



# Rental housing

## Shortage exists, but there is progress

It's a simple law of economics. As demand goes up, the market value increases. According to various community members, available rental housing here is now at a premium.

Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth said the chamber gets frequent inquiries from people seeking help locating rentals.

"Find a roommate, look in the paper, go to Realtors, check with fellow employees. If that fails, you run the ad. Check in the Downs, and mobile homes, and after that... good luck," Jungbluth said in his usual advice to rental seekers.

Apparently, said Frank Tellez, general manager of the Village Inn Pancake House on Highway 70, it is next to impossible for someone earning the minimum wage in Ruidoso to survive.

Tellez cites the high cost of living in Ruidoso as a major employment problem among service-oriented businesses.

"I've had lots of problems getting and keeping good employees since we opened here seven months ago," he said.

"The housing costs are way out of line. There is no middle range in Ruidoso. It's high or low," he added.

According to Jungbluth, at least 75 entry-level, minimum-wage jobs will be created within the next month, because of the planned opening of five new businesses.

"The housing situation is horrible. It stinks. And nobody's doing anything about it, never did," Jungbluth added.

However, developers did recently

break ground in Ruidoso Downs for a \$1,700,000 apartment complex. The 48-unit project is financed through the Farmers Home Administration, and designed for middle-income residents of the area.

Joseph R. Ortega, executive director of Regional Housing Authority, Region 6, said a feasibility study showed an overwhelming demand for moderately priced housing in the area.

Ortega said rents in the complex would range from \$210 per month for a one-bedroom apartment to \$296 for a three-bedroom apartment.

A 70-unit, moderate-income housing project for Ruidoso also has been approved, said developer James Anthony of Albuquerque.

The project is also subsidized by the Farmers Home Administration, Anthony said. It is planned for property behind the Camelot Theater.

"We did a person-to-person feasibility study for this project. We talked to the people on the streets. We've done these projects elsewhere in the state, and Ruidoso needs some affordable housing," Anthony said.

Lou Andes, district loan technician for FmHA, said her office, which subsidizes borrowers' interest, uses an adjustable family income when qualifying prospective tenants. An adjusted family income of \$20,500 is usually the ceiling for moderately priced housing complexes.

Andes said that, although her five-county region granted approval to seven projects this year, prospective owners must meet strict qualifications.

"We have a lot of inquiries into our programs... but we have difficult qualifications," said Andes

Providing adequate rental housing for the Ruidoso working class has been an ongoing issue, said Realtor Fred Heckman.

"A few years ago, we tried to put together a housing project that would offer affordable rents for young people, starting out and the elderly," Heckman said.

"We ran into three major problems: the lack of available R-2 zoned property, the inability to get property rezoned to R-2, and the high cost of construction in Ruidoso," said Heckman.

He also said rental rates in Ruidoso were "considerably higher than average." He said he used the government calculation that 25 percent of a person's average monthly income normally goes for housing expense.

"We found not only does a person living in Ruidoso generally spend more than 25 percent, but what they get for that 25 percent isn't much," Heckman said.

"We haven't increased our stock of affordable housing, and we have increased the need. It was bad then and it's bad now," he added.

John T. Winniford of Lela Easter Real Estate said rentals become scarce during peak seasons.

"We have one-room cabins for \$250 per month, including utilities, plus a cleaning and damage deposit, no pets. That's about the best we could do for cheap seasonal rentals right now," Winniford said.

Although he does not support government-supplemented housing complexes, Winniford said it is necessary for village officials to pass laws conducive to building multi-dwelling projects.

"Until they let us put more units per

acre, it will be this way," he said. Winniford suggested companies who employ large numbers of people should consider buying rental property for the use of the employees.

"That way, they should be able to keep the people longer," he said.

Recent action has taken place within village hall to alleviate the rental housing crunch, said Planning and Zoning (P&Z) chairman Greg Masters.

Citing a proposed new zoning designation, R-4, Masters said members of his commission are seeking alternatives to balance growth and beauty.

The R-4 zoning designation under consideration would allow buildings to occupy half the total square footage of property on which they sit.

The R-4 alternative would allow an increase over the present number of dwellings permitted on a lot zoned R-2. That is the zone for all multi-family housing now. R-4 would maintain the required allotment of 40 percent green space (undeveloped area).

"The reason that there hasn't been any R-4 zoning in the past is the fact that this P&Z commission is the first P&Z commission to identify the problem, and try to solve the high density housing problems," Masters said.

Referring to the past voting record of the village council in matters regarding high density proposals, Masters said community involvement has always been a key factor.

"If you fill up city hall during a meeting, with all the people who would live in a moderate income housing project, it wouldn't be voted down," he predicted.

# Carrizozo High School had a lot of help

When Carrizozo High School was visited last spring by a reviewer from the Department of Education, principal Dennis Sidebottom was scared.

The reviewer "laid us open to the bone," he said. "She spent an exhaustive couple days here going over everything we do."

She met with teachers, parents, support staff and students in a detailed effort to determine if Carrizozo High was really one of the best secondary schools in the nation.

Last week, her conclusion was learned when federal Education Secretary T. H. Bell announced that Carrizozo had emerged from the competition as one of this year's winners in the prestigious "Secondary School Recognition Program."

Along with West Mesa High School and Jefferson Middle School in Albuquerque, Carrizozo made the grade competing against 1,500 other schools that had entered the contest nationwide. Of that number, 555 made it to the second phase of competition, but only 202 made it to the top.

According to Sidebottom, the announcement confirmed what he already knew—that Carrizozo High School has a good education system staffed with excellent teachers serv-

ing students who want to learn.

He said the competition, aside from winning, had been both revealing and interesting. "Even if we didn't win, if we didn't become one of the award winners," he said, "it was a great exercise in self-evaluation."

The schools were rated on what the Education Department calls "attributes of successful schools."

Among them were clear academic goals; high expectations; order and discipline; student rewards and incentives; opportunities for student responsibility and participation; administrative leadership; positive school climate; and community support.

Entries were nominated by school superintendents in every state except Maryland and New Jersey. Only three states—Montana, South Dakota and Tennessee—produced no winners.

Carrizozo school superintendent Jim Miller said he was "pretty excited" about the honor, which will take him, Sidebottom and another person to Washington, D. C., in September to receive the award from President Ronald Reagan.

"We've been working really hard for the last few years to work with kids in specific areas," Miller said, "and that appears to have paid off."

One of those areas, Sidebottom

pointed out, was a new policy designed to ensure that students stay in class. It is a policy that has turned the tide at Carrizozo.

Three years ago, when Sidebottom first arrived, the school was plagued with discipline and attendance problems. Vandalism was common, and the school's national test scores were less than optimal.

Sidebottom proposed, and has since enforced, a tougher attendance and discipline policy that encourages learning above everything else.

"We don't put up with much foolishness," he said. "We feel good attendance is a key to student success."

As a result, he said, the attendance record has improved "dramatically." Students are in school 20 percent more often than they were three years ago.

And with the help of staff improvements and curriculum revisions, scores on the California Test of Basic Skills, a standard measure of learning, similarly have improved.

Currently, Sidebottom noted, the school is witnessing "an unusually high percentage of kids going on to college and vocational-technical schools."

He said 48 percent of the graduates pursue higher education, a significant number considering the rural nature

of the Carrizozo school district.

One of the contributing factors has been an abundance of scholarships, another unusual situation for a small district. This year's seniors were able to choose from 46 scholarships totaling more than \$8,000.

Of those 46, Sidebottom said, 37 came from the surrounding community. Small businesses, clubs, the Chamber of Commerce, even individuals contributed to the scholarship program.

