Annexation dies in P Z

Parliamentary procedure caught the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) by surprise Monday when an annexation petition was refused without ever coming to a vote.

After close to an hour's discussion, dominated by residents opposed to the annexation, P&Z member Tom Kelham's motion to approve the annexation of 102.5 acres of land between Alpine Village and Forest Heights died for lack of a second.

P&Z members were informed by village clerk Leon Eggleston several minutes later—after more discussion and another motion in favor of the annexation—that the unseconded motion served as a denial of the annexation.

With or without a vote, the annexation petition by Ruidoso Land Company appeared in trouble after several nearby landowners voiced their opposition.

Most of the opposition, and the commission's zoning and development on the proposed zoning, centered on the land. A preliminary annexation plat showed the land divided into mobile home lots with a recreational vehicle park in the center and a proposed motel and apartment complex in another area.

Although developer Keith Mills had agreed to create a single-family residential buffer zone along the property adjoining the Forest Heights Subdivision, residents were still opposed to the mobile home lots and the RV park.

Forest Heights is zoned for single-family residential homes. The land proposed for annexation was originally a part of the Lincoln National Forest, but Ruidoso Land Company acquired the land a few years ago in an exchange with the U.S. Forest Service.

Forest Heights residents also expressed concern about increased traffic and lowered property values if the property were developed as proposed.

P&Z chairman Greg Masters pointed out that the property would probably be developed with or without the annexation. If the property was not annexed, the subdivision

could be developed under less stringent Lincoln County subdivision regulations, said Masters.

The commission appeared to be in favor of the annexation, but concerned about the zoning and development. P&Z member Margaret Gaddy suggested tabling the motion, but commission member James Paxton said the commission had agreed to come to a decision at Monday's meeting.

The commission tabled the petition two weeks ago to study it further. Members discussed approving the annexation with a zoning recommendation different than requested, but Paxton said they should vote on the annexation as presented.

Paxton, who works for the real estate company listing the property, informed the commission that he would abstain from voting on the issue.

"It's now destined to be a county subdivision more than likely," said Kelham after being informed that his unseconded motion served as a denial.

While the commission did not approve the annexation, it did grant change in use for two businesses in Ruidoso.

It approved a change for the Ruidoso Inn to time-share condominiums and Jerry Dale's bar to a bowling alley.

Peter Sullivan, representing Ruidoso Inn, said the Reddington Investment Group planned to convert the 101 motel rooms into 58 condominiums during four phases of construction. The company would also add a tennis court, a children's play area and an adult exercise area, said Sullivan.

He assured P&Z members that the Reddington Investment Group would keep close control over the management of the time shares.

There was some question about adequate parking and green space. The commission approved the request provided all questions about meeting building codes were cleared up in writing when the measure went before the village council for final approval.

Jerry Bigham informed the commission that he would continue to offer bar service and a restaurant at the proposed bowling alley. The alley will

have 10 lanes and serve a maximum of 100 to 150 people at one time, said Bigham.

The bar now can accommodate up to 600 people, said Bigham. Although he plans to open the bowling alley earlier in the day than the bar currently opens, P&Z members agreed it would create less traffic and parking impact on the neighborhood.

In other business, P&Z: —Approved a rezoning from C (commercial) to C-1 (light commercial) for property on Mechem Drive between Course View Drive and Terrace Street. The change in zoning restricts the type of commercial development allowed on the properties.

—Denied a sign permit for Taco Villa because all signs were to be put on one side of a building that the Taco Villa representative claims sits on a corner. The commission split three for and three against the permit, with chairman Masters casting the deciding negative vote.

—Denied an 18-foot front lot line variance for T. G. Herring. It was brought out that his carport would be only two feet from the front lot line and would not provide adequate safety for entrance and exit. The carport was already under construction without a permit when Planning and Zoning representatives stopped work. It was noted.

—Approved a 10-foot vacation of right of way and side lot line variance for the Laboratory of Clinical Medicine. Attorney Nancy Cusack said the current owners did not know part of their house extended onto the K street right of way, which has never been used. The commission left it to the village council to determine a price for the land to be vacated.

—Approved a replat from several lots into two commercial lots between the Village Inn Pancake House and the Ruidoso Inn for John Pennington.

—Approved a replat of Lot 133A, Block BB, and Lot 107, Block B, Sleepy Hollow Subdivision. A lot line was moved 16 feet on the Upper Canyon properties to alleviate an encroachment by one house.

—Formed committees to study proposed apartment zoning and minimum commercial lot sizes.

Crowd for downtown meeting

Spurred by examples of other cities' efforts, close to 60 Ruidoso residents Wednesday night pointed out problems and offered suggestions for improving the midtown shopping area.

Midtown merchants and others mentioned narrow sidewalks, delivery trucks, through traffic, landscaping, street lighting, parking and pedestrian traffic as areas that need attention in the central business district.

Representatives of the BRW planning firm wrote down many of the suggestions and promised to incorporate them into the comprehensive master plan they are formulating for Ruidoso.

"The input you have given is going to be tremendously valuable," Planning and Zoning Commission chairman Greg Masters told the audience gathered at village hall.

BRW representatives John McNamara and Rick Pilgrim outlined what they are currently doing in the formulation of a transportation and comprehensive plan, then showed examples of downtown revitalizations

in a number of other cities around the country.

The transportation plan is one of six elements of the comprehensive plan, which also includes the formulation of a land use plan, a zoning map, housing plan, commerce and industry plan and public facilities.

McNamara said they are currently working on data collection for the plan, and will later address goals and objectives, plan elements, and implementation guide.

McNamara said the 20- to 30-year plan for Ruidoso's development should be finished around February 1985. Ruidoso is paying BRW \$100,000 to complete the plan.

Pilgrim said BRW has advanced furthest on the transportation plan because it is of special importance in Ruidoso.

"You have some serious physical problems as well as some developing problems," said Pilgrim. He specifically pointed out Ruidoso's traffic accident rate, which Ruidoso police chief Dick Swenor confirmed is the greatest for any city this size in New Mexico.

A slide presentation outlined the planning and financial process for revitalizing downtown areas, and showed both low and high dollar ex-

amples from small farm communities to large metropolitan areas.

"There are a whole range of opportunities you can be looking at," McNamara told the audience.

The examples included renovated old buildings, storefront rehabilitations, sidewalk improvements and enlargements, building murals, planters, benches and organized merchant associations.

