Business signals mixed

On the eve of Ruidoso's "official" summer season (July 4 to Labor Day) business leaders have mixed reviews on the business climate to date. And while some are not expecting as good a summer as in previous years, others are brimming with anticipation of better days ahead.

Tom Kelham of House of Kelham said his business is running comfortably ahead of last year. He showed an increase of 25 percent during the months of January through May, and expects to see a June increase of about 20 percent over a year ago.

"It's almost exactly what we forecast," said Kelham. He is looking for similar growth, about 25 percent, for the months of July and August.

He said he felt that the economy, which has improved to a certain degree, has allowed him to recoup much of the business that was missing two years ago.

Charles Johnson, general manager of the Village Lodge at Innsbrook, said he was anticipating a successful summer season, particularly in the next two months.

"Our business is real good," he said. "In fact, it's very good. I'm very pleased with it." He estimated that business has improved some 30 percent over the same time last year.

And July and August, he predicted, will be "as good, if not better."

At the Super 8 Motel in Ruidoso Downs, general manager Rick Arlaud said the weekends have been extremely busy. But he added that everyday activity has not been as busy as he would like it to be.

The 63-room motel, which opened last March, has no figures for last summer with which to compare. However, Arlaud said business had almost tripled over the last few months.

General manager Becky Smith at the Prime Time Restaurant said her business also has been confined primarily to weekends. "We might have more people here," she said of tourists in town, "but they're spread out."

She blamed the Texas economy as being one factor in the overall decline. She said she expected July and August to be "about the same" as June.

Richard Little, owner of Jackalope Square, said his business is off about 18 percent over last year. June is down 12 percent, he said, and July and August could come in five to 10 percent off.

"I think the main thing is that there's more competition," he said, "so the pie gets split more ways."

Three years ago, when he first set up shop in town, there were 12 gift shops, counting his. Now, he said, there are about 40. At the same time, he noted, there is more business

space available for rent this year than at any time in those three years, an indication of the turnover in the area.

"I've talked to quite a few business people," Little said, "and there isn't anyone super excited about business this year."

Yolanda Kittrell, day manager at Don Victor's Mexican Food, said her business has been outstanding, well ahead of last year.

"Our pre-season was better than we expected," she said, "so we think we'll have a terrific summer."

According to Rick Henson, general manager of Ruidoso-Sunland, Incorporated, which owns and operates Ruidoso Downs Race Track, business is looking good. The daily average handle is up 1.71 percent, with the daily attendance average up 7.91 percent over last year.

"We feel our daily handle should increase," Henson said. "And if our attendance stays up eight percent, I'll be tickled to death."

Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth said he hears the same question every year about this time. "Where the hell's the business? Well, business never starts until July."

He acknowledged that competition is "keener now than ever before." But he believes that business in general will be good, particularly for businesses that have established themselves over the past few years.

Cemetery conditions criticized

New regulations for the village-owned Forest Lawn Cemetery were instituted recently after former council member Al Junge raised questions concerning cemetery policy.

The new regulations state that in the future, only human beings will be allowed burial in the cemetery. It was also decided that village excavation contractor Jim Woodriddle will have an exclusive contract.

Junge gave the council the opinion that conditions at the cemetery were less than satisfactory. Lack of maintenance and lack of a set village policy were his primary complaints.

At the council meeting, Junge said he knew of at least one dog that was buried at Forest Lawn. He also told the council that individuals were allowed to perform excavations, "regardless of the damage caused by inept digging and backfill."

Joan Bailey, Junge's daughter, said she also had been dissatisfied with the cemetery's maintenance policy. Bailey said that after the recent death of her mother, she became more familiar with conditions at the cemetery, which she called "disgraceful."

"The cemetery is something that people don't want to think about ... like death and taxes ... and I'm not going to let go of this until something is done," she said.

The cemetery, located on Highway 37 North, had a total outlay expense of \$26,508.61 in the 1982-1983 fiscal year. The 1983-1984 budget, to date, has had an outlay expense of \$14,891.23. According to village manager Jim Hine, money generated by the cemetery stays in the cemetery budget.

"It's just like any other department in Ruidoso ... it's based on supply and demand," Hine said.

Bailey, however, thinks a few changes are in order. She said that during the last council meeting, Mayor George White quoted figures

stating that \$40,000 had been spent on maintenance and upgrading of the cemetery.

"I challenge that (budget figures) I think there is a misappropriation of funds if they have spent \$40,000 in three years out there," Bailey said.

Grave site appearance, water availability and ground and road maintenance were among her concerns.

"There isn't even a bench out here (at the cemetery) to sit on ... there should also be walkways so you know where you're stepping," Bailey said.

Another related problem, said Bailey, lies with the present procedures for purchasing a lot at the

cemetery. Bailey said she was uncomfortable purchasing her mother's grave plot from the same person to whom she paid her water bill.

Village employee Leona Budens said all village business is handled by her or one of the other clerks at village hall. "We're all clerks, regardless of the business," Budens said.

The procedure for purchasing a burial plot in Forest Lawn requires the selection of a plot from a platted map at village hall, with a fee of \$100 for the property. The contractor's fees for opening and closing a grave are \$300 during the week and \$400 on Saturday or Sunday.

According to Hine, the cemetery is professionally weeded twice a year. He said the Parks and Recreation Department also sponsors cemetery cleanups. According to Bailey, the ground is covered with hazards, including rotting pine needles.

"This is a mess ... it could be an inferno out here," she said, filtering through a pile of forest litter around her mother's grave site. "Even if we wanted to plant flowers around Mother's grave, we couldn't get the water to come out of the faucet," she added.

Bailey suggested that the council re-form the recently disbanded cemetery board. She said chairperson Billy Clarke cited lack of interest in attending meetings and performing duties as the primary reason for dissolution of the board. Bailey said she hoped to be appointed to the board, if a new one is formed.

"I'm a person of principles ... and until something is done to improve this cemetery, nothing will stop me," she said.

Chamber dues hike not yet firm

The Chamber of Commerce made no final decision last week on raising membership dues, contrary to one published report, but the matter is to be taken up again this week.

Confusion about what exactly had been decided at a closed session following last Wednesday's board meeting caused the premature announcement of a dues increase.

A budget workshop session is planned for today (Monday) to wrestle with the proposal, which would increase dues by a flat \$40.

The Roswell Daily Record had reported Thursday that the dues increase was in fact approved, effective July 1. But according to executive director Ed Jungbluth, the story was the result of misinformation he had received about discussion that took place in the closed session.

Jungbluth said he was not present for the closed session.

He said the budget committee would debate the dues increase today, along with other budget considerations, then present its recommendation to the full board of directors at noon Friday.

