Jarle Ja! Halsnes captures U.S. Open Ski title

In a tremendous feat of endurance and concentration, Norwegian Jarle Halsnes claimed the U.S. Open title and \$20,500 for the weekend's work at Eagle Creek Ski Area.

Halsnes won the giant slalom race and \$6,000 Saturday. He placed second to Frenchman Alain Navillod in the slalom Sunday, then won the final \$10,000 championship match against Navillod by a mere .036 seconds.

Halsnes' successful weekend pushed him into first place on the Pro Ski International Tour, passing Austrian Georg Ager. Ager did not get beyond the round of 16 skiers either day. Halsnes won the slalom and combined championships at the First Interstate Cup in Winter Park, Colorado, last month.

Halsnes earned his paycheck this weekend, running 20 runs over the two days.

"I can't breathe. I can't think," said Halsnes as well-wishers gathered around him after his final victory. "I am too tired to be happy."

Halsnes said he was tired early Sunday after running eight races Saturday to claim the giant slalom victory. He said he gained more strength as he warmed up.

Halsnes also attributed his victory to mental attitude.

"I was positive all the time," said the second-year pro.


After winning the giant slalom on Saturday, Halsnes was on the verge of sweeping the whole competition in his final match against Navillod. He won the first race by .359 seconds and was even in the second when he hit hard in a rut and lost a ski only six gates from the finish line.

Weariness and disappointment were apparent as Halsnes lay face down on the snow while Navillod skied across the finish line to claim the slalom title and \$6,000 first prize.

Had Halsnes won both the slalom and giant slalom races, the \$10,000 U.S. Open title would have been his automatically.

But Navillod's victory forced a final match between the two men on a half slalom, half giant slalom course.

Navillod, five-time French national champion, beat Halsnes by 236 seconds in the first race. On the second run, Navillod led through the slalom portion of the course with Halsnes looking wild in the upper gates. But Halsnes settled down to smooth strong skiing in the giant slalom portion. He pulled ahead to a 271 advantage to take the race and a

\$10,000 check by .036 seconds.

Both Navillod and Halsnes faced stiff challenges before getting to the slalom finals Sunday.

Navillod had to come from behind in his match against six-time U.S. National Champion Cary Adgate in his semi-final match. Adgate won the first race by 168 seconds, but Navillod beat him by 345 seconds to advance to the finals.

Adgate went on to claim third place and \$3,000 by beating Norwegian Reidar Wahl in their final match.

Wahl and Halsnes had a very close first race in their semifinal match before Wahl blew out of the course two-thirds of the way down. The automatic 15-second disadvantage was too much for Wahl to make up in the second run, as Halsnes coolly kept in the course and close enough to Wahl to earn the victory.

Halsnes had more difficulty in his quarterfinal match against American Peter Dodge. He had to overcome a 559-second deficit in the second run to advance.

Halsnes had it easier in the giant slalom Saturday, with opponents falling or missing gates in the previous three races before the final match against Lonny Vanatta.

Halsnes won the first race by 526

seconds and the second by .031 to beat Vanatta.

Vanatta, the winningest American pro, was competing in his final races as a pro this weekend. The Steamboat Springs, Colorado, native has won 20 professional races in his seven-year pro racing career.

His second-place finish earned him \$4,500.

"I really liked this kind of hill," said Vanatta about the high and hard snow.

Despite the warm temperatures Saturday, snow on the course remained hard.

"The hill is great for pro skiing," said giant slalom third-place racer Sjur Gautneb. "You have to be a better technical skier."

American Dave Stapleton took fourth in the giant slalom Saturday, but missed his first race Sunday when he overslept that morning.

Amateurs got their chance to run through the gates Saturday afternoon in the Celebrity Pro Am race. The race featured 27 teams made up of one pro and three amateurs competing on a triple elimination course.

Ruidosians Clifford Deaton, Tommy Thomason and Chuck Wooddell combined with pro Ewald Zirbeseg-

ger to win the pro am. The team of Bob Martin, Mike Hurd, Matt Vuckley and Peter Kaskes was second. Jo Bob McGuire, Barry Williams, Janet Steele and pro Navillod placed third.

Media coverage for the race was abundant, with seven television stations, SKI and Powder magazines, AP and UPI wire services, and the Albuquerque Journal and El Paso Times all sending representatives.

USA Cable Network also taped two hour-long programs that will be broadcast four times each. The giant slalom race will be broadcast first Wednesday evening at 7:30 p.m. local time. The slalom race will be broadcast Saturday at 6 p.m. USA Network is not broadcast locally, but can be picked up by satellite receiving "dishes."

