Kans. Futurity to Flying Arky

Flying Arky, an 11-1 longshot, surged into the lead on the last jump and grabbed a dramatic nose victory in Sunday's finale of the \$605,384 Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

First place in the first leg of the Triple Crown for two-year-olds was worth \$199,927.

The windup of the 350-yard classic was a heart-breaker for A Cinch Or Better, the 2-1 favorite who made a big move at the start, then picked up even more momentum in the final half of the journey. He appeared to have the Kansas sewed up as he neared the wire.

Somehow, Flying Arky managed to get far more power into his strides than his foes expected. He appeared out of range at the halfway point. But the gelding, who had started the current Ruidoso Downs season as a maiden, steadily picked up his speed as he sped toward the wire.

Flying Arky was clearly moving the fastest of all in the final strides and barely managed to nail A Cinch Or Better. The latter, in turn, was only a nose ahead of Flow Of Cash.

Jockey Jacky Martin, aboard Flying Arky, scored his second Kansas victory. His first came in 1976 aboard Lord Winsalot.

Flying Arky is owned by Willie and Dee Talley of Athens, Texas. The trainer is Jack W. Dube. The payoffs: \$23.80, \$7.40, \$4.60.

A Cinch Or Better, a gelding owned by Gene White and Henry R. Heydenreich Jr. of Keller, Texas, earned \$83,453 for second. The payoffs: \$4.53, \$1.53, \$1.03. Alex Baldillez Jr was aboard.

Flow Of Cash, who had brisk early R. Wood of Frisco, Texas, was ridden lected \$39,024 for third and returned a show payoff of \$3. Flow of Cash, a filly owned by B.F. Phillips Jr. and Minnie R. Wood of Frisco, Texas, was ridden by Danny Cardoza.

Jockey Martin, in the post-race interviews, said he expected Flying Arky to run well in the Kansas. "He ran a good race two weeks ago in the trials, and I didn't push him much at that time," he said. "He's really trained much better—and run much better—than he did down in Texas."

Flying Arky negotiated the Kansas course in 18 seconds flat on a track described as slow from rains the

previous day. A headwind in the 15 miles-per-hour range was blowing.

Flying Arky, a sorrel gelding by Nellie's Ark out of Kita Wheeler, had been to the races six times before shipping to Ruidoso Downs for the Kansas Futurity. All of his previous outs had been staged at Val Verde, Texas, where he had made the finales of three futurities (without winning), and had earned over \$40,000.

In the Kansas trials, the gelding found himself, and had won by two lengths as a 5-2 favorite. He came out of the Kansas with a record of 2-4-2 from nine starts. His earnings now stand at \$243,200. The gelding also stamped himself as the one to watch in the upcoming Rainbow Futurity and All-American Futurity, the second and third legs of the Triple Crown.

Of the total Kansas Futurity purse of \$605,384, a hefty \$467,098 was split up in the finale alone. There was also a \$5,000 breeder's award.

Here's the way the rest of the field wound up in the Kansas Futurity: 4th—Cash Margin, earning \$27,617; 5th—Halo Fresh, \$22,214; 6th—deadheat between Jet Toro and Flaming Viking, each earning \$20,413; 8th—Brides Bouquet, \$19,212; 9th—deadheat between Dash For Destiny and Heart Streaker, each earning \$17,411.

An irony of the Kansas outcome is that A Cinch Or Better, shortly after the break, drifted out and bumped Dash For Destiny. The latter was pushed into Flow Of Cash. The chances of both Dash For Destiny and Flow Of Cash were seriously impaired. The point of irony is that all three horses—plus Jet Toro—are trained by C. Dwayne Gilbreath.

Flow of Cash, much to her credit, made up considerable ground at the end to bag third.

Spring Lark, a colt by All-American Futurity winner Moon Lark, outdistanced his foes with ease in Saturday's \$87,656 Kansas Futurity First Consolation at Ruidoso Downs.

Spring Lark took command at the first jump of the 350-yard sprint, moved into a clear-cut advantage of the halfway point, then accelerated even more in the final yards.

The colt flashed across the finish with a one and a half lead in a swift clocking of 17.55 seconds.

Gunfire hits police vehicle

An unknown assailant fired three gunshots at a Ruidoso police officer Friday as the officer traveled down Main Road in the Upper Canyon area of Ruidoso.

Two bullets hit the door and the third shot shattered the windshield of the police vehicle, driven by Officer Ron Hart. After the shots were fired, Hart radioed for backup police units and he and his K-9 partner then left

the vehicle for cover.

