Tough road regs told

The Lincoln County Subdivision Regulations were the topic of much discussion at Thursday night's meeting of the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission.

Changes to the regulations have been discussed before, beginning when the Planning Commission determined that the county could no longer afford to accept paved roads into the county road maintenance system.

Their recommendation to the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners that such a ban on paved roads be adopted was turned down. The commissioners instead asked that the regulations be looked at to determine if more stringent regulations could be drawn up.

The county contracted Pajo Technical Services of Las Cruces to go through the regulations and make suggestions to bring them up to a more workable level for the county. Joe Shain, engineering vice president of the company, gave a report to the Planning Commission during the meeting Thursday.

In the report, Shain said, "We are proposing these (changes to the Subdivision Regulations) to assist you in your efforts to secure higher quality and more readily maintainable subdivision streets. To accommodate the varying soil and climatic conditions of Lincoln County, we have attempted to combine situational flexibility with a stringency that will result in the end products you desire. We feel that because the county will be assuming maintenance responsibilities, you should have more input into and be knowledgeable of what is being built and how it is being done."

In his report, Shain also indicated that subdividers would now have to provide "additional design and record keeping, allow for county inspection during construction, prove end product quality and compliance, and utilize materials that you find most desirable."

Specific changes in the report called for:

—The involvement of a professional engineer registered in the state of New Mexico by the subdivider, and employment of an additional professional engineer by the county who is not employed by the subdivider, to "review and comment on the adequacy of the proposed road construction plan, design, location, specifications, and drainage structures."

—The preparation of a Road Construction Plan. This plan, according to the report, would give specific information about the subdivision roads. Shain said the plan would enable the county to know precisely what to expect from the subdivider.

"It will provide specific construction details that the owner and builder should meet. It will give your inspectors ... a standard against which to compare the finished product," Shain said in his report.

—County concurrence to any changes to the approved Road Construction Plan. In addition, the proposed changes would require that the subdivider provide the county with a schedule of any construction work to be done. Shain said this was important because it would enable county crews to monitor the development of the roads.

—All streets (a combination of pavement section (any combination of subgrade, base course, gravel or asphalt) designed by a New Mexico registered professional engineer.

—The county to reserve the right "to periodically inspect the roads. The county shall advise the subdivider to take those actions necessary to keep the roads in the same general condition that they were in for the preliminary inspection. If in the opinion of the county, the subdivider does not adequately maintain the roads, or if unusual or excessive reconstruction or maintenance obligations seem evident, the county reserves the right to extend the test wear period," the report said.

Shain said the test wear period would continue to be two years in length, and inspection of the roads by the county engineer for acceptance by the county shall occur 90 days prior to the end of that two-year period.

According to Shain, the change would enable the county to develop a good working knowledge of the subdivision roads. Then, if questionable situations were to arise, the county could extend the test wear period without becoming involved in an "accept or reject" ultimatum, Shain said.

—The subdivider to provide manufacturer's certifications proving that the materials supplied meet the specifications of the county. This would enable the county to require ac-

tual written proof that certain materials had been used in construction of roadways, Shain said.

Shain said the proposed changes to the regulations would help the county oversee the development of subdivision roads that the county would eventually be assuming maintenance responsibilities.

"It's going to give the county a lot more control in what they're accepting," he said.

Planning Commission member Walt Wilson said he favored the changes.

"I think this is going to put some teeth in the road department," he said.

Several minor additions and changes to the recommended regulations were suggested by commission members and District Attorney Steve Sanders. Shain said he would make the changes by the next meeting of the Planning Commission.

In other business, the commission:

—Approved a replat of lot 9, block 29, of Rancho Ruidoso Estates.

—Approved a replat of lot 1, block 3, of Palo Verde Mobile Park.

—Approved a preliminary plat review of the Raven Ridge subdivision.

—Approved a preliminary plat review of the High Mesa subdivision.

—Approved a preliminary plat review of the Pines of Gavilan subdivision.


—Approved a conference review plat of the Vista Grande subdivision, due to the excessive grade of the proposed roads in the subdivision.

—Denied approval of a conference review plat of the Manzana Valley Mobile Home subdivision, due to the lack of an emergency access into the subdivision. The commission members also requested more information on a flood rike in the area.

—Tabled a replat of Lot 27 of the Little Creek Hills subdivision until a representative from the requesting group can come before the commission.

—Discussed the Vera Cruz subdivision. The commissioners determined that due to the large size of the lots in the subdivision, it would be classed as a Type IV subdivision.

