Junior ski racer Neely Schwab continued her winning ways last week, claiming a silver and a gold medal at the National Junior Olympics in Winter Park, Colorado.

Schwab, the only member of the Ruidoso-Sierra Blanca Ski Racing Team to compete in the Junior Olympics, placed second in the J.S. (nine and under) girls' giant slalom.

She then defeated all other girls in her age group in pro form dual elimination races. A missed gate at the end of the slalom race was all that prevented her from claiming a third medal, said her mother Beverly Halladay.

"It was beautiful to watch," said Halladay, who was obviously pleased.

Neely was a little less overwhelmed by her performance, citing "a lot of cute guys" as the real source of fun for the national competition.

When asked what made her such a good skier, Schwab answered, "Stephen started me when I was two and a half."

Her stepfather, Stephen Halladay, has helped racing team coaches during the year. He travelled with Schwab to Winter Park last week.

In the 11 races she has entered this winter, Schwab has earned nine firsts, one second and one fourth place. She will compete in one more race this season at Loveland, Colorado.

Council in marathon meeting

The Ruidoso village council talked dollars, cents and zoning for six and a half hours Tuesday night. It was the first meeting since the council adopted a 5:30 p.m. starting time in the hope of concluding meetings earlier.

In addition to approving numerous purchases and sales, the council postponed any decisions about appointments and residency requirements for village commissions and boards.

Mayor George White submitted his recommendations for appointments to numerous village committees, which included replacements for members not living within the village limits.

Upon the governing body's request, village attorney Lee Huckstep recently issued his opinion that members of the Planning and Zoning Commission must reside within village limits. Three of its members, including chairman Greg Masters, do not live in the village.

It is still unclear whether other board and commission members must reside within village limits.

Huckstep said the residency requirement would be necessary for those committees having actual governing power as opposed to advisory function. Mayor White also read a village ordinance that requires all members of any board or commission to reside within the village limits unless otherwise specified by ordinance.

The council tabled White's appointment recommendations and will examine ordinances creating all board and commissions at a special meeting at 2 p.m. Tuesday, April 10.

The council did authorize the construction of small sections of pipeline for the Grindstone reservoir project, a new fire substation on Highway 47

and replacement of 15,000 linear feet of water line.

Thompson Construction's low bid of \$114,192.50 was accepted for placement of just over 4,000 linear feet of raw water and treated water pipelines through Don Dorman's Grindstone residential development.

Although council member Sherman Atwood expressed concern about spending money on the Grindstone project before the Carlsbad Irrigation District protest is settled, the council approved the expenditure so that pipeline may be laid before Dorman paves streets in his development.

Pioneer Western Construction was awarded the \$108,329 contract for the new fire substation on Municipal Airport property near Rocky Mountain Boulder Supply. The new substation will include four truck bays, two offices, sleeping quarters and a physical fitness room.

Financing of the construction will be aided by the sale of village property near the corner of Sudderth and Mechem Drives. The council approved the sale of the property for \$51,000 cash to Linda and Gregory Zielinski. The property was originally bought with the intention of using it as a fire substation, but was later determined to be unsuitable for that purpose.

The council also authorized the expenditure of \$67,436.15 for water pipes and fittings to be used in the replacement of 15,000 linear feet of water line. D & J Services will replace 4,300 feet of line for \$26,225 with the village water department replacing the rest of the line.

The council also approved a joint powers agreement with Lincoln County for work on Gavilan Canyon and Carrizo Canyon roads. Assistant village manager Frank Potter said the agreement was necessary to apply for State Highway Department cooperative funds.

Potter outlined a \$1 million, five-year plan for improvement of the two roads. According to the proposed

plan, the village would contribute \$40,000 per year for the project. The council took no action on the plan. Potter will take the joint powers agreement to the Lincoln County commissioners for their approval.

The council also agreed to address the State Highway Commission in Alamogordo April 19 or 20 concerning the recent two-year postponement of Highway 37 expansion to four lanes.

The \$275,000 purchase of the trash transfer/compactor system will be financed at nine percent over five years after approval by the council Tuesday night. The solid waste department will borrow the money from the general fund and make monthly payments of \$6,645.83 for five years.

The council, however, rejected Al Junge's protest of the Planning and Zoning Commission's refusal to zone 40 acres of land in the Hollywood area for industrial use.

Junge appeared satisfied when Planning and Zoning Commission chairman Masters said the commission would determine zoning designations for the currently unzoned property. The property includes the old sewer plant, a proposed site for the transfer/compactor system.

In other business, the council:

- Approved the vacation of road right of way and sale of 9,434 square feet of property across the street from Cree Meadows Country Club to Fred A. Boyd for 50 cents per square foot.

Council members expressed concern about selling property below market value, and Sherman Atwood and Rick Evans voted against the sale.

The sale carried restrictions against selling the property separately from adjacent property owned by Boyd. Other adjacent property owners will also be contacted and offered the same opportunity on the 50 feet of right of way being vacated.

Postponed the sale of two small parks in the Skyland area until the planning company BRW determines a

best use for the land.

- Heard Masters invite the public to a formal presentation by BRW on parking and other issues concerning the midtown area. The presentation will be at 7 p.m. Wednesday, March 7, in the council chambers.

- Established Sewer Assessment District 5 from the Springs Condominiums at the bottom of Alto Hill to Alto Crest.

- Authorized the publication of intent to issue \$1,250,000 in joint utility system revenue bonds for the construction of the Ponderosa Heights sewer.

- Awarded the aviation fuel contract to Pride Refinery. The village will pay \$1.46 per gallon for aviation fuel and \$.99 per gallon for jet fuel.

- Awarded a \$4,318.21 contract to K & L Enterprises for the refinishing of the municipal swimming pool.

- Agreed to hire A & K Planning consultants to help the village acquire Community Development Block Grants. The village will apply for a \$500,000 grant to resurface roads in Ponderosa Heights that will be torn up by the sewer project there.

- The village will pay \$1,000 to hire the consultants, and three percent of the grant value, if obtained.

- Assured Barney Waldrop that the public will have use of the Ruidoso Public Library multi-purpose room for some time to come and that another public meeting place would be found before any library expansion into the room occurred.

- Heard Lincoln County commissioners chairman John Hightower greet the new council and pledge the county's cooperation and support for future projects.

- Approved several items previously acted upon by the Planning and Zoning Commission.

- Adjourned to executive session to discuss property acquisition, water right acquisition and pending litigation.

Downs trustees approve softball nights

The men's slow pitch softball league will get a second night of the week for games on the Ruidoso Downs field this summer, according to a resolution Downs trustees plan to consider.

About 10 representatives of the men's and women's leagues went to the trustees' meeting Monday to request playing nights.

The Lincoln County Women's Slow Pitch League will play on Monday nights again this year. They schedule two games each week from May 7 through August 27. About 10 or 12 teams play games in the Downs and at Fort Stanton.

The men's slow pitch league has 12 teams. They will play on Fridays, as they did last year, and will also play on Tuesdays. They asked that the additional night not be on a weekend.

The men's fast pitch league can use the field on the remaining four days, Wednesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday. Fast pitch teams used the field five nights a week last year. No fast pitch representative attended the trustees' meeting.

Slow pitch officials also asked that the electric meter be read before and after games, and that they be charged according to that.

In past years, fast pitch paid five sevenths of the bill, and each slow pitch league paid one seventh, according to the number of nights per week each played.

Mayor J. C. Day also warned that drinking alcohol at the park must be cut as much as possible, because it is illegal.

The three trustees present also voted to cut Municipal Judge Paula Smith's salary from \$600 to \$450, beginning in April. The \$150 from the court budget will be used to pay Jo Ann Jenkins, who has been working as court clerk.

She is also the police clerk. Jenkins spends about two hours per day in the village offices working on court records and collecting fines, she estimated. Police department and court books are often done together, she added.