Through such scholarships and other support, he said, the community has demonstrated to the students "that they recognize and appreciate" the efforts the students are making to improve themselves.

"We've got an outstanding school board and teaching staff," Sidebottom said. "But without the community involvement and support, I don't think we would have been able to win this award."

He called community backing "that little extra, the thing that tips the scale in your favor."

Sidebottom said the award is likely to pump up school pride and the students' pride in themselves. He said it also will help the school recruit quality teachers, an added plus for a rural school district.

But equally important, he said, the award shows supporters "that their

effort was valuable, that they produced something."

That support is a necessary ingredient to bettering education, he said. Without it, the system doesn't work as well.

"People who want to improve their schools have to get the community involved, and they have to get real positive support from the community," Sidebottom concluded. "Just about anything's possible if the community gets behind its schools."

# Bank robbed, suspect held

The Bank of Ruidoso's Upper Canyon branch was robbed at gunpoint Wednesday morning, but quick action by the Ruidoso Police Department resulted in the arrest four minutes later of a suspect in the robbery.

According to police reports, Mark Wilson, 28, of Ruidoso, was arrested at 10:27 a.m. after the 10:23 robbery of the bank. Police said Wilson was apprehended in possession of a firearm and currency. Some \$500 was taken in the robbery, according to bank officials.

Wilson currently is being held under a \$25,000 bond pending arraignment and coordination with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the U.S. Attorney's office.

Suspects in another armed robbery which occurred Sunday afternoon in the parking lot of the Gabriela restaurant, have been charged in that incident. Jo Ann King, 31, of Roswell, and James Masci, 22, of Gallup, each have been charged with armed robbery, conspiracy to commit an armed robbery, breaking and entering, possession of a controlled substance and possession of a stolen weapon. Bond has been set at \$10,000 for each of the suspects.

# Gary Mitchell on Racing Commission

Ruidoso attorney Gary C. Mitchell Wednesday was named to the State Racing Commission by Governor Toney Anaya.

Democrat Mitchell, 33, takes the place of former chairman Willard Krueger, who died in June. The unexpired term runs till January 1, 1987.

"It was an interest on my part that I've had for a long time," said Mitchell Thursday. He said several persons from this area had sought to have a Lincoln County representative on the commission, because of the importance of horse racing to the county economy.

As an owner and breeder of race horses, and as an attorney who had represented clients before the Racing Commission, Mitchell filled the bill.

"It's quite an honor," said Mitchell. "I'm really pleased. I really appreciate what the governor did."

Mitchell said he understood his first meeting as a commissioner would be Thursday, June 28, in Ruidoso.

# Pinetree parking on to council

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) wrestled with interpretation of legal terms during their regular meeting Monday.

Discussion involving the number of parking spaces now provided by Pinetree Square developer Denny Lovrin included the legality of designated "compact cars only" areas. Also questioned was legal parking space measurement.

According to Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis, a designated parking space must be 180 square feet. Either 9 feet by 20 feet or 10 feet by 18 feet would meet the requirements.

Pinetree Square, according to P&Z, needs to provide a total of 91 parking spaces. Presently the shopping center has a total of 67 parking spaces. However, 13 are designated for small cars only.

Janet and Jimmy Goodwin, owners of Schlotzsky's Sandwich Shop in the shopping center, said the present parking situation was "not good."

"We're quite a bit short for having adequate parking. With the way the lines are painted now, the straight-in parking is causing a problem also ... the way, people

coming in another ... people trying to pull in and out," said Janet Goodwin.

Lovrin questioned the interpretation of the legal measurements of a parking space.

"There is one thing I'd like to ask. How do you measure stripes? From inside to inside of a line, or from the center of the line?" Lovrin asked the commission.

"I've noticed there are a lot of parking lots in town that aren't even paved. They're gravel. And the stripes at the Safeway (parking lot) are pretty thin," Lovrin added.

"I guess it depends on if you're the stripes, or the griper," said P&Z chairman Greg Masters.

P&Z voted to present to the village council all action that has taken place in regard to the parking situation in the shopping area. Masters recommended the motion, saying it was time to send the matter on to policy makers.

Tip sheets signs were also brought up for discussion. Masters stated that the manner of displaying where tip sheets are sold is not presently complying with village sign ordinances.

"There is a place for signs and we do have control over them," Masters said. "The rest of the city has been very cooperative."

The commission members voted to

direct Davis to send letters to those businesses failing to comply with the village sign ordinance.

In other business, the commission

heard from Ted Bennett regarding zoning on lots 3 and 4, Block 1, Hamilton Terrace subdivision. Bennett asked for an administrative review, recommending the lots be reconsidered for C-1 rezoning from their present R-2 zoning. The lots were part of an earlier administrative review, but were not rezoned at the request of a nearby property owner. The commission members voted to reconsider the lots in another administrative review.

Declined to vacate an alleyway on Lot 3B, Block 6, Wingfield subdivision, for John Taylor. It was pointed out to the commission by John Tanner, adjacent owner, that such a clearance would remove his present right of way.

Voted to replat three townhome lots into two lots. Lots 28, 29 and 30 of Deer Park Woods Townhomes, Unit 4, for Lakeside Corporation, were the lots affected.

Approved the vacation of right of way adjacent to Lot 10, Block 5, Lockout subdivision, for William Grössbeck.

# Lion Fugate new district governor

Ruidoso Noon Lions Club member Bill Fugate will take over the reins as District 40M Governor on July 1. Fugate is the first of the Ruidoso Noon Lions to climb the ranks of Lions Club leadership to become district governor.

As governor, Fugate will oversee the activities of nearly 900 Lions Club members throughout the District 40M area, of which over 100 make up the Ruidoso Noon Lions and Evening Lions clubs. District 40M covers a large chunk of New Mexico, including everything in the state south of a line from just north of Ruidoso west to the Arizona state line.

The area has a total of 27 Lions clubs and nine Lioness clubs. Fugate said he would be traveling to all the clubs during his one-year term of office, a round trip of some 7,000 miles.

According to the governor-elect, several Lions Club activities will be stressed during his term of office. Fugate said the Lions eye bank project will be primary. The project sponsors eye replacement surgery, of which 22 have been performed so far this year.

Fugate said he has named two Ruidoso Lions Club members to the board of directors of the New Mexico Eye Bank in Albuquerque. Appointed to three-year terms were Lions Club members Bill Morrison and Bill Allen.

According to Fugate, the Lions Club also works on providing needy children with eyeglasses.

Another Lions Club project that will be stressed will be the diabetes program. Fugate said Lions Clubs in all areas will be sponsoring clinics for diagnosing diabetes. Fugate said any adult over the age of 45 should be checked for the disease. He pointed out that diabetes is a leading cause of blindness.

"We'd like to get more people aware of what diabetes can do to the eyes," he said.

Fugate said he would push

membership as one of his top goals while in office as governor. He said he would like to reach a membership of 1,000 members in District 40M during his term.

Part of taking over as governor includes attendance at the district governors school in San Francisco. Fugate will attend school June 30 to July 3, then will attend the following

International Lions Club Convention July 4-7. Fugate estimated over 650 district governors will attend the school.

Fugate said the position of governor has been long in coming for him.

"It's been a long, hard roll. I've enjoyed it and look forward to this year," he said.

# Ruidoso Downs results

Miss Mitedo, the filly who won the \$192,547 West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park, breezed through her Rainbow Futurity trial during Wednesday's program at Ruidoso Downs.

The program consisted of 14 races, each a 400-yard trial spin for the upcoming \$750,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity.

