## Mr Master Bug in a squeaker

Mister Master Bug, the third-richest quarter horse of all time, collected \$77,005 for his win in Sunday's Rainbow Silver Cup at Ruidoso Downs.

But it was not a case of picking up easy money.

The sleek four-year-old ran into more firepower than expected and had to turn in an all-out effort to hold off the 9-2 shot, Betts Full Moon.

The stewards took a long look at the photo-finish picture before calling it Mr Master Bug by a nose. This nose margin was probably half an inch or so.

Jockey Jacky Martin put it this way: "He started to cough, or maybe he was getting tired. He usually runs real strong. But this time, he was hanging. He didn't have anything left at the wire. I guess this was the hardest I ever had to ride the colt. He probably ran harder than he ever had to in his life."

Marvin Barnes of Ada Oklahoma, the owner of Mr Master Bug, commented: "This is only the third time we've run him this year. This horse likes to run. He thrives on running. Our plan is to run him in the World's Championship Classic this summer, and then the All-American Gold Cup. Our goal is to have him reach \$2 million in winnings—then we'll retire him."

The Classic and the Gold Cup could

put Mr Master Bug over the top, since he came out of the Silver Cup with a money line of \$1,569,761. He is now breathing hard on the second-place slot (in all-time earnings) held by Higheasterjet at \$1,617,209. The sport's top money-maker is Dashing-ly at \$1,754,322.

Betts Full Moon, who picked up plenty of stature by the way he went gunning after Mr Master Bug, earned \$26,181 out of the total Silver Cup purse of \$154,010. No Tell Motel, 15 1/2-1 in the betting, hit the wire only a neck behind Betts Full Moon and pocketed third-place money of \$15,401.

Mr Master Bug covered the 440-yard course in 21.62 seconds, breaking the seasonal record set by Rise N High at 21.65 in the Rainbow Derby trials three days earlier. There was no wind in the Silver Cup scramble. The track was fast.

Ironically, Mr Master Bug was the owner of the seasonal record earlier in the meeting, when he set the top Silver Cup qualifying time of 21.925 seconds. The All-American Futurity winner is trained by Jack W. Brooks and ridden by Jacky Martin.

Ruidoso fans were pretty well sold on Mr Master Bug in the Silver Cup, and made him and his entymate, Miss Squaw Hand, heavy favorites. The betting returns: \$3, \$2.40, \$2.20. Betts Full Moon, piloted by Steve Harris for Vincent C. Fister Jr. of

Westerville, Ohio, returned \$4 to place and \$3 to show. Julie A. Jewson is the trainer. No Tell Motel, owned by McDermott Ranch of Madisonville, Texas, handed out \$3.40 to show. Roy Brooks was up.

The rest of the field got in this way: 4th—Miss Squaw Hand, earning \$10,780; 5th—Call Me Favorite, \$7,700; 6th—Screen Test, \$6,160; 7th—Glo Billy Sims, \$4,620; 8th—Wranglers Go Man, \$3,080; 9th—Dynago Victory, \$1,540; 10th—San Rosa Leah, \$1,540.

Except for the early scramble for positions, the Silver Cup evolved as a two-horse race.

Mr Master Bug broke on top from the number seven post while his stablemate, Miss Squaw Hand, also had lost of early lick. She came out of the rail slot.

After the field had progressed about 50 yards, Mr Master Bug solidified his position on the front end. But Betts Full Moon, who was about a length off the lead in the early going, quickly began picking up steam.

At the midway point, Mr Master Bug was moving in high gear, but Betts Full Moon was advancing with great speed and determination.

It was at a point about 75 yards from the wire when Betts Full Moon really began bearing down on the people's choice, and appeared ready to go bulleting into the lead. Somehow,

Mr Master Bug was able to call on every ounce of octane, and resisted the challenge. He refused to let Betts Full Moon get by. The two leaders appeared to be in a holding pattern as they tore across the finish.

In winning the Silver Cup, Mr Master Bug added more luster to his reputation—since he has now won a major stakes race in each year of his career. He won the All-American Futurity as a two-year-old, the Rainbow Derby as a three-year-old. The valuable property is by Master Hand out of Flick Bug.

Here's the way they qualified for the Silver Cup: Mr Master Bug, 21.925; Betts Full Moon, 21.975; Miss Squaw Hand, 21.990; Screen Test, 22.040; Call Me Favorite, 22.105; Dynago Victory, 22.130; Glo Billy Sims, 22.185; Wranglers Go Man, 22.215; San Rosa Leah, 22.260; No Tell Motel, 22.285.

The latter got into the Silver Cup the hard way, deadlocking Kita Blue for the bottom qualifying slot. A draw was held to break the tie, and No Tell Motel won—and proved himself worthy with that fast-closing third-place finish.

The Silver Cup field included two graduates of the 1981 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale: Wranglers Go Man, who was purchased for only \$13,000, and San Rosa Leah, acquired for \$29,000.

## Crime Stoppers voice prisoner concerns

"I took exception to having those people loose in the community," said E. J. Fouratt, a member of the Ruidoso Crime Stoppers. "We expect them to take extra dilligent care in sending anyone down here to Camp Sierra Blanca."

Fouratt made his comments at the Thursday evening meeting of the Crime Stoppers. He presented a letter signed by some 50 area residents opposing the housing of violent prisoners at Camp Sierra Blanca.

The letter was sent shortly after the March escape of a prisoner, convicted of four murders, from the minimum security facility at Los Lunas.