Both McNamara and the Ruidosians in attendance appeared pleased with the turnout and suggestions. McNamara said he had been working on a new comprehensive plan in Roswell for 18 months and had never had 60 people attend a meeting there.

"Marvelous. All you've got to get is some cooperation and it's amazing what you can accomplish," said council member John Underwood during the meeting.

"I think it's great," said businessman Gary Hall, who noted he appreciated the concentrated community effort to improve the downtown area.

Both McNamara and Pilgrim emphasized that they are always open to public input on the plan, and will conduct more public meetings in the future.

Candidates file for elective offices

Candidates for all county offices, state representative and state senator, and district judgeships filed their intentions to run for office Tuesday.

Candidates who filed for the position of county commissioner of District I included incumbent Kenneth Nosker, a Republican, and Ralph R. Dunlap, a Democrat. In the race for county commissioner of District II are Frankie Silva, a Democrat, and A. W. Gnatkowski, a Republican. Incumbent Bill Elliott was the only candidate who filed for the position of county commissioner from District III.

Filing for the position of county clerk were Fran Siddens, a Republican, Carol Schlarb, a Democrat, and Charlotte Jarratt, also a Democrat. Candidates who filed for the position of probate judge included R. L. Van Norman, a

Democrat, and Lee Jacqueline Martin, also a Democrat.

Competing for the position of county treasurer are Alice Mignon Sims, a Republican, and Flora S. Vega, also a Republican. Filing in the race for county sheriff were incumbent Tom Sullivan, a Democrat, John M. McIntyre, a Republican, and Ernest S. Sanchez, also a Republican.

Marion L. Schlarb was the only candidate who filed for the position of county assessor. Filing for the position of magistrate judge of Division I were incumbent Bettye Dean, a Democrat, and S. M. Ortiz, also a Democrat.

Candidates filing for New Mexico Senate in District 39 (Lincoln-Socorro-Otero counties) were Democrats Wilton Howell and Rey Serna, and Republican James L. Martin. Filing for the state House of Representatives from District 56 (Eddy-Chaves-Lincoln counties) were Democrats Marvin B. "Mickey"

McGuire (incumbent) and Anita Sanders, and Republicans Ben Hall, Fred Collins and David E. Barratt. Filing for the House of Representatives from District 52 were Democrats Neil R. Baird Sr. and Noel B. Mauldin and Republican Maurice Hobson, incumbent.

Filing in the race for district judge from District 12, Division 1, were Democrat Norman D. Bloom Jr. and Republican Sandra A. Grisham, in Division 2, Democrat Robert Doughty, incumbent, in Division 3, Democrat Billy Gene Payne and Republican Richard A. Parsons.

Filing for a seat in the Eighth District (Torrance-Lincoln-DeBaca-Chaves-Eddy counties) on the state Board of Education were Democrats J. James Sanchez and James L. Shuler.

Candidates who are contested in their own parties will run in the June 5 primary, and the general election will follow in November.

CPR classes offered to groups

Jim Stover and other people who provide health care want to make April a CPR month in Ruidoso.

CPR, short for cardio-pulmonary resuscitation, can save lives. Stover and his cohorts want to train the public to save more lives.

"We'd like to get as many people out there trained in CPR as possible," Stover said. He is the ambulance service director.

Emergency Medical Service technicians want to teach short CPR courses to people who work at restaurants and in other businesses, and to service organizations.

Classes will be set up for any group that requests one. They can be conducted at the place of business or meeting place of the group, or at the hospital. Days and hours are flexible.

"CPR really isn't that hard," Stover said. Teenagers can learn it during an eight- to nine-hour class.

Ordinary people who learn CPR—the ones who call ambulances or start CPR after a heart attack—are the first leg of a vital triangle.

They provide basic life support for heart attack victims. One important aspect is to keep people from getting excited. Members of the public are also the ones who must learn when to act, and what to do.

The public needs to know the emergency telephone number in their area, Stover said. In Ruidoso, it's 257-9111. Stover suggested people put it on their telephone, because even a minute wasted makes a difference.

"Cardiac victims must get immediate attention, long before we get there," Stover said.

EMS ambulance staffers are the next leg of the triangle. They give advanced life support. The final leg is the Emergency Room staff at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

"If you can give basic life support within four minutes and advanced life support within eight minutes, you can save 40 percent of the victims who are dying now," Stover said.

EMS can usually respond in this area in less than eight minutes. Also, "the hospital is geared up." The Intensive Care Unit is staffed with Advanced Cardiac Life Support-certified people.

That's why the medical people want to strengthen the public, the

first leg of the triangle. The CPR classes will help.

The hospital will provide materials, with Leala Newsome spearheading the effort. She is the management education specialist.

EMS people will teach the classes. Stover warned, "They may have to drop everything and run to answer a call during the class."

Another aid to the public will be posters about how to help choking victims. Stover's goal is getting them into every restaurant in town.

His goal for the CPR courses is to reach one of every four permanent

residents in the area. When that happened in Seattle, Washington, the death rate plunged.

In Ruidoso, tourists and horsemen will soon pour into town. "We're coming into racing season, where we tend to get more emergencies," Stover pointed out.

"I feel a good spirit of cooperation. In general, this area has an attitude of caring," Stover said.

Anyone interested in arranging a free CPR class may telephone 257-7381—extension 290 or extension 316. The only charge to participants is 50 cents if they keep their class manuals.

Ponderosa easement holdouts tell side

Holdouts on the Ponderosa Heights sewer easements claim they are not opposed to the sewer, just the way the village is going about it.

The Village of Ruidoso has initiated condemnation proceedings against 64 property owners for easements on 30 pieces of property for the construction of a sewer system in Ponderosa Heights Subdivision.

The village has requested a five-foot permanent easement and a 15-foot temporary construction easement on the properties. It has said it will not pay for the easements.

Village attorney Lee Huckstep said some of the easements have been obtained after property owners failed to respond to a letter notifying them of the condemnation proceedings. He said he hoped to clear up the rest of the easements by sometime in May.

Loss of trees, lack of compensation for the easements and concern over what will be left after the job is done appear to be the main concerns of landowners who will not grant Ruidoso the easements.

Shirlee Chiavario, who lives at 100 Harvard Place, said she was not against the sewer and was not asking for any money. She is concerned about trees that will be cut down during installation of the sewer line.

