Airport 'red herrings' detailed

"They've got to come to the realization that this is the only place we can build this airport, and we're going to build it on Fort Stanton Site B," said Fred Heckman, chairman of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission last week.

Heckman referred to the reluctance of the Board of Regents at New Mexico State University to give up their use permit on lands at Fort Stanton Mesa, currently in use for range experiments, for the proposed Sierra Blanca Airport.

"The battle is that we've got to accommodate, we've got to compromise."

Heckman said NMSU has been resisting location of the airport on the Fort Stanton Mesa site by promoting false impressions surrounding the airport. Heckman termed the false impressions "red herrings."

"New Mexico State has a number of red herrings to sway public and private opinion," Heckman said. He listed the red herrings as the belief that viable alternate sites exist; the belief that the airport is being proposed to enable extensive commercial development; the belief that more and more land will be requested as

the airport grows; and the belief that the Carrizozo airport could be developed instead of the Sierra Blanca Airport.

Heckman said extensive work has been done by the commission and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to search for a site for the airport, and the conclusion is that Site B is the only choice. Heckman said because the Sierra Blanca Airport will play such a big part in this area as a regional airport, it demands a unique site.

"We're not trying to duplicate that strip," Heckman said of the Ruidoso airport. "We're in trouble now. It's that future projection that we're trying to take care of."

Heckman said acceptance of any location but Site B would be only a temporary solution. The FAA, which will be responsible for a considerable amount of the funding for the airport, will look closely at site considerations.

"FAA is not particularly interested in putting millions and millions of dollars in an airport that they'll have to close down in 20 years," Heckman said.

The second red herring, according to Heckman, simply does not make sense. Because Site B is surrounded by government land, extensive development is not likely. Heckman

said urban encroachment is not desirable near an airport.

Heckman said the airport would be best surrounded by the experimental ranch currently on the mesa.

"They're the best possible neighbors we could have," he said. "The commission is a strong supporter of the range projects. We look forward to being close neighbors and allies in the future."

Heckman also discredited the belief that the airport will use more and more land in the future by pointing to the statement issued June 13 by the commission. The statement ensured that only 1,666 acres would be requested, as asked for in the original June 15, 1983, request for transfer of title of the land.

"Any contemplation or conjecture made by others of additional land requirements of this commission is deceiving," the statement reads.

Of the belief that the Carrizozo airport is a suitable alternative, Heckman pointed to the restricted airspace and mountains surrounding the airport, and the distance from Mescalero and Ruidoso Downs as reasons against Carrizozo as an alternative.

"We would use the Alamogordo Airport before we'd ever go to Carrizozo," Heckman said. "It will never become the Sierra Blanca Air-

port." The recent trip by Ruidoso officials to Washington, D.C., to meet with top national leaders on the airport issue has also been instrumental in discrediting false beliefs.

"The trip certainly helped to lay to rest the red herring that the airport has no political support," Heckman said. He said the trip was also valuable in that it helped support efforts already being made in Washington for the airport, led by U.S. Representative Joe Skeen, and that it helped keep the issue alive.

Heckman said the trip also resulted in U.S. Senator Pete Domenici and the Department of the Interior clearly stating that the decision on the mesa is up to the Board of Regents at New Mexico State University. It earlier was believed that power to transfer use of the land was held by the top Bureau of Land Management officials.

"The monkey is clearly on their backs," Heckman said of the board. "They know what we need and how treacherous our situation is in Ruidoso. They can't put off the decision any longer. Sooner or later an airport will be built on Site B. It's a matter of time and how many people die before it happens. It's very simple."



Postal parking

Work continues on the parking lot of the main Ruidoso Post Office. Workers will finish grading the lot for drainage and may begin to lay the base course today, according to Postmaster Bernie Lechman. The lot will be open temporarily when the base course is laid, then will close again when the asphalt is laid, probably Wednesday or Thursday. Lechman estimated the work will provide 10 to 12 new parking spots.

Retail merchants to hear lodgers' views

The Retail Merchants Committee of the Chamber of Commerce meets today (Monday) in a special session to hear from representatives of the Ruidoso Lodgers Association and to take a stand on the proposed three percent lodgers' tax.

Lodgers' tax is now two percent, but the village council is scheduled to decide on a proposed increase to three percent Tuesday.

The retailers committee is expected to hear from Lodgers Association president Bill Rawlins and vice president Phil Hamilton, among others, as to why the association opposes the tax and why the committee should support them in opposing it.

Committee president Richard Sandoval predicted that it will be "a difficult meeting." He said he felt the tax is "a necessity, we have to have it." But he added that he was ready to listen to what the association has to present.

As to the possible outcome of the final vote, Sandoval said he expected the committee would endorse the three percent tax.

Rawlins said he was going to the meeting with a positive attitude. While he would not divulge exactly what he intended to say to the committee, he said it would be "essentially the same thing we said to the village council," earlier this month.

"We just want to talk to them and present our side," Rawlins said. "We hope it'll be a friendly meeting and we appreciate them asking us to come and present our side."

The meeting is scheduled for noon today at the Chamber of Commerce building.

Grindstone water protest dropped

A protest standing in the way of construction of the Grindstone Canyon Dam has been dropped by the Carlsbad Irrigation District.

The district withdrew its protest Tuesday to the Ruidoso application to store water in the proposed dam. In a letter to the state engineer, Carlsbad Irrigation District attorney Jay W. Forbes gave no reasons for the withdrawal.

"I'm very excited that they dropped it and we're getting on with the work on Grindstone Canyon Dam," said Ruidoso village councillor Rick Evans. "I just regret that it had to go

this far." "I'm relieved that we don't have to go through a formal hearing," said village water attorney Neil Stillinger. "I think it will expedite things."