It asked for an accounting of prisoners at Camp Sierra Blanca, and removal of any prisoners who have been convicted of violent crimes.

Many at the meeting voiced their shared concern over the situation at the camp.

The group then voted, at Crime Stoppers President Richard San-

doval's suggestion, to write to Governor Toney Anaya and Department of Corrections officials, urging a solution to the problem of housing violent prisoners at the camp.

"I sure think we're going to have to stay on top of the issue," said State Senate candidate Wilton Howell, a visitor at the meeting.

Also during the meeting, Ruidoso Police Officer Mark Paz made two suggestions to the group concerning greater involvement in Crime Stoppers by local youth.

Paz proposed that the group offer a high school senior a scholarship for university work. Paz said such a scholarship could be offered to a student interested in pursuing a law enforcement education.

"There is an ability to reach those kids," Paz said. He added that such a program may result in greater exposure of school students to the Crime Stoppers program.

The group voted to direct Paz to consult attorney Ron Harris before proceeding with the scholarship project to ensure the legality of such a

project by a non-profit organization.

Paz also suggested the group invite local students to participate in Crime Stoppers projects and meetings. The group agreed, and Paz said he would invite some students to the next meeting.

The group also heard a report from Ruidoso Police Investigator Mike Lovelace. He said Ruidoso Police Chief Richard Swenor has attributed a significant drop in the crime rate in Ruidoso during the past year to the Crime Stoppers program.

Lovelace reported a recent Crime Stoppers tip resulted in two felony arrests and the seizure of more than two and a half pounds of marijuana. He said the informant in the case was paid \$500.

Lovelace said another tip was less successful, with only one ounce of marijuana seized. Having that much is a misdemeanor offense. The group voted to pay the informant in that case \$50.

The group also voted, during the meeting, to go ahead with a project to place two Crime Stoppers signs in

Ruidoso.

The two signs, measuring four by eight feet, will read "Crime Stoppers active in Ruidoso" and will be placed at the "Y" and along Highway 70 approaching Ruidoso Downs from the east.

Plans also call for two additional signs, which will be placed at the Inn of the Mountain Gods turnoff and near the Swiss Chalet Inn.

Crime Stoppers member Bill Rawlins also reported to the group on the progress of the Crime Stoppers membership project.

He proposed three classifications of memberships, based on the amount the member has donated to Crime Stoppers. Rawlins said items such as decals, wallet cards, lapel pins and plaques could be given to recognize those who donate to Crime Stoppers.

The group directed Rawlins to continue his efforts on the project.

The Crime Stoppers number is 257-4545. Callers need not reveal their names to collect a Crime Stoppers reward.

## Chamber draws 49 new members

## Blown valve affects water service in Capitan, Nogal

An air relief valve that "blew sky high" Thursday morning three and a half miles north of Alamogordo caused interrupted water service in Nogal and Capitan late last week and over the weekend.

Alamogordo Water District office manager Sue Daugherty said the unit which malfunctioned was an old galvanized valve that had rusted through.


"It blew sky high," she said, "and it must be shooting 30 feet in the air."

She said the district would have to wait "until the geyser goes down to

get some men in there to work on it." Capitan village clerk Virginia Spall said Friday the village was drawing on two large water storage tanks and would be able to draw some water from Eagle Creek.

Spall said things would be all right as long as people conserved water and the breakdown did not continue for more than four or five days.

Daugherty said she expected the flow of water to slow by Saturday, after which a crew was to go to work on the valve. The repair could be completed by Monday, she said.



## Bad checks bad news, but precautions help

Bad checks are a sore point with business owners when they come back from the bank marked "insufficient funds." However, whether a business accepts checks can often be the turning point of a sale.

The problem has no single solution. Each business owner must weigh the positive side of helping sales by accepting checks against the negative side of receiving a worthless check.

Bad-check writing in Ruidoso is a concern of Quinn Martin, special Assistant to the District Attorney. People can turn to Martin's office, in the Lincoln County sub-office behind Ruidoso village hall, after receiving a bad check.

"It stays fairly steady," Martin said of the number of worthless checks his office handles each month.

His office helps local merchants in the prosecution of worthless checks. By following a simple procedure,

merchants can initiate prosecution by the District Attorney's office against writers of worthless checks.

The most helpful step a merchant can take to facilitate prosecution, Martin said, is to collect as much information as possible from the writer of a check.

Martin suggested recording a check writer's date of birth, social security number, telephone number, current driver's license number, license plate number, description of vehicle and general physical description when taking a check.

He also stressed the importance of having the store clerk initial the check.

"That enables the prosecutor to have the person who took the check identify the check writer in court," Martin said.

Martin added the District Attorney's office now charges a fee to people convicted of writing worthless checks.

He said the fee increases as the

## Robbery suspects jailed

Held at the Ruidoso jail are Jo Ann King, 31, of Roswell, and James Masci, 22, of Gallup. According to Ruidoso Police Lieutenant Dave Pfeffer, King has been charged with armed robbery, possession of a stolen

weapon and possession of a controlled substance. Masci has been charged with possession of a stolen weapon and possession of a controlled substance.

According to Pfeffer, four people left the restaurant about 1:15 p.m. Sunday, and approached their car in the parking lot. As they entered their car, he said, a woman also got into the car, drew a gun, and demanded

money from the four. The robber then escaped with the money on foot, and was apparently picked up by a waiting vehicle.  
Ruidoso Police arrested King and Masci at about 6 p.m. Sunday. Pfeiffer said some of the alleged stolen money was recovered. The two remain in detention and bond has not yet been set.

