Plane crash kills one

It has happened again. One person died and three others were critically injured Friday afternoon when a single-engine airplane crashed in the Country Club Estates subdivision after an aborted landing attempt.

Ronald Wahlrobe, 43, of Lubbock, Texas, was pronounced dead on arrival at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital. Wahlrobe was a pastor at the Trinity Interdenominational Church in Lubbock. He was coming to Ruidoso for a religious retreat, according to Ruidoso Police Chief Dick Swenor.

Linda Opperman, 38, of Lubbock, remained in critical condition Monday morning in Saint Mary's Hospital in Roswell.

Judy Moore, 37, of Crosbyton, Texas, was listed in serious condition in the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

Harold Opperman, 39, of Lubbock was listed in stable condition in the intensive care unit at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital Monday morning. No one on the ground was injured. Harold Opperman was the pilot.

According to airport employee Steve Perry, it was Opperman's first time to fly into the Ruidoso airport. With south-southwesterly winds gusting at close to 30 miles per hour, Opperman headed south for his approach to the landing strip at about 2:25 p.m., said Perry.

He tried to land the plane twice, but winds prevented him from keeping the plane on the runway, said Perry.

He abandoned the landing attempt, then banked the plane sharply to the left, according to Perry. The sharp banking procedure apparently cut his airspeed, and Opperman could not get the Beechcraft Musketeer high enough to avoid trees on the canyon walls to the east.

"He couldn't get out of the canyon," said eyewitness David Jarratt.

The plane then banked back to the right, losing more airspeed, said Perry. According to Jarratt, the plane stalled with its nose up in the air, then nose-dived, landing with a "thud" in a yard at 107 Nogal Place.

The plane apparently bounced clipping the corner of a house roof. It stopped, leaning against a tree with its tail in the air.

"We knew somebody was going to be killed," said Perry, who watched the accident from the airport.

"He (the pilot) wasn't familiar with the area," said Perry. "He just kind of panicked."

Perry said normal procedure in the case of an aborted landing is to proceed down the canyon over the Cree Meadows Golf Course and downtown Ruidoso before attempting to turn around.

There was apparently no engine trouble involved in the accident, said Chief Swenor. Witness Jack Robertson said he heard the engine running as it passed over him near the site of the crash.

No one else was hurt in the accident. According to police reports, the house at 107 Nogal Lane belongs to Ely Spears of Hobbs, and was unoccupied at the time.

Johnny Jarratt was one of the first people on the scene, and found the occupants crying for help. He cut a seat belt from around one of the passengers, who he said was blue for lack of air, but waited for emergency personnel to further attend to the victims.

The front of the plane was completely smashed, leaving the cockpit hardly recognizable. Robertson said fuel was pouring over the left wing of the plane.

Emergency personnel used a jaws of life extrication device and a winch for 15 to 20 minutes in retrieving the four people from the wreck.

White Mountain Search and Rescue volunteers guarded the wrecked plane Friday night and Saturday morning. Federal Aviation Administration officials, who drove into Ruidoso, investigated the site Saturday morning. The wreckage was removed shortly afterward.

The crash was the second fatal one in the subdivision since 1979. A plane crashed only a few blocks away in May 1979, killing the pilot. According to the National Transportation Safety Board, 17 people have died in 26 crashes since 1964. Two planes crash landed at the airport in the last two and a half months.

Ruidoso residents reacted strongly to this most recent accident.

Rod Adamson said he was at the White Mountain Elementary School picking up his five-year-old daughter at the time of the accident.

He explained that his daughter attends Nob Hill Elementary School on the other side of town, but was in one

of five or six buses that travel along Hull Road—one block from the accident—at almost the exact time of the accident. Adamson said he was terrified at the thought of the plane hitting one of the buses.

"It just scares the dickens out of me," said Adamson. "I'm just a father and I hate to think that could happen."

"I have been up here almost 10 years and have always heard that we are going to move the airport."

He wondered aloud when the airport would actually be moved to another site.

"When the cows quit eating?" asked Adamson.

New Mexico State University leases 25,000 acres of land on Fort Stanton Mesa—the proposed site of a new airport—from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) for range research. The university has opposed an airport on 1,600 acres of land on the mesa, claiming it would irreparably disrupt valuable research.

U.S. Representative Joe Skeen said he was "horrified" by the accident. Skeen has supported a new airport for Ruidoso, citing the dangerous location of the present airport.

"It emphasizes once again what we've been trying to say all along," said Skeen. He lamented the fact that it took another death to emphasize the safety hazards of the airport.

"It's very tragic and I'm sorry to hear that," said state Transportation Secretary Judith Espinosa of the accident. She said the crash meant people working for a new airport at the state level would work even harder.

"I think it (the accident) emphasizes the fact that we need an airport and we need it at the right place, which is Site B," Espinosa stated.

Site B is the preferred airport site on Fort Stanton Mesa. The site has been opposed by New Mexico State University, which conducts agricultural research there.

"It's human lives we're talking about," Espinosa added.

"People in this town need to take a stand and get an airport," said David Jarratt.

"We can't just sit back and wait," said Adamson. He said he was ready for some kind of demonstration by Ruidoso residents to show the U.S. Interior Department that Ruidoso needs and wants a new airport.

Fred Heckman to address council

Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) chairman Fred Heckman will deliver a report at Tuesday's village council meeting on the status of efforts to get a regional airport.

Local resident John Howden is hoping to see a huge turnout for Tuesday's meeting as a show of concern about the danger of the present airport.

"We need a big big showing of people and their kids," said Howden.

Councillor Bill Karn endorsed the idea of a big turnout. "I think it would be great," he said. "I'm tired of picking up dead bodies all over town just because NMSU is having a grass study."

"My dad said they were good at growing grass for graveyards."

