## Racing crowds, handle both up

The 1984 horse racing season at Ruidoso Downs got off to a tremendous start as the three-day handle finished up at \$1,308,065. "There were great quarter horses running in the trials for the Kansas Futurity and Kansas Derby, and this quality is clearly reflected in the excellent mutual figures," commented general manager H. Rick Henson. "It's a fine start for the new season, and we're very pleased."

The current figure is a solid gain of 16.63 percent over last year's opening weekend (also three days), which produced a handle of \$1,121,579 for an average of \$373,860. The current average is a hefty \$436,022.

Wagering over the weekend went this way: \$359,167 on Friday, \$499,780 on Saturday, \$449,118 on Sunday. The turnstile also clicked steadily and totaled out at 11,158 over the weekend, an average of 3,179. The attendance figures are a solid gain of 24.2 percent over opening weekend last year.

Burnell, a colt who's already run up earnings of more than \$350,000, set the top qualifying time for the upcoming \$287,304 Kansas Quarter Horse Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

Burnell raced in Sunday's seventh race, which was one of nine 400-yard elimination trials (on the 12-race card) for the first leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-olds.

The colt exploded out of the rail post as a 2.5 favorite and led every step of the way, winning by one and one-half lengths. His clocking of 19.890 seconds held up as the fastest of the day. In fact, he was the only qualifier to check in under the 20-second mark.

Burnell, a finalist in last year's \$2,530,000 All American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, is owned by Thomas E. Rack and Ace B. Walker of Corpus Christi, Texas. Jack Brooks is the trainer.

As a two-year-old last year, he went to the races 16 times and scored excellent marks of 12-1-1. His last win came on October 22 at Blue Ribbon Downs in Oklahoma, when he won the Heritage Place Futurity and earned \$161,082.

Fans who backed Burnell in Sunday's Derby trials had to be content with low mutual returns of \$2.80, \$2.60 and \$2.10.

The finale of the Kansas Derby comes up on Saturday, June 2, and hands the winner \$98,806.

The second top qualifying time of 20.050 seconds went to Bar Forth, who won the ninth race by a cruising two and one-fourth lengths. Bar Forth, owned by W. L. Sunny Edwards of Ruidoso, was a \$42,000 purchase in the 1982 All American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs.

A Cinch Or Better, a gelding owned by Gene White and Henry Heydenreich Jr. of Keller, Texas, made the third start of his young career on Saturday's program at Ruidoso Downs and qualified for the finale of the \$605,384 Kansas Futurity.

The gelding's success on Saturday was no surprise, since he raced a 1-2 favorite in the sixth race.

Saturday's entire 13-race program consisted of second-day elimination trials (each at 350 yards) for the first leg of the famed Triple Crown for two-year-olds.

A Cinch Or Better passed under the gavel in the 1983 All American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs and was a repurchase at \$15,000. He's already earned nearly that much and stands to win as much as \$199,927 (by finishing first) in the Kansas finale on Sunday, June 3. His value increased tremendously with his win on Saturday.

The gelding ended the dash with a sizable two and one-half length lead and was clocked in 17.690 seconds. That clocking held up as the fastest of the day. A Cinch Or Better is trained by C. Dwayne Gilbreath. The rider is Alex Baldillez Jr. Both Gilbreath and Baldillez scored four wins apiece on Saturday.

## ET Zoning recommended for east of town

A large amount of the land immediately surrounding Ruidoso on the north and west was recommended to be zoned R1 by the Ruidoso Lincoln County Extraterritorial (ET) Zoning Commission during a meeting Thursday.

Land surrounding Ruidoso in sections 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 4, 5 and 9 was discussed by the commission for recommended zoning designations.

The commission is currently recommending zoning for all areas within one mile of the Ruidoso village limits. Their recommendations go to the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority for final approval. The commission has so far zoned land in the Carrizo Canyon and Gavilan Canyon areas.

During the Thursday meeting, the commissioners learned that they had missed zoning of several small areas in both canyons. Areas of Sections 27 and 26 were identified as not having been zoned by the Zoning Authority.

"There never was a public notice made on it," said ET Commission chairman Milt Alcorn of the unzoned areas. Some confusion surfaced during the meeting on which of the areas were actually in the county, and were eligible for zoning.

Apparently the county map, used for tax purposes, does not agree with maps used by village officials. County manager Suzanne Cox said she would check with the county assessor's office to ascertain exactly which areas are in the county and are to be zoned.