Ruidoso Police officers also responded to a fire and explosion Friday night at the Ruidoso Trailer Park. According to the Ruidoso Fire Department, the explosion resulted from a propane leak. Park owner Clem Clutter said the owner of the trailer, from Odessa, Texas, and another man returned to the trailer after an absence of several months. Clutter said they had removed a

heater when last at the trailer and apparently forgot to secure the gas line. When they returned Friday and turned on the gas to the hot water heater, gas leaked from the unclosed gas line at the heater hookup, according to Clutter. The resulting explosion sent both men to the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital with minor burns, Clutter said. Clutter reported that at one time flames from the explosion reached 75 feet high.

# Rainbow trials Wednesday

A five-day racing weekend at Ruidoso Downs kicks off on Wednesday. The first three days of the weekend—Wednesday, Thursday and Friday—will consist of first-round elimination trials for the \$700,000 (estimated) Rainbow Futurity at 400 yards.  
The Rainbow Futurity is the middle jewel in the Triple Crown for two-year-old quarter horses.  
Fourteen-race programs are booked for Wednesday through Friday, with regular 12-race agendas on Saturday and Sunday. Despite the expanded cards on the first three days, the regular post time of 1 p.m. will be in effect throughout the week.  
Here's how the trial format for the

Rainbow Futurity works: the top two finishers in each heat (Wednesday through Friday) will advance into the time trials on Thursday, July 5. Since the first-round three-day span will cover 42 races, that means a total of 84 heat will meet in nine time trials in the second round.  
Flying Arky, a gelding owned by Willie and Dee Talley of Athens, Texas, will try to keep his Triple Crown dream alive when he swings back into action on Thursday's program.  
The entire card—consisting of 14 races—is the second of three days devoted to opening-round trials for the \$700,000 (estimated) Rainbow Futurity. The distance is 400 yards. Flying Arky came into national pro-

minence on June 3, when he stepped into the Ruidoso Downs starting gate as an 11-1 outsider in the final of the \$605,384 Kansas Futurity finale.  
The gelding, with Jacky Martin at the controls, zoomed to a nose win in the first leg of the Triple Crown. The victory slice amounted to nearly \$200,000, and that beefed his career income up to a little more than \$243,000.  
The gelding's next objective is the Rainbow Futurity, and the first step in that direction would be a first- or second-place finish in Thursday's trials. The top two finishers from the 42 trials (14 are to be run on Wednesday, another 14 are slated for Thursday, the final 14 on Friday) will advance into the time trials on July 5.

amount of the bad check increases. Martin said the new policy will help the office maintain a staff to handle the problem.  
Specific information on the actual process of initiating a prosecution against a worthless-check writer is available at the sub-office.  
How prevalent is the problem of worthless checks in Ruidoso? For some business owners, the problem is extremely bad, but others report little trouble.  
"We've got to do something to cut down on it," said Phil Creecy, Safety assistant manager.  
Creecy said the grocery store has seen a substantial rise in the number of bad checks received since the first of the year.  
Store checkers have been instructed to increase their strictness in requiring identification in response

to the bad-check increase, he said. Usually the checks written for smaller amounts are returned, Creecy said.  
"We get some pretty good-sized ones that come back, too," he added.  
Scott Schrader, owner of the Western Auto store, agreed that more small checks are bad than large ones. He also said the overwhelming majority of worthless checks his business gets are from local people.  
Schrader said fewer worthless checks are showing up because the store is taking tighter precautions.  
"We're screening them closer than we used to," he said. Schrader added his business gets more worthless checks in slow times than in busy times.  
Ben Franklin Office Manager Felicia Hales said the occurrence of bad check writing at Ben Franklin is slightly higher than it was at this time last year.  
Hales said cashiers at the store are directed to be especially careful when

accepting a check numbered 200 or less.  
"Almost all are from new accounts," she said of the bad checks the store receives. Hales agreed the largest share of bad checks come from local people.  
Mannie's Toggery has experienced an opposite trend in bad check writing than the one at Ben Franklin, according to owner Pat Hale.  
She said the incidence of bad check writing at her store has actually decreased since the same time last summer. Hale said the problem is not a serious one at Mannie's Toggery.  
"We really don't get that many," she said.  
As the number of people in Ruidoso increases as summer progresses, so will the incidence of bad check writing. Merchants in town will have to deal with the problem.  
Hopefully, greater precautions and the help of the District Attorney's office will keep bad checks at tolerable levels.

## Racing wrapup

Annie Dancer, a grey gelding running as a 10-1 outsider, overpowered the stakes filly, Machisma, on the final jump of Saturday's \$35,577 Norgor Thoroughbred Derby at Ruidoso Downs.  
Machisma, a winner of over \$140,000, appeared to have the Norgor in the bag when she turned for home with a comfortable four-length lead.  
The filly had plenty of punch left in her stride and Ruidoso fans probably assumed the six-furlong duel was all but over.  
But Annie Dancer, energetically piloted by Pedro Benitez, rallied out of fourth to reach the second-place spot at the head of the homestretch.  
Even at the midway point of the stretch, Machisma looked like a winner. But the game filly began to tire, just as Annie Dancer smelled victory and began to pile it on.  
Annie Dancer nailed Machisma right on the wire, winning by a half-length and earning \$17,788 for his owner, Bowers Z-B Western Wear of Colorado City, Texas. The gelding is trained by Clifford C. Lambert, Sr.

at Delta Downs in Louisiana. The son of Pocket Coin is trained by Thomas A. Riley.

