Heavenly day!

21-1 longshot captures Sunday's Rainbow Futurity

Heavenly, a 21-1 longshot owned by Ft. Worth businessman Roy Browning, completely dominated Sunday's 21st running of the \$777,720 Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

It was a shocker of the first order as Heavenly exploded out of the gate to take the early lead in the 400-yard middle jewel of the Triple Crown for two-year-olds.

Heavenly encountered some early opposition from the 3-2 favorite, Miss Mitedo, who was going after her seventh straight win (against no defeats).

Miss Mitedo, owned by J. W. Ham of Odessa, Texas, tried her best to match Heavenly's early lick, but it was apparent from the start it would be a tough assignment for the people's choice.

When Heavenly reached the midway point of the stretch, she ignited her afterburners and took off. At the finish, she was impressively in command with a 1 1/4-length gap.

The filly never faced a serious challenge and picked up a fat paycheck of \$276,058. Steve Harris was up Jack Brooks, who has trained numerous stakes winners at Ruidoso Downs, is the conditioner.

That gross purse of \$777,720 included \$659,902 split up by the 10 finalists, plus the \$112,817 which went in Saturday's Rainbow Consolation, plus a five-grand award to the winning breeder.

In winning the Rainbow Futurity in such commanding fashion, Heavenly became a prime candidate for the upcoming \$2,530,000 All-American Futurity. The filly is by All-American Futurity winner Pie In The Sky, out of Handy Dancer. She was bred by R. S. Bowers.

Heavenly returned mutuel payoffs of \$44.20, \$18 and \$5.20. The winning time, on a fast track and against a headwind, was 19 9/2 seconds.

Prohibition, carrying odds of just over 5-1, moved gamely in the final strides to overtake Miss Mitedo for second. The difference between the

two was only a nose. Prohibition, a gelding owned by McDermott Ranch of Madisonville, Texas, collected \$126,198 for second. Roy Brooks was up. The mutuel returns: \$7.80, \$4. Thomas Zarate is the trainer.

Miss Mitedo, piloted by Larry Byers, earned \$64,676, which pushed her career earnings to \$138,167. The show price was \$3. Larry Keiter does the training.

Raise The Gamble, a \$15,000 purchase in the 1983 All-American Select Quarter Horse Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs, picked up plenty of esteem with a closing rush which put him in fourth place. The colt ended only a head behind Miss Mitedo and earned \$33,915 for his owner, David Reede of Fort Smith, Arkansas. Troy Crissup was in the saddle.

Heart Streaker, a 17-1 longshot breaking from the rail post, lost his bearings shortly after the break, and bolted into the rail, tossing Jacky Martin to the turf.

Martin was taken to nearby Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital, where X-ray examination appeared to indicate no serious injuries.

Here's the way the rest of the field got in, with purse money earned: 5th - Streak Laico Bird, \$30,760; 6th - Decidedly Cute, \$29,972; 7th - Cash For Sis, \$29,183; 8th - A Cinch Or Better, \$28,394; 9th - Heart Streaker, \$27,605.


Flow Of Cash was scratched, but earned \$13,136 nonetheless.

A Cinch Or Better, a 4-1 shot, reared at the start, cut himself while getting out of the gate, ran about 25 yards, then slowed down. Decidedly Cute reared before the start.

Sunday's co-featured \$14,825 Jockey Club Stakes at seven furlongs went to Annie's Dancer (\$8.80) by three lengths.

There were no six-win tickets in Sunday's Pic-Six wagering, which set up a carryover total of \$26,890 for Thursday's Pic-Six pool.

Fill Mackis Cup recorded his fourth

straight win in Saturday's \$10,550 Sierra Blanca Handicap at Ruidoso Downs and took another step toward the thoroughbred Horse-Of-The-Meet crown.

The gelding turned in an impeccable performance while rolling to a 3 1/2-length score in the 6 1/2-furlong duel and setting a seasonal record of 1:19 5/2 seconds.

Fill Mackis Cup enjoyed the

pleasure of winning with considerable ease against a blue-ribbon field which included the reigning kingpin in Southwest handicap circles, Curribot.

