## Bob wins state track titles

A large crowd at Albuquerque's Wilson Stadium Saturday night found out what anyone who has seen Ruidoso High School's track team this year already knew.

The Warriors' Cisco Bob is the best boys distance runner in the state's AAA division, and probably one of the best in any division.

Bob won both the 1,500 meters and 3,000 meters to lead Ruidoso's boys team to 18 points and a fifth-place finish in the state AAA division meet.

The Warrior junior won the 1,500 meters in 4:07.31 and took the longer event in a personal best of 9:04.14, both times fighting off strong challenges from Grants' Franklin Martinez.

Bob's two victories were the first first places by Ruidoso since the Warriors joined the AAA division in 1979. The two wins were worth 14 points.

"I knew he was going to be tough," Bob said of Martinez after winning the 1,500 meters. "I just ran a good pace all the way."

Curt McClellan, another junior, added the other four Ruidoso points by finishing second in the 800 meters with a personal best of 1:59.95.

A crowd of about 50 Warrior supporters cheered the athletes on both nights.

Lovington won both the boys and girls AAA division titles.

The Wildcats scored 63 25 points to win the boys championship. Grants was second with 47, Silver City scored 27, and Artesia had 19.

Lovington scored 60 points to win the girls division. Albuquerque Academy was second with 37 points.

But Bob's two wins were the highlight of the AAA division in many people's opinion. He ran the 1,500 meters at 6 p.m. and the 3,000 meters three hours later.

The Ruidoso athlete was in third place after one lap of the 1,500 meters. He moved up to second at the end of the second lap and stayed in that position until the final 220 yards.

Then he made his move, pulling ahead of Martinez and winning by one and a half seconds. The Grants runner was timed in 4:08.91.

The 3,000 meters was even closer. Bob, Martinez and Danny Jacques of Los Lunas (the third place finisher in both races) almost immediately made it a three-man race.

Cisco Bob put on a strong sprint for the win. Martinez came back in the last 30 yards to make it extremely close, but the Warrior athlete had the victory.

Junior Francisco Olvera and freshman Gabe Tam each recorded 9 42.0 times in the 3,000 meters to give the Warriors strong hopes for next year.

McClellan's 800 meters race was perhaps the most controversial one of the entire meet.

A runner from Los Lunas actually crossed the finish line first, but was disqualified for cutting in too quickly. Silver City's Sal Garcia was the official winner in 1:59.61.

McClellan was in second place going around the last turn, but Garcia put on a strong rush to edge the Warrior runner at the finish line. Many observers at the finish line

and in the stands thought McClellan had beaten Garcia.

But a review of the finish line film showed the Silver City runner nipping McClellan.

"Yes, I think he beat me," McClellan said after the race. "I felt I ran pretty well, but I was hoping for a faster time, around 1:58.0."

McClellan finished third in last year's 800 meters final, but this was the first time in his career the tall Warrior athlete had broken two minutes.

Disappointment and promises of better things next season made up the rest of the Warrior boys and girls performances.

The Ruidoso boys 400-meter relay team of Mark Johnston, Steve Snidow, Eric Strobel and McClellan didn't make the finals, as they dropped the baton on the second exchange in Friday's trials.

Ruidoso was in second or third place at the time and could have qualified for the finals.

Justin Smith, another junior, ran a 42.93 in his 300-meter intermediate hurdles trial, but failed to qualify for the finals. He has a best of 42.48 on the season.

"Justin's first five hurdles were his best all year," said Warrior head coach Ronny Maskew. "His last three weren't quite as good. His 42.93 time (electronically timed) compared to previous hand times is very close to his personal best."

Maskew was pleased with the performance of his state qualifiers, but stressed the need for more athletes and a new track next year.

A track is being built at the high school campus.

"Our guys that scored did a great job," he remarked. "I was hoping we'd qualify more guys for state. That's where depth and a new track will help. A good track always helps athletes, particularly in the sprints and relays."

A team that wins a state relay title gets 10 points, while an individual who wins an event gets just seven.