—Tabled a conference review plat of the Mountain Breeze Acres subdivision until a representative from the requesting group can come before the commission.

Two villages' governing bodies to meet

The Ruidoso Downs Board of Trustees will meet at 7 p.m. Monday, March 26, in the village hall.

Items on the agenda include:

—Hiring Don Dutton as the new village attorney.

—Accepting the resignation of an office clerk and hiring an additional sanitation department employee.

—Hearing Judge Paula Smith's request that the village pay a court clerk. Presently, the day police dispatcher handles the work.

—Hearing a talk by Steve Massey from SENMEDD, the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District. He will speak about federal Community Development Block Grants.

—Hearing requests from the women's and men's slow-pitch softball leagues for night use of the village ball field.

—Listening to John Harlacker's plans for his veterinary clinic and a partner's horse barn near the racetrack.

—Hearing Thomas E. Latta's proposal for some property on which he wants to build a storage tank.

—Listening to Ray Smith's request for water usage at the radio station he plans to open soon.

—Discussing a contract with A and R Planning Consultants, a Santa Fe group that prepares block grant applications.

Mayor George White will recommend appointments to several village boards and commissions during the Ruidoso village council meeting beginning at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 29, at village hall. Village attorney Lee Huckstep advised White last week that members

of village boards and commissions must reside within the village. The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission and other village boards currently have members who do not live within the village limits.

White will name replacements for those who do not live within the village limits, as well as for members whose terms expire at the end of fiscal 1983-84.

White's recommendations are subject to village council approval. The council will also review the ordinances concerning boards and commissions.

—Ordinance 84-4, sale of municipal

Medicare cost system affects hospital

The Ruidoso Honda Valley Hospital staff is taking April 1 seriously. That's the day the fiscal year begins there, and the day they must start using DRGs.

DRG stands for Diagnosis Related Groups, administrator Ken Moore said at a recent Rotary Club meeting.

DRGs have a direct effect on hospitals in their billing departments because Medicare is requiring them as the various hospital fiscal years begin.

One of 467 DRGs will include a 65-year-old woman diagnosed as having a heart attack, for example. Her case will be grouped with related cases. A 12-year-old boy diagnosed as having tonsillitis will be part of another DRG.

Today, if a woman using Medicare has a heart attack and is hospitalized six days, Medicare pays the hospital part of the total bill. If a woman in a similar situation stays nine days, Medicare pays more.

With DRGs, the federal health program will pay the same amount for each case in a DRG.

For instance, if the average payment for a heart-attack case were \$10, that's what a hospital would get for

each case. If its costs amount to \$7 of that, the hospital gets \$3 profit. If the hospital costs add up to \$12 before the patient leaves, the hospital still gets \$10. The hospital must absorb a \$2 loss.

The DRG system is mandated by Medicare to try to contain its zooming costs. Moore said Medicare costs have risen dramatically in the past two decades.

He explained to Rotary members and other groups inside and outside of the Ruidoso hospital that DRGs are designed to reward efficient hospitals that regularly handle cases at less cost than the Medicare payments.

Those payments make a big difference to the Ruidoso hospital. It is part of a New Mexico hospital group called Southwest Community Health Services (SCHS). About 40 percent of SCHS revenue comes from Medicare.

Besides, Moore said, insurance companies including Blue Cross and Blue Shield are considering using a system similar to DRGs.

Inside the Ruidoso hospital, staffers are working on cost control measures, Moore said.

They plan group purchasing, to get better deals on needed items. They also plan tighter inventory control

and increased productivity. As he discussed DRGs with employees, Moore said he tells them, "Everybody has got to carry almost

more than their fair share of the load. We have to do more and provide quality care with less resources than we have in the past," he summarized.

Reaction mixed to airport news

Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) chairman Fred Heckman labeled "stupid" Secretary of Transportation Elizabeth Dole's suggestion for a new cooperative study on possible sites for a regional airport to serve Ruidoso.

A spokesman for U.S. Representative Joe Skeen said he saw the suggestion for a study as a positive thing.

If Dole needs to be convinced that the preferred Site B is the best place for the airport, Heckman said, she should do her own study. Dole had suggested in a March 15 letter to Interior Secretary William Clark that their two departments join in a study of all possible sites for a new airport.

"I think the Secretary needs to satisfy herself," said Heckman. He said New Mexico State University, which controls Site B through a lease with the Bureau of Land Management, had held out a "red herring"—the idea that there are other sites.