She said she expected to lose 12 to 15 trees if construction crews install the sewer line along the requested easement on her property. She said she

bought the lot two years ago for the trees and for the privacy and enclosure it provided.

She is especially concerned about three large ponderosa pines one and a half to two feet in diameter. She believes the village could move the line 10 feet over into an arroyo where no trees would be disturbed.

Chiavario is also concerned about how construction crews will clean up after they are done.

"It's just beautiful where I live, and, believe me, I know it won't be when they are done," said Chiavario.

Chiavario says she thinks she has little chance opposing the easement, but will fight it as long as she can. She said she planned to talk to District Judge George Zimmerman about the easement.

Arden Good, of 142 Juniper Road, is concerned about the loss of his trees, but thinks he should receive some compensation for them—and for destroyed ground cover in the easement.

"I think my trees are worth something," said Good.

Good acknowledged that his property may increase in value as a result of the sewer, but pointed out that many others would have increased property values without having to grant an easement.

Good says money is really secondary to his concern about what trees will be cut and how the property will be left when construction is completed. He said no one has shown him exactly which trees will be cut and which ones will be left standing.

Assistant village manager Frank Potter said the contract for sewer line installation included a clause requiring the contractor to remove as few trees as possible. He said work may be confined to a swath only as wide as a backhoe in some areas.

He said the contractor will also be required to clean up the construction area, including removing trees. The contractor may be willing to leave the felled trees for the property owner's use if they want them. Potter said dirt in the sewer ditch would be packed to prevent erosion.

He also said some easements have been moved during negotiations, and indicated others possibly could be changed. However, easements must remain on lot lines since nothing can be built over an easement, said Potter.

He said the Farmers Home Administration, which is providing a \$1.25-million loan for the sewer construction, would not allow a free hookup to the sewer for those who granted easements.

Josephine Sanchez realizes she will have to pay for the hookup and wants the village to give her something for her easement. Upon advice of her husband, she has signed papers granting the easement, but she said she was willing to join others fighting it.

"I'm not for a free easement," said Sanchez. "When it comes time to hook up to the sewer they are going to charge the heck out of us."

Sanchez said she did not care about increased property values because she had no intention of selling her

home. She also mentioned an elderly couple on a fixed income that would have difficulty paying for the hookup.

Linda Chavez has a different problem.

"The reason I didn't want to give an easement is because my house is sitting on it," said Chavez.

She said a five-foot deck on her house extends right to the property line where the easement has been requested. As she understands it, the easement would include the deck and 10 feet of her house.

No one has been able to show her exactly where the sewer line will be, she said. She added that she did not want to grant the easement until she was sure her house is safe.

"They may not know my house is sitting on it," said Chavez.

Potter said he was aware of the problem and that something will have to be worked out. He said he had referred the problem to attorney Huckstep. Huckstep was not available to comment upon Chavez's problem.

It appears unlikely the property owners will be able to prevent easements through their property. They may be entitled to some compensation. But that will be determined by weighing the taking of the easement against the increased property values caused by the sewer installation, according to state statutes.

Whatever the settlements, residents of Ponderosa Heights soon should have access to village sewer, though they may have fewer trees.

County commissioners discuss Alto road

The subject of roads once again dominated the agenda at Tuesday morning's meeting of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners in Carrizozo.

Much discussion centered around a road leading from Fort Stanton Road to the Lincoln Hills subdivision area. During the meeting, Alto developer M. H. (Don) Blaugrund voiced concern that if the road is not taken over by the county and added to the county road maintenance system, the future of another road may be jeopardized. Lincoln Hills Road, which leads from one side of Deer Park Valley subdivision to the other, runs perpendicularly across the Lincoln Hills road.

"This should have been a county road a long time ago," Blaugrund said. "It is not a dedicated road and never was."

He said an agreement dated from the mid-1960s provided that the road would eventually be turned over to the county, but that with the bankruptcy of the company that was developing the Lincoln Hills area, the agreement was never fulfilled.

Blaugrund said he had reason to believe the Lincoln Hills subdivision was recently purchased by new owners. He said he wanted to see the road situation solved before it became a problem.

District Attorney Steve Sanders said he believed the county legally could take over maintenance of the road if it so desired.

"If the county wants it, I think we have some legal rights to it," he said. "I think the county has plenty of legal arguments."

The commissioners voted to appoint a road review committee to study the road situation and report back at the next commissioners' meeting. Named to the committee were Walt Wilson, Bob Palko, Bob Scribner and, as alternate, Larry Tillman.

On Sanders' suggestion, the commissioners also asked that Blaugrund collect the signatures of at least 10 people from within a two-mile radius of the area.

In other road-related matters, the commissioners voted to deny acceptance of the roads in the Wolf Creek and Wolf Springs subdivisions. According to preliminary inspection reports by Joe Shan of PAJO, the Las Cruces engineering firm that conducts inspections for the county, problems with the subdivisions include road widths that are too narrow, poor compaction of the base course of the roads, and blocked and obstructed culverts, among other problems.

According to county road superintendent Guy Henley, "The roads look well, but they haven't been completely brought up to specs." Henley said the roads needed some work before they would meet the specifications required by the county for road acceptance.

Representing the owners of the subdivisions was Larry Tillman, who said he would take the recommendations of the engineering firm back to

the owners for more work on the roads.

Also during the meeting, the commissioners voted to table requests for road width and paving variances for three subdivisions until the county Planning and Zoning Commission can study the requests. Roads in the Raven Ridge, High Mesa Unit 4 and Pines of Gavilan subdivisions were requested to be of narrower width and surfaced of gravel, rather than bituminous pavement as called for in the county Subdivision Regulations.

In other business, the commissioners:

—Approved Resolution 72-41, the budget of the Glencoe-Palo Verde Fire District in the amount of \$3,137.

—Approved Resolution 72-40, the funding agreement between the county and the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District in the amount of \$2,500.

—Voted to assume control of the Zia Senior Citizens Center, at the request of center director Barbara Ward. According to Ward, the center could not qualify for certain funding because it was sponsored by the Carrizozo Women's Club. She said if the county assumed sponsorship, the center would qualify for more grants and other funding sources.

—Approved the appointment of Willa Stone and Dr. John Clem to the Carrizozo Health Center Advisory Board.