The young Warrior girls team didn't score any points, but still ran a seasonal best of 4:15 in the 1,600-meter relay trials Friday night.

Deanna Peso, Jackie Jefferson, Laura Trapp and Kim Daniels made up the team.

Daniels, a junior, also ran in the 100-meter and 200-meter trials, but failed to reach the finals.

She ran a 13.22 in her 100-meter heat, but didn't advance to the finals as the second heat was faster. Her 200-meter heat time was 26.90.

Daniels, who has seasonal bests of 12.8 and 26.65, was bothered by a soreness in her leg during the meet, but she still ran well.

NOTES: Former Ruidoso girl standout Valerie Garcia, who transferred to Albuquerque High School last year, ran on three winning Bulldog relay teams as her team finished fourth overall in the AAA division. Hobbs and Manzano defended their AAAA boys and girls championships.

# Sierra Blanca Airport Relocation Committee formed

A group of Ruidoso area residents Thursday planned an extensive mail campaign designed to urge several politicians to help Ruidoso obtain land for a new airport on Fort Stanton Mesa.

The Sierra Blanca Airport Relocation Committee (SBARC) formed several subcommittees to spread the workload, and read the drafted copy of a letter they hope people will send to politicians involved.

As outlined Monday, SBARC's plan is to send one copy of the prepared letter to as many people as possible who may have any concern about the airport controversy. People will sign the letter and return it to SBARC, who will copy it six times and send it to six different politicians.

The letters will be going to U.S. Interior Secretary William Clark,

President Ronald Reagan, U.S. Transportation Secretary Elizabeth Dole, U.S. Senator Pete Domenici, U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman and U.S. Representative Joe Skeen.

The letter briefly outlines the dangers of the current Ruidoso airport and New Mexico State University's opposition to the construction of an airport on Site B on Fort Stanton Mesa. It then urges the politicians to exert whatever influence they can to free Site B for a Ruidoso area airport.

SBARC plans to contact local residents, out of state visitors, pilots, NMSU alumni and others with their mailout.

Committee member Greg Masters said he would like each politician to receive 1,000 of the letters.

"We're fixing to put the pressure on them," said committee member John Howden.

Howden volunteered to take care of fund-raising. The committee hopes to

raise approximately \$5,000 to cover mailing and printing costs. Sierra Blanca Airport Relocation Committee accounts have been opened at Ruidoso State Bank, Moncor, The Bank of Ruidoso, First Federal Savings Bank of Ruidoso and Pioneer Savings and Trust.

Howden said interested people can contribute to SBARC with deposits of any size to those accounts. Non-residents can mail their checks to the Sierra Blanca Relocation Committee at P.O. Box 3581, Ruidoso N.M. 88345.

Committee member Jenny Dorgan said a direct phone line to Domenici's office may be set up for people to use.

SBARC established subcommittees to handle mailing, printing, phones, media and fund-raising. Chairpersons were selected for all the subcommittees, but the group emphasized that they still need volunteers.

"We really need to move fairly fast," said Masters.

# Postal service forum Tuesday

Ruidoso residents will have a chance to voice their opinions and suggestions on Ruidoso's mail delivery system at 2 p.m. Tuesday, May 15, at the Ruidoso village hall.

The Ruidoso village council, Ruidoso postmaster Bernie Lechman and three representatives from the U.S. Postal Service sectional office in Roswell will hold an open forum on mail delivery in Ruidoso.

Lechman said it would be an oppor-

tunity for residents to discuss the Neighborhood Box Units (NBUs), their placement around town, and possible alternatives. He mentioned unmanned postal stations and even a second Ruidoso post office as possible alternatives.

The Ruidoso village council passed a resolution last October requesting the Postal Service to refrain from placing any more of the NBUs in Ruidoso until suitable arrangements could be made with village officials for their placement.

Residents had complained about dangerous placement of the boxes, in-

creased charges for boxes at the post office, and unsuitable box sizes on the units.

Lechman said last week that he had conferred with assistant village manager Frank Potter and Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis about existing and future NBUs. He said some had been moved and larger concrete pads would be poured around others to provide better footing for mail patrons.