Racers and organizers appeared pleased with the U.S. Open.

"I was very pleased with it," said Pro Ski International executive director Paul Carson.

He noted that volunteers did 99 percent of the work for the race and thanked them, "from the bottom of my heart."

He then called for the Second Annual U.S. Open in Ruidoso next year.

Tuesday is election day here, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan

Voters will select municipal judges and governing body members during elections Tuesday. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. at polling places in Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan.

Ruidoso voters will cast their ballots at the Ruidoso Public Library. Village clerk Leon Eggleston said there will be two voting machines available to handle more voters quickly.

Ruidoso Downs voters will cast their ballots at village hall. Capitan voters will cast theirs at the fair

building. Only registered voters living within village limits may vote in the municipal elections.

Ruidoso's new council will meet Thursday at 10 a.m. for an organizational meeting. Ruidoso is the only village in the state to meet so early, said Eggleston.

The November 8 referendum, which increased the size of the council from four to six council members, also required current council members to resign within 120 days of the election Thursday, March 8, marks 120 days since the election.

Ruidoso High DECA club tops at state

Ruidoso High School continued its tradition of outstanding performances in Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA) competition by dominating state competition in Albuquerque Thursday through Saturday.

DECA focuses on marketing and product distribution.

Ruidoso qualified 16 people for the national championships at Kansas City, Missouri, on May 16-24. Ruidoso's total beat all other schools in the state.

Del Norte High School of Albuquerque had the second highest number of qualifiers with nine.

Ruidoso has led the state in national qualifiers for the past six years. The top three individuals in each state competition category go to the national competition.

"I'm just tickled to death with our performance," said Ruidoso DECA advisor Eddie Parker.

"Qualifying 16 kids for nationals is five more than we had last year, and we had the most in the state then, too. The other schools have a lot of respect for us," he said.

Ruidoso won first place with its Pepsi Learn and Earn project. Three students will be chosen to represent Ruidoso with that project at the national competition.

Club president Jeff Fargarson said Ruidoso High tried "something new and different" for the Pepsi project this year. The club worked on a wholesale level.

"It was real for us this year," he said. Pepsi projects also can be paper projects, rather than involving actual products.

Club president Virgil Reynolds said the Pepsi project at Ruidoso has placed near the top in national competition for years.

"For the wholesale project this year, we tried a different strategy. We built up a company." While working on the project, he said, they discovered that "wholesaling on a

small level really isn't effective."

Fargarson said Ruidoso DECA could be the best in the nation. "The club does well because of Mr. Parker," he said. "He's got his act together and motivates us."

Parker said students in DECA work because they enjoy going to national conventions. They got into their winning ways about eight years ago and have kept the momentum going, he said.

About 40 Ruidoso students participated in the three-day state competition in Albuquerque. Adults who accompanied them included Parker, bus driver Dennis Alward, Mildred Tillman and Margie Copeland.

Competition was divided into two levels in about a dozen categories. Seniors usually take exams on the supervisory level and juniors take master employee tests.

Ted happy with performance

"I was skiing really well this weekend," said local professional ski racer Ted Marolt of his efforts in the Pro Ski International U.S. Open races at Eagle Creek Ski Area.

"My lack of consistency shows a lack of training, I was hoping to do a little better."

Marolt was the only Ruidosoan to qualify for competition in the races, and managed to advance to the round of 16 in Friday's Giant Slalom competition. Racing against Austria's Hans Hinterseer, Marolt lost the first race by a narrow margin, but beat Hinterseer in the second go-round to progress to the round of 16 Saturday morning.

"I felt really good," Marolt said Friday of his victory over Hinterseer. "My objective was just to qualify for the race. Most of the pressure is off, now I can just think about ski racing."

In his matchup against American Lonny Vanatta Saturday morning, Marolt lost, and Vanatta went on to place second in the competition. Sunday, in the slalom competition round of 32, Marolt raced against Norwegian Stein Halsnes.

"I was ahead of Stein in the race, and I thought to myself, 'Now that I'm in front, I should just relax.' As soon as I said that I hooked a tip," Marolt said.

The hooked tip cost him the race, but Marolt said that overall he was pleased with his performance.

"I thought I was skiing really well. Beating Hans in the Giant Slalom to get into the round of 16 was real good. I felt that with the way I was skiing today (Sunday), I ought to have been right in there, maybe not winning the competition, but right up there. It just takes losing your concentration for a split second and you're out of it. It's just a lack of training."

