## Half of P&Z on the way out?

Mayor George White said Wednesday he planned to follow "the letter of the law" and replace members of the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) who do not live within village limits.

White made the statement in a special meeting of the village council during a discussion of village committees. He said the village had been "neglectful" in allowing non-residents to serve on committees.

Applying the law to P&Z would mean the replacement of chairman Greg Masters and members Ray Bishop and Margaret Gaddy, said Masters. Bishop said member James Paxton planned to move outside of the village in a month.

Some council members questioned such a sweeping change in P&Z. Councilman Ray Dean Carpenter said he would not like to lose continuity on that body, and that if the non-resident members could be kept, they would be.

Village attorney Lee Huckstep was instructed to find out whether the village was bound by law to have only village residents on its committees. Huckstep had noted the residency requirement was based a state attorney

general's ruling made in the 1950s.

The mayor indicated a change in attitude toward his task of appointing people to committees. He said that during the previous council's term, he had been pressured into appointments—that committee heads had said the whole body would quit if he did not make a certain appointment, or that the committee would cease to function.

"I weakened at times and said 'okay, rather than fight, who do you want on the darn thing?'" White said. Afterward, Masters and Bishop expressed concern about having to leave P&Z.

"We all have a lot of pride—and to be booted off the P&Z committee would be a pretty bad deal for us," said Masters. "We've worked pretty darn hard."

Mayor White said his appointments, which he planned to announce next week, would be "competent individuals."

Also Wednesday, the council settled on a new meeting time and a revised format for regular meetings. Meetings will continue to be on the second and last Tuesdays each month. They will begin with a one-hour study session at 5:30 p.m. in the village hall auditorium. The regular meeting will start at 6:30 p.m.

The new time will be in effect for the Tuesday, March 27, regular council meeting.

The study session could be dispensed with if the agenda were not heavy enough to warrant one, councilman John Underwood said. He also said the mayor's presence at the study sessions as a "guiding light" would be appreciated by the council.

The consent agenda, a means to grant blanket approval of all items placed on it, was scrapped. White had stated his dislike of the consent agenda concept.

It was decided the regular agenda would be issued the Friday before council meetings, with a 5 p.m. Thursday deadline for inclusion on the agenda.

In other business Wednesday, the council:

—Agreed to let village administrators have control over out of state travel for village employees. Previously, such travel had to be okayed by the council.

—Approved appointment of councilman Ray Dean Carpenter to serve on the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority.

—Heard announcement of a meeting at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 15, of the council, county commissioners, county manager, village and county

P&Zs, Extraterritorial Zoning Commission and Extraterritorial Zoning Authority to discuss extraterritorial zoning.

—Approved work on a "water profile." As explained by councilman Bill Karn, who requested it, the profile would show historical per unit water use for different zoning designations.


This will help in determining water needs for areas that ask to be annexed, he said. The data could also help in reviewing the utility expansion charge, to see if it should be set up on a sliding scale related to use rather than being on the current per lot basis, Karn noted.

—Heard road superintendent Jack LaMay report that repair of Gavilan Canyon Road would cost an estimated \$600,000 and repair of Carrizo Canyon Road would cost an estimated \$100,000.

—Heard airport manager Tim Morris report that two bids were received on providing aviation fuel to the airport. They will be considered at Tuesday's meeting.

—Approved village clerk Leon Eggleston's request for permission to accept nomination as an officer of the International Association of Municipal Clerks.

—Adjourned into executive session to discuss acquisition of water rights.

Bob Wieland flexed his muscles and walked a few more yards. A trucker heading west dragged on his air horn.

The muscular Wieland headed east from Ruidoso Downs Tuesday. He is passing through on a trip from California to the White House.

His powder blue T-shirt proclaims he is on a Walk for Hunger. The journey of five million steps is designed to call attention to hunger for food and hunger for the Lord.

Wieland first noticed the physical hunger in Vietnam. That's where he lost his legs.

His feat would be amazing if he still had feet, but Wieland is using his hands to work his way along the shoulders of highways.

"What's happening is basically impossible," Wieland said. "The Lord Jesus is giving me the strength. Sometimes it's awesome to me."

He walked a few more yards, then said he had met quite a few people who were spiritually hungry.

Wieland spiritually to talk to Hank. The jogger had come out from Ruidoso Downs and wanted to discuss Jesus. During his trip, Wieland said, he has prayed with 385 people, right on the concrete beside the road.

He has met all sorts of people since he left Knott's Berry Farm. On Tuesday, he had been on the road 18 months and 12 days.

Chui Davalos, from Bent, strolled beside Wieland the other day. She listened and contributed a few words as Bob spoke with Hank.

The jogger accepted a leaflet about the walk and a religious tract, then jogged on down U.S. 70.

Bob Wieland walked a few more yards. A trucker waved as his big rig rounded the bend.

The cross-country haulers are friendly, Wieland said, and ordinary folks are starting to take an interest in his project.

Positive momentum is building, he said, as he gets attention from reporters. Also, for a time, a camera crew from Japan filmed his trip.

During a five-month stretch, Bob was alone, and he had problems. A car engine blew up. A motorcycle was stolen.

When he hit Deming, however, things changed, he said. Friends began to call friends about him.

At an El Paso church, a family offered him their home in Ruidoso for as long as he needed it. The Inn of the Mountain Gods also gave him lodging.

Bob isn't alone any more, either. Marshall Cardiff is traveling with him. He was moving from California

to New Mexico to work for an irrigation company when he saw Wieland. Cardiff is a permanent support crew, driving a pickup back and forth.

He set up a small tarpoline so Wieland could take a break on it. A half-dozen people gathered to eat a late carry-out lunch from Don Victor's.

While the friends ate, Davalos set aside the Army canteen she carried and the pouch of peach-colored leaflets. In them, Wieland describes children rummaging burning dumps for scraps of food.

He also wrote about supporters of his walk.

They include entertainer Pat Boone and pitcher Don Sutton as national co-chairmen. A committee member is actor Richard Anderson, who was in Ruidoso during the U.S. Open Ski Race.

Sutton's role in the Walk is especially appropriate. He pitches for the Milwaukee Brewers, who play in Wieland's home town.

Wieland, who is 38, was working toward a major league pitching career before he was drafted into the Army. He was in Vietnam only two months before he detonated a mortar round.

The shell blew his body in half, but he feels lucky. "A mortar round will blow up a tank," he said. His escape was a miracle, he feels.