The trials continue with similar 14-race cards on Thursday and Friday, and the top two finishers from each of the 42 races during the three-day period will advance into the Rainbow time trials on July 5.

Wednesday's program was also sparked by another build-up in the Pic-Six pool. For the fourth-straight day, there was no six-win ticket, so the carryover total for Thursday's Pic-Six wagering is \$29,223.68.

Miss Mitedo, owned by J.W. Ham of Odessa, Texas, made her Rainbow bid as an odds-on favorite in the third race. She broke smartly, took a half-length lead and was under no pressure throughout the rest of the journey while winning by 11 lengths. Larry Byers was up. The win was the filly's fifth straight against no defeats. She returned mutual payoffs of \$2.80, \$2.20, \$2.10. Larry Keiter does the training.

Another heads-up winner was The Wretched One, a filly who went into the 11th race with winnings of almost \$25,000. The daughter of Moon Lark won by 11 lengths and returned \$4.80, \$2.80 and \$2.20. Steve Harris was up, substituting for Jacky Martin who wasn't feeling up to par and was excused from all his his mounts during the day.

Streak Laico Bird, who operated as a 1-2 favorite in the first race, won by a half-length and logged his third straight victory.

Wednesday's Pic-Six consolation wagering produced two tickets with five winners. Each handed out \$3,495.60.

Softball players may have to travel a little farther, but at least the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Department now has a potential site for location of the White Mountain

Sports Complex. The Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association (ECICWSA) voted Wednesday to grant a lease to the department for use of 22 acres near Eagle Creek Ski Area.

The 12-year renewable lease proposed by ECICWSA would provide a site for the softball and soccer fields planned in the sports complex project. The department earlier had been

# Summer Fest to new site?

An amphitheater to house the Ruidoso Summer Festival was discussed at the Wednesday meeting of the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association (ECICWSA).

Jackie Spencer, of the Summer Festival Board of Directors, asked if approximately 50 acres of ECICWSA land could be leased to the board to be used as a building site for the proposed amphitheater.

Spencer said the festival has outgrown the facilities used this year at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. She proposed a piece of ECICWSA land directly across from Eagle Creek Ski Area for the amphitheater.

"We think it would be a lovely site for an amphitheater," Spencer said. She said the amphitheater would be similar to the building housing the opera in Santa Fe.

ECICWSA member Jim Hine asked whether the festival board would object to other activities being held at the proposed amphitheater, such as Easter sunrise services.

"As long as they were careful with it," Spencer replied. Spencer said she would be against any "hard rock concerts" at the amphitheater.

The association voted to grant a lease to the festival board, subject to several conditions.

Also during the meeting, the ECICWSA members voted to lease a 22-acre parcel of land to the Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Department for construction of the White Mountain Sports Complex. (See related story.)

The land would be used instead of Ruidoso schools land that was originally proposed for the complex. That site was ruled out when the schools reported that they could grant only a three-year lease on the land. ECICWSA agreed to a 12-year lease for their property, with a 12-year renewal option.

Approved a resolution to set the regular meeting dates of the association at 6:30 p.m. the second Thursday of every other month, beginning in August. The August meeting will be the annual meeting for the association, and will be at Cree Meadows Country Club.

Approved payment of a bill for computer services from Anderson and Denton in the amount of \$2,606.25.

Instructed Hine to draw up a preliminary job description for possible hiring of a manager for the association.

Voted that the association join the New Mexico Rural Water Users Association.

Voted to retain Fox and Company to do the annual audit.

the state level, final approval depends on the U.S. Department of Interior. So far, \$20,000 in federal funding of the \$80,000 project is anticipated by the Parks and Recreation department.

Kreuch said a change of sites for the proposed complex would necessitate beginning the funding review process anew, but would not hurt the Parks and Recreation Department's chances for the funds.

"We can work with Ruidoso on an alternative site," Kreuch said. "We run into these types of problems on a regular basis. I feel confident it can be worked out."

Parks and Recreation director Pam Graves said the new site would not be as convenient as the schools site. The Parks and Recreation Commission is scheduled to meet today (Thursday) to discuss all the alternative sites for the complex.

The proposed recreational sports complex for the Village of Ruidoso isn't dead yet, but progress toward its being started has certainly slowed down.

Recently, the New Mexico Natural Resources Department refused to pass on to the Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund an application to use \$20,000 in federal funds to help build the sports complex near White Mountain Middle School with a three-year lease.

According to Ruidoso Parks and Recreation director Pam Graves, the state felt that the federal government wouldn't approve the limited lease.

The federal government wanted a 10-year lease for the recreation department to use the funds. Thus, the department can't build the sports complex at the middle school with the federal funds.

The Ruidoso School District didn't want to commit itself to a 10-year lease. There is the possibility that an elementary school will be built on the property within five to 10 years. The school district owns the property.

Now the department must look at other sites to build the complex with the federal funds.

Fortunately, besides the \$20,000 in federal funds, \$10,000 is still available from the state.

Graves is having a meeting with the recreation department's commission today to discuss other alternatives.

"I don't want to discuss the alternatives until I talk about them with the commission," she commented. "I'm optimistic. We've still got some money."

Some people felt the complex would be finished by the end of this year. Now that's just a pipe dream.

The first phase of the project includes three softball fields and a baseball field. The second phase has

two soccer fields, and eventually, the middle school football field will be overhauled.

So the project is still alive. It's just that it will probably be completed later than most people thought it would.

But the sooner it's completed the better. A modern sports complex is badly needed in this area.

A lot of people want to have major softball and baseball tournaments in this area. The present facilities are barely adequate to have big tournaments here.

More seating capacity is needed along with more modern fields. The proposed complex would be a start in the right direction.

The Ruidoso High School boys varsity basketball team will have to play without standout Dan Ullmann next season.

Ullmann and his family are moving to Alamogordo. In fact, Dan will join the AAAA-division Alamogordo Tigers basketball team at the University of Texas at El Paso summer camp next week.

The 6-6 Ullmann, who will be a junior in the fall, averaged over 19 points a game last winter and was among the state's leading scorers. He was also an excellent rebounder and had a lot of agility for a big man.

Ullmann's younger brothers Dennis and Doug are also fine basketball players and will be missed.

# Pioneer portrays contemporary cowboys

Gordon Snidow calls himself a pioneer. He's a present-day pioneer in art, not a pioneer who worked with cattle a century ago. Snidow paints and sculpts the cows and cowboys of today.

The Ruidoso artist says he is proud to call himself the first in his generation to portray contemporary cowboys, and proud to have popularized Western art.

"There wasn't anything established when I started," he says. "There wasn't any trail to follow. We plowed the ground. We've been the pioneers."

During his career, Gordon Snidow's paintings and sculpture have been displayed in museums, galleries, work areas and homes from Montana to France.

Like Barbara Mandrell, who sings "I was country when country wasn't cool," Snidow was painting contemporary cowboys when painting contemporary cowboys wasn't cool.

He even dresses like one, in a berry-colored Western shirt and blue jeans that have been worn and washed and worn until the seams show white.

Two things he wears set him apart from ordinary Western working men.

One is a top-quality bandana around his neck, rather than a cotton one. The other is an official brass and silver buckle from the Cowboy Artists of America.

With 25 members and five emeritus members, the CA includes an elite double-fistful of artists who work in paint and other media. Most of them, naturally, live west of the Mississippi River.

The group formed in Arizona in 1965, and Snidow was one of the earliest members. He has held every CA office and has been president twice, more times than anyone else. He expects to be president again during 1984-1985.

He is also proud to have won two of five gold

medals at one of their shows. He has won scores of awards, including best-of-show awards in 1977, 1978 and 1982.