The win was the first of 1984 for Annie Dancer (from three starts), and made amends for a second-place finish (by five lengths) to Queen Elect in the Norgor trials. Queen Elect raced as an 8-5 favorite in Saturday's showdown, but failed to produce enough early speed, and dropped back from third place to wind up sixth in the 10-head field.  
A sizzling early pace was set by the 5-1 shot, No Defeat, who covered the first two furlongs in 21 4/5 seconds, the half in 45 3/5. That snappy first fraction probably took something out of Machisma's wind, since she stuck with No Defeat in the early going.  
Annie Dancer was clocked in 1:13 4/5 seconds and returned mutual prices of \$23.60, \$6 and \$4.60. Machisma, owned by H.T. Hornbuckle of Albuquerque, collected \$7,826 and refunded tote prices of \$3.60 and \$3 as the 8-5 second favorite. Salustio Burgos was up.  
Native Impression, a 16-1 outsider ridden by Joe Martinez for S. Marchand McDougal of Ruidoso, rallied out of last place to finish third, earning \$4,269. The show payoff was \$5.20.  
High Bounds Dance rallied to take fourth (earning \$2,134). No Defeat ended up fifth for a \$1,423 paycheck.

Rise N High, a gelding who had done most of his running on the west coast, emerged at the star of Thursday's elimination trials for the \$55,230 Rainbow Derby at Ruidoso Downs.  
Rise N High won the fourth race, which was one of 12 Rainbow elimination trials, and clocked the 440 yards in 21.655 seconds.  
That time held up as the fastest of the day, and made Rise N High the one to watch in the July 4 finale of the middle jewel of the Triple Crown for three-year-olds.  
Much of the attention on Thursday's card was taken by Pic-Six wagering, a new betting feature at Ruidoso Downs which is rapidly gaining great favor with the fans. Thursday's Pic-Six wagering started out with a seven-day carryover total of \$58,249, and fans on hand Thursday wagered a staggering \$79,996.  
This time, though, Ruidoso fans had no trouble zeroing in on the Pic-Six. There were 37 six-win tickets and each of these returned \$2,428.20. In the consolation there were 836 tickets with five winners and each of these tickets returned \$37.60 apiece.  
The total amount disbursed in Thursday's Pic-Six was \$121,277.

Rise N High, owned by C.B. Newbegg and G.S. Boskovich, Jr. of Newhall, California, was nominated to the Rainbow trials via a late payment of \$15,000. Steve Treasure is the rider and James Brookfield is the trainer.  
Rise N High went off as an odds-on favorite in his Rainbow trial, broke in fifth place, then poured it on to win by a length. His career earnings now stand at \$231,982.

First place in the Rainbow Derby will be worth a thumping \$206,580.  
The second-fastest time of 21.665 was hung up by another supplemental nominee, Indigo Illusion. The filly, a winner of over \$640,000, raced as a 1-5 shot in the seventh race, won handily by one and one-quarter lengths under Robert Bard and was timed in 21.665 seconds.  
Indigo Illusion is leased by J.E. Jumonville, Jr. of Ventress, Louisiana. Charles W. (Bubba) Cascio is the trainer.

The other Rainbow Derby qualifiers: Racy Roman, 21.720, owned by Morris Stephens of Graham, Texas; Patti Dash, 21.795, owned by Betty Wells of Sulphur, Oklahoma; On A Stormy Day, 21.795, owned by Larr Stephenson of Wichita, Kansas; Moons Lady Levi, 21.805, owned by Clary Spencer of Edmond, Oklahoma; Fols Gold, 21.825, owned by Floyd H. Jones, Jr. of Norman, Oklahoma; Easily A Twelve, 21.830, owned by H. Don Farris and Don E. Keith of Sunland Park.







# Cablevision is television for 5,600 subscribers in county

It's been called a monopoly because it has no competitors.

With a reach stretching across 400 miles of Lincoln County, it touches homes hidden in valleys and protected by the outside. For some, it is a link to the outside.

For most of its subscribers, however, Lincoln County Cablevision is a source of entertainment and information. In a region where receiving television signals is difficult, it provides television-hungry people with 17 courses from which to choose.

"The last four to five years, we've grown at anywhere from 14 to 18 percent a year," said Paul Crown, general manager of Cablevision. "In the cable industry, that's damn good."

In communities with cable, it is common to find half the homes on the cable system. With its multitude of channels, cable offers the possibility of selective programming that reception television can not equal.

"Having 50 percent of the homes on line is not only common, said Crown, but is considered an industry standard, a good average for the majority of cable systems.

If a system can manage to go beyond the average and pull in as many as 75 percent of existing homes, that system is viewed as having an extremely high capacity.

It means existing reception and the makeup of the community have somehow combined to drive people

onto the cable at an unusually rapid pace.

Such are the conditions that have blessed Cablevision, which enjoys an almost-unheard-of 90 to 95 percent capacity.

"If you're on the right side of the hill," explained Crown, "you might get two good channels. If you're on the wrong side of the hill, you might get three poor channels."

In other words, he said, "If you want to watch decent TV, you have to go onto the cable."