"If there are any alternative sites we'd like to know. So would FAA (Federal Aviation Administration),

so would the state Department of Aviation," said Heckman. SBAC did considerable research dating from the 1960s and narrowed possible sites to Site B and the nearby Site A, both on Fort Stanton Mesa.

Heckman pointed out that Interior Department personnel had no expertise in determining a viable site for an airport. He noted that FAA, which is part of Dole's Transportation Department, had been in on the research for the Sierra Blanca Airport "since the very beginning."

FAA and the state Aviation Department would be glad to share their expertise with Secretary Dole, said Heckman. He indicated he feared a "sandbagging" job like the National Academy of Sciences study if middle Interior bureaucrats get involved.

Jerry McKinney, press secretary for Congressman Joe Skeen, was not so skeptical of Dole's suggestion.

"I think the letter is a very positive thing," said McKinney.

"The letter is very strong in saying that the need for a replacement airport is critical," McKinney pointed out.

He said Dole had called for an environmental impact statement, which he said was "the next step in this thing."

Reading from the letter, McKinney said Dole had noted the first step in the land acquisition process was to justify need—and that SBAC had done so satisfactorily in its land transfer request.

The second step, she wrote, was an environmental review.

"If upon completion of the environmental review process, a favorable decision can be reached, the FAA is prepared to request the property conveyance," Dole wrote.

SBAC's request of Interior that Site B be transferred from Bureau of Land Management to FAA jurisdiction to allow the airport is still in the Transportation Department, McKinney said.

He said the letter did not specifically call for an environmental assessment of Site B. It called for a look at Site B and any other alternate sites, he noted.

The letter pointed out several problems with Site A. McKinney stated, including poor instrument approach and high cost site preparation.

Army's loss is Ruidoso's gain

Gene Sellers' metal name tag lists MT (ASCP) SBB. The letters stand for Medical Technologist, American Society of Clinical Pathologists and Specialist in Blood Banks.

That hints at some of the skills he uses as laboratory supervisor at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

It does not give any hint about why he chose Ruidoso when he retired from the U.S. Army.

"I've always wanted to be out among the trees and the land," he said, to explain why he and his wife, Ester, are putting down roots in Ruidoso.

"I wanted to have my own home that I could stay in for a while, at long last," he said.

They moved all over the world while he was in the Army. The couple raised three sons while living in Missouri, Germany, California, Korea, Indiana, Ohio, Wisconsin and Texas.

Ester Sellers stayed in San Antonio, Texas, to sell their house when Gene Sellers started working at the hospital here in December.

Sellers said frequent moves were financially costly, but that military life had paid him dividends academically.

He went into the military with less than three years of college study behind him. He retired 24 years later with a bachelor's degree, a master's degree and a doctoral degree in medical technology.

Before joining the Army, Sellers worked as a medical technologist at a Carlsbad Hospital. The Ohio native

came to New Mexico for the first time for that position.

He landed the job when he was 19, and he told people helping him find work that he would go anywhere in the country for a salary of \$300.

If he could do his career over again, he said, he would probably repeat it. "I got caught up in the saving lives thing," he said.

Sellers and the five people on his staff help save lives, he said, although ordinary people are not usually aware of the team. The average patient

remembers two professionals in the health field, Sellers said: doctors and nurses.

What do medical technologists and medical technicians do behind the scenes?

"If you think of a body fluid, we run tests on it," he said. They may be best known for their analysis of blood samples.

Sellers is happy with the hospital staff in Ruidoso.

"They are some of the greatest people I've ever worked with. The staff has attracted very good people. For this size of town, the community is very lucky."

Barrett seeks House seat

Republican David E. Barrett, a 10-year resident of the Artesia area, has announced his candidacy for the New Mexico House of Representatives from District 56.

The district includes Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan.

Barrett said he was running because he believed it was time for people who have had successful experience in private enterprise and who "realize the value of a dollar" to become more involved with government.

He expressed concern over increases in the size of government and said it was time for better efficiency in government. He stated that it was time to say, "What can I do to help."

Barrett is a member of Faith Baptist Church and is past president of the Artesia Rotary Club. He is on the

He has worked on the North Eddy County United Way campaign and the Artesia Community Concert Association. He is a member of the New Mexico State Hay Advisory Board.

"Barrett feels that having earned his way in life by hard work that he will be the representative who can and will listen to and respond to the people of House District 56," his announcement concluded.

