County commissioners approve Lincoln Historic Ordinance

"It is our desire to hear everything you want to say about this," said Lincoln County Board of Commissioners chairman John Hightower. He was addressing a near capacity crowd at the final public hearing on the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance. And for the next hour and a half, Hightower proceeded to give all present sufficient time to speak their minds on any aspect of the proposed ordinance, which many did. When it was over, the three county commissioners did away with emotion and voted unanimously to approve the ordinance in its final form. Among those giving testimony was William Lumpkin, an architect who spoke at length on the need to preserve historical towns. He said he had traveled extensively to other towns similarly protected and had found "tremendous enthusiasm" for the concept of historical preservation. He said there are several reasons to preserve such towns, one of which is the valuation of property.

which is unprotected. Sue Graham, a property owner in zone B in Lincoln, presented the commissioners with a petition with over 70 signatures in favor of the ordinance. Many of those who had signed, she said, were unable to make it to the meeting. Another petition, this one against the ordinance, claimed that the proposal was full of holes and was not ready for passage. Sally Black said she agreed that a zoning ordinance was necessary, "but not this one." She and other owners objected to the proposal as being too restrictive and not allowing them to live. Pat Ward suggested that the town be given an opportunity to vote on the issue, thereby deciding on the ordinance by majority rather than by the commissioners. Those speaking in favor of the proposal slightly outnumbered those opposed. The reasons given for passing the ordinance ranged from the need to preserve the town's uniqueness to maintaining the value of the property.

Lumpkin cited the example of Nevada City, California, first built in 1860. The town is governed by zoning protection and, because of it, he said, property values are one-third higher than in neighboring Grass Valley.

Mike Hainer, who owns a vineyard west of Lincoln, called the proposal "an incomplete document" which required some improvement. But he supported it over the ordinance that was currently in place. At one point, the hearing drew some

angry grumbling that prompted Hightower to silence the audience. "I don't want to shut anyone up," he warned, "but I will if I have to." The commissioners went from seat to seat soliciting comments from those in attendance. Most gave short remarks, others read from prepared statements. Doug Parin said that "just because it's taken two years to come to this point does not mean (the ordinance) is right at this point." But a man in favor of passage pointed out that the ordinance, if passed, would remain "a living document" which could be returned to for amendments or revisions at a later date. After listening to testimony, the commissioners were ready to vote. Commissioner Bill Elliott noted that "the saddest part of this whole thing is that it's neighbor against neighbor, friend against friend." He said he felt the people would come to appreciate the commission's decision and the final ordinance in the years to come. District Attorney Steven Sanders said all legal requirements had been met in terms of public notice of the hearing, including a notice sent to all property owners residing in Lincoln. The ordinance was then quickly passed. It will go into effect in 30 days.

Council schedules two meetings

The Ruidoso village council will meet twice this week, at 2 p.m. Monday, June 11, and at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, June 12. Monday's special meeting will concern the recent Lodgers' Tax Committee proposal to raise the lodgers' tax from two to three percent. Tuesday's meeting of the council will be a regular meeting. Items on the agenda for that meeting include: —A request from Jace Ensor con-

cerning the Ruidoso School of Gymnastics and the sale of Overlook Park. —A recommendation by the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) to rezone R-1, R-2, R-3 and C zoned areas of Hamilton Terrace, McCarty Subdivision and Wingfield Subdivision (Ruidoso Lodge Tract) to a C-1 zoning with the exception of lots 3 and 4, Block 1, of Hamilton Terrace, which were