Aside from the poor reception in the area, Crown attributes the high number of cable customers to a turnover in the type of people that have moved to Ruidoso.

He called the village "a younger town," a place where young adults are slowly replacing the older set. Young people, he added, are more interested in television variety than are older viewers.

Cablevision, which is owned and operated by Rifkin and Associates of Denver, Colorado, has been watching the village change for 13 years.

Today the system offers its 5600 subscribers 17 channels with several options, including Home Box Office and ESPN, an all-sports network.

The basic cable rate is \$12 a month, with an additional charge for HBO of \$11.50 a month and \$1.50 for ESPN.

New hookup charges run \$30 a shot, while reconnect charges cost \$15 if a cable is in place in the home and \$25 if the home requires wiring.

Outside of Ruidoso, the system services Ruidoso Downs, Alto and

Capitan, and county areas in between those communities.

Crown said he foresees limited growth in the future, although he plans to add one or two channels a year for the next few years.

He said the system can currently handle 24 channels, and he would like to see it filled in the future.

What he doesn't like, he emphasized, is to be considered a monopoly. "The word gets me in an uproar whenever I hear it," he said. "I'm the only cable system in town but anyone else can come in here and get a franchise."

He said people move to Ruidoso from Albuquerque and immediately complain about the system he runs. "They get a little happier because I charge more than Albuquerque."

The difference, he said, is that in Albuquerque, where the system offers 30 channels for \$10 a month, there is competition and a greater density of homes.

Those two factors help hold the basic cable charge down while enabling more channels to be offered with added options.

As it is, he said, Cablevision charges at a rate of 70 cents per channel, only two cents per channel above the national average.

Crown called that a good deal for subscribers, since the industry standard for cost effectiveness is 25 hookups per mile, and his average is only 14 hookups per mile around the county.

One area of weakness in the system

is its lack of commitment to public access. All cable systems with more than 4,000 subscribers are required by the Federal Communications Commission to provide the public access to a cable channel.

The original idea was to provide a balance of views on community issues for everyone interested, regardless of a person's ability to pay for air time to express those views.

Crown admitted that Cablevision does not and will not provide public access. He said his facilities are too small and the type of access the FCC envisioned is too expensive.

In place of access, Crown provides a limited amount of program origination. He uses the access channel, Channel 11, for taped programs provided to him, and for footage he shoots at local events.

On a consistent basis, he carries Ruidoso village council meetings, taped races from Ruidoso Downs Race Track, public service announcements, classifieds and weather reports.

The studio sits atop the A-frame structure that houses offices on Sudderth, with a single camera set-up and a small set.

Crown did say he would "hopefully enlarge local origination" slightly at some point, but noted that when summer ends, everything changes.

"Once the money's gone," said Crown, "it's hell to get sponsors." He said he will probably cover the motorcycle festival in the fall, along with occasional coverage of other local promotions.

## Jim Hine explains budget

The Ruidoso village council recently voted approval of a preliminary budget to be sent to the state Department of Finance and Administration for approval. The figure-packed 20-page document represents probably the most complex budget yet for the village, according to village manager Jim Hine.

In simple terms, the budget is made up of money coming in, as revenue; and money going out, as expenditures. Beyond that, it takes the calculated approach of Hine to explain exactly what goes on as the village earns and spends its way through a fiscal year.

As Hine speaks of the budget, an observer can tell it is one of Hine's favorite topics of conversation. He juggles information about debt service, interest on investments and general obligation bonds as easily as a circus performer juggles tennis balls, but Hine never seems to miss a catch.

The overall budget for the village totals \$12.5 million in revenues, plus unspent monies carried over from last fiscal year of \$6.9 million for the Grindstone Canyon Dam project and \$1.55 million for the Ponderosa Heights sewer project.

That gives a total of \$21 million on the positive side of the village budget. The village expects expenditures of \$21.4 million this coming fiscal year, with the difference being taken up by a healthy beginning cash balance.

The largest single fund in the village budget is the general fund. Bringing money into that fund, Hine explains, are a myriad of revenue sources.

A "biggie" is the total amount of gross receipts taxes returned to the village by the State of New Mexico. The taxes are collected by the state throughout the year from Ruidoso businesspeople, then returned, in part, to local governments.

For Ruidoso, that will mean an income this coming fiscal year of \$945,000 in municipal gross receipts taxes; \$1,254,000 in supplemental gross receipts taxes; and \$1.7 million in regular gross receipts taxes.

Another state-shared income the village gets is the gasoline tax. This tax comes from the one cent charged on each gallon of gas sold in Ruidoso. This coming fiscal year, that total is expected to reach \$104,500.

Two cents collected on each pack of cigarettes sold here will net the village an additional \$34,000. A franchise tax levied by the village on all utility companies for the use of the public rights of way will gain another

\$215,000 for the village.

These and other revenues will result in a total general fund income of \$4,019,923 this coming fiscal year.

Now comes the fun part—spending all that money. According to Hine, money from the general fund will go to pay everything from tort liability insurance to library books.

This coming fiscal year, the village expects to pay \$2.29 million in salaries to the 151 full-time and 13 part-time village employees. Although that may sound like a lot of money, the total only averages out to a salary of \$14,013 per employee.

About \$342,800 of general fund money will be spent on capital outlay projects among the 13 village departments. Those departments will cost the village \$1,135,350 in operating expenses this coming fiscal year, Hine estimates.