Also during the meeting, the commissioners heard from Ruidoso resident Jack Barber. Barber brought to the attention of the commission some Ruidoso Land Company property between Alpine Village and Forest Heights, saying he had a petition of 40 signatures of nearby property owners against the proposed development on the site.

Barber outlined to the commissioners the multi-use development planned for the area, which would include an area for a motel or apartment project. The development would contain some areas of both R1 (mobile home) and C1 (light commercial) land, according to a map presented by Barber.

"That bothers me a little bit," Alcorn said of the multiple uses planned for the area. "It may work out fine. I don't know."

Commissioner Ray Bishop suggested the commission zone the land as a Commercial Planned Development (CP), which would then ensure commission involvement in the future of the development. Any plan so designated has to come before the commission before being allowed to proceed. The commission agreed with Bishop.

Also during the meeting, the commissioners received a list of editorial corrections to the ET ordinance from Cox. She said the list included only typographical and editorial changes,

but no changes in the content of the ordinance.

Cox also reported that the ET Zoning Authority had voted during their meeting Thursday morning to accept \$10,000 from the Village of Ruidoso government on the condition that the ET Commission hire its own zoning enforcement officer and secretary.

Formerly the zoning enforcement office of the village had handled zoning in the ET area. The village zoning enforcement office will handle the job until the end of this fiscal year, July.

Cox reported the Authority had also made some minor changes to the ET Commission's recommendations in the Gavilan Canyon area, most of which involve White Mountain Development Company land.

Other zoning changes made by the ET Authority included a mobile home park in Valley East subdivision that was zoned RMP (mobile home park) and some small areas of Fawn Ridge that were missed by the ET Commission that were zoned RMS (mobile home subdivision).

Specific areas recommended by the ET Commission to be zoned included:

Section 36: all R1 (single family residential).

Section 35: all R1.

Section 34: all the commissioners decided to recommend zoning for the Sierra Blanca Unit I and II areas according to the restrictive covenants. Lakeside Estates was recommended to be zoned R1. All Eagle Creek

Water User's Association land in the entire area and Mountain Villa Estates land in Section 34, was recommended to be zoned R1.

Section II, Sierra Blanca Units II and III were recommended to be zoned according to the restrictive covenants of the area. S. P. Johnson land in tracts C, D, E and F received a C1 recommendation. The Barney Luck land in the area was recommended to be zoned R1. Eagle Creek Associates land received a C1 recommendation and Eagle Creek West Condominiums received an R1 recommendation (multi-family).

The land occupied by the High Country Lodge received a C1 recommendation. R. W. Baxter, Roger Allen, Vineyard and Taylor land in the section was recommended to be zoned R1.

Section 32: all land received an R1 recommendation.

Section 3: all land received an R1 recommendation.

Section 4: all areas were recommended to be zoned R1 except Alto Crest land one lot deep, which received a C1 recommendation.

Section 9: Alpine Village and part of Red Cedar subdivision were recommended to be zoned R1. The Ruidoso Land Company land was recommended to be zoned CP.

The next meeting of the ET Commission will be a public hearing for the areas north and west of Ruidoso. The meeting is scheduled for 2 p.m. Thursday, June 21.

## Generic vs. name drugs: buyer beware

Generic drugs have one major advantage. They cost less than similar patented or trade brand drugs, sometimes two thirds less.

They also have disadvantages compared to their trade brand counterparts. Area druggists have mixed feelings about their use.

"Only in the last five or six years have generics become increasingly more prevalent," said Jerry Jacobs of Hospital Pharmacy. However, generics were available to consumers for years before that.

Their sole advantage over similar drugs, he said, is price. A potential major drawback is what Jacobs called "bioavailability," whether the ingredients of the generics are absorbed by living people as readily as the ingredients in patented medicine.

"Are they indeed truly equivalent once they're absorbed into the body," he said, is one consideration. "In some cases, this may be critical," he cautioned.


Don Swalander of Don's Prescription Pharmacy said, "An aspirin is not an aspirin." All drugs are not created equal, even if they have identical ingredients.

"Will they dissolve the same?" is a question Swalander thinks consumers should ask when comparing generics to other drugs.

The generics may have tougher coatings than their patented, or trade brand counterparts, so people may not absorb as much of a generic as of a patented medicine.

However, the raw ingredients for the generics can come from the same source as the raw ingredients for the trade brand drugs, Jacobs said.