One man who honors flag

Four years ago on Father's Day, Wilbur Conley's children gave him a stick. He was pleased.

It wasn't actually a stick, but a pole. Attached to the 50-foot pole was an immense American flag. That's what pleased Conley.

Family members have flown the flag at Conley's Nursery since then. Their business is three miles east of Ruidoso Downs Race Track, at a bend in Highway 70.

In good weather, they run the 12-by-18-foot flag up the pole in the morning. In the evening or when bad weather threatens, they carefully take it down.

The Conleys wait for July each year, and not just for Independence Day. They have an even larger flag, measuring about 18 by 25 feet, which they fly in the summer.

"We fly it when the wind quits," Susan Conley Rains explained.

She and her father talked about their flag between serving customers at their thriving business.


"I've always wanted a large flag," Conley said. "It's probably one of the best single symbols of what this country stands for, of freedom."

Members of the Daughters of the American Revolution (D.A.R.) and other patriotic groups may describe how the red, white and blue symbolize courage, purity and loyalty.

The D.A.R. honored Conley with a certificate for flying the flag recently. They wrote that he is a fine citizen and that he hopes the flag will bring some joy or lift spirits as people come around the curve and see it.

Conley isn't that elaborate about his flag. When people see it on the slope near the Downs, he said, "everybody gets a boost, twingers down their backs."

When asked, he said he was a veteran of South Pacific fighting during World War II, but that that

wasn't extraordinarily important.

"Everybody needs to appreciate what we have," he said of his country.

All Americans should fly flags, he believes. Of course, they don't have to be as big as his flag. "Size doesn't matter," Conley said.

Angeles, California. The Conleys gladly give leaflets to interested nursery visitors. The order leaflets are printed in red, white and blue.

The Conleys work full-time or on weekends amid a glorious blanket of blossoms, beneath Old Glory. Wilbur and Edna Ruth Conley had four children: Doug, Susan, Ted and Corky.

Why not Carrizozo for airport?

In the recent events surrounding the location of the proposed Sierra Blanca Airport, the Carrizozo Airport often has been suggested as a possible site for the new airport.

Rumors for and against situating the airport there have been an integral part of the overall airport issue. However, according to Bob White, director of the state Aviation Department, constructing the new airport in Carrizozo is a virtual impossibility.

White said the Sierra Blanca Airport is destined to be a fully functional airport for the entire region. Such an airport, he explained, cannot be done in Carrizozo.

The main problem at Carrizozo is that it is not an acceptable location

for aircraft instrument approaches. White said the airport is surrounded by mountains on the east and south, and a White Sands Missile Range restricted area closely neighbors the airport to the west.

"It is just as much an obstacle as the mountains," White said of the restricted area. He termed the zone a "hard-core, primary" part of the missile range.

Due to these surrounding obstacles, White said, only visual weather condition approaches are permitted at the airport. He said a strict set of criteria is examined when determining if an airport qualifies for instrument landings, which depends largely on surrounding blocks of airspace that are obstacle-free.

White said the nearest area to the Carrizozo Airport that would qualify for instrument landings lies about 10

miles north and four miles west of Carrizozo. Location of the new airport there, some 50 miles from Ruidoso, probably would not happen, White said, because it would be simpler and less costly to just use the Alamogordo Airport or Roswell Airport, both comparably distant.

White was quick to point out that the Carrizozo Airport is a good facility for what it is designed to be. Also, he said the State Department of Transportation recently spent \$175,000 to upgrade the airport.

"Unfortunately, it's still not the type of airport we envision is needed to satisfy the requirements for the Sierra Blanca Airport," he said.

Another factor involves money. White said a large part of the funding



Meganette just too fast

Meganette, the filly who won last summer's Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, had to take a back seat to Burnell in the waning on Sunday's \$86,173 Rainbow Derby Consolation.

Burnell was made the 6-5 favorite in the sloppy 440-yard dash, while Meganette—despite having won six out of her last seven races—was nearly 5-2.

But Meganette showed little pity on her nine foes and led all the way for a commanding 1 1/2-length victory. Jockey Jerry Nicodemus was so confident of victory he didn't even use the whip.

Meganette collected \$17,706 which pushed her 1984 income up to \$24,256 and put her career total at \$307,184.

The filly by Dash For Cash out of Easy Secret is trained by H. Don Farris for San Jose Cattle Company of Pleasanton, Texas. The mutual payoffs: \$6.80, \$2.60, \$3.20.

Burnell—foiled again in his ongoing attempt to win big at Ruidoso—had to console himself with second-place money of \$12,394. Jacky Martin was up for Thomas E. Rack and Ace B. Walker of Corpus Christi, Texas. Fans who had backed the striking colt in the mutuels got back \$2.60 both to place and show.

Third went to Thats Whiskey Talk, a 33-1 outsider who mustered a strong move out of fifth place. Thats Whiskey Talk reached the finish a length behind Burnell, earning \$9,443 and handing out \$6.40 to show. Rudy Bustamante was up for Toni Bode of El Campo, Texas.

The Derby Consolation was a one-sided affair, with Meganette in command throughout. The only doubt came in the early yards when Burnell, breaking from the No. 9 post, delivered plenty of speed. Burnell was just off the pace at that point, and doing a good job of keeping up with Meganette.

But Burnell's problems developed when he was unable to shift into high gear and keep up with Meganette. The latter gained momentum as she neared the wire. Burnell ran evenly throughout.

Although the track was sloppy, Meganette was clocked in a sizzling 21.69 (which translates into a 98 speed index). The seasonal record is 21.62 (held by All-American Futurity winner Mr. Master Bug).

Meganette's upset of Burnell probably caught numerous Pic-Six players off guard. (The Consolation was run as the 10th race). The result was one Pic-Six ticket with six winners, worth \$14,308.60.

Here's the way the rest of the field got home in the Consolation: 4th - Allotta Dial, earning \$8,833; 5th - Elegant Envoy, \$8,263; 6th - Fetchen The Cash \$7,082; 7th - Master Request, \$6,492; 8th - Take It To Em, \$5,902; 9th - Pass N Call, \$5,312; 10th - Mr. Crimmon Bug, \$4,721.

Cattle Growers drop Site B opposition

Opposition to location of the proposed Sierra Blanca Regional Airport at Fort Stanton Mesa Site B decreased Thursday when the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association (NMCGA) voted to support the site if all other alternatives are ruled out.

The 200 Cattle Growers members at the Raton meeting passed a resolution with no opposition supporting the site. The members also stipulated in the resolution that New Mexico State University (NMSU) be compensated, if the site is approved, for replacement of all range experiments currently being conducted on the Fort Stanton Mesa site.