Lechman invited all interested people to attend the meeting and voice their opinions.

# Festival poster has stories behind it

"Nogal Meeting"

Artist Denise Dorn said she came up with the title for her batik before she even began sketches for the piece.

She said an Indian once told her the word, Nogal, represented a "plateau of consciousness." The two Indians portrayed on her batik indeed appear to have reached some sort of mutual "plateau of consciousness."

When discussing her batik, Denise most often mentions words such as peaceful and restful.

The two Indians facing each other beside a solitary butte under a maroon moonlit sky do indeed emanate a calmness they look into each others' eyes and have no need of words. The frantic rush of day to day life is left far away from this meeting place.

Getting the pair there, however, seems to have been less than a peaceful experience for Denise.

After being asked to create a batik for the Ruidoso Summer Festival Poster, Denise made one. But she thought it was not good enough for the poster.

With a printing deadline approaching, she drew another one and began the lengthy process of waxing and dyeing a new piece of cloth.

Carefully she painted on the wax, deliberately including cracks and lines that give the Indian faces their character. Finally, after 15 separate dyeings, and only an hour before the deadline, she finished the batik.

It now has been reproduced in a signed and numbered edition of 250 posters to commemorate the 1984 Ruidoso Summer Festival. Dorn is pleased with the reproduction.

"I'm really happy with it. They did a great job," said Dorn. Guynes Printing Company in El Paso, Texas, printed the poster.

Dorn works part-time in cardiopulmonary services at the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital. She will be participating in this year's Ruidoso Art Festival and currently displays work at the Bear Claw Gallery.

Although the posters are selling quickly, some are still available. They may be purchased for \$30 plus shipping from the Ruidoso Summer Festival Incorporated. The address is

# Lodgers petition against tax increase

The Ruidoso Lodgers Association (RLA) voted Thursday to send a petition to the Ruidoso village council voicing the lodgers' opposition to any increase in the lodgers' tax. The action was taken during a special meeting of RLA at the Innsbrook Village recreation center.

The petition came as a result of the recent Lodgers' Tax Committee proposed increase of the lodgers' tax from the current two percent to three percent.

According to RLA president Bill Rawlins, the petition will be accompanied by a list of reasons the lodgers oppose the increase. Those complaints include:

—Problems with the amount of lodgers' tax money that goes to the

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce. The lodgers propose that the chamber membership dues be increased to help support the operation of the chamber, and that the lodgers' tax money be used strictly for promotion of Ruidoso.

—Inadequate feedback on the effectiveness of advertising that is paid for by lodgers' tax money. Rawlins said the lodgers want to know where the money can best be spent to achieve the utmost results.

—Concerns that overall taxes levied on tourists are too high now, and that a rise may overtax the tourists, making this market less desirable as a tourist destination.

—Disagreements with the method of collecting lodgers' tax. According to Rawlins, the lodgers feel they should not be the only ones collecting the tax, and that it should be spread

over all tourist-related businesses. —Disagreements with the tax being collected only in Ruidoso. Rawlins said the lodgers feel the surrounding areas are benefiting from the expenditure of lodgers' tax money, but are unfairly not collecting the tax.

Other complaints completed the document, which is to be signed by as many lodgers as possible, according to Rawlins.

Also during the Thursday meeting, the lodgers heard Ruidoso village councillors Jerry Shaw and Bill Karn give their support to having more representation from the lodgers on the Lodgers' Tax Committee. According to Shaw, five appointments soon will be made to the board by Mayor George White. The two councillors suggested the lodgers present a list of proposed members to the mayor for consideration.

# Round one in Theidt vs. school board

"This board has operated improperly for too long. These people have to abide by the same laws as we do," said Jerold Theidt at an emotional meeting Thursday night of the Capitan school board.

At the meeting, Theidt outlined a two-page formal complaint he has lodged against the board. Theidt accused the board of conducting a "secret" meeting March 29, without prior public notice. Theidt alleged that the board members have discussed confidential board matters at home and with friends at local restaurants.

"We've had blatant cases of this in the recent past," Theidt said.