The combined expenditures by the village this coming fiscal year, as the general fund, will total \$4,126,241, as calculated by Hine. That total is greater than the revenue total, but the fund begins each fiscal year with a beginning cash balance.

Hine is quick to state that, above all, the village never operates in a state of deficit spending, as regulated by state law.

"We live within our means," Hine said with a smile.



The Ruidoso school board has invited reaction from community residents about whether the open-campus lunch policy should continue at the new high school building.

In the new building, the teens would have to drive down twisting Gavilan Canyon Road, risking accidents or speeding tickets.

Board of education members expressed concern about student safety during their recent meeting.

They said student council members had even suggested the campus should be closed. That opinion is bound to be unpopular among the other students.

Anyone who has gone to the new Ruidoso High School knows the lunch-hour travel concerns have a strong basis.

However, Principal Tom Hansen was taking the right route when he pleaded for an open campus.

He said closing it would restrict the special atmosphere at the high school, turning him into an enforcement officer.

Hansen is right. We trust teenage drivers enough when they are driving to school. We should trust them enough when they are going to lunch.

Even people in pursuit of the perfect pizza are entitled to be considered innocent unless their actions prove them guilty.

## Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

SANTA FE—You can be the smartest ad man in the world and still be a bad politician—as certain New Mexico politicians are learning to their dismay.

It also costs them sharply to pay for that privilege.

Some candidates have developed a great dependence on surveys and image-building—so much so that in Santa Fe, for instance, we have people spending \$20,000 to win a City council post.

Books and movies make some people believe a candidate can be created from anyone not positively repulsive, if he or she will only follow the prescriptions of the Madison Avenue types.

It's not that easy.

For one thing, what works in the broad sweep of a presidential campaign may have little or no application in a local contest where everyone concerned knows everyone else. You may have committed to memory the whole of "The Selling of the Presidency" and know just how Patrick Caddell pulled it off, and still be useless in a local race.

Let's construct an imaginary scenario (based, you may be sure, on a real-life happening right at home).

Let's say a person with a hankering to run is trying to decide which of two state Senate districts he has the better chance of winning. He calls upon a political pollster, relatively recently arrived in New Mexico, to test the waters and advise him which choice to make.

The pollster constructs a survey, one question of which is "Can you name your incumbent state Senator?" When that question elicits lots of "no" answers, he concludes that the incumbent is not well known even in his own district.

"Run here," he tells the client.

Wrong. He should have worded the question like this: "Do you know Fred Gabaldon?" Of course, that is not the Senator's real name.

If he had, the "yes" answers might have convinced him to put his client into any race but this one. That would have spared his man the embarrassment of defeat.

A little knowledge is a dangerous

thing—and about the only way to get beyond the "little knowledge" stage in New Mexico politics is by lots of seasoning.

We do things differently here, including our voting. Because of that, what was learned in Political Science 415 in some college east of the Mississippi may take considerable tailoring before it is locally applicable.

If the mere ability to afford a political consultant were the only thing necessary, wouldn't the rich win all elections?

They don't, in New Mexico or anywhere else.

That's one of the reasons why this columnist, along with a few others, refuses to accept from any candidate or campaign staff a cursory report of standings revealed by a political poll.

Without being given every detail, including a copy of each of the questions asked and all (not just selected) results, it is impossible to interpret the validity of the data which have been gathered.

Some of the bigger newspapers in the state, busy taking down the pollsters' numbers and passing them on to their readers as though they were gospel, do everyone a disservice.

Polls have grown less and less accurate as more and more Americans have learned to keep their own counsel. How many times during this primary season have the pundits on TV remarked on how high the undecided vote was this year.

Most of those folks weren't undecided; they have just learned to avoid being impolite and saying, "None of your business."

That, after all, is the fact. It isn't anybody's business how you are going to vote; and if we'd all get together and tell these professionals at prying to take a flying leap, we'd be doing sensible politics a favor.

We'd also be saving gullible would-be politicians a lot of bucks presently being taken from them by the snakeoil salesmen who say they know the inmost secrets of political campaigning.

Hey, if they're so good, how come they don't run themselves?

## Letters to the editor

### DEAR EDITOR:

To the Voters of District 56:

I would first like to thank you for the opportunity of having served as your representative this term and would like to give special thanks to those who supported me.

During the recent campaign for the primary election I chose not to engage in a negative exchange with my opponent. However, now that the election is over and the decision has been made I would like to comment on some of the statements, suggestions, hints, innuendoes, etc. made through radio and newspaper advertisements as well as in letters mailed to registered Democrat voters.

First, I would mention my voting record. Anyone has the right to disagree or to make judgements concerning the record itself. However, no one has the right to say or even suggest what my reasons were for voting a certain way unless he or she has discussed the situation with me because only I know the "why's." Neither my opponent nor any of her advisers bothered to do that before assigning reasons for my votes. I attempted to study each issue and then vote what appeared to be best according to the input I had received.

Some examples of Toney Anaya bills I supported are the Veterans' center, funding for tourism and economic development, children's code and shelter care, funding for education, air quality control, solar industry development, co-op highway money, and community corrections. The fact that he advocated something does not automatically make the idea bad even though he may not be the most popular governor in the history of our state.

The terms "integrity," "independence," "special interests," "political bureaucrats," "badgered," "need for personal power," "no strings attached," were certainly tossed around in suggestive ways. I would challenge anyone to find fellow workers of mine, including state legislators, who would cite me for not having honesty, integrity, or independence and be able to state circumstances to back up such citations.