The loss of his legs ended his baseball hopes, but hardly halted his involvement in athletics. Wieland started lifting weights, and has done that for 18 years.

After only eight years, he broke a world record in the bantam weight division against full-bodied men. Officials wouldn't sanction the 303-pound bench press. They cited an obscure rule that shoes must be worn during competition.

He ran the weight room at California State University in Los Angeles, and taught the college athletes something about perseverance along with the iron-pumping arms.

His iron-pumping arms made it look easy as he walked a few more yards, without shoes.

Walking on your arms is strenuous, he said. If you don't believe that, cross your legs and walk on your hands across a room to the TV, he said.

Wieland has a loftier goal. He plans to go through Amarillo, Texas; Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; St. Louis, Missouri; Indianapolis, Indiana; Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; and Baltimore, Maryland, to get to Washington.

What will he do when he gets to the White House? "Rest," he cracked. He

### Wieland to address assembly

During his Walk for Hunger, Bob Wieland backtracks to cities to speak at assemblies and churches.

He plans a program in Ruidoso High School at 11 a.m. Monday, March 26. Wieland will speak to students and interested members of the public. His topics will include perseverance and experiences in Vietnam, said Pat Valliant, former Ruidoso school superintendent.

First City National Bank, Ruidoso State Bank and The Bank of Ruidoso are sponsoring the free program, Valliant said.

Wieland also plans an ap-

pearance at services in the Assembly of God April 1. He plans to talk and give a bench press demonstration.

plans to do that in August 1985, or thereabouts.

"I don't look really far forward, and I don't really look back," he said. Then he walked a few more yards.

He hasn't planned his journey so he will be in the northern states during warm weather. "I haven't the slightest idea when I'll get there," he said. "I can't even tell you when I'll get to Roswell."

In terms of time, he's about halfway through his journey. In terms of distance, he logged a third of the steps, or about 919 miles, by Monday. He figures his step stretches a yard, and that he will take five million of them. He averages a few miles a day, and goes as much as 8.45 miles.

Those figures don't daunt him. "I give it everything I have every day." He is tired physically. Not mentally, he notes, but despite his rigorous training, his muscles are tired.

He got into shape for the trip by walking the mountain slopes and shining beaches of Southern California.

Wieland walked a few more yards. He does that, day in and day out, 27 days a month. Three days a month, he goes back to California to be with his wife, Jackie, and their four dogs.

Why doesn't he just stay home? He was sleeping, he said, when Jesus called him. "That still, small voice spoke to my heart."

## Ruidoso Downs names commission heads

Mayor J. C. Day named commission heads during the first meeting of the new Ruidoso Downs board of trustees Monday.

A sense of fresh starts filled the air like the aroma of brewed coffee. "It's going to be a pleasure to work together," Day said.

Wilma Webb, Downs secretary-treasurer, said, "It appears this village is doing well financially. This year we're doing great."

Trustee Conrad Buchanan asked

questions about the sewer account and other bank accounts the village maintains. Webb replied that the number has been slashed in recent years.

Buchanan said, "We're more financially solvent than I had anticipated." The trustees then voted unanimously to accept Day's nomination of long-time colleague Jake Harris as mayor pro tem. Harris will substitute for Day if necessary.

LeVerne Cole will continue as Parks and Recreation Commission head. Buchanan will be Street Commissioner and part of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission.

Harris will chair the Water and Sewers Commission. Jackie Branum will head the Sanitation Commission.

After the unanimous votes for those posts, Day said, "I feel we've made the turning point in Ruidoso Downs. I believe we're going to see some nice things."

The Planning and Zoning Commission has two vacancies for citizen members. Trustees discussed naming Scott Tillman for one slot, or contacting other unsuccessful candidates in the March 6 election. However, they took no definite action.

In other action, the trustees official-

ly canvassed the voting returns. About half of voters registered in the Downs cast ballots.

They also passed unanimously an Open Meetings Law notice. Public panels regularly vote to give advance notice on regular and special meetings to reporters and citizens.

The Downs gives at least three days notice for regular meetings and 48 hours notice for special sessions. An emergency session may be called with less notice.

The next regular trustees meeting is scheduled at 7 p.m. March 26 in the village hall.



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

**P&Z meeting covers full spectrum**

Business of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Monday included everything from denial of an annexation petition to discussion of downtown parking.

A request from Cree Joint Venture to rezone six lots in Golf Course Estates from R-1 (single-family residential) to R-2 (multi-family residential) was denied by the commission.

Attorney Don Dutton, representing Juniper Development, explained that developers wanted to put a 12-unit condominium project at the site. He pointed out that restrictive covenants for Cree Meadows allowed for such use on contiguous lots.

In answer to a question from attorney Ron Harris, representing property owners opposed to the rezoning, Dutton said no interest had been shown in developing the land under R-1 zoning, thus the request.

Harris said homeowners had counted on the R-1 zoning to protect them from the possibility of condos being built. He added that increased marketability of the lots was not a valid reason for rezoning.

It was pointed out that a 13-acre site at Cree Meadows was already zoned R-2. P&Z member Margaret Gaddy

cited that fact in her motion to deny the request, which was seconded by Bill Carrigan.

The motion passed by a 4-1 margin, with Gaddy, Carrigan, Martin Rose and Tom Kelham voting "aye" and James Paxton voting "nay." Ray Bishop abstained.

Paxton said people needed to realize that at some point there would be density in the subdivision, and that he did not see much difference in that taking the form of condos rather than houses. He said the situation applied in other parts of town as well.

P&Z took no action—other than to form a study committee—on a request from Ruidoso Land Company to annex 102.576 acres on both sides of Alpine Village Road adjacent to Forest Heights. The developer, Keith Mills, is seeking R-3 (mobile homes) and C (commercial) zoning for the area.

Plans call for dividing the R-3 area into small mobile home lots, similar to those in Cherokee Mobile Village. Recreational vehicles would be accommodated on part of the development.

The committee—made up of Gaddy, Paxton, P&Z chairman Greg Masters, Rose and Kelham—was to study the request and make a report at the next regular meeting. There were several comments on the desirability to the village of such a

project, and it was noted that the developer had made water rights available for purchase by the village.

Signs were another topic of Monday's meeting. Ken Taft of Taco Villa asked about a proposed sign for that business. The restaurant plans to erect a 52.5-square foot sign.

Maximum sign size is 32 square feet under the existing sign ordinance. The proposed new ordinance, however, would allow Taco Villa a 52-square foot sign, based on the size of the building front.

P&Z referred Taft to the Architectural Plans Review Committee so that body could grant him a variance based on the proposed new ordinance.