Councillor Ray Dean Carpenter confirmed that this is the last protest. Carpenter was instrumental this spring in helping work out a compromise to protests by a group called the Lazy H Limited against two earlier water-related applications.

According to John Couzens of the State Engineer's Office in Roswell, the withdrawal means no hearing will be necessary.

"We can proceed to review the application and make recommendations without going to hearing," he said.

"Now we can work directly with the village."

A hearing date for the Ruidoso application and Carlsbad protest had been set for July 17.

Couzens said final approval for the water storage application could come as soon as a few weeks. He emphasized, however, that simply because the Carlsbad protest has been dropped does not necessarily mean the application will be approved.

"It's a very important application," Couzens said. "We want to make sure we protect these rights (of other downstream water users) and the rights of the city (Ruidoso)."

Couzens said after his review of the application, it is sent to the Santa Fe office of the state engineer for final

action. The only other step necessary by the State Engineer's Office before construction begins on the dam, according to Couzens, is approval of the village's application to actually build the dam. Consideration of this application will be based mainly on safety. There are no protests to the application to build the dam, Couzens said.

According to assistant village manager Frank Potter, construction on the actual dam will not begin until early next spring—a delay of over a year due mainly to the Carlsbad protest. Potter said work on the intake structure to divert water from the Rio Ruidoso may begin this fall.

County P&Z has lengthy meeting

A road variance was granted, a preliminary plat review was approved, and mobile home fire space specifications were amended in the regular meeting of the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission Thursday night.

In a four-hour session, Larry Tillman requested from the commission a variance on the width of the roads which service the 23 lots of Wolf Creek subdivision and the 23 lots of Wolf Springs subdivision.

The roads were built to Ruidoso road specifications of 25 feet when they were constructed, but now fall short of the 28 feet the county is stipulating.

"They just loop in there," said Tillman of the driving pattern of new residents of the subdivisions. "They don't go anywhere direct there."

He said the roads are not thoroughfares and never will be. They serve only the current and future property owners that are filling in the development.

Commission chairman Bill Seelbach suggested that the approaches to the roads are not where

they were platted. He speculated that they may have changed the specifications of the legal descriptions of some of the lots.

Seelbach said he had driven on the roads and noticed that the culverts needed to be dug out. Also, he said, "the compaction is awful."

Tillman responded that he had someone who would work on the culverts, once the variance on the width was obtained.

"The width doesn't seem to be a problem," Seelbach said. "You just don't want to get too close to the edge or you slough off onto the side."

Tillman was then granted the variance he sought, for three feet with the stipulation that the road cannot be used for any other or future development or subdivision.

In other business, the commission: —Approved a preliminary plat review for the Los Chozas subdivision with a stipulation. Commissioners agreed that the road into the subdivision, which crosses over private property, should have a backup access in the event that the primary access is denied. The stipulation calls for an alternate access to be established to Highway 380 if such a situation develops.

—Tabled action for a variance request for Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates for lack of maps and information to consult. The request will be taken up at the regularly scheduled meeting next month.

—Discussed without decision the platting specifications of several different subdivisions, including land owned by the Ruidoso Land Company adjacent to the Forest Heights and Alpine Village subdivisions.

—Amended subdivision road specifications as previously proposed, primarily wording changes to strengthen and clarify the actual measurements of the specifications.


—Passed a motion to obtain a detailed explanation as to road specifications for different types of road uses.

—Amended regulations regarding resubdivisions to restrict the division of subdivided lots to those in excess of

20 acres. Anything smaller will not be allowed to be divided.

—Moved to ask the attorney general's office to take action on a problem of alleged illegal subdivisions in the area of the Fort Stanton Estates subdivision. Seelbach addressed concerned residents during the meeting, telling them that the subdividers had ignored the commission's directive to correct the situation or make evident their intentions to correct the problem. But, he added, "the appropriate action will be taken."

—Amended the mobile home fire space specifications as to distance between units. The commission decided to require that 20 feet be left between units that are placed side by side in a mobile home park. End to end units must maintain a space of at least 15 feet.

Six Mescalero maidens to 'come of age' in annual ceremonies

Six Mescalero Apache Indian maidens will participate in the "Coming of Age" ritual during the Fourth of July weekend.

According to tribal members, the Coming of Age ceremony is one of the oldest traditions in the Mescalero culture. It is a serious and solemn ritual, observing the time when a girl ends her childhood and prepares for womanhood.

The ceremony, which takes place every Fourth of July weekend at the Mescalero ceremonial grounds, extends throughout four full days and into the morning of a fifth. The public is invited, although unauthorized cameras are not allowed and non-Indian guests must leave by midnight.

During the ceremony, the maidens are honored by their family and friends, who participate in rituals and prepare many feasts. The work, expense and time involved signify the importance of the ritual.

The ceremonial grounds will be transformed by the time the ritual officially begins at the dawn of the first morning, Wednesday, July 4. Family members erect teepees on the south side of the feast grounds, with an arbor of oak brush connecting the area.

Medicine men play an important role in the ceremony, along with traditional chants and dances. The maidens remain mostly quiet, observing the customs.



The Mescalero Apache ritual, "Coming of Age," takes place each year during the July 4 weekend. It lasts four days, and traditional dance, dress and food are part of the

Traditional clothing of buckskin, fringed blouses and skirts, moccasins and leggings are worn. Each maiden

carries with her a buckskin pouch filled with yellow pollen to symbolize strength and fertility.

ceremony. The public is invited. Pictured from left are maidens Sarah Kazhe, Neida Geronimo, Rona Morin, Winifred Comanche and Marcene Fernando.

After nightfall, with a huge fire lit in the pit of the ceremonial grounds, the chants of the medicine men, the

Dance of the Maidens, and the Dance of the Mountain Gods are performed. Each day the rituals are repeated.