The latter, going after his fifth straight win (as a 3-2 second favorite) was well out of range throughout most of the race. But, much to his credit, he came on courageously in the stretch under his hefty load of 128 pounds, and had to squeeze through tight traf-

fic. Scotts Sissy, an 18-1 outsider hauling a light 111 pounds, also finished with an eager salvo, and reached the wire in second place, a head in front of Curribot.

Fill Mackis Cup, owned by Mack Yates of Cherokee, Texas, was made the 6-5 favorite, probably on the strength of his previous outing, in which he set Ruidoso's track record

for seven furlongs. He hauled 123 pounds in the Sierra Blanca. Joe Martinez was up.

T.V. Repairman, a 20-1 longshot, opened up a five-length lead during the backstretch, but was pretty well spent when he turned for home. Fill Mackis Cup, trained by Bill Leach, literally shot out of the pack to take the lead. The gelding was moving smoothly, under no strain whatever, when he straightened out for the stretch run. He opened up his lead with every stride toward the wire.

Fill Mackis Cup earned \$6,300, which lifted his 1984 earnings to \$19,711, and put his career total at an impressive \$187,604. He came out of the Sierra Blanca with a 1984 record of 4-2-0 from six starts. The mutuel payoffs: \$4.20, \$2.80, \$2.60.

Scots Sissy, ridden by Ramon Apodaca, earned \$2,321 and paid \$10.40, \$4.80. The gelding is owned by Anthony Williams of Albuquerque.

Curribot, the property of Juliana Winters of Oklahoma City, had to be content with a \$1,055 purse. The show price: \$2.80. Casey Lambert was up.

Saturday's excellent program—which also included the \$112,817 Rainbow Futurity Consolation at 400 yards—attracted the season's second-biggest crowd of 7,008, who wagered a seasonal high of \$796,990.

Fill Mackis Cup is by Raise A Cup out of Charo.

The Rainbow Consolation went to American Speed, a 4-1 shot owned by Haymaker Farms Limited of Yukon, Oklahoma. Rudy Bustamante was up.

American Speed outfought Budget Approval (6-1) in the final stages of the 400 yard dash, winning by a head and earning \$24,709. The colt returned \$10.60, \$5.20, \$4.20.

Budget Approval, with Larry Byers up, banked \$17,296 and returned \$5.60. \$4.80. Torch Lighter (6-1) collected \$13,178 for third. The show price: \$6.60. The winning time for the consolation was 20 05.

Lodgers asked to do survey

A "visitors origin survey" has been mailed to 70 Ruidoso lodgers. According to Tommy Morel, vice president of advertising for the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, the results should clear the way for better days ahead.

"All of the lodgers in Ruidoso have an enormous wealth of visitor information contained in their files," Morel wrote to lodgers, "and it is our hope that some of this information can be gathered together and studied in depth so that we can better utilize the advertising funds available to us."

The letter Morel sent accompanied the visitor survey, and included complete instructions on how to participate in the study.

He told lodgers that one of the tasks facing the advertising committee is to "determine exactly where in the U.S. our visitors are coming from, which will then enable us to pinpoint our marketing efforts in the upcoming '84-'85 advertising campaign."

Morel said later that it had been

determined that there were 21,000 registration cards filled out from July 1983 to June of this year.

If one of every 15 cards were referred to as planned, he said, the study would provide a substantial amount of information about where the tourists are coming from and how long they stay.

"This is the most critical piece of information that we need to get our research started," Morel said. "This is the foundation for what we're doing. If we don't get this correct, then the other work we do will not be as correct as it can be."

He said the accumulated findings will be shared with all businesses interested, whether or not they are chamber members. The information could help a business determine what advertising strategy to adopt over the next year.

The survey is a standard marketing practice that is geared at advertising and marketing. Morel said that zip codes provided on the surveys will determine Areas of Dominant Influence (ADI), which will help determine where to send advertising dollars.

The ADI system is one used by broadcasting companies to pinpoint the geographical areas where viewers and listeners are tuning in.

Morel said the primary tourist markets as of today are El Paso, Dallas-Fort Worth, Albuquerque, Midland-Odessa, Lubbock, Houston and Amarillo.

Secondary markets include Roswell, Austin, San Antonio, Oklahoma City, Phoenix, Tucson, Denver and Southern California.

Within three or four years, Morel predicted, Los Angeles and other parts of Southern California will be slowly moving up the scale as important tourist markets.