Don King, who had requested a sign for his package store, was referred to the owner of the building where he leased space. Owners of buildings that house more than one business can allocate the building's allowable sign footage among tenants.

In other business, P&Z:

- Moved a hearing on sign appeals from Ruidoso Rent All, T. L. Wilson Sporting Goods and the Shell service station to May 7.
- Approved rezoning of 18 lots in Cree Meadows Country Club Subdivision from C to C-1, as part of the ongoing process of stipulating "light commercial" use for commercial property in the village.
- Approved a front lot line variance of 8 feet, 10 inches for Lot 12, Block 1,

- Pinecliff Unit 2, for Roger Sowder.
- Approved a side lot line variance of 3 feet for Lot 4, Block 24, Town and Country North Unit 2, for Darlene Hart, pending an attempt to get approval of neighboring property owner.
- Approved rear lot line variance of 15 feet for Lot 23, Airport West Third Addition, for Caesar Garcia, pending written approval of neighboring property owner.
- Approved front lot line variance of 10 feet for Lot 9, Block H, White Fir for Brad Johnson, pending written approval of neighboring property owner.
- Approved replat of lots 7 and 7A, Block 8, Forest Heights, for Forest Heights Professional Center.
- Discussed a request for information on parking requirements in commercial district for lots 22, 23, 24, Block J, Ruidoso Springs, for Don Parsons.

Masters noted that P&Z has encouraged high-density retail development in the downtown area. He said discussions with village officials had indicated the feasibility of special assessment districts or bond issues to finance construction of off-street parking there.

At Paxton's recommendation, a committee of Kelham, Bishop, Rose and Masters was formed to study the parking situation.

**Chamber in suits over bill**

The recent Pro-Ski International U.S. Open ski race at Eagle Creek Ski Area may have been left powerless if not for the efforts of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, but now those actions by the Chamber have resulted in a legal battle.

The Chamber agreed, according to claims contained in lawsuits filed this week in District Court, to pay an outstanding \$7,358 electric bill owed to the Otero County Electric Cooperative by Eagle Creek Ski Area, when that company threatened to cut off power to the ski area the day before the ski race was to start (February 29).

That agreement stated that the Chamber had until March 9 to pay the

bill, according to the claim. The Chamber refused to pay the bill, claiming the electric company's threat was unfair, considering "the pressure to go ahead with the race. The electric company countersued, claiming the Chamber made a willing misrepresentation, and asks for \$10,000 in punitive damages, in addition to the amount of the electric bill.

Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth offered no comment on the situation, after attending a regular executive session of the Chamber Board of Directors, held this morning.

Jungbluth also said the board decided at the meeting to cancel the Jeep party, which was scheduled for Sunday, March 25. Jungbluth said a lack of participation was the reason board members gave for the move.

**Wayne Richardson from 'The Land Down Under'**

High school exchange student Wayne Richardson calls his visit to Ruidoso a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

Rotary International is sponsoring his year in this country. Richardson traveled from New South Wales, Australia, to New Mexico.

His parents have a sheep and wheat spread outside the town of Trangle, population 1,000. Richardson is 17 and the oldest child in his family, with three brothers and two sisters.

Unlike Ruidoso, his home is flat, but it does have lots of trees. Back there, it doesn't get as cold as it does here.

"It was well into the hundreds when I left." The seasons in the Southern Hemisphere are reversed from the ones here. It was hot in January at his home, but cold in Ruidoso.

He is staying in his American home with George and Barbara Smith and their 16-year-old sons, Mike and Jim.

In recent years, Richardson attended a boarding school in Forbes. That's where he heard about the Rotary exchange program.

It's not a one-for-one exchange. A student from El Paso is visiting Richardson's home district.

Competition to get into the exchange program was intense. Judges picked by his sponsor club, Forbes, conducted interviews of candidates and

listened to their speeches.

"I shook that weekend," he said of the wait for the decision. Five days later he learned he had been selected, but didn't learn his country until later.

"It felt weird coming into a new country," he said. Richardson had never been outside of Australia.

He has already visited Mexico, and plans a Rotary trip around the United States this July.

At Ruidoso High School, he runs the 3,000-meter event. He also ran track in Australia.

Sports are handled differently in the United States and in Australia, he said. There, they are played outside school, and athletes must buy their own equipment. Few have much time for it. They're doing homework.

Right now, he isn't getting any credit from his Australian school for his studies here, he said. His home school is just too far ahead of the Americans.

Australian classes meet 200 days a year, instead of the 180 scheduled in America. Besides, students' dedication to schoolwork isn't as high here, he thinks.

"In Australia, the work seems much harder," he said. Richardson gets three hours of homework a night there, he said.

Here, Richardson is studying algebra, English, computing, United States history and physical education.

He would like to become a PE teacher, after he returns to Australia.

**Capitan council holds organizational meeting**

The Capitan village council held an organizational meeting Monday night at the village hall building in Capitan. During the meeting, newly elected trustees Kelly Beavers and Norman Renfro and municipal judge Johnnie Johnson were sworn into office by village clerk Virginia Spall.

Also during the meeting, the trustees heard a report from Martha Theidt on the progress of Smokey Bear Day.

She requested that the village collaborate with the Capitan Chamber of Commerce in building a joint float for the Smokey Bear parade.

"I feel that we have to get the village in on this," she said of the upcoming celebration.

Council member Benny Coker said the council did want to be a part of the event, and would help however they could.

"I feel like we want to get involved in it," he said of the parade. "Floats are expensive, and coordinating the two will be a good idea."

Theidt also reported that judges for the parade would be chosen from outside Capitan, to ensure impartiality in their decisions.

Theidt said State Senator Charlie Lee had been chosen as Grand Marshal for the parade. She said he would be accompanied in the parade by long-time Smokey Bear supporter Dorothy Guck.

Also, Theidt said she had contacted U.S. Senator Pete Domenici and U.S. Representative Joe Skeen, who indicated they would be at the parade if at all possible. Theidt said planning for the event was proceeding smoothly.

"I think it's working out real well," she said. "There's a lot of people who are going to realize that Smokey Bear didn't come out of Walt Disney studios."

**Courses to be offered here**

New Mexico State University professors will offer graduate-level courses again this summer at White Mountain Middle School.

Classes include Foundations of Curriculum, taught by Jeanette Marti; Classroom Learning, taught by Richard DeBlasie; and School Finance, taught by Loyd Cooper.