According to NMCGA President Don Hofman, the vote came as a result of the pressure of bad publicity the group received for opposing location of the airport on the mesa site. The Cattle Growers had opposed the location for the past six years.

NMSU, which holds a lease-type agreement to use Fort Stanton land from the Bureau of Land Management, opposes location of the airport on the mesa site, contending that important agricultural experiments will be disrupted.

Village of Ruidoso officials, Governor Toney Anaya, U.S. Representative for the Sierra Blanca Airport depends on revenue generated from the sale of the present Ruidoso Airport lands. He said the \$6 million to \$7 million in Ruidoso village funds from the sale of the property would not likely be spent on an airport in Carrizozo.

The preferred site for the airport is "Site B" on Fort Stanton Mesa. The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission, Joe Skeen and U.S. Senator Jeff Bingaman, among others, have indicated strong support for location of the airport there.

The New Mexico State University Board of Regents, holder of a lease-type agreement for use of the land from the Bureau of Land Management, favors some other site for the airport. The university has supported "Site A" on the mesa, an area declared unacceptable by many, including the Federal Aviation Administration.

Racing wrapup

Queen Elect bolted into the lead as soon as the gates swung open and led all the way for a tenacious half-length victory in Saturday's \$9,250 Aspen Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly, owned by Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas, gamely resisted a persistent attack from the oncoming Fly By Chopsticks in the final yards of the 5 1/2-furlong sprint for sophomore distaffers.

Suitably enough, both fillies are graduates of the 1982 Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale For Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings. Queen Elect was taken by Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas, for \$20,000. Fly By Chopsticks was acquired on a \$30,000 bid.

The Aspen triumph put \$5,550 in Queen Elect's account and that boosted her career income up to \$36,379. F. O. Martinez was in the saddle, substituting for his brother, O. A. Martinez Jr., who was banged up a bit—but not seriously hurt—in a spill earlier in the program.

Queen Elect is trained by Ruidoso's leading conditioner, William F. Leach. The mutual returns \$13.44, \$3.60, \$3.40. The filly is trained by Thomas A. Riley for the J.A. Leonard Cattle Company of Abilene, Texas.

Wistful Eye, owned by LeRoy Spires Jr. of Snyder, Texas, moved into second deep in the stretch but had to settle for third. She reached the wire a distant three lengths behind Fly By Chopsticks. Wistful Eye earned \$925 and refunded a \$4.80 show price. Casey Lambert was up.

Noble Carry made his seasonal debut in Friday's six-furlong headliner at Ruidoso Downs and bowled over an allowance field by five lengths.

The gelding, ridden by Leroy Coombs for James Bradley of Hereford, Texas, surged into the lead as he neared the turn for home.

From that point on, the rest of the field stood no chance. Noble Carry continued to open up eagerly and was alone at the wire in a clocking of 1:14 flat.

Overlooked by the betting public, Noble Carry returned \$28.20, \$15.60, \$4.80. Obviously Quick (\$5, \$3.20), a 9-2 shot piloted by Joe Martinez, had to settle for second. Third went to the 5-2 pick, Scout Hankins (\$3.20). Salustio Burgos was up.

High Street, the 6-5 favorite, had a flash of early speed, but this energy didn't last long, and the colt wound up fifth.

Lady Platoon launched a strong attack out of third place in Thursday's 6 1/2-furlong headliner at Ruidoso

Downs, but the filly had to hang on tenaciously in the final steps in order to nose out the 3-5 favorite, Devilishly Smashed. The two fought it out in side-by-side fashion throughout the stretch.

Lady Platoon, owned and trained by Ronald Patterson of El Paso, returned mutual payoffs of \$12.80, \$3.80, \$3.40. Apprentice Eugene O'Neill was up at a light 106 pounds.

The win was the first of the meeting for Lady Platoon from four outings.

Devilishly Smashed, piloted by Joe Martinez, was in contention from the first jump, and tried gamely to overhaul Lady Platoon. The chestnut filly handed out \$2.80 to place, \$2.60 to show.

Western Whirlwind, a 24-1 longshot ridden by Larry Hunt, made a big move in the final half-furlong and loomed up powerfully on the rail. But the filly had to settle for third, only a head behind Devilishly Smashed. The show price was \$5.20.

Thursday's eighth race Trifecta returned a fat \$8,463.60 after Shesamastergypsy, 8 1/2-1, nosed out Woody's Rocket, nearly 59-1, with six others (21-1) taking third. But that Trifecta return was still short of the seasonal Trifecta record of \$11,587, recorded on May 27.

Flying Arky, winner of the \$605,384 Kansas Futurity earlier in the current Ruidoso Downs meeting, faces his final stepping stone toward the Rainbow Futurity during Thursday's program.

The Kansas Futurity is the first leg of the Triple Crown for two-year-olds, and the Rainbow Futurity—enriched to the tune of some \$750,000—is the second leg. The third leg comes up on Labor Day with the renewal of the \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity.

The first nine races on Thursday's 12-race program will consist of 400-yard time trials for the Rainbow. Those contenders who hang up the 10 fastest times will meet in the Rainbow finale on Sunday, July 22.

A total of 83 two-year-olds will take part in Thursday's dramatic showdown.

The holiday turf card in the cool pines continues through Sunday, with a first-post of 1 p.m. each day. Friday's program offers the \$9,000-added Jet Deck Handicap at 440 yards, Saturday's spotlight is on the \$8,000-added Jockey Club Prep Handicap (for three-year-olds) at 6 1/2 furlongs and the \$7,000-added Ruffast Handicap (for two-year-old fillies) at 5 1/2 furlongs, while Sunday's main focus will be on the \$8,000-added First Lady Handicap at six furlongs.

Flying Arky, owned by Willie and Dee Talley of Athens, Texas, racked up a major score on June 3 when he tore through the stretch to post a nose win over A Cinch Or Better in the Kansas Futurity. The gelding raced at nearly 11-1 and hauled in almost \$200,000.

Pony Express rides again

The Lincoln to White Oaks Pony Express race this year will feature a \$3,000 purse. The 16th annual race is scheduled to begin at 8 a.m. Saturday, August 4.

Winners of previous races generally have turned in times of a bit more than two hours. Some won by a matter of seconds.

Riders have delivered thousands of letters during the races.

Breakfast at Double Crossing is scheduled at 6 a.m. this year. A rodeo, barbecue and dance are planned to follow the 40-mile race. A horseshoe tournament also is scheduled.

A \$50 fee will be charged to each one-rider or two-rider entry. It will be added to the purse. Riders may pay the fee and register up to the morning of the race.