Once the surveys are received, the information will be processed during a period of several weeks. Each lodger then will be given a copy of the findings, Morel said, so they can see the result of their efforts.

He said he hoped to get the surveys back from the lodgers within 30 days—sooner if possible.

"It doesn't need to be done all at once," he said. "It can be done in their spare time." Morel figures it should take no lodger more than two hours to complete the survey.

The result in the end, he said, will be smarter advertising buys and a better handle on what to expect from the tourist season.

"The more wisely the advertising dollars are spent," Morel said, "the better the results will be for each business in town. It's meant to benefit the gift shop, the gas stations, everybody. It's like the lodgers' contribution to the Village of Ruidoso."


Banquet tonight

A full-grown black bear that had been marauding garbage cans at the 150 Oak Drive residence of Char Collyns was captured Thursday night in a New Mexico Game and Fish Department trap. According to Collyns, she first became aware of the bear "generally disturbing things" Saturday night. The bear returned almost every night until finally being

caught in the trap Thursday.

Collyns said she suspected the bear may be the same bear that had been raising havoc in the Upper Canyon area, since the Collyns' Ponderosa Heights home is very near the Upper Canyon area.

Collyns said it was not the first bear to visit her home. "Lord, I've had them every summer," she said.

Game and Fish Officer Ernie Sandoval Reported that the bear was the first caught in the past two years. He said he had only set the trap twice so far this year, the second time being for capture of the Ponderosa Heights

bear. Sandoval said the trap is only set in extreme cases, when a bear is actually causing some problems.

The trapped bear was taken to the Capitan Gap area and released. Sandoval said bears "make a beeline" for the nearest available cover when released.

That may not be the end of the problem, though, because bears often return within a few weeks to the Ruidoso area after being relocated to the Capitan Gap, according to Sandoval.

Either way, there's a bear out there somewhere who's going to think twice before going on his next garbage can raid!

LTC continues line item adjustments

Persistent efforts to arrive at reasonable lodgers' tax budget line items seemed to be the focus of a second budget workshop conducted Friday by members of the Lodgers' Tax Committee (LTC).

The often hotly debated budget line items were changed again at the Friday special meeting, just days after the group formulated an initial list of proposed budget line items for the 1984-1985 lodgers' tax budget.


Those budget line items are scheduled to be discussed with members of the Ruidoso village council at 3 p.m. Tuesday, July 24.

The action is a result of the council's decision not to pass the lodgers' budget line items when it approved the budget at the June 12 meeting of the council. Debate during the line item workshops over the \$170,000 budget centered on the use of the funds by the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce.

Several times during the Friday meeting, concern surfaced over the degree to which lodgers' tax funds are used to support the chamber. Some line items were cut with recommendations that the chamber either get more out of the approved money or seek other funding sources.

Early in the meeting the contractual services line item was cut from \$11,000 to \$8,500. The group had previously pared the same line item at the earlier workshop, cutting the original request from \$12,500 to \$11,000.

"My calculations show there may

be an excess of what is needed," LTC member Budgie Green said of the line item, which pays the salary of two part-time tourist counselors at the chamber. Green said he based his \$8,500 proposal on a 36-hour week at \$4.50 an hour. He proposed that the remaining requested \$4,000 be put into the contingency fund on the condition that the chamber come back for it later in the year "if they can substantiate (the need for) it."

Also affected was the chamber's request for \$12,000 to attend two trade shows. The LTC members left the amount requested intact, but added a

stipulation that the money be used for three trade shows, instead of two.

Other items remained as decided at the first workshop of the group. The line items will be recommended for approval by the council at the July 24 meeting.

Also during the LTC meeting, member Phil Hamilton voiced concern over remarks made recently by chamber leadership.

"I'm concerned about Chamber of Commerce remarks that they're going to pull out of the advertising program," Hamilton said. "I don't know how to take the chamber's remarks—as a threat or seriously."

Hamilton proposed that some thought be given to the formulation of a tourist bureau that would be set up by the village if the chamber leadership did indeed decline to participate in the lodgers' tax advertising effort.

Green suggested at one point in the meeting that the \$40,000 council-approved funds portion of the lodgers' tax budget could be used to hire an advertising agency to handle the promotion of the village if necessary.

Member Joan Bailey, however, strongly opposed those ideas. "What better vehicle to do the advertising of Ruidoso than the Chamber of Commerce," she commented.