"I've been fortunate," Snidow says. The CA is important enough to him that, even when he wears a dark suit for a symphony concert, he adds a CA tie tack.

At the two major cowboy artist gatherings each year—the CA Show in Phoenix, Arizona, and the Western Heritage Show in Houston, Texas—Snidow rubs elbows with such formal folks.

He hasn't always moved in high society circles. "Dad was a home decorator, a house painter, and his dad was a house painter. I can paint houses," he said.

The first house he lived in was in Paris, Missouri, the same country that produced Mark Twain. Snidow says he had a childhood like the author's character, Huck Finn.

"I played in Mark Twain's birthplace. What is now a public park was my private playground," he says. His mother's family owned farms in the area.

After a few years, the Snidows moved west, to Tulsa, Oklahoma. Then they lived in Sherman, Texas, and Enid, Oklahoma, before returning to Tulsa. That's where he graduated from high school.

By then, he knew he wanted to be an artist. In fact, he says, he staged his first art show while he was a youngster. When he was in the second grade, he hung works in the gym for the Parent-Teacher Association.

One strong influence from his Tulsa years was the Thomas Gilcrease Institute of American History. It houses an extensive collection of quality Western art.

He was lucky enough to decide early in his life what career he wanted, he says.

"I thought I'd like to be the successor to Russell and Remington. I see them as talented men."

Frederic Remington and Charles M. Russell were painters of the American West decades ago. They made a statement about

their times, Snidow feels. Snidow seeks to make a statement about his times, too, by painting modern men of the West, rather than portraying cowboys of the past.

Other people whose work he has studied include great illustrators, such as Norman Rockwell.

Snidow is no urban cowboy who spends all his days indoors, looking at other people's work. At the age of 17, he was a horse wrangler in Colorado. He has driven hay wagons and now owns a variety of pickup trucks.

His subjects are contemporaries, real people he knows. "I go and live with them and try to tell their story." He calls his art the continuing saga of the cowboy.

Despite mechanization, he thinks that saga will be told in the future. "As long as you have cow-calf operations, the most economical way is on grass, and then you'll have cowboys," Snidow says.

He can patiently explain the differences between cowboys, ranchers, cattlemen and cattle buyers to city people.

Cowboys, he says, are characteristically proud men who won't sell their souls. He learned to know some of them in what he calls Will Rogers country.

Although residents of Ruidoso might associate paintings of cowboys under strong

yellow light with Gordon Snidow, that sells his diverse work short.

"As an artist, I have an interest in all media." He estimates he does about 10 percent of his paintings in oil, 85 percent of his works in gouache, and the rest as drawings.

"That doesn't count the sculpture," he adds. Sculpture can frustrate him, because of the multiple steps and delays in casting, making molds, and shipping needed to produce bronzes.

His son Steve, who just graduated from Ruidoso High School, is an adept sculptor.

One of the younger Snidow's works is given a prominent space in the Ruidoso Travel Agency. Sue Snidow proudly displays her son's piece at her three-year-old business.

Gordon Snidow says he deliberately did not encourage Steve to concentrate on art.

"I don't believe in forcing a father's choice on children," he says. Of course, he offers them any encouragement he can.

The Snidows' three children are Christie, Laurie and Steve. Christie is a computer programmer in New York. During the recent school year, Laurie did post-graduate studies in photography in Colorado.

They are a reason the family moved to Ruidoso, when they could have lived in any number of areas. Gordon and Sue Snidow thought the school system was a good one. They have lived in New Mexico for 25 years.

He enjoys the beautiful country. "You've got the best of everything."

The amount of heat produces wonderful summers, he says, and in winters, Ruidoso gets enough snow to make it interesting.

"I like this country. It's just the right spot for me."

If you ramble around his studio on the family's One Gray Fox Ranch near Alto, you continuously notice things which belonged to relatives.

The spacious work area is lined with rusted license plates and modern lights. Work-darkened chaps used by cowboys Gordon has painted hang on one wall.

He walks to an opposite corner and carefully unwraps a gleaming rifle he has never used. Snidow won it and the grand national quail hunt last year. He also participated in the one-shot antelope hunt.

Like many hunters, he studies habitat and is interested in preserving his quarry.

More family memorabilia are tucked in odd corners. If you ask him about his distinctive signature, he may tell tales of his forefather in the American Revolution.

Anyone who recognizes a Snidow painting will notice "G Snidow" in the corner. He learned design at the prestigious Art Center College of Design in California, and likes the way that signature looks.

He is also proud to give prominent display to his surname, which comes from French-German Huguenots.

"When Christian Snidow came to this country in 1720, he made his mark," he said. Christian left his name to Christiansburg, Virginia.

Snidows left their names, spelled phonetically, across generations as they crossed the country.

Gordon Snidow is leaving his name on this generation of artists, in the American West.

Hurrying to get to church can get you into big trouble. Believe me, I know.

Another thing I often do is put on my seatbelt. I'm glad I didn't do it that time. After the roll, the top of the cab over the driver's seat and the top of the seat were only a few hand-breaths apart.

I didn't take in all of this at the time, of course. I didn't feel badly hurt, so I muttered some sort of eloquent prayer like "Thank you, God."

Then I tried to open the passenger door. It wouldn't budge, so I climbed out the back and jumped off the bed.

Slowly, I walked to the road. It doesn't get much traffic, but I was lucky and immediately waved down three cars.

I asked them which way they were heading, because I'd become disoriented. They looked at me kind of funny, because I looked normal, as if I should know where I was going.

It was Father's Day, and they said they were heading for Nogal Canyon for a picnic.

I told them I'd rolled my truck and they drove me to a nearby house so I could phone for help. I didn't get their names, so I can't thank them in person, but the man driving the blue car was named Clifford.

We got to Dave Cox's ranch just as he was leaving, so he turned around and called the sheriff.

I called my housemate, P. J. Sharpe, and asked her to bring some clothes, because by then I realized the blouse and slip I was wearing were slashed.

I might not have noticed it, but my

stomach underneath those clothes was slashed, too. It stung. I must have landed there on the back window frame.

It's funny, the things you think in emergencies. I remember being glad my shirt was ripped, and not my expensive suit.

Dave drove me back to the truck and I changed into the clothes P. J. brought. Guy Brown from the sheriff's office came over the hill then, bubble lights flashing.

He and a man who acted like a paramedic didn't stay long, but did take some information. Since I seemed to get to good shape and didn't want to go to a hospital, the partner advised me to see Nancy Guck.

P. J. had gone back home for something or other, and when she returned, Nancy was following her. P. J. had called her. Folks in Carrizozo, Capitán and Nogal think the world of Nancy, for good reason.

She took my blood pressure, felt some tender spots and asked some questions. She obviously knows what she's doing, and told me. A lot of experts don't do that.

Pam was returning to Albuquerque anyway. She teaches in Capitán during the school year and studies for her doctoral degree at the University of New Mexico during the summer. I'm impressed.

She put Chelle on a plane for Denver, Colorado. One of my brothers is in Boulder, and Chelle will stay with him instead of me.

I was disappointed, because I had been looking forward to showing her New Mexico. This is her first trip west of St. Louis, Missouri, and she wanted to see the cactus.

Now she's seen a somewhat wilder West than either of us expected.

Now I'm moving kind of slowly, and won't be heading out for many photos or interviews outside the office until my body and my truck's body are back in shape.

## ET has workshop

The Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission met in a workshop session Wednesday afternoon and prepared themselves for a public hearing slated for today.

According to commission chairman Milt Alcorn, the hearing will concern the zoning proposals for the north section of the extraterritorial zone along Highway 37, and about half of the west section.