Theidt also accused the board of stressing athletics over education. He pointed out that no student who has graduated from Capitan is making a living from involvement in athletics. Theidt also said the rate of turnover among the schools' teachers is too high.

"The attrition rate is horrible," he said.

Theidt then asked for the resignation of all the board members, and said he would take the matter to the state Attorney General's Office if the board members did not resign.

"I think the people in Capitan have to get behind their kids," Theidt said

in closing. Board president Mark Delgado then responded to Theidt's charges.

Delgado said the March 29 meeting was held strictly for the purpose of discussing personnel, and so qualified as an executive session under the Open Meetings Act.

Delgado admitted that the board had acted improperly in notification of the meeting.

"It was not posted," Delgado said of the meeting notice. "It was just an oversight."

Board member Jim McDaniel also commented on the meeting notice.

"We may be wrong, I hope not," he said. "What we did, we did in good faith."

Delgado added that the meeting was strictly a work session and that all decisions arising from the meeting were made during a later public meeting.

To Theidt's question of why no notice for the meeting was posted, Delgado said he would like to "reserve comment on that."

Delgado also answered the charge of an over-emphasis on athletics by pointing out the \$160,000 in scholarships the 38 graduating Capitan High School seniors received last year.

"Our standards far exceed state standards for graduation," he said.

Echoing one Theidt charge was Rose Garner, who questioned the

rapid turnover of teachers at the schools.

"There's no stability," she said. "Students come back in the fall and don't even know who they're going to have for a teacher."

Delgado said the low salary schedule at the schools is partly responsible for the turnover. Some teachers are simply not rehired, he said.

"This is just like a garden," board member Isidro Peralta commented. "We weed out the weeds."

At one point in the meeting, each of the board members announced their refusal to resign from the board.

"I tell you I will not resign," board member Preston Stone said.

"I'm not going to quit, either," Delgado said. "I don't think we ever had the intention of breaking the law."

Stone said he also believed the board acts in good faith, and said he "goes to the Lord" before each meeting for guidance in his decision-making as a board member.

"You haven't scared me one bit," said Peralta, who also refused to resign.

Board member Robert Runnels said he would welcome an investigation of the board and school system. He said the investigators would be very impressed and find that the Capitan schools are among the best in the state.

During the meeting, the board also heard former Capitan school counselor David Reilly make a statement. Reilly is one of the faculty members who was not rehired.

"I was not given an evaluation," he said. "I was not given any time to correct what I did wrong." Reilly thanked the school administration for all the help they had given him, and advised the school board to retain the current administrators.

"You must get behind them, support them, and not fight for personal gains," he said.

Theidt spoke again during the meeting when the board attempted to go into an executive session. Theidt said because the meeting was being conducted in the schools' multi-purpose room instead of the regular meeting room, it qualified as an overflow-size meeting. He said because of that, the board was not allowed to go into an executive session.

Delgado said he did not agree, and one meeting-goer accused Theidt of being "unreasonable."

"You bet I am," Theidt said in reply. The board then went into executive session and adjourned the meeting about 30 minutes later.

After the meeting, Theidt said he would keep a May 15 appointment with the state Attorney General's Office in Santa Fe to continue action in the matter.

## Construction worker paralyzed in accident

A local bricklayer was partially paralyzed in a fall Thursday morning when a scaffold he was working on at the new Ruidoso High School evidently collapsed.

Rick Garrett of Ruidoso Downs was paralyzed below the mid-chest when he broke his sixth vertebrae in the accident, said the Reverend Dale McCleskey.

Ruidoso Police Lieutenant Dave Pfeffer said Garrett fell about 12 feet onto his back when the scaffold collapsed.

Although Garrett originally had no feeling or motor control below mid-chest, McCleskey said, feeling had returned down to the ankles by Monday morning.

McCleskey, pastor of the First Bap-

tist Church of Ruidoso Downs, has been in close touch with doctors and Garrett's family since the accident.

Doctors, who had originally given Garrett only a five percent chance of walking again, have increased that to 30 percent, said McCleskey.