In other action, the committee voted to set aside the council-approved \$40,000 for promotion of Ruidoso.

"I understand that the funds are to promote Ruidoso," LTC member Rod Adamson said. "We should encourage people to come forward with ideas to promote Ruidoso."

Other committee members agreed with Adamson's suggestion. The group voted that any individuals or groups who want to present ideas for funding by LTC should submit a completed LTC form detailing the request by the first of the month the presentation is to be made.

The request then will be reviewed by LTC members prior to the regular LTC meeting of that month, when the request will be heard.

Groups or individuals who receive funding, and those who have recently been funded, will be required to complete a followup report for the committee after the event, detailing its success.

The LTC also heard village councillor Jerry Shaw request an accounting from chamber officials of what became of \$1,000 in returned state-matching monies. According to Shaw, a past chamber event ran \$1,500 over budget, but \$2,500 was returned to the chamber by Epstein Communications, the advertising agency that handles all local advertising that goes through the state-matching monies program.

Chamber president James Paxton agreed to explain the discrepancy at a future LTC meeting.

In other business the LTC voted to appoint Hamilton to the Advertising Committee of the chamber board of directors.

The committee also instructed Bailey to lodge an LTC request with the chamber board that all lodgers in Ruidoso who pay lodgers' tax be listed on the chamber lodgers directory, if the directory is to be paid for with lodgers' tax monies.

Racing wrapup

Mr Easy Ed never gave his competition a fighting chance and cruised to a 3 1/4-length victory in Friday's \$11,875 Flying Charm Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The five-year-old gelding, leased by George W. Suthers of Arnett, Oklahoma, raced as a 2-1 second favorite in the 870-yard sprint. It was the gelding's first try at that distance.

Mr Easy Ed zipped over the course in a swift 45.34 seconds, which eclipsed the previous seasonal mark established by Short Shrift at 45.43 on May 28.

First place in the Flying Charm was worth \$7,125 and the mutuel returns amounted to \$6, \$6.40 and \$4.40. The win was the gelding's third straight. Gary Sumpter was up.

Mr Easy Ed is by the thoroughbred stallion, Hempen, out of the Easy Jet mare, Easy Life. G.H. Suthers is the breeder. Joe D. Merrick is the trainer.

Special Hank, the longtime 870 star at Ruidoso, squeezed through tight stretch traffic and came on gamely to finish second in the Flying Charm, a neck in front of the 52-1 outsider, Holly Dolly Jet.

Special Hank (a thoroughbred) earned \$2,612 for his owner, Lowell Hankins of Rocksprings, Texas, and refunded mutuel payoffs of \$5, \$6, \$3.60. Salustio Burgos was up. Holly Dolly Jet (\$9.40) collected \$1,187 for third.

After jumping into a quick two-length lead, Mr Easy Ed had the Flying Charm sewed up. He was never threatened and reached the top of the stretch at least three lengths on top. It was a coasting jaunt the rest of the way.

Mr Easy Ed scored a major triumph last summer at Ruidoso when he finished a close fourth (at 38-1) in the \$1,500,583 All-American Gold Cup and earned \$105,041.

Another highlight of Friday's card came in the ninth race, when My Going Jesse blasted out a 4 1/2-length win at four furlongs and equalled the track record of 44 3/5 seconds (set by Norgor on August 14, 1976).

My Going Jesse, a seven-year-old gelding owned by Preston Farms of Burk Burnett, Texas, raced as a 7-5 second favorite under Mike Lidberg. He led all the way.

Mr Master Bug, the third-richest

quarter horse of all time with winnings of \$1,569,761, struggled to a neck win in Thursday's fifth race at Ruidoso Downs and set the top qualifying time for the \$104,715 World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic.

Thursday's program included four 440-yard trial spins for the Classic. Mr Master Bug, owned by Marvin Barnes of Ada, Oklahoma, raced as an odds-on favorite in his trial spin, and had to pour on the coals to hold off the persistent 8-1 outsider, Dynago Victory.

Mr Master Bug was clocked at 21.895 (with a tailwind), and that time held up as the fastest of the day. The Classic finale comes up on Sunday, July 29, and hands the winner \$52,357. That amount, if it goes to Mr Master Bug, would put the four-year-old colt's career total ahead of Highesterjet's second-best total of \$1,617,209 on the all-time money list.