According to Police Chief Richard Swenor, when other officers arrived on the scene, near the second bridge in the Upper Canyon, they found Hart and his partner unhurt. The officers set up a roadblock, and police dogs were used to attempt to locate the assailant. Swenor said because of the

D-Day vet Friberg recalls June 6, 1944

Joseph Friberg sat at the table in his cozy kitchen, in his house tucked in one of Ruidoso's quiet corners. "We actually led the Normandy invasion," he said.

Like scores of other armed forces veterans in recent days, he was reflecting about the D-Day invasion of France during World War II. The 40th anniversary of that battle will be observed Wednesday, June 6.

Friberg wasn't sitting at home with his family on June 6, 1944. He was a radio man in the Ninth Air Force, transporting paratroopers across the English Channel.

"We were the ones that led the invasion," he said. "We knocked out bridges."

Planes carrying bombs for the bridges or paratroopers for the landing were over France long before the troops encountered German soldiers on the ground.

"The boys that landed were still across the channel," Friberg said. When they did hit the sand at places like Utah Beach, many of the soldiers were killed.

The air crews sustained such losses more than once. "I was in seven major invasions," he noted.

Friberg had been trained expressly for dropping paratroopers into places including Normandy, southern France and Holland. "We were specialists."

"Holland was worse than Normandy for us," he said. By then, the German defenders expected the American airplanes.

At Normandy, even the Americans weren't sure of the location and date of the invasion. "For quite a number of weeks we were feinting," he said. They flew to various sites to try to trick the Germans about their planned landing areas.

When they took off on the missions before the Normandy invasion, he said, "we didn't know ourselves it wasn't the real thing."

Secrecy surrounded the operation. "We were kept like prisoners in a compound." That way, nobody could reveal any plans.

Then, on June 6, the Americans and their European allies launched the invasion. They organized the biggest air armada ever formed, Friberg

said. "It was like a highway in the sky. It was solid," he said. Aircraft were everywhere. "They were still going when we were coming back."

The fighting was intense. "There was so much shellfire, in the dark of night you could see whole battleships," he said.

Even if the missions over Holland were more dangerous, Friberg recognizes D-Day's pivotal role.

"The few days following D-Day were crucial. We weren't sure we could stay on the mainland." The Germans might have repulsed their attack.

The Germans had thought they had fortified their side of the English Channel so it would be impregnable to attack by the Allies.

Friberg hadn't planned to be part of that massive invasion. He hadn't even expected to go into the Air Force. If he hadn't planned that, how did he end up there?

"It was easy in those days," he quipped. In her seat across the table from him, his wife, Leona, laughed with him.

Friberg's voice became serious again. He attributed his assignment more to the providence of God than to any plan of man. Masses of men were being trained and being sent to all types of posts all around the world.

When he got his greetings from Uncle Sam, he went into the airborne infantry. He left his native California for basic training in Utah, then went

Kansas Derby to Racy Roman

Racy Roman, a gelding whose reputation rested mainly on a longshot third in last summer's \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity, won Saturday's \$287,304 Kansas Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The Kansas Derby is the first leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-olds. First place in the Kansas Derby amounted to \$98,911, which hiked Racy Roman's career income up to \$277,123.

Racy Roman is owned by Morris L. Stephens of Graham, Texas. High L. Tucker is the trainer. The rider is Jeff Williams.

Racy Roman ended the muddy 400-yard dash in 19.86 seconds and returned \$10.20 to win, \$5.60 to place, \$3.20 to show. Easily A Twelve, coupled with Ima Dasher Myself as a 3-1 shot, mustered a steady assault which put her a nose in front of the even-money favorite, Burnell.

Easily A Twelve, piloted by Jerry Nicodemus, earned \$45,216 for second and refunded mutual payoffs of \$3.80, \$2.60. Burnell (with Jacky Martin up) had to be content with a third-place purse of \$23,173 to go with the \$351,365 he brought into the Kansas Derby. The show price on Burnell was \$2.40.

Racy Roman, breaking out of the number 7 post in the nine-head field, got off to a heads-up start and ran a straight course—at first. The gelding held a slight lead at the first jump. Burnell broke in fourth place.

As the field splashed toward the halfway mark, Racy Roman tightened his grip on the lead slot. My Real Dream and Lady Bee Loose, both longshots, had a flurry of speed near the lead, but both dropped back.