Downs officials plan to adapt her job description. It will combine the full time police duties and the part-time court duties.

The court clerk is chosen by the municipal judge and has duties separate from the police department clerk's duties, although Jenkins fills both roles.

The trustees also voted 3-0 to hire Don Dutton as village attorney. He is offering reduced rates to the Downs, it was noted.

The village board also appointed Scott Tillman and Rita Nash to fill vacancies on the five-member Planning and Zoning Commission.

Trustee Conrad Buchanan said he had spoken with Tillman about the commission, since it meets on the

same night as the fire fighters Tillman said he could attend both meetings, Buchanan reported.

Trustee Jackie Branum suggested Nash, adding, "I think she'd be good."

The village board also listened to assorted speakers from around the state. Steve Massey spoke about Community Development Block Grants. He represents SENMEDD, the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District.

SENMEDD receives funding from federal, state and local governments. The Downs pays \$50 per year.

Massey said about \$9 million in block grants would be available in New Mexico this year. "We'd sure like to see Ruidoso Downs get some of the money," he said.

Each community may make one application for itself and one on behalf of a non-profit organization. The applications are due May 4.

The trustees voted 3-0 to start work on an application for water project funding this year, although streets also need improvement, they said. Buchanan said paved streets would improve property values and travel ease.

Mayor Day had asked, "Should we go for water or streets? My feeling is, go for water storage."

In other business, the trustees approved plans for John Harlacker's veterinary clinic and a partner's horse barn with little comment. The partners own land near the racetrack.

Village officials also listened to Tom Latta of Albuquerque. He owns 20 acres of land near the former Red Man Club, and wants to develop it eventually.

Latta offered to donate a quarter or half an acre of land there to the village for a water storage tank site. The donation would help his subdivision as well as the village, he said.

"We know we'll need water for it, and know you'd have to build a road to the tank," he added. "We're not asking you to develop our land."

The trustees will consider the offer pending an opinion from the village engineer.

In response to Latta's question, Branum said the land is now zoned for single-family homes, and apartments could not be built there.

Another speaker was Ray Smith, from the new radio station KOAW. He asked for a permit to share a water line with a neighbor.

"We don't have any water to drink up there," he said.

Trustees voted 3-0 to grant a six-month permit for the shared water line. The village ordinarily allows no more than one unit per water meter.

Smith said proposed home building in the area should allow pipes to the station soon. He also said the station expected to begin broadcasting in a short time.

Trustee LeVerne Cole did not attend the Monday meeting. The next regular session is planned at 7 p.m. Monday, April 9.



O-Bar-O Ranch versus county, chapter ?

The controversy between owners of the O-Bar-O Ranch and the Lincoln County government erupted again last week when a county road crew was blocked from grading County Road 24.

On Tuesday, March 20, a county road crew arrived at the ranch with orders from the county to grade the road, which runs directly across the ranch owned by the Lietzman brothers, Paul and Robert.

According to Board of County Commissioners, chairman John A. Hightower, the grader was sent to improve the road, which continues from the ranch across Forest Service land up to Carrizo Peak. The road was to be improved enough to allow the removal of a 60-foot radio tower and a small storage building owned by the county and located on the peak.

According to Hightower, the road is the only access to the Forest Service property where the tower and building are located. Hightower said an agreement between the county and the Forest Service stipulated that the county had only a user's permit for the land. Since the county was no longer using the equipment, he explained, it needed to remove the tower and building.

The county had utilized the tower and building as a radio repeater site, but had not used it for over a year before the removal operation began.

"We had to take it down," Hightower said. "We have to get it off of there."

When the county road grader arrived at the ranch, it was physically stopped by the Lietzmans or their representatives, who blocked the road with a vehicle, according to District Attorney Steve Sanders.

According to Charles Hawthorne, attorney for the Lietzmans, the county did not notify the Lietzmans that the grader would be in the area. Hawthorne said it was not until a hearing before District Judge Robert Doughty Thursday morning—between the Lietzmans and county of-

officials—that Paul Lietzman was told why the grader had appeared on the road the previous Tuesday.

At that hearing, it was judged, according to District Attorney Sanders, that the county would be permitted to go up and grade the road, and remove the building and tower.

That stretch of road, particularly from the ranch up to the peak, will be extremely expensive for the county to make passable, according to Hawthorne. He said it would cost the county more to fix the road than the building and tower were worth.

"It will take thousands and thousands of dollars to make that

road passable for a pickup. It's covered with boulders this high," Hawthorne said, indicating chin height.

Hawthorne said he believed the county was harassing the Lietzman brothers over the road issue.

"There's no logic to what the county's doing," he said. "This is really ludicrous."

According to Hightower, the county has no choice but to remove the equipment, due to the agreement with the Forest Service. He said the cost of the tower and building had no bearing on the decision to remove them.

In addition, Hightower said the

county had another agreement with the Forest Service to maintain the road. He said the road was used as a fire access to the area, in addition to opening up public lands for hunting and other recreational activities. Hightower said the county intended to use the radio tower at the county's Ruidoso suboffice.

Hawthorne said the Lietzmans offered to buy the equipment from the county, but the county refused the offer. According to Hightower, the decision to reject the Lietzmans' purchase offer stemmed from earlier events concerning the tower and building.

Hightower said that approximately three years ago, when the county was still using the tower and building for its repeater, he was approached by a representative from the Motorola company. The representative requested the use of the tower and building for the Lietzmans.

Hightower said he told the representative that he and the Lietzmans would have to go before the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners for a permit to use the equipment. Hightower said that was the last he heard from them until several months later, when, after a routine service trip to the tower site, county crews reported that someone else was using the equipment.

It was determined that the Lietzmans had installed an unauthorized repeater at the site, Hightower said. When questioned by the county commissioners, he recalled, they claimed they had obtained a permit from the county offices.

Hightower said no such permit was ever issued.

"They just put it on there," he said of the Lietzman repeater. Hightower said the county would continue with the removal operation.

"We're going to get it down," he said, "one way or the other."

In the meantime, county crews have returned to the site, and have begun work on what is certainly one of the most controversial stretches of road in Lincoln County.

Senate hopeful Pratt states views

Believing that some federal priorities have to be changed before much progress can be made in New Mexico, State Representative Judy Pratt is on the campaign trail for the U.S. Senate seat held by Pete Domenici.

Pratt, of Albuquerque, will face Nick Franklin in the June primary for the Democratic nomination. She passed through Ruidoso earlier this week.

The three-term legislator is confident she will beat Franklin. It is Domenici and his policies she is taking aim at in her campaign.

"I think he (Domenici) uses his power against the people of the state," she said. Her decision to challenge Domenici came about after she determined that unseating him was: first, necessary; and second, possible.

"I'm mostly concerned about the budget cutbacks," she said when asked which of his policies she opposed. She listed human services—including programs for senior citizens, students and student aid, Indian health, and job training—as affected areas.

"This has been accompanied by a 66 percent increase in military spending, Pratt pointed out.

She noted that under President Reagan's "New Federalism," the states have been given the authority to carry out programs, but the money has been taken away. She gave the example of job training, claiming the state now has the responsibility—but with one-third the funds and twice the need.

Pratt believes the key to her campaign is winning the support of people who have been affected by the cutbacks.

"We spend a lot of time trying to activate voters," she said. Her stop in Ruidoso was part of a "walking tour," which takes her into neighborhoods of cities she visits, and which places an emphasis on voter registration.

Pratt says her House of Representatives district always leads the state in voter turnout, and she feels the ap-

proach that has been successful for her there can work statewide.

She mentioned Hispanics and women as two groups that would be forces to reckon with in the November election. She was asked about being a woman candidate.

"I think it's sort of a bonus, in fact, this year," she said. She is one of just four women in the country who are running for the Senate.