The maidens participating this year include Neida Geronimo, 15, who is the great-granddaughter of Geronimo. She attends Tularosa High School, plays basketball, and enjoys music. Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. Robert Geronimo.

Marcene Fernando, 13, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Fernando. A member of the Mescalero Apache Tribe of Laguna Pueblo, she attends St. Mary's Middle School in Albuquerque, and she enjoys swimming, camping and participating in traditional Indian dances at Laguna Pueblo.

Winifred (Winnie) Comanche, 13, will be a freshman at Tularosa High School. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Comanche Sr. and the great-granddaughter of Henry Treas. She enjoys sports and soap operas.

Maiden Rona Morin, 15, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald S. Morin. Her great-grandfather was the scout, Redboy Magooshboy. She attends Tularosa High School, and her hobbies include riding horses and sports.

Sarah Carlyn Siki Kazhe, 13, also attends Tularosa High School. Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. Pete Kazhe and her great-grandfather was the scout, Roger Toelanny. She is involved with sports and arts and crafts.

Maiden Pamela Morgan, 13, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Kaseah, also will be participating in the ceremonies.

Racing wrapup

SEWARD JUNCTION, a \$26,000 purchase in the 1983 Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings, picked up \$62,211 with a coasting victory in Sunday's Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity.

The colt picked up his fourth straight win against no defeats and swelled his career income up to \$156,161.

Earlier on Sunday's card, there was some drama of a different sort, when the Pic-Six wagering (on the fifth through 10th races) produced only one ticket with six winners. This ticket was worth \$23,325.40. The fan holding this ticket preferred not to disclose his name.

Seward Junction, owned by the J.A. Leonard Cattle Co. of Leander, Texas, raced as 6-5 favorite in the Norgor Futurity, led all the way, and reached the wire with a commanding 3-1/2-length advantage.

The valuable colt is trained by Thomas A. Riley. Carlos Rivas is the pilot. The mutual returns: \$4.60, \$2.60, \$2.60. Untamed Melody, owned by Sue H. May, Jeanne Leach and Carol Childs of Fort Stockton, Texas, took second place money of \$27,373. Joe Martinez was up.

Third went to Black Jack Mack, the property of Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas. F.O. Martinez was in the saddle. The third-place purse was \$14,930.

Untamed Melody and Black Jack Mack were part of a three-horse entry, so each paid \$2.20 and \$2.60.

Seward Junction, breaking out of the outside post in the 10-horse field, immediately grabbed a half-length lead. Untamed Melody took over second from the rail post.

Untamed Melody spent the rest of the race in the futile attempt to catch Seward Junction.

FILL MACKS CUP got everything his way in Saturday's \$10,150 Mescalero Apache Handicap at Ruidoso Downs and stepped off a half-length win.

The gelding, who wins Ruidoso handicaps with clockwork regularity, made it look like just another day at the office.

Under confident handling by jockey Joe Martinez, Fill Macks Cup broke in third place, then moved up to take over second behind his front-running stablemate, Jack The Knife.

Fill Macks Cup has a way of appearing not to be bearing down, so when he casually moved along in second place during the backstretch run of the seven-furlong sprint, Ruidoso patrons probably were wondering whether he'd ever get down to serious business.

In the upper stretch, he moved into an even position with his stablemate, and that's when jockey Martinez decided it was time to get rolling. He went to brisk left-handed whipping, and Fill Macks Cup easily pulled into the clear.

FLAMING VIKING, the palomino gelding who deadheaded for sixth in the \$605,394 Kansas Futurity, cleared his first hurdle in his path to the \$750,000 (estimated) Rainbow Futurity.

The gelding raced as a 1-2 favorite in Friday's second race at Ruidoso

Downs, and blasted out a half-length win in the 400-yard dash. He led all the way and was never seriously threatened.

Friday's entire 14-race card marked the third straight day of first-round elimination trials for the middle jewel of the Triple Crown for two-year-olds. In order to advance into the time trials on July 5, a hopeful had to finish either first or second. In the time trials, those contenders who chalk up the 10 fastest clockings will meet in the July 22 finale.

Flaming Viking, owned by Oliver J. Hennie of Temple, Texas, returned low mutual prices of \$3, \$2.40, \$2.40. Joe Martinez was up. Madam Jezebel qualified for the time trials by running second at 10-1 odds.

The big surprise of the trials was Mac Copy, who won the first race by a neck at 62-1 odds and returned \$125.40 on a \$2 win ticket (a bit under the seasonal high of \$145). Mac Copy was ridden by Richard Bickel for Andrew and Harris Smith of Ardmore, Oklahoma.

Flying Arky, winner of the \$605,395 Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, kept his Triple Crown dream alive by surviving Thursday's trial round of the Rainbow Futurity.

But Flying Arky ran into plenty of arguments from Cash Margin.

The two fought it out in side-by-side fashion throughout the 400-yard journey, and Cash Margin (who finished fourth to Flying Arky in the Kansas finale) got revenge this time.

The filly reached the wire with a head lead and returned \$5.80, \$2.10, \$2.10. Jerry Nicodemus was up for Clarence Scharbauer Jr. of Midland, Texas. Flying Arky paid \$2.10 and \$2.10 as a 1-2 favorite.

Despite the setback, Flying Arky will still advance into the Rainbow Futurity time trials on July 5. Fourteen first-round Rainbow trials were staged Thursday. The top two finishers made the first-round qualifying out. (Thursday was the second of three straight days of first-round trials.)

In the July 5 matchup, the clock will be used to determine the 10 contenders for the July 22 finale of the middle jewel in the Triple Crown for two-year-olds. The Rainbow purse is estimated at \$750,000.

DEVILISHLY SMASHED, a filly who has improved steadily in three outs at the current Ruidoso Downs meeting, looks like the one to beat in Thursday's headliner.

Ten sophomores will meet at 6 1/2 furlongs, dueling over a \$4,300 allowance purse.