"I'm skiing as fast and as well as any of the guys on the mountain."

Marolt said the races this weekend may have rekindled his interest in greater participation in professional racing.

"This race has given me a little more thought about getting into the sport full time."

Marolt said he didn't have any specific plans to compete again this year, but that the possibility existed. He said he would definitely compete if the race were held here again next year.

Marolt said he felt the race was a success.

"Everyone really enjoyed the race," he said of the other racers.

"They thought the race went really well."

"I hope it was success enough to have it again next year," he said. "I hope the town felt it was, too. The celebrities had a great time. Everybody just loved the race."


Marolt said the support by Ruidoso for the race was uncommon.

"I've been to races all over the world. Very rarely do you see the town getting behind the whole thing like they did here. I would like to personally thank the town of Ruidoso and everybody for their support."

The home of the world's richest horse race hosted Hollywood entertainers for the world's richest ski race this weekend.

Celebrities skied, or tried to ski, in the pro am races Saturday afternoon. Then they sang for the Pro Am Awards Dinner Saturday night at Jerry Dale's.

Emcee Lyle Waggoner, who acted in "The Carol Burnett Show" and "Wonder Woman," played a mean leaf during the entertainment.

Despite a technical problem, Barry Williams took his turn on the stage. He is known for acting in "The Brady Bunch" and "General Hospital," although he said he deliberately did not watch the latter show on the air, even when he could.

Williams has been singing for more

than a dozen years; he said. His credits include musicals.

Also on stage Saturday, Christopher Holder of "The Young and the Restless," drafted Governor Toney Anaya to sing with him.

Before that duo, Raina English belted out selections. The ski weekend was hardly her first trip to Ruidoso.

"I think my dad helped pay for Ruidoso Downs," she quipped at a press conference in the Albuquerque airport Thursday. "I grew up in Lubbock."

Fans of "The Lawrence Welk Show" recognize her as half of a singing duo, but she prefers to sing solo. "You can be more creative," she said. However, "it's much more frightening, singing alone."

The bugs that make the rounds each winter don't bother her professionally. "It's not difficult to sing with a

cold. It is difficult to sing with a sore throat or cough.

"I have sung when I could not speak."

Touring has disadvantages, she has found. "If I could make a living staying put, I would," she said. English has a six-year-old daughter.

"I really want to do musicals," she said when asked about the future. She's looking forward to taking a musical comedy workshop.

Another entertainer with local connections is Tim Culbertson. His credits include "Hill Street Blues" and "Star Trek II."

Culbertson's sister-in-law, Jeanne Culbertson, is a strong supporter of Special Olympics in New Mexico. Events this weekend helped raise money for that program.

Other stars were new to Ruidoso. "I've wanted to see this part of the state," Richard Anderson said.

The history buff had done location filming for two of his 50 movies near Gallup and Carlsbad.

He portrayed Oscar in "The Six Million Dollar Man" and "The Bionic Woman" on television. "Perry Mason" is also among his series credits.

Films give you the opportunity to prepare, compared to television, he said. However, he called filming on location, rather than on a series lot, hard work. "You work under existing conditions, and are away from home."

Anderson's family includes three daughters. He has skied with them.

Some of the celebrities were nearly new to skis. Robert Walden, who played Foss on "Lou Grant," has been skiing since Christmas. He admitted he fell into the Red Bull during one run.

Ullmann, a 6-5 athlete, averaged around 19 points a game and was also an excellent rebounder. He had excellent agility for a big man. Warrior players given honorable mention status were senior Gilbert Rivera, sophomore Russell Easter and junior Patric Pearson.

Other members of the first team included Michael Viramontes of Deming, Jesus Saenz of Cobre, and Chris Harrison and Todd Mannon of Hot Springs.

Warrior coach Ron Geyer was glad Ullmann made the first team but thought Rivera also should have

made all-district. "I was very disappointed Gilbert didn't make the all-district team," Geyer said.

The 5-6 Rivera was a good outside shooter and was also one of the Warriors' best dribblers and playmakers. Pearson, a 6-0 athlete, showed considerable improvement during the season and scored in double figures several times.

Cloudcroft led 14-13 at the end of the first quarter and 28-22 at halftime. But the Tigers fought their way back into the contest in the third quarter, outscoring the Bears 18-12 for a 40-40 third-period break tie.

The two teams fought evenly in the fourth quarter and first overtime period. They scored 14 points apiece in the final quarter and seven apiece in the initial overtime period.