Pratt listed several issues of concern to Southern New Mexico:

—Water—"the bottom line for any kind of development in this part of the state." She favored the desalination plant for Roswell and would like to see regional solutions to water problems.

—Agriculture—she is "in serious disagreement" with the PIK (Payment in Kind) program, believing it benefits only large farming interests. She feels international trade policies can be developed to create markets for agricultural products.

—Oil and gas—her position is that a rebuilding of basic industry would help pick up the energy industry. Pratt said she needed to research the question of natural gas deregulation further, and that care must be taken not to gouge consumers.

The candidate, a "progressive Democrat," said she supported human services, peace (she favors a verifiable nuclear freeze), and environmental concern.

She said she wanted to find solutions to problems in those areas, "But I want to be practical about it."

Pratt said the Reagan administration had seen big business through the recession by awarding big defense contracts, which she called a "non-productive" approach.

Excessive military spending has contributed to deficits and program cutbacks, she believes.

Pratt used to fly into Ruidoso when she conducted teacher training programs in Mesalero some years ago. "I'm a great advocate of a new airport," she said, noting that she spoke from personal experience with the present Ruidoso airport.

Chamber board discusses RMC woes

The fate of the Retail Merchants Committee (RMC) of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce was discussed in depth at the Wednesday meeting of the chamber board of directors.

Board members decided chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth would approach the committee at its next meeting with the proposal that the board vice president of community development, who sits on the committee as an ex-officio member, be appointed as permanent chairperson of the committee. The current vice president of community development is Joan Bailey.

The present leadership of the Retail Merchants Committee consists of a rotating chairperson from the membership of the committee.

Other discussion at the meeting centered both on the leadership and direction of the committee.

"Without question, there has been a lack of leadership," chamber president James Paxton said of the committee. "If you take away the Easter Egg Hunt, there's not a whole lot that they take care of."

Board member Tom Kelham suggested the committee instead concentrate only on projects that deal direct-

ly with the retail merchants in Ruidoso.

"Get them out of the Easter egg business," he said.

Discussion also centered on the position of the committee as a standing committee of the chamber. It was suggested that the committee either break off from the chamber, or come more directly under the guidance of the chamber.

"They've basically just done what they wanted to do," said board member Bill Braudt. "It's not a committee of the chamber."

Kelham stressed his belief that the group should remain as a standing committee of the chamber.

"I personally would rather see it affiliated with the chamber rather than as a separate group. Keep them tied to, and under the direction of, the chamber," he said.

All at the meeting agreed that something must be done about the leadership of the group.

"The thing is definitely floundering," Kelham said of the group.

"I think this may be a lifebuy for them," Paxton said of the move to establish a permanent chairperson for the group.

Also during the meeting, the board was presented with the list of newly elected board members for the com-

ing year. They are: Duane Byars, Bill Carrigan, Paul Crown, Gary Garner, Ken Moore, Kim Pickett, Frank Potter, Jerry Pope and Floide Wilson. All were elected for two-year terms except Pope and Wilson, who were elected for one-year terms left vacant by Joe Loving and Richard Farris.

The officers were elected by votes cast by chamber members.

In other business, the board:

—Heard a report from Jungbluth on the Board of Director's retreat. Jungbluth said the retreat would take place on April 27 and 28. The board members agreed to hold the meeting at the Holiday Inn de Las Cruces.

—Heard a report from Jungbluth on the cancelled Jeep Party.

"This year it got to a point where we weren't to a break even point with only two days to go," Jungbluth said.

Paxton suggested the possibility of starting another type of fund-raiser to replace the Jeep Party.

"There's nothing wrong with the Jeep Party," he said. "It just got old."

—Heard a report from Tommy Morel on the progress of the Advertising Committee. Morel reported on upcoming advertising expenditures that the committee will be making, and reviewed the success of the recent U.S. Open ski race.

"It was really rewarding to see the results of our hard work," Morel said

of the event.

—Heard a report from Jungbluth on the chamber insurance program. Jungbluth said problems with National Equity Life, the insurance company for the chamber insurance program, have been settled.

—Approved the purchase of a new phone system for the chamber offices. According to Jungbluth, the system will be purchased from Contel at a price of \$2,911.

—Heard a report from Jungbluth that a familiarization tour of 40 travel agents will be coming to Ruidoso.

—Discussed the upcoming chamber banquet. According to Jungbluth, the banquet will be held sometime in May. He said a speaker for the event had not yet been chosen.

—Discussed participation by the chamber in the Capitan Chamber of Commerce's Smokey Bear Day parade. The board members discussed the possibility of making a combined float with the Ruidoso village government.

—Heard a report from Yvonne Lanelli on the upcoming Tele-auction to be held to raise funds for television station KENW, Portales. Lanelli said the auction would take place the week of May 28 through June 2.

"It will be the biggest, funnest live fund-raising auction you will ever see in your life," Lanelli predicted.

State officials comment on proposed airport study

Two state officials said this week that U.S. Secretary of Transportation Elizabeth Dole's request for another study on sites for a new airport for Ruidoso was a way to keep the Interior Department from turning down a land transfer request for Site B on Fort Stanton Mesa.

"I think that this was the best that DOT (Department of Transportation) could get out of Interior right now," said state Transportation Secretary Judith Espinosa.

Dole suggested a study of alternate airport sites and an environmental review in a March 15 letter to Interior Secretary William Clark.

State Aviation Department director Bob White agreed that the letter was

written to forestall an adverse decision on the transfer request in middle-level management at Interior.

"We still have this problem of cows versus people," said White, referring to New Mexico State University grazing research on Site B.

He said Interior apparently did not believe his department or the Federal Aviation Administration when the agencies said Site B was the only viable site. "I guess they're going to have to be convinced again," he said.

"It's almost disconcerting that a branch of government has such a total disregard for human lives," he went on. A new airport for Ruidoso has been the top priority of the state

Aviation Department for years, because of the dangerous location of the present airport.

Espinosa said that although she was "a little disappointed" by Dole's letter, it was hoped the letter would

Sheriff seeks re-election

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan has announced his intentions to run for a second term as sheriff.

"I feel that the Sheriff's Department has come a long way since I took office some fourteen and a half months ago," Sullivan said. "During my first campaign I indicated that I wanted to make the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department a professional law enforcement agency that the citizens of Lincoln County would be proud of. I feel that we are very near reaching that goal."

Sullivan noted the hiring of two former sheriffs, a former investigator for the Attorney General's office, and two full-time investigators as greatly needed improvements to the staff of the Sheriff's Department. Sullivan said the addition of the investigators has resulted in a considerable increase in the number of felony arrests by the department.

Other changes in the department made by Sullivan include:

—Dividing the county into districts, with a Sheriff's Department deputy residing in and responding to calls in that district. Sullivan said this has resulted in better patrol coverage and shorter response time to calls.

—Introduction of night patrol of critical crime areas in the county.

—Establishment of personnel training programs, including biweekly inspections of personnel and equipment.

—Improvements in the jail, including uniforms for inmates, an updated diet for inmates, the installation of intercoms in the jail, and the compilation of policy and procedures manuals for the jail and the entire Sheriff's Department.

—Installation of a National Crime Information Center (NCIC) computer. According to Sullivan, the computer has allowed the department direct NCIC communication, and has resulted in increased efficiency in the department.

—Increased communication with national law enforcement agencies, including monthly reports by the department to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

"I think I have proven to the citizens of Lincoln County that I can handle the position of sheriff, and I would solicit their support in enabling me to serve them for another term," Sullivan said.

Other boys singles action saw Mike Smith of Ruidoso drop a 6-3, 6-3 decision to Paul Rodriguez, Jim Smith of

Doubles action saw Rodriguez and Edmondson top Brown and Swalander 6-4, 6-7, 6-3, in the number one match.