recommended to be left zoned R-2. —A request for front and side lot variances of Lot 26, Block 7, of White Mountain Heights subdivision for Leroy Stewart. P&Z denied the request. —A request for a front lot line variance of lot 40, Block 34, Unit 5, of Ponderosa Heights for Emmett Morgan. P&Z approved an eight-foot front lot line variance. —A request for a front and rear lot line variance of Lot 4, Block 1, of Golf Course Estates for Jean Hammond. P&Z approved a 10-foot rear lot line variance only. —A request for approval of an appeal of an Architectural Plans Review Committee (APRC) denial of a sign application for H & O Investments. P&Z approved a center sign only. —A request for a replat of lots 20 and 21, Block 8, of Cree Meadows Country Club Estates for Frankie Battles as approved by P&Z. —A report from P&Z chairman Greg Masters on the BRW recommendations regarding the replatting of commercial property. —A report from P&Z enforcement officers Paul Davis and Buddy Bunkid regarding street name changes. —A report from Mayor George White on the resignation of Mary Dean from APRC. —A report from Ruidoso Airport manager Tim Morris on the feasibility of a controlled airport. —A request for a restaurant license for James Daniel of Two Rivers restaurant, to be located at 661 Sudderth Drive. —A request by Paul Davis for an executive session to discuss possible litigation.

Councillors tell of trip

"I think we finally convinced some people there that the problem is not going to resolve itself and not going to go away," said Ruidoso village councillor Sherman Atwood of the recent council trip to Washington, D.C. The council left Wednesday on a three-day trip to meet with government officials in Washington. The purpose of the trip was to strengthen support and seek new support of the relocation of the Ruidoso airport to the Fort Stanton Mesa Site B. The Ruidoso delegation consisted of all members of the Ruidoso village council, Ruidoso Mayor George White and assistant village manager Frank Potter. During their Washington visit, the group met with U.S. Representative Joe Skeen and Jim Marquez, chief legal counsel for the Department of Transportation; U.S. Representative Manuel Lujan; U.S. Senator Pete Domenici; officials from the Department of Interior and Bureau of Land Management (BLM); and U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman. Several councillors said one of the most constructive parts of the trip was the meeting with the Department of Interior and BLM officials. The councillors learned from BLM officials that BLM will cooperate with the request for an airport at Site B if Ruidoso can negotiate for use of the land with New Mexico State University (NMSU) officials. In earlier meetings with the NMSU Board of Regents, the council was told that use of the land is a decision of BLM officials. According to Councillor Bill Karn, if NMSU can be convinced to move the experimental range research studies off Site B, BLM will arrange for comparable land for the studies to transfer to. Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter said he felt the group received a more favorable response from the Department of Interior than ever before. "I think we're moving off dead center," he said. Councillor Jerry Shaw said some effects of the trip may not be felt until later. "I do definitely feel that it was a

fruitful trip and that we will see results down the road," she said. Another airport-related event occurred while the delegation was in Washington. Department of Interior Secretary William Clark ordered an environmental impact statement of all possible sites for a new Ruidoso airport. According to published reports, Clark will concentrate the studies on Site A and Site B. According to Karn, the Department of Interior and Department of Transportation are currently deciding which department will do the study and how it will be done. He said such studies can take as long as six months to complete. The group's meeting with Domenici was less constructive, several councillors said. Domenici said if the Ruidoso group can convince NMSU to relinquish control of the land at Site B, he will support the move. Domenici did not, however, take a side in the controversy, according to Shaw. "I can't say that I was not disappointed," she said. Councillor Rick Evans said the primary accomplishment of the trip was that the group was able to clearly identify "where the system is blocked," and determine what needs to be done to overcome the obstacles. Senator Pete Domenici and Bureau of Land Management officials both indicated that a compromise must be reached at the state level before the Site B land use agreement between BLM and NMSU can be amended, Evans said. He pointed out that this contradicted NMSU's claim that it was strictly a federal matter. Another benefit of the trip was that it showed there is political support for relocation of the Ruidoso airport, Evans said. "I think we laid that myth (that there is no such support) to rest," Evans said. He also said Site A on Fort Stanton Mesa as a possible alternative