Tom Ortega of Gibson's Pharmacy said consumers should not use a



generic substitute for any timed-release drug. In general, however, he favors the lower priced substitutes.

He said generic drugs can be substituted for trade brand ones if a patient asks for the switch, unless a physician refuses to allow the generic.

Some generic substitutes look like the equivalent trade-brand pills or capsules. Others may be differently colored than the comparable patented drug. That may cause problems for people who are used to a black pill, for example, and switch to a green generic pill.

Swalander called designing a generic pill to look like a patented pill "me-too stuff."

"But they're getting away from that," he said of generic drug manufacturing houses.

The druggist said he leaned toward being anti-generic, although he had

no qualms about drugs coming from qualified manufacturers. He is concerned about some facets of quality an ordinary consumer might not be able to consider.

Jacobs does not avidly support or reject generics for his customers. "If they want to save five bucks, fine, or if they want the brand name, fine too," he said. He does like the choice the generics give consumers.

Generic equivalents tend to be offered for drugs that are often prescribed. Ortega said about half of the anti-biotics he sells are generic, and about 40 percent of the heart medicine.

All sorts of drugs have generic equivalents, ranging from morphine to aspirin, Swalander said.

Drugs that people use regularly, like high blood pressure medicine, tend to have generic equivalents, he said. Such maintenance medicine is

popular in generic form. Antibiotic equivalents are also common, Jacobs said.

Jacobs said. "The more commonly used drugs are usually available in generic form because they've been around a long time." The patents on such trade-brand drugs have elapsed.

U.S. patents are granted to drug companies to encourage research, Swalander explained.

If a company spends money to develop a drug, a patent gives it the exclusive right to market the drug for 17 years. Profits from those sales can pay for the research.

"Most generic houses have spent almost nothing on research," he said in contrast.

When the patents run out, Ortega said, companies will often step in with generic equivalents. For instance, the 17-year-old patent on Valium will end soon, he said.

Jacobs said the generics' portion of the prescription drug market varies from area to area, depending on local law. It can be from 10 to 40 percent of sales.

States like Arizona or Florida which include many retired people in their populations tend to stress generics, Swalander said.

Two groups of people likely to include generic buyers are retired people and young adults. Both are cost conscious, he explained.

Another group of people using generics includes those in Medicaid and welfare programs. Government medicine programs require the use of generics where possible.

All of the pharmacists said consumers should weigh the advantages and disadvantages of generic drugs against trade-brand ones before filling their prescriptions. They recommended consulting doctors.

**HALO FRESH**, a filly carrying odds of over 18-1, emerged as the top qualifier in Friday's first-day qualifying round for the upcoming \$605,384 Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

Thirteen 350-yard Kansas trials constituted Friday's season-opening agenda. Another 13 trials were on Saturday's program.

The top five qualifiers from each day—strictly on the basis of running time—will meet in the Kansas finale on June 3, shooting at a victory purse of \$199,927 in the first leg of the famed Triple Crown.

Halo Fresh, owned by J. Larry Brumbaugh of Fort Worth, Texas, scored a major surprise in the 13th race when she got off to a flying start under Mike Lidberg, then held on for

a nose victory over the on-coming Heart Streaker. Halo Fresh, by All-American Futurity winner Moon Lark, was timed in 17.920 seconds. That clocking held up as the fastest of the afternoon.

Prior to the Kansas trials, Halo Fresh had been to the races four times (all on the non-betting circuit in Texas), had earned \$7,042 with a 1-1-0 record. The filly is trained by Terrell Davidson.

Heart Streaker, the property of Jack Fletcher and Mike Sharp of Simonton, Texas, wound up as Friday's second-best qualifier with a time of 17.935.

Brides Bouquet, owned by Roy Browning of Fort Worth, Texas, qualified with a time of 18.045. The other two spots were taken by Flaming Viking, 18.095, owned by Oliver Hennie of Temple, Texas, and by Flying Arky, 18.120, owned by Willie and Dee Talley of Athens, Texas.

## Thursday starts five-day stretch

Yates Landing, a colt who was purchased for the sale-topping price of \$33,000 in last year's Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings at Ruidoso Downs, looms as a strong threat in Thursday's program at Ruidoso Downs.

The 12-race agenda kicks off a five-day holiday weekend which extends through Memorial Day (Monday, May 28). First post each day is 1 p.m.

Thursday's headliner (11th race) covers four furlongs for New Mexico-bred two-year-olds and is the second of two trial divisions for the upcoming \$50,000 (estimate) Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity. The top five finishers from each spin will advance into the final slated for Saturday, June 2.

