyon, Carrizo Canyon and the Alto area.

—Held an executive session to discuss pending litigation.

## Complaint leads to drug charges

Ruidoso police Tuesday arrested Joe Garland Keesee and charged him with nine separate drug offenses after being called to his home on an alleged illegal cable television hookup.

Police reported they seized three pounds, five ounces of alleged marijuana; 5.5 grams of alleged cocaine; over an ounce of alleged hashish; a variety of pills; and almost \$3,000 cash at Keesee's home in Ponderosa Heights.

According to Ruidoso Police Department investigator Hazel Poissot, officer Pete Esquibel went to Keesee's house to investigate a complaint about an illegal cable television hookup.

During the investigation, Esquibel discovered a bag of what was suspected to be marijuana and a small amount of what was suspected to be cocaine, said Poissot.

After Keesee signed a search waiver, police found the other materials, said Poissot.

Keesee has been charged with interference with communications; possession of marijuana with intent to

distribute; possession of cocaine with intent to traffic; possession of controlled substances percodan, tincture of opium, quaalude, valium, amphetamines, florinal and hashish.

Keesee appeared Wednesday before magistrate Jim Wheeler and has been released on a \$20,000 property bond. A preliminary hearing has been scheduled for March 22.

## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

**SANTA FE**—One million one hundred fifty-nine thousand six hundred dollars down the drain.

That's what the early 1984 session of the Legislature cost us.

What did we get for that expenditure? Little or nothing.

The Governor and the two houses can share the blame for that. The only ones who don't have any guilt to feel are the people—though they put up the money that the others threw away.

And how do the people feel about all that?

From those who have commented to this writer, it would appear the major emotion is something like disgust. Maybe "a plague on all your houses" might catch the spirit of it.

Legislators appear to have been unable to rise above their own old smallnesses. The Governor in turn was such a negative influence that he himself began to laugh at it. ("I'll come out against your measure, and that should help you get it passed.")

That mixture led to a session that can only be described as useless and fruitless.

What's sad is that this will further shake the faith of the people in their government.

Not everyone here in the capital understands the ripple effect of revulsion in politics. According to that observation, the ripples go out in a manner inverse to the way they do in physical nature. There, if you drop the pebble in the pond, the ripples grow softer the farther they are from the center of impulse.

In politics, the reverse is true. If even those who participated in the legislative fiasco this year are disgusted, they are in effect at the center where the ripple begins. But the farther from them and from here you go, the stronger that revulsion becomes.

The people at home, going about their daily business, are disgusted deeply—and rightly so.

They want to know, among other things, why a legislative assembly cannot accomplish the one thing it is organized to do above all others:

direct the spending of money by the agencies of state government during the coming fiscal year.

That is the barebones essential of any legislative session, and this one did not even do that.

As a result, they must be called back, probably sometime around the middle of March, to get their work done, just as troublemakers in the classroom once used to be kept after school.

They are free till then, but with little to be proud of.

Before he left for home, one lawmaker said to this writer: "I don't want to go back to my district and have to attempt to explain to my constituents what went on up here."

"Why not stay here in Santa Fe?" he was asked.

He answered that he wasn't any more sure he could explain things to the people here.

But Governor Anaya has told us, in the unhappy hours after the session, while his people were totting up how little he got from among the 200 or more things he asked for, that he will listen to the voice of the people.

His last statement at that Thursday afternoon news conference was that if legislators at home are told by their people that there is total opposition to a rise in taxes, he will abide by the decision.

That, as we say up here, is a promise, not a commitment. (That's a politician's distinction that ordinary people do not usually make.)

The waves of feeling reaching the man typing these words would not suggest legislators are going to be told they must come back to the capitol and raise taxes.

That may prove an even greater disappointment to the Governor than the ones he has already experienced since 1984 rolled in.

If that's the message, we hope he will bite the bullet.

If he doesn't, a special session will turn out to be as disorderly, as discreditable and as fruitless as the one just concluded, which set new records in all those categories for the state of New Mexico.