basically had been eliminated, with Domenici expressing doubt that an environmental impact statement on possible sites would revive Site A. Evans was impressed with the New Mexico Congressional delegation's support of and knowledge of the airport issue. He praised Senator Jeff Bingaman, Congressman Manuel Lujan, and, in particular, Congressman Joe Skeen. Overall, Evans appeared satisfied that the trip was worthwhile. "I think one by one that we are eliminating the red herrings that New Mexico State has thrown up," he said. He added that responsibility for "any subsequent tragedy" at the present Ruidoso airport rests squarely on the university. Mayor George White felt the trip accomplished what it was intended to, as far as determining the reaction of the state Congressional delegation to relocation of the airport. There was not necessarily 100 percent support of moving the airport to Site B, however, he noted. "I felt as though Pete (Domenici) immediately went on the defensive, saying, 'Really, this isn't up to Washington, D.C., to make this decision,'" White reported. The senator told the group to work from the bottom up, White said. Domenici was instrumental in the announcement that an environmental impact statement would be done, the mayor noted. A receptive audience was given to the councillors everywhere they went, the mayor reported. "If you notice, all through my theme, I haven't mentioned Site B versus Site A," he pointed out. "I thought the trip was very worthwhile," White stated. "If nothing else, it's keeping the ball rolling."

Hall-Barrett race up in air

The Republican race for state representative in District 56 has yet to be resolved. As of late last week, Ben Hall still clung to his one-vote margin over Dave Barrett of Artesia. Barrett had announced that he planned to request a recount and possibly challenge rejection of three absentee ballots which were declared invalid. According to Eddy County clerk Virgie Cole, the ballots were rejected for "unauthorized oaths." But Monday morning, Barrett said he was not sure if a recount would accomplish anything. He said he still planned to challenge rejection of the three absentee ballots, as well as request the inclusion of a fourth absentee ballot that was mailed June 1 and not received by the county clerk until June 6. He said he would file his challenge Wednesday morning, following the official canvassing of votes slated for late Tuesday. Cole said 36 votes that had apparently been cast for Hall were in error. She said the votes were actually cast for incumbent State Senator Budd Hebert but mistakenly counted for Hall. Those votes had given Hall a final tally of 487 votes to Barrett's 450. After correcting the error, the vote dropped Hall back to 451 votes, just one ahead of Barrett. That's where the vote currently stands. A court order was obtained last week from 5th District Judge John Walker to open the sealed ballot box with the three invalidated absentee ballots. The box was opened in front of Walker and the three Eddy County commissioners. The commissioners agreed the three ballots were invalid, according to Cole.

Three victims of a May 4 plane crash in Ruidoso that left one person dead are reported as "doing real good" in a Lubbock, Texas, hospital. Harold Opperman, 39, of Lubbock; Linda Opperman, 38, of Lubbock; and Judy Moore, 37, of Crosbyton, Texas, were injured in the single-engine airplane crash that resulted in the death of Ronald Wahlrobe, 43, of Lubbock. The plane crashed in the yard of a home at 107 Nogal Place. The three are all now at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, where they are progressing very well, according to the hospital nursing staff. Hospital authorities said the three may be released within a few weeks.

Carrizo Canyon sewer dispute rekindles

A sewer line dispute between The Carrizo Lodge and neighboring property owners came before the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners at their Friday meeting in Carrizozo.

Ann George of Resort World Real Estate told commissioners she owned property on Carrizo Creek Road that she attempted to place on the sewer line which services The Carrizo Lodge. She said she had attempted to tap into the line on at least three occasions, but was stopped as many times by a representative of the Lodge.

She added that a court injunction has since been issued against her, preventing her from further attempts to tap into the line.

According to District Attorney Steven Sanders, the dispute arose after the county granted an easement to the Lodge, which agreed to allow future property-owners to tap into the sewer line.

Sanders said he asked the engineer of the project if the line was large enough to service new property owners, and he was assured that it was.

A stipulation by the Lodge that hookups to the line be completed before the road was paved, he said, was not in the contract. In fact, he said, the contract "the county has

does not say when the property owners have to tap into the line."

George said it was her understanding that the contract allowing the line "was for the benefit of the users on Carrizo Creek Road."

She said the dispute has cost her financially, and she asked the commissioners to intervene on behalf of the owners.

Sanders noted that the commission had two options. One was to do nothing "and let the owners fight it out." The second was to step in and enforce the agreement with the Lodge.

After some discussion, commissioner Bill Elliott said, "I would like to resolve this and let the people at The Carrizo Lodge know that they have to live up to the agreement."

