Stars sign for Summer Festival

The Ruidoso Summer Festival has signed contracts with performers and set the schedule for the week of music in June.

The festival will be June 1 through June 9 in the Wendell Chino Ballroom at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Classical cellist Leonard Rose; pianist Santiago Rodriguez; vocalists Joy Simpson and James Tyeska; and the Kingston Trio will join the Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra and conductor John Giordano in several performances during the week.

The festival will kick off with Casino Night Friday, June 1. The Wendell Chino ballroom will be transformed into a gambling casino where patrons can try their luck at roulette, blackjack, craps and a number of other games of chance. Money used to purchase chips will be donated toward the Ruidoso Summer Festival Incorporated. Prizes will be awarded to the biggest winners of the night.

Classical cellist Leonard Rose will perform with the Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra the second night, Saturday, June 2.

A Champagne Brunch will be followed by a free concert Sunday morning at the Inn. The Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra will perform a selection of light classics.

Classical pianist Santiago Rodriguez will perform with the orchestra Tuesday evening, June 5. Rodriguez, a silver medal winner at the 1981 Van Cliburn International Piano Competition, is a native of Cuba and made his debut with the New Orleans Symphony at the age of nine. He has won several other awards and played with symphonies around the world.

"He combines the technique of a

virtuoso with the poetic sensibility and organizational clarity of Dinu Lipatti," wrote New York Magazine's Peter Davis. "This talented young pianist seems ready for an important career."

The Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra will take listeners on a musical voyage into a distant galaxy Thursday evening. The performance, titled "Starship Encounters," will include a light show.

The orchestra will return to a more traditional favorite Friday evening when it accompanies vocalists Joy Simpson and James Tyeska in highlights from George Gershwin's "Porgy and Bess."

Wrapping up the week of music Saturday evening, June 9, will be the popular Kingston Trio. One of the longest lived musical groups in the country, the Trio will be performing their own classic tunes such as "Tom Dooley," "Tijuana Jail," "Scotch and Soda," and "Charlie and the MTA."

Led by original member Bob Shane, the group has added other favorites "Early Morning Rain," "Amazing Grace" and "The First Time (Ever I Saw Your Face)."

"We genuinely love to perform and we work hard at making it look like fun. To keep the Kingston Trio idea alive, our goal is simply to be the best at what we do," said Shane.

Tickets, ranging from \$15 to \$35, will be available to the public around mid-April. Those who wish to become Benefactors or Los Ruidos by donating \$500 to \$1,000 will have prior seat selection. Ticket sales cover only 20 percent of the festival costs, wrote festival president Ann Denton, and contributions are what really support the week of music.

- How out of state travel will be handled


- Discussion of Extraterritorial Zoning Authority and Commission

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Dry conditions raise forest fire danger

"Springtime in this area is by far the most critical fire period."

That statement made last week by U.S. Forest Service fire management specialist Steve Makowski is especially true this year. An abnormally dry January, February and March have helped create conditions for high-intensity forest fires.

Makowski said precipitation is running about 25 percent of normal for the three months. About 20 inches were recorded in January and in February, he pointed out, while normal levels for those months are 1.31 and 1.29.

Most of that precipitation takes the form of snow. In a normal year, snow stays on the ground for extended periods and the larger fuels on south-facing slopes of the forest get quite wet, Makowski explained.

This year that extended cover has been lacking.

"The things have just been drying out and drying out," said Makowski. The "things" he refers to are the so-called 1,000-hour fuels—those over three inches in diameter.

The hour figure for a fuel is related to the time required for it to take on or give up moisture. The 1,000-hour fuels contribute to fire intensity—how hot a fire burns.

Smaller fuels affect a fire's rate of spread. In a normal spring, there can be fast-spreading fires (with high winds a contributing factor), but they will not be of great intensity because the larger fuels are wet.

This type of fire has a low flame length and is not particularly damaging to the environment, according to Makowski.

If winds are normal this year, however, fast-spreading fires with much higher intensities can be expected.

To compound the problem, only a significant deviation in normal spring weather would have any impact on

the fuels.

"We're in a position now where we can't make up," said Makowski. "If we get more snow it's going to be gone so fast it's not going to affect those larger fuels."

Rain would not help much either, he said, unless it came in a week-long drizzle.

The Forest Service has taken extra steps to prepare for this year's fire season. The 18-member Hot Shot fire fighting crew has been called to duty two weeks earlier than usual.

About a dozen Hot Shots started to work Sunday, March 18, and Makowski expects the crew to be at full manpower by April 1. He pointed out that virtually the same personnel as last year make up the crew, which minimized training requirements.

"We will be fully operational just right off the bat," he said.

The Ruidoso Model 70 600-gallon pumper truck is also operational and its four- to five-member crew has been on duty since before March 1. The Capitan Model 70 also stands ready, and the Bonito Model 70 will be on line before April 1.

Two Forest Service employees are working full time on fire prevention, and Makowski expects the Mon Jean lookout tower to be manned for seven-day a week coverage by the end of this month.

Makowski noted that the opening of fishing season April 1 and the spring turkey season later in April will mean increased use on the Lincoln National Forest. Picnic and camping use already has picked up.