Burnell began to come on in the latter stages, moving fast and willingly. But the classy colt was no match for Racy Roman. The latter kept pulling away and zipped across the wire with a comfortable length margin.

Jockey Williams, obviously elated, had these views: "My horse (Racy Roman) really ran a good race. It took him 40 or 50 yards for him to get up his speed. He began drifting to the outside, so I had to hit him right-handed to get back on course. He's got

a lot of heart."

Asked when he thought he had the Kansas Derby sewed up, Williams replied, "When my horse quit drifting out on me. When I saw he was going straight, I knew we had it won."

Williams added he's now in his first year of riding at Ruidoso. "It's hard to get accepted by the other jockeys. Maybe this will help."

Bar Forth, a 9-2 shot who looked impressive in the trials, had the bad luck to get slammed around a few times by Lady Be Loose shortly after the break. The colt lost all chance for victory.

My Real Dream took fourth-place money of \$12,151. The rest of the field checked in this way: 5th—Ima Dasher Myself, \$11,021; 6th—Easy Truckala, \$10,738; 7th—Bar Forth, \$10,456; 8th—Lady Bee Loose, \$10,173; 9th—Ryons Mito Honey, \$9,891.

On a Stormy Day was scratched, and was awarded last-place money of \$9,608.

Racy Roman, in winning the Kansas Derby with such authority, pushed himself toward the head of the class among the nation's best.

comrades because he was married, he said. "He left on our first anniversary," Leona Friberg said.

Joseph Friberg believes the young age of the fighters was deliberate. "There's a vast difference between a contemplating, mature man and a young man," he said.

"The younger the man is, the less reflection he devotes himself to," he said. It is difficult to picture Friberg as an unthinking man. He is hardly a rash man today.

As an all-day rain created sticky mud outside, he sat inside and politely declined to comment on the sticky situation of Vietnam-era draft evaders.

Before he spoke about any topic, he thought about his answers.

One thing he doesn't dwell upon is the war. Some memories are not happy ones. On days such as Veterans Day, of course, he thinks back to the war.

"I think of the young men who gave their lives right by my side, so to speak," he said. One of those men had a child who was born about the same time as his own child.

"My oldest son was born a month before D-Day. Of course, that increased my anxiety during the invasion."

His family was the reason he broke regulations during that attack. "I carried a photo taped to my leg," he said.

The flyers were not supposed to carry anything personal, in case they were captured and it was used against them. However, Friberg took the photograph and taped it to himself along with a regulation escape kit.

The Fribergs have five children. They first came to Ruidoso in 1961. They did not return to California, not to the San Joaquin valley where he was raised.

During the war the population in California swelled by three million people. "It seemed to me to be overpopulated," he said.

Friberg's unit has not planned reunions, either. "It's surprising. We became so close to each other, far closer than I was to my natural brother."

In addition, he has never returned to Europe. Other veterans of the fight have retraced their paths to the beaches where so many soldiers died.

"Yes, I'd like to go back," he said, "but to see the old battlefields? No."

Friberg would like to visit the church-related sites he was unable to visit when he was a young man, preparing for that fateful D-Day 40 years ago.



A street by any other name or two or three

If you are sitting in your car parked in the front parking lot of The Ruidoso News, you can be sure that the street adjacent to the parking lot is Park Avenue.

From start to finish, throughout its 100 yards of length, it's Park Avenue all the way, and it's the only Park Avenue in Ruidoso.

If you travel south on Park Avenue, trouble begins. A left turn will put you on Zuni Trail, but a right turn will put you on Carter's Lane. Carter's Lane and Zuni Trail are one street, but at some mysterious point along the road, Carter's Lane becomes Zuni Trail.

Nearby is Riverside Drive. Soon

after you turn onto Riverside Drive from Sudderth Drive, the road becomes Baldy Drive. Round a corner to a stop sign, and the road becomes Country Club Road. Rumor even has it that the road becomes Scenic Drive at some point.

Speaking of which, there are a total of three widely scattered Scenic Drives and one Scenic Place in Ruidoso: Ruidoso also has the distinction of having two Canyon Roads, two Juniper Streets, two Roy Drives, two Silver Streets, two Taos Trails, two Tamarack Roads, two West Brady Roads and two Woodland Drives.

Virginia Canyon Road unpredictably twists over four roads in a relatively short distance.

This vagueness can play havoc with emergency and utility crews, to say nothing of your Aunt Emma coming

to visit on her first trip west from Yazoo City, Mississippi.