Heckman had just put his signature on his report Friday when he got word of the crash.

He pointed out that the report will be free of the "emotional taint" of Friday's tragedy.

Heckman said Sunday he had told one interviewer when asked his reaction to the crash that he was relieved.

Reflecting on his answer, Heckman said that when you're sitting on a time bomb—a keg of gunpowder—and the thing goes off and it's a firecracker, you're relieved.

He added that Friday's accident was sad and shocking, but he expressed fear of others to come.

"It's going to get worse and one of these days we're going to have a real bad one," Heckman lives near the crash site. Friday's crash was the

third—and second with a fatality—in a two-block area from his home.

Heckman said the feeling now is a full environmental impact statement will have to be done before SBAC's land transfer application for airport Site B on Fort Stanton Mesa goes to the Department of Interior.

He said the airport effort needs to be concentrated on two things. One is that New Mexico State University (NMSU) must be made to see that an airport would be advantageous to its research program.

The other is that political pressure must be continued. Secretary of the Interior William Clark must be made to doubt the veracity of his own staff, said Heckman, as that staff is preaching the NMSU line.

New effort at three percent lodgers' tax

The Ruidoso Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC) Thursday evening approved a \$208,000 budget and a recommendation to the village council to increase lodgers' tax collections to three percent.

The proposed 1984-85 budget represents a \$38,265 increase over the 1983-84 budget and \$78,000 more than predicted lodgers' tax revenues. The village council will have to give final approval to the lodgers' tax budget.

Included in the budget was a request for \$40,000 to be contributed by the Village of Ruidoso for development of new markets. The village contributed \$55,000 to lodgers' tax last year. The council approved \$30,000 to be spent for media advertising and \$25,000 for a Mexican advertising program.

LTC members were reminded Thursday night that the \$25,000 for Mexican advertising was only a temporary loan from the village general fund, and must be repaid by the end of the 1984-85 fiscal year.

None of the LTC members remembered the term "loan" being used when the council approved the \$25,000 expenditure. But village clerk Leon Eggleston showed them a copy of the original resolution and read

minutes of the village council meeting during which the loan was approved.

LTC member Rod Adamson moved that the \$25,000 loan payment be tacked onto the originally proposed \$183,000 budget. After his motion passed unanimously, Adamson noted the predicted \$78,000 shortfall in lodgers' tax collections.

The committee has predicted lodgers' tax collections will be \$130,000 next fiscal year. Lodgers' tax collections amounted to \$105,761.08 in 1982-83, and were running about 12 percent ahead of that as of February.

LTC chairman Archer Wilson noted Thursday that collections are still ahead of last year but not 12 percent—as of the end of April.

He said the \$208,000 proposed budget is a relatively small promotional budget for a town that depends so heavily on tourism. Wilson said that shortfall should motivate the committee to recommend an increase of lodgers' tax collections from two percent to three percent.

LTC member Linda Flack warned committee members that they should consult Ruidoso lodgers before taking the matter before the village council. Chamber of Commerce president James Paxton agreed that lodgers should be consulted about the increase. He said the chamber's attempts to have the lodgers' tax in-

creased last year failed in part due to lack of campaigning with that group.


"I agree. We have to work with the lodgers," said chairman Wilson, who noted that he had already talked to several lodgers about the proposed increase.

West Winds Lodge owner Nancy Radziewicz said the committee should expect substantial opposition from lodgers. She said lodgers have had a poor year so far and would not

Friday's fatal plane crash provokes ire of nearby residents

"Too close for comfort" and "we need a new airport" were chorused by Nogal Place neighbors after the Friday fatal crash.

One resident did point out that Country Club Estates residents knew the airport was there when they moved to the neighborhood.

Most of the neighbors reacted strongly against the airport.

"I want that thing closed and out of here," Libby Sears said of the airport. She lives at 114 Nogal Place, close to the crash site at 107 Nogal Place.

Traffic has increased tremendously at the airport since the Sears family moved to the neighborhood 15 years ago, she said. A lot of the planes are getting larger, too, she added.

"We didn't think much about it (air traffic) when we bought," she said. Now she thinks about it. At the time of the afternoon crash, Sears was not at home, but her two children were.

"Of course I rushed to the phone," she said, to make sure they were safe. Sears said she had opposed the airport since the last fatal accident in her neighborhood.

Because of a prior commitment, she probably will not attend the Ruidoso village council meeting Tuesday. However, many neighbors plan to be at the session for a discussion of the airport.

One person who does not live in the neighborhood but happened to witness the incident is David Jarratt. His father, Johnny Jarratt, lives on La Luz Lane, a few yards uphill from the crash.

David Jarratt was sitting in his

father's living room, discussing building a house with a client who happens to be a retired pilot.

They rushed to the crash to help the victims.

A day after the accident, David Jarratt reflected about the airport situation. "For a person that flies in and knows this airport, it's so-so," he said. "You can live with it."

For first-time pilots in the area, it can be treacherous. However, "this scares every kind of pilot."

Jarratt is not a pilot himself, but he said he had flown in and out of the airport often.

His own home is in the Juniper Hills area, near the north end of the airport runway. Planes often fly low over his house as they land from the north.

"I watch them come in all the time," he said on busy weekends, like the Fourth of July weekend, the

family can sit on their front deck and view the steady air traffic.

"It's stupid for us to have that airport," Jarratt said. "Because of the approach patterns and the way they fly out, it endangers everybody in town."

He praised the village fire department and police in their response to the accident, then wondered why Ruidoso doesn't have an equally good airport.

"I don't understand what our drawback is. We need an airport."

For one thing, crash landings hurt the economy in a resort community, he said. "This kills my business (homebuilding)," he claimed, along with trade for motels and other tourism-related concerns.

He compared it to having a shark on the beach at a seaside resort.