Each class carries three credit hours toward teacher recertification and costs \$100. At least 18 people must sign up for a class, or it will not be conducted.

The curriculum course, Educ 535, is scheduled July 4-8 from 1 to 4 p.m., July 11-15 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., and July 18-22 from 1-4 p.m.

The classroom learning course, a counseling and educational psychology offering, is slated on two weekends and during two weeks.

It is planned June 26 from 4-7 p.m.; June 26 from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4 p.m.; July 1 from 4-7 p.m.; July 2

from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4 p.m.; and July 4-8 and 18-22 from 9 a.m. to noon.

The school finance course, EMD 576, will be offered from 8:15 a.m. to noon Monday to Thursday July 2 to 20.

For more information about any of the courses, call Sandy Gladden at 257-7324 or 378-4347.

The courses are open to people from Ruidoso and surrounding cities, including Tularosa, Carrizozo and Honda. The field-based master's program is designed to serve people who cannot move to a campus in the summer.

Gladden said fall undergraduate classes for people who cannot move to campus are also being considered.

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# Readers rate news coverage for interest, quality, content

From a trickle to a flood to a trickle, the surveys kept coming in. The Ruidoso News Redesign Committee, which formulated and distributed a reader survey to help evaluate content of the newspaper, was surprised and pleased by the response.

About 700 surveys were distributed—most to mail subscribers chosen at random. The number of surveys sent to each geographic area was proportional to the number of mail subscribers from that area. Just over 30 percent of the returned surveys were from within Lincoln County. The rest were from elsewhere in New Mexico and from Texas and other states.

Of the total, 249 (over 35 percent) were returned. The number of returned surveys represents about five percent of the total circulation of the News.

It is thought that a sampling of this size allows conclusions to be drawn which are applicable to the entire readership.

The two-page survey form allowed readers to express their degree of interest in and rate the quality of 33 areas. A "1" indicated "very interesting" and "good coverage;" a "2" indicated "fairly interesting" and "fair coverage;" a "3" indicated "not interesting" and "poor coverage."

Readers were also invited to indicate which of 13 other areas they would like to see receive more coverage.

Readers gave "Photos" the highest interest rating and the highest quality rating. However, relatively few people graded photos, preferring instead to use the "comments" space or to circle one of the comments we provided (more, less, larger, smaller).

Of those, the greatest number of respondents wanted more photos. Many—and this especially applied to out of town readers—indicated they would like more pictures of the "scenic" variety.

Several people noted occasional problems of clarity or lightness in photos. It is an ongoing effort to get the best possible photo reproduction in The News.

The survey showed just how important a part of the newspaper photos are. While each of the four reporters at The News is actually a reporter/photographer, the first half of that job description tends to take precedence.

Perhaps in the future, reporters will go out more often with just a camera, leaving their notebooks behind.

The second-highest interest rating went to "Letters to the editor." This was not unexpected—we knew they were very well read. The high quality rating was a bit of a surprise.

All of our correspondents may pat themselves on the back. Lest it go to

their heads, we also had comments like "too much from so-and-so" and "Get awfully tired of Mr. such-and-such."

What the survey confirms is that if you want to say something in the newspaper and you want it to be heard, a letter to the editor is probably the best way.

As expected, "Ruidoso government and services" rated high for interest. We were glad to note that its quality rating was even better.

A few charges of "bias," along with "editorializing" and "opinionated" writing seemed to be aimed at our coverage of local government, however.

"Less opinion and more verified facts would be more professional," wrote one reader. "Very opinionated," said another.

A comment from one reader might shed light on some of the comments from others.

"I don't feel it necessary to report the childish bickering that seems to occur in the city meetings," wrote a McAllen, Texas, subscriber.

We have reported it, however, and that might have influenced someone in Ruidoso to claim that "obvious bias shows all too often in news stories."

The newspaper was also accused, from Alto, of glossing over or ignoring news that was detrimental to the tourist trade.

The Ruidoso News is an entertainment medium in itself to a Lovington reader—"I pass it on to a friend who loves reading about how no one can do anything up there without fighting and namecalling. Great entertainment."

As far as covering the Village of Ruidoso, the survey reminds us that we are The Ruidoso News and shouldn't forget it. Regarding the charges of bias, the editorial department would agree with the local reader who wrote, "For the most part I feel you try to be fair to all parties concerned."

Our readers attached a fairly high importance to county news. Some survey respondents asked for more coverage of the Hondo Valley, and someone thought we should range as far as Cloudcroft.

Manpower limitations prevent us from covering outlying areas—even Ruidoso Downs—as thoroughly as we would like to. But we are keeping an eye on growth throughout Lincoln County as it affects our role as the county's largest newspaper.

The possibility of establishing a county bureau—possibly a person based in Capitan—has been discussed. As one reader noted, "all areas (of the county) use and support Ruidoso and therefore are an important part."

Under the heading of "Feature stories," readers indicated a lot of interest in news features and human interest features. Dannie Storm's columns, "The Dreamer" and "The Silver Lining," drew a slightly lower interest rating but a higher quality

"I'm always happy after reading about the apples, wildflowers and weather in Mr. Storm's columns," wrote an Austin, Texas, reader—one of many who praised the columnist.

Several survey respondents suggested that a "Best of Dan Storm" collection be published in book form. How about it, Dannie?

Looking past the relatively low interest ratings given to horse racing coverage, we noted comments from many readers that racing news is why they subscribe.

"Why waste space on Sunland Park?" asked one reader. "Too much coverage on Sunland Park," said another. "Who cares about it—130 miles away."

Two questions arise. What else might we put in the space taken by Sunland that would attract the readership that year-round racing coverage does? Also, who would fill it, as the staff is very busy already?

It should be pointed out that we are still in the process of evaluating the survey results and deciding what changes to implement. It was pleasing to note that people seem to like the various special editions.

Staff-produced opinion page features rated higher in interest and quality than our two syndicated items—Fred McCaffrey's "Inside The Capitol" and Dick Wright's cartoon.

That is not to say that our work did not come in for a good deal of panning.

"Local columns too 'sophomoric,'" wrote a San Antonio, Texas, reader. "Not really interested in your per-

read. Comments about advertising were generally favorable, but, speaking of bias, we did discover some anti-Realtor feeling among readers.

"Too damn much (advertising)," wrote a Ruidoso respondent. "Why don't you call the paper 'The Realtors' Digest?'"

"Real estate owns you and the community," wrote our Lovington critic. "A lot of people had nice things to say, however."