Capitan advanced to the Cloudcroft game by virtue of an easy 70-45 win over Mountainair Friday night.

Anyone interested in playing in the league is urged to attend the meeting.

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

Well, it looks like work will begin soon on a modern sports complex for Ruidoso, and the end results should be good for all local sports enthusiasts.

The sports complex, which still needs official approval from the state, will be built just to the south of the White Mountain Middle School gymnasium, in two phases.

Approval for the complex came last month from both the village and the school district. The complex will be located on the middle school ground and will take up 22 acres.

Pam Graves, Ruidoso Park and Recreation Department director, hopes the first phase will be completed by June. It will consist of two softball fields and a soccer field.

The second phase should be completed next year, and will probably have two more softball fields and a soccer field.

Bathrooms also will be built. A track and a football field, already on the 22 acres, may also be renovated in the future.

"The minimum cost will be probably \$150,000 for the total project," Graves said. "We've still got to get a contour map of the area—where a plane take photos of it—before we start the work."

Funds for the complex are coming from a state grant, lodgers' tax and in-kind funds (village labor or volunteer labor).

"We're going to try to get as much volunteer labor as we can," Graves commented.

At first, Little League baseball and soccer teams will use the fields, as will recreational softball teams.

But there's always a chance high school teams will use the fields in the

future if baseball and soccer are added to the high school sports schedule.

The present facilities for baseball, softball and soccer are insufficient to handle the increasing needs of these sports.

All-American Park Field in Ruidoso Downs is old, and its seating and parking facilities are limited for softball enthusiasts.

Little League sports in this area need more fields. Spectator seating for these sports is substandard and limited.

In the long run, the new fields may open the door to more youth programs in Ruidoso.

Better softball fields could increase interest in more advanced youth baseball programs, such as the Pony League or Babe Ruth.

At present, after a youth becomes too old for the Little League program, he doesn't have any more baseball options to look forward to in this area.

With better facilities there might be more support for advanced youth baseball in this area.

An attempt was made last year at starting a Babe Ruth League team in Ruidoso, but not enough kids were interested.

At least one standout Ruidoso High School athlete is probably as good or better at baseball than he is at any other sport.

But he can't play baseball because there is no high school team or teenage baseball program.

That might change in the future if better facilities are available.

The new sports complex should be a first step in improving local youth athletic programs.

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Jimmy Neeley has some contractors singing 'red tag blues'

Ruidoso building inspector Jimmy Neeley wants Ruidoso to have a good reputation in the building industry.

In the process of trying to create a good reputation for Ruidoso, Neeley has created one for himself. And in some people's eyes, it's not all good. As one village employee puts it, the only person Neeley would beat in a popularity contest these days is the dog catcher.

Neeley's lack of popularity appears to stem mainly from the little red tags he has been leaving on job sites around town since he began as inspector a month ago. The red tags are "stop work" orders issued because the builder either has no building permit or is violating the Uniform Building Code (UBC) in some manner.

Neeley did not want to say how many red tags he has issued or to whom, but he acknowledged there have been quite a few. Apparently there have been many more than have been issued in a long time.

While a number of contractors have applauded Neeley's concern for quality construction, the stop work orders—especially those left when no one is on the building site—have irritated many.

"People jump up 14 feet in the air," said Neeley of some of the builders who find the red tags on their building

sites. Neeley said he realized that the stop work orders can cost a contractor time and money. He believes, however, that the lessons a contractor learns from one red tag will prevent future costly mistakes. He said he notes on the back of the stop work orders which codes are being violated.

Neeley said he often stops at building sites before being asked to inspect them. If no one is there and he finds construction problems, he will often leave a red tag at the site, he said.

"It gets their attention that I want

to talk to them," said Neeley.

He believes he is doing the contractors a favor by pointing out potential problems before the actual inspection, and thus reducing costs of correcting them.

He mentioned one site he stopped at where workers were installing insulation in a house whose windows were too small for fire exits. The contractor was not on the site. Neeley left a red tag and sent the insulators home, he said. He figured it would be less expensive to correct the window problem before all the insulation was installed.

If a contractor is on the site, Neeley

said, he will talk to him about the problems without having to red tag the site.

Neeley said he has seen recurring problems which are generally minor. He said he has had to red tag building sites for improper egress windows, blocking concrete piers, guard rails, attic vents and ventilation under wooden floors.

"The word communication is probably the key," said local building contractor Bill Braudt.

Braudt said he had no problem with Neeley enforcing the building code to the letter.