Garrett's wife, Sarah, is a kindergarten teacher at Nob Hill Elementary School.



Both Warrior netters lost first-round singles matches in the state AAA division tournament at Albuquerque Academy in the Duke City. However, they competed well, and they realized that just getting to the state tournament was an accomplishment.

Trapp, a senior, lost to Karen DeSoto of Grants in three sets, 3-6, 6-3, 6-3. Brown, a junior, fell to eventual state runner-up Todd Kjeldgaard of St. Pius 6-3, 6-1.

Both Ruidoso players took early leads, but were unable to keep their advantages in the 90-degree weather.

"I think they played pretty good," said Warrior coach Mike Crocker. "But those kids up there (in the northern part of the state) have played a lot of matches and have a lot of experience."

"Laura played well in the first set, but after that I think the other girl noticed that Laura's overhead is not really strong, and she started hitting a lot of lobs. But I think Laura is a better player than the other girl."

"The other players just used better strategy in the matches."

DeSoto and Kjeldgaard did indeed play in more matches this season than Trapp and Brown did.

The Grants netter had a 15-4 record on the season, while Trapp was 6-2. Kjeldgaard was 20-3 on the season and Brown was 8-2.

Trapp, who was the District 3-AAA champion, had mixed feelings about her performance.

"I don't really think I played that well," she said. "I did well in the first set, but then I probably got a little too confident and she came back."

Brown felt that experience might have been the major factor in his loss to Kjeldgaard.

"I played pretty good," he said. "I guess experience was the main difference. I'd say he and McMillian (Mike of Goddard, the player who defeated Brown for the district title) are about equal."

Kjeldgaard lost to Robertson's Garon Fulgenzi in the championship boys singles match, 6-4, 3-6, 6-3.

Jennifer Racca of St. Pius topped Sandra Romero of St. Michael's 6-1, 6-2, for the girls singles title. DeSoto lost in the semi-finals.

Alan Dils and Loren Dils of Belen won the boys AAA doubles championship with a 6-1, 6-0 win over Keith Gage and Doug Livingston of Albuquerque Academy.

Laura Coe and Debbie Denison of Goddard beat Ann Timmons and Maria Clark of Portales 5-7, 7-6, 6-4, for the girls doubles crown. Both teams are from Ruidoso's district.



No under-16 matches were played during the weekend. Association matches are played every Saturday at the middle school.

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

And so, our deepest gratitude goes out to these three who have done so much for so many of our young people. And we wish them every happiness in their retirement and all God's Blessings.

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

## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Government is a dynamic process, not a static one.

Even such a heartless critic as this one feels some sympathy for a governor as he twists and turns, trying to find just the right combination of people in jobs which will give his administration stability and forward momentum.

The truth is that as soon as that is achieved, something will occur which will throw the whole machine out of kilter again.

Government is dynamic, not static. At one point in his proposals concerning present change, Governor Anaya told some of us, he was playing with the idea of shifting as many as 15 or 16 individuals in his official family. Every time you begin to consider one move, you set off two more, one to replace the person who is being moved and one to dispose of the person who is moving out.

Inside the Governor's suite, a hired consultant, Bill Sisneros, had designated who should do what and who should report to whom. Governor Anaya was pretty well satisfied the Sisneros suggestions could be taken.

But a further problem had become apparent as the study was being made.

Those policy aides the Governor had set up had a couple of weaknesses. One was that they were operating too purely in the theoretical realm. They didn't have enough connection, the Governor now saw, with the real world—the one where the dollars and cents are.

Just down the hall from their offices was the Department of Finance and Administration, which is almost solely concerned with that hardedged topic, the bucks.

The two just weren't relating enough, so Toney Anaya was struggling in his head for a way to bring them together.

Their further problem was even tougher to solve, at least without some substantial changes in the work style of their boss. The policy aides, and others in the Governor's office, still wanted too much to spend time with the top man, and Anaya by now has a good fix on how limited his personal time actually is.

The reason they want that, as he must understand, is his way of doing things: He is extremely hard on those who make what seem to him wrong

decisions when they do it on their own. The consequence is that they hesitate to make decisions on their own.