Persons building campfires at unimproved areas present a potential fire hazard, Makowski noted. He suggested that pine needles, dry grass and other fuels be cleared three feet from around a fire ring.

Fires should be extinguished by pouring water on them, stirring, and pouring more water. "Don't pile dirt on it," Makowski cautioned. Doing that can cause an "oven" effect that keeps coals burning longer.

The same effect is created when a smoker stubs out a cigarette into a crevice on a log, said Makowski. He warned that all actions that are a potential ignition source be carried out with extreme care. "The fuels are just flat ready," he said.

Cellist and pianist to perform Saturday

Chamber music by Schubert, Faure and Shostakovich will be featured in a free public concert at 8 p.m. Saturday, March 24, at Ruidoso First Christian Church.

The program features cellist James Fittz and pianist Melba Halamicek. It will open with the "Arpeggione" Sonata of Franz Schubert. The Romantic Era composer lived only 31 years, but produced more music than any other composer of his time. Schubert is principally known for his songs, especially German lieder.

The arpeggione, invented in 1823, was like a bass guitar played with a bow. While the instrument quickly became an anachronism, Schubert's "Sonata in A Minor," written for it in 1824, did not. The music is a beautiful example of his melodic genius.

Three songs by Gabriel Faure are the next feature. Faure, who was nearly 80 when he died in 1924, is revered as a song composer, although his passion was chamber music.

His works that will be performed demonstrate the wonderful marriage of both capabilities. The vignettes set romantic expression into simplicity and elegant style.

The next work, the Shostakovich "Sonata for Cello and Piano," is a sterling sample of that composer's inventive genius. It is characteristic of his music before the Communist Party politburo called him to task for writing music with no positive social value.

After that, conservativism constructed much of Shostakovich's music. In this work, however, rousing folk idioms alternate with a beautiful

melody and somber tone painting in a wide range of colors.

James Fittz began his formal music studies at the age of five years. As a high school student, he won first prize in the International Music Competition in Tokyo, Japan.

His teachers have included Gordon Epperson and the late Yoshio Sato. Fittz earned a bachelor's degree in English literature and philosophy from Wheaton College in Illinois. He also has a master's and doctoral degree in music from the University of Arizona.

Fittz taught studio cello across the country before joining the New Mexico State University (NMSU) faculty. He has also performed throughout the United States.

Melba Halamicek received early training in Indiana, where she made her accompanist debut as an eight-year-old.

She attended Indiana University and the University of Texas at El Paso. Halamicek received a master's degree in music from NMSU.

She has performed extensively throughout the Southwest and has been heard in broadcast dual recitals. The Saturday performance is the second in the 1984 series. The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and the New Mexico State University Department of Music sponsor it.

The next programs in this series will be offered in conjunction with the Ruidoso Summer String Workshop conducted at La Junta Guest Ranch July 13-26. The performances are planned at First Christian Church

Balloons to be launched Wednesday at Nob Hill

Albuquerque isn't the only New Mexico city filled with balloon boosters. The bright orbs will fill Ruidoso's skies Wednesday, to mark the beginning of spring.

Runner-up prizes are also planned. Entries must be mailed by May. About 500,000 children launched their balloons last spring, Weekly Reader said.

Gavilan canyon zoning recommendations made

The Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission met Thursday in a workshop session to discuss zoning recommendations for the Gavilan Canyon area.

The recommendations from the meeting, and input from a public hearing scheduled for Thursday, April 19, will be sent to the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority for final approval. It is not until then that actual zoning changes will be made. All work previous to the Authority's decision consists of recommendations only.

During the meeting, commission members discussed using the results of a BRW master plan being done for the Village of Ruidoso, but decided the year it will take to complete the report was too long to wait.

"We can sit here for a year to wait for that plan to come out," commission member Ben Hall said at the meeting.

Also during the meeting, the commission members heard a report

from Ruidoso village councillor Ray Dean Carpenter on efforts to arrange for repair of Gavilan Canyon Road. He said the council had looked at annexing the right-of-way of the road. He said that some councillors had voiced concern that if they annexed the roadway, adjacent property owners would want annexation.

"It may be that we have to annex in order to get people around the downtown area," Carpenter said, referring to the use of Gavilan Canyon Road as a bypass around Ruidoso. Carpenter said either annexation or a joint powers agreement between the village, county and state would be done to begin improvements on the road.

The commission members made recommendations for zoning in the canyon beginning at the point where Gavilan Canyon Road joins New Mexico Highway 37. The property occupied by the Three Bees Mart and Starr's Nursery were recommended to be zoned commercial, as was property in the B. L. Luck subdivision along Highway 37.

Other property in the subdivision

was recommended to be zoned single-family residential (R-1). Property in the Robolitos Tract, Gavilan Ranch, Los Corralitos, and Judy Segal and Fred Segal areas, and property belonging to the El Paso Boy's Club, were recommended to be zoned R-1.

An RMS designation, which allows for single-family residences and mobile homes, was recommended for the Fawn Ridge, Aschoff and Gavilan Acres subdivisions.