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The concept of the ordinance makes good sense for all the people of Lincoln County and the property owners of Lincoln itself. Lincoln, as an historical community, provides Lincoln County with a broader economic base enhancing tourism in the county and the state and particularly providing an excellent form of family entertainment aside from that provided by skiing in the winter and horseracing in the summer. The ordinance has, I believe, enhanced property values for owners in Lincoln Valley, thus providing a healthier tax base for the county.

As a homeowner in Lincoln, I strongly support the Historical Zoning Ordinance and urge the County Commissioners to support revisions to the ordinance which will make it clearer and leave less room for self-interpretation. When you read this I hope that the entire area is covered with a lot of snow. As of this date it has been 34 days since we have had moisture in the City.

Several years ago I started to keep a daily weather report and the data is proving to be very interesting. Only moisture within the City is considered.

In January 1983 there were 7 days of moisture versus just 5 days for January 1984. For the entire month of February 1983 there were 6 days of moisture including 9 inches of snow. To date for the current month the total is 2 1/2 CH.

When you look at the moisture days for March 1983 the answer is 11 days. This was a very wet month. If the moisture days for March 1984 match 1983 we will recover from a potential drought problem which we will certainly face next Summer.

Rain-off is vital to our water supply and, in fact, to the City's economy.

A lack of moisture at present will affect the ski areas but, in the overall view, the effect on our water supply will be serious.

If any reader is interested in my unprofessional water diary all you have to do is call me.

At first glance I cannot find any winter month during the past 5 years where no moisture has been recorded for as long as 34 days and the weather report is not encouraging for the near future.

I would like to comment on the recent publicity and letters to the Editor which have appeared in your paper concerning the Historical Zoning Ordinance for the community of Lincoln.

The present historical zoning ordinance has been in effect for a number of years. It has been only partially successful due to the ambiguity of the ordinance and the inability, or in many cases unwillingness, of the County Commissioners to enforce it.

## Editorial

Our first question for State Representative Mickey McGuire upon his return from Santa Fe was: "were things as bad at the Legislature as newspaper accounts led us to believe?"

"I felt they pretty much were," he replied.

Governor Anaya has come under fire for failing to sell his programs to the lawmakers. Talking to McGuire, however, one gets the feeling it was largely the lawmakers' treatment of the governor—and each other—that left a bad taste in his mouth.

Early on, said McGuire, he felt a sense of certain legislators trying to show how powerful they were. It was going to be their way or no way was how he read them.

Then McGuire and his fellow members of the House Appropriations and Finance Committee saw three weeks' work go down the drain when the Senate bypassed the committee process and rejected the House appropriations bill.

"You can accept losing if the game was well played," said McGuire. The game just concluded was not particularly well played, he added.

The representative acknowledged that the governor brought some of his troubles on himself. But the lawmakers who disagreed with Anaya attempted "to make that point at all costs."

Conflict makes good copy for newspapers, whether it be in Santa Fe or at Ruidoso village hall. But we hope this spring brings more cooperation and less discord to both chambers of government.—TP

## Reporter's Round by Billy Allstetter



I gulped and felt a cold drop of sweat trickle down the side of my body. I always get a kick out of being called Mr. Allstetter, but don't necessarily relish the responsibilities that sometimes come with the formality.

Like standing in front of 30 ninth-graders and telling them about the world of big time journalism in Ruidoso.

Mr. Allstetter, hardened city beat reporter. Cigarette dangling from his mouth as the smoke floats around his head. Pencil behind his ear and cynical expression on his face as the politician tries to talk his way out of a graft accusation.

"And now that I have your homework, here is Mr. Allstetter," said Ruidoso High School English teacher Galen Farrington.

"Huh? Oh! Yes!"

Daydream shattered. All of a sudden it was not a corrupt politician in front of me, but 30 young students all looking at me for pearls of wisdom.

All, that is, except those more interested in the pretty girls sitting next to them or want ads in the papers I had just passed around.

