## How that car landed in the river

Some days, a Good Samaritan's efforts are for naught. When Faye Eby tried to stop a stranger's runaway pickup Thursday, her own car landed nose down in the Rio Ruidoso.

"That's the strangest one I ever took," Ruidoso police officer Robert Kenney said of the accident report.

A chilling rain began to fall as wreckers hoisted the car from the river after 11 a.m. Thursday. Eby watched them work on the red Pontiac and explained what happened.

She was driving to work at the Pizza Hut when she saw a Toyota pickup roll from the parking lot onto Sudderth Drive. Nobody was driving it.

"The little blue truck started pulling out," she said. She hurriedly pulled into the parking lot. "I threw my car into park, or thought I did."

Eby then ran after the truck to try to stop it, and discovered its doors were locked. When she looked up, she saw her own car rolling toward her.

It left the parking lot, glanced off the truck, crossed Sudderth and the east parking lot at the Chamber of Commerce. Then the car plunged down a rocky bank into the river.

"I tried to hold the car back," she said. When she bruised her ribs, she decided to get out of the way. Emergency Medical Technicians rushed to the accident scene, but she declined treatment.

"I was scared, put it that way," Eby said as she described her feelings the day after the accident. "I hope to God it never happens again."

The 1964 Pontiac belongs to her father-in-law, Harry Eby of Ruidoso. A headlight and one side of the front bumper is crushed, and the gas tank was punctured by a rock.

Because the car no longer was in running condition, they arranged to have it towed home.

Minor damage to the truck included a broken tail light.

Police issued unattended motor vehicle tickets to both Eby and the truck owner, Jeffrey Cartridge of Pinon.

Eby said she asked for a court date to be set, because she doesn't want to pay the \$30 fine.

"I'm just glad nobody was hurt," Eby said more than once. "Cars can be replaced, people can't."

She said she could not have ignored the truck—had someone been hurt, it would have been on her conscience.

When asked if she thinks of herself as a Good Samaritan, Eby replied, "I hope so. If I can help someone, I will."

Her friends and people at work back her. "They tell me I did the right thing," she said.

Eby might even repeat what she did. "I don't know whether I'd do it again," she said. "It depends on the circumstances."

If kids are ever in a truck in a similar situation, or if people might get hurt, she said, "I'll help any way I can."

That's a true Good Samaritan.

## 'Water education' had

Water rights and water law were explored by a group of Ruidoso village officials and some 250 others in attendance at the New Mexico Water Conference Thursday and Friday in Las Cruces.

Attending the conference from Ruidoso were Mayor George White, village manager Jim Hine, assistant village manager Frank Potter, and village councilors Sherman Atwood, Bill Karn, John Underwood, Jerry Shaw, Ray Dean Carpenter and Rick Evans.

Leroy Givens of Boyle Engineering, attorney Don Dutton and village attorney Lee Huckstep also attended the conference.

Speakers at the conference addressed a variety of water issues, including water law, water litigations, the Rio Grande Compact, Indian water issues, water quality laws, and economic development and water law. The conference was organized by the New Mexico Water Resources Research Institute at New Mexico State University.

"I certainly found that there's a lot to learn and pursue," said councillor Jerry Shaw. "I thoroughly enjoyed it."

Shaw added that she felt the overall information the conference made available was most beneficial to the Ruidoso representatives. She said she also found the section on Indian water issues to be very informative.

"We can do some direct negotiating, we all got that message," she said of dealings with the Indians. Shaw said the possibility of sitting down on a one-to-one basis with the Indians to solve some of the water problems, as mentioned during one part of the conference, would be much more desirable than going through extensive legal proceedings.

Shaw also mentioned the possibility of starting a library of information about water for use by the council. It would include a wealth of printed information the councilors were able to obtain at the conference.

Shaw said she felt Ruidoso was probably the best represented municipality at the conference.

"I'm very proud of the fact that all of the council went," she said.

Councillor Sherman Atwood said he found the conference to be valuable, especially considering future water issues the council will have to deal with.

"I really found it rather enlightening," he said. "I'm sure enthused over it. I think it's going to help all of us understand the problems of water

rights." Assistant village manager Potter also pointed to the benefits the council will receive from the conference in future dealings.

Potter said he believed the council gained valuable knowledge that will come in handy when the governing body is faced in the future by experts on water issues.

"I think the council will be able to speak for themselves," he said of such a situation. "They educated themselves."

Potter said he, too, found the conference to be very informative. "They answered some of the questions I had always wondered about," he said.

## Lincoln Historical Ordinance gets lively public hearing

A vocal but orderly crowd filled San Juan Bautista Church in Lincoln to capacity Saturday for a public hearing on the proposed Lincoln Historical Ordinance.

After numerous complaints last fall about the previous ordinance governing the historical sites of Lincoln, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners directed the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission to rewrite the ordinance.

A group of members from the commission and the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board formed to accomplish the task, and the results of their months of effort were presented at the public hearing for further input.

The meeting, conducted by the commission, began in discord with the proposed ordinance as commission member Wes Grigsby read a prepared statement declaring his opposition to the ordinance.

In his statement, Grigsby said he agreed that historical sites should be maintained and preserved, but that he saw no reason to continue building in the same style as that used in the past.

Tourists, he said, do not come to Lincoln to view new buildings that are built to resemble those that are old. He also questioned the authority of the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board.

After reading his statement, Grigsby left the commission table to join his family in the audience. His actions drew a burst of applause from the crowd.

Residents from Lincoln and other surrounding communities then questioned nearly every section of the proposed ordinance as Planning and Zoning Commission chairman Bill Seelbach led the meeting section by section through the ordinance.

Major sources of questions and opposition centered around those sections of the ordinance concerning the authority of the board, nominations to the board, the inclusion of Zone B (the areas immediately to the west and east of Lincoln) and the need of even having such a board to administer the ordinance.