First post, Thursday through Sunday, is 1 p.m. The weekend highpoints include Saturday's \$7,500-added Aspen Handicap for three-year-old fillies going 5 1/2 furlongs. On Sunday, two stakes are in the works: the \$10,000-added Governor's Handicap for three-year-olds and up at 7 1/2 furlongs; and the \$88,173 Rainbow Derby Consolation at 440 yards.

In Thursday's headliner, Devilishly Smashed will break from the number six post with Joe Martinez up at 110 pounds. The filly hung up a 1-2-1 record from seven starts last year, earning \$2,729.

Some tip sheet signs targeted for removal

According to the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), part of Ruidoso's local color must comply with the village sign ordinance. Signs advertising where tip sheets are sold have frequently been in violation of the sign ordinance, said P&Z chairman Greg Masters.

"There is no problem with having them up (tip sheet signs), but they must meet with the present regulations," Masters said. Sign permits must be purchased and display regulations met, he added.

"We need tip sheets ... it's a part of Ruidoso," Masters said. "We just need to coordinate an effort so the signs are properly displayed. There shouldn't be any problem with that."

Planning and Zoning enforcement officer Paul Davis was directed to

send notices to those persons in violation of the sign ordinance during a regular meeting of P&Z last Monday.

"Right now I'm having to crack down on persons with tip sheet signs that are in violation ... it's hard to send letters, though, when you don't know who to send them to," Davis said. Persons who write tip sheets usually put up their own signs, he added.

"The best thing to do is take down all the signs that need to be (taken down), and then see who calls about them," Davis said.

Although tip sheets are a popular item at many local counters, most of the "tipsters" themselves are hard to pin down.

According to village personnel, Ol' Dum Dum's Tips and John's Tips are put out by village councillor Sherman Atwood. Whether or not Atwood is responsible for the misplacement of



advertising signs presently is not known, Davis said.

Atwood has been out of town and unavailable to comment on the status of his tip sheet signs.

A spokesman for Prairie Dogs Tips said no signs are put up without per-

mission of the property owner. "If they didn't want them there, they wouldn't be there," he said. The spokesman said that if the tip sheet signs do have to comply with the village sign ordinance, he hoped that a separate permit would not be required for each sign displayed.

Colonel E.L. Ritchie of Cloudfcroft has been selected New Mexico's Outstanding Tree Farmer of the Year.

He received an engraved plaque, a McCulloch chainsaw and gift certificates in a ceremony at the Secretary of Natural Resources Office in Santa Fe.

The award goes to people who practice forest management and encourage others to care for New Mexico timber resources.

At New Mexico Tree Farm No. 14, Ritchie practices timber stand improvement, grows and sells Christmas trees, and spends time on erosion control measures.

The property is just northeast of Cloudfcroft. He bought the land in 1958 and has been a tree farmer since 1967.

When asked how long he had been managing the land, Ritchie replied "Not long enough." When he bought the property, gullies were more common than grass. Now grass has replaced the gullies.

His Christmas trees include Scotch pine, white fir and blue spruce. He began selling the trees six years ago and now sells 400 a year. Families can choose their own trees, but Ritchie cuts them.

in the fall.



Public Notice

Business customers with two or more telephone lines have begun paying a monthly "access charge" to phone companies for putting through Interstate calls. The new charges, which are \$6.00 per line, per month, and which began nationwide May 25, were ordered by the Federal Communications Commission and are the result of numerous changes in financing telephone operations in the U.S.

The interstate charges are similar to the monthly intrastate Customer Access Line Charge (CALC) New Mexicans began paying January first. These intrastate charges also stem from the nationwide changes in funding telephone operations.

Both the interstate and intrastate charges now appear on the telephone bills of business customers with two or more lines. So, if you lease more than one business line, you can expect to see these charges on your telephone bill. Business customers leasing only one line and residential customers have also been paying the intrastate CALC but will not have to pay the interstate access charges until June of next year.

The FCC considers the access charges to be the most equitable way to charge for fixed local service costs. The access charge plan reshuffles telephone pricing to bring rates closer to actual costs of each service provided. Regulators have kept the rates for basic local telephone service below costs, while long distance rates have been artificially high to help pay for local service.

One benefit of implementation of the access charges is a 6.1 percent reduction in long distance rates charged by AT&T. The FCC estimates up to a 40 percent toll rate reduction when the whole access plan goes into effect.

The 6.1 percent reduction in long distance rates will result in a \$1.7 billion savings to customers over the next year.

Well, who should I put the kiss of death on today? Today, if you did not know, marks the start of that venerable event on the tennis calendar—Wimbledon.

Last year, I predicted that Guillermo Vilas would win Wimbledon, and he promptly lost to Nigerian Nduka Odizor. That probably should have made me leery of picking a winner this year, but naaaa.

What one has to be careful of is picking the players one would like to see win the tournament, instead of the players one really expects to win. But then, what kind of challenge is there in prognosticating that Martina Navratilova will win Wimbledon?

Actually, I'm sort of rooting for Martina to collect another silver plate. I want her to win a real Grand Slam.

Now if you're a casual follower of professional tennis, you may be thinking, "Didn't she just win the Grand Slam?"

No, she did not. A Grand Slam is achieved by winning the world's four major tournaments—the Australian Open, the French Open, Wimbledon and the U.S. Open—in a single calendar year.

At least, that was the way it always had been. Then a year or two ago, the International Tennis Federation decided that a Grand Slam could be achieved by winning those four events consecutively.

When Martina won the French a couple of weeks ago, she completed the pseudo slam. She also pocketed the \$1 million bonus the ITF offered up to lend credibility to their new slam.

But let me make it perfectly clear that I, Ruidoso News tennis columnist Tim Palmer, do not recognize the Navratilova slam. (I can see that statement making headlines on Fleet Street in London.)