A tract of 80 acres, recently acquired by Southwest Community Health Services, and a 40-acre tract that has been invested in by local physicians, were recommended to be zoned C-P. The zoning allows for a new hospital and a planned residential and commercial development.

That development was briefly outlined at the meeting by J. Greg Masters of Sierra Development Company. Masters said he represented a group of investors in the properties.

"That would be super," he said of the recommended zoning.

Just down Gavilan Canyon Road, the Pines of Gavilan, a subdivision being developed by Ed and Janet Pear-

son, was recommended to be zoned commercial one lot deep along Gavilan Canyon Road, and RMS elsewhere.

Recommended for a single-family residential zoning were Eagle Creek Acres, Homestead Acres and the Andy Winton tract. The Valley East subdivision was recommended to be zoned RMS and RMF on the east side of Gavilan Canyon Road. Those designations would allow for single-family residences, mobile homes and a mobile home park. The subdivision property on the west side of the road was recommended to be zoned commercial.

Recommended for industrial zoning in the canyon were 40 acres owned by the White Mountain Development Company that is being used for sand and gravel activities. Other White Mountain Development land in the area south of the Valley East subdivision was given a commercial zoning, 200 feet on either side of Gavilan Canyon Road.

The public hearing of April 19 will be the next meeting of the Extraterritorial Zoning Commission.

Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival to HQ at arena

Preparations for the 1984 Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival are in full swing, according to Glen Ferguson, president of the Ruidoso Business Association, the organization that is sponsoring the event.

"We're real excited," Ferguson said of the event, scheduled for September 26-29. This will be the third year the Ruidoso group has sponsored the event. According to Ferguson, this year will be the biggest in the history of the Motorcycle Festival.

Last year, a record 7,000 motorcyclists were estimated to have rolled into Ruidoso for the festival. Ferguson said participants this year may number up to 10,000.

"It's not far off," Ferguson said of the 10,000-participant goal. "We're real close to it. Our event is the second largest single event being put on in Ruidoso."

In addition to more riders, this year will be different from years past due to a new location for the trade shows and contest judging of the festival, according to Ferguson. The Ruidoso Super Select Sales Arena, located about 12 miles east of the Ruidoso Downs racetrack, will be the center of activities during the festival.

"It's just great," Ferguson said of the new location. The 18,000 square feet of floor space in the modern facility will add a lot of prestige to the festival, Ferguson said. The cooperative attitude of the arena's owners, Richard and Joanie Thompson, is an additional attractive feature of the site, Ferguson said.

"Richard and Joanie are just about as excited about it as we are," Ferguson said.

The arena will be the site of the trade show, featuring four main exhibitors and dozens of other smaller exhibitors scattered throughout the open building. Also in the arena, artists will be custom pinstripping motorcycles. Ferguson said booths will also line the front and sides of the building.

Large exhibits will be put on by Harley Davidson, BMW and Custom Dressers, and possibly Honda, according to association vice president Gary Boyd.

At the head of the arena will be displayed the grand prize of the festival, a touring motorcycle dressed by Custom Dressers, with a Poly Tron Cargo Trailer, all contributed by Custom Dressers and valued at \$15,000. The second grand prize will be an Eagle III Cargo Trailer, contributed by Smith's Manufacturing, valued at \$825.

Outside the arena, under a

covered area surrounded by bleachers, the awards ceremony will take place. Contests judged there will include the best dressed male and female riders, oldest bike ridden, oldest rider, best dressed couple, largest uniformed club, best dressed sidecar rig and best dressed trike, among others.

On Friday of the ceremony, a Festival Queen and Mr. Motorcycle will be named, and they will lead the motorcycle caravan Saturday morning up Highway 70 and Sudderth Drive.

Other events during the festival will include a scavenger hunt, with motorcyclists visiting 60 to 80 local merchants in the Ruidoso area, and a series of poker runs. According to Ferguson, the scavenger hunt is consistent with RBA's goal to have the festival benefit Ruidoso.

"We want the businesses to benefit from the 10,000 people in town," Ferguson said.

The poker runs consist of riders traveling to five different locations around Ruidoso and drawing a playing card at each location. At the end of the five stops, the person with the best hand wins a prize, such as a helmet or a leather jacket.

Ferguson said a poker run last year raised \$700 to go to Jerry Lewis for Muscular Dystrophy work.

This year, a "Gigantic U.S.A." poker run, jointly sponsored by

McDonald's Restaurants and RBA, will feature a \$1,000 first prize. Motorcyclists in that event must stop and make a purchase at three different McDonald's locations between September 1 and September 28.

The participants' fourth purchase must be from a McDonald's in Deming, Carlsbad, El Paso, Socorro or Roswell. The fifth stop must be at the McDonald's in Ruidoso. Poker hands will then be drawn by the eligible players, with the winner getting \$1,000.

According to Ferguson, efforts the RBA members have made during the year to promote the festival are paying off. RBA members have traveled to motorcycle get-togethers in Los Angeles, Denver, Houston and other areas.

At those events, Ferguson said, they show a slide presentation of the attractions of the Ruidoso area and the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival. He said the show usually results in enthusiastic responses.

"We have more registered now than we did at this time last year," Ferguson said.