As a result, they must walk their judgments past him before they have the nerve to put them into effect.

Instead of saving him work, therefore, they added to his load. So he struggles to find the answers.

And as all this went on, he was still dealing with the backwash from changes already made.

Joe Goldberg had been moved to Health and Environment from Human Services. That left the Governor's office taking the calls from those who were worried at the place to which Joe had moved and from those who were worked up by what he left behind at the agency from which he came.

At Health and Environment, that was complicated by a second factor. Every time Goldberg fired somebody or moved somebody who had been put in place by Bob McNeill, the original Secretary there, his action was read as something of a repudiation of McNeill, who now sits at the right hand (once removed) of the Governor. Those who suffered in the change, you may be sure, went crying to their former boss.

And over at Human Services, the stir was over the day-care program. The Governor's office was fielding the calls on that one too. So-called "vendors" of day-care service, that is, those who operate the centers and depend on state and federal funds to keep them in business, are a highly vocal group. Over the years, they have learned that unless they fight, some bureaucrat in Santa Fe or Washington will hurt them deeply.

Mothers who feel they and their kids are being stepped on are also an awful force to deal with.

So Governor Anaya, in what might have been seen as a quiet time, with no legislators to fight with and no campaigns to run, had plenty on his plate.

Sometimes he must wonder why he wanted the job.

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DEAR EDITOR:  
To The Commissioners of Lincoln County:

It was my privilege to be in Lincoln yesterday for a meeting of The Lincoln County Historical Society. While there, I attended the public hearing relative to the newly rewritten Lincoln Historic District Ordinance. I commend the conduct of your moderator and basically feel that the Planning and Zoning Commission has done a fine job.

Although certain individuals appeared to dominate the floor with similar rhetoric, I was more impressed with the brief statements of James Sanchez and Ofella Salas. I plead your indulgence on the thoughts of this outsider.

I have been a history buff, and have toured the American West as such, for about twenty-five of my forty-eight years. Excluding Pueblos, I can recall only two locations that have maintained their historical appearance while continuously inhabited by those engaged in the day to day pursuits of earning a livelihood. Both are in New Mexico and are respectfully Lincoln and Los Cerillos. Unfortunately, the appearance of the latter is rapidly deteriorating due to a lack of zoning and its close proximity to larger population centers.

Due to her proximity to Ruidoso and the scarcity of suitable land, Lincoln will soon come under increased pressure from those who would exploit her heritage through planned development. I thought it to be significant that a speaker during the hearing from a real estate man who specialized in acre packages.

I am pragmatic in accepting the fact that some future development in the area is inevitable. With proper buffers protecting the historic zone and using a compatible architectural design this might even be desirable from a convenience viewpoint should such ventures include a gas station and grocery store. Without strict zoning, however, such ventures may eventually include a Billy The Kid theme park and condominiums on the hill. One must only look towards Ruidoso.

In the best long term interest of all concerned I would sincerely recommend retaining zone "A" as rewritten with no compromise and retaining zone "B" as rewritten with very minor compromise. These are not all unreasonable and will work to the advantage of all when long term gains are considered.

I do, however, strongly urge you to delete the "one half mile on either side of U.S. 380" verbiage in favor of "from the centerline of U.S. 380 to the highest contour (highest known elevation above mean sea level) of the mountain ranges on either side of aforesaid U.S. 380" or some similar statement of like intent and purpose.

Although I have taken no measurements, as an engineer I can assure you that it is physically possible to build a road along the mountainside with ingress/egress from outside of the historical area. Perhaps it would be a forest service road, but there are plenty of precedents in other areas where the forest service provides access to summer homes. No expensive survey would be necessary as was suggested. Simply use an available contour map from the U. S. Geological Survey or similar governmental agency for delineation purposes. Again, this will deal with what appears to me as a very dangerous loophole so I urge your further consideration on this clause.