I find it interesting that one ad used against me indicates that I was

responsible for teachers not getting a raise in 1983 but in one of the letters and in statements made following the election it is hinted that I was controlled by NEA-NM and that my main concern was to see that teachers' salaries were increased to a high level. I have never advocated that the salaries in "my profession" should be the highest of any profession but I certainly believe there is real danger if they are not at least competitive. I particularly resent the suggestive implication made in the letter that because I belong to NEA I advocate "gun control, a nuclear freeze, and affirmative action for homosexual teachers in OUR schools."

I am a firm believer in the importance of support for education but while in office I have truly made an effort to consider all requests including some specific ones from the oil and gas industry, Navajo refinery, agricultural and soil conservation concerns, and problems relating to economic development and tourism. I don't believe I failed to visit with and listen to anyone who contacted me.

My position on the airport was—and is—that it is too important to become strictly a political issue as some would make it. Without a great deal of fanfare I expressed my concern for former Secretary Wait in Carlsbad in the summer of 1983; spent at least an hour in Secretary Clarke's Washington office in April of 1984 discussing their situation with four individuals in the BLM Division; and have visited personally with Houston McKenzie, chairman of the NMSU Board of Regents.

I have some apprehension about a person who seems to have already made some very major decisions before the details of the needs of the people or the issues have even been introduced, discussed or studied. In two of the letters mailed to voters mention was made of "Christian beliefs," and a "family-oriented Christian." When I analyze this election campaign I wonder if these are ideals some folks talk about rather than live.

I believe the most apropos closing might be a statement sometimes heard around the racetrack—"Good luck with your picks!"

## On the Village Beat with Tim Palmer



The rose bushes outside Eve Ball's door are in full bloom, and the smell of roses fills the air.

"You know I love to take care of them," she said when her guest remarked on the flowers. "I can't do it anymore."

Eve, who celebrated her 94th birthday in March, doesn't get out of the house much these days. But her many friends and fans will be glad to know she is doing fine.

One of the most enjoyable newspaper stories I have ever done was a feature on Eve Ball. The project stretched over many months and many interviews, because she is such a pleasure to visit.

"Nobody needs people more than I do," Eve told me when I dropped by last week. She has said the same thing many times.

Visitors are asked to telephone and let her know they are coming, however.

Some days will find Eve working with her collaborator, Lynda Sanchez, on a third book about the Apaches.

"I would say that we're maybe three-fourths through," she said. I asked her if the book would be finished by the end of summer.

"Well, of course we hope to but I doubt that we can." Then there is the task of finding a publisher.

Eve has been down that road. The awards on display—particularly The Saddleman and The Golden Spur from the Western Writers of America—are evidence of her success as a writer.

But Eve took "In the Days of Victoria," her first book on the Apaches, to 16 publishers before it was accepted. Her research technique—oral history—was held in "utter contempt" by two men with the University of New Mexico Press, she recalled.

She confronted one of them once and asked him, "Don't you think the people that made history may know something about it?"

If something isn't written down, does that mean it didn't happen? That gave those fellows something to think about, even before Eve's books won so many awards.

It is a regret of Eve's that she has yet to have a book published in New Mexico, though, since the state is the setting for her works.

The question of accuracy of oral history was one I had never discussed with Eve, and it was interesting that she brought it up. Someone once privately cast doubts to me on some of the stories Eve got from the Mesquiteros.

She acknowledges the potential for inaccuracies in writing history, but feels it exists both with oral and written sources.

"What is truth, anyway?" she asked. "From my point of view, it's what your contemporaries accept as convincing evidence of an occurrence."

"It's fact, but it's a dead certainty that the next generation will challenge you—and maybe prove you're wrong."

Obviously, Eve feels that "getting it down"—recording history before it is lost forever—is the important thing.

What about the Bible as history, I wondered.

"I think the Bible is good history—up to certain points," she said. She pointed out that geological evidence seems to contradict some of what the Bible says, but that the people of the time it was written took it for fact.

The morals and precepts in the Bible are good, she believes.

That led to something else I had never discussed with Eve Ball. Does she have a personal relationship with God?

"Certainly I do. The fact that I don't attend church doesn't mean I'm irreligious."

She doesn't like evangelical sermons, she said, "because I'm already sold." She sometimes listens to choirs and preachers on TV, and uses the option of switching off the set if the speaker bores her.

Eve told me about a fellow who was dying of cancer and somehow became completely cured. She believes it was a miracle.

"There are things that happen that you can't explain any other way," she said.

As for people who would tear down religion, she went on, "What do they have to give as a substitute if they take away your faith in God?"

On evolution, she made the observation that humans seem to be devolving toward the animal state.

Of course, one of the joys of visiting Eve Ball is hearing her stories of the West as it was. I would be remiss if I did not repeat a tale she told last week.

Seems there was a big dog who liked to cool off by rolling in his owner's flower garden after it was watered. The owner decided the dog needed a thorough beating to cure it of the habit.

In the middle of the beating, the dog ran away to the neighbor's house, with the owner in hot pursuit. The neighbor saw them coming and feared the dog had hydrophobia (rabies).

"Is he mad?" the neighbor yelled.

The owner yelled back as he ran after the dog.

"Well, if he ain't mad, he's the damndest forgivin'est SOB I ever saw."

Eve Ball is a great lady, and I count it a privilege to know her.