The flights go on. "In the time I was at that crash, four planes took off," Jarratt said.

Mary Klein echoed him. "Even while all this was going on, there was another (plane) taking off," she said.

She and her husband, Bill, live at 100 Nogal Place, at a corner just south of the crash. "It's too close for comfort," she said repeatedly Friday evening.

"I was in the kitchen. I heard a boom and came out to look." She thought it might be a construction truck, or "maybe someone had come up and hit our motor home."

The Kleins had considered leaving Ruidoso for the weekend, but decided it was too windy to drive the motor home.

"If they're taking off in these winds, pilots should think two or three

or four times before doing it," she said.

"When these planes are up there and they're in trouble, where are they going to come down?" she asked.

Klein compared the airport situation to a street somewhere that needs a stop sign. "Someone generally has to get killed before they put one in," she said.

Airplanes encountering problems aren't new to Klein. When they lived in California, she said, she heard an engine in trouble. The plane later crashed in a schoolyard.

The possibility of a plane crashing among children in Ruidoso is a concern for her. Youngsters live in her neighborhood, and the White Mountain schools are near the airport.

Klein has never flown from it. "After this, I don't think I care to," she said.

favor an increase in the tax they must charge their customers.

Kadzewicz said Ruidoso lodgers also felt some resentment that no lodgers outside of the village limits collect the tax, but still benefit from the advertising it purchases.

Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth said he would approach the Lincoln County commissioners and the Ruidoso Downs trustees about instituting lodgers' tax collections within their jurisdictions. The chamber approached those governing bodies with the same request last year, but neither body instituted the tax.

Jungbluth also noted that increased lodgers' tax collections could result in more matching funds from the state, which would be spent for media advertising.

Ruidoso received approximately \$55,000 this year in matching funds

from the state for media advertising. Jungbluth said he had been informed by state officials that Ruidoso could expect to receive close to that amount this year if lodgers' tax collections remained the same.

The one percent increase in lodgers' tax would increase local revenues approximately \$50,000 to \$60,000. If the state matched that money on a 60-40 basis as it has this year, that could mean close to an additional \$100,000 for media advertising, said LTC member Richard Sandoval.

Flack said the committee should tell lodgers that the committee understands that business is down, but that the village should advertise more and try new programs to increase business.

Sandoval's motion to recommend a one percent increase in the lodgers' tax to the village council passed unanimously.

LTC's proposed budget included

\$67,500 for media advertising, up from \$56,235 last year. The advertising budget included \$2,000 for the Ruidoso Art Festival, \$1,000 for the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival, \$37,500 for fall and winter advertising, and \$27,000 for spring and summer advertising.

The budget also included \$12,500 for a full-time administrator of the lodgers' tax. That money would roughly correspond to the \$7,500 allocated last year for a part-time travel counselor at the Chamber of Commerce. The exact job description for that position has not been determined yet.

The proposed budget also included allocations of \$12,000 for trade shows attended by the Chamber of Commerce, \$2,000 for trade shows attended by the Ruidoso Business Association, \$5,500 for the Aspen Festival, \$2,000 for Sun Country regional tourism organization dues, \$14,000 for printing costs on brochures and han-

douts, \$7,000 for postage; \$7,500 for a contingency fund; and \$13,000 to the village for administration of the lodgers' tax fund.

Committee members discussed the possibility of not having to pay the village that money if they hire a full-time administrator, but were informed by village clerk Eggleston that the village planned to appropriate that money anyway.

The proposed budget also included \$40,000 for new market development. The committee is asking that the village contribute that money to the lodgers' tax fund. If it is approved, more specific expenditures for that money will be determined, said Wilson.

The budget also included \$25,000 for the repayment of the temporary loan from the village general fund.

Since the committee finished its budget proposal Thursday, the budget workshop previously scheduled for Monday, May 7, has been cancelled.

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) approved a final plat of High Mesa Subdivision Unit 4 in Alto for Don Blauggund during a special meeting Thursday.

The subdivision is 28.401 acres with 55 lots of one-third to three-quarters of an acre, according to Blauggund. It is east of the three other High Mesa Subdivisions Blauggund has developed. He said he hoped to sell the lots for \$15,500 to \$19,900.

The commission approved the plat in spite of the fact that some of the utilities will be above ground. Blauggund said he thought his subdivision would be the only one in Lincoln County able to supply 500 gallons of water per minute for two hours.

Approval of Blauggund's plat was the only action taken at the special meeting.

Anita Sanders seeks seat

Anita Sanders has announced that she is a candidate for the state House of Representatives from District 56. She is a Democrat who lives in Artesia.

Sanders said the primary reason she is running for the position is the need for "a strong voice in Santa Fe for our district." Sanders also cited crime and prison reform and integrity in government as issues important to her.

Sanders also addressed the issue of an airport for Ruidoso in her announcement of candidacy.

"One of the most pressing needs of our district is a new airport in Ruidoso," she said. "We need that new airport, and in the past two years we have seen very little progress. I feel that the airport should be put at the top of the list of state-funded projects because of the danger to lives posed by the limitations of the current facility. I will strive in every manner possible to achieve this goal."

Other high priorities for Sanders would include a fight against future tax increases and tax reform to ensure fair tax treatment for areas of New Mexico that experience heavy tourist traffic.

On that issue, she said, "These areas need to be given special consideration under the tax law so they can benefit directly from tax revenues generated by tourism."

Sanders is the owner of Sanders Realty in Artesia. She is married to Fred Sanders, president of the Artesia branch of Valley Federal Savings Bank. The couple has two children: Cheryl, a dental hygienist in Ruidoso, and Jeff, a senior in high school. Sanders is also a director of the Artesia Chamber of Commerce and a former president of the Artesia Board of Realtors.