—Voted to table any action on letter received from the New Mexico Natural Resources Department outlining the requirements for par-

ticipation in the federal rural roads matching funds program. County manager Suzanne Cox said she would attempt to gather more information on the program, and the commissioners invited county residents interested in the program to petition them with their requests.

—Voted to approve a technology transfer agreement with the State Highway Department. The agreement will provide for training of the county road department by state officials, in road maintenance and building-related topics.

—Signed a contract with Ernst and Whinney for an audit of the county for the 1983-84 fiscal year.

—Voted against participation in a pilot private jails project. According to a letter sent to the county from the office of the state attorney general, the project would allow public bodies to contract with private entities for the operation of jails.

"I'm one hundred percent against it," said Sheriff Tom Sullivan. "I think the sheriff should have control of his jails."

—Heard a report from road superintendent Henley on the progress his department has made since November. Henley listed the amounts of gravel and pit-run material that county road crews had hauled to various locations around the county. He also said crews had done work on a low water crossing area, fenced the Fort Stanton-Lincoln landfill, cleaned and changed several culverts and cleaned several culverts.

RHS Band's Hawaii trip drawing near

Members of the Ruidoso High School Blue and Gold Band are making lists and checking them twice.

They aren't getting ready for a cool Christmas. They're packing for a trip to warm Hawaii April 12 through 16. Before they leave, they plan a concert Monday, April 9.

About 117 people, from fathers to freshmen, are planning the trip. In addition to instruments and luggage, they will take special costumes, a state flag and a book.

The flag and the book, which depicts the grandeur of New Mexico, are gifts from Governor Toney Anaya to a fellow Democrat, Hawaii Governor George R. Ariyoshi. The band will carry the New Mexico flag in the International Hawaii Festival's World Pageantry Parade.

Students who carry the Ruidoso banner in the parade will wear Mesquero Apache clothes, to lead the Warrior band. One drum major will wear cowboy garb, complete with chaps. The other plans a fiesta dress.

The Indian, Western and Spanish clothes represent New Mexico's tricultural heritage. Members of the band are of Indian, Hispanic and Anglo descent.

The cultural mix is cited in a memorial from the state Legislature introduced by Representative Mickey McGuire of Ruidoso Downs. The memorial cites the band as Ambassadors from New Mexico.

In addition to the state proclamation, the Village of Ruidoso has pro-

claimed April 12-19 as Ruidoso High School Band Week. A proclamation signed by Mayor George White praises the band and its music educators.

The Hawaii trip itinerary includes a tour of Pearl Harbor, shopping and concerts, time on the beach, a tour of Oahu, watching a Polynesian pageant, and a luau.

The band plans a pre-Hawaii concert at 7 p.m. Monday, April 9 in the Ruidoso High School gym. The band will play selected concert and marching music they plan to perform in Hawaii.

Admission costs \$1 per adult and 25 cents per school age child.

Also at the concert, Sue Sherwood will present a short vocal musical. In addition, Churchill Cook's White Mountain Middle School students will sing "Kids for America," a short musical presentation.

In the last 18 months, band members and boosters carried out many fund-raising events for their trip. About \$30,000 was raised to pay for it.

Each student paid or earned \$730. Parent chaperones are paying for their trips. Area banks and savings institutions paid for a car the band used to raise money in a drawing.

People in the community also made donations of various sizes. Band Booster head Mary Myers said, "I'd like to thank everybody who has helped us."

Karen and her Amigo back to the books

Karen Foster may not move much from her seat in the White Mountain Elementary School library, but her eyes and voice are everywhere.

She may call to a boy named Jeff to get back into his seat, then in a few moments swing around and help Estella with her string art.

Foster doesn't leave her seat because she has MS, multiple sclerosis. It's a degenerative disease, and its effects can vary in strength, she said. However, she believes most people react to it as if it were worse than it is.

MS can cause muscle spasms and loss of muscle use. "It's not a really painful thing," she said. "It can be very frustrating."

"It's all in how you look at it." MS keeps her from walking and driving like ordinary people, but doesn't stop her from moving right along.

Two weekends ago she picked up an Amigo at a factory in Albuquerque. The little vehicle is a cross between a moped and a small golf cart. On it, a handlebar with forward and reverse controls is set in front of a swivel seat.

It also has her nameplate and a holster for a pop can, similar to those in some cars. Beneath her name is written a warning not to operate the vehicle before reading the instructions.

The Amigos have been manufactured for three or four years. Foster said. A man built the first one for his wife.

"There's an emotional difference to it and a wheelchair," Foster says. "This makes me feel like I'm not handicapped."

The Amigo is maneuverable and compact. It comes apart and fits in the trunk of a Subaru.

That's the car she and her husband, David, use now. He is a plumber for Allison Plumbing and Heating. They have a daughter, Heather, who is a high school student.

Within a few months, Heather may work for a driver's license so she can take her mother around town. As Karen mentions that, the proud,

slightly nervous smile seen on parents of young drivers crosses her face.

The family hopes to buy a van with a lift and hand controls. Karen could drive that herself, but the vehicle would be expensive.

The Amigo and medical care since the MS was discovered six months ago have been expensive, too. The Rio Ruidoso Lioness Club has started a fund at The Bank of Ruidoso to help pay Foster's bills.

Insurance also will help pay for them. Foster laughs and mentions, "I have a prescription for the Amigo."

Her prescription and treatment don't interfere much with a fairly usual schedule for a school employee. During the year, she works with students. During the summer, she is a college student herself.

Altrusa gave her a scholarship. She must study three more terms for a bachelor's degree in elementary education from the University of New Mexico.

Foster wants to be a teacher. This is her second year as librarian. Before that, she was a fifth-grade aide. "I started as a parent volunteer," she said, "when my daughter started first grade."

During the second year, she was the volunteer librarian. "The next year, the aide position opened up."

She loves her work as librarian. "It's the perfect job if you don't have to be the sole support." She gets the same vacations as her daughter, for instance.

"I'm very fortunate to work in this school system," she said. While she was in the hospital, the school hired a substitute.

"I can set up a library to run without me." Teachers help, and volunteers can shelve books. If the time stretches too long, however, things start to unravel, she said with her ready smile.

With or without her, two middle school aides shelve books. During the school week, Foster teaches each third-through fifth-grade class once.

She likes the kids' reaction to her MS more than that of adults. "Kids are much more matter-of-fact," she says.