Lincoln area resident Mike Hainer also read a prepared statement to the commission. Hainer said he could not agree with formation of the board as outlined in the ordinance because the board members would not be directly answerable to the people of Lincoln.

"We have a proposed board with direct authority over our daily lives with no check or rein," he said.

He also stated that the county commissioners, who are the governing

body of Lincoln and the ultimate authority behind the ordinance, are not directly answerable to only the people of Lincoln, but to the county as a whole. He said he found such parts of the proposed ordinance "intolerable."

Hainer said he and other residents had serious questions of the authority of the board because of problems in the past.

"We've had indiscriminate abuse of authority," he said, "and we're not so sure it won't happen again."

Grigsby also addressed the issue of the power of the board in his statement, saying he opposed handing over power to individuals who are not answerable for their actions.

Commission member Ben Hall then pointed out that unless the village of Lincoln were to become incorporated and a local government was formed, no other governing arrangement for the ordinance is possible.

He also stressed that the proceedings were a hearing for a revision of the original ordinance. If the new ordinance is not passed, Hall noted, the former one will be in effect until

some future action by the county commissioners.

Also the topic of heavy discussion was the nomination process to the board. Lincoln area resident Nadine Courson said she was concerned about nominations from "bleeding hearts" from outside Lincoln. She said nominations should come from Lincoln residents only.

Other discussion centered on the requirements to be a member of the board. On this, the ordinance reads, "Four members shall be property owners in the Lincoln Historic District."

Several people at the meeting expressed concern that that wording would allow non-resident property owners to be elected to the board. It was suggested that the wording be changed to read "resident property owners" or "bonafide residents." Lincoln resident Jerry Lock also suggested that an age limit and length of residency stipulation be added to the requirements.

## Planners seek input with survey

Approximately 350 randomly selected Ruidosoans will get a chance to provide their input into the village's planning process this week.

Later this week the Village of Ruidoso will send out 350 surveys to residents and business owners in Ruidoso.

Representatives of BRW, the company compiling a Comprehensive Master Plan for Ruidoso, hope residents and business owners will take the opportunity to provide their opinions on this plan by completing surveys and mailing them back to village hall.

"They (the surveys) are just one more way to get public involvement," said BRW vice president John

McNamara. McNamara is directing the formation of the Comprehensive Master Plan that should guide Ruidoso's development over the next decade or longer. He and other BRW representatives are currently in the process of gathering data about Ruidoso for the formation of the plan.

BRW will use technical data, input from citizens at public meetings, input from village administrative staff, and answers to the surveys to formulate the plan.

"We're trying to get attitudes, perceptions... what people want," said McNamara of the surveys.

Surveys will be sent to 250 homes and 100 businesses. McNamara is hoping for a 30 to 50 percent return.

The surveys are five and six pages long and should take only a few minutes to complete. They are ad-

dressed and stamped, requiring residents to just staple or tape them shut and drop them in the mail.

The resident surveys contain questions about housing, important issues facing Ruidoso, recreational facilities, and shopping areas. The business surveys have many similar questions, as well as ones about business growth and rehabilitation and important factors in operating a business in Ruidoso.

McNamara said BRW will complete the data collection and have a draft of goals and objectives ready for review in eight to 10 weeks. The company will hold a public meeting for more public input at that time, he said.

He urged everyone who receives a survey to complete it and drop it in the mail.

# Accidents raise spectre of airport tragedy, Site B battle goes on

It still scares people. In the back of their minds they know the airport sits at the bottom of a box canyon with a school and houses all around.

They believe their children are in danger at White Mountain Elementary and Middle Schools. They know they are in danger downtown along the flight path for the Ruidoso Municipal Airport.

They know several people have died in accidents in the past. They know more accidents will happen.

It has been close to 20 years that Ruidoso has been trying to get a new airport on Fort Stanton Mesa. It has been more than a decade since the Ruidoso school system put the schools next to the airport.

Ruidoso residents and visitors alike have lived with the airport for over 30 years. Accidents happen only occasionally. People forget. They push it to the back of their minds and hope someone out there will get them a new and safe airport.

"It's close and we know it's there," said White Mountain Elementary School principal Don Weems, as the sound of a jet taking off rumbled through the walls of his office. "That right there makes you aware."

Weems said he was especially

aware of the hazard during May and September, when kids are still in school and the summer air traffic is keeping the airport busy.

"The bad thing about it is that we've grown to accept it," said Weems.

School property is little more than 100 yards from the runway. The playground for 800 elementary and middle school children is just over 200 yards from the runway.

When an accident happens, people are stirred and worry about the airport situation for a while. Weems said he heard a few comments after the most recent incident at the airport, when shifting winds forced a crash landing at the airport.

Mel O'Reilly has two sons at White Mountain this year. He says the airport situation bothers him. He notices it the most when he is at the school for soccer games on Saturdays.

He especially worries about the jets that are now landing in Ruidoso with increasing frequency, and mentions the plane that landed in Lloyd Davis' yard in the Country Club subdivision several years ago. But he doesn't know what to do about it.

"Well, there really isn't anything I can do on a personal level," said O'Reilly.

He wonders if the school system should become involved in the fight for an airport—or the Ruidoso Parks

and Recreation Department, which is planning a recreation complex on White Mountain School property.

Ruidoso Schools superintendent Sid Miller says the airport concerns him. But he believes all of Ruidoso could be in as dangerous a position as the White Mountain Schools.

He noted two accidents that have occurred on two sides of Nob Hill Elementary School.

Miller said the school board and administration have not become involved. Weems said he would show any interested people just how unsafe the current situation is. Miller said the schools might become involved if anyone asked them to.

The Ruidoso village council has been busy trying to learn its job, and has only asked for an update from Sierra Blanca Airport Commission chairman Fred Heckman. Mayor George White traveled to New Mexico State University last week to talk to university vice president Don Rouch about the airport, but found Rouch out of the office.