With a sputter and a cough, I began my spiel about the paper. Advertising pays for it, the editorial fills the space above the ads, composing builds it, pressmen print it and circulation distributes it.

My lecture was hardly so concise, hopping from subject to subject and back again. Granted, the newspapers began to shuffle more as the end of the period approached. But I was a little surprised and pleased by the questions the kids asked.

One of the best was a question I often face and have learned a lot about since starting with The Ruidoso News almost a year and a half ago. In so many words, this innocent looking young lady asked me how come we distort stories and don't print what people say or what really happened.

The "Truth" is something I have struggled with very hard since becoming a reporter. It has to do with trying to get accurate notes, write only information that is specifically written in them and not what you think you remember the person saying.

It can be a real trick sometimes. I sometimes feel embarrassed and pity the poor person who is receiving the fourth phone call Sunday night when I have forgotten to ask him the necessary questions on the previous three calls.

Then there is that juicy quote you

would just love to use but are missing one word. Or you just didn't ask the exact question, can't get hold of the person, and are so tempted to assume the answer from the rest of the conversation.

But as Tim has told me numerous times, you know what happens when you assume—you get it wrong.

And then there is that old story about someone who comes into a classroom, performs some extraordinary act like knocking the teacher off his feet and kidnapping the most beautiful student in the class.

When the students are asked to write their accounts of the incident, the teacher receives 30 different descriptions.

And so it has seemed to me at times in newspaper writing. Exactly where does the truth lie and who speaks it?

It is a hard and often frustrating experience trying to figure it out. There is never enough time to talk to all the people you want and find out everything you would like to know. Then, trying to include all the shades, nuances and details of a situation in the story often seems impossible.

But I have learned one thing since being here. It is sure worth trying as hard as you can to do it. What seem to you minor details are very important to people who know that 5,000 other people are reading them.

Not too long after I arrived, a lady called me about a mistake at the very bottom of a story, about the ownership of a gravel pit. I was half frightened to answer the phone for three weeks after that trade.

Or the time I went to Cree Meadows to relax and watch a football game, but ended up being shredded by a couple of irate citizens for things I had written in the paper. Being told that I was the guy who never gets anything right cut deep.

Or the fearful call I got after making a mistake in the court reports. But it is good to be told. Otherwise, how would you know you made a mistake. Hopefully, you learn something from it.

It isn't worth it not to get all the facts and every point of view you can. And yet, mistakes do occur sometimes.

It still amazes me that intelligent people take so much stock in what I write.

But I have learned a lot about the power of the press and the effect a few words in the paper can have on a person's life.

The responsibility frightens me at times.



The RHS band was one of four selected for the festival, Flores said. Judges made choices based on submitted audio tapes.


While in Hawaii, the band plans four performances. They will play at the festival, at two shopping centers, and in a public concert with Hawaiian schools.



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



## NEVER A CHANCE

Neke's Crescent, ridden by Kevin Cogburn, had little trouble fending off the even-money favorite, Never Love, in Sunday's five and a half furlong feature offering at Sunland Park. The 10-1 shot, Cineron, moved up well at the end to take third.

## Zeke's Crescent wins Sunday

Neke's Crescent, a 2-1 shot piloted by Kevin Cogburn, took command at the half-way point of the backstretch and cruised to a one and one-quarter length score in Sunday's headliner at Sunland Park.

Neke's Crescent had so much in reserve that he hardly raised a sweat while fending off a mild but long challenge from the betting favorite, Never Love.

The latter, running at even odds, moved up to challenge Neke's Crescent in the upper stretch of the five

and one-half furlong sprint. Never Love steadily tried to whittle away the deficit, but it was clearly a lost cause.

Neke's Crescent, who had to buck strong headwinds, timed the distance in 1:05 2/5 seconds and returned \$6, \$3.20 and \$2.80. He's owned by H. T. Hornbuckle of Albuquerque. The win was the first of the year for Neke's Crescent in two starts. He earned almost \$17,000 last year. The five-year-old gelding is trained by Fred Danley. Kevin Cogburn is the rider.