He said if necessary, the county should secure an injunction against the Lodge "to prevent them from harassing property owners who want to tap into the sewer line."

Board chairman John Hightower agreed, saying, "It's up to us to help the owners out." The commissioners passed a motion to intervene in the case.

According to county manager Suzanne Cox, representatives of the Lodge were notified of Friday's meeting but failed to show up.

In another matter, Jim Stover, director of Ruidoso Emergency Medical Services (EMS), appeared

before the commissioners to request the continued subsidy of EMS. He asked for a 12 percent increase over last year's subsidy of \$15,000, to \$16,800.

Stover said the subsidies from the county have been helpful to EMS, particularly since the service provided reaches into areas outside of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs. He said EMS recently responded to accidents or medical emergencies in Biscuit Hill, the Cedar Creek area, the KOA Campgrounds and Glencoe.

He noted that half the residents of Lincoln County reside in Ruidoso and the Downs and, as county taxpayers, deserve the continued subsidy of the county.

But Cox challenged the need to continue the subsidy, claiming the agreement it was based on dated back to the early '70s and no longer applied. She said EMS does not cover the same territory it once covered, which included Capitan, Alto and the Hondo area.

County ambulances have replaced EMS in those areas, she said, and plans are under way to eventually add another to the Hondo area.

Cox also said the county ambulances provide EMS with backup assistance whenever it is required. She said that in itself constitutes a form of subsidy.

The commissioners were in agreement as they slashed the EMS sub-

sidy from next year's budget.

In other business, the commissioners: —Approved the 1984-85 county budget after raising by 10 percent the salaries of county employees. The commissioners also added one deputy to Sheriff Tom Sullivan's staff and trimmed four positions from the county Road Department.

—Accepted a bid of \$800 to buy the Burroughs computer system in place since 1977.

—Tabled action on two ordinances because the required publication time of 14 days, to notify the public, was not met. The ordinances, one concerning live music security and the other concerning emergency excavation, will be taken up at the next meeting.

—Tabled action on the proposed joint powers agreement between the Lincoln County Jail and Ruidoso concerning prisoners to be housed at the county jail. It was not determined in the agreement how the Sheriff's Department was to be compensated for guarding hospitalized inmates. Action on the proposal will be taken up once that question is answered.

—Formed a Road Viewing Committee to report on a closure petition. The county roads, all in the Hondo Valley, were listed as A-006, A-007, A-008 and A-009. The petition asks that the roads be closed to public use.

Van Pelt celebrates 100

Every chair in the Capitan Senior Center was filled Sunday afternoon, and more people were coming in the door.

The center of attention was diminutive Bessie Van Pelt. Everyone was celebrating her 100th birthday.

Bessie's nephew, John McCrary Jr., drove more than 900 miles from Naples in East Texas to be with her. He hadn't seen her for years. Another nephew took her out to dinner the night before.

In honor of her 100th birthday, she received a \$100 check. Other gifts piled up in a basket behind Bessie as people hugged her and congratulated her.

Bess Van Pelt has lots of friends in Capitan. Her minister came by to chat. He sees her every Sunday, when her friends drive her to Capitan Methodist Church.

Her landlady, Pearl Coor, brings her hot meals often, and so do Mr. and Mrs. Elvin Anderson. More of her friends came in, signed the guest registry, had some cake and exchanged a few words.

She's been making friends in town since 1971, when Bessie and her husband, Bill, moved to Capitan. They

had moved to Lincoln County about 40 years before that, from El Paso, Texas.

Over the years, Bess made many friends. Some from the Methodist church and the Senior Center threw the party for her. Members served two kinds of cake and chatted beneath a "Happy Birthday Bess" banner.

Racing wrapup

In Sunday's feature event, three-year-olds traveled seven furlongs in quest of a \$4,800 allowance purse, and the honors went to Makum Trimble.

The gelding, a \$15,000 purchase in the 1982 Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale for Select Thoroughbred Yearlings, ended a tough stretch battle a nose behind the 4-5 favorite, Mr. Twice Worthy.