The unique life-size puppets have performed from British Columbia, Canada, to New York. The troupe is based in Albuquerque. Members construct the puppets, write and perform their skits and songs.

They are publishing a booklet, "No Strings Attached," as an aid in

educating people about the art of puppetry.

"No Strings Attached" adapts a traditional form of Japanese puppetry known as Bunraku, which originated in the 17th Century.

Bringing life to each puppet requires synchronization by three puppeteers. They dress entirely in black and work against a black background.

The All and Everything puppets include four-foot Howard, seven-foot Conjure, a 12-foot fire-breathing dragon and a 25-foot Abraham Lincoln.

Tickets cost \$2.50 per person and are available from Noon Lions or at the door. Proceeds will fund Lions programs.

Around Sports with Gary Brown



The popularity of baseball always seems to peak around this time of the year.

On the local level, the Ruidoso Little League is about to select an all-star team for the regional tournament. On the national level, the major league races are driving into high gear and the all-star game is almost upon us.

So it's probably a good time to reflect on the first half of the major league season.

Certainly the best team so far has been the Detroit Tigers. Detroit really doesn't have any weak spots, and a blistering start has enabled the Tigers to take a solid lead in baseball's toughest division, the Eastern Division of the American League.

The worst team? Either the San Francisco Giants or the Cleveland Indians.

The Indians are annually one of the worst teams in the major leagues, and they were expected to retain that distinction this season.

San Francisco, however, has some excellent hitters in the Giants' lineup. But the pitching has fallen down, and that's pretty much sealed the Giants' fate.

In between the Tigers and the Indians and Giants, there's a whole range of teams who could be very good or mediocre.

The Tigers' division has several excellent teams and probably the best pitching staffs in baseball. Toronto would have an excellent chance of winning the title in any other division.

The American League Western Division is probably the weakest in the majors, but it also has the closest race.

All seven teams are close enough to make it a race to the wire. California has led the division most of the year, but defending champion Chicago is only a few games behind. Minnesota has stayed close all season, and

Oakland is beginning to make a move.

Perhaps the most interesting race is the National League Eastern Division.

Guess who is fighting for the lead along with the always-tough Philadelphia? The New York Mets and the Chicago Cubs.

The Cubs! Most of the people in this country weren't alive when Chicago last won a pennant (1945). The Cubs have started fast in previous seasons, but this year they seem to be a real contender.

Many people still remember the Mets' miracle 1969 season, when they came from behind in the latter stages of the season and won the division.

But New York didn't stop there. The Mets went on to win the National League pennant and the World Series in one of the greatest comebacks in sports history.

Will the Cubs or the Mets win it? I don't think so. If Philadelphia doesn't capture the flag, then Montreal or St. Louis will probably do so. All three of those teams have had plenty of pennant race experience.

Another new power this season is San Diego. The Padres looked impressive in taking two of three games from the Los Angeles Dodgers in the Dodgers' home park last week.

I think the Padres will win the Western Division. They've got several players who've played on pennant-winning teams while with other clubs. San Diego has steadily improved over the past three seasons and seems ready to take the title.

Neither Los Angeles or Atlanta seems to be solid enough to take the division. Houston, Cincinnati and San Francisco have far too many weaknesses to challenge.

But who will be in the World Series? I'm betting on Detroit and San Diego. The Tigers should win the series. Any team that can breeze through the American League East deserves the world championship.

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Rainbow Derby

attracts rich runners



Ten three-year-olds, packing total earnings of more than \$2.3 million, are matched in the 20th running of the Rainbow Derby at Ruidoso Downs on Wednesday, July 4.

The Rainbow Derby, one of the world's richest races and the middle jewel in the Triple Crown for sophomores, will cover the classic 440-yard distance.

The total purse (including the consolation and breeder's award) is a thumping \$594,230. The amount to be handed out in the July 4th finale alone is \$504,056.

First place is worth \$206,580—plus enormous prestige and potentially huge breeding value, particularly if the winner happens to be a colt.

The Fourth of July program launches a five-day holiday weekend in the cool pines. First post each day is 1 p.m.

Here are highpoints of the rest of the week: Thursday (July 5)—400-yard time trials for the \$750,000 (estimated) Rainbow Futurity are included in the 12-race program; Friday—the headliner is the \$9,000-added Jet Deck Handicap (for three-year-olds and up) at 440 yards; Saturday—key events are the \$8,000-added Jockey Club Prep Handicap (for three-year-olds) at 6 1/2 furlongs, and the \$7,000-added Ruffast Handicap (for two-year-old fillies) at 5 1/2 furlongs; Sunday—the topper is the \$8,000-added First Lady Handicap (for fillies and mares, three-year-olds and up) at six furlongs. The First Lady Handicap also carries a \$5,000 Breeders' Cup Premium Award.

Rise N High, a gelding who was purchased for only \$6,500 in the 1982 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs, looks like one of the fast guns in the Rainbow Derby.

The gelding has two major talking points: he has already proven his ability by running up career earnings of more than \$231,000, and he holds the top qualifying time of 21.655 seconds.

In the Rainbow trials, Rise N High raced as an odds-on favorite, under Steve Treasure, and swept to an impressive length win. That put his 1984 record at 1-0-2 from four starts, good for earnings of \$21,448. Included in his current record are a close fourth in the 350-yard Town Policy Handicap at Los Alamitos, and a third—only a neck away from victory—in the Los Alamitos Derby at 440 yards. He raced as a 10-1 outsider in that one.

Last year, Rise N High went to the races seven times, hanging up a 4-3-0 record and pulling in \$210,534. His major accomplishments include a second (at 13-1) to Indigo Illusion in the rich Faberge Special Effort Futurity at Los Alamitos (he was a half-length back at the wire), and a cruising 1 1/4-length victory in the 440 Ranches Futurity at Trinity Meadows. The latter provided a victory purse of \$49,984.

Rise N High is owned by C.E. Albrech and G.S. Boskovich Jr. of Newhall, California. The trainer is James F. Brookfield.

Indigo Illusion, the brilliant filly leased by J.E. Jumonville Jr. of Ventress, Louisiana, could easily be tabbed as the people's choice for the Derby. Her career income is a portly \$844,541, which makes her the 16th richest quarter horse of all time.

Her connections had enough faith to shell out a supplemental nomination fee of \$15,000 to get her into the Rainbow trials, and she came through with a 1 1/4-length win in the second-best qualifying time of 21.665. Robert Beard does the training.

Earlier in the current meeting, Indigo Illusion carried the top weight of 126 pounds against older horses in a division of the Go Together Handicap. She slipped on the first jump, but quickly regained her feet, and carried that hefty payload to a head victory as a 1-2 favorite.