Never Love, foiled in his quest for his second straight win, had to settle for second, returning \$2.80, \$2.40. Cineron, a 10-1 outsider, closed powerfully on the rail to bag third, paying \$2.80.

It was another busy day at the Sunland Park track as the crowd of 3,304 (third highest of the meeting) punched in \$482,640 on the 12-race card. That was second-best for the meeting, topped only by the \$448,231 on Sunday, February 5.

WHAT IS BELIEVED TO BE the biggest mutual payoff in the history of New Mexico racing occurred during Sunday's eighth-race trifecta. Two \$1 tickets from a total trifecta pool of \$65,515 were sold on the winning 4-10-6 combination. As of late Monday, Sunland Park mutual manager Jerry Knott reported one of the tickets had been cashed. Since the payoff was calculated on a \$2 bet it was \$43,856.80. But each \$1 winning ticket was worth \$21,928.40.

THE PREVIOUS BIGGEST trifecta payoff at Sunland Park was a \$15,386 return on Amadlamond-Crowlita and Hi Wan on January 21, 1983. The previous largest trifecta return at Ruidoso Downs was a \$27,074 payoff on May 7, 1983, combining Kelly's Patch, Rhonda's Rainbow and Imiteheadancer. The previous biggest exotic return at Sunland Park was a \$38,840.60 Big Q payoff on January 16, 1982. Sunday's huge payoff was started when Sub Pro, ridden by Ruben Miranda, won the five and one-half furlong dash for \$4,000 claimers by one length. Sub Pro was a modest \$11.20 winner. Fair Jester, a \$70.30-1 longshot under Lyndell Rutherford, took second by a neck over Spare Rib, a \$28.30-1 risk under Salustio Burgos. The highest previous trifecta wager was a \$14,182.20 payoff on December 2 combining Arabian Host, Arvid and Rebel Soldier. The trifecta where patrons must select the first three finishers in order, is held on the eighth and twelfth races. It is the most popular wager at Sunland Park.

THE HIGHLY REGARDED YOUNGSTER Cap Badgett, amazed Saturday patrons with a superb performance in racing debut. The colt is a son of 1978 Triple Crown winner Affirmed, out of a Windy Sands mare, Gipsy Jet. The Kentucky-bred chestnut colt led virtually every jump of the six and one-half furlong dash which drew 12 three-year-old maidens. He took the quarter-mile in :22 3/5, the half-mile in :45 3/5, the six furlongs in 1:10 4/5 and completed the distance in 1:10 4/5 while romping home by eight and one-half lengths

under Carlos Rivas. Trained by Jose Dominguez, Cap Badgett is owned by E. Thomas Badgett Sr. of Fort Lauderdale, Florida. As the 4-5 wagering favorite, Cap Badgett returned \$3.60 to win. His father, Affirmed is best remembered for his three thrilling stretch duels in the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont Stakes with Alydar. Cap Badgett's win was hardly a stretch duel, but it indicated his potential.

LADY OF SINN TIED the season's fastest reading for 350 yards while capturing Saturday's 10th race at 350 yards. The four-year-old Sinn Fein mare raced in a 17.64 reading with a slight tailwind to tie the time set by Ease Up Brother on November 15. The victory avenged an eighth-place finish in the Juarez Handicap on January 22. That race, won by Rocket Jet Bug, covered 350 yards as Lady Of Sinn was sent off as an even-money wagering choice. Lady Of Sinn, ridden by regular jockey Mike Lidberg, blazed through the stretch and overtook Rocket Jet Bug by a neck. The victory was the fourth in five races at Sunland Park this season for the Texas-bred mare. Trained by Bob E. Arnett, Lady Of Sinn is owned by Jesse L. Hankins of Rocksprings, Texas. As the 5-2 third-wagering choice, Lady Of Sinn paid \$7.00 to win.