When they ask her for rides, she jokes that she will hook up a cart and charge a quarter to pay for the power.

"The biggest blessing of the Amigo is that I'm able to get back to work,"

she said. Being with the kids is obviously an important part of her life.

It is also obvious that Karen Foster is not going to let MS slow her down.


Skeen names county head

Hoping to improve on fine performances of last weekend, the Ruidoso High School boys and girls track teams will compete in the Las Cruces Invitational Saturday.

The meet will be at Mayfield High School. The first events will begin at 9 a.m.

A mixture of AAAA and AAA division schools will probably compete in the meet. Silver City and Deming of Ruidoso's District 3-AAA could compete in the invitational.

"It will probably be stiffer than Portales (last week) but not as tough as Alamogordo," said Warrior boys coach Ronny Maskew about the competition in the meet.

The Warrior boys finished third at Portales, but could only score five points in the Alamogordo meet two weeks ago. That invitational featured some of New Mexico's toughest teams, plus some excellent teams from El Paso, Texas.

Ruidoso's girls took fourth in the Hagerman Invitational last week.

The Warrior boys should do well in the distance and middle distance races.

Junior Cisco Bob won the 1,500 meters and 3,000 meters at Portales. He set a school record in the 1,500 meters with a 4:08.90 clocking and ran a 4:13.30 in the 3,000 meters.

"There should be some runners

there who could push Cisco," Maskew commented. "I think Mayfield has a good runner."

Maskew thinks Bob can run around 9:00.0 in the 3,000 meters and 4:05.0 in the 1,500 meters in Saturday's competition.

Another junior, Curt McClellan, should be a top contender in the 800 meters. McClellan ran a 2:01.03 for second place at Portales. That was also a Warrior school record.

"I think he can go below two minutes this time," Maskew said. "He's looked real good in practice."

The Warriors also could do well in the boys relays. They showed improvement in the relays last weekend.

Ruidoso finished third in the 400-meter, 800-meter and 1,600-meter relays at Portales.

Considerable improvement was shown in the two shorter relays.

Ruidoso ran a 45.6 in the 400-meter relay and a 1:35.20 in the 800-meter relay.

Sophomore Ryan Frost, Eric Strobel, Steve Snidow and McClellan ran in those relays.

Frost could also be a threat in the open 100-meter and 200-meter races. He was second in the 100 meters and third in the 200 meters last weekend.

Ruidoso ran a 3:41.30 in the 1,600-meter relay at Portales, also finishing third.

The Warriors also have strength in the intermediate hurdles and long jump.

Justin Smith and Russell Easter went fourth-fifth in the intermediates last weekend. Easter was also fourth in the long jump, and senior Mark Johnston took fifth.

Tracy Gann and Rodney Rose probably will go in the high jump.

Warrior girls coach Sergio Castanon doesn't have many girls to work with as several are injured. Still, Ruidoso should do well in some events.

Deanna Peso won the 800 meters last week. She'll compete in that event again, as well as the medley relay, 1,600-meter relay and long jump. Peso was fifth in the long jump at Hagerman with a 13-11 effort.

Jackie Jefferson could do well in the 1,500 meters and might run on some relays. Jefferson finished second in the 1,500 meters at Hagerman, running a 5:48.0. She has a best of 5:36.0 this season.

Castanon hasn't decided who will run in the 400-meter, 1,600-meter and medley relays.


Trapp and Mobley teamed to take Edwards and Aton 6-4, 6-0, in the top doubles match.

Staying on the subject of car racing, there is a high school division in the monthly District Four Firestone-Centerline Racing Series at Roswell Dragway.

Ruidoso High School is entered in the division, as are several other Southeastern New Mexico high schools.

Clovis High School is leading the competition after two meets. Artesia High School is second.

However, Ruidoso is still in contention but needs more drivers.



No, they're members of the Warrior basketball team, running distances as part of their spring cage sessions.
The Warrior cagers are working out five days a week in the afternoon as part of their spring program, and they plan to have an active summer

There will be a summer league competitive program two of those nights. The other three nights will consist of weight training and free play.


The summer competitive league will be made up mostly of high school team players, but some other Ruidoso teams could play also.

At the end of July, Geyer is planning to take the team to the University of Texas at El Paso Team Camp.



Talk at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Retail Merchants Committee (RMC) meeting Wednesday varied in pitch from discussions of Easter Eggs to heated debate over the issue of leadership and direction of the group.

Much of the meeting was spent with members and visitors voicing their opinions on the subjects of a leader for the group, and what the group should be doing.

chairman and get this committee on its feet," he said. Budgie Green officially nominated Sandoval to a two-year term as chairman of the group. Upon Shaw's suggestion, the group accepted the nomination by acclamation.

Discussion then centered on the upcoming Easter Egg Hunt. The group agreed to participate with the Parks and Recreation Department in efforts to make the event a success. Projects surrounding the event, such as coloring 200 dozen eggs and obtaining prizes for the prize eggs, were discussed. D.A. Steve Sanders to resign

District Attorney Steve Sanders announced recently that he would be leaving his position as this area's district attorney for a position in Santa Fe as coordinator for the New Mexico District Attorneys organization.

Sanders, who has been district attorney for the past four years, commented on his decision to leave.

"It was a very difficult decision to make, mostly because I have so many friends here in Lincoln County," he said.

According to Sanders, his new position will involve him in situations all over the state. He said the position was created by the New Mexico Legislature in the recent session.

Sanders said the purpose of the new state office will be to handle conflict prosecutions statewide; to provide education and training to district attorneys and other law enforcement officials statewide; to assist with formulation of budgets for district attorneys; and to aid in the presentation of those budgets to the Legislature. Sanders said as coordinator he would have statewide jurisdiction.

"It's really going to be challenging to help the people of the state and to help law enforcement around the state," he said. "I'm really looking forward to the opportunity."

Sanders said he was picked for the job because of his interest in the courtroom as well as the appellate procedures. He said his familiarity with the legislative process also helped

qualify him for the position. Sanders said he would leave his present office sometime this July. He said Governor Toney Anaya would then make an appointment to fill the position left vacant by Sanders for the remaining six months of his term as district attorney.

Sanders said he was pleased with the progress of the office since he became district attorney. Sanders said that during his administration, the office had cut plea bargaining from 77 percent to seven percent, tried three times as many cases each year as the previous year, and opened offices in Carrizozo and Ruidoso.