But the stewards immediately called an inquiry, and Mr. Twice Worthy was disqualified for bothering Makum Trimble in the stretch run. So Makum Trimble, owned by Guy M. Bowers of Pampa, Texas, was elevated into first, and collected \$2,880. That hiked his career income up to \$33,364. The tote payoffs: \$6, \$2.80, \$3. Gary Sumpter was up. Mr. Twice Worthy returned \$2.40, \$2.60.

Malaysian Star, an 11-1 shot, got in third and refunded \$4.20.

Sunday's races attracted 4,508 fans, who wagered \$480,745, which was up over the same day a year ago.

No fan managed to hit all six winners in Sunday's Pic-Six wagering at Ruidoso Downs, so the drama continued to mount.

The total carryover pool swelled up to \$58,249.07.

That amount will be funneled into this Thursday's Pic-Six wagering at the mountain course.

When Sunday's Pic-Six wagering failed to produce a ticket with six winners, that marked the seventh straight day in which there was no six-win ticket.

In Saturday's featured Mr. Kid Charge Handicap at 400 yards, the win went to Racin Free, a 5-1 shot ridden by Jacky Martin. Racin Free ended with a strong move to win by a half length in 20.01 seconds, returning \$12.20, \$6.40, \$4.20. First was worth \$5,820.

Rocket Jet Bug, a 9-1 shot, ended up second (\$7.80, \$5.20), 3/4 lengths in front of Midland Native, a 7 1/2-1 shot. Midland Native returned \$4.00. Coda Mundi, an even-money favorite, broke poorly. Sgt. Pepper Feature, who went into the race with career earnings of almost \$870,000, was never in contention and finished fifth.

In Friday's five-and-one-half furlong headliner, the win went to

Next Flight, who hugged the rail around the turn for home and got up for a well-fought head score over Funny Native. Next Flight returned \$7.40, \$4.60 and \$3.60, and covered the distance in 1:07 1/5 seconds.

Funny Native was in the thick of it all the way while finishing second (\$4.20, \$3.80). Third went to Sailing Blade (\$3.40). Crator High, going after his fourth straight win, was in contention until the half-way point of the stretch.

Friday's program also included two six-furlong elimination heats for the \$35,577 Norgor Thoroughbred Derby. The two trial winners were Queen Elect (who won by five lengths in 1:13 2/5 seconds) and Machisma (who won by a head in 1:14 1/5).

Those who also qualified for the June 16 finale were Annes Dancer, Native Impression, High Bounds Dance, Crimson Countess, No Defeat, Be My Partner, Not For Hire and Charlie Mike.

Mr. Master Bug, the third-richest quarter horse of all time, inched closer to another big payday during Thursday's program at Ruidoso Downs.

The colt scooted to a cut-and-dried length victory in the sixth race, which was one of four elimination trials for the \$154,010 Rainbow Silver Cup.

Mr. Master Bug covered the 440-yard distance in 21.925 seconds, and that made him the top qualifier for the finale which comes up on Sunday, June 17. Strong headwinds of some 40 miles per hour were blowing. The Silver Cup is exclusively for four-year-olds.

The Silver Cup trial victory added another \$1,500 to Mr. Master Bug's account, and that put his lifetime earnings up to \$1,492,756. The valuable colt, who won the All-American Futurity in 1982 and the Rainbow Derby last summer, is owned by Marvin Barnes of Ada, Oklahoma.

Ruidoso patrons launched Mr. Master Bug as a heavy favorite and he returned mutual payoffs of \$2.60, \$2.80, \$2.20. Betts Full Moon, owned by Vincent C. Fister Jr. of Westerville, Ohio, rolled to a length win in the first trial division and checked in with the second-best clocking of 21.975.

Super horses Thursday

It would be no exaggeration to call Thursday's program at Ruidoso Downs the finest collection of three-year-olds in quarter horse history.

The entire 12-race card consists of 440-yard elimination trials for the \$550,000 (estimated) Rainbow Derby, the middle jewel in the Triple Crown.

A total of 120 sophomores will take part, and the list reads like a Who's Who of quarter horse stardom.