"I really enjoy real estate ads—especially those with photos," said a Lubbock, Texas, subscriber. "Well done, usually attractive," was a Ruidoso reader's comment.

Several people made suggestions regarding organization of the advertising—such as listing real estate by areas. These have been passed along to the advertising department.

One reader who is also an advertiser was very enthusiastic about the results he gets.

"Very profitable. As a small businessman, my most affordable, successful and effective advertisement."

Readers gave The Ruidoso News good marks for the most part in the categories of appearance and trustworthiness. Further modifications of the newspaper's appearance can be expected in the coming weeks as the redesign project—of which the survey was a part—continues.

This broad summary of the survey results obviously could not include all of the observations made by the 249 persons who responded. Their comments, however, have been taken under consideration, and many will affect the newspaper's content, organization and appearance.

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

## Savings Bank completes remodeling



The \$600,000-plus remodeling of the Ruidoso branch of the First Federal Savings Bank of New Mexico has been completed, according to branch manager Dick Parsons.

The bank, located at 398 Sudderth Drive, will celebrate by having a grand opening ceremony from noon to 6 p.m. Sunday, March 25, which is the 12th anniversary of its first opening in Ruidoso. At the grand opening, prizes such as a trip to Las Vegas and savings accounts from \$10 to \$100 will be given away.

Parsons said the remodeling doubled the floor space of the facilities, and added more drive-up banking lanes. Newly installed at the bank are 306 safety deposit boxes, ranging in size from three- by five-inch boxes to 16- by 32-inch lockers. The bank added a night depository and an updated security system. In addition, the bank has begun a consumer lending program.

Parsons also said the bank has acquired additional parking facilities. The public is invited to attend the grand opening ceremonies.



## Fittz flies high musically

James Fittz sees similarities between being a crack military pilot and being an expert musician. He has been both.

Now he is a cellist at New Mexico State University (NMSU). Flying and playing are "really quite compatible," he said. Both musicians and pilots must concentrate completely, he explained.

If orchestra members let their minds wander, they get into trouble quickly, he said. Fittz isn't in danger of that.

Enthusiasm floods his face when he talks about his chamber music, what he calls an intimate art. He is planning concerts for Ruidoso students next month, and is also working on the Ruidoso Summer String Workshop at La Junta Guest Ranch on July 13 to 26.

Fittz is one of five workshop faculty members. He will be chamber music director and teach cello and double bass. Richard Dunn will be administrative director. Rosemary Silverstein and Richard Strawn will teach violin. Guillermo Quezada will teach viola. Most are associated with NMSU.

The workshops are aimed at high school and college participants. Last year, 28 participated. They came from Florida, Oklahoma and other states, but most were New Mexicans.

The musicians play in chamber groups and a string orchestra, using music by composers including Dvorak, Brahms, Beethoven and Mozart.

A typical day involves breakfast, three hours of rehearsal, a lunch break, another two to three hours of rehearsal, individual practice, coaching and supper.

Three evenings a week, they will add public concerts at Ruidoso First Christian Church to that busy schedule.

The workshops offer "music on a very high level," he said in an understatement.

Fittz has been associated with the workshops since he joined the NMSU faculty. He backed the workshop move from Cloudercroft.

"Ruidoso seemed to me to be a community that would support this kind of thing," he said. "I'd like to see another Aspen in Ruidoso." That Colorado ski center turns to cultural pursuits each summer.

Fittz wants to see the workshop prosper in this area. "Because we're publicly funded, NMSU has an obligation to serve southern New Mexico," he said.

The workshop aims to attract students because musicians should

start young, he said. Fittz is an example. "I started formal music studies when I was five."

His parents were both traveling musicians, until his father joined the military during World War II. James spent many years in Japan and won an international music competition in Tokyo.

Fittz will present a free concert with pianist Melba Halamiczek at 8 p.m. Saturday, March 24 in Ruidoso First Christian Church.

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
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**The Silver Lining**

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
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

## Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE**—A fact which must be faced: readers of this publication, and of this column, must be sick unto death of hearing about the New Mexico State Legislature.

Unfortunately, this writer's contract with his papers does not allow for his saying, "Hey, let's take the day off."

Neither is he empowered to write: "Dear Editor, Let's leave this space blank today in the interests of saving the folks' eyesight."

Likewise, Associated Press must go on filing its column-filling stories. United Press International must tell your local radio station what is transpiring here.

So you, dear friend, are sated, filled and overfilled, at capacity. "No more! No more!" you are crying. "Let us hear no more!"

There was a lot of false piety going around during Act 2 of New Mexico Legislature 1984.

That group of conservatives who grasped control of the Senate, and hence of the whole process of governing, wanted very much to be perceived as the caped crusaders who had come to save us all from the demon tax increase.

There was some truth to that, but it was hardly the whole story.

They would have been more convincing in the part of St. Martin sharing his cloak with the beggar if there were not also these other elements:

—Too evident enjoyment of the power to stick it to their brother and sister lawmakers, some of whom they had obviously envied for years; and

—Too much intoxication with their own sense of power, which left them looking no more attractive than those who were too long on another form of drunk.

What was most disillusioning about them was their arrogant logrolling—the worst this capital has seen in many a year.

To get where they got, and to stay there, they were obviously willing to give away the old homelace if

necessary. They attempted to pass out goodies to those legislators whose votes were absolutely necessary to make up their majority to an extent which was seriously disturbing.

A little give-and-take is a normal part of government, and acceptable to all citizens.

Over done, it is embarrassing.

And we got too much of this time. Those guiding the coalition and those who knew they were needed to make up its numbers put in for so many projects, requiring so many dollars, that they ought to be ashamed of themselves.

A fair distribution of capitol to all parts of the state, structured somehow to meet each area's various needs, is what a legislative session should aim at.

Instead, this session blatantly went to work rewarding naked power—and it was not pretty to watch.

As an antidote to the words above, this quote:

"There is a genius in the constitutional balance of powers that, for all its frustrations, is the best safeguard against the abuse of power."

It comes from David Broder, the political columnist all the rest of us should model ourselves on.

He has been observing government with the keenest of eyes for many years, and knows what he is talking about.

This year in New Mexico we have watched those balanced powers tug at one another, push and shove, without shame or pity. During the first session, Legislature and Governor were at one another's throats. During the second, the Governor prudently retired; that left House and Senate to fall upon another in a manner which can only be described as extremely ill-tempered.

We must keep telling ourselves, "This is just the balance of powers working itself out. Bad as it is, it is more desirable than its alternative."