So far this year, the filly's record is a perfect four-for-four, which produced winnings of nearly \$40,000. Last year, she did a tremendous job while posting a 10-2-0 record from 13 starts and collecting \$604,453.

Her win in the Faberge Special Effort Futurity came by a half-length at nearly 9-1.

Here are the qualifiers for the Rainbow: Barbarys Pokey, 21.870; New Years Special, 21.715; Racy Roman, 21.720; Fatti Dash, 21.795; On A Stormy Day, 21.795; Moons Lady Levi, 21.805; Fols Gold, 21.825; Easily A Twelve, 21.830.

Barbarys Pokey, a colt owned by John Kitzman of Cypress, Texas, rolled to a length win in the trials as a heavy favorite. In his previous try, he finished second by a length in the Kansas Derby Consolation.

Barbarys Pokey has earned \$8,935 so far this year with a 2-1-0 mark from three tries. Last year, he won four times from seven outings and banked \$37,328.

New Years Special, a \$5,700 purchase in the 1982 All-American Sale, got into the Derby finale by banging out a 1 1/4-length win as a 7-2 shot. His career earnings are at the \$55,000 level. He is owned by R. Nathan, Richard Fox and Benton Pruet of Albany, Texas.

Racy Roman, a gelding who operates out of the stable of Morris Stephens of Graham, Texas, is clearly a Rainbow heavyweight. The gelding made his mark earlier in the

meeting when he swept to a length win as a 4-1 shot in the finale of the \$287,304 Kansas Derby—the first leg of the Triple Crown. In the Rainbow trials, he left the gate as an odds-on favorite and coasted in with a 3/4-length lead.

Racy Roman has earned just over \$102,000 so far this year. In 1983 he went to the races 13 times, scored a 4-3-3 record and collected \$176,532. His landmark effort last year was a third (at 39-1) in the finale of the All-American Futurity. Third was worth \$153,500.

Patti Dash, owned by Betty J. Wells of Sulphur, Oklahoma, is a longshot

hope. The filly (a winner of less than \$6,000) got into the Rainbow finale by finishing second to Barbarys Pokey at 47-1.

On A Stormy Day, a winner of nearly \$166,000 thus far, has been well-seasoned against top-of-the-line company. In the trials, she ran second (at nearly 4-1) to Rise N High.

Moons Lady Levi, a filly who collected a respectable \$41,157 last year, wrangled her way into the Derby by nailing down third behind Barbarys Pokey. She was over 15-1 in the trials.

Fols Gold, owned by Floyd H. Jones Jr. of Norman, Oklahoma, collected a whopping \$539,362 last year. But the

colt had to settle for second behind Indigo Illusion in the Rainbow trials.

The bottom berth belongs to Easily A Twelve, whose brilliant stakes background includes a second to Racy Roman in the Kansas Derby. Last year, she won the \$237,835 West Texas Futurity at Sunland Park. On the final day of the 1983 Ruidoso meeting, she took fifth—less than a length away from victory—in the All-American Futurity. That effort netted a paycheck of \$77,500. Jerry Nicodemus is the rider.

The purse breakdown for the Rainbow Derby extends from that \$206,580 for first down to \$20,067 for last.

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Mescalero ceremonial this week

The Mescalero Apache Tribe is preparing for the opening day of the annual ceremonial dances and rodeo to be held July 4 through July 7. The highlight of the four-day celebration will be the maiden puberty rites—the coming of age ceremony.

Six maidens will participate in this year's ritual, which is scheduled to begin at dawn on Wednesday. One of the oldest Mescalero Apache tradi-

tions, the coming of age ritual signifies a girl's transition into adulthood.

This year, participating maidens are Rona Morin, 15; Sarah Kazhe, 13; Winifred Comanche, 13; Neida Gerónimo, 15; Marcene Fernando 13; and Pamela Morgan, 13.

The maidens participate in the age-old ceremony with eight days of ritual that includes personal sacrifice, blessings of medicine men, and the nightly dance by tribal members of the Dance of the Maidens and the

Dance of the Mountain Gods.

Festivities will continue throughout the four-day celebration. The fifth annual Mescalero Celebration Parade will be held July 7, with the theme, "We Cherish our Heritage." The parade will assemble between the old post office and the Old Road Restaurant, and will caravan to the ceremonial grounds.

Traditional and modern games—including wood chopping contests, cigarette rolling and greased-pole climbing—are schedul-

ed on the ceremonial grounds from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Wednesday and Saturday and from 10:30 a.m. to noon Thursday and Friday.

Fireworks were live ammo

On July 4, 1776, men of European origin were fighting in America as the Declaration of Independence was signed.

On July 4, 1944, Americans were fighting in Europe. Glen Pace was one of them. He had participated in the mammoth D-Day landing in Normandy, France, less than a month before.

On July 4, 1984, he and his wife, Berdell, live in Ruidoso and in Levelland, Texas.

Pace was among many veterans of American wars who recalled World War II during the 40th anniversary of the D-Day invasion.

He was a staff sergeant for the Ninth Division Infantry, 359th Regiment, Third Battalion headquarters unit of the United States Army.

"We landed in support of the Fourth Infantry at Utah Beach," he said, although "they didn't really need us. It was two or three days before we did much fighting."

"Of course, we were under infantry fire." When his unit was on the beach, red-hot shrapnel knocked sand into his eyes.

"I was a radio man." Shrapnel hit his equipment, but didn't put it out of commission. "We were lucky on that day."

Pace believes "when my time has come, it's come." However, "I always think I'll be one of the lucky ones."

During the invasion, he said, "I

landed on an LCT." The Landing Craft Tank was loaded with headquarters equipment.

"We had to pull jeeps ashore. We just got in at a good time." Shelling had temporarily stopped. "They did a lot of shelling after we landed."

In Normandy, Pace said, "there were more casualties from mortar fire than anything else."

"We left England about 8 a.m. There were ships as far as you could see, all the way back to England."

"We went in under the guns of the Battleship Texas," Pace said. "It was comforting."

He is a native of Texas. He first learned about radio in his home state, and he left home to join his Texas-Oklahoma unit.

Pace had gone to Los Angeles,

California, to go to school, but didn't like it and moved back to Texas. He took a correspondence course and ran a radio shop for a few years before the war, in addition to farming.

He was drafted after the military rejected him once because of an ear problem. He first went to Fort Sill, Oklahoma, then to Abilene, Texas, and then to a station in Louisiana.

Pace received desert training in Arizona and California. "Then on January 1, 1944, they loaded us on a train and sent us to New Jersey."

He said, "I could have gone into the Signal Corps, but I got attached to that unit." Pace ran communications for his battalion.