Bob White, state aviation director, is not sure if his people should have been presenting a stronger argument for a new airport to the federal Interior Department.

"Interior has heard one side for many years now," said White, referring to New Mexico State University and Bureau of Land Management lob-

bing in favor of range research now conducted on the proposed airport site at Fort Stanton Mesa.

The Interior Department must decide whether to approve an application by the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission for the transfer of approximately 1,600 acres of land on the mesa from the Bureau of Land Management to the Federal Aviation Administration for a new airport.

But White said he was not sure if lobbying by his division would be productive.

Debi Bigham, whose son attends White Mountain Middle School, said two recent accidents and an editorial in The Ruidoso News scared her to death. But she said she didn't know who to contact about it, and counts on others to fight for the airport.

"Somebody needs to do something about it," said Bigham.

"Somebody," mostly in Washington D.C., is working on it. Federal Department of Transportation personnel and Representative Joe Skeen are trying to convince the Interior Department of the need for a new airport.

The state Transportation Department supports the new airport, as does Governor Toney Anaya.

"We are acutely aware of the problems at the airport," said U.S. depu-

ty assistant secretary of transportation Phil Haseltine. "We are committed to getting it replaced."

Haseltine is one of several Federal Transportation Department personnel working with the Interior Department on a new study of potential airport sites.

Although several studies have been done before, Federal Transportation Secretary Elizabeth Dole recently proposed a cooperative study by the Interior and Transportation Departments. Aviation director White and state Transportation Secretary Judith Espinosa both stated they believed the study was a way to forestall a decision against the application by the Interior Department.

"We've already studied this interminably," said Joe Skeen, who has come out strongly in favor of an airport on the mesa during the last year. "We've done all the studying we need."

He sees the current cooperative study, however, as an opportunity for the Federal Department of Transportation to convince the Interior Department of the need for an airport at the preferred site (Site B) on the mesa.

He said he had been in close contact with the Department of Transportation, which has been making strong presentations to the Interior Department about the need for an airport.

"It isn't bogged down," insisted

Skeen. "We've been keeping the pressure on."

Recent action by the Federal Department of Transportation is a valuable and new tool in the fight for a new airport, indicated Skeen.

Haseltine said the current study would be completed within six months. He said the study would recommend one site for the airport—one that ideally would satisfy the Department of Transportation, Interior Department, New Mexico State University, state officials, and the citizens of Ruidoso.

Once the study is completed, the formal application process will advance, according to Haseltine.

Studies have been done before. Similar applications have been denied in the past.

New Mexico State University and the Bureau of Land Management have not changed their opposition to the airport on the mesa.

But new people have joined the fight for the airport on the mesa. Although most of the action is now centered in Washington D.C., Anaya is the first New Mexico governor to support strongly the proposed airport. Skeen has been very visible in his support for the past year. The federal Transportation Department is strongly favoring a solution to the problem.

And Ruidoso waits for an answer.

## Interior official visits Mescalero

Assistant Interior Secretary for Indian Affairs Kenneth Smith visited the Mescalero Apache Reservation Thursday. He heard Mescalero Apache President Wendell Chino lash out at federal government funding cuts within the first five minutes of his arrival.

Chino questioned the Reagan administration's commitment to Indian self-determination, and its proclaimed policy of funneling more funds to a local level.

"Mr. President talks about that, but all we have seen is cuts at the local level," said Chino. "We need improvements in just about every program we have ... The infrastructure

has to be strengthened if the tribe is going to be self-determined."

The Mescalero Apache Tribe received \$200,000 out of a requested \$1.6 million for the federal Jobs Bill program last year. Tribal administrator Dick Wardlaw said the tribe had been receiving steadily decreasing federal funds for the past four to five years.

Smith, a Wasco Indian from the Warm Springs Reservation in Oregon, reaffirmed his commitment to self-determination for Indian tribes. He said he did not know why the Mescalero Apache Tribe received less money, and that he would investigate the problem.

He said the self-determination program was intended to funnel more money to local Bureau of Indian Af-

airs (BIA) agencies and allow them a greater voice in how it is spent.

Attempts to eliminate two of the 12 BIA area offices around the nation failed to get Congressional support, he said.

Smith was visiting the Mescalero Apache Reservation for the first time Thursday and Friday. He said he came to see the "good operation" Chino had boasted about for so many years.

"I understand they are doing comparably well," said Smith of the tribe's efforts toward self-determination.

Chino said his and Smith's discussions would include the budget cuts, along with sewer and water projects and the proposed regional airport at Fort Stanton Mesa.

Commission member Betty Shrecengost then suggested that the wording be left as it is in the ordinance, and that the integrity of the county commissioners be trusted in the decisions in the nominating process.

Also during the meeting, Lincoln resident Jerry Thompson raised the question of whether a board is needed at all for administration of the ordinance.

"This is a living community," responded Seelbach. "It has to be a living document."

Seelbach said the board was needed both to utilize the understanding of the people who live in the community and to ensure day-to-day administration of the ordinance. It was pointed out that the county commissioners would otherwise be responsible for the administration of the ordinance in the absence of such a board.

Many meeting-goers voiced opinions against inclusion of a B Zone in the ordinance. Both Thompson and Myrna Grigsby asked the commission to call for a show of hands on the issue. Seelbach refused, and said it was not covered under the state statute providing for public hearings.

Other Lincoln residents voiced opposition to the ordinance as a whole. One resident quoted from the Declaration of Independence of the United States of America and said the ordinance threatened his liberty and freedom. Another resident, Joe Baca, also voiced opposition.

"We have some communist people here who are trying to make us do what they want," he said. "I am against it."

The county commissioners will review a tape of the hearing and make a decision on the ordinance at a future meeting.