"Our part of the state has not received a fair share of benefits for too long," she said. "We need a strong assertive voice for us in Santa Fe to change this situation."

Atkins runs for DA's post

Bert Atkins, a 32-year-old lifetime resident of Alamogordo, has announced his candidacy for district attorney of the 12th Judicial District.

After graduation from Alamogordo High School, Atkins attended the University of New Mexico and the University of New Mexico School of Law, where he received his juris doctorate degree in 1977. While in law school, Atkins published two articles in the Natural Resources Journal, and received a Dean's Award for his services to the school.

In his third year of law school, Atkins participated in a special clinical law program in which the students practiced as felony prosecutors in the Albuquerque district attorney's office. His association with that office included the administrations of both James Brandenburg and Ira Robinson.

Since law school, Atkins' experiences include two and a half years as an assistant district attorney. He handled all forms of work ranging from the prosecution of death penalty murder cases to civil assistance for county government.

Atkins attended and successfully completed a Career Prosecutor course in 1981 at the National College of District Attorneys.

Atkins has spent the last year as district public defender for the 12th Judicial District, representing over 300 clients during that time.

"I want to offer the people of Otero and Lincoln counties my abilities, energy and integrity," said Atkins.

"The office of district attorney is not a nine to five job, but rather a 24 hour a day commitment. I pledge to make the office of district attorney responsible to all those it represents; to coordinate the energies of law enforcement; to provide legal assistance to county government agencies; and to act in the interest of those victims of crimes whose lives are personally affected. I will devote whatever time is necessary to the job."

Atkins and his wife, Eve, have two children, ages two and five. They expect their third child in September.

Dean, 35, is in the ranching business west of Carrizozo with her husband, Larry. They have a daughter, Casey.

She is vice chairman of New Horizons Development Center, a non-profit corporation for the mentally retarded in Carrizozo; past president of Canyon Cowbells; past board member of the Carrizozo Health Center; and a current member of the Twelfth Judicial Law Enforcement Association.

Dean noted that she had worked closely with attorneys in Lincoln County, and encouraged any interested party to speak with them about her abilities.

Ruidoso High School will be represented by 12 athletes in the state AAA division track meet in Albuquerque next Friday and Saturday.

The Warriors reached that number as a result of Friday's District 3-AAA meet at Cobre High School. Ruidoso finished fourth in the boys division with 58 points and fifth in the girls division with 25 points. Silver City won both the boys and girls titles easily.

Cisco Bob won the 1,500 meters and 3,000 meters to spark the Warrior boys effort. Curt McClellan added a first in the 800 meters with a personal best of 2:01.01.

Other Warrior boy qualifiers were Francisco Olvera and Gabe Tam in the 3,000 meters; the 400-meter relay team with a second place; and Justin Smith in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles.

Eric Strobel, Steve Caidow and Mark Johnston teamed with McClellan in the relay. Smith took third in the hurdles Friday but had qualified by time last week.

Warrior girls going to state are Kim Daniels in the 100 meters and 200 meters, and the second-place 1,600-meter relay team of Daniels, Laura Trapp, Jackie Jefferson and Deanna Peso.

The meet was run on Cobre's slow dirt track and most of the times were sub-par because of that.

Bob, who has run a 4:06.76 1,500 meters and 9:09.90 3,000 meters this season, ran a 4:13 in the shorter race and a 9:38 in the longer one. He won easily in both races.

Olvera finished second in the 3,000 meters with a 10:04.0 clocking, and Tam was fourth in 10:18.0. However, both qualified for state several weeks ago.

The boys 400-meter relay team took second in 45.76, off their seasonal best but a good time on the Indian track. Ruidoso was third going into the final leg but McClellan put on a strong finishing kick to nip the Hot Springs anchorman for second place.

McClellan again used his strong kick to win the 800 meters. His previous best was 2:01.25. He has placed in every 800-meter race he's run this season.

Johnston, a senior, added a fourth place in the long jump, and junior

Tracy Gann was fifth. Gann also was third in the 400 meters.

Smith was third in the intermediate hurdles but qualified for state with a 42.48 last week. The Warrior junior was also fifth in the 110-meter high hurdles with a 17.2 time.

The Ruidoso 800-meter and 1,600-meter relay teams each took third but failed to qualify.

The Warrior 800-meter relay quartet of Johnston, Snidow, Strobel and McClellan ran a 1:36.0. The 1,600-meter relay squad of Snidow, Gann, Strobel and McClellan recorded a 3:44.0.

"We did pretty well," said Warrior head boys coach Ronny Maskev. "Several of the kids had personal bests. We were hoping to do better in a couple of the relays."

In the girls competition, Daniels just missed taking first in the 100 meters as she ran a 12.9, one-tenth off her seasonal best of 12.8.

She has also qualified for state in the 200 meters, but didn't run that event in the district meet because the Warriors needed help in the relay events. Daniels has a 26.65 best in the 200 meters this season.

It was a real team effort that enabled the Warriors to qualify in the girls

1,600-meter relay event. Ruidoso ran a seasonal best of 4:21.0.

Trapp got the Warrior girls off well, and Jefferson, who has been injured, kept Ruidoso close to second place. Peso ran a strong leg and Daniels closed with a rush to push the first-place squad.

Senior Lillian Lopez also had a good day, although she didn't qualify for state. She was third in the shot put with a 32.1 throw and was fifth in the discus with a 91-foot toss. The discus effort was Lopez's personal best.


Freshman Katherine Sanchez was fifth in the long jump with a 13-11 effort. She has a best of 15-3 this season.

Berdine Smith added a third in the 3,000 meters, and Peso was fourth in the 800 meters. Peso also finished sixth in the long jump.

"I was very disappointed with a lot of the performances," said Ruidoso head girls coach Sergio Castanon. "I thought we'd do much better."