The remainder of the west section will be taken up separately at a workshop meeting and public hearing next month.

At yesterday's meeting, the commission reviewed correspondence and telephone messages from area property owners, recommending zoning fairly consistent with the requests received.

One area of variance came in regard to a western tract owned by Earl Traylor, requested to be zoned commercial (C-1) for the north 360 feet, one lot depth, with the rest to remain residential (R-1).

Commission member Ray Bishop noted that the property, which is adjacent to the Eagle Creek Ski Resort, is not totally accessible from all directions and is not suited to commercial development at present.

The commissioners agreed and recommended that the lot be zoned entirely residential, leaving open the option of Traylor appearing before the commission at a future date to request a different zoning designation.

An extensive amount of time was devoted to discussing an area of the Sierra Blanca subdivision, and the need to amend the extraterritorial ordinance to include within zones C-1 and C-P "anything of a more restrictive nature."

The commissioners examined lots 53, 54 and 55 in Block 1 of the Sierra Blanca subdivision, Unit 2, and lots 1 through 8 in Block 2.

In compliance with the restrictive covenants written into the subdivision, the commissioners recommended zoning those areas as R-3, with the rest of the subdivision being continued as R-1.

The discussion concerning the ordinance amendment governing a C-1 and C-P designation arose from the

commissioners' concern that a commercially zoned area would not permit other, more restrictive uses, such as residential use.

Alcorn later said that the commission has been considering the dilemma for some time, and may turn to a resolution instead of an amendment to the ordinance to speed enactment of the change.

The public hearing is scheduled for 2 p.m. today at village hall in Ruidoso.

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

## Busy summer at Sierra Blanca ski area

It's spruce-up time at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, as crews take advantage of decent summer weather to improve and maintain what exists on the mountain—and to add a few things that don't.

According to general manager Roy Parker, workers have been kept busy creating a new expert trail, expanding another, putting in a novice lift, repairing snow fences, replacing the

floor in the restaurant and generally preparing for the upcoming season.

Parker said that much of the work will be done during the rainy season next month, when cut trees that could not be removed by log haulers will be burned.

The new expert trail will be next to the Caliente run, an expert trail that drops off from near the top of the Lincoln double chairlift. The new trail will incorporate part of Lower Peebles run, between Caliente and Chute.

Rover, another expert trail, will be expanded to a total width of 120 feet and made into a full run. The trail runs parallel to Geronimo and crosses the Sierra Blanca trail into Moonshine Gulch.

Chair number 7 will be the new novice triple chairlift, being built at a cost of \$450,000. Parker said the lift will serve up to 2,000 skiers an hour, raising the resort's entire chairlift capacity from 9,400 people per hour to 11,400.

In addition, double chairlift number

1, for intermediate and expert skiers, is being converted to electricity, doing away with the old diesel power source.

Snow fences that were destroyed by high winds last April also are being repaired. Parker said 100 mile per hour winds shot across Apache Bowl, ripping holes in some of the fences and flattening others.

He said he expected all repairs, additions and maintenance to be completed well before the new season gets under way.

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# W.I.C. focus infant nutrition

When Barbara Baudo is at work, she sees about 50 mothers a month from Lincoln County and Mescalero. She wants to see 300.

"I'm the Lincoln County W.I.C. nutritionist," she explained. W.I.C. stands for Women, Infants and Children, a national program that started about a decade ago.

It provides nutrition education and nutritious foods to pregnant women, mothers who are breast feeding, and the parents of infants and young children.

"We take kids up to the fifth birthday," she said. "They're mostly small."

Baudo said more than once, "It's not a welfare program." She urges people with income at any level to participate in the free classes.

"This isn't a give-away program. It's an education program." She includes slide presentations and various other material.

W.I.C. does provide some food. People qualify if they have incomes below limits similar to those for school lunch programs, Baudo said. For instance, a family of three must have an annual income of less than \$15,207. A family of four must make no more than \$18,315.

A family unit can include a father, a mother, and children. If a young mother is living with her parents, only the mother's income counts for eligibility for the program.

Any couple that has just had a baby is probably a one-income family, she also noted.

People who receive the food help get supplement checks which they can redeem at Safeway Stores in Ruidoso. The checks can total about \$60 per month to be spent for milk, cereals, cheese and other foods.

Baudo is brimming with ideas. She would like to organize a breast-feeding group. Another project would be monthly education meetings for small groups of people.

She sees each of her 50 clients every month. She maintains a growth chart for each child and talks about nutritional risk factors with mothers of premature babies.

Most of her clients are women, but

some of them are fathers. "I get some dads that come. I'm tickled to death. I have one case where the mother stays home with the kids and the dad comes."

She also sees grandmothers who are taking care of youngsters, and mothers who come into the office with their children.

For all of them, she has general and tailored information sheets, including a food-buying guide and "Fathers Ask: Questions About Breastfeeding."

"These young families are really conscious now as far as having healthy babies," she said approvingly. Baudo has a degree in home economics education.

Young parents she sees are also concerned about the mothers' health,

she said. Some families deeply need the educational and food help. One of her families must buy special formula that costs \$13 per can.

Another mother of three said they had changed all of their eating habits since learning things at W.I.C., Baudo said.

Although doctors and nurses tell her about some clients, Baudo said, "most of my clients come in as referrals from other clients."

W.I.C. is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Wednesday through Friday in Ruidoso. Baudo also travels to Carrizozo twice a month.

Area residents interested in the instructions or food assistance may call the Ruidoso Health Office at 258-3252. "The receptionist doesn't quiz people over the phone," Baudo said.

She prefers to meet people face to face. "They can relate to me because I'm a woman and have kids."

She summed up her philosophy when she said, "If we have healthy, happy moms and dads, we'll have healthy, happy kids."

The W.I.C. office is in the county sub-station behind the Ruidoso village hall. The Ruidoso Field Health Office is on Kansas City Road off Cree Meadows between Highway 37 and Hull Road.


"A lot of people are not aware of the health office location," Baudo said. "We're trying to promote the whole health office."

The office offers services including immunizations, family planning, adult health, hypertension screening, tuberculosis services, venereal disease services, children's medical services and a cancer screening clinic.

For instance, office workers plan a free slide show about infant car seats connected with the loaner program at 10 a.m. Tuesday, June 26.

For information, call Cathy Johnson at the health office.


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
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

# Seward Junction takes aim at Norgor Futurity

If you had to name an early-season kingpin among two-year-old thoroughbreds at Ruidoso Downs, that honor would probably go to Seward Junction.

The colt impressed Ruidoso watchers last week when he stormed out of the number nine post in the four-furlong trials for the Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity and raced to a neck victory.

On Sunday, he gets a chance to tighten the vise on his two-year-old competition when he runs as the likely favorite in the Norgor finale. The winner collects a hefty \$62,180 out of the gross purse of \$124,360.

Seward Junction, a son of former Southwest stakes star Pocket Coin, first came into prominence a year ago when he was purchased for \$28,000 in the Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings.

That \$28,000 price (handed over by the J.A. Leonard Cattle Company of Leander, Texas) now shapes up as a tremendous bargain. Seward Junction's career record now stands at three wins from three starts. His money line is a bulging \$93,950.

Earlier this year, the colt made his racing debut at Delta Downs in a trial spin for the four-furlong Jean Lafitte Futurity. He breezed to a four-length win, then was back in action in a division of the Jean Lafitte finale and coasted in with a two-length cushion as a 2-1 shot. That victory plunked over \$91,000 in his account.

Last week's Norgor Futurity trials at Ruidoso consisted of five races, and the first- and second-place finishers from each race made the finale.