## Smokey Day plans final

## Senator Tower discusses Middle East

United States Senator John Tower of Texas talked about his recent trip to the Middle East at the 23rd annual Permian Basin Petroleum Producers Convention Friday night at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Speaking to a large and supportive crowd in the Wendell Chino Ballroom, Tower cited terrorism and the Iraq-Iran War as major problems.

"Terrorism is a form of warfare," the Texas senior senator said. "Considering the enormous political pressure that was brought to bear on the president as a result of the airport

incident (Beirut), we have to concede that terrorism works. The United States has no alternative but to confront terrorism head on."

Tower also said that terrorism had an affect on democratic countries because of "their openness."

The senator also expressed his concern about Iran's threat to close the Strait of Hormuz, where much of the world's oil passes through on ships.

He explained that only two percent of the United States' oil comes through that strait. However, 20 percent of Western Europe's oil and 60 percent of Japan's oil comes through the strait.

The United States would be "unable

to isolate ourselves from the economic problems of our allies," Tower remarked about the possibility of the strait being closed.

Tower also praised King Hussein of Jordan for his work in the Middle East, citing Hussein's work for support in the Arab world of President Reagan's peace plans.

The senator also discussed business mergers.

"Mergers are necessary for the survival of United States firms in the world markets," he said.

Tower also told the crowd that it was important for people in the petroleum industry to let the citizens of the United States know how impor-

tant the industry is. He also criticized some of his colleagues in Congress from non-producing states for their ideas on energy production.

"I will continue to support the administration in protecting United States interests overseas," he said. "And will oppose any threat that would damage any domestic energy programs."

Tower has decided not to run for another term, and he expressed his thanks to the crowd at the conclusion of his speech.

"It's been a joy to serve you over the years," he said. "And work for the greatest state in the greatest country on the globe."

## "Mickey" McGuire announces for House

State Representative Marvin B. "Mickey" McGuire has announced his intention to seek reelection to the state House of Representatives from District 56.

McGuire lives in Ruidoso Downs and teaches sixth grade at White Mountain Middle School in Ruidoso. He has been with the Ruidoso school system 23 years.

He has served one term in the Legislature. He is seeking the Democratic nomination to the seat in the June primary.

The legislator said he wanted to make use of the knowledge and experience he gained serving a first term by returning to the House of Representatives.

"I was effective ... by virtue of the committee I was appointed to," he said. But, he added, he could be much more effective upon returning because of what he learned.

McGuire serves on the House Appropriations and Finance Committee and the Voters and Elections Commit-

tee. He is an advisory member of the Legislative Education Study Committee.

In addition, he is on the Education and Job Training Committee of the National Conference of State Legislators, and is commissioner from the House to the Education Commission of the States—another national commission.

He said he realized that every vote he made could not please every constituent. But he said he wanted the public to know that every vote was made after attending meetings, studying legislation and conferring with knowledgeable people.

"I did work at it," he said. McGuire is a 1944 graduate of Artesia High School. He earned a bachelor's degree in business and economics in 1951 from Eastern New Mexico University at Portales. He completed a master's degree in education from that school in 1955.

He and his wife, Ruth, have three children—Reeves, 29, Joe Bob, 27,

## Smith, Daniels get qualifying marks at Lovington Saturday

Justin Smith and Kim Daniels qualified for the state meet in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles and girls 100 meters, respectively, to highlight the Ruidoso High School boys and girls track teams' performance in the Lovington Invitational Saturday.

Smith, who has shown steady improvement all season, ran a 42.48 for third place in the intermediate hurdles. Daniels qualified in the 100 meters with a 12.8 in the trials. She qualified in the 200 meters earlier this month.

In team competition, Ruidoso's boys took fourth with 31 points. Lovington won with 117 points. Monahans (Texas) had 72 points, Artesia scored 42, Goddard had 23 and New Mexico Military Institute had 18. Eight teams competed in the invitational.

The Warrior girls finished fifth, scoring seven points.

A high wind affected most of the times and distances during the meet. Thus, some of the Warriors' efforts were not as good as they might have been had the weather been better.

Junior Cisco Bob again won the 1,500 meters and 3,000 meters, recording 4:10 and 9:09 times. He has run a 4:06.75 in the 1,500 meters and a 9:04.90 in the 3,000 meters this season to qualify for the state meet.

Francisco Olvera, another junior, added a fifth place in the 3,000 meters (9:58.0). He and freshman Gabe Tam have already qualified for the state meet in that event.

Curt McClellan finished third in the 800 meters with a 2:05.30 clocking, about three seconds slower than his seasonal best.

Senior Mark Johnston earned a fourth place in the long jump with a 20-0 effort, his personal best and probably the best jump in Ruidoso history. No longer jump has been confirmed, according to head boys coach Ronny Maskew.

Sophomore Russell Easter also had a personal best in the long jump, leaping 19-4 1/2.

The Warrior relays teams were hampered by injuries and illness, but still came through with a couple of places.

A medley relay team of Bubba Miller, Dalton Hamilton, Jeff Willingham and Manuel Montano finished fourth. Montano is a junior while the other three runners are freshmen.

The 800-meter relay team of Johnston, Easter, Eric Strobel and McClellan ran a 1:37.0 for third place, impressive considering the poor weather conditions.

Ruidoso's relays teams were without Steve Snidow and Tracy Gann in the meet. Gann has an injury and Snidow is sick.

Maskew was pleased with the Warriors' performances. "Considering the problems we've

had with injuries this past week, I think the guys did very well in every event they were entered in," he said.

With the District 3-AAA meet coming up next Friday at Cobre, how does Maskew see that meet?

"Silver City has to be favored," he said. "Because of our lack of depth in the field events, we would have a hard time placing as high as second. Third place would be a good effort for us."

Daniels didn't run in the 100-meter finals, as she had already qualified for state and wanted to go to the Ruidoso prom Saturday night.

Deanna Peseo and Katherine Sanchez scored the Warriors' points.

Sanchez, only a freshman, finished second in the 300-meter low hurdles with a personal best of 51.0. She also leaped 15-1 1/2 in the long jump, finishing sixth.