JOCKEY WAYNE BUEHRER, trainer Johnny R. Dennis and the Burleson Race Horse Company of Truth or Consequences, combined to capture the final two races on Saturday's program. They took the featured eleventh with T.V. Repairman (\$6.00) and then won the twelfth with favored Ha Cha Jo (\$4.00). Bucher, meanwhile, actually won three consecutive races. He took the last two events on Saturday and then captured Sunday's opening race aboard Tiny Jilter (\$12.80) for owner-trainer Janice Stogner of Albuquerque.

A TOTAL OF 27 contestants in the Miss New Mexico-USA Pageant were guests on Sunday at Sunland Park. The group was honored by having the ninth race named in their behalf. Bill Thomas, Sunland Park administrative assistant, said the pageant entrants have been guests at the races for the last 10 years.

Thomas will serve as one of the co-ordination judges on Saturday, February 25, in Las Cruces.

TOP LEVAN FAILED in his attempt to record his eighth win of the meeting. The 10-year-old Top Moon has seven victories, the most wins for any horse this season. Although he was dismissed as the 6-5 wagering favorite in Friday's fifth race, the Oklahoma-bred dasher experienced a rough trip and finished seventh. Top Levan opened the season by taking his first five races, then ran a fourth and continued to win his next two starts. Friday's race was for \$8,000 claiming horses traveling 400 yards. Trained by Donald E. Mooney, Top Levan is owned by Debra Ann Provenge of Saginaw, Texas.

TWELVE RIDERS EACH scored a victory on Friday's program. Winning jockeys included F.O. Martinez, Ramon Apodaca, Tomey Swan, Santos Toquinto, Richard Bickel, Frank Pacheco, Larry Byers, Eugene O'Neill, Lyndell Rutherford, Don Strington, Casey Lambert and Larry Urioste.

ALL 12 WAGERING FAVORITES lost on Friday for the first time this season. Losing public choices included Gun In The House (2-1) in the first, Tramp Leader (7-5) in the second, Scrutinize (2-5) in the third, Miss Tyrant T. (2-1) in the fourth, Top Levan (6-5) in the fifth, Maybebad (9-5) in the sixth, Lead And Plead (7-5) in the seventh, Little Joseph (8-5) in the eighth, T.V. Belle (6-5) in the ninth, Say I Do (even-money) in the tenth, Dear Tess (2-1) in the eleventh and Texas Polka (9-5) in the twelfth.

OWNER-TRAINER JOHNIE L. JAMISON, jockey Harla Webb, breeder Dr. Leopoldo Villareal and the stallion, A Gypsy Says, combined to win two races on Monday's program. They started in the first race with Panadero (\$3.30) and then took the eighth with Dare She (\$13.80). Panadero is out of the fine George Lewis mare, Miss Laette, while Dare She is out of the Bold And Brave mare, Brave And Spunky.

## Trifecta payoff tops record

Right after Sunday's eighth race at Sunland Park, announcer Harry Henson made an unusual announcement. "Ladies and gentlemen," he began. "May we have your attention, please. The Trifecta payoff in today's eighth race is too large to post on the totalisator board..."

A hush quickly went over the grandstand and clubhouse as Henson announced the payoff: \$43,856.80. The sudden response from the crowd was a kind of vocal awe.

Sunland mutuels manager Jerry Knott called the payoff a record in the history of New Mexico racing. "We've never before had a payoff, anywhere in the state, touch \$40,000," he said.

The highest previous payoff at Sunland was \$38,840.80, which was handed out in Big Q wagering on January 16, 1982.

Sunday's bonanza came about when Sub Pro (9-2), Fair Jester (just over

70-1) and Spare Rib (just over 25-1) finished one-two-three in the five and one-half furlong sprint.

The winning Trifecta combination was beamed up by the fact the three main contenders (Handy Dandy at 5-2, Conk Man at 7-2, Baffle You at 9-2) each failed to get in the money.

The object of the Trifecta is to pick the top three horses in order.

Sunday's right Trifecta combination was sold in two \$1 units. A few minutes after the race, a person holding one of the two \$1 tickets showed up to cash his ticket, and declined to announce his name.