However, now that I have denied Martina her not-yet slam, I am rooting for her to achieve a true Grand Slam, which she can do by successfully defending her Wimbledon and U.S. Open titles.

This is a bit of a turnout for me. For the past couple of years, I have

been rooting for Martina to lose, and I've been happy on those very infrequent occasions when she did.

It's not that I dislike her; truly I admire her very much. But I thought and still think that it would be better for women's tennis if some of the glory were spread around.

I'm putting that belief on hold until the end of this year; however, Martina stands on the threshold of recognition as perhaps the greatest woman tennis player of all time, and a true Grand Slam would add a lot more weight to the claim.

Over on the men's side, we have the makings for a little more drama. Three players can be considered favorites for the title: John McEnroe, Ivan Lendl and Jimmy Connors.

There are reasons, however, that each could be eliminated before the final. McEnroe is coming off of a grueling loss to Lendl in the final of the French.

Will losing after being so close to the big title he really wanted affect his play at Wimbledon? It might. So much mental toughness is required to win week after week on the men's pro tour, and there are going to be days when it's just not there.

What Lendl has against him is a so-so record on grass. He did reach the Australian final on that surface, however, and the fact that he broke his "Big Four" title match drought in Paris may mean he is on his way.

Connors always has performed well at Wimbledon, and his game seems to be as strong as ever. He may be lying in wait like he did in 1982, ready to grunt his way to the final and capture a third All England title.

Having copped out by picking Martina on the women's side, however, I am going out on a limb with the men. My pick is Scott Davis, the young California pro. He or his Australian counterpart, Pat Cash, or any of several other young lions could find themselves "in the zone" and really make things interesting at Wimbledon.

But things are always interesting at Wimbledon—it's the best tournament of the year.

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Commission approves zoning

The regular meeting and public hearing of the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning Commission drew a sparse crowd Thursday as it approved previously recommended zoning to the north and west of Ruidoso, with the exception of a single tract in section 9.

That section, adjacent to Alpine Village and Forest Heights, is owned by the Ruidoso Land Company and had been recommended by the commission last month to be zoned as a commercial planned development (C-P).

But commission members reversed the zoning proposal after hearing from residents of the surrounding subdivisions that a C-P designation was disagreeable.

Jack Barber told the commission he had several letters from property owners opposing the C-P zoning. He said the owner of the tract had plans for multiple uses of the land, which were inconsistent with the wishes of local property owners.

Bill Ivy supported Barber's statement, saying he represented the majority of the residents of Alpine Village who felt the tract would be more appropriately zoned if given a residential designation of R-1.

"We feel you'd be doing a real disservice to the people in the area and so forth if it's zoned in any way other than R-1," he said.

Among the proposed uses are a C-1 hotel or motel, a recreational vehicle and mobile home park and a general use park.

Commission member Karon Petty made a motion to approve the entire zoning proposal except for the land in question. She noted that the owner had never appeared before the commission and was not represented in the audience.

"I'd like to have the man come before us and ask us for the kind of zoning he's looking for," she said.

Member Ray Bishop, encouraging a C-P designation, said, "We should allow the man the use of his land. But we as a commission should have control of what he'll put in there."

He said a commercial plan would force the owner to appear before the commission for approval of a master plan for the tract, thus affording the commission control.

After some confusion as to the wording of Petty's motion, Bishop proposed a motion to amend her motion so as not to exclude from voting consideration the tract in question.

When the confusion that followed Bishop's motion was straightened out, Walt Wilson made the final motion to zone the land R-1 instead of C-P.

The motion carried on a 3-2 vote, with chairman Milt Alcorn abstaining. Voting in favor of the R-1 designation were Petty, Wilson and Mack Bell. Opposed were Bishop and Ben Hall.

Others speaking at the public hearing were Greg Mobley, representing the 105 acres of L.G.M. Enterprises, and Don Blaugrund of Alto Village.

Mobley questioned commission members on their recommended R-1 zoning of a tract of land in section 4. He said L.G.M. Enterprises was considering developing a portion of the land, and wondered if some other designation would be more appropriate.

He was advised on the available designations for the property, and was told that the owners could return to the commission at a future date and request a zoning more in keeping with their development plans. Mobley agreed then to the R-1.

Blaugrund spent time with the commission members before the hearing going over maps of Alto Village. He

spoke briefly during the hearing on areas of the village as those areas were discussed.

He also requested that Hall clarify the zoning designations so that people in the audience could understand what was permitted in residential areas versus commercial.

When it was over, the commission had approved the following recommendations for zoning:

- Section 36-R-1;
- Section 35-R-1;
- Section 34-zoned according to the restrictive covenants of Sierra Blanca subdivision, units 1 and 2, Mountain Villa Estates, Lakeside Estates and Eagle Creek, with the balance of the section as R-1, Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Users property, sections 33 and 34, zoned also at R-1;
- Section 33-the balance of B. L. Luck land, R-1; Eagle Creek Ski Area, C-1; Eagle Creek West Condos, R-3; R. W. Baxter, R-1; Roger Allen, R-1; High Country Lodge, C-1; Traylor and Rick Vineyard land, R-1; and the Johnson tract, C-1;
- Section 32-R-1;
- Section 4-Blood Ranch, R-1; Alto Crest I, one lot deep along highway, C-1; the balance of Alto Crest, R-1; Baxter land, R-1; Bryon Havens, R-1; L.G.M. Enterprises, R-1; Cecil Lance, R-1; S & J Venture, R-1; Ruidoso Land Company, R-1; Tall Pines, R-1; and the balance of section 4, R-1;
- Section 5-Blood Ranch, R-1;
- Section 8-R-1;
- Section 9-Alpine Village, R-1; Red Cedar, R-1; and the Ruidoso Land Company, R-1.