Sailing Blade, a four-year-old gelding who has been no worse than third in three of his last four tries, takes a dip in class for Thursday's headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

The seven-furlong sprint for \$17,500 claimers puts up a \$4,500 purse. Nine head will go to the post.

The racing weekend extends through Sunday. First post each day is 1 p.m.

The list of activities on tap during the week includes the 12th annual Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale for Selected Thoroughbred Yearlings, scheduled for Friday and Saturday evenings in the All-American Sales Arena on the track grounds. Each session begins at 7:30 p.m.

A hundred and eighty-nine yearlings have been catalogued, making the 1984 edition of the Summer Sale the biggest in its history.

Saturday's racing agenda includes the \$10,000-added Ruidoso Speed Handicap for three-year-olds and up. The distance is four furlong.

On Sunday, two stakes are in the works: the \$12,000-added Billy The Kid Handicap for three-year-olds and up at one mile; and the finale of the \$104,715 World's Championship Classic at 440 yards.

Thursday's program also includes two elimination trials for the six-furlong Rio Grande Futurity for New Mexico-breds. The trials are slated as the ninth and tenth races.

Before Maroline Smith returns to Jamaica, she will address a special meeting of Women's Aglow Fellowship of Ruidoso at 7 p.m. today (Monday).

She and her husband, Robert Smith, left Ruidoso in March to found Prince of Peace Ministries in the Caribbean. They returned to Ruidoso a few weeks ago. Both are licensed ministers and graduates of RHEMA Bible College in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The Smiths returned from Hopewell, Jamaica, to the United States in June. They are buying supplies and equipment in this country, after a primitive start in Jamaica.

"I had one little tin table and a hotplate under a banana tree," Maroline Smith said. "We ate anything put before us, including goat's belly."

While in the States, the couple have ministered at camp meetings and other occasions in Texas, New Mexico and Arizona.

When Maroline Smith spoke of Hopewell and her experiences there, the smile on her usually cheerful face broadened. The blue eyes that matched her suit so well started to twinkle.

"We went to stay three days and stayed three months," she said. The Smiths plan to return to Jamaica and the surrounding islands within a few weeks.

At a time in life when some people talk about taking it easy with their grandchildren, Maroline Smith is planning a fresh direction.

Of course, the Smiths have a fami-

ly, including five children. All are born-again Christians, Smith said proudly, and support their parents with prayers. A daughter-in-law also acts as secretary for the mission project.

When asked about all the changes after their retirement, Smith said, "We didn't plan on it. Bob was an engineer and salesman for RCA. I was a charge nurse." They moved permanently to what had been their weekend cabin in Ruidoso.

Mrs. Smith is from Hamilton, Texas, a town near Dallas. Mr. Smith is a California native retired from the United States Navy.

Smith became a nurse after she became a grandmother, and her husband became a pilot after he became a grandfather, she said.

"We never did have a dull life," Smith reflected. "People used to say, if you get bored, go over to the Smiths' house. But compared to what it is walking as a disciple of Jesus, that was dull."

Their new direction started while they were out of town.

"We were in St. Thomas in the Virgin Islands and the Lord called me in an audible voice," she said. Within hours, Smith was calling the Bible college to enroll. That was in 1980.

She explained why she went back to school. "I'm a registered nurse. I don't think you'd want to take a job in a hospital without training, and I don't think we could do any less for the Lord."

Smith was raised a Baptist, but when they were in Ruidoso, she and her husband attended Trinity Mountain Fellowship. "As far as I'm con-

except Wednesday, and sometimes they were busy then.

The missionary doesn't know how long she and Bob will stay in the Caribbean, but she is sure of one thing.

"We'll stay until Jesus says it's time to go," she said.

Pony Express to carry mail

On one day this summer, postal patrons can step back into history and send their letters by Pony Express. Riders in the 16th Annual Pony Express Race Saturday, August 4, will carry mail from Lincoln to White Oaks. The letters will then be transferred to ordinary mail channels, and can continue to any destination in the world.

The race will begin at 8 a.m. at Double Crossing, about two miles west of Lincoln. One or two riders for each entry will use four mounts to get through the mountains north of Capitan and Lincoln, through Encinoso, and on to White Oaks.