The first division of the Kindergarten trials is scheduled as Thursday's eighth race.

Yates Landing, owned by Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas, made his racing debut at Sunland Park on March 25, and raced as a 7-5 favorite in a four-furlong dash. The colt engaged Barlow Blade in a heated battle, then lost by a whisker.

But the outing was all the preparation Yates Landing needed for the trials for Sunland's showcase event,

the \$338,519 Riley Allison Thoroughbred Futurity. He raced as a 5-2 shot, took the early lead, dropped back suddenly to third place, but had much left for the stretch and came on strongly to beat Barlow Blade by two lengths.

That put Yates Landing in the May 13 finale of the Allison Futurity. The colt got away at just under 8-1, and showed plenty of strong speed as he set the pace during the backstretch run. At the turn for home, he was forced to begin backing off, but he held on well enough to finish sixth, earning \$6,570.

Yates Landing figures to be a stand-out favorite on Thursday as he breaks from the No. 6 post with F.O. Martinez in the saddle. 
Aquaconic, is a filly worth watching, since her racing debut on March 2 (at Sunland) resulted in a three and one-fourth length win as a 6-5 favorite.

Next time out, on April 27, Aquaconic raced as a 6-5 favorite in the Allison Futurity trials, but finished second.

## McGuire discusses airport with BLM

State Representative Marvin B. "Mickey" McGuire reported that he had a productive session with federal Department of Interior officials concerning the Ruidoso airport situation while in Washington, D.C., recently.

The Interior officials he spoke with included Frank Edwards, assistant director of lands for the Bureau of Land Management (BLM); Vincent J. Heckler, chief of the Lands Division of BLM; and Selma Sierra, with Lands and Minerals Management at BLM.

"Basically I got the feeling that the lines of communication will be

open—that it was not a closed issue at all," said McGuire. He said the BLM people were knowledgeable about the airport situation, and that they assured him the Fort Stanton Mesa land transfer application certainly would be considered when it was submitted by the Department of Transportation.

McGuire was in Washington for the National Conference of State Legislatures. He serves on the Education and Job Training Committee of that body.

He said the conference was very

good. "You discover that all states are facing the same kinds of problems (that are foreseen) in education," he said.

McGuire was particularly impressed by keynote speaker Marc Tucker, author of "The Changing Nature of Education and Work."

Supporters of McGuire's campaign for reelection to the House of Representatives from District 56 are holding a fund-raiser from 7 to 9 tonight (Monday) at Nottingham's Pub. The cost of \$10 per head includes hors d'ouvres. There will be a no host bar.

Her father, Maurice Waters, and brother Mark Waters both practice dentistry in Clovis, the town where Sally Waters was born.




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# Around Sports with Gary Brown



With summer almost here, there is action at either the softball fields or the Little League baseball field every night of the week except Saturday in Ruidoso.

There are some extra teams in the Ruidoso Little League this season, and the four local softball leagues are as active as ever.

But's there's still something missing.

Teenagers here can't compete in baseball once they pass the Little League age limit (12 years old). They can play on softball teams, but it isn't exactly the same sport, and doesn't offer them competition against youths their own age.

Last year several people tried to start a Babe Ruth team in Ruidoso, but interest in it disappeared after awhile.

"At the most we had about 25 kids out for the program," said Larry Sherwood, one of the Babe Ruth organizers. "But with just that number, we felt we couldn't make a go of it."

If people aren't interested in playing baseball, then there really isn't any need for a team. But a lot of kids have expressed interest in the sport.

Why they didn't turn out in big numbers for the Babe Ruth practices last year is a big mystery.

There has always been some interest in Little League baseball in Ruidoso, and it seems that would carry over to the teenage years.

At the present, Sherwood doesn't plan to start a Babe Ruth team this year, but he thinks a similar program could be started in the future.

"It would help a lot if the kids had a high school program here," he said.

"I think that would help Babe Ruth baseball.

"It's a shame. My son loves baseball. There's a lot of good athletes in town who could play baseball and were good at it."

A number of former Little League players like Cody Bill Browning, Russell Easter and Scott Neal could have done very well in Babe Ruth baseball.

"Cody was the best player I've seen here," said Ronny Taylor, a former Little League manager. "I think we've got a good chance of getting a baseball program started in high school eventually."

According to Taylor, there are at least two school board members who would like to see a high school baseball program started. If that happened, interest in summer teenage baseball would probably increase.