Grisham seeks judge post

Sandra A. Grisham has announced her candidacy for the position of District Judge for the Twelfth Judicial District, Division 1, of Otero and Lincoln counties.

"I care about our legal system, and I care even more about the people whose lives it affects," said the candidate. "As District Judge, I will have a rewarding opportunity to serve those people and to serve our community."

Grisham has been with the law firm of Durrett, Jordon & Grisham since 1979. Prior to that, she was in private practice in Albuquerque, and served as Special Assistant District Attorney for Bernalillo County for much of that time. Grisham graduated from the University of New Mexico School of Law in 1973.

Grisham said her extensive experience would enable her to "come to the bench with an open mind and an ability to weigh and consider all sides of a conflict." She said she had the ability to "fashion workable solutions to difficult human problems."

Grisham is currently chairperson of the Alamogordo Mayor's Committee on D.W.I. and Alcoholism. She has been director of the Arabian Horse Association of New Mexico, and

Richard A. Parsons Sr. seeking judgeship

The bill creating a third judgeship for the district provides that the judge live in and reside in Lincoln County. He or she will be elected by the voters in both counties, however.

Parsons is a member of "Lincoln County's oldest and largest continuously practicing law firm." He is in practice with his daughter, Karen Parsons Williams, and Daniel A. Bryant. He is currently president of the Lincoln County Bar Association.

He has been practicing law in Ruidoso since 1960, and served as an Assistant District Attorney from 1960 to 1963 under Dan Sosa.

Parsons is a veteran of World War

II and the Korean conflict. He served as a naval pilot and a legal officer, with over 17 years of active and ready reserve service, including 25 months of sea duty.

He has three children: Sharon Wagner of Albuquerque; and Karen Parsons Williams and Richard A. Parsons Jr., both of Ruidoso. He has two grandchildren, with another expected in June.

Parsons lives near Capitan with his wife, Judy.

He was in the first class to graduate from the University of New Mexico College of Law.

"I am seeking this judgeship because I believe that after a third of a century of legal experience, and nearly a quarter of a century of practice in the Lincoln-Otero county area, I possess the experience and qualities necessary to sit as a fair, impartial, informed and hard working judge for the people of both counties," Parsons said.

He said he had no outside business endeavors and would devote his full time to the judgeship. He echoed Chief Justice Burger, saying he believes it is time lawyers remember they ought to heal conflicts and not merely get caught up in the dramatics of the courtroom.

"I believe in no nonsense law and order. I do not believe in locking up juries and letting criminals out," said Parsons.

He added that he did not intend to use the office of judge as a stepping stone to any higher office.

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Does the system really work? It does if you let it. It does even better if you work with it.

Legislators in Santa Fe this year appeared intent on demonstrating its weaknesses instead of its strengths, on frustrating it rather than using it. And despite them, the system came through after all—bloody and bowed, but nonetheless operational.

Here's the theory: We have two counter-balanced legislative bodies, with equal power to initiate, consider and adopt legislation; nothing can become law unless both concur in its passage. Those two, when considered as one Legislature, are in turn counter-balanced by the governor; he can neither introduce nor pass legislation, but nothing becomes law unless he signs it.

It's a good system, in part at least because it spreads power instead of concentrating it. As a practical certainty, it assures that nothing becomes law which is not the product of consensus, arrived at by adjustment and compromise.

It also often gives us laws which nobody really agrees with all the way.

You can see that in bare outline in the appropriations act that will govern New Mexico's expenditures totaling \$1.4 billion for the year, and to impose as much as \$173 million in new taxes to raise the necessary revenue.

He didn't get what he wanted. Of those two points, he got a resounding "no" on both.

The final bill, under which we will live and operate, authorized the spending of \$1.306 billion, or about \$100 million less than the administration asked for. Further the Legislature refused to go along with any tax raise at all.

But that doesn't mean lawmakers got what they want. Both House and Senate had to give something to get a bill enacted. That final total is less than the House wanted by \$37 million, and more than the Senate wanted by \$23 million.

Everybody gave something, to make the system work.

But they sure didn't do it gracefully, smoothly, courteously or quickly. They wrangled and hassled and carried on, till a clear-eyed observer wanted to scream.

Here are some of the major problems they managed to put in the way of the system, to an extent that it became a near-miracle it worked at all:

—Loose lips. Too much mouthing off from every one concerned about everybody else and how deficient they are.

Most notably a fault on the part of the Governor, but taken up with too much enthusiasm by the so-called leaders of the so-called coalition in the Senate as well.