The commission's acceptance of the zoning proposals must now go before the Extraterritorial Zoning Authority for final approval. That is expected to happen within the next two weeks.

College-level courses to be offered here

People will be able to start college in Ruidoso this fall, in a new program to be offered by the New Mexico State University Alamogordo branch in cooperation with Ruidoso Municipal Schools.

Five undergraduate courses—freshman composition, psychology, sociology, speech and management—will be taught nights at the new Ruidoso High School. Freshman composition is a four-credit-hour class; the others carry three hours' credit.

The classes will meet in 90-minute sessions two days a week from September 10 to December 6. There will be Monday-Wednesday and Tuesday-Thursday classes.

Course offerings were selected because they are "good solid academic transfer courses" that can be transferred to New Mexico State or other colleges and universities, according to program organizers.

Costs of the coursework include a one-time \$10 matriculation fee; tuition of \$26 per credit hour; and a \$5 building use fee that goes to the school district.

High school seniors can take the college classes with the principal's permission, through the "Early Admit Program." A 3.0 grade point average is required to participate.

Organizers are seeking teachers for the five courses. A master's degree in

the discipline to be taught is required. Interested persons should leave a resume at the Ruidoso Municipal Schools administration office next to the old high school.

Information sessions on the new program will be conducted from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday, July 17, and Tuesday, July 24, at the administration building. Students will receive advisement and academic counseling then.

Actual registration for classes will take place from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesday, September 5, and Thursday, September 6.

Downs board reviews mobile home park deal

Once again, the Ruidoso Downs board of trustees discussed Jim Wimberly's proposed mobile home park Friday.

Don Dutton, attorney for the village, asked the trustees to review permission they gave Wimberly at their last meeting to build the park.

He had questions about a well Wimberly plans to drill and a water storage tank the developer plans to give to the village.

Wimberly said he thought the permit had been settled at the last meeting. "It appears to me you're looking for something you're not going to find," he said.

Mayor J. C. Day said he found an objection, about potential problems with too many animals.

The village has made mistakes in the past, Day said, and he stated that he wanted to be sure it did not make any new ones.

"I'm running out of patience," Wimberly said. "I've been trying to get this permit since February 23."

Dutton said Wimberly had not applied for a permit to dig a well, and Wimberly said he believed paperwork from the State Engineer's Office gave him the permission.

Trustee Conrad Buchanan said he wanted to be fair to both the village and Wimberly, then added he believed trustees had voted at their last meeting to approve a permit.

Dutton said his second concern, beside whether Wimberly was legally authorized to drill a well, was about the 50,000-gallon water storage tank, to be connected to the village water supply.

"My two concerns were drilling the domestic well and connections to the tank," he said.

Buchanan cited an agreement between Wimberly and the village about what would be built at the site. "If he (Wimberly) doesn't live up to the agreement, then we've got a problem," he said.

The developer vowed, "Once that building permit is issued, all my ducks will be in a row before I turn a spadeful of ground."

Dutton said the ordinance could be published Monday, and time for any appeals could begin then.

"In no way was I pointing a finger that Mr. Wimberly wasn't going to live up to his agreement," he said. "I just wanted to be sure we had apples and apples."

Wimberly then said he understood that "if for some reason I didn't get that well, the Village of Ruidoso Downs would still be obligated to serve me water."

Dutton said he did not interpret the situation that way, and trustee Jackie

Branum also indicated disagreement. In other business:

The trustees granted Men's Slow-pitch Softball League representative Gary Boyd's request for two portable toilets at a tournament planned Friday through Sunday, July 6-8.

Ruidoso Downs will pay for the facilities, which will cost about \$50. Boyd said 12 teams from Southern New Mexico would play, and he expects about 144 players.

Boyd said the league may plan another tournament in August, and a league tournament in September.

He also discussed the overflowing dumpsters near the field and claimed fast-pitch players leave bottles littering the park.

Clerk-treasurer Wilma Webb said village employees were fixing the ball park dumpster.

Day explained the meeting was held Friday instead of the usual Monday because trustee Jake Harris and Webb planned a trip to Santa Fe.

Ruidoso Downs will receive \$86,250 as a Community Development Block Grant for a water storage tank, as Day announced last meeting. The pair must attend a two-day meeting so the village can receive the money.

The next meeting is planned at the regular time, 7 p.m. Monday, July 9.

The council voted unanimously to authorize village officials to sign checks as needed. Banks request actions like Resolution 84-12 from public officials each year.

Buchanan received consent from the council for a roof on village dog kennels. He and Police Chief Charles Robinson met Lincoln County Humane Society members to discuss the roof. The trustees told Buchanan to ask for plans before the society could add a roof.

Day described a meeting he attended in Roswell Friday afternoon, just before the council meeting.

Mayors along Highway 70 from Clovis to Las Cruces want to rejuvenate an association of their communities. They want a four-lane highway along the entire route.

The group plans another meeting July 7. Day said communities along the route may have to pay small costs for the association.

Buchanan said Highway 70 averages 70 trucks per hour in Ruidoso Downs, and that making it a major route would lead to beneficial increases in traffic.

Village officials praised young Downs boxer David Ordorica, who was fighting in national competition in Saginaw, Michigan, at the time of the meeting.

Trustees received an agreement from Paul Vordermann about a proposed temporary building. He plans to sell seafood in it.

Firefighters respond to structure fire and forest fire

Local firefighters responded to two separate fires Saturday in the Ruidoso area.

Fire crews responded to a minor structure fire at 114 Johnson Road at 6:30 Saturday evening. The probable cause of the fire was reported to be a battery charger on the porch of the house.

Ruidoso, Forest Service and other area firefighters responded to a forest

fire at 9:39 p.m. Saturday on Snowflake Ridge behind the Swiss Chalet Motel. The fire was about a mile west of Highway 37 on the power line road, and was apparently caused by lightning or an unattended campfire.