The Ruidoso Little League All-Stars have done better in recent years in tournament action. Two years ago, the team won two games, and last year they won one.

With the Little League program improving, it's probable that enough youths would be interested in a Babe Ruth-type program in a couple of years.

The first part of the sports complex at White Mountain Middle School will probably be completed by next fall. There will be several softball-baseball fields there.

Excellent facilities are usually a big boost to starting a sports program, and the new sports complex is a step in the right direction.

So maybe teenage baseball lovers could have something to look forward to after all.

**Lincoln Ordinance closer to finale**

The Lincoln Historical Ordinance took another step closer to final approval as the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission voted Thursday to send the ordinance along to the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners for their final decision.

Also meeting at the courthouse Thursday night was the Lincoln Historical Review Board. Action at the board meeting included discussion of proposed building plans submitted by Joe Salazar, Matt Borowski and the Lincoln Heritage Trust. All three plans received approval.


Elliott opened her store in April 1983. From the spirited smile that often accompanies her words, one can see she enjoys her work.

## Editorial

Once in a while, we get some news out of Washington, D.C., that provides a ray of hope.

Such was last week's announcement that the U.S. House of Representatives rejected a plan to start renewing the nation's nerve-gas stocks.

The Reagan administration, turned down on its request to produce nerve-gas weapons the past two years, tried a different tack this time. They asked Congress for the money to build parts for nerve-gas bombs and artillery shells, but pledged not to assemble them into weapons without first asking Congress for permission.

"No thanks," said Congress. "We'll exercise our power as a check on the executive branch now instead of later."

Proponents of chemical weapons argued that we needed them as a deterrent to first use by the Soviets, who already have them. Though we wouldn't put it past the Soviets to do anything—include drop nerve gas on our troops—we sincerely doubt that things could ever go so far without a nuclear war.

The trouble with trying to reason your way through these weapons debates is that reason rebels against things like mass annihilation, disfigurement, etc.

It must really be tough on Capitol Hill, where lawmakers actually decide what will be built and what will not. In this case, it is a tiny bit encouraging that they said "no."—TP

## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

**SANTA FE** — Nelson Rockefeller said he learned everything he knew about political infighting in the arts community — by serving on museum boards.

Another good place to pick up the subject is inside a university faculty. But that's insiders' politics. What's more the rage these days is turning education, from the university level to kindergarten, into a political stick with which to beat one's outside adversaries.

We saw it earlier this year as Toney Anaya, either cynically or from full conviction, sought to ride a wave of educational ballyhoo into some sort of national prominence. No soap. It didn't work here.

Republican Governor Lamar Alexander of Tennessee did a little better. His innovative "Better Schools Program," including evaluation of every teacher once every five years, was shot down once but revived and passed in a special legislative session.

Those opposing the Alexander plan were largely members of the National Education Association, the same ones who supported Anaya's and his plans here.

Have they taken education squarely into politics?

Well, consider this. They have a national budget of over \$71 million. When that is added to the money held by their 50 state affiliates, the total comes to more than a \$350-million war chest.

Over 80 percent of the teachers in the nation, just at 1.8 million of them, belong to the NEA, which makes them the second largest union in the nation. Only the Teamsters have more members.

Their group was so helpful in electing Jimmie Carter that he set up the Department of Education at their request.

Are they active in New Mexico?

They have just come out with their endorsements in legislative races, in which they took the trouble to scrutinize 175 questionnaires and sit through 169 personal interviews with candidates.

One interesting result of that is what they did to present members of the Legislative Education Study Committee, the on-going group of legislators which oversees the state's schools.

They endorsed the opponent of Senator Christine Donisthorpe of that committee. They put off endorsements in the case of Senator John Morrow and Representative Ralph Hartman. They didn't endorse anyone in the races of committee members Sam Vigil, himself an educator, and Bob Corn, because, they said, no questionnaires were returned. They are presently supporting only two of the committee's present members, Senator Tim Jennings and Representative Murray Ryan.

They would apparently like to see a new committee, composed, one supposes, entirely of members of their choosing.

Another slightly worrisome spot is in the races for the state School Board. Most of those running there are educators or closely connected to educators through family ties. (Teachers can't run for the local school boards for which they work, but there is nothing to prevent them from running for the statewide body.)

One further wonders how many of those state School Board people are Anaya partisans, who might give him the control of that body he was refusing in constitutional changes by the Legislature.