"However, we're real young. We've got seven freshmen on the team. Lillian and Kim did a good job."

The state meet will be at Wilson Stadium in the Duke City. Competition will begin at 4 p.m. both Friday and Saturday.

This past Saturday was both a step back in time for me and a possible look at the future.

I ran (at least about two-thirds of the way) in the four-mile jog-a-thon sponsored by the Friends of the Ruidoso Public Library.

The race started at the intersection of Gavilan Canyon and Hull Road. It continued down Gavilan past the new high school, passed the present high school, and finally ended at Bart's Better Burgers on Sudderth Road across from the library. Most of the race was downhill.

I wasn't really ready for the race. Although I ran track and cross-country in high school, it's been over 15 years since I ran a distance race in any competition.

I mean the most I've worked out in the past months has been to get off my couch to turn another television channel on. I weigh at least 50 pounds more than I did when I ran in high school, and I'm about the same height.

Could I survive this arduous race through the mountains at almost 7,000 feet above sea level?

I decided I'd better try it if I was ever going to get back into shape. I hadn't known what that was like since the late 1960s or early 1970s.

Besides, I'd just been running the race for the fun of it, even walking part of the way.

So off I went to the race. I've always preferred running in cool weather instead of hot weather, and fortunately, Saturday morning was brisk.

I got to the starting line and took a few minutes warming up along with the other competitors, who included News editor Tim Palmer and reporter Darrell Pehr and his wife Linda.

We took off and immediately I tried to stay up near the front of the pack.

While running in high school, I usually tried to get close to the leaders and ahead of most of the other competitors, although it didn't always work out that way.

I've never had a strong finishing kick, so the above approach was really my only approach. In high school, my main goal was to be competitive in most of my races—not really to win. There were a lot of other runners who could leave me in the dust on the final lap of the two-mile run.

So this time I figured my only chance to finish well would be to stay up with the leader for as long as possible.

When I was in shape, I was able to pace myself well without running out of gas. But that was a while ago.

I felt my legs begin to stiffen. I tried

to speed up but I couldn't. As we ran through the pines in the first mile, I felt myself "losing it" and decided to walk for a while. After all, I was just using this race as a stepping stone to get back into shape.

Gradually people passed me up. At about the halfway point Darrell caught up with me and we ran together awhile.

But finally Darrell pulled ahead and I slowed down, trying to do something for the final quarter-mile "sprint" I was hoping to pull off.

However, that "sprint" never came off.

As I turned up the road towards the present high school gymnasium I figured I had about a half-mile left.

In truth, it was less than that. It was between two-tenths and three-tenths of a mile from the gymnasium to the finish line.

But when I saw the finish line ahead of me, it seemed like it was a million miles away.

My old high school coach always told us that we'd know when we were in shape if we were able to maintain or increase our speed after the pain and stiffness set in. It was the old pain barrier. We were supposed to push ourselves more when we felt the aches and pains in our legs.

Well, the pain and stiffness had been with me most of the race and I couldn't see how I'd be able to run the rest of the way.

I tried to push and the speed wasn't there. To make matters worse, a strong wind was blowing in my face, and I seemed to go slower.

About halfway down the final street I stopped for a few seconds, feeling I needed a brief rest to run the rest of the way.

I started running again. My legs felt like rubber and I thought I was going in slow motion.

Off in the distance, I heard people encouraging me to finish. I was in agony.

Every step seemed to take forever. There wasn't any speed left but I ran on.

Finally I crossed the final line and breathed a sigh of relief. I used to enjoy the final parts of the race, even though I couldn't kick well.

But there wasn't any enjoyment in the last part of Saturday's race.

Maybe I was getting old.

But I decided after the race that age wasn't going to stop me. I plan a moderate running program over the next few weeks to get back in shape.

I saw a glimpse back at my past and decided I still wanted it to be part of my future.

Donna Mobley of Ruidoso had a bye in the first round of the girls singles competition, but lost a hard-fought


decision in the second round.



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Water-borne disease giardia subject of a recent workshop

"Giardia seems to be our biggest problem in water supply systems, especially in the Rocky Mountains," epidemiologist Stewart Castle recently told a group of water technicians at the Ruidoso Public Library.

Surface water supply systems, especially those such as Ruidoso Water Plant Number One in the Upper Canyon, are especially susceptible to the parasitic protozoan giardia lamblia, said Castle during a workshop on the prevention of water-borne disease in water supplies.

The workshop was one of three given around the state, jointly sponsored by the Water Supply Program, Health and Environment Department and the New Mexico State University Dona Ana Branch Utility Operator Training Program.

The disease, giardiasis, is commonly characterized by diarrhea, abdominal cramps and fatigue. It can come in an acute form, which includes weight loss and fever, or a chronic form, which comes and goes for months.

Giardia lamblia was a suspect in a mysterious disease that struck many people in Ruidoso last summer. The cause of the disease was never discovered.

While chlorine can effectively pre-

vent viruses like Hepatitis A and bacteria like Salmonella from reaching the consumer, giardia lamblia cysts are relatively unaffected by the chemical. Chlorine concentrations necessary to kill the cysts make the water almost unpotable, said Castle.

The parasite has two different stages—a dormant cyst stage and an active reproductive stage. The parasite reproduces in the digestive tract of almost any mammal. Once it is excreted into a harsher environment, it changes into the cyst form, which has a resistant cover.

It is also extremely difficult to detect in water, and is often absent from the water system by the time people start becoming sick, said Castle.

People who are exposed do not come down with the disease for an average of two weeks. The cysts that caused the disease may easily be gone from the water system by that time.

Even if they were not, the 10-micron cysts are very difficult to find in the water.

"At this point there is no reliable method of testing the water for giardia," said Castle.

Some experimental methods for determining the presence of giardia lamblia are currently being worked on, but none can guarantee conclusive

results, said Castle.