"We've needed a little zeal in that office for a while," said Braudt, who noted that strict enforcement of the building code could help the construction trade in Ruidoso.

It is red tags for minor code violations that irritates the builders, said Braudt. Braudt said he had a run-in with Neeley over some footings that turned out to be properly placed in the end. But because of a lack of communication, Braudt almost had to stop the pouring of the footings, which would have been costly.

No one, however, seems to argue that Neeley knows his business. Neeley has worked six years as a union carpenter and 10 years as a building contractor.

He wrote a technical manual for building inspectors in El Paso and has taught college courses in construction for eight years at New Mexico State University and El Paso Community College. He also has a private school in which he has taught builders how to pass contractor's tests for seven years.

"He seems to be quite knowledgeable," said contractor George Cliff.

Cliff said he has had positive experiences with Neeley during two inspections, and found him "very cooperative."

Contractor Phil Hines said he was angry when he first found a red tag on his building site, but calmed down after talking to Neeley about the violations and how to fix them.

"He's just doing his job," said Hines. "If contractors would quit trying to buck him, things would work out better."

Neeley said he has been somewhat taken aback by his new role as building code enforcer. Before taking the job a month ago, he had been a popular instructor at a community college who played tennis with his students. The building inspector, on the other hand, rarely has good news and often has to play the heavy.

"It doesn't suit my personality,"

said Neeley. But he still believes he must do it.

"I can't forget what I know. I know the code," said Neeley. "Those codes are to safeguard life and health."

He emphasized that the building codes are minimum requirements for construction. He said a Construction Industries Division employee in Santa Fe told him Ruidoso had a bad reputation as a boom town with many unlicensed contractors building substandard houses.

He hopes his enforcement of the building code will protect both consumers and contractors while improving Ruidoso's reputation.

Although he knows the codes, Neeley acknowledged he makes mistakes. In the case of a dispute over codes, Neeley said he will call engineers and publishers of the Uniform Building Code in California to discuss interpretations.

He said he invites those who dispute his interpretation to be with him when he makes the calls so everyone will understand the situation.

Neeley said he hopes the recent hubbub over red tags and code violations will calm down as he and local builders become used to each other.

"I am hoping over time the relationship will become cooperative," said Neeley.

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

The "great experiment," of course, is the increase in the size of the Ruidoso village council from four members plus the mayor to six members plus the mayor.



Whoever wins Tuesday, the 19 candidates who have participated actively in the campaign are to be congratulated on their interest and their efforts. And we compliment the various organizations that sponsored candidate forums to help voters make their choices.

How well a seven-member governing body will work remains to be seen. At least the logistics of seating seven people at the council table at village hall have been taken care of, thanks to some fine carpentry work by Derald Waltrip.

We encourage all voters to go to the polls Tuesday. The six who fill those seats should be there because the greatest possible number of citizens put them there.—TP



"THIS IS ALL YOUR FAULT"

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Things are never boring in the Capital City.

You might look for a lull, with one session of the Legislature finished and the second not convened yet.

And our Governor had gone off to Washington, with the clear aim of telling President Reagan how to run the country, despite evidence that more New Mexicans had confidence in the way Reagan does his job than in the way Anaya does his own.

We poor commentators on the political scene might have been left to amuse ourselves, with no politicking taking place.

Except that this is Santa Fe, and there is always politicking here.

So we celebrated by holding the Parade of Candidates, as we always do in even-numbered years, when those who want to run for statewide office have to come to the Secretary of State and file the papers which will formally make them candidates.

That's not such an easy task. The rules are tough, and they must be rigorously followed.

To demonstrate his or her seriousness, each candidate must file petitions which contain the names of legally registered voters who number 3 percent of votes cast for the seat desired in the previous primary for that post.

There were 21,600 votes cast in the last Republican primary for the U.S. Senate, for instance, so Frank Bond, campaign manager for Pete Domenici, had to file a minimum of 650 names in support of his boss in this year's race.

The six-inch stack of petitions Bond turned in probably contained ten times that many names.

Also filling with plenty to spare was Nick Franklin, who wants the

Democratic nomination to run against Domenici in November.

Franklin is a new face as a candidate, though he is known around the state from previous political activity, including managing a campaign for Jack Daniels, against whom Domenici made his first run for the Senate, and a period as state Democratic chairman.

Judy Pratt, who will run against Nick in the primary, contending for a race against Pete in the Fall, arrived late in the day, in contrast to Franklin's early morning hour, also with plenty of support.

Peter York, mayor of Roswell, was a new face to many of the Santa Fe reporters. He wants the Democratic nomination to run against Joe Skeen in the Congressional race in District Two.