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## Editorial

The difference between rights of the individual and rights of the community as a whole can sometimes be difficult to ascertain.

Such is certainly the case in nearby Lincoln. At the root of the recent controversy between supporters and detractors of the Lincoln Historical Ordinance in Lincoln is the argument between those who believe their personal property rights are at stake, and those who call for the preservation of a slice of history for the sake of the many.

Input from upcoming public hearings, to be held in Lincoln, and the final recommendations of the Lincoln Historical Revision Committee, whose members are rewriting the former historical ordinance, will be presented to the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners for final approval or disapproval.

The commissioners have vowed to hear both sides of the argument before coming to a decision. Many letters and comments have been received by the Revision Committee from concerned people who live outside Lincoln, expressing beliefs on both sides of the issue.

But shouldn't it be the right of the people who live in Lincoln, alone, to make the choice?

It will be a difficult decision, indeed, when the commissioners draw the line between the rights of the individual and rights of the community. Let's hope that decision honors the wishes of the majority of the residents in Lincoln.—DP

## Reporter's Round

What are the most popular types of vehicles being driven in Ruidoso today? It's something I'm sure not many people pause to think about every day.

But this reporter decided to try to shed some light on this, the issue that most concerns the service station attendants and drive-up bank tellers of Ruidoso.

At great expense of time and effort, The Ruidoso News conducted an extensive survey to scientifically pinpoint which type of car is driven most by Ruidosoans. Countless minutes were spent watching traffic speeding along Sudderth and Mechem drives, great physical strain was endured steering back and forth through the parking lots of lower Lincoln County, and pencil after pencil was sharpened away to nothingness tallying the results, all in the name of finding out which are the most popular autos in town.

Due to the multitude of different models, years and styles of vehicles running the streets of Ruidoso, determination of how to count the cars proved difficult. Our panel of professional car-counters, however, managed to come up with a plan of action. The cars were counted two ways: by single model, regardless of year manufactured, (such as "Studebaker Larks") and grouped together, with cars of same make, and similar model and year comprising a team (such as "Studebakers built in the last ten years").

In addition, we divided up the results into three geographical areas. Those areas were, real estate office parking lots, the Ruidoso High School parking lot, and a general sampling from the parking lots of the two Safeways, Gibson's, the Ruidoso Honda Valley Hospital and the length of Paradise Canyon Road.

Well, the winners were ...

In the single model, general category, our spotters saw 24 Subaru wagons roaming the highways and byways of Ruidoso. Those two-dozen foreigners were closely followed by every description of Ford truck imaginable. We counted 23 of the pickups, from early sixties survivors to mammoth, showroom-clean, brand-spanking-new four-wheelers.

The third-place winners were the ever-present Jeep Wagoneers, with 20 being spotted around town. Nineteen Chevrolet trucks, of nearly the diver-

sity of the Ford pickups, were also seen. A big favorite at the parking lot of the "old" Safeway were AMC Eagle wagons. Four of them waited patiently in that parking lot for the coming bags of groceries.

Less numerous means of transportation were: motorcycles, of which three were seen (and one of those was parked, with a "For Sale" sign attached); International pickup trucks and Ford Falcon station wagons, of which one of each was viewed lumbering along in traffic. No Studebakers of any kind were discovered in this survey.

In the general area, "same make" category, the big winner was again the team of Subaru. A total of 37 four-wheel-drive wagons, sedans and pickups were eyeballed, beating the team of AMC-Jeep four-wheel drive Wagoneers, CJ-5's and Eagle wagons by four vehicles. The 33-member AMC-Jeep team was followed by a team of 29 Chevrolet trucks and Blazers. A special mention should go to the new downsized versions of the Chevrolet Blazer as one of the most popular new styles of vehicle in Ruidoso. We saw six of them.

In the parking lots of the real estate offices around town, the champ was the Jeep Wagoneer, with eight counted, followed by six Subaru wagons, five Datsun "Z" cars, four Lincoln Continentals, two Buick Wildcats and a Cadillac, among other single models. At the high school parking lot, Chevy trucks and Subaru wagons tied for first at six apiece. Second place went to the four Toyota pickup trucks seen there. That parking lot also won the "most different kinds of cars in one parking lot" classification, with a large percentage of the cars in the lot being one-of-a-kinders.

The parking lot of the new Safeway was the site of a fierce head-to-head battle between Jeep Wagoneers and Subaru wagons, with equal numbers of the four-wheelers present there.

The award for the most unusual vehicle in Ruidoso would have to go to Leonard Sedillo, owner of a roadable 1949 or 1951 Army half-track. Sedillo said he used the half-track on hunting expeditions. On the open road, he said, it is capable of 45 miles per hour.

So now you know, all you auto-watchers, what are the most popular vehicles in Ruidoso.

**DEAR EDITOR:**  
I am a home builder and proud to be a member of an industry that is leading the nation's economy along the road to recovery following the most devastating recession since World War II.

For the good of the national economy, the nation's home builders believe the time has come for a bipartisan effort to reduce deficits.


1984 is an election year and if our current leadership won't defuse the deficit time bomb, maybe it's time we looked for leadership that is willing to face up to the problem.

**Walking to Washington with Walter for worship and disabled veterans**

"Hey, I've always admired the pioneer women," said Jennifer Roy. Roy and her wagon-pulling donkey, Walter, passed through Ruidoso Monday and Tuesday, on their way to Washington, D.C., from California.

Roy is traveling the distance for two causes, she said. The first cause is support of President Ronald Reagan's stand on the importance of religion to this country and the ability of Americans to have freedom of choice of worship.

"Our country was founded on prayer," Roy said. She said the president's decision to declare 1983 as the Year of the Bible helped prompt her walk. "I think the country was getting pretty far from where it started from."

Roy said her other cause for walk-

ing was to raise funds for the Disabled American Veterans (DAV). She said she ran a home for disabled veterans in California, but was unable to provide them with full-time facilities. The 58-year-old grandmother said she hoped her walk would help to raise concern and support for veterans across the country.

"If it takes till I'm eighty, I'm still going to try to get those guys a place," she said of the veterans.

Roy said she was receiving some funding for the home from local DAV and American Legion chapters, and from private sources. She said she was sponsoring herself in the walk. According to Roy, she also has the support of her children in her work with the Disabled American Veterans.

"My kids are all involved in it now," she said. Roy said she was progressing about

20 miles a day. She started from her home near Mount Whitney, California, on November 8, and expects to reach Washington, D.C., in mid-summer. She said she was enjoying her time traveling through New Mexico, and that she had had nothing but good encounters with people during her journey.