Ferguson said for the members of RBA, the excitement level before the festival is rising almost daily.

"We're motorcycle up to here," Ferguson said, raising a hand to chin level. "We're excited about it."

Spruce budworm spraying set for May

The word is "go" on a project to spray up to 200,000 acres or more on the Lincoln National Forest, Mescalero Apache Reservation and state and private lands to combat an infestation of the Western Spruce Budworm.

Aerial spraying will start between May 18 and May 23, according to Paul Gordon of the U.S. Forest Service. Ten fixed-wing aircraft and four helicopters will be employed in the project, which is expected to take 12 to 15 days.

About 75 percent of the infested area will be sprayed with a chemical called carbaryl, or "Seven." Seven is probably the most common pesticide used in agricultural food production, said Gordon.

The pesticide is licensed for 545 different insects. A concentration of one-half gallon per acre will be used in the

spraying project.

"It (Seven) has probably been examined more widely than most other insecticides," Gordon said.

The other pest-killer to be employed against the spruce budworm is bacillus thuringiensis (BT). This is an ingestive agent that kills the budworm larva by attacking its digestive system.

BT will be used over areas of habitation and areas adjacent to bodies of water, including sensitive watershed, said Gordon.

"In general we can expect a higher kill on the larvae with the Seven than with the BT," he said.

The total acreage to be sprayed will be determined in the coming weeks. Areas of the vulnerable vegetative type—white fir, Douglas fir and corkbark spruce—total 175,000 acres on the Lincoln National Forest, at least 65,000 on the Mescalero Apache Reservation, and 17,000 acres on state and private lands.

A spruce budworm infestation kills about five percent of the affected trees, according to Gordon. It also results in a 30 percent retardation of growth and top kill.

Reforestation of affected areas adds to the damage costs, Gordon noted. He pointed out that potential timber losses were of particular concern to the Mescalero Apache Tribe, because of timber's economic importance to the tribe.

On the Lincoln National Forest, most of the infested areas are in the Mayhill and Cloudcroft districts. There is some infestation on the Smokey Bear District near Ruidoso, including an area up the Ski Run Road.

Gordon said owners of private land would be able to sign up for the spraying program at an office to be set up in the James Canyon firehouse near Cloudcroft.

The starting date for spraying will depend on the time of emergence of

buds and the larvae being in their third or fourth instar (stage of development).

Home base for the aircraft in the project will be Alamogordo. The planes and helicopters have been contracted, as has the mixing of the two insecticides.

The project has been budgeted at \$10 per acre. Lincoln National Forest supervisor James Abbot noted that was a liberal estimate, however, and predicted the job could be completed with the \$1.5 million allocated to it.

A lawsuit that would have held up the project was settled out of court recently. The suit had been brought by an unincorporated environmentalist group.

Gordon noted that the Forest Service was always "on the front line" when it came to battles over use of pesticides, though it accounts for one-half of one percent of pesticide use in America.

Computer students impress at UNM Hospital honors ex-trustee

Jim Dickinson took a half-dozen high school students to a state computer conference recently. "The people were very much impressed by what (the students) had done," he said.

Most of the people attending the New Mexico Council of Computer Users in Education were adults. They worked in businesses, at Sandia and Los Alamos labs, and as educators.

The adults crowded into two sessions to watch the teenagers during the March 9-10 convention at the University of New Mexico (UNM). Dickinson estimated that up to 100 people joined the audience.

Dickinson is proud of his students.

"Nobody else in the state is doing what these kids did," he said.

Ruidoso High School students Kim Copeland, Steven Dobbs, Rochell Hornbuckle, Mitch Rhodes and Dee Sherwood attended the conference. Former student Eric Berg also worked on the two one-hour presentations, followed by question and answer periods.

The students presented programs they had written on various subjects, including keeping basketball statistics, lists of grade average for counselors, and ski lists.

The teenagers paid many of their own expenses for the trip. In addition to making their presentations, they attended other programs, Dickinson said. Those focused on subjects such as robots or teaching music with com-

puters. Back in Ruidoso, Dickinson is teaching a first-year programming class and a one-semester computer literacy class. Most use the Basic language. His programming class uses word processors, spread sheets and commercial applications.

Second-year computer students pursue directed study, and use computer languages including Cobol, Fortran, and even the difficult language, Assembly.

Although Dickinson has worked with computers for about 3,000 hours, "The students still come up with different applications I hadn't thought of," he said. He encourages projects interesting to them and to himself.

A few tears trickled down faces and a torrent of praise fell on friendly ears as Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital trustees praised a former colleague Thursday.

The children of Ben Sanchez listened proudly as board president Pinky Jones said, "We thank God we had him." Sanchez, who was nearly 70 when he died last year, served untrudgingly as a trustee.

Another trustee, Ruidoso High School counselor James Sanchez, said he wasn't related to Ben Sanchez. However, the man was like a father to him, James Sanchez said.

Gabriel Sanchez and his three sisters accepted a plaque honoring Ben Sanchez. He said Ben Sanchez "was not only my father, but my best friend."