The other doubles competition had Jim Smith and Cache Mundy topped by Alway and Mirviella 6-0, 6-0, and Mike Smith and Westergren beaten by Dempsey and Ruffo 6-4, 7-5.

Laura Trapp of Ruidoso raised her singles record to 2-0 in girls play with a 6-4, 6-2 victory over Brenda Valdez.

Other Warrior girl singles wins went to Rachel McCoy with a 6-1, 6-1 decision over Denise Stoner, and Melissa Henderson taking a default win in the final match. Henderson's

McClellan will also run on the 400-meter, 800-meter and 1,600-meter relay squads.

Sophomore Russell Easter could do well in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles. He had a 45.0 in that event last week.

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

Big men should dominate the action at the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) men's basketball championships this weekend in Seattle, Washington.

Sam Bowie, a 7-1 skyscraper from the University of Kentucky, will be the tallest player in the four-team finals. However, Akeem Olajuwon of the University of Houston and Georgetown University's Patrick Ewing are both 7-0, and Kentucky's Melvin Turpin is 6-11.

Only the University of Virginia lacks a real big man. But the Cavaliers have been one of the biggest Cinderella stories in the NCAA in several years. However, Virginia doesn't figure to get to Monday's finals. Houston should beat Virginia fairly easily in the semi-finals Saturday.

That shows how much the big man has taken over basketball. About 15 years ago, it was rare to see 7-footers in the NCAA. Kareem Abdul Jabbar, now of the Los Angeles Lakers, dominated the collegiate action when he was with UCLA in the late 1960s.

But big men should be in the limelight in Seattle, and the tournament title should be up for grabs.

This will be Houston's third straight trip to the NCAA final four. Two years ago, the Cougars lost to eventual champion University of North Carolina in the semi-finals. Last season Houston was favored to win the crown but was upset by North Carolina State University in the championship game.

Look for the Cougars to lose in the championship game again this year, as Georgetown tops Houston by a few points.

Houston will defeat Virginia, and Georgetown will edge Kentucky in the semi-finals Saturday. Monday night Ewing will hold Olajuwon down enough to give Georgetown the title, but not by much, say 65-60.

Georgetown rotated 10 players in its 61-49 victory over Dayton University in the West Regionals championship game last Sunday.

The Hoyas have good overall height, quickness and depth. They were also the most consistent team in the regional competition.

Michael Jackson (not to be confused with the singer) is also an excellent scorer, having tallied 14 points in the victory over Dayton.

Georgetown is also a better free throw shooting team than Houston. Teams that don't shoot well from the free throw line are lucky to win championships, and don't often get the opportunity to do so.

Kentucky has the tallest team in the final four, but the Colonels had to struggle against several teams in the regionals, and Bowie isn't as dominating as Ewing or Olajuwon. Kentucky's guards are also suspect.

So it will come down to the battle of the big "aircraft carriers" when Houston and Georgetown tangle Monday night in the title game.

And in the end, Ewing will be the one with the smile on his face.

Local professional bowler needs sponsor

Ed Petrie of Ruidoso wants to join the Professional Bowlers Association (PBA), but he needs some help getting into it.

Petrie is currently with the Southwest Classic Bowlers Association and has averaged 213 and 214 the past two seasons. He has a 229 average at the Carrizozo Recreation Center this season and bowls there weekly.

But he needs a sponsor to join the PBA.

"I have the second highest average in the Southwest Classic Bowlers Association," Petrie said. "I want to get into the PBA but I need a sponsor first."

"Without a sponsor, about the only way a bowler can afford to get into the

PBA is to be independently wealthy."

Someone who sponsors a professional bowler pays 100 percent of the expenses. However, it's all tax-deductible and the sponsor also gets a percentage of the winnings.

Petrie, 29, certainly has the background to warrant competing in the PBA.

Petrie got his start in bowling when he was living in Ohio as a youth.

He bowled his first game ever when he was five years old and scored a 121. He started bowling competitively when he was 12 years old. He played in the junior leagues there and had a 129 average his first year of competition.

Petrie also played team sports in high school, but bowling was his first

love.

Since then, the 6-0, 150-pound bowler has improved steadily almost every year.

This is Petrie's third season in the Southwest Classic. His average is high enough to get into the PBA. He has earned over \$3,000 the past two years competing just once a month.

He has had 15 sanctioned 300 games and over 50 more unsanctioned ones in his 17-year career.

Petrie, who works at Village Hardware in Ruidoso, lived in El Paso, Texas, for a while after getting out of the Army.

He belonged to the West Texas New Mexico Masters Association before joining the Southwest Classic.

Before Petrie can join the PBA, he has to attend a bowling school. It costs at least \$200.

"The school helps you in public relations, publicity and how to deal with the media," he said. "You're taught how to get along with everybody and to have a good image."

According to Petrie, the average bowler in the PBA makes around \$50,000 to \$70,000 a year. Some make over \$100,000.

"Pro bowling has come a long way," Petrie remarked. "It's got a better reputation than it used to have."

What does Petrie like best about bowling?

"The competition is good," he said. "The people are fantastic and the travel is excellent too. You get to see different parts of the country. But I like the competition the best."

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Third Condo Share officer found guilty

"I sort of feel like Ruidoso Condo Share has claimed another victim," said Tim Quigley, attorney for Donald Gardner, former sales manager for the Ruidoso Condo Share Vacation Club. Gardner was found guilty Monday on several fraud-related counts in District Court after the jury deliberated for three and a half hours.

"We're not at all pleased with the decision or verdict," Quigley said.

Gardner was found guilty on two counts of fraud over \$2,500, a third-degree felony; and one count each of criminal conspiracy, criminal solicitation and securities fraud, all fourth-degree felonies.

Third-degree felonies are punishable by up to three years in prison and a \$5,000 fine. Fourth-degree felonies are punishable by up to 18 months in prison and a \$5,000 fine.

Three Ruidoso Municipal School District board members voted Monday to seek bids for finishing work and athletic equipment at the new high school. They met in a special session Monday.

Because of an infestation of Western spruce budworm now present in forested areas of the Sacramento Mountains, spruce, Douglas fir, white fir or corkbark fir may be infested. Trees with top defoliation almost surely have the pest.

Through a cooperative effort, the U.S. Forest Service, N.M. State Forestry, and N.M. Department of Agriculture will spray private landowner's trees in late May or early June of this year if requested by the land owner to do so. This service will be available at 25 percent of cost or less.

If you wish to have this done, please come to the James Canyon fire station east of Clouderoff, on April 3, 4, or 5. Agency representatives will be there between the hours of 8:30 a.m. or 5 p.m. Please bring documents showing legal ownership and legal descriptions of your property.





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


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David Markum demonstrates how the Clearbrook water filter works. Markum is the Clearbrook salesman for the Ruidoso area.

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
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

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

SANTA FE—When it comes to getting the dough, the rest of the state can learn from the North.

In New Mexico, it's hard to define "the North" exactly. Like many things here, it's more of a state of mind than a geographical entity.

If you consider it as including the counties in the north-central part of the state such as Rio Arriba and Taos, and then you throw in Mora, San Miguel, Santa Fe, Guadalupe, Valencia and Socorro, plus the Valley areas of Bernalillo county, you've more or less got a picture of it.

Its representatives know how to wheel and deal.

Take that big bill which authorizes issuance of \$137 million in severance tax bonds, for example. It will set up more than 54 projects of various sizes around the state. Better than half of them are in the nine counties of the geographical area described above, leaving the rest to be apportioned out among the remaining 24 counties.

And you thought those conservative Senators, most of them from other areas, ran this year's Legislature.

What's more important, the dollar figures on the northern projects are big ones. They're not in the hundreds of thousands of dollars, like most of this year's authorizations are. They've got the long list of zeros after them.