Castle suggested water turbidity, or cloudiness, can often be an indicator of the possible presence of giardia. If the water treatment plant is allowing some dirt and other materials through, there is a chance that giardia is slipping through the system as well.

And giardia appears to be quite prevalent in surface water, especially cool mountain streams.

"We know they are around," said Haywood Martin, Environmental Improvement Division director of training schools. "It loves surface water."

Giardia very rarely gets into wells, but often gets into surface water as a result of mammals defecating into the water system. Dogs, elk, beaver, almost any mammal can drop giardia into the water. It can live up to two months in cool water, said Castle.

The best method of removing giardia from the water system appears to be filtration, said Santa Fe water superintendent Tom Scanlon.

The Alto Crest treatment plant is state of the art, but the Upper Canyon plant is an older one lacking the coagulation and sedimentation processes now common in treatment plants. The coagulation and sedimentation processes help remove more of the water impurities before the water ever reaches the filter.

The Upper Canyon plant depends

solely upon filtration and chlorins for its treatment, said Ruidoso water quality technician Becky Durham. A breakdown in the filtration can allow the giardia to slip through, said Scanlon.

Because of space limitations at the plant, the small number of people served, and the cost of adding the processes to the plant, it appears unlikely that Ruidoso will add a coagulation and sedimentation process to the Upper Canyon plant, said water superintendent Richard Sanchez.

The Upper Canyon plant provides water only to the Upper Canyon.

The village is now working on a supply system that will allow the Upper Canyon to get water from the Alto Crest plant when the Upper Canyon plant has to be shut down because of high runoff and turbid water. Periods of high runoff are also periods of higher chance of giardia contamination, said Scanlon.

If turbid water comes out of the taps in the Upper Canyon, Castle suggested boiling it before drinking it.

The Upper Canyon will be able to receive water from the Grindstone reservoir once it is built, said Sanchez.

Just because the giardia cysts slip through the system does not mean that people who drink the water necessarily will get the disease. Castle predicted that if every person in a

room were given a glass of giardia-impregnated water, only 50 percent would actually show any symptoms.

In a general population drinking from a giardia-contaminated system, a much lower number would come down with the disease, said Castle.

An accurate diagnosis of the disease can be done only by laboratory testing of stool samples, said Castle. It is relatively easy, however, to treat the disease with a couple of different drugs, he noted. Doctors will often prescribe those drugs before getting conclusive results, because of their effectiveness and the fact that they cause relatively few side effects.

In addition to water supply systems, day care centers can be a prime method of source of the disease, said Castle. The disease is transmitted only through a fecal-oral route of transmission. The combination of diaper changing and food preparation within day care centers can allow for transmission of the disease, said Castle.

Swimming pools have also been known to be a source of the cysts, he added.

Castle toured the Upper Canyon

plant and saw its water source while he was in Ruidoso. Although he said he was unqualified to comment on the operation of the plant, he did say that that type of water source could easily contain giardia lamblia cysts.

He said the Alto Crest plant, which supplies most of Ruidoso, offers a very small chance of giardia contamination.

He suggested a public meeting for Ruidosians to further educate them about the disease. Durham said that will probably happen later this summer.

Two researchers from New Mexico State University also will be studying Ruidoso's water system for possible giardia contamination and detection this summer.

Castle warned the water technicians that it is important to notify the Environmental Improvement Division if there is any suspected giardiasis outbreak. Providing accurate information to the public about the disease can prevent panic, he said.

The technicians should also remember that eight of 10 reports of water causing sickness turn out to be false, he said.

County P&Z discusses Lincoln Ordinance

The Lincoln Historical Ordinance was the topic of discussion during a short meeting of the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission Thursday night at the courthouse in Carrizozo, but no definite action was taken on the content of the ordinance.

According to county manager Suzanne Cox, transcripts from tape recordings of the recent public hearing of the proposed ordinance were still unavailable by the time of the Thursday meeting. The well-attended public hearing lasted over eight hours Saturday, April 28, in the San Juan Bautista Catholic church in Lincoln.

Cox said the transcripts were to be reviewed by the commission in their attempts to include suggestions made at the public hearing in the ordinance.

Last fall, the commission was directed by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners to rewrite the ordinance that had governed building

activity in Lincoln since the late 1960s. The commission designated a rewrite committee, made up of commission members and members of the Lincoln Historical Review Board, to do the rewriting. That committee has been meeting every week since November and had a preliminary, reworked ordinance ready for the April 28 meeting.

Cox said the commission possibly would hold as many as two more public hearings on the ordinance.

Also during the meeting, the commission heard chairman Bill Seelbach announce his resignation from the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission.

"The main reason for it is business," Seelbach said of his resignation. "Business is picking up; you just can't be effective if you try to do everything. I need to be concentrating on business."

The commission also held an executive session to discuss pending litigation, then adjourned.

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
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Shooting suspect Herrera arrested

It was with a shock that I heard the news about Michael McCarty from Glencoe Postmaster, Della Bonnell, because only a day or two before I had spoken with the lad when he stepped into Bud and Teel's Glencoe Store (The Devil's Canyon Stage Stop) for a cool drink.

Harry S. Truman, born May eight, 1884, to Martha Ellen and John Anderson Truman, in Lamar, Missouri.
Life so many great men before him, his sterling qualities became clear in childhood and early youth. On the farm near Independence, Missouri, young Harry pitched in with the daily chores, helping every way he could. Hard working and obedient he was a great source of comfort to his father and mother.

...did, becoming one of our greatest presidents and a giant historical figure.
One of Harry Truman's outstanding qualities in his favor was his looks. The magazines, the newspapers, the T.V. did not do him anything like justice.
In 1948 on his "Whistle Stop" reelection tour through the country he made a speech on the State Capitol lawn in Denver. I worked through the crowd and got within twenty-five or thirty feet of him, and had a chance to study him closely.