A winner is expected to ride into the mining ghost town about two hours after the start of the race. Spectators are encouraged to watch the riders, although some rules must be followed about the use of vehicles near the riders.

A horseshoe tournament, a barbecue and an amateur rodeo will follow the race. Organizers also have scheduled a Western dance at 9 p.m. in the White Oaks Casino and Museum.

Anyone interested in sending a letter on the 41-mile Pony Express route should address the envelope in the usual way, including the required amount of postage. The lower left corner of the front of the envelope should be left blank for the commemorative seal.

The letter should be placed in another, larger envelope with \$1 and mailed to Pony Express Race, Post Office Box 596, Capitan, NM 88316. Letters must reach Capitan by Thursday, August 2, to guarantee inclusion in the race.

Billy the Kid Pageant in Early August

The Annual "Last Escape of Billy the Kid" will be held, as it has since 1949, in the first weekend in August.

This year's director, Betty Bennett, has announced that practice begins Tuesday evening, July twenty-four.

About this time of year thirty-five years ago, Wilbur Coe told me: "Danny, I want you to come over to Lincoln and help us put on the, Day in Old Lincoln."

The year 1940 was New Mexico's four-hundredth birthday or its "Quarcentennial." That year all over New Mexico celebrations of one kind or another were held commemorating this milestone in the state's history.

Wilbur Frank Coe, at that time president of the Lincoln County Historical Society, established the "Day in Old Lincoln." This was a day honoring the pioneers of Lincoln County and the Southwest, many of

whom were alive at that time. Mostly the day was devoted to various ways of honoring the old-timers, renewing old acquaintances and telling of the old days.

As a part of this day, Wilbur decided to have a historical pageant of the early days in Lincoln County.

For this purpose the Historical Society, under Wilbur's direction, employed a veteran Hollywood script writer, Blending Sloan, and his young assistant, Mark Hamilton, to write a script.

For their source material they took a book that had come off the press in 1924 or 1925 entitled, "The Saga of Billy the Kid," by Walter Noble Burns.

It so happened that Burns got almost all his material from Frank Coe, a friend and companion of Billy, as was his cousin George, who later wrote an excellent book of the early days entitled "Frontier Fighter."

One way or another Sloan and Hamilton, with the help of Wilbur, came up with the title, "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid," which remains to this day—and is a fine title except for one thing: Can we be sure it was his last escape?

However, this "shadow of a doubt" does not keep it from being a good sketch of early Lincoln County. Sloan and Hamilton fell under the spell of the world famous "Lincoln County War" and "gave it their best shot."

With the result that the pageant has become world famous and has grown from one night to two and finally three.

Like we say, the first pageant was held in 1940 with the streets of Lincoln acting as the stage and the folks watching from the sides of the street. It was very realistic, complete with ox carts, stage coaches, wagons.

The first Billy the Kid was Peter Hurd. Since then there have been six Billys.

During the years of World War II, the Day in Old Lincoln together with the pageant was discontinued and then revived in 1949. That year, the Kid was John Davis, now of Albuquerque, to be followed through the thirty-five years since that time by John Thomas; Tom and Earl Taylor, both great-grandsons of George Coe; Billy Shrecengost, Jr.; and last year's and this year's Kid, Bert David Shrecengost.

The script is essentially the same as the original, except for additions through the years, by Nora Henn, Ralph Bonnell, Edward Penfield, David Shrecengost and especially by Dave Parks, who has been a mainstay of the show these many years as the narrator.

The show is in a class by itself in Folk Pageants. Be prepared to come over the first weekend in August and help Betty Bennett and the two hundred or more local actors and actresses turn the clock back a little over one hundred years.





Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE—It would be hard to think of any job more useless than that of developing a political platform.

All the blah and hoorah about what goes into such documents is really only so much wind. What they say makes not the slightest difference to anyone within 24 hours after they have been formally adopted by those strange tribal gatherings we call political conventions.

Test: Tell us in your own words the contents of two or more planks in the platform adopted this week by the Democrats in solemn conclave in San Francisco. Then estimate how many extra votes those planks will attract to or repel from the Democratic candidates who are theoretically going to run on this platform.

It is a simple fact that almost no one pays the slightest attention to these collections of platitudes, no matter how much care and attention may have been put into them by those who feel honored to be named as draftsmen. They are, in truth, as phony as the conventions at which they are enacted.