"People couldn't be nicer," she said. Roy said at nights she either camped out in her fold-out wagon, or accepted one of the many offers from local people for lodging in the towns she passed through. She said she was not trying to hurry to her goal.

"I don't put any pressure on myself, and I try to be safe," she said. "If something happens, at least I'm doing something worthwhile."

Roy said she would write a book about her adventures when she completed her trip.

## Ruidoso-Sunland in Breeders' Cup

Five stakes races at Sunland Park and another five at Ruidoso Downs are part of the new Breeders' Cup Premium Award program which covers more than 400 stakes races in North America and will distribute a staggering total of \$20 million.

The program debuted in New Mexico with the \$12,500 Sunland Park Derby (March 18), which offered a Breeders' Cup award of \$5,000.

"The Breeders' Cup program has tremendous potential for the continued growth of thoroughbred racing in New Mexico, since it offers such an impressive financial incentive," commented H. Rick Henson, general manager of Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs.

The \$20 million fund has been amassed from nomination fees from owners of stallions and by nomination fees from owners of offspring of those stallions. Nearly 1,100 stallions, and approximately 18,000 of their progeny, have already been nominated to the program.

An eligible horse in a Breeders' Cup race will share in the awards program if he finishes first, second or third.

Here are the other races on the Sunland Park stakes list, with the amount of the Breeders' Cup award (which, of course, is in addition to the gross purse): City of El Paso Handicap, \$5,000; El Paso Times Handicap, \$5,000; Sunland Park Handicap, (which comes up on May 6), \$5,000; Texas Derby, \$5,000.

The upcoming Ruidoso stakes with Breeders' Cup awards: Memorial Day Handicap, (Monday, May 28), \$5,000 Governor's Handicap (Sunday, July 1), \$5,000; First Lady Handicap (Sunday, July 8), \$5,000; Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby (Sunday, August 12), \$5,000; Ruidoso Mile (Saturday, September 2), \$8,000.

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# Sunland Park Hoofbeats

A TOTAL OF 24 TWO-YEAR-OLDS had their connections make the latest payment to remain eligible to the Riley Allison Futurity, Sunland Park's featured presentation. The Riley Allison, named in honor of the late founder and driving force behind the construction of Sunland Park, is one of the nation's premier races for two-year-old thoroughbreds. It is one of the nation's earliest major events for youngsters and is regarded as perhaps the top Southwestern futurity by area horsemen. It will be contested over five furlongs on Sunland Park's closing day, Sunday, May 13. The total amount on deposit is \$210,325, which already makes it one of the richest Riley Allison Futurities since the race began in 1964. The top purse was \$331,404 in 1982 while the 1983 event was worth \$323,705. The next payment of \$750 is due at the time of entries for the trial races on Tuesday, April 24. The trials are set for Friday, April 27. Leading the list of early nominees is Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas; and Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Klein, who each have five youngsters eligible. Those with four still eligible include V.J. Callaway of Hobbs; Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas; Mrs. Mollie Kelly and Chuck Mattox of El Paso; Cleber and Patricia Massey of Abilene, Texas; Gail and Peggy Odom and Trinity River Thoroughbreds. Stanley Beard, who won last year's Riley Allison Futurity with the outstanding Tri Jet colt, Triple Sec, has nominated three. Horses can still be supplemented at time of entry into the trials for a payment of \$5,000. Some of the horses who have captured Riley Allison Futurities and gone on to become nationally recognized runners included Missie Pit (1966); Italian Ruler (1971); Bold Liz (1972); Thirty One Jewels (1973); and Bold Ego, who won the Riley Allison in 1960 and then won the Grade I Arkansas Derby in 1981 at Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Arkansas. He also ran second in the Preakness Stakes at Pimlico, the second jewel of the thoroughbred Triple Crown, and went on to become perhaps the greatest New Mexico-based runner.

99 sophomores were eligible after the last payment deadline. Owners must now pay \$500 to enter their horses for the trials or they can be supplemented into the trials at a cost of \$5,000. The total amount on deposit prior to entry day was \$61,500. Last season's West Texas Derby, won by Realeasy Chick, was worth \$94,604. The race is scheduled to be contested at 400 yards on Sunday, April 8.

DALE CORDOVA MADE a successful return to Sunland Park on Saturday after the past few weekends riding at Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Arkansas. The talented young rider piloted three winners on Saturday's program. He started with Loot The Ship (\$23.60) for trainer Michael G. Felter in the ninth, then won the tenth on Mark Ten (\$11.20) for trainer Frank Cappellucci and took the twelfth as a substitute rider on Bold Brilliance (\$80.80) for trainer John L. Danley.

TRAINER J. MICHAEL WELCH of Ruidoso won two races on Saturday's program. He took the second with Kids Blue Fire (\$36.20), a horse he owns, and then captured the fourth with Plenty Impressive (\$9.20), who is owned by Jan Boultinghouse of San Saba, Texas. O.A. Martinez Jr. was aboard both winners.

TINY JILTER POSTED his third straight victory when he scotched to a half-length victory in Sunday's fifth race at 400 yards. The five-year-old Tiny's Gay horse started his string with a one and one-quarter length decision against \$3,200 claimers at 440 yards on February 15, then dead-heated for a win with Little Bar Bet in a 350-yard dash for \$4,000 claimers on February 25. Sunday's effort was against nine three-year-old and older quarter horses running for a \$4,000 claiming tag. Wayne Buehrer has been aboard for all three victories. Janice Stogner of Albuquerque had Tiny Jilter for his three wins as trainer Ben Torres claimed him from Sunday's race for Homer Garza. As a 4-1 risk, Tiny Jilter returned \$10 to win on Sunday.

RHOMER RED WAS CLAIMED from Saturday's 10th race for \$12,500, which tied for the highest priced claimer this season. The four-year-old Out Of The East colt was taken by trainer Clifford C. Lambert Sr. for owner Troy A. McCarty after running sixth in the six and one-half furlong chase. Robert L. Dolman was the trainer for owner William A. Hudson of Artesia, New Mexico. King Vagabond was also claimed for \$12,500 on January 8.

JOCKEY PAT VALENZUELA and his wife, Gina, were cited in the winner's circle after Sunday's sixth race. The 21-year-old rider started his career during the 1978-79 season at Sunland Park, breaking his maiden on November 10, 1978, for trainer Greg Henson on only his third mount. During that initial season at Sunland, Valenzuela won six races from 51 tries. Since then, he has become one of the West Coast's finest riders at Santa Anita Park and Hollywood Park near Los Angeles as well as Del Mar near San Diego. Valenzuela recently won the rich Santa Anita Handicap aboard Interco. He set a Santa Anita Park record for most victories by an apprentice rider with 83 during the 1979-80 season. He was in El Paso over the weekend visiting relatives.