Peseo was bothered by the high winds but still finished third in the 800 meters with a 2:39.0 clocking. Peseo had a best of 14-6 in the long jump.

Cappie King, running in her first 100 meters of the season, ran a 14.3.

"I felt the girls did very well," said Ruidoso head girls coach Sergio Castanon. "Katherine's race was excellent. That made the whole track meet."

Like Maskew, Castanon sees Silver City as the team favorite in the district race.

"But the race for second should be a tossup," he said.

## Capitan wins girls' crown, local tracksters stand out

It was a good day for Capitan and Carrizozo high school's track teams in the District 1-A meet at Artesia Saturday.

The Capitan girls won the district title, while a good number of athletes from both schools qualified for the state A division meet next Friday and Saturday.

Capitan scored 91 1/2 in the girls division, followed by Cloudfroft with 83 1/2 points. Carrizozo finished third.

In boys competition, Capitan tied for second with Hagerman as Cloudfroft won the title. Carrizozo was fourth.

Shawna McDaniel provided a big lift for the Capitan girls when she won the 200 meters in 29.21 near the end of the meet.

"That was the turning point," said Tiger girls coach Darrel Ray. "I didn't think we'd win it until then."

The Tigers also showed their strength in winning four relays and thus qualifying for state in those events.

The 400-meter relay team ran a 54.2; the 800-meter relay squad finished in 1:54.8; and the medley relay team recorded a 2:01.4. The 1,600-meter relay team ran a 4:32.9.

Another Tiger star was Becky Huey, who won the 400 meters in 64.1 and ran on three relays. McDaniels, Tracy Herd and Joan Leslie also ran on three winning relay teams. Herd took third in the long jump with a 14-4 leap.

Becky Phillips ran on the winning 1,600-meter relay team and finished second in the 300-meter and 100-meter low hurdles events.

Christetta Chavez of Carrizozo won the two hurdle events, took third in the 100 meters, and was second in the high jump with a 4-8 leap. She qualified for state in the high jump last weekend.

Chavez's 24 individual points were the most by any girl in the meet.

Mary Jane Ferguson of the Grizzlies also qualified for state, taking second in the long jump with a 15-1 leap. Both Ferguson and Chavez have made the state meet every season since the eighth grade.

Liz Beltran was a standout in the field for Carrizozo, winning the shot put and taking second in the discus.

The Capitan boys were paced by Todd Proctor, who won the discus and shot put, took second in the javelin, finished third in the pole vault, and was fifth in the 165-meter low hurdles. He finished with 22 points, second to Cloudfroft's Tony Bell.

Danny Cummins added a first in the 200 meters (24.25), was third in the high jump, and ran on the winning medley relay team along with Ben Wolff, Tim McElhannon and Jack Revey, who had a strong final leg.

Tim McElhannon won the 400 meters in 53.18, was fourth in the javelin and ran on the medley relay team. He and Cummins also ran on the third-place 400-meter relay squad along with Sammy Castillo and Ben Wolff.

The 1,600-meter relay team of Cummins, Castillo, Revey and Wolff finished second in 3:49.41, but failed to qualify for state.

Daron Armstrong was another state meet qualifier for the Tigers as he finished second in the 3,000 meters in 10:29.48. He was also fourth in the 1,500 meters.

"I think the team did very well," said Tiger boys coach E. C. Jenkins. "I feel the people we qualified are strong in their events and should do well at state."

Carrizozo was sparked by its excellent sprinters and relay teams.

The Grizzly 400-meter relay team of Stevie Stearns, James Guevara, Kenneth Crenshaw and John Roueche finished first in a fine 46.1. The same quartet along won the 800-meter relay in 1:37.6.

Roueche and Stearns also went one-two in the 100 meters, both qualifying for state. They ran faster in the trials, Roueche having an 11.33 and Stearns an 11.35.

Roueche was also first in the 165-meter low hurdles while Joseph Candelaria took first in the 800 meters in 2:11.0.

Roueche also finished third in the discus and Crenshaw was fourth in the shot put. Crenshaw had already qualified for state in the shot put.

"I was very pleased with the team," said Carrizozo coach Hal Roueche. "I wasn't sure how our relay teams would run since we've had injuries but they did fine. Candelaria's 800 meters was outstanding as was our girls' efforts."

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Day or Night

In a meeting Thursday, April 19, the New Mexico Corporation Commission gave final approval to new rate schedules for Continental Telephone of the West (Contel). The new rates will replace the 52% surcharge that was put into effect by the Commission in 1983 while Contel's rate request was being considered.

Several changes in the way Contel charges its New Mexico customers for various telephone services are included in the rate schedule. The following are highlights of the new tariff.

- All single party zone and mileage charges will be replaced with a flat monthly fee of \$3.00 to any customer outside of the Base Rate Areas.
- Contel will be allowed to apply additional charges for late payments and also make a \$10.00 charge for checks returned because of insufficient funds.
- Customers will now be charged for calls to Directory Assistance. Contel will apply a \$.30 charge for each call after the first three each month to Directory Assistance.
- With regard to service connection, Contel will replace Time and Material charges with Premises Visit, Wiring, and Equipment Handling charges. All inside wire will be customer-owned and new rates will be applied if customers choose to have Contel maintain their inside wire.

In conjunction with the review and acceptance of the proposed rate schedule, Contel will initiate Usage Pricing in some of its New Mexico serving areas. The Usage Pricing option will allow customers to pay for their phone service based on their actual usage rather than paying a flat rate each month, regardless of how often they use their phone.

Usage Pricing is due for implementation in parts of Contel's Espanola and Ruidoso districts in June, 1984.

A couple of weekends ago as I drove on Highway 70 near Mescalero, I saw Ruidoso High School track star Cisco Bob jogging along at a brisk rate. "What dedication," I thought, "particularly on a Saturday."