—Logrolling. Some legislators simply said, "This item is non-negotiable." In a process which depends for its success entirely on negotiation, that is about as directly designed to frustrate the system as anything could be.

—Control. Some lawmakers further insisted that members of their particular bloc must make up the majority of every special group formed to conduct negotiations. That insistence also acted as a chilling factor, day after day after day.

—Logrolling. Assuring "loyalty" from some legislators by promising to deliver specific projects for their districts also tends to frustrate the system. That makes it almost impossible to view such promised projects in the same light as all the others. Those who have committed to deliver them cannot afford to see them bargained away.

That last element was especially harmful to the working out of the system in the bills which fund capital projects for the coming year.

Slowness in reaching agreement on those, in large part because this element was in operation, led to at least one 18-hour legislative day no one who experienced it is every likely to forget.

It worked, the system did—finally, and with much creaking and groaning. The trip wasn't pleasant, but we finally got there.

DEAR EDITOR:

Is our country making too many laws? One day maybe all of us will just have to be lawyers in order to get by in our day-to-day lives.

I'm speaking specifically about two recently passed laws (the child-safety seat law and the more recent liability insurance law), that although I comply with them just as any law-abiding citizen would, I personally object to them. Yes, they are good laws—they do help society as a whole, but this is supposed to be America—the land of the free—where you do have a choice.

I don't believe the ones who passed this child safety seat law ever had to contend with keeping an active 2-year old strapped into one for a 400 mile trip or tried to change diapers, etc., without having to pull off the road to do so. Yes, I know the seats save lives, but how did that help the mother who lost her 2-year old who was strapped down in the back seat in one when a truck rear-ended her auto two summers ago, while she and her older child escaped from the front seat? All I mean is it should be up to the individual—Freedom of choice.

Pertaining to the liability insurance, not everyone can afford it, are they supposed to stop driving altogether? Not to work, buy groceries or anything? But it is a useful law also. No one should drive, have an accident — and then not pay for the damage. But is an accident ever only one person's fault? Sometimes yes, but not always so. Defensive driving should be secondary to all of us who own a vehicle. Most accidents could probably be avoided if more of us would pay more attention to the road — road conditions and especially to what everyone else on the road is doing instead of listening to our radios, stereos, talking to passengers and scolding children, or day dreaming. And keeping our vehicles in the best condition possible.

Generally speaking, our laws are becoming burden some for our individuals who like the freedom to make their own choices. Nearly everyone today has a law that is their "pet peeve." Some door will be closed "because it's the law" — even if it's a stupid law that perhaps should be abolished. Not to mention some of the ancient laws that were never changed — like splitting on the street, or hitting your horse in front of the courthouse. Or the hot dog vendor in New York who recently closed because he couldn't make fresh hot-dogs any longer. The "law" said he had to wrap them individually. The reason? His hot dogs were being contaminated by air pollution before he could get them handed out the window to his customers.

Big Brother is too apt at putting his finger in our daily lives now, mostly for our own good, of course, but I do believe he is trying to homogenize us. The government is in such a quagmire now with overspending, horrific wastes and abuses, that I believe it should look into its own problems first, before it enters further in my daily life.

Monday afternoon, I covered a regular meeting of P&Z, subbing for vacationing Billy Allstetter. It always hits home to me when I go a P&Z meeting just how important the issues this body deals with are to the village.

And it seemed to me as I watched it operate Monday that the current P&Z was the most effective of any in the two and a half years I have observed it. They went about the business of dealing with weighty matters like a rezoning request, a sign appeal and an annexation petition coolly and competently.

As if that were not enough, the board took time at the end of the meeting—in what has become a regular practice—to discuss P&Z-related matters of concern in the village.

The topic Monday was downtown parking. At the recommendation of a member, a sub-committee was formed to study the issue.

I sat in on that committee's meeting Wednesday morning. The group consisted of P&Z members Ray Bishop, Tom Kehlman, Martin Rose and P&Z chairman Greg Masters.

Some groundwork had already been done. P&Z members had learned from village administrators that it may be feasible to finance a village-owned parking lot or lots downtown through a revenue bond issue.

It seems that only a small percentage of downtown businesses have the amount of off-street parking required by ordinance. Of course, a lot of the slack is taken up by on-street parking on Sudderth Drive.

The concept discussed at the meeting was construction of one or more large municipal parking lots and abolition of on-street parking. This would allow widening of sidewalks and installation of streetlights.