The supernova of the collection is On A High, whose last outing at the mountain course came on Labor Day of '83 and produced a first-place check of \$1 million in the finale of the \$2,300,000 All-American Futurity.

Mr. Suspenders, who took the runner-up prize of \$343,500 in the All-American, is also set to go, as is Racy Roman, who bagged third-place money of \$153,500, and came roaring back earlier this month to brilliantly win the first leg of the Triple Crown for sophomores - the \$287,304 Kansas Derby.

Other glittering stars on the Rainbow trial roster include Indigo Illusion, last year's national two-year-old filly champ; Double Dutch Bus, winner of last summer's \$655,615 Kansas Futurity; Meganette, heroine of last summer's \$688,800 Rainbow Futurity; Easily A Twelve, the stakes star whose most recent exploit was a second in the Kansas Derby; Burnell, the top Kansas Derby qualifier whose money line is now reaching \$350,000.

Despite such willing firepower, the owners of three horses had enough confidence to shell out \$15,000 each in supplemental nominations to the Rainbow trials. The three horses are Maxebig in the second race, Rise N High in the 10th, Indigo Illusion in the fourth.

The latter, of course, looms as a major Rainbow contender, and her supplemental nomination was no surprise. The filly made her Ruidoso debut as a heavy favorite carrying 126 pounds against older horses in the Go Together Handicap (second division, 350 yards) on May 27. The filly slipped on the first jump, recovered her balance - high weight and all - and rushed smoothly through the final yards to nail the stakes mare, Miss Squaw Hand, by a head. 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
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

In another major division contest, the Elks outscored Ruidoso State Bank 11-7 Thursday night.



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

Flood waters in years past having done away with two electric organs, the church has been a little short of music and singing during the last few years.

Therefore it was a special blessing that some members of the choir from The Church of the Holy Mount came down to sing special numbers. The church is named in honor of Anne Helena Tully.

John Cooper mentioned that the church had been built from native stone after the Anglican Style by John Bruns, a master at stone building. Also mentioned was the beloved Reverend Ted Howden, the early priest of the church, when it was the only protestant church between Ruidoso and Roswell.

Ted, the son of Bishop Frederick Bingham Howden, was the chaplain of the 666th Coast Artillery, New Mexico Men, which was captured on Bataan in World War II. Father Ted died on the Bataan Death March as the result of giving all his meager rations to his fellow prisoners.

Paul Jones read some very heartfelt letters from former priests of the church, Father James Eubanks, Father Frank Wilson and Father Delbert Achuff. Also a letter from Bishop Richard Trelease, Bishop of the Episcopal Church of the Diocese of The Rio Grande.

All described their fond memories of their days serving Saint Anne's and all Lincoln County, and sent their hearty congratulations in this landmark in the life of the church, and asked their blessing upon its work for the Lord in years to come.

Flowers on the altar were in memory of Anne Helena Tully, Helena Anne Coe, Helena Coe Lemay, Sydney Coe Bonnell, Annie Coe Titsworth, Bertha Storm and Edna C. Schierenberg.

An out door communion at Church of the Holy Mount followed at Ten O'Clock. And after this, dinner on the grounds. Folks came from all over Lincoln County to the Saint Anne service and also the service and dinner at Church of the Holy Mount.

All of us are deeply grateful to those who "in thought, word, and deed" made this Sunday, June Ten, 1984 something to be treasured forever.

Editorial

To see a first-class symphony orchestra in person—such as the Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra at last week's Ruidoso Summer Festival—is truly an awe-inspiring experience.

Unfortunately, the thought of forking over up to 35 dollars for that experience awes most people into declining.

And therein lies the rub. The Summer Festival does a great service to the community by bringing in performers of the highest caliber. However, the cost of the concerts, and to some degree the setting, discourages a big turnout from residents.

It should be pointed out that Ruidoso Summer Festival Inc. is a private concern. It does not receive public funds and is not accountable to the public.

Like anything, the event is open to public criticism, however. And charges that the festival has become "elitist" and that it has strayed from its original intent have been voiced for the past couple of years.