After the emotional interlude, hospital administrator Ken Moore reported to the trustees about the

financial status of the hospital. He said no major changes had occurred since his report last month.

"February is a disastrous month for us," said Moore. He explained that it is usually a slow month, and three payrolls must be issued.

One month is left in the hospital's fiscal year. March had been about normal, Moore said, with a high number of patients.

"We can end the year with a positive bottom line," Moore said.

Dr. Paul Echols then asked the trustees to grant assorted hospital privileges for three men, Dr. James Hopper, Carrizozo doctor Daniel Blodgett and Carrizozo dentist Jamie Dale Good.

Echols, the hospital chief of staff, spoke highly of them. The trustees approved the privileges unanimously in each case.

He also read from a letter he had written in response to a concern by the New Mexico State Police about transporting blood to the hospital at

high speeds, only to have it go unused. That was risky and costly to taxpayers, it was claimed.

Echols said he had written that he was grateful for the service to this isolated hospital.

In the emergency room, he said, some patients need large amounts of blood. If doctors wait until they have used the supply in town before getting more, they must wait another three hours for delivery, Echols said.

It is better to have it and not need it than to need it and not have it, he said. Jones then asked, "Where's the beef?" and got a report from Pink Ladies head Lorene Ross about her group's income.

She added the Pink Ladies were happy to have four male members. The trustees unanimously approved a slate of officers for the Pink Ladies for next year. Members will vote on the selections in May.

The group will soon start summer hours at their thrift shop.

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Mexico fishing service of local outfit

If you happen to be a fat, nine-pound Florida bass swimming around in Mexico's Lake Baccarac, watch out! Treks, International is coming your way!

Treks is a unique, Ruidoso-based company specializing in flying bass enthusiasts from the United States to Lake Baccarac, in Mexico, for some of the best bass fishing this side of Bacubirito (a village near the lake).

According to Ruidosoan Bill Streeter, who is in charge of sales and promotions for Treks, groups of sport fishers are flown to Bacubirito by charter airplanes. The anglers stay in a modern resort near the lake, owned by Mexican chain hotel-owner Richardo Baldarama, a partner of Streeter's.

Seasoned bass fisherman Billy Chapman supervises fishing operations on the lake. Guests at the resort

are treated to meals of 12-ounce T-bone steaks, frog legs, shrimp, lobster and, of course, freshly caught bass. The resort has a satellite television antenna, so guests can be assured of watching games of their favorite football teams.

The resort is otherwise completely isolated, except for an airplane kept ready for emergencies, according to Streeter. The facilities are completely air-conditioned.

Streeter said a typical day of activity at the lake includes boating out on the lake in early morning; spending a couple of hours casting for the big ones; a lakeside outdoor barbecue of the morning's catch for lunch; an hour's siesta; and then an afternoon of more fishing.

Native guides help direct anglers to good spots, and they filet and freeze the proceeds of a day of fishing.

According to Streeter, the emphasis of the trip is on fishing. "This is strictly fishing," Streeter

said. "There's no room for any Mickey Mouseing."

Streeter said the lake is an excellent location for fishing enthusiasts.

"It's kind of secret. It's almost impossible to get into but by plane," he said. "It's in the mountains. It's a new lake, it hasn't been fished out."

Streeter said eight- and nine-pound bass are commonly caught at the lake. He said the size and availability of fish, and the tranquil atmosphere, are big points in favor of the lake.

"It's peaceful. It's exciting fishing," he said. "You'll catch more than you can keep. It's a bass fisherman's paradise."

Streeter said he takes mostly businessmen, executives, doctors and lawyers to the lake.

"We have a very elite clientele," he said. Streeter estimated the cost of a three-day trip at around \$1,000, for "everything."

He said business for the enterprise

was gradually increasing. Streeter said most of the clients have been from New Mexico and Texas, and the business is planning to expand into California and Arizona.

Streeter said the business conducts trips all year except August, September and October, when high temperatures prevail and it is the time of the rainy season. During those months, Streeter said, Treks turns around and brings Mexican tourists to Ruidoso. He said the Mexican clientele are largely families.

While in Ruidoso, Streeter said, the Mexicans are taken on camping trips, horseback rides, visits to the Ruidoso Downs racetrack or on trout-fishing expeditions. He said Treks also takes clients to special events going on in Ruidoso at the time of the trip.

But come November, it's time for Treks to go back to bass fishing.


"It's fun," Streeter said of the experience. "If you're into bass fishing, you don't want to miss this lake."

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
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Finally, the champions

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
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"She Blinded Me with Science" could be Steve Dobbs' theme song

"NMSU has just as good a college of engineering and physics as Harvard, and it's cheaper and closer to home," he said.

He started doing something about that five years ago, when he was in the seventh grade. "Mr. (Page) Hubbard inspired me," he said. The science teacher "demonstrated what an atom really looked like," and Dobbs became fascinated by science.

"I invented a tractor beam, but you need a black hole to operate it," he said. That bit of doing will have to wait to be applied in life. Black holes have been theorized by space scientists, but are still only imagined. None have been discovered yet.

Real life physics interests Steve. It is rapidly changing.

"A great deal of open-mindedness has to be put into it now," he said.