Most of the men in his headquarters group were in their 20s. When they picked up reinforcements at Camp Dix, New Jersey, many of them were younger. During the invasion, Pace was 29 years old.

"The first man in my section who was killed was 38," he said.

When his unit left New Jersey, it boarded the British ship Athlone Queen in the same convoy that included a temporarily refitted Queen Mary. They headed for England.

"It took us 14 days to get there. We went real slow."

They landed at Liverpool, then moved to a town near Birmingham. The unit participated in a practice invasion, but he didn't go.

"I had a wisdom tooth pulled," he said.

In June, he did participate in the invasion. Most radio operations in Normandy were in code and in the dots and dashes of Morse Code. The encoding changed at least every day, he said, and radio operators had to keep track of it.

During July 4 picnics this year, Americans might think about Pace's food supply during the landing. It was semi-sweet chocolate bars, he said. "We went 22 days from D-Day without a kitchen meal."

During one battle, Pace was sent about 15 or 20 miles behind the lines. "All of a sudden, shwoot-bang," he said. A shell landed near them.

As fighting continued after D-Day, Pace went with his unit almost as far as Czechoslovakia.

When Pace was evacuated, "I'd seen almost 11 months of continuous combat." He was worn out.

"I had a fever, something like hepatitis. They sent me back to a hospital. I stayed in that evacuation hospital four or five days."

He was then sent back to a replacement depot. The fighting in Europe ended while he was there.

"I didn't think I'd ever go back to my outfit," Pace said, but he did. He was shipped home in September 1945.

Pace fondly remembers one war experience. He was in a hotel on the German-Czech border. "We stayed in that hotel two weeks. I really enjoyed it."

In the Bavarian Alps of Germany, he stayed in the Golf Hotel. The food was so good, he said, "we nearly killed ourselves." That hotel offered another luxury. "I had a bed," Pace explained.

"I laid down and ka-wam, ka-wam, something was hitting the side of the hotel."

German soldiers were shooting bazookas at the hotel. "We called in artillery on them," Pace said.

His unit fought in Europe, but he was ready to go to Asia to fight. "If

they'd needed us, we would have gone," he said. The soldiers felt a sense of purpose.

Despite his wartime experiences in Europe, Pace has never returned there. He and his wife discussed going back for the D-Day reunion this year, but decided they couldn't spare the time and the money.

They regularly attend division reunions in this country. The Ninth Division proudly wore the T-O patch, since many members were from Texas and Oklahoma.

On this July 4, Pace can look back on trips all over the country. "We've been as far as Minneapolis."

The story of Glen Pace is the story of one soldier. Thousands of soldiers have thousands of similar stories.

On this 40th Independence Day since D-Day, all of their stories are worth remembering.

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Seatbelts a must for children and adults

At a Tuesday program for parents of young children, Paula Miller told them, "You need to use your car seat every single time."

She was talking about how often they should use the infant and toddler safety device when they drive with their children.

A father and four mothers brought their children to the morning slide show and talk for the area car seat loaner program.

Miller spoke in the Ruidoso Health Office in the Lincoln County substation behind Ruidoso village hall. She works for the New Mexico District Six Health Department, out of Roswell.

Then Cathy Johnson, who works at the county office, demonstrated use of the sturdy white plastic carriers.

They are shaped like barrels with one high side, which is positioned to face the front of a vehicle. Pads and straps secure babies in them. Parents may borrow the seats for nine months before returning them.

Miller is convinced car seats are needed safety devices for babies. Her slide show said a collision can throw an unprotected baby into a dashboard with the same force as a three-story fall.

She also detailed the year-old New Mexico law which requires the use of car seats. Children younger than one year must be in a federally approved car seat in any vehicle in the state, she said. Parents who break the law are subject to fines.

Children ages one to five years must be in a car seat or buckled up on the back seat of a car.

In a pickup truck without a back seat, she continued, all available seat belts must be used. She described parents with two children who ride in a truck with three belts. The driver must use one belt, the baby's car seat must use one, and the third belt must also be used.

Car seats for babies weighing less

than 20 pounds are designed so that the children ride in them facing the back of the vehicle.

They generally use straps over babies' shoulders, around their waists and between their legs. The slide show cautioned that putting sack-shaped clothes or blankets around babies before putting them into the seats could cut the safety of the seat.

The car seats sold for bigger toddlers are generally strapped in so the children face the front. Some convert from the infant to the toddler setup.

When babies sit up at home alone, they're usually ready for the forward-facing seats.

Miller emphasized that young children of all sizes must be strapped into their seats every time they are in a vehicle. About 75 percent of accidents occur within 35 miles of home, she said.

"It's really important that you wear your seatbelt, too," she said. When she asked adults in the audience how many had worn their seatbelts to the meeting, no hands were raised.

She said that that was not unusual, but she wishes it was. Parents must wear their belts when they are with their children for two reasons, she said.

First, children watch and imitate their parents. Second, if an adult is not strapped in and is thrown around in the vehicle, she or he can harm a child who is protected.

Miller continued to answer questions and receive the sign-up sheets from parents. About a dozen car seats have been loaned from the Ruidoso office, including the ones given to parents Tuesday. More have been distributed in Carrizozo.

More than 800 seats have been loaned to parents in the district, which includes Chaves, Eddy, Lincoln and Otero counties.

In addition to the seats, the health office distributes leaflets. Parents who seek more information or a car seat may call Johnson at 258-3252.

Racetrack traffic challenges Downs PD

When it comes to driving in Ruidoso Downs, Police Chief Charles Robinson has two pieces of advice. Do not drive in the Downs when you're drunk, he said, and obey speed limits.

The primary purpose of traffic law enforcement is increased safety, he said. Drivers may grumble about small-town speed traps, but ticket revenue isn't the main reason for fining speeders, according to Robinson.

The chief looks at statistics and sees other results of intensive enforcement.

When he became chief more than two years ago, he said, 40 or 50 Ruidoso Downs accidents were reported per year. Now, the total is down to 28.

"Last year we wrote quite a few citations," he said. Speeding has diminished.

The patchwork speed limits on Highway 70 in the Downs cause problems, he believes. "I wish it was the same speed all the way," he said. "There's a lot of fluctuation."

In the Hollywood section near Ruidoso, drivers can legally go up to 40 miles per hour. Near Ruidoso Downs Race Track, the limit is 45 m.p.h. In the built-up section of the village, it drops back to 40 m.p.h. Then at the eastern edge of the Downs, it returns to the highway limit of 55 mph.

Robinson has asked the village to drop the limit to 40 mph all along Highway 70. On dirt roads off the main street, the speed limit is 25 mph. The chief contradicted rumors that officers write more tickets for Texans than for people from other states.