Seward Junction won his Norgor trial test in 47 seconds flat.

The four other trial winners were Bird Picker, a filly who won by a nose at nearly 8-1 in the betting and was clocked in 48 flat; Babys Avenger, a coasting two-and-one-half-length winner in 47 3/5 (as a 6-5 favorite); Sherry's Ace, who got in by one and one-half lengths in 48 1/5 at better than 9-1; and Black Jack Mack, a one-and-one-quarter-length winner (at 5-2) in 46 3/5.

Two other members of the field—Sherry's Ace and Challenge My Ego—also passed under the Summer Sale gavel. Sherry's Ace, owned by Gail Odum of Santa Teresa, New Mexico, was picked up for a slim \$1,100. Challenge My Ego was taken for \$27,000 by Don Pelton and H.L. Todd of Burlington, California.

Sherry's Ace apparently found his sea legs in the Norgor trials, winning his first race. Previously, his four

outs produced a 0-1-0 record.

The Norgor contenders who qualified by getting in second: Blue Eyed Mary, Light My Native, Jane's Pocket, Challenge My Ego and Untamed Melody.

Seward Junction, Bird Picker and Babys Avenger each appear to be vindicating the judgment of their owners. Each was nominated to the trials via a late-penalty payment of \$2,500.

Babys Avenger, a filly owned by W.P. Bishop of Seguin, Texas, made her racing debut in the Norgor trials, was pegged as the people's choice, and came through with the largest victory margin of the trial races.

Challenge My Ego was the longest-priced horse to make the finale. He ran second to Black Jack Mack at 30-1. The second-biggest outsider was Light My Native at just over 19-1. The

colt is owned by Sam Henderson of Odessa, Texas.

Blue Eyed Mary holds the distinction of having qualified for the finale of the prestigious Riley Allison Thoroughbred Futurity at Sunland Park. The gross purse for that one was over \$338,000.

Blue Eyed Mary goes into Sunday's showdown with a record of 1-2-0 from four starts, good for winnings of \$7,256.

Carlos Rivas, one of the leading thoroughbred jockeys in this part of the country, is the rider of Seward Junction. Larry Byers rides Babys Avenger.

The Ruidoso Downs mutual equipment was really humming over the weekend as the tally for the four-day stretch hit \$1,943,190. That's a thumping gain of 9.43 percent over the \$1,584,372 recorded on the same four-day weekend a year ago. The big surge over the weekend swelled the seasonal daily average to \$420,553, as com-

pared to the \$414,450 at this time last summer. Current wagering-per-race is \$34,756, up 2.89 percent.

Attendance is also soaring, with a daily average turnstile count of 3,867. That's a gain of 9.05 percent over the 3,546 average at this point a year ago.

## Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

Seward Junction, a \$26,000 purchase in the 1983 Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings, made an impressive Ruidoso racing debut on Friday. The colt scored a hard-running neck win in his four-furlong trial for the \$124,360 Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity. (The finale comes up on June 24.) He has now won three straight against no defeats, and his bankroll is up to a thumping \$93,950. He is the likely Norgor favorite.

Seward Junction was clocked in 47 seconds flat. The four other trial winners and their times: Bird Picker (\$17.80), 48 flat; Babys Avenger (\$4.60), 47 3/5; Sherry's Ace (\$20.60), 48 1/5; Black Jack Mack (\$7.20), 46 3/5. Those who qualified by running second: Blue Eyed Mary, Light My Native, Jane's Pocket, Challenge My Ego, Untamed Melody.

Sherry's Ace, a gelding who scored his first career win (from five starts) in the Norgor trials, has the makings of a great bargain. He was purchased in the Summer Sale for only \$1,100, and now stands to make as much as \$62,180 (by winning the Norgor Futurity). He is owned by Gail Odom of Santa Teresa, New Mexico.

Challenge My Ego is another Summer Sale graduate, having brought a winning bid of \$27,000.

Take My Picture, winner of the \$338,519 Riley All-ston Futurity at Sunland Park last spring, faced Seward Junction but was unable to threaten. It was her first defeat.

With so many outstanding three-year-olds running in Thursday's trials for the Rainbow Derby, many fans undoubtedly felt secure in their chances to hit the Pic-Six. Another favorite was the fat seven-day carryover total of \$58,249. So much en-

thusiasm was generated, in fact, that the amount wagered on Thursday's Pic-Six was a staggering \$79,996. The first two winners in the Pic-Six races (fifth and sixth) were 3-1 shots, New Years Special and Viking Mist. Then came an easy one—Indigo Illusion (\$2.60). The next was a 6-1 pick, Miss Jordash. From there on it was really easy—Burnell (\$3) and Meganette (\$2.40). The results: 37 tickets with six winners (each worth \$2,428.20) and 836 tickets with five winners (each worth \$37.60). The total amount disbursed in Thursday's Pic-Six wagering was a remarkable \$121,277, a figure which clearly underscores the remarkable popularity of the Pic-Six. Track officials also wore big smiles on Thursday, as the handle on the 12-race card ballooned up to \$411,860—an increase of \$157,107 (61.67 percent) over the same Thursday last year.

Rise N High, a winner of more than \$230,000 so far, was a bargain-basement purchase for only \$6,500 in the 1982 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs. The gelding's value took a huge leap on Thursday when he sizz-

ed over 440 yards in 21.655 seconds and set the top qualifying time for the \$595,230 Rainbow Derby. A win in the Derby finale on July 4 would enrich his account by \$206,530. Rise N High is by the thoroughbred Hemen, out of Easy Ashley.

Another graduate of the 1982 All-American Sale, New Years Special, checked in with the fourth-fastest Rainbow Derby clocking (21.715). The colt, by Game Plan out of My Evelyn, was purchased for only \$5,700. Master Request, who qualified for the Rainbow Derby Consolation, was a Sale purchase at \$20,000. Master Request, a filly, is by Master Hand out of Miss Brisk Lady.

The list of qualifiers in order: Rise N High, 21.655; Indigo Illusion, 21.665; Barbarys Pokey, 21.670; New Years Special, 21.715; Racy Roman, 21.720; Patti Dash, 21.796; On A Stormy Day, 21.795; Moons Lady Levi, 21.805; Fols Gold, 21.825; Easily A Twelve, 21.830.

On A High, the winner of last year's All-American Futurity, made his return to the mountain track in Thursday's ninth race (a trial division for the Rainbow Derby). On A High fought well from the rail post, but was

unable to overtake the high-flying Burnell, who won by two and one-quarter lengths as a 1-2 favorite. Ironically, Burnell—despite his lopsided win—didn't travel fast enough to make the Rainbow finale, and had to settle for the second-fastest berth in the consolation.

There were few surprises in Thursday's Rainbow Derby trials as seven of 10 odds-on favorites trotted into the winner's circle. Among the qualifying field the only upset came in the fifth division when New Years Special (a \$3,401 shot) blasted the odds-on favorite Mr Crimson Bug with a one-and-one-half-length win. The colt paid \$8.80, \$3.00 and \$2.20.

Trainer Hugh L. Tucker popped two of his charges into the finale of the Rainbow Derby—one of which has a shot at snaring the Triple Crown for three-year-olds. Racy Roman, winner of the \$287,304 Kansas Derby, earned a berth in the Rainbow Derby finale with a three-quarter-length win in the first division. New Years Special, another Tucker trainee, earned his spot in the finale with a strong one-and-one-half-length win over Mr Crimson Bug, the colt who placed third in last year's Rainbow Futurity.