Well, dedication and hard work has been a trademark of the Warrior distance runners this season.

Already, Bob and three other Ruidoso runners have qualified for the state AAA division meet in the 800 meters through 3,000 meters. The Warriors should grab a bundle of points in the state meet's long races two weeks from now, and they should do very well in the District 3-AAA meet this coming Friday.

"Right now in the AAA division I don't know if there's a school that has a group of runners like we do," said Warrior head boys track coach Ronny Maskew. "Some schools may have a second or third runner as good, but not all four."

And Ruidoso should continue to be a power in distance running for a while.

Bob is only a junior and already has set school records in the 1,500 meters and 3,000 meters. He finished second in the state 1,500 meters last season after finishing fourth in his sophomore year.

Other Warrior runners who have qualified for the state meet in the distance races are freshman Gabe Tam, junior Curt McClellan and

junior Francisco Olivera. McClellan took third in the state 800 meters last year.

All four of the runners competed on the Ruidoso cross-country team last fall, and that experience undoubtedly has helped them this spring. It was the first time Ruidoso has fielded a cross-country team.

"It was a big advantage to all of them," said Warrior head coach Ronny Maskew. "It probably helped them get ready for the shorter races this spring."

The four distance stars run around eight miles a day during their workouts after school.

"They each run a lot of their own too," Maskew said. "You know, it's easy for a good distance runner to get up and enjoy cross-country. They're all good, hard-working kids."

Needless to say, Maskew is optimistic about the future of Ruidoso's distance running corps.

"It's definitely the strong point of our program now," he said. "We've got some younger kids who should do pretty well soon, and we'll probably get some good distance runners from the middle school also."

So, if you see a young man in his teens running around the Ruidoso area one of these days, he's more than likely a distance runner for the Warriors—a budding dynasty in New Mexico track circles.

The 1984 Cree Meadows golf schedule was recently completed, with the first tournament a four-man scramble affair this coming Sunday.



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
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# The Dreamer

Today's Silver Lining takes the form of a letter written by Dan Storm's brother, Mark.

**DEAR DAN:**

You may remember that when our uncle Jerome Vincent Storm was editor of The Desert Hot Springs Sentinel, a California newspaper, he wrote a column entitled "Storm Clouds."

Frequently he wrote of episodes of his early life. I have been fortunate enough to have come into possession of some of them, and the one presented here is one of his best.

I thought you might like to pass it on to the readers of The Ruidoso News.

**YOURS, MARK**

**STORM CLOUDS**

Father's Day approaches. It is next Sunday, June 18th. A fitting time to celebrate it, for in that month more men lose their independence than any other time of the year.

"There's no damn fool like a parent," my father used to say, and when I think of what fathers have to put up with from their young, I'm inclined to think he was quite right. We always called him "Pod."

Pod's parents were Southern sympathizers, though they lived in the North. Pod, however, ran away to war and enlisted in the Navy on a gunboat, with the Yankees, when he was 14 years old. He wrote such a beautiful hand he was elected, even at that early age, Ship's Writer. After the war, he taught school. His sister and brothers were artists and Pod became interested in photography in the tin-type stage.

He had a photographing gallery in Evansville, Pennsylvania. One day, on a visit to Pittsburgh, Alliea Reno, a young school principal there, spied the young man.

"Who is the gentleman?" she asked a companion.

"Oh, that," said her friend, "is the egotistical Frank Storm from Evansville."

Shortly afterward, Frank and Alliea met and it was not long before they were married. Weak lungs sent Pod to Denver where he recovered his health and became the pioneer photographer of Denver with a gallery on Blake, which was then the main street.

Pod was 5 ft., 8 in. in height, completely bald on the top. His nose was so ponderous I used to study it as one does a map. He had an extraordinary moustache which curled up at the ends like handle-bars on a bicycle. Despite the fact that he worked so late, he would always stop at the barn to make sure we kids had watered the horse. If the animal gave the bucket a disdainful sniff he knew we had done our part. This seldom happened and Pod would walk backward and forward from the hydrant in the yard until the horse was satisfied. I used to hear him late at night, doing the things I could have so easily accomplished in the daytime. I would say to myself, "I'll do better tomorrow," but I never did. He saw great wealth at one time and we had a home on Capitol Hill. A Panic wiped out all that. Pod could have been right in their pitching though with the healthy politics in Denver. But he'd

run into something that was not according to Hoyle and parted company with the mounted gang to take shelter in the solid comfort of his own honest racket, the photographing gallery then at Sixteenth and Curtis. He had a pride in his work and the pictures he made are as clear and fine as the day they were developed years and years ago. His triumphs and reverses were predicated in a day's work from reflections he gathered from his customers.

"Aren't you ready, Mr. Storm?" There was a touchy interval to live through. When the subject gazed upon his own likeness, it was a sensitive pause, for there is nothing more personal than the duplicating likeness of oneself. The suspense was terrific. Pod would drum with his fingers on the showcase in agitation.

If the customer said the proofs were fine, Father's whole being radiated calm sunshine; if it went the wrong way, calm despair. He never could seem to get it into his head that anybody but himself could be wrong. The customer was always right. Pod arrived at that, not through business training, but by a certain instinct which was as much a part of him as the kindness which governed everything he did.

Pod wasn't afraid of anything. I remember one night when a giant drunken plumber was in the act of killing his wife. Her shrieks woke up the neighborhood. The women,

forewarned of the impending tragedy, commandeered their menfolks into action. Some of these smuggled closer into the bedclothes, while others made a run for it, but stopped petrified with fright outside the kitchen door of the house from which the screams echoed into the eerie night.

Pod, with his shirt tail flying, tore through the crowd and into the house. The shrieking woman had been giving her murderous husband the

runaround and was unharmed. Her spouse turned all his wrath on Father. Fortunately, in his anger, the plumber threw the butcher knife he was brandishing instead of using it to better advantage. A white pit-bull dog attacked Pod at the back of his legs, while the plumber was exchanging blows to the face.