"We used to get complaints that we were writing Texans," he said, but drivers with Texas plates do not get as many tickets as people from New Mexico.

The department handles traffic from many states and tries to cut accidents.

"Thank goodness we're fairly level," Robinson said. Winter snow isn't the problem on Downs roads that it is on other area streets.

On the other hand, summer track traffic does contribute to accidents. The stop-and-go nature during traffic backups on race day evenings contributes to accidents. Drivers can become involved in chain reaction accidents.

"A lot of people want to run the shoulder of the road," Robinson said. Avoiding traffic that way is illegal, and when drivers try to merge back onto the pavement, they provoke accidents.

On race days, the Ruidoso Downs Police Department usually has two officers directing merging in the evening.

On busy race days, such as when futurities are run, the whole department may direct traffic.

The Downs officers must be the most experienced in traffic control in the state, Robinson said.

At all times, the officers are alert for drunk drivers. Last year, they made about 75 arrests for driving under the influence of alcohol.

"Santa Fe is impressed with our record. That makes me feel good," Robinson said.

When the police aren't busy on the roads, they answer other complaints, including domestic trouble and animal control.

"We've just about doubled our calls compared to last year," Robinson said.

The department has not doubled. It now numbers five officers, just one more than last year. Although the department is short-handed, Robinson said, the officers have set another goal. They want to increase dog licensing.

Owners can help the enforcement effort by going to village hall to get licenses for their pets.

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

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—Let your fingers do the walking through the yellow pages—and you'll learn a lot of sociology. Ads, after all, tell any close observer a lot about the society which generates them.

Take the new Santa Fe phone directory, for instance, recently distributed. One of the most rapidly expanding classifications it contains is headed "Alcoholism Information and Treatment Centers."

Just a few years ago there was no such heading. Now, even for what is after all only a minor-league city, it offers a choice of 20 listings of those who specialize in treating men and women addicted to booze.

Are we becoming an alcoholic society, or is it that we are only now beginning to admit the existence of our common ailment?

If the latter is true, as some students of our society insist, that is a good thing. This particular disability seems to be one which will not respond to treatment till its presence has been candidly acknowledged.

So what are we going to do about all the booze-hounds in our midst?

Give them our sympathy, maybe even our prayers—but if they are caught driving while drunk, throw the book at them.

That's what New Mexico law now calls for.

Effective July 1, those much-toughened laws to punish citizens who drive under the influence of alcohol took effect.

(Don't we some how diminish and trivialize that offense when we hide it behind the TV-cop-type designation, "DWI"? Wouldn't we be wiser to come right out and use uglier words like "driving while drunk"?)

Among other things, our new laws include these provisions:

—A stiffening of penalties against juveniles found guilty of this kind of misconduct.

—That's singling out one group in our society for special punishment, admittedly. But those under 21 have singled themselves out in this regard: They kill more people in alcohol-

related auto accidents than the rest of the population does.

So when they are found guilty of driving while intoxicated, they will now lose their driver's licenses (a kid's proudest possession) for six full months.

If they are found driving thereafter with even enough alcohol in their blood to reach .05 on the test (as compared to an adult's .10), they will lose their license for a year.

—As for those older folks, they share part of the juveniles' punishment for two or more convictions on the drunk-driving charge.

From now on the courts will no longer issue those limited licenses, or "work permits," which used to be so common. People got one of those simply by going into district court and demonstrating that they needed a car to get back and forth to work or to earn their livelihood.

No more, for either adults or juveniles found guilty after a prior conviction on the same offense or a prior court-ordered attendance at drunken drivers' school.

Wait till you hear the howls from the first travelling salesman who allows himself to get into this situation. He will claim the court is taking away his means of livelihood. The court may well reply that the driver should have thought of that before drunkenly turning the key in the ignition.

There's no good pretending these are superb examples of stiffening up the laws; they aren't. But they are as much as our Legislature could nerve itself to take as first steps.

If they help, if the accidents per 1000 miles travelled decline, and with them the injuries and deaths that mixing alcohol and gasoline lead to, every sober citizen will want to see things made even tougher.

What drunks do with their own lives, though tragic, is personal. But they should not be allowed to threaten the lives and limbs of all the rest of us.

On July 1, New Mexico started delivering that message a little more loudly and clearly.

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Reporter's Round

"When you've been someplace for 44 years, you get to learn about the area," Leota Pfingsten was saying the other day. "In 1940, I got married and moved to this side of the mountain. Before that I didn't know there was anything on this side of the mountain."

She laughs heartily, as she always does, and then mentions how it used to be in the Hondo Valley, back when neighbors were scarce and news was light. There wasn't much going on in those days. Ranchers were the dominant breed then, with a few farmers filling in the gap.

Leota was but a young lass, taking in the great beauty that remains still. A curious and interesting lady, she grew in knowledge of the area as the area grew. New faces, new lines of ownership began to change the face of the valley. But what it had been before never really faded.

So it was with the small community of Lincoln, a quiet place with the charm of yesteryear. As the years progressed, though, it became evident that what Lincoln had in history and appeal was something that could eventually be lost to time and progress.

Leota says a group of residents began to feel that "things were coming in that they wanted to prevent." An ordinance to preserve the Lincoln of old was established, and, for 10 years, residents tried to adjust to it as they tried to understand it.

From there things got a little complicated. A new ordinance was proposed and written that would better define and clarify what exactly would be the future of the small town.

Rolling up her sleeves, Leota joined in the massive task of preserving the history of Lincoln. I say massive because not only was the proposed ordinance to replace a previously enforceable ordinance, it was to cut through differences of purpose and direction that at one point threatened to set "neighbor against neighbor," as County Commissioner Bill Elliott once put it.

The final result, 20 weeks in the making, is a sizable document that weighs in at just under a pound. Laid out on plain white bond, the pages are filled with specifications and line drawings, giving it the unmistakable appearance of formality and authority.

But, obviously, there's more to it. A good deal of thought and feeling went into drawing up the ordinance, and that too is as evident as the very ideal of preserving the town in the first place.

A couple of weeks ago, the county commissioners appointed five people to the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board. In their hands was placed the formidable job of administering the provisions of the ordinance, which takes effect next week.

Leota Pfingsten happens to be one of those appointed. And fortunately so, I think. To hear her talk about the ordinance is to think the commissioners wise men of boundless foresight. What they have done, quite simply, is to place on the board someone who understands change and who realizes that the best documents are those that remain alive.

"Of course, there'll have to be amendments," Leota figures. "We have to use common sense. Ten years ago we didn't know about wind machines for the orchards. So we have to be flexible, especially in the area of agriculture."