Truman, as they said, "looked like the guy next door," in other words, a typical American.
Also on his features was the stamp of greatness. His face was that of a fighter, yet a kind face. Honestly and sincerely were written upon one side of him and down the other. He had a wonderful pair of eyes, clear gray, twinkling with humor, intelligence, and compassion.
The crowd watched him, listening without motion or slightest sound, seeing one of themselves, sensing at first hand his pure honesty, unshakable courage, high purpose, and true Americanism.
After his talk you heard folks muttering, "This guy is going to win," and I felt the same, that he was teaching the heart of America.
Truman left us many classic little by-words:
"The Buck stops here." "If you

can't stand the heat, stay out of the kitchen. War is a disease and should be treated as such."
Truman's record as a man surpassed even his great accomplishment as president.
His devotion to his wife, Bess, and his daughter, Margaret, is something for all humanity to follow.
The Dropping Of The Bomb
In the summer of 1948 - when was it? - we were in a building in Manila. I had forgotten to take my Atabrin, and was having a malaria chill and fever in my bunk in the basement.
A kid came running in.
"Hey, Dan, Truman has dropped a bomb on Japan a thousand times more powerful than a block buster, and the Japs are giving up."
I said, "Get out of here. I feel bad enough without all your wild stories."
"It's true!" he said. "Listen!"
Out in the harbor there was a continual booming of Naval guns, in celebration.
With the sweat pouring from me I sat up on the edge of the cot, all thought of the chill and fever gone.
It was all over. Perhaps a million American soldiers saved, myself included. And untold suffering of the civilian Japanese population also spared.
And so we offer the tribute of a prayer of gratefulness to our great fellow American, "Human Truman", as he was often called.
And may The Good Lord ever bestow blessing upon his Memory and upon his spirit.



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

Inside the Capitol

The first concerns an event taking place immediately after that great natural disaster, the Legislature of 1984.

Governor Anaya and his troops have been completely routed. The forward momentum of their administration has been stopped dead, principally by overreaching demands and ignorance of how to use the system.

Yet here is our Governor ready to tell all his agency heads that he and his office staff have been highly successful in dealing with legislators. Any problems there are, as he sees it, were caused entirely by those in government whose now appear before him—and if they don't shape up and learn some political savvy, about half of them will be looking for other work.

But here's the kicker: Somebody has invited to the gathering of "all agency heads" both Leonard DeLayo, a known Anaya enemy, and Steve Reynolds, in no sense an Anaya man.

Both have to be quietly asked to leave before the Governor can make his outlandish speech. It was a little bit embarrassing, according to one who was there and who tells the story.

The next has to do with "shadow candidates," those folks who lend the use of their name in the primary when they have not the slightest intention of running in November. That way, they hold the spot open so that party officials can handpick the real candidate, who name remains a secret until after primary results have been announced.

Bernalillo County has one of those, apparently because GZOP bigwigs did not approve of the member of their party who announced for a County Commission nomination. They put in a young employee in their office, Peter Shams-Avari, who admittedly will withdraw after the June primary. He is, you might say, a strawman candidate.

Some of us who know Holm Bursum of Socorro wonder if he isn't in the same category. He has always been willing to be of service, but it's hard to believe he longs for a two-year term in the Legislature at this stage in his career.

Jim Martin, who held the spot, announced for the Senate when fellow Republican Charlie Lee decided not to run at the last minute.

Maybe Bursum, longtime Republican power, only decided to allow him name to grace the primary ballot so an honest-to-John candidate can be named later.

Then there's the case of the "I didn't do what you said I did, but I apologize for doing it anyway" story. This one comes from action of Jim Miller, Toney Anaya's man at the top in the Office of Education.

Associated Press, which seldom gets things wrong, said in a story that Miller, who approves budgets for all school districts in the state, was telling school people they should estimate the number of pupils in their system next year on the high side. That way, he reportedly said, they would get enough money to give teachers the raises the Legislature meant them to have.

Shortly after that story ran, Harvey Fruman, top Anaya staffer, was seen on his way to his office with the AP story in his hand.

Within minutes, Miller and his boss, Cabinet Secretary Denise Fort, were seen heading worthlessly through the double doors behind which Fruman offices.

After another brief interval, Miller and Fort were explaining to the AP man who filed the story that what really happened was that a couple of extremely conservative school superintendents had been gently nudged to estimate pupil attendance at the high end, rather than the low end. In no way had educators been asked to do anything dishonest like falsifying their numbers.

To be doubly sure he was not misunderstood, Miller said he would write a clarifying letter to all school districts in the state to tell them to tell the truth.

Very gratifying. Makes one feel warm all over.

And a final question, which originates with a man who has held high office in state government over a long period of time:

"How are we going to make it through two and a half more years?"

What a waking up to—and appreciation of—one's surroundings can do, is put the goings-on in one's life in perspective. Because of the nature of the newspaper business, those goings-on in my life include practically everything going on in the town.

In Ruidoso, as we know, that is a lot.

Ruidoso is changing all the time, in subtle and not-so-subtle ways. I got a tip the other day that a landmark was being torn down in midtown.

This was the pointing hand sign by Mary's Fashions—the one that told us

It was five miles to Alto Village. As it turns out, the sign and its twin on Alto Crest were dropped from the advertising budget of Alto Village many years ago, but they have stood on and on.

"I never liked the sign," said Alto developer Don Blaugrund when I asked him about it. When the contract for the signs ran out seven or eight years ago, he didn't renew it.

When someone called him six weeks ago to ask about removing the sign in midtown, Don told them to go ahead, since he hadn't been paying rent on it for some time. The signs were first installed in about 1969, he recalled.