Mrs. Morgan, one of the neighbors, came running through the back yard with a baseball bat, shouting, "Where is he till I hit him?" But by the time she got inside, Pod had the plumber on his back as a result of a jolt to the jaw, and various ladies were helping to tie the wretch with a clothline. The plumber spent a long time in the penitentiary and the neighborhood never saw him again. He had delivered a blow blackening both eyes and swelling up the nose. I thought Pod would never look normal again. It took months. I remember Thanksgiving Day, Pod carving the turkey, his face all swelled up, and sweating, as he always did when serving the bird.

Pod loved to recite Shakespeare, especially "Richard III" and he did a mighty fine job with the line, "Shine out, fair sun, for I shall have a looking glass, to see my shadow as I pass."

He lived to be 83 and passed away in Los Angeles, having introduced me to the motion picture business.

I remember on one of those beautiful sunny days we used to have in Hollywood before smog messed things up. We were returning from a walk. He gazed across the street at a home there.

"The people in that house must be very kind," he said.

"Why do you say that, Pod?" I asked.

"Because," he replied, "They're always in trouble."

## Editorial

Our initial reaction to Mayor George White's successful removal of chairman Greg Masters from the Planning and Zoning Commission was the same as that of most people—we were hot.

However, we now ask that cooler heads prevail.

What's done is done. Ruidoso must have a P&Z, and will have a P&Z, however the chips may fall.

It is up to the survivors of the mayor's purge—and to some of the non-survivors—to see that the new commission is as effective as it possibly can be.

The people who were directly affected must ask themselves what is best for the village—something we cannot believe the mayor did ask himself.

We are speaking of Masters and the P&Z members who retained their appointments. Resignations from P&Z (or from other village committees) in protest of the mayor's action would have a symbolic value only.

The future of Ruidoso needs capable direction, and is too important to leave totally in the hands of inexperienced people.

White said Masters could continue to serve P&Z in an advisory capacity. We encourage him to accept that offer. Masters benefited from an orderly transition of the chair, and his successor deserves the same.

Ruidoso is bigger than any individual. We encourage these people to put the village first.—TP

## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE — If you've watched New Mexico governors come and go, you can almost write the script.

As a candidate, the man destined for the top spot declares solemnly that creating new jobs for our people will be his major aim in office — though in his heart he knows he doesn't have the faintest idea how to accomplish that.

Once in office, he thoroughly revamps the agency concerned with economic development. That includes appointing people with no experience in the field to run it, as well as giving it a new name — which does at least create work for the printers of letterheads and business cards. In that revamping, every procedure left over from the previous administration gets dumped, including those which have been working nicely and need not be tampered with.

His overpaid and inexperienced appointees to this job then make breathless pledges to impossibly high goals — 5,000 new jobs their first year in office was the most recent one.

There will follow highly publicized pursuits of whatever industries are currently fashionable ("high tech" is the buzz phrase at the present).

Since all other states, counties and cities are also after that same target, we are guaranteed to be up against maximum competition, in both quantity and quality.

It's only when all this has proved notably unproductive (at least when the paucity of results is compared to the dollars expended) that an alternative thought dawns: Why not help the businesses we already have to grow?

That's not glamorous, and the idea involves no international travel, but it does have considerable merit.

Then — and almost always only then — the people at the top stumble on the charms of tourism, which long-termers have always appreciated.

They should. Serving tourists keeps 39,000 New Mexicans busy, and those tourists pay something like \$67 million a year in taxes which would otherwise have to be shouldered by residents.

Governor Anaya was speaking the literal truth when he said to a conference of tourist industry people, recently, "You represent New Mexico's most important private in-

dustry." That suggests expansion of this already-existing group of business might be more practical than any amount of blue-sky talk about the "maybes" — those out-of-state companies that might move to New Mexico if they can't get a better deal elsewhere.

Thanks largely to spadework done by Bruce King's people before they left office, the state is spending enough money for tourist advertising for the first time.

The plan to use much of that money, to match local bucks set aside for the same purpose is a clumsy one and not without problems, but it helps put our total ad budget in the \$5 million-per-year category for the first time ever.

The best thing the present administration has done in the area of advertising the state's charms is an in-depth study of the habits of travelers as they apply to New Mexico. It gives us something of a picture of the kind of people we are talking to when we use our state's evident charms as lure to attract expenditures.

For instance, it was not clear before this survey that as many as 39 percent of those who come here as tourists are professionals — doctors, lawyers, scientists and others — who arrive with fat wallets. Only 11 percent of them are educators, though they make demon tourists because of their curiosity.

Our tourists, in other words, are upscale folks — the kind who don't just happen into New Mexico but choose it because they know what they will find here.

That's almost as smart as most of our citizens, who moved here for exactly those same reasons.

Maybe we won't soon be announcing a new electronics plant at Cannonville, but there's no reason we can't put lots of visitors through there. Maybe no factory plans to locate in Taiban, but any tourist dollars left behind there would look mighty attractive.

Moral of story: If you cast your bread on the waters in expectation of return, do it when the tide is coming in, not going out. Tourists are an incoming tide.

## On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer



Why would I be watching MTV at 6:45 in the morning? Column research, of course.

I tuned in in time to catch a video I had seen for the first time just the night before, "Heart of Rock 'N Roll" by Huey Lewis and the News.

That figured. It swung the pendulum of the love-hate relationship I have developed with MTV (Music Television) back toward the friendly side.

One thing I can say in favor of MTV is that it has introduced me to new performers I enjoy—like Huey Lewis and the News.

One thing I can say against MTV is that for a good part of the time I am watching it I feel like I am engaged in something that is a total waste of time.

Music Television, for the uninitiated, is a cable television network whose programming is devoted totally to rock music. The bulk of that programming consists of rock videos.