It seems that a large concert hall for Ruidoso would make at least some of the concerts more accessible, since greater attendance conceivably would result in lower ticket prices. One place that comes to mind is the new high school gymnasium—seating 1,500.

Of course, that gets into the area of "What does the Ruidoso Summer Festival want to be?" And that is for its board to decide.

Meanwhile, the event has come and gone. It was a joy for those who attended, but something little noticed by most everyone else.—TP

Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—Our Governor says he is surprised Walter Mondale didn't carry New Mexico. After all, he reminds us, all the state's Democratic leadership were Mondale supporters.

That may have been the trouble. Anybody who doesn't read the results of the June 5 primary as a massive repudiation of the Democratic party leadership in the state just isn't paying attention.

Gary Hart didn't just slip by the great front-runner, Fritz Mondale, in New Mexico; he creamed him by a margin of about 17,000 votes. Hart did almost 30 percent better than Mondale, recipient of all that stout support from Anaya and Bruce King and Jerry Apodaca and almost every other party leader around.

You have to figure those voters wanted to send a message.

And if that doesn't convince you, there is the matter of Judy Pratt.

She beat Nick Franklin by around 8,000 votes, which totals out to something like 16 percent. And who is Nick Franklin? Just the former state chairman of the party to which both belong, who evidently thought that fact alone would be enough to sweep him to victory.

If Democrats think those indicators can be read as in any way encouraging, they have forgotten that the root virtue in politics is realism.

Anaya, of course, fared even worse than the party generally. He was set upon defeating Caleb Chandler, state Senator from Clovis, who whipped the Anaya candidate by an embarrassing wide margin. He also wanted badly to beat Francisco Gonzalez, another of the Democratic Senators who defied him. That didn't come off either. In fact, Anaya's man in that race (in Taos County and surrounding areas) ran third.

The only Anaya target who went down to defeat was Senator Ron Olguin in Albuquerque's South Valley; and most who know him think Ron shot himself in the foot. Anaya had appeared so unsure Tom Benevisez, Olguin's opponent, could win, that he had not been active in this race. Olguin, regarded here as one of the most arrogant men ever to work

out of the Senate (where arrogance is not an unusual vice), turned off more of his own former supporters than the Governor was able to do for him.

Ann Watkins, Judy Pratt's campaign manager, was absolutely correct when she said her tiger had "a fantastic campaign organization, somewhat outside the Democratic party structure."

That's part of the reason she did well.

If somebody in the Democratic party organization doesn't put that group back together between now and November, they may be set back years in political power.

There was a certain amount of crowing around the capital on the day after election about the fact that Emilio Naranjo, longtime patron of Rio Arriba County, had failed to show the muscle that is expected of him. There were some uncharitable chuckles too about the fact that Donald Martinez, long San Miguel County's most flamboyant politico, had gone down to defeat.

Democrats who understand what awaits them in the Fall should not be triumphant over any losses of ground by any members of their party. In November, they are going to need everyone they can get—and both of those just mentioned are the kind of producers of votes the party is liable to want badly.

Anaya, by and large, has demonstrated that his vote-getting power is almost purely personal. Evidently his blessing on other candidates is about as helpful as somebody else's curse.

And the rest of those Democratic leaders? Most of them can charitably be described as old and tired. What's more, most voters seem to think of them as distinctly tiresome.

If the party doesn't do something drastic—and now—its spirits on November 6 will plummet even further.

Footnote: How is it possible for Albuquerque television stations to create election-night coverage that is uniformly worse than last time, each election for more than 20 years?

As he's singing, with his class of Singing, 'Oh, Mother Country, I do love you.'

"Mother Country"

That lyric came to mind as I listened to Mayor George White tell about the recent 55th-year reunion of the class of 1928, Wisconsin State Teachers College.

George joined 26 of his classmates at the reunion in River Falls, Wisconsin. (State Teachers College is now the University of Wisconsin at River Falls, but it was a satellite campus of the university back then, too.)

Naturally, a group photo was taken at the reunion.

"Did you notice that they're practically all women?" George asked. There were 20 women and seven men in the group. He said just about all the remaining members of the Class of '28 were there.