So people whose memories of Ruidoso include that distinctive pointing finger henceforth will have just that—a memory.

And now I understand Ruidoso is going to get a Wal-Mart. Now that won't put us in the metropolis class all by itself. The burg of Bolivar, Missouri, where I went to college, has a Wal-Mart.

But I think that when it goes in here, I will do some more designating—just like I designated summer to have started Thursday night.

I will start calling Ruidoso a city, instead of a village. It will be a case of waking up to something—and appreciating something—that is all around us.

The challenge is to work to make Ruidoso a city we can be proud of. Thank goodness we have so many people working hard to do just that.

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Northcreek, a professional office complex under construction by the team of Rod Adamson and Bob Dolgener, borders a quiet, pine-lined ravine.

Office development under construction

Northcreek, a half-million dollar professional office development, is currently being built on Highway 37 near Fox Plaza by the team of Rod Adamson and Bob Dolgener.

"There's nothing like it in Ruidoso," said Dolgener, whose company, Eagle Creek Construction, is building the six-unit complex.

Adamson and Dolgener agreed that the complex would be different from many currently in Ruidoso, and that a quiet atmosphere and uncongested feeling were strived for in the planning of the project.

Adamson stressed the low-key signage and extensive landscaping of the project.

"We're going to spend some money on the landscaping," he said.

According to Adamson, the project will consist of two buildings, one of which will house offices 1,260 square feet in size. The offices in this, a two-story building, will be finished in the interior, and will feature a reception area, three offices and two half-bathrooms. The three offices will be separated by sound-proof insulation, according to Adamson.

The other building will house three

one-story offices 830 to 900 square feet in size. Adamson said the interior of the building would be finished to suit the tenants' needs. The office encircles a courtyard area that will also be completely landscaped, Adamson said.

The two offices will be joined along the backside by a deck, which will overlook a small rock-strewn ravine. The complex is nestled in a thicket of tall ponderosa pines.


Dolgener said the offices would be finished on the exterior with stucco and that the two-story unit would have cedar siding on the upper level. The windows of the complex will be outlined by heavy cedar timbers.

The project is a Planned Unit Development, according to Adamson. He said each office is on a separate lot, and common areas will be jointly owned by all the office owners. Adamson said the offices would be available for rent immediately, and offered for sale sometime after the project reaches final completion.

"It will give someone a nice, private place of business with some nice amenities," Dolgener said of the offices. Construction on the complex began in February, and completion is expected by the end of June, according to Dolgener.

Treat your boots to The Cowboy Boot Repair

The boots were worn, nicks and scuffs covered the leather surface. Discoloration and fading had left the boots with a weak tan hue. The soles were nearly completely gone, worn away by many miles of use. Ken Petree picked up the boots.

"I attempt to make a boot look brand new," he said, holding up the boots for closer inspection. He put the boots on a work table and began to finger through a stack of shoe-sole shaped leather pads.

Petree is the owner of the newly opened Cowboy Boot Repair, on Sudderrth Drive across from Jackalope Square.

"A man's boots is about as touchy as a man's hair," he said. "You can make enemies real quick in a boot shop. You mess up somebody's pair of boots—you've made an enemy." Petree gave no indication that he wanted to make enemies with the owner of the pair of boots he held. His quick hands measured, then prepared for gluing two of the leather pads.

"I use only the best grade of leather I can buy," he said between clips of the glue brush. "I will not buy cheap leather because my name stands behind my work. Your work is as good as your materials."

After a short drying period, the pads were ready to be applied to the tired soles of the boots. Petree worked

quickly, nailing the new sole to the boot bottom with sharp taps of a hammer.

Petree said his shop has had steady business since its opening two months ago. He finished attaching the sole to the first boot and moved on to the second.

"We pay good money for good boots," he said, resting the hammer head on the half-nailed sole. "People want top quality work to go into them to make them look like they just came from the factory."

Petree said he first began boot repairing and bootmaking some 18 years ago. His decision to go into the business was based on a personal need, he said.

After an accident, Petree said, he was forced to wear a brace from the hips down for a period of time. His doctors told him he could no longer wear boots, but he was determined enough to learn about bootmaking to make himself a pair of boots. Petree still does orthopedic work.

In addition to bootmaking and boot repair, the shop features shoe repairs, saddle repairs, saddlemaking, boot and shoe polishing and shining, and a wide variety of handmade leather goods, including custom-made Western belts.

Petree said he was an official Master Leather carver, and the intricate detail of the leather belts at the shop supports his claim.

After the pads were applied, Petree

continued with several other steps in the repair process, taking the boot from machine to machine in the repair area of the shop. Between the whir of a grinder and the clatter of a sole-stitcher, Petree told of his decision to move to Ruidoso from Clovis, where he had operated a similar shop.

"I thought about moving up here for about four years," he said. "I finally did."

Petree said he felt there was a need in Ruidoso for a shop like his, and said he enjoyed the people here. He added that the shop is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8:30 a.m. to noon on Saturday.

Petree began to dab black ink on the sole of the boot.

"This type of business is almost a dying art," he said, "because no one wants to learn it because it is hard work." He turned on a line of buffing and sanding wheels and began to finish the sole.

"Most people don't take the time because they don't care," he yelled above the noise.

Petree said his background also includes teaching bootmaking and saddlemaking. He said experience plays an important role in the quality of work a boot repairer does.

"This is something you just don't do, you work at it," he said, applying a greenish substance to the boot.

"That's green, isn't it?" he said to a bystander. "Reckon I ruined it?" He began furiously rubbing and polishing

the boot, and applying additional colors and waxes. When he finished the final shining, he held up the boot with its unfinished partner. The two contrasted sharply.

"Now you can see why I enjoy doing it," Petree said with a grin as shiny as the newly polished boot.