For the really uninitiated (after all, it was a cover story in Time magazine), rock videos are little mini-films that accompany the playing of songs.

Sometimes they just show a group or individual performing. More often they feature special effects, dancers, actors, exotic locales, and about everything else you can imagine.

I don't think I have succeeded very well at describing what a video is—basically, you have to watch some to understand.

One way of thinking of videos is that they are little movies. Little movies that you see over and over again, if you watch much MTV.

The good ones don't mind seeing repeatedly.

The crummy ones don't get any better with subsequent viewings. What videos seem to have done is change the way people relate to rock music. An argument against videos is that they take away the listener's freedom to visualize a song—it's done for you.

For example, if you have seen the video, "Uptown Girl," by Billy Joel, do you think you can ever hear the song again without thinking of Christie Brinkley?

Not that that is an unpleasant image to conjure. Her eye language is amazing in "Uptown Girl."

When the video simply shows the performer in concert, the viewer retains more freedom to visualize, or to attach the song to a particular memory of his or her own.

The visual imagery in a concert video can be powerful, however, as in Van Halen's "Jump," the favorite video of Mrs. Palmer and her sixth-grade class.

With the exception of the occasional "Jump," however, concert videos aren't as interesting to watch as story videos.

My current favorite is "You Might Think," by The Cars, with its good

humor and great special effects.

You can read a message into "You Might Think." The funky-looking lead singer keeps pestering the beautiful girl until she finally seems to accept and even enjoy the attention. Almost every male figures out when he's too old to do anything about it that girls he classed as inaccessible back at school... well, maybe they weren't.

Another video I get a kick out of is "Legs," by ZZ Top. The story is of a square (but beautiful behind her glasses) girl who is hassled, along with the nice boy who likes her, by some lowlifes.

The pair is rescued by a trio of femme fatales, who oversee the conversion of the girl into a real knockout. ZZ Top appears and disappears, playing the good guys who are causing this all to happen.

So good triumphs over evil, so to speak, but... Did that girl have to become a super fox to find happiness? Mightn't trying to emulate her cause problems for young girls?

I mean, what if she was planning to go to medical school before she was "shown the light"?

(It's obvious I'm getting too caught up in watching these things.)

In my research viewing, I discovered something interesting. A video I didn't particularly like, "Back Where You Belong" by 38 Special, had kept me from really listening to the song. When I turned my head from the TV and just listened, I realized the song was pretty good.

I asked some sixth-graders about MTV.

"I watch that (MTV) more than any other station," said Layne Paquin. How much, I wondered.

He estimated about six hours a day. Does he do homework while he watches?

"No, too involved in the videos."

K.C. Starr doesn't watch MTV every day, but he enjoys it when he does. He plays saxophone himself, and wouldn't mind playing in a rock band and being in a video someday.

Rachel Ibarra likes the story videos, like "Hello," by Lionel Richie. MTV is having an influence on Ruidoso's young record buyers, according to Jan Mayer, manager of The Flip Side.

"They see it and then they'll come in and buy it."

Policeman Mark Paz has some reservations about MTV. He told me he sees a lot of TV-imitated behavior in his work, and indicated MTV might influence youngsters in an undesirable way.

For myself, I think I am going to cut down. After all, I have now written "The MTV Column," so I can't justify any more watching as column research.

Goodbye, Nena, it was nice while it lasted. But a feeling that there are better things to do (like read a good book) has popped our 99th Luftballoon.



**Mountain Ski Shop back in business**

"It was a disaster when it happened. It was the wrong blasted time to have a fire," said Ronnie Taylor, owner of Mountain Ski Shop.

Taylor's shop, the victim of a very destructive fire in the icy-cold early evening hours of December 19, just reopened its doors on Monday. The fire resulted in a complete loss of the contents of the shop just six days before Christmas.

"It couldn't have come at a worse time," Taylor said. The shop had just been stocked for the Christmas crowds, Taylor said, and had undergone a thorough remodeling the previous summer. The fire resulted in a financial loss for the business that wasn't completely covered by insurance.

"I was definitely underinsured," Taylor said. "Needless to say, we will have better coverage this go-around."

According to Taylor, the business is

a family endeavor, and the accident had an effect on the Taylor family. However, he said they never considered giving up the business.

"It's hard to put into words how a person feels when they see their livelihood go up in smoke," he said. But, he added, "going out of business never entered my mind, this is our living."

According to Taylor, they took advantage of the fire damage to completely remodel the shop.

Taylor said they managed to add about 1,500 square feet of sales space to the shop, and utilized bright colors and open space to give the shop a feel of airiness.

"We're tickled to death to be open," Taylor said. "We are very proud of our store."

Taylor said the shop has also obtained a new "state-of-the-art" grinder for the ski shop, and will continue the same service and repairs of skis offered before. Taylor said the other departments of the store will

also continue the same policies and offerings as before the fire.

According to Taylor, a grand opening for the shop is scheduled for mid-May. He said the remodeling of the shop was complete, except for paving of the parking lot, which will be done within a few weeks.

Taylor stressed that the shop suffered a complete loss, and that no merchandise from the time of the fire is left. He said a salvage company from Utah bought all the stock that was usable.

The support of friends in Ruidoso helped the Taylors get through the crisis of the fire, Taylor said.

"It's great to know you have people who are concerned about you when things happen like this."

Believing that things would work out for the best, Taylor said, helped him have faith in the future of the shop.

"If you don't give up the ghost, things will work out for you," Taylor said.

**School board opens sports gear bids**

They set a special session at noon Tuesday, May 29, to open those bids.

The next regular session of the board is scheduled at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 8, in the board room.

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

"Overall, I just liked what Yamaha brought out, what they stood for and the quality behind it," he said.


Taylor said he wanted his dealership to maintain a small, friendly dealership atmosphere. He said he would like to see it as a local, friendly place to visit.






The Judds will be back in the studio in May with pro-