The class had 40th- and 50th-year reunions, and George attended the 40th. So some of the people he hadn't seen in 15 years, others longer.

"This guy I hadn't seen since I graduated," he said, pointing to a face in the photo.

Did George recognize the fellow? "No," he pointed to another face. "This kid right here I recognize probably more than anybody else out of the whole class."

George also visited his old roommate, who was re-marrying his wife on the occasion of their 50th wedding anniversary.

In college, the roommates shared a room in a big old house—there were no dorms. They were charged \$2.50 a week rent.

The room had one double bed. George and his roommate chuckled over the memory that the roommate had the bed to himself the first part of the night, while George was out carousing. George had it to himself in the early morning hours because his roommate was up and gone.

Was George really out carousing? "I wouldn't say carousing. But I was out, put it that way."

Minong, Wisconsin, is George's home town, and he also visited there on his trip. It is 100 miles from Minong to River Falls.

Was it a big deal to go away to college?

"Hell, yes. We went down on the train."

He recalled that students usually went home only at Thanksgiving and Christmas. If they were lucky, they got home for a couple of days at Easter.

George recalls as "the most lonesome time of my life," his first year at college when he had to stay in River Falls through the Christmas holiday. He was working at a restaurant.

He remembers having a big lump in his throat when he met his classmates returning on the train.

What does one do at one's 55th-year class reunion?

"A lot of reminiscing," Tim was spent in the campus archives, looking through the old yearbooks. George was on the yearbook staff in college, and he was business manager for the school newspaper.

"I had kinda forgotten about that—but the old annual brought me back to my senses."

George was also in the school play every spring. He participated in debate (the school's "big forte"), too. But he couldn't quite crack the first team, George recalled in a non-regretful way.

I asked the mayor if he had taken note of any "collective wisdom" in the gathering of septuagenarians.

"Much to my surprise, Tim, it was a wholesome attitude toward life." He explained that the college itself took a lot of interest in "good old civic citizenship—you name it," and that his class caught the spirit and got involved.

The mayor found a photo of himself wearing an Al Smith derby—he had been out campaigning for Smith in the 1928 presidential race.

George was reminded by one classmate that he had been prom chairman his junior year, and how hard he had worked at it.

He was also a cheerleader. George led the reunion group in a cheer for old times' sake, showing Class of '24 honor students how it was done in the twenties.

George's classmates voted him the "Most Spirited Member," not only of his class but of the entire decade 1920-1930.

The enthusiasm his class had back then remains with its members to this day, according to George. He said he didn't break or anything grumbling about going home or anything like that, and pointed out that these were people who went through the Great Depression after leaving school.

Did this wholesome attitude give George a feeling of pride?

"Absolutely."

I mentioned a character in a Eugene O'Neill play who forever revered his four years of college as the high point of his life, and asked George if he felt the same way.

"I could almost say 'amen,'" he said. "It was without a doubt—I'll put it this way, it was the happiest three years of my life."





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

Truck drivers, commuters and the hungry have another restaurant to make a note of. The Apache Summit Restaurant, on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation directly off U.S. Highway 70, is open for business.

Owners Fred and Sofie Peso offer a complete breakfast and dinner menu, specializing in Mexican food.

"Everything we serve here is from scratch. Nothing comes out of a can," said Sofie about the homestyle cooking.

The restaurant, which reopened last April, was built in the 1950s. The Peso family, including four children, all pitch in to keep the doors open from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. seven days a week.


Besides food and refreshments, the restaurant houses an art gallery. Fred, himself an artist, said all the crafts for sale are by local Indian artists.

"This is something we have been dreaming about," said Sofie. "I wanted a restaurant, and Fred wanted a gallery. Now we have that." "I really wanted a place to show others what the Mescaleros can do," Fred said.

As Sofie said, Fred is a man of many talents. Formerly with the Bureau of Indian Affairs, he is a skilled sculptor and craftsman. Sofie noted that he also enjoys working with buckskin.

The showcases in the gallery display many beaded crafts, and Fred said the key chains are very popular.


The dining areas of the restaurant are large and comfortable. Wood