The other ticket was still outstanding at the close of Sunday's program.

In the computerized cash-sell mutuel system used at both Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs, it's possible to purchase trifecta tickets in \$1 units when these purchases are made in combination. One of the most

popular combination buys is the "\$6 box," in which a fan selects three horses, and winds up with six different combinations. In this case, he wins if his three horses run in the top three, in any order.

The \$6 box is based on six \$1 units, which means a winning ticket is worth half the posted price.

This was the situation in Sunday's eighth-race Trifecta, as two separate fans (each holding a successful \$1 unit) wound up splitting the \$43,856.80 payoff.

The fan who cashed in his \$1 ticket right after the eighth race Sunday had invested \$30 in his Trifecta buys.

The previous high Trifecta payoff for the '83-'84 season was \$14,162.20, established on December 2 with the combination of Arabian Host, Arvid and Rebel Soldier. The previous all-time Trifecta high payoff at Sunland was \$15,395, recorded on January 21, 1983.

## Fantastic Voyage beats long odds

Fantastic Voyage kept the pace all to himself while rolling up an easy victory in Monday's headliner at Sunland Park.

The feature offering on the Washington's Birthday card covered a mile-and-one-sixteenth and put up a \$3,500 allowance purse.

Fantastic Voyage, who scored his first victory against maidens last month, wasn't given much chance by the holiday crowd of 2,410. The four-year-old gelding carried odds of just over 11-1.

But he fooled his five foes by storming into an early lead and hanging on throughout the journey. Jockey Salustio Burgos kept Fantastic Voyage on the lead during the backstretch run, but was careful to make sure the gelding had enough left for the stretch.

When Fantastic Voyage hit the top of the stretch, Burgos shifted into high gear and Fantastic Voyage easily put distance between himself and the challenging 2-1 shot, Walkin Boss.

Fantastic Voyage hit the wire with a bulging four-length lead and returned hefty mutuel payoffs of \$24.40, \$5 and \$3. The gelding is trained by Phillip Clemmer for Dr. Victor Savino of Albuquerque.

The victory was Fantastic Voyage's third straight. The winning time was

1:46 4/5 seconds.

Walkin Boss, with Eugene O'Neill up, finished second and returned \$3.80 and \$2.40. El Fantastico, a 5-2 shot, hit the wire in third place, two and one fourth lengths behind Walkin Boss. The show payoff was \$2.40.

Farmer County Kid, the 9-5 favorite, never managed to offer a threat.

Monday's wagering handle finished up at an excellent \$306,740. The same program a year ago produced a handle of \$291,129.

# Track builds barns to please racers

When Donald F. Smith was searching for the best horse barns to install at Ruidoso Downs, he had a very simple guideline.

"I've always put myself in the position of the horsemen. What kind of a barn would I want if I had horses running at Ruidoso Downs," said Smith, general manager of Ruidoso Downs Race Track. "We had bids on cheaper horse barns, but the kind of barns we're putting in are the kinds of barns I would want to put my horses in if I trained at Ruidoso Downs."

With that in mind, Ruidoso Downs has started work on building eight new barns in the area at the bottom of the hill facing the racing office and track kitchen complex.

The new barns replace antiquated barns which have been leveled. Smith said each barn will have at least one feed room (measuring eight by 12 feet) on a side, and perhaps two on a side depending upon each barn's dimensions.

The new barns will contain 310 stalls, including 60 tack rooms, leaving approximately 250 stalls for horses. Concrete will be used for the outer perimeter for the barns as well as for each stall.

"Each stall will be 12 feet by 12 feet. That's what you might say is the ideal size for a race horse. If you go any smaller than that, a big horse won't be comfortable in it," Smith explained.

Smith said the barns are being built by the MD Enterprises, which was

founded in 1975 and has locations in the major horse areas in the continental United States with representatives in Hawaii, Canada and Venezuela.

"I visited each of the companies, looking at their operation, how they built their barns and other factors: I then suggested to the Board of Directors (of Ruidoso-Sunland) that this would be the best company for us to use. They agreed and then we sought and received approval from the New Mexico Racing Commission.