IM MAHERAS SURPRISED a tough group of allowance runners in Saturday's featured race at five furlongs by roaring down the stretch while drawing out for a two and one-quarter length victory. The race attracted 10 three-year-olds seeking a purse of \$3,200. The lightly raced Maheras colt was making his fifth career start, all at this meeting. He now has won three races for trainer

Jon G. Arnett and owner Patty Winters Alexander of Prescott, Arizona. The Texas-bred runner's clocking of :58 1-5 tied the seasonal fastest time for the distance set by Crow's Request on January 14. Ridden by David Lidberg, Im Maheras paid \$21.00 as a \$9.50-1 risk. Delta Way, the 2-1 second-wagering choice under Dale Cordova, was second, while Rita Fois, the 6-5 favorite under Casey Lambert, finished third.

DAVID LIDBERG WON THREE RACES on Sunday's program, including the featured \$15,275 Sunland Park Derby. He started in the eighth with Spy's Delight (\$43.60) for trainer Jimmie D. Claridge, took the ninth on Little Brent (\$6.00) for owner-trainer R. Frank Thompson and captured the featured event on a Phoenix invader Golden Ribbet (\$17.00) for trainer Victor N. Karns.

JOCKEY O.A. MARTINEZ JR. won three races, including two straight, on Sunday's program. He took the second on Sara's Special (\$19.00) for trainer Rey M. Marquez and then won the third on Draconides lady (\$8.20) for trainer Billy Powell. He captured the twelfth with Truly A Prince (\$6.00) for trainer Bob E. Arnett.

## Sunland Derby to Golden Ribbet

Golden Ribbet, a stakes invader from Phoenix, faced the best Sunland Park had to offer in three-year-old competition and sped to an easy victory in the prestigious Sunland Park Derby.

The 23rd running of Sunland's top event for sophomores offered a total purse of \$15,275 and handed the winner \$9,165. The distance is a mile.

Golden Ribbet, who mounted his winning rally from just off the pace, pounded into the lead at mid-stretch and won by a surprisingly easy one and one-half lengths. The colt boosted his career earnings up to \$57,975 and returned generous payoffs of \$17, \$5.80, and \$8.20.

David Lidberg was up for his third win of the afternoon.

Golden Ribbet is trained by Victor Karns for John R. Graham of Lordsbury. The winning time was 1:41 1/5 seconds.

Addendum, a 7-2 shot piloted by Mike Lidberg (David's brother), moved gamely in the stretch to finish second. The runnerup purse was \$3,360. Kings Scout, off at better than 13-1, picked up third-place money of \$1,833 and refunded a \$7.80 show price. Kings Scout reached the wire a distant four and one-quarter lengths behind Addendum. O.A. Martinez Jr.

was up. Mr. Gaelic, who went into the Derby on a four-race win streak and a strong claim to the sophomore crown, bit off more than he could chew this time and was unable to sustain his speed over the mile distance. The colt, as expected, showed plenty of spirit while grabbing the lead shortly after the break. He moved eagerly throughout the backstretch run, then began backing off. He finished fifth.

An odd aspect of Golden Ribbet's performance is the fact he was on or right near the lead for awhile during the backstretch rush, then began

dropping back. His supporters probably thought his Derby hopes were gone. But jockey Lidberg guided him toward the rail and reached the top of the stretch in fourth place. But he had saved all possible terrain in the turn, and when Lidberg asked him for another salvo, the colt delivered a powerburst on the rail.

Promised To Play, a 5-2 shot, was second at mid-stretch, but weakened in the last half-furlong to wind up sixth.

The Derby was viewed by 3,880 fans, who wagered the season's third-best handle of \$445,074.

IN STEWARD'S RULINGS: Jockey Jimmie Hunt was suspended three racing days (March 18-18) for careless riding resulting in his mount, Go Pac Man, being disqualified from second and placed eighth during the fifth race on March 10.

Rita Fols, as expected, got away as


the betting favorite at 6-5. Delta Way was next at 2-1.

But Delta Way, despite giving his



## Miss Mitedo futurity favorite

Miss Mitedo, who amazed observers in her trial race, returns to action in Sunday's rich West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park.

The 13th running of the season's first major race for two-year-old quarter horses matches the 10 fastest juveniles from the 95 who participated in 10 trials on March 9 at Sunland Park. This 330-yard scamper will provide the winner with \$67,391.46 from the gross purse of \$192,547.03.

Miss Mitedo began her career at Rollie White Downs in Brady, Texas on January 29. She breezed to a half-length victory in an allowance race for fillies. Her time for the 300-yard chase was 15.94.

The daughter of Kaweah Sunrise was dismissed as an \$11,200 outsider in the third West Texas trial heat. But she was in command throughout under veteran rider Stuart Dolphus and swept to a two-length victory.

That tied for the biggest victory margin of the six winners who ad-

vanced to the finals. Her time of 16.715 was the fastest qualifying time and also the fastest reading at the distance this season at Sunland Park.

The second- and third-fastest qualifiers are both from the strong stable of veteran trainer Jack Brooks, the Oklahoma-based horseman who is one of the dominant figures in quarter horse racing.

Miss Handy Bug turned in the second fastest time of 16:755 while tallying a two-length win in the fifth division. The Mr. Hay Bug filly started twice at Blue Ribbon Downs in Sallisaw, Oklahoma, before arriving at Sunland, scoring a trial race win and then running fourth in the Boomer Sooner Prep Futurity over 300 yards on February 11.

Faith Luck An Hope, a colt by The Third One, won the ninth trial event by one and one-half lengths in 16:795, the third-best reading. That was his career debut for owners Dr. H.D. and Margaret Hall of Ada, Oklahoma.

He has Rocky Rich, the fourth-fastest runner with a 16:905 clocking; Rich Classic Lady, the eighth-fastest qualifier with a 16:975 and Showing Easy, the ninth-fastest runner with a 16:980 reading.

Rocky Rich, a son of 1970 All-American Futurity winner Rocket Wrangler, won the first trial heat by one and one-half lengths; Rich Classic Lady, a Timeto Thinkrich filly, was second in the third division while Showing Easy, a Showum Jet gelding, was third in the second division.