He has his mind and heart set on a specific dream right now.

"Los Alamos (Labs) is the only place I'd like to work. I don't like large cities."

You can get hardware and technologically advanced parts faster in large cities than you can in Ruidoso. However, the outdoors isn't as accessible.

"I climb mountains and lift weights," Dobbs said. He doesn't ski because of a problem with his left leg. That kept him from joining school athletics, but "I would have been a good wrestler," he believes.

He may not be an active high school athlete, but he's a fan.

"I support the teams. I go out and holler for them," Dobbs said.

Keeping physically fit complements his mental ability. "I want to stay in shape for the bow hunting season," he explains.

It's difficult to envision Dobbs as someone who would hurt people. He is interested in The Assassination Game, however. In T.A.G., players stalk others to "kill" them with water guns.

"Anything having to do with weapons fascinates me," he said. He has a collection at home.

At school, Dobbs is an unabashed RHS booster.

Equipment may be primitive, but the school has great teachers, he said. He wishes he were a little younger,

He does appreciate the arts, however, and said the school had the best band in the state. He plays a little guitar himself, but, "I'm a scientist," he said with conviction.

Because of that intense interest, "I'm the blond sheep" in the family. He isn't a black sheep, but his interests don't closely match those of relatives.

His mother, Evelyn Dobbs, is a secretary at RHS. They have lived in Ruidoso most of his life, although they did spend some years in Farmington.

In a mobile town like Ruidoso, many students recently moved to the area. Some have step-fathers, and that presents problems to guys thinking about dates.

"If I wanted to look up a girl's name in the phone book, it's beyond hope," he said.

He is in touch with plenty of people, however, although many of his friends graduated from high school last year. Some of them will be at NMSU.

Dobbs is dreaming about the time when he will be there, and is suffering from acute senior fever. In fact, he said with a laugh, he's had senior fever since the sixth grade.



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
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

The assessments shall be due and payable at the office of the Village Treasurer within thirty (30) days after the date of the hearing. The assessments become effective without interest and without demand, or all or any part of the assessment may, at the election of the owner, be paid thereafter in twenty substantially equal semiannual installments of principal and interest, with interest in all cases on the unpaid and deferred installments of principal from the date of publication of the ordinance at the rate of twelve percent (12%) per annum, provided that said interest rate may later be reduced by ordinance, but not increased. Penalties shall be due for delinquencies, and installments may be prepaid.

Any objection to the regularity, validity and correctness of the proceedings, of the assessment roll, of each assessment contained therein, and of the amount thereof levied against each tract or parcel of land shall be deemed waived unless presented at the time and in the manner herein specified.

At the time and place so designated for hearing objections, the Village Council shall hear and determine all objections which have been so filed by any party interested, to the regularity of the proceedings in making the assessments, and to the correctness of the assessments, or of the amount levied on any particular tract or parcel of land to be assessed, and the Village Council shall have the power to adjourn the hearing from time to time and, by resolution, shall have the power, in its discretion, to revise, correct, confirm or set aside any assessment and to order that another assessment be made de novo.

After the hearing and at the meeting, the Village Council will consider a resolution passing on the objections heard and considered at the assessment hearing, and modifying and confirming the assessment roll, and will consider an ordinance levying assessments for the District and will consider such other matters as may come before the Council.

Within the time provided by law, any person who has filed an objection may commence an action in District Court to set aside the determination of the Village Council; however, after such time for commencing an action directed by ordinance, no such actions (including the defense of confiscation) shall be perpetually barred.

"Young Love" was presented with guitar accompaniment by Bob and Betty Batte.


"The Rose" was sung by Carol Martin, as she played the piano and was also accompanied by guitar and voice by her husband, Dennis.







Fort Stanton not to change use after all?

The Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School will remain a center for the treatment of the developmentally disabled, according to Robert McNeill, chief of staff of the governor's office.

A proposal to turn the facility into a long-term alcohol abuse rehabilitation center has run aground in the legislative sessions in Santa Fe.

The proposal was not accepted during the regular session of the Legislature. According to State Representative Mickey McGuire, legislation being considered in the special session, if passed, would provide for the center to continue as it was presently being operated.

According to Carolyn Klintworth of the State Health and Environment Department (HED), the fate of Fort Stanton is in the hands of the legislators.

"We don't know what's going to happen. None of us knows what will happen until this is over," she said of the present special legislative session.

Klintworth said HED has been directed to maintain a census of between 116 and 119 clients, and to continue the process of moving out those who are ready and to admit those clients who have need of the services at Fort Stanton.

"In a sense, Fort Stanton has always been in a transition," she said. Klintworth said as far as she knew, the current staff would also be maintained.

"If we do maintain a census of that level, we would assume that the current staff will probably remain," she said.

Klintworth said HED will be waiting for "specific directives" before making any changes.

According to Fort Stanton administrator Mark Delgado, if the legislators approve the budget bill, language in that bill would provide for the operation of the center for the next year as it is currently being operated. If the legislators do not approve the bill, Delgado said, he did not know what would become of the center.



SANTA FE—Is Bruce King our once and future governor?