How about \$13.25 million for sewer projects in Albuquerque's South Valley, represented by Senator Ron Olguin, one of the dissident Democrats who made the Senate coalition possible? And don't miss the \$4.5 million for a Taos community center and \$1 million for a waste water system at El Valle de los Ranchos; both of those are in there as sweeteners for Senator Francisco Gonzales, another Democrat that mostly Republican coalition had to hold onto.

Both those particular goodies for "El Comanche" Gonzales are so wildly out of line they are liable to be vetoed by Governor Anaya shortly after you read these words.

But they got in there. What's more, they lasted through all the negotiations between the House and the Senate.

In the North, there's rejoicing. Mayor Louis Montano of Santa Fe put his comment very directly: "No district in the state has prospered as well as we have."

He's probably accurate—and all those non-northern Senators and Representatives who cooperated to bring that about may find their local citizens asking questions about how it came to happen.

Oh, well. There's always next year.

That's pretty much of a shotgun wedding between Public Service Company of New Mexico and Gas Company of New Mexico—and like all such marriages, it will leave almost nobody happy.

Judge Sherman Finesilver appears to have been intent on restarting that five-year-old lawsuit between Gasco and some others, including PNM. He seems to have more or less told the utilities to lock themselves in and not come out till they made a deal.

The one they came up with will deliver Gasco, which has a book value of \$225 million, to Public Service Company for \$16 million less than that. PNM will pay \$83 million up front, with the rest to come over the next two years.

Governor Anaya, who has been following the case closely, was notably ungracious on being told of its consummation. About all he could find it in his heart to do was to huff that almost anybody would be a better owner for the gas company than Southern Union of Dallas, which evidently failed to establish a working relationship with the Anaya administration.

Lieutenant Governor Mike Runnels ended the session with a \$55,000 cut in the annual budget to run his office. He'll still get \$240,000 for the purpose.

That's not bad when you consider that before 1980 the budget never got above \$187,000, to fund the office of a part-time I.G. and three staffers.

Runnels now has a good excuse to fire some of his eight people the ones he thinks are not totally loyal to him and his career.

Thank you for the nice article you published in Mondays "News." I appreciated your interest in 'P and Z.'

Ruidoso has lost, with the removal of Greg Masters, Jim Paxton, Ray Bishop and now I find out Tom Kelham, a group of men that had Ruidoso at heart. Successful, business men that gave many hours each week for a better Ruidoso.

We all appreciated that those owners not wanting certain properties rezoned had an equal voice. We studied variances, sites and reasons as well as cause and effects of zoning changes. We all own property within Ruidoso and pay taxes.

I feel badly that Mayor George White must have had more pressure exerted on him to have us removed than the pressure exerted to place us on the commission.

It certainly has never been a secret, nor have I tried to hide the fact that I do not live within the corporate limits. In fact our home was on the Altrusa Tour of Homes in 1981 and they certainly never tried to indicate we were within the Village limits.

In your article you stated Mayor White only found out a few weeks ago about this problem. About 10 days before the last meeting of the past council Mayor White was in my office at the Charleston Square and told me that the problem existed. He also informed me that he instructed Leon Eggleston to place this on the back burner until the newly elected council was formed at which time he would try to amend the ordinance as far as residence requirements. Now whether he so instructed Mr. Eggleston I do not know.

I enjoyed serving Ruidoso on the Planning and Zoning Commission as well as APRC. I know that some of my voting was not always in 100 percent agreement with all concerned. However all approvals or disapprovals were majority vote—not one individual. I only wish that Mayor White had considered Ruidoso rather than being pressured—as he stated. He approached me to be a member—never did I ask him to be one. We retired to Ruidoso in 1978 and really enjoy all the amenities offered here.

I wish the newly appointed members of the various commissions the best of success and know that they will work for a better Ruidoso.

A person who just bought a \$50,000 vase would carefully package and secure it before embarking on a car trip with it. Our children are surely more precious than a vase and deserve equal consideration. Obviously, the woman who wrote the letter has not read the research on safety seats, nor has she seen the films showing what happens in accidents when the car seats are not used. The lives this law saves far outweighs the inconvenience some parents feel.

As for liability insurance - if a person cannot afford it, how are they going to afford to repair another party's car or pay their medical bills in case of an accident? Even the best drivers have accidents. A local insurance man gave a price range of 70-80 dollars every 6 months for an adult driver with a good driving record for the required insurance. Naturally the price is increased with a poor driving record - but aren't those the people who we really need protection from?

These are both excellent laws - the first protects innocent children who depend on their parents for safety, the second protects the victims of traffic accidents that are not their fault.

Reporter's Round

It's easy to forget that Ruidoso is not the center of the world.

Perched on this isolated mountain-top, the hub of activity in Lincoln County, our local issues and events tend to take on a larger than life aspect while the rest of the world slips into the background.

It is a shock, although a somewhat pleasant one, to be reminded that other towns, cities and nations exist—with their own concerns, failures and successes.

I have been lucky enough to travel to the outside world a couple of times this winter. Trips to Winter Park and Telluride, Colorado, reminded me that Ruidoso is not the only winter resort area in the world. Yes Dorothy, there is another world over Apache Summit. And it is full of ski areas competing for the winter tourist dollar.

I was impressed with both areas and think they have implemented some ideas and programs Ruidoso would do well to consider.

First impressions are powerful. My first impressions, over the telephone, of both those resorts were favorable.

On both occasions I knew almost nothing about the areas I planned to visit, and certainly nothing about lodging there.

In both cases I called the central reservation service listed with directory assistance, told them my plans and the type of accommodations I wanted. In both cases, one five-minute call and a credit card number was all I needed to arrange a place to stay.

At Winter Park the same number can get you ski rental, ski school and lift ticket reservations as well. I don't know about Telluride.

It was so easy. Much easier than obtaining a list of lodging establishments, making several phone calls to find vacant rooms and prices, then deciding where to stay. As a first-time visitor to the two resorts, I got a very positive introduction.

Getting to Winter Park was another lesson in tourist accommodation. I flew into Stapleton airport in Denver, and found several bus services that offered four to five daily buses to the resort. After the bus dropped me at the central reservation office in town, another van from a local hotel picked me up and took me to my room. Deluxe! I loved it.

Bus service through Winter Park and to the ski area three miles away stopped at the hotel every 20 minutes, all day and into the night. I never once used a car in Winter Park, and didn't really miss it. In Telluride, we were asked not to use our cars—to rely on the public transportation that traveled to the ski area.

Granted, the lengthy and winding road to Sierra Blanca Ski Resort

makes frequent public transportation a difficult problem. But not necessarily impossible.

Recent discussions about a tramway from close to town to Sierra Blanca raised some exciting ideas. And there must be some other ideas for getting the skier easily and safely up the hill.

Some sort of shuttle service from El Paso or Albuquerque seems to have a real potential for transforming Ruidoso from an almost completely car-dependent resort to one that people could fly to.

The Colorado ski areas themselves were impressive. Telluride did not have much of a base area, but the lodge halfway up the mountain was a beautifully remodeled set of old ranch buildings. High ceilings, heavy beam construction, lots of windows and all-weather carpet.

I especially enjoyed the windows, from which I could watch the changing weather on the mountain, and skiers performing their slopeside comedies and dramas. Eagle Creek ski owner Paul Southwick once commented to me that people enjoy sitting around after skiing—talking about their day on the slopes and watching others come down the hill—almost as much as they enjoy actually skiing.

I think his new lodge, with huge windows looking out on the hill, has provided an excellent place for that.

The all-weather carpet throughout most of the lodge at Telluride made it a warm place with no slippery or puddled floors—a real refuge from the raging winter outside.

At Winter Park there were employees constantly roaming the base lodge with dustpans, picking up any stray pieces of trash. It was a clean, warm place with an excellent view of the hill.

Of course Winter Park is one of the oldest ski areas in the Rockies, and has quite a head start on Ruidoso. Telluride is smaller, but definitely has some money pouring into its development.