Sanders said he would like to thank all the people in this area who have supported him during his time in office.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—We have to do something about the way the state appropriates its money.

The way things are now, we prepare one gigantic piece of legislation and try to move it through the process—past the House; into committees in the Senate and then onto the floor in that body; and then to the governor's desk for his signature.

That's the normal route for any bill—but this is not just any bill.

This year, for example, the total amount of money it allowed for spending was \$1.306 billion. That's not chicken feed.

But it's not just the scope of the measure which causes trouble. There are at least two other problems.

We probably should be giving more direction to state agencies in the way the money is to be expended, as the Legislative Council Service has been pressing us to do.

As it now stands, the bill normally just says that one of the larger agencies of government shall have a budget of X hundreds of millions of dollars, without specifying in much detail where that money must go.

That puts a lot of discretion in the hands of agency heads; and legislators, looking at the mostly inexperienced people Toney Anaya named to those posts, became understandably nervous.

Their impulse was to say clearly how much of that dough must go into certain categories of spending. The administration, however, resisted that. They say that some of the money being appropriated early in this calendar year won't actually be spent until late June of 1985. They consider restrictions of any more serious kind to be too hard to work with in light of that lengthy period of time.

You can expect legislators, however, to come up with some form of accomplishing this end which will be acceptable to both administration and lawmakers, probably by the time the 1985 Legislature convenes.

The present system is just too loose for comfort—and the smart folks in the executive branch know that too. But legislators themselves have to be restrained a little as well.

Of late, House Bill 2, the one which carries all that big appropriation, has gotten stuffed with too many detailed

appropriations for specific and limited purposes.

This year, for instance, it had money set aside for a health center in Mora and money for the Department of Economic Development which had to be spent for an experimental project to grow Christmas trees. (Both items were vetoed by the Governor as not being "meritorious"; it was hardly coincidental that both were favorites of Senator Francisco Gonzales.)

If we need those kinds of projects at all, they should probably be in separate bills, so they can be considered on their own merits.

That's just what some legislators don't want, of course. They like to hide their favorite "gimmies" in the bosom of that vast bill almost everybody is going to end up supporting eventually.

What will be necessary to pull all this off (if by some miracle lawmakers agree with what is said here) is a tough hand at the helm in House Appropriations and Finance, where the gigantic expenditure measure originates. Once things get adopted there, it's hard to get them out later—unless, of course, future Legislatures are going to be as intent on spoiling things as the 1984 one has been. There, for the first time in recent memory, the Senate just threw out the House's work entirely and passed its own bill.

That's part of the reason we ended up with a relatively fruitless regular session this year and had to convene a special gathering, at great expense to the human spirit, and also to the exchequer.

You get some weird paradoxes in government.

Those attorneys for minority groups who are still suing to have our House of Representatives re-restricted have to file against Toney Anaya—who is probably in total sympathy with what they hope to accomplish.

And Joe Goldberg, an Anaya Cabinet Secretary, is reportedly still advising the other side on that lawsuit, though he's no longer as active in suits against the state as he once was.

But tell me this: why aren't seat belts mandatory for adults? Many adults are killed in auto accidents too. We believe human life is more important than anything else and it is. Why should adults have a choice?

Should we have mandatory seat belts laws for everyone — not just children? The law is inconvenient. It would be so for adults too. Is that why we don't have a law for adults — because it's so inconvenient that only half would comply? Does everyone always comply with the child safety seat law because it is a law now?

I am only saying: why do we have to have a law to tell us what we already know to do? Should we have a law that says we're not to stick our hand on a hot stove? Because you know it will hurt, but you'll do it anyway to see if the stove is hot.

I did not mean Mrs. Hazel any harm by using her accident as an example. I saw the accident scene (so did others) and her 2 weeks later in the doctor's office where I worked.

It was a terrible accident and difficult to forget even for a bystander.

Perhaps I should have used as an example my cousin who died on an icy street — he was speeding and hit a bridge and turned over. He used no seat belt. He chose not to wear one and he chose to speed. He paid with his life for his bad choices. The telling of this example doesn't make it any less hateful.

If it was my choice I would ban all cars and make everyone walk. I would not want my opinion imposed on everyone else, however. We all choose whether to use automobiles.

At times it is hard to comply with any law. If you are rushing to the hospital in an emergency you don't always stop at stop signs or obey speed limits.

I may have used bad examples; but I believe Americans need their freedom of choice and are slowly losing their grip on it.

Everyone is also entitled to their opinion and that is mine. The actual purpose of my letter was to encourage people to drive more defensively.

State Fair granted eight more race days

The New Mexico Racing Commission voted unanimously to grant the New Mexico State Fair (NMSF) 25 days of horse racing, the most in the fair's history.

Fair Manager Steve Anaya requested an additional eight days of racing in addition to the traditional 17 days that run in conjunction with the fair. The 1984 NMSF horse meet will run September 7 through September 23, and then resume on September 26,

28, 29, 30, October 3, 5, 6, and 7. The additional eight days will be run on Wednesday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday the two weeks following the close of the fair.

In making his request, Anaya said there was a definite market for additional race dates in Albuquerque; that the additional race dates would have a positive economic impact in Albuquerque, especially among the hotels, restaurants, and transportation industries; and that it made

sense to utilize the extensive horse racing facilities at the fairgrounds more than just 17 days.

Anaya cited a 1983 scientific survey taken at the NMSF racetrack in which 82.5 percent of the 400 persons surveyed said they would definitely attend.

The survey was conducted by the Bureau of Business and Economic Research at the University of New Mexico and has a plus or minus error factor of five percent.

"We're very excited at having an extended race meet," Anaya said. "We think the fair, the horse racing industry, the state's largest city, and the state is ready for an extended meet."

The move for additional race dates follows the most successful race meet in the fair's history which saw a record handle of \$17,137,955 and attendance of about 205,000 during the 17 day meet in 1983.

Easy Demand favored in Derby



Lovely Mai Shanley of Alamogordo, recently crowned Miss New Mexico—U.S.A., looked every bit a winner while posing with jockey Larry Hunt in the Sunland Park winner's circle. On May 17, Mai represents New Mexico in the Miss U.S.A. Pageant in Lakeland, Florida.