Like Domenici, other members of Congress sent duly authorized substitutes to file for them.

Barbara Richardson dropped by early to file her husband's papers. Jerry McKinney, from Skeen's Washington office, filed for his boss, and Manuel Lujan's campaign manager for hers.

Also filing quietly in the early morning hours was Justice Dan Sosa of the Supreme Court, a top vote getter among Democrats, who will be opposed by Judge Tom Mescall of Albuquerque on the Republican side.

And so it went all day, with few major surprises. Most of those who filed were already identified with the race they plan to make.

But their presence here demonstrated that the 1984 election season has actually begun, as surely as the opening of Spring training proves that the baseball season cannot be far behind.

That was probably a good idea somebody had, to get the conservative coalition in our state Senate to run an ad telling why they are still convinced we do not need an increase in taxes.

Getting every member of that group (including the three Democrats in it) to sign their names has a way of

committing them a little more deeply. It also serves notice on Governor Anaya that they plan to continue sticking together. That can't encourage him greatly, since he counted on luring at least a couple of them to his side before the special legislative session begins.

Maybe Anaya should have stayed home to take care of his own problems.

On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer



After pretty much being absent for several years, science fiction seems to be creeping back into my life.

Darned if I'm not becoming intrigued with The Gods of Riverworld, the fifth and latest novel in the Riverworld series by Philip Jose Farmer. I did not expect to like the book, because I felt sort of exhausted after getting through number four, The Magic Labyrinth.

But Farmer has created such an engaging protagonist in Richard Francis Burton. Actually, the author did not create the hero. Richard Francis Burton is a historical figure—a 19th century explorer and linguist who found Lake Tanganyika.

The genius of Riverworld lies in the fact that Farmer has peopled the novels with characters from all ages of mankind, all reincarnated on the banks of the 10 million-mile-long River.

So you have Burton sharing adventures with such disparate figures as Eric Bloodaxe the Viking, King John of England and Nazi Herman Goering.

The first Riverworld book, To Your Scattered Bodies Go, easily has a place on my "must read" list for science fiction aficionados. And if you read the first, you must read the second, The Fabulous Riverboat, if only because much of that tale revolves around a dynamic character named Samuel Clemens.

What other science fiction classics would I place on my "must read" list?

Glad you asked. The distinction, "Greatest SF Novel of All Time," is sometimes attached to Alfred Bester's The Stars My Destination. Whether such a sweeping accolade is deserved by any of the great SF books is debatable.

But Stars is certainly one of my favorites. Its appeal, too, lies largely in a likable hero—some might say anti-hero—Gully Foil.

Bester wrote another classic that I give equal stature, The Demolished Man. The protagonist of this novel is not very likable, but he is fascinating.

Both the Bester novels, like most SF megaclasses, have a unique premise that draws the reader into the world the novelist creates. In Stars it is jaunty, in Demolished it is peeping, and demolition.

To find out what those are, you have to read the books. And you should. SF varies from what is called Space Opera (people zapping each other with rayguns, as in Star Wars) to futurism—predictions of what the future holds for our world.

In the latter category, my favorite author is John Brunner. In Stand on Zanzibar and The Sheep Look Up, he paints a world that we very possibly will inhabit within a half-century.

Those novels are in the episodic style—they are made up of several different storylines and switch rapidly from one to another.

Before or after tackling Zanzibar or Sheep, you might want to try Brunner's minor classic (I think), The Shockwave Rider. That novel was inspired by Alvin Toffler's influential non-fiction work of the middle 1970s, Future Shock.

The proliferation of computers in our society since Shockwave came out is proof that Brunner was a prophet. Read it and you'll see what I mean.

Of course, the "biggie" that readers with at least a passing acquaintance with SF probably have read is Frank Herbert's Dune. It will be even bigger when the movie, filmed in the Chihuahuan desert, comes out.

I read Dune a long time ago, and I'm almost afraid to read it again because I don't want it to lose its specialness to me. Dune 2, Dune Messiah, and Dune 3, Children of Dune, I have less regard for.

The recent God Emperor of Dune I have not read yet, but maybe I will because I'm enjoying The Gods of Riverworld. What I might do is read Dune again before I see the movie, to see how good a job the makers of the film have done.

I think people who live or have lived in the Southwest can relate especially well to Arrakis, the arid planet where Dune is set.