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# Building permits top previous totals

The Village of Ruidoso issued 58 building permits for construction projects in May valued at \$5,073,235. A total of 231 building permits valued at \$16,673,692 have been issued this year by the village.

The May valuation total is the highest monthly total this year, some \$1.6 million higher than the total of last month. However, the total number of permits is only up 13, from 45 issued in April.

The village issued 28 permits for new single family dwellings, valued at \$2,858,318, for a yearly total of 127 permits issued, valued at \$10,135,840.

Permits for residential additions or alterations totaled 28, with a value of \$236,699. That figure brings the yearly total to 52 permits issued, valued at \$632,562.

For new commercial buildings, the village issued four permits in May, valued at \$1,483,601. The yearly total for new commercial building permits now stands at 24 issued, valued at \$3,726,258.

Two permits were issued for commercial additions or alterations, valued at \$43,073, bringing the yearly total to 15 issued, valued at \$687,960.


One permit for demolition was issued, valued at \$2,480. Three such permits have been issued this year by the village, valued at \$11,690.

Two permits for new apartment or condominium buildings were issued by the village, valued at \$449,064. The yearly total is nine permits issued, valued at \$1,458,382.

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
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# Talented local boxer trains for national bout

David Ordorica symbolizes what amateur boxing is all about.

The Las Piedras Boxing Team (LPBT) athlete is going for the National Junior Olympics 80-pound senior championship in Saginaw, Michigan, this week.

Standing just 4-10, weighing only 80 pounds and being extremely soft-spoken, the dark-haired Ordorica doesn't strike an imposing figure to the casual observer.

However, what Ordorica lacks in size he more than makes up in spirit and determination, which is what amateur sports are supposed to be about anyway.

"I like the one-on-one battle between the boxers," Ordorica said, "and the fact that boxing helps me stay in shape."

"Probably the best thing about boxing is that I get to travel and see a lot of places, and amateur boxing is also safe."

Ordorica has seen a lot of places in his four-year amateur career with the LPBT.

He won a bronze medal in the National Junior Olympics Tournament last year in Minnesota. Last month, Ordorica captured the National Police Athletic League crown in Niagara Falls, New York.

The Ruidoso High School junior-to-be won the Regional Junior Olympics title in Phoenix, Arizona, last week to earn a shot at the national crown this week.

The manner in which the Ruidoso boxer has won his recent bouts suggests he may be the guy to beat in Saginaw.

Ordorica topped Jimmy Martinez of Colorado in the first round of the Regional Junior Olympics finals. Martinez's coach threw in the towel just 40 seconds into the bout.

In the National Police Athletic League finals, Ordorica stopped his taller opponent in the second round, using a combination of a long straight right, a short right and an uppercut.

Ordorica also won the state Police Athletic League title this season, going unopposed. The LPBT boxer's reputation has grown so much that he has trouble finding opponents in tournaments now. In the state Police Athletic League tournament, Ordorica's LPBT teammate Kevin Jefferson also won a state crown.

Besides the Police Athletic League and Junior Olympics titles, Ordorica has also won several state Silver

Glove and Silver Cup championships.

LPBT coach Lucky Mulqueen has worked with Ordorica for four years. Before then Ordorica boxed briefly under a program started by Bill Streeter.

"I boxed for awhile with Bill Streeter," Ordorica remarked. "Then I joined Lucky's program and Kevin came with me."

David has a variety of punches which he uses, but he has one favorite.

"The straight right," he said. "When the bout starts, I try and go right at the other boxer and throw a lot of punches. You have to score points."

"By then I can see what he's throwing and how to stop it."

What does Mulqueen think is Ordorica's best attribute?

"His attitude," the coach answered quickly. "He's really self-motivated and that's a key. That's something you can't teach in the gym."

The good feelings are mutual on Ordorica's part.

"He's a good coach," Ordorica said. "He knows what he's doing."

Mulqueen himself has a long history of amateur boxing, having competed in high school, college and while in the armed forces.

Ordorica and Jefferson usually work out five days a week. If a big tournament is on the schedule, they'll practice six days. They split their workouts between running and working out in the LPBT gymnasium on Mulqueen's property.

While Ordorica's first love is boxing, he has also done well in other sports. He played junior varsity football in his freshman year at Ruidoso High School, playing against players twice his size. He was also a fine runner in cross country and track last year.

Ordorica lives in Ruidoso Downs with his father Juan; mother Amparo; sisters Patricia, 17; Justa, 21; and Elsa, 23; and younger brother Jamie, nine.

Jamie has expressed an interest in amateur boxing at times and has worked out several times in the LPBT gymnasium.

Ordorica's mother is proud of her son's accomplishments.

She doesn't worry much about David getting hurt in the boxing ring because she thinks it's safe.

David's older brother Miguel, who lives in Ruidoso and operates a

business, has been helping the LPBT boxer in his workouts for about a year.

"He's done a lot," Mulqueen said of Miguel. "He should get some credit."

One possible hangup in Ordorica's amateur boxing future could be a rule that says a boxer must weight 101 pounds by his 16th birthday. David will be 16 in November and must gain 21 pounds by then so he'll be able to continue competing.

If he doesn't gain the 21 pounds, he won't be able to box until he does.

"Yeah, I can gain those pounds," Ordorica said confidently.

Ordorica isn't sure what his sports future will be after amateur boxing, but one thing is sure. He'll put all his effort into anything he tries and will probably succeed.