"Our new barns will be as good or better than the barns of any racetrack in the state of New Mexico," he added.

Smith cited the Boyle Engineering Company in Albuquerque with designing the engineering plans for drainage in the new barn section.

"After July, it usually rains quite a bit in Ruidoso and causes flooding in that part of the barn area. We're trying to handle the drainage problem in the barn area step by step. This is the first stage of our hopes to eventually have proper drainage in the entire barn area. The Boyle people helped us considerably with the drainage factor as well as numerous other aspects of our new plans," Smith noted.

Smith said he was more than pleased about finally constructing new barns for veteran trainers such as Brooks Claridge, J.B. Montgomery and J. Doyal Roberts, who have raced at Ruidoso Downs for more than two decades. They have been stabled in the old barns year after year.

"This is one of the major projects I have hoped for in Ruidoso Downs,"

Smith said. "When I came here, one of the primary goals I had was to clean up the barn area at Ruidoso Downs. Every little step we do is a step in the right direction.

"If the horsemen aren't happy, they reflect their bad attitude in several ways, such as not entering their good horses or not bringing their good horses to the particular racetrack. Trainers such as Brooks Claridge, J. Doyal Roberts and J. B. Montgomery have been stalwarts for many years at Ruidoso Downs. We're glad these trainers and all the others who have stabled in deplorable barns will now have something they and all of Ruidoso Downs can be proud of," Smith said.

Smith said the benefits of the new area will also be felt in this summer's two-day Annual Summer Sale of Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings in late July, as well as the All-American Sale of Selected Quarter Horse Yearlings in late August.

"How can you possibly expect someone to come to either of our horse sales, spend \$100,000 on a horse and put him in a stall you and I wouldn't even want to walk into, let alone stay in?" he questioned.

"Each racetrack has an obligation to look into how it can improve the horsemen's stay. Track officials should look at and then resolve any problems, as best they can with the money they have available. We've made a start at improving the barn area. We hope we can continue to do much for our loyal horsemen," he said.

## T.V. Repairman hangs onto lead

T.V. Repairman, a five-year-old piloted by Wayne Buehrer as the 9-5 second favorite, took an early hold on Saturday's sprint headliner at Sunland Park and never let go.

During the backstretch rush, T.V. Repairman encountered some brisk resistance from the 12-1 shot, Christian Luck.

The two raced almost on even terms until the turn for home, when Christian Luck, with F.O. Martinez up, began fattening his lead. It was


little more than a romp down the straightaway of the six and one-half furlong dash.

T.V. Repairman hit the wire with a three-length lead, stopped the clock in 1:18 1/5 seconds, and returned \$6.80, \$3.80, \$2.40. The win was his second straight. T.V. Repairman is owned by Burleson Race Horse Company of Truth Or Consequences. Johnny Dennis does the training.

Christian Luck ended up second, returning \$5.40 and \$2.60. The odds-on

favorite, Copper Case (a career winner of over \$306,000), appeared hopelessly beaten in the first half of the race, then showed some of his old flair while closing for third. He paid \$2.20.

Sunland's business trend continued to pick up steam as Saturday's program attracted 3,617 patrons. Wagering on the 12-race card topped out at \$428,122. It was the second-best handle of the '83-84 season, surpassed only by the \$448,231 on Sunday, February 5.

when she reached the upper stretch. Maylasian Star, a 30-1 shot ridden by David Lidberg, also did her best running in the stretch, and finished second. Beautiful Ending, the 2-1 second favorite, hit the wire in third place, three lengths behind Malaysian Star.

The people's choice, Dear Tess (2-1), had good speed while cutting in-

to the wind down the backstretch, but came up short after the turn for home.

Miss Denton, owned by Jerry Rheudasil of Lewisville, Texas, returned mutual payoffs of \$8.20, \$5.40, \$2.60. Malaysian Star refunded \$21.40 and \$4.60. Beautiful Ending paid \$2.60 to show.

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