No estimate of the acreage involved was available, but it was reported that the fire was minimal.



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

Our Brother, Mark came in second in the free-for-all men's foot race. But he does not need to feel badly; the lad that nosed him out, an Apache Indian, later set the state high school record in Arizona for the One-Hundred-Yard Dash. Now I have forgotten the boy's name.

The maidens going through the ceremony bring back many a fondly remembered name: Willie Magoosh, Dennis Treas, Sam Kenoi, Willie Comanche (medicine man), Jasper Kansea, Robert Geronimo, the En-jade boys, and many others.

The Mescalero Ceremony is one of the most ancient, authentic, and colorful of all American Indian rituals.

We know the whole four days will be great.

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

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Should pre-commitment be a qualification for a governmental appointment?

In anything except a general way, probably not.

Yet there is considerable evidence that the office of our (traveling) Governor may be making specific requests from people being considered for positions on boards and commissions.

Some people who were notified they were being considered for appointment to the Racing Commission, for example, say probing questions were asked about their willingness to go along with that plan to allow Spring racing days to the State Fair. The impression created was that they would not be named unless they were prepared to vote "yes" on that issue.

In light of direct statements made to other board members that "you should not serve here unless you can support whatever the Governor wants done," questions before selection of board members should not be surprising. After all, if you extract such a promise before the person is named, you will be spared the trouble of firing him or her later—and such firings have generated considerable heat for Toney Anaya in his year and a half in office.

Even more disturbing is the suggestion that those considered for appointment as regents at our universities are also being asked to take specific stands.

For instance, there is strong opposition to John Aragon, the president at Highlands University, in some of those who are closest to Governor Anaya. One of the members of the Highlands board resigned from that post after voting to continue Dr. Aragon's contract for another year. Rumors, which seem to be well-founded, suggest nobody will be appointed to that board who is not willing to get rid of Aragon at the proper time.

And when will that be? Well, about two years from now Toney Anaya is going to be looking for a job...

Those national competency tests for teachers seeking certification

become effective on July 1.

After that time, teachers new to any one of 12 specific subjects—for example, mathematics, Spanish, science or business education—must have passed a test in that subject. In addition, a three-part National Teachers Examination has been a requirement for all prospective teachers for a year.

Making those demonstrations of at least minimum knowledge a requirement has long been an announced goal of the State Board of Education. That goal has now been achieved.

The achievement was not without hard battles.

If the board's position can be defined as an effort to keep unprepared teachers out of the classroom, you would almost have to say that many in the educational hierarchy, especially the deans of some of our schools of education, seemed intent on allowing unprepared teachers into the classroom.


They will deny that was their motivation, and the denial is probably true. But the net effect of their rocklike opposition to our doing what we have done often gave that impression.

Adoption of the tests to be used was not some quick decision on the part of the Department of Education; nothing having to do with this topic is ever accomplished quickly.

A total of 480 educators in the state passed judgment on the specific tests before they were chosen—235 public school teachers and 245 university instructors. That's a pretty large jury. Then another gigantic panel, this time of 131 college educators, set passing grades. These were lowered to such a level as almost to assure total ignorance of the subject matter on the part of anyone who fails.

And there is one more protection for teachers who feel such testing is beneath their dignity: The Superintendent of Public Instruction can still waive the requirement for one year if there is evidence that a good teacher or potential teacher would be lost to the system without that.

At long last, competency testing has come to New Mexico, but it didn't come easily.

Editorial

A member of the previous village council expressed concern that one of the most important political entities in the county was overlooked by village officials and the public.

That entity is the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association. The association was created by the villages of Ruidoso and Capitan to hold ownership of about 600 acres of land and attached water rights along Eagle Creek.

It consists of three members from each village, who are appointed by the mayors with advice and consent of the governing bodies.

The association has traditionally concerned itself primarily with water matters. Last week, however, its members unanimously approved two requests to lease portions of land.

The Ruidoso Parks and Recreation Department plans to put a recreation complex on 22 acres, while the Ruidoso Summer Festival plans an amphitheater and parking on 40 acres.

Both projects sound like they will put the land to worthwhile use. But we are uncomfortable with the lack of public involvement in the decision-making process.

This is not the first time someone has cast their eyes at the 600 acres—Eagle Creek Ski Area was formerly association property, and the Ruidoso hospital considered relocating there.

If development is inevitable, we wonder whether a master plan for the entire acreage should be drawn up. Perhaps Greg Masters would form a committee to do that.

The Eagle Creek land belongs to the people of Ruidoso and Capitan, and the process of deciding on its use should involve the people more than it did last week.—TP

Reporter's Round

The streets of Ruidoso are lined with history, even going back into the 19th century.

I've always had an interest in the historical aspect of towns, particularly the older buildings which stand as monuments to the past, so I've tried to look into the Ruidoso area's history as much as possible.

Ruidoso may not have as much of a colorful past as Lincoln and White Oaks do, but we've got our share of "monuments to the past."

These buildings tell the story of a time when Ruidoso was a tiny village, back before the advent of the automobile and paved roads.

Probably the most famous historical building in the Ruidoso area is the Old Mill Curios on Sudderth Drive. It's a favorite subject for photographers and gives people a good idea what 19th century life was like in Lincoln County.

Another interesting building is the White Mountain Inn in Ruidoso Downs, a large white building behind the First Baptist Church.

I've tried to look into the background of this building but I don't know the exact date when it was built. However, several people I've talked to think it dates back to the late 19th century, and I tend to agree.

"When we moved here, we saw some data that said it was built in 1861," said Roy Mayo, the present owner of the White Mountain Inn. "I don't know if that's true. We don't have anything to substantiate it."