The description is based on the legend of King Arthur, who supposedly did not die after leaving the Round Table. He was described as being rex quondam et futurus—"he who was once a king and shall be again."

Does that apply to Bruce King and the governorship? It has once already. Will it fit again?

Well, just as there are people reportedly still awaiting Arthur's return, there are certainly those awaiting Bruce's. There are even those who say that latter group includes Bruce himself, along with other members of his family.

But can he pull it off?

Those who expect King to be a candidate for governor again in 1986 base part of their belief on the "relief" factor. That supposes that after the turmoil and disorder of the Anaya years, Bruce and his pattern of quiet, calm governing will be viewed with considerable enthusiasm.

That could well be, but there's more to the story than that.

One thing to watch is that race for Democratic national committee. Bruce was giving people to understand he wanted that post badly. If he does, some would perhaps see it as a cap to his career and not feel that they were required to keep on rewarding him with offices whenever he decides he desires them.

On the other hand, current rumors suggest maybe King is drawing back a little from that race.

That could be because he is too modest to expect the party to give him every honor available. It could also be because he is running into some resistance in this regard. Former Santa Fe mayor Art Trujillo also wants the committeeman's post, and he's working hard to get it. If Bruce felt he was likely to be defeated in this effort, he might hear from him that he has decided not to make that race.

And there's one more consideration. It's what has been happening to the Democratic party nationally.

Voting in primaries and caucuses there might well be read to mean Democrats are fed up with the old, tired faces.

Certainly those coming out for Gary Hart—and both their numbers and their diversity have been something of a surprise—are voting for him almost entirely because he is not old and tired. It can't be his "new ideas" which attract them, because nobody knows what those are. The one claim he can make on the support of his party is a promise of change.

Not to be overly blunt about it, Bruce King can hardly make the same claim.

We have seen him and seen him and seen him. In fact, many New Mexicans may not be able to remember when they were not seeing him.

There are two full years before those who want to be elected governor have to make their irrevocable decision in the matter. During that time, the Democratic party could well have gone off and left those cliches from the days of FDR and LBJ which have served the old warhorses so well.

Bruce King is in the old warhorse category. That is a simple statement of fact.

Question: Will voters buy that any more?

King has time to meditate on that question. How he answers it will affect his future plans—and perhaps ours.

One good word from the second and special session of the 1984 Legislature: No new money had to be appropriated to pay for it.

It turns out somebody had been squirreling away funds left over from past legislative sessions, and that stash was there to be drawn on to pay for this one.

The discovery causes one to wonder whether other such pockets of unused dough may be lying around some where.

One also asks why the funds have apparently earned no interest while they were not being drawn on.

"Unfulfilled housewife and mother applies to law school and is accepted. But university is in big city—three and a half hours away. Husband takes over parenting role during the week and wife comes home on weekend breaks from classes."

Sounds sort of like the script of a made-for-TV movie, doesn't it?

But a local family is living this scenario, and has been since last fall. Sheila Harris is a first-year law student at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque. Her husband, Ron, practices law in Ruidoso.

They have two sons: Brian, 14, and Neil, 10.

It seems Sheila and Ron were having lunch one day and conversation came around to law school.

"I could do that," Sheila remembers saying. She took the admission test and did well.

Thinking, "Why not apply?" she did, and was accepted to UNM.

"And after you've done all that you feel kind of silly not to go," she explained.

And now her schedule keeps her on the go. She leaves Albuquerque early Friday afternoon when she gets out of class. She is at home in Ruidoso until after lunch on Sunday, then she drives back to the Duke City to get ready for a new week.

Sheila lives in a guest house—complete with kitchen—at Ron's parents' home in Albuquerque. The house is conveniently close to the UNM campus.

In her little house, she can study away, with nothing to bother her "except my own mind." What this means, she indicates, is that she is prone to the temptations many students have of doing things other than studying—like reading a magazine or going to the 7-11 for some candy.

Sheila said she liked to take her schoolwork to the library. With people watching, she pointed out, you have to at least appear to be studying.

"Those bad traits you had in college, you'll still have 'em when you go back," she said.

But she obviously is doing some things right. She has hung in so far, and she now feels sure she will make it through the three-year degree program.

Some of her classmates cannot say the same.

"People drop out by leaps and bounds," she said. She called law school "very hard psychologically," and "dehumanizing."

"You feel like you've lost your identity—you really get sucked into it," she said.

What exactly is the pressure, I wondered.

"It's to feel like you stand out, or to do something to excel," she explained. Students sometimes are made to feel really dumb, she went on. You might work very hard on something for a class, only to have the teacher rip it to shreds.

For people without a lot of confidence—and Sheila put herself in that category—"It's devastating."

"It puts you in such a single-minded

world, because of the stress and stuff. You make real good friends real fast or you don't survive."

A doctor in her class said the pressure was greater in law school than in medical school. Sheila pointed out that medicine and other fields involve learning substantive things.

But in law school, "You're retraining your thought processes." The teachers are trying to shake the students of jumping to conclusions.

An attorney must take a set of facts and see 100 possibilities, and find a way to help a client's case. There is no set answer, she said.

Sheila and her peers have discussed this country's adversarial system of law, and where the line of distorting facts to win a case is crossed. But she defends the system.