In summation, I would say to you that Lincoln is relatively modern while preserving her appearance. Tongue in cheek, I will say that I did not find it necessary to exchange my pickup for a horse to gain entry. And in zone "B" one will find steel fence posts and aluminum gates. If my memory is correct is there not already a naked propane tank serving the Murphy/Dolan building? My intent is not to tell you that the people of Lincoln do not know what they have— for conversation with both factions during the Public Hearing convince me that they do indeed.

I submit to you that they are simply too familiar with it and need to back off and reconsider its value. Yes, familiarity does make one have a tendency to overlook a few things. While in town all day and overhearing many conversations, I do not recall a single person observing that "exactly one hundred and three years ago today Billy The Kid shot his way out of that building that stands intact only because of interested people who sought to protect our heritage."

We in the Fort Worth area watched our "Hell's Half Acre" fall prey to neglect and eventually to urban renewal. We are having a tough time with preserving our historic stockyards area which exists now largely because the public wanted to save it. I urge you and indeed challenge you to do a better job than we have done.

Thank you for this forum and I very much appreciate your consideration of these thoughts.

DEAR EDITOR:

Reference: Lincoln County Historical Review Board.

My name is Maurildia Perry. My parents came from Texas to New Mexico in about 1914-1915 and homesteaded a place above Lincoln, and over the years they raked and scraped and managed to accumulate a little more land. I was born here nearly 65 years ago. No one could

have loved Lincoln and the land here any more than myself and my family.

The Lincoln County War, which, as I understand it, was nothing more than a power struggle, has been over with for about a hundred years. Following those turbulent times, Lincoln once again became the delightful little village it formerly was, a wonderful place in which to live and raise a family.

Unfortunately, people of my generation had a battle of their own to fight over the years and fight we did. There were no shots fired, no blood shed, but it left just as many scars. I refer to the war that all of us here were involved in—a fight against the feelings of prejudice against our parents and grandparents brought with them insofar as our Spanish American neighbors were concerned. Though no shots were fired, feelings were hurt; painful, spiteful words were spoken; but our generation still battled for the privilege of playing with, dancing with, breaking bread with, visiting freely in the homes of, marrying and having children by, sharing our common joys, sorrows and griefs with our Spanish American friends. Sometimes I'm still not sure this battle is completely over, but we are making progress, thanks to our almighty God.

Now, our once-peaceful and congenial lives, and our unique little community is again embroiled in another civil war perpetrated and incalculated—I spent two hours over my dictionary looking for these two words. If there be one among you who might not know what they mean, they simply mean "hatched up by" and "shoved down your unsuspecting throats by."

To repeat, we are embroiled in another civil war perpetrated and incalculated by a little handful of people who have migrated into these peaceful hills, saw a good thing, and who have left no stone unturned in order to further their own selfish aims and gains—a way to making a living off our village, our heritage, and the unsuspecting wayfarer who chances to wander this way. But in order to achieve their aims and visions, they feel the need to muzzle the rest of us who would prefer to live out our lives in the peace and serenity we used to have, enjoying the love, companionship, and understanding of our neighbors.

Some of these persons are the same persons who about 10 to 15 years ago told me dumbbells who had lived here all our lives that we didn't know or appreciate what we had in this community. Well, I do know, and I appreciate the fact we did have a peaceful little village, which is more than I can say now. They harangued and harrassed us to a point we were finally convinced that if we didn't zone ourselves, some dastardly dudes from outside would come in and do it for us. Through these scare tactics, they succeeded in twisting our arms into passing our first ordinance.

And what's happened? We pass an ordinance, we try to live by it, and here we are again right back where we started from. The ordinance and revisions we've had have accomplished three things. No. 1, they have turned neighbor against neighbor, friend against friend. No. 2, they have caused us to become the laughing stock of all Lincoln County if not the entire state of New Mexico. And No. 3, and most despicable of all, they have transformed several of our neighbors into snoopers and snitchers who spend their time roaming the valley and to see and to report on any person who is not living his life to suit them.