Fortunately this hodge-podge of misnamed asphalt is being studied by a special committee of the Ruidoso village council. Headed by Buddy Bundick, the committee is gathering suggestions for roads that share a single name, and deciding which names to cut from roads with several names.

According to Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis, the committee is attempting to get as much public input on the matter as possible. He said the committee has already made some road name suggestions to the council, which were approved at the last council meeting.

Those changes include Cedar Creek Drive and Paradise Canyon Drive,

which will become Paradise Canyon Drive; Carter's Lane and Zuni Trail, which will become Carter's Lane; Mountain Trail and Bradley Drive, which will become Bradley Drive; School Road, Spring Road and Wingfield Street, which will become Wingfield Street; Juanita Street and Eagle Drive, which will become Eagle Drive; and Riverside Drive, Baldy Drive, Scenic Drive and Country Club Road, which will become Country Club Road.

The committee is still trying to find out what to name all the roads in town that share names, and public input is being strongly encouraged. Hopefully all will be decided soon, so you can tell Aunt Emma exactly which former Scenic Drive you live on, before she leaves Yazoo City.

Latin Star, a 34-1 longshot, set a seasonal record of 46 seconds flat for four furlongs while pounding out a half-length victory in Saturday's \$32,240 Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The Rio Grande Kindergarten is exclusively for New Mexico-bred juveniles.

Latin Star, ridden by Gary Sumpter for Winford H. Carlike of Lovington, jumped into contention at the outset by sticking with the even-money favorite, Barlow Blade, during the backstretch run.

Barlow Blade was still bristling with speed while swinging into the turn for home, and had all the makings of a winner. But in the upper stretch, Latin Star—instead of fading as most Ruidoso fans probably thought she would—came on with a quick powerburst.

The filly took command suddenly and was in command throughout the stretch run. Barlow Blade held on stubbornly, but it was clear early in the stretch drive that she would not be able to hold off Latin Star's assault.

The winning time of 46 flat trimmed four fractions off the seasonal record, and wasn't far off the track mark of 44 3/5. The achievement was made even more significant by the fact the track was listed as "muddy" from light rains falling from heavily overcast skies.

Allotta Dial, one of last summer's leading two-year-olds, began establishing her reputation as a three-year-old by easily winning Friday's \$41,260 Kansas Derby Consolation at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly got away alertly, opened up her opposition in the first few jumps, and continued to pile up her lead as she stormed over the 400-yard course.

She was under no pressure in the final 100 yards and cruised across the finish with a length lead in a clocking of 20.07 seconds. A slight headwind was blowing. The track was fast.

Leased by Jack P. Fletcher of Simonton, Texas, Allotta Dial earned \$8,478. This pushed her '84 earnings up to \$18,464 (from a 2-1-1 record from four starts). Her career earnings are now \$192,156.

The filly, by Dial Jester out of Easter Lady Chick, accounted for most of her earnings with a sixth in last summer's Kansas Futurity and a nose second in the Rainbow Futurity.

Shur Kote Wrangler, a 13-1 longshot piloted by Nicky Wilson, rallied out of fifth place to score a narrow win in Friday's \$45,629 Second Consolation of the Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The sprint covered 350 yards and was negotiated in 18 seconds flat against a brisk headwind.

Queen Elect, running as a 3-5 favorite, led all the way in Thursday's Five and one half furlong headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly got some early arguments from the 7-1 shot, Pocket Spirit, but shook that one off easily at the turn home.

Queen Elect was under no pressure in the stretch, and she walked in with a fat three and one half lead and was timed in 1:07 1/5 seconds.

Editorial

"Every voter ... exercises a public trust," President Grover Cleveland said during his inaugural address almost a century ago.

The United States has changed considerably since then, but the need for exercising that public trust hasn't changed.

Without exercise, a body cannot remain healthy. It no longer reflects its former appearance. In extreme cases, it wastes away.

Without exercise of the right to vote, the body politic cannot remain healthy. It no longer reflects the true appearance of the people, if all types of individuals do not vote. In extreme cases, the body politic wastes away.

That need not happen in this country. Exercising the right to vote does not require much exertion here. It involves registration, which takes a few minutes, and voting, which takes a few more.

Voting is a privilege, as well as a right. Many people around the world can't vote, or can do it in name only. Americans can vote, and can make substantive choices. For generations we have had that good fortune.