"If both attorneys are doing their jobs, the facts should come out," she said. Then it is up to the judge and jury to decide. But an attorney must be able to see both sides of a case, Sheila notes, or he or she risks being outmaneuvered.

In an "advocacy" class, students handle a mock lawsuit. Sheila professed an interest in criminal law, engendered by reading "gory" cases. Does she plan to specialize in criminal law?

"No, I just like to read blood and guts."

The plan is for Sheila to join Ron's practice here after she gets her degree.

And what about the effects on Ron and the kids of her being away all week?

Sheila says it has been hardest on Neil; that Brian is at an age where he wants to be independent.

"Both of them have forged new relationships with their dad that have been neat," she said. The boys have also become more responsible and independent, she feels. They do laundry and wash dishes, knowing such things will not get done otherwise.

"They're going to make great husbands some day," said Sheila with a laugh.

She calls home every day, and the boys can call her anytime. Long distance phone bills are proving the most expensive aspect of her law studies.

But Brian and Neil support their mother's endeavor.

"They're proud of me and they want me to keep on," she said.

I asked Sheila whether she thought of herself as an example to other women who might feel unfulfilled, as she did.

"I wouldn't say that because it's so different for everyone," she answered. She does look on her experience as proof that "you can do anything you really want to do."

And she points out that the women in her class do as well as the men in school. She also predicts the women will be as successful when all are practicing attorneys.

But she credits the people close to her for her own success at self-assertion.

"I have an exceptional family—and I am sure you couldn't do it without that."

Finally, we get some news from Washington that President Reagan plans to do something to reduce the deficit.

In fact, Reagan has put the Democrats in a position of looking like the bad guys if they don't go along with his package, while laying the historical blame for the deficit on that party.

One sometimes shakes one's head in wonderment at the political suavity of the president. Of course, some head-shaking in amazement is also done, as when he appoints his buddy Ed Meese attorney general.

But all in all, President Reagan has done a good job for the country, and his action on the deficit does much to alleviate the concern of his supporters that he was going to let it just grow and grow.—TP

Dear Gentlemen:
Because you are now in the process of evaluating the content and legal framework of the Lincoln Historic District and its ordinance, for ourselves and for generations to come, please consider the following:
Lincoln was a cattle town in New Mexico territory during the westward expansion of our country just over a hundred years ago. The famous and the infamous people who are now remembered primarily in history books have all departed. Only their ghosts and legends remain—and their names: Pat Garrett, Lew Wallace, J.J. Dolan, John Tunstall, the McSweens, "Black Jack" Pershing, William Bonney, John Chisum, and the list goes on.

For the most part, the buildings of Lincoln and the surrounding land are just as they were in the late 1800's—unspoiled by commercialism, overpopulation, or land development. It is surely the LAST of the historic western towns which remains with many of its original buildings still standing. Other old western towns which also have historical importance such as Deadwood, Tombstone, and Dodge, to name a few, have all been destroyed to one degree or another by over commercialism, overdevelopment, and greed.

Lincoln, a registered landmark, is regarded one in the latter part of the 20th century, as a national treasure which has been protected by farsighted Americans thus far, with the establishment of the Lincoln Historic District. The historic buildings are listed on the National Register of Historic Properties. So the legal framework which is overseen by the Lincoln Historic Review Board and which will insure Lincoln's conservation, is largely already in place.

Years ago the Lincoln area was not threatened by as much growth as it is today; but as Ruidoso booms and expands, the outlook for the Ruidoso and Bonito valleys is growth. Keeping the Lincoln Historic District intact with its unique buildings and setting protected, will require a strong ordinance as well as vigilance on the part of all Americans who want to preserve and protect this small piece of New Mexico for its citizens and for future generations.

It would seem that in some cases, individuals who have lived in an area the longest have the least perspective. One would think that families whose heritage and roots come from this valley would be the first in line to

protect the resources which have been entrusted to them. It seems that these individuals would support more vigorously the entities which are here to safeguard their historic community and to insure their children and grandchildren of their heritage.

Those who represent the people of Lincoln County have a duty to themselves as well as to their constituents, and posterity, to maintain the historic value of at least a small part of Lincoln County as their forefathers saw it.

The character and historical architectural integrity of a town are not destroyed by one large act, but rather by a series of seemingly small occurrences: a trailer here, a chain-link fence there, a vending machine innocently placed on a porch, a building constructed with little sympathy to its neighbors, an abandoned car, a neon sign, a metal gate. A town is the sum of its parts, and how the parts fit together determine whether the result is a failure or a product of quality.

We Americans who have a deep, abiding love for the footsteps which our forefathers took, hope that those of you who have the authority—our county commissioners—will not let those footprints be blown away on the winds of greed and self-serving attitudes.

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

The motel is owned by Southwest Developers Joint Venture of Ruidoso, and is a franchise of the Super 8 Motels chain of Aberdeen, South



According to Arlaud, the motel was built in Ruidoso because of the opportunity here.




The motel is open for accommodations and is taking reservations now, according to Arlaud. The phone number of Super 8 Motel is 378-8180.

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
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