She says the purpose of the document is to generally preserve, to retain in Lincoln those aspects of significance that have come to speak of culture and history. Leota knows a bit about those things, having worked at the Lincoln County Heritage Trust museum that caters to the past.

"I don't think you'll find many towns in our area that have stayed like we have for ten years," she points out. "The tourists I see at the museum always comment about the town. They say, 'This is absolutely wonderful!' They can't believe how clean it is."

Holding on to a town's past may be a little like longing for the old days, when Guy Lombardo sang with the Big Bands and pizza was only a quarter.

Yet it says something of the people that suggests a sense of priority and a concern for future generations. Lincoln County is on the path of growth and there's no turning back. To preserve a town before the onslaught is to treasure the future as much as the past.

Leota says the ordinance has a definite place in the town of Lincoln. "It'll keep it the special place that it is."

The following is a general summary of the subject matter contained in Ordinance No. 84-13. The preamble generally recites that certain preliminary action, including the levy of assessments, has been taken by the Governing Body in connection with the "Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, Sewer Assessment District No. 5" (the "District") and the making of certain sanitary sewer improvements therein...

ed and the Bonds (as hereinbelow defined) have been sold to Stern Brothers & Co. (the "Purchaser"), Albuquerque, New Mexico, and associates.

Section 1 ratifies all prior action taken in connection with the District, the improvements therein, the levy of assessments therefor and the sale and issuance of bonds for the "Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, Sewer Assessment District No. 5, Sewer Improvement Bonds/Series July 1, 1984" (the "Bonds") to the Purchaser for a price of \$500 per each \$1,000 of the Bonds and accrued interest.

Section 2 authorizes, empowers and directs the Village Treasurer to receive and enforce all assessments due in connection therewith; and to disburse said assessments to proper persons; pursuant to this ordinance.

Section 3 authorizes, empowers and directs the Village Treasurer to receive and collect all sums due in connection with the assessments and to disburse said sums to proper persons, according to law, and Village ordinances and resolutions; requires all sewer improvement assessments unpaid after May 8, 1984 to be paid into a Special Assessments and Bond Retirement fund (the "Bond Fund") which is pledged exclusively to the Bonds.

Section 4 states that the Bond Fund is a trust fund.

Section 5 provides that if the owner of any assessed lot or parcel of land is delinquent for 60 days in the payment of any sum due in connection with said assessments, the Council shall give written notice to the Purchaser and the delinquent owner, and if not paid within 10 days thereafter, the Council shall foreclose the special assessment lien against the delinquent property at its own expense and as provided for the foreclosure of mortgages on real estate or otherwise and if there is no purchaser therefor at public sale, the Village shall purchase the lot or parcel at a certain minimum price; provides that any bondholder may file and petition for the foreclosure of the lien of the delinquent owner on the Bonds from federal income tax.

Section 6 further provides that if there is no purchaser at the sale of the property, the Village shall bid for the property from any available funds and take certificates or deeds for the benefit of the bondholders; and authorizes the Village to lease or sell the property and to deposit proceeds therefrom into the Bond Fund.

Section 7 authorizes the Bonds in the amount of \$272,984; sets forth the detail of the Bonds including but not limited to providing that the Bonds shall consist of 55 Bonds in the denomination of \$5,000 each except bond numbered 1 which is in the denomination of \$3,984, and that the Bonds shall be numbered from 1 to 55, dated July 1, 1984, payable July 1, 1984, all interest payable July 1 and January 1 of each year, commencing January 1, 1985, at per annum rates of 11.00% and 12.00%; providing for continuation of interest at the same rate per annum, if unpaid at maturity; and providing for the place and manner of payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, including provisions for payment of interest, regular record date and special record date.

Section 8 provides that all Bonds are subject to prior redemption in regular numerical order on any interest payment date at par and accrued interest; provides that after any assessment installment date, if money in the Bond Fund exceeds the interest due on the next Bond interest payment date, the Village shall call for redemption on the next interest payment date as many Bonds as permitted by said excess; provides for 15 days' written notice of prior redemption by publication and mailing; and sets out other detail concerning prior redemption.

Section 9 provides for registration, transfer, replacement, delivery and holding in custody of Bond certificates and cancellation of and registration records for the Bonds.

Section 10 permits the Bonds to be refunded provided that the Bonds may not be called for prior to the expiration of the purpose of refunding and the Bonds may not be refunded unless it is certain that there will not be sufficient moneys in the Bond Fund to regularly pay the Bonds.

Section 11 provides that the Bonds are negotiable instruments, and are to be governed by the Uniform Commercial Code—Investment Securities.

Section 12 authorizes the Mayor, Clerk and Treasurer to file their signatures with the Secretary of State, provides for the execution and authentication of the Bonds; provides for the use of facsimile signatures and a facsimile of the Village seal; and provides other detail in connection therewith.

Section 13 provides that the Bonds and interest thereon are payable solely from the Bond Fund.

Section 14 provides that the Bonds are not general obligations or a debt of the Village; that the bondholders have no claim to any general or other fund except as herein provided; that the payment of the Bonds is not secured by any encumbrance or other pledge of property except for special assessments and that subject to said exception no property shall be forfeited or taken in payment of the Bonds.

Section 15 provides for the form of the Bonds, certificates of authentication and assignment form.

Section 16 provides for the form of the Bonds, certificates of authentication and assignment form.

Section 17 requires the Village to maintain accurate books and accounts concerning payment of the Bonds and interest and concerning collection and disbursement of special assessments, to permit an inspection of the books and accounts at reasonable times and to cause a statement concerning said books and accounts to be prepared each year and to be furnished to the Purchaser; requires the detail of said statement relating to bank accounts for such funds and contains other detail concerning the foregoing.

Section 18 provides that Bond proceeds will be invested but not so as to become arbitrage bonds or to otherwise imperil the exempt status of the interest on the Bonds from federal income tax.

Section 19 provides for successor registrars or paying agents for the Bonds.

Section 20 authorizes the Village officers to take all necessary action to effectuate this ordinance, including printing the Bonds and executing necessary certificates and agreements specified therein.

Section 21 permits any bondholder to commence any court action which may be necessary to protect the liens created by this ordinance on said special assessments which may be necessary to compel the performance of any duty imposed by this ordinance or any other ordinance concerning this district; and provides that failure of any bondholder so to proceed does not relieve the Village officers of the obligation of performing said duty.

Section 22 permits amendment or supplementation of this ordinance upon consent of the owners of 75% of the outstanding Bonds, but also makes several exceptions to said rule.

Section 23 declares an emergency, provides for the publication hereof by title and general summary and for the effective date hereof.

Section 24 specifies this form for publication.