Like young adults who have always been in good physical shape, we sometimes don't take the time to maintain what we have. We should. No sweat or long, painful hours is involved in keeping this nation in shape.

A little exercise is required, however. On Tuesday, everyone who is registered to vote should expend a little effort and go to the polls.

The effort won't be painful, and it will keep our body politic in good shape.—CR

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE--Jesse Jackson's rhetorical devices--incantation, rhythmical speech and repetition--ring strange in the soft twilight under a New Mexico sky.

The man and his ideas are from other times and places--southern slums, Negro churches, northern ghettos. On Santa Fe Plaza their retonarica is unfamiliar and exotic.

There is no doubting the man's appeal. He reaches below the surface of the mind to touch a realization almost all of us harbor. "There's something WRONG," it says. "We badly need a CHANGE."

But what change? At that point the Reverend Jackson gets a little elusive. His answers tend to become catch phrases which have played well before other crowds. He pulls out fragments of other speeches which have been well received, regurgitating them in no particular order, dropping one to rush on to another if the first does not generate the hoped-for effect.

That effect--unlike his probing demand for change--is almost entirely surface. He seems to feel most successful when it is externalized and of-the-moment.

What he seems to be seeking for is not so much change, which he praises, as simple response. Perhaps the "amens" affirm his existence.

As in many religious experiences, the intensity of the moment, the deep feel of a thing vaguely shared, may confuse the congregant into the belief that something lasting has happened.

Which gets us to another problem. What is Jackson--a minister of religion? a social reformer? a practitioner of the use of political power?

The three are similar, but they are not the same.

Part of whatever success Jackson has had is in the ability to shift quickly between the roles. Just as you begin to critique him by the matter-of-fact criteria which apply to one, he moves away like a butterfly. "That is not what I am all about," he says with a kind of messianic hauteur, which raises as many questions as it answers.

What is Jesse all about? That's the

main one.

He's not about a lot of hard facts or the irritation of detail, that's clear. During his New Mexico appearances, he gave evidence of believing Hispanics here have been denied the right to vote and the Pueblos have been decimated by genocide.

Sometimes he seems to be about theology, which appears to chill many who would like to coalesce with him; and sometimes he seems to be about a kind of inspirationalism which goes no deeper than Norman Vincent Peale's, though it is expressed more flamboyantly.

Maybe what he is about right now is symbolism.

John Kennedy's candidacy symbolized the fact the Roman Catholics could no longer be denied the right to aspire realistically to the highest office in the land. Clearly, Jackson's candidacy gives the same validity to the claims of blacks and other minorities who have so long been disenfranchised too, at least in this regard.

Jackson may also stand as a symbol of the fact that a poor man who can mobilize support can, with the help of federal funds, make a legitimate run for the nomination.

But if there is one thing you can be sure of about Jesse Jackson, it is that he will not be content to be any man's mere symbol. He is a personalist, first and last, and a personality, who has become what he is in his own right and by his own ardent striving.

He is not likely to stop striving now. So the final question becomes, where does Jackson go from here?

He says with great assurance that after him, politics will never be the same again. That cuts both ways. After this dose of politics, Jesse will never be the same again either.

He will almost certainly keep at it, wherever and however that may be.

A quiet observer, watching all this from the sidelines, might hope he will not feel it necessary to grow increasingly flamboyant and shrill in order to keep the spotlights on him. There are hints of a dangerous side to the man and to some around him which could tempt him to the demagogue's role.



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County voters face choices

Tomorrow's primary election will include a mixed bag of national, state and county races as Democratic and Republican voters decide who will move on to this fall's national election.

In the Democratic presidential race, voters may choose between Walter Mondale, Gary Hart, Jesse Jackson, George McGovern and Lyndon La Rouché Jr.

On the Republican side, President Ronald Reagan is running unopposed. For the United States Senate, Republican incumbent Pete Domenici is running unopposed, while Democrats Nick Franklin, Judith Pratt and Anselmo Chavez vie for an opportunity to face him in November.

Both races for United States Representative in District 2 are unopposed. Peter York is the Democratic candidate, incumbent Joseph Skeen is the Republican.

Democrat Eric Serna is running unopposed for Corporation Commissioner, while Wray Simmons takes on James McDaniel on the Republican half of the ledger.

Republican Thomas Mescall has no opposition in his bid for an eight-year term as Justice of the Supreme Court.

Democrat Dan Sosa Jr. is also unopposed for the same position for an eight-year term. Mary Walters also faces no opposition in her bid for a four-year term.