Another series that I have not read the latest installment in is the Foundation saga by Isaac Asimov. I would probably need to go back and reread the Foundation trilogy to get the most out of Foundation's Edge. With my reading time sorely limited, that might have to stay on the back burner for a while.

If you're looking for an introduction to Asimov, I would recommend The Caves of Steel. Readers of mystery novels—and I know that subcult is as devoted (fanatic?) as SF fans—especially will enjoy this detective story.

My personal favorite by Asimov is The Gods Themselves. This novel, too, has a fascinating premise—a parallel universe. The author's linking of that universe to our own is ingenious.

Well, I had meant for this to be a list of my 10 favorite science fiction authors/novels, but I guess I rambled too much.

But this leaves the opportunity to continue with the subject. I know there are some die-hard SF fans in Ruidoso, and I look forward to talking to some of them about their personal favorites.

Happy reading, and may The Force be with you.

DEAR EDITOR:

This will be my first Letter to the Editor, but I felt the need to share a special feeling with all your readers.

I've been working at the Ruidoso Care Center now for two years, thanks to a dear friend whose father-in-law lives there. She told me they needed aides to work there. I was frightened at the thought of working there because I had no experience and I didn't like old people. (A fact I didn't know until I started to like them.)

I applied for and got a job as an aide and was trained to care for their physical needs. The things they weren't able to do for themselves anymore like for some, because of a stroke or disease, we have to assist them with their food. Along with helping them eat, we also help them bathe, dress, and do all the little things that you and I do every day. We also help them write letters or when time permits, we read a little to them.

Learning to deal with their mental and emotional needs was the most difficult for me. On my first morning there I saw an aide stop an old woman in the hallway and give her a warm hug and smile, no words said. The woman smiled as the aide walked on.

I was uncomfortable giving attention in this way, but I was determined to, and now I feel nothing but happiness when my hugs, kisses or smiles are returned. You can't know how good a smile can look sometimes until you see those faces light up. For some of those residents, the staff has become the only family they have.

That's why I'm especially happy when volunteers and visitors come. Even if the only thing you do is smile and say hi. Sometimes all they want is someone to stop and listen for a while, maybe for them to tell an old story, or just to talk. Sometimes they need a shoulder to cry on. Mine has been wet a few times.

That's why volunteers are every bit as important as the staff. I wish we had more of them.

I laughingly tell everyone that I refuse to grow old, but that day will come. I only hope that if I have to go to a nursing home or a Care Center, that I have people around who care when I'm sad or lonely and who will take the time to make me smile.



AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 77-3 (CABLE TELEVISION FRANCHISE ORDINANCE) TO AMEND THE SCHEDULE OF RATES AND CHARGES AUTHORIZED UNDER THE FRANCHISE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO DOWNS, NEW MEXICO, THAT SECTION 5, PARAGRAPH C OF ORDINANCE NO. 77-3 BE AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

1. C. The following rates and charges (hereinafter called basic charges) are hereby authorized for the following service performed by the cable television franchise holder under this franchise and should not be increased by the Governing Body of the Village of Ruidoso Downs except as hereinafter set forth.

BASIC CHARGES

- A. Installation Charge for First Outlet \$30.00
B. Installation Charge for a Reconnect in a home previously connected \$15.00
C. Installation Charge for a Reconnect in a home not previously connected \$25.00
D. Installation Charge for each additional installed at time of cable or other installation \$10.00
E. Installation Charge for each additional outlet installed not at time of cable installation \$15.00
F. Charge for Relocating an Outlet \$15.00
G. Monthly Service Charge for First Outlet \$12.00
H. Monthly Service Charge for each additional outlet for Television \$2.50
I. Monthly Service Charge for each outlet for FM Radio \$2.50

The franchise holder is hereby granted the right to increase the basic charges during any calendar year, without the approval of the Governing Body of the Village of Ruidoso Downs, by an amount not to exceed 8% per year of the basic charge in effect at the time of the increase.

Cablevision may refuse service to any person when a former customer is residing at the same address who has not paid the amount owing to the company for prior service.

Because Cablevision does not repair TV sets, it may charge \$15.00 for a service call if a problem exists with a TV set but not within the cable system, and the customer is given this information at the time of a previous service call within the prior sixty (60) days.

Cablevision shall have the right and privilege of adding the monthly gross receipts tax to the above service charges set forth herein, except as state herein pertaining to the increase of basic charges without the consent of the Governing Body of Ruidoso Downs, shall become in full force and effect five (5) days from the final publication of this ordinance.