The inn is believed to have been used as an old stagecoach stop long before the automobile came into being. It might have been the only stage stop between Roswell and Alamogordo.

The old Wingfield home—now Wingfield's Wharf Restaurant—is another interesting building with historical importance.

It was the home of one of the pioneer families of Ruidoso and is one of the oldest buildings in this area.

But perhaps the most interesting part of Ruidoso is the Upper Canyon area, with its large number of rustic cabins.

The Upper Canyon is generally con-

sidered to be the first part of Ruidoso that was settled by families seeking summer homes.

Many of the cabins in the Upper Canyon date back to the mid-1920s, and some even before then!

There's a certain charm about the Upper Canyon that makes me think of life as it might have been back in the 1920s or 1930s.

The area is heavily shaded with trees, and a person driving through the area can get the impression that the Upper Canyon is isolated from the rest of Ruidoso in another time zone.

Probably the oldest cabins in the area are those near the Mesalero Reservation line at the end of the Upper Canyon.

They are believed to have been built in 1914-15 by several families looking for summer retreats.

About a year and a half ago, I struggled through the snow in the Upper Canyon to take photos of these old and rustic cabins.

Built near the Ruidoso River, the cabins presented a scene that resembled something out of a New England winter picture postcard.

In fact, traveling through the whole Upper Canyon area is like a trip into a previous era.

I can imagine old Model-T's driving up the dirt road, or even horse-driven carriages.

Log or frame cabins line both sides of the road, with plenty of trees around them. The cabins seem secluded and peaceful.

The old Noisy Water Lodge on the left hand side of the road driving up the canyon is one of the best known landmarks in that area.

It was built in the late 1930s, fairly recent compared to some of the cabins in the Upper Canyon.

The Upper Canyon is still popular as a place to live in the summer or throughout the year.

It's an important part of Ruidoso's heritage, a heritage that has a long and romantic history.

In recent years, Ruidoso's population has grown rapidly. Here's hoping we can keep our "monuments to the past" even while we grow.

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Paula Land earns doctorate

Paula Land was willing to pass up living in the same community with a crowd of fellow psychologists when she moved to Ruidoso.

The native of Levelland, Texas, said, "I've always wanted to live in the mountains." She had been familiar with Ruidoso as a tourist, she said, before starting to work in town last September.

"I'm on contract with the State of New Mexico to work with special education kids, but I work with a lot more than that," she said.

Land recently earned a doctoral degree in school psychology at the University of Texas (UT). She believes she may be the only person in Ruidoso who has earned such an advanced psychology degree.

She finished her doctoral dissertation late last year. "I worked on it all fall," she said. Then on April 17, she was on the Austin, Texas, campus for her oral examinations.

That time was a spring vacation in the Ruidoso schools, but she was working hard. The oral exams were the last step in the long process that began when she started studying at UT after earning a master's degree at Texas Tech University.

"I went summer and winter taking courses and teaching," Land said. She took courses for four years.

Also, she and a professor directed a family intervention program. In addition, she taught an educational psychology class and studied the attachments infants form with their mothers.

Land specializes in the treatment of children and families, and can work in school or private settings.

"I sometimes wish there were more people here that do what I do," she said. "It sharpens my skills."

However, there's a trade-off, she said. Her position offers a lot of independence and support within the Ruidoso Municipal School District.

Land has worked in various settings during her career, including a mental health center in Arizona after she earned her master's degree.

She prefers working with youngsters over working with adults. For one thing, the children accept her readily. Land said she had had no major problems with students.

They come to her based on referrals by teachers, parents and special education personnel, and from a variety of other sources. She also will refer people to the counseling center in Sierra Professional Center or hear referrals from the center.

Referrals and the other aspects of her field haven't always been important to Land. She didn't even start college wanting to be a psychologist.

"Until I was a junior, I was a chemistry major," she said. However, "I couldn't imagine not working with people." She switched to psychology, and enjoys the career evolution in the field she chose.

"I feel so lucky," she said. "I love what I do. It's draining, too, sometimes, but it's also really uplifting, to watch someone progress."

Another reason she likes youngsters, she said, is that they are so resilient as they work for that progress.

Many certified people who work in schools receive automatic raises when they earn doctoral degrees, but Land does not.

She is close to the pinnacle of training in her field, but has not quite reached it. The last step is obtaining a license.

She must complete more field work and pass oral and nationwide examinations before she can receive a license in New Mexico.

People who have such licenses are entitled to expand their work. For instance, they can advertise a private practice.

So, doctorate in hand, Paula Land is hard at work to get licensed in the field she loves.

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

It must be summer: Frank's Fruit Market open for 13th season

"If it's in season, we've got it," said Jean Cox, co-owner of Frank's Fruit Market. Her statement summed up the variety of fruits and vegetables available at the market, on Highway 70 East near Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Everything from string beans to muskmelons, mangos, apples and even yellow watermelons is available at the market.

According to Cox, who owns Frank's Fruit Market with her husband, Frank, this is the 13th season the market has been open. She said the market is open each year from May to the day after Labor Day, every day from 8:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m.

The market specializes in fresh fruit and vegetables "direct from farm to family," according to Mrs. Cox. She said three trucks are constantly on the road for the market,

gathering produce from farms as far away as Georgia and California.

Frank's also receives exotic produce, such as kiwis (a small fruit with a taste close to lime sherbet) from New Zealand, and papayas from Hawaii.

Jean said the market gets a lot of return business, with some people making special trips to the market from distant places.

"We have people who drive up here from Lubbock or El Paso," she said. "They don't come for the races, they come for the fruits and vegetables."

In the off season, the owners operate a similar market in San Angelo, Texas. The market there specializes in nuts, citrus fruits and Christmas trees.

Cox said she and her husband have operated produce businesses for 35 years. The market employs seven people. The phone number at Frank's Fruit Market is 378-4821.

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