Easy Demand, another rugged competitor from the respected stable of trainer H. Don Farris, heads the field for Sunday's featured West Texas Derby at Sunland Park.

The 13th running of this Grade II stakes race is set for 400 yards for the 10 fastest three-year-olds who competed in five trial races on March 23. The winner will collect \$46,318.41 from the total purse of \$92,636.83.

Easy Demand, an Easy Dozen gelding, has seen limited action in his career.

He started just four times as a two-year-old in 1983, winning one race and running one second. He collected \$10,042 for Farris, who owns him and also combined with regular rider Jerry Nicodemus to breed Easy Demand in Oklahoma.

Easy Demand ran a close fourth in last December's rich Sunland Park Fall Quarter Horse Futurity, beaten just one and one-quarter lengths by Bubbly Bobbie.

The gelding looked superb in the second trial heat for the West Texas Derby, scoring a win by one length. His time of 19.645 was the fastest of 50 sophomores who participated in the trials.

Easy Demand's powerful race also helped his second-division running mates. Six horses who ran in the second heat qualified for the finale.

Sassy Wrangler (second); Warm Thoughts (third); On A Stormy Day (fourth); Heavy Rail (fifth) and Ber Hempens Baby (sixth) all trailed Easy Demand yet gained the finals.

On A Stormy Day is the biggest moneymaker in the field, with career earnings of \$129,240 on six wins with three seconds and three thirds. The Rocket Wrangler filly ran sixth in last Labor Day's \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

Kingdom Jet, who was supplemented into the trials at a cost of \$5,000, made his owners appear sharp when he roared to a one-length verdict in the fourth division. His time of 19:770 was the third-fastest qualifying reading.

Sassy Wrangler, a daughter of Rocket Wrangler, had the second-best qualifying reading with a 19.765 clocking.

Warm Thoughts, a Kitaman filly from the strong stable of trainer Jack W. Brooks, had the fourth best qualifying reading with a 19.810. In her fine career, she's collected \$85,213, the second-biggest moneyline of the 10 Derby hopefuls.

Besides Warm Thoughts, Brooks

also qualified Patti Dash. Trainer J.B. Montgomery and Howard E. Peterson also have two Derby entrants.


Montgomery has Sassy Wrangler and Amazing Prophecy while Peterson has Truly A Bunny, who won the

third trial event by almost one length and Ber Hempens Baby.

Leckie tipped his hand last week when he ran third to the stakes horses, Curribot and Starhitch.

But Leckie didn't get the role of people's choice in Friday's five and one-half furlong allowance headliner. That honor went to Christian Name, who got rolling an even odds.

In the upper stretch, Leckie slipped into the lead under an alert ride from Larry Chavez. Christian Name, in third place at that point, mustered a game attack, but Leckie was three-quarter lengths in front when he hit the wire in an excellent clocking of 1:05 3/5 seconds. Stiff winds were blowing.

Leckie, owned by Leonard Don Mathis of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, returned \$4.80, \$2.40, \$2.20. Christian

Name handed out payoffs of \$2.40 and \$2.20. Rhome Red (\$2.60) took third.

Friday's program was a bit special since it marked the advent of Pic-Six wagering in the Southwest. The object of the Pic-Six is to pick the winners of six straight races (fifth through 10th races).

No fan accomplished that feat in Friday's inaugural edition, but there were 12 tickets with five winners each. Each of these tickets returned \$341.60.

Since no one picked six winners, half the net Pic-Six pool will be funneled into Saturday's Pic-Six pool. This carryover amount from Friday is \$4,100.89.

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Sunland Park Hoofbeats

SUNLAND PARK OFFICIALS were more than pleased with the public's response to the Pic-Six wagering, which made its debut in New Mexico and Sunland Park on Friday. "We're really pleased with the way it went this first weekend," said Sunland Park general manager H. Rick Henson. "It's going to take a little time until everyone is used to it. There were a lot of questions asked this week. Such as how to bet it, when to bet it. But our handle on Saturday was up 30 percent over Friday and that shows people are starting to get used to playing with it. If we continue at the rate we're going now, we're going to have some really strong pools in the very near future." Sunland Park's Pic-Six requires patrons to select the winner of six consecutive races, the fifth through the 10 events each day. Patrons pick up the special selection cards, fill them out and then take them to one of the designated Pic-Six tellers. They pay for them and get their tickets. On Friday, \$10,382 was in the Pic-Six pool. There were no six-winner tickets, but 12 tickets selected five winners and returned \$342.60. On Saturday, there was a carryover pool (from half of the Friday Pic-Six pool) of \$4,100., and one lucky ticketholder won \$9,213.60 for hitting all six winners. In addition, 14 tickets each had five winners and they were worth \$365.20 each. On Sunday, the pool hit \$13,646.00. There were no tickets with six winners, creating a carry-over pool for Friday of \$5,350.17. There were 3 tickets with five winners and each one returned \$1,796.60. The carryover pool which saves half of the pool for the next day if there are no tickets with six winners each gives the possibility of huge Pic-Six pools if there should be several straight days with no winning six-winner tickets. The Pic-Six has enjoyed fantastic success at major California race tracks and Sunland Park officials are hoping for the same success. Judging by the first weekend, it's starting as a fine addition to the local wagering program.

JIMMYLIN, one of the most popular runners in the Southwest, proved age 13 is no barrier to good performances. The veteran runner made his 1984 debut by running second, beaten just three lengths, in Friday's first race. According to New Mexico racing regulations, once a horse reaches his 12th birthday, it has to win a race in the previous year in order to continue racing. The Nimette gelding won two races in 1983 as a 12-year-old and won seven in 1982 as an 11-year-old. In his lengthy career, the California-bred runner has posted 26 wins with 17 seconds and 11 thirds from 118 outings and has earned more than \$76,000. Jimmylin is trained by Jimmie D. Claridge, who owns him

with Leonard Ziekle of Amarillo, Texas. David Lidberg rode him in Friday's opening race as a \$17,700-1 outsider.