Meanwhile, down in Albuquerque, the rival teachers' union, the American Federation of Teachers, always small in New Mexico, is apparently suffering from some sort of palace revolution. Many of its former officers have left the fold and talk of starting an independent union of their own. (Too much Al Shanker maybe?)

Governor Anaya's policy aide for education, who only got on board before this year's legislative session, is on the verge of departing.

And over in the Office of Education, Jim Miller, the Anaya man who made the mistake of telling school administrators to kite their figures, seems to be in trouble for saying what some of us have long thought those folks were doing in politics? Up to the members.

Remember that next time someone tells you how high are the ideals of our schools and those who direct them.

In fact they're right in there fighting, just like those who practice hot-and-heavy politics on museum boards.

## On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer



Today we will address ourselves to the question: Is "Ruidoso Downs Superstation" a contradiction in terms?

After talking to the principals at radio station KOAW, I decided the answer is yes and no.

The "family" operation of KOAW is very much in keeping with the Downs' down-home way of life. But the technology—and the attitude of management and ownership—seems very up to date.

KOAW went on the air April 18, after taking about two years to go from idea to reality. The station, at 1490/AM, broadcasts 24 hours a day.

It has a daytime operating power of 1,000 watts, and drops to 250 watts after sunset. Clearance is expected in June for 24-hour operation at 1,000 watts.

I was getting all this information over coffee with general manager John Raymond, owner Wayne Eakin and Wayne's wife, Betty. Jimmy White is another owner.

We were seated in the kitchen of the single-wide mobile home that houses KOAW. The building sits on a hillside where the village of Ruidoso Downs backs up against the mountains to the east.

Being involved in starting the radio station has been something of a homecoming for John Raymond. His roots in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley include the fact that he is the grandson of Oney Ramond, who owned the Tinnie Mercantile (now the Silver Dollar Restaurant) until 1957.

Ruidoso Downs had a different name back then.

"It took me years to figure out what happened to Green Tree," said John. Wayne Eakin goes back a way in these parts also, having "graduated from the eighth grade here."

The call letters, KOAW, have no particular significance, the two men told me. Wayne came up with "Keep Our Area Wonderful" as we talked.

I wondered about the viability of housing a radio station in a mobile home. John and Wayne indicated it was no problem, but they pointed out that everyone who worked there was like family.

The production and control rooms appeared quite comfortable to me when I toured the building. The disc jockey even has a nice view of trees and sky as he spins the music.

"What about the music?"

"I'm real proud of it," says John. "I had been having a little trouble figuring out the format of KOAW, having heard everything from 'The Thompson Twins to Andy Williams, so it was good to hear John explain it."

"Some people would call it an oldies format," he said. The station plays

some new music, he noted, but that is very limited.

The word, "variety," probably best describes KOAW's selection of old music.

John pointed out that in a given hour, a listener might hear everything from Frank Sinatra to Willie Nelson to Led Zeppelin.

"It's a little bit of something for everybody," said John. He did say the station tries to keep the music "soft."

The station steers clear of very hard rock and sex- and drug-oriented songs.

The combination old and new format is "very unusual," according to Raymond, who has been in radio for nearly 20 years. He explained that the decision to go with it came after "a lot of talking to people"—several hundred over the past two years.

"From the young to the old, the soft rock oldies format seemed to be what people wanted."

He went on to say that people like the oldies—it's the music they grew up with. A woman called John one day to say the music made her cry as she worked in his kitchen.

Raymond believes the variety of music on KOAW reflects the variety of people who live and visit here. People call and say, "Don't change." John and Wayne told me.

They listed some listeners and their musical tastes: the police department, Van Halen; the hospital, Jackson Browne; senior citizens, Bob Wills. A lot of the station's music is played by telephone request.

John said KOAW has found an audience where he did not expect one—in the barn area at the racetrack. Some fans there were so enthusiastic, he reported, they told him they were going to paint the roof of the barn: "The horses in this barn listen to KOAW."

The station depends on the RKO radio network for much of its programming. Shows like "Nighttime America" and "Solid Gold Saturday Night" are picked up via satellite, as is RKO news.

There is a full-time local news person working for the station, too. Community involvement is a stated goal of management.

All in all, I enjoyed my visit to KOAW, and I certainly want to welcome the newest member of the local media. I do admit to mixed feelings about so many oldies, though.

I mean, Chad and Jeremy were hot in the middle sixties, but I was just a mixed-up adolescent. You don't always want to be reminded of some parts of your past.





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