For Judge of the Court of Appeals, Democrats Joseph Alarid, position one, and Thomas Connelly, position two, are unopposed. No Republican is up for a vote.

Republican James Lee Martin is running without opposition for State Senator, District 39. Democrats may choose between Wilton Howell and Rey Serna.

District Judge for the 12th Judicial District is another race of single candidates.

On the Democratic side, Norman Bloom Jr. is running for Division 1, Robert Doughty II for Division 2 and Billy Gene Payne for Division 3.

Republicans Sandra Grisham is up for Division 1 and Richard Parsons Sr. is running for Division 3.

The race for District Attorney finds Republican James Richard Askew Jr. opposing Sam Sanchez, while Democrat Bert Atkins is taking on James Weldon.

No Republican is running for the State Board of Education, District 8, or the District Magistrate, Division 1.

For the Democrats, J. James Sanchez opposes James Shuler for the education board seat. Sanchez is a counselor at Ruidoso High School.

S.M. Ortiz is running against Bettye Dean for District Magistrate.

The County Commissioner contest in all three districts has produced no

opponents. Republicans Kenneth Nosker and A. W. Gnatkowski are running for Districts 1 and 2, respectively. Democrat Ralph Dunlap is running for District 1, Frankie Silva for District 2 and Bill Elliott for District 3.

Republican Frank Slocum is running unopposed for County Clerk, while Charlotte Garratt and Carol Schlarb vie for the Democratic nomination.

No Democrat is up for either County Treasurer or County Assessor.

For the Republicans, Marian Schlarb is unopposed for County Assessor. The County Treasurer race finds Flora Vega opposing Alice Mignon Sims.

Republican Ernest Sanchez opposes John McIntyre for County Sheriff. Democrat Tom Sullivan runs unopposed.

The race for Probate Judge has no Republican candidates. The Democrats may choose between Lee Jacqueline Martin and R.L. Van Norman.

Since Lincoln County is divided into four state representative districts, voters will select from among state representative candidates according to their voting district.

In Representative District 51, Democrats Patrick Tays, Leonard Sheffield Jr. and John Kalin oppose each other for the nomination. No Republican is on the ballot.

Representative District 56 finds Anita Sanders opposing Marvin (Mickey) McGuire for the Democrats, while Ben Hall, Fred Collins and David Barrett battle it out for Republican votes.

Republican Richard Knowles is the only candidate of either party running in Representative District 57.

In Representative District 52, Republican Maurice Hobson runs unopposed while Noel Mauldin takes on Neil Baird Sr. for the Democrats.

Polling locations throughout the county are as follows:

- Precinct 1, Capitan, the Fair building in Capitan;
- Precinct 2, Nogal, the Nogal Fire Station;
- Precinct 3, Carrizozo, the school conference room;
- Precinct 4, Carrizozo, the County Commissioner's room;
- Precinct 5, Corona, the village hall;
- Precinct 11, Ruidoso, White Mountain School;
- Precinct 12, Angus, the Bonito Fire Station;
- Precinct 13, Ruidoso, the public library;
- Precinct 14, Ruidoso, Ruidoso High School;
- Precinct 15, Ruidoso Downs, the village hall;
- Precinct 16, San Patricio, San Patricio School; and
- Precinct 17, Hondo, the Hondo Fire Department.

About 5,696 people are registered voters in Lincoln County. County Clerk Jane McSwane expects less than half of them to turn up at polling precincts tomorrow.

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


"There have been times I've threatened to hide his hammer," Sandra said of George's passion. Now that Country Essence is a reality, both partners are committed.

The store is spacious and light, making the perfect showroom for their inventory. A catalog filled with pictures of the 250 different items offered by Country Essence rests on an oak table.

"If someone has a picture, a rough sketch or an idea, we can convert it into furniture," George said.

Materials used making the furniture are of the finest quality, he said.

Hand-selected, kiln-dried Ponderosa pine, wood screws for durability, and top-of-the-line oil-based stain, sealer, and lacquer finish are among them.

The Moncriefs' inventory also includes oak furniture selections from Nashville, Tennessee, Olde Country Reproductions Pewitex and Imperial Pottery from Joplin, Missouri.

"The punch-tin we use is made by a third-generation Amish," Sandra added. "And if a customer wants, we



can put stained-glass in any of our products."


The Moncriefs recently moved to Ruidoso from Sevierville, Tennessee. They find the area full of friendly, well-wishing people.