If you don't think political conventions are phony, you have never been to one.

New Mexico's Republican biggies spent more than two hours last weekend haggling over a platform which was summarized like this: "The document called for a commitment to economic growth, equality of opportunity and a climate conducive to individual achievement."

Who can be against any of that?

Are these phrases which capture the unique essence of Republicanism and will cause voters en masse to transfer their loyalty to that specific political party? Is there anything there to which a totally convinced, dyed-in-the-wool Democrat could not also subscribe?

Was it worthwhile, in short, bothering to go to the trouble of adopting this document? Would it have mattered to anyone if that had not been done?

A further note on the same Republican state convention:

Many of the leaders of that party, most of them men, are inclined to boast about their modernity and

broad-mindedness in naming women to so many of the delegate slots assigned our state.

One's admiration for their generosity in giving up their traditional masculine power cools slightly at the realization that nothing at all is to be accomplished at the convention to which these women were so daringly dispatched.

You can't help asking yourself if the males would have been so cooperative if there had been some good fights in the offing.

Is there any real difference between the two major political parties? A recent guest on Bill Buckley's television program made this point: Few Republican politicians are full-time professionals at that trade, while almost all serious Democratic politicians are.

It makes for significant differences, in attitude and in dedication to the work. If it is your bread and butter, as it is to most Demo polys, you are going to give your full attention to the matter. If you have a generous income from other sources, as many Republican bigwigs do, you are not likely to be as devoted or as motivated.

But the commentator in this case allowed for one exception. "Those people who believed in and worked for Barry Goldwater," he said, "conducted themselves like full-time professionals—which is why we have Ronald Reagan in the White House today."

Like Barry himself, many of those Goldwaterites are aging now and slowing down. They didn't elect their man, and the common wisdom has it that they couldn't have pulled that off no matter what happened.

But the Republicans have occupied the White House 60 percent of the time since Goldwater's run, and they may be on their way to another four years in power.

That's not a bad accomplishment in the face of all those professional politicians on the other side, who can't get it through their heads that it's the GOP they should be venting their wrath on.

Eight Lincoln County residents have received on-the-job training this year through a state Employment Security Department (ESD) program.

ty residents could receive on-the-job training through the federally funded Job Training Partnership Act. The ESD-operated program pays one-half of the training costs—up to a maximum of six months—to any employer who hires these workers, Lopez noted. ESD administers the on-the-job program through its local area office.



From pencil strokes to colorful pastels to the wonders of prismacolor, works by four local artists are being showcased this month in the main room of the Ruidoso Public Library.

Organized by artist Nancy Fleharty, the works represent a range of art media and subject matter, and have been professionally framed for display.

Fleharty is among the four artists

represented in the showing. Her work is done in prismacolor, an art medium she equates partially with drawing in color. The method employs the use of color pencils.

An illustrator and calligrapher, Fleharty began organizing library art shows as president of the 20/20 Gallery Cooperative. She now illustrates advertisements for The Attic, Emily's, the Road Runner and Daily Plant-It, when not involved with her art.

Tom Hyland, whose work is in pen-

cil and charcoal, is a graphic artist and sign painter. His "Girl from Lake Turkana, Kenya" is done strictly in pencil, and evokes a sense of distant emotion brought suddenly into focus.

Another prismacolor artist, J. D. Yoakum, is also a graphic artist and sign painter. Many of her designs have been immortalized in cloth as T-shirt fronts for Sierra Graphics.

Of the artists represented, only Kevin Johnson is working out of state. Now painting and teaching would-be

skiers in New York state, he has had his work shown in different areas of the country, as well as abroad.

Johnson's work in pastel is unusual and satisfying, and seems to reflect the diverse experiences he has accumulated in his travels about the world.

All four artists are well presented in a showing that is varied and representative of contemporary art. The display will continue through the end of July.

Players rent for \$3.95 per night Monday through Thursday and \$5.95 per night Friday and Saturday for members.

Memberships run \$20 for 6 months; \$30 for one year; and \$60 for lifetime memberships. Bryant said she would not be "Gone With the Wind." She plans more locations in the future.

Rainbow Home Video is open Monday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Friday and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Don't forget to pick up some popcorn on the way home.