2. All other provisions of Ordinance No. 77-3 shall remain in full force and effect.

Paging company leases "freedom machines"

It's a Friday afternoon. The weather is clear, warm and inviting, and you haven't hit a golf ball since late fall. You want to head for the links so bad you can feel the weight of a nine iron in your hands, but you're afraid to leave the office and chance missing an important phone call.

What do you do?
Call Mitch and Shirley Suess at S & S Beepers, of course.

"We're a paging company with beepers and pagers for businessmen, or even the individual, who wants to stay in touch," said Mitch Suess. Suess and his wife, Shirley, operate the business, which opened February 1.

S & S Beepers is at 1031 Mechem Drive, in the Attic and Friends shopping center.

"We're giving people the opportunity to play golf or exercise and still keep in touch," Suess said.

According to Suess, the company is based around the leasing of Motorola radio-pagers, or beepers, as they are commonly called. Suess said that for a charge of \$25 a month, his company will supply a customer with a leased beeper and the right to use the S & S radio frequency to receive messages.

Each beeper has its own phone number, and messages either can be called in to the beeper directly or through call-forwarding from an office or home phone. Suess said the

beepers can also be called long-distance.

When a person calls the beeper number, or is forwarded to the beeper through another phone, it rings three times, then a tone sounds. At that time the caller has 15 seconds to deliver a message, then the call is completed. Within seconds, the beeper "beeps," and repeats the actual voice of the person giving the message.

"It's a freedom machine," said Suess. "It gives you some freedom that you didn't have before."

Suess said all messages are relayed through transmitters atop Camelot Mountain. A big plus for the system, Suess said, is that no one else can listen in on your messages with their beepers, as is the case with many other beeper systems. This is especially important to customers who prefer that their messages remain confidential for business or personal reasons.

The beepers operate on an extremely high frequency that facilitates clear reception, according to Suess. He said the 24 hour a day message service can be successfully operated in Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Alto with excellent clarity.

"We're really proud of the system," Suess said. "It is the first one in a mountain area. It is performing above expectations and we're getting a good range. This has surprised a couple of engineers."

When the system was installed, there were only a few like it in the country, Suess said.

According to Suess, in addition to the \$25 monthly lease cost, the customer must also pay a \$100 deposit. The deposit covers S & S if the beeper is accidentally broken, since every beeper is insured with a \$100 deductible policy.

Mitch said the actual cost of each beeper is \$315 to \$330. According to Suess, the company has the beepers covered by insurance so the customer won't be as worried about breakage.

"We didn't want the customer to have to worry about it," he said. If a beeper must be replaced due to breakage or technical problems, Suess said, that beeper's phone number can be transferred to a replacement beeper.

According to Suess, the company may expand in the future, but for the present time will concentrate on beepers.

"We are basically a communications company," Suess said. "We will stay with the leasing of beepers right now."

He also said they may be getting new digital display pagers which would display the phone number of the person leaving the message, and pagers which would display digitally the actual message in written form. Suess also mentioned the possibility of a mobile phone system in Ruidoso.

Suess said he and Shirley started the business because they wanted to serve the community of Ruidoso.

"We looked around here for a year for something that would be a service to the community," Suess said. The beeper business looked like a way to achieve that goal, so the Susses went into business.

"Our goal is to service the community of Ruidoso to the best of our ability and to give someone the opportunity to better enjoy their business. We consider ourselves a service-oriented company."

Suess said one quality of Ruidoso that they found to be particularly appealing is the business community.

"We're not the types of people who would jump off into an environment we didn't feel safe in. We have no qualms about starting a business in Ruidoso. We feel like the business economy in the town is superb."

Suess said the combination of the favorable business and personal atmosphere of Ruidoso was icing on the cake for them.

"We feel very comfortable here, not only the business climate, but the climate of the people."

The Susses moved to Ruidoso from Lubbock, Texas, two years ago. They had come to Ruidoso for years to vacation in a small trailer they owned in town. One day, Suess said, they just decided to move up here permanently. Suess said they left their real estate and oil investment business in Lubbock to make the move.

"We enjoyed what we did," Suess said of their Lubbock business interests, "but it got to be too hectic." Suess said during their final vacation here, he remembers telling Shirley that he would "give up everything just to be able to move up here."

Suess said six weeks later, they were house-shopping in Ruidoso.


"It's home, and it feels like home," Suess said of Ruidoso.

S & S Beepers is a home-operated and home-owned business, Suess said.

"This isn't just a branch office, this is headquarters," Suess said.

The company is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. every day except Sunday, when it is closed. The business may be contacted during regular hours at 258-5108.

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