It also would theoretically increase commercial density downtown because areas used for parking could have businesses on them instead.

Employees of downtown businesses would be required to park in the lots, and spaces in the lots might have meters to generate revenue.

The sub-committee, with direction from Masters, brainstormed the concept from various angles.

Where would the lots be? Land along the river below the main fire station was mentioned.

But someone claimed studies show that while shoppers don't mind walking uphill going back to their cars with their purchases, they don't like to walk uphill to the shopping area.

Someone revealed that commercial property off Sudderth that might make a good parking lot had come on to the market that same morning, at a bargain price.

To give an idea of the enthusiasm of this group, Rose said that if he thought it would help, he would go to the bank to borrow money to buy the land and hold it for the village!

After some discussion, the committee arrived at an existing downtown from the phone company to the Texaco station on one side and from Pioneer Savings to the midtown 7-11 on the other side.

A future downtown could extend west to Mountain Ski Shop and Navajo Spirits and east to the Midway Garage and Ski Chalet, it was determined.

Multi-story parking was another possibility discussed. An improved downtown Ruidoso was compared to the famed River Walk in San Antonio as a potentially wonderful place to walk and shop.

The committee eventually agreed on a course of action: first, methodology of funding; second, concept of charging business owners for space in the lots, probably through a lease; third, construction of parking improvements—by village or private labor and machinery; fourth, study of business parking use to figure how many parking spaces needed for different uses, e.g. restaurants, retail shops, etc.

Upon adjourning the four men agreed to meet again in a week. This time, they were planning to go out armed with tape measures and start measuring sidewalks!

I left the meeting thinking, "All Right! These guys are getting after it!"

Then came the notice Wednesday night that Masters, Bishop, Margaret Gaddy, and soon James Paxton would have to leave the Planning and Zoning Commission.

That was the cold slap. No one is really to blame. Mayor George White said he became aware of the state law requiring residency for committee members in the last couple of weeks. He feels he can do nothing but follow the law.

Perhaps the new village council can seek an amendment to the law that would allow non-resident representation.

My only hope is that the bright-burning enthusiasm and vision for a better Ruidoso I saw last week aren't lost. There must be a way it—and these citizens who have it—can be allowed to serve the village.





Despite setbacks, said Karen Foster's mother, Karen maintains a positive attitude. Lawanda Strong said her daughter knows most people with MS live seven or eight years after it is discovered.

By then, Foster believes a cure will be found, Strong said.



The Photo Shoppe and Ruidoso Gems is a combined business at 1031 Mechem Drive in the Attic and Friends shopping center. Owned by Ed Cass, the combined shop opened January 5.

According to Cass, the Photo Shoppe carries a full line of photographic supplies and accessories, including photographic chemicals, printing paper, film, batteries and filters. The shop is an authorized Kodak dealer, and handles Nikon, Cosina, Kodak, Canon and Olympus cameras. Cass said Ernest Mata would be the manager of the business.

The Photo Shoppe features film developing and printing, with the use of the KIS Photo of France system. Cass said the actual development time from undeveloped film to finished film and prints is one hour; with time of film development, handling

and delivery set at a maximum of two and one half hours. Cass said they develop color Disc, 110, 126 and 35 millimeter films with the KIS processor, and send all other types of film to the Kodak processing location at Dallas, Texas.

Cass said another service of the shop was repair of most makes of cameras. Cass said both he and his wife, Alice, were Certified Photographic Councillors. He said normal services of cleaning lenses and checking batteries were at no charge.

Cass said he had been in the photographic business for 35 years. He still owns two photo shops, University Camera and Plains Camera, in Lubbock, Texas. In addition, Cass owns Plains Jewelry, and is continuing his practice as a Certified Diamond Inspector and gemologist in the Ruidoso Gems part of his business.

Cass custom designs and casts jewelry, and has made pieces worth nearly \$200,000 for some of his clients.

As a gemologist, Cass studies and identifies gems, using microscope, heavy liquid and refractometer techniques. Cass said he also performed fluorescence checks on gems. Cass said he had the largest selection of gems in southeastern New Mexico. Cass said his family had vacationed in Ruidoso for several years, and one year decided to move here permanently.

"Peace of mind and happiness is here in Ruidoso," he said. "We came up here strictly for the purpose of enjoying it."


Cass said he would operate the shop as more of a hobby than a strictly success-oriented business. He said he wanted to build professional friendships with the people of Ruidoso.