But the attitude is what I guess impressed me as much as anything. As a first-time visitor to both ski areas, I found it very easy to have an enjoyable vacation, and felt very welcomed by the community.

There also appeared to be a true sense of cooperation between the merchants, ski areas and lodging establishments. All for the benefit of the visitors, and eventually the business people who benefit from increased tourist traffic.

It would be neat to see Ruidoso, Sierra Blanca, Eagle Creek and maybe the Inn of the Mountain Gods working together so well. Whatever came of that idea to combine efforts to attract tourists and conventioneers?

When they slaughtered their pigs, and beef, they would kill enough to last them a year. Lem had five brothers and five sisters.

He rode a horse to school four miles. He attended classes until the tenth grade.

Salee was first married when he was 20, and soon had four daughters. He moved to Ruidoso in 1934, because "It was the most beautiful place he had ever seen." When he moved here he brought his own horses, and other equipment, and made Salee Stables, near Carriage

Creek. He said the business was really good because the people had nothing else to do. He had trails all over the territory up here, where he saw animals such as deer, turkeys, and all kinds of wild horses.

The winters back then were very long and cold, but whenever they needed wood, they would just go and cut some, when they needed feed they would just go and kill it with the .30.30 rifle.

He had the only heavy truck in the area back then, so he hauled livestock and wood for other people. From his stables towards Ruidoso Downs the only buildings up there were the old mill and the Armstrong's general store.

Salee said Ruidoso has grown so much since he moved here that he doesn't recognize the progress now.



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
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
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Capitan combines science, art



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
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
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

Miss Mitedo did!

Miss Mitedo lunged into the lead shortly after the break and ran aggressively the rest of the way while scoring a half-length victory in the March 25 finale of the \$192,547 West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park.

She earned \$67,391 for her owner, J.W. Ham of Odessa, Texas, and stamped herself as possibly a major contender for the upcoming Sun Country Futurity as well as those Triple Crown races at Ruidoso Downs this summer.

The amount disbursed in the West Texas finale was \$164,435.

Miss Mitedo is trained by the up-and-comer, Larry Keiter. The veteran pilot Larry Byers turned in a first-rate job aboard the filly.

In the West Texas Futurity trials two weeks earlier, Miss Mitedo was pretty well ignored by Sunland Patrons, and got away at 11-1. She came through with a two-length victory and the top qualifying time of 16.715 seconds.

Sunland patrons apparently figured that performance was no fluke, and made the filly a 2-1 favorite in the finale. Aided by a brisk tailwind, she zipped over the 330-yard course in 16.69 seconds—which set a new seasonal record. (The previous mark was the filly's top-qualifying time.)

The West Texas champion returned wagering payoffs of \$6, \$3.40 and \$3.60, and increased her career record to a perfect three-for-three. Bugs Bright Kitten, just over 5-1 in the betting, ran an even race all the way, and ended up second for a paycheck of \$30,807. Kevin Cogburn was up for Max D. Webb and E.L. Botkin of Farmington. The payoffs:

\$5, \$5.40;

Rich Classic Lady, a 40-1 longshot, made up considerable ground to finish third. The filly hit the wire a half-length behind Bugs Bright Kitten. Gary Sumpter was up. Third was worth \$15,788. The filly is the property of Everett B. Stamm of Benkelman, Nebraska.

Here's the remaining order of finish, with purse-money earned: 4th—Showing Easy, \$8,279; 5th—Save My Soul, \$7,509; 6th—deadheat between Miss Handy Bug and Daddy Hold On, each earning \$7,220; 8th—Faith Luck An Hope, \$6,931; 9th—Rocky Rich, \$6,739. Truckle Wind was scratched, but still earned \$8,546.

Miss Mitedo broke alertly in second place, but appeared to skid a bit and drifted quickly toward the inside. Jockey Byers steadied the filly, then asked her to begin bearing down. She quickly took off after the early leader, Bugs Bright Kitten, and passed that one rapidly.

At the halfway point, Miss Mitedo was moving in high gear, safely in control, and well out of reach of the late-charging Rich Classic Lady and Showing Easy. The latter pair had to make up at least several lengths throughout the final portions of the dash.

Miss Handy Bug, the second-best qualifier, got into hot water from the start when she broke just off the lead and found herself in fourth place. The filly tried gamely to reach a contending position but after covering half the journey, she had little more to give and slipped into the pack.

Miss Mitedo is by Kaweah Sunrise out of Decks Dainty Lady.

During the hectic win-circle ceremony, trainer Keiter looked all-business as he carefully adjusted the victory blanket on his champion filly. But he suddenly showed his real feelings by kissing the filly on the neck—in tender and obvious gratitude. So far as Keiter's career as a trainer is concerned, the triumph was a milestone.

Keiter, 29, had these post-race views: "This is the best thing that's

happened to me in three years of training. It sure is a good feeling. We knew our filly had a good chance if she didn't make any mistakes. She didn't break as well as we would have liked, but once she got rolling, she really moved."

Jockey Byers noted: "She didn't break as sharply as I had hoped, but she was with the leaders at the start. They had her beat a half-length, maybe three-quarters. But then she really started to run. She had a good final kick."

Kaweah Sunrise, the sire of Miss Mitedo, is a stakes-placed stallion who is now eight years old and stands at the Big C Ranch in Avon, Utah. He earned some \$57,000 in his racing career.

Rich Classic Lady has already proved to be a tremendous bargain, since she was purchased for only \$17,000 in the 1983 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs.

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Easy Demand, easily

Easy Demand, a gelding who has done all of his running at Sunland Park, jumped into sudden prominence by setting the top qualifying time for the \$92,836 West Texas Derby.

This was the main development of Friday's program, which included five 400-yard elimination trials for one of the nation's key early season stakes events for sophomore quarter horses.

Easy Demand, ridden by Jerry Nicodemus, got a heads-up start from the rail post in Friday's fourth race and stayed on top all the way. He hit the finish line with a length lead at almost 7-2 odds and halted the timing equipment in 19.645 seconds.

That time held up as the fastest of the day and just might be impressive enough to install Easy Demand as the favorite for the Derby finale which

comes up on Sunday, April 8. The gelding, owned and trained by H. Don Farris of Sunland Park, started his career last Spring at Sunland Park. Friday's outing was the sixth of his career, and his third win. The mutual payoffs: \$8.60, \$5, \$3.60.

Sassy Wrangler (23-1) and Warm Thoughts (11-1) chased Easy Demand under the wire, and both were pulled into the list of 10 qualifiers.

The main surprise among the trial heats was Bubby Bobbie, who raced as a 1-2 favorite on the strength of her wins in two major Sunland events: the All-American Sale Futurity and the Sunland Fall Quarter Horse Futurity. But the filly faded to fifth in the third race and dropped out of the West Texas Derby picture.

Pic-Six betting starting Friday

Pic-Six wagering, which has revitalized California racetracks, is coming to Sunland Park.

"Pic-Six wagering begins on Friday (March 30)," announced Sunland Park general manager H. Rick Henson. "The fans in our area have shown they enjoy a chance to bet a little and collect a lot. The Pic-Six certainly offers them this opportunity."

Henson said the fifth through 10th races will be included in the Pic-Six. He added that trifecta wagering (where patrons must select the first three finishers in the exact order) will continue to be used on the eighth and 12th events each day.

The Pic-Six wagering has produced some massive payoffs at California racetracks, mainly through the advent of the carry-over pool. If no one has all six winners on one day's program, part of the Pic-Six wagering pool is carried over to the next racing day, to be included in that day's additional Pic-Six wagering pool.

One person won a California record \$488,396 on January 11 at Bay Meadows near San Francisco on the seventh carry-over day. Hollywood Park near Los Angeles paid a Pic-Six of \$466,157 last July 4.

Henson said Sunland Park would employ the carry-over pool to increase Pic-Six payoffs.