When it reaches the point that we do not have a free choice in the color of our homes, or the choice over whether to plant a fruit tree, a rose bush, or a pot of petunias, a row of beans or a row of hemlock, burn down an offensive outhouse or put in a new hydrant, etc., I can only say we here in Lincoln have at last reached that same high pinnacle of human life those poor colored people reached when they were placed in bondage to the rich whites some 3 or 4 hundred years ago.

If this ordinance passes, I can't see that we will be one whit better off than that first black man who was placed in shackles, thrown into the holds of a stinking, airless ship, shipped across a rolling, rocking ocean, and subsequently sold into slavery. If we accept this new ordinance, we won't have one civil right left to say grace over—nor will we have the right to say that grace.

Sam Walter Foss back at the turn of the century summed up my philosophy of life when we wrote these immortal words.

"Let me live in my house by the side of the road  
Where the race of men go by;  
They are good, they are bad, they are weak, they are strong.

Then why should I sit in the scorners seat,  
Or hurl the cynic's ban?  
Let me live in my house by the side of the road  
And be a friend to man.

Oh, God, if only we here in Lincoln could live in our house by the side of the road and be a friend to man.

Will those of you here today who feel as I do, who would prefer to live without the shackles and bondages proposed under this new ordinance, will you please stand in silence and be counted as standing up for those human rights which were guaranteed us under the Constitution of the United States which was accepted back in 1776.

## Editorial

It must not be any fun at all to be a motel or rental cabin owner in Ruidoso.

You are subject to the vagaries of the weather and the economy. You have to collect a two percent lodgers' tax from grumbling customers.

Then you watch as the village council, influenced by the Lodgers' Tax Committee, influenced by the Chamber of Commerce, decides how to spend the tax revenue. And they seem to want to spend it in a way that you can't see helping your business one bit.

Your own organization tries hard. But several major lodging establishments are absent from its membership rolls.

What can you do?

Well, you can start by asking yourself if it's wise to oppose automatically a one percent increase in the lodgers' tax.

Sure, the tax has a built-in unfairness to it. You have to collect it, but everyone in the tourism business benefits from the spending of it (theoretically).

It seems to us, however, that support of the increase—and your decision to give it or withhold it—represents a valuable political card.

Let's say you support the increase. In return, you ask for greater representation on the Lodgers' Tax Committee and in the Chamber. You ask for a guarantee that if and when the gross receipts tax is increased, at least part of the revenue will go to tourism promotion.

You may choose not to play the card at all. But think about it. The way we see it, it's the only one you've got.—TP

## Strawberry Patch never dull

On an average day, Pam Alston is surrounded by a hubbub caused by a score of knee-high people.

She supervises the tiny children at Strawberry Patch Infant Care, tucked along a quiet stretch at 239 Sud-derth Drive.

The center serves children ages six weeks through 24 months. "We're the only state-licensed day care center in that age group in Ruidoso," Alston said.

On an average day, about 25 regular children arrive at the center, plus a few drop-ins. The Strawberry Patch is open from 7:45 a.m. to 5:15 p.m. on weekdays, and from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday.

Its busiest days are Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Like many places in Ruidoso, the Strawberry Patch is busiest in the summer, and opens on Sunday from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. That helps parents who work at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

It doesn't take long to see that Alston loves children. It doesn't take long to notice her English accent, either. She was born in Kent, England, but has been an American citizen since 1965.

Alston describes her day care center to a visitor between helping a dozen youngsters or mixing a crowd-sized batch of macaroni and cheese. The center serves a hot lunch and two snacks each day.

She has three children of her own. The youngest is a teenager. She also has four grandchildren. "Two are here at the Patch, two are in California," she said.

Usually four adults work with the children, Alston said, interrupting herself with an admonition. "Close the gate, Rachel."

The youngest children sleep in cribs or playpens. An interior gate separates various rooms inside the center.

Pam enjoys running the Strawberry Patch.

"It's better than having more kids," she said. "You get to love them all day." Then at night, parents collect the children and she goes to a placid home.

She laughs when she recalls her husband Jim's comment about the Strawberry Patch. He is a Ruidoso police officer, and once cracked, "I've been to quieter riots."





"I'm returning home, so to speak," he said.