GLOVER D. RETURNED to Sunland Park to make his first 1984 New Mexico start a magnificent one as he captured Saturday's featured 11th race. The six-year-old Valid Appeal gelding ran three close fourths and one third in four trips this spring at Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Arkansas, before facing six four-year-old and older horses running six furlongs under allowance conditions. The Florida-bred runner laid off the early pacesetter, T.V. Repairman, while saving ground along the rail. As the field neared the far turn, Casey Lambert asked Glover D. for speed and he quickly took the lead and maintained it thereafter although the rapidly-closing Hainesville made up much ground to finish second. But Glover D. was never seriously menaced as he pulled away to win by one-length. His time of 1:10 3/5 tied the seasonal fastest clocking set earlier by Star Route and Donna's Boy. Last year as a five-year-old, Glover D. won five races with four seconds from 15 tries and earned \$53,214. Last summer at Ruidoso Downs, Glover D. won the Lincoln County Handicap and ran second in the Governor's Handicap, the Billy The Kid Handicap and the Isayobly Handicap. Trained by J. Doyal Roberts, Glover D. is owned by Jay C. Childers of Borger, Texas. As the 2-5 wagering favorite on Saturday, Glover D. paid \$2.80 to win.

A TOTAL OF 184 TWO-YEAR-OLDS made the most recent payment for the prestigious Sun Country Futurity. The Sun Country, set for 350 yards on Sunday, April 29, has an estimated purse of \$300,000. It is Sunland Park's most important quarter horse race, having earned Grade I status by the American Quarter Horse Association grading committee. It is the only Sunland Park event with a Grade I ranking. A total of \$157,150 is on deposit for the race. The next payment date is Tuesday, April 10, with \$500 fees for eligible horses or \$5,000 for supplemented horses. Jon F. Bar Brannon's Monchichi, winner of the West Texas Futurity Consolation, is on the eligible list as is Rich Classic Lady, third in the \$192,547 West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park, who is owned by Everett B. Stamm of Benkleman, Nebraska. Owners Sam F. Henderson of Odessa, Texas, and R.D. Hubbard of Kingsport, Tennessee, head the owners' list as each has five still eligible. Henderson has Already Reddy, Getmegone, Pour Me A Double, Smoke N Ice and Truckle Wind while Hubbard has Eclipse Award, Magic Moves, Sixy Chick, Sound N Fury and Thats Super. A year ago, Hubbard won the Sun Country Futurity (worth

\$259,913) with Racy N Lacy. Trials are set for Friday, April 13 with the 10 fastest runners gaining entrance to the Sun Country Futurity and the second group of 10 swiftest runners will earn spots in the Sun Country Futurity Consolation on Saturday, April 28.

SALUSTIO BURGOS RODE two consecutive winners on Friday's program. He started in the second with Irish Strongman (\$19.80) for trainer Jimmie D. Claridge and then captured the third with Map O Texas (\$6.00) for trainer Fred I. Danley.

HORSES WEARING PROGRAM NUMBER SEVEN enjoyed a fine day on Friday. The first three "seven" horses won and then two more prevailed, making five winners from the lucky seven post. Winners included Special Mojo (\$5.80) in the first, Irish Strongman (\$19.80) in the second, Map O Texas (\$6.50) in the third, Mr. Twice Worthy (\$3.40) in the tenth and Dandy Bet (\$18.40) in the twelfth.

JOCKEY DAVID LIDBERG won both halves of Sunday's daily double races. He won the first on Deepest Wish (\$18.00) for trainer J. Doyal Roberts and then captured the second on Withy (\$5.60) for trainer Frank Cappellucci. The 1-8 combination returned \$89.60.

TRAINER ELMER SHEPARD was presented with the March Barn-of-the-month award by the Sunland Park Horsewomen United organization. The award was presented in the winner's circle after Sunday's seventh race. The blanket was donated by the Jim Miller Training Center of Albuquerque.

MAI SHANLEY OF ALAMOGORDO, who was recently crowned Miss New Mexico U.S.A., was honored by having Sunday's ninth race named in her honor. She won her title recently in Las Cruces in a ceremony judged by Bill Thomas, Sunland Park's administrative assistant. She will now represent New Mexico in the Miss U.S.A. contest set for Lakeland, Florida, on May 17. The winner of that pageant will represent the United States in the Miss Universe Pageant in July in New Zealand.

Glover D. returned low mutual payoffs of \$2.80, \$2.60, \$2.60. Hainesville refunded \$3, \$2.60. Christian Luck took third (\$3).

Delta Way outruns Mr. Gaelic

Delta Way has been eating the dust of some of the top stakes horses in his age bracket in the Southwest. But the colt got revenge on two of his key foes—Machisma and Mr. Gaelic—in Sunday's six-furlong allowance topper at Sunland Park. Delta Way, anxiously piloted by O.A. Martinez Jr., reached the top of the stretch with more zip than his seven foes could begin to handle. The colt swooshed by the pace-making Mr. Gaelic with ease, then continued to fatten up his lead as he cruised down to the finish. He hit the tape with a convincing three-length margin, and reestablished himself among the Southwest's top three-year-olds.

No flash in the pan, Delta Way had more than proved himself last year as a two-year-old, when he piled up a bank account of almost \$44,000. On the last day of '83, he finished far behind Machisma in the Sunland Park Fall Thoroughbred Futurity. Later, he was handed severe drubbings by Mr. Gaelic in an allowance dash and in the Pan Zareta Handicap.

If the windy conditions at Sunland on Sunday bothered any of the contenders in the headliner, they certainly didn't hamper Delta Way. Those 38 miles-per-hour tailwinds merely pumped more power into the colt's impressive stretch run. He clocked the distance in 1:22 1/5 seconds and returned \$14.20, \$5 and \$3.80 in his

first score of the year.

Delta Way is owned by Ronald Sugamoto of Alamogordo. He's trained by James W. Curry.

Mr. Gaelic, with F.O. Martinez up, turned in a commendable job. He fought gamely from the first jump to assume the lead on the rail, and even turned back the odds-on favorite, Machisma. Mr. Gaelic appeared to be sitting pretty at mid-stretch, but Delta Way's attack was just too much. Mr. Gaelic refunded \$4.60, \$3.80.

Native Impression, a 24-1 shot rid-

den by Wayne Buehrer, finished a head behind Mr. Gaelic and returned \$6.80 to show. Machisma ran out of steam in the stretch and faded to seventh.

Sunday's Pic-Six wagering produced no tickets with six winners, but there were three tickets with five winners, and each of these tickets returned \$1,796.60. Since no one picked six winners, half the net Pic-Six pool (\$5,390.17) will go into Friday's Pic-Six pool.

Sunday's total handle of \$452,777 was second-best of the meeting.