"Half of each day's net Pic-Six pool will go to those patrons who have selected six winners. The other half of

the pool will go to persons who have picked the second most number of winners, but less than six," he said.

If no one picks six winners, half the pool goes to the players selecting the most winners. The other half will be carried over to the next day's Pic-Six pool. This carry-over process will continue each racing day until someone picks six winners, he noted.

In the event of a scratch, the actual wagering favorite in the race will be substituted for the scratched horse, Henson said.

The betting process will work like this: Patrons will attempt to pick the winners of six straight races, the fifth through the tenth. The Pic-Six is a \$2 bet for one horse in six races. But if a patron desires more than one horse in a race, the cost will naturally be increased. Two horses in each race will cost \$128.

To figure the cost, simply take the number of horses selected in each race. If you have one horse in the fifth, two in the sixth, one in the seventh, three in the eighth, two in the ninth and all 10 in the tenth, simply multiply 1 times 2 times 1 times 3 times 2 times 10, which equals 120. Take that times two dollars and the total cost is \$240.

Sunland Park has installed specially designated mutual equipment supplied by the American Totalisator Company for Pic-Six wagering. Special Pic-Six wagering selection

cards will also be available.

The special wagering selection cards are to be filled in with each patron marking the program number of the horse in each race he desires. The cards can be marked with pencil or pen with blue or black ink.

After completing their cards, patrons will take them to the clearly designated Pic-Six mutual windows. The teller inserts the wagering cards in the machine, and the machine instantly calculates the cost and issues a Pic-Six wagering ticket.

"It's a very simple process. We expect no problems at all. All the cards must be in before the fifth race each day," Henson said.

Just as in the regular pari-mutuel wagering, the payoffs are determined by the number of patrons who wager on the winners. The more people who pick winners, the more will share in the Pic-Six distribution and the payoffs will be smaller. If fewer people have the right combinations, the payoffs will be greater.

Henson said Southwestern horse racing fans have always been enthusiastic over exotic wagering.

"Our two trifecta payoffs are now our largest wagering pools. The daily double has traditionally been a popular bet as are quinelas. We're sure the excitement of a challenging wager like the Pic-Six will prove extremely popular."

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Sunland Park Hoofbeats

THE SECOND TRIAL RACE was the place to be for West Texas Derby hopefuls during Friday's five trial heats for the season's first major test for three-year-old quarter horses. Six of the 10 finalists competed in the fourth race and gained entrance to the 13th running of this rich race for sophomores. The 400-yard dash is set for Sunday, April 8, with the winner set to collect \$46,318.41 from the total purse of \$92,636.83. Easy Demand, an Easy Dozen gelding, was the fastest qualifier with a 19.645 clocking while taking the second trial heat by one-length. Easy Demand is owned and trained by H. Don Farris, one of quarter horse racing's outstanding trainers, and was ridden by veteran rider Jerry Nicodemus. The Oklahoma-bred dasher was bred by Farris and Nicodemus, making Easy Demand one of the personal favorites of the two veteran horsemen. Easy Demand has started just six times in his brief career, capturing three victories with one second. Others who trailed Easy Demand yet gained finalist positions included Sassy Wrangler (second); Warm Thoughts (third); On A Stormy Day (fourth); Heavy Rail (fifth); and BCR Hempens Baby (sixth). Three trainers, Jack W. Brooks, J.B. Montgomery and Howard Peterson each qualified two three-year-olds in the finale. Brooks has Warm Thoughts, a Kitaman filly, and Patti Dash, a Dash For Cash filly; while Montgomery has Sassy Wrangler, a daughter of 1970 All-American Futurity winner Rocket Wrangler, and Amazing Prophecy, an Aforethought colt. Peterson qualified Truly A Bunny, a Bunny Mackay colt and BCR Hempens Baby, a daughter of the speedy Hempen. Sassy Wrangler had the second-fastest qualifying time with a 19.765 while Kingdom Jet, who was supplemented into the trials at a cost

of \$5,000, had the third-fastest clocking with a 19.770 reading. Only one of the five wagering favorites reached the finals. BCR Hempens Baby, who was launched as a \$1.70-1 choice, finished sixth in the second heat, yet reached the West Texas Derby with the eighth-fastest clocking (19.910). The biggest moneymaker of the 10 Derby horses will be On A Stormy Day, a Rocket Wrangler filly who is trained by Fred I. Danley and owned by Larry Stephenson of Wichita, Kansas. She won six races with three seconds and three thirds from 16 outings as a two-year-old in 1982 and earned \$129,164. She collected \$73,500 for running sixth in last Labor Day's \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs. Although she finished fourth in the second division, that was her first start since October. She tied for the fifth-fastest qualifying time with a 19.850.

CURRIBOT, last summer's thoroughbred horse-of-the-meet at Ruidoso Downs, looked like his old self in capturing his 1984 New Mexico debut in impressive fashion. The seven-year-old son of 1974 Preakness and Belmont Stakes winner Little Current, roared through the stretch to take a widening one-length victory over Starhitch, who turned in a good effort. Curribot, who was ridden by Casey Lambert, set a seasonal fastest clocking for the mile distance. He caught the mile in a fine 1:37 3-5, less than two seconds off the track record of 1:35 4-5 set by Cabin Fleur in 1962. Curribot had started three times this year at Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Arkansas; before beginning his New Mexico campaign. He's trained by J. Doyal Roberts for owner Juliana Winters of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. As the 3-5 wagering choice, Curribot paid \$3.20 to win.

PLAY MOODYS GAME, a \$57.80-1 outsider in Friday's first division of the West Texas Derby trials, set a seasonal high show payoff return and triggered one of the highest quinela returns of the season. The three-year-old Game Plan filly finished second, just a nose behind the \$16.20-1 outsider, Poppy Express, who won the 400-yard dash. Only \$14 of the \$1,549 show pool was wagered on Play Moodys Game. She paid \$35.60 to place and \$47.80 to show. The previous highest show payoff this season was \$38.80 on Fall Command on February 11. The combination of Poppy Express and Play Moodys Game paid \$923.60 for the quinela.

POPPY EXPRESS was ridden by Richard Bickel for trainer Willie J. Hunt and owners W.E. Ball and Betty J. Wallace of Garland, Texas. Ramon Apodaca was aboard Play Moodys Game for trainer Alberto Dominguez and owner Bill C. Sommers of Andrews, Texas.

LEVI LOVE TIED a seasonal fastest time while drawing out for a four and one-half length victory in Friday's eighth race at six and one-half furlongs. The seven-year-old Pro of Me Stealing was clocked in 1:17 3-5 while defeating nine four-year-old and older horses running for a \$5,000 claiming price. That clocking tied the time set by Tonkawa Charger on December 30. Levi Love was ridden by O.A. Martinez Jr. for owner-trainer James C. Elam of Anthony, New Mexico. As the \$3.30-1 second wagering risk, Levi Love returned \$8.60 to win.

KITA BLUE, one of the better three-year-old quarter horses to campaign in southern New Mexico last

year, made his four-year-old racing debut a winning one by gaining a half-length victory in Saturday's ninth race at 350 yards. Ridden by Jerry Burgess, the four-year-old Kitaman horse defeated seven allowance runners in 17:87. Kita Blue won four races with one second and three thirds from 12 outings, in 1983 for trainer Jack W. Brooks and earned \$63,232 for owners Sonny and Betty Terry of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. He ran third in last April's \$94,604 West Texas Derby at Sunland Park. As the 4-5 wagering favorite on Saturday, Kita Blue paid \$3.60 to win.