The top two qualifiers in the Rainbow Derby trials were entries supplemented with a \$15,000 payment. The two are Rise N High (owned by

C.B. Albrecht and G.S. Boskovich, Jr. of Newhall, California) and Indigo Illusion (leased by J.E. Jumonville, Jr. of Ventress, Louisiana). It was a wise decision for the owners as both horses earned \$1,500 for their qualifying wins and the least they can expect to pocket for placing last in the Derby is \$20,068.

Patti Dash, a filly by Dash For Cash, turned in a super performance in Thursday's Rainbow Derby trials qualifying as a \$46.80-1 shot. The filly, trained by Jack W. Brooks, has lifetime earnings of only \$5,826 and now has a shot at a winner's purse of more than \$206,000.

Apprentice jockey Eugene O'Neill proved that his last six-furlong win on Bold Yardstick was no fluke. In that outing (on May 27) the colt nosed out the gelding Wild Blade, but was placed sixth on a disqualification. O'Neill was up again on Bold Yardstick for Friday's finale race and brought the colt across the wire to win by a neck over the favorite, Devilishly Smashed. Bold Yardstick paid \$10.80, \$6.00 and \$4.00.

O'Neill also opened Friday's program with a win on Miss Mandrell. The filly was the favorite (\$1.50-1) in the six-furlong race and did not disappoint with a three-and-one-half-length blitz over Miss Joslin.

Jockey Carlos Rivas had a great day Friday, bringing in two winners—one of them a \$5,001 shot that paid \$12.00, \$6.20 and \$3.60. Rivas was up on Clarence's Dream in that race (the seventh) against the favorite, What Speed. He also won the 11th race with Seward Junction (\$6.20).

Pereloom, a 4-5 favorite in Saturday's sixth race at five and one-half furlongs, appeared to have the race sewed up when she reached the top of the stretch in high gear and in command by about two lengths. But the mare drew a gasp from the fans when she veered out sharply, evidently distracted by something that caught her eye. But jockey F.O. Martinez managed to get her back on a straight course and she held on against the onrushing Obviously Quick. Pereloom returned \$3.60 to win.

Sunday's third race (for New Mexico-bred two-year-olds traveling four furlongs) was unusual in that five of the 10 horses were graduates of the 1983 Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings. Jeep Dancer (a \$7,600 purchase) finished second by a nose. Third went to Mels' Christian (a \$1,500 purchase), and fourth was taken by Elegant Reason (\$9,200). The two other Sale horses in the lineup: Evening Bandit (\$1,100) and Miss Calico (\$1,700).

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

F.O. Martinez and Salustio Burgos, both brought in four winners over the four-day weekend at Ruidoso Downs to tie for the weekly jockey crown.

Martinez' big score came in the Norgor Futurity trials where he qualified Black Jack Mack for a berth in the \$124,360 finale.

Burgos also placed the colt Light My Native into the finale of the Norgor Futurity with one of his four scores. The weekend work moved him from sixth to fifth place in the seasonal standings. He is now 13-9-9 from 97 starts for a win percentage of .134.

Apprentice jockey Eugene O'Neill and Alex Baldillez, Jr. both made three trips to the winner's circle over the weekend. O'Neill's victories moved him from fourth to third in the seasonal standings, while Baldillez moved up two slots into sixth.

Jack Martin, winner of Sunday's \$154,010 Rainbow Silver Cup, took over the number one spot in overall standings on the basis of his win percentage. Both he and Joe Martinez have 19 wins, but Martin scored the healthier win percentage at .253 to Martinez' .164.

In the trainer competition, William F. Leach took the honors for the second straight week. Leach popped five of his charges into the win col-

umn over the weekend to bring his seasonal standing to 20-15-10 from 92 starts.

Jack Brooks made headway moving into the third position from fifth with three wins. Hugh L. Tucker also nabbed three for the week to move from eighth to seventh in the standings.

Three trainers moved into the standings with five wins to share company with Jimmie Claridge. They are Gregory K. Henson, Cecil Crabtree and Thomas A. Riley.

Racing resumed Wednesday at Ruidoso Downs with the first of three days of elimination trials for the \$700,000 (estimated) Rainbow Futurity at 400 yards.

Fourteen-race programs were booked for Wednesday through Friday, regular 12-face agendas on Saturday and Sunday. The regular post time of 1 p.m. will remain in effect despite the expanded cards.

The weekend slate includes the \$9,000-added Mescalero Apache Handicap and the \$9,000-added Master Salls Handicap on Saturday. Both are for three-year-olds and up. The Mescalero Apache Handicap covers seven furlongs and the Master Salls is run at 870 yards.

On Sunday, it's the four-furlong Norgor Futurity, which splits up a purse of nearly \$125,000.







## La Luz: a village of light

Age-old irrigation channels, fruit-laden trees, and the feeling of a slower pace of life surround the visitor to the village of La Luz.

La Luz is on New Mexico Highway 545, about five miles north of Alamogordo. The unincorporated village has only an informal system of government, according to village residents.

La Luz, or "the light," began long ago as a Spanish mission, according to present-day villagers. Adobe walls that line crop fields in the village attest that a presence of the Spanish founders of the town still remains. Red pottery tiles on the roofs of older buildings in town are remnants of the now-disbanded La Luz pottery works.

Prevalent in the village are acres of crops, especially fruit trees. Water to nourish the crops flows through La Luz from high mountain canyons in gurgling irrigation channels that interlace the village.

The lifeblood waters result in abundant crops of figs, tomatoes, peaches, pecans, pears and apricots, among others. A common sight along the tree-lined lanes in the village are hand-lettered signs offering fruit and vegetables for sale.

A less bright side of the water situation in La Luz is the limited supply of water the village has to draw from. The La Luz Mutual Waters Users Association shares water flowing

down the La Luz Canyon with the City of Alamogordo, and increasing demand on the water supply is putting pressure on both users.

Thriving in La Luz is a vibrant art colony. The Gallery La Luz, on Highway 545 just before the village, is a cooperative venture owned by 28 area artists. According to gallery agent Inez Wyatt, the gallery features works of sculpture, pottery, woodwork, painting and stained glass.

Wyatt said the major event at the gallery is the annual National Miniatures Show. She said miniature works from as many as 1,000 artists from all over the country are expected to be displayed in the show. This year's show, the 10th annual, is scheduled for July 28 to August 31.

Other art activities in the village include the pottery works of Al Potter and Freida Herrera's Weaving School.


The gallery began in 1972, and the level of involvement has increased yearly, Wyatt said.

According to village resident Paul Gordon, the actual site of the village of La Luz has moved along the canyon several times during its hundreds of years of existence. He said the local Catholic church, Our Lady of the Light, has had as many as three locations.

The colorful history of the village seems to be reflected in the constantly changing irrigation waters, which

flash back and forth through areas of light and dark as they flow beneath giant cottonwood trees.

La Luz is a village well named as "the light."



A small statue graces a building of the Lady of the Light Catholic Church in La Luz.



## LENGTH ARMS v NEGOTIATIONS



### Inside the Capitol by Fred McCaffrey

**SANTA FE**—Did you see Juan Vigil and Paul Bardacke on the television news that night?

It was when they were making their joint appearance to discuss recent developments in that plan to register applicants for welfare as voters, all this to take place within the confines of Human Services offices.

They looked calm as you please. Cool, even gentlemanly, as each presented his case. Bardacke, the Attorney General of the state, said the plan Vigil had proposed for that purpose was unconstitutional. Vigil, the Cabinet Secretary for Human Services, said his people would, of course, attempt to find a way to avoid the difficulties to which the Attorney General pointed.

You would never have guessed that a mere few moments before, the two—or at least the Attorney General and Vigil's lawyer—had been engaging in a screaming match in the Governor's offices.

You can see why there might have been some emotions involved.

Dick Rubin, Vigil's legal counsel, was acting on advice of William Walker, an Assistant Attorney General. Walker said such registration was strictly okay.

He was very firm in that opinion. Here is how he put it: "Question: May New Mexico Human Services Department employees act as voter registrars at HSD offices during working hours? Answer: Yes." No equivocation there.

To support his position, Walker quoted much case law, almost all of it having to do with the federal Hatch Act and the New Mexico Little Hatch Act.

On the basis of that, Rubin had told his boss to go ahead with the plan, and we in the media had been treated to a Goody-Two-Shoes-type news release about what good citizens the Human Service people were going to be. About all it needed was organ music or illustrations with cherubs to turn a governmental office into something approaching a church.

Now here was Paul Bardacke, the big boss of the Attorney General's law firm, saying all that was not to be.

All those citations Walker provided,

he said, had to do with government workers acting as voter registrars on their own time. That wasn't what was planned here. Vigil was going to pay their regular salaries while they performed that function, and there happens to be provision in state law, overlooked by Mr. Walker, which says, "All registration officers appointed under this section shall serve without pay."

That was enough to shut down the Vigil-Rubin-Walker plan, or at least transform it entirely.

But the AG's opinion really said much more. When Governor Anaya later called the Bardacke letter "more of an editorial than an opinion," he may have merely been trying to distract us from its further content.

What that goes on to say, in almost so many words, is this: The people who are the administrators of state government (such as the Governor and his agency heads) are not allowed to decide what the function of such agencies is to be. That has already been set, in some cases by the Constitution and in all cases by the passage of the legislation which appropriates the money to each agency. No matter how laudable additional actions may be, or how attractive to politicians in government, the funds of that agency may only legally be spent for what the Legislature has specified.

Needless to say, no Legislature has told Human Services or any other state agency that it should register voters during the time it is performing its regular functions. Needless to say, no Legislature has said the money appropriated to pay state employees should be paid them for registering voters; a Legislature has in fact forbidden that directly, in the law the Attorney General cited.

If Juan Vigil and Toney Anaya decided the social workers at HSD should sell hamburgers during working hours, those workers could not be ordered to do so.

The point is raised here because with these guys in office, almost anything is possible.

Stand by, Bardacke. We're going to need lots more of your opinions.

### Reporter's Round by Darrell Pehr



Visiting the grocery store is something most of us do on a regular basis, and many people might take this event for granted, as just another of life's chores. Sometimes, though, such a shopping trip can be much more than a simple hum-drum task. Grocery store shopping can be an actual adventure, full of interesting sights and events.

The adventure begins at the opening of the automatic doors. The first obstacle you encounter is in the form of a decision... do I need a cart or just a basket? Carts are for serious shoppers, baskets for those who are there for "just a few things." I always get a basket first, then give up and return a few aisles later to dump the overflowing contents of my basket into a cart.

A prime spot for some real action at the grocery store is the produce section. For inexperienced shoppers like myself, the produce section is a place of great mystery.

How do you tell if it's a good melon? What's the difference between McIntosh apples and Delicious apples? How can you tell if the grapes have seeds in them? One of the biggest produce questions is probably—What goes in the plastic bags?

This last question has long troubled me. What are those bags for? Are they just to keep your oranges from rolling around in the cart, or is there something sanitary involved?

And what fruits are supposed to go in the bags? I'm fairly sure grapes go in the bags, but what about pineapples?

I've drawn the line at bananas. I put anything smaller than bananas in the bags and let anything larger than bananas go "bagless." Then I alternate how I treat bananas with each trip to the grocery store, one trip they go in a bag, the next—no bag.

Another adventure at the grocery store is searching for certain items. Parmesan cheese is a good example. First guess is the cheese section. Wrong! What about in the condiment section? Wrong! This is an item that is classified according to what it is used with, very tricky. This takes careful reasoning. I finally found it nestled near the spaghetti sauces.

More adventure can be found in the generic aisle. There is an eerie feeling of being in some barren wasteland as you pass between the shelves in the generic section stacked with colorless cans of beans and boxes of laundry soap. The starkness of the name "peanut butter" printed in plain black on a plain white label is somehow a little scary. No friendly Peter Pan here.

Part of the adventure in the generic aisle is pretending to be "just passing through" while actually grabbing all those great bargains. You certainly don't want anyone to see you in the generic aisle, but what's the difference between generic baggies and the other kind?

Other fun at the grocery store involves watching other shoppers. Some wield their carts like giant army tanks, crashing into anything in their way. If you look these tank operators in the eye, you are convinced they would happily run their cart over you for a good buy on beans. Watch these shoppers from a safe distance.

Then there are the comparers. You can often find these folks immobile in the middle of an aisle, holding two nearly identical jars of apple sauce up to the light, trying to determine any difference. They pretend not to notice the 15 carts backed up waiting to pass through the aisle as they make a careful decision on which is truly the best buy.

As you approach the check-out lanes, more adventure is in store. You know, no matter what, that you have too many items for the express lane. I'm always at least one over the limit. The trick, then, is to listen to the store intercom. If they announce "Karen to the front, please," you know a new check-out lane is about to open. Speed matters here, don't be afraid to be quick with your cart if necessary to secure an advantageous place in the newly forming line.

Now comes a period of waiting while Karen does a heroic job of plowing through the mountain of groceries in the cart of the tank operator who flattened two stacks of root beer in her rush for a good spot in line. A good game to play here is—How much is this going to cost? When I shop with my wife, Linda, we each guess how much the load is going to cost us, with the loser having to make dinner. It helps pass the time.

Finally clear of the check-out lane, the final adventure comes in the parking lot. Here, carts become dangerous projectiles, careening about the parking lot according to the degree of slope of the asphalt, strength of the wind and number of mischievous little children. Jungle rules apply here, with survival of your car's paint job depending on the will of the gods.

It's high adventure, all right, no doubt about it. Never think again that a trip to the grocery store will be a hum-drum affair. Instead, have an adventure!

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
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# Alto man donates race horse to NMSU

A Ruidoso race horse breeder has donated a thoroughbred to New Mexico State University's horse program in honor of retiring NMSU president Gerald Thomas's service to education and the state.

William R. Burgess, an Alto resident who breeds and races quarter horses and thoroughbreds, has given "Our Red Baron" to NMSU, according to Wayne Bueher, consultant to Burgess.

The four-year-old gelding has raced at Sunland Park as well as Ruidoso Downs, Bueher said.

"We hope that this gift to the university will not only be an asset to NMSU's horse program but we hope it also will stimulate others to help the university as well," Burgess said. "Universities can use many types of contributions from supporters."

The Burgess gift was coordinated by Britt Porter, a 1984 graduate of NMSU who was a Crimson Scholar with a particular interest in race horse chemistry. While working as a student intern at M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute's department of pediatrics, Porter said, he learned about the importance of private gifts to institutions.

"I came back to my final year at NMSU convinced that the best thing I could do for my alma mater would be to find people willing to help the university," said Porter.

His search, he said, found a more than willing Burgess who was familiar with similar gift programs in other states.

Dr. Arnold Nelson, head of animal and range sciences at NMSU, said, "Continued growth of our horse program is heavily dependent upon such gifts because state funding often does not allow for growth."

The NMSU horse program includes 35 brood mares, five stallions and several geldings, according to Professor Joe Armstrong, extension horse specialist and horse program leader.

NMSU offers 10 courses in horse-related studies, serving about 275 students a year, he said.