BARLOW BLADE SET a seasonal fastest time while scoring a courageous nose win over favored Yates Landing in Sunday's third race. The two-year-old Plucky Blade filly was clocked in :46 while winning the half-mile sprint for two-year-old New Mexico-bred maidens. Ridden by Mike Lidberg, the filly is trained by Bob E. Arnett for owners R.A. Canning and Clayton Hurst of T. Or C. Yates Landing, a Platoon Leader colt, was purchased for \$33,000 in the 1983 Summer Select Sale For Thoroughbred Yearlings at Ruidoso Downs. As the \$2.80-1 third-wagering choice, Barlow Blade paid \$7.60 to win.



APPRENTICE JOCKEY Eugene O'Neill rode three winners on Sunday's program. He started in the eighth with Mossy Road (\$23.00) for trainer Johnnie L. Jamison, then won the tenth with Hainesville (\$37.00) for trainer Jim L. Boss and captured the twelfth on Miss Party Twist (\$56.00) for trainer Darrell E. Fallier.

MISS MITEDO set a seasonal fastest clocking when she scooted to a half-length victory in Sunday's featured \$192,547 West Texas Futurity at 330 yards. She was clocked in 16.69, aided by a moderate tailwind. The former 330-yard standard was a 16.715 she recorded while winning her trial race on March 9. Ridden by Larry Byers, she's trained by Larry Keiter and owned by J.W. Ham of Odessa, Texas. As the 2-1 wagering choice, she paid \$6.00 to win.

Consolation to Monchichi

Monchichi broke sluggishly in Saturday's \$28,111 West Texas Futurity Consolation at Sunland Park, but the filly made up for it with a big charge in the final yards.

The late attack propelled Monchichi into a three-quarter length lead on the last jump of the 330-yard journey, and enriched her bank account by \$5,776.

Monchichi raced in the Consolation as part of a four-head entry trained by Jack W. Brooks. Danny Carodoza was in the saddle. The Consolation champ is by Hy Lucky Jay out of Kitalfa, and is the property of Jon F. Brannon of Choctaw, Oklahoma.

The filly's stablemate, Call For Kate, finished second under Larry Byers while Leading Jet, a 4-1 shot, ended up third (only a head behind Call For Kate). The runner-up purse amounted to \$4,043, while third yielded a paycheck of \$3,080. Casey Lambert was up on Leading Jet.

Call For Kate, owned by Roy Browning of Fort Worth, Texas, opened a solid early lead and was able to resist a challenge (at the half-way point) by Leading Jet. The latter is

owned by LeRoy Spires Jr. of Snyder, Texas.

But Call For Kate didn't have enough reserve energy to beat off Monchichi when that one hit her best stride on the far outside. Monchichi grabbed the lead about a half-dozen jumps from the wire and stopped the clock in 16.97 seconds.

A mutuel oddity developed in the Consolation as the result of the early declaration of Sure Casady, the late scratching of Tee Two Uno, Truckie Stop and Native Deckette, and by the fact the four head (Monchichi, Call For Kate, Bowettalee and Cruising Moon) were linked as a betting entry.

The final result was that there were only three betting interests in the six-head field, which obviously called for the elimination of show wagering. Monchichi and Call For Kate returned \$3.40 and \$2.20, for quinela

payoff purposes. Leading Jet (who ran third) was linked with the entry, setting up a quinela return of \$8.60.

Bowettalee earned \$2,988 for fourth. The Censor collected \$2,695 for fifth. Cruising Moon earned \$2,310 for sixth. The four horses which did not run each earned \$1,829.

In Saturday's mile headliner, Curribot—who performed brilliantly at Ruidoso last summer and ran up '83 earnings of over \$100,000—made a triumphant return to Southwest racing. He easily pulled away from Starhitch (winner of the recent El Paso Times Handicap) to win by a length.

Curribot was timed in a torrid 1:37 3/5 seconds, which was a new seasonal record by nearly a second. The previous mark was set at 1:38 2/5 by Tonkawa Charger. Fans who backed Curribot on Saturday collected a low \$3.20 to win.

Talented runners lead Ruidoso boys, distance crops top strength

Several talented individuals who could rank among the best athletes in the state will lead the Ruidoso High School boys track team this spring.

Cisco Bob in the 1,500 meters and junior Curt McClellan in the 800 meters should challenge for the state title in their events this season.

Bob, a junior, took second in the state AAA division meet last spring, while McClellan—another junior—finished third in the 800 meters as a sophomore last season.

The talented duo form the core of an outstanding middle distance-long distance Warriors' running team.

Other talented distance runners include Francisco Olvera and Gabe Tam. Olvera is a sophomore and Tam is just a freshman. Both runners competed on the Ruidoso cross-country team last fall.

"That'll be one of our strong points," said Warrior head coach Ronny Maskew about his distance runners. "That and maybe the long jump, the way some of our

guys are practicing there.

"I think we'll be as strong as last year. Maybe a little stronger later in the year in some events like the relays."

There are some question marks for the Warriors elsewhere, but Maskew and assistant Jim Ramsey have a lot of promising talent to work with.

Seniors Eric Strobel and Steve Snidow return in the sprints. Sophomore Ryan Frost and senior Mark Johnston also could help out in the short races and relays. Freshman Billy Harrison has potential and could help the Warriors a lot this season.

Johnston is also a fine long jumper, having gone 19-2 in practice and 19-11 in the first meet of the season.

Sophomore Russell Easter, one of the finest athletes at the school, will be a candidate in the long jump and hurdles. He has excellent potential in the intermediate hurdles.

George Gresham, who finished fourth in the District 3-AAA shot put competition last season, mov-

ed to Arizona. Still, the Warriors have several fine weight prospects.

Manuel Montano, a powerfully built junior, has looked good in the weights and is also a good high hurdler and sprinter. Junior Chip Ramsey is another returning veteran in the shot put and discus. Harrison will probably compete in the weights, too.

Junior Tracy Gann could be a good prospect in the high jump. Gann is 6-3 and has a lot of ability.


White Mountain Middle School also will have a track team this

Ruidoso girl thinclads lack depth, but have outstanding individuals

Ruidoso High School's girls track team won't have a lot of athletes competing this spring, so head coach Sergio Castanon hopes to get excellent performances from the athletes he does have.

"The only way we could take second again is if the girls we have do an outstanding job all-around," Castanon said.

Castanon and assistant coach Pixie Arthur only have around 15 athletes to work with, but several of them competed on last year's team. Ruidoso has finished second in the District 3-AAA meet the past two seasons and Castanon was named coach of the year in 1982.

Deanna Peso finished seventh in the state 800 meters last season and ran a leg on the Warrior 1,600-meter relay team that finished fifth with a 4:16.90 time at the big meet. Peso will probably concentrate on the 800 meters and 3,000 meters this season.

Peso is a senior and has plenty of big-meet experience behind her.

Rachel Kaydezhinne and Berdine Smith are other promising distance runners and should get a lot of competition this season.

State meet veterans Valerie Garcia and Gia Rose moved away so the Warriors will probably be hurting in the relay events. Garcia was one of the top relay an-

chorwomen in the state and Rose was a versatile runner.

A big plus for Ruidoso this season could be transfer Kim Daniels. Daniels, a sprinter, ran on a fast relay team in Midland, Texas, last season.

"She could be one of the best sprinters in the district this season," said Castanon of Daniels.

Diane McClure, an all-district basketball player, is a good shot putter and discus thrower. She competed in those events in Texas last season.

Veteran Lillian Lopez should help out in the weight events and the relay. She has also competed in the state meet before and could be one of the best shot put-discus throwers in the state before the season ends.

Lopez has already thrown the shot put 33-5 this season, her best effort ever.

Other Warrior athletes who could do well are Keri Pate, Kerry Gladden, Lana McClure, Felicia Childress, Laura Trapp and Katherine Sanchez.

Sanchez won the long jump in the Eunice Invitational (the season opener) and is also a fine hurdler.


Herd, Tiffany Huey and Becky Huey teamed with Patti Huey (now graduated) to finish third in the 1,600-meter relay.
